B "WHOLE WIDE WORLD" (2:00)
[Lowell BMI—Jones, Biggs] The Deep River Boys, known the world over for their beautiful blend, fall into the rock and roll groove on this release and belt out an exciting ditty the kids should enjoy. Swinging side.

C+ "ALL MY LOVE BELONGS TO YOU" (2:40) [Tee Pee ASCAP—Winkler, James] Another commercial rock and roller smoothly executed by the boys. This half has today's popular fish-beat.

DAVID ROSE ORCHESTRA

B+ "THEME FROM 'THE SWAN'" (2:22) [Miller ASCAP—Kaper] David Rose hands in a lush and gorgeous arrangement of the title theme from the forthcoming Grace Kelly-Alec Guinness film "The Swan." Rich and stirring melody that could develop into a smash.

B "FORBIDDEN PLANET" (2:27) [Robbins ASCAP—Rose] Eerie and unusual astral sounds are heard throughout this lush and beautiful theme which David Rose has written for the film "Forbidden Planet." Fascinating recording. Something extremely different. Should make interesting change of pace programming. Lovely melody.

VIC DAMONE & PERCY FAITH O.

B "TO LOVE AGAIN" (3:15)
[Columbia ASCAP—Washington, Stoloff, Sidney] Vic Damone gets a beautiful assist from Percy Faith's ork as he hands in a wonderful interpretation of the top romantic ballad from the new Columbia flick "The Eddy Duchin Story." Touching tune based on one of Chopin's most ear-pleasing melodies. Song is clicking, and this version should take a cut of the sales.

C+ "I CRIED FOR YOU" (2:32)
[Miller ASCAP—Freed, Arnheim, Lyman] Paul Weston assists Vic on this up-beat revival of an old favorite.

B+ "THE GUN OF BILLY THE KID"
[C. H. Harris, ASCAP—Martin, Myers] Versatile Rusty Draper does an exciting job with a stirring western tune about the gun of one of the great names in Western folk lore. Should go well with the younger set.

B "SOMETIMES YOU GOTTA LOSE TO WIN" [Pure BMI—Royce, Swain] Rusty comes over well on this half as he chants a stirring, romantic ballad set against a rhythmic rock and roll fish beat. Pretty side.

MORGANA KING

B+ "DELOVELY" (2:10) [Chappell ASCAP—Porter] Morgana King makes an extremely thrilling debut on Wing with her exciting jazzy rendition of one of Cole Porter's great classics. The lark has a great style and vocal quality that gives a tune a "something special" sound. Reminds this reviewer of Lena Horne. A sleeper that could break big.

B "IN THE WEE SMALL HOURS OF THE MORNING" (2:25)
[Redd Evans ASCAP—Hillard, Mann] The talented lark changes the pace and wends her way thru a beautiful moody top-drawer ballad. Great piece of romantic wax. Strong coupling.

● Sarah Vaughan, still going strong with her hit rendition of "Mr. Wonderful," sends up a couple of great new sides that should keep her voice and her name before the public for the next few months. On one deck, the lark swings through a terrific up-beat ditty dubbed "Hot And Cold Running Tears." A catchy novelty with a good beat and some interesting guitar effects. The thrush really sings up a storm. The star changes the pace on the coupling and lilts through a tender romantic item labelled "That's Not The Kind Of Love I Want." Pretty teaming of lyrics and melody. Sounds like a two-sided clicker.

One piece, titled "The Rovin' Gambler" is an exciting finger-snapping novelty with a catchy up-beat and a most amusing story line. Happy cutie that the deep voiced songster delivers in class "A" fashion. "John Henry" is another great folk item from the pen of the "16 Tons" author, Merle Travis. It's a wonderful piece of material that's been popular for many years. This rendition may make the tune a smash in the coming months.

It's a stirring drum-filled tango pretty tagged "Tango Of The Drums." The public loves tangos, yet very few of them are released. This one can be expected to rack up a huge sale. Beautiful effort that will have instrumental lovers running to the stores. "Sinner Man," is an exciting folk flavored piece. An emotional spiritual selection with Will Holt and a chorus handling the vocal chores. Watch the top deck.

● Two completely different sides make Vaughn Monroe's latest coupling an attractive disk that should do big things over the counters and in the boxes. "The Rock 'N Roll Express" is a colorful novelty with a thrilling tempo and a potent delivery. Monroe gets a strong assist from a chorus and Joe Reisman's ork as he flies through this chugging ditty. Cute set of lyrics make this an enjoyable side from all angles. "There She Goes," the lower lid, features the rich voiced baritone on a warm and sparkling ballad with an inviting latin tempo. Vaughn hands in a pretty bit of crooning here.

B+ "BEGINNER'S LUCK" (2:20)
[Sheldon BMI—Ebb, Klein, Coleman] Young Dori Anne Gray, who had a regional click with her "Heart-break Alley" platter, comes up with another potent platter that could be her "big break" disk. It's an exciting, fish-beat rock and roller that the teenagers should love. Good lyrics for the younger set.

C+ "I SURRENDER" (2:00) [Benay ASCAP—Cherzer, Goodis] The chirp makes a complete turnabout and dances through a colorful military tempo novelty. Cute and catchy march item.

ROBERT CLARY

B "HEART OF PARIS" (2:45)
[Mills ASCAP—Larue, Parish, Auric] French song star Robert Clary sings from the heart as he fashions a warm and tender romantic ballad about his native country. Beautiful melody superbly executed.

B+ "MERRY-GO-ROUND" (2:32)
[Southern ASCAP—Lawrence, Van Parys] The gifted performer hands in another outstanding performance on this half as he glides through another wonderful French melody with English lyrics. Lovely waltz tempo romancer that could smash.

ALAN FREED & HIS ROCK 'N ROLL BAND

B "TINA'S CANTEEN" (2:34)
[Sylvia BMI—Sears] Popular New York jockey Alan Freed leads a rock and roll band thru a swinging side on his first release as an artist for the Coral label. Solid jumper with a good beat. Tailor-made for the youngsters.

B+ "RIGHT NOW, RIGHT NOW"
[Bonita BMI—Sears, Calhoun] Another hard hitting instrumental rocker with the boys in the band really driving. Shouting voices are heard throughout this portion.

JOSE CURBELO ORCH.

(Fiesta 065; 45-065)

B+ "LA LUNA" (2:32) [Morro BMI—Aguilar] Jose Curbelo and his crew, currently riding high with one of biggest two-sided latin hits on the market, "Poco Pelo" b/w "La La La," comes up with another sensational side that could easily become the #1 cha cha. It's a terrific dance item with a thrilling sound. Sharp beat and a great group vocal effort.

C+ "RENDEZVOUS" (2:32) [Pemora BMI—Colon] Santo Colon handles the romantic vocal duties on this smooth and tender cha cha.

THE PILGRIMS

B "THIS LAND IS YOUR LAND" (2:19) [Ludlow BMI—Guthrie] The Pilgrims blend beautifully on an attractive rendition of a well known folk song. A warm and inspiring piece.

[Dare BMI—Knight, Hays] The group stars again on a lively and most contagious light-hearted ditty. Wonderful country flavored polka ditty.

(Mardi-Gras 1021; 1021x45)

B+ "TOGETHER 1-2-3" [Aljean BMI—Castellanos] Al Castellanos, a master of the latin beat and the man behind one of the all time best selling dance disks, "Speak Up Mambo", comes through with another winner in this catchy cha cha ditty. Lively side with a terrific dance beat. A big seller.

B+ "MERENGUE TA-KA-TA" [Aljean BMI—Castellanos] This half features one of the best merengues to hit the market in months. An exciting inspiring arrangement with a terrific vocal gimmick. Hot coupling.

ANTHONY PERKINS
(Epic 9165; 5-9165)

B+ "A LITTLE LOVE CAN GO A LONG, LONG WAY" (3:00) [Northern ASCAP—Webster, Fain] Anthony Perkins, a wonderful dramatic actor, drew raves from TV critics for his touching performance in the Goodyear TV play "Joey", recently. Here Epic offers the star singing the tender ballad which he performed in the show. A beautiful, sentimental offering that could develop into a smash. Song grows on you. There are probably thousands who will be looking forward to this recording.

C+ "IF YOU'LL BE MINE" (2:42) [Chappell ASCAP—Martin] A smooth presentation of a pleasant up-beat love story.

MITCH MILLER ORCH.

B "THAT GIRL" (2:30) [E. B. Marks ASCAP-BMI—Suesse] Buddy Weed works on the harpsichord as Mitch Miller and the chorus glide through a catchy instrumental novelty with a wonderful melody. Pretty piece. Different from the run-of-the-mill merchandise. Chorus sings without words.

C+ "ST LAWRENCE RIVER" (2:36) [Rylan ASCAP—Merrill] A pleasant little march beat ditty with an attractive melody and a cute lyric.

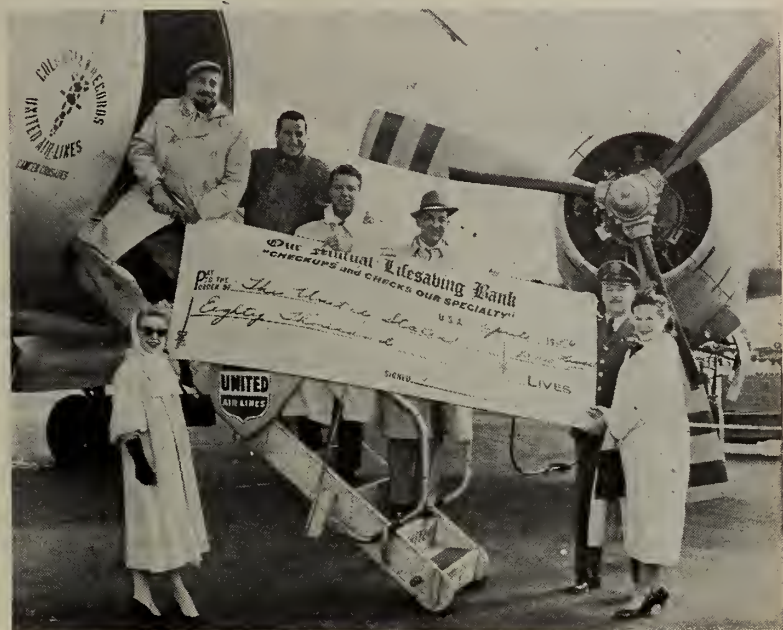

Columbia Record Artists Tour For Cancer Crusade



NEW YORK—The Columbia Records-United Airlines "Flying Cancer Crusaders" has had great success in a 16 city 5 day tour of the country on behalf of the American Cancer Society and 1956 Cancer Crusade. Kicking off with a sendoff on the Ed Sullivan Show, Sunday, April 8th, the disk stars boarded a special United Airlines ship on Monday, April 9th for the first leg of their trip. The group consisted of singers Tony Bennett, who had just completed a stand at New York's Copacabana, Lu Ann Simms, Guy Mitchell, and Peggy King, who had heard of the trip and winged in from the coast to join the others. Columbia toppers Mitch Miller and Percy Faith were in on the tour from the beginning as were Dr. John King, a cancer research specialist, Lt. Col. William Fitzgerald, a cured cancer patient who had opened the drive by presenting the "Sword of Hope" to President Eisenhower in the White House and publicity reps from the cooperating organizations.

Starting off in Philadelphia, 3 cities a day were on the heavy schedule, and sometimes 4 stops were made when time permitted. It was the first time such a completely covered tour was ever done in such an up tempo manner. Usually only a city a day is skedded. The artists were tape interviewed at the airports by an average of 5 to 20 local disk jockeys, in special rooms set aside for them by United Airlines. The stars were also interviewed by newspaper people as well as on radio news shows and television shows. They were filmed right at the airport, usually outside where better light conditions permitted film coverage. Thousands of photographers shot the singers, and others, who presented mayors and governors and other civic administrators with the Cancer Society's "Sword of Hope". In the lay-overs, in Boston, Cleveland, Chicago, San Francisco, and Los Angeles, more time allowed for an average of 5 to 10 radio-tv shows for the group. Total amount of interviews by disk jockeys and others was estimated at over a thousand talks for the week. It may reach nearly two thousand when all reports

are in from the field.

John Becker, radio television publicity director for the American Cancer Society and Steve Barrie from the same office, were on the tour to coordinate things as well as Karl Galda from the United Airlines Public Relations department. Dave Gordon, on a week's leave of absence from Screen Gems, the television subsidiary of Columbia Pictures, was along to supervise the entire tour. Dick Linke Columbia's publicity head, who was skedded to go on the trip, stepped out at the last moment for Peggy King. The special United plane, used by the president of the airline only holds 15 passengers and a crew of 3.

"I have never been with such a wonderful group of people such as those on this trip," said Becker, "and they insisted to disk jockeys and all the other people, they were on this trip not to talk about their latest recordings, but to tell their fans and friends that a checkup and a check can help save lives from the threat of cancer." He added, "I would like The Cash Box if they could, to let the fellow members of the industry know how helpful these hard working people were in this fight against cancer. We cannot thank them enough for the sincere and warm messages they brought to the public."

The first 3 city a day tour wound up in Hollywood on Friday, April 13th, but radio and television appearances continued on throughout the following two days. Lu Ann Simms appeared on "Juke Box Jury" while Mitch Miller and the others made the disk jockey circuit. It was also estimated over 100 motion picture men from television stations were at the airports to cover the arrival of the "Flying Crusaders" as well as hundreds of newspaper photographers. All in all, the tour was rated a bigger success than any other and plans are being made for next year, to be longer and with the same people as well as others. The entire tour was sponsored by the American Cancer Society with United Airlines contributing the airplane and Columbia the help of their artists and their Columbia distributors.

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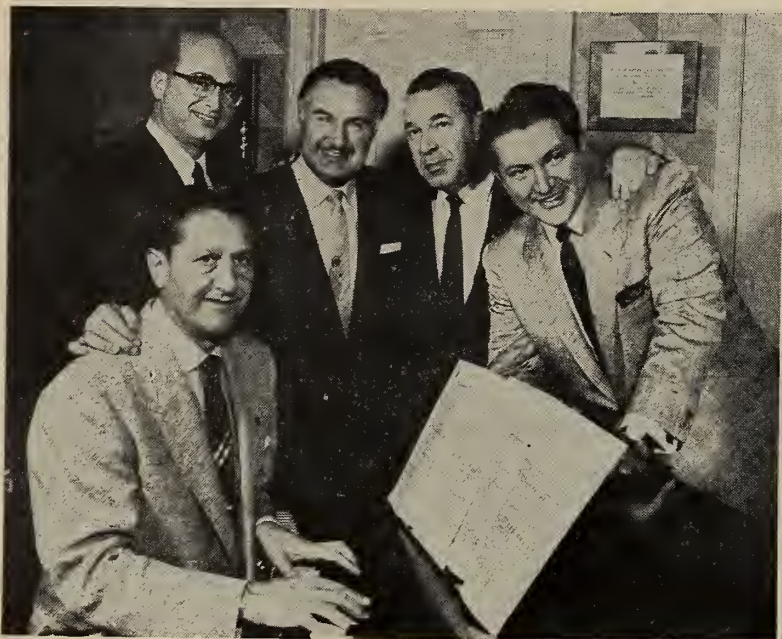

"THE EDDY DUCHIN STORY"—Orchestra Conducted By Harry Geller—Piano Solos By Harry Sukman and George Greeley—Capitol T716 (1-12" LP)
 Hollywood has once again found enough human interest in a musical personality's life to portray it on the screen. Following in the recent footsteps of Glenn Miller, Ruth Etting and Benny Goodman the short life (41 years) of Eddy Duchin will hit the movie screens shortly. The recording companies, as they've successfully done with the other name artists, are reviving the music and polished piano technique of Duchin. Each of the sets named above has selected 12 Duchin favorites featuring re-creations of the Duchin style. Decca has gotten hold of the original sound track. Carmen Cavallaro is heard and Tyrone Power seen in the film. The Mercury and Capitol releases feature two other talented keyboardmen and on some numbers (i.e. "Manhattan," "Dizzy Fingers," "Brazil") they ably approximate the Duchin manner. All three packages have tremendous sales potential within easy reach of chart stature. All three feature attractive covers of the film's stars, Tyrone Power and Kim Novak.

 Glenn Osser and the ork hit the mood music nail on the head with arrangements and material of a high order. With such worthy representatives of pop music as Richard Rodgers, Cole Porter and Jerome Kern supplying the tunes, not much can go wrong. And nothing does as Osser's group effectively handles the numbers. Superior issue of lush music.

 Besides a bevy of fine films produced so far this year, there is also Hollywood's increased emphasis on creating pop hits from movie scores and themes. This MGM release of recent movie material contains aside from at least two current favorites ("Serenade" and "Molly-O") a number of attractive melodies. Some, in fact, are oldies (i.e. "Where Or When" from "Gaby" and "The Angels Sing" from "The Benny Goodman Story"). Name performers on the pressing such as David Rose, Leroy Holmes and Billy Eckstine make this a strong item.

 Catherine Sauvage is a singing star in France. On this Epic release Miss Sauvage performs 12 of her specialty pieces. Those who understand French will find the numbers expressing quite an earthy point of view on life. Regardless of one's linguistic ability, however, Miss Sauvage's exciting delivery should please many listeners. A select audience should find the disk an entertaining bill of fare.

"THE LOVER'S TOUCH"—Bill Snyder—Piano Solos with Orchestra and Rhythm Accompaniment—Decca DL 8237 (1-12" LP)

 A pleasant interchanging of orchestra and rhythm accompaniment sets a good background variety to the piano of Bill Snyder. Each number may have the intimacy of rhythm accompaniment or the lushness of the ork. The offerings include standards and several interesting Snyder compositions. Snyder's keyboard artistry is constantly deft and imaginative. Above average mood music set.

Miss Fiordaliso's voice is pleasantly sweet and Mr. Buti possesses a typical Italian tenor delivery. The pieces, arranged and orchestrated in an easy-going Continental way, are drawn from various sources. "That's Amore," for example, is of American origin. Actually recorded in Italy, the set may find a limited but agreeable following.

LATIN RHYTHMS

"SPEAK UP"—Al Castellanos And Orchestra—Mardi-Gras LP 5002 (1-12" LP)

SPEAK UP MAMBO; MERENGUE NO. 28; FREE FOR ALL; CHA CHA CHA AT THE HAREM; TALKING RHYTHM; CHA CHARAMA; MERENGUE PIE; THE BUTTERFLY CHA CHA; MUMBLES MAMBO; ARE YOU KIDDING.

Some of the current top mambo-Cha Cha Cha-Merengue sizzlers get the tasteful touch of famed Al Castellanos and the ork. This Latin dance lover's delight features one of all-time mambo favorites, "Speak Up Mambo." The set shouldn't have any difficulty in getting on the turntables of any red-blooded Latin rhythm enthusiast. For a variety of Latin-rhythms at their best, this is the album to get.

JAZZ

"ELLINGTONIA 56"—Johnny Hodges, Alto; Cat Anderson, Trumpet; Harry Carney, Baritone; Bill Strayhorn, Paul Gonzalves, Tenor Saxophone; Britt Woodman and Quentin Jackson, Trombones; Jimmy Hamilton, Clarinet—Norgran MG N-1055 (1-12" LP)

THE HAPPY ONE; DUKE'S JAM; NIGHT WALK; YOU GOT IT COMING; HI'YA; SNIBOR; TEXAS BLUES.

The drive that's still keeping Duke Ellington and His Band way up there on the jazz scene is the whole story on this Norgran pressing. Though the Duke himself is not included on the platter, many of his worthy aggregation are. Leading the boys and playing alto is Johnny Hodges, a formidable Ellington colleague. The original material is expertly handled by the full band and a smaller version of the outfit. Glossy performances by Cat Anderson on the trumpet and Billy Strayhorn on the keyboard. Impressive jazz set.

"CAN'T GET STARTED WITH YOU"—Featuring Jackie Paris—Wing MGW-60004 (1-12" LP)

THERE WILL NEVER BE ANOTHER YOU; HEAVEN CAN WAIT; STRANGE; THAT OLE DEVIL CALLED LOVE; WHISPERING GRASS, DON'T TELL THE TREES; HEART OF GOLD; I CAN'T GET STARTED; INDIANA; CLOUDY MORNING; WRAP YOUR TROUBLES IN DREAMS; GOOD NIGHT MY LOVE.

A substantial amount of a soft jazz technique applied to some of the better tunes around, gives Jackie Paris a top rating of his first wing LP. With the exception of "I Can't Get Started" and "Wrap Your Troubles In Dreams," Paris' material is not heard often but in every respect it's class stuff. Though his jazz approach is evident, Paris still maintains strong traces of ballad vocalizing. Thus the package should react nicely to a pop-jazz audience. Jackie has a loyal deejay following. And the jocks should be programming from this platter regularly.

"COUNT BASIE"—Count Basie And His Orchestra—Brunswick BL 54012 (1-12" LP)

JUMPIN' AT THE WOODSIDE; EVERY TUB; OUT THE WINDOW; SHORTY GEORGE; TIME OUT; DOGGIN' AROUND; TEXAS SHUFFLE; BLUE AND SENTIMENTAL; CHEROKEE; TOPSY; JOHN'S IDEA.

Count Basie, who has done more than his share to keep swing sounds alive offers some explosive examples of some of the best swing music one is apt to come across. Featuring besides the Count, the disk happily has Lester Young, Tenor Sax, Buck Clayton, Trumpet and Herschel Evans, Clarinet. This issue on LP of 11 Basie classics is bound to stir many a swing-jazz fan to his nearest record outlet. Collector's item.

CLASSICAL

TCHAIKOVSKY: Symphony No. 4, In F Minor, Op. 36—Boston Symphony Orchestra—RCA Victor LM-1952 (1-12" LP)

Tchaikovsky's last three symphonies, the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth are beyond a doubt his three greatest contributions to the symphonic catalogue. Whereas the Fifth and Sixth show a dominance of personal despondency on the part of Tchaikovsky the Fourth, as can best be explained, is a work of contentment and fulfillment. This dynamic and lyrical opus is brilliantly mastered by the Boston Symphony Orchestra under Charles Munch's baton. The waxing is an invaluable part of an already well represented Fourth Symphony list of available recordings.

LECUONA: Andaluca (Suite Espagnol)—ALBENIZ Songs Of Spain (Cantos De Espana)—Leonard Pennario, Piano—Capitol P8319 (1-12" LP)

Two of the best known composers of serious Spanish music are featured on this Capitol platter. Lecuona's "Andaluca" of which two sections, "Andaluca" and "Malaouena", have made out extremely well on their own, is a fascinating piece of color and imagination. Albeniz's "Song Of Spain" is also a rich harvest of descriptive themes. Both pieces receive the superb tonal craftsmanship of Leonard Pennario. Excellent entry for both classical and semi-classical music adherents.

TCHAIKOVSKY: Serenade in C Major For String Orchestra, Op. 48—Mozartiana (Suite No. 4 in G Major, Op. 61) Paul Van Kempen Conducting The Orchestre Des Concerts Lamoureux—Epic LC 3213 (1-12" LP)

Two lesser known compositions of the Russian master Tchaikovsky are featured on this Epic entry. The Serenade is a happy opus that measures up (particularly in the delightful second movement Walzer) with his other romantically inclined works. The "Mozartiana" is based in the main on themes by Mozart. It is a well structured essay composed of little, jaunty gems. Paul Van Kempen's direction of the accomplished Orchestre Des Concerts Lamoureux is light-hearted and superb in the spirit of both works. This classical platter ought to attract many a Tchaikovsky fan.

College Students To Compete In Nation-Wide Jazz Contest

NEW YORK—The "National Collegiate Jazz Contest", sponsored by The Rudolph Wurlitzer Company, is currently under way throughout America, reaching millions of college and university students.

Designed to find the nation's top professional instrumental college jazz group in celebration of Wurlitzer's 100th anniversary of musical progress, the contest offers the winning jazz group a guest appearance on the Steve Allen "Tonight" TV Show, a record company audition and a Wurlitzer Electronic Piano for the college represented.

Second and third groups will be selected as runners-up in the contest and receive recognition trophies.

Six finalists will be selected by the Wurlitzer Music Workshop from all the entries. Some of the biggest names in jazz today will judge the six finalists to determine, by majority vote, a winner. The judges include Duke Ellington, Dave Brubeck, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey, Ralph Flanagan and Don Elliott.

All entries will be judged on instrument execution, performance, musical knowledge and arrangements.

Applications and covering material have been sent to the Student Council President of each college in the nation with 1,000 or more student enrollment. Professional college jazz groups of six or less instrumentalists may enter. There is no limit to entries from any one college.

A tape recording of two or three jazz selections by each group entering the contest must be sent to the judges in care of the Wurlitzer Music Workshop, 522 Fifth Avenue, New York 36, N. Y., no later than midnight Saturday, May 12, 1956, at which time the contest will close.

The winning group will appear on the Steve Allen "Tonight" TV Show on Friday, May 25th, and will be presented with the Wurlitzer Electronic Piano to be placed with the music department of the college which they represent.

Contestants in the contest must be professional musicians and college

students. There is no entry fee or charge of any sort involved.

An Eastern Collegiate Jazz Contest was sponsored in 1955 by the Music Society of America, Inc. So keen was the interest among the proponents of jazz that Wurlitzer deemed it advisable to continue the competition on a nationwide scale with an eye to the future and the fostering of musical interest and appreciation throughout collegiate America.

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London Inaugurates Its 1956 "May Is Mantovani Month" Campaign

NEW YORK—London Records has started the wheels rolling for its 1956 "May Is Mantovani Month" Campaign.

In addition to a wealth of flier, streamer and advertising material, London is offering a \$1.98 "Monty" Sampler on a one-shot basis. One sampler will be offered for every two regular Mantovani LP's purchased. Dealer re-orders apply against quotas, prizes, etc., but do not entitle the dealer to additional samplers. The dealer cost of the \$1.98 sampler is \$1.50. The sampler includes 12 songs—one each from twelve Mantovani albums.

In addition, the diskery is introducing a new regular-priced LP in connection with the month-long program. It is titled "The Waltzes of Irving Berlin" and the London brass expects this to be Monty's biggest album to date.

In connection with the program, a copy of the "Monty" sampler will be sent to all disk jockeys and radio stations throughout the country. London is also offering to radio stations fifteen Mantovani albums, the Berlin one included, for the price of \$1.00 each, postage prepaid.

Triangular pennants, dealer display kits, Mantovani Catalogs, Window Easels, Sampler Jackets, etc., will be rushed out to distributors.

Fifty million people are expected to see advertisements selling the sampler and the new "Berlin Waltzes" albums in such consumer magazines as Collier's, Companion, Newsweek,

Saturday Evening Post, Woman's Day, Cosmopolitan, New Yorker and Time.

Contests are being run for performance and display. In the performance contest, each dealer is being assigned a quota covering all 15 regular Mantovani 12" LP's (Excluding the Sampler) by his salesman and distributor. Winning dealers will be determined on the basis of percent of purchases, over quota, giving large and small dealers an equal opportunity to win.

The first national prize is a one full week all expense paid trip for two to Acapulco (Mexico) New York, Miami or Las Vegas.

Second national prize is a holiday weekend-all expense paid trip for two in New York (if winner is east of the Mississippi) or Hollywood (if winner is west of the Mississippi). Third national prize is \$100. Twenty-three additional local prizes of \$50 each will also be awarded.

Ten prizes of \$50 each will go to the dealers who have the best store and window display featuring Mantovani and "May is Mantovani" Month. Dealer displays will be judged from photographs submitted direct to: Mantovani Photo Contest, London Records, 539 West 25th St. New York 1, N. Y. Photos must be submitted not later than May 31, 1956. Winning dealers will be announced by June 15th.

London salesmen throughout the country, representing their distributors, will have a quota and three salesmen will also be awarded prizes.

NEW YORK—Fred Amsel and Jerry Levy of Directional Enterprises, have announced the signing of Bobby Scott, ABC-Paramount recording star of "Chain Gang" fame, to a personal management contract.

Levy and Amsel are currently negotiating with 20th Century Fox Studios for a term picture deal for Scott. He has already been pacted for a brace of TV appearances on the "Big Surprise" Show for Speidel.

Directional recently signed the Four Voices, currently on the charts with "Lovely One" on Columbia, and have re-signed the Rover Boys (ABC-Paramount) to a long term contract. The Rovers have just come out with a new disk coupling "Graduation Day" and "I Hear Music".

Sheldon Promotes "Graduation Day" Records

NEW YORK—In conjunction with their latest plug tune "Graduation Day", Sheldon Music has sent an interesting promotion flier to 3,500 disk jockeys.

The flier comes in the form of a diploma and is offered "for outstanding service rendered to the youth of America; for helping . . . the record of 'Graduation Day' achieve nationwide popularity".

The diploma is signed by Dean "Goldie" Goldmark, general professional manager of Sheldon Music.

Each of the 3,500 diplomas was individually addressed in long hand by the pubbery's office staff.

The flier mentions the Four Freshmen and the Rover Boys who recorded the tune for Capitol and ABC-Paramount, respectively.

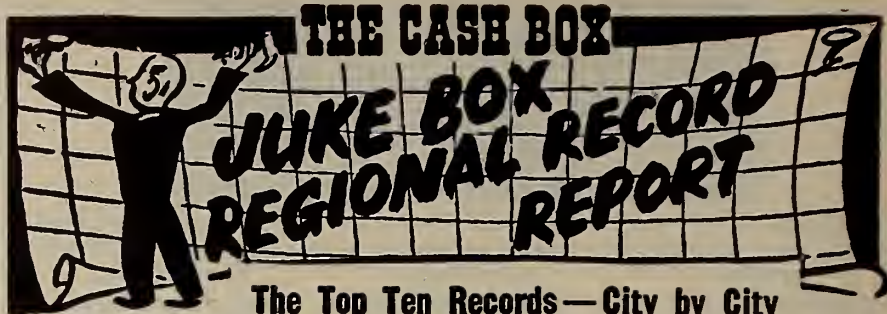

NEW YORK—Dizzy Gillespie and his 18-piece jazz band, currently on a goodwill tour of the Middle East for the State Department, have enjoyed "tremendous success so far", according to a spokesman for ANTA, the theatrical appointees which arranged the tour for the State Department.

The Karachi, Pakistan, English language newspapers the "Dawn" and the "Morning News" wrote glowing reviews about the unit's recent concerts at the Palace Theatre.

The "Dawn" stated: "America's Dizzy Gillespie and his 18 piece orchestra . . . drove the audience of about 1,000 crazy; and they brought down the house with applause and shouts of encore."

The "Morning News" said of Gillespie: "To play a trumpet exceptionally well is certainly a worthy goal . . . but

Gillespie accomplishes what only a few musicians can."

Gillespie and the group are currently performing in Beirut, Lebanon, and then will play in Syria, Turkey, Yugoslavia and Greece before returning to America. This is the first tour of jazz musicians ever to be sponsored by the State Department and the Middle Easterners have been jamming the theatres everywhere the Americans have played and paying \$3 a seat.

Due to the enthusiastic reception of "bop" and "modern" jazz in Iran and Pakistan, Dizzy has added many more progressive jazz pieces to the program, which consists of a history of American jazz.

Midwest Distributing Campaign Results In 48% R&B Sales Increase

ST. LOUIS, MO.—The Midwest Distributing Company, this city, has almost doubled its total sale of rhythm and blues records since December of last year due to an energetic and well-planned campaign to promote the music.

It all began when Paul Levy, president of Midwest, became associated with the Kilroy Advertising Company of St. Louis with the prime object of getting a more concentrated exposure of R&B records on stations that specialized in the programming of pop disks.

In December, Midwest bought a full hour program, from 10:00 to 11:00 P.M. on WIL called "The Rhythm and Beat Show". It started with three hours a week and now the company is running six hours a week. And the results have been most pleasing for all concerned. WIL has enjoyed an average 1.5 increase in audience rating in the 10 to 11 time period since the show started, and the program does not use a personality. The music rather than the dee jay is accented and the station is provided with a script for each show. Introduction and remarks are kept to a minimum so that the greatest possible number of records can be programmed.

Point of sale counter cards listing the Midwest distributed records currently popular are distributed to dealers throughout the city. And currently the distrib is in the process

of building a "Rhythm and Beat Fan Club". Membership cards and registration cards (all free of charge) have been in the hands of the record dealers for about two weeks, and Midwest has already received returns from more than 2000 members. Punch cards are being issued to each member of the club, who will receive a free record for every ten he buys from the "Rhythm and Beat Popularity List" counter card. Since only records distributed by Levy are listed on these counter cards, he is assured of the movement of his records.

Midwest reports that through these efforts, record dealers who formerly did not even stock R&B records prior to the campaign, have become big accounts and the stores that did stock the records have tremendously increased their purchase orders. R&B sales have increased 48% for the first quarter of this year as compared with the same period last year. And the increase is not just the product of greater sales on the hit records, but also represent an increased sales impact by a greater number of records. Where formerly about five records were selling in quantity, now as many as 15 to 20 may be moving in volume at the same time.

The next step being contemplated is a Rhythm and Beat Fan Club Stage Show featuring top recording stars appearing in person.

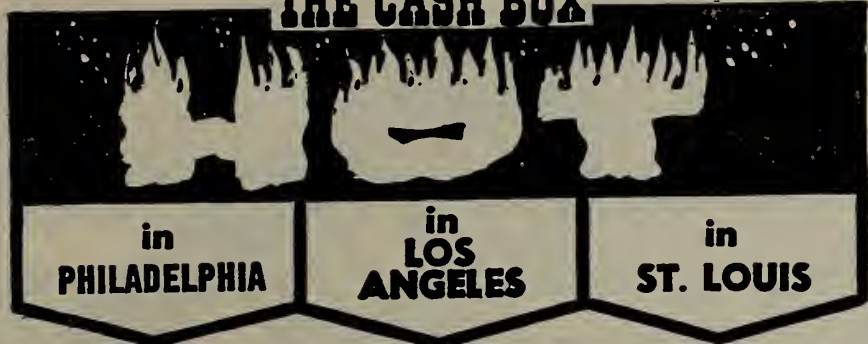

Livingston's first Bill Thomson release brought in so many requests for new material that Thomson flew from the West Coast to rendezvous with a Livingston recording crew in Florida for a series of sessions on what is

probably the only stereophonic Hammond Organ in the country.

In the classical vein are four Concertos for French Horn and Orchestra featuring James Stagliano and The Zimmler Sinfonietta. These tapes have the additional interest of being the first stereophonic recordings made in the newly completed Kresge Auditorium of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Fantasy Signs La Porta

NEW YORK—John La Porta, modern jazzman, has been signed by Fantasy Records to an exclusive contract and will begin recording for them this month.

Known for his alto and clarinet playing, and his arranging, La Porta will record a number of new works he is currently writing. The first LP will include sides cut with duet, quintet, and septet.

A native of Philadelphia, La Porta has worked and recorded with a number of big bands, including Woody's famous First Herd, and also has recorded with Lenny Tristano as well as his own albums on Debut.

He currently divides his time between teaching and studio work.

The Blackwood Brothers Quartet (RCA Victor) slated for personal appearances May 1st through May 12th which will carry the popular quartet into parts

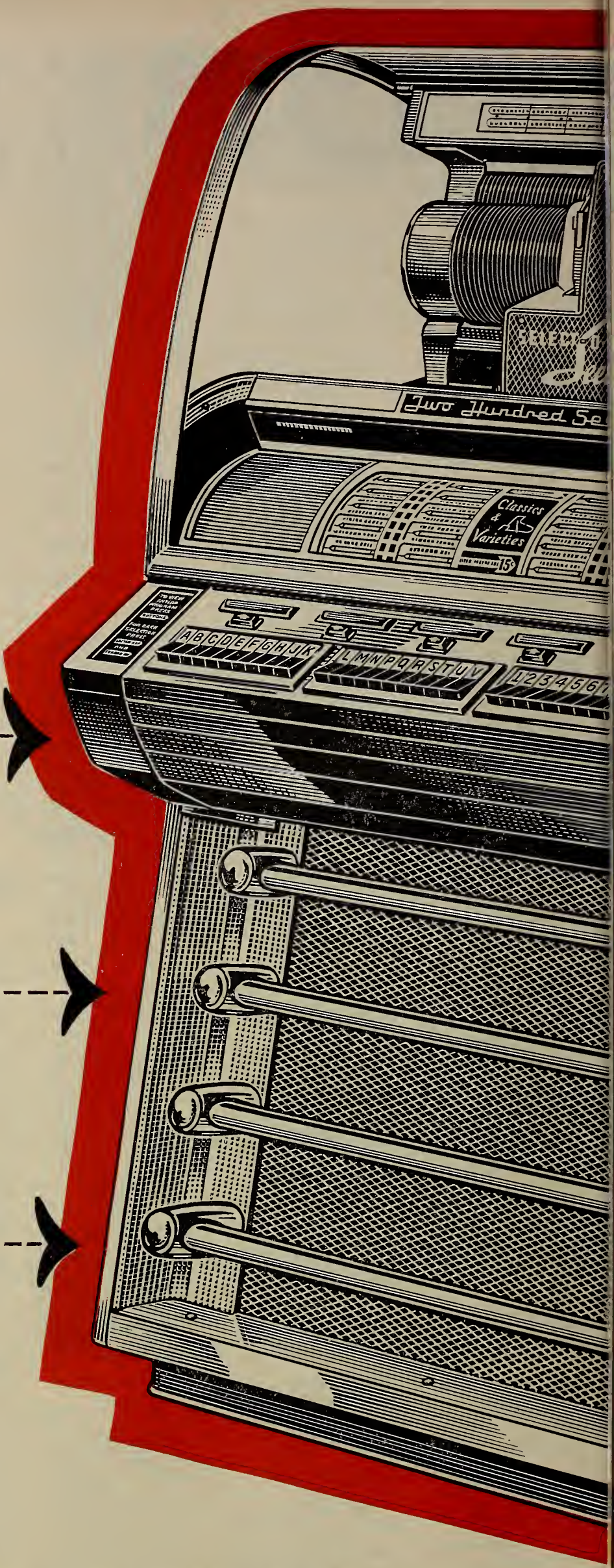

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How To Start A:

TEENAGE CANTEEN

Here and There

NEW YORK—Seeking an answer to reports that building for 1956 is on the decline, *The New York Times* investigated. The newspaper reports "A Survey of Data on Contract Awards Indicate No Such Thing". Using a survey made by the F. W. Dodge Corporation, statistical service, the newspaper writes: "The Dodge survey shows that construction contracts awarded between January 1 and March 22 totaled \$5,355,910,000, some 21 per cent above the year-ago level." "Remember", points out the *Times*, "these constitute fixed plans for building in the months to come. In past years, the Dodge reports have been, if anything, on the conservative side. They have proved so reliable, on the whole, that many companies base their production plans on the month-by-month figures."

PHOENIX, ARIZ. — Operators in this rapidly expanding industrial State can look to the future with great optimism. Not only is plant expansion progressing rapidly, but the employment situation keeps getting larger and larger. Employment Security Commission statistics show that 230,000 of the State's population of slightly over 1,000,000 were employed at the start of 1956. The report states: "The prospects for continued prosperity are good. Industrialists predict growth unparalleled in peacetime and further development of subcontractors to supply local industry. Labor leaders foresee no end to the building program."

NEW YORK—While this new development in vending will not help the professional operator, it is interesting to report the plan of the Independent Grocers' Alliance. Don R. Grimes, president, sent a memo to all its members announcing a new feature—a vending machine which will contain at least 25 items considered to be the basic needs of housewives everywhere, and which will be placed outside of the store after it is closed. The vending machine, Grimes said, will contain dairy products, rolls, bread, coffee, soap and other items.

PATERSON, N. J.—This is strictly for the private attention of our golfing friends. There's a firm in this city, Fairways Co., that is producing a private range which can be set up at home, either indoors or outdoors, thru the use of a practice net. It is easy to set up and allows a full swing and full impact with the ball. The frame is 6½ feet high, 8 feet wide and is made of net bound with canvas on a tubular steel frame. And only costs \$39.50.

It seems that many thruout the industry are still puzzled about how to start a "Teenage Canteen" into immediate operation. The following points are offered for those men and women who are anxious to get a "Teenage Canteen" under way in their communities and will expend the necessary effort to do so.

1.—Rent, or obtain by donation, any store of a good size in any neighborhood where you believe a "Teenage Canteen" should be in operation. Teenagers will help you to decorate the place. Paint it. Arrange gaily covered streamers and even murals. Rent chairs and tables or, if you have old chairs and tables, repaint them in gay colors.

2.—Bring in some cases of soft drinks. Make sure these are iced. Also cookies, candies and whatever other such eatables can be obtained, either by donation or by purchase. Here, again, teenagers will help serve and arrange the eats as well as the soft drink counters.

3.—Set up a free playing juke box with plenty of extra records of the type teenagers appreciate. In fact, if you have a teenage son or daughter, he or she and their friends will probably help you in this regard. Have the extra recordings handy so that the kids can interchange these as they desire.

4.—Call on the principals of the local high schools. Tell them of the "Teenage Canteen" you are creating. They will help spread the word about to the teenagers in the school. The PTA (Parent-Teachers Association) will be more than happy to help. They'll pass out invitations. They'll help supervise. They'll help serve. They'll bring goodies and everything else to help make your "Teenage Canteen" the most popular teenager gathering place in the community.

5.—Phone your record distributors. Tell them what you are doing. Ask them if any outstanding recording stars are in town. These artists will be more than happy to make an appearance and, if you can afford to, they will also autograph their latest recordings for the teenagers. In fact, you can follow thru on this by having a large sign as well as invitations made advising all the

kids the names of the recording artists who will visit the "Teenage Canteen" and when they'll be present.

6.—Local disk jockeys will be more than happy to cooperate. Many have already indicated they would make it their business to emcee events at "Teenage Canteens" or just visit about and greet their fans. In fact, some of the disk jockeys have stated that they'll be happy to bring recording artists along with them, to meet the boys and girls who enjoy the "Teenage Canteens".

7.—To get still more attendance, phone local newspapers, radio and TV stations. They'll spread the news. They'll probably photograph the place and the kids to make the "Teenage Canteen" even more popular. They'll be happy to help. They have helped in every instance wherever such help has been asked of them.

8.—If there are noted athletes in town or other well known personalities, a phone call will usually bring them to the "Teenage Canteen". In this way surprise appearances of noted personages are constantly being brought to the "Teenage Canteen". This causes the canteen to become even more interesting and attractive to the teenagers in the community.

9.—Help for supervision, ideas and affairs can be had from local youth organizations. From prominent business organizations that interest themselves in youth. From the youth division of the local police department who will be more than happy to cooperate. From fraternal organizations and from many other people who are tremendously interested in the creation of "Teenage Canteens" to help eliminate juvenile delinquency wherever it exists and, at the same time, bring about an interesting place in the community for all the teenagers.

10.—Summing it all up, do you believe that this is really too difficult a task? It's actually a matter of some phone calls and a few personal visits. Within a week or two a "Teenage Canteen" will be in operation in your community with the blessings of all the people.

MUSIC LEADERS FORESEE EXPORT OF OVER 35,000 PHONOS FOR 1956

Believe Trade Can Surpass the 24,372 Phonos Exported in 1955 by Greater Concentration and Closer Cooperation With World Markets

CHICAGO—The U.S. Department of Commerce reports that 24,372 phonographs were exported to countries all over the world at a total value of \$11,221,699 has caused a great deal of enthusiastic comment thruout this coincenter.

This indicates that the average price of a phonograph shipped into the world markets was approximately \$450. This figure is between the reconditioned and new phonographs.

Therefore, at a price of about \$450 per phonograph, the 35,000 phonos which optimistic music leaders foresee as being exported from the U.S. during 1956, almost 50% greater volume than 1955, would set a new high mark for phono shipments out of this country dollarwise at about \$15,750,000.

Confronted with these facts, music leaders weren't one whit downed in their enthusiasm or in their optimistic belief that the industry could and would export about 35,000 automatic phonographs, both new and used, during '56.

One reason advanced for this new high figure was that those countries which have already imported a goodly volume of new and reconditioned phonographs would have to replace some and buy others for locations which would demand phonos due to their appearance in competitors' places.

Those countries, these men claim,

where only a few phonos were imported, provided the population was there, would want more. They point to what has happened in other similar instances.

Should the industry reach the 35,000 exportation figure, for both new and used phonos, this would set an all time high for the industry. The close to \$16 million figure has never before been reached, it is claimed.

The fact remains, many point out, that the music operators in the U.S. are changing over to new style high fidelity phonos faster than ever before.

They are also receiving very fine trade-in valuation for their former phonos.

This all works to the advantage of the importer, these men explain, and believe that importers everywhere in the world realize this.

It is, therefore, no great surprise that manufacturers as well as a large number of distributors are concentrating more intently on sales to the export field.

The manufacturers have already made arrangements for closer cooperation with all the countries worldwide.

All this cooperation and concentration with and on the export field may result in the achievement of the 35,000 volume figure so optimistically advanced.

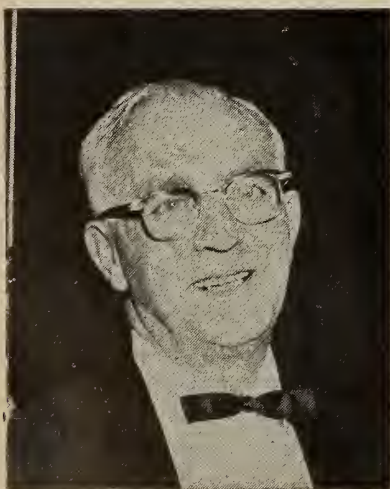

CHICAGO—"Something quite new and unusual in the realm of pool tables is seen in Williams' new 'Klik Billiards', currently on hand at the company's distributing outlets," said Art Weinand, general sales manager of Williams Manufacturing Company, this city.

"It is the first table that permits players to make billiard shots off their own, their opponents', or any of the balls on the table. The middle area of the p'ayfield presents an entirely new arrangement consisting of a ball which protrudes through the center hole. Because this ball is fastened to a universally flexible pivot that moves off-center in every direction, it serves two purposes. First, if hit squarely by a ball at moderate speed, it moves off-center and permits the ball to drop through the center hole for a score. Secondly, if hit too hard, the pivot ball in the center hole won't let the ball drop through. Instead, it shunts the hard-hit balls off to other areas with its snappy rebound qualities.

"Four 'captive' balls and four lite-up bumpers surround the center hole ball. These serve as rebounds and

many curious and interesting shots are being made in this area of 'Klik Billiards'.

"The table is built for 3 or 4 sided play, two or four can play and it takes in two dimes per game. The cabinet is rich and impressive in its two-tone appearance. It utilizes an area only 36" wide by 64" long", concluded Weinand.

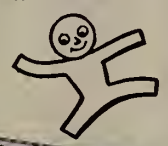

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UMO of Michigan Wins at License Hearing

MELVINDALE, MICH. — Roy Small, Public Relations Counsellor and Conciliator of United Music Operators of Michigan, won a great victory here by having this city rescind its ordinance requiring a \$300 per year Regulatory License Fee from juke box ops.

Two months ago at the hearings held by the City Council, the Mayor and the City Attorney, there was agreement, after listening to Roy Small, that the ordinance would be held in abeyance until Small would be contacted by the City Attorney and help with suggestions.

Instead, the City Attorney wrote an ordinance which went into effect as of April 16. This ordinance required that juke box operators pay a \$300 per year Regulatory License Fee.

Immediately all members of the association who operate phonos in this city cut off their machines. Two other operators, not members of the UMOM decided to sell out. They sold their phonos to association members. Therefore, this city had no music as of midnight, April 16.

On April 18, the seven members of the City Council again convened, headed by the Mayor and the City Attorney, and held open public hearings on the new ordinance at the request of Roy Small and the UMOM.

Small pointed out to the Council, the City Attorney and the Mayor, the tremendous number of defects in the ordinance. He also showed where the ordinance was not actually written for automatic music.

The Mayor then asked to entertain a motion to rescind this ordinance. The motion was made and voted on and the ordinance rescinded.

The Mayor ordered the City Attorney, along with a License Committee which he appointed, to meet with Roy Small. Small is to write a new ordinance which will then be placed before the City Council for vote.

(It is believed that this is the very first case of its kind in the industry

where the head of a music operators' association has been asked by any city, large or small, to write an ordinance.)

Auld Lang Syne

CHICAGO—George R. Thayer of Binghamton, N.Y., a member of the 20 Year Club's "Golden Circle", having been active in the industry for 50 years, will agree this is a small world, when he learns the oldest operating member of the industry, Harry S. Lavine of Oil City, La., recalls meeting him in Binghamton.

Harry advises, "I recall meeting George R. Thayer when purchasing pianos from the Binghamton Piano Company. I believe he operated automatic banjos, then pianos."

Lavine goes on, "I operated automatic banjos in Cleveland at that time. Before then, there was the Wurlitzer Tonophone, the first motor driven musical machine. It featured a wooden roll made by the Wurlitzer Music Company of Cincinnati, Ohio.

"In Rising Sun, Indiana, the automatic harp was manufactured. Before these were other machines. One was made by the Crown Piano Company of Boston, Mass. Another by the Peerless Piano Company. The Regina Music Company of Rahway, N. J. also made machines. Thomas A. Edison company made the first picture machine and the first automatic phonographs.

"About 54 years ago I purchased drop pictures for the drop picture machines from a Mr. Mills of Chicago."

What Harry S. Lavine couldn't recall was the full name of the "Mr. Mills" he mentioned, tho he did state:

"He was the first, original Mr. Mills in his business in Chicago. Can you enlighten me?"

(Editor's Note: We certainly can, Harry, the "Mr. Mills" you refer to was Herbert S. (Hub) Mills, father of the late Fred Mills. The factory was then located at Jackson Blvd. and Green Street in Chicago. Maybe you can also recall the big three-day party that "Hub" Mills gave the same year of the Dempsey-Tunney fight in Chicago. In fact, "Hub" used to push machines aside to clear a floor and run an annual party for the operators of his period. He passed away at the age of 59.)

N. Y. Employees Union Holds Fourth Dinner

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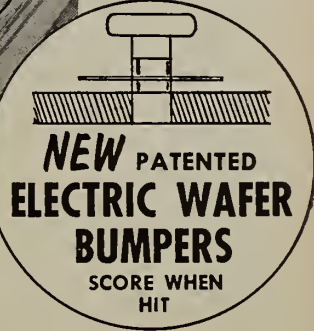

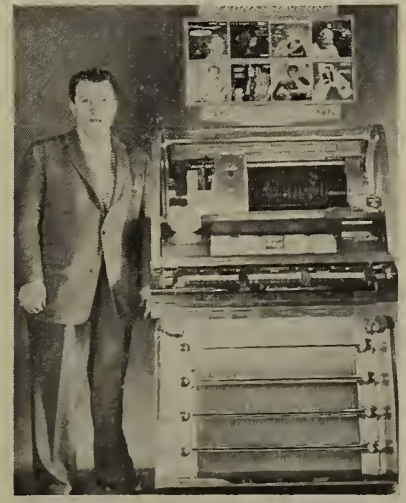

[Also known as the "C. M. I. (Coin Machine Industry) BLUE BOOK"]

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business, and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics. These buyers will purchase machines "as is" at prices quoted by the trade at large and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.
