

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FABULOUS FALL SEASON!

What's ahead for the Fall?

From every indication, the most fabulous season in the history of the record business.

In the past month, almost every record firm has announced a Fall program which collectively far surpasses anything the record industry has yet been able to offer the American public. The range of packaged goods is truly spectacular not only in volume but in content. What's more, albums are being offered in such attractive jackets, designed with the greatest merchandising possibilities in view, that sales should be garnered on the packaging alone.

In the single market, potential Fall smashes are already beginning to appear. It's obvious that ballads are going to have an easier time of it in the coming months which means that hit records in this category will have a longer life, racking up larger amounts of sales.

It seems clear then that now is the time for distributors and retailers to stock up. For despite the cry of professional mourners that the record industry simply cannot handle the amount of records—albums in particular—that is being issued, no sign of such a disability seems to be developing. As a matter of fact every indication points to increased orders all along the line. Moreover, in several cases distributors

have told us that they were amazed at the amount of records individual retailers were ordering. There seems to be no fear on their part that they will be overstocked. Rather they are ordering now in some cases as far ahead as they can visualize right through the Christmas season.

All portents therefore point to an unprecedented Fall season. And for the future, there is still no limit in sight as far as the record industry is concerned.

It's clear that we've nowhere near as yet tapped the market that is available. Records are becoming more vital everyday as a means of entertainment. Their importance is demonstrated in many ways and none more spectacularly than in the number of TV shows planned for the Fall which revolve around record personalities. And these shows themselves will be another factor in the increased business expected for the Fall. For the TV shows will be used to promote the records of the artists who appear on them, thus increasing record sales.

It all means that the record business is still spiraling and shows no sign of slowing down. In fact the rate is increasing.

If you gather from all this that the future looks good, we think you're right. For at worst, the future is optimistic. At best it can be fantastic.

ALAN DALE (ABC-Paramount 9845)

B+ "I'LL NEVER FORGIVE YOU"
Montagne, Thorn] Alan Dale could make big noise with this sentimental romancer set to a shuffle beat. It's a contagious rhythm item with a strong assist from a gal vocal group. One of the performer's best sides in quite some time. Keep a tab on it.

B+(2:43) [Melody Lane - Dalton BMI-Foster] The crooner leans into an emotional ballad of deep devotion on this half and comes up with another top grade job. Wonderful song handled with great feeling and depth.

MILLS BROS. (Decca 30430)

B "CHANGE FOR A PENNY" (2:58) [Golden Bell ASCAP-Merrill] The veteran Mills Brothers sound wonderful as they glide thru a smooth and tender romantic ballad about a gal named Penny. Warm tale of romance that grows on you.

B "TWO MINUTE TANGO" (2:38) [Roosevelt BMI-Singleton] This end has the quartet rockin' thru a cute rhythm novelty. Solid dance stuff with a good lyric.

[Hill & Range BMI-Dee, Weisman] Film star Tony Perkins makes his Victor debut with a smooth reading of a delightful Hawaiian flavored shuffler that could blossom into a big hit. It's a pretty romancer with most pleasant air of simplicity and a contagious melody. Fine first showing. Tony is one of the most talented vocalists of the film-stars-turned-singers, and he could make a big name for himself in this field with this initial showing.

C+ "FIRST ROMANCE" (2:46) [Pan BMI-Davis] The young star's following will also enjoy this tender love ballad crooned with warmth.

WINDY HILL (RCA Victor 6985)

B "LIGHTHOUSE!" (2:12) [Empress ASCAP-Udell, Goodman] The lighthouse theme is effectively used, vocally and instrumentally, in its role as the hope for finding of a loved one. Hill gets off a solid echochambered, R&R number. Hard hitting waxing.

"HOW COME?" (2:35) [Empress ASCAP-Schafer] Hill strikes a blue-note in this slow rock 'n roll ballad. Emotional effort.

SAMMY KAYE ORCH. (Columbia 40988)

B+"MOONLIGHT SWIM" (2:03)

(Chas. N. Daniels ASCAP-Dee, Weisman] Barry Frank gets an excellent assist from the Kaydets and the Sammy Kaye Orchestra as they present a delightful shuffle-beat romancer with that tropic-isle flavor. Charming sound. One of Sammy's most commercial sides in quite some time. Could blossom into a biggie.

B "MARY LOU" (2:15) [Mills ASCAP-Lyman, Waggner, Robinson] Sandi Summers and the Kaydets take over the vocal chores on this bouncer. Cute romantic novelty with a catchy up-beat.

• It's a great feeling—probably to every one in the business—when a brilliant young talent makes the grade. Johnny Mathis is one such star. An unknown as late as December of '56, today he is one of the most promising stars in the business and the only newcomer we can recall who has hit simultaneously with his first two single releases "It's Not For Me To Say" and "Wonderful! Wonderful!". And

in the coming weeks we can expect to see at least one more Mathis hit on the boards. For in his latest release, the youngster hands in a masterful job of an outstanding new love song titled "Chances Are." It's an extremely commercial romantic item with a smart lyric and a beautiful melody penned by the two men who gave Mathis "It's Not For Me To Say," Al Stillman and Robert Allen. Watch this song take off. Mathis fans have been waiting a long while for this follow-up, and chances are it'll be another huge seller. The companion deck, "The Twelfth Of Never" displays Johnny in a more dramatic vein as he chants an emotional and very touching folk flavored ballad of deep love. Ray Conniff assists on both ends with great musical backdrops. Johnny Mathis is headed for the upper echelon of stardom and he'll be around for many, many years.

• The "King", who has been doing a fabulous job on TV, has been equally successful on wax of late. Both sides of his current release "Send For Me" and "My Personal Possession" are riding high on the charts, and both halves of his newest platter should do the same in the coming weeks. One portion, the ballad, is the title song of the much heralded MGM flicker "Raintree Country". It's a lovely romantic offering with a wistful melody and a tender, class lyric which Cole handles in his inimitable velvety manner. Strong tune that grows on you with each listen. The companion side feature Cole singing an easy rocker tagged "With You On My Mind". A smooth rock and roll love tune presented with the same ease and warmth that made Nat's "Send For Me" so successful. Both ends of this biscuit should make big noise. Watch 'em.

It's a dramatic waxing with a big orchestral backing set to a good shuffle beat. The boys really belt and come up with a commercial side the kids will want. The Coins should have no trouble making it two-in-a-row. The coupling has the boys bringing another oldie up to date. It's a pretty romancer dubbed "This Life" and sports a similar shuffle rhythm. Upper half sounds like another big money-maker.

RENALDO LOREN ORCH. (Prep 114)

B "BREAD, LOVE AND TEARS" (2:01) [Robert Mellin BMI-Icini, Mellin] Renaldo Loren leads his orchestra through a spright instrumental bouncer with a charming Italian flavor. Tune stems from the flicker "Scandal In Sorrento."

B "FIESTA IN RIO" (2:02) [Stardust Songs BMI-Mellin, Scharfenberger] From Italy, Loren takes us to Brazil for a colorful latin tempo melody. Pleasant, light listening.

BILL CAREY (Dot 15618)

"SINGLE" (2:32) [Towne ASCAP-Teifer] Carey understandingly renders the effort, which wistfully tells of a man who regretfully never married. Painting a poignant picture, the song has a distinctive melody that repeated hearings make an even greater impression on the listener. Something that has fine sales possibilities.

B "SHADOW OF A DOUBT" (2:03) [Trinity BMI-Carey] An able beat ballad is given the hard sell by the performer. Waxing will attract the kids.

GEORGE MORGAN (Columbia 40978)

B "OUR SUMMER VACATION" (2:18) [Acuff-Rose BMI-Morgan, Cahan] The country and western vocalist is smoothly in pop circles with this timely-tune that sentimentally recalls a teenage summer. Morgan's delivery shows a good deal of warmth, which ought to carry over to many a hand-holding teen couple. Could step out.

An intensive newspaper and magazine publicity campaign has been set up with the entire release sched-

Special dealer aids will be provided including the following point of sale material: (1) mounted easel-backed album covers on all the albums; (2 reprints of the trade ads; (3) a new VIK catalog listing all current merchandise through October 1; and (4) additional quantities of album covers, liners and promotion pieces.

The Music Business In Italy

by DAN FISHER

ROME, ITALY—Cannes to Monaco, sans any trace of Her Grace, San Remo, Genoa, and now Rome. Two days at the Italian Riviera, Portofino, too, which is a pretty good parlay for this refugee from the Brill Building. Along the way I picked up a group of old Hollywood pals and what was a solo junket is now a platoon.

Rome is so American it's like a gorgeous Broadway spaghetti parlor featuring Italian-speaking waiters and the most stunning decor on the Continent. Everything entertainmentwise is tinged with Americana, to say nothing of the thousands of U.S. citizens paying their monthly dues to Italian landlords.

Strolling down the Via Veneto I passed such eminent personages as Bruce Cabot, Armru Sani (a big star here), Tony Martin, Cyd Charisse, David Wayne, Thelma Carpenter (who's starring in a local club), Mario Lanza and that crown prince of independent music publishers Ivan Mogul. Even such as I make the columns of the Daily American by walking the Via Veneto.

Most everybody goes to Bricktop's, a nightclub run by a 62 year old American Negro lady who is the Sophie Tucker of Europe. Thelma Carpenter shares the singing spotlight and is very well received at Bricky's. The only other club open here is Della Rosa, starring the Bernard Bros., the original mimicing-to-records boys. Just great, too.

The Romans here must operate on policy of When In Rome Do As The Americans Do. The big musical attractions are Doris Day, Frank Sinatra, Louis Armstrong and omnipopular Lionel Hampton. Arrevidirchi Roma and off to Capri, the road company Fire Island with cliffs. Only three late places going musically here, The Eden, #2, and the Quisisana. At #2 they dance and sing to songs like "Rock Around the Clock," "My Prayer" and "Cry" while the latter spot draws the Spanish dance set. At the Eden, Italian tunes like along with "Stardust" and "Body & Soul." "Guaglione," "Na Voce, Na Chitarra"

Next, Milano, the heart of the Italian music business. Galleria Del Corso is the Brill Building of Italy and the key men are Alberto Rossi; the Messrs. Kramer, Ricci, Redi and Bixio.

Popularity-wise, Claudio Villa is the No. I male provincially, while

Teddy Reno is overall most popular. Up and coming among the newcomers is Fausto Cigliano. Nilla Pizzi and Katina Ranieri are tops among the femmes; the Angelini Orchestra is the leading pop band and Trovaioli foremost in the modern jazz idiom.

The Italian homegrown hit parade consists of: 1, "Lazzerella," 2, "Guaglione," 3, "Na Voce Na Chitarra," 4, "D'Italia." From the American stockpile, "Only You" by The Platters is the top-seller and Belafonte's "Banana Boat" is No. I in the juke boxes.

A rapid rundown of their tastes in American performers would consist of Nat King Cole, Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald, Doris Day, Jackie Gleason, The Platters and The Hi-Lo's.

The Brill regulars who think their troubles are confined to our Tin Pan Alley should talk to Alberto Rossi. "We are in a period where the old songs are not as big as the new types," he said, which is a masterpiece of understatement when applied to the U.S.

The new rhythm gaining ground here is a mixture of 6/8 time shuffle and one-step. The blue jeans, Giovento Bruciata in their language, or rock-nrollers to us, like these songs and they're very much influenced by American movies like "Blackboard Jungle," "Rebel Without a Cause," and stars like Jimmy Dean and Marlon Brando. American moviemakers should be careful what movies are sent over—their influence is too great to have the exports treated lightly, Mr. Rossi says.

"I hope the entire world returns to the better songs, those written by the Gershwins, Berlin, Porter, Kern, Rodgers and Hart, and yes, your dad Fred Fisher. We need a more relaxed music instead of the exciting kind. The age we live in is exciting enough." Mr. Rossi is one of the top writers and publishers in all Europe.

Italy's wonderful but I sure miss the hot dogs at the Turf, the chopped liver at Lindy's, and I can't even bear to think about those thick steaks at Al & Dick's.

This steady diet of melon, expresso, pasto, jambo, veal this and veal that can be become pretty monotonous. I lose my mind these days at anything near the color of tomatoes.

Things will be changing soon, however. I'm off now to Switzerland, Germany and Denmark, and I'll be writing you next from there.







"MOOD JAZZ"—Joe Castro With Voices And Strings-Atlantic 1264 (1-12" LP)

A profusion of beautifully orchestrated melodies pervades this Victor entry by Malko and the Philharmonia. The works, which includes six additions to Dvorak's Slavonic Dances waxed by Malko in his last Victor release, are performed with an affection for the grace, vitality, and nationalism imbued in them. Fine orchestral presentation.



"MUNCH CONDUCTS WAGNER"—The Boston Symphony—Charles Munch, Conductor — RCA Victor LM-2119 (1-12" LP)

The disk is an excellent August Red Seal "Save On Records" (\$2.98 tag) choice sure to attract a host of the Wagnerian coterie. Munch and the Boston Symphony offer distinguished readings of three commanding orchestral pieces from three of Wagner operas, "Overture And Venusberg Music" from "Tannhauser"; "Magic Fire Music" from "Die Walkure"; and "Siegfried's Rhine Journey" from "Die Gotterdammerung." Superb sound. A thrilling classical issue.



GLIERE: Symphony No. 3 In B Minor, Op. 42 ("Ilya Murometz")—The Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, Conductor—Columbia ML 5189 (1-12" LP)

This is a reading of the Gliere work that should This is a reading of the Gliere work that should gain most of the attention from the classical following as compared with other available versions of the opus. The symphony, descriptive, in the melodic and moody Russian musical idiom, of the adventures of a Russian knight, is authoritatively performed by Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra. 





For the past two years McCullough has been a member of the sales staff of WSM-TV.







WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Small Business administration, in its "Small Marketers Aids" stresses the value and presentation of ads by small firms. We reproduce the item herewith, replacing the words "small business firms" with coin machine "wholesalers". "The effectiveness of a wholesaler's advertising often can be increased by having it reflect a distinctiveness which is in keeping with the personality of the firm. This individually can (1) make a small advertisement more attractive and thus increase its attention value, even among larger advertisements; (2) provide a continuity in the advertising effort by tying together advertisements appearing in different places and at different times; (3) help to build a well-known personality for the small firm, contributing to greater customer loyalty; and (4) result in increased returns from the dollars invested in advertising. Individuality can be reflected in the copy approach, the presentation, the schedule, the layout, the art, or by a combination of various distinctive advertising techniques. The individuality, however, should be in good taste, should be in harmony with the desired personality of the firm, and should appeal to the largest cross-section of potential customers."

MONTREAL, CANADA — The "boom" conditions in Canada continues on unabated. The Bank of Montreal's July business review points out indications are that "the total amount of work put in place in 1957 may amount to \$8.776 billion, or \$876 million more than was spent last year". The consumer price index has continued to rise and at June stood at a record of 121.6 (1949 equals 100); the figure indicates that prices were 3.2 per cent higher than a year ago. "Boom" condition was set in motion by a huge volume of investment and increasing demand for goods and services the past two years. This condition continues, with a still rising volume of money being invested in new plant, equipment and housing.

LONDON, ENGLAND — English music machine operators, who in the past few years, have been expanding their operations, are greatly perturbed over royalty payments they have to make to the performing rights societies. Each machine is tabbed for over ten pounds per year per machine (over \$26). We understand operators are planning a program to have this tax reduced.

- 5—Increased cost of tin leads breweries to study price rise.
- 6—Soft drinks heading higher in price.
- 7—Aluminum prices up 2% to 4% this summer.
- 8—In the last two years wages have climbed 9.1% and non-food wholesale prices have gone up 8.3%.
- 9—This industry, as well as every other industry, cannot continue to assimilate price increases of raw materials and components much longer.
- 10—Living costs will have gone up 3% to 4% this year with rents and services creeping up accordingly even while money remains tight.

It doesn't take too much study of the above facts to convince any operator that the time has arrived when he must immediately adjust his business methods to meet the new inflated conditions now prevalent thruout the business world.

Just as all other businessmen have quickly readjusted to meet higher costs and gradual, creeping inflation the average operator, who hasn't yet made such adjustment, is urged to do so immediately.

With the U. S. dollar now valued at but 49.8¢ as compared to the 100¢ dollar of 1939, and with overhead expenses up over 450% while the cost of new machines has gone up over 350% in that same 18 year period, the operator can no longer afford to continue on dime (4.9ϕ) play.

To survive mounting inflationary pressures which are besetting him and at the same time, to insure continuing on ahead on a somewhat profitable basis, the operator simply must readjust to modern business conditions.

Manufacturers and distributors must plunge wholeheartedly into the task of helping the operator to readjust his general operational activities.

The manufacturers and distributors realize, today, as The Cash Box has pointed out for over 14 years now that, unless the operator is in a solid financial condition, the entire trade suffers.

The operator simply must arrange with each and everyone of his locations for a more equitable share of the gross intake.

There is a recommendation that one week of each month the operator keep the entire income from all of his machines.

The fact that he takes onc entire week's collection each month for himself will, these men claim, prove sufficient to meet his tremcndously increased overhead servicing expenses.

Regardless of whatever method the operator adopts, he must put into practice a plan which will allow him to receive a more equitable share of the gross income from all of his machines to meet growing inflationary pressures.

MORE OPS PLAN MERGERS

Believe Can Cut Overhead and Servicing Expenses While Arranging for More Equitable Share of Gross Intake With Locations by Merging Their Operations.

CHICAGO — Information received from many operators thruout the nation indicate they plan to merge operations due to the tremendously increased overhead and servicing ex-penses with which they are faced at

this time.
This is an outgrowth of the many editorials which have appeared in The Cash Box in regard to the benefits which can be derived from "operators' co-operatives".

co-operatives".

Actually an operator's co-operative is, in all concept, a merger by another name. In the case of the operators who are planning to merge their operations they have even more reasons than those business men who have arranged for co-operatives in a great many other fields.

Regardless of the fact that mergers have been most prominent in the news

have been most prominent in the news for sometime, the hard rock individ-uality of the nation's operators with-held such action in the coin machine

business.

More and more smaller manufacturing firms have been merged in with the larger, more financially secure organizations everywhere in the nation. In fact, mergers continue and, if anything at all, seem to be growing with ever greater force in all industries.

Those operators who now advise that they, too, plan to merge their operations with those of other opera-

operations with those of other operators in their areas, seem only to be following a modern business trend. The most outstanding reason these operators present for the merging of their businesses is to save on overhead and servicing expense.

Every operator claims that this is the biggest burden he bears today and that, if he could cut overhead and servicing expense, he could profit from his present operation.

There is no doubt that by merging, such savings can come into effect. Many machines are criss-crossed by operators in various locations. One operator has the phono and the other the games. This means two service calls and two collection calls. These can become one.

calls and two collection calls. These can become one.

By merging there is usually a cut down on servicemen and mechanics and this frees many well experienced mechanics and servicemen for other operators who desperately need such help.

At the same time, of course, the merging firms save overhead expense by such cuts in their labor requirements.

Still another point, and one of the

ments.

Still another point, and one of the best that these operators bring forth, is that they can arrange to obtain a more equitable share of the gross intake from their machines by merging as one firm.

"It's been very tough for me to obtain 65%-35% commission", one operator reports, "because the location owner points to the other operator in his place and says that this man, who operates the phonograph and has to bring in new records, tubes, parts of all kinds and still give good serv-

ice, works with him on a $50\,\%\text{--}50\,\%$ commission basis."

ice, works with him on a 50%-50% commission basis."

This operator points out that, since both of these men are discussing merging their operations, here is one place where they will get a 65%-35% commission percentage deal because both the phono and the games will now be placed on that basis.

"The difference we can earn on this one location alone", this operator claims, "makes the merger worthwhile. This is one of the best spots in town, This storekeeper has said time and time again that, 'If the other operator wants it, too, I'll go along with you.'"

Other cases of this same kind are pointed out by many ops who believe that they will, most definitely, profit by merging their businesses.

"Of course", as one operator advises, "I can't expect to get an equal share with this other operator. After all", he says, "he has double the number of machines on locations. But we believe that we can get together on a two-third and one-third basis.

"I'd be very happy to get one-third from the combined business for my share", he explains, "because, from figures we've already gone over and from what we would save, this would be a lot more than I'm making now.'

Like in all business mergers in any industry there are a great many problems that must be first ironed out between the merging neutics.

Like in all business mergers in any industry there are a great many problems that must be first ironed out between the merging parties.

For example, who will be in charge of what. Who will handle the office and who will handle the outside work. Who will buy new equipment. Who will decide on what equipment should be replaced

will decide on what equipment should be replaced.

In short, the problems, at first seem almost endless. Yet, the major-ity, can very easily answer the many questions. These men are acquainte with their individual locations and know the requirements of those spots This is, then, the basis for successful mergers.

mergers.
Whatever does come about in the months to follow, it shall be interesting to this publication, as well as to all in the industry, to note these mergers taking place and what the resultant effects will be over a period of time.

CHICAGO—Fred Johannsen, Liberty Phonograph, this city, reports that he has been successful in winning location co-operation, in some instances where collections have slowed down, by "suggesting" to the owner that a 40 selection phono be substituted for the 100 selection juke

"I watch the slow spots carefully,"
Johannsen said, "until I am convinced
that the location owner is not promot-

that the location owner is not promoting the play.

"When this is obviously the reason why collections have declined beyond a certain point, I explain that my investment in the 100 selection phono is too great and suggest that the small take warrants a smaller 40 selection phonograph.

"This causes the location owner to feel a loss of prestige," Johannsen continued, "and starts him to pushing the play.

the play.
"Last month, for instance, two spots

"Last month, for instance, two spots quickly jumped up to very satisfactory collections, after I tried this approach to the problem.
"Besides," Johannsen, added, "when the location owner sees how a small amount of effort increases profits, he is stimulated to even greater effort."

Urges Ops to Get **Guaranteed Minimum** Based On Value Of Installation

WEST PALM BEACH, FLA.—
"The only reasonable and fair way to operate is on a guaranteed minimum basis," reports Gleason Stambaugh, Jr., of Florida Music, this city.
"The guaranteed minimum should be so much of the value of the entire installation," continues Stambaugh.
"If a location wants a brand new phonograph plus ten wall boxes and five speakers he has to guarantee more than a location that is satisfied with an older machine with no extra speakers or wall boxes.

"Percentage," points out Stambaugh, "means nothing if there is not enough in the cash box to pay for the pro-rated share of the machine's operational cost.

the pro-rated share of the machine's operational cost.

"Gentlemen," urges Stambaugh, addressing himself to all operators, "there is a certain basic cost of operation in any business. The coin machine business is no different. You must get your cost out at the very least to stay in business and be able to hope for better days."

SINGAPORE — Altho juke boxes are not required to take out licenses are not required to take out licenses in this city, music operators are in considerable trouble because the Senior Crown Counsel, Inche Ahmad bin Ibrahim, is prosecuting an owner of a bar, contending that a bar becomes a "theatre" under the laws of Singapore if it has a juke box on its premises and patrons play it.

The location owner pleaded not guilty in magistrate's court to a summons charging the location with car-

mons charging the location with carrying on a "theatrical performance in a theatre" without a police license

by providing musical entertainment from a juke box.

Defendant's counsel contended that a theatre must be a place giving organized entertainment with a visual

impact.
Should the Crown succeed with its contention that locations are to be considered "theatres,' the repurcussions would react unfavorably not only against juke boxes, but also against those shops which play radios or TV sets during business hours.
The Court reserved judgment at this hearing.

Singapore Official | Manila Operators **Fight Confiscatory** License Fee

Results In Court **Issuing Temporary Restraining Order**

MANILA, PHILIPPINES-Music machine operators here have banded together to fight what they contend is a confiscatory tax imposed by an existing city ordinance.

existing city ordinance.

The ordinance provides for an annual tax of P300 (\$150) on pinball machines as well as juke boxes. The previous tax was P55 (\$27.50). An existing injunction stopped the finance committee chairman from collecting the P300 tax from pinball operators, and the music machine men contend they came under this injunction. The finance committee chairman now is insisting that all back taxes be paid. The juke box operators have advised the administration that the tax of P300 is altogether too high and they would have to withdraw their machines from the city, causing a worsening in the unemployment situation. And if the back taxes have to be paid, they would have have to go out of business

And if the back taxes have to be paid, they would have to go out of business as voluntary bankrupts.

Operators met at a public hearing before the municipal board (pictured herewith), voicing their opposition to the enforcement of the city ordinance. As a result of this concerted effort, on August 15, Judge Antonio Canizares temporarily restrained the Manila Government from enforcing the ordinance imposing a P300 license fee on operators of juke boxes and pinball machines.

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
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"Clean Machines **Earn More Money**"



"That is to appraise the route, take inventory and make necessary

changes.

"With a little effort", Micon continued, "he gets rid of deadwood, trades off obsolete equipment and tightens up the route.

"The good operator gets out to see his locations. He talks. He promotes. He anticipates the demand of the locations and makes the changes he soon would be forced to make anyway.

"Result is," concluded Micon, "that the progressive operator stimulates better play and keeps his route at peak earning efficiency at all times."

"Now the operators are dropping off their old hinged top bumper pool games and leave within a few minutes with a six pocket replacement for the location.

The converted 6-pocket table, according to Rubenstein, includes all new accessories, such as a set of Aramith balls, oversize cue-ball, four

cue sticks and everything else needed

"Some ops bring in three or four old tables at a time", Rubenstein added. "And some prefer to wait for their own tables to be converted, picking them up later."

Rubenstein also pointed out that the bumper pool tables are usually in need of repairs anyhow, and that the trade-in value is low.

the trade-in value is low.

"The operators, consequently, prefer to save time and work by letting us do the complete job for them. Then," Rubenstein said, "when they find the six pocket game increases collections, they start bringing in more and more of their old tables."

The firm is also shipping complete conversion kits to customers all over the country, according to Rubenstein.



FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Price Lists" acts exactly the same as the market quotation hoard at the Stock Exchange-posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be ont of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the snhscriher at least has the last known prices as a hasis to work with. Prices may he very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth hnt \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered hy ontstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will he offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Price Lists" should he read as follows: First price listed is lowest price guest?

METHOD: "The Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price

REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become npset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, huy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories much worn to he priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddle ride machines these may even he higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddle rides are no longer in business, and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take those facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics. These buyers will purchase machines "as is" at prices quoted by the trade at large and recondition the machines themselves to meet their evan operating standards.




