

FVP **PRAIS The Cash Box "Volume Play Promotion Cards" Win Praise of** Leading Juke Box Ops. Tests Prove "6 Plays 25c" Win Public Approval. At Cost of Only 5c Per Week Per Machine Music Ops Show Average Week's Collection **Increase Better Than 20%.**

Only two issues have gone by since The Cash Box presented its "Volume Play Promotion Card" to the juke box industry.

industry. Prior to that, as is now known to all the field, *The Cash Box* had been con-ducting tests thru the good offices of well known music ops, to learn just what "volume play" could accomplish in juke boxes. The results were so terrific, that *The Cash Box* immediately released the news to all in the trade, so that every juke box operator could take advan-tage of the play increase which these first imen were enjoying. firstimen were enjoying. MAnd to make it easier for the na

tion's music operators to conduct their own tests, *The Cash Box* enclosed, with each of these past two issues, as it is doing this issue, a sample card for use in any juke box.

The letters of praise which have flooded *The Cash Box* because of tests made here and there thruout the country by progressive operators seeking ways and means to better their earn-ing power has been the most remark-able achievement in the history of this publication.

From villages, towns and cities, everywhere in the country, have come letters of praise. Without fail, every-one of these letters enclosed orders for quantities of the "volume play promotion cards" to be mailed each week.

week. Months ago The Cash Box presented the "volume play" plan to the music machine industry. It urged every operator in the nation to give the pub-lic a "bargain." All the nation's leading merchandising minds were stating that, "the public is only buying

bargains." The famed Coca-Cola firm was again openly advertising their 6 bottles for 25c carton. Everywhere, and in every city, merchants were enticing more income, but only with "bargains."

The Cash Box proved to the auto-matic music industry that it, too, had a "big bargain." The bargain of 6 plays for 25c.

And The Cash Box also proved that duplication of play (or as some in the industry term it, "overplay") actually brought the 6 plays for 25c down to 3 or 4 plays for 25c.

"In short," The Cash Box wrote, "if only 30 of the present players of any juke box on any location will play 'quarters' instead of 'nickels,' the op-erator will take in (30 times 25c) \$7.50 where, if 100 players played 'nickels' (100 times 5c) he ordinarily received only \$5. Therefore, by the use of 'volume (quarter) play' the operator earned 50 per cent more profit."

Because another publication, with very little understanding of what "vol-ume play" meant, stepped in to con-fuse the issue with "dime play," The Cash Box then proceeded to have vari-ous operators conduct tests. The re-sults of these tests are today well known to all in the trade.

known to all in the trade. To say the very least, the results were "remarkable." More and more juke box ops asked The Cash Box for more and still more "volume play pro-motion cards" so that The Cash Box entered into the business of providing these cards, based on its weekly com-pilation of "The Nation's Top Ten Tunes" at the lowest possible cost to the operator. The time has arrived when the aver-The time has arrived when the aver-age op must return to "play promo-tion." He cannot long subsist on ne-glect. He must go ahead. And, to go ahead, he must take advantage of the modern type of merchandising which has won so much for other merchants all over the nation.

merchants all over the nation. Those music ops who haven't yet made the test are urged to do so im-mediately. They should remove the card which faces this page in this issue and place it into one of their machines and change over that ma-chine to feature 6 plays for 25c (1 play 5c 2 plays 10c and 6 plays 25c) and see what happens. There is no longer any doubt that

and see what happens. There is no longer any doubt that they, too, will follow along the course which so many other ops have adopted. And, perhaps, will change over a great many more of their juke boxes to fea-ture 6 plays for 25c which is the es-sence of good merchandising today— because it offers the public the "big bargain" the public wants.

MUSIC OPS RECORD COST CUT IN HALF AS OBERSTEIN BOWS W LOW COST PLATTER. **REACTION POINTS TO BOOM IN FIELD**

Eli Oberstein To Release 39c List Disk. See Ops Buying More Records Than Ever Before. Obie To Concentrate On Music Ops. To Release Varsity Label This Week

Lee Savin Joins Staff

NEW YORK—Eli Oberstein, for-mer artist and repertoire director at RCA-Victor Records, this past week disclosed to the trade the debut of his new record venture, Varsity Records, designed to hit the music operator market.

Oberstein disclosed that his new label will market for the astounding low price of 39c list, with a 40% re-duction in price to music operators and dealers.

lawer with market for the asoditing low price of 39c list, with a 40% re-duction in price to music operators and dealers. Oberstein, long associated with the music business, and well noted as one of the most successful men in the in-dustry, disclosed that the Varsity line will activate immediately, with re-leases of current popular tunes ex-pected out within a week. In addition to the Sonora pressing plant in Meriden, Conn., Oberstein will set up a plant in Chicago and on the West Coast. The firm will do away with the regular distribution channels, and will make sales directly to music ops and dealers. A staff of 15 men, concentrated in the larger cities, will be employed in both a sales and exploitation capacity. These men will contact music operators and deal-ers, and keep on the lookout for song hits which very often spring up as territorial hits. Information pertain-ing to sales and exploitation progress will be forwarded directly to Mr. Oberstein in New York. The firm will grant a 5% return privilege to music operators and deal-ers on new and unused records. It is well to note that very few of the major recording companies allow a privilege of this sort, and in some cases, any return privilege at all. At the outset Oberstein plans on using comparatively unknown talent, to be featured on records backed with two popular song hits. Altho the rec-ord ban prevents Oberstein from pos-sibly using name talent at the present, he disclosed that he may at the end of the ban, possibly sign several name artists. Oberstein has been recording masters in England, and dubbing in vocal parts in this country. He can have a finished product in the hands of dealers and ops within a week. In addition to the general mode of re-cording Oberstein has purchased a large amount of masters from the Sonora Record firm, and will select and weed out those tunes he believes labeled hit material. The initial reaction of music opera-tors in this city was vividly expressed in the statement of one large music

labeled hit material. The initial reaction of music opera-tors in this city was vividly expressed in the statement of one large music op, "I'll have a standing order in with that fellow just as long as he can supply me with the hit tunes. The people who play phonographs today don't as a rule, give a hoot who is on the record. They want to hear the hit tunes and the songs most popular. Where I might have been hesitant about buying records at the prevailing prices, I certainly won't be now. I, don't see how I can miss, with my largest expense, the cost of records, cut in half."





Altho the song is limited to those sentimen-tal locations, the waxing itself is one that should cause a load of attention to be focused on the thrush. Titled, "My Home, My Home," Mary offers a plea for Israel on this bit, with her strong, deep meaningful tones ringing true throughout. There is no doubt that the song will garner wide appeal —especially so in Jewish areas. On the flip with "Lullaby of the Leaves," Mary comes back with another won-derful spot, spooning the charmed wordage in tones that satisfy. Don't miss this platter—it's sure to add to your phono take—and add consider-ably. ably.

"Where Flamingo's Fly" (3:00) "Evelyn" (2:59) TOMMY ROBERTS (MGM 10210)

(MGM 10210) • Heavy ballading of piper Tommy Roberts and a side that has the glitter and spark of a winner. It's the strong wordage of "Where Flamingo's Fly" that will offer ops the incentive here, with Tommy singing way down deep and low, and with loads of vigor and meaning. Ditty is set with an ava-lanche of splendor about it, with the Hugo Winterhalter ork displaying their usual vibrant orchestrated pat-ter of beauty behind Tommy's vocal spot. Flip, titled "Evelyn" has been kicked around a bit. Tommy's rendi-tion here should add to the tune's winning ways. Get next to "Where Flamingo's Fly," by all means.

"Blue Danube" (3:04) "Sophisticated Swing" (3:20) LES BROWN ORCH. (Columbia 38250)


• Pair of instrumental sides by capa-ble and very popular Les Brown ork, and the set up of "Blue Danube" and "Sophisticated Swing" shows as pos-sible items for music ops to latch on to. Both decks, aimed at the kids that love to jump, should meet with fair approval and possibly boost ops phono take. The crew take off on the top deck, "Blue Danube," displaying their wares in able fashion throughout. Ar-rangement of the song is attractive and makes for pleasant listening. Flip switches to a slower beat, with the unit once more coming in with a mel-low performance. Ops that have the spots—take note. Pair of instrumental sides by capa-

"Sweetheart of Television" (2:35) "Toodle-oo-Baby" (2:41) THE DAY DREAMERS (Dana 2016)

(Dana 2016) • Ops catering to locations that go in for polka rhythm would do well to take a look-see in this direction. Com-bo tagged The Day Dreamers step out in all their glory as they offer the metro of "Sweetheart of Television" and "Toodle-OO-Baby." Both sides spill in mellow polka rhythm with the tempo fast and furious all thru. Altho the wordage of the songs are slightly lost by too much instrumentation, the waxing as it stands, makes for pleas-ant listening. Topside is the one that should corner the market. The pair is there for the asking.

(Mercury 5156) • Here's one that music ops can reap harvest with! It's balladeer Snooky Lanson with a pair that have the spark of a real coin culler. Ditty bound to cause all the commotion is tis bit titled "You Darlin'," with Snooky in fine smooth voice through-out the entire waxing. Song is set in bounce tempo with Snooky's mellow vocal warbling spilling in delightful measures. On the backside with an other comer in "Where The Apple Blossoms Fall," Snooky bounces back with another strong contender for phono honors. Cookie weaves in slow twith some wonderful flavor thrown up by the orchestral backing. Both sides rate a spot in your machine-hop on the bandwagon.

"Tomorrow Night" (3:07) "Give Me Time" (2:46)

(Mercury 8091) • It's another bell ringer for chirp Patti Page—and another sensational nickel nabber for music ops through-out the nation with this hunk of wax. Patti's strong vocal flavoring offered on this pair should boost the gal's name to new heights in phono and music circles. Sure to come in for a load of attention is her rendition of "Tomorrow Night," currently kicking up a storm on boxes across the map. The gal is full of tricks and quivers in her pipes as she spoons the slow, shuffle wordage in winning fashion. Ditto the flip, titled "Give Me Time." Rhythm backing displayed here is of the finest caliber and shows the gal's pipes in fine light throughout. Don't miss this pair—they are definitely coin winners.

labeled hit material, with neither rating any extra special praise— that is the extent of their coin culling attractiveness. Buddy spoons the strong and deep mean-ing tones of "Where Flamingo's Fly" in excellent voice, with repeat wordage sinking deeper at every turn of the wheel. Wax spills in mellow tempo with some great accompaniment supplied by the George Barnes Quartet spiking the cookie. On the flip with a cut bit titled "Got-Ta Have More Money," Patti bounces back with a repeat clincher. Ditty has loads of kicks and stuff about it, with the thrush's vocal strains spilling in gala manner. Wax message weaves around the inflation angle, with the title coming in to round out the story. Get next to this double barrel winner—but fast.

"You're The One I Care For" (2:55) "The Silver Wedding Waltz" (2:28)

VERA LYNN (London 232)

(London 232)
Dainty vocal chirping of Vera Lynn and a ditty literally speckled with hit possibilities. Vera's soothing and charming voice shows in beautiful splendor on the top deck, titled "You're The One I Care For." Ditty is wrapped up in the title, with a ton of sugar and spice spilling in roman-tic airs that satisfy. On the flip with a waltz, Vera sets well to offer "The Silver Wedding Waltz." Vera's per-formance on this side matches the gala quality of the top deck, with sil-very phrases of plush simplicity showing the gal to best advantage. Orchestral support rendered by the Bob Farnon crew hypo the pair and add to it's winning ways. Both sides rate ops avid listening attention.

"Time Out For Tears" (3:00) "Be Mine" (2:38) ANNE SHELTON (London 239)

(London 239) • Pair of sides ops may want to go for are offered here in pleasing fa-shion by chirp Anne Shelton. Wax, titled "Time Out For Tears" and "Be Mine" is effective as it stands, with Anne's fashionable pipes adding lus-ter to the cookie. Top deck, a ditty that ran wild in race spots not too long ago, weaves in slow tempo, with Anne purring the strong wordage in adequate manner. Flip, some lyrics patterned to the "La Paloma" melody rolls along in sprightly fashion, with the title offering the bill of fare. Wax won't stop traffic by any means. Ops who need filler material might do well with this duo.

"On The Painted Desert" (3:11) "October Twilight" (3:07) ANNE SHELTON (London 236)

(London 236) • More music via chirp Anne Shelton and the set up of "On The Painted Desert" and "October Twilight" seep thru to show as effective platters which might boost ops phono play. Top deck should be well known to music ops, since it whirled on juke boxes not too many moons ago. Anne's rendition is pleasurable enough as it stands. Flip shows the gal in better light with this soft strong romantic bit twirling slowly in warm intimate manner. Both sides are there for the asking, and since music ops know their routes better than we do, we'll say—take it from here.

"A Tree In A Meadow" (2:56) "Tea Leaves" (2:59) JOHN LAURENZ (Mercury 5148)

(Mercury 5148) • The slow, tender tones of balladeer John Laurenz and the top notch splen-dor of a pair that have the tint of coin play about them show here in "A Tree In A Meadow" and "Tea Leaves." Both songs are currently riding on phonos across the land—this rendition should add to the play the songs are already receiving. Topside of the pair is the one we go for, John's smooth pipes pitch prettily throughout the ditty, as the plush wordage spills in glowing phrases that satisfy. Orches-tral backing on the pair rates a ton of applause as singing strings filter throughout the beautiful passages of the wax. Take note of John's wide and ever increasing popularity—then run out and grab a handful.

"Take It Away" (2:38) "The Laughing Samba" (2:51) EDMUNDO ROS ORCH. (London 230)

(London 230) • Ditty kicking up a storm in many 'spots throughout the nation is offered here in fair fashion by the Edmundo Ros ork. Wax, titled "Take It Away" is styled in top notch Latin manner, with the title of the ditty being repeated throughout the song for the bill of fare. The maestro himself to the mike for the cute lilting, rhythmic wordage, with his vocal spot quite attractive. Flip parrots the title throughout the wax, with Edmundo in the vocal spotlight again. Folks that go for rhumba rhythm should hold still and settle for this pair.

Titled, "Cuckoo Bird Waltz", the vocal team show their warbling strains in fairly effective manner. Ditty is set in slow, patterned waltz fashion with able orchestral background through-out. On the back with "Holiday Polka", the Day Dreamers grab the spotlight for the refrain of this cute piece of wax. Wax and lyric is wrapped up in the title, with a pleas-ant background of harmonicas under the direction of Michael Chimes. Top deck right for the refrains.

(Victor 20-2912) • Plug tune rapidly starting to pop as an attractive bit of phono material gets a rousing sendoff with this top notch rendition by the Tommy Dorsey ork. With balladeer Stuart Foster in the limelight for the vocal chores, the deck takes on an alluring air—one that will definitely boost the tunes' popularity and hypo phono play im-mensely. Stuart's delightful vocal strains spill in smooth bits of dainty melody sure to satisfy the most avid music fan. Ditty bounces along in sprightly fashion, with the piper bask-ing in the spotlight, and well deserved one at that, all thru the waxing. On the flip with "Baby, Baby All The Time", chirp Lucy Ann Polk bounces back with another gala waxing to set the stage for more coin play. On the flip with a lighter piece, piper Romaine Brown steps to the mike for vocal chores and shows his pipes to fair advantage with "Scratch! And You'll Find It." Loads of free rhythm are offered here, with the combo joining in. "Danny Boy" might do the trick—listen.

"Where Flamingos Fly" (3:06) "I'm Waiting For Ships That Never Come In" (3:00)

(Victor 20-2925) • Effective tonsils of chirp Beryl Davis show here, with the metro of "Where Flamingos Fly" seeping thru the wax. Song is one which sells it-self; Beryl's rendition is fair enough as it stands. Altho the song does not showcase the gal's excellent voice to best advantage, her many fans are sure to approve. Flipped we find the ever popular "I'm Waiting For Ships That Never Come In." Beryl steps out slightly on this side to possibly attract some phono play. Both sides of this cookie won't stop traffic, but they will nevertheless come in for their fair share of coindom.







The reason — "it's the overwhelming demand for our new fiveball "Carnival", states Herb Jones, vice president.

"The unusual condition brought about by the great demand for 'Carnival'" stated Jones "brought in all the executives and production experts on

the Fourth of July week-end, an un-heard of situation. However, it was most necessary that we revise our entire production facilities so as to be in a position to turn out this great game in the quantities demanded by the trade."

George Jenkins, Bally vice president and general sales manager, was another exec who was on hand during the holidays. "It is important that I know the production schedule" beamed Jenkins "as the distributors on the phone have been banging me for more and quicker deliveries. With the production line now in a position to turn these games out faster than ever before, I am doing my utmost to get them to the trade."

"It appears as if Bally was right" stated Ray Moloney, president of Bally, referring to his statement of a week ago that the industry would be given a 'shot in the arm' by the manufacture of a game similar to its 'Bally Reserve' of ten years ago. "'Carnival', which is reviving the original build-up bonus introduced by 'Bally Reserve', is creating the same kind of excitement the original game did in 1938. We hope the increased production facilities of our plant will help us satisfy the initial demand somewhat at this time. However, our production executives are studying the situation to further increase produc-tion should the demand continue at such a furious pace."



Coinmen Eye Increased State And Local Budgets Anticipating New And Increased Taxes

Some Groups Organizing To See That **Taxes Are Fair And Equitable**

NEW YORK—Coinmen thruout the country are carefully eyeing the local and state financial budgets, for the coming periods. They knew that prac-tically every community has made pro-visions for increased expenditures and will tax every possible source of rev-enue. Gradually, year by year, taxes have been imposed on coin operated machines, and in following periods, these taxes invariably are increased. The United States government ex-acts a federal tax for years, and today twenty-one of the states now impose taxes on coin machines as a source of revenue. However, with forty-four states meeting this coming legislative year, it is anticipated that many of them will consider state coin machine taxes for the first time, while the states now deriving revenue from coin machines will consider additional and higher taxes. higher taxes.

Operators have indicated the possi-bility of their municipality adopting local tax measures to meet their in-

local tax measures to meet their in creasing budgets. Some of the coinmen in certain territories are preparing their forces to be in a position to know just when tax measures are being introduced, and will be ready to present their case to the right authorities so that they can overcome legislation imposing un-fair and excessive amounts. The fair and excessive amounts. The newly formed Georgia Coin Machine Operators Association was primarily organized just for this purpose.
