



And this year was great.

The record business is truly one of the fastest expanding businesses in the country today with a future that is in a very real sense limitless. No one can even guess how far sales may expand in the coming years. For so much depends upon population figures, the state of the economy and the emotional factors which sometimes determine record sales.

But we can guess about the coming year. And that should be considerably better than 1955.

In the decade since the war ended, the record business has grown to full stature in the entertainment field. It is no longer considered a minor offshoot. It is a solid, legitimate area of entertainment. Record stars make their way into all other fields, draw thousands and thousands of customers, sell millions of records and earn incomes that are not only comparable to those in other entertainment endeavors, but very often far surpass them.

Moreover, the record industry has found areas of sales which nutil recently had never been explored.

Next year should be even better For instance the jazz market today is the sole support of several companies who are doing extremely well —to put it mildly. The kiddie market is booming, hitting the kids who were born since the war and who are just now ready to appreciate music. And the potential of this market, when it reaches teenage, should be overwhelming.

> Meanwhile, the integration of rhythm and blues music into the pop field, has brought on a revitalization of the pop market. It has created excitement where it was badly needed and has brought customers into the stores for one hit after another. Probably the great story of the record business in the past year was the appreciation of rhythm and blues by the kids of the nation. Just as swing took over the country in the 1930's and created a whole new era of music as well as a host of new stars, so has rock and roll stimulated the imagination of children today with results that will probably be the same—new stars, new music, new vitality for the entire record business.

Boston Mayor Honors Symphony On Its 75th Anniversary

BOSTON, MASS. spicuous contribution in spreading the fame of Boston throughout the world as a center of culture and the arts," Mayor John B. Hynes last week cited the Boston Symphony Orchestra and its conductor, Charles Munch, in special exercises at the Boston Club commemorating the Orchestra's seventy-fifth anniversary.

At the same time, George Marek, of New York, RCA-Victor official, presented Munch with a new \$1600 RCA Victor high fidelity record player to mark the long-time association of his company with the Boston Symphony. Marek paid tribute to Munch for the "prestige the Orchestra's recorded works have given the entire recorded."

"For three-quarters of a century the Boston Symphony has been a symbol of Boston's rre-em'nence in culture and the fine arts," the Mayor's citation read. "Its interpretation of the world's greatest compositions has been acclaimed at home and abroad by countless thousands of music lovers through RCA Victor records.

"Through performances on the concert stage and on records, the lives of people in Boston and throughout the world have been immeasurably enriched." the citation continued. "Its unparalleled musical ability has reflected great credit on the City of Boston and has enhanced the reputation of this City throughout the musical world."

Marek revealed that there is a greater demand the result for the citation continued."

Marek revealed that there is a greater demand than ever before for the recordings of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. He attributed this to "the great virtuosity" of Conductor Munch, to the development of im-

proved recording techniques and to the growing popularity of high-fidelity record players for the home.

"People are discovering that, through recordings, they can get the same realism out of the world's greatest music and the world's finest artists in their own living rooms as they do in the concert halls," Marek declared.

Also unveiled at the exerc'ses was a coupling on RCA Victor records of Beethoven's Fifth and Schubert's Unfinished Symphonies, played by the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and scheduled for release next month.

Conductor Munch christened his new record player by playing Beethoven's Seventh Symphony—his first recording with the Boston Symphony Orchestra—and Berlioz' Romeo And Juliet which was recently awarded Grande Prix du Disque of the Evench Academy the French Academy.







Should be a big hit.

A hilarious side that should catch like wild-fire. Bottom half "A Little Beauty," is another seam-splitting novelty with ridiculous lyrics. Introduction and ending are take-offs on the Peter Potter "hit or miss" record judging system. Very funny two-sider.

Bill Haley and his Comets, who have played an important part in the popularization of rock 'n roll music with an up-beat, come up with an exciting LP that'll keep the youngsters hoppin' around the house. It's Haley's first 12" LP and includes all of the dozen sides he's cut since joining the label. Almost every one of them have hit the charts and two of the sides have topped the million mark. For the youngsters who haven't already purchased these tunes in single form, or the eight items in the "Shake, Rattle and Roll" LP, this album oughta be a juicy morsel. Great dance stuff for a teen-age party.

"PARDON MY BLOOPER!"—An Album Of Radio And TV's Most Hilarious Boners—Volume 4—Jubilee LP 2011 (1-10")

When Kermit Schafer tunes in on a radio or TV program he's interested in what is in the script. It is the pure'y unintentional boner or slip that Mr. Schafer is waiting for. This disk is the fourth in a most amusing collection of radio-TV fluffs. The listener will find most of the bits as wild as the three preceding volumes. What the disk amounts to is another great adult party entertainer. Should go well with the novelty record set.

The disk is an on-the-spot recording of Buddy's appearance at Mr. Kelly's, a night club in Chicago. His voice is clear and s'ncere. The package features Buddy with some favorite sentimental melodies. A glance at the song titles will tell you that Ernesto Lecuona's music is undeniably sentimental, cleverly descriptive and picturesque. You feel these qualities when you listen to the songs. But, what really strikes the listener is that Lecuona's songs for the most part lack the intense Spanish quality that his fellow countrymen, in composing music, indulge in. Some of the tunes might have been written for a Broadway show. But, whatever the music's origin, it is light, melodic and purposely romantic. Playing his own creations Lecuona can ooze out every bit of sentiment in the pieces. On the disk he plays expressively and with playful lightness. Good mood music entry.

The average Broadway musical contains about twelve songs in its score. Yet, at best, only a few may dent the charts. The melody may be somewhat complex or the lyrics may be so closely knit to the musical's plot, that they are meaningless when sung outside of the musical. Shannon Bolin, currently entertaining the filled houses at "Damn Yankees" each evening, provides evidence to prove that neglected show tunes are not necessarily without musical merit. All the tunes presented with the exception of ("One More Spring," "I Know Where I'm Going" and "My Love Is A Wanderer") graced Broadway or the films. Miss Bol'n sings expressively. Some of the tunes she excels in are Rodgers and Hart's "He Was So Good To Me" and Bart Howard's "My Love Is A Wanderer." It's an excellent disk. Show tune addicts will treasure the package. the package.

On this album, Garber offers 12 such tunes with Larry Dean, Jeri Randolph and a trio assisting in the vocal department. Pretty package for the adult set. Especially so for those who enjoy dancing at home.

All the jazz pianists on this disk have established reputations with the buyer. In one of the jazz record events of the year, four top flight men of the cool keyboard are pressed on one LP. It's an excellent opportunity for the discerning jazz enthusiast to quickly (and economically) compare the output of each. He'll hear differences, but the common denominator for all the boys is sheer jazz brilliance. A more direct comparison will be gotten between Teddy Wilson and Bud Powell as they give separate interpretations of "Tea For Two." Serious jazz lovers won't be able to stay away from this set.

"SWING GUITARS"-Oscar Moore, Barney Kessel, Tal Farlow-Norgran-MGN 1033 (1-12" LP)

Norgran's newest LP has three top pros on the guitar, Tal Farlow, Oscar Moore, and Barney Kessel. The attentive jazz listener will have a field day comparing the technique of one with the other. Sticking closely to the standards the boys set the listener up for some deft arrangements of the old standbys. Great hi-fi sound. The set's a jazz collectors find.

"THE JOHNNY SMITH QUARTET"—Featuring Solos By Bob Pancoast, Piano, George Roumanis, Bass, Mousie Alexander, Drums—Roost LP 2203 (1-12")

Johnny Smith is one of the foremost jazz guitarists around. With the instrument in Johnny's hands it assumes a richness in harmony and rhythm. The guitar becomes an almost unlimited resource of tonal ingenuity. Luckily Johnny has plenty of occasions to display various forms on the disk. There is the almost slow motion plucking of the strings in "Django" that makes every note resound like a bell. With "Tired Blood" he's fast but still clear. He's backed up with some skilled jazz men that feature Mousie Alexander with some deft work on the drums, Bob Pancoast on piano and George Roumanis on bass. Good material. Excellent sound. Notable jazz set.

"JAZZ FOR TONIGHT"—Steve Allen and jazz accompaniment—Coral CRL 57018 (1-12" LP)

It seems that before one can turn his television dial, a new facet of Steve Allen's varied gifts is presented to the public. He is one of the wittiest adlib men in the business and last summer he was signed to portray Benny Goodman in the now completed "Benny Goodman Story." Here Steve comes up with a highly competent jazz set. Sticking to the standards (barring one original piece "Chicken Wire Blues") he displays a soft touch resulting in a velvety piano style. He's got a good trombone with Urbie Green, and a warm clarinet in Hank D'Amico. Excellent sound. The package has shown signs of increased activity on the charts. This is no doubt because of Steve's popularity, and what is more significant a notable effort in jazz artistry.

CLASSICAL

BEETHOVEN—Concerto In D Major, Op. 61 For Violin and Orchestra—Wolfgang Schneiderhan, violin, The Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, Paul van Kempen, conductor—Decca DL 9784 (1-12" LP)

The early history of this familar concerto is somewhat strange. It was gratefully received by its opening night audience in Vienna in 1806. The critics seemed to enjoy the work also but were cautious. Succeeding years have disspelled any doubt as to the concerto's greatness. It is a pirited work that demands the utmost in violin virtuosity. Wolfgang Schneiderhan gives a commanding performance of clarity and grace on the string instrument. The recorded sound will satisfy the most discerning connoisseur of hi-fi. The set will hold its own quite well with the many other offerings of this opus.



Capitol Makes First Move of Recording Equipment Into Unique New Tower

HOLLYWOOD-The first loads of Capitol recording equipment were moved Monday, Dec. 19 from the label's present site at 5515 Melrose in Hollywood to the new custom-designed high fidelity Studio B at the Capitol Tower, the new international headquarters building of Capitol Records, Inc., now nearing completion. Shortly, similar installations will be made in Studios A and C at the new location, 1750 Vine, just north of Hollywood Blvd. and one block south of the Los Angeles-Hollywood freeway.

Regular Capitol recording sessions are expected to be launched in the ultra-modern studios by mid-January. Offices, which will comprise the top 12 floors of the 13-story (height-limit) reinforced concrete edifice, are expected to be completed and ready for occupancy by late February. Approximately 60 per cent of the distinctively different structure will be occupied by Capitol Records, the balance to be leased to tenants.

On Monday, Dec. 19 and Tuesday, Dec. 20, the final construction touches were put on the building, a 92-foot aluminum spire was set in place.

A red flashing beacon light will be mounted on the uppermost tip of the mast which will spell out "Hollywood"





PENSACOLA, FLA.—Proof of the solid drawing power of country music attractions comes in a glowing report of the huge crowds at a recent Red Foley Show in Pensacola, Florida. The show was originally set for one nite only, but the crowd demand was so heavy that Foley was held over for an additional day.

According to Dub Allbritten, Foley's personal manager, there were more folks on the outside on the first night than on the inside, with the auditorium packed to capacity with something over 3,500 paid admissions. By the time the second show began, the crowd outside was almost rioting. Screaming police cars raced to the scene and Foley, spotlighted atop a police escort automobile, pleaded with the rioting crowd to remain quiet. He told them they would be accommodated at additional showings the following day and thus succeeded in restoring order.

The next night again found an overflow crowd, but the show had to move on due to previous commitments in other cities. Pensacola officials said it was undoubtedly the "biggest thing ever in Pensacola," while harried city police struggled with the mass of automobiles that choked the city. Foley's ABC-TVer "Ozark Jubilee" is highly rated in Pensacola.

NEW YORK-In keeping with the Christmas festivities, it's interesting to delve into the question "Who set up the first Christmas tree in America and Where"? To these questions historians fail to give us a positive answer. Some believe Hessian soldiers introduced the tree to us during the years of our Revolution. Folks in rural areas had no problem in finding trees—a suitable pine or spruce was sure to be growing nearby. People living in towns and cities, however, usually had to buy their trees. No one can be sure who first made a business of selling Christmas trees. It may well have been Mark Carr of the Catskill area who, it is said, was selling his trees in New York City as early as 1851.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Business in general for 1955 was the best in U.S. history, according to all reports. What about the future? The long range is optimistic. Here are two points of view. Professor Sumner H. Slichter of Harvard sees a booming economy for at least the next ten years, with the Gross National Product doubling itself in that time. The general belief is that the business boom will continue. Many also believe that the boom may assume even greater proportions.

If there is a slideoff in general business later on, some claim, they look to an upsurge in business for this trade.

Probably best expressed, and summarizing all statements was that of one noted leader who said:

"From any and every angle we just can't see any business drop-off in the months ahead.

"If anything at all", he continued, "we see better business than we have enjoyed during 1955 ahead for everyone in 1956."





Better Than 95% Favor 10¢ Play

CHICAGO — From all answers to its questioning editorial (which appeared in the December 10, 1955 issue) this publication has learned that better than 95 percent of the nation's operators (games and music) favor dime play as the best solution for the increased income they require to continue in this business.

Most surprising were the reports of those who already have dime play in action in their areas. Gross in-creases, these men reported, range anywhere from 30% to over 50% on an overall average.

Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the neculiarities of his territory. peculiarities of his territory.

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business, and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics. These buyers will purchase machines "as is" at prices quoted by the trade at large and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards. the machines themselves to meet their own






