

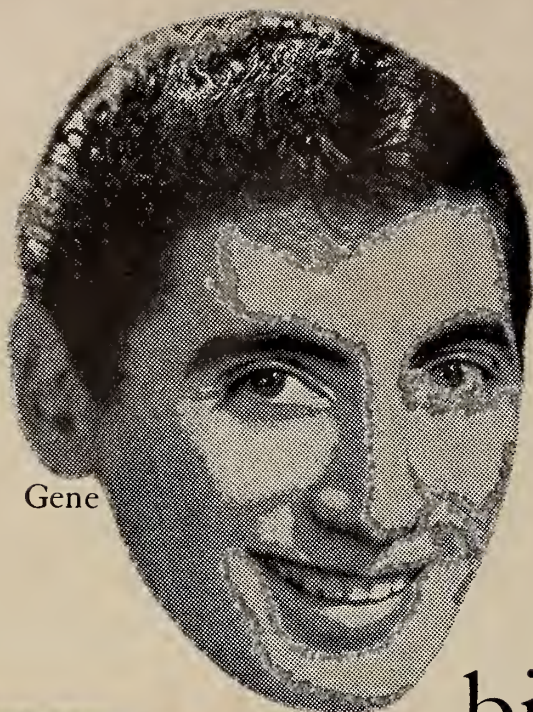

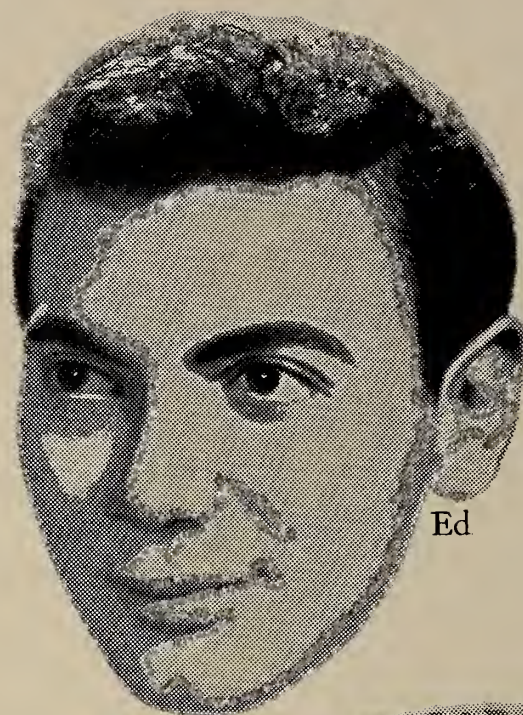

RECORDS ARE THE GATEWAY TO STARDOM!

There is probably no faster path to stardom than a hit record.

In the last few years, the record industry has not only taken its place among the other entertainment outlets as a creator of top names, but has in many cases far outpassed the others.

Today a hit record almost immediately brings the artist into the homes and lives of millions of people. Not only is the record heard constantly on the radio all hours of the day and night, but the artist is in great demand for TV appearances, nightclub dates and all other personal appearances. Moreover, if you go to a restaurant, bar, candy store or any other location in which there is a juke box, the artist is with you by dint of the constant play his record receives.

There used to be a time when record artists were somehow not considered the equal of artists who reached the public through a different medium. Today that prejudice is disappearing. Even established artists are benefiting by hit records. Take the case of Tennessee Ernie. He had been on television for a long time before he made "Sixteen Tons". Yet no one can deny that it was his recording of that song which sent him to the top of the heap, even though his television shows had been just as good before as they are now. Another case in point is Gale Storm. She had been in the movies for a number of years and her name was known to millions of movie goers. Yet she's never enjoyed the degree of popularity which she has today. And it can almost all be traced to the series of hit records which she has made in the past several months.

As for new artists who have reached stardom by a smash record, the list is interminable, but some recent ones who come to mind are The Platters, Pat Boone, Roger Williams, The Cadillacs and Julie London. All of these artists were almost total unknowns just a few months ago, yet today as the result of a record which caught the public's fancy, they are top name artists whom the public demands to see and hear.

Record artists today are learning to become full fledged performers because as soon as their disks hit, they must go out and make personal appearances. When you make a personal appearance, it's not just enough to sing a song. You must perform. Most artists learn that lesson very quickly. And in this day of television where every performance is scrutinized by millions of people who are comparing it with the greatest performances available in the entire entertainment world, the record artist who doesn't come through performance-wise soon finds himself without an audience to play to.

It's not surprising that as soon as a record artist breaks through, his first concern is to develop a performance style consistent with his recording style.

The important thing, however, is that today a recording artist is considered in the same class as other performers. Moreover his fame and popularity very often far exceeds those of performers who have been in the public eye for years but have not had the fortune to be exposed in the exciting, stimulating, star making medium that is the record business.

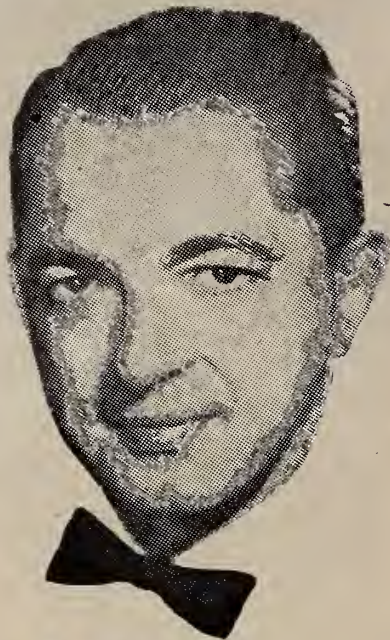

ⓒ "I DIDN'T MEAN A THING" (2:23) [Met ASCAP—Kramer, Redman] A good rhythm arrangement of a pleasant teen-age ballad. Many of the youngsters should find these lyrics pertaining to them.

ⓑ+ "AC-CENT-TCHU-ATE THE POSITIVE" (3:30) [E. H. Morris ASCAP—Arlen, Mercer] A great Mercer-Arlen oldie gets a top grade revival treatment from two of Decca's top names. The boys style the ditty in a delightfully informal manner. Could be a hit all over again. Swinging side.

ⓑ "BEAT ME DADDY EIGHT TO THE BAR" (3:01) [Leeds ASCAP—Rave, Prince, Sheehy] Another tremendous favorite out of the hit parade lists of the past, is modernized and belted across by the duet. Colorful deck.

ⓑ+ "MADEIRA" (2:40) [Ardmore ASCAP—De Sousa] Here's a side to watch closely. An unusual instrumental item chock full of excitement from beginning to end. Has a thrilling African flavor and features French horns and harpsichord—instruments familiar to Miller instrumentals.

ⓑ "BOLERO GAUCHO" (2:47) [Bourne ASCAP—Guitton, Michel, Philippe, Gerard] Stan Freberg handles the harpsichord once again—this time treating a lush arrangement of a pretty latin item. Familiar melody issued a few years ago on another label. Excellent coupling.

ⓑ+ "SECRETLY" (2:40) [Greta BMI—Raleigh, Weissman] The Bon Bons, London's promising femme trio, issue a good ballad set to the currently popular fish beat. Commercial piece of material that should meet with the approval of the younger set.

ⓒ "PRECIOUS LOVE" (2:52) [Regent BMI—Moore] The girls blend warmly on this tender, sentimental love affair.

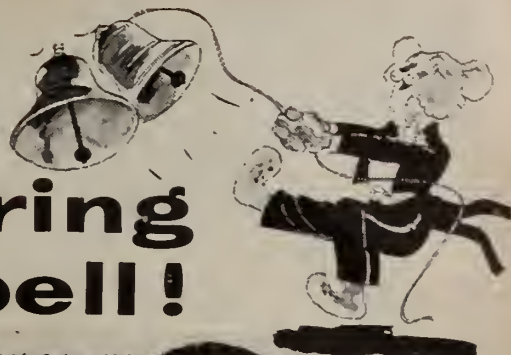

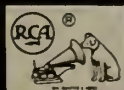

"THE GREAT BENNY GOODMAN"—with Harry James, Gene Krupa, Teddy Wilson, Lionel Hampton—Columbia CL 820 (1-12" LP)
LET'S DANCE; SING SING SING; DON'T BE THAT WAY; ONE O'CLOCK JUMP; MEMORIES OF YOU; STOMPIN' AT THE SAVOY; BUGLE CALL RAG; KING PORTER STOMP; AVALON.
This set catches Benny Goodman during the sky-high popularity of swing. It also catches B.G. as he is about to thrill the nation in the film story of his life, Columbia, which has many of the choicest Goodman plums ever recorded during the swing rage, releases them once again to a hungry pop-jazz audience. The selections are from three sources: radio, Carnegie Hall, and special wax sessions. Major artists as Harry James, Gene Krupa, Lionel Hampton and others are in the "Let's Dance"—"Memories Of You"—"Stompin' At The Savoy" type of Goodman reliables. This package is already heading toward a position on the charts.

"THE BENNY GOODMAN STORY"—The Original Benny Goodman Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM-1099 (1-12" LP)

All the pieces will be in the fabulous number of selections that the film will offer. Sales will be as generous as a blank check.

"BELAFONTE"—Harry Belafonte—RCA Victor LPM-1150 (1-12" LP)

Our nation has a proud heritage of music that sprang directly from the expressive hearts of the people. One of the truly great folk song artists of our time, Harry Belafonte, is heard in some of the more sturdy songs of the people. Singing from the heart is not an easy task for any singer. It may be possible to get away with it in other forms of music, but in folk music too much in the song depends on "feeling" the tune and lyrics. There lies much of Belafonte's mastery in handling this type of music. Many of the set's offerings are well known Belafonte specialties. This includes "Waterboy", "Scarlet Ribbons" and the classical calypso item "Matilda". The other finely executed numbers are tapped from Negro spirituals and the pop field ("Unchained Melody"). His "Mark Twain" is already a top seller on the charts. "Belafonte" should soon follow suit. Wonderful photo of the star on the package. Belafonte's newly acquired fandom can make a juicy acquisition by purchasing this package.

"I CAN COOK TOO"—Nancy Walker—Dave Baker at the piano—Dolphin 2 (1-12" LP)
I CAN COOK TOO; SOME OTHER TIME; I'M TIRED OF TEXAS; GET MARRIED, SHIRLEY; DOWN TO THE SEA; IRVING; MILKMAN, KEEP THOSE BOTTLES QUIET; OH, SO NICE; THE CHARADE OF THE MARIONETTES; A FUNNY HEART; MY COUSIN IN MILWAUKEE.
Nancy Walker's high comic talent was already firmly established when she returned to the legitimate theater in Noel Coward's "Fallen Angels". The critics' wild enthusiasm for Nancy's comedy performance in the Coward revival lifted her to newer heights. Now the versatile performer debuts on the new Dolphin label with superior material that should make the album a winning entry in the area of sophisticated tunes. The lyrics and the appropriate melody in such items as "I Can Cook Too", "Get Married, Shirley" and "Irving" are perfect Walker numbers. In the romantic division Gershwin's "Oh, So Nice" and David Craig and David Baker's "Down To The Sea" are sung with affection. The set's audience is large enough to give it solid sales. Should be a big platter in New York. Walker's many fans will consider the disk a must.

"STRITCH"—Elaine Stritch—Orchestra Conducted by Deane Kincaide—Dolphin 3 (1-12" LP)
ARE YOU HAVING ANY FUN; YOU'RE GETTING TO BE A HABIT WITH ME; THAT'S THE BEGINNING OF THE END; AND THE ANGELS SING; LET IT SNOW; THAT'S BOY; TOO MANY RINGS AROUND ROSIE; THE OBJECT OF MY AFFECTIONS; EASY STREET; IF; THERE'S A LULL IN MY LIFE; YOU TOOK ADVANTAGE OF ME.
One of the delights in the stage revival of "On Your Toes" was the performance by Elaine Stritch. Her scintillating bump and grind delivery of "You Took Advantage Of Me" literally made her a star overnight. Dolphin, in one of its first releases, offers Miss Stritch (and THAT "You Took Advantage Of Me" number) in a genuinely refreshing uproar on many excellent tunes. One of the best Stritch slam bangs is the clever "If". A Vincent Youmans' oddity "Too Many Rings Around Rosie" is done in a fascinating 1920 setting. For a slower paced Stritch the outstanding piece is "There's A Lull In My Life". On the whole the package is one of the more exciting album waxings in quite a while. Broadwayites and folks who have had the pleasure of watching Miss Stritch perform, will love this disk.

"LOCO MOTION"—Joe Loco, His Piano and His Orchestra—Columbia CL 760 (1-12" LP)
LOCO MOTION; TREMENDO CHA-CHA-CHA; MAMA INEZ; CHA-CHA-CHA NO. 5; MY HEART, MY LIFE, MY LOVE; PASO MERENGUE; MANHATTAN; BAION BABY; ALL OF YOU; NEGRA CONSENTIDA; TENDERLY; HAPPY DAYS ARE HERE AGAIN.
The highly rhythmic piano antics of famed Joe Loco takes the spotlight on his initial Columbia LP release. The selections are composed of the three Latin conquests in the U.S.A.: the mambo, cha-cha and merengue. Most of the material transformed to one of the three dances are taken from standard items. These include tunes like "Manhattan", "All Of You" and "Happy Days Are Here Again". The arrangements are for most part tuned to the rhythm rather than the melody. This, of course, hits the dancing market. The deft piano of Loco will entertain those who prefer to sit them out. This package may well turn out to be one of the hot sellers on the label. Excellent party item.

"JAZZ AT THE BLACK HAWK"—Dave Brubeck Quartet featuring Paul Desmond—Fantasy 3-210 (1-12" LP)
BLUE MOON; MY HEART STOOD STILL; LET'S FALL IN LOVE; JEEPERS CREEPERS; ON A LITTLE STREET IN SINGAPORE; TROLLEY SONG; I MAY BE WRONG.
The great present day interest in jazz has brought into the spotlight a number of outstanding interpreters in the jazz field. And without a doubt one of the foremost newer names in cool music is Dave Brubeck. Album waxings that bear his moniker are always big sellers. And here, Fantasy has probably released another Brubeck smash. It certainly has some of his most intelligent jazz moments. The disk is an on-the-spot pressing taken from a San Francisco club, "The Black Hawk" and features Brubeck's sidekick Paul Desmond on the alto. One of the most tender jazz numbers on the disk is "The Trolley Song". The same melody is repeated in a rehearsal of the song. It displays the boys practically out on their own and contains some "vocal" work by Brubeck as he pleads for a particular jazz style. Jazz fans will really relish that unusual performance. In fact the remaining jazz artistry won't let the jazz lover down either. The set can hardly miss being a powerful jazz seller.

"STRING ENCHANTMENT . . ."—Alfred Newman and His Orchestra—Decca DL 8194 (1-12" LP)
HOLIDAY FOR STRINGS; WALTZ FROM SERENADE IN C FOR STRINGS; HEART WOUNDS; MOLLY ON THE SHORE; PRAYER OF THE TOREADOR; HARLEN SQUARE DANCE; NOCTURNE; LAST SPRING; SCHERZO.
There has been increased interest in bringing the string section of an orchestra to greater importance in popular music. Listening to Alfred Newman's new package one can see why. When it comes to establishing a mood (especially a romantic one) nothing quite fits the bill as the sweet tones of Newman's string instruments. Many of the world's more ambitious composers have provided ample material written for string sections. Some of the best pieces are represented on this exceptional disk. Such string gems as the "Waltz" from Tchaikovsky's "Serenade In C For Strings" and "Last Spring" from Grieg's "Elegaic Melodies" are formidable examples. With composer-conductor Newman directing the work the more classical pieces glow brilliantly. And the intentional mood music qualities of the disk stand out beautifully. Striking cover job. The set can expect satisfying sales to mood music adherents.

"BIDIN' MY TIME"—Teddy King—with Al Cohn and His Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM-1147 (1-12" LP)
BIDIN' MY TIME; ONCE TOO OFTEN; THAT OLD FEELING; THE I'M NOT SUPPOSED TO BE BLUE BLUES; CARELESS LOVE; FOR ALL WE KNOW; WHEN I GROW TOO OLD TO DREAM; I'M IN LOVE WITH THE HONORABLE MR. SO AND SO; I CAN'T GET STARTED; LOVE WALKED IN; I Poured MY HEART INTO A SONG; TAKING A CHANCE ON LOVE.
Many folks are gonna meet Teddy King for the first time via her exciting rendition of the up-and-coming ballad "Mr. Wonderful". Victor would also be pleased to introduce the gal in their "Meet The Girls" series. The jazz-pop artist is heard to good advantage in a mixture of standards and less frequently heard items. One of the latter numbers that should make the rounds is "Once Too Often". Her jazz talent is pronounced on that one. "For All We Know" shows she can turn right around and sing sensitively with a ballad. As "Mr. Wonderful" climbs in popularity this set should get a wholesome amount of sales.

"ACCENT ON DIXIELAND"—Pee Wee Erwin—Urania-1202 (1-12" LP)
WASHINGTON AND LEE SWING; BATTLE HYMN; DIXIELAND SHUFFLE; HINDUSTAN; PAGAN LOVE SONG; I'M CONFESSING; MEMPHIS BLUES.
Both in arrangements and in some of the material he uses, Pee Wee Erwin is willing to let his boys make Dixieland music that is often off the normal Dixieland track. Not that the spirit of that flavorful music is ever lost but as in "I'm Confessing" the pace is extremely subdued at the start. It's almost modern jazz but then again the familiar Dixieland pacing at the end of the number reminds you it is not. Their bright rumpus with "Battle Hymn" will serve to sum up Mr. Erwin's resourceful group. The disk may make a stir in Dixieland circles.

CLASSICAL

MOZART—"DON GIOVANNI"—Giuseppe Taddei, Baritone; Cesare Valletti, Tenor; Italo Tajo, Bass; Maria Curtis Verna, Soprano; Carla Gavazzi, Soprano; Elda Ribetti, Soprano; Orchestra And Chorus Of Radiotelevision Italiana, Turin Conducted by Max Rudolf—Cetra C1253 (3-12" LP)
The complete recording of Mozart's "Don Giovanni" is one of the notable recording events in the celebration of the composer's Bi-Centennial. The cast performs the impeccable score with a vocal richness that is, indeed, one of the highlights of this season's opera recording output. The story of a "Rake's Progress" unfolds dramatically and fascinatingly. Giuseppe Taddei's Don Giovanni is constantly vibrant in its commanding understanding of the part. The other excellent vocal chores include Maria Curtis Verna's Donna Anna and Cesare Valletti's Don Ottavio. Max Rudolf's conducting is exceedingly resourceful in his precision handling of the lyrical and oftentimes soaring score. While one does not have to look hard to get the complete opera on LP this new addition is one of the handsome issues. Complete libretto is part of the set. Worthy sound.
RIMSKY-KORSAKOV—Scheherazade—The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra—William Steinberg, Conducting—Capitol P8305 (1-12" LP)
Scherazade is easily one of the most popular classical compositions ever written. It is a work that is entrancingly imbued with melodies that perfectly capture the atmosphere of its subject. And when a performance of the work takes full advantage of "Scheherazade's" color the cry of "it tires me" becomes an asinine remark. The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra under William Steinberg's commanding direction is one of the smoothest and lyrical recordings of the tone poem available. The package has a lot of competition in the rich catalogue of "Scheherazade" pressings. Superlative sound and exotic cover.

Bethlehem Signs Duke Ellington To Contract

NEW YORK—Duke Ellington, veteran bandleader, jazz pioneer and music great, has inked a contract with Bethlehem Records for an undisclosed sum, it was announced by Bethlehem this week.

Under the terms of the contract Ellington will do two LPs a year for the label, and will, of course, have complete freedom of recording material.

Bethlehem A & R mentor Red Clyde planed to Chicago to supervise the recording session which was expected to consume the best part of three days.

With his Bethlehem contract the Duke joins forces with two former members of his organization, singer Betty Roche and trumpeter "Shorty" Baker. Both are scheduled to record LPs for Bethlehem in the very near future.

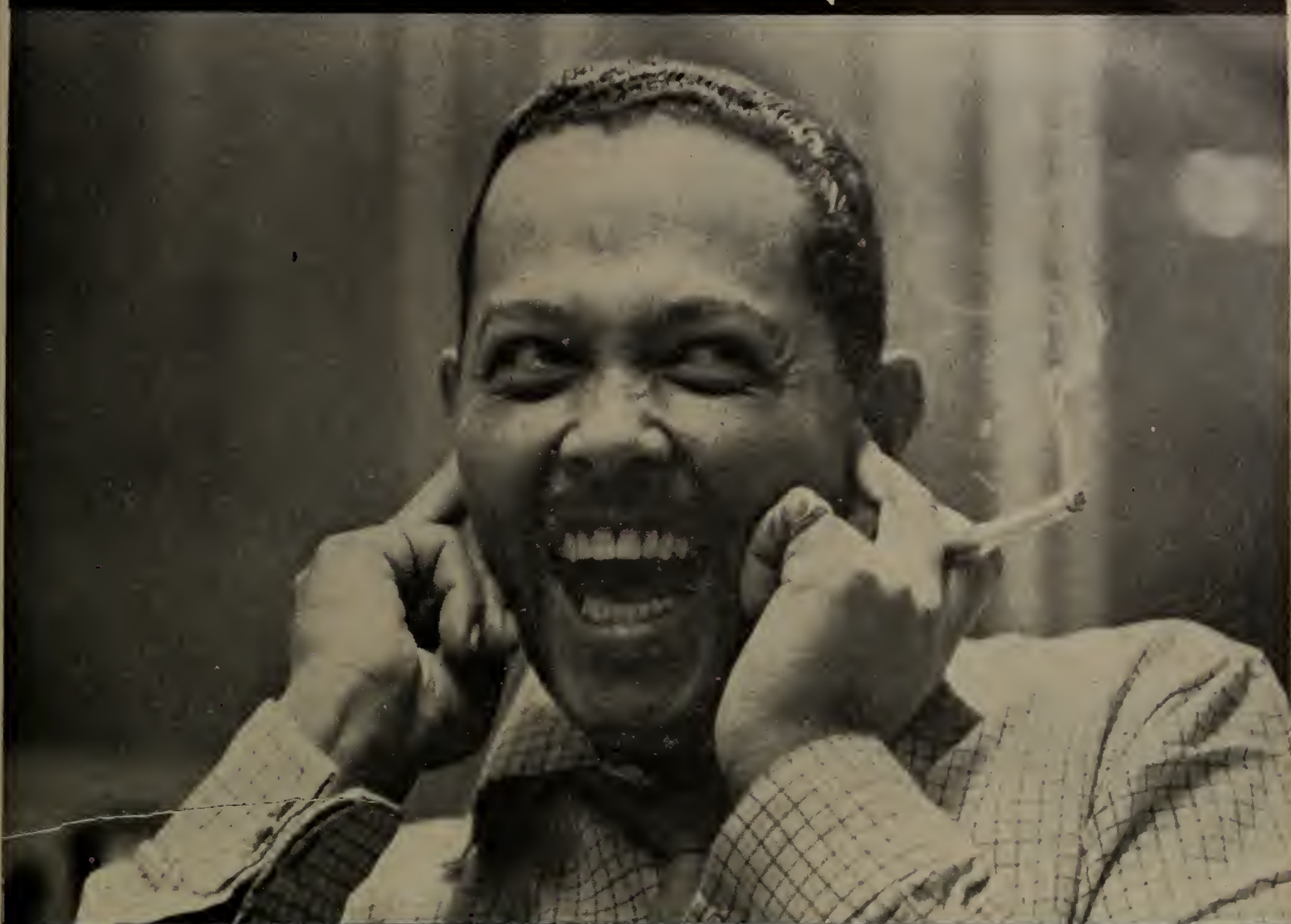

Most Record Company Execs Oppose MOA's Entry Into Disk Biz

Shapiro-Bernstein Names Brettler

NEW YORK—Shapiro, Bernstein & Co., announce the appointment of Leon J. Brettler to the position formerly occupied by the late Elliott Shapiro. Brettler is 28 years old, served in the Army and graduated with honors from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He was associated with Dupont as industrial engineer in the building of the hydrogen plant for the United States Government. Mr. Brettler is well versed in all fields of music.

Liberty Gets World Distribution

NEW YORK—Si Waronker and Jack Ames of Liberty Records, Inc., have announced the consummation of an agreement with London Records, the subsidiary of English Decca, whereby Liberty Records will be leased to the English Decca firm for worldwide distribution outside the United States.

The Liberty label currently has the best selling album in the United States, "Julie Is Her Name" by Julie London. "Cry Me A River", one of the selections from the LP, is also a best selling single.

Capitol Signs Nelson Riddle To New 6-Year Contract

HOLLYWOOD—Alan W. Livingston, executive vice-president of Capitol Records has signed arranger-conductor Nelson Riddle to a new six-year contract with the label, effective January 1, 1956. He has been with the label since July 1, 1953. In addition to conducting his own instrumental singles and albums for the company, Riddle backs such Capitol artists as Frank Sinatra and Nat "King" Cole. Currently, his "Lisbon Antigua" is skyrocketing to nearly 1,000,000 copies.

Roman Record Garners Play

NEW YORK—Dick Roman, the talented young Double AA label's vocalist, who created some territorial action with his first release "How Many Others", seems to be following-up his first disk with an even bigger platter in "Hold Me Forever". The tune, written by Benny Ross, features Roman accompanied by George Siravo's ork and the Ray Charles Singers.

NEW YORK—Most major record company execs expressed deep dissatisfaction this week with MOA's plan to sponsor a new record company.

In commenting on last week's editorial in *The Cash Box* entitled "MOA Is Wrong To Manufacture Records", all major company spokesmen but one said that the arguments advanced by *The Cash Box* mirrored their own thinking.

Although not available for quotes, one company official said his firm definitely would not participate in MOA's annual convention nor would he have any of his firm's artists attend. Four others said they were already committed for this year's convention, but that they would re-examine their relationship to MOA as a result of the start of this record firm. One said that MOA's firm would make no difference at all to his company.

The majority of execs contacted said that MOA had sought and received the support of record firms in their various projects and some were actually associate members of the organization, paying an annual fee. In view of MOA's entering the record business, these execs expressed the opinion that they couldn't see how their firms could continue to support an organization that was going into direct competition with them.

It was also suggested this week in another trade paper that record firms would welcome MOA's entry into the manufacturing field because the new firm would use the existing pressing facilities of the majors. Almost to a man, this reasoning was called ridiculous by execs of those firms which had their own pressing facilities and was resented by the execs of those firms which did not have pressing plants.

As a result of the furor raised by MOA's plan to float a stock issue of \$500,000 to juke box operators to finance the company, the heads of the organization meeting in Chicago this week announced a change of operation. The new firm, tentatively known as Paragon Records, will be underwritten by Barney Young, who also heads up the third performance rights agency, and will be sponsored by MOA with revenue from the sale of records going into the organization's treasury.

Coast Office For Planetary

NEW YORK—Phil Kahl announced last week the opening of a west coast office which completes a New York, Chicago, Los Angeles operation for his firms Planetary Music, Phil Kahl Music and Patricia Music.

Julie Losch will head the coast office, Joe Dracca in Chicago and Mel Turoff in New York.

The company's current releases getting the big push include "Grapevine", Billy Eckstine's first release on Victor; "Lullaby of Birdland", currently riding the charts via the Blue Stars' recording on the Mercury label, and "Why Do Fools Fall In Love" waxed by the Teen Agers, the Diamonds, Gale Storm and Gloria Mann.

More Foreign Disks Being Programmed

Polish, Czech, Italian, Greek, French, Swedish, Norwegian, Spanish, Chinese, Many Other Languages Heard On Juke Boxes All Over U.S.

CHICAGO—Roadmen for various factories are reporting, as one of the sidelights of the visits they are making to various territories, the increasing numbers of foreign recordings they are finding programmed on juke boxes.

It seems, according to some of these men, that more and more juke box operators are heeding the call of foreign born populations. They are meeting the requests of these peoples with recordings in their own language featuring the music with which these people are most familiar.

“Down in Texas”, one well known traveling salesman reported, “I heard more Czechoslovakian recordings than I ever before heard in all my life.

“What’s more”, he added, “operators find that these will earn just as much and last even longer on their machines than the latest pop tunes.

“Of course I realize”, he stated, “that the foreign records can’t be considered in the same programming category with pop tunes. Yet, it’s very interesting to note how they quickly catch on, and how they bring

in many extra coins into the phonographs.”

The foreign recordings being reported by the roadmen range all the way thru the entire list of nations.

One returnee from San Francisco reported, “I visited way down in Chinatown and went to play a juke box there and bumped into some Chinese title strips.

“Don’t know how many turn out Chinese records but this sure was interesting, especially when I noted that the operator of the phonograph wasn’t Chinese.”

The suggestion for increased foreign records programming was printed in this publication many months ago.

In fact, it was The Cash Box that urged many of the nation’s juke box operators to pay closer attention to the value of foreign disks for those locations where such recordings could produce very fine results.

It now seems that this campaign took hold. Many music operators everywhere in the nation are finding foreign records one of their best programming bets.

Rubinstein Giving Five Concerts and Recording For Victor In 13 Days

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Arthur Rubinstein at 67 has embarked upon one of the most impressive feats of his artistic life, in celebration of the 50th anniversary of his American debut.

Starting Tuesday, February 7 at Carnegie Hall, Rubinstein, with Alfred Wallenstein conducting the orchestra, undertook a series of five concerts in 13 days. He is playing 17 major works for piano and orchestra, including major works by Mozart, Beethoven, Schumann, Chopin, Liszt, Brahms, Tchaikovsky, Grieg, Franck, Falla and Rachmaninoff.

The remaining concert dates are February 10, 15, 17 and 19. To mark this venture as an “iron man” stint, Rubinstein will record for RCA Victor at Carnegie Hall the Grieg A Minor Concerto on February 11, beginning at Midnight. On Sunday, February 12 starting at 10.00 P.M. he will record the Liszt Concerto No. 1 in E flat Major. Both of these works are included in the program he will give on Friday, February 10. The orchestra in these recordings will be under the leadership of Alfred Wallenstein.

In Chicago during January Rubinstein recorded with Fritz Reiner conducting the Chicago Symphony Orchestra two works which he will be performing during his five concerts, the Rachmaninoff Concerto No. 2 and the same composer’s Rhapsody On A Theme Of Paganini.

RCA Victor will release all four of these compositions in early fall, 1956.

Rubinstein was recently asked why he has undertaken to perform so many major compositions in such a short span, replied: “I am not playing 17 concerts in five concerts because I think it is such a big accomplishment. Others could do it, I am sure. But, after so many years in which I have played some of them not so good, I would like to prepare them all to my own satisfaction just this’ once. After all, I cannot wait 17 years more to play them one at a time. . . .”

Columbia Reports LP Club Test Plan Successful

NEW YORK—Hal Cook, national sales manager of Columbia Records, stated this week that the Columbia LP Club test plan being run in the Cleveland and Akron area for two months starting January 23rd, has met with great dealer reaction all over the country, and many dealers have already requested that they be permitted to sell subscriptions to the Club on the same basis as those dealers in the test area.

The test plan permits dealers to offer three bonus records free and in advance, to members signing up thru retailer channels. Approximately 1000 new subscribers have been enlisted into the club during the first three weeks of the Cleveland operation.

Seaway Distributors, the Cleveland-Akron distributor for Columbia Records, sparked the drive in the area via a \$3500 promotional campaign employing radio and newspaper ads and dealer displays. Sixty-two dealers in the territory (comprising almost every eligible LP dealer) participated.

Cook said that some time in April, Columbia will set five or six additional cities where the plan will be run concurrently. Pittsburgh and New York may be two of the cities.

Kay Thompson In New Film

NEW YORK—Kay Thompson, the well known entertainer who recorded the song version of her best selling book “Eloise”, on the Cadence label, will play the part of a fashion consultant in the new Audrey Hepburn-Fred Astaire film “Funny Face”, the Gershwin Brothers musical hit.

Archie Bleyer, Cadence prexy, and the Chordettes, head up to Detroit this week to promote their new release “Whistlin’ Willie” (Our Melody) b/w “Eddie My Love”.

From Mar. 12-24 the boys will work the Statler in Detroit after which they will tour the midwest and Canada with Blue Barron's band for a minimum of eight weeks.

TV Film Firm Formed

NEW YORK—Barry and Enright Productions, Inc., have joined with Hy Zaret in forming a new subsidiary, BEZ, Inc., to produce animated films ranging from TV commercials, public service and entertainment films, to non-TV educational and industrial films. Films will feature unique sound tracks based on techniques created by Zaret.

Zaret is well-known as a "pop" songwriter ("Unchained Melody", "One Meatball", etc.) and his adaptations of songs for public service spots on radio and TV have won several awards.

Barry and Enright have had several years of network experience with animation in the course of producing their "Winky-Dink And You" CBS-TV package, and a recent "Omnibus" telecast on advances in video techniques, singled out their pioneer use of many unusual electronic devices and special effects, for commendation.

New Style Displays For Dealers

NEW YORK—Decca Records is shipping to dealers a new style of display material. It has created these displays on the principle of the "I-Beam". They are advantageous in that each display can be rolled up for shipment, with little chance of damage en route. Another advantage of the "I-Beam" displays are that they are 30% lighter in weight than those displays previously in use, decreasing shipping costs considerably. The first "I-Beam" display unit shipped by Decca was on their original cast album of "Guys And Dolls". A similar unit on Decca's "Carousel" album is now en route.

Gary Crosby & Davis Teamed

NEW YORK — Decca announced last week, the release of a platter by a new duet—Gary Crosby and Sammy Davis, Jr. The firm reports initial reaction to the two sides, "Ac-cent-tchu-ate The Positive" and "Beat Me Daddy Eight To The Bar" is very exciting. The former brings back memories of a Decca release of January, 1945. At that time Bing Crosby, Gary's dad, and the Andrews Sisters recorded the Johnny Mercer song, to the tune of close to a million copies.

Doubleday Introduces Dolphin Records

NEW YORK—News in both the publishing field and phonograph record business is the entry of a major book publisher, Doubleday & Company, Inc., into the recording of "show business" musical entertainment. Dolphin Records, the new phonograph record division of Doubleday, marks the entry of the publisher into the recording field.

Nationwide distribution is just being completed of four new personality albums featuring Cyril Ritchard, Nancy Walker, Elaine Stritch, and Portia Nelson. To follow in the near future will be an album of Greta Keller.

Designed for the "at home" entertainment of the sophisticated urbanite and exurbanite, Dolphin Records are focalizing their recordings on feature personalities who are now high-lighted in the entertainment field, or who are approaching national attention. Each artist has already garnered a "following" in the field from which he has come . . . night clubs (both here and abroad), theatre, and/or television.

Incorporated in each Dolphin personality album are the hit tunes associated with the success of the artist and his unique technique. Cyril Ritchard, star of "Peter Pan" and "The King And Mrs. Candle," sings "The Old Gavotte" from his role as Captain Hook in the stage and TV performances of "Peter Pan." Nancy Walker does numbers from various musical comedies in which she starred, such as "Down to the Sea" from the recent "Phoenix, '55", as well as her delightful performances of "Get Married, Shirley" and "Irving". The Distributor who wins the 1955 Gold Record Award is E. & R. Distributors in Butte, Montana. Runners-up among the Decca Distributors are the Toledo, Indianapolis, Grand Rapids and Phoenix. Presentation of the Gold Records will be made to the winners during the coming week.

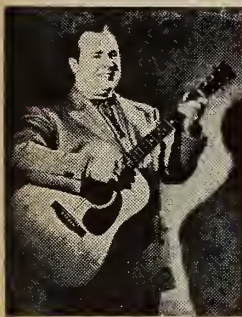

CAMDEN, N. J.—Representatives of the RCA Service Company are co-operating in the special trade demonstrations conducted by 20th Century Fox to help launch the new CinemaScope 55 process, it was announced last week by W. L. Jones, Vice President, Technical Products Service Department.

The demonstrations are intended to show the improved picture obtained from the CinemaScope 55 negative which is used for the 355mm print.

Service Company field engineers will be in attendance at 18 special screenings to prepare the standard theatre equipment for the demonstrations.

The first of the series of demonstrations began January 23 and contained sequences from "Carousel" and "The King and I" photographed in 55mm and printed in 35mm. Plans call for the demonstrations to be completed at selected theatres across the nation by February 21.

Four Aces And Elaine Malbin To Co-Star In Industrial Shows

NEW YORK — MCA Corporation, headed by Ervin Brabec, which packages industrial shows, is going full blast ahead with a new wrinkle, in a "Show Of Shows" promotion to be sponsored by Steinberg's Ltd., Montreal, Canada—a supermarket chain—March 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 12, 13, 14 and 15.

In addition to the free admission via the sales slips, customers who pick up entry forms at Steinberg's markets will draw for a jackpot of General Electric prizes.

A similar gimmick was worked successfully in Youngstown, Ohio, last year by Brabec and Youngstown Central Foods.

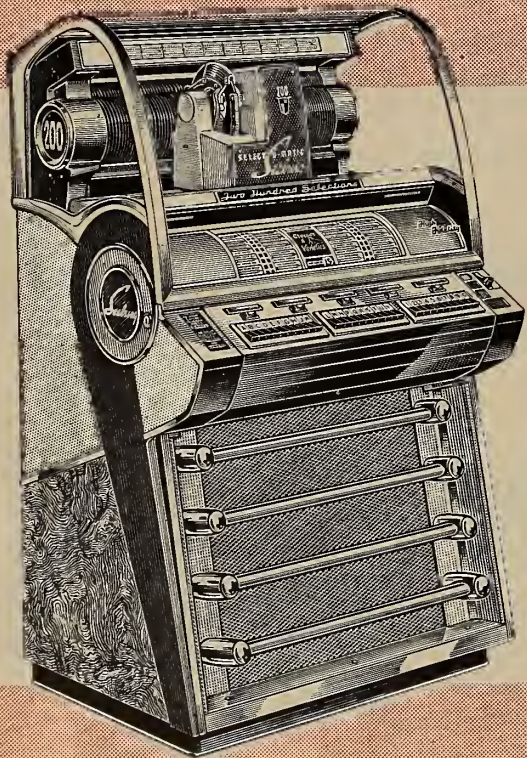

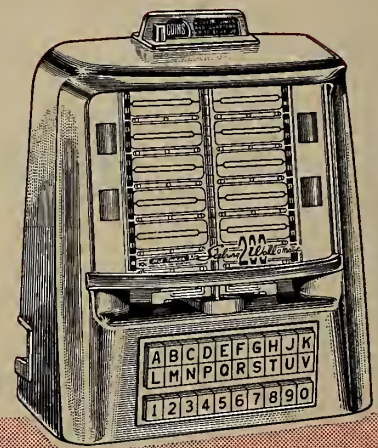

Here and There

NEW YORK — Of interest to the cigarette machine operators is the yearly report by *Printer's Ink* (an advertising publication) on the cigarette sales and the rating of foremost selling brands. For 1955, they report that the top selling cigarette was Camel. In order, the next 14 brands are: Lucky Strike; Pall Mall (king); Chesterfield; Winston (filter); Viceroy (filter); Philip Morris; Chesterfield (king); L & M (filter); Old Gold; Kool; Herbert Tareyton (king); Raleigh (king); Philip Morris (king); and Marlboro (filter). In studying the figures, it's interesting to note that every regular brand dropped in sales from 1954. The increases were all in the king and filter brands. It's quite obvious that the cigarette machine operator must have a multiple vendor to take advantage of the current smoking habits of the public. Total sales showed a gain of approximately 3 per cent over 1954. This marks a halt in the downward progression that has faced cigarette manufacturers since the summer of 1953.

DETROIT, MICH. — You've probably read this. But, for those who didn't, and for their amazement, we repeat the report that's been in the news. General Motors Corporation's net income for 1955 hit a new high of \$1,189,000,000 on a record-smashing sales of \$12,443,000,000. Staggering, isn't it? GM is the first industrial company to extend its net profit in one year beyond the \$1 billion mark. The firm showed a gain in 1955 in net profit over 1954 of 48 per cent; and a sales increase of 27 per cent. The total GM tax bill will probably be in the area of \$1.6 billion. The average number of salaried and hourly rate employes on GM payrolls thruout the world totaled 624,000, up 47,000 from the 1954 average.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Despite the lay-offs in automobile plants, lumber, fabricated metals, textiles, etc., strangely enough, the month of January, 1956 set a civilian employment record, according to the joint monthly report on employment issued this week by the Departments of Commerce and Labor. Employed in January, 1956 were 62,900,000 compared to January, 1952 (peak) of 61,003,000. 2,700,000 more people were employed than in January, 1954.

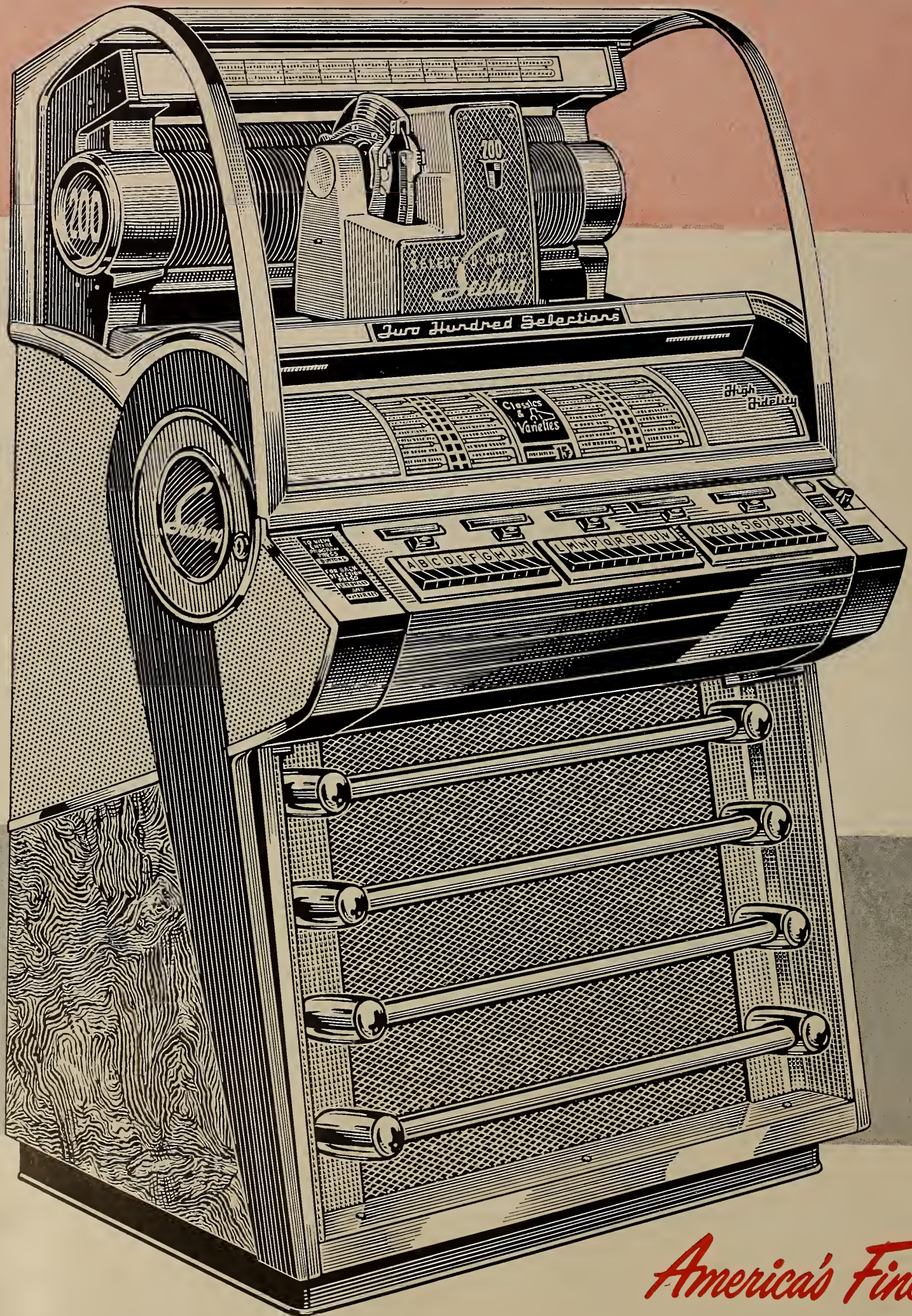

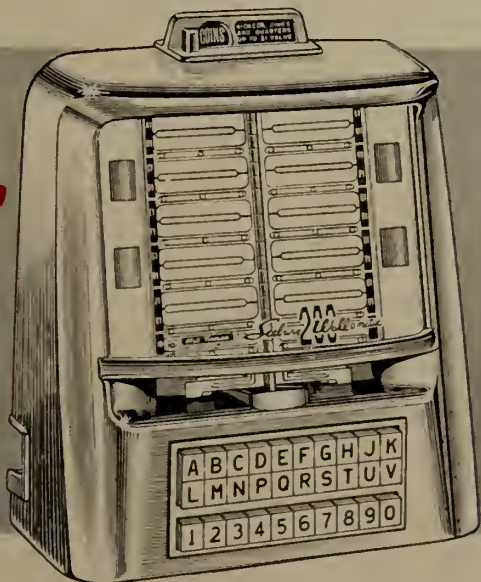

COPYRIGHT BILLS HEARINGS COMING

House of Representatives Indicates Dates Will Be Around End of February or Beginning of March

WASHINGTON, D. C.—It was disclosed this week that dates for hearings on the four Copyright bills now in the Sub-Committees of the Judiciary of the Senate and House have been discussed in these bodies, and tentative arrangements made.

In the House, Rep. Edwin E. Willis (Dem. Martinville, La.), it is reported, has scheduled hearings to take place around the end of February or the beginning of March, with no definite date set as yet. Bills before this Sub-Committee are the "Thompson Bill" (H. R. 2677) and the "Thompson Bill" (H. R. 4316).

In the Senate, Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney (Dem. Wyo.) has called a hearing, tentatively set for Wednesday, February 29. This hearing will be for the lawyers of both the proponents and opponents only, with the purpose of discussing the two bills before it, the "Kilgore Bill" (S. 590) and the "Langer Bill" (S. 1254).

Senate Hearings Tentatively Set for February 29 for Lawyers of Both Sides To Discuss Bills

Altho it is indicated hearings in both House and Senate are in the wind, it's highly possible a postponement may be affected. In past years dates had been set, but were later postponed for a future date, when the music machine interests asked for additional time to prepare its case and bring in witnesses.

The Cash Box, thru its many sources of information, is extremely close to the situation, and will advise the juke box industry immediately exactly what is transpiring, and what procedure to undertake. "Gladiator" Breaks All Gottlieb Sales Records

Exceeds All Foreign Shipment Marks In Addition To Domestic Postwar Sales Records For Single as Well as Multiple Player Games

CHICAGO—Alvin Gottlieb of D. Gottlieb & Company, this city, advised this past week.

"'Gladiator' has broken all post-war records for our firm.

"This not only includes single player five-ball games but also for multiple player five-ball games and", he added, "we are still far, far from the end of our production run on 'Gladiator'."

"'Gladiator', by the way, is a two-player, multiple coin five-ball game featuring 1 play 10c and 3 plays 25c.

Said Alvin Gottlieb, "It never even dawned on us that we were breaking all our post-war sales and production records until one day this past week when Nate and I sat down to arrange for still another production schedule.

"On going over our sales records we were actually amazed to learn the number of 'Gladiator' games we had already shipped.

"What was most impressive to us", he continued, "was the fact that we had already shipped more of this two-player, multiple play five-ball 'Gladiator' than we had shipped of even single player five-ball games."

Nate added, "Not only has 'Gladiator' broken all records for the domestic market, but", he elatedly reported, "this two-player, multiple play five-ball has broken all our international sales and shipment records by a wide, wide margin, bettering anything we've accomplished with any five-ball game since the end of War II."

Nate Gottlieb also added, "From all present indications the run on 'Gladiator' is far from over. We believe that when the total count is in this game will have set a new record for our firm that will be hard to equal."

MOA Holds Committee Meet

NEW YORK—Al Denver, vice president of MOA, and one of the seven men on the advisory committee of MOA, who met at the Morrison Hotel, Chicago, this past week, told The Cash Box upon his return to this city, that the committee discussed the formation of a record company, the third performance society, the forthcoming MOA meet, and the current Copyright legislation.

MOA's scheme to sponsor an operator-owned record company was discarded by the committee who now advises that there will not be any sale of stock to operators (probably because of the commotion this plan created in the record industry). They

announced a new plan (similar with the exception of the sale of stock to operators) to the effect that Barney Young, music publisher and third performing society head, would underwrite and own the record company. However, MOA would continue to sponsor this record company and would receive a monetary return on the sale of records. Irving Gwartz, who was being considered for a position in the record company, has been dropped.

In addition to Denver, those on hand for the committee meet, were George A. Miller, Sidney Levine, Clint Pierce, Martin Britz, Harry Snodgrass and Les Montooth.

This same remark, "the pool games business is hotter'n ever", seems to be the clarion call of every factory in town.

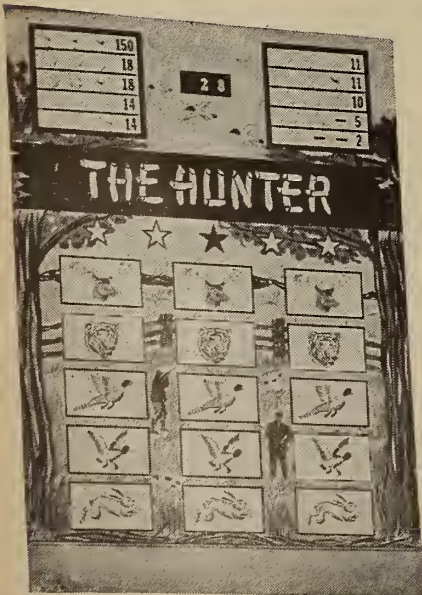
Heavier production schedules are in effect on the pool tables at the factories here than there have been on any games for a long, long time.

English Queen Mother Views AMI Phono



LONDON, ENGLAND—Paul Hunger, Alt. Director, Automatic Musical Instruments, this city, sends us a photo (reproduced herewith) showing Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, inspecting the BAL-AMI phonographs at the Automatic Musical Instrument's exhibit at the International Hotel and Catering Exhibition, Olympia, London.

FRESNO, CAL. — Mike Johnson, music machine operator, this city, says he's not in the business fifty years yet, but he'll drop a few hints by relating some actual experiences.

Johnson says when he went into the business his only competition was the coin operated piano. He operated the Gable Phonograph, which cost him about \$245 at the time. The cabinet of the Gable stood about six feet high, four feet across, and about two feet deep. It had a main spring which pulled the other various coil springs taut—and then with a terrific "bang" the motor shut off and the other springs pulled the record from one side over onto the turntable, pushing the reproducer up through the nospiece, thereby changing the needle. A new needle was used for each play. Records could be purchased then for from 18 to 20¢ each.

It was necessary to wait for the record to be completely played before inserting the second nickel. A little later he invented an accumulator which could take up to seven nickels at once. However, it was necessary to return to the machine after each record to select the next.

As a rule the commission to the location was 20% and sometimes 40% after the first three dollars had been deducted as front money.

Johnson says this was when he was working for Fay Replogle, Sr., a partner in the old Central Music Company of San Francisco. The route consisted of about seventy pieces and stretched from Fresno to Bakersfield, both sides of the valley included. It would take about four days away from home to make the complete rounds.

Report on new sales and promotion ideas. Keep salesmen, route men, service men on their toes with pep talks at regular intervals. In short, help keep this big business going at top speed.

He accomplished all these tasks very capably. The wealthy operator-distributor held him in high regard. Respected his judgment. Was very fond of him. Even discussed inner secrets with him.

One day, as this young promotion man was visiting about in a big city, he met a friend whom he hadn't seen in some years.

"It sure is a terrific deal, but", he added, "it's no good for me."

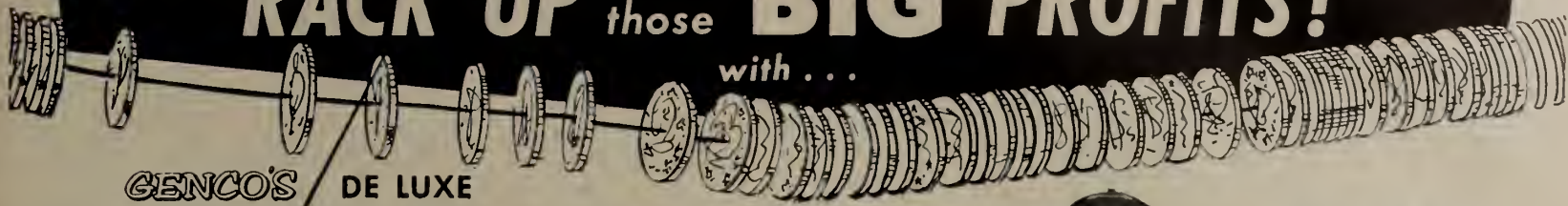
The young promotion man was stunned. His feet seemed turned to clay. He was frightened. Had he offended his biggest account? Was he now going to lose this business? He felt sick.

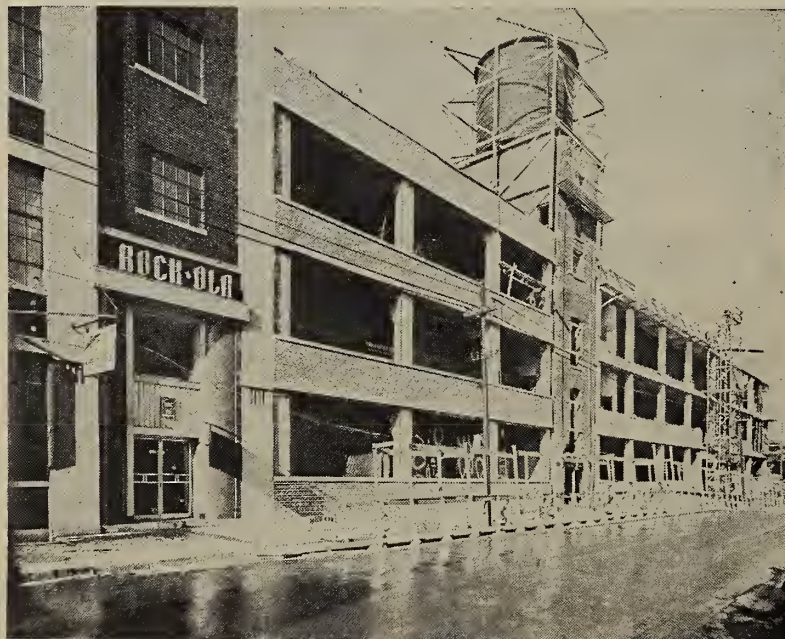

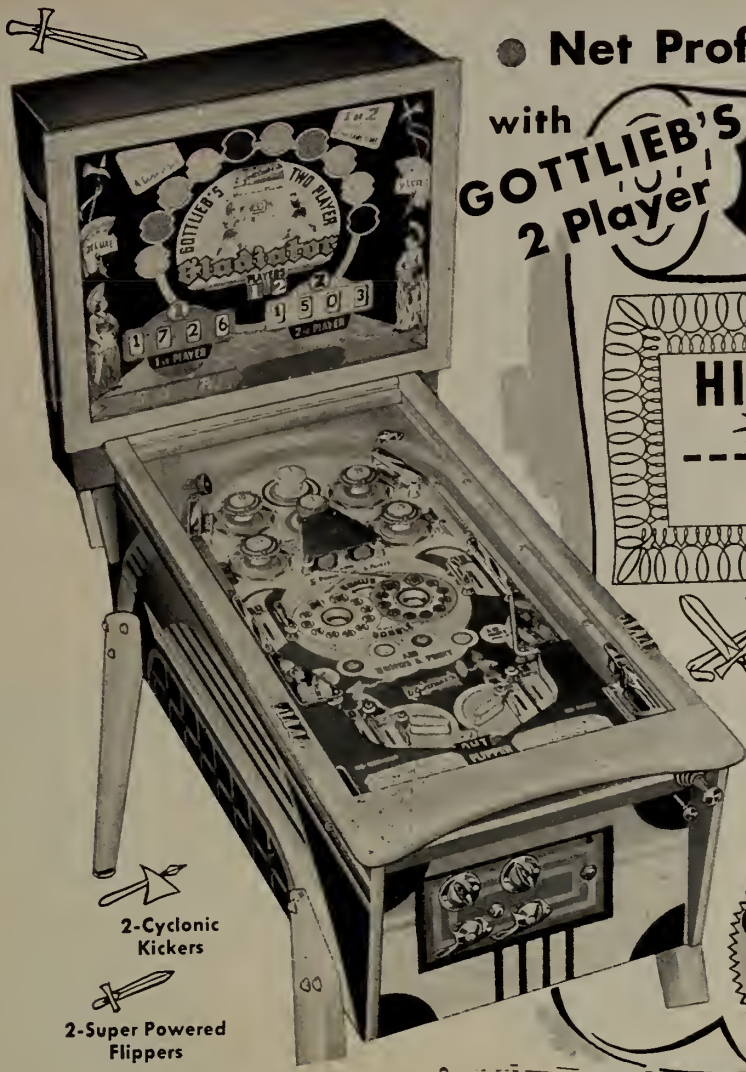

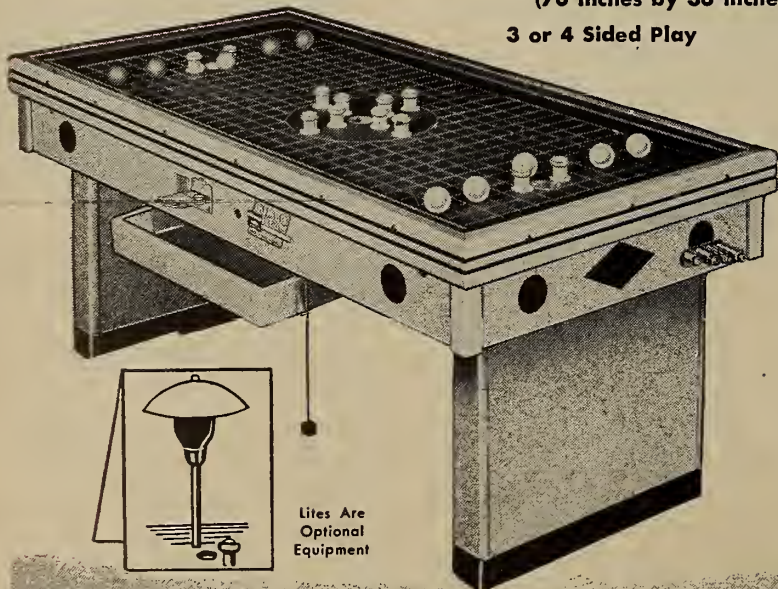

How To Use "THE CASH BOX PRICE LISTS"

[Also known as the "C. M. I. (Coin Machine Industry) BLUE BOOK"]

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such buyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.

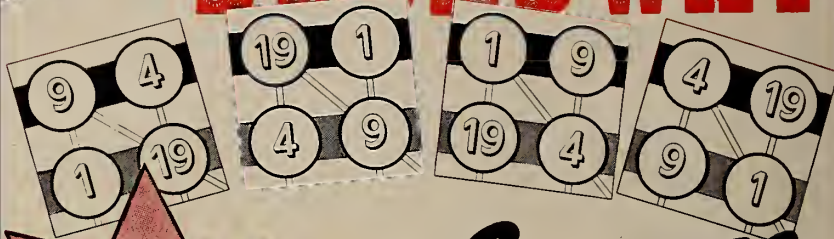
