


"STICKS AND STRINGS IN HI-FI"-Marty Gold And His Orchestra-Vik LX-082 (1-12")
















#### "LADY AND THE TRAMP"—Peggy Lee—Decca DL 8462 (1-12" LP)

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

"HARPO IN HI-FI"—Harpo Marx—Mercury MG 20232 (1-12" LP)

All kidding aside, Harpo Marx is a delicate man with the harp. In this Mercury release, Harpo yields a sensitive, and warm touch as he works on evergreens ("My Funny Valentine") and Harpo originals ("Lullaby Doll"). Orchestral sup-port always keeps the artist in the forefront, and is just right for its mood music purposes. Deft harp performances by the veterań enter-tainer. tainer.

"BECAUSE I LOVE YOU"—The Somerset Strings—Epic LN 3254 (1-12" LP) "WILL YOU REMEMBER" — The Somerset Strings—Epic LN 3255 (1-12" LP) "LOOK FOR THE SILVER LINING"—The Somerset Strings—Epic LN 3255 (1-12" LP) These mood sessions come from a 3-disk pack-age, and are now available in 3 separate packages decked out in attractive covers. The melodies per-formed cover folk ("Deep River"), operetta ("When I Grow Too Old Too Dream") and "pop" ("TIl Close My Eyes"). They are played in an unhurried, dinner music manner. The waxings should take well to the mood music audience.

"TO MY WIFE"—Jim Tyler And His Orchestra— Davis JD-107 (1-12" LP) The title, and a colorful boquet of roses on the package make this mood entry ideal Mother's Day, anniversary or birthday fare for the hus-band to purchase. Jim Tyler and the ork, in some well-sounding arrangements, lushly take on 12 sentimental favorites ("Always," "I Love You Truly," "Let Me Call You Sweetheart"). With Mother's Day coming up, it would be advisable for dealers to stock up on such a disk as this.

"THE MOODS OF LONDON"—Philip Green And His Mayfair Orchestra—Capitol T10059 (1-12" LP

LP) Philip Green and His Mayfair ork make their first U.S. disk appearance in a set built around 12 items from English writers. At least 6 tunes have made a deep niche in our standard repertoire ("Mad About The Boy." "These Foolish Things Remind Me Of You." "Love Is The Sweetest Thing"). These and the others are played in the familiar lush manner U.S. mood buyers are ac-customed to hearing. Colorful package. Pleasur-able listening. able listening.

"THE CALYPSO CARNIVAL"—Columbia CL 1007 (1-12" LP)

This is one of the few disks answering the current calypso craze approaching the subject in unadulterated fashion. The artists, 8 of them, including Lord ("Mama Looka Boo-boo") Flash perform the 13 happy and humorous selections with infectious rhythm and charm. Authentic, delichtful calues fun delightful calypso fun.





The selections all bear the titles of various American attractions, states and cities ("Georgia On My Mind", "St. Louis Blues"). Additional friends Heath made on the tour should call for impressive seles on this on the tour should call for impressive sales on this entry.

"SOLID! SOUTH PACIFIC"—Bobby Hammack Quintet—Liberty LRP 3037 (1-12" LP) This jazz inclined approach to the Rodgers And Hammerstein musical play, "South Pacific" should get results from the jazz coterie, and perhaps show music admirers who are willing to hear a swinging version of the famous score ("Some Enchanted Evening," "A Wonderful Guy"). Bobby Hammack's five man crew, working mostly with various tinkling instruments (vibes, bells, tim-bales, etc.) hold nicely to the melodies while pouring imaginative jazz juice liberally over them. The epic musical brightly arranged.

"ZOOT"-Zoot Sims Quartet-Argo 608 (1-12" LP)

Celebrated sax man Zoot Sims is on hand in Celebrated sax man Zoot Sims is on hand in this Argo issue for 4 relaxed, almost exclusively with Sims in the spotlight, sessions on a bill of standards ("The Man I Love") and jazz entries ("55th And State"). Sims seizes his situations with smooth and penetrating tenor and alto pointers. Johnny Williams, at the keyboard, gets in some skillful licks. Sims has the following to make this platter good jazz stock. make this platter good jazz stock.

"HANK MOBLEY AND HIS ALL STARS"— Blue Note 1544 (1-12" LP)

Blue Note 1544 (1-12" LP) The line-up here, and its performance, is worthy of the "all-star" label. Mobley (tenor sax), one of Blue Note's consistently solid jazzmen, has put his men such as Milt Jackson (vibes), Horace Silver (piano), and Art Blakey (drums) on 5 Mobley originals. Four of the sessions are in delectable high spirits, while the remaining run a mellow blues course. Doug Watkins (bass) has some excellent moments on "Lower Stratosphere." Impressive jazz platter. Impressive jazz platter.

"SHADES OF SAL SALVADOR" — Bethlehem BCP 39 (1-12" LP)

BCP 39 (1-12" LP) Sal Salvador is one of the dependable jazz guitarists making the instrument an excellent source of jazz improvisation. On this Bethlehem waxing Salvador, using the services of quartet, quintet and septet, deftly takes on a mostly ever-green program ("Carioca," "They Say It's Won-derful") for some classy, swinging sessions. Nifty jazz entry.

"FAMOUS BARITONE ARIAS"—Robert Merrill, Baritone—RCA Victor LM-2086 (1-12" LP)

Baritone—RCA Victor LM-2086 (1-12" LP) One of the Met's leading baritones, Robert Merrill, is currently making a stand on TV's "\$64,000 Challenge," a factor that should affect the sales of this package featuring the artist in 6 (5 by Verdi) great baritone arias. Recorded in Italy, Mr. Merrill impressively displays his high-ranking voice in selections from such works as "La Traviata," "Adrea Chenier," and "Otello." Good sound. Major operatic entry.

BACH: Partitas And Sonatas (For Unaccom-panied Violin)—Nathan Milstein, Violinist—Capi-tol PCR 8370 (3-12") This is a 3-disk collection of Bach Partitas (No. 1, 2, 3) and Sonatas (No. 1, 2, 3) exquisitely performed by Capitol's master violin artist, Nathan Milstein. Rarely has a recording found Milstein in such fine tone, and with such a tre-mendously tricky bill of fare as these unaccom-panied violin pieces find him. Capitol has gone all-out in providing Milstein with wondrous sound. These are deep works more enthusiastic classical followers will delight in.



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



#### Industry Golf Tourney Goes International

NEW YORK-The Disk Industry Scholarship Committee's (DISC) first annual golf tournament was originally proposed to be held in the East, expanding to national scope in subsequent years. However, the officers and directors decided to go all-out and make it a national tournament the first year. Now, it appears that the tournament will have international overtones since the first overseas entry was received from Robert Wynn, president of the Japan Sales Company, Tokyo. Wynn is a record manufacturer-distributor who covers both civilian and U.S. military record outlets in the Far East.

According to Hirsh de La Vies, MOA vice-president and national membership chairman of DISC, "If Wynn doesn't come to the U.S. on a business trip so we can play him, Sammy Kaye and I will go over there and play him on his own ground." Harry Obitz, PGA member and pro at the Fred Waring Shawnee-on-Delaware club where the DISC finals will be played, reports that lining up outstanding golf clubs around the country is fairly simple for the DISC tournament play but admits the selection of a Tokyo course is a little more difficult.

HARTFORD, CONN.—With practically everyone in the coin machine business driving a car, employer as well as employee, making their rounds of locations, we call attention to a report by The Travelers Insurance Companies of Hartford, Conn., titled "Heedless Horsepower". Heedless horsepower is the chronic disease of the Age of the Automobile", states Travelers. "Its symptoms are many and various. The heavy foot on the accelerator; the eye fixed on the climbing speedometer; the hand on the horn; the mind idling while the car is in high." Continuing, the report points out the fact that 40,000 Americans were killed and 2,368,000 injured in 1956 on U.S. highways. That's an increase of 6 per cent in fatalities and nearly 10 per cent in injuries over 1955's total. "It is the driver—not the manufacturer who must bear the greatest weight of blame", says the report. "For it is the driver who can control the horsepower and use it safely for his greater ease and convenience. It is the driver who is lectured to, legislated at, prayed for, preached to . . . in every medium of public expressions known to man. And it is the driver who nods sagely, promises readily, and forgets everything but his sense of overwhelming power when he steps on the gas." Predicts the insurance company: "If this year's record is equal to that of 1956, one in 70 Americans will be a statistic . . . a pain wracked survivor, or a name in the obituary colum." We at The Cash Box don't want that to happen to our good friends—so we add our plea—drive carefully.

Steel Corp., Northwestern Mutual, E. I. Du Pont de Nemours. It's interesting to note that most of these firms are insurance companies, steel, banks, and oil. The three auto giants are listed, as are some home appliance and railroads.

CHICAGO—Along with the manu-facturers of the 200 selection high fidelity phonographs, the operators also agree that they must get " $10\phi$ play plus" to enjoy profitable opera-tion of these higher priced and more attractive machines

tion of these higher priced and more attractive machines. One manufacturer here reports: "We will only ship 10¢ chutes on our 200 selection phonograph. We believe that dime play, plus a more equitable arrangement of the gross intake, is the answer to profitable operation of 200 selection phonographs for all operators." Operators are adamant in their be-lief that unless they can install the

lief that, unless they can install the 200 selection hi-fi phonos on " $10\phi$  play plus", it won't be profitable to operate the machines.

"Yes", one well known operator here said, "there are some locations where just straight dime play on a fifty-fifty basis can work out for the new 200 selection phonographs. "But", he added, "the average loca-tion where the 200 will have to be installed, due to the demand of the owners, won't make the grade, as far as any return on the investment is concerned, because of the price of the phonograph itself as well as the greater overhead expense incurred." In general, the entire industry seems to be in agreement with the fact that the new, higher priced, 200 selection phonograph, must be op-erated on "10¢ play plus" if the operators are to enjoy any sort of profitable return on their investment.

CHICAGO — The new six-pocket pool games led the way. Now all manufacturers of multiple player games are planning to use  $25\phi$  coin chutes.

**More Mfrs Plan:** 

chutes. "The fact is", one manufacturer here stated, "the demand for the 25¢ coin chute is growing. "The operators have found", he claims, "that they can just as easily get a quarter from two players as they can two dimes. "And the 20 percent difference", he says, "means covering overhead ex-pense or paying for the game." Even music operators here are now planning to make the "Two-Bits For Two" test. (This slogan was coined by The Cash Box in its April 27 issue).

Phil Levin, president of Chicago's Recorded Music Service Assn., has been talking 25¢ play for sometime. Perhaps Phil, and some of the other leading music ops here, will make the test and, with play action what it is, may find that "Two-Bits For Two" plays can work just as well for phonos as "Two-Bits For Two" players works on pool and other games.

on pool and other games. Whatever the result of the phono tests on "Two-Bits For Two" plays, the fact remains that the quarter chutes are growing in prominence. They are being held in ever higher regard and respect by the operators

regard and respect by the operators who are finding that this in one way they can overcome increasing expenses.

#### **Seasonal Play Jump Fades**

#### **More Air Conditioned Locations Have** Halted Ups and Downs of Summer **Play Action. Foresee Eventual Elimin**ation of Seasonal Effect on Collections as Ops Speed Routes More Effectively

CHICAGO—"It wasn't so long ago when operators looked to Spring with great elation", one well known oper-ator here stated, "because they be-lieved that the jump in play would help to offset the forthcoming hot and poor play summer months. "Now", he continues, "operators go right along into Spring (if there is a Spring season) just as if this were but a continuation of Fall and Winter business.

business.

but a continuation of Fall and Winter business. "What's more", he added, "they don't fear the hot summer anymore the way that they used to, either. "They realize", he claims, "that with almost every outstanding and second-ary location now featuring air condi-tioning that there is very, very little, if any drop in play action." This is, more or less, true all over the country. Operators have come to disregard seasons, in many cases. Some believe this is also due to the fact that the operators have more effectively spread out their routes to include a greater variety of locations. "For example", one leader here says, "the average route isn't as highly concentrated anymore. The

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perators have many different types of locations. "Also", he adds, "the

operators have many different types of locations. "Also", he adds, "the locations are spread out. "Thus", he points out, "makes it possible for the operator to enjoy fine play action in some spots even when others fall down. So on an overall average play action remains more or less constant."

manufacturer here points out One that the operators are also enjoying finer equipment and that play holds up, because of this, better than ever

"The machines being manufactured today", he states, "are of such a nature that the operator is assured constant play action regardless of the season.

All this is proved by the fact that, these past years, business has been just as great during the torrid months, and in some years even better, than in the cool and so-called indoor play months.

In short, seasonal play action jumps seem to be gradually fading away and this has caused better business to come into being for the majority of operators.



"These two operators", Ted ex-plained, "walked in here one day about two weeks ago, after they saw our ad in The Cash Box on our 'Lucky Horoscope', and wanted to look the machine over. "To make a long story short", Ted continued, "they both walked out with a few samples each. "They told me they were going to give the machines a real test in their cities. "One was a vending machine oper-ator", Ted reports, "and the other was a juke box operator. "That", Ted points out, "kind of had me worried. If they were amusement machine operators", he explained, "I would have felt much better about the tests.

the tests.

"I'd be more certain they'd know how to locate our 'Lucky Horoscope' to the best advantage in their locations.

"But", Ted says, "now we're not worried at all about locating the 'Lucky Horoscope' on locations anymore.

"Nor are we worried whether the

"Nor are we worried whether the operators confine themselves to mu-sic, vending or games, anymore. "These two calls", Ted advised, "were for a very fine number of our 'Lucky Horoscope' venders. "Because", Ted explains, "both these operators told me that the 'Lucky Horoscope' had taken in more the first week than what they had paid for it. The second week was al-ready going bigger than the first." Rubenstein points to many such cases where operators have taken in more than they paid for 'Lucky Horo-scope' the first week of its operation.

#### "Mystery Tune" Gets Play Plus Cooperation

PORT ST. JOE, FLA .-- Damon P. PORT ST. JOE, FLA.—Danion 1. Peters, Jr., this city, advises that at-tention to the individual programming of records, plus the use of a "mystery received as pack as a scoperation of the scoperation of the individual programming of records, plus the use of a "mystery tune", has helped him to gain very fine cooperation from his locations. "I have found that most of my lo-cations", reports Peters, "to be ba-sically the same. At least as far as acceptance of equipment, record ap-peal, maintenance of the equipment and agreement on commission deals. "Except for some of the high, key locations that demand records of a nature ranging from Bach to Muddy Waters. I find these locations to be my hardest as far as cooperation with the record aspect is concerned. "Some of the records they demand

"Some of the records they demand are not always recorded on 45 or 78. Such as some of the jazz items. Hence I converted to  $10\phi$  play. I made it a practise to give such locations some-thing new each week. Maybe one or two new records since, as I stated above, these ranged from Bach to Waters. Because of this the location gave me much more cooperation. "Another method L employed to

gave me much more cooperation. "Another method I employed to gain fuller cooperation and to let the location select its own records. Be-lieve me, while the operator knows what is being played nationally and what is most popular by his trade magazine, the location knows what his customers want, because he's listen-ing to his customer's requests. So, let the location make a choice of at least two or three records each week. Do this and you will have the wait-resses and bartenders pushing for business for you. business for you.

Another method that I've found rather successful has been the 'mys-tery tune' idea. It creates interest. It lets the customers know that there is a juke box in the place and that the owner of the juke box is a bit al-truistic. That he doesn't mind giving

wher of the juke box is a bit al-fruistic. That he doesn't mind giving away a little. "The operaor can write this off his income tax as 'advertising'. Here is the way it works: "Find a record with a beat. The kind of beat that appeals to the loca-tion. Tape over the name of the label and the name of the artist on both sides. Designate this selection as the 'Mystery Tune' on the title strip. If the machine plays both sides you will have two 'mystery tunes'. "Have your local printer or sign maker arrange a neat, attractive sign that gets attention. Have one placed near the juke box and maybe one or two at a few more strategic spots.

two at a few more strategic spots. Have the sign read: 'Win \$5 (what-ever amount) name the mystery tune on the juke box. Selection Number (whatever the number). Ask the pro-prietor about details.'

"Have the sign maker leave the space where you are to insert your mystery selection number blank. In this way the signs can be used over and over again provided, of course, they are kept clean and neat.

"The proprietor must keep a pad and pencil on display. The customer writes his name and address and whatever tune he guesses it is. You can have one winner or more winners. Run this for a month and then shift the tune to some other location.

"This has proved very successful with our locations. I sincerely hope it will prove of good value to other operators who desire to obtain their lo-cations' cooperation."

Bombay, India importers have been in contact with U.S. and European firms and, it seems, more business will be done, especially with reconditioned juke boxes, in the future. Japan seems to be the most progres-ive and appressive as far as again

sive and aggressive as far as coin machine equipment is concerned. Im-porters in Tokyo and Yokohama have been in contact with U.S. firms re-

garding used machines as well as new equipment.

Japan is already very well covered with arcades and the phonos and games have overlapped into various types of locations.

From all indications it seems that Japan will again lead the Far East in imports of all types of coin oper-ated machines.

ated machines. Guam, Korea, Malaya, British Ma-laya and the Philippines, as well as many other parts of the Far East are already users of coin machines.

already users of coin machines. If reports come true there is sure to be a revival of shipments to the Far Eastern countries. The orient was among the better im-porters of U.S. machines prior to War II but has been slower than other parts of the world in recovery. With Hongkong, Macao, Singapore, Tokyo, Yokohama, Manila, Kuala Lumpur as well as Agana, Seoul and Bombay, and other cities, starting to call for coin machine equipment, the expected revival of the far eastern market may come about sooner than expected.

#### Boston Council Sustains Mayor's Veto Of Phono License Fee Reductions

BOSTON, MASS.—The Boston City Council sustained the veto of Mayor John B. Hynes on juke box fees at a stormy session Monday night, April 22. Charges that the council's committee on ordinances had not held true public hearings on license fee changes produced a bitter wrangle that prompted the president to threaten to suspend any member who got too violent in his accusations.

In his accusations. It was the third week of virtually unprecedented council fury and it was the outgrowth of the council's vote to reduce the license fees on juke boxes. The fight flared anew when Councilman Gabriel Piemonte charged hearings of the committee on ordinances under former chairman Francis X. Ahearn "were not public hearings in my definition of the word."

The council voted to raise the fee on pins from \$35 to \$100, an action which would add an estimated \$60,000 to the city treasury. Piemonte charged the public was not aware of most committee hearings and that while the letter of the law was being fulfilled the "spirit of the law" was being violated. Hope U. S. Mfrs. Will Arrange for Licensees to Build Phonos and Games in England

LONDON, ENGLAND—British operators are reported to be looking to U.S. coin machine manufacturers for appointment of licensees in England to manufacture the latest phonos and games.

They are of the hope that American manufacturers will investigate their market and will then arrange to manufacture, or have some firm manufacture under license for them, in the British Isles.

The English operator is of the belief that there is sufficient business in the British Isles to make manufacture under licensee profitable for U.S. firms.

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from an of their machines in a state to dime play. Amusement game manufacturers have, for some time now, shipped their new products with  $10\phi$  coin

chutes. One well-known amusement ma-chines manufacturer stated the other day that for the past two years they have been shipping all their games

"We just can't see operators using any other but the dime chute," he

frankly stated. In every case manufacturers have frankly and openly said that they be-lieve the time has arrived when the operator must assure his future by use of a more equitable arrangement of the gross intake from this equip-ment in addition to  $10\phi$  play.

#### **Export Distributors Still** Backlogged

CHICAGO — Some exporting dis-tributors have been reporting that they are actually turning down orders, due to the backlog they have on hand, and are trying their best to recondition and refurbish as fast as possible for shipment to various countries.

countries. One distributor here stated this past week: "We have enough orders on hand to keep our mechanics busy for all next month. "We just turned down a letter of credit for \$5,100 as a deposit on machines. We just couldn't handle any more and we didn't want to hold up this man's money for over a month until we got around to even month until we got around to even starting to take care of his order." Other distributors have similar re-

"Even though we are still taking orders," one distributor said, "we are not guaranteeing delivery time. "If the imputer warts to place

"If the importer wants to place the order with us under such condi-tions we'll take it with the guaran-

tee that we'll try our best to fill the order just as soon as we possibly can. "We, too," he stated, "won't hold the

"We, too," he stated, "won't hold the man's money for a month. We'll re-turn it if we see we just can't get around to taking care of the ship-ment within that time." The demand, from the European market especially, has grown to such a point that distribs who have been encializing in expart report they can-

specializing in export report they can-not handle the reconditioning and re-furbishing of used machines fast enough.

Central and South American firms are just as anxious to get late model used machines. This is true from all over the world, according to distribu-

over the world, according to distribu-tors. "It seems," stated one well-known exporting distrib, "that orders are piling in from all over the world at one and the same time. "It's just humanly impossible to handle all the business," he advised, "even if we were able to obtain all the late model machines requested."



the perfectly cooled beer or the better ham sandwich that the place features. "This is especially true", Conners says, "when changing over to 10¢ play on the location's juke box. "If his ham sandwich happens to sell for 50¢", Conners explains, "and his competitor next door serves a ham

sandwich for  $35\phi$ , the location owner definitely doesn't tell the customers to

definitely doesn't ten the customers to go next door and get the ham sand-wiches from his competitor for  $35\phi$ . "Instead", claims Conners, "he tries his hardest to sell the customer on the fact that his ham sandwich is better all ground and is therefore

on the fact that his ham sandwich is better all around and is, therefore, worth  $50\phi$ . France, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, Germany and Italy have been buying in very fine quantity.

The result is that more and more games and phonos from the U.S. have been placed in all popular locations, especially those spots tourists fre-quent in large numbers.

Regardless of the heavier purchases Regardless of the heavier purchases made this past winter, as well as this past first quarter of '57, European im-porters are still seeking for more and still more machines of all kinds in an effort to have all top locations cov-ered before the tourist season gets well under way in June. Play action on U.S. games and phonos has been very fine, leading European commen report. They also state that they arrest

They also state that they expect play action to be even better during the summer months when the continent is practically overrun with U.S. tourists.
