by operators for almost every single retailing outlet, was the salesboard.

But the salesboard has gone the way of all such items and, therefore, there now is open to some keen and ingenious mind the possibility of making a million dollars practically overnight.

The answer, of course, lies in the product itself. It must be set up for distribution to every retail outlet. Whether it is to be given away free, or whether it is to be distributed on one basis or another, isn't the point.

The point being brought out here is that there are thousands of coin machine operators everywhere in the nation who can instantly obtain for the correct product (whatever that product is) the most complete distribution and/or coverage of every single type of retail outlet in any community anywhere in the nation, and in all communities all over the nation.

There is no doubt that there will yet come along some ingenious minded individual who will develop and present such a product.

A product which the operator can dispose of, or distribute, to the retail outlets of the nation.

The advertising expense to obtain this distribution factor is very nominal for almost overnight, by completely covering the coin operated machines industry, the advertiser can obtain a complete, national distribution setup to cover all retail industries in all communities all over the country.

The operators are eager, even anxious, to have such a product brought to them. And they hope, brought to them very soon, too.

An investigation of this field might surprise some large mcrchandising organizations as to what speedy overall retailer coverage they could enjoy by distributing thru the coin machine operators of the nation.



The tuba plays an in-teresting nart. teresting part.

• "TUBA SQUARE DANCE" (2:34) [A] Gallico Music] Arki the Arkansas Woodchopper comes up with the lyrics to a happy novelty with a western twang. It's something cute and different and different.

ART MOONEY ORCHESTRA (MGM 11456; K-11456) "BABY DON'T DO IT" (2:30) [Bess Music] The great voice of Cathy Ryan is showcased by a super backing by the ork of Art Mooney as they jump through one of the coun-try's top R&B hits. It's a sensational treatment that should get loads of spins. spins.

• "ALL NIGHT LONG" (2:34) [Valando Music] Cathy sings from right under the heart as she offers another slow jump. Great ar-rangement by Art and smooth backing once again by the Cloverleafs.

BILLY MAY ORCHESTRA (Capitol 2364; F-2364)

B "LITTLE BROWN JUG" (2:25) [Maytime Music] From his album "Bacchanalia" comes a terrific Billy May arrangement of a great standard jump tune which Glenn Miller hit with a few years back. Jump fans will go for this in a big way. The May style is solid.

COCKTAILS FOR TWO" (2:30) [Famous Music] Another fine standard is given the May sound effect treatment and the result is in-viting. It's another fine side from the album.

GUY MITCHELL & MINDY CARSON (Columbia 39950; 4-39950) SO AM I" (2:30) [Advanced Music] Guy Mitchell and Mindy Carson get an able assist from Mitch Miller and his ork as the duo drift along on a pleasing lilter with an in-viting set of lyrics and a pretty mel-ody. The pair team well together. G "I WANT YOU FOR A SUN-BEAM" (2:45) [Santly-Joy Mu-sic] Another bouncer with a slightly faster tempo is a fitting set up for some smooth harmony by Guy and Mindy. The tune is a pretty one.

SANDY SOLO (Borry 812; 45-812) B "BELIEVING IN YOU" (2:57) [Crane Music] A lush backdrop is most fittingly set up for Sandy Solo as he warbles in his tender and romantic manner a pretty ballad. His smooth voice sounds real sincere. "IT REALLY DOESN'T MAT-TER" (2:40) [Wemar Music] Sandy does another ballad with a broken-hearted theme and hands in a good sounding piece. Bobby Byrne's ork supports the vocalist in top flight fashion on both ends. This one might hit.

We think it's one of their best jobs that may even be bound for the top seat in the record derby. Les handles the flip side alone and comes up with a terrific version of the oldie "Sleep." We look for the "Top Of The World" side to come off big.

NAT "KING" COLE Prize package of good listening and a potent side destined to make a strong bid for wax honors is is-sued by Nat "King" Cole. The song stylist lends a hand from Billy May on the "Can't I" and sings a lovely ballad with an up-tempo backdrop in his soft and caressing manner. The vocal accompaniment are neat-ly woven together. Flip is a lush ballad dubbed "Blue Gardenia" title of the coming Warner flick. Nelson Riddle assists here with a pretty instrumental. Both sides make for a juicy acquisition for operators. Cole is a natural on both ends, especially the top.

Both side are equally excellent as Jimmy's voice is show-cased to best advantage by his partners. Both sides should be greatly appreciated by their legion of fans and we look for either end to cause a stir.

ROSEMARY CLOONEY Rosemary Clooney's voice is in better form than we've ever heard it before as she serves up a ballad labeled "What Would You Do" in her heart-felt and stirring manner. Backed by Paul Weston's ork, the slow waltz tempo ballad is really a piece of beauty. The other lid is a subdued Latin tempo ballad named "I Laughed Until I Cried" that is perfectly suited to the thrush's voice. Percy Faith sets the mood on this half. Either deck has a pleas-ing warmth about it, but we lean toward, the "What Would You Do" side. It's really touching.

FRANCES FAYE (Capitol 2390; F-2390)

(2:40) "A FOOL IN LOVE" (2:40) [Bourne Inc.] Frances Faye departs from her usual light hearted manner of vocaling and eases through a pretty ballad enhanced by a harp from the Dave Cavanaugh aggregation. It's a very pretty song.

G. "THERE'S A BELL THAT RINGS IN MY HEART" (2:12) [Duchess Music] Here the lively night club star who really belts out some terrific records dishes up a cute bouncing novelty. Sound effects help add to the deck.

WOODY HERMAN AND HIS NEW THIRD HERD (Mars 600; 45-600)

B "A FOOL IN LOVE" (2:49) [Bourne Inc.] The versatile Woody Herman shows all his talent on this end by leading the Third Herd, tooting on the sax and doing the vo-caling on a very pretty ballad. It's a fine job in all departments.

G "BUCK DANCE" (2:37) [Crom-well Music] Here the Herd teams up to belt out lively bouncing instru-mental. The rhythm and arrangement are both inviting.

RICHARD HAYES (Mercury 70103; 70103 x 45)

B "AND THE BULL WALKED AROUND, OLAY" (2:50) [Mal-abar Music] With a cheering vocal group giving a crowd like feeling Richard Hayes does a cute novely that oughta get a load of spins. The cute lyrics and bouncing tempo are both happy.

"CHANGEABLE" (2:15) [Kings-way Music] Richard does smooth bit of caroling to a moderate tempo. The tune is very pretty and the deliv-ery is top flight. It might catch on.

Ever since 1949, when the band business really hit bottom after a toboggan that lasted for several years, trade circles have been heralding a new era-of revived band interest. While the cry of "Wolf" has been heard many times before, notably each time a new aggregation was put together or a new promotion man came up with a world-shattering dream, this time it really looks as if it could happen. Last Friday night (February 27), Broadway wit-nessed a heartwarming scene as far as those inter-ested in the band business are concerned. On one street Harry James and his orchestra were making Box and on the next street Les Brown and his orchestra were playing Roseland. Not for many years had two major bands played Broadway at the same time, outside of theater appearances. Of course it wasn't quite like the good old days when perhaps a half dozen bands or more might be on the street, but it was a strong enough indication that people were turning out again to dance to name hands.

name bands. Right after the war, for reasons which many have speculated upon but which no one has been able to put his finger on, the band business started its de-cline. Since then however, there have been periodic efforts to revive that lucrative end of the business and while each push has gotten us a little further to the goal, the silver lining—until very recently—was not really in sight.



The record business, probably more than any other factor, has played the important role in the current band revival. When the Ralph Flanagan band was formed a couple of years ago, with the tremendous impetus it received from RCA Victor, that gave the band business the greatest shot in the arm it had had for a long time. Since then, other bands that have made it on records have found that profitable personal appearances have followed automatically. Some of these are Ray Anthony, Billy May and cur-rently, Ralph Marterie. The important thing, however, to keep this new band phase going, is the need for young bands, new talent, who can provide the music. It's not enough to concentrate only on the established orchestras and get them booked. That's the easiest part. Booking agents must develop new orchestras—and there are many of them just waiting for the opportunity and backing which a major booker could give them. The band business today looks as though it could break through again and become a major entertain-ment factor. But it's not there yet. And it's going to take all the work of everyone connected with the industry to do it. That means dance halls must stimulate more attendance; bookers must be more courageous in developing young talent; record com-panies must give them the opportunity to show what they can do; and disk jockeys and juke box opera-tors must go all out in programming their disks to help bring them to the attention of the public.

Johnnie Ray Forms Foundation For Hard of Hearing







Meyerson will confer with studio executives and Jesse Kaye, west coast representative for MGM Records. They will examine plans for new sound track albums and west coast recordings.



For some undisclosed and not-too-apparent reason, certain bypaths in the record industry seem to offer a fatalistic charm and fascination—so magnetic, that the grass seems to hold a greener hue unsurpassed by the shade in what-ever back yard we possess at the moment. Artists seem to regard the disk jockey profession with an astounding degree of awe; disc jockeys, conversely, observe the activities of the performers' domain with something almost ap-proaching envy; and, when the sands of time appear to be running out for varied other talents within the business, the amazing attitude becomes obvious that the big field to crack is—PROMOTION!

Now this has grown to a situation of quite some magnitude. . . . Evidently these individuals have observed the operations of the average promotion and exploitation expert with undue respect and reverence. Or, it may be, that some pure and simple stroke of M'Lady Luck has focused some hitherto elusive atten-tion on an individual engaged in the pursuit of publicity for a client. Be it as it may, the field of record promotion, exploitation and publicity has become a major undertaking in the music bizz these days.

Every now and then, we run into a barrage of cleverly-disguised queries in regard to the career of a promotion man. These are disguised because, while the average artist, artist-manager, deejay, etc., may be laying plans to invade the ideal vocation (wha-a-a-t?), they harbor the thought that the guys and gals already engaged in such may not be wont to part with the "stock-in-trade" which comprise the tricks of the business.

Without intending to betray those of our own confrers and colleagues in this peculiar rat race, the following is herewith set down as, more or less, a basic catechism of the Promotion, Exploitation and Publicity Man's Career:



1. Don't get married. Wives won't put up with your hours.

- 2. If you are already married-how're things at home?
- 3. Don't take more than three or four accounts, and make sure that these accounts are all top-flight artists who already have at least one million-record seller under their belts. This will give you an open sesame to all your outlets. Also, you will have plenty of time to look around for another job.


Be sure you get paid for value received. Most free-lance promotion and exploitation men ask for a stand-ard fee of a hundred dollars a week. That's what they ask for

5. Set up an elaborate office, because you've got to have a good front. Cover the floor with oriental rugs, use nothing but hand-carved desks and chairs, and be sure to cover the walls with large (21 by 14 should be about right) photographs, suitably autographed, (e.g. "To Manny—who keeps me in business, My Very Best—Always"—) and, above all, deck the halls with boughs of holly.... Because it'll be a cold, cold day when you can afford to pay for all of this!

- Use some sort of emblazoned, embossed stationery. A half-inch border in flaming vermillion will always call attention to your letters to the deejays, juke-box operators, librarians, etc. Then you will frequently hear them say: "OhmyGawd, here's another letter from _____."
- Don't be too perfunctory in your information to your outlets. Tell them the whole story regarding your clients. Employ enough adjectives to create an effect, i.e., amazing, fabulous, sensational (That's a good one!), terrific, etc. Then see what happens _____ (!).
- Spare no expense when your clients come to town for a p.a. Toss a big cocktail party, arrange for police escorts with motorcycles, set up lunch-eons and dinners with all the leading disc jocks, operators, retail dealers and everybody. By the time your client's stay is finished, you should have made so many friends that you might be able to swing a loan for a few bucks.
- 9. Remember your sources at Christmas time. It isn't necessary to "blow your top" on these gifts. Little things like type writers, Caddie convertibles, yachts and diamonds, etc., go a long way in cementing relations. And don't think your clients don't appreciate it. Believe us—it's the thought behind the gift that counts. . .
- 10. As a final note: If you're the type who believes in safety in numbers and are gunning to have a whole stable of accounts, be sure to pit your clients against each other. For example: "If you are representing two male vocalists, tell one (Darken Hansome, let's say) that the other is selling like crazy on his latest Groovey waxing. Then tell the other (Leighton Uglee, let's say) that Darken Hansome's latest Warpee platter is going to be the biggest smash of the year. That'll keep them on their toes. . . . Almost toe-to-toe, you might say!

Actually, that's about all there is to it. Now, isn't that simple?

Excuse us now, please. We've got to go make another alimony payment. That's the story....



Joe Csida Becomes **VP** of Santly Joy Also Heads Trinity Music, Firm's First BMI Affiliate




Goodman's New Band Gathers Top Names


NEW YORK — In forming his new band for the projected Benny Good-man-Louis Armstrong tour, Goodman has been gathering some of the best musicians available.

<u>Here We Go Again:</u> Sen. Pat McCarran Introduces Bill Against Juke Box Biz

Bill Reported to Have Strong Backing of ASCAP. Only Different From Last Year's Bryson-Kefauver Bill in That It Does Not Mention Amount of Royalty— Tribute Juke Box Ops Must Pay for Use of ASCAP's Copyrighted Music. Could Be Any Sum Determined By Whim Of ASCAP.

Senator Pat McCarran (Dem. Nev.) has just introduced into this 83rd Session of Congress of the United States a bill (S.1106) which would amend the Copyright Act of 1909. The bill was read twice and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Bill S.1106 is designated as "relating to the rendition of musical compositions on Coin Operated Machines. It would strike out of the 1909 Copyright Act the following: "The reproduction or rendition of a musical composition by or upon coin operated machines shall not be deemed a public performance for profit unless a fee is charged for admission to the place where such reproduction or rendition occurs."

It would insert in its place the following: "The reproduction or reudition of a musical composition by or upon a coin operated machine shall be deemed a public performance for profit by the person who owns, operates or services such machine whether or not a fee is charged for admission; provided that a person who himself owns, operates, services and retains all receipts of a single such machine, located in an establishment in which he conducts a business other than that of providing entertainment, and to which no fee for admission is charged shall not be deemed to have infringed upon the exclusive right of public performance for profit as a result of the rendition or reproduction of the musical composition by means of that coin operated machine, if such reudition or reproduction is intended to be heard only by persons in such establishments.

It is reported that ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers) is strongly behind this bill.

It was a certainty last year when this industry successfully opposed the Bryson-Kefauver Bill, that ASCAP would again get someone to sponsor a similar bill even tho the wording would be different. It is believed that there may be still another bill introduced, possibly by Senator Kefauver and Representative Bryson, changing the language of the bill introduced by them in 1952. But, whatever else comes along in this 83rd Congress, the fact remains that ASCAP is once again trying harder than ever to KILL THE JUKE BOX GOOSE THAT LAYS THE GOLDEN EGGS FOR ITS VERY OWN MEMBERSHIP.

Once again then, every automatic music operator, jobber, distributor, manufacturer, supplier, record seller, recording manufacturer, and any and all others allied to, or directly engaged in the automatic music industry must get ready for one of the biggest battles of all time to defeat this newly introduced McCarran Bill.

Every single member of this industry, and all allied to it, must prepare for the fight of their lives to help preserve their livelihood and the livelihood of their families against this new scourge of locusts attempting to eat up all that has been so hard won, so hard fought for by the men and women of the antomatic music industry.

Anticipating this new legislative effort sponsored by ASCAP, *The Cash Box* warned the industry (February 28 issue) that it should be prepared. In that issue we reprinted the following statement made by David C. Rockola, president of Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation, before the Sub-Committee of the Committee of the Judiciary, House of Representatives, during the Bryson-Kefauver Bill hearings on February 7, 1952.

"Such an argument," (referring to the arguments presented by ASCAP almost every year for the past 25 years) "and its repetition year after year, amounts to a contemptuous disregard for the judgment and decisions of succeeding sessions of Congress. Those gentlemen must know by this time that such a contention is not correct. If they do not know the facts, they could easily find them. Under the circumstances, their reiteration of that erroneous contention, in the face of its rejection by session after session of Congress, is, to say the least, a reflection on their good faith in again advancing that contention."

We stress the fact that this new bill introduced

by Senator Pat McCarran does not mention any specific royalty payment (as did the Bryson-Kefauver Bill in 1952) but just requests that the section be stricken out of the Copyright Act of 1909 that states the rendition of a musical composition upon a coin operated machine shall not be deemed a public performance for profit. The insertion of the new clause into the Copyright Act would then permit ASCAP to ask for any royalty it sees fit. This can mean ANYTHING—from \$10 per machine per year to \$5,000 per machine per year—or 1 cent per side of every record—or 10 cents per side of every record, DETERMINED SOLELY BY THE WHIM OF ASCAP.

The Juke Box Industry, Record Industry, and others have successfully defeated past efforts—THIS NEW McCARRAN BILL MUST BE DEFEATED ALSO—BUT IT WILL TAKE A GREAT AMOUNT OF DETERMINATION.

McCarren Bill Top Item Of Discussion

CHICAGO - Executives of the Music Operators of America (MOA) are now in session at the Congress Hotel, this city. It's a two-day meet, starting Monday, March 9, and continues into Tuesday, March 10.

Led by George A. Miller, president, representatives of the country's music operators associations, are on hand to map a program for its future. Usually, a national convention of all in the music machine industry is announced following the executive meeting, but this year it has already been stated that there will not be any annual convention.

Top item on the agenda, and which will probably take up most of the twoday conversations, is the McCarren Bill (S.1106) just introduced (see story page 27 this issue) which will try once again to extract royalty from the juke box operator for the performance of recorded music. 

With the fact that bowling alleys all over the country are reporting increased play action, and with the further fact that the shuffle games man-

ufacturers are enjoying boom sales, it seems from all present indications, that shuffle games will continue on for a long, long time getting great play action.

Furthermore the new shuffle and bowler games introduced by the manufacturers here have clicked so well that they have been forced into new production runs, one after the other, on demand of their distributors who report that operators are enjoying very fine play action everywhere.

Territory for shuffle games continues to grow.

Bowling alley owners report play jumping anywhere from 10% to far over 50% up and above last year.

If anything at all was needed to maintain enthusiasm of many operators for their shuffle games, reports emanating from the American Bowling Congress on the growing popularity of the alley sport, was surely all that was necessary to convince the men that their games will be in good play action for a long time into the future.

Manufacturers of shuffle games haven't hesitated to continue to make investments in development and engineering as well as materials for production of new and better models.

Some of these are, naturally, much higher priced. But the thrilling play action more than offsets their cost, as operators report that the play is much greater, and players much more satisfied with the thrills built into the new products.

Agree Setting Up Own Time Schedule Answer To Depreciation Problem

Write Congressmen and Senators to Back Sen. Frear's Optional Depreciation Bill (S.298)

CHICAGO—Each week more and more operators, jobbers, distributors, as well as manufacturers, are getting behind Delaware Senator J. Allen Frear, Jr., and the bill which he has introduced into the Senate of the United States (S.928) which allows business men to set their own reasonable time period for depreciation of all the equipment they purchase.

This optional depreciation plan is not new. It was backed by the Senate Small Business Committee in 1952. It is now being lobbied on by the machine tool manufacturers.

It is the one real answer to the inequitable depreciation problems faced by this industry.

Should this bill pass and become law, it means that amusement games operators can set up their own reasonable period of time in which to depreciate the games they purchase.

The same holds true for the automatic music, vending, and service machine operators. They, too, instead of battling with local depreciation schedules, can now set up their own reasonable period of time in which to depreciate their equipment.

Juke box ops can decide on a three year period to depreciate their phonographs and the other music accessories which they purchase.

Amusement games operators can take anywhere from six months to a year on their own option to depreciate their machines.

Vending and service machine operators can set their own time period to depreciate the various types of machines they operate.

Again The Cash Box was first.

This publication advised the trade of Senator Frear's Bill (S.298) three issues back.

Every intelligent operator in the nation quickly wrote his Congressman and his Senator urging that this bill become law.

It means the end of inequitable depreciation. It means the end of much loss.

There are territories where, today, automatic music equipment is depreciated over a period of five years. Other territories are allowed four years. Some depreciate their equipment in three years.

Further inequities exists in the fact that many tax officials consider amusements in the same category with automatic music, and the depreciation period remains the same.

It is absolutely ludicrous to tell any amusements operator that he should depreciate pinball games, as an example, in a period of from two to three, or even more, years.

This unjust depreciation of equipment, subject to the decisions of the various heads of Internal Revenue offices thruout the country, has caused much grief.

Now this can all be settled and well settled, too, by the passage of Senator J. Allen Frear's bill (Senate Bill 298) if the nation's operators will write to their Congressmen and their Senators to get back of this bill and help make it into law, leaders thruout the nation are convinced.

It takes only a short letter to the average Congressman and Senator to convince him what this would mean to any operator anywhere in the nation.

Here in Chicago, where in the nation. Here in Chicago, where the juke box operators have a four year period in which to depreciate their equipment, there has been much grief in this regard.

The reason is that the music operators here are up against 25% depreciation per year. Those knowing how the price of a new machine falls after the first year agree that 40% is the minimum depreciation figure for that period. And that 30% the second year, 20% the third year, and 10% the fourth and last year would be fair and reasonable. But the law sticks at 25% per year.

In some areas music ops are only allowed to depreciate their equipment at the rate of 20% per year over a period of five years. Everyone engaged in the industry knows that this is absolutely ridiculous from any standpoint.

The Cash Box time and time again explained the problem. This publication also explained that present inequitable depreciation rates could not be changed except by a meeting of representatives of all the operators from all of the 48 states in Washington with the proper tax committee.

They could then only hope for a uniform national rate. This meeting still wouldn't mean a better depreciation rate would come into being.

Delaware's Senator J. Allen Frear, Jr., was made cognizant of this problem by industries thruout the country. He followed along the line of the recommendations made to the Senate by the Senate Small Business Committee in 1952.

He has introduced a bill (S.298) which answers the entire problem by allowing business men to depreciate their equipment on their own option over a reasonable period of time.

Whether this bill will, or will not, pass this 83rd Congress, the demand that it be backed up by the Congressmen and Senators of all members of this industry will keep it fresh and alive.

It will yet become law, for it will solve one of the nation's most trying problems, and one of its greatest business inequities.

Lenny is just ready to give this here little monster of his a bop on the bean and I am ready to kick his little pants in on him but good when Lenny's missus runs on up.


