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

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
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

B "DROP ME A LINE" (2:29) [Jay & Cee BMI—Johnson, John-son] A sensational and super-commer-cial new piece of material is beauti-fully handled by Bonnie Lou. Song is one of the best to come along in quite a while and could make Bonnie a. big star. An all-around top grade waxing.

• "OLD FAITHFUL AND TRUE LOVE" (2:19) [Jay & Cee MBI-Singleton, McCoy] A catchy rock 'n' roller is cleverly handled by the thrush and a vocal group. Inviting deck deck.

# AL HIBBLER (Original 1008; 45-1008)

B "AUTUMN WINDS" (2:30) [Challenge BMI-Gewirtz] Orig-inal issues a new platter waxed by one of the nation's hottest artists. And it's a beautiful piece of romantic material. Great delivery. Dramatic.

G "YOU WILL BE MINE" (2:25) [Sylvia MBI—Sears] A beaty number treated in a rhythm and blues fashion is belted across here. Two sides have a load of echo effects.

### SUE ALLEN (Key 504; 45-504)

•"I'VE NEVER BEEN TO ST. LOUIE" (2:33) [HR ASCAP— Fell, Hillbrook] A stirring piece of blues material is emotionally treated by the moving voice of Sue Allen. Good number.

COFFEE BREAK" (2:18 [HR ASCAP—Hillbrook, Fell] A cute bouncey ditty is pertly styled on this end. Lively, commercial stuff.

### THE VARIETEERS (Hickory 1025; 45-1025)

'MINNIE, COME HOME" (2:16) B "MINNIE, COME HOME" (2:16) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Sweeney] A contagious novelty is given a commer-cial reading by the Varieteers. Boys blend attractively. Number jumps.

CALL MY GAL, MISS JONES" (2:37) [Acuff-Rose BMI— Sweeney] A fascinating delivery of a broken-hearted item is dished up here. Where they slow up and talk, the results are effective. Different.

# THE TOP-NOTCHERS (Town and Country 1004; 45-1004)

G. Jenkins ASCAP—Jenkins] Gordon Jenkins and the ork glide through one of the batoneer's own compositions. Good only for special locations. Imaginative work.

C "LAST LOVE" (2:47) [Leo Feist ASCAP—Fisher, Jenkins] This side is a more commercial piece of mood material. A chorus and Bob Grabeau take over in the vocal dept.

### **TOMMY EDWARDS** (MGM 11993; K-11993)

B "WELCOME TO MY HEART" (2:43) [Lowell BMI—Soloway, Wolfe] The touching and dreamy voice of Tommy Edwards is in top form on this well written love song. Lovely deck that could click with suffi-cient exposure.

G "SPRING NEVER CAME AROUND THIS YEAR" (2:48) [Famous ASCAP—Martita, David] Another pretty piece of love material treated with a great deal of feeling. Tommy has an infectious voice that sells a ballad.

## JOHNNY CONQUET & ORCH. (Rainbow 292; 45-292)

**C** "TAKING A CHANCE ON LOVE" [Miller ASCAP—La-Touche, Fetter, Duke] The nimble fingers of Johnny Conquet dish up a rhythmic piano arrangement of an oldie set to a cha-cha beat. Cute side that the dancers will like.

G "JUMPIN' MERENGUE" [-Gonzales] The merengue, the latest dance craze, is on this half. Johnny's keyboard work again takes front and center. Rhythm section rounds out the deck.

# PAULETTE GIRARD (Chateau 501; 45-501)


Ge "BON BON BON" [Coliseum BMI—Darwin, Girard, Mathews] Paulette Girard is surrounded by a bunch of youngsters as she chirps a light and lively French novelty. At-tractive ditty tractive ditty.

**G** "THAT'S PARIS" [Coliseum BMI — Darwin, Mathews] The children's voices add appeal to this flighty French waltz number. Multiple voices blend invitingly.

# ELISE RHODES (Bald Eagle 1001; 45-1001)

B "I WAITED IN THE RAIN" [-Klanosky] Thunder and light-ning supply the atmosphere for Elise Rhodes' stirring interpretation of a beautiful love song. Thrush has a won-derful voice and a good vehicle in this side. With work, this side could stir up noise. Latin beat.

• "SWEET KISSES AND SALTY TEARS" [-Klenosky] Another pretty romantic offering by the sweet voiced songstress. Tune has an up beat and an inviting melody.



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### COMMODORES (Dot 15372; 45-15372)

"RIDING ON A TRAIN" [Gallatin BMI—Glenn, Montgomery] A new group called the Commodores comes over well on its first Dot release. Tune is a beaty item that should do well in the R & B field too. Solid arrangement.

Genn] This exciting side oughta appeal to the rhythm and blues market more than to the pop. It's a jumping piece with a load of sax work.

## THE CHEERS (Capitol 3146; F-3146)

Ge "I MUST BE DREAMING" (2:19) [Quintet BMI—Leiber, Stoller] The Cheers, who clicked with "Bazoom," dish up another wild and wooly novelty that could break. Has a rock 'n roll beat.

**G** "FANCY MEETING YOU HERE" (2:53) [Quintet BMI— Leiber, Stoller] The group changes the pace and glides through a tender romantic ballad. Appealing piece of material that'll need plenty of play to get started.

## DICK HYMAN TRIO (MGM 12005; K-12005)

B "THE VERY THOUGHT OF YOU" (2:20) [Witmark ASCAP-Noble] The Dick Hyman Trio, one of the most refreshing small groups around today, displays its wares on a wonderful oldie. Fine rhythmic interpretation.

(C) "WHEN DAY IS DONE" (2:35) [Harms ASCAP—Katcher, De-Sylva] Another evergreen is similarly handled on this end. Dick has a great touch at the keyboard. Inviting listening.

# CONNIE FRANCIS (MGM 12015; K-12015)

"FREDDY" (2:37) [Duchess BMI —Pan, Kirk, Harnick] Connie Francis makes an exciting MGM debut with a colorful novelty treatment of a cute tango item. Thrush has a pert, refreshing voice. Good deck.

"DIDN'T I LOVE YOU ENOUGH" (2:18) [Leeds ASCAP —Mann, Lewis] Glenn Osser's ork supplies a production backing for Connie's belted delivery of a love song.


JANET BRACE (Decca 29531; 9-29531)

B "IF YOU KNEW" (2:36) [Goday BMI—Ingham] Jack Pleis sets up a subtle backdrop for Janet Brace's soft thrushing of an appealing romantic rhythmer. Inviting deck that could make noise.

B "THAT'S THE WAY IT IS" (2:40) [Northern ASCAP—Whitney, Kramer] The dreamy quality of the thrush's voice is most effective on this tender piece of love stuff. Strong two-sider.

• An Italian piece of material called "Eh Cumpari", made a major recording star of Julius La-Rosa, and two new Italian tunes will keep him up atop the hit paraders. One half is a delightful and humorous bouncer dubbed "Mama Rosa". It's a zany ditty loaded with gimmicks — tonguetwisting lyrics, the tweet of the friscalletu and a clever orchestral backing. A smash if we've ever heard one. The coupling is a beautiful Italian ballad tagged "Domani". It's a thrilling love song that has a charm all its own. It's a side that'll take time to build, but when it hits, watch out. Definitely a twinthreat.





THE HILLTOPPERS The Hilltoppers, currently on the charts with their rendition of "The Door Is Still Open", take hold of a powerful new piece of tune stuff for their latest release, a song that looms as a big hit for the coming months. It's the dramatic title tune from the Hecht-Lancaster film "The Kentuckian". The song has a stirring melody with an exciting cowboy feeling. Jimmy Sacca is in top form in the lead position. A grade "A" performance. The lower lid, "I Must Be Dreaming" is a fast moving handclapper with a rock 'n roll flair.



SAMMY DAVIS, JR. • Sammy Davis will always have a hit record, because each piece of wax he makes carries all the sparkling personality that he projects on stage. He's currently riding high with a hot two-sider in "Love Me Or Leave Me" and "Something's Gotta Give", and now he offers a unique presentation of the oldie "That Old Black Magic". It's an experience. Words can't describe the fantastic gimmicks that Sammy uses on this platter. You've just gotta hear it for yourself. Flip is a warm and meaningful version of the ballad "A Man With A Dream" from the B'way musical, "Seventh Heaven".



SAMMY KAYE • Crazy Otto not only revived the cornball piano technique, but he also brought back gang singing. And with the return of the gang shout, the banjo was also reborn. "Hey Mr Banjo" hit and now "Alabama Jubilee" is clicking. On this platter, Sammy Kaye's ork and Glee Club swing into the trend with a raucous and exciting novelty dubbed "The Banjo's Back In Town." The deck is just loaded with life and has a catchy set of lyrics. Plenty of banjos and loads of voices. A hit. Bottom is a slow waltzer, "Joe Joe Joe."

# THE CUES (Jubilee 5201; 45-5201)

B "ONLY YOU" (2:41) [Lowell BMI—Kreigsmann, Stanton] The Cues, a wonderful new group, debut on Jubilee with a stirring, dramatic reading of a strong new tune. This version could push the song up the ladder. Pretty.

• "I FELL FOR YOUR LOVING" (2:55) [Lowell BMI—Jones] Here the boys show their versatility as they glide through a hot rock and roll novelty. Good coupling for the jukes.

MIKE PEDICIN QUINTET (RCA Victor 20-6150; 47-6150)

(2:23) (Planetary BMI—Wolfson, White] Mike Pedicin and his boys come up with a jazzed up vocal and instrumental treatment of the "Barcarolle." Good dance deck. Has a Haley drive.

**•** "FE-FI-FO-FUM" (2:08) [Rhyme & Rhythm ASCAP—Reichner] A rockin', peppy arrangement of a zany, lively novelty makes this a good twosider. The teen-agers will go for both halves.

### BILL CAREY (Coral 61429; 9-61429)

B "HEAVENLY LOVER" (2:46) [Oxford ASCAP — Springer, Wayne] The round voice of Bill Carey is intriguing on this stirring romantic item. A stylish performance with a good choral backdrop. Has hit possibilities.

G "MY FATE IS IN YOUR HANDS" (2:40) [Joy ASCAP— Waller, Razaf] The crooner does a smooth job on this ballad. Ok deck.

FIREHOUSE FIVE PLUS TWO (Good Time Jazz 90; 45-90)

B "ALABAMA JUBILEE" [--Cobb, Yellen] As the trend toward big, wild and wooly instrumentals and vocals swings into high gear, the Firehouse Five comes up with a houserocking rendition of a tune that's breaking big. Crazy job that'll get loads of spins. Potent deck.

G "TUCK ME TO SLEEP IN MY OLD KENTUCKY HOME" [-Meyer, Lewis, Young] The jazz men offer another exciting Dixie version of a cute novelty. The vocal is lively and inviting. Good for community singing.

# EDDIE HEYWOOD (Mercury 70645; 70645x45)

B "LAND OF DREAMS" (2:28) [Meridian BMI—Heywood, Gimbel] Eddie Heywood, who made a load of noise with his piano version of this same tune a few months ago, gets a choral assist on this interpretation. The other presentation was instrumental. This one has lyrics. Could catch on again.

G "SUMMER HOLIDAY" (2:22) [Meridian BMI — Heywood] The pianist demonstrates more of his keyboard skills as he glides through an up-tempo pleaser. Instrumental accompaniment rounds out the deck.

(2:38) [Dandelion BMI—Chorney, Shrager, Shrager] This end is a clever jumper with plenty of beat. A catchy ditty that'll get plenty of air play. Driving deck.

# STEVE ALLEN (Coral 61445; 9-61445)

B "GOO-GOO DOLL" (1:58) [Rosemeadow ASCAP—Wolf, David, Carr] A catchy novelty inspired by the cute sound of the goo goo doll is happily treated to a bounce beat by Steve Allen. The doll is a big thing with the "Tonight" TV audience and its popularity could start the disk on the right track.

Ge "OLD BETSY" (2:47) [Wonderland BMI—Bruns, George] Steve sings the song that's a tribute to Davy Crockett's trusty gun. Ok novelty.

# MANTOVANI ORCH. (London 1547; 45-1547)

**B** "MA CHERE AMIE" (2:43) [Burlington ASCAP—Berman, Kahn, May] The superlush string section of Mantovani's orchestra wends its way through a beautiful waltz instrumental. Lovely theme.

Get "AMOREUSE" (2:47) [Free-Berger, Mech] Another delightful ballad tenderly treated by the strings.

# DAY, DAWN & DUSK (Apollo 476; 45-476)

**B** "MISS PETUNIA" (2:20) [Bess BMI—Tennyson, LaVerne] An exciting rock 'n roll novelty is colorfully handled by Day, Dawn and Dusk with Charlie LaVerne and his Quintars in the backdrop. Real powerhouse of a jumper that could catch big.

• "LET THE TEARS FALL" (2:25) [ASCAP—Tennyson, LaVerne] A Les Paul type backing enhances the beauty of the group's presentation of this shuffle beat romancer. Pretty harmony.

# GENE JIMAE (Genie 1301; 45-1301)

# EDDIE BALLANTINE (Wing 90001); 45-90001)



G: "BANJO BLUES" [Brandom ASCAP] The string star and a chorus dish up another cute bouncey novelty. Happy side.



Miss Ponselle, however, in her choice of pieces with which the public is not too familiar, and singing with only piano accompaniment, makes this release an item limited in sales potential. Miss Ponselle sings three numbers in English, of which two are well known to the public—"Drink to Me Only with Thine Eyes" and "Homing." The necessity of bringing recording equip-ment to Miss Ponselle's home near Baltimore, perhaps explains some of the thin snots thin spots.

ADAM: "GISELLE"-Capitol Records P-8306 (1-12" LP)

Anatole Fistoulari conducting The London Symphony Orchestra Anatole Fis-toulari conducts a light, bright and spright ballet that is melody filled. The London Symphony Orchestra is gay, martial, haunting and frenzied in turn. Ballet collectors and light music lovers will find the story of the ill fated lovers—the prince, the peasant rival and the pretty commoner, Giselle—a delightful bit of fantasy. Light summer fare both for listening and relaxing music music.

TCHAIKOVSKY—"Souvenir de Florence, Op. 70"—The Arthur Winogrod String Orchestra—MGM Records E-3173 (1-12" LP) One of Tchaikovsky's seldom recorded works, the "Souvenir de Florence," is given an intimate treatment by the Arthur Winogrod String Orchestra. Though Winogrod uses an orchestra, he maintains the "chamber" sound by using an all string combination. As is usual in most Tchaikovsky words, the "Souvenir" is heavenly laden with melody and might serve to introduce chamber music to the yet initiated. Limited market and will be sold basically on the strength of the composer.

"OFFENBACHIANA" — Offenbach/Rosenthal — Remington (1-12" LP) R-199-183

(1-12" LF) Remington has a valuable piece of property in the newest Manuel Rosenthal release, "Offenbachiana." Rosenthal, perhaps best known for his adaptation of "Gaiete Parisienne" stays in the same vein with an adaptation and orches-tration of excerpts from several Offenbach operettas, "Le Pont des Soupirs," "Barbe-Bleue," "La Vie Parisienne," "La Grande Duchesse de Gerolstein," "Vert-Vert," "Madame Favart," "La Fille du Tambour Major." The result. a symphonic suite, is easily identifiable Offenbach. The suite contains the dash, spirit and gayety of the famous French composer. Rosenthal should enhance his reputation with the release of this suite and Remington should sell a raft of records. of records.

Bellson injects a large amount of color with a pair of Latin tunes, Festival and Mambo A La Louis Bellson, by the addition of conga drums, bongos and steel bands. The fluid and ever fascinating Charlie Shavers horn takes off for some solid solos, to add to the overall effect of the album. Bellson fans will like it.

George Paxton of Paxton Music stated that he has no replacement in mind at the moment, but several moves for expansion are currently under consideration.




# **Davy Crockett Speaks**



# Marek Sees Hi-Fi For Pop Record Buyers

NEW YORK — America's millions of popular music fans will account for a majority of the sales of assembled home high fidelity instruments in the next few years.

This prediction was made last week by George R. Marek, Manager, Artists and Repertoire Department, RCA Victor Record Division, at a press luncheon at the Barbizon-Plaza Hotel marking the introduction of RCA Victor's New Orthophonic High Fidelity "Victrola" line.

"One of the popular misconceptions about high fidelity is that it is primarily for classical music," Marek explained. This is definitely not true. Eddie Fisher, The Three Suns, or any of the other 'pop' music artists sound just as thrilling in high fidelity as does a Beethoven piano concerto or a Brahms symphony.

"High fidelity is especially exciting for lovers of jazz as it brings out a new concept of quality in high and low tones. Even those interested in country-style music will be amazed at what high fidelity does to the reproduction of string instruments."

Marek pointed out that true high fidelity is a combination of recent advances made in the fields of sound recording and reproduction. He said a majority of the records—both popular and classical—being made today are made with new high fidelity techniques.

"However, the true quality that we have been able to produce in these new records is partially diminished if they are not played on a high fidelity player that can take out of a record everything that was put in at the recording studio," he said.

Another misconception on high fidelity—that it is too technical to be operated by the average music lover—was discussed at the luncheon by J. L. Franke, Chief Engineer, RCA Victor Radio and "Victrola" Division.

"Despite the fact that the workings of high fidelity record players may seem mysteriously technical to the ordinary music lover, a homemaker doesn't need to fear that hi-fi will turn her living-room into a facsimile of an electronic laboratory," Franke said.

Home instruments now being mass produced, he explained, are enclosed in attractive table model and console cabinets which, in the case of the new RCA Victor New Orthophonic high fidelity models, are available in a variety of attractive wood finishes of modern and traditional designs.

"These instruments are carefully 'laboratory - balanced' by highlytrained engineers before they leave the factory," he said. "Each component must be in complete balance with every other part to achieve true quality of high fidelity."

The new RCA Victor line includes a twin-cabinet model, The Mark I, with four speakers, a record changer, high fidelity tape recorder and AM-FM radio. It has a nationally advertised list price of \$1,600. Other models start at \$129.95.
