One of the problems which has always confronted the operator has been to make coin machine boosters of his location owners. This is a most important problem. It is one problem to which every man now operating coin machines should give all the possible thought he can.

The storekeeper is the man with whom the operators come in constant contact. He is the man who should boost every coin machine in his place of business and even those machines not in his store. Yet, the average operator neglects the location owner. He never does care whether the retailer boosts his machine or not, and always has the argument that, "Aw, they're not interested in anything but the cash they can get from the machines."

This is only natural. They are as much interested in profits as the operator, himself is. But, they can be interested in the equipment of this industry, if the operator will apply himself to this purpose, to the extent where their power as retailers in any community would prove extremely helpful in times of stress.

By the operator cultivating the location owner he wins a friend whose power is greater than his own, in most cases. If the operators in any community would run banquets every so often, or picnics, or some other type affair where the location owners were also invited, so as to bring about a closer understanding and thereby a greater friendship, they would be insuring their own future.

But, if the operator is only going to be interested in what his machine takes in on any location, rush in and grab his collection and rush right out againthen he has lost the one all-important contact which he can make today to insure his future for tomorrow.

The locations, if they become boosters, will get back of the operator when any fanatic or hypocrite or bluenosed reformer gets up to tell all the rest of us how we should conduct our lives. They can, as the leading and recognized businessmen of any community, thru their business organization and fraternal clubs, demand that the coin machine, important to their livelihood and businesses, be given the most complete consideration up and above whatever is said by any publicity seeking crusader.

IT'LL BE TOO LATE TOO SOON

Time for Action! Ops Must Gauge Needs and Order Now. Factories at Trade's Disposal So That Ops Won't Get Caught Short Again. Higher Materials Costs and Upped Wages Sure to Spiral Equipment Prices. Defense Needs Expected to Take Over Many Plants. No Time Left for "Let's Wait And See" Policy.

NEW YORK—The nation's elder statesman, Bernard N. Baruch, calls the present policy of the nation, "let us wait and see." That very same type of policy can today be attributed to a great many members of the coin machine industry.

This is no longer the time for "let's wait and see." It's too late. Every day draws tighter the reins, which are guiding on the nation's policy, to bring about greater action for the smaller businessman, so that he can overcome the recession under which he is laboring.

In addition, the coin machine operator who, without any doubt, is an integral part of the nation's small business, and who is suffering because small business is suffering, must immediately arrange for a change of the "let us wait and see" attitude to insure his future welfare as well.

To protect himself the operator must quickly gauge his needs, while there is still time, and order as far in advance as he possibly can, so that he won't be caught short again.

It's no longer any use attempting to hide the fact that this nation is gradually jumping from a "cold war" into the hottest kind of conflict. Every passing day brings reports of experts that the "time draws shorter, be prepared."

At the same time the operator must also bear in mind that with raw materials and wages zooming, prices of all equipment must spiral to meet these increased costs. He can to some extent overcome this rise in prices by ordering what he needs now and what he will need later immediately—at present prices.

The factories of the industry's leading manufacturers are at the disposal of the nation's coin machine operators right now. They may not be at his disposal much longer. There is no doubt anymore that the greater majority of these plants may soon be engaged in defense work, tieing up all their facilities to the needs of the nation.

Should this happen, while ops dabble about lackadaisically with the "let us wait and see" policy, there will be a lot of sorry men in this field who will be able to recall that they could have purchased brand new merchandise at pretty decent prices compared to the fact that, just like last time, they will be paying double this price for old and worn equipment.

Every outstanding manufacturer in the industry knows that defense work is imminent. That, almost any day, he may be called in by various government agencies to turn his plant over to whatever will be required of him.

These manufacturers have quietly advised distributors, jobbers and operators that the time is drawing shorter and shorter and that the men in this field must prepare themselves for any eventualities.

It'll be too late too soon, unless the majority of the men engaged in this field suddenly change from the "let us wait and see" policy to the "let's go into action" policy. And actually get into fast action. So that they will not be caught short of equipment should any emergency arise.

In the first place it is only good business logic, especially for those progressive ops who change equipment regularly, to buy now. The savings which can be effected at this very moment will more than pay the operator. He will, at the same time, be far ahead of his competitors, and be able to continue onward with greater surety of success.

Regardless of what happens in the near future, and regardless of the hush-hush attitude of outstanding officials in Washington, there is no doubt that all experts regard the present world situation as "touch and go."

In short, even the slightest tremor can set off the bomb which will explode the entire world into another blood bath.

These are facts—not conjecture. These are reports of experts. There is little time left. The average operator must act accordingly. He knows what his average requirements are and he also knows that he will need even more than average orders when prices zoom and merchandise becomes difficult to obtain.

Therefore, while he has the nation's coin machine factories at his disposal, he can prepare himself for the future with whatever equipment he will require, if he places his order immediately with the manufacturers so that he will have machines he constantly uses in stock.

Warnings have gone forth to the operators time and time again. It is sincerely hoped that this time they will be fully and carefully heeded and that all progressive and intelligent operators will avail themselves of the opportunity to order while they can.

"Let's Do It" (1:59) "Where Or When" (3:18) PEGGY LEE and BENNY GOODMAN (Columbia 38281)

Here's one of those things you dream about. A combination like Peggy Lee and Benny Goodman cutting a hunk of wax in 1 minute and 59 seconds. Peggy rolls right into the topside, "Let's Do It," one of the very grand Cole Porter tunes, and gives it all it needs to make it a really great hunk of shellac. And, with maestro Benny Goodman and his terrific sextet to back her up, well, just listen in, if you're at all interested in moneymaking wax. On the backing, "Where Or When," a Rodgers and Hart Oldie, Benny displays the reason why he's the greatest of the clarinetists known to pop music. His sextet, with maestro Goodman to lead them thru their paces, is terrific on this number. And, with Peggy in a slow, soft, sweet, sentimental mood, spooning the lyrics of this grand song, picture the rest for yourself. Grab this platter, brother.

"Shut The Door" (2:38) "It's A Lonesome Old Town" (2:39) PATTI CLAYTON (Bullet 1039)

The gorgeous Patti Clayton, with maestro Howard Smith and his ork to background her, does one of the very swellest jobs with the old novelty, "Shut The Door" (They're Coming Through The Window), which every juke box op will fondly recall as one of the very best of the nickel nabbers. Patti does the tune in medium fast tempo and the chirp makes it sparkle. On the flip, "It's A Lonesome Old Town," Patti goes into a soft, smooth, slow and mellow mood to produce one sweet hunk of sentimental shellac. It's grand music, especially for those dim grand music, especially for those dim lit spots where those ever lovin' cou-ples gather 'round. Here's wax with plenty of c-o-i-n pressed into it.

"Rendezvous With A Rose" (2:55) "Everything Reminds Me Of You" (2:58)

Bringing the tune that's grabbin' lots of attention, "Rendezvous With A Rose," to the fore is piper Pepper Nealy doing one grand job of selling this sweet song. Pepper has pepper in his voice. This is one side that's gonna get him lots of attention everywhere. He sells the side for all it's worth and is sure to make this one of his most popular platters. On the flip, "Everything Reminds Me Of You," Pepper once again spoons the lyrics in slow tempo, but, adds something to this tear jerker which gives it lots of stuff. It's the sentimental kind of tune many a location looks forward to. Just listen in and take it from there.

"Cool Water" (2:48) "Auf Wiedersehen, My Dear" (2:48) DERRY FALLIGANT (MGM 10256)

The tune that's creating a sensation 'round the nation, "Cool Water," brought to the juke boxes by a grand, brand new song stylist, Derry Falligant, who clicked big on the West Coast and definitely rates this shot by MGM. His unusual styling of this tune, in medium slow tempo, with a smooth and almost velvet-like handling of the lyrics, is really something to listen to. On the flip, "Auf Wiedersehen, My Dear," an oldie that's had

• Chirping herself right into the top spot this week with one of the grandest, lilting tunes heard in many and many a moon, comes the sweetheart of the juke boxes, Dinah Shore, to bring one of the greatest disks to the music industry. With her Happy Valley Boys

backgrounding her, and with a true western flavor ringing thruout the platter, with her lilting vocal carrying the tune right over the top sure to make listeners plunk in coins to hear her over and over again, Dinah brings "Buttons And Bows," from the picture, "Paleface," and completes the cutting in 2 minutes flat. A speedy spinning disk that has everything the juke box operator needs to cull coin. And, to make it even more impressive, on the flip, "Daddy-O," Dinah goes to town with a bluesy number in her own inimitable style and sells it to a fare-thee-well. This tune's from the pic, "A Song Is Born." Dinah's backed on this side by Sonny Burke and his ork. The money's on the topside, the speedy spinning 2 minute, "Buttons and Bows." Grab a boxful. This is a winner on any location.

many a gal shedding tears for years, many a gal shedding tears for years, Derry simply spoons the tune into one of the neatest pieces of shellac heard in a long time. There's no doubt that many a gal, in those dim lit spots, is gonna fall in love with this guy's voice. This is wax you can bank on.

"Borscht" (2:23) "He Sez, She Says" (2:35) MARION HUTTON (MGM 10252)

Though "Borscht" isn't considered the topside of this platter, your reviewer is picking it as the "top side for juke boxes." Not only because Marion Hutton puts a terrific beat into this beet soup song, with grand novelty lyrics and lots of speedy spinning tempo, but, because this is the sort of novelty tune that juke boxes always cash in with. Just listen to this gal beat beet soup. She sure sells the tune. On the flip, "He Sez, She Says," Marion once again returns in lively tempo to click with trick lyrics that lotsa people are gonna like. She that lotsa people are gonna like. She peps the place right up with her chirping. Novel feature of this side is the way she winds up the cutting—with a long, drawn out kiss. Grab some and spread 'em around.

"The Silver Shenandoah" (2:45) "Someone As Sweet As You" (2:50) EVELYN MacGREGOR (Seva 2008)

• Here's a chirp that's got lotsa voice. Evelyn does a very fine piping job selling this sweet, sentimental tune, in waltz tempo. The gal's got lots of stuff on the ball and there's no doubt that many a spooner's spot is gonna take to this platter. On the flip, "Someone As Sweet As You," Evelyn once again goes into a sweet and sentimental style, beautifully backgrounded (as on the top side) by The Three Kings, and cuts wax that has lots and lots of possibilities. It's relaxing. Smooth, soft, mellow and sentimental. Take it from there.

"P. S. I Love You" (3:05) "My Pal Gonzales" (3:03) WOODY HERMAN ORCH. (Columbia 38289)

Opening in medium slow tempo, chirp Ann McCall, with Woody Herman and his ork to gorgeously background her, does one of the very best piping jobs on, "P.S. I Love You." The gal sure can sell a song. What's more, she's right in there all the way thru the side. Lots of people are gonna play this wax over and over. On the flip, "My Pal Gonzales," the maestro himself comes in for the lyrics and makes this novelty one of the best. Woody is to be congratulated for the very smooth manner in which for the very smooth manner in which he handles the ork and, at the same time, shoots the lyrics and the tune right over the top. Its good wax.

"12th Street Rag" (2:50) "Mama's Gone Goodbye" (2:41) JACK FINA ORCH. (MGM 10251)

Even tho it spins in longer time and it's all instrumental, we're pickin' one of the grandest versions yet heard of that grand, grand oldie, "12th Street Rag." The way maestro Jack Fina fingers those 88's is something to listen to. The grand beat he puts into this number will have every guy and his gal in every high school and university location thruout the land tappin' toes and keepin' time. Fina does a very fine job on "12th Street Rag." It's terrific instrumental wax. On the backing, another instrumental, "Mama's Gone Goodbye," that once again displays the great piano skill of the maestro with the rest of his crew coming in to background his beautiful fingerin'.

"Ah, But It Happens" (3:06) "Down Among The Sheltering Palms" (2:32)

• One more cutting of the very great, "Ah, But It Happens," and this time

by a crooner who presents one of the very best versions of the tune yet heard. Piper Curt Massey sells this tune to a fare-thee-well. He is beautifully backgrounded by Rafael Mendez and his ork to cut a side that's got lots of nickels pressed into it. On the flip, "Down Among The Sheltering Palms," crooning the fine lyrics here in soft and mellow mood, Massey sends this side over the top. This is one of the smoothest vocal platters. It's got lots of beautiful background music. Maestro Mendez can take a deep bow for the job he did to help put this crooner over with this disk. Latch on.



Capitol Records Biz Past 6 Months At New High

Pass \$8 Million Mark. Highest In Firm's History Is Report

HOLLYWOOD, CAL.—Sales and earnings of Capitol Records, Inc., in the first six months of 1948 were the highest for any similar period in the company's history, President Glenn E. Wallichs reported today in a letter to stockholders.

Sales for the six months ended June 30 last were \$8,013,659.20, an increase of \$1,218,774.90 or 18 per cent over the same months of 1947.

Net income after all charges in the first half of 1948 was \$725,489.45, which was equal, after providing for dividends on convertible preferred stock, to \$1.60 a share on the 430,000 shares of common stock outstanding. In the corresponding period of 1947 net income after charges amounted to \$18.881.32.

In the three months ended June 30, 1948, net income after all charges amounted to \$131,901.49, equal after preferred dividends to 28 cents a share on common stock. There was a loss of \$188,225.21 after tax adjustment in the corresponding period a year ago. Sales in the quarter ended June 30 last totaled \$3,188,136.53 against \$2,836,401.77 in the same months of 1947.

Mr. Wallichs stated that sales and earnings benefited in the first six months of 1948 from the exceptional popularity of certain songs originating on Capitol records. Those songs in turn tended to increase the demand for other Capitol products. The effect was to further strengthen the company's trade position.

He further stated in his quarterly letter to the stockholders, "Following the customary seasonal trend, sales declined in the second quarter, but the trend apparently reversed before the end of June."

Officers of the firm were listed as follows: Glenn E. Wallichs, President; Floyd A. Bittaker, Vice-President; James B. Conkling, Vice-President; William H. Fowler, Vice-President; Roy C. Marquardt, Vice-President; E. Paul Ludman, Treasurer and Ass't. Secretary and Daniel C. Bonbright, Assistant Treasurer.



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

There's everything on this side but the nickels—and those are sure to come wherever this platter spins. Both sides are made for juke box play. And both sides spin in speedy tempo, so that there is sure to be many of these disks cut to ribbons, listenin' to Johnny Bond selling two great songs. Latch on, this is grand, grand wax.

On the topside, featuring the popular, "She's A Real Gone Oakie," and with the backing of his Western String Band, Deuce takes right over and sells the tune to a fare-thee-well. It's grand tempo and it's got everything on the ball to make it a grand moneymaker. On the flip, "The Peanut Polka," Deuce once again comes thru with a grand side, and with unique lyrics. Deuce sells the side, but good. It's a lively tune and it's got what it takes.

It's great wax. On the flip, Bob goes into livelier tempo, leaving the vocal to Bill Gray, and produces a tear jerker that will get those nickels, dimes and quarters out of many and many a guy's pocket. With grand instrumental backing and in slower tempo, Tex once again produces a side of wax that's got c-o-i-n pressed right deep into it. This is one disk you should grab and grab quick.







Damage is estimated by the firm's executives to run about \$12,000 but insurance coverage will compensate for any loss.



in the lobby. Receipts from all this equipment will go to CMI for donation to the Cancer fund.

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



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

Since appearance of item here re: counter game operation, many report they would go many miles to be able to operate former reel type counters with ciggy awards. Upped prices of cigarets plus increased sales taxes which have deluged subtle with more perpises then public with more pennies than ever before in history a natural for this type operation. "But where," asks one op, "can counter games of reel type, offering packs of cigarets for awards, be operated?" None seem to think \$100 Federal license will burt

Regarding statement made by Regarding statement made by Far-Westerner that ops in New Jersey and New York overlooked "good bet" when they didn't coin operate shuffleboards here years ago, fact is if ops would have coin operated these boards ABC board would have immediately stepped in to stop such operation. to stop such operation. Shuffleboard is well known as competitive game. ABC won't recognize such games in taverns if customers are charged for privilege to play.

Many ops have left coinbiz. Routes have, in most cases, been taken over by other ops in same territory. Few are reported to have sold to new blood. Also closing of certain territories forced some ops out of biz. Generally, tho, coinmen regard situation as "good."

Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.
