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

Bust Up Clean Up

Many letters, wires and phone calls have already reached *The Cash Box* since the appearance of last week's (March 31) editorial wherein it was suggested that, for the good of the industry, arrangements be made to "bust up ten year old equipment blocking off thousands of locations thruout the nation".

These letters, wires and phone calls ALL AGREED with *The Cash Box* that arrangements be made as soon as possible to get such a program into action.

Never before in its history has The Cash Box enjoyed such a flood of acclaim for any of its editorials. And the trade will agree that The Cash Box editorials have stirred up much progressive and constructive action.

Most of these letters, wires and phone calls came from operators. These were the very men to whom this editorial was addressed. These men agreed that this was the time to "bust up and clean up" and that, thereby, a better industry would result.

What these ops asked for was an arrangement whereby they could trade in ten year old machines "at a price that would get rid of them once and for all time".

As one noted op stated, "I'm more than willing to have my old machines bust up. I also suggest that rather than export them and get a bad name for this industry in the foreign markets, we bust 'em up, just as you recommend. But, for crying out loud, get them off our hands at a decent trade-in price, so that it will pay to pull them off locations."

Almost every letter was of a similar nature. This brings the crux of the situation down to the fact that there must be some method devised whereby these ten year old machines, regardless of what they are, can be profitably taken in trade and bust up.

Everyone wants to see this happen. Therefore, the problem resolves itself down to the way it can be successfully accomplished. This can happen thru the complete cooperation of the various sales organizations with their manufacturers to wipe out the blight of ten year old machines from the industry.

Bust up—clean up! The time has arrived when all in the field must recognize the many disadvantages accruing from ten year old machines. In the music field, newspapers and magazines have begun to call these ten year old phonos, "screech boxes". In the pin game field, they get little or no play especially wherever a new game appears.

BUST UP — CLEAN UP! Ten year old phonos, regardless of how hard the operator tries to keep them working will never equal the new phonos in tone quality, attraction, earning power and general interest.

As far as ten year old games are concerned — they simply ruin one more location for they lose the players' interest in games.

From a financial standpoint — the operator loses all around when he continues to run completely depreciated equipment. With new equipment he obtains greater route valuation and more profits on the depreciation he is allowed to deduct.

Bust up . . . clean up . . . the entire industry should join hands in this move for its own greater, grander future.



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SUCCESS OF NEW GAMES WIPING OLD MACHINES OFF MARKET

Ops Ridding Themselves of Old Games as Reports Spread How New Machines are Clicking on Locations All Over the Nation. Continued Production of New Game Winners Sure to Wipe All Old Machines Off Market is Belief. Collections from New Games Reported to be More Than Double That of Old Machines.

NEW YORK — Since the survey reported here wherein coinmen from all over the nation advised that collections from new games were anywhere from 100% to 300% above those from old games on the same locations, more and more operators are replacing their old machines with new games. This is gradually wiping the old games off the market.

It seems, therefore, that what the amusement machines field has to thank for its own "bust-up" campaign, is the very success of its equipment. The operators in this field aren't waiting for a better trade-in price situation to arise to get rid of their old machines. They are, instead, converting as rapidly as they can to the new games to offset the low collections which they were enduring in the past.

Leaders in the amusement games field now report, "With the great run of winning games which we have had, coming one right after the other, there is no longer any doubt that the old games will gradually come off locations and the picture will soon be completely changed with new machines operating everywhere."

The fact is that game after game which has been produced these past few months in the amusement field have all been "winners." This has had a great deal to do with the sudden change of heart by the majority of operators. After investigating reports, these ops have decided to replace old machines with new games. They have also learned that the trade-in valuation set on the new equipment shows them a good profit and that collections increase tremendously. Therefore, retaining old games on locations today can only be done so at a loss to the operator. There is no real trade-in value left to the old machine. Furthermore, ops report, collections from the old games do not compare favorably with those from new equipment.

With these facts before them, the intelligent operators are changing over just as rapidly as they possibly can to the new machines. Once they have these on their locations they find that the trade-in valuation against the new machine they intend to purchase is such that the price they actually pay for the next new game is within a very reasonable figure and they are more easily able to carry on with profit assured them from then on.

This is wiping the older machines off locations more rapidly than anyone figured it would. It has also created a boom of very assuming proportion in the field. At the present time pinball manufacturers report that their production is practically sold out on the announcement of a new machine.

Most impressive to the operator was the fact that from almost everywhere in the nation, reports have been filtering thru that collections on the new machines show better than 100% to 300% over what old games did on the very same locations. This is reported to have started much buying of new machines by many of those ops who believed that they could still get along with games ten years, and more, old.

Ops also learned, as they started to trade in these very old games, that there was practically no trade-in valuation left whatsoever and that the price being offered them was actually a "bust-up" price. In short, the jobber or distributor who took such an old machine in trade only did so with the intention of "busting it up and getting it off the market."

From then on the operator found that the new game he had purchased was holding to a very good trade-in valuation which, on purchase of his second new game, brought the actual price down to an extremely reasonable figure.

The average op has been gradually clearing his route of very old machines. It now looks like the amusement games field will be among the very first to have cleared itself of very old equipment and probably will, within a reasonable period of time, be replaced with all the very latest machines introduced since the end of the war.

This means, to all engaged in the amusement games business, a better and more solidified industry, as well as a surety that their division of the field has every opportunity of springing back into first place **position**.

VITAL MATERIAL Shortages Hurt All Production

Shortage of Steel Holds Up Production Of All Types Of Equipment With New Venders Hit Hardest. Lumber Shortage Affects Cabinet Deliveries. Suppliers' Prices Zooming. M'f'rs Working Against Odds to Hold Present Price Line.

NEW YORK—Once again the industry is being held back from speedy growth by shortages of vital materials.

Manufacturers are again complaining that obtaining steel and lumber is becoming more and more a problem each day.

One noted manufacturer reported the closing of one large plant due to the fact that suppliers just wouldn't (or weren't able to) obtain the steel he needed for his production and that, furthermore, the prices they quoted forced him to close due to the fact that the finished price would then be so high as to make sales an impossibility.

The majority of the vending machine manufacturers, many of whom believed they would be in full blast production by this time, are also suffering.

Some of these have decided to withhold any further production efforts until the market has reached a more normal stage.

These men report that if they were forced to pay the prices now being asked by suppliers their machines would cost them more to produce than what they had quoted as their list prices to the trade.

"Under such conditions," one noted vending machine manufacturer stated, "we simply must halt any attempt at production and wait until we are able to obtain materials at a more normal price and in better quantity so as to assure the operators being able to buy our equipment at a fair and equitable price and in the quantity desired."

Also aggravating to the average manufacturer is the fact that the suppliers of all raw materials, as well as some of the finished components, are once again zooming prices as the shortages become more and more apparent.

Yet, the average manufacturer continues with all zeal and ingenuity in an attempt to hold the present price line which he believes is as high as it should ever reach.

This has aggravated a great many situations among the members of the industry right down the line. In the first place, operators who have been waiting for certain types of machines to be produced are becoming very irritated and somewhat disgusted with the situation and are swinging over, in some cases already reported, to other fields.

Salesmen, too, have suffered. Some of these men have been waiting for commissions to come due to them on delivery of merchandise sold many months ago. As the machines are delayed (and continue to be delayed) due to lack of raw materials, these salesmen have been forced to leave and seek other means for earning a living.

One noted manufacturer of amusement machines reported the other day that he had spent two weeks scouring the markets for lumber to assure himself sufficient cabinets for one of his new games.

He also stated that the price he was finally forced to pay cut his profit down to the very bone and that he believes he will be forced to raise the price of his product (even tho he considers it sufficiently high at this time) due to the fact that the slowed up production and the lack of profit were making it impossible for him to go ahead on this basis of his former price quotation.

What is aggravating all those manufacturers who are faced with this growing shortage of basic materials is that the suppliers are taking advantage of the situation and are raising prices on a skyrocketing market.

This is sure to affect present prices of machines unless a sudden break comes along in the materials shortages situation. Only the manufacturer's own efficiency of production allows him to hold the present price line. This he is working hard to do with all the ingenuity and resources at his command.

NEW TYPE USED MARKET FORESEEN

Pre-War Used Equip't Fast Fading From Picture With Only Very Latest Pre-War Types at a Price in Demand. Used Machines of Past Year's Vintage Opening New "Used Market".

NEW YORK—An entirely new type of used machines market is gradually coming into being. This is now noticeable to all in the field. The very old machines are losing ground in this market every day. Demand for them has been fading for sometime. Of late even this demand is reported to have practically disappeared.

As far as pre-war machines are concerned, and this takes into consideration all the various categories of coin operated equipment, only a very few of the later types are in demand. And these only at a very low price. This price may be said to be anywhere from one-third to one-half what was asked for the same equipment toward the end of the war, when prices were already falling steeply to meet new machines production.

The new type used machines market concerns itself only with the equipment first produced when the war was over. Some of these command extremely good prices as well as a very ready market. Others are slower moving, but they also have a market which is considered very spacious, in comparison to the market for the older pre-war equipment.

The average jobber and distributor planned on being able to export great numbers of these old prewar machines. As yet, tho, there hasn't been too great an export market created. As is well known, Great Britain always was the largest of the export markets for used American merchandise. But with the restrictions now in effect, no shipments are even allowed into England, not even from Canada. This blocks off the largest and most profitable user of American coin operated equipment.

Therefore, whatever exports are being made to Canada, to South and Central America, aren't as yet of sufficient volume to take care of the huge numbers of these old used machines which are available.

The result is that prices have been going down steadily on the very old machines to the point where some have asked that they be erased entirely from the "C.M.I. Blue Book" and only later type used machines be allowed to remain. These also should be dated, according to dealers, so that the newer merchandise produced during 1946 and 1947 would be shown in a more preferential light.

The market is changing very rapidly, and the demand continues on some items, there is no doubt that when the end of 1947 rolls around the used equipment market will not be recognizable, at least not in its old form.

There is also no doubt that the names of the machines which will appear in the "C.M.I. Blue Book" at that time will be entirely foreign to those which appeared prior to this year.

Jobbers and distributors believe that this is a turn for the better. As long as they can have an active market, they state, they feel that the equipment should be the answer to whatever the situation demands.

They also feel that the market will only be active if the new machines start coming in on trades so that the lesser type locations thruout the nation can obtain them after they have passed thru the better spots.

"It's a return," one noted distributor reported, "to the old time coin machine business we always knew prior to the war. Games that were some years old always faded from the trade-in field and were sold off as 'parts' or traded in for 'parts' only. The newer equipment was all that the field was concerned with. It looks like this is just what is happening now and this is good for the whole business for that's the one sure way the field has of realizing its progress."

As the new equipment enters and is listed on the market it has brought more buyers per unit than all the older equipment has been capable of mustering these past months.

This, in itself, is an indication of the trend of the used equipment market. It shows that the field points toward the newer machines as the answer to its future progress. Page 7

FREIGHT PROBLEM GROWS

Shipping Becomes More Difficult. Carriers Claim Cartons Too Bulky and Lack Weight. Shortage of Freight Cars Plus Higher Rates Also Being Felt. Truck Firms May Charge for Full Poundage Rate.

CHICAGO — Freight has again become one of the leading problems of the industry. For some time now manufacturers have been urging nearby distributors to send their own trucks to pick up machines. This has helped all concerned.

The problem is being aggravated by the fact that freight rates are so inequitable. Not only are rates going up, but in some cases they have risen to such a point that complaints are very vociferous. West Coast coinmen are especially upset over the high rate they have been forced to pay.

Trucking firms also enter into this situation. Formerly, to overcome some of the inequitableness of the carriers' rates, the average coin machine firm would ask that equipment be sent by truck. Now the truckers claim that the cartons (especially pin games) are too large and too bulky and yet their weight does not cover the area they occupy in the truck.

For example, one trucking firm finds that it can only handle a certain number of cartons on one of the type trucks it uses. This truck is used to freight 10,000 lbs. of merchandise. But, with the truck loaded to capacity with pinballs, the entire weight is only about 2,000 lbs. This means, the trucking firm complains, that they must send out a 10,000 lbs. revenue load and only collect for 20 per cent of its actual value, or the 2,000 lbs. with which it is loaded.

To offset the loss, the truckers state, they will have to charge for the entire 10,000 lbs. This means a tremendous increase in freighting cost to the receiver of the merchandise, whether this be operator, jobber or distributor. And when this is added to the mileage charge it is being estimated that there will be a very heavy additional cost per unit.

Up to the present time some of the manufacturers have been able to prevail on the trucking firms, who have handled their merchandise for some years, to withhold any such increases. But with the railroads and express companies obtaining increases from ICC, and with the further fact that overhead costs have continued to go up for the carriers, it now looks like they won't be able to hold off the increase much longer.

Whatever results there is no longer any doubt that what can save the large user of new machines will be contracts with the carrier to hold to a specified rate and to carry specified poundage for certain mileage.


The average distributor points out this can't be done in view of the fact that (1) production is as yet too uncertain with the average factory and few know when the manufacturer is ready with a complete shipment and (2) the new machine may not be to the liking of the distributor so that he doesn't want to immediately invest in large quantity as well as (3) that contractual carrier obligations may create unnecessary expense over a period of time.


Some nearby distributors to the manufacturing center here plan to use their own or hired trucks to bring the merchandise to them. The distributor who is many miles away from the factory center will still be forced to undergo either increased freight rates or inequitable express rates and charges or, if shipping by truck, perhaps tremendously increased trucking costs.


Most irritating to the distributors and jobbers is the fact that they will. in all probabilities, have to assimilate these added costs. This, they explain. again cuts into their profit margin.

As some distribs have stated, they are already cutting list prices so as to help the ops change from old machines to new. Now with greater overhead being added on from shipping charges, they will be forced to curtail some sales.

In short, as one distrib puts it, it will be a question of less sales at profit rather than volume sales at a questionable margin.











• Dinah Shore has the kind of reputation where just about anything she puts to wax comes up in the money. As a result, it can be said that the best thing about this wax package is the fact that she comes with it. Both "Mama, Do I Gotta" and "When Am I Gonna Kiss You Good Morning" are rhythm ballads with a pleasant, danceable beat injected by the Sonny Burke Orchestra. Paced for the younger listeners, the platter should do best in ice cream emporiums, or wherever mild little novelties are best accepted.

> "As Long As | Live" "The Possum Song" KAY KYSER ORCHESTRA

(Columbia 37292)

• If your route is in a territory where Jane (The Outlaw) Russell is a big drawing card in the local flickeries, or otherwise, you can probably use this disk to good advantage. With Jane as the reatured vocalist, the Kay Kyser crew turn in "As Long As I Live," but, from her performance, we'd say Jane has assets more outstanding than talent as a singer. The flip, "The Possum Song," showcases the Kyser crew to better advantage. A grand little novelty with plenty of well controlled beat, the side has Gloria Wood and the Kampus Kids on the lyric. If you do well with Kyser, you'll do okay with this item.

> "The Brooklyn Bridge" "It's The Same Old Dream" FRANK SINATRA

• Frank Sinatra can usually be depended upon to come up with one for the money. And he has. The songs, "The Brooklyn Bridge" and "It's The Same Old Dream," are both featured in his latest flicker that's tabbed "The Brooklyn Bridge," and, as a result, just about everybody who sees the movie can be termed a potential phono customer for the platter. Both tunes are ballads, and Frank warbles 'em in a pleasant, relaxed style that makes for easy listening and smooth dancing. Peg this as a hunk of wax that belongs on your route.

"Adobe Hacienda"

"If I Had My Life To Live Over"

THE DINNING SISTERS

(Capitol)

• Here's a pair of mighty powerful juke box melodies put together on a single platter by the Dinning Sisters, popular vocal combo. Topside, because of manner of performance, is "Adobe Hacienda," a tune that can be expected to emerge among the top ten very soon. With it, the Dinnings blend their voices well and offer up a sprightly arrangement that's well suited for phono action. The flip, "If I Had My Life To Live Over," an excellent item for any tavern spot, is handled a bit too gaily for the bistros, but should serve as an effective piece of merchandise for the chocolate sundae crowd.



ART LUND

• Now hear this! Here's one for the trade that's destined for the top money in short order, and it'll probably be the sorry op who doesn't take advantage of the tip. The tune is "Mam'selle," and its done by Art Lund, former Benny Goodman vocalist, who's making his first performance on wax as a featured recording star with this platter. Melody is from the flicker "The Razor's Edge," and the way it's treated here, complete with lyric, draws a rave from this reviewer. It's one of the best jobs Lund has turned in and poses him as a big bidder for top popularity. A haunting romantic banad, ops need not fret about where to place this disk. Wherever guys and gals get together, that's it! You can take it from there. The flip. "Sleepv Time Gal," is a neat rhythm ballad that's so well known it's a natural for action from the phono customers who are partial to solid standards that are well done. It's that kind of a side.

"A Sunday Kind of Love" "Who Cares What People Say" Frankie Laine (Mercury 5018)

• Following up the smash success he created with "That's My Desire," Frankie Laine scores again with this, his latest, tabbed "A Sunday Kind Of Love." Featuring a brand of song styling that clicked big on Harlem phonos, Frankie bids fair to increase his audience and market with this platter. "Sunday" is right for him, and he does right with it. The flip, "Who Cares What People Say," is another top drawer ballad and should go well on its own once the top side has been worn white. Give it a hearing.

"I Believe" "It's The Same Old Dream" ARTIE SHAW & MEL TORME

(Musicraft 492)

↑ Mel Torme, the new songsation, and the Artie Shaw Orchestra get together on this batch of wax to do a pair of click melodies from the flicker "It Happened In Brooklyn." With Mel coming along well as a gift to the swoon trade, and Artie with a well established following, the coupling of these two should draw more than the usual amount of play. If the platter has a drawback, it is because the combination of a celebrated ork and a celebrated songster results in the listeners not getting enough of either one.

"Cu Tu Gu Ru" (Jack, Jack, Jack) "Made For Each Other" ENRIC MADRIGUERA ORCHESTRA

(National 9028)

Big city ops always have calls for first class rhumba, and this offering by. the stellar Enric Madriguera crew more than fills that bill. It's one of the best things that Madriguera has turned out, and that's saying a lot. Done with a well-defined Latin beat, and the entire ensemble partaking of a crackerjack lyric, the side emerges as a "must" for spots where the Latin brand of music making is in demand. The flip, "Made For Each Other," is in bolero tempo with Patricia Gilmore delivering the lyric in English. Not as effective as the top deck, it'll do as a "filler" after the topside has culled its share of heavy action.

BOBBY DOYLE

• Vocalist Bobby Doyle comes up with a Latin-styled coupling on this disk that's made better thanks to the Jose Morand ork's handling of the instrumental support. Top deck is "Illusion," a romantic ballad you'll probably be getting a big call for very soon. With it, Bobby weaves a pleasant session of song-spinning, injecting enough feeling of moonlight and roses to score well with the lady phono customers. Meanwhile, Jose's boys add enough on the instrumental to make it a solid dance floor item. The flip, "The Story Of Sorrento," highlights Bobby doing an English lyric to the beloved Neapolitan love song. Peg it as a strong supporting side.

EDDY HOWARD ORCHESTRA

• Eddy Howard, who has earned himself a topnotch reputation as a moneymaker for the trade, scores again—and big with this pairing of romantic ballads that are suited for just about any location. Headlining the disk is "I Can't Make Believe It Was All Make Believe," and Eddy gives it the usual very sweet and low treatment. Flipped, with "Maybe You'll Be There," he's joined by a trio on the vocal, and they score big. Peg this as a disk that's high in the Howard tradition, and take it up from there.

• Here's the kid with the mellow voice on a pair of smoothies that will hit the starry-eyed kids, and spell coinplay for you. It's Andy Russell doing "Dreams Are A Dime A Dozen," and "Unless It Can Happen With You." Topside tune drifts along in sweet, melodic refrain as Andy pipes his wares. Holding appeal for the moon-in-June'rs, this danceable ditty will hold Russell's Sprouts. Teaming with the missus, Della, Andy spins more romance in top fashion, on the backside. The Paul Weston ork provide splendid backing on the pair in their usual manner. Ops can look for this pair to catch coin all the way.

"Why Don't We Say We're Sorry" "Goodnight Sweetheart" TEDDY WALTERS

(Musicraft 15101)

• They oughta eat this kid up alive! Here's Teddy Walters, with a voice like a golden angel, piping oh so pretty on a beautiful romantic ballad. Titled "Why Don't We Say We're Sorry," Teddy's voice will melt right into your heart. It's a natural for the hand-holding crowd, as he sings lightly all the way through. He's got that sit-you-down quality, and made of the stuff the bobby-sox kids love to wail about. It's sure action for the phonos. "Goodnight Sweetheart," spins in top fashion also, and shows' Teddy with his guitar to good advantage. You'll like the pair, so latch on.

"Gone With The Blues"

"Have You Ever Loved A Woman"

JAY MCSHANN SEXTETTE

(Mercury 8032)

• Jay McShann and the boys get together here to knock out some music that you folks can really enjoy. "Gone With The Blues" coupled with "Have You Ever Loved A Woman," shapes up right for the race fans that love the moaning blue theme that McShann offers. Using Jimmy Witherspoon on the vocal, the balladeer renders some good stuff on the pair. Ops that need filler material would do well with these sides.

"Why Did It Have To End So Soon"

"If I Had My Life To Live Over

BOB JOHNSTON

(Majestic 7218)

• More ballad material headed ops way, is this cutie titled, "Why Did It Have To End So Soon." Choir boy Bob Johnston takes vocal honors here and the lad's voice is nice and smooth. Singing in casual tones, Bob spoons through the side in great shape. On the backing with an established hit, "If I Had My Life To Live Over," Bob renders effective music which should mean more coin play for music ops. Both sides are there for the asking and deserve your listening time. SLEEPER OF THE WEEK "Ivy" Jo Stafford (Capitol 388)



JO STAFFORD

• Pegged as the big comer this week is a brand new Jo Stafford disk featuring a brand new Hoagy Carmichael melody, and they're all wrapped up in a package called "Ivy." As a package it sounds loaded for heavy action and a smash hit. The tune is haunting, the lyric is excellent, and the performance turned in by Jo Stafford is another clinching reason to put this platter on immediate order. As for rhythm, its pace can be compared to that of the well remembered "To Each His Own," and the way the Paul Weston ork blends in for the instrumental backing rates orchids for Paul and all the crew. As if that were not enough, the flip is "A Sunday Kind Of Love," chosen by The Cash Box as a "Sleeper Of The Week" a few fortnights ago, and still expected to zoom in popularity on its own. You take it from there.

"Across The Alley From The Alamo" 'There Is No Greater Love"

WOODY HERMAN (Columbio 37289)

• Initial cutting as a single turns up fine for Woody Herman on "Across The Alley From The Alamo." Spooning lightly in melodic style, Woody adds just a bit of a western twang that flavors the ditty highly. The Herman herd (and they're heavy), will notice a smoother pitch to the piper's tonsils, as he runs through the 'Alamo.' Flipped we find, "There Is No Greater Love," deep meaningful ballad, which Herman renders effectively. Ops can use both sides to good advantage—so give it a whirl.

"You're Priceless" "When I'm With You"

NICK DE LANO (Black & White 825)

• As cute a song as you want to hear headed your way—it's called "You re Priceless." Penned by versatile Morrie Amsterdam, the ditty shapes up fine and mellow. with Nick De Lano piping smooth all thru the waxing. 

The Easter season has arrived and a tour around the platteries reveals that everybody has caught the spirit of the holidays and it's like Christmas with sunshine the way good cheer and optimism is being demonstrated . . . Ops caught at the local disk distribs have caught the spirit, too, and see better collections on the way. And that's something! Even the record reviewers here at THE CASH BOX have stopped complaining. They comment that the platters reviewed this week compose one of the best shipments they have ever heard, with the greatest majority of platters falling into the "you ought to hear this" category.—And what a welcome change that is from the comments you usually hear around here about the big load of records that arrive every week.

Along Tin Pan Alley, habitat of the music publisher fraternity in Gotham, conversation is to the effect that great big clicks are emerging. Ordinarily, the noise they make is just so much clanking in a clanking tin pan. But these days one gets the impression that the boys are not talking thru their stetsons. Yup, the big tom toms are beating up and down the sidewalks of Broadway spelling out melodies fast growing to big click proportions. And the talk is about "Mam'selle," "A Sunday Kind Of Love," "Midnight Masquerade," and a little step-child just rushed in from the West Coast called "Mah-Zel (Means Good Luck)", which has been adopted by one of the top powerhouse pubberies. From these tunes at least one ditty is expected to grow into the "To Each His Own" category — and that's some category for everybody concerned.

Briefly said: Stan Kenton will break up his band while he takes a well earned rest beginning May 1st. He will resume on August 15th. Meanwhile, his platters will be released on schedule by Capitol . . And speaking of Capitol, insiders declare that Jack (the voice with the smile) turned in one of his best performances on his forthcoming platter tabbed "Jack, Jack, Jack". . . Inked to a pact over at Apollo this past week was Tony Bari; the first releases he has skedded are in the Italian language . . National has named distribs for Detroit, Cleveland, Toledo, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and El Paso . . . In addition, they've signed The Ravens, a Negro quartet, to their talent roster . . . Lots more talk (good) being circulated about Ray McKinley's "Red Silk Stockings And Green Perfume" under Majestic's brand.

Reports indicate that Mercury has a great big winner in Frankie Laine. New York ops, who first pushed his "That's My Desire" up Harlem way, are now circulating his platters all thru the territory and reporting big returns. Meanwhile, it might be noted that his "A Sunday Kind Of Love" bounced into the No. 3 spot on the "Burning The Jukes In Harlem" chart. Ops report that customers began playing the side seconds after they fitted it into place on the phonos. They expect it to be bigger than his "Desire." — A good sign for the tune, by the way, since it was on the Harlem chart that ditties like "The Gypsy" and "For Sentimental Reasons" indicated the tune was a click long before they were showing in any other territory.

Tony Pastor, who recently signed with Columbia Records, will do "Red Silk Stockings" for his first release . . . We have been informed by Audience Records. who are producing a series of albums featuring top radio comedians, that their platters will not be permitted to be played on juke boxes . . . The question is: Whose loss is that?
