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THE CASH BOX covers the entire music industry, ranging from retail record and music stores to disk jockeys, music publishers, recording artists, record manufacturers, music composers and arrangers, radio and TV stations, and all others allied to the music industry throughout the world.

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ECORDS ARE AUNIQUE ART FORM

Over the past several years, it has become eminently apparent that records are a unique art form. They weren't always considered so, particularly by people in the entertainment business, but now that the public has shown its acceptance of that fact, the entertainment world has seen the light also.

Records are unique for many reasons.

They are unique in that they constitute one of the few entertainment mediums which a person can enjoy at will. A record can be stored and brought out anytime someone feels like listening to it. A juke box player can also select the record of his choice at anytime he desires. This obviously isn't so of motion pictures, radio, television or the stage in that you just can't enjoy the same performance anytime of the day. In most cases, as a matter of fact, once you've seen a performance, that's it. It's very rare that you have the occasion to see it or hear it again.

Moreover, records are unique in that getting a hit in our field is different from every other aspect of entertainment and the effect cannot readily be reproduced in other mediums. For instance, it is becoming more and more prevalent that when a singer performs on television, he months the lyrics while his hit record is played. This happens because a record is such a blend of musicianship, vocalizing, arrangement and A&R know-how, that it is almost impossible to reproduce the sound which the public expects to hear.

Pointing up the uniqueness of the

record business today is the fact that a few years ago, records didn't have anywhere the status they now enjoy. Recordings were considered a minor offshoot of all the various entertainment mediums, certainly nowhere nearly as important as what was then considered more substantial forms. Today that has all changed. Record artists become known faster and more intimately than artists in almost any other field. It was Elvis Presley, basically a record artist, who in the space of a few months, became an international sensation. It was Randy Wood's Dot Records which was bought for several million dollars by Paramonut Pictures, a firm which only a short while ago probably didn't even consider having a record arm. And it is the record business as a whole which in 1956 upped its gross sales by more than 50%. a phenomenal achievement in any industry. and which at this moment cannot really set its sights on any future goal because there are no limits foresceable.

The great things that have happened to the record business and the people in it are a result of a self-assertiveness which may not have been particularly planned, but which occurred through the creativeness and ingenuity of its personnel. They took records out of the class of an adjunct of other art forms and made it a unique art form in itself.

If people in the record business are enjoying the results of that achievement today, they have mostly themselves to thank.

NEW YORK—Bernard Goodwin, President of Du Mont Broadcasting Corporation, Richard D. Buckley, President, and J. D. Wrather Jr., Chairman of the Board of WNEW Broadcasting, Inc. announced last week the purchase of WNEW by Du Mont, thereby merging television station WABD and radio station WNEW.

Du Mont, owner of New York television outlet WABD and Washington TV station WTTG, is paying approximately \$7,500,000 in cash and Du Mont stock for WNEW to the owners headed by Richard D. Buckley, J. D. Wrather, Jr., and John L. Loeb. Buckley, president and general manager of WNEW, will continue as president of Du Mont's WNEW division. In addition, Buckley will serve as a director and vice president of Du Mont.

The transfer of WNEW is subject to the approval of the Federal Communications Commission. Because this acquisition involves an offering of additional shares to the Du Mont stockholders, to be underwritten by Kuhn, Loeb & Company and Carl M. Loeb, Rhoades & Company, this transaction will be submitted to Du Mont stockholders for their approval.

Roger Williams To Cut 36 LP's For Kapp In Next Three Years

NEW YORK—Pianist Roger Williams will produce 36 LP albums between now and the end of 1959, in one of the most ambitious recording programs ever attempted by an artist, it was announced last week by Dave Kapp, president of Kapp Records.

This schedule can only be attempted, according to Kapp, because of the tremendous following among record buyers that Williams has developed in the past 18 months, since he first achieved national recognition via his hit recording of "Autumn Leaves." This record, Kapp reports, has sold over two million copies and has been distributed throughout the world.

During this time, Williams has produced seven LP albums, and in the last six months alone these have sold over 380,000 copies. His latest album, "Songs Of The Fabulous Fifties," a two-pocket package that retails for \$7.96, has sold over 68,000 copies in the first six weeks of its release, Kapp states. Williams also has a hit single in "Almost Paradise," which is on the popularity charts.

Because of Williams' classical and jazz background, the 36 albums will run the gamut of all types of music to fill the demands of all record collectors. Special promotional material will be designed to highlight the albums at the dealer level, and the release of the albums will also be timed to coincide with Williams' concert tours, which are now being set. These will include both pop and serious performances with leading symphony orchestras as well as solo appearances.

LP's To Play Major Role In Imperial's '57 Gross

HOLLYWOOD - Imperial Records, heretofore known primarily as a single records label, expects 40% of its predicted \$7,000,000 gross this year to come from albums, announced label prexy Lew Chudd. Imperial's \$5,000,-000 1956 gross saw only 22% attributed to package goods.

Chudd bases the expected 18% increase on the fact that his current album catalog, 40 strong, will be bolstered by an additional 20 foreign albums after his European trip in May, when he will formally pick up options already contracted for. This, coupled with the acquisition of two motion picture sound track albums, "Men In War," already released, and "Ride Back," to be released next month, plus four more which Chudd is bidding on for summer release, will give Imperial major sales contenders in all divisions of the market.

Chudd is also readying the entire Imperial line to make his entrance in the tape market this fall. "All recording sessions for the past two years," says Chudd, "have been covered stero-phonically." Tapes will be issued in half track, full track, and sterophonic for staggered as well as stacked heads.



Although this was the young midwesterner's first classical concert, he has sung operatic arias as a member of TV's "Show of Shows," and was graduated with a master's degree in music from Northwestern University. Bill also studied opera at Chicago's Roosevelt College and majored in music at DePauw College.



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

The oft-recorded Davis crew has a quality jazz entry for their Columbia debut.

Against expert 3 man support, Cohn and Brookmeyer compliment each other with persuasive attacks on the original-evergreen material. Reliable jazz stock.

This is the first volume of a 2 volume series devoted to sessions by the late trumpeter Fats Navarro. Besides the original pressings, most of the numbers (i.e. "Our Delight", "Dameronia", and "The Chase") have alternate masters which include marked and subtle changes from the originals. Navarro had a fiery attack that had direction and imagination. Jazz collectors will want to get their hands on these rare jazz performances.

Pianist Pennario effectively unearths the lyrical and emotional scope of both pieces. Vladimir Golschmann authoritatively directs the Concert Arts Orchestra. Appropriate coupling.

BARTOK: Music For Strings, Percussion And Celestra—STRAVINSKY: Song Of The Nightingale (Symphonic Poem)—The Concertgebouw Orchestra Of Amsterdam—Van Beinum, Conductor—Epic LC 3274 (1-12" LP) Two pillars of 20th century classical music, Bela Bartok and Igor Stravinsky, are represented in this fine Epic release in 2 works abounding in brilliant orchestrations. The Bartok piece has made the record rounds far more often than Stravinsky's rhythmic and evocative opus. Both are amazing technical feats, and Eduard Van Beinum's direction of the Concertgebouw Orchestra Of Amsterdam rings with color and excitement. Eye-catching cover symbolic of the 2 works. NEW YORK—The Juilliard String Quartet has been signed to an RCA Victor contract as part of a long range program designed to build up the company's catalog of chamber music literature on disk and tape, it has been announced by Alan Kayes, Manager Red Seal Artists and Repertoire, RCA Victor Records.

The Quartet will participate in two recording projects, one of which is a survey of chamber music from Haydn to contemporary composers. The survey is tentatively contemplated as an eight long play record series. The basic list of repertoire for the Quartet will include works by the following composers: Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert, Dvorak and Bartok.

The Juilliard Quartet will also participate in a special RCA Victor series called "Chamber Music For Everyone." Now being developed, the project will include duo, trio, quartet, quintet, sextet, and septet repertoire. As the project is presently envisioned, other repertoire will be recorded by performers currently under contract to Victor.

The Juilliard String Quartet was founded in 1946 by William Schuman, President of the Juilliard School of Music, with the aid of the Juilliard Foundation. The members of the quartet-in-residence, who also teach chamber music in the School, are Robert Mann, 1st violin; Robert Koff, 2nd violin; Raphael Hillyer, violist; and Claus Adam, cello.

The Quartet spends the months of July and August in Aspen, Colorado, where its members are on the faculty of the Aspen Music School and give frequent performances at the Aspen Festival. Having toured widely in the United States since its organization, the Quartet now plays up to 80 concerts on its annual transcontinental excursion. In 1955 the ensemble made a five month tour of Europe. During which time it played 76 concerts in 10 countries. The Quartet has received high critical acclaim both here and abroad for its interpretation of both contemporary and established classical repertoire.







Atlantic To Launch \$3.98 LP Series

NEW YORK - Atlantic Records this week announced its plans to launch a new LP line to be called its 8000 series.

The 8000 series has been designed to sell at \$3.98 and will make its bow early in April when Atlantic will issue seven rhythm and blues albums. Though primarily R & B, current plans are that the 8000 series will be elastic and will in the future include some pop and some jazz pack-

The first seven albums will be titled: "The Greatest Rock and Roll" (an anthology of hit singles already released by most of Atlantic's starstudded roster); "Lavern Baker"; "Ray Charles"; "Ruth Brown"; "Clyde McPhatter"; "Joe Turner", and "Ivory Joe Hunter." Each package will have 14 selections.

The March 23 issue of The Cash Box carried the story of Atlantic's LP price raise from \$3.98 to \$4.98. This new price refers to its 1200 line, which is its regular catalogue comprised mainly of jazz and a few sophisticated pop albums. Simultaneously with the announced rise in price mention was also made of "The Greatest Rock and Roll." This may have led the reader to conclude the price of this album was pegged at \$4.98. It is, however, one of the new 8000 series selling for \$3.98.

ROCHESTER, N. Y .- A nationally known symphonic music conductor and a Rochester disk-jockey are beating the drum these days, for music-lovers and pop record fans listening to WHEC, Rochester!

Frederick Fennell, conductor of the Eastman Symphonic Wind Ensemble (heard on Mercury LPs) and Bob E. Lloyd, deejay of WHEC's "Lloyd's Unlimited" (Monday through Friday 3:30-6:00) are the stars, and a symphony size copper kettle-drum is getting the beat.

It all began when Lloyd, casually mentioned on his afternoon show that he liked the sound of the kettle-drum at the close of the Coca-Cola commercial (one of his sponsors). "We oughta get Fred Fennell of the Eastman School up here with a kettle-drum one of these days."

Fennell heard the broadcast just before hopping a plane to keep a concert date in Cherokee, Iowa. En route to the concert, he stopped off in Chicago for dinner with old friend Bill Ludwig, Jr. of the W. F. Ludwig Drum Company. Fred mentioned Lloyd's yen for a kettle-drum. Ludwig's immediate rejoinder was, "Let's send him one!" To the amazement of Fred Fennell, a symphony-size kettle-drum was shipped to Lloyd the next day!

The real twist to the story is that Lloyd, who started it all, was the most surprised deejay in America when a gigantic carton was delivered to him at the WHEC studios four days later. Fennell had tipped off the other studio personnel on his return to Rochester just hours before the drum was delivered and was waiting for Lloyd and the unveiling!

Result? Lloyd has his kettle-drum, makes his own noises for his sponsors and Fennell is a regular studio guest on "Lloyd's Unlimited"-giving Bob E. instructions on foot-pedal and drumsticks.

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



SASKATCHEWAN, CANADA—
The territory here is on one of the world's biggest booms in history. Oil, uranium and other mineral products are said to be the reason. The town of Estavan, 10 miles from the North Dakota border, is typical. The economy boom has increased the town's population in five years from 3,935 to more than 6,000. The Saskatchewan Power Corporation is erecting a \$40 million plant here. When Saskatchewan's potash industry is firmly on the tracks and rolling, it is expected to create new employment, directly and indirectly, for some 12,000 people. A number of records were broken in the economy here last year—value of construction work went up to a new high of \$301 million, \$14 million greater than in 1955. Manufacturing production also had its biggest year with an output valued at \$310 million, and 1957 is expected to hike this figure to \$325 million.



USED MACHINES MARKET STRONG DURING FIRST '57

MUSIC: Continued Scarcity of Late Model Used Phonos Holds Prices Up. Of 50 Phonos Reviewed, 34 Models Remained at Same Price, 4 Models Went Up in Price; 12 Models Fell Slightly Down.

PINBALLS: Heavy World Export Market Demand Caused Prices to Remain Strong. Of 50 Late Model 1955-1956 Games Checked, 33 Held at Same Price, 3 Went Up in Price, 4 Fell Slightly in Price. There Was Very Little Change in Price of 50 Older 1953-1954 Pinballs Surveyed.

KIDDIE RIDES: Prices of 12 Kiddie Rides Checked Softened During the First Quarter. 10 Kiddie Rides Were Lower in Price, 2 Remained at the Same Price.

SHUFFLE GAMES: Prices of 1955-1956 Models Show Very Slight Downtrend. Of 35 Shuffles and Bowlers Checked, 20 Remained at the Same Price and 15 Were Slightly Down in Price.

ARCADE EQUIP'T: Prices for Arcade-Type Machines Were Mixed During the First Quarter of 1957. Of 35 Machines Reviewed, 6 Were Up in Price, 14 Slightly Down, While 15 Held to the Same Price.

CHICAGO—Even the equipment is three months older, continued heavy demand from domestic and world markets, held prices and, in some cases, even raised prices.

Some prices softened for some machines, but on an overall average, with the majority of prices in effect of the past three months remaining unchanged and some prices unchanged for the past six months this is, in effect, equal to an actual raise in prices of used machines.

Therefore the term, "a strong used machines market" is used to describe the first quarter of 1957.

With the spring season here and demand for used machines of all kinds growing, instead of diminishing, the effect pricewise on all used equipment should continue a very strong market right thru the second quarter. Only new and sensational products, it seems at this writing could, in any

fashion whatsoever, affect the present

prices on the used machines market. (All the above information is based on "The Cash Box Price Lists" now over 18 years old. "The Cash Box Price Lists" have never missed a single week's issue in over 912 weeks' issues).

A. W. Adickes, Hamburg, Germany, Celebrates 30th Year As Coin Machine Distributor



A. W. ADICKES

HAMBURG, GERMANY—That a coin machine merchant can look back on an activity of 30 years in international business, is, certainly, an event in such a small field as the automatic machine industry. A. W. Adickes, of the "NOVA Apparate GmbH.," of Hamburg, is, without any doubt, one of the most outstanding personalities of the German and European automatic machine industry on the international market.

When he was 21 years of age—on January 1, 1927—he became connected with Vogel & Halke, of Hamburg; in the same year, he represented the SECA Scales on the Leipzig Fair; in the following years, he made several trips for said firm to England and later to the U. S. A., with remarkable success.

In 1931, he started his own business in England. Until the beginning of the war, his London firm of Scott, Adickes & Co., with its branches in Paris and Madrid and its great investments in Belgium, Holland, South Africa and India, etc., was the chief exponent of the European trade in automatic machines. The name of this firm embodies for the "old boys" a period of industrial history: A. W. Adickes, as the founder of said firm, is glad to confirm that, with his importations from the U.S.A., he started an important period of the pre-war history of the automatic machines in Europe, influencing as well very definitely the pre-war production program of the German manufacturers. Especially the era of the crane machines and the pinball games, which in their modern form is still today the backbone of the entertainment machine business, goes back to the importa-tions of "Scott-Adickes." The beginning of the war in 1939 prevented the importation of Rock-Ola automatic phonographs which were already popular at that time. Mr. Adickes has now been a good friend of Mr. Rockola and of other owners of leading firms for approximately 20 years!

The hostility of the well introduced English firms, which he had to meet, soon gave way to respect and friendship, due to his fair and consequent

business policy and the opening of new possibilities of making money for the British operators. As the years went on, Scott, Adickes & Co. obtained and held the general representations of the leading American amusement machine producers for Europe and the British Dominions. Before and after the war, Mr. Adickes made many trips to the U. S. A. This was necessary due to the current changes in the suitable machines, and in order to make a thorough study of the markets and to keep up his personal contacts. From 1932 to 1939, the pre-war firm of Mr. Adickes represented also the leading German producers in England, France, Spain and the Commonwealth.

To hear this young man, who celebrates his anniversary, talk about his experiences and about the history of the firm of Scott, Adickes & Co., is like a chapter out of the annals of the international coin machine industry. It is a history of daring courage and consequent business management. With an import record, which was outstanding at that time in the history of the automatic machine industry, of 15,000 "Rainbows" to Europe-this machine became later very popular in Germany under the name of "Tura Ball"—the firm of Scott, Adickes & Co. took the lead among the European firms doing business in automatic machines. The same number of sales was reached, in 1933-34, with a machine by Genco, named "Silver Cup," which became known in Germany under the name of "Tura-Duplex."

The war brought a sudden end to the meteoric rise of the firm of Scott, Adickes & Co. Mr. Adickes' business and private property is still confiscated today. After serving in the Army for five years, Mr. Adickes became a partner in an import and export enterprise in Hamburg, and in 1953, he founded again his own automatic machine trade firm, the "NOVA Apparate-GmbH."

The new firm of Nova adapted the business principles of the former London firm. Just as before the war, Mr. Adickes is still guided today by the principle of showing trends and new possibilities of making money to the operators.

Mr. Adickes strongly believes in personal contacts and is especially happy about the fact that his many connections with international businessmen in this field have not been hurt by the war and have currently been resumed—which is one of the reasons why the firm of Nova has gained its place on the word market so fast. Today, this firm has a good name in Germany as well as in all of Europe, not only as the general representatives of the Rock-Ola phonographs, but also for the leading American automatic amusement machines.

As the second Chairman of the recently founded Association of the German Automatic Machine Industry, A. W. Adickes has taken an active

There is no longer any doubt of the growing importance of the world's markets as far as U.S. manufacturers and distributors are concerned.

This past year of 1956 saw new high marks set as far as export business was concerned.

But even these paled compared to the orders which were received by distributors and manufacturers alike for the first quarter of 1957.

A cablegram received from a well known Swiss distributor probably talks for all in the European market. This distributor advised he wished to purchase five-ball amusements in hundred lots.

This is unprecedented as far as the postwar era is concerned. It definitely indicated the growing demand for American coin operated music and amusements thruout the European continent.

What's more, Europe has now taken the lead away from both Canada and South and Central America, as far as U.S. coin machine exports are concerned dollarwise and also as far as quantity is concerned.

What is even more interesting was a survey made by this publication, as 1957 came into being, among noted European distributors asking whether they planned to "buy as much or buy more in 1957 than they did in 1956".

In every case the answer was, "We plan to buy more in 1957."

This, too, is unprecedented in view of the fact that 1956 was a record export year for America's coin machines industry.

It is only sad that such countries as England continue to disallow purchases of machines direct from the U.S.

British distributors are still try-

ing hard to win over their government to allow them to purchase even a small amount of machines directly from the U.S.

A story appeared in this publication, a few months ago, that a Western German distributor had arranged to ship new U.S. phonographs to England. This heartened many of the juke box manufacturers in the U.S.

Distributors thruout the U.S. have been doing a very fine export business. More and more distributors have entered into export. In each case they have found themselves amazed at the demand for reconditioned machines of all kinds.

The average U.S. distributor, engaged in exportation, is eagerly seeking for equipment of all kinds in an effort to satisfy his backlog of orders.

In almost every case he has had to resort to international phone calls or telegrams advising that he cannot obtain the quantity nor the machines wanted.

In fact, many have found a ready market for older machines than what has been called for in every case.

The scarcity of late model used machines has awakened business for new equipment. The manufacturers are working ahead in an effort to meet this demand intelligently.

Phonographs, especially, are being called for in very large quantity. Better than was ever expected.

Yet, everything considered, export is still a very small part of the production of the present American juke box manufacturers.

But it is growing and the U.S. automatic phonograph manufacturer has become much more in-

terested in the export market than he has ever been.

Pinball manufacturers who receive orders for 200 and 300 new machines to be shipped are not surprised anymore. The lack of late model used pinball games has brought this chout

brought this about.

And though the prices of the new machines are, most naturally, much higher than what the world market importers ever paid for used machines, sales somehow seem to be going on ahead with little slowdown.

Manufacturers are of the belief that the world's markets will more appreciate the new machines, due to the lack of trouble and mechanical servicing, and that importers will find more satisfied customers are easier to sell.

In the meantime, even though final reports for the fourth quarter of 1956 haven't as yet been compiled, it is well known in the industry that the first quarter of 1957 was one of the very best, as far as orders for machines were concerned.

Many visitors to the European market this past fall, including the publisher of The Cash Box, helped to stimulate greater interest in export and import.

This publication feels very proud of its "Quarterly Export Editions" which, over the years, have helped promote better business and a finer relationship with all peoples internationally.

Most every manufacturer showed considerable activity during the first three months of 1957:

AMI, Inc., Grand Rapids, Michigan, still in production of its model "G" phonographs (80, 120 and 200 selections), with the 200 selection machine its biggest seller

selections), with the 200 selection machine its biggest seller.

Auto-Photo Company, Los Angeles, California, still producing its hit "Model 11" automatic photo studio, with production running continuously to supply the demand.

Bally Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, celebrating its 25th year as a manufacturer, is so busy supplying equipment of various kinds that its production lines cannot keep up with demand. Introduced during this period were "Key West", an in-line game: "Balls-A-Poppin", a novelty pinball; and a sensational ball bowling game "ABC Bowling Lanes". The firm continues its production of its shuffle bowlers "DeLuxe ABC Bowler" and "DeLuxe Congress Bowler"; and its Kiddie game line of "The Champion" (horse), "Model T" and "Bally Bike".

Bally Vending Corporation, Chicago, Illinois, with John Stewart named assistant treasurer, producing a line of vending machines.

Chicago Coin Machine Company, Chicago, Illinois, unable to keep pace with orders pouring in for its new bowling ball type game "Bowling League". Other games produced during this period were "Ski-Bowl" and "DeLuxe Skee Roll", skee ball type games.

Exhibit Supply Company, Chicago, Illinois, in preparation for Spring business, kept busy producing its Card Vendors and cards.

J. F. Frantz Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, still busy producing its five products "A.B.T. Guesser Scale", "A.B.T. Rifle Sports Gallery", "A.B.T. Challenger", "Kicker & Catcher," and "Pace Aristo Scale."

Games, Inc., Chicago, Illinois, came out with a new amusement machine called "Skeet Shoot".

Genco Manufacturing & Sales Company, Chicago, Illinois, produced an extremely successful amusement game "6-Player Skill Ball", a skee type ball game, and followed it up with a new gun "Circus Rifle Gallery".

D. Gottlieb & Company, Chicago, Illinois, following its policy of controlled production, turned out "Rainbow" and "Ace High", pinbals, and "Flag Ship", a 2-player pinball.

International Mutoscope Corporation, Long Island City, N.Y., after a number of years of experimentation, is producing its new "Voice-O-Graph", which records and vends either a 45 rpm or 78 rpm record.

J. H. Keeney & Company, Chicago, Illinois, in addition to its continued production of its vending machine line, produced two amusement machines, "6-player Bowlette", a skee ball type game, and "True Score" a ball bowling machine.

Marvel Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, is manufacturing "Lucky Horoscope", a fortune telling amusement machine.

Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation, Chicago, Illinois, continues with its line of phonographs—200 selection, 120 selection and 50 selection.

J. P. Seeburg Corporation, Chicago, Illinois, continues to supply the trade with its model "V-200", a 200 selection phonograph.

United Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, the first company to introduce the ball bowling type game, is hard pressed to fill orders that keep piling in for its "Bowling Alley".

Watling Manufacturing Com-

Watling Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, keeps a steady flow of its "Penny Fortune Scale" going out to the trade. Williams Manufacturing Com-

Williams Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, produced six machines during this period. In the pinball field it produced "Perky" and "Star Fire," and "Shamrock" a 2-player pinball. Other machines were "Roll-A-Ball", a 6-player skee ball type game; "Peppy, Musical Clown" a novelty machine; and "Crossfire" a gun.

The Rudolph Wurlitzer Com-

The Rudolph Wurlitzer Company, North Tonawanda, N.Y., introduced its "2100" series of phonographs—model "2100", 200 selection; "2104" 104 selection; and "2150" a 200 selection medium priced phono.

Das jüngst vergangene Jahr 1956 brachte neue Spitzenleistungen im

Ausuhrgeschäft.

Doch diese sogar sind jetzt schon überholt durch die Anzahl von Aufträgen, die bereits bei den Herstellern und Vertriebsfirmen im ersten Vierteljahr von 1957 eingegangen

Das von einer bekannten schweizer Vertriebsfirma erhaltene Kabel sprich wohl für den ganzen eturopäischen Markt. Diese Vertriebfirma teilt darin mit, dass sie Fünf-Ball-Spiele in Partieen von hunderten zu kaufen wünscht.

Das ist etwas ganz Neues für die Nachkriegszeit. Es zeigt klar die ständig wachsende Nachfrage auf dem ganzen europäischen Kontinent nach amerikanischen münzautomatischen Plattenspielern und Unter-

haltungsspielen. Dazu kommt, dass Europa jetzt die führende Stellung in der Ausfuhr von amerikanischen Münzautomaten von Kanada wie auch von Süd—und Zentral-Amerika an sich gerissen hat, und zwar was den Dollarwert wie auch was die Mengen betrifft.

Noch interessanter ist das Resultat einer Rundfrage, die von dieser Zeitschrift zu Anang des Jahre 1957 unter bekannten europäischen Betriebsfirmen veranstaltet wurde, und zwar wurden diese Firmen gebeten, mittzuteilen, "ob sie ebensoviel oder mehr in 1957 als in 1956 zu kaufen gedenken.

In jedem Einzelfalle lautete die ntwort: "Wir beabsichtigen in Antwort: "Wir beab 1957 mehr zu kaufen."

Das ist auch noch nie dagewesen, da ja 1956 ein Rekordausfuhrjahr für die amerikanische Münzautomatenindustrie war.

Es ist nur schade, dass Länder wie England sich noch immer dem direkten Ankauf von Automaten aus den U.S.A. widersetzen. Die britischen Vertriebsfirmen sind immer noch hart an der Arbeit,

um ihre Regierung zu überreden, weningstens doch den Ankauf einer kleinen Menge von Automaten di-rekt aus den U.S.A. zu gestatten.

Vor einigen Monaten brachte diese Zeitschrift die Nachricht, dass eine westdeutsche Vertriebsfirma Wege gefunden hätte, um neue amerikanische Plattenspieler nach England zu verschiffen. Das war eine erfreuliche Nachricht für viele Herstellers von Plattenspielern ("Juke Boxes") in den U.S.A.

Vertriebsfirmen in allen Teilen der U.S.A. haben ein ausgezeichnetes Exportgeschäft getätigt. Immer mehr Vertriebsfirmen sind ins Exportgeschäft hineingegangen, und in jedem Falle sind sie über die grosse Nachfrage nach wiederinstandgesetzten Automaten aller Art erstaunt gewesen.

Die durchschnittliche amerikan-ische Vertriebsfirma, welche sich mit der Ausfuhr befasst, ist eifrig darum bemüht, die verschiedensten Ausrüstungen zu finden, um die

Rückstände der eingegangenen Auftrãge aufzuarbeiten.

In fast allen Fällen musste eine solche Firma das Uberseetelephon oder-kabel benutzen, um mitzutei-len, dass sie die erwünschte Menge oder Automaten nicht beschaffen könne.

Tatsächlich existierte vielfach ein Markt für ältere Automaten, der mehr aufnehmen konnte, als

vorhanden war.

Der Mangel an Spätmodellen von gebrauchten Automaten hat das Geschätsinteresse an neuen Ausrüstungen erweckt. Die Hersteller sind eifrig an der Arbeit, um dieser Nachfrage in der richtigen Weise entgegenzukommen.

Insbesondere werden Plattenspieler in grossen Mengen nachgefragt, und zwar weit mehr, als erwartet werden konnte.

Doch alles zusamengerechnet ist das Exportgeschäft noch immer nur ein kleiner Teil der Herstellung der heutigen amerikanischen Plattenspielerindustrie.

Das Ausfuhrgeschäft ist aber im Anwachsen begriffen, und der amerikanische Hersteller von automatischen Plattenspielern ist heute mehr am Exportmarkt interessiert als je zuvor.

Pinball-Hersteller, die heute Aufträge auf 200 bis 300 Apparate erhalten, sind nicht mehr erstaunt. Das erklärt sich aus dem Mangel an Spätmodellen von gebrauchten Pin-Ball-Spielen.

Obgleich natürlicherweise Preise für neue Maschinen heute viel höher sind, wie die Preise, welche die Importeure auf dem Weltmarkt für gebrauchte Maschinen zu zahlen gewohnt waren, so scheinen doch die Verkaufsabscheinen doch die Verkaufsab-schlüsse ohne viele Rückschläge voranzugehen.

Die Hersteller sind der Ansicht, dass die Weltmärkte die neuen Maschinen gerne aufnehmen werden, weil sie störungsfrei sind und keiner mechanischen Instandhaltung bedürfen, und dass die Importeure mehr beriedigte Kunden haben werden und somit mehr verkaufen können.

Obgleich die endgültigen Berichte für das letzte Vierteljahr von 1956 noch nicht zusammengestellt worden sind, ist es doch schon in der Industrie bekannt, dass das erste Vierteljahr von 1957 eines der besten war, was Ar Apparate betrifft. Auftrage für die

Viele Besucher der europäischen Märkte im letzten Herbst, unter ihnen auch der Herausgeber von "The Cash Box," halfen ein grösseres Interesse am Export und Import zu erwecken.

No queda ya la menor duda acerca de la creciente importancia de los mercados mundiales desde el punto de vista de los fabricantes distribuidores de los Estados Unidos.

Este año pasado de 1956 fué testigo de nuevas altas marcas establecidas en los negocios de exportación.

Pero aun éstas no son nada en comparación con el número de pedidos recibidos por los distribui-dores y fabricantes durante el primer trimestre de 1957.

Es probable que un cablegrama que se recibió de un renombrado distribuidor suizo interprete bien el modo de sentir de todos los demás en el mercado europeo. Dicho distribuidor manifestó que deseaba comprar máquinas de cinco bolitas en lotes de a cien.

Esto es algo que no tiene precedentes en la era de la postguerra. Fué indicativo de la creciente demanda de máquinas americanas de música y diversión que existe en todo el continente europeo.

Y lo que es más, Europa ha logrado ya adelantarse al Canadá y a las Américas del Sur y Central en lo que respecta a las importaciones de máquinas de los EE. UU. en términos de dólares, así como a las cantidades importadas.

Lo que es aún más interesante fué un estudio llevado a cabo por esta publicación a principios de 1957 entre los más conocidos distribuidores europeos, en el curso del cual se les preguntó si se proponían "comprar tanto o más en 1957 que en 1956."

En todos los casos la respuesta fué: "Nos proponemos comprar más en 1957."

Esto tampoco tiene precedentes, en vista del hecho de que 1956 fué un año "record" para la industria americana de máquinas accio-

nadas por monedas. Sólo se ha mencionado el hecho de que países tales como Inglaterra siguen prohibiendo la compra de máquinas directamente de los

Los distribuidores británicos continúan luchando para hacer que el gobierno les permita la compra, aunque sea de una pequeña cantidad de máquinas, directamente en los EE. UU.

Hace varios meses se dió a conocer en esta publicación que un distribuidor de la Alemania Occidental había dado los pasos necesarios para despachar nuevos fonógrafos de los EE. UU. a Inglaterra. Esta noticia dió gran ánimo a muchos de los fabricantes de fonógrafos automáticos en los Estados Unidos.

En todos los EE. UU., los distribuidores han llevado a cabo un buen negocio de exportación. Más y más empresas se han dedicado a dicho negocio. En todos los casos, dichas empresas distribuidoras se han sorprendido de la gran demanda que existe por máquinas reacondicionadas de todas clases.

La mayoría de los distribuidores de los EE. UU. que se dedican a la exportación, solicitan ansiosamente máquinas de todas clases para dar cumplimiento a sus pedidos pendientes.

En casi todos los casos, se han visto obligados a recurrir a llamadas por teléfono o cablegramas internacionales para dar a saber que no les es posible obtener el número de máquinas ordenadas.

En realidad, muchos han encontrado un buen mercado para las máquinas viejas mejor de lo que se esperaba en cada caso.

La escasez de máquinas usadas de último modelo ha contribuido a despertar el interest del comercio en los nuevos equipos. Las fábricas trabajan anticipadamente con el objeto de hacer frente a esta demanda de manera concienzuda.

Los fonógrafos, en especial, se ordenan en cantidades muy grandes, mucho mayores de lo que jamás se anticipaba.

Sin embargo, tomándose todo en cuenta, el negocio de exportación constituve aún una pequeña parte de la producción de los fabricantes actuales de fonógrafos automáticos en los EE. UU.

Pero se trata de un negocio que está prosperando, y por ello los fabricantes americanos de fonógrafos automáticos se han interesado cada vez más en el mercado de exportación de manera sin ejemplar.

Los fabricantes de máquinas de "Pinball" que reciben pedidos de 200 y 300 máquinas nuevas no se extrañan más. Esto se debe a la escasez de los juegos de "pinball" usados de último modelo que se deja sentir actualmente.

Y aunque los precios de las máquinas nuevas son, como es muy natural, mucho más elevados que los pagados por los importadores los mercados mundiales por máquinas usadas en el pasado, las ventas parecen haber ido progresando de alguna manera con pocos retardos.

Los faricantse conceptúan que los mercados mundiales apreciarán más las nuevas máquinas debido a que no se echan a perder ni requieren servicio mecánico y que los importadores se convencen de que es más fácil venderlas a los clientes satisfechos.

Entretanto, aun cuando todavía no se han compilado los reportes finales correspondientes al cuarto trimestre de 1956, es bien sabido en la industria que el primer trimestre de 1957 fué uno de los mejores en lo que respecta a los pedidos de máquinas.

Muchos de los visitantes al mercado europeo en el pasado otoño, inclusive el editor de The Cash Box, contribuyeron a estimular mayor interés en las exportaciones

e importaciones.

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50% LESS PLAY STILL MAKES 10¢ PLAY MORE PROFITABLE

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Illinois Supreme Court Ill. Rectory Thanks Minter For Phone Gift Rules Free Play Pinball **Games Legal**

SPRINGFIELD, ILL.—Pinball machines that do not pay out money but reward players only with free plays are legal under Illinois law, the Illinois Supreme Court ruled Wednesday, March 20.

The high court in effect ruled that a pinball game which does not pay out "anything of value" and, therefore, on which no money is staked, is not a gambling device and does not fall within the gambling device prohibition of a 1953 statute.

The opinion reversed the Second District Appellate Court ruling on the case, which held that the machine in question, known as a "Bally Dude Ranch" was not permissible under the 1953 act dealing with pinballs.

The statute provides that pinball devices which involved skill and rewarded players with free plays are

not gambling devices and could be

In a majority opinion, written by Justice Joseph E. Daily of Peoria, the

high court said:
"A free play is neither money, the equivalent of money, nor a valuable

cquivalent of money, nor a valuable thing.

"It is unrealistic to hold that the possibility of winning a greater or lesser amount is gambling because if it were, most amusement games would be barred by the statute."

Justices Charles H. Davis, Rockford, and Harry B. Hershey, Taylorville, filed a dissenting opinion.

The machine involved was seized in 1954 at a tavern in Silvis, Ill. Elmer, Warren C., and Robert M. Hallgren appealed to the high court and the justices viewed the device last September at a demonstration staged by George Crampton, assistant state's George Crampton, assistant state's attorney of Rock Island County.





Used Equipment: Demand Outraces Supply

Shortage of Late Model **Phonos and Games Acute. Few** Have Any Sizeable Stock Left. **Quantity Difficult to Obtain**



CHICAGO — Even manufacturers here, in an effort to help their distributors in Europe and other countries around the globe, are inquiring of the people they call, whether these firms have "late model used games which can be immediately shipped to foreign countries?" CHICAGO — Even manufacturers

As is well known among all leading exporting distributors thruout the U.S. demand for used phonos and games has outraced supply.

More "wanted to buy" ads are being featured, in an effort to obtain some quantities of used games, than has appeared in *The Cash Box* in many, many months.

Biggest demand, it is reported, is from the European market. Dearth of late model games has created a hardship among well known European importer-distributors.

Importer-distributors.

It is very difficult for the Europeans to sell the same large quantities of new equipment as used machines. The differential in price makes this a very rough task even for the super-sales minded European importers.

The fact remains that since late '55 and almost all of '56 the market

was showing lack of used machines

for export.

Demand began to outrun supply early in '56 and has continued to the point where, as the first quarter of '57 comes to its end, the situation has become most acute.

In an effort to satisfy their importer enstemers, especially in the European

customers, especially in the European market, exporting distributors here are shipping older and still older model equipment at attractive prices.

Many depend on the Europeans to recondition these machines to fit them

for operating peculiarities in their own countries.

own countries.

But even two year old machines are becoming ever more difficult to obtain. Importer-distribs in the U.S. report that they now have orders for older models. Some dating back to four years and even more. Yet, even these are difficult to obtain in any real quantity.

quantity.

In the meantime, manufacturers here are shipping new equipment and are of the hope that the demand will continue for the European market, along with demand from Canada, Central and South America and also the Pacific countries.

Vending Machines Exports Lag Behind Phonos and Games

Business in '56 Considered Good by Vend Machine Firms. 10,000 Vendors **Shipped for \$1.5 Millions. Far Behind Phonos and Amusements**

Look for Better Year in '57 Because of Pensi-Cola and Other Beverage Dispensers

CHICAGO—Vending machine exports again lagged behind in 1956, compared to business by the automatic phonograph and amusement games

manufacturers and distributors.

It is expected that a little over 10,000 vending machines will have been exported when the final figures for 1956 will have been compiled for a valuation of approximately \$1.5 millions. millions.

But vending machine leaders feel that 1957 "will be a much better year." They attribute much of this to the opening of many new plants thruout the European continent by Pensi-Cola

thruout the European continent by Pepsi-Cola.

This, they believe, will help them to sell more beverage dispensers. In this way, they feel, they will tremendously boost export volume both quantity and dellowing.

quantity and dollarwise.

Whether this will become fact is yet to be seen. But, in the meantime, there is hope in the business hearts and minds of many beverage dispenser manufacturers.

It was the find hope of many in

It was the fond hope of many in the vending machines field that the year of 1956 would open the big wedge for U.S. machine exports worldwide.

So far the vending machine field has lagged far behind and, it seems, continues to do so at this time.

There are many explanations for this. Many point to the fact that Europeans have been far ahead of the U.S. vending machines field for many years.

In Switzerland, Belgium and other countries of the European continent, vending machines are part and parcel of retail store business. At the same time, they point to the higher prices of American equipment. They also point to the lack of hard coinage in many European countries.

They point to many other things such as non-dependable electric current and demand for mechanical type venders.

Whatever the problems, they seem to be manifold, as far as the vending machines business is concerned. Leaders of the industry in the U.S. consider it "extra business" when they receive orders from world markets for their machines.

1956 Juke Box Exports Surpass 20,000 Mark

Average Over 6,000 New and **Used Juke Boxes Exported** Each Quarter to all World Markets. First Postwar Year To See 20,000 Mark Shattered. Units Valued at Over \$12 Millions

CHICAGO-With the final and fourth quarter figures as yet not com-piled (October, November, December, 1956) U.S. juke box exporters have already set a new high mark for the year 1956.

Well over 20,000 new and used juke boxes, it is already ascertained, have been exported to all world markets by U.S. manufacturers and distribu-

1956 will be the first postwar year to see the 20,000 export mark shattered. The units will total well over \$12,000,000.00 in value for a new high mark.

With the exception of the second quarter of 1956, U.S. exporters shipped over 6,000 new and used juke hoves each quarter boxes each quarter.

The first quarter of 1956 saw 6,384 juke boxes shipped at a valuation of \$3,140,892.00.

The second quarter saw a drop in used phonos, but a gain in new juke boxes, and tho the total shipped dropped to 5,749 machines exported, the valuation went up to \$3,187,042.00.

The third quarter again saw the 000 mark surpassed. But this time by but one phono for a total of 6,001 juke boxes exported for the highest valuation yet, reaching \$3,468,029.00.

As used juke boxes become scarce,

more and more new phonos are being shipped and the final, fourth quarter valuation is expected to exceed the \$3.5 millions mark.

With exports continuing well ahead in the first quarter of 1957, regardless of the fact that fewer used juke boxes were shipped, and tho the quantity may be lower, value will be much greater, it is generally believed.

Most exporters in the U.S. are also of the opinion that, with the greater majority of the used juke boxes already exported the newer units, which they will be taking in trade will be shipped at higher prices and these, plus the cost of the new machines, will send exportation valuation far over the \$15 million mark for 1957.

The total valuation for the first three quarters of 1956 reached to \$9,795,963.00. This means that total valuation, including the final, fourth quarter of 1956, will easily surpass the \$12 millions mark.

Growing interest in world markets by both juke box manufacturers, as well as the increase in the numbers of distributors who are exporting used phonos, assures the industry a new high mark for 1957.

For example, at this time the popular big bowling games will, it is believed, hold back much export when available

Distributors are seeking guns, arcade equipment, pinballs and other,

smaller type amusements, for shipment all over the world.

The larger type, bowling games, now so popular in the U.S., it is believed, will take a long time in gaining popularity in foreign fields.

Yet exports continue to be very important to an ever growing number of exporting distributors.

Manufacturers are working ahead on plans for export machines. Pinball manufacturers are enjoying better ex-

manufacturers are enjoying better export business than ever before.

Distributors claim that they could ship a great many more machines if they were able to find what they needed.

As of the end of the third quarter of 1956, over 18,000 amusement games were exported worldwide for a valuation of \$2,748,464.00.

With shipments averaging over

6,000 amusement games each quarter, it is easily discernible that better than 20,000 amusement games will show in the final figures for 1956.

In fact, many claim that the figure will exceed 24,000 and that the valuation will be over \$4 millions.

"Where the great fault lies," she emphasizes, "is in not stressing the importance of the music machine in a location. There are some spots which would be unply to continue in busic. would be unable to continue in business without music. They do not realize the juke box is the 'drawing card', and also the 'holding hand' that keeps the crowd settled. Programming is very important, whether it's noticed or not. I've seen some high class res-

taurants and food bars quit on the juke box. Why? Because there wasn't juke box. Why? Because there wasn't enough study and effort made in programming the records. The manufacturers give us enough space on the machine to include 'dinner music' and 'soft, gentle music' for these locations. "We should have business contacts with both the patron of the juke box as well as the maker of the machine. We can then discuss the drawbacks, needs. etc.

meeds, etc.

"Here in our territory, it's the juke box operator who is the loser. There aren't any rules or codes of any kind. No price increase to 10¢. A few oper-

ators use dimes because the location ators use dimes because the location owners are interested in making money. On a number of occasions the juke box has been tied up with newspaper stories, taking the blame for people arrested for gambling on the premises. Our business is a pice clean business Our business is a nice clean business—one that a woman can run. It's exciting and could be profitable if there could be a price range on the play, even 15¢, 2 for 25¢ isn't too much, considering what is being sold, music by the best and most popular singers and musicians. It's just a matter of asking for what should be. I'm for boosting business with good old fashioned pep talks, clean machines and proper programming.

"By the way", concludes Mrs. Janssen, "Mr. Janssen is one of the best mechanics around."

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lewer price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Pur-chasers of such equipment must realize that machines and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and lahor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even he higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to he made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business, and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many huyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics. These huyers will purchase machines "as mechanics. These huyers will purchase machines "as is" at prices quoted by the trade at large and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.
