



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Gradually the nation's operators are beginning to realize the predictions which have been made here these past months. All indications point to one of the biggest play booms in the history of this industry.

The big play boom that is getting under way also poses a great problem for the average operator in maintaining and preserving his equipment.


It will pay every operator to think about, study and test 10c play. There is no doubt that there will be just as many 10c players, eventually, as there are now 5c players.

Even if the 10c players are somewhat less in number than the 5c players were, the operator is still better off. Not only will he earn more, but, he will preserve his equipment for so much longer a period of time.

Many other problems may also come about. A dozen and one things that came into being during World War II. But, there is no doubt, that the operators are sure to overcome one and all of the problems as they arise.

Therefore, the operator must prepare himself immediately, if he hasn't already done so, to enjoy one of the greatest play booms this industry has ever had.

Only by being completely prepared with equipment, parts and supplies, good mechanics and servicemen, can he really enjoy the boom, and profit therefrom.

• A grand oldie is taken to town on the top half by Dick Brown. Turning in his usual sock vocal, Dick has Hal Kanner and his orchestra to back him up on this sentimental piece. Lower half mixes religious overtones with romance and finds Dick doing another good job. This should get a play.

"GREEK BOLERO" (2:56) "CO-CO-COCONUT" (3:05) XAVIER CUGAT ORCH. (Columbio 39256)

• A very melodic bolero makes up the Xavier Cugat offering on the top deck. Cugat and his band make this item sound quite exciting. On the second side, Abbe Lane goes into a rhumba, singing out the lyrics in pleasant fashion. Ops whose customers are Cugat fans won't want to miss it.

"ZOOMA, ZOOMA BACALLA" (2:50) "GOOD-BOOGDI-GOOGI" (2:56) LOUIS PRIMA ORCH. (Robin Hood 106)

• Louis Prima and Keely Smith join up to go through an old Italian number. They make it the familiar melody good to hear again while the band comes in for some loud licks. The lower half finds Louis going it alone in his well known style. The top deck could kick off.

"RAMONA" (2:54) "STRINGBEAN" (2:37)

TEDDY PHILLIPS ORCH. (London 976)

• Teddy Phillips and his orchestra have two instrumentals to toss around here and they certainly make them worth listening to. Teddy comes up with a sax solo on each end which sound very smooth. With the boys in the band backing him up, there's some fine music to hear on this disk.

• Vera Lynn, the English thrush, shows off her grand voice with two ballads here. Both are slow items on which she gets a good assist from Bob Farnon's orchestra and a wonderful chorus. Each end shows a fine production an dops oughta hear it for themselves.

• A singer with a lot of promise, Al Martino, shows up on this platter and makes with some good music. The top deck is a rhythmic item on which Hal Kanner's orchestra helps out while the bottom side is a ballad which also is good to hear. Ops should take a listen to this boy.

(RCA Victor 20-4101; 47-4101)

• Two big orchestrations are turned out here by Henri Rene and the orchestra. The upper level is a lovely melody which the orchestra brings out in grand fashion. The bottom side gets a vocal from April Stevens which makes it a winning number too. Ops oughta listen in.

"JALOUSIE" (2:44) "ESTRALLITA" (3:04) KORLA PANDIT (Vita 204)

• Korla Pandit plays two standards on the organ here and makes them both sound very inviting. On each side he shows some fine musicianship and a type of playing which should gain him many fans. Ops who have the proper spots, i.e. the quiet ones, will want to go along with this.

"PRETTY LITTLE BELLS" (2:19) "ARE YOU SINCERE?" (2:50) BENNY STRONG (Copitol 1462; F-1462)

• A cute novelty is given some good treatment by Benny Strong and the orchestra. Benny does the vocal on this number and imparts a happy feeling to it. The second side is a slow ballad on which the band and the chorus come along. This one will do fine as a filler item.

INCREASE IN COLLECTIONS SEEN Spring And Summer Seasons Minnesota Juke Box Tax Bill **Tabled Due To Efforts Of One Man Viewed With Great Optimism**

NEW YORK-Reports coming in | from all over the country indicate that coinmen are looking toward the spring and summer seasons with great optimism.

For many years, the trend has been that fall and winter months brought the biggest collections for the operator, and the largest number of sales for the wholesaler. However, it is quite clear that these conditions have changed, and that better business has switched to the months which bring warm weather and sunshine.

In addition to those resort and seashore locations that are available during spring and summer, which assist numerous operators to enlarge their operations during that period, the feeling today is that good weather brings out more people from their homes to places of entertainment. This condition has come about during the past few years, and it is claimed that television has a lot to do with changing the habits of the country's individuals. Should bad weather prevail, or even somewhat unfavorable weather, it is claimed that rather than leave their comfortable homes, people listen to TV.

Coinmen feel that many people have become satiated with television in their homes, and desire to get out of the house. However, they would prefer pleasant weather for their jaunts. One operator stated "I found that my business during the spring and summer months of last year was the best I ever enjoyed, creating a top collection record of the years spent in the coin machine business. Then during the late fall and winter months, business took quite a drop. I am now cleaning up my equipment on location, and buying additional pieces, as well as seeking more spots, as I anticipate business will once more jump to what 1 enjoyed during the warm weather months of 1950."

Many coinmen in some of our midwestern states suffered from unusually bad snow storms this past winter, and they, more than any others, state that they're looking forward to warmer weather to bring bigger collections.

In addition to individual location owned spots headed for better business, Arcade Owners anticipate a banner year. Wholesalers have been busy for many months supplying equipment to arcade men preparing for the coming season. Ordinarily buying didn't get going until this month, but arcade owners have been getting ready since the 1st of the year. The influx of men to army camps has made arcades in close proximity very valuable once again. Many new arcades have also been planned to open near camps.

Another reason why coinmen can anticipate increased business is at-

tributed to the many additional people now employed. Government leaders predict that employment in June, 1951, will set an all-time high, with probably 68,000,000 persons drawing down pay envelopes. These people are expected to patronize their local "work-men's clubs" (taverns, restaurants, etc.) where coin operated equipment is available. The economical nature of these machines gives them the necessary relaxation they seek.

Bulking all reports received at this office, both verbal and written, makes it easy for your editor to predict the next several months will see a boom both for the operator and wholesaler.

Wash. State Governor **Vetoes Pin License Bill**

TACOMA, WASH.-Governor Langlie vetoed (March 20) a bill passed by the Washington State Legislature which would have permitted city or county governments to boost their revenues by licensing pinball machines.

City and county governments in the state lost their revenue from such devices early last year when the State Supreme Court ruled that pinball machines with payoffs were gambling devices. Many operators of the machines subsequently said they converted them into purely amusement devices. As a result the State Tax Commission reduced the tax levy from 20 per cent

of gross income to only ½ per cent. When the measure vetoed by the governor was before the State Legislature, an assistant state attorney general interpreted the bill to mean that pinball machines of all types could be licensed by the city or county governments, including the type banned by the State Supreme Court as gambling devices.





"We don't see why," these men state, "there is any need to 'code' the price lists which are officially accepted everywhere. Without any 'code,' it is much easier for all in this industry to more quickly read the prices, especially during long distance phone call transactions."

There is the crux of the entire problem. *The Cash Box* is in business by the grace of its subscribers. It has always, and will always, continue to bow to their wishes.

Much debating regarding "new" products. Seems that all are of the belief that the time has, at long last, arrived when this industry requires entirely new products to restimulate play all over the country. In this regard, these men point out, this industry needs an entirely, new and different amusement game. They say that something like what happened when the very first pin games were introduced, back in 1930 and 1931, would now be just what the industry could use to awaken it all over again. Of course, all realize that the factories now engaged in the manufacture of amusement products for the industry, aren't the tiny assembly plants of yesteryear. Today, some of these large manufactories, could turn out as many as a thousand games per day (of the old type) if they worked three shifts and could get the materials for their production lines fast enough. Another big factor which would hold back the boom over any new product would be the present defense emergency. Whether this emergency will develop into an all out full scale war or a continuous series of warlike actions (as in Korea) isn't known even to the experts.
