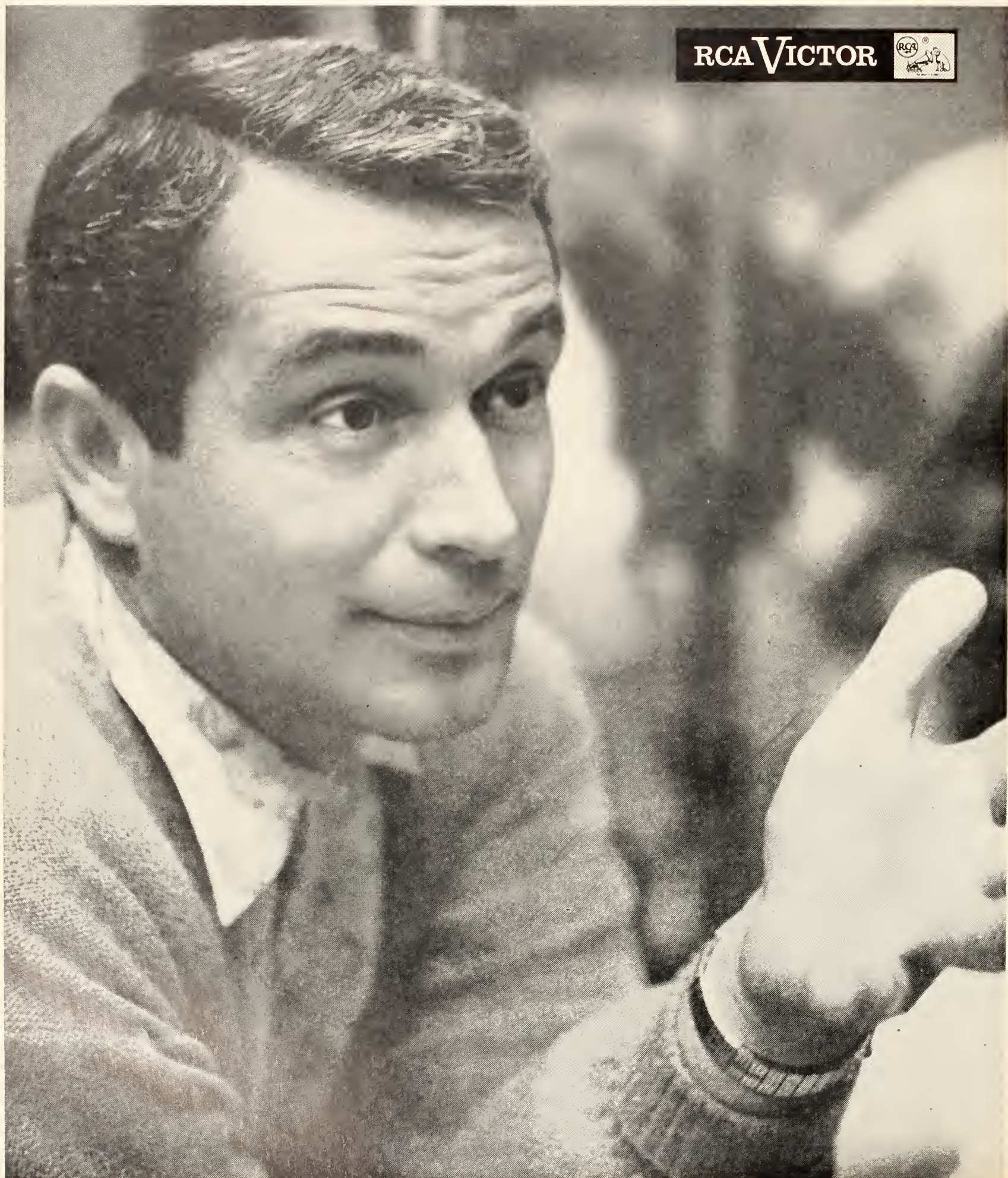

The Cash Box

HITS FROM HOLLYWOOD

For the first time in the history of *The Cash Box* charts, five out of the top six tunes come from the movies. They are "Rock Around The Clock" from "The Blackboard Jungle"; "Unchained Melody" from "Unchained"; "Cherry Pink And Apple Blossom White" from "Underwater"; "Something's Gotta Give" from "Daddy Long Legs"; and "Honey Babe" from "Battle Cry".

This amazing showing is the culmination of a movement which received renewed impetus when it was generally conceded that the motion picture and the record "Three Coins In The Fountain" had a mutually beneficial effect upon each other. Since then there have been special efforts made to tie in a song with a picture and vice versa. The results are now evident from the charts.

In the last year or two a new recognition has developed between movies and the record industry. It has been obvious that instead of working exclusively of each other as had been the case, cooperation could create greater returns for each. As a matter of fact this movement has gone so far that at times a song is literally dragged into a movie where it might even be out of place.

But in general this new concept of theme music has had beneficial results. What greater promotion can there be for a picture than to have its theme song being played on juke boxes and on the air all day long? And what

greater promotion for a record than to see and hear it in a picture that you've enjoyed.

Actually with many movie songs it's possible to trace their rise in popularity with the distribution of the film across the country. It's been made clear, with such songs as "Honey Babe" for instance, that as a film leaves the main cities and reaches the neighborhood areas, record sales of the song in that picture grow greater.

Therefore publishers who have movie songs have to deal somewhat differently with their product than has been the custom recently. In the past several years, everything depended upon a record as far as the publisher was concerned. If a record didn't make any noise within a couple of weeks—or a month at the most—the publisher would forget about it and go onto the next record. With our new movie situation however, that's impossible, for a record might make no noise at all while a picture is playing Broadway and might still blossom out when it reached the neighborhood houses.

The emphasis on movie tunes is bound to bring about still further changes in the creation of hit songs. But as far as we're concerned that's fine. For every way we can discover to create hits is another stimulant for the record and music businesses. And every stimulant means greater activity and greater profits.

B "THE HOUSE OF BLUE LIGHTS," (2:05) [Robbins ASCAP—Raye, Slack] The sultry voice of Pat Morrissey comes over with oomph as the thrush belts out an exciting jump version of a hot tune that's making big noise out west. Tune is heading up there. This version should share in the final take.

B+ "MIDNIGHT SUN" (3:04) [Crystal ASCAP—Burke, Hampton, Mercer] A side that the thrush issued on one of her previous releases, is used again as the coupling here. Top notch reading of a great standard.

B "THEME FROM FEMALE ON THE BEACH" (2:18) [Northern ASCAP—Burke] Harmonica virtuoso, Leo Diamond is supported by a lush Henri Rene backing as he wends his way through a beautiful theme from a forthcoming pic. Lovely.

C+ "DESTINY" (2:53) [Boston ASCAP—Baynes, Eardley, Wilmot] A delightfully tender waltz is the material on this end. Easy on the ears mood music.

B "MAY I NEVER LOVE AGAIN" (3:00) [Broadcast BMI—Marco, Erickson] Billy Ward's Dominoes dish up a dramatic vocal interpretation of a beautiful and stirring new ballad. Lead voice is great. Good pop and R & B fare.

B "LEARNIN' THE BLUES" (2:23) [Barton ASCAP—Sillers] The crew hands in an exciting rhythm version of one of the nation's top tunes. Terrific arrangement that'll get plenty of spins. Lead comes over superbly.

The other end is a tune tagged "Where Is That Someone", from the musical "Seventh Heaven". A penetrating, star-dusted love song. Watch 'em.

BUNNY PAUL

C+ "SONG OF THE DREAMER" (2:08) [Ludlow BMI—Curtis] A big rhythm and blues tune that seems headed for pop success, is interpreted with sincerity and warmth by Bunny Paul. Pretty tune.

C+ "FOR THE VERY FIRST TIME" (2:38) [Berlin ASCAP—Berlin] A great Irving Berlin standard is intimately woven on this end. Velvety side.

THREE CHUCKLES

("X" 0150; 4X-0150)

B+ "BLUE LOVER" (2:37) [Regent BMI—Colacrai] The Three Chuckles blend warmly on this pretty, new, sentimental love song. Tune was penned by Cirino Colacrai who wrote "Foolishly" and "Runaround". Tender love song. Could make the grade.

B "REALIZE" (2:37) [MPHC ASCAP—Hilliard, Wood] Another pretty ballad set to a similar shuffle beat is rendered on this end. Good coupling for the young lovers.

B+ "THE GIRL UPSTAIRS" [Robbins ASCAP—] The beautiful theme melody from the Marilyn Monroe pic "The Girl Upstairs", is lush and melodically presented by David Carroll's ork and a chorus. Sax solo plays important role. Pretty stuff.

C+ "YOU'RE HERE MY LOVE" [Famous ASCAP—] A string filled piece of mood music opens this side. At mid point, a warm male voice takes on the vocal chorus. Inviting deck.

(Avis 114; 45-114)

C+ "DON'T FLIRT WITH ANYONE ELSE" (2:34) [Sage & Sand BMI—School] A love song with a beat is waxed by Diane Richards. Red Reese's ork assists.

C "VAIN" (2:45) [Sage & Sand BMI—Wilson] A sentimental two step is thrashed on this end. Pleasing ballad.

DUKE JENKINS ORCH. & JO-JO SPOONS
(Pennant 331; 45-331)

C+ "MAMBO BLUES" [BMI—Jenkins, Greer] A mambo with a rock and roll beat is belted across by Jo-Jo Spoons and the Duke Jenkins Orch. Rhythmic side that moves from start to finish.

C+ "SAD AGAIN" (2:50) [BMI—Jenkins, Greer] Spoons ambles along warmly on this end and croons a pretty ballad. Backdrop is simple and inviting.

WERNER MULLER ORCH.

B+ "LA CUMPARSITA" [P. D. —Rodriguez] The fabulous Werner Muller Orchestra, the crew that's been supplying the amazing backdrops for Caterina Valente's recordings, takes a solo run on this platter and comes up with a lush and beautiful instrumental rendition of one of the most beautiful of all tangos. European waxing has a great sound. Should make big noise.

C+ "TANGO DESIRE" [Kassner ASCAP—Niessen, Cassen] Another exciting tango instrumental. Should come over beautifully on a Hi-Fi set.

B+ "BANJO WOOGIE" [Mills ASCAP—Malkin, Paul, Morgan] The Sunnysiders, who skyrocketed to national prominence with "Hey, Mr. Banjo", dish across a boogie woogie arrangement of a banjo tune. An exciting side with a load of punch. Should be a big seller.

C+ "I JUST WANNA BE BY YOU" [—Jay] Another colorful gang-sing type cornball novelty. Has that happy 20's sound. Cute tune. Banjo used here too.

ARLYNE TYE

C+ "TALKIN', TALKIN', TALKIN'" [Mellin BMI—White, Connolly, Mellin] Arlyne Tye's voice is wistful and smooth on this agreeable lilting love song. Pretty bit of piping.

In the country field, records riding high are: Red and Betty Foley's "Satisfied Mind"; Webb Pierce's "I Don't Care" and "In The Jailhouse Now"; Kitty Wells' "Making Believe," "Whose Shoulder Will You Cry On" and "Make Believe" and Ernest Tubb's "Have You Seen."

In the packaged goods field, Haley's "Shake, Rattle & Roll"; "Starring Sammy Davis Jr.," "Crazy Otto"; "Mood For Love" by the Four Aces; "Lady And The Tramp" by Peggy Lee; Jack Pleis' "Music from 'Disneyland'"; Lenny Dee's "Dee-Lightful" and Wayne King's "Melodies Of Love" all played a big part in the June sales figure.

Progressive & Roosevelt Share "Razzle Dazzle"

NEW YORK—An agreement was reached this week between the Progressive Music and Roosevelt Music Publishing Companies under which ownership of the song "Razzle Dazzle" now resides in both companies.

Both Progressive and Roosevelt share in all facets of the song including the copyright.

"Razzle Dazzle," written by Charles Calhoun, has been recorded by Bill Haley for Decca, and currently bids to be another important disk entry for Haley.

Notification of the co-ownership has been made to Harry Fox and BMI, and the sheet music bears the joint imprint of both publishers.

Mellin Music is acting as sole selling agent for the sheet music for U.S. and Canada.

Columbia Announces New Price Schedule

NEW YORK—A new simplified price schedule on Columbia long playing records has been announced by Hal B. Cook, Director of Sales for the company. It became effective July 5.

With the exception of a small special list, all Columbia Masterworks 12-inch long playing records now have the suggested retail list price of \$4.98 per disk. The special list includes records with suggested retail prices ranging from \$5.95 to \$100, representing special productions and packages.

All records in the \$4.98 series will now be packaged in an inner protective sleeve, while many of the covers will be newly designed and laminated. A further innovation for Columbia Masterworks releases will be a "factory fresh" seal and treatment for each new record shipped.

At the same time, fifty of the best-selling Columbia Masterworks 12-inch "Lp" records of lighter classical works are being transferred to the company's CL-500 series, a Popular catalog with disks retailing at the suggested price of \$3.95. Included in this new addition to the CL-500 series are all of the Andre Kostelanetz releases. All these selections will be packaged in newly-designed laminated jackets with inner protective sleeves.

To aid dealers and distributors in inventory control and to provide instant price information, Columbia will begin immediately to ship all "Lp" records with stickers which show selection number and suggested retail price.

Columbia's new price policy, Cook pointed out, is based on intensive study of dealers' pricing problems in the past six months. He estimated that on the effective date of the price change, almost 500 Columbia "Lp" records will increase in price, with a resulting estimated increase in value of dealer inventories of four per cent on an across-the-board basis.

Each dee jay contacted will receive a golden pass to the Warwick cinematic, "Prize of Gold" and will have a quick portrait of himself done by Starr in a new art medium called, "Golden Touch on Charcoal."

Floyd Bittaker, Capitol Records' First Employee, Dies of Heart Attack

HOLLYWOOD—Floyd A. Bittaker, 57, Hollywood Manager of the International Department of Capitol Records, Inc. and that company's first employee, died of a heart attack in Munich, Germany, Saturday (July 2). Death came while Bittaker was on a six-week business trip of Europe with Sandor A. Porges, Director of Capitol's International Department.

Bittaker came to Capitol in April 1942 after nearly eight years with the Ray Thomas Company of Los Angeles, radio and record distributors, where he had been Sales Supervisor. When he joined Capitol, he was hired personally by Glenn A. Wallichs, President and co-founder of the company.

As Executive Vice-President in Charge of Sales and Distribution, Bittaker set up Capitol's distributing branch known as Capitol Records Distributing Corp. Primarily because of his organizational success with CRDC, Bittaker was assigned to head up the Hollywood office of the rapidly-expanding International Department in February 1954.

The deceased, born in Ohio, is survived by his wife, Pauline; two children, Marilyn, 16, and Bruce, 11, of North Hollywood, Calif.; his father, Henry Bittaker, and a sister, Mrs.

Evelyn Harper, both of San Diego, Calif. He was a member of Kiwanis International in Hollywood.

Great material for dancing because the music has a sharp and definite beat. The tempo of each of the numbers changes from slow to quick. For anyone who wants waltz music at its best, this is the album to get.

This solid MGM package features that "in between" Woody Herman the fabulous Mr. Herman during the transition era between his amazing "Second Herd" and the debut of his "Third Herd". It's an exciting album mixing some up-beat items with some slow stuff. Disk features a number of top Herman items fashioned with rhythm and thrills by the ace clarinetist. Album has that big band sound that Herman was noted for during the fabulous swing era and also contains some selections with progressive overtones. All these pieces were waxed in '51. We're still wild about Wood's theme "Blue Flame" and his "new" arrangement of "Golden Wedding". Both numbers bring back great memories. Should appeal to all Herman fans.

"The Sounds and Music of the RCA Electronic Music Synthesizer"—RCA Victor LM-1922 (12" LP)

Some months ago, the Radio Corporation of America announced the creation of a sound and music synthesizer, an electronic mechanism that can synthesize any sound. On this album, RCA Victor shows what the synthesizer can do. One side presents narrator John Preston with an explanation of the manner in which these sounds are produced. He discusses physical characteristics of musical sounds; synthesis by parts; and offers excerpts from musical selections; and all the sounds other than the narrator's voice are produced by the synthesizer. The second side unites the different sounds on seven instrumental type selections. It's a most interesting recording that should appeal to all who are involved in reproduction of sound, and should have a great appeal to the curious. Although the sounds produced by the mechanism have a great similarity to various instruments, no sound is exactly like that of any instrument—at least not to this reviewer's ear. It's another electronic advancement by RCA.

WANDA LANDOWSKA—BACH "THE WELL TEMPERED CLAVIER (COMPLETE)" RCA Victor LM 6800 (6-12" LP's)

A special complete collection of Bach's 48 Preludes and Fugues. It is done up in a hard wood binding covered with black silk and contains Wanda Landowska's personal notes and autograph. Victor has been releasing these as singles since 1949 and when one thinks of The Well Tempered Clavier, one immediately also thinks of Wanda Landowska. The limited edition will sell to a select few collectors and libraries.

SCHUMANN "Sonata No. 1 in A Minor"
BRAHMS "Sonata No. 2 in A Major"—Mercury MG 80002—(1-12" LP)

RAFAEL DRUIAN, VIOLINIST. JOHN SIMMS, PIANIST.

Rafael Druian, who has been previously heard on many Mercury releases, is the star of this production and the artist bears up exceedingly well under the difficult twosome paired in the album. The soloist performs the Schumann and Brahms sonatas with a warmth and understanding. Both are seldom recorded

works and should please the limited market for which it is intended. With Druian on the piano is John Simms, who has been accompanying the violinist for the past five years.

MARJORIE LAWRENCE IN OPERA AND SONG—Camden CAL 216—(1-12" LP)

Camden digs into the vast RCA Victor vaults to come up with an album featuring Marjorie Lawrence. The album is intended to capitalize on the current flick, "Interrupted Melody", the true story of Miss Lawrence's tragic affliction. With the publicity that the famous singer is receiving and will receive in the coming months this could be a big Camden seller if the distrib is on his toes. Nothing can be found to fault the singing presented on this release. Miss Lawrence's is a great voice. An excellent offering at an economy price.

RAVEL—Epic LC 3123 (1-12" LP) Jean Doyen, piano, Jean Fournet conducting the Orchestre des Concerts Lamoureux

CONCERTO IN G MAJOR FOR PIANO AND ORCHESTRA.
LEFT HAND CONCERTO IN D MAJOR FOR PIANO AND ORCHESTRA.

Epic offers dealers a fine release and one not too often recorded by competitive companies. The pair, "Concerto in G Major" and "Left Hand Concerto", are two of Ravel's last works. Beauty abounds in the G-Major piano concerto, still retaining a fresh and modern sound, as though it had been written today. It is well performed by Jean Doyen at the piano with Jean Fournet conducting. The more difficult and more dramatic (historically) Left Hand Concerto is also ably presented. This piece, according to the oft repeated story, was written for Paul Wittgenstein, a famous Austrian pianist, who lost his right arm in World War One. Ravel was requested by Wittgenstein to compose a piece for him that he might play with his one remaining hand. It takes a pianist of exceptional skill and Doyen fills his part with excellent results.

The mood of the album is Billie Holiday, who served as Braff's inspiration in the selection of the tunes for the session. Braff, whose reputation has been on the ascension, sports a delightful and expert horn as he fronts a well integrated group of musicians. It is an intriguing, relaxed offering that swings. An extra bit of luster is added to the general effect thru the fine keyboard work of Ellis Larkins. We'll hear more from Braff.

CY COLEMAN TRIO "Piano Patterns"—Benida 1023A (1-10" LP)

Cy Coleman, a favorite on local scenes, etches, with his trio, a 10" LP that is an exhibition of his technical skills. Coleman combines a brilliant technique with warmth where it is called for and dash where it is needed. It is a tasty presentation of jazz with an individual styling and with a strong commercial appeal. It will provide many hours of listening pleasure.

For the fifth year in a row, Como is making this goodwill tour in which he actually won't be plugging any record but will be saying hello and thanks to disk jockeys, operators, one stops and distributors for all they've done in his behalf during the year.

Clef And Norgran Start Bonus Plan

HOLLYWOOD—Bernie Silverman, sales manager for Clef & Norgran Records, announced their new list prices and bonus plan for July last week.

The new price structure will set 12" LP's at \$3.98; 10" LP's at \$2.98 and EP's at \$1.49 with single 78's and 45's remaining the same at 98c & 89c. The percentage mark-up for dealers and distributors will remain the same with the exception of the EP's. With the new price of \$1.49 dealers will realize a profit of 42% instead of the former mark-up of only 38%.

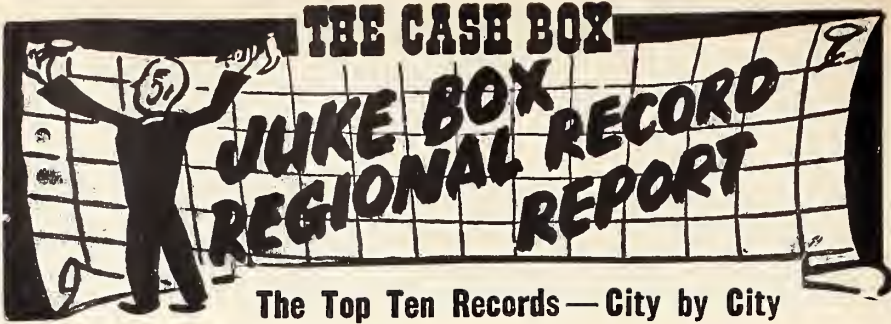
The new pact allows Georgia to retain the rights to package her own TV show and make any movie deals she sees fit.

Ramon Sabat, Panart Records Prexy, In N. Y. To Set-Up U. S. Mfr. of Catalog With Marlow Prod.

NEW YORK—Ramon S. Sabat, head of Panart Records of Cuba, arrived in New York last Tuesday to conclude arrangements for the pressing of the Panart catalogue in the United States.

The Panart catalogue, which has over 35 numbers on 10" LP's, several 12" Albums has been imported for the past few months by Marlow Productions Inc.

The Panart LP catalogue has three series, the 300, popular Cuban and Spanish music, with artists like the Orquesta America, the Conjunto Casino and many others, all of whom record exclusively for Panart; the 4000 series, a classical catalogue of Cuban composers and the works of the Havana Symphony Orchestra and the 3000 series, the 12" disks with heretofore unrecorded versions of Zarzuela excerpts.

With the production scheduled for early Fall, the Panart 78 and 45 disks will also be made available in the United States. Mr. Sabat has been visiting various distributors and disk jockeys to gather information which will make it possible for him to record special material for the American market using the same recording stars.

The special recordings will be for LP use only and will give the buyer the merengue, mambos, cha-cha-chas, boleros, pasodobles, tangos, etc.

Having just completed the building of a large and up to date recording studio in Latin America, it will make it possible to increase productions to two or three LP sessions per month, including the season's concerts of the Havan Philharmonic Orchestra.

Stan Steinhaus, head of Marlow Productions, sees the possibility of a price reduction across the board for the entire Panart catalogue, which has been selling for \$3.85 and \$4.98, to \$3.00 and \$3.98 for long playing albums and setting the 78/45 list at \$1.00. Pressing of the Panart catalogue will be done simultaneously on both the East and the West coast of the United States, with the west coast operation directed from New York. Distributors have already been contacted and given the information of the catalogue's availability and at this writing, New York, New Jersey and Maryland are covered.

The initial 78/45 RPM release will

bring about 15 of the top numbers of the catalogue to this market and from then on the Cuban and American releases will be at the same time.

Maltby On Monroe TV Show

NEW YORK—Richard Maltby, RCA Label "X" Recording Artist, has been signed as Musical Conductor on "The Vaughn Monroe Show," which debuts on July 19th over NBC-TV, it was announced last week.

Maltby has gained added popularity through his public appearances with his new orchestra recently, and has just completed engagements at the Totem Pole in Boston, and Hunt's Starlight Roof, in Wildwood, N. J. He will appear throughout Ohio and Pennsylvania early in July and return to New York for the Monroe show.

His current record of "Hightide Boogie," as well as his recent recordings of "Begin The Beguine March" and "St. Louis Blues Mambo" are still on "X"'s best-seller lists.

Here and There

NEW YORK—In an interview with the press recently, the president of one of our large coffee firms, was asked if coffee would ever go back to 5¢ per cup. His answer is of great interest to all music machine operators. "If coffee ever is sold at 5¢ a cup" he said, "we'll be in the midst of a devastating depression."

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Sinclair Weeks, Secretary of Commerce, declared this week, that the United States has entered the second half of 1955 with every prospect of achieving new production and sales records. He stated that surveys conducted by the twenty-five industry divisions that make up his department's Business and Defense Services Administration gives a uniformly optimistic picture of the months ahead. The surveys covered more than 400 manufacturing fields.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Top government economists said this week that the nation is likely to round the 1955 halfway turn at about a \$370 billion output clip, giving solid promise of the most prosperous year in U. S. history. The report stated that most of the pulse-points at which the experts check the economic heartbeat show a vigor rarely matched since business records have been kept. That's so with gross national product—the total value of goods and services—and the average weekly wages, total disposable income, total consumer spending and total savings.

LOS ANGELES—A slight increase in cigarette sales this year over the 1954 level was predicted this week by one of the executives of a major cigarette manufacturing firm. Sales in 1954 dropped 4.7 per cent from the 1953 total. This 1955 increase is attributed to the fact that the cigarette-scare broadcast so widely in 1954, attributing lung cancer to smoking cigarettes, is fading from the public's memory. Cigarette sales before World War II were accounted for in 90 per cent of distribution to 6 brands. Now there are from twenty to twenty-five brands, with filter-tip cigarettes accounting for something over 20 per cent of sales, and king-size cigarettes making up for some 27 per cent.

KIDDIE GAMES COMEBACK

Rides—Guns—Trains—Tractors— Revive Kiddie Play Action. Davy Crockett Yet to Come?

One very pleasing event of this past season was the introduction of a series of new kiddie games and their acceptance by the trade.

After the long sales slump in kiddie games of all kinds, few believed that acceptance would be anywhere near as good as it has since proved to be.

In the first place, and as was already known, by so many small manufacturers originally jumping into the kiddie ride field, the market became glutted with equipment of all kinds and prices not only reached a competitive stage but were, in many cases, ridiculous from the standpoint that few manufacturers could survive under such conditions.

The long experienced operator realized that like all other types of equipment, kiddie games, too, would eventually show wear and tear and parts would have to be replaced.

Unknown manufacturers jumping into the field just to cash in while the flush of sales was under way, were sure to fall by the wayside when the going got rough. That's just what happened.

Those operators who purchased the products of such manufacturers find they have no place to turn to for parts. The result is that their equipment is practically valueless.

Whereas the more experienced operator paid more, but continued to do business with the established manufacturers, his equipment is still being maintained for he still has a place to go to when he needs parts.

It was the older line manufacturer who realized of late, as the demand for more and more parts came into his factory that kiddie games were still in the field, regardless of the fact that they had tremendously slumped in sales due to the former overglutted market condition and, thru surveys and investigation, decided to start manufacturing again, but this time presenting entirely new types of kiddie games.

These new games, guns, rides, tractors, trains and others, are capturing play action from the kiddies.

It is also interesting to note that many who didn't care to enter the kiddie games field, when the first big boom occurred, are now in it and enjoying this new type business. These men explain that competition isn't as throat-cutting as it formerly was because fewer men are now in the field.

These few would much rather work together so that all could enjoy some returns on their investments, than fight each other, as happened when the first kiddie ride boom occurred, and all lose whatever they had invested.

Even those men who sold out their operations of kiddie rides are now back in the field. This time they have a better knowledge of how to operate the kiddie games. They know what locations will, and what locations won't, bring them a decent return on their investment.

With experienced men in the field and with much more fascinating equipment being manufactured it now appears that the kiddie games field is here to stay as a very definite and integral part of the coin machine business.

It is also interesting to note that there is no longer a glut of manufacturers in the field. Those few who are building the kiddie games are the old line, long experienced manufacturers who have the knowledge and the experience to assure purchasers of the finest construction and, what's even more important, their factories will be around to supply parts for a long, long time to come.

Of course no manufacturer as yet has come up with a Davy Crockett kiddie game. But the surety is that one or more will soon present one type of product or another to take advantage of this raccoon-cap craze among the kiddies. Whoever will be first will probably find himself a very busy man provided, of course, that his product is what the kids believe is Davy Crockett.

GENERAL BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN CANADA GREATLY IMPROVED

MONTREAL, CANADA—The Bank of Montreal Business Review for June reported an upswing in general business in Canada, saying that the signs of strengthening in Canadian economy that could be detected at the start of this year have been confirmed in recent months. "Export trade" the review stated, which rose sharply in the last quarter of 1954, continued to record substantial gains and in the first four months averaged more than 12 per cent above a year earlier. The predicted rise in construction activities appears to be in the process of fulfillment. And, in contrast to a year ago, the majority of manufacturers are once again building up their stocks of raw materials and enlarging their production schedules."

In addition, the Monthly Review of The Bank of Nova Scotia reported "The general pace of business activity in Canada has shown a distinct improvement during the past three months."

The Review points out that favorable Spring weather came quite early in most parts of the country, and that outdoor activity picked up much sooner than in 1954. At the same time, the Canadian bank survey states there has clearly been a significant revival of expansionary influences in the economy.

The total volume of industrial production, which contracted noticeably during the first eight or nine months of 1954, has been rising strongly in recent months and by May was at a new all-time high for that period of the year.

"There is little doubt" the Review observes, "that the main factor underlying the recent improvement in Canadian production income has been the general strengthening in the external economic environment, in particular the vigorous recovery in United States business."

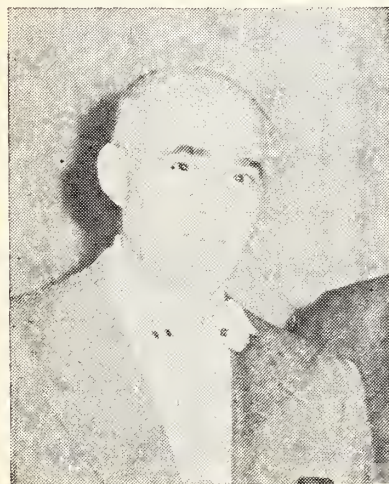

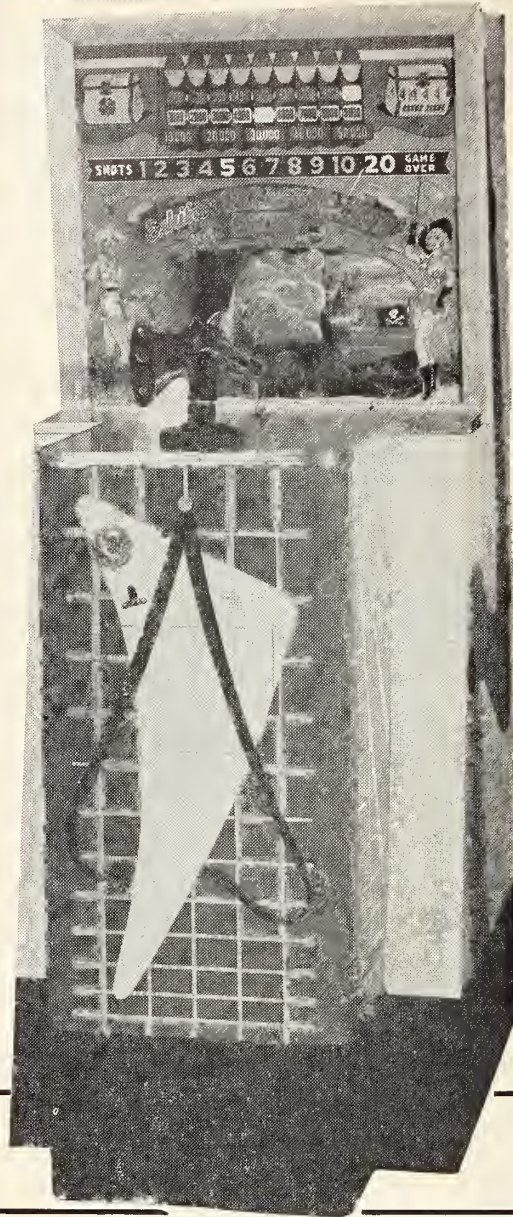



Coin Machines In Australia

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA—This once lucrative export market for American coin machines has been practically closed to imports of these machines since World War II.

Import restrictions and high customs duties have made it necessary for Australian coinmen to produce their own machines. They are now manufacturing a variety of vendors, with the exception of cigarette machines, which are not in use here.

It is reported that four firms are manufacturing music machines, ranging from 12 to 50 selections. All machines use 78 rpm records. Amusement machines, which would constitute the largest import market, brought in under quota restrictions, are only a minute proportion of what is needed. Very few machines are manufactured here.

Certain types of gaming machines are manufactured locally, but are limited in operation as each of the five States have different laws as to what can or cannot be operated.

MESA, ARIZ.—"Music Accounts for 50 Per Cent Sales Gain in Supermarket" is the report of the president of the Nasser Supermarket, this city, to the General Electric Company, who manufacture the equipment used.
