

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A Star Is Born
On Juke Boxes

In her current smash film, "A Star Is Born," Judy Garland plays a singer whose great ambition it is to make a hit record that will be played on juke boxes across the nation. When she starts her career that is what she constantly dreams of. And one of the highlights of the picture is when she does have that number one record which is being played on the machines all over the country.

The thoughts that Judy expresses in these scenes are the very same that dozens of up and coming singers think every day. Each of them knows that if he or she can catch that one big one which will delight juke box audiences, then success is theirs. Likewise most of our current top singers acknowledge readily the debt they owe to the play that they received on the 550,000 juke boxes located throughout the country.

For today, the simple fact is that records played on juke boxes are responsible for the careers of most of our top singers.

The juke box has proved a phenomenal medium for these singers. For not only do jnke box operators contribute to singers' incomes by buying at least a quarter of all records sold, but the promotional effect of jnke box play is immeasurable.

A record played on a jnke box reaches everyone in the place. You can't turn it off as you can a radio. You must hear that record. And it is only through exposure that hit records can be made.

The exposure which the network of

juke boxes that dot this nation gives to a record and an artist is the greatest possible today.

And so strong is the influence of the juke box in the creation of new stars, that it really only takes one hit record to make an on-the-way-np singer a top personality.

Just this year we saw at least two examples of that when Kitty Kallen, who had been singing for a number of years, suddenly skyrocketed to the highest brackets by latching onto one hit record. Likewise, The Crewcuts came from out of nowhere with their smash and suddenly became the hottest group in the country.

For years, we at *The Cash Box* have been telling, writing about, and proclaiming the star making potential of the juke boxes. We have always said that success of the juke boxes was the surest way to success in all other entertainment fields because a juke box audience is a basic American audience. If you appeal to them on records, as can only be proved by whether they put their coins in the juke boxes to hear you, then it is more than likely that you're going to appeal to them in other mediums, for these same people comprise those other audiences too.

So today, we've reached the state where we see the efficacy of the juke box acknowledged on all sides, from the artist, the record company, and now in films.

All we can say is that we've been proclaiming it a long, long time.

BMI Music Editor Offers Tips To Writers About Song Sharks

NEW YORK—"The recent indictment of three California 'song sharks' for allegedly bilking a college professor of \$5,000 to 'promote his song' once more focuses attention on a racket that for years has been picking the pockets of thousands of naive and inexperienced song writers." This from Milton Rettenberg, director of music editorial department of Broadcast Music, Inc. and one of the nation's most diligent exposers of music-business racketeers.

Pointing out the many ways in which non-professional writers of songs are being taken in Rettenberg cites misleading advertisements, brochures and direct-mail solicitations which promise advice, "constructive criticism", publication and even recordings—all for a fee, of course.

"These charlatans," says Rettenberg, "will enthusiastically accept your song, regardless of its merits, or, set your lyrics to music for fees ranging from \$20 to several hundred dollars. Or they will record your completed song for a fee and send you a catch-phrase contract that will cost you hundreds of dollars. With other elements of the music business we at BMI have been working with the Post Office and Better Business Bureaus for a long time to end this practice and, in 1947 we prepared a booklet warning songwriters of these racketeers. Since that time we have distributed thousands of copies."

The veteran music editor emphasized that these individuals who promise publication are not legitimate music publishers. "Simply operators who skirt the edges of the law," he said, "they might provide a printing service... but at exorbitant prices. In every instance, the cost to the song-writer through the 'song shark' method is far more than he would ordinarily pay to any legitimate printer."

Stressing that songwriting is a difficult and highly competitive profession in which only those with genuine talent, originality and salesmanship can hope to succeed, Rettenberg also told of the staggering odds facing the amateur writer. "During the fiscal year ending June 1, 1954," Rettenberg stated, "about 50,000 songs were registered for copyright in Washington. Of those 50,000 songs, only 9,000 were published. Of the 9,000 published, less than 100 reached best seller proportions, and just about 99 percent of those were written by experienced, professional songwriters."

However, for those who are determined to go ahead and write a hit song, Rettenberg offered the following tips:

- 1. Never pay a publisher any money for the publication of your manuscript or the recording of your song. Any publisher who asks any fee is not running an ethical, legitimate business.
- 2. To submit a completed song to a reliable publisher, it is necessary only to have the melody line placed on manuscript paper, with the lyrics written below the melody and harmonies indicated. If you are unable to do this yourself, some local musician may do it for you for a small fee.
- 3. Submit a copy of your song to as many reliable publishers as you wish; their addresses may be found in publications devoted to music.
- 4. Don't be discouraged. Remember that songwriting is a skilled craft, and any craftsman or artist, in addition to having genuine natural ability, must work and study for years to attain success.

Mambo Comes To Carnegie Hall

NEW YORK-Mambo finally made Carnegie Hall, last week, in the form of a concert called "Mambo USA." Featuring an array of some of the top names in the field, the George Goldner-Irving Schacht production will travel through 55 key cities of the United States and the returns ought to be tremendous for all concerned.

Although some of the higher priced seats were empty at the start of the Carnegie performance, the audience continued to pour in while the show was going on until at intermission time, the house was a healthy size. When the show hits the other 54 cities where mambo has become increasingly popular, there will probably be stand-

ing room only.

The concert was mainly occupied by the music of Machito and his 18 piece Afro-Cuban orchestra which in addition to taking the spotlight during some segments, also supplied the background music for the terpsichoreans and the vocalists. Top Palladium dancers including Horatio and Lana, Michael & Nilda Terrace, and Barry & Tybee offered the frantic steps of the dance which has been sweeping the country. Classy crowdpleasing hoofing was demonstrated by all three of the boy-girl teams, but it was the male dance team of the Mambo Aces that stole the foot-work show. The youngsters danced as though they had been working on their routine for years. In the vocal department, attractive newcomer Aura San Juan, sister of movie star Olga San Juan, treated the audience to some polished chirping of the more popular Latin tunes of the day. The show could have used more of Aura's

vocalesthenics. The big voice of Carlos Ramirez, long a favorite of the Spanish music lovers, belted out a halfdozen of the big Latin standards in his familiar manner. The Facundo Rivero Quintet took over in the groupvocal department.

A fitting conclusion to the enjoyable two-hours of Mambomania was the tremendous instrumentation by the Joe Loco Quintet. The crew worked perfectly, making it obvious why they are so popular on records. From the exciting rhythms, the quintet eased into some soft mood music with a Latin flare. The wild bongo-antics of Bobby Flash drew cheers.

With such great talents coming through in top form, it was tough for any individual to steal the show. But it was the zany antics of 3-foot tall Tun-Tun who pulled the trick. The half-pint dancing and singing sensation, as his friends call him, had the audience cheering for more. the audience cheering for more.

The entire affair didn't run too smoothly, obviously hampered by opening night blues. But when the rough spots are ironed out, "Mambo U.S.A." will probably be a big Package success. age success.



According to disk jockey Bob "Pedro" Harris (WVNJ-Newark, N.J.) "the mambo is here to stay. It won't become passe as did the Black Bottom, Big Apple, Charleston and Peabody" asserts Harris with firm conviction. Harris is an authority and his opinion must be respected. He was one of the first, Harris interjected at this point "I was the first," dee-jay to introduce mambo music to radio audiences back in 1947. He began his "Mambo Rendezvous" as a weekly sixty minute segment, but it has progressed to a daily Monday thru riday three hour show. It is one of the most popular mambo shows in the New York Metropolitan area. His mambonick fan club now totals over 40,000 members. "Mambo will never die," repeats Harris. "In fact there are now variations of the torrid music called Cha Cha Cha and Tepo to take over if the current craze ever cools off." A vet of 22 years in the announcing field, Harris foresaw the coming of age of the Mambo back in 1947 and joined WVNJ to become their expert on Latin-American music. He is in a large measure responsible for the success of such top Latin-American recording stars as Joe Loco, Tito Puente, Tito Rodriguez and Pupi Campo to name just a few. Harris also claims to have been the one who suggested to A & R men of record companies that they record pop tunes in mambo tempo. An indication of the rise in the mambo fever is evident in the results of the recent WVNJ survey among its listeners. CHICAGO—A report of the revenue from licensing of cigarette machines here, by William T. Prendergast, city collector, is a good indication of how inadequate is a restricted program. The present ordinance limits these machines to industrial and mercantile establishments to which the general public does not have access. Backers of the original ordinance estimated that annual revenue woul amount to more than \$100,000. The total revenue collected so far is estimated at only \$24,250 from licenses which have been sold for only 356 locations where machines are located, altho 578 machines have been licensed since the ordinance went into effect last July 31. If machines were permitted to be located in taverns, and other locations where the public can buy cigarettes, sponsors of the ordinance said the annual revenue would exceed \$300,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Wanna look into the future—10 years from now? Dr. Grover W. Ensley, staff director of the Joint Congressional Committee on the Economic Report told a group here that gross national product may hit a figure higher than a half trillion dollars \$535 Billions) by 1965. During the 12 years between 1953 and 1965, Dr. Ensley suggested the probability of: * An increase of one-fifth in population. * A reduction of the average annual hours of work of nearly 10 per cent. * An increase in the total national product of nearly 50 per cent in constant prices. * A rise in real disposal income per capita of nearly 30 per cent.

NEW YORK—This is surprising news. The statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, here, say that a study of 19 countries shows that, altho the United States has one of the best mortality records for children, its position becomes less and less favorable with advance in age. At ages 55 to 59 only three of the countries have higher death rate among males than the U.S. One suggested possibility is that our standing at the older ages is related to the high proportion of overweight people in our population.

But, as far as there being locations around, there are more locations than ever before.

Back in 1939 it was estimated that there were about 2,000,000 retail locations in the nation.

This year of 1954 the estimate by Dun & Bradstreet runs to 4,200,000.

Every day, everywhere in the nation, more are going into business than are going out of business.

With the tremendous highway building program that is under way in almost everyone of the 48 states, more and still more business enterprises are coming into being.

The new roads create entire new communities. And these new roads stretch from coast to coast and from border to border.

Once again the problem resolves itself down to what has been printed here time and again. That what the industry needs is new and entirely different type equipment, at a price.

This would allow the nation's operators to spread their operations further than they are spread at the present time, and collect but once or twice per month, until the locations so develop that more constant coverage becomes necessary.

The only product known to have covered more locations than any and all others combined was the salesboard of yesteryear.

Some day, it is hoped, someone will come along with an idea that will be able to cover as many locations as did the salesboards in their heyday.

In the meantime, there remains a tremendous percentage of the nation's locations available for all types of products manufactured and sold by the industry.

Constant research will probably bring new products to the fore which will, in due time, cover more locations than the small percentage of the 4,200,000 locations now being covered by the industry.

This will bring about the biggest boom the industry has ever known—when these new products become fact.




