Talking It Over

As more and more juke box ops thruout the country begin to enter into coin operated television, an unusual legal problem seems to be arising.

This is the fact that certain telecasters are flashing notice that their programs cannot be featured by "coin operated television receivers."

So far only one music op has reported any trouble in this regard. This report comes from Milwaukee, Wis. where one of the TV stations featured such an announcement and then had an attorney checking the various locations where this op was operating television-phono machines.

Nothing further has resulted except that this op has been approached to pay a license fee to that station of \$1 per year for the privilege of picking up and featuring their programs on each of his coin operated video-juke box combinations.

Others have also, in the meantime, reported such incidents, and are wondering just how this will affect the future operation of combination television-juke boxes.

As yet there has been no legal decision in this regard. But, there is no doubt that somewhere in the nation some op and some telecaster are going to lock horns over the issue and, perhaps, whatever will result may act as the precedent for the future of coin operated television.

The some juke box ops, and associations of music operators, are as yet opposing coin operated television sets, the fact remains that this type of entertainment continues to grow greater each day and is expected, eventually, to set up an entirely new type of American entertainment.

In fact, some even predict that within ten years television stars will be making "personal appearances" in the leading nation's theatres just as the movie stars do today.

Others also claim that eventually the idea of a "movie theatre" will be replaced with a video show. And that, in addition to regular entertainment on large size screen, live news, coming in every minute, will be flashed constantly on an additional screen, making this type of "show" something to really interest all the public.

Therefore, it is high time that the average juke box op and his association began to think about video. Perhaps it may pay the nation's juke box leaders to instantly tie in with whatever music op it may be who will be the first to lock horns with any telecaster regarding paying a yearly license fee for showing his programs via coin operated video.

An ounce of prevention can be worth many pounds of cure—especially in this instance.

Ops Testing TV Combos. Report Video Hike Juke Box Play Action. Look to '49 Helps as Coin Operated TV Year.

With four different video-juke box combos already on the market, and some others reported on their way in, the coin operated television business begins to take on ever increasing importance for the automatic music op.

First unit that was shown was "Videograph," featuring Emerson Television plus Filben juke box mechanism combination.

Immediately afterwards along came "Tele-Juke." Tho this unit works on an entirely different principle, that of using the music ops' juke box mechanism and combining it with video in a different style cabinet it, too, has great possibilities.

Just a few weeks ago Aireon Manufacturing Corp. of Kansas City, Kans. showed their Coronet-Television combination using an entirely new and different principle. This firm have an RCA-Victor chassis featured in a very special and attractive cabinet. The video is not an integral part of their Coronet phono. It is separated from the juke box and the telecast programs can be purchased thru anyone of the disk turntable spots as well as thru any wall or bar box which may be tied in with the Coronet on the same location. Here is a new approach to coin operated television.

Since then Solotone Corp. of Los Angeles, Calif. have shown their three-way unit through their national sales agent, Dennison Sales Company. This unit is self-contained and uses the Solotone individual speaker boxes to feature ten selective records on as many different turntables, four radio stations and as many television programs as the operator and the location owner care to provide the patrons.

Dennison Sales Co. also state that they have an individual box made completely and solely for television and television only for the smaller location where only coin operated television is desired. This unit has won much comment from the trade.

Others, too, are also planning an early introduction of coin operated television and television of the laterial process.

Others, too, are also planning an early introduction of coin operated television combos. Among these are some of the better known automatic music manufacturers who have been experimenting with video receivers in divers fashion.

All this points to a new era for the juke box ops. Already it is known that those music ops who are featuring TV are earning more from their phonos. It seems, for some reason or other, that the public will play more records in the juke box which combines TV. Why? No one seems to know.

One noted op claims that since he's getting \$20 per week front money guarantee and splitting the blalance on a 50/50 basis it seems to him that the location owner cuts the TV program off just as soon as possible and gets the juke box back into action.

"For," this op states, "he realizes that the juke box collection will cover his front money guarantee and even show him some profit and, at the same time, his video costs him nothing."

Most impoirtant to the trade, of course, is the fact that more and more juke box leaders thruout the country are digging into TV. It is surprising to note the sudden interest which has resulted. It is even more surprising in view of the fact that certain coinmen claimed "ops just ain't got the dough to buy television-juke box combos" that they are buying.

H. F. Dennison of Dennison Sales Company, while showing his Solotone Master Entertainer in New York City, showed this writer actual orders. Many of these were what he called, "Advance orders."

In short ops have been buying and locating his unit even tho telecasting hasn't as yet started in their communities. "The idea," he explains, "is that the smarter operator is getting ready for the time when television comes in to his city and won't be hurt by it as were operators in other cities."

Mr. Harold Pearson of Aireon Manufacturing Corp., Kansas City, Kansadvised the writer over the long distance phone one day just a short while ago, "We've never had so much interest shown in any product with which I've ever been connected."

In short, Mr. Pearson, too, is beginning to feel the great undercurrent of interest in coin operated video and realizes that his firm hav

In short, Mr. Pearson, too, is beginning to feel the great undercurrent of interest in coin operated video and realizes that his firm have entered into

what many believe will prove the "future of the coin operated music industry, with 1949 the first big coin operated television year."

Lou Forman, president of Videograph Corp., New York City, told the writer, "Every day we are getting calls from music operators regarding 'Videograph.' We have entered into the business that the operator now realizes is his salvation."

Every day something new and different is beginning to break on the market, and it seems all is directed at the forthcoming TV ideas.

Juke box ops were, at first, extremely skeptical regarding coin operated video. Since then they have changed their minds. All claim that the present units being shown are still in a crude, and even in an embryonic stage. But, so is television generally. The idea is, of course, to get in on the ground floor. After that improvements and new ideas will come along just as they did in juke boxes, radio, etc.

Those ops who are already hopping on the bandwagon are extremely excited about what is happening. One well known New Jersey operator reported, "One of the spots where we set our first unit jumped over 650% in take the very first week." He admits it may go down. But, he can't see how it can do very much less. The location owner has advised him that this is the very first time when the patrons "were really excited" about coin operated music.

There are a great, great many things no one in this (or even in video) yet knows about television and what it will eventually come to in the American entertainment world. It is noted already that some of the smaller ball clubs and boxing organizations are seriously thinking of eliminating telecasting of their games and boxing matches. They claim that TV is killing their take.

A potent example is the Newark (N. J.) Bears baseball club (division of the New York Yankees) which is folding, and which attributes much of its loss to telecasting of its games.

Some of the best known bouts weren't allowed to be telecast by the Tournament of Champions. But, there is no doubt that all this will eventually be ironed out, just as many other irritations and wrinkles in the TV picture will also be corrected.

The idea now is for the trade to look ahead. If coin operated TV combos

The idea now is for the trade to look ahead. If coin operated TV combos are doing what it is reported they are on locations, then all music ops had best begin to open ears to listen and—for the first time—eyes to see.

There are many, many irons in the fire. Many new and, possibly, better units will be introduced. But, this is not the time to be caught off base. What is most interesting to all the manufacturers, distributors and operators of music machines is that TV has helped tremendously to hike play and that the juke box part of the combo shows greater take than ever before. This is what these people are most interested in and, therefore, something for all in the trade to closely investigate.

One leading eastern operator who has just started out with a new unit reports. "Without even as yet connecting the video, our take has jumped. So much, in fact, that we simply can't believe it, and are now wondering whether we should hook in television at all. We feel that just the suggestion of a hookup with TV was sufficient to stimulate bigger play action."

There it is. The trade is left to its own thoughts and its own investigations. But, there is no doubt that television is on its way—and just how far it will go in how short or long a time will depend on the people who get back of it, and the acceptance it gets from the public—based on the programs it produces.

VIC DAMONE (Mercury 5207)

Soft, intimate spooning of Vic Damone and a brilliant offering in this highly touted "My Own True Love." Song is from the Paramount picture of the same name and should receive heavy bally once it breaks. Damone's piping on this warm ballad shows as one of his best to date. The refreshing lyric and meaningful manner in which Vic renders this song should point to it becoming a featured bit on the boxes. On the flip with "A Market Place In Old Monterey," Vic comes back with another cute bit in this dainty piece of music. It's the top deck, "My Own True Love" that will spin on the phonos.

"Play The Playera" (2:11) "Will You Promise" (2:26)

JERRY SELLERS (MGM 10307)

Pair of sides by the young promising Jerry Sellers and the set-up of "Play The Playera" and "Will You Promise." Both sides are strong contenders for phono honors and should meet with ops approval. Topside is the better of the pair, with Jerry's fond pipes purring the beautiful lyrics. Mellow Latin beat furnished by the Enoch Light ork adds brilliance to this side. On the backside with another romantic bit in "Will You Promise," Jerry bounces back with another first-rate performance. Both sides should garner their fair share of coin. of coin.

"My Darling, My Darling" (2:30) "Dainty Brenda Lee" (3:08)

PETER LIND HAYES (Decca 24519)

Music ops know about this tune already—but here's a truly great rendition of "My Darling, My Darling" which should become widely popular. It's Peter Lind Hayes with The Stardusters spooning the smart, and dainty lyrics. Song is one that meets with the listeners approval from the first earing. Hayes' vocal performance here should put the phono spotlight on him, and grab a ton of coin. On the coupling with a potential winner in "Dainty Brenda Lee," Peter and the group bounce back with more delightful music. The slow, melodic beat, added to Hayes' alluring vocal spot should merit loads of attention. The wax definitely rates a spot in your machine.

JOAN BROOKS (Universal 129)

Pair of sides that have all the ear marks of becoming phono favorites are these offered here by thrush Joan Brooks. The gal's smooth pitch on this pair, ably accompanied by the vocal harmony of Hi, Lo, Jack And The Dame makes for easy listening pleasure. Top deck, "Just Once More" spills in soft, romantic tempo with

• Ditty that grabs this featured spot this week is this latest offering by the widely popular and capable Tony Pastor orchestra. Always a consistent money maker for juke box operators, Tony and the gang offer "It's Like Taking Candy From A Baby" to set the stage for some heavy coin play. Teamed with chirp Rosemary Clooney, the maestro offers ops a side that can really take off and go. It's slow,

tempting music, with Rosemary purring the cute lyrics in ex-tremely fine voice. The gal is one of the most up and coming vocalists in the biz-she turns in a wonderful performance on this side. Her strong and meaningful tones on this bit are sure to attract loads of attention and hit pay-dirt for music ops. The thrush and Tony split the vocal chorus, with the wordage echoing the title. Song makes you stop and listen, and then come back for another earful. On the flip with "The Chowder Special," Tony, the Clooney Sisters and the entire crew take part in this novelty. Ditty is done up in light, happy vein and should sit well with the many Pastor fans. Topside, "It's Like Taking Candy From A Baby" rates a spot in ops machines.

Joan purring the intimate lyric in top notch fashion. Flip is a comely bit too, with Joan piping "Don't Ever Forget" for another splendid performance. Topside is the one we like.

"As You Desire Me" (2:53) "I'll Remember April" (2:38)

DERRY FALLIGANT (MGM 10308)

Pair of sides which might make decent filler bits for music operators are these offered by balladeer Derry Falligant. Topside is done in straight ballad manner with the strong wordage of the widely-known "As You Desire Me" echoing in attractive phrases. Derry's pipes make for easy listening throughout. Flip, "I'll Remember April," is done up in chanting-whisper style which doesn't fill the bill at all. Music ops who have the spots on their machines can take a look-see here.

● The light and vibrant piano fashions of maestro Jack Fina are shown to excellent advantage here. Jack tickles the ivory's in top notch manner on the piano classic "Canadian Capers" to make this a deck the Fina fans can go for. On the flip with "Siesta," from the MGM flicker "The

Kissing Bandit," Jack and the boys serve up some mellow novelty wax that appears to be headed for a spot on the juke boxes. Local offering by Charles Martin is attractive as he purrs the cute lyric in South-Of-The-Border tongue. Song should receive some wide publicity via the motion picture attachment. Ops take note of this one.

• Wax story on this pair should read "Shake well before using." Music styled to meet the needs of music operators with those Latin rhumba locations is this duo done up by Pepito Torres. Top side, "Jingle Bells Calypso" makes for cute listening and dancing pleasure. Tempo here is quite attractive and should rate heavily with the hip-swivelers. On the flip with a bolero, the gang come back with another piece ops can use effectively. Both sides of this platter deserve ops whirling time—and more.

"Brush Those Tears From Your Eyes" (3:05)

BUDDY CLARK (Columbia 38364) ● The popular Buddy Clark, who has had a banner year in disk circles, sets with a pair which should boost his popularity all the more. Currently receiving heavy play in many locations, Buddy offers "Brush Those Tears From Your Eyes" in attractive manner here. Vocal background by The Modernaires flavors the wax immensely. On the flip with a ballad, Buddy bounces back with another comer in "One Sunday Afternoon." Song spills in slow tempo and makes for fair listening pleasure. Wax is tailor made for those light spots.

"I Knew You When" (2:20) "Polka Dots And Moonbeams" (3:14)

CLAUDE THORNHILL ORCH. (Columbia 38347)

The musical styling of maestro Claude Thornhill, coupled with strong ballading of piper Buddy Hughes is shown to excellent advantage on this pair. Song, titled "I Knew You When" is extremely attractive, with Buddy turning in one of his best vocal jobs to date. Ditty has a nice beat to it that makes for repeat listening pleasure. The Thornhill ork display some fine instrumental wares throughout this piece. On the flip with an all instrumental bit, the maestro grabs the spotlight as he tickles the ivorys on "Polka Dots And Moonbeams." Ditty is one that should be remembered well by music ops since it scored not too long ago. This rendition rates with the best. Top deck for the asking.

Following on the heels of his smash success with "On A Slow Boat To China," maestro Kay Kyser offers ops a pair that appear to be loaded with the stuff that makes for coin winners. Topside with "Say It Isn't So," shows as a really novel, unique hunk of music. Beat is toned down, with the Campus Kids piping the vocal spot in hush-hush fashion. Novel arrangement makes you listen — but attentively so. Coupled with another cute one in "Ever Since Eve," this biscuit really shines. The maestro takes vocal honors on this side as he chants the cute lyrics a la Phil Harris. Wordage weaves around the title and makes for easy listening. Ops take note of this cookie.

Meanwhile, the bulk of the nation's diskers, still maintaining an air of confidence as to the approval of the plan, eagerly awaited the "Green Light" to start recording.

Altho most diskers are set and prepared for the usually busy Xmas season, it was learned that several of the son, it was learned that several of the majors, in particular, have fresh holiday songs they wish to cut immediately. Most of the stock for the holiday season, already in the hands of dealers and distributors, is moving fairly lively, with several disk industry reps predicting a top sales season.


Plans of the agreement, entered into between the American Federation of Musicians, and the phonograph re-

Strong Possibility of Guy Lombardo Entering Disk **Biz With Musicraft Remains**

NEW YORK-Musicraft Records, in dire financial straits in recent months, appeared to have bolstered their position this past week, as the plattery worked out several pressing plant and distribution deals.

Musicraft, it was learned has entered into new working agreements with their distributors. It was reported that the new arrangements virtually makes the distributor pay for his recordings upon receipt or on a sight-draft basis. A lease-master deal is known to have been in the works with one of Musicraft's distributors. The distrib, who also would have access to pressing facilities, would merely lease masters from Musicraft and pay the plattery a royalty on every recording sold. The distributor would guarantee the firm a substantial amount of sales too, it was learned. Whether this plan has been put into operation has not been displayed.

The Musicraft diskery, who haven't produced a biscuit in some time now, was back in the swing of the business again this week. Pressing plant agreements were made with four firms; three on the East Coast and one on the West Coast.

Meanwhile rumors concerning the reported entrance of Decca Records artist Guy Lombardo into the Musicraft picture continue. The latter appears to be fairly certain the ork-

ster will join them, and if so, with substantial financial backing. bardo's pact with the Decca plattery runs out this month, and altho he has not committed himself with regard to Musicraft, it is known that the orkster is planning a conference with Decca prexy Jack Kapp in this matter. Lombardo is one of the Decca firm's top wax selling artists throughout the

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



In the Best Record category, "My Happiness," recorded by Jon & Sondra Steele on Damon Records, has taken a tremendous leap to take over first place by a narrow margin. Running a close second, with only a difference of a hundred votes is "Manana" by Peggy Lee, recorded on Capitol Records. "Ballerina," "Four Leaf Clover" and "Nature Boy" remain hot contenders and are only a few thousand votes off the pace of "My Happiness."

Orkster Vaughn Monroe has taken a commanding lead in the Best Orchestra division, running ahead of Art Mooney and Tex Beneke.

In the Best Female Vocalist spot, the race remains tight between Peggy Lee, Margaret Whiting, Doris Day and Sarah Vaughan, in that respective order.



Hirsh De La Viez Again Named President

START DRIVE FOR FULL MEMBERSHIP. DUES TO BE \$1 PER YEAR

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A group of well known coinmen met at the Statler Hotel here this past week and reorganized the Coin Machine Operators of America, Inc., for the purpose of making this the national body of coin machine operators of every type of equipment.

Hirsh De La Viez was again named President of the group. He made a very inspired speech wherein he urged that all the coin machine operators in the country get together into a national organization for their better welfare.




