

And that clicked-hard-in our mind.



CMI ADOPTS MORE OF "THE CASH BOX" PROPOSALS

Tells Nation's Assns It Will Start "Nat'l Tax Council", "Nat'l Credit Bureau", "Nat'l Distribs' Organization and Help to Eliminate Federal Excise Taxes. Will Increase Public Relations Work.

CHICAGO—The CMI (Coin Machine Industries, Inc.) adopted many more proposals, first put forward before the industry by *The Cash Box* when, in a meeting with all association presidents and managers as well as the press this past week (Monday, Feb. 3), Dave Gottlieb, president of CMI, announced that this organization would create a "National Tax Council", a "National Credit Bureau", would help to eliminate the Federal excise taxes and put together a distributors' group.

The Cash Box now further waits for Coin Machine Industries, Inc. to adopt its suggestions for the creation of a "School for Mechanics" as well as a "National Board of Trade". The latter to act as a common meeting ground for all associations, all independents and all connected with the coin machine industry.

In the meantime, CMI also announced at this meeting that it was going to greatly increase its public relations effort. (Over four and a half years ago *The Cash Box* proposed and continued to suggest at regular intervals that there be created a "Public Relations Bureau".) This was the first proposal of *The Cash Box* which CMI adopted. Now that CMI plans to further the efforts of its "Public Relations Bureau" all connected with the industry are tremendously pleased.

A speech in this regard was made by James T. Mangan who is director of the public relations program for CMI. Jim Gilmore, secretary-manager of CMI, called upon the associations individually at this meeting and asked for any suggestions which could be given to CMI in helping with the work necessary to carry forth the "National Tax Council", "National Credit Bureau", help eliminate the present mess of Federal excise taxes and also bring about a distributors' national organization.

The truth of the matter is that very few really worthwhile suggestions were offered in this direction by those present. Most related their own problems and a few told how they worked their organization plans. But, there is no doubt that once these men return to their respective homes and have time to think clearly they will offer some very fine suggestions to CMI which should help put these proposals of *The Cash Box*, which CMI have now adopted, over the top.

Present for CMI at this meeting and sitting at a speakers' table were: Dave Gottlieb, president; James T. Mangan, director of Public Relations Bureau; James Gilmore, secretarymanager of CMI; John Chrest of Exhibit Supply Co. and Ferdinand H. Parsons of Buckley Mfg. Co. The two latter are directors of CMI.

Among the associations present were: Jay Bullock of Southern California Music Operators Assn.; LeRoy Stein of the Music Guild of America, Newark, N. J.; Al Denver and Sidney H. Levine of the Automatic Music Operators Assn. of New York (Levine is attorney for this group); Jack Cohen of the Cleveland music ops assn.; McKim Smith who heads the Arcade Owners Assn.; Joe Brilliant, president of the Detroit music ops assn.; Chas. Cantor of the Cincinnati assn.; Col. R. E. L. Choate of the Alabama music ops assn. and some others.

CONVENTION BIGG TEMPO SLOWER Orders Placed Just as Great as Ever

But Wild and Hectic Speed Action of Pre-War Years Missing

CHICAGO — The old timers who wandered thruout the aisles of displays at this past 14th Annual Convention and Exhibition of Coin Machine Industries, Inc. felt that "something was lacking."

As they stated, "I don't know what it is—but, something's missing."

And this statement became general as the convention continued with more and more coinmen asking just what had happened to the "old-time show flavor".

As far as the placement of orders for new products was concerned, according to the exhibitors, these were "just as great as ever".

But, as far as the wild and hectic speed action of the old pre-war conventions—this was definitely lacking.

No longer was there shouting and running and tumulting.

The coinmen have not slowed down. They have become more dignified. They now realize that this is big business. That this is a business which requires many millions of dollars of capitalization from leading finance organizations and that these organizations are not in agreement with the short-sighted speedy hectic action of the old days.

There were more serious business meetings than ever before. There were more serious private discussions. Buyers were careful. These men did not plunge as they did in the old days. They studied the products they needed, chose quietly and carefully and then purchased in the quantity they were certain they could use.

There weren't as many new faces around the floor as there were in pre-war days. In those pre-war conventions exhibitors were always checking with each other on new men who came to place orders with them. This year there was very little such checking necessary for most of the men who attended were from well known firms and the few who weren't prominent in their areas always were with others from the same territory who instantly vouched for them.

Furthermore, many noted jobbers and distributors would walk along with their leading operators and wait to see these men purchase equipment prior to making any commitments.

This, too, slowed up the old-time, pre-war tempo of the show when distribs plunged by purchasing a large quantity of machines and then brought their customers over to the booths to sell them on the equipment.

This time the action was reversed. The manufacturers did the selling and the distribs learned from their jobbers and operators just what had happened and then committed themselves—cautiously and carefully.

All in all, as one noted coinman expressed himself, "This was for the best. It showed," he claimed, "that the trade was tending to better business methods and that, generally, all would benefit from such action."

Others believed that the slower tempo and the more conservative air of the convention was due to the fact that the coinmen hadn't as yet adjusted themselves to meetings of this kind and that it would take a few years before they would again get back into hectic speed action.

Some claimed that a great part of the slower tempo could be attributed to the present recession period and that coinmen were carefully judging their purchases in keeping with lowered collections—awaiting the boom —collection spurt to once more speed up the entire tempo of the trade. YOU CAN

"Linda" "Roses In The Rain" MATT DENNIS & PAUL WESTON ORCH. (Capitol 362)


• A ballad destined for interesting action "Linda." Done here by Matt Dennis with instrumental support from the smooth Paul Weston Orchestra, the number emerges as a profitable item for the trade. Of Matt's performance it can be said that he is a "comer." But, in fairness, it must be added that this is not his best disk. And that is so because the arrangement to which "Linda" is done has a bit too much bounce to it to score to the extent it might have had it been more carefully paced. On the flipover, he has less material to work from. "Roses In The Rain" is strictly a filler item, tho, as such, it does satisfy. At any rate give the top side a try. Peg it for your spots where they like their romantic yodeling delivered at a lively pace, and you'll do well with it.

"Rainbow at Midnight" "Kentucky Waltz" EDDIE DEAN (Majestic 11004)

• "Rainbow At Midnight," one of the most profitable folk tunes in current popularity is given one of the best interpretations it has yet received on this platter which features Eddie Dean & His Boys. Of course the top attraction is Eddie's vocal stint; he serves up the lyries in a fashion that will bring coinage from patrons who thought they had tired of hearing the The instrumental accompaniment it ditty. nets from Dean's men is strictly in keeping with the best that can be offered, so the whole side emerges as something the trade should get next to by all means. On the flip, with "Kentucky Waltz," ops with spots where the folk tunes are in demand will find that Eddie has provided them with another strong coin puller for use after the top deck has been worn white.

"I Tipped My Hat And Slowly Rode Away" "If This Isn't Love" JACK SMITH (Capitol)

A western style ballad heavily loaded with "sleeper" possibilities is "I Tipped My Hat And Slowly Rode Away." Done heré by Jack Smith, assisted by a vocal combo. the tune comes up as something certainly worthy of attentive listening from ops who never before had reason or occasion to use Smith's platters on their phonos. As usual, Smith's voice radiates gaiety and reminds one of a guy who never experienced a hangover in his life, but it may be that the style scores at last with this tune. At any rate. make sure to hear it. On the flip. Smith takes on "If This Isn't Love." The presentation is a happy little offering, and Smith sounds very happy doing it. But unless you have a call for Jack's work, it'll be the topside only for interesting action.



• Selected as the top coin winner this week is Eddy Howard's disking of "I Want To Thank Your Folks." Reported in music circles as a tune that'll be given No. 1 plugging by its pub, that factor is bound to bring it to the attention of the public ear via a number of powerful mediums, and, adding to that the first rate treatment it nets on this side of wax from the smooth Howard ork and the silken piping of Mister Howard, you have a disk tailor made to fit the top money-making brackets. On the flipover the platter features "Too Many Times," an effective ditty that's given a neat performance by Eddy, with the assistance of his Trio. Snatch the platter. You probably have a legion of customers waiting to hear the master on wax again.

"It Might Have Been A Different Story" "Speaking of Angels" TEX BENEKE AND THE MILLER ORCH. (Victor 20-2123)

• A pair of smoothies to come off the Beneke-Miller bandstand are the latest pair of ballads titled, "It Might Have Been A Different Story" and "Speaking of Angels." Featuring Gary Stevens as the choir boy, the music men make mellow backing the lad up. It's good stuff, done up in that slow romantic mood, and where the hand holding crowds gather, they should go for this. Reminiscent of the old Miller ork, folks will sit back and gather both sides in.

"Young and Wild" "Take Me Out Of The Rain" WYNONIE HARRIS (Apollo 381)

• Here's that main again making merry blues. Wynonie Harris aided by Johnny Alston's All-Stars, steps out to do "Young and Wild," and brother, latch on. It's blues in its deepest sense, and Wynonie's rendition is tops. Backed by "Take Me Out of The Rain," Wynonie offers ops more blues that rate high. The accompaniment features some of the best boys in the biz. Ops with race spots—grab these sides.

"How Are Things In Glocca Morra?" "When I'm Not Near The One I Love" TOMMY DORSEY ORCHESTRA (RCA-Victor 20-2021)

• Peg "How Are Things In Glocca Mo ra" as a tune that'll hit the top in popular ity thruout the nation. Now consider this waxing of the song as one of the best yet released on it, comparable only to the out standing side cut by Martha Tilton. Handling the vitally important vocal chore here is Stuart Foster, and of his interpretation only the highest praise can be offered. Ditto as much for the splendid arrangement and support he receives from the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra. The song, out of the Broad-way musical "Finian's Rainbow," is getting plenty of plugging and plenty of waxing. but even without these, it can climb hitward on its own. On the reverse, the same voice and the same hands work out with "When I'm Not Near The One I Love." Also out of "Finian," the tune doesn't appear to have what it takes to effect a standout on the phonos.

"How Are Things In Glocca Morra?" "When I'm Not Near The Girl I Love" TOMMY DORSEY ORCHESTRA (RCA-Victor 20-2121)

• Here's an oldic brought back to life by list of just about every music op in the land and as done here by the Tommy Dorsey ork, with Stuart Foster on the vocal, the side stacks up as equal to the best yet heard. "Glocca Morra" is great phono fare for dancers or listeners, for the tayern and the bobby sox trade, and it's just a matter of time before this click from the Broadway musical "Finian's Rainbow" spurts its way to among the top of anybody's hit list. On the flip they do "When I'm Not Near The Girl I Love," also a tune out of "Finian,' but a long way below the click stuff from which "Glocca" has been made. As done here, with Foster again taking on the vocal stint, the TD crew make pleasant music. but the song itself lacks the meat to serve as an adequate showcase for their talent.

"... And Two Is Eight" "Could It Have Been" AL DONAHUE ORCH. (University 508)

• Here's an oldie brought gack to ilfe by the Al Donahue ork, that the kids in the icc-cream parlors should go for. "And Two is Eight" offers the Donahue crew chiming in chorus and maestro Al in there with a spot vocal. It's got that same jump beat it had years ago, and the popularity the ditty had then, may earry the tune now. Backed by "Could It Have Been." chirp Penny Piper renders a fair vocal on a ballad that might be classed as stock. Ops that need fillers might do well by this pair.

• Oh, are they going to play this one! They'll wear the wax white, so help me. It's "Opus #1" with hyrics. Anita O'Day, as per her usual, renders as smooth a performance as can be heard. The kids that jumped to this tune for so many years while they played it straight, will by all means, beat a path to your phono for this one again. The Krupa ork, make mellow music backing up the chirp, who's vocal shines like a beacon. Backed by an all instrumental titled "Val Triste," it's Krupa all the way, displaying the wares of his bandsmen on a pepped up side. For money in the bank, grab on to "Opus #1"!

"Love Is Such A Random Thing" "That's The Beginning Of The End" BOBBY DOYLE

(Signature 15067)

• With loads of romantic appeal and a flair for making the moon-in-june crowd sit back, Bobby Doyle offers ops a pair of tender ballads that add up to eoin catching. Topside tune is "Love Is Such A Random Thing." and Bobby boy does it up in that sweet mood for which he is noted. Backed by a number, which has long been in the phono's. Bobby's retidition of the ditty will definitely add to its appeal. The Ray Bloch ork back the choir boy, and of course they lend full support in top manner.

"Big Fine Girl" "Let Your Pride Be Your Guide" GEECHIE SMITH (Capitol 365)

• Latest pair of race ditty's to emanate from this waxery feature Gecchie Smith moaning the blues. "Big Fine Girl" is wrapped up in the stuff: it's slow, tender and Geechie's voeal adds to the quality of the tune. Backed by "Let Your Pride Be Your Guide," this side shapes up as stock. A jump chorus by the combo sets it right for awhile, and Geechie comes back to take the windup. Both sides won't stop traffic, but ops who can use fillers, might do well with this pair.

STAN KENTON ORCH. (Capitol 361)

@ Rockin' in high calypso rhythm. and heading for an orehid in the phono's, is this piece from Stan Kenton, titled. "His Feet Too Big For De Bed." The entire family will walk around singing and humming this ditty. It's got chanteuse June Christy knoeking out the lyrics, and the gal really lets out on this one. Reminiscent of past calypso favorites, the ditty shapes up as a sure coin-catcher. Λ chorus joins June in her chanting and they blend well with the chirp. Stan's artistry stands out on top and one particular riff he uses will have the kids shouting. Baeked by "After You," a sentimental ballad shows up The Pastels to very good advantage. If you are looking for sure coinaction, then latch on to the topside tune.

"My Day Is Complete" "They'll Do It Every Time" JAMES CRAWLEY'S MUSICAL CHIPS (Super-Disc)

• Wanna sit back and relax? Then latch on to this waxing of "My Day Is Complete." It's slow race stuff, the kind that will make you dream. Featuring Cortland Carter on the voeal, the kid spoons his way through the ditty in neat style, crooning a ballad that definitely has possibilities. Backed by "They'll Do It Every Time," the group and Carter turn up more race stock, in a shouting manner. Action for the pair will come on "My Day Is Complete."

"When You're Not There" "I Wasn't Born In Ireland" THE STARDUSTERS (Swan 8003)

• The Stardusters step out here to do a pair of rhythmic ballads that ops should by all means, listen to. Topside tune, "When You're Not Thege" offers the combo in perfect harmony, blending a ditty that the starry eyed crowd should go for. The Phil Napoleon ork provide the group with ample support. Flipped, we find, "I Wasu't Born In Ireland," and ops who latch on, are bound to catch-coin with this one during the St. Patty season. Ops will have to pick their spots with both sides, but never theless, look for the shamrock ditty.

"I Want To Thank Your Folks" "That's Where I Came In" PERRY COMO (Victor 20-2117)

• The Perry Como fans will go for this pair. Due for heavy plugging is Perry's. "I Want To Thank Your Folks." in which he emphasizes the sweet and sentimental side of you. Perry's voeal, is of course, the top quality for which he is so well noted. On the backside with, "That's Where I Came In." the troubador once more renders another sweet, melodic ballad. Spinning slowly, Perry's voice sinks in with deep feeling, and allows the customer to catch the soft tones of the ork, directed by Lloyd Shaffer. Ops should without a doubt, lend an car to this pair.

"Step It Up And Go" "Little Woman, You're So Sweet" BLIND BOY FULLER (Columbia 37230)

• Unique in its manner, Blind Boy Fuller's latest, titled "Step It Up and Go," really does just that, it steps but and goes. En hanced with a jump beat, Fuller renders his vocal in top fashion, that will make the race fans move. For accompaniment, Blind Boy uses a guitar and washboard, and the backing is so good, folks will think he has a full ork behind him. Backside with "Little Woman, You're So Sweet," rates an Fuller's vocal versatility. Look for top side tune for the action.

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

Big 1947 Program **Revealed At CMI Public Relations Meet**

CHICAGO—A call for a definite concen-tration for the betterment of the in-dustry's public relations with the partici-pation of all the nation's coinmen was sounded at a special meeting held here this past week as part of the CMI Show program. program.

this past week as part of the CMI Show program. Supervised by Dave Gottlieb, president of CMI, and James T. Mangan, director of the CMI Public Relations Bureau, the meeting served to advise the trade of the plans, policies and accomplishments of the bureau, and to gather additional ma-terial and ideas which could be put to effective use in behalf of the industry. Attendance at the meeting was small, tho the interest on the part of all who were there was a definite indication that an awareness of the necessity for good public relations is becoming an increas-ingly dominant factor among representa-tive members of the trade. In his report to the assemblage, Man-gan revealed that a \$150,000 budget has been made available to the Public Re-lations Bureau by the CMI. Heavily lauded for his efforts in the creation and establishment of better pub-lic relations for this industry was Bill Gersh, publisher of The Cash Box, who was described as the spark plug behind so many of the plans which the CMI is now pushing into being. Locard Micon, well known West Coast distrib, represented Samuel (Cur-ley) Robinson, AOLAC's managing di-rector at the meet: Curley was unable to attend the Show because of the current situation in Los Angeles, where he was reported engaged in all out efforts to save Los Angeles from going down. Micon urged that the trade adont a list of a line up of policies originated by AOLAC thru which ops could make at least fewer enemies. if not more friends. He exemplified his remarks of things not to do by referring to the scene of an operator driving a brand new Console machine roped to the back. In addition, he urged jobbers and distribs in closed territories to keep banned equipment in their showrooms away from the gaze of passersby. Discussing current terminology in the trade. Mangan said that one of the bet-ter ideas he had heard at the conclave had been offered by LeRoy Stein, man-aging director of the Music Guild Of America. New Jersey music op group. Stein had advised that the industry re-frain from using many terms now sound-ing to the disadvantage of good public relations. Even the term "music operat-

Stein had advised that the industry re-frain from using many terms now sound-ing to the disadvantage of good public relations. Even the term "music operat-or" was among the proposed changes. Stein urged that the ops consider them-selves and refer to themselves as "music merchants." Reporting of current activities in CMI

merchants." Reporting of current activities in CMI public relations. Mangan claimed that the first six weeks of the organization had seen 300 individual projects, many of which have already been completed. For the second six weeks, said Mangan his group had plans for an additional 500 projects. 500 projects.

Another coinman praised for his indi-vidual enterprise in bettering public re-lations for the industry was Joe Hanna of Utica, N. Y. Hanna was another who called upon all coinmen to think of pub-lic relations as something that begins at home. In line with a wider public relations program despite the limited resources new available to the bureau, Mangan called upon all coinmen to serve as pub-lic relations agents, and it was suggested from the floor that all associations desig-rate a responsible member to handle that activity. In addition it was announced that from now on all associations would receive reports from the CMI Public Relations Bureau of all activities in which the bureau is engaged.

Also unique in the display showing of the Millis Constellation was the fact that it could be laid down on its side and the records would continue to play just as well as if the machine was in its natural upright position.

Another feature which met with much approval was the shoulder level view of the program and which is very easily played by the average player due to the fact that he simply presses the bar which contains the song. This is reported to have clicked with many who called at the Hotel Continental to see the machine.

Mills Industries distribs were tremendously enthused over their new Constellation and all are anxious to get back to their territories to tell the music operators about this new machine.

Price was not announced but it is believed that it will be in keeping with the general price average now in effect for all new phonos.

Mills Industries distribs were on hand long before the official opening of the convention and meetings were conducted to decide various sales factors. Charley Schlicht, who heads Mills Industries phonograph division, reported that every one of their distributors, without fail, believes that the Mills Constellation will lead the way to a new kind of better profit percentage in their territories.

As the news of this new phono spread among the visiting ops more and more of these men trekked over to the Hotel Continental to see the Constellation. Mills distribs report *i* that for hours the display room was so crowded that it was practically impossible to do anything but just line the people up and let them look over the demonstration of the machine.



HIGH PRICES CONTINUE

Convention Proves Need for Better Commish Basis

CHICAGO—Probably the most outstanding fact of this past coin machine show, and which was recognized by all coinmen who attended, was that prices continued to remain high and, in some cases, were even higher than before.

Coinmen reported this fact and asked whether there would ever be a lowering of the prices which were placed into effect the moment the war ended and production of new coin operated equipment once again got under way.

There was an effort made by certain of the manufacturers to arrange for lower prices to the trade via a cut in distributors' percentages but, it is reliably reported, in most cases the distribs decried this method.

Therefore, as coinman after coinman stated, "This proves *The Cash Box* to be more than ever right. We need a better commission basis with our locations or we just aren't going to amortize the cost of the present equipment in time to see any profit."

Reports continued thruout the large exhibition hall that there absolutely must come into being a better commission basis in every territory in the nation, and that the operator, himself, must now protect his interests so that he will be able to continue in business on a profitable basis and remain in a strong and liquid financial condition.

The present high prices of new coin operated equipment will continue. Labor will fight for even higher wages and, as labor gains more victories, prices will tend upward unless, of course, such great efficiency of production and overwhelming production of raw materials come about that prices, because of these facts alone, will come down to a more normal base.

ASCAP READIES NEW FEDERAL TAX DRIVE ON JUKES **Plan to Introduce New Legislation to Current Congress.** Foresee Revenue of **3 to 4 Millions Per Year From Jukes**

CHICAGO—Overlooked in the heated and hurried preparation for the coin machine show was the fact that ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers) was once again releasing the news that it was again preparing to present legislation to this current Congress to collect from each juke box in the nation on its old theory that coin operated phonos gave a "public performance for profit".

Amid the whisperings was an article which appeared in the January 29 issue of "Variety," leading magazine of show business, which stated that ASCAP would have the support of other organizations as well as the film people.

As the trade knowns, and as The

Cash Box carried the news to it all during 1946, there was and still is in the House of Representatives in Washington what is known as the "Buckley Bill," introduced by Representative Charles Buckley of New York. This bill has since been reported still in committee. There was also a bill in the Senate which is reported to still be in committee.

Now, it seems, ASCAP is once again entering into the fight to collect on its catalog of music and will try to get some sort of legislation thru the current Congress to change the Copyright Act so that every juke box in the nation, playing an ASCAP copyrighted song, will have to pay royalties to the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers for this privilege.

The Cash Box awaits the introduction of this new legislation in Washington. Once again it will analyze the complete effect of the bill on the industry when and if it is presented.

There is no doubt that with a possible \$3,000,000.00 to \$4,000,000.00 revenue for ASCAP, should it get such a licensing arrangement thru Congress, this organization is going to put up a strong fight to get such a bill thru the Congress.

It is now up to each and every music machine man in the nation to watch every move that will be made and to be completely prepared to combat whatever action ASCAP may decide upon. Page 54

Bally Announces Two New Multiple Games

CHICAGO — Announcing two new multiple games, released by Bally Manufacturing Company at the Coin Machine Show, George Jenkins, vice president and general sales manager of the Bally organization, pointed out that the games-"Bally Entry" in the automatic class and "Special Entry" in the replay class-introduce several distinct innovations.

"First of all," Jenkins said, "the new stepped up odds is proving a strong play attraction in test locations. Odds start at 3, instead of the old style 2, and step up to 5, instead of 4. Also the Odds are multiplied out for the player. Top odds, for example, are 160, instead of 40 multiplied in the player's mind by four. This dramatizes the multiple feature and definitely produces increased multiplecoin play.

"Additional coins are also attracted by the new 'Mystic Flash' feature, whereby win-section of play-field, normally at the bottom of the board, is magically transferred to the top of the board — to sections which usually score only purse or show. Extra coins are deposited to flash the Mystic Flash' and location tests prove that the feature really gets plenty of extra coins," he continued.

"Many new convenience features are included in 'Bally Entry' and Special Entry," such as the motorpperated shuffle, and, needless to say he games retain all the profit-proved principles of Bally's greatest muliples.






