

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WANTED:

MORE AIR TIME

As everyone knows, the record business is expanding in incredible fashion. More records are being cut by more artists on more labels and are selling in greater quantities than ever before. At the present time, it is impossible to see just how far this expansion will go, but certainly we are nowhere near the end of it.

This all looks very well for the record industry and the people connected with it. But there's one fly in the ointment. There are at the present time three areas of exposure for records. These are juke boxes, retail stores and disk jockey play. It is through these avenues that the public becomes aware of records and hears them often enough to grow to want them for their own collections. Now as the record industry has expanded, so have these avenues of exposure expanded, but unfortunately they have not always been able to keep up. This isn't true so much of juke boxes and retail stores, but it is definitely true of disk jockey play.

In the last several years, juke boxes have expanded not only in the number of locations but in their greater capacity. Today juke boxes offer up to 200 selections which means that they hold considerably more records than they did just a couple of years ago. Retail stores too have been keeping up with the changing nature of the record business. From marginal businesses, they have been becoming substantial enterprises. They have been adopting modern merchandising methods, have in many cases redesigned their stores in the interests of better selling and more

attractive atmospheres, and in general have accepted a new status in keeping with their increased grosses.

We don't mean to imply now that radio play hasn't expanded also. It has. But unfortunately, by the very nature of disk jockey play, which permits a record to reach a wide audience almost as soon as it is cut, the pressure on disk jockeys has become so great that it is literally impossible for them to play all the records that are available to be played or deserve to be played.

In the past several years, disk jockeys have assumed a wider and wider importance in the record field and in keeping with this recognized movement more and more stations have been devoting more time to disk jockey activities for obviously from the economics of radio, it is a good idea. But there are only 24 hours in the day and there is a limit to the amount of records that can be played in that time. It is, in fact, quite a commentary on the rate of expansion which the record industry has gone through, that 24 hours a day is not enough time to present records in a manner that many people in the record business feel they should be presented. Particularly is this so in so-called hot record towns where the competition for air time is the greatest.

What the answer to this problem may be, we can't say. But it seems obvious to us that if the record industry is to continue to grow, the areas of expansion already in existence must grow also and perhaps even new methods of exposure must be developed.

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
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Brunswick Re-activated As Coral Subsid

NEW YORK—Coral Records has announced that, effective this month, Brunswick Records will be re-activated as a full-fledged subsidiary label. The operation, which has been in the planning stage for one year, will develop Brunswick as a major contender in the industry, with repertoire that will embrace all facets of the pon market, both with singles of the pop market, both with singles and LP's.

Norman Wienstroer, General Sales Manager of Coral, will also be at the helm of the Brunswick sales operation. He is currently in the process of finalizing plans for the subsidiary's own distribution set-up. For the most part, the new line will be handled by entirely separate distributors, except in New York, Chicago and Detroit where the Coral-owned branches are equipped to handle both lines, and in the case of a few Coral distributors who have split their operations into two segments, and may be given the Brunswick line.

two segments, and may be given the Brunswick line.

The Artists & Repertoire Department for Brunswick will be headed by Bob Thiele, who also handles the recording department for Coral, The new label will provide more opportunity to expose new talent—which was one of the reasons for the formation of the Coral label, itself a subsidiary of Decca Records, in 1948. The Brunswick roster will include some of the artists previously heard on Coral, in addition to those who on Coral, in addition to those who will be signed expressly for the new label. Among those who are making the switch from Coral are Bob Crewe,

Jeffrey Clay, The Three Kittens, and a group of performers who, when on Coral, appeared under the "Lawrence Welk Presents" banner. This latter category includes The Lennon Sisters, accordionist Myron Floren, vocalist Alice Lon, organist Jerry Burke, bass singer and pianist Larry Hooper, pianist Tiny Little, violinist Dick Kessner, and guitarist Buddy Merrill. New artists who have already been signed by Brunswick include Vicki Young and Bunny Paul, Vincent Lopez and Lou Quadling.

The initial release of Brunswick singles is slated for March 11th. Among these will be sides by Vicki Young, Bunny Paul, the Three Kittens and the Lennon Sisters. The company is also making a strong initial entry in the album field. The LP's to be issued in the first release are: "Skylark" by Jackie Paris; "The Fox In Hi Fi," "George Williams; "Tony Scott In Hi Fi," "Francies Wayne;" "This Is Art," Art Lund; "The Swinging Herman Herd," Woody Herman; Charlie Ventura's "Here's Charlie;" "Jackie Cain And Roy Kral;" Herb Jeffries, "Passion;" and "Concert Jazz" featuring Tony Scott, Terry Gibbs and Don Elliot.

Martin P. Salkin, Director of Publicity and Promotion for Decca and Coral, will also assume this position for Brunswick. Coral has had the Brunswick label for some time, but several years ago the release of singles on the label was discontinued, and only a minimum of albums were issued in recent months.

Modern Records Expanding **Album Department**

HOLLYWOOD — Saul Bihari of Modern Records revealed plans this week for the expansion of office and studio facilities and the appointment of additional personnel to handle the firm's stepped-up album production. Starting immediately, all package goods will be released under the Crown label, and will retail for \$1.98. The new album line will feature 12 inch LP's, with full color photographic covers all performed by top artists. Modern and RPM artists featured on Crown Albums will continue to release in the single field under the Modern and RPM labels. Crown will be released through the same distribution channels as Modern, but the firm plans to sell the LP line directly to chain store and rack jobber outlets. Fred Robbins has joined Crown as a sales representative and is currently in the East surveying market conditions in the album field.

Already released for March are: "Jazz Supreme"—The Modern Jazz Stars; "Femme Fatale" — Hadda Brooks; "Callender Speaks Low"—Red Callender; "Very Truly Yours"—Don Ralke; "88 A La Carte"—Williard McDaniel; and "Jumpin' With The Jacks". Planned for immediate release are: "The Fabulous Jimmie Beasley"; "Rockin' and Reelin'";—The Cadets; "Singin' The Blues"—B. B. King; "String Of Pearls"—Phil Miller; "Organ Fantasy In Hi Fi"—Betty Staples. In production now at Modern's plant are: "For Singing' Dancers" — Phil Miller; "Dinner Time"—The Three Taps; "Eddie My Love"—The Teen Queens; and a bongo session LP.

Bihari said, "Under the new policy, Crown will be able to offer the consumer a \$3.98 album at a retail price of \$1.98."

HOLLYWOOD — The suit pending between Lois Publishing Co. and Modern Music Publishing Company over the tune "Dance With Me Henry"— also known as "Walflower"—was settled in Los Angeles on February 28. Suit was settled on the basis of equal division of publishing rights by the two firms involved.

Maxim Announces Changes In Epic Roster

NEW YORK—Arnold Maxim, Epic a & r head, announced that the Epic roster would undergo a big change in the immediate future.

Already under way, the changes include several signings and several conclusions of pacts. Recently added to Epic are Romeo Penque, Bill Farrell and Lee Kane. Negotiations are going on with several names currently with other labels, but Maxim advises it as premature to make any announcement at this point.

Lewis Disk Hits Million

NEW YORK—Decca Records last week announced that Jerry Lewis' recording of "Rock-A-Bye" had just gone over the one million mark in sales. This disk marked Lewis' debut on the label, as well as his debut as a serious vocalist. His album "Jerry Lewis Just Sings", meanwhile continues to be one of the top sellers in the country. Decca believes that the new Lewis single, which couples "It All Depends On You" and "Let Me Sing And I'm Happy," and on which he is backed by Jack Pleis, will be at least as successful as the first release. On Tuesday, March 5th, Lewis made the round of the New York stations and delivered the new release, personally.

B.B. King Into Pop Field

HOLLYWOOD-RPM Records last HOLLYWOOD—RPM Records last week released a new single record by B.B. King aimed strictly at the pop market. Choice of material and a full orchestral background with voices were planned to attract the pop record buyer. King, an established top seller in the blues field, broke into the pop charts with his last release of "On My Word Of Honor". Initial reaction from distributors indicates that the new disk could be another contender for pop honors.

\$294,000,000 Record Gross For 1956 Indicated By Excise Tax

NEW YORK—John Griffin, secretary of the RIAA, this week revealed the total excise tax paid to the government by the recording industry as \$14,004,000 for the four quarters of 1956. Griffin was careful to explain, however, that this figure was probably about \$1,000,000 less than the actual figure since taxes are paid quarterly and the last quarter of 1953 will be paid in 1957.

The 1956 figures are in truth representing the first three quarters of 1956 and the last quarter of 1955. It is Griffin's guess that when the government's figures are released for the payments made for the October, November, December months of 1956, they will total in the neighborhood of \$5,200,000.

Griffin's figures are compiled for the calendar year, running from January through December, rather than the fiscal year figures which run from July through June.

Excise figures are based on 10% of the manufacturers' selling price to the wholesaler and not at the retail level. In the case of the single record, since most are wholesaled at 45 cents, the excise tax per record runs about 4½ cents. This is added at the wholesale level and included in the retail price. The \$14,004,000 excise tax figure, when carried out to the retail level, brings the 1956 record sale to \$294,084,000.

Figures for the last three years show a steady and sensational rise in the sale of records. In 1954—the total excise tax paid was \$9,013,000 for a retail figure of \$189,273,000. This was bettered in 1955 by almost \$900,000 at the excise tax level as the figure reached \$9,908,000, and a sales total of \$208,068,000.

Griffin also pointed out, for the sake of clarity, that these figures are the government's and cover the entire recording industry. About 85% of the total was paid by RIAA members and the remaining 15% by those outside the association.

Mills Music Publication Receives Brotherhood Award

NEW YORK—Mills Music announced, last week, that one of its publications—"The Lonely Abalonian," an action-song playlet on brotherhood, by Ruth Norman and Hardy Weider, has been given the Brotherhood Award by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Awards were made on February 20, 1957, in New York City.

"The Lonely Abalonian" was written by Ruth Norman and Hardy Weider who have collaborated on a number of educational publications which are published by Mills. This award, also made to the ABC radio network for its broadcast of the work, is the only one made in 1956 by N.C.C.J. to a radio network children's program. The work was selected from over 500 nominations which had been received.



In the interim between his latest package smash, "Calypso," and his latest, "An Evening With Belafonte," Harry Belafonte has become one of the most sure-fire successes on singles. Returning to more diversified material in this set than he had in the "Calypso" item, Belafonte again demonstrates that national barriers form no inconvenience to his ability to sing with authoritative warmth or vitality. Some of the sessions (i.e. "Once Was," "Mary's Boy Child," and "The Drummer And The Cook") were taken from previous Belafonte issues. Dealers will see this one rapidly clear shelves in chart hitting order.

"NIGHT DREAMS"—Gordon Jenkins—His Orchestra And The Ralph Brewster Singers—Capitol T 781 (1-12" LP)

Fresh from his chart package, "Manhattan Towers," Gordon Jenkins returns to the mood music fold with a collection of, as one of the set's songs states, "Drifting And Dreaming" sessions. With material taken from underplayed standards, Jenkins and ork plus the vocal chanting (the lyrics are not sung) of the Ralph Brewster Singers, provide a mood disk of quality. Powerful soft and sweet dealer item.

"YOURS FOR A SONG"—Vic Damone—Mercury MG 20163 (1-12" LP)

These 2 disks summarize Vic Damone's days with Mercury. Each pressing presents Damone in a different vocal light. In "Yours For A Song," the singer croons to 12 evergreens ("Isn't It Romantic,", "Easy To Love," and "April In Paris"), while with "The Voice Of Vic Damone," his delivery is up-tempo ("Tzena, Tzena," and "My Truly, Truly Fair") and Bluesy ("Born To Sing The Blues"). Damone's high-ranking stature should make these vocal re-caps strong selling stock.

"HI-FIDDLES"—David Rose And His Orchestra—MGM E 3481 (1-12" LP)

David Rose's latest MGM effort takes him on an exciting musical tour of 12 colorful novelties. The novelty song is, of course, great fun with a maestro such as Rose, who likes to monkey around with melodies that lend themselves to whacky orchestrations. Rose makes the most of the material and glides happily tongue-in-cheek throughout the disk. Delightful hi-fi presentation.

Garner's last Columbia effort was the highly touted "Concert By The Sea." His latest offering is a series of driving, sharp keyboard artistry on 9 numbers, mostly requiring no introduction. There are three Garner originals, the heartily played "Passing Through," "Mambo 207," an inventive, Latin beat session and the honky-tonk era inspired, "The Way Back Blues." Garner is accompanied by Al Hall (bass) and Spec Powell (drums). A most imaginative and persuasive Garner.

"AFFAIR"—Abbey Lincoln—Orchestra Under The Direction Of Benny Carter And Marty Paich—Liberty LRP 3025 (1-12" LP)

Abbey Lincoln is a prominent night club personality, and this, her first LP, ought to bring Miss Lincoln solidly into the LP fold. The stylist is heard sensitively, with the exception of the uptempo "Would I Love You" and "This Can't Be Love," on a program of wistful pieces. Miss Lincoln's way with a ballad is persuasive and well phrased. Reliable ork backing. Fine mood vocals.

The accent is on Latin rhythms in this Decca release by the classy keyboard artist, and the result is the expected Cavallaro polish and keen sense of rhythm. Nifty, long-range seller.

Josephine Premice, who has made the rounds of several Broadway musicals ("House Of Flowers"), many countries and niteries, displays a particularly clever knack for the current U.S. craze, the calypso. Miss Premice sings 10 numbers, each containing the delightful tongue-in-cheek philosophy of the calypso song. One of the numbers, "Hollywood Calypso," was released as a single. Friends of calypso have excellent renditions of it here.

Such staples as "La Vie En Rose," "La Seine," and "Paris, I Love You" are the vehicles for a musical tour of Paris by the Orchestra De Moulin Rouge under Marcel Guillemin's direction. Good cover job. Bright mood package enhanced by the free book.



Imperial Sells 2 Million Disks In One Month

HOLLYWOOD-For the first time in its 12-year history, Imperial Records has hit a one-month sales figure of 2,000,000 records, it was announced by label prexy Lew Chudd.

Chudd revealed that January of this year was the record breaking month, with February close behind with sales just passing the 1,500,000 mark. To keep up with the demand, Imperial is currently employing 5 pressing plants: two in Los Angeles, and one each in Indianapolis, Pittsburgh and Memphis.

Commenting on the record breaking months, Chudd said that "Much of the success can be attributed to the musical classification barriers being broken in the past year. Everything is now pop. Rock and Roll, Country and Western are selling right along side what the industry once labeled as pop records. Trade charts have intermingled the various categorical hits in the pop listings. Radio stations," continues Chudd, "are treating all music the same way in their programming, and last but most importantly, the record buyer knows no categorizing bounds."

Because of this, Chudd predicts that 1957 will be the biggest record buying year in the history of the industry. And Imperial has already initiated expansion plans in artists, personnel and pressing facilities to meet the expected demand.

Wall Street Inspires **New Request Album**

NEW YORK-Hans Lengsfelder, Request Records' A & R head, has taken inspiration from the nation's financial center for his latest album "Musical Portraits Of Wall Street." The newest in a chain of recordings which are tied in with important business organizations, this instrumental offering features the World Symphony Orchestra.

The New York Stock Exchange, Lengsfelder reports, has been cooperative in seeing that the album gets wide circulation among the thousands of members of the Exchange. A letter from Ruddick Lawrence, Vice President of the Stock Exchange, has been sent to brokerage firms all over the country informing them of the existence of "Musical Portraits Of Wall Street."

Street."
According to Lengsfelder, "Wall Street, as the center from which 8,630,000 investors, large and small, control the business and industry of this country, has all the pulsating excitement of Broadway and Hollywood. The various phases of buying and selling securities—stocks and bonds—each have their own rhythm which originally inspired these melodic which originally inspired these melodic themes.

The album's backliner carries the story of the part that Wall Street plays in the growth of the nation, from the time the Exchange occupied from the time the Exchange occupied a lone table under a Buttonwood tree to the huge organization it is today. The saga of Wall Street is interwoven into the description of the instrumentals bearing such titles as "Ticker Tape Tango," "Securities On Parade," "Market At Midnight," and "The Lady Says Sell."

"Man of Many Talents"


NEW YORK-Herman Diaz, Jr., Vik Artist and Repertoire chief announced last week the signing of Geoffrey Holder to a recording contract.







Godmother Edith Adams joins Cinderella in singing "Impossible!" King Howard Lindsay and Queen Dorothy Stickney join the entire populace of the kingdom in "The Prince Is Giving A Ball." In addition, Rodgers has written "Waltz for a Ball," plus "Gavotta," another dance at the Palace ball, and an opening march, "Where Is Cinderella?". "Where is Cinderella?" was recorded by Sid Feller and Paul Weston. These numbers are interspersed with additional interludes of dialogue set to music.

The new pop albums include "Love Is The Thing" by Nat "King" Cole, with the first backing by Gordon Jenkins and his orchestra; "Gene Vincent and His Blue Caps," including many original songs by Vincent himself plus "Unchained Melody"; "Aloha," the first Capitol album by the King Sisters in a collection of Hawaiian songs, with orchestra conducted by Alvino Rey; "Round the World" with Les Baxter," 12 traveling music songs inspired by distant lands; "Faraway Music," with Don Baker at the console of an old Robert Morton theater-type organ; "Polynesian Holiday," by Harry Owens and His Royal Hawaiians, Owens' fourth Capitol album of songs from the south sea islands; "A Band Is Born," by Billy May and his orchestra, a showcase album of May's now available in 12-inch size; "The Marion McPartland Trio"; and "A Night In Old New Orleans," by Sharkey, his Kings of Dixieland and Lizzie Miles, consisting of a dozen selections actually recorded on Royal Street, New Orleans.





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BMI Writers Attack **SPA Administration**

NEW YORK—A group of members of the Songwriters Protective Association who are also affiliated with BMI met last week in the offices of Bernie Wayne to discuss their discontent with the behavior of the administration of SPA.

The writers charged that SPA was

aligning its official power on the side of ASCAP writers in their current fight with BMI. They charged that official mailings from SPA, directed to the full membership, publicized attacks on BMI and failed to publicize any rebuttals to these attacks.

In this connection, Bernie Wayne last week sent the following telegram to Senator Warren G. Magnusson, Chairman of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee:

"Charges made to you and publicity released by Songwriters Protective Association were never submitted to or approved by Membership of SPA and do not represent views of all members. A representative group of SPA members has already met to protest this abuse of SPA's function and misuse of its funds. These and other members regard the charges as malicious and wholly without foundation. We urgently request that in the traditional American spirit of fair play these unrepresented SPA members be permitted to express their viewpoint to your committee.'

Mellin Settles Lawrence Suit

NEW YORK-Publisher-songwriter Robert Mellin has settled out of court a suit brought against him by Jack Lawrence involving the songs "My One And Only Love" and "Music From Beyond The Moon".

Lawrence had charged that Mellin who published "Music From Beyond The Moon", which was written by Lawrence and Guy Wood, had subsequently taken the melody, discarded Lawrence's lyrics, and written new lyrics titled "My One And Only Love". Lawrence's suit called for an injunction on all transactions involving "My One And Only Love", an accounting of royalties due, and damages.

The suit was settled for what Sol Klein, attorney for Lawrence, termed a "substantial sum". In addition the lyrics to "Music From Beyond The Moon" revert to Lawrence while Mellin has full rights to "My One And Only Love".

Also set for March release is the album of the sound track from the "Funny Face" movie starring Audrey Hepburn, Kay Thompson and Fred

Hepburn, Kay Thompson and Fred Astaire. This will mark Verve's first film score release.

At the same time, Granz announced that arranger-conductor Buddy Bregman has just signed a new long-term contract with Verve and will handle the company's increasing A & R chores along with guitarist Barney Kessel.

Thunderbird Disk Gives Station WWEZ The Laugh

NEW YORK-Thunderbird Records recently issued a rock and roll novelty record featuring Peter Roberts, an NBC Monitor announcer with an extremely contagious laugh. The disk is titled "Ho Ho Rock & Roll" and is built around Roberts' unusual laugh.

When the record was released in New Orleans a couple of weeks ago, Ken Elliot of WWEZ, decided for a gag to play it 18 times a day on his show. However, when Elliot finished his show and went home, the laugh mysteriously began to appear on commercials, newscasts and regularly-scheduled programs. WWEZ was unable to explain it. Listeners have since bombarded the station with queries, complaints and compliments, laughing themselves the way the record has cut in on programs.

It started February 26 when the station went on the air and hasn't let up since. Officials have searched all over the station, even called in radio directional-finders from Dallas to no avail. The laughter continues. No one knows whether it's just a publicity stunt or some devout rock and roll ham operator who feels that everyone can use a good laugh these days.



The celebration will be launched with a special 4-hour program over Nashville's Station WSM, featuring the top stars of Grand Ole Opry such as Roy Acuff, Minnie Pearl, Rod Brasfield, Ernest Tubb, Hank Snow, Kitty Wells, Johnny & Jack, June Carter, Marty Robbins, Ray Price, Johnny Cash, etc. Judge Hay, one of the original founders of Grand Ole Opry will be honored together with some of the old-time performers who still appear on the shows, which are broadcast nationally over the NBC network.

In Washington, D.C., the National Press Club will salute Grand Ole Opry by presenting a special performance to be attended by political dignitaries in the nation's capitol on Thursday, May 9th. The Governor of Tennessee, Frank G. Clement and members of the Tennessee delegation will be guests of honor.

Grayline Restyles Demonstrator

NEW YORK—The Grayline Company of Chicago has announced that it is making deliveries on a completely re-engineered and restyled 1957 version of its model "300" record demonstrator phonograph.

A new transcription type, ball bearing pivot tone arm, and a rubber padded 3-speed turntable are used on the unit. In addition the "300" contains two 6" Philips speakers, a full range continuous duty amplifier, and a 45 RPM record changer for continuous background music or record plugging.

Richard Gray, president of the firm, stated that sales of the "300" have been doubling every six months since the original version was announced in July 1955. The price on the new "300" is the same as on the previous version.

Among those albums soon to be released are: "For Dancing Feet" featuring the orchestra of Pete Lofthouse, Lawrence Welk's arranger; an album of authentic calypso music recorded in Jamaica; and an album by Chuck "Razzmatazz" Murphy containing many of his original compositions.

NEW YORK—Jolly Joyce who, with Mrs. Joyce, was part of the Bill Haley and The Comets party that went to England and the Continent for a very successful engagement, returned several days before the Haley contingent.

Joyce revealed that wherever Haley appeared the towns went literally "wild" over him. Joyce said that Haley is perhaps as great or greater abroad than he ever was in the United States. Before Joyce left he completed a deal whereby Haley will return to London in September for a two-week engagement at the Palladium and two weeks of one nighters in the British Isles. Joyce also concluded a deal with Lou and Leslie Grade, London agents, to handle Bill Haley and The Comets' bookings for a feature motion picture to be made in London when Haley returns for his Palladium stint.

Lou and Leslie Grade also underwrote Bill Haley's special endorsements on hats, shirts, ties, brooches, necklaces and rock 'n' roll chairs. All of the above are already being manufactured.

In addition to his Haley activities, Joyce concluded a deal to bring Alan Freed and his all-star R&R show to the British Isles in August; signed Lord Kitchner, calypso Mello-Disk records Continental star and arranged a picture deal with Sam Katzman of Columbia Pictures. Kitchner will start shooting on March 19.

Joyce also booked the original Amos and Andy CBS-TV show for personal appearances in the British Isles for April, 1957. The tour is now being set up. Amos and Andy are well known in the Isles—since they are seen weekly on BBC-TV net out of London.

Another act that Joyce booked was Steve Gibson and The Red Caps with Damita Jo. The band will do the Paris and London music halls in September. Also set was Jon Ann Tolley for the British Isles during May.





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

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Here There

NEW YORK—This hasn't a thing to do with coin machines, but we ran into a man who could easily become the most hated individual in the country—at least by school children and teachers. Lt. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, (U.S. Army—retired) vice president, Remington Rand Division, Sperry Rand Corporation, claims "There is no longer any reason why the average healthy student should not go to school almost the year around. The long Summer vacation is an inheritance from the days when ours was an agricultural economy." He also says that students should attend school more hours. "The short working day" he says, "was established in the days when children walked miles to school and also assisted in the daily family chores." Boy, oh, boy—wait until the kids hear of this.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The Department of Labor estimates that if the economy continues to expand at recent rates, we will need to produce goods and services worth \$560 billion in 1965. That production, it says, will require employment of 79 million, a rise of 10 million over 1955. This jump of 10 million will be in the young worker group—those under 25 years old and in workers over 45. Half of this rise will be women. Due to the birth slump during the depression years, it is estimated that men in the 24-34 year old group will decline by 750,000 by 1965. By 1965, the group over 65 years old will rise to 17.4 million. Total population at that time it is predicted will run 193.3 million.

NEW YORK—The Commercial Discount Corporation, this city, issued a report based on a survey, advising businessmen on "How To Get More Dollar 'Mileage'." Five ways are detailed on how to stretch working capital: 1) Speed up deposits; 2) Speed up payments for receivables; 3) press customers to pay bills ahead of time; 4) slow up inventory accumulations; and 5) selling or borrowing against accounts receivable, using commercial companies for such borrowings.

BRISTOL, TENN.—Coinmen in and around this area will be interested to know that the Sperry Rand Corporation announced plans for construction of a new 150,000 square foot plant near Bristol. Employment of approximately 1200 is anticipated.

As the warm season approaches, some operators will cooperate with locations to arrange for air-conditioning. In this fashion they will be assuring these locations continued top patronage during the hot, humid months. Similarly, they will be assuring themselves continued peak play on the machines they have in these locations.

In short, by cooperating with each other, doing first things first, they will help boom play on all the machines, these men report.

Some operators help locations by various methods to gain greater popularity and, thereby, more patronage. This assures the operators top locations.

A popular location, where people congregate, means greater income for the operator. Especially if the operator places the correct equipment in such a location. Clean, neat, sparkling, beautiful, attractive machines.

The kind of machines that capture instant attention. That win commenda-

tion from the players, cooperation from the owner. People will always patronize such machines to the fullest capacity.

First things first. More patronage for each location will mean more play. This is, today, the first thing operators must help their locations achieve — more patronage.

Some operators believe in advertising to help their locations. Like window streamers, hand bills, attractive menus and circulars, and other such methods.

Whatever methods the operator can impress on his locations, and also cooperate with his locations to use, as long as this will help popularize the location and, thereby, bring in greater patronage, the operator is sure to enjoy greater income along with the locations.

If the operator already enjoys dime play plus a more equitable division of the gross intake from his locations then it most definitely becomes necessary for him to help his locations prosper, so that he, too, will prosper.

First things first. And the very first thing every operator must now do is to cooperate with his locations to help bring about the greatest possible patronage for his locations.

This means greater patronage for his machines. Culminating in greater prosperity for his locations and for himself.

"10c PLAY PLUS" FOR NATION'S PROGRESSIVE OPERATORS

Survey Reports Indicate Ops Who Feature Finest Equip't, Give Best Service, Have Outstanding Personality and Good Sales Ability, Know Their **Locations and Can Intelligently Point Out Business Needs, Are Those Who** Are Capable of Instituting "10c Play Plus" More Equitable Arrangement of **Gross Intake From Machines**

CHICAGO—As a result of the many hundreds of letters received from operators regarding "10¢ Play Plus" a more equitable division of the gross intake, many important facets for the success of such operating have come

intake, many important facets for the success of such operating have come into the open.

It seems that those operators who feature the finest equipment, who give outstanding service to their locations, who have pleasant personalities and are congenial in their dealings with their locations, who have very good sales ability and who can intelligently point out their business needs to their locations, are reported to be the kind of operators who have been able to arrange for a more equitable share of the gross intake from the equipment they operate.

Strange to state, this does not necessarily mean very large operators in the big cities. In many cases, which have come to light, small operators in rural areas have been able to make better arrangements with their locations, in addition to dime play, they have the operators in the large, urban centers of the nation.

It does seem that the operator must have sales ability. Must operate the finest equipment. Must give outstanding service. These seem to be unalterable requisites. In addition, this operator must also be able to point out intelligently to his location his business requirements. To continue to progressively serve them.

Actually, this kind of operator

requirements. To continue to progressively serve them.

Actually, this kind of operator seems to be able to take his location into a true partnership, the kind of partnership that reasons out a method for conducting business on a profitable basis

This is the kind of operator who can

point out that, while all his overhead point out that, while all his overhead expense and general costs to be able to continue on ahead in business are rising to new and unprecedented heights, his charge for the entertainment which he offers the public has not risen accordingly.

In short, though the operator pays more for everything he needs to do business, his income has remained static.

No business man or no business firm, as these operators explain, can long continue to absorb increasing overhead and higher costs and charge the same price for the merchandise they sell that they used to charge years ago.

More and more operators are making arrangements to divide the gross intake of their machines on a more equitable basis. Some are arranging for minimum front money. Others are changing to 60%-40%, 65%-35% and even 70%-30% in some cases. There are those with low income locations who make a flat charge to cover their servicing overhead cost and arrange to divide whatever may be taken in over this figure on an equitable basis. table basis.

There are a great many plans in effect. In some towns there are as many as six and seven and more different methods used by operators. Arrangements are based on the individual location.

al location.

Regardless of all the confusing myriad methods in use, to arrange for a more equitable division of the gross receipts from all machines, the operator, himself, who can accomplish this is usually the type of man herein described and, in almost every case, among the really progressive operators in his area.

Trade Stirred Up Over **Trading Stamps**

Some Ops "For"—Some "Against" **Use of Trading Stamps to Stimulate** Play of Phonos and Games. Some Claim Locations Won't Cooperate. Some Believe Locations Will Cooperate. Some Foresee Drastic Cutthroat Competition for Locations. Others **Believe Plan Opens Way for Dime Play** Plus More Equitable Division of **Gross Intake With Locations and Ops Enjoying Increased Income**

CHICAGO-Never before, it seems, has the trade been as much stirred up over any single issue as it now is over that of the use of trading stamps to stimulate play of phonos and games.

Stimulate play of phonos and games. Since the report here, concerning the trading stamp as a play stimulation plan for phonos and games, this past week, some operators have advised that they are "for," and some have stated they are "against," the use of trading stamps.

Some believe that the leastion over

have stated they are "against," the use of trading stamps.

Some believe that the location owners won't cooperate, and will never get around to giving one stamp for each dime or each quarter play, whichever comes into being.

Others are just as adamant in their belief that the location owners will cooperate because they feel that, as long as the trading stamps will help to bring business into the location, the owner has every reason to cooperate to the fullest extent.

Some are of the belief that "this is the answer to dime play plus a more equitable division of the gross intake." They claim that, by booming business the locations will be happy and, especially so, will the ops, be happy.

These men believe that the trading stamps can bring in more business and that they then can arrange for a more equitable share of the gross intake from their phonos and amusements.

Others are also of the belief, espe-

Others are also of the belief, espe-

Others are also of the belief, especially in those areas where there are no associations, that drastic cutthroat competition will come into being.

These men claim that operators, in an effort to grab more play and also to grab other locations, will offer double and even triple the number of stamps, and openly advertise this fact.

One of these operators says: "This will start a real war for spots as well as for greater giveaways with the result that we will all suffer."

Others point to the fact that, with so many U. S. families saving trading stamps today, this will click with the public, and will help bring about better public relations with even housewives also becoming interested in coin operated music and entertainment.

In short, the pros and cons are wide and varied and run along many strange lines and beliefs.

strange lines and beliefs.

As yet there has been no definite test made by any operator anywhere. At least no information of such a test has been forthcoming.

There are those who believe a test should be made and others who claim they wouldn't dare "just test the trading stamp plan." These latter claim that "there would then be no way to stop, once started because, even if it proved a failure, the few who did get stamps will always want them in the future."

There are those who feel this is not the case. They point to the fact that

the case. They point to the fact that the operators would have to tie in with the operators would have to tie in with the trading stamps most popular in their area. These would have to be the stamps of a nationally known and recognized firm. If the plan failed, they could stop, they claim, because like stores that fail, the stamps the public received would still be of value.

The Cash Box came into the midst of all this when certain of its members discussed trading stamps as a means for play stimulation, along with many other ideas, with executives of Chicago's music operators' association

tion.

The report of this discussion appeared in *The Cash Box*, Page 45, March 2 issue.

From then on, this publication was bombarded with inquiries. A questionnaire has been sent nationwide and results will be reported as the answers are received.

Locations Rent Machines From Ops for Percentage of Gross Receipts or Fixed Fee. Number of Years Involved in Contract of No Import

CHICAGO—Reports indicate that nore and more operators are signing

more and more operators are signing their locations to rental contracts for a period of years.

The fact remains that the location is renting the machines from the operator for either a fixed fee or a percentage of the gross receipts.

Due to the fact that, sometime ago, reports fil'ered in where the Internal Revenue Department had requested

Revenue Department had requested ops to file "partnership returns" with locations taking in \$600 and more, where no lease or rental arrangement was in effect, many ops who have oral rental agreements immediately signed their locations to contracts so that

their locations to contracts so that the agreements would have a much firmer basis of proof.

With the fact that the locations actually rent the machines from the operators, in mosts cases on a percentage of the gross receipts from the machines, and the orerator agrees to service and keep the machines in good repair, the most that would be required of such operators who have such contracts in force would be the such contracts in force, would be the filing of Form 1099 known as an "information return" which comes under the 1954 code, section 6041.

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George Ponser Dies

Pioneer Coinman's **Activities Embraced Every Phase of** Coinbiz

MAPLEWOOD, N.J. — George Ponser, one of the industry's pioneer coinmen, and known internationally, died here on Tuesday night, March 5, after a long illness. He was 54 years old.

Ponser entered the coin machine business in the industry's early days, and had been associated with every phase of the business-operator, jobber, distributor and manufacturer.

As head of a jobbing and distributing firm in the early 1930's, Ponser represented most of the large Chicago manufacturers, and at one time had branch offices in a dozen large cities, with headquarters in New York City. Products sold by his firm ranged from amusement machines to venders to music machines.

With the dissolution of his branch offices, after the past war, Ponser with Irving Kaye manufactured a number of successful amusement machines, including one of the most popular skee-ball type games of that period. He later opened his own manufacturing company in Chicago, which lasted only a short time.

Upon his return to New York City, Ponser became business manager for the Associated Amusement Machine Operators Association. He left this organization to open a branch office for Albert Simon in Syracuse. His latest venture was jobbing of reconditioned machines in Newark, N.J., and producing slate tops for pool games.

Many of the industry's well known personalities were employed by Ponser, at one time or another. Among these were Jack Mitnick, Joe Ash, Bert Lane, Fred Iverson,



CHICAGO—For too long a time now there arises that old and worn cliche regarding the fact that 10¢ play can only come into being "because the people are different" in this or that center of the nation.

One very well-known operator-leader here best explained this to someone who questioned him regarding dime play with the statement:

"Well, the people in Chicago are different. That's why it was easy to institute dime play in Chicago."

His answer was simple and right to the point. Pulling no punches whatsoever he stated:

"The only difference between the people in Chicago and the people in New York is 900 miles."

And that has been the answer wherever progressive operators have insti-

ever progressive operators have insti-tuted dime play successfully.

There's no difference in the people.

But there is a difference in operators.

Some operators fear their location owners. Some operators would rather continue along the line of least resistowners. Some operators would rather continue along the line of least resistance and suffer accordingly than step to the front and logically and intelligently explain to their location owners why they must obtain more per play so that they can pay more for service and equipment.

What's even more interesting is the fact that the average location owner, who has had to raise the prices of the merchandise he sells constantly over the past inflationary years, understands and sympathizes with the operators' needs.


The location owners, in the majority of cases, have been more willing and more inclined to make a test of 10¢ play than have their own operators.

Many Ops Still Trying To **Get Dime Play Accepted**

Claim Drives by Competitors Offering 5¢ Play Plus More Commission Percentage to Locations Stymies Efforts to Get Dime Play Working

CHICAGO—An operator from Kentucky advises that in the nine counties





surrounding his base of operation there is no dime play anywhere.

He advises that he has, at the present time, only one machine on 10¢, 3 for 25¢ play.

This, he reports, is due to the fact that this location has found dime play more profitable and, because the location cooperates with him to the fullest extent, won't allow operators to place a nickel play machine. The location is happy with the better income return.

But, also states this operator, at one time he had almost all of his music equipment on 10ϕ , 3 for 25ϕ play.

Then, he says, along came competing operators who began to offer his locations $60\,\%$ commission and were willing, in addition to this higher commission basis to the location, to install the music machines on 5¢ play.

Even this didn't hurt, as far as 10¢ play is concerned, he advises but, he adds, what did hurt, was the offer these operators made to place their machines on 60% to the locations.

To retain his locations, in the face of this sort of competition, he had to reinstitute 5¢ play.

"But," he concludes, "as soon as the memory of this sort of commission percentage basis grows dim, I'm going to once again go back to 10ϕ play and this time," he adamantly states, "I'm going to put them all on contract and let every competitor go hang."

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

4 Year Phono Depreciation

Internal Revenue Service Calls for Suggestions to Revamp Old '42 Depreciation Schedules. Juke Box Biz Can Now Ask for Uniform 4 Year Nationwide Depreciation Schedule of 40% First Year, 30% Second Year, 20% Third Year and 10% Fourth Year by Letter to Reach Engineering and Valuations Branch of I. R. S. Before June 30, 1957

CHICAGO—It is now possible for the juke box industry to enjoy a uni-form depreciation schedule nation-

For years The Cash Box pointed out the need for such a depreciation

schedule.

Juke box operators from all over

Juke box operators from all over the nation not only agreed with this publication but made every effort to help arrange such a schedule by pointing out its need to their local offices of the Internal Revenue Service.

MOA (Music Operators of America) can now help bring into being a uniform national depreciation schedule by writing a letter asking the Internal Revenue Service, Engineering and Valuations Division, to change to: 40% depreciation for the first year; 30% the second year; 20% the third year and 10% the fourth and final year for juke boxes.

This schedule of depreciation for all phonographs was originally proposed

phonographs was originally proposed by The Cash Box. Many juke box op-erators reported that they were try-ing to bring this schedule into being

locally.

Music Operators of America, showing that they represent the juke box ops of all the nation, all 48 states, can bring this proposal in writing to the Internal Revenue Service, which is now requesting all businessmen in all industries to bring forth new ideas for revamping the old 1942 depreciation methods.

tion methods.

The juke box ops, nationally, will then have a truly fair and reasonable depreciation schedule which can be proved in every regard.

The fact remains, and prices have shown this, that a new phono will depreciate anywhere from 40% to over 60% the very first year. This means that asking for a 40% depreciation the first year is reasonable and logical. The same is true of 30% more the second year, 20% the third year and 10% for the fourth and final year. With the approval of a uniform schedule by the IRS the nation's juke box operators will then be better able to arrange their purchases, trade-ins and future business.

Some ops are now forced to depresion the first versus and the second years are now forced to depresion.

Some ops are now forced to depreciate in five years and longer and, a few here and there, reported they depreciate in three years.

In short, from one area to another, depreciation schedules vary. These are actually subject to interpretation of local IRS offices.

Chicago Coin's "Ski-Bowl" Featured In Sports, Report of Dodgers Recreational Activities

NEW YORK — Here's the kind of publicity that we love to see the coin machine industry get. And, measured by any show biz press agent, is worth thousands of dollars.

Bill Roeder, sports staff writer of the New York World Telegram, reported this past Wednesday, March 6: "Another rainy day in Dodgertown kept the athletes indoors and we moseyed around the lobby watching some of them kill time. The recreational outlets included a pool table, a piano, a juke box, a pinball machine, another coin operated game called 'Ski-Bowl' (a Chicago Coin machine).

"The 'Ski-Bowl' game is this spring's big attraction. Sometimes there will 20 to 30 people hanging around it, waiting for a chance to play or just kibitzing. At the time of our moseying, however, Joe Pignatano, Chuck Templeton and Bert Hamric had the machine to themselves. They assured us that they weren't experts.

"'Drysdale is the camp champ', Pignatano told us. 'The perfect score on this thing is 990, and I've seen him make it a number of times. The only other one I saw do it was Zimmer once.'"

Similar stories also appeared in other New York papers.

Location Loans Hurt

OAKVILLE, ONT., CANADA — Mel Bargess, music operator in this area, reports that some operators are pulling out of locations due to loans being made to location owners which are upsetting operations.

"An example of location loans", advises Bargess, "is here in an average location in Toronto where there are twenty-eight 100 selection wall boxes.

"The operator is pulling out because a distributor has stepped in and has offered the location owner a location owner as location owner as location owner as location owner as location of the loc

has offered the location owner a loan in 'thousands'.

"Recently", reports Bargess, "I signed a contract for ten 100 selection wall boxes and a hideaway in a

new restaurant.

"A distributor loaned the location money and started installing a 200 selection phonograph on a 50-50 basis.

"It's not the small operators, like myself", protests Bargess, "that cut prices. It's the big ones.

"Normally", claims Bargess, "I tell customers we must work on a 60%-40% basis and the locations are willing to give me this 60%.

"But", he adds, "the distributor for the very same make machine comes along and advises he will install a 200 selection phono on 50-50.

"The result is", he concludes, "with the cost of equipment as high as it is I cannot make money unless I get 60% of the gross in most of my 200 selection locations."

Seeks Better Program Lights

LaFERIA, TEX. — Reece A. Love of Love Music Company, this city, suggests that program lights should be arranged in some other way, instead of behind the title strips so that they will give better and stronger lighting to the title strips.

Reece advises that these lights, as at present constituted, fade very fast, and cause the entire program to look old and worn.

He also asks, "Why not place cash boxes on the outside of the phonograph?"

Old Time Op Again Recalls Coinbiz Early Days

CHICAGO-Harry S. Lavine, Oil City, Louisiana, has been the subject of many Cash Box stories. His life, which includes better than fifty years in the coin machine business, could be a history of the arcade and coin machine operation.

Lavine's most recent communication with The Cash Box is of such interest we decided to reprint it here.

"Prior to operating the Penny Arcades, the first picture machines I owned and operated were the drop picture machines. This was several years before my going to the Buffalo Exposition in 1899 as a concessionaire. Enclosed find my picture taken at the Exposition.

"The first picture shows that I am aware of the Pathe Pictures at that Exposition. The first Penny Arcade to my knowledge was in New York City; the second in Buffalo, New York.



"Returned to Cleveland in the Fall of 1900. In the Spring of 1901, there was an Edison Phonograph Parlor operating about thirty phonographs only, using cylinder records. These machines had rubber ear tubes with curved Bakelite ends to insert or to hold against the ear. After each operation of the phonograph, everyone was supposed to wipe the Bakelite ends with a clean towel fastened to the machine, so as to keep the tubes clean and sanitary. There was a Mutoscope Parlor operating about forty Mutoscopes only. I purchased the Edison phonographs and the Mutuscopes, adding every known kind of machine to be had in the U.S.A., to make a Penny Arcade. Opened several Penny Arcades thereafter.

[Also known as the "C. M. I. (Coin Machine Industry) BLUE BOOK"]

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to he out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a hasis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth hut \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must he taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered hy outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should he read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest

price quoted.
FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers hecome upset due Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers necome upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, huy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worn to he priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the lahor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and lahor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even he higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made hy hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in husiness and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many huyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such huvers will ditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such huyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.

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
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
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
