Why The Disk Jockey?

People in the music business—just as in all businesses - sometimes have funny ideas. For instance in our business you occasionally hear someone say, "We created the disk jockey. We made him important. And as a matter of fact, maybe we made him too important".

Certainly everyone in this business has at one time or another either heard that said or perhaps even said it himself.

Well there are several fallacies to that line of thinking.

First of all, we did not create the disk jockey. The economics of the radio business did that-the necessity to have interesting and comparatively inexpensive shows to fill up all the hours of air time available.

And second of all, we did not make the disk jockey important. He proved his importance a long time ago by creating hits together with the juke box operator.

How can you make a person who creates hits for you too important?

The disk jockey came up fast. Starting at a slow pace, he suddenly mushroomed as the record business expanded to take care of juke box needs. As more records started coming out from an ever increasing number of diskeries, there was a greater necessity to get these records before the buying public. And disk jockey programs proved to be one of the more effective ways. Naturally as the disk jockey proved that he could make hits and sell records, his importance to the music business increased.

Today it is taken as axiomatic that part of the method of getting a record started is to get as wide disk jockey play on it as possible. Today the disk jockey is not in the developing stage. He has arrived.

As we have said, once he started to move, the disk jockey came up fast. And as happens in any sphere in which that occurs, some abuses may have arisen. But when people say perhaps the disk jockey has become too important, they are implying that the entire field is open to those abuses.

Any rational person knows that it is not. And furthermore an entire profession cannot be blamed for the mistakes or greediness of a few of its mem-

The disk jockey field, now that it has reached a mature stage, is giving this country some of its most important entertainment personalities. These men have the same sense of responsibility to themselves and to the public which supports them as other top names in the entertainment industry have.

Obviously, to us in the music business, the disk jockey is a fascinating field of study. We want to know what he thinks, how he thinks, what his preferences are, what his gripes are.



"Make Friends With Records" Selected As Slogan For Industry by RIAA

NEW YORK-At a meeting held on June 3, the Promotion Committee of the R.I.A.A. selected a slogan which now becomes official for the whole record industry and which will be recommended for use by all manufacturers of phonographs and phono accessories. The slogan selected is:

MAKE FRIENDS WITH RECORDS, and was originated by Wendell Buck, 10 East 39th Street, New York City,

The development of a slogan suitable for use by all segments of the industry was one of the first tasks assigned to this committee after the organization of R.I.A.A. early in 1952, and in the course of the last eighteen months nearly 2,000 different slogans have been considered. Prior to the selection of the winning slogan the committee met on several different occasions to consider other entries and at no time was any other proposed slogan able to attract a majority vote of approval. However, the winning slogan submitted by Buck was enthusiastically approved by all members of the committee and was adopted without a dissenting vote.

The search for an industry-wide slogan began with a contest conducted by several disk jockeys during the Hartford, Connecticut promotion conducted by R.I.A.A. in September 1952. However, no slogan was submitted at this time that met with general approval of the record companies. All employees of the record companies were then urged to submit proposed slogans and several hundred additional entries were received. Subsequently, the employees of advertising agencies and other publicity organizations familiar with the phonograph and record industry were asked to participate, and thereafter a thousand or more entries were received from such outstanding organizations as McCann-Erickson, J. Walter Thompson, Cunningham & Walsh, and Calkins & Holden. As an inducement to participation in the contest by employees of these organizations, a prize consisting of a library of classical records was offered by the Association.

The winner of the contest, Wendell Buck, is himself a record enthusiast and heads up his own public relations organization.

It is believed by the Promotion Committee that the slogan selected will be widely used by all companies interested in the sale of phonograph records and accessories both in publication advertising and all other types of printed matter. The Association plans to furnish to all its members a specially designed logotype of the slogan for the purpose of maintaining uniformity of appearance.

In the search for a slogan, R.I.A.A. received many excellent suggestions which dealt with music in a broad sense, but the Promotion Committee decided early in the contest that the winning slogan should specifically mention records.

Disk Industry Volume To Rise, Sacks Predicts

CAMDEN, N. J.—A substantial upsurge in phonograph record sales over the present annual volume of \$200,000,000 has been predicted by Manie Sacks, Vice-President and General Manager of the RCA Victor Record Department. He told a meeting of the company's overseas distributors that greater appreciation of classical selections, availability of holiday, industrial and special-occasion music. and a 300 per cent increase in the number of record players in use were leading factors in the industry's postwar growth and healthy outlook for the future.

Schools and colleges have helped to promote interest in the classics, Sacks said, adding that radio and television also have played a notable part in this development. Greater availability of "mood music," expansion of music's role in factories and offices since World War II, and a promotion by the trade of records as "a welcome gift for every commemorative milestone." he said, have also contributed to the industry's upturn in sales. He also noted the importance of the increase in turntables in use in the United States from 8,000,000 in 1946 to the present total of over 24,000,000.

Pointing out that the final quarter of 1952 was the best in Victor's entire 50-year history and that the first quarter of this year brought a 10 per cent rise over the same period last year, Sacks underscored the value of three new aids for selling records:

1. Growing understanding of the value of "exposure," which has brought self-merchandising albums, heightened eye-appeal of packages, and other advances permitting visual shopping and self-selection of records.

2. Broadening of the industry's retail base through addition of syndicate stores on "fast-selling pop and middleof-the-road classical items."

3. Introduction by Victor last September of Extended Play records, which have enabled the trade to offer record buyers "more music for less



"Melba" Gets All-Out Promotion

The biggest promotional campaign on a musical picture in recent years has been built around the United Artists release, "Melba," starring Patrice Munsel. The campaign was designed by Lyle K. Engel, U. A.'s music promotion consultant. It included the services of disc-jockies and top celebrities, and was designed to exploit both the movie and the music from the movie.

The high point of the promotion came on Monday, June 22nd, two days before the premiere itself. Twenty-four big name disc-jockies, representing all but one metropolitan radio station plugged "Melba" continuously from 12 noon to 12 midnight and played music from the film, including the "Melba Waltz" and "Is This The Beginning of Love."

During this time, ten ice cream wagons were stationed a block apart—from Times Square to the Capitol Theatre. The wagons were manned by celebrities in town who, assisted by New York models, gave away free peach melba ice cream donated by Louis Sherry to every one of the thousands who gave to help fight cerebral palsy. Each wagon had a radio tuned to the particular disc-jockey who was talking about "Melba" and cerebral palsy at that time.

Several days before this, the big disc-jockey contest on "I like the Melba Waltz because . . " in 50 words or less got under way. A thousand dollars worth of prizes were given away, with duplicating prizes for the disc-jockey. The contest ended on midright on June 24th, right after the premiere.

Baion, Brazilian Dance Gaining In Popularity

NEW YORK-Gaining increasing popularity in the United States is a new rhythm called the Baion. Actually the Baion is an old Brazilian folk dance originating in the northern provinces of Brazil. Until two years ago, it was practically unknown. Once introduced into the major cities of Brazil it caught on with such dramatic suddenness that it quickly spread to Uruguay and Argentina and soon exceeded in popularity the Rhumba and Mambo, and even replaced their favorite native dance, the Tango.

The first Baion in the United States was the popular "Delicado," interreted instrumentally by Percy Faith. The second, also a hit, is the Baion from the picture "Anna".

"The Baion" just released by Juno Records, Inc. is the first rendition of the Baion using the authentic Brazilian folk rhythms and recorded by the Honeydreamers with English lyrics.

Juno's "Baion" was composed by Paulo Aiencar a noted Brazilian song-writer, who has had many of his tunes recorded and published in the United States and Brazil. Ben Raleigh who has many hit tunes to his credit, was commissioned to write the English lyrics.

Juno Records, Inc. was recently formed by two successful business men both with good classical and popular musical background. It is their intention to build a label of which they can be proud.





BRAUNSCHWEIG, GERMANY—
The "Automaten- Markt", magazine
for the German coin machine industry, released figure; which show that
in the last three mouths of 1952 there
was an increase in the export of German equipment. Exports in 1952 were

NEW YORK—In a mid-year survey of 228 firms representing a cross-section of the city's commercial activity, the Commerce and Industry Association of New York, Inc. reported that not only did New York City business generally increase in volume during the first half of 1953, compared with 1952, but equally consistent gains should be maintained in the last six months of the year.



LOUISVILLE, KY. — Altho more than 80 of Kentucky's 120 counties are dry, efforts are being made to capture the State Legislature, and force the entire state to prohibit the sale of disstilled spirits. The Temperance League of Kentucky wants a repeal of a 1948 amendment to the local option law, and a review of the work of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. The amendment lets cities of the first four population classes vote independently of their counties on the wet-dry question.



Al S. Levy of Dayton, O. has been operating since 1916. He actually started in the coin machine business at the World Fair in St. Louis in 1903 as a salesman for Watling Scales. His wife Fannie has shared with him all the grief and joy of forty three years of marriage. They have been blessed with three fine children, two sons and a daughter: all college graduates. The A.S.L. Entherprises, the trade name for the business, is now in the capable hands of his two sons, Ben and Al Ir. Though retired from the business, Al Levy sets the policy and method of operation that was so successful for him over the many many years he operated. His storerooms still contain machines that were manufactured twenty and thirty years ago. Parts and accessories for games whose manufacturers have long passed out of business, grace the shelves and are a momento of his glorious past. Like the Chinese, he don't believe in destroying or throwing anything away; as there might be a day when most of his forty years in this business. The army claimed him for five years between 1941 and 1946, when he was honorably discharged into the Air Corps Reserve as a Lt. Colonel. He was recalled during the early days of the Korea incident and served for 21 months more. Al Jr. the youngest son recently completed two years of service in the army as a Lieutenant.

These are the type of men who are now operators. They are clean, high class men. Unfortunately, Dayton, Ohio has no operators association. There are approximately forty operators in the immediate vicinity who still operate under the laws of the jungle. You hear the usual complaints about jobbers and distributors; underselling, and selling direct to locations. This will continue

distributors; underselling, and selling direct to locations. This will continue as long as the operators are not organized. In the early days of the coin machine business this was the only method of operation. It was dog eat dog. All the early pioneers operated under this theory. In this Atomic Age those methods should be as dead as the Dodo. With the type of men who have entered this business in the past decade, I hope that they will gradually rise above the methods used in the early days and conduct their business according the present

As I see it, the new generation of operators have the opportunity to erase the stigma that has been associated with this business. If this is to be their business of the future, it will require much effort and sacrifice on their part to put this business on a par with other businesses, so that it can enjoy the esteem and good will of the public.


