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

Talking It Over



For some years there has been the mistaken conception about "merchandising" music. Everytime some organization or individual in the juke box business ran a series of advertisements or publicity releases in the press, this was considered "merchandising" music. This is not "merchandising" music—this is "selling" music.

Ever since the juke box trade reached national acceptance as an outstanding division of America's music industry the members of this field have been, and are today, "selling" music to the public.

But, there are many new factors entering into the automatic music picture. For example, with the fact that overhead has so tremendously increased and the prices of machines are at all time highs, a new commission basis must come into effect so that the operator can continue on profitably.

Since the operators are now arranging to obtain a greater share of the gross receipts from their equipment, (a) the 70%-30% basis, or (b) "front money," or whatever other arrangement they can make so that they will insure their continuance in the automatic music operating business on a profitable basis—they must give the storekeeper something in return for the extra percentage which they desire. And that's where merchandising music comes into the picture.

They must make scientific installations of their equipment. They must please both the eye and the ear of the merchant as well as of the public. They simply must merchandise the music they have on every location. This will mean better tone music and therefore happier merchants. And certainly more appreciative customers—to put more money into the machines.

Installing the new machines in any locations today should be done with a complete understanding of sound engineering principles so that the location owner is impressed with the installation and will gladly agree to a different commission basis—because of the type of installation made—and the fact that the music is now actually being merchandised to the public.

Merchandising music is the new plan of the intelligent music machine operators thruout the nation. There is no longer any need to just sell music. The public have been most completely sold on juke boxes and coin operated music systems and understand them—as far as purchasing the music from them is concerned.

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SALES SPIRAL AS COLLECTIONS CLIMB Demand Great for New Equipment. Juke Box Ops' Swing to Games Adds to Boom. Demand for Moderately Priced Novelty - Type Game for Closed Areas Grows. Leaders

Urge Ops Anticipate Needs Now as Defense Work Looms.

Most impressive to all the field these past weeks has been the sudden sales spiral. This has now been attributed to the fact that more and still more operators thruout the nation are reporting "increased collections" and, furthermore, that many of them have also stated, "collections continuing to go up".

Much of the great sales increase being enjoyed by the amusement games field is due to the fact that juke box ops have switched over to more diversified operations. Even leading juke box distribs, who formerly handled nothing but automatic music, are now also distributing and operating amusement equipment.

This sudden switch on the part of the nation's leading juke box operators to equalize their lowered collections has been responsible for a flood of orders for new games.

But, what is most outstanding, is the fact that collections started to slowly climb as the Fall season came into being and then, just a few short weeks ago, suddenly zoomed, surprising even the operators themselves. They have continued steadily upward to the point where many now believe that they are heading into one of the best Fall seasons in years.

Surprisingly, too, is the fact that most amusement equipment is riding right along with this sudden collection and sales spiral. Shuffleboards have clicked in many areas, even tho these have been known to the field (as non-coin operated) for many, many years. Pinball is going right ahead maintaining its sales leadership which it regained the early part of the year. Bells are selling better, as are consoles and one-balls and other equipment.

Now, there is a demand coming up, and which is growing ever more prominent, for a moderately priced noveltytype game for closed areas. The greater portion of this demand, it is noted, is from juke box operators who are eagerly seeking supplemental income to their juke box intake.

Such cities as New York, Detroit, Cleveland, Atlanta, Los Angeles and many, many others, could use such equipment. These are among the big buying areas in the nation.

Somewhat dimming the picture at this time is the fact that many of the coin machine factories have been called into conferences with Government officials who have discussed dies, tools and general machinery with them.

This foreshadows the time when many of the largest coinfactories may be once again working for Uncle Sam, producing whatever he needs to assure adequate defense of the nation.

Leaders are therefore urging operators to anticipate their needs now so that they won't again be caught short. The belief is that once some of the larger factories in the trade get under way with defense projects much of the production potential will be lost and game prices will zoom even beyond what they are at this time.

As some leaders see it, this may once again raise the used machine to a higher price than what operators can now purchase new equipment.

This was something everyone attempted to avoid dnring the past war period but, if it enters into a loss of manufacturing capacity in the field due to defense work, this is what will most likely result and will mean that many, who can now definitely protect themselves from being gonged, will find themselves in the unenviable position of paying more for an old, worn machine, than what they can now pay for this same machine, new and factory guaranteed.

The sales spiral will continue upward for the weeks to come, it is the general concensus, for collections are going up very steadily. Such being case the coin machine industry may be among the very first to recover (from among all small businesses) from the readjustment era.

This readjustment, which has caused so many bankruptcies and general business recession, has now left a very definite and glaring imprint on practically all business.

Some businesses are first now beginning to feel its effects. The coin machine trade felt the effect long ago and gradually adjusted to a point where recovery is possible.

Now with overhead lowered in most cases and with greater industry and conservatism predominating, the tendency toward recovery grows stronger each day.

As long as collections even hold at their present level, sales will continue to zoom forward, but, with the fact that collections are rapidly rising—sales, too, will rise in keeping with the collection spiral.

There is as yet much work to be done by all in the field to actually bring about complete recovery. But much of this work has already been accomplished. The greater problem now is for the trade to increase its efforts and work to the point where the possible peak can be foreseen. And then strengthen itself at this peak for the future.

The manufacturers are working like trojans to assure the field all the equipment it will need. They are turning out the very finest games in their long histories.

But, the field itself, must now take advantage of this opportunity to insure its income for tomorrow, and especially for the day when defense work may take away the largest part of the manufacturers production potential, so that none are caught short again.

Almost positive to be one of the biggest clicks ever is this bit offered by balladeer Barry Green, and done up in the style and manner that spells coin play. This deck rates like a spade flush—it's that good. With a wonderful shuffle beat in the background, Barry spoons the cute refrain to offer ops a platter that can really move in the juke boxes. The disk has loads of zip and pep behind it; add Barry's fine voice to a glow-ing instrumental spot and ops have a disk that can spin night and day. On the flip with more cute stuff, Barry renders "I Gotta Know" to keep the phono whirling hot and heavy. Ditty is offered in light man-ner and should earn wide praise. "Brush Those Tears From Your Eyes" is sure-fire. Get next to it!

• The romantic tenor pipes of piper Dale Waltz is displayed here in glow-ing fashion as the balladeer steps out on the right foot with his first plat-ter release. Spooning the azure pure wordage to "This Is My Beloved," Dale shows loads of dramatic appeal in his beautiful interpretation of this ballad. It's a soft and tender setting and one which the moon-in-june kids should go for. On the backside with the oldie "Just A Gigolo," Dale de-livers another socko vocal to set the stage for some heavy coin play. This hunk of wax might be just the thing to hypo sagging phono play for music ops. Lend an ear in this direction.

(Capitol 15234) • Pair of instrumental sides by the Skitch Henderson ork show the piano playing maestro at his best, with this duo titled "Maybe" and "Cornish Rhapsody." Top deck, an oldie, is dusted off by Skitch in glowing man-ner, with his keyboard hogging the limelight on the side. Ops should know the tune well since it always has been a top favorite. On the flip with "Cor-nish Rhapsody," Skitch delivers his interpretation of this popular classic in dazzling style to keep the turntable whirling hot. Song is tastefully ren-dered and should meet with heavy ap-proval. Lend an ear here.

On the flip with "Maria Mia," Reggie splits the vocal spot with English and Italian lyrics to offer wide appeal for music ops. "I Love You So Much It Hurts" is the side to ride with. Latch on!

It's wax with a story and delivered in the very best of song styling. Song spills in slow tempo with a dramatic flutter of strings and reeds simulating the enchanting lyric Frank purrs. The captivat-ing and fascinating patter of this song is sure to create an avalanche


song is sure to create an avalanche of excitement with Sinatra fans as

Both sides of this recording should stimulate phonograph play immensely — don't hesitate a second! Grab it.

(Republic 140) • Bowing into the disk spotlight via this performance, piper Bill Hart shows the spark of a winner with his terrific rendition of "Remember Sep-tember." His soft, and intimate warbling make you get up real close and listen attentively. Lyrics of the song are dreamy and should draw raves from the cuddle-kids. Flip has loads of possibilities also as Bill bounces back with another sensation-al platter in "Just Like Old Friends." His romantic charm and silvery pitch make for delightful listening pleas-ure. Accompaniment by the Dewey Bergman Ensemble adds to the plat-ter's winning ways all the more. Looks like a "sleeper"—spin it.



• Pair of songs currently receiving heavy promotion are these offered here by maestro Sammy Kaye and his orchestra. "Here I'll Stay" and "Green Up Time" from the musical production "Love Life" shows as

Ops who haven't as yet heard the ditty should get next to this version pronto. On the flip with a standard, Russ and his boys do "The Night Is Young And You're So Beautiful," and do it the style and manner that adds up to loads of play in the juke boxes. Loads of floating strings and a charming showcase of music have the unit ren-dering a stellar performance. Take a look-see here.

Wordage is wrapped up in the title with the girls offering their best. "Bella Bella Marie" for the moola.



Flip steps down in tempo and once again features the maestro at the keyboard. Ops who use this brand would do well to grab a listen.

• Orchestrated patter and vocal splendor of Maestro-balladeer Russ Morgan and a pair of sides which might come in for some heavy play on the part of phono fans. Titled, "You're Nobody Till Somebody Loves You" and "When You Left Me," Russ shows his magic styling to glowing advantage here with this duo. Top deck parrots the title with Russ purr-ing the soft, tender wordage in fair fashion. You'll go for the flip, "When You Left Me," as the light scintil-lating rhythm fills the ether with sweet nostalgia. Wax rates ops listen-ing time. ing time.

Both tunes should be well remembered by music ops since they were featured widely. Top

deck is split in English and Spanish vocal while the flip is sung straight throughout the waxing. Andy's many fans should clamor for this material once more.



ROUND THE WAX CIRCLE DISKERS HUDDLE WITH **AFM AS OPTIMISM RUNS HIGH**

Continued Meetings Flood Disk Industry With Rumors As To End Of Recording Ban

NEW YORK-Continued meetings NEW YORK—Continued meetings between representatives of the record industry and James C. Petrillo, presi-dent of the American Federation of Musicians, had the platter industry at fever pitch late this past week. With optimism for the end of the ban higher than it has ever been, there were those who believed that the ban might be called off very shortly.

shortly. As The Cash Box went to press

this week there was every indication of the possibility of the recording in-dustry once again proceeding with re-cording sessions minus venetian blinds

cording sessions minus venetian blinds et al. The six major diskers represented at the meeting held here this past week (Tuesday and Wednesday), re-quested a revision in the sliding scale of royalty payments to the union under the old contract. Whereas pay-ments varied on the individual price of records from $\frac{1}{2}c$ up to as much as 5c, representatives of the major plat-teries have requested a blanket roy-alty scale of 1c of the selling price of

any recording. It was pointed out at the meeting that the union would un-doubtedly receive as much in royalty payments, but the recording com-panies would save untold amounts of money in bookkeeping expenses and the like. The request made by the recording men was viewed as a stand of concrete

men was viewed as a stand of concrete confidence among them in their deter-mination to effect a settlement, and one which would not come thru hasty decisions. Altho most diskers are anxious to

Altho most diskers are anxious to start recording, there was a feeling of complacency among several. Attorneys for both the AFM and the recording industry were still purr-ing over the aspects of the Petrillo proposal. Many were of the opinion that the Federal Government would not condone the plan; while others were almost certain of its approval in Washington.

Washington. Meetings between the diskers and the AFM will continue throughout the latter part of this week and pos-sibly early next week.







LONDON LIBRARY SERVICE SEEN AS HYPO TO WIRED **MUSIC INDUSTRY**

Wide Selection Of Popular & Standard Music Aids Music Operator, Cuts Costs

NEW YORK—The London Lib-rary Service, a division of the Lon-don Gramophone Corporation, this city, is now making available to wired music operators and industrial plants, a library of specially recorded material on 10" discs at 78 RPM. It is the only library service of its kind available in the United States. Featuring instrumental arrange-ments only, the library contains the outstanding standards plus the popu-lar hit tunes of the day. Rhythm and tempo are treated with care and the variance in volume level is kept with-in reasonable range, thus avoiding the problem of constantly monitoring the music. The library it was learned may the music.

The library, it was learned, may be used in conjunction with any auto-matic or manually operated 78 RPM record player. Now that the use of automatic equipment for wired music is rapidly increasing, there is less

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need to engage the services of per-sonnel to manually operate wired music studios. The use of the Lon-don Library Service with additional material that is now available will sustain full time wired music opera-tion

sustain full time wired music opera-tion. Music operators throughout the East who have been using the service disclosed that they find the library very satisfactory. One local music operator stated, "I find that I'm mak-ing more money by using the Lon-don Library Service. I don't have to worry about records as much and I find that my operational overhead has been decreased appreciably. With defense plants going up more than ever, I'm sure wired music is the thing today."




Sheet Music Sales Up **Over Last Year**





NEW YORK-Of interest to the coin machine industry was the warning issued to its members by John E. O'Neill, general counsel of the Small Brewers Association, at the eleventh annual convention of the National Beer Wholesalers Association which took place at the Commodore Hotel this week.

O'Neill adressed the gathering declaring that bills strongly curtailing liquor advertising and directed toward national prohibition will be re-introduced at the next session of Congress, and will be supported by at least 30 percent of the population. He warned that "many people fail to recall the intolerable conditions that existed during the prohibition era and other adults were too young to have seen them."

He pointed out that the deciding factor on prohibition is neither the "wets" nor the "drys", but a third group of "non-consumers." The attitude of this group will be influenced by what its members see of the liquor industry, he asserted.

"If local social problems result from abuses at the retail level, lax enforcement of the law, or any other reasons, regardless of where the responsibility belongs, this group will eventually support the drys and we will have prohibition," O'Neill cautioned.

"The liquor industry must give the fullest support to every officer, local, state or Federal, who is charged with supervising the industry and must be constantly alert against industry con-ditions that could draw criticism," he stated.

stated. As the welfare of the coin machines industry, to a large extent, depends upon the continuance of liquor sales, it would be to the interest of all in it to watch developments, doing every-thing possible to cooperate with the tavern owners and local liquor asso-ciations ciations.






