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Music Editorial

ELEVEN YEARS

Have eleven years gone by already? It hardly seems possible.

Yet it has been that long since *The Cash Box* was founded . . . and it's been an eventful eleven years.

It has brought profound changes to the entire world, changes in habits, customs, thinking, activities. We have come through war, readjustment and further war. We have witnessed political and social developments which can't help but affect the lives of every single one of us.

And in our own world—the music world—we have been the audience and the participants in just as tremendous an upheaval.

Remember back to the music business of 1942? It was the era of bands. Band business had become big business. Everywhere in the nation, expensive aggregations were playing for dancehalls, proms and every other type of function.

Since that time, we have gone through many, many phases — and many, many names.

We have all watched bands decline in drawing power and vocalists rise to the top. We've watched records become so important that one hit disk can mean stardom and all the rewards that such a status implies.

We've gone through one trend after another, war songs, coming home songs, folk music, revivals, the sound phase and the current instrumental phase. We remember name after name—stars who reached the top and then either secured their position there or slipped back and disappeared from the scene.

We have watched the methods of merchandising tunes and records under-

go a complete upheaval.

We have witnessed the rise of the juke box and the disk jockey to the point where they have become the main focal points for the selling of records.

During this period, juke boxes have increased in numbers to such an extent that by now they account for the direct sale of one quarter of all records sold—just to keep them filled. And this doesn't take into account their promotional effect on the further sale of millions and millions of records.

We have watched too the rise of the disk jockey, who because of radio's need to fill time effectively and at comparatively small cost, has become a major entertainment factor in our country, purveying a form of entertainment inextricably allied with the record industry.

Therefore, in the eleventh anniversary issue of *The Cash Box*, the disk jockey field will be surveyed in its entirety. Their likes, dislikes, preferences and objections will be revealed. Their place in the music industry will be reviewed. And they themselves will write about their own problems.

This will be the greatest, most ambitious look at the disk jockey picture ever undertaken in the music business. It will be a reference book that will be used over and over again for many months to come.

In all sincerity, we know that YOU will want to be represented in it with your most important advertisement, your most important message.

Our eleventh anniversary edition will be a highlight in the history of *The Cash Box*.

"NAILA" (2:42) [Public Domain] A lush and swaying waltz is beautifully interpreted by the combo. Stanley handles the piano masterfully and the results are fine. Luch backing adds to this deep material. material.

The enchanting tune has a mystic quality about it and the way Nat sings it, it's real attractive. The Latin tempo by the Nelson Riddle ork adds to the good quality of the number. Flip features the "king" with Billy May's ork on a blues lilter from the "Jennifer" flick. We go for the top half in a big way and look for it to catch fast. There are a hoard of versions on "Paradise," but we feel that the Cole version will take the others over in the long run.

WINIFRED ATWELL (London 1343: 45-1343)

"CORONATION RAG" (2:12) [Francis, Day & Hunter] Winifred Atwell lends her talented fingers to a rinky tink rag time tune which she herself composed in honor of the Coronation. The rhythmic bouncer really moves. Number has a fitting regal sound to it.

"BOUNCE THE BOOGIE" (1:58) [Capitol of Brussels] The artist lets herself go on a fine toe tapper with a rhythmic boogie beat. She handles the piano in a masterful and impressive manner.

JOHNNY CLARK

(Marvello Music 87-51453-1)

"LIVIN ON LOVE" (2:30) [Marvello Music] Johnny Clark hands in a straight forward styling of cute ditty that omes over pleasantly. The number bounces along at an appealing pace.

G'I'LL SAVE MY LOVE FOR YOU" (2:30) A light backing supplements an adequate vocal offering by Johnny as he lilts along on an up tempo ballad. Tune has an ok quality.

PAUL WESTON ORCHESTRA (Columbio 40014; 4-40014)

"SHANE" (2:38) [Paramount Music] With a sound of a horse's hooves clacking in the backdrop, the lovely theme music from the flicker "Shane" is lushly presented by Paul Weston and his ork. Very pretty piece of listening

[M & C Music] The versatile artist does another pleasant bit of singing as she offers a tango number with a light backdrop. A larger ork in the backdrop would bring out the fine quality of Joyce's voice.

JIMMY LEYDEN ORCHESTRA (Derby 824; 45-824)

B "DO - LIKE - I - DO" (2:50) [Leo Feist, Inc.] A lively comball item with a gay air to it is pleasantly handled by Jimmy Leyden and the ork. The chorus dishes up a solid vocal job as the banjo strums in the rear. Cute ditty.

"UNDER A SWEETHEART MOON" (2:17) [Miller Music] A pretty waltz that has a fine summer season flavor to it is delivered with a sway by the Leyden crew. Chorus is wonderful on its harmony.

ROSE MURPHY

"THE LITTLE RED MONKEY" (2:28) [Miller Music] The "Chi" gal, Rose Murphy, does a cute chirpy vocal version of a novel ditty that kids should go for. Her high voice gives it a childish sound. Catchy ditty has something unusual about it to make it sell.

[Miller Music] In her very different manner, Rose happily glides thru a bouncey take off on a fine standard. She sounds like she's having a good time. Plenty of gimmicks on this side. Cute and catchy.

"FANTASIA MEXICANA" (2:25) [Boosey & Hawkes] To a rhythmic mambo tempo is set the lovely music of Fantasia Mexicana. Fitting perfectly into the piece is an exotic and beaty trumpet solo by George Lopez. Number moves and is good for dancing.

G"THE SONG FROM MOULIN ROUGE" (2:40) [Broadcast Music, Inc.] The tune that's sitting right up at the top of almost every national poll gets a mambo treatment from Noro and his boys. Featured is the trombone of Chauncey Welsch. A quiet and rhythmic piece.

A committee was appointed at the meeting to canvas the entire music industry to see whether most would be willing to cooperate in such a plan. Members of this committee are: Ben Bloom, chairman; Cork O'Keefe;

George Paxton; Lou Levy; Jean Aberbach; Bobby Mellin; and Dick Volter. If the reaction is favorable, a panel would then be selected to screen ma-

would then be selected to screen material submitted for the show. While at present the show is scheduled for thirteen weeks, it was reported that if it were successful and became sponsored it would be allotted to a permanent spot on the NBC network

Here and There

WASHINGTON, D. C.—That top business looks for greater things to come was indicated this week when two government bureaus reported that businessmen plan to spend record amounts on new plant and equipment in the second and third quarters. The capital outlay schedules call for spending \$7.244 billion in the second quarter, and \$7.088 billion in the third quarter. These programs will create an all-time record, outstripping even 1952 by 7 per cent. Economists consider plant and equipment spending a key indicator of business activity trends.

OTTAWA, CANADA—Canada as a market continues to look better and better. The Bureau of Statistics reported this week that Canada's population stood at 14,692,000 at March 1 of this year, an increase of 68,000 over the previous three months, and a jump of 376,000 compared with March 1, 1952.

NEW YORK CITY—Tavern owners here received some relief from their overburdened taxes, when the City Council voted to kill the present levy of 25 per cent of the amount paid by the dealer for state license. Through concerted effort of the liquor dealers, it was pointed out that continued imposition of this tax would cause many dealers to fail. The tax will be collected in 1953 (payable June 25), but will end after this year.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Here's one reason why kiddie ride popularity should never slacken. The Public Health Service reports that there will be 4,005,670 babies born in the United States during 1953, if births continue at the rate for the first quarter of this year. So far births are running ahead of last year when the national total reached the record-breaking figure of 3,889,000 registered and unregistered births.

CHICAGO—Some of the Chicago manufacturers may be wondering just why their cabinet manufacturers are behind in deliveries. The report of the National Lumber Manufacturers Association, who received word from 491 mills, was that shipments were 6.9 per cent above production for the week ending May 30.

CHICAGO — First "Chicago, 1953, Automatic Amusement Game, Num-ber 8388" sticker was in the hands of C. B. DeSelm this past week.

It was the first shuffle game license issued by the city, since the injunctions and legal ramifications of court battles which have been going on since 1949, to prove that: "the shuffle game doesn't violate the bagatelle ordinance of the City of Chicago."

This long, drawn out case came to an end a few weeks ago when the Illinois Supreme Court, Springfield, Ill., ruled that the shuffle game does not violate the bagatelle ordinance of the City of Chicago.

This favorable ruling was given to Empire Coin Machine Exchange, Inc., this city, against the City of Chicago.

Injunctions were obtained in 1949 so that operators could place shuffle games. These were withdrawn when the Appellate Court ruled that shuffle games did violate the bagatelle ordinance of the City of Chicago.

This court also stated in its ruling that an injunction was not the proper remedy under the law.

There were quite a few injunctions in existence at the time and the case then had to continue up above the Appellate Court to the Supreme Court of the State of Illinois to obtain the "proper remedy."

This will give such people as George A. Miller, president and general manager of Music Operators of America, Inc., an opportunity to clean up whatever local work he has and appear in Washington before the Senate's Judiciary Committee diciary Committee.

It will also give the attorneys for the juke box industry time to better prepare their case.

Many individuals will have to appear in Washington at these hearings. Operators, distributors and manufac-

Operators, distributors and manufacturers and, it is believed here, this one extra week will give them time to arrange for the trip.

In the meantime, all are hard at work trying to get ready the defense for the juke box industry, in opposition to the ASCAP sponsored McCarran Bill and the Dirksen Bill.

Both bills, it is reported, will be presented at the hearings by the proponents.

ponents.

The opponents, the juke box industry, it is understood, will have to be ready with all testimony and proof the moment that the proponents are finished presenting their side at the hearings.

WILL ASCAP POLICE TELL JUKE BOX OPS HOW MUCH TO PAY IF ASCAP WINS?

History of Bryson-Kefauver Bill in 1952 Shows ASCAP Wanted to "Police" Juke Box Industry. Does This Mean, Should ASCAP Win In Congress, It Will Look Thru Juke Box Ops' Books, Know How Many Locations, How Many Machines, How Much Earned, and Then Charge According to Each Individual Operator's Earnings?

The above is not an imaginary or fantastic supposition. It is a fact. This matter of ASCAP acting as "police" for the juke box industry was made known in 1952, when ASCAP sponsored the Bryson-Kefauver Bill, and grasped at the opportunity to ride in on the crime wave reports which were causing so much publicity during that period.

The fact remains, then, if this is what is back of ASCAP's plans, every single juke box owner in the nation had best get on the job and do his share to help defeat the present ASCAP-sponsored McCarran Bill, S.1106, and the Dirksen Bill, S.1444, which will be heard in Open Public Hearings before the Senate's Judiciary Sub-Committee beginning Tuesday, June 30.

The point is that the possibility of ASCAP acting as "police" over the juke box industry is very much more than mere conjecture.

ASCAP, neither in the McCarran Bill, nor in the Dirksen Bill, makes any statement as to how much it wants, should it win in Washington. The fact remains that ASCAP has not openly stated, nor openly published, WHAT IT WANTS.

Checking through all the past bills sponsored by ASCAP, with the exception of the Bryson-Kefauver Bill of 1952, where ASCAP asked for 1c per side of each recording per week (one of the most intricate and complicated bookkeeping feats in higher accounting that could have ever been placed in a bill before Congress and which definitely meant ASCAP would have to "police" the juke box operators) ASCAP has never included in either the Buckley Bill, or the

Scott Bill, and now not even in the McCarran Bill, or the Dirksen Bill, WHAT IT WANTS.

In short, ASCAP simply seeks to first get that section of the "Copyright Act of 1909" amended which states that juke boxes are excepted from paying royalties for copyrighted music.

ASCAP's music publishers and ASCAP's music composers already get the royalty they demand from the nation's juke box owners via the record manufacturers. The record manufacturers add the royalties for ASCAP's music publishers and composers onto the price the juke box owner pays for each record he purchases.

But ASCAP says that it is not getting any royalties "directly." Well, then, who's ASCAP? Why ASCAP is the ASCAP music publisher and the ASCAP music composer. These are the men who sit on ASCAP's Board of Directors and are ASCAP's officers. They want to get paid TWICE for the very same copyrighted music.

In short, if they can get MORE MONEY for their copyrighted music, paid twice for the same tune, then they split that up as ASCAP. ASCAP is only the collective collection agency of these ASCAP music publishers and ASCAP music composers.

But back to ASCAP's methods now and in the past. Should, by Federal Law, ASCAP get the section of the "Copyright Act of 1909" amended, to state that juke boxes are no longer excepted from paying royalty for copyrighted music, then, with the Federal Government on their side, ASCAP can actually "police" the juke box industry.

ASCAP "police" can look into the books and records of all juke box operators. They can note how many phonos each operator has. How many locations he has. Where these locations are. How much he earns from his route. And they can then charge according to his earnings. And have FED-ERAL LAW to back them up.

Perhaps, then, this is why ASCAP hasn't openly stated what they actually want from the juke box operators of the nation. Perhaps this is the purpose they have in mind.

This is all the more reason for every single juke box owner in the nation to work with all his might to defeat this fourth ASCAP attempt at Federal legislation since the end of World War II.

Any juke box operator who even remotely thinks that the above is not possible should go back and read the booklet issued by ASCAP in 1952. And also re-read reprints of some of the statements made about the juke box industry at that time regarding the fact that ASCAP would "police" the juke industry. At the same time he should also read some of the terms ASCAP used in regard to him and his business.

If that doesn't bring him to an explosive boiling point, he need but think of himself living in a "police state." How he, as an American, would like to live in a "police state," with his business being constantly policed, with his records being mauled over, and with his earnings being shunted about, to please a multi-million dollar collective collection agency.



"In the "Rocket", the three joy-stick controls, operated by the rider, gives five different ride movements, simulating actual movements by a rocket ship."





Almost all juke box ops bypassed the most treacherous and dangerous phase of the present ASCAP sponsored McCarran Bill (S.1106) and the Dirksen Bill (S1444) which is that, should ASCAP win its much sought after amendment to the "Copyright Act of 1909," so that juke boxes would no longer be excepted from paying royalties for copyrighted music, the entire juke box operating industry would be turned into an ASCAP-policed business. In short, ASCAP could then look thru juke box operator's books and records, note how many phonos and locations each juke box op has, how much he earns, and then may charge according to what each operator earns, for the right to use ASCAP copyrighted music. This isn't fancy. This isn't supposition. This isn't imagination. Check back to 1952. Read ASCAP's own statements regarding the fact that ASCAP would "police" the juke box operators. In fact, the bill that ASCAP introduced in 1952, the Bryson-Kefauver Bill, would have made police action on the part of ASCAP necessary. In this bill ASCAP asked for 1c per side of each record per week for royalty. To check, and make sure they got that 1c, they would have had to look thru juke box ops' books. Perhaps, then, that is why ASCAP is not telling, in its two present bills (McCarran and Dirksen Bills), just what it wants. If juke box ops don't want to have their businesses under ASCAP's police supervision, they had best wake up and help defeat these two bills coming up for Open Public Hearings before the Senate's Judiciary Sub-Committee on Tuesday, June 30, 1953.

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


