

Talking It Over



Now's the time for the intelligent operator to buy.

This is the time for him to plug up every open location in his territory while the prices of used machines are dropping. Now, while he can get them reasonably, he should arrange to place a machine in every open location so that he will forestall the entrance of competition.

Not only should he plug up these holes, but he should see to it that every location he takes on is signed to a contract of at least two or three years duration, so that he can depend on that location remaining his for at least this period of time. And, furthermore, he should place his equipment in the spot on a 70%-30% commission basis—or any other basis which is most suitable to the pecularities of his own territory—but a commission basis which will assure him a decent profit on his investment.

This he should do NOW—while he can. There is no doubt that after some dropping down—used equipment will level off in price and will go up to a new basis mark.

Many coinmen have spread themselves out very, very thin from a financial standpoint. They are now drawing into themselves and becoming very cautious about purchases.

This is, therefore, the time for the intelligent operators to buy—to cover themselves—to make sure that every location they want in their territories will be theirs.

But, even most important, is the fact that this short slump period has definitely demonstrated to the members of this industry that unless their businesses are economically sound they will lose in every case.

Coinmen must arrange for a better commission basis to offset such slumps should they again arise in the future and to assure themselves a decent profit on their investment—come good times or bad times.

TRADE'S FUTURE OUTLOOK BASED ON DEFENSE WORK

Future Uncertain as Uncle Sam Starts to Move in to Take Over Production Facilities and Stockpiles. Urge Ops Anticipate Requirements Now to Offset Tomorrow's Needs. Again Foresee Era Where Used Equipment May Cost More Than Present New Machines.

As the so-called "cold war" becomes hotter everywhere on the European continent, and as more and more military analysts once again begin to write columns in the nation's leading press, manufacturers are girding themselves for the calls they expect to receive from Uncle Sam regarding defense requirements.

It is already known that the largest military appropriations in peacetime history are well under way and that Congress has seen fit not to hamper their passage. This has resulted in contacts being made with various industrial organizations by both Army and Navy technical experts discussing and studying possibilities for production and freezing stockpiles of raw materials.

It can, and may, mean that much sooner than expected the larger industrial potentials of this industry will be engaged in work for Uncle Sam and will, because of this effort, be in no position to go ahead with any type of domestic production, or, if they can still continue to produce equipment for this industry it will be at such minimum as to be practically negligible.

Word is received of more plants turning over their production facilities to the defense effort. As the weeks and months go by this will become generally noticeable and, before long, it will be surprising to see large industrial organizations which will not be engaged in defense work. At least these are the predictions of experts.

Therefore, for sometime, operators, jobbers and distributors in this industry have been urged to make their requirements known as far in advance as they possibly can. The reason is that many believe they may once again be caught short. Should this happen the spiral on used equipment prices is once again going to match and even exceed the cost of new machines.

There are few, if any, who want to see this happen again. But, when production is tremendously curtailed, it definitely can, and will, happen. Therefore preparedness is something which should be placed to the fore by everyone now engaged in the industry. And the type of equipment used should be on advance order.

Few know what tomorrow can bring. But, as expert after expert has stated, the spark can be ignited anywhere in the world and the holocaust will result so suddenly that many will be caught napping. This is not the time for the men who will depend on the equipment of this industry to earn their living to be caught napping. They simply must face facts and must order what they will require as far in advance as they possibly can.

Manufacturers have already reported being called in and have have discussions as to the productiveness of their present machinery. They know that the time is drawing near when they may have to turn over all, or the better part, of their production capacity to whatever Uncle Sam will require of them.

There is little that can be done to stop this engulfing defense work wave. It is dimming the future outlook of the industry. It

is the general belief that after the presidential elections in November the dam will break and a floodwave of defense orders will result which will carry before it many an industry now of the belief that it will carry on as formerly.

Should the United States also commit itself to supply all the Western European powers, as well as certain Asiatic and Mediterranean countries with military equipment, and it seems from the discussions being held by the U.N. in Paris as well as the separate meetings being carried on by the powers assembled there that this is the case, then surely all will instantly foresee that every industry of any manufacturing capacity will be engaged in helping this nation supply the military wants of these other countries.

That being the case very, very little productive capacity will be left for domestic requirements and this means that few, if any, new coin machines will be available. It also again means that with very few new machines coming off production lines that the used machines market will zoom to new and important heights, just as it did the last time, and the prices which will be asked will be like those of the present used car market.

There is still time left for those who wish to prepare themselves in advance to act. They can arrange for placement of quantity orders to insure receiving as much equipment as they can handle.

This is the one and only way in which the operator, jobber and distributor can protect himself. It will also prove a boon to the manufacturer for, once the buyers advise in advance just how much of what they can use, the manufacturer can then plan his production accordingly and will be able to meet requirements. But, when the manufacturer is left in a quandary as to just how many pieces to send thru his production line, he will, as he should, play as safe and as close as he possibly can, with the result that shortage is bound to result.

The one and only man who can effect a cure to this problem which will face the industry as defense requirements become more pronounced is the operator. It is up to him to arrange to get what he can, and ask that his order be honored as far in advance as possible.

No longer can he wait. No longer can he even hesitate. The time is drawing so close to the day when almost every factory of any productive capacity will be engaged in Uncle Sam's defense work that he must decide now what he wants for tomorrow to assure himself the security he will require.

A pair of sides that scored heavily ages ago by a performer who made them hits is offered here in pleasant manner. It's old timer Nick Lucas with "Tip Toe Thru The Tulips" and "Side By Side" that show as potential coin winners. Nick's handling of the slow paced lyrics on this side is sure to meet with favor. The wax is especially suited for the tavern spots and as such should have wide appeal. On the backing with "Side By Side," Nick renders the bouncy rhythm in tones that count. The wax and the songs should have heavy sentimental appeal. Ops should take a look-see in this department. A pair of sides that scored heavily

Top deck, titled "Not Tonight, Josephine" spills in medium tempo with the wordage swinging around the title. Flip, "Pigs Knuckles" is a pleasant polka ditty in rapid polka tempo. The wax makes for fairly pleasant listening. Lend an ear in this direction. this direction.

Plug ditty bound to kick up an awful storm in juke boxes throughout the land in the immediate future is this bit done up here by piper Sam Browne. It's an oldie with a terrific hypo, and as rendered here, should come in for its fair share of coin play. Titled, "Down Among The Sheltering Palms," Sam spoons the light, frivolous wordage in soft jubilant tones that add up to a healthy coin culler. You'll like the beat and toe-tapping rhythm this tune offers as well as Sam's vocal spot. On the flip with the current favorite "Cool Water," Sam comes back again to turn in another favorable performance. Ops need no urging with this ditty—Sam's rendition should increase phono play. "Sheltering Palms" for the moola.

"If We Can't Be The Same Old Sweethearts" (2:52)

Here's another oldie that has bounced back into the musical limelight. It's a song that scored and ran wild in grandpa's day and is a cinch to do so today. Definitely one of the hottest items on wax around, The

Here's a ditty music operators will be playing in juke boxes up and down the coast, from Maine to California! It's that old rhythm tune, "Down Among The Sheltering Palms," currently receiving heavy plugging, that grabs this featured spot this week. Make no mistake about it—it's a tune that is sure to be received by phonograph fans throughout the land in heavy rolls of approval. With the

affectionate voice of Johnny Mercer, combined with The Pied Pipers and the Paul Weston orchestra; cer, combined with The Pied Pipers and the Paul Weston orchestra; this platter takes on an even more attractive air. The sprightly rhythm, with Johnny spooning the grand lyric makes for top notch listening pleasure. The Pipers add their bit in making this platter a hit, by purring some beautiful harmony in the background to round out the side. The refrain of this hunk of wax is all decked out with the stuff that goes toward making this thing a coin culler. On the backside with a classic piece of music, Johnny renders the smart and infectious lyric to "One For My Baby." Ditty has been around some and gained heavy popularity at the time. It's a platter that makes you listen. Both sides beckon coin play in a big way with "Down Among The Sheltering Palms" leading the way.

Wayfarers set with "If We Can't Be The Same Old Sweethearts" to come up with a potential moneymaker for music operators. The infectious melody and inspiring wordage is bound to be taken to, and should be well remembered by veteran music ops. Rhythm literally rolls forth in beautiful tones of expression with the lyric breaking thru to add to the side. On the flip with some hearts and flowers music in "You Can Die Of A Broken Heart," the group once again display their versatile vocal talents to best advantage with this piece. It's the top deck wherein lies the gold.

"Hankerin'" (2:42) "Just For Now" (2:50) FELIX KING ORCH.

• Pair of instrumental sides which Pair of instrumental sides which wired music operators may go for are these offered in light fashion by the Felix King Orchestra. With the piano featured throughout the pair, maestro King offers the popular "Hankerin'" and "Just For Now." Both tunes are growing in popularity and should be widely known at this stage. Top deck is the better of the pair, with some beautiful rhythm seeping thru the wax. Music ops who have the spots should pay close attention to this platter.

"Rambling Rose" (2:46)

"There's Nothing Too Good For You" (3:00)

● The vocal expressions of balladeer Benny Lee combined with the music effort of maestro Stanley Black set the stage for some potential coin play on this London platter. Benny offers

the gay and beautiful lyric to the popular hit 'Rambling Rose" on the top deck, to come up with a cookie that can move in the juke boxes. Vocal rendition here should add immensely to the popularity of this song. On the flip with "There's Nothing Too Good For You," Benny once again renders a fairly pleasant piece. Altho the song lacks balance, it might grab some phono play as a filler item. Ops who haven't as yet tried "Rambling Rose" should by all means, look into this disking.

"Perhaps, Perhaps, Perhaps" (2:56) "The Matador" (3:02)

DESI ARNAZ ORCH. (Victor 20-3113)

• A pair of sides that can really move in those spots that go for the Latin brand of music are offered here by the widely popular and capable Desi Arnaz orchestra, with the maestro himself in the vocal spotlight on the pair. The rapturous refrain of the now standard 'Perhaps, Perhaps, Perhaps' has Desi spooning the light, fragrant wordage in subtle tones of splendor. There's no doubt about this piece moving in the machines, it's a song that is easily taken to. On the flip with the up-and-coming "The Matador," Desi displays his versatile vocal styling with some strong ballading that scores. Music has to be listened to in order to be fully appreciated. Both sides rate a spot in your machines. machines.

"Danny Boy" (2:47) "Phil, The Fluter's Ball" (2:39)

• More re-issue wax out of Capitol Records with the tenor pipes of Den-

nis Day pitching smoothly on "Danny Boy" and "Phil, The Fluter's Ball." Top deck is widely known and is well performed by Dennis. The song should have wide sentimental appeal and as such should be met with great demand. Flip has Dennis singing this gay novelty tune in his best Irish brogue. Song bounces along in sprightly tempo and makes for pleasant listening. Ops who have the locations should do well with this duo.

"Fiddle Faddle" (3:00) "Jazz Legato" (2:30) ERIC ROBINSON ORCH. (Mercury 5189)

Music which wired music operators can use to extremely good advantage are these sides offered in scintillating fashion by the Eric Robinson orchestra. The beautiful and dramatic refrain of the widely popular "Fiddle Faddle" gets a grade A sendoff here, as dancing strings throw brilliant patterns of enchanting music thru the ether. It's wax that can be listened to time and again, with the listener never tiring of the wonderful music. On the backside with "Jazz Legato," maestro Robinson and his orhestra once again offer some top notch music for operators. Both sides should be greeted with wide favor in those quiet dining locations.

"Dream" (2:44) "The Whiffenpoof Song" (2:56)

Two songs which always have been in great demand are re-issued here, with The Pied Pipers rendering some beautiful harmony throughout the duo to come up with some potential coin winning wax for music operators. It's the dreamy, atmospheric rapture of "Dream" that offers the incentive here. The tune, one of the Pipers most heavily requested songs, should be remembered by music ops as one of their best songs ever. Slow, haunting pacing combined with the glamour thrown about this tune makes it a ditty to watch. On the back with "The Whiffenpoof Song," the combo once again step forth with some great music harmony to score. Ops who have a call for this stuff should hop on the bandwagon.

"The Wedding Rhumba" (2:51) "Tambo" (2:38)

CHUY REYES ORCH. (Capitol 15244)

Some wax in the rhumba vein, with Chuy Reyes in the driver's seat to offer "The Wedding Rhumba" and "Tambo." Top deck, an all instrumental piece moves at rapid tempo with Chuy and the boys displaying their best musical wares. Song is one that can catch on. Trumpet solo and some gay keyboard work by the maestro highlight the side. On the flip with "Tambo," piper Tony Gari steps forth to deliver the south of the border lyrics. Ditty, in dance tempo should be received in fair fashion by the hip-swivelers. Music ops take it from here.



DISKERS-PETRILLO IN STYMIE ON BAN SETTLEMENT

Meetings Continue Throughout Week As Recording Industry Presents Demands To AFM Officials. Indie Diskers Association Meets. Optimism Remains High.

NEW YORK-Continued meetings between the recording industry and the American Federation of Musicians (AFM) were accelerated here this past week, as disk indus-try representatives and union offi-cials entered into their third week

of negotiations.
While both factions reported that a great deal of progress has been made, the negotiations were temporarily stymied as diskers and union reps evidenced a lack of agreement on several important points.

It was learned that the AFM had proposed that royalty payments be made by the diskers on all recordings sold since the beginning of the year. The AFM also requested that the record industry pay royalties on all disks made abroad and ties on all disks made abroad and sold in the United States. Both proposals met with little approval on the part of the record manufac-

Disk industry reps want royalty payments to start upon settlement

of the ban. James C. Petrillo was said to have given up the idea of securing royalty payments on foreign made disks after receiving no approval by the record industry committee.

The proposed statute rate of royalty payment, presented to Petrillo last week, seems to remain one of the better arguments diskers have and at this stage, has a great deal of chance of being approved by the AFM prexy. The diskers proposed a flat rate of 1% royalty payments on the retail price of a recording as against the sliding scale which had been in use under the old con-

tract, prior to the recording ban.

Diskers also were learned to have proposed the stoppage of royalty payments to the union or the trustee named, in the event of any work stoppage by the AFM. Mr. Petrillo voiced no opinion on this matter altho it seems he may look upon this as a possible strike breaking tactic.

Recording men are still of the

belief that the ban will shortly be called off, altho many expressed the opinion that it may be weeks before anything concrete turns up. The fact that the meetings which were conducted this past week at night and day pace, indicates that the AFM is fairly firm in its obvious decision to effect an early settle-

While the basic plan itself is the major point of discussion, the other angles involved, as to pay scales, hours, etc., have been deliberated upon as well. Most important to all represented is the point of whether or not the trustee-plan will secure or not the trustee-plan will secure the approval of the record industry representatives and later the Federal Attorney General's office. Those close to the Taft-Hartley bill were known to be keeping close contact with the present negotiations and reportedly had already scanned the Petrillo proposal. Nevertheless, the Petrillo plan will have to meet with the stipulations and requirements of the Taft-Hartley Law before any further prog-

ress can be made.
Several trade observers voiced Several trade observers voiced the opinion this past week that Washington had already given the green light to Petrillo regarding his proposal. This point was explained by the statement that the union prexy would not needlessly entertain any proposal with the record executives unless he felt sure the plan would meet with Federal approval. If this is true, others in the disk biz queried, why wouldn't those Federal agencies involved and Petrillo make this statement? statement?

statement? Independent record manufacturers this past week also met and discussed those proposals made by the major platteries at confabs with the AFM. Chairman of the group, Jack Pearl, disclosed to the indies the demands of the majors. Mr. Pearl was called away from the meeting, (Wednesday—Oct. 6) to return to a meeting with the AFM at 9 P.M.

Wax Deal With Tele-Funken

Exchange Of Masters With Continental Waxery Gives Capitol Plattery First Outside Distribution

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF. — Capitol Records Inc., this city, have completed arrangements with the Tele-Funken record manufacturing organization in Germany, which will give the former plattery its first foreign wax distribution, it was learned here this past week

week.

The deal with Tele-Funken, which first had to be cleared thru U. S. Government Federal agencies was arranged by Sandor Porges, head of the firm's foreign department and James Conkling, vice-president in charge of extists and reporteign. artists and repertoire.

The arrangement by Capitol with Tele-Funken is viewed in the trade as a major one, lifting Capitol to the major level of RCA-Victor, Decca and Columbia Records. Capitol Records, who recently entered their sixth year in husiness have near had one for in business, have never had any for-eign wax distribution.

eign wax distribution.

Tele-Funken, it was learned, has working agreements with record manufacturers throughout the Continent. The recordings issued by these firms will be available to Capitol, as will the latter's masters be available to the Tele-Funken organization.

It was reported that several masters were already on their way to the United States from Tele-Funken, and that the recordings from these masters would be ready for marketing in the U. S. early next year.

the U. S. early next year.

Altho it was not revealed whether the deal with Tele-Funken would include pop material as well as classical, it was learned from reliable sources

that many of German firm's masters did include European jazz items which would be marketable here.

would be marketable here.

With the bulk of the Tele-Funken masters undoubtedly in the classical field, this arrangement with the German diskery marks Capitol's first venture into the classical field on a large scale. Details of Capitol's plans as to price, merchandising and promotion plans were not disclosed.

Uncle Sam Hits Out At "Party" Disks

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Department of Justice this past week was reported launching an immediate widespread investigation into the "party" disk business.

It is believed that the bulk of obscene recordings stem from California and other points in the west. Trade

and other points in the west. Trade observers pointed out that it is a federal offense to transport, purchase or sell pornographic recordings thru interstate commerce.

A recent case involving a Kansas City, Kansas, disk distributor was brought to light before the U. S. District Court.

While offenders in the obscene record business generally are in the distributing or retail lines, juke box operators were cautioned to be on the lookout for the "party" material.

He explained that sales this past month were well over 20% higher for a like period last year.

New Catalog Of Record Promotion Services

NEW YORK—The importance of the juke box as a record exploitation tool is highlighted in the new "catalog" of record promotion services being offered to record companies by Albert Millet, local indie disk flack.

Albert Millet, local indie disk flack. This is an entirely new plan of operation and does not obligate record companies either to put a man on full time or to pay a flat weekly or monthly fee. Millet's method requires payment only for "the service you want, when you want it." He will take a disk jockey to lunch for you, put on a personal appearance at a retail sore, pose your artist for photographs at a juke box function, make up a window streamer, a juke box title strip, a catalog or a record release sheet . . . all on a piece work basis.

Millet claims that there is no mystery to plugging a record. It consists of a "number of purely routine jobs to get the record played, displayed, and written about as often as possible in the hope that enough of the public will hear it, like it . . . and buy it."

He offers to do any or all of these routine jobs so that you can "do as many of them as you feel should be done . . . while your plug record is still hot."

His catalog lists the jobs that should be done by record companies in getting a record "exposed to the public." It is divided into five groups of services: Contact work, special events, information services, merchandising services, and production services

Millet claims that he is the only record promotion man who holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Marketing, which is a fancy word for promotion. He has been engaged in advertising of commercial commodities for many years until he entered the entertainment field as promotion

manager for one of the entertainment weeklies. He left about a year ago to go into business for himself as a free lance record promotion man.

JUKE BOX OPS ASK HALT TO 20% DANCE TAX

Agree Take Will Boom. Also State Will Crowd Many Spots. Ask Musicians Help. Claim Will Bring Back Small Bands.

NEW YORK—Since appearance of the article in *The Cash Box*, October 2, 1948 issue (page 14), many letters have been received from the nation's leading juke box operators agreeing that there should be a campaign started to eliminate the present 20 per cent tax which prevails in locations where dancing is allowed.

As one noted juke box op stated, "It seems as if the Government is intent on halting the American people from enjoying the dancing which is their heritage. Thru the years, since

this nation was founded, men and women danced when and where they felt like it, in places which arranged for such dancing. Certainly the government's officials are cognizant of this fact. They should remove a tax which halts the public from enjoying itself."

He continued, "There is no earthly reason, at least in my mind, why a husband and wife, who enjoy a few minutes in some tavern or other spot in their naborhood, should be stopped from dancing because, as the proprie-

tor will tell them, if he allows dancing, there will be 20% added to their bill.

"Surely," he says, "this isn't what we, or anyone else, in this nation, want to happen. If people want to dance, they should be allowed to. As far as we in the juke box industry are concerned, we know that where dancing is allowed, especially in those ice cream spots where the youngsters gather 'round, the take jumps to new highs, for the juke box is working at top speed.

"Even in taverns," he claims, "the take is known to reach new highs. The musicians themselves should back us for everyone of the better spots immediately arranges for small bands to play during the evenings and, in some cases where they can't afford bands every evening, over the weekends. In short, the musicians as well as the juke box industry will prosper from the removal of this 20% dance tax."

More and more juke box ops have voiced these same sentiments in reports to The Cash Box. All are of the belief that removal of this 20% imposition on the dancing of the nation's peoples, will help this automatic music industry and will, at the same time, create that happier and more optimistic attitude which is so badly wanting these days.

Many ops recall that when dancing

Many ops recall that when dancing was allowed in some of their locations, which provided small dance floors, their take was at an all time high.

JUKE BOX OPS!

Since elimination of the dancing, collections have been less than one-third what they were at that time. This is proved by operator after operator who has checked against old records in his possession in spots where dancing formerly was the main attraction.

Some of the ice cream spots where

Some of the ice cream spots where youngsters first learned and created the new dance steps were the "best locations in the nation" as one well known operator puts it.

He also says, "There is no doubt that if we can eliminate this twenty per cent dance tax, these same spots will once again become the 'best' on our routes and we will be able to feature many different kinds of recordings which we don't and can't feature at this time."

One op claims, "Some of my locations whom I showed your article to were immediately enthused over it. They urged that all of the juke box ops in this territory get together and do something about eliminating this 20 per cent dance tax. This proprietor told me that it would help his business tremendously for it would bring back the crowds who used to flock to his place and it would mean better business for everyone else in this town."


Here is something for all to consider. The fact that so many retailers would be enjoying much "better business" were this tax removed.

Tavern after tavern, especially those many country spots where people gather evenings and over the weekends, would find their business increased far over one hundred percent what it is today. The ice cream and soda spots would jump accordingly.

There is no doubt that locations want this tax removed. Many a store-keeper has brought this up to ops time after time. There is a surety that a petition circulated among location owners would get their heartiest support
