<u>Greater Selectivity Brings:</u> BOOM IN FOREIGN RECORDINGS

Juke Box Ops Call for Foreign 45's as They Enjoy Extra Income Boom Programming Disks to Please Locations' Foreign Patrons.

Spreading out rather quietly, everywhere in the country, is the constantly growing use of foreign recordings.

of foreign recordings. This was brought about by the tremendously increased selectivity of the new juke boxes.

It is no longer surprising to find juke boxes with complete panels of foreign disks for the people who frequent the locations.

What is holding back even greater development of this market is the lack of 45 rpm recordings.

Many of the new juke boxes feature 45's and, because it is difficult to obtain the foreign recordings they need on 45 rpm, they have been forced to hold back the greater growth of this market.

Even back in the days of 10, 12, 20, and 24 selections, juke box ops featured foreign recordings in certain locations.

But, the tremendous majority of the automatic phonos, veered sharply away from such disks. Simply because they needed the selection space for the many pops, hillbillies, folk, rhythm and blues, and other tunes.

Today, with correct programming a very important factor, and with the further fact that the automatic phonos range from 80 to 120 selections, there is an entirely different approach to placement of recordings so as to obtain maximum intake from locations.

It was but a natural evolution, that the juke box ops would soon look about their locations, and where they found a spot frequented by Polish, Italian, Jewish, Mexican, Spanish, and other nationalities, that they would program disks in the languages of these peoples.

Results have been phenomenal in some cases. One operator reports that he programmed a series of title strips in one panel under "Polish Records" with the result that he not only enjoyed a very good increase in income from the spot, but has since been forced to double the size of the panel.

There hasn't been too much fanfare made about the foreign disks, even tho *The Cash Box* sometime ago urged the manufacturers of foreign recordings to press them in 45 rpm. Yet the foreign disk field has continued to grow. It is now reaching what can be termed boom proportions.

termed boom proportions. Operators have suddenly come to the realization that, in view of the fact they have all the space they require because of the greater selectivity of the modern phonos, they can easily feature complete panels of foreign tunes, without sacrificing their pop disks or other disk space.

They also know that they are missing a very good bet if they don't quickly take advantage of this fact in many of their spots where a definite foreign element is part and parcel of the steady patronage. From the farm workers' country came

From the farm workers' country came word this past week that operators have found it paid them to feature certain foreign disks which met with great approval of the patrons of these type of locations.

As far as the cosmopolitan spots are concerned, in every large city in the nation, foreign disks were used for years and years, in fact from the very beginning of automatic music.

But today this has continued to grow and, as each day passes, more and more music operators, are calling on dealers to obtain foreign disks of one type or another.

The boom is under way.

The only obstacle, according to juke box ops, is that they cannot obtain a goodly supply of the foreign disks in 45 rpm.

They would definitely, they claim, be able to improve intake on many of their locations were such 45's available.

Perhaps all this can be summed up in the statement of one well known music operator who wrote *The Cash Box*:

"Please go all out to get the people who have these fine foreign record catalogs to press their disks on 45 rpm. We need them.

"We've been getting more and more calls for foreign recordings ever since we started to program them.

"What's more," he says, "our take has gone 'way up.

"We believe," he concludes, "that here's part of the programming answer for operators everywhere—foreign disks."

Music Ops Continue To Call For More Uniform Records

Want Disks to Have Quicker Starts, Uniform Tone Level and Two Minute Play or Thereabouts Where Possible

Automatic music operators everywhere in the nation continue to sound the clarion call for more uniform recordings.

This has been continuing now for almost ten years. Ever since *The Cash Box* first brought home the three great necessities of music operators, as far as records are concerned.

First, as all operators agree, there must be uniformity on the start of the records. And, furthermore, they want the start to be cut down considerably from the time now being used.

Many disks have half inch wide bands of absolutely nothing pressed into them. This just causes patrons to kick at phonos thinking that "the machine's stuck."

This has been brought home time and time again by *The Cash Box* and the nation's music operators have strongly supported this need.

Second, is the continued bugaboo of recordings being made at different tone levels, requiring storekeepers to dash over to their volume controls and cut down on the scream of one record whereas, the very next one chosen, requires the location owner to again dash over and raise the volume.

This has been going on for years now. Everytime that this is published the recording manufacturers continue to neglect this need.

Some of the phono manufacturers have attempted to arrange for volume control themselves to hold all records at one tonal level within the phono itself.

Third, and most important, is the need for 2 minute disks. This means 50% more income for the music operator during the peak play hours. After *The Cash Box* crusaded for many, many months, most of the record manufacturers began to pay attention to the "time element" of recordings.

The Cash Box went even further in this regard. It published the time of play of each recording it reviewed so that the operators could decide for themselves in this regard.

Now the manufacturers seem to again have become lax and the time is running well over three minutes and almost four minutes on some of the latest disks to be released.

The three things asked by the music operators of the record manufacturers are all extremely simple to arrange:

1) Faster starting recordings; 2) Uniform tonal volume for the records of all recording manufacturers; and 3) Two minute play records wherever and whenever possible.



B "I DON'T CARE" (2:51) Dolores Gray comes up with a fine vocal job on a cute handclapping number as the Sweetland Singers back the artist vocally on this western sounding bouncer.

B. "TWO OTHER PEOPLE" (2:55) Ray Arthur and his orchestra back again and come up with a lush aire to which Dolores does some more grand caroling on a pretty ballad of love and tenderness. The group adds warmth to the fine waxing. Could be a big song.

RAY CURA (Mercury 70021; 45-70021)

⁽¹⁾ "YOURS" (2:50) A number currently making its move for top honors is smoothly covered by the persuasive voice of Ray Cura as the Jack Halloran Singers back with a fullness on the ballad.

"HOW AM I TO KNOW" (2:55) G "HOW AM I TO KNOW" (2:55) Strings provide a lush aire for Ray and create a backing that show-cases the artist's voice to full advan-tage as he warbles a ballad. The deliv-ery is much better than the tune.

B "TWO OTHER PEOPLE" (2:35) Denny shows his versatility by coming through with another fine job on a lovely ballad. The tune has a per-fect blend of lyrics and melody.

ART & DOTTY TODD (RCA Victor 20-5029; 47-5029)

B "HEAVENLY HEAVENLY" (3:15) The voices of Art & Dotty Todd multiply to the number of six as they present a lovely waltz based on the melody "Viva La Compagne" with the sound of a choir. The multiple voice waxing demonstrates some lovely harmony. lovely harmony.

B "BROKEN WINGS" (2:52) The same six voice sound is created by the duet as the artists come through with another polished job on a ballad. The pretty sound has a sincerity about it

MINDY CARSON

(Columbia 39889; 4-39889)

Her pert inviting voice does won-ders with a cute ditty labeled "Bar-rels 'n Barrels Of Roses" and the result is absolutely grand. The tune is a catchy one, the lyrics light and appealing, and Mindy's pres-entation tops everything. The cute bounce tempo comes forth from the consational orthestra of Percy bounce tempo comes forth from the sensational orchestra of Percy Faith. The side is different than the usual run of the mill numbers and is a number that is always wel-comed. "All The Time And Every-where" is the name of the other half that features the chirp on a soft and romantic ballad. She does a fine job here but the upper side is much more exciting. Ops oughta get on the top segment. It's gonna draw barrels 'n barrels of coins in the boxes. the boxes.

FRED LOWERY (Columbia 39887; 4-39887)

• DANCING TAMBOURINE" (2:06) Fred Lowery comes up with a fine bit of whistling on a cute bouncer full of zest as the Norman Luboff chorus backs with a soft smooth hum.

B "SWEET LEILANI" (2:28) The tempo is changed as Fred delivers a lovely sweet Hawaiian melody with his penetrating whistle. The soft chorus and the steel guitar create a romantic and picturesque aire.

JANE TURZY (Decca 28436; 9-28436)

G "BE MY BABY" (2:39) Chirp to a cute bouncer with pleasing lyrics and a light aire about it. Handelap-ping and Remo Bondi's ork back the songstress.

G"AIN'T IT A CRYIN' SHAME" (2:26) The pert voiced thrush does a similar type of number with the same handelapping and lightness about it. The tune is not very much.

HERBIE FIELDS ORCHESTRA (Coral 60867; 9-60867)

B "DARDANELLA" (2:49) Herbie Fields and his boys take a grand old melody and give it a fine run for the money. The exciting instrumental is set to a solid jump tempo.

G "EVERYTHING I HAVE IS YOURS" (2:47) Another fine in-strumental arrangement is dished up by Herbie and the lads with the leader taking the alto sax and belting out some slick tooting.

ALAN PAUL (Rialto 601)

• "LOVE OH LOVE" (2:49) Set into a powerful orking is an inter-esting vocal as done by Alan Paul in his low voiced manner while Buddy Koster supplies the waltz tempo.

"BRAVO" (2:50) The tempo is changed to that of a beguine-bo-lero which exhibits Alan's voice to much better advantage. The senti-mental number sung in fine style is introduced by a crowd's cheering of bravo. A fine piece of wax.

JIMMY PALMER ORCHESTRA (Mercury 70013; 45-70013)

• "YEARNING" (2:30) A steady drum beat with a good bounce tempo is the pace for a grand old fa-vorite that's beat out by the Jimmy Palmer ork with the aid of a group handling the jumpy vocal chores.

• "SECRETS" (2:46) Ronnie Neu-bert does the chanting on a slow and pleasing ballad with a soft choral support to add feeling to the deck. Jimmy Palmer and his boys provide the music once again.

HERB KENNY (MGM 11360; K-11360)

G "I DON'T CARE" (2:46) Herb Kenny's fine soft voice blends smoothly with the harmony offered by the Rockets and the pretty backing of Fred Norman's ork, to come up with a pleasant side pleasant side.

G "CALLING" YOU" (2:43) Herb and the crew team on another slow number with romantic lyrics. An echo follows Herb's voice through the number and some low voiced talking adds color to the deck.

SAVANNAH CHURCHILL (RCA Victor 20-5031; 47-5031)

• "IF I DIDN'T LOVE YOU SO" (2:30) In her low and sexy voice, Savannah Churchill eases through a fine blues number with a great deal of oomph as a chorus hums in the backdrop.

B "WALKIN' BY THE RIVER" (3:15) The vigorous voiced thrush follows through with another grand piece of stylish vocalizing that shows her talent to better advantage. The subdued choral backing makes the artist's voice glow.



MINDY CARSON

• Mindy Carson comes back into the spotlight with a tune that should bring her quite a few rungs higher up the ladder of success.

FRANK CAMPANA (Jubilee 6023; 45-6023)

B "TENDERLY" (2:29) One of the public's favorite standards is warmly delivered by Frank Campana in his pleasing and inviting style as the pretty ballad is lushly backed by Dick Freitas and his men.

B "I WISH I'D KNOWN" (2:44) A fresh and interesting type of in-troduction leads into a full and stringy waltz with a fine tune that is vocalized on by Frank in a most feelingful man-ner ner.

PAT TERRY (Derby 813)

B "APRIL FOOL" (3:02) A soft chime effect in the backdrop adds color to Pat Terry's soft quality wax-ing of a sentimental number as he's smoothly backed by the Sid Feller ork. "DID I REMEMBER" (2:45) Pat



MITCH MILLER AND PERCY FAITH

NEW YORK—Every Monday after-noon is publishers' day at Columbia. That's the day when any publisher can come up to Mitch Miller's office, get in to see him, play his latest songs and get a yes, no or maybe. Mitch established this system for many reasons. One was in order that no one in the business could say that he was unavailable, that he couldn't be seen. Another was to acquaint him-self with the changing music business

self with the changing music business personnel. And the third and most important reason, was that he might be able to come up with hit material from these sessions.

Mitch is very quick to admit that Mitch is very quick to admit that he has never gotten an A-1 real smash hit this way. He's recorded a number of tunes which came to him cold on a Monday afternoon. He's had high hopes for some of them, but in the last analysis, there have been no smashes.

The session starts at about noon. By that time, there are several pub-lishers waiting in the lobby. In the audition room are Mitch, Percy Faith and Joe Higgins. Sometimes one or two other people are present.

The publishers start coming in one by one. Some are well known. Some aren't known at all. Occasionally there is an amateur song writer who has heard that anyone can get in on Monday afternoon. And he gets a hearing also. Some publishers have one song. Some a case full. All are heard.

For the most part, Mitch's answer is "No". It may be said in many different ways, but it's still "No". Most of the time it's an outright "No, I can't use it". Or he may say, it's just the thing for an artist somewhere else. Or he may like to have some changes made in the lyric or the melody. Or the tune may be a steal or sound familiar. There are millions of reasons why a song can't be accepted. Throughout the session, possibly


two or three songs are kept. Sometimes Mitch knows just the artist he wants it for. Sometimes he wants to see whether he can fit it to someone. Some-times he just wants to think about it some more it some more.

Before the afternoon is over, there are several interruptions. Lunch is ordered. Later an afternoon snack. There's an occasional visitor without a song. And there are many laughs.

a song. And there are many laughs. The laughs come from various sources. Sometimes the lyrics to a song are hilarious—hilariously bad. Sometimes the demonstration causes a smile. Sometimes a publisher's ap-proach is the funny point. And always there are stories.

Almost every incident reminds someone in the room of another oc-casion. One of the funny stories on this particular day was told by Percy Faith. After someone had demon-strated a tune on the piano, he said it reminded him of the time an un-known publisher had come into the audition room without any one to play audition room without any one to play his song. He was told that usually publishers brought along their own demonstrators but it just so happened that there was someone present who could play the song. But he wasn't satisfied with the piano player. He felt he couldn't play well enough and complained bitterly all during the rendition. When he left the room, he told the other publishers waiting in the lobby that he thought a company as large as Columbia should have a competent piano player to demonstrate a song. It was then that he was informed that his demonstrator had been Percy Faith.

The auditioning lasts most of the afternoon and around five o'clock it comes to an end. By then all the songs have been heard, all the pleas made, all the stories told. Everyone's exhausted and it's time to call it a dayuntil next week.

"BMI Growth And Development Can Be Summed Up by One Word — Flexibility" Says Burton

NEW YORK-The operation of BMI can be summed up in one word, according to Bob Burton, who is probably most responsible for that organization's present set-up. That word is flexibility.

In late 1940 and early 1941 when BMI first came into being, the only publishers associated with it were E. B. Marks, Peer and a few smaller firms. Peer specialized in hillbilly music and Marks had a standard catalogue. The great need of BMI therefore was pop music.

This was a tremendous problem because ASCAP had just signed all its member firms to long term contracts and so the possibility of acquiring established publishing firms and writers was very remote.

It was Bob Burton's theory that the only people available were those just below the ownership level in the existing firms, i.e., the song pluggers, the general professional managers, etc., men with the necessary experience to conduct a music publishing business but who, for one reason or another had never gone out on their own. And most of the time that reason had been lack of money.

Burton theorized that one way of attracting capable, fresh, young talent to the business was to offer to set these people up in their own firms.

But the problems were many. First of all, none of these new firms would have catalogues which would provide them with income and second of all they had little or no capital of their own on which they could operate. Because of the necessity of keeping its new firms alive, BMI inaugurated the policy of advances or guarantees based on an estimate of the person himself, the position he held in the music business, and the possibilities for his future.

That policy proved highly successful in that it helped establish firms which have lasted for more than ten years now, such firms as Regent, Porgie, Embassy, Vanguard, Republic and others.

After this initial stage of creating new publishing firms, what might be termed the second stage set in. As the first firms became better established, it was possible for BMI to search harder for its new people and to exercise more choice in those accepted. And so the standards used then were determined by three factors:

- 1) Who a man was.
- 2) What he proposed to do.

3) Whether he would be exclusive or non-exclusive BMI.

Now in what is possibly the third stage, BMI has created a new Tin Pan Alley-which is a frank recognition on the part of music publishing firm owners that having a BMI or an AS-CAP firm is not very different, and that certainly one does not denote any more quality than another.

There are many reasons for the rise of BMI but they probably all revolve around its logging system. BMI from the start decided that it would pay off on radio plugs. It pays 4c per plug per local station and 6c per plug per network station. And it logs every station, not just a few, not just networks-but all stations.

This system of paying off for radio plugs and logging all stations brought about a revolution in the music business. Frst of all, the value of a live plug changed and suddenly became much less. The value of a record increased because only one record was capable of deriving performance income all over the country at the same time. And thirdly, entire fields of music such as hillbilly and rhythm and blues, which formerly brought no performance money at all, suddenly began paying off.

Intrinsically involved in the growth and strengthening of BMI was the rise in the number of radio stations from about 600 when it started to about 2700 today. This naturally meant a much greater source of income. And concurrent with this growth was the establishment of the disk jockey as a force in the music business. This was a further outlet for records. And under the BMI system, records became the basis of all income.

Now an entirely new field was opened up to the American public. Hillbilly and rhythm and blues music, which formerly had been limited to specific publishers, took on new importance so that established firms began to work on them, expose them to the public, and make them hits.

Throughout this entire development of BMI, it was flexibility of operation which helped the organization survive and grow. Bob Burton claims that it was the key factor in BMI's ability to attract new people. For he could revise conditions to meet individual needs and so get people into the organization who otherwise would not be interested.

Today, it is Burton's contention, that BMI publishers are the smart, young people in the business as opposed to the vested interests. It is also his contention, that with very few exceptions, there is no smart young publisher, who does not have a BMI firm (even if he also has an ASCAP firm) or who at the very least is not now negotiating with BMI.

Mercury Starts New Promotion Plan

CHICAGO-Mercury Records has just instituted a new public relations plan using newly appointed men in key cities. The entire program is being set up and supervised by Arnold Silverman.

The promotion men will aid the distributor in his relations with coin machine operators, one-stops, dealers and jockies-and they will act strictly as promotion men, not as salesmen. It will be their job to see that the foregoing groups are promptly advised of the newest Mercury releases and aid them in every possible way with promotional material.

It is Mercury's contention that with the record business as competitive as it is today, it is impossible for salesmen to take sufficient time from their selling to engage in this type of activity. Therefore the diskery has taken this step which it believes will benefit not only its own firm, but the record business in general.

The plan is being started on a small scale with the intention of expanding it throughout Mercury's entire dis-tributorship. At present public rela-tions men have been appointed in Boston, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Detroit with other key cities scheduled shortly shortly.

CHICAGO—Music operators thru-out this area, led by Robert E. Gnarro of A.B.C. Music Service Corp., are complaining that the independent record manufacturers are causing them to lose locations, forcing them to pull machines from good spots, and gen-erally creating one headache after an-other for the operators because the indies are not pressing 45rpm disks as they should be doing.

Gnarro, and the operators who are associated with him in this complaint, claim that the average major record manufacturer is about 80% up to par as far as 45s are concerned.

"But," Gnarro states, "that doesn't mean any loss to us. The average major record manufacturer has been supplying us with 45rpm records at about an 80% clip.

about an 80% clip. "We do have some trouble with Co-lumbia which we rate at about 70%. With Capitol Records we have the problem of clearing out the center, which isn't a very easy job, consider-ing that we buy in lots of 50 or 60 records at a time.

records at a time. "But, regardless of this, Capitol at least supplies us with what we need, as far as 45rpm disks are concerned. "Our big problem everywhere here in town is to get the indies, especially those who suddenly develop a hit rec-ord, to press 45s. Here we have our hands full."

Gnarro and the others associated with him in A. B. C. Music Service Corp. stated this past week:

"Unless we can get better coopera-tion from the independent record manufacturers we are going to cut them out entirely.

"We are prepared to send letters to all of our locations advising them that we shall discontinue to feature any indie labels because of the fact that they cannot and will not, in most instances, press 45rpm records.

"We just won't sit back and wait three to four weeks to get a record, and find that after that period of time, the record is absolutely dead as far as the public is concerned.

"Why should we lose spots if these indies won't cooperate with us?"

Bill Hill Named Manager Of Buffalo Record Biz

BUFFALO, N. Y. — Bill Hill, former regional manager of Capitol Records, has just been appointed manager of the record division of Bernie Simon's Music House in this city.

The firm runs five retail shops in the area plus a one-stop service and Hill will be in charge of all personnel dealing with records, buying, etc.

Next week Bernie Simon will hold a luncheon meeting of all distribs in Buffalo to introduce Hill.

Como's "One Little Candle" Adopted As Xmas Seal Tune

NEW YORK—The three thousand tuberculosis associations throughout the nation have adopted as their Christmas Seal Sale campaign song for 1952 "One Little Candle" recorded by Perry Como for RCA Victor and published by Leeds.

Choice was based on the design of this year's Christmas Seal, a little candle in an old fashioned candlestick, plus Perry's pleasing way with the tune. As a special stint for radio, Perry cut a voice track on behalf of Christmas Seals which is dubbed into the original recording as a spoken introduction. The record, together with tie-in copy, is being shipped to disk jockeys on a national basis as a public service announcement with high entertainment appeal.

RCA Victor has distributed 15,000 fliers to record dealers across the country as window and counter dis-plays. Juke box operators have been contacted to program the song, and a similar approach has been made to the chain stores.

As an added impetus, the 3,000 tuberculosis associations are request-ing their local radio stations and disk jockeys to spin "One Little Candle" for Christmas Seals.

"Sugarbush" Halts Work

LONDON-The British Broadcasting Corporation has ordered disk jockeys on its "Music While You Work" program for factory workers to stop playing the top-hit tune—Co-lumbia Records' "Sugarbush" by Frankie Laine and Doris Day.

Said the BBC: "Sugarbush" feasaid the BBC: "Sugarousn' lea-tures intricate handclapping as a part of its rhythm and some machine-shop workers reportedly have been hitting machinery with their tools in time with the handclaps."

"There have been some disastrous results," admitted the BBC ruefully.



Rolf Ericson, Swedish trumpet star who spent three years over here with Woody Herman, Elliot Lawrence and other top bands and was due to return here this week as an immigrant, will be heard leading his own group featuring Reinhold Svensson, blind Swedish pianist; Arne Domnerus, alto sax, and others who have acquired some following here as part of the Swedish jazz cult.



ue Sales Spurt that Started Last Summer. Biggest Post-War Backlog on Hand at Mfrs and Distribs. Phonos Hold No. 1 Sales Spot. Vendors Second. New Kiddie Rides Hot. No End to Sales Boom in Sight, Leaders Claim.

TRADE CALLS FOR NIFORM TRUCK AND FREIGHT RATES

Ops, Jobbers, Distribs Ask For Leadership In Concerted Drive To Get Uniform Rates For All "Coin Operated Equipment"

CHICAGO — Gil Kitt of Empire Coin Machine Exchange, this city, is to be credited with sounding the clar-ion call for all the trade to get back

of a concerted effort to obtain uniform truck and freight rates for "coin op-erated equipment". This story appeared some weeks ago in *The, Cash Box* and stirred up tremendous approval thruout the trade. trade.

tremendous approval thruout the trade. Many stated that the wide diver-gences as reported by Gil Kitt regard-ing truck rates on equipment were nothing new to them. Others claimed that they were pay-ing even wider and greater differences on shipments, "all depending on how the shipper labels the machines". Kitt stated that his firm was ar-guing why they should pay as little as \$2.95 per 100 lbs. on certain equip-ment labeled one way, and then be asked to pay as high as \$6.50 per 100 lbs. on practically the same equipment, because it was labeled another way. A concensus among operators, job-bers and distributors, who have al-ready called attention to these glaring differences of charges from truck and freight lines, is that leadership is needed to bring about a concerted ef-fort to drive for a complete change of rates. Operators are most interested for

of rates. Operators are most interested for, as they state, they are the ones who will wind up paying the charges, and they believe that these must be low-ered.

Jobbers and distributors are just as anxious to bring about a uniform truck and freight rate for they, too, are forced to suffer because of the wide differences in present charges.

For example, as one distributor pointed out, a shipment labeled: 'games', came to him from one trucking firm at \$6.50 per 100 pounds.

That very same type of machine, he reports, labeled 'coin operated equipment', was then sent to him and received by him at \$2.95 per 100 lbs.

In short, there must be some method adopted by the truck and freight lines to get shipments properly labeled so that the industry will pay the lowest possible minimum.

What is more, as one distrib out west said, present rates are com-pletely out of line for coin operated equipment, and should be adjusted downward.

One of the most enthusiastic boosters for a concerted program to bring about more uniform truck and freight rates is Lyn Brown of Los Angeles.

In fact, almost everyone of the California jobbers and distributors are planning to get behind this move. They pay a state tax on shipping.

CHICAGO-Most fascinating is the continuing sales boom that is prevalent in every division of the industry. "And", according to leaders here, "there's no end in sight."

To make doubly sure of this fact The Cash Box phoned twenty of the nation's leading distributors at twenty widely separated areas via long dis-tance telephone to hear directly from them as to just how they figured sales at this time.

Without a single dissent, everyone of these leading distributors stated that they were backlogged with or-ders on new equipment.

It was learned that the majority were far behind on phonograph deliveries and were falling further be-hind each day.

Next in line, according to the dis-tributors, came all types of vending machines. The greater majority were behind in orders on drink dispensers and other of the larger units.

The smaller vendors were meeting orders, according to most of the dis-tribs who handle these.

All games were grouped into one class with orders far behind for the new hit pins and shuffles as well as other types amusement games.

Kiddie rides are hot, according to the distributors. The demand for the space ships is so great at this time that few believe they will ever get what they need to take care of im-mediate demand. Interesting in this regard is the fact that many of the distribs are waiting for leading manufacturers introduce space ships and even other kiddie rides.

They believe that these have opened tremendous new field which ranges from leading department stores down to small supermarkets.

The manufacturers, most of whom are centered in this area, all report being behind in deliveries. And this regardless of what they are manufac-turing at this time.

It is believed, after these long dis-tance phone calls and close contact with the manufacturers, that the backlog will continue on for some many months yet to come, unless materials sufficiently loosen up and war production space is cut down before any let-up can be noted.

The big demand for the new phonos is absolutely unprecedented. They take a very great lead into first place.

Distributors for all the leading manufacturers of phonos report that they can use many, many times what they are now receiving.

They have been on long distance phones with their factories constantly in an effort to get more phonos shipped to them.

This tremendous sales spurt continues since the Summer of '52.

Employment At Record Peak And Still Expanding

WASHINGTON, D. C.—U. S. De-partment of Labor's Bureau of Em-ployment Security issued a statement this week in which it calls attention to the high mark of employment in the country.

to the high mark of employment in the country. In September, total placements made by State employment services rose to a new post-World War II high of 2.5 million. Unemployment of 35 million workers covered by State un-employment insurance laws have employment insurance laws have dropped to a 7-year low during the week ending October 18. During that time less than 2 per cent of the workers were unemployed and claiming benefits.

benefits. Occupational shortages have in-creased substantially in recent weeks, State employment security agencies reported. There are heavy demands for engineers, chemists, draftsmen, and other professional occupations, and for such skilled occupations as machinists, tool makers, die setters and sinkers, and machine shop occu-pations. pations.

In September, non-farm employ-ment rose by 520,000 to an all-time high for that month, the Bureau re-

AMI Shows Net Income Of \$234,120 For First 9 Months

Creates Record Of Increased Sales Volume and Gross Earnings.



JOHN HADDOCK

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH.—AMI, Incorporated, showed a net income of \$234,120 for the nine months ending Sept. 30, 1952, according to John Haddock, president. He stated this is equivalent to \$1.06 per share on the 220,870 shares of common stock outstanding, after provision for Federal income and excess profits taxes. No comparison with 1951 is available.

The nine-month showing which reflects increased sales volume and record gross earnings also highlights the tax burden, provision for which totaled \$546,380, stated Haddock. This tax is substantially more than double the company's net earnings. Net income before taxes amounted to \$780,500 or \$3.53 per share.

AMI's progress this fiscal year, Haddock declared, can be measured by the fact that net income for both the second and third quarters shows an appreciable increase over first quarter earnings.

A third dividend of 15 cents per share on the 220,870 shares of common stock outstanding was declared at the November 1st meeting of the Board of Directors, payable December 5 to stockholders of record on November 18. Two dividends of 15 cents each were paid previously, the first on May 9 and the second on August 22.

In spite of its increased sales volume, the firm has faced the problem of trying to satisfy the ever present backlog of orders and distributors are constantly pressing for more frequent and larger deliveries.

and larger deliveries. The firm hopes that the erection of its new plant (reported in The Cash Box, Sept. 27 issue), which should be completed by June 1953, will make it possible to satisfy operator demand for its products, and at the same time increase its volume of sales.

A committee was formed to make the arrangements for the next gathering. These men will be headed by Mr. Cardinal of Cardinal Amusement, Montreal. They will arrange for the location, contact all the operating firms in the area, and set up a program.

Solway, as well as Paul Lafontaine, attorney, addressed the operators, pointing out their problems and difficulties, and urged that they form an association.

Leaders of this movement acknowledge that operators here must be educated to the importance and value of forming an association, and agree that it will take time, patience and hard work. "We have been watching the formation of associations in the United States," stated Solway, "and note that a great deal of effort and time is spent before they attain their goals. We expect to work diligently to get an organization together in this territory."

George Miller Leaves For Washington Confer With Officials **O. P. S**. Το

C., left for the capital city on November 4. Before re-turning Miller will make many other stops in behalf of the organization. The main nurnose of this trip is to

The main purpose of this trip is to appear before the Office of Price Sta-bilization in Washington, D. C., to ob-tain decontrol for the music operators of automatic phonographs on a national basis. Tighe Woods of O.P.S. has made it quite clear that decon-trol cannot be extended on a sectional or state-wide basis, but must be ap-plied for patiencelly. plied for nationally

Recently the music operators of the Recently the music operators of the nation were asked to send petitions from all parts of the United States to the Office of Price Stabilization in Washington requesting decontrol for the industry, and the trip that Mr. Mil-ler is making at the present time is a follow-up on these petitions. In a re-cent letter from Tighe Woods to George Miller, Woods stated that the O.P.S. would be glad to discuss the problem with representatives of the industry who could assist O.P.S. in industry who could assist O.P.S. in reaching a decision for the industry on a nation-wide basis.

As reported in the November 8 issue of The Cash Box, George Miller said: "We just can't see how a music machine, located in the dim recesses of a tavern, can in any fashion whatsoever, cause inflation or, in any way, affect war production.

"We do not believe that automatic music instruments were ever intended to be placed under control of O.P.S. because of the above which is the actual reason for the creation of the great Office of Price Stabilization."

Miller says he is very hopeful that this trip will climax the long fight for decontrol that has cost the operators in the State of California as well as other states a lot of money and hard-ship. Hirsh de La Viez, third vice-president of M.O.A., will assist Miller while he is in Washington.

From Washington Miller will go to New York to meet with Al Denver, who is second vice-president of Music Operators of America and Sidney Le-vine, the legal counsellor of M.O.A. He will also hold a conference with John W. Griffin, executive secretary of the Record Industry Association, to discuss future coordination and coop-eration of the two organizations.

From there he will go back to Chiago to confer with members of the Manufacturers Association to discuss congressional legislation thought to be detrimental to the phonograph industry. He will again discuss the possibility of a national public relations program sponsored by all segments of the industry.

Ray Cunliffe, national treasurer, Clinton Pierce, first vice-president, and Les Montooth, national secretary, will join Miller in Chicago to assist in the future activities of M.O.A.

From Chicago he will go to Omaha, Nebraska, to confer with one of the new national directors, Jerry Witt, who is also an officer of the Nebraska Music Operators Association. Miller will meet with as many of his executive officers as possible as all of these men will play a leading role in the future activities of M.O.A.


