

BIG BIZ AHEAD

Having just come through what was one of the biggest Christmas record sales periods ever, we can confidently look forward to excellent, if not record breaking, business in the next few months.

As has been proven in past years, Christmas is not the end of a boom sales period, but rather the beginning. While other products are selling happily during the entire month of December, records, for some unexplainable reason, do not sell powerfully until the last week before December 25. It then breaks out with a fury, and dealers who were growing anxious and fretful, suddenly find themselves too busy to even sigh with relief as those crowded shelves suddenly empty. Frantic calls are put in to distributors to rush supplies for those last minute sales.

Then—just as suddenly as the sales began—Christmas is over. There is nothing so dead as Christmas the day after. This might hold true for other products that were zooming in sales while record shop owners sat and worried, but is certainly is not true of the record business. January, February and the first half of March are traditionally great record months.

There are many reasons for this.

1) The record buyer finds him-

self with "cash" presents and some of this finds its way into the registers of the record shops.

2) The thousands of new sets that were given for Christmas have created new record "fans". This brings a surge of sales, because no one buys more records than the new phonograph owner.

And most important—this year the number of stereo sets that were sold for Christmas delivery creates an entirely new market for a new product. This not only replaces some monaural sets but enlarges the buying market—just as did the introduction of high fidelity sound, and before that, the three speed player.

3) The bad weather season covers most of the United States and indoor parties reach their peak.

4) Record companies, that have held back their best talent and best releases for about three weeks before Christmas, will now begin to again issue the "cream of the crop".

It has always been an adage in the business that a big hit will bring business for everyone. This year, "Chipmunk" is getting the credit for having started Christmas business swinging. The fantastic sale racked up by the Liberty novelty disk made everyone happy. And already, new disks are breaking out with phenomenal speed.

It looks like a big 1959 for everybody—and particularly the record business. **GEORGIA GIBBS**


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

Record Reviews

LINK WRAY (Epic 9300)

B+ "DIXIE-DOODLE" (2:06) [And-val BMI — Grant, Wray] Link Wray and the Wraymen, the group that caused quite a "Rumble" on the charts recently, are back again with an Epic-purchased master that has that 'hitsville' look. It's a wild, shout-filled version of what most Soutn-erners consider their national anthem.

B "RAW-HIDE" (2:05) [Andval BMI — Grant, Wray] Another frenzied rocker that the crew explodes with electrifying force. Great funky sound on both portions.

EDDIE LAWRENCE (Coral 62070)

B "THE SALESMAN'S PHILOSO-PHER" (3:03) [Merrick BMI— Lawrence] Eddie Lawrence adds an-other real amusing link to his "Phi-losopher" chain with this carload of comical incidents that depict the plight of the traveling salesman.

B "MOTHER PHILOSOPHER" (3:03) [Merrick BMI—Lawrence] Mom's unfortunate daily experiences get the light-hearted Lawrence work-over here. Jocks'll love 'em both.

EDDIE GARSON (Hamilton 50016)

B+ "SCALAROONIE" (2:07) [Herb Reis BMI—Garson, Julian] Here's one that could happen overnight with exposure. It combines practically all the vocal and musical gimmicks, that the kids are calling for, on one potent biscuit. Beat, lyrics and presentation are an r&r delight. Garson has a winner. winner.

B "BO-BO" (1:44) [Reis BMI— Garson, Julian] Another tasty rock 'n roll morsel is this contagious novelty rocker. Milton DeLugg's ork and vocal crew sparkle in the back-drop on both lids.

BILLY SHEPARD (Felsted 8549)

B+ "SOMEBODY STOLE MY GAL" B+ (1:56) [Robbins ASCAP—Wood] Billy Shepard's wonderfully new rockin' interpretation of the oldie, brought back in chart style a while back by Johnnie Ray, should make the tune pull loads of new coin. Sock vocal and instrumental assist by the Joe Leahy outfit with a bright "Tisket-A-Tasket", question and answer re-frain. frain.

B "YOU CALL EVERYBODY DARLING" (1:56) [Mayfair AS-CAP — Watts, Trace, Martin] This soft-shoe, partial gang-sing revival of the evergreen should easily make the turntable grade.

THE FIVE BLOBS (Joy 226)

B+"FROM THE TOP OF YOUR GUGGLE (To The Bottom Of Your Zooch)" (2:12) [Wise, Goehring, Antman] Bernie Nee, of "Blob" fame, brings his five Blobs over to the Joy diskery with a nonsensical cha-cha ditty that could take the teenage mar-ket by storm. Packs a sales wallop.

B "ROCKIN' POW WOW" (2:14) [Hawthorne A S CA P — Wise, Goehring, Twomey] A cha-cha-tom-tom beat is in evidence on another chart contender dished up by the 'Blobs'.

JIMMIE STEWART (Trump 817)

B "LIVIN' DOLL" (2:13) [Trump BMI—Stewart] Jimmie Stewart, not the movie star but a newcomer with the r&r goods, makes his bid for national attention with this cute romantic rocker. Enjoyable choral assist enhances dish.

C+ "TEN THOUSAN' MILES" (2:27) [Trump BMI — Stewart] The vocal crew backs Stewart again as he claims that he'll follow the gal to the ends of the earth to prove that his love is true. Enticing, up beat coupler coupler.

MARIO LANZA (RCA Victor 7439)

B+ "FOR THE FIRST TIME" (2:21) [A.M.C. ASCAP—Panzeri, Ram, Taccani, DiPaola] The popular film tenor turns in a beautiful reading of "Come Prima" (sung in English) the song which he sings in his next MGM pic "For The First Time". The song has been on the charts for a few months now, but this dramatic new reading plus the tremendous film exposure, could breathe new life into exposure, could breathe new life into the song. Watch this version.

B "O SOLE MIO" (2:26) [P.D.— Russo, DiCapua] The great Ital-ian standard is executed with heart and meaning by the performer. Strik-ing delivery that Lanza fans will love. Sung operatically all in Italian.

GENE BUA & CANDY ANDERSON (Warner Bros. 5030)

B+"TWO" (1:45) [Empress ASCAP —Jaxon, Paul] Warners could have a money-making disk in this delightful rock-a-cha-cha by Gene and Cardie Articits bound and build Candy. Artists have a pleasant blend and commercial material to work with.

B "BABY, IT'S COLD OUTSIDE" (2:22) [Frank ASCAP—Loesser] The wonderful duet oldie is revived by the twosome with today's beat in mind. Smooth easy-going version jockeys should enjoy spinning.

THE HONEYCONES (Ember 1049)

B+ "TELL ME WHY" (2:24) [Sig-Honeycones, who stirred up some ter-ritorial dust with their previous Em-ber outings could make it on the national level here. It's a hip-swing-ing, rock-a-ballad treatment of the Four Aces' click of not-so-long-ago. Watch it.

B "YOUR FACE" (2:08) [Alstel BMI—D'Arenzo] Flip is fetching up beat romantic novelty slanted to-wards the teen's tastes.

CHARLIE BLACKWELL (Warner Bros. 5031)

B "MIDNIGHT OIL" (2:09) [Mu-sic World BMI—Sherman, Sher-man] Here's a contagious little ditty that the kids'll be whistling in the near future. Charlie Blackwell grabs star billing on the light-hearted in-strumental toe-tapper that opens with a whistle and snare drum and adds an instrument each time around. Jocks are sure to 'cotton' to this one.

B "NONE OF 'EM GLOW LIKF YOU" (1:39) [Moonbeam BMI-Gettle, Winn] This end is a happy-g lucky love affair that Charlie know out invitingly. Swinging entry.

CONWAY TWITTY (MGM 12748)

• Conway Twitty, the lad who skyrocketed to fame with his tremendous waxing of "It's Only Make Believe" and copped top honors in The Cash Box Op Poll as "The Most Promising New Male Vocalist of 1958", follows up his initial platter with a great coupling his many new fans have been awaiting. The young star does a torrid job with "Make Me Know You're Mine", a low-down blues piece that has Twitty growling and really belting from the heels. Fabulous sound and delivery. On the companion piece, "The Story Of My Love", the songster chants an emotional romantic ballad. Pretty sequel to "Make Believe". Both are loaded with potential, but we lean to the upper portion. Conway Twitty is here to stay.

"OH WHY" (2:27) [Marquis BMI—Spector]

"I DON'T NEED YOU ANYMORE" (2:27) [Marquis BMI-Spector]

THE TEDDY BEARS (Imperial 5562)

• The Teddy Bears, who zoomed to national prominence aboard their tremendous smash "To Know Him Is To Love Him" a current chart topper, should have another in their debut coupling for Imperial. The trio is in top form on a beautiful new ballad dubbed "Oh Why". The tune is an adaptation of a Bizet classical theme with a lovely lyric which the femme portion of the crew delivers with heart. Excellent support from her two male partners helps make this another smash possibility. The flip, "I Don't Need You Anymore", is a lovely story tune with a general similarity to "To Know Him". Pretty side too. But we'll bet on the upper portion.

"THE LONELY ONE" (1:40) [Gregmark BMI—Hazlewood, Eddy] "DETOUR" (2:00) [Hill & Range BMI--Westmoreland] DUANE EDDY (Jamie 1117)

• With a string of three successive chart riders ("Rebel Rouser", "Ramrod", "Cannonball"), "twangy" guitarist Eddy will be making if four-in-row with "The Lonely One", a melodic, steady roll-along opus culled from the performer's best-selling "Have Twangy Guitar, Will Travel" LP and EP. The Eddy instrument stays up-front all the way, with subtle chorus blending nicely in the backdrop. "Detour", the Patti Page hit of some years back, is the sizzler on the under cut. Sax chore is whacky. The "Lonely One" is take we buy.

"PLAIN JANE" (1:56) [Rumbalero-Fern-Progressive BMI—Pomus, Shuman]

"WHILE I'M GONE" (1:55) [Progressive BMI-Darin]

BOBBY DARIN (Atco 6133)

• Darin, who has had two straight chart items in "Splish Splash" and "Queen Of The Hop", should be keeping company with the lists once again on "Plain Jane", a romping beat re-working of "Dance With The Dolly (With The Hole In Her Stocking)". Darin's zest and the combo rock sparkle make this number a natural for standing-room-only acceptance from the kids. The songster wistfully cuddles the coupler, "While I'm Gone". "Plain Jane" all the way.


("What Can I Give) MY ONLY LOVE" (2:21) [M. Witmark ASCAP—Nichols]

TAB HUNTER (Warner Bros. 5032)

Tab Hunter may have the biggest hit of his career (and that includes "Young Love") in his latest Warner Bros. offering, "I'll Be With You In Apple Blossom Time". Hunter opens his new reading of the ever-green with a slow crooning intro, and after the first few bars, breaks into a thrilling rock-a-cha-cha beat that'll have the kids flipping. Arrangement and delivery are just fabulous. This is definitely the songster's best performance to date. Watch it take off. Flip is a soothing folk-flavored ballad tagged "My Only Love". Pretty side. But it's the top half all the way.

ROY HAMILTON (Epic 9301)

• Songster Hamilton has given the oldie, "Somewhere Along The Way", the kind of teen-beat reflection that's going to win new chart favor for the effort. As the pro songster offers the wistful tale, a soft, but ever-present combo beat sets the rock pace and a supporting chorus chants effectively at appropriate emotional moments. Here's where another standard makes the teen grade. Hamilton puts somewhat more vocal drama into "It's Never Too Late", a potent item worth attention, too. Top-half, though, is a more clean-cut, melodic production. It's the item to go on.

"A PICTURE OF YOU" (2:30) [Rush BMI—Washington, Perkins, Wiggins] "PRELUDE TO LOVE" (2:07) [Medlin BMI—Webb, Abbott] THE DANLEERS (Mercury 71401)

• The Danleers, who rode high on the two-market, pop-r&b hit listings with their very big waxing of "One Summer Night", could duplicate that success with their latest Mercury release. Tagged "A Picture Of You", it's a dandy rock-a-cha-cha, replete with a host of teen-acceptable sounds, that the songsters wax in money-making fashion. The fetching fish-beater on the flip has to fall in the shadow of the top end.

(Atlantic 2011) (Cub 9021) S Jazzists Wilbur de Paris and Bob Wilder join the "Petite Fleur" competition (Laurie's Chris Barber has the chart reading of the tune), each displaying the melody under different and effective circumstances. On the Atlantic de Paris stint, both a harmonica and clarinet split the sprightly solo Spotlight, while a contagious rock-a-dixie background beat holds a delectably steady course. The Wilder outfit on Cub prefers the sentimental road, with a clarinet softly and expressively taking the melodic spotlight almost all the way. Both versions offer purchasers a prominent reading of the pretty opus. Each unit reverses its respec-tive "Petite Fleur" tempos on its coupling: the de Paris crew ambles through "Over And Over Again" and the Wilder boys are hearty on "Atlas #1".

HUMPHREY LYTTLETON (London 1844)

• Humphrey Lyttleton, one of Britain's leading jazz trumpeters, makes an impressive U.S. disk debut with a trumpet cha cha item that could blossom into a tremendous instrumental smash. Titled "Bodega", the number is a catchy jazz flavored Latin item reaturing Lyttleton in the spotlight with some of the most refreshing muted-trumpet work we've heard on single wax in quite some time. Number reminds this listener of the recent "Mack The Knife" hit that had such a big run a few years ago. And with "Petite Fleur" clicking (also a muted-trumpet solo) jockeys should be interested in discovering this delightful new instru-mental. Lyttleton excels again on the flip, a slow bluesy version of Rodgers and Hart's "Manhattan".

DEAN REED (Capitol 4121)

Disk Mfrs Plan Increased Stereo Singles Releases In '59

NEW YORK—With stereo making the big push late 1958 and all indications that 1959 will be "the year of stereo," and with the nation's juke box manufacturers offering the operator stereo equipment, the big question arises: "Will there be enough stereo singles available to service the juke box and will the home stereo provide a new market for stereo 45's?"

Here's what the record manufacturers tell us they intend to do in 1959 for stereo records:

Mercury Records: "We will produce all pop singles in stereo," stated Art Talmadge. "We feel that there are sufficient buyers to make the sale of our pop singles practical and profitable. Currently, we have ready for sale the nation's number one seller, "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes," by The Platters, and the new releases of Patti Page, The Diamonds, Brook Benton and The Gaylords."

ABC Paramount: "We have available for the stereo juke boxes the current Paul Anka and Eydie Gorme releases. Our policy will be to keep close watch on our releases and the minute we see a definite reaction to our regular single release we will issue it in stereo for juke box and home consumption," said Sam Clark.

Coral Records: Norm Weinstroer advised. "We have already gone into stereo for juke boxes. On the 1st of February we will issue five EP's. Two Teresa Brewer, one McGuire Sisters, one Lawrence Welk, and one Dick Kesner."

RCA Victor: Said Ray Clark, "We are recording everything in stereo. Anything with juke box potential will be released in stereo. New recordings by major artists will immediately be made available in stereo. We are already releasing extensive EP merchandise in stereo. These releases will be made available on a weekly basis. In addition to our regular stereo EP and single releases, we have released one single in stereo only. This is a record that lends itself juke box play and stereo demonstration at the same time. It is "Buck Dance" by The Little Thumpers."

King Records: Hal Neely reports, "King Records has already issued two stereo singles. They are Bill Doggett's 'Rainbow Riot' and Dick Stabile's 'Poor Butterfly.' Our plans for the future are to issue in stereo all singles that show sufficient sales. We have been cutting everything in stereo for more than a year."

London Records: "We are going into stereo singles just as we have in LP's," stated Walt Maguire. "We have for immediate release two hit singles, "The Children's Marching Song," by Cyril Stapleton, and 'Talk To the Trees," by Edmundo Ros. In addition we have 10 to 15 EP's which are on the way to New York from England."

Seeco Records: Jerry Shifrin advises, "We have several Jose Mellis standards out in stereo and shall issue any of our singles that show sufficient sales reaction."

Dot Records: "Starting the first of the year, any Dot Record that begins to show hit potential will be immediately released as a 45 RPM stereo single," said Randy Wood. "By the middle of the year Dot expects to gradually step up its stereo production until all new singles will be released both monaurally and stereophonically."

Capitol Records: A spokesman for Capitol said, "When we have definite indications that there is an adequate stereo singles market we intend to release this type of recording. In the meantime we are closely watching the stereo singles market on a week to week basis."

Decca Records: A representative of Decca reported that, "Decca will enter the stereo EP field in February with several releases suited for both the juke boxes and the home trade. Everything at Decca has been cut in stereo for some time and is continuing to do so. Should there be a demand for any of our singles in stereo we will be able to satisfy that demand immediately."

Stereo Gems Records, Inc.: Bob Rosen has the following to say: "We are going ahead with a full stereo program of good standard tunes. We just did several Lenny Herman sessions wherein he cut current show tunes and we will have five or six stereo singles for immediate release. We have been importing tapes from Europe covering the fields of jazz, pop and classical, and they will be ready for release in the near future giving the juke box operator a full stereo selection. On the market already are six single releases of standard tunes by the Blair Smythe Orchestra."

Roulette Records: "Roulette has just issued a special release of ten stereo singles taken from our best selling EP's," said Irv Jerome. "However, we are cutting everything in stereo and should there be a demand we'll have stock for them the next day."

MGM Records: Charles Hasin re-ports, "MGM has jumped into stereo all the way. We have been working with the juke box manufacturers in an endeavor to give them what they want and about February 1st we will issue about fifty stereo singles in addition to the ten we have already released. These fifty will not be culled from old stereo tapes that we have on hand, but will be fresh recordings currently arranged with stereo in mind before we went into the session. We also have hundreds of tapes in our files that we, as did every other company, cut during the past years, but these are not included in the fifty mentioned. For the future we plan to offer a full line of stereo singles."

Warner Brothers: One of the Warner Brothers execs informed our West Coast representative that, "We now have 24 singles and EP's available in stereo. We have also given promotional copies of our singles to juke box manufacturers and distributors. We have made available to them a package of 18 EP's which we sell to the operator for \$10. In addition, we have furnished complimentary copies of our stereo singles to various state operators' associations."

Columbia Records: Goddard Lieberson states, "The future of stereo records in any form depends on the outlets for such records. At the moment the chief outlet for stereo singles seems to be juke boxes. The development of other markets remains to be observed."

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

Coed Diskery Makes Grade

NEW YORK - The Paxton-Winneton Music Publishing Companies have come up with what appears to be one of the most successful publisher owned record companies in the business today, Coed Records.

Headed by George Paxton, president and Marvin Cane, vice-president (the two are also partners in the Paxton-Winneton firms) Coed Records currently has one of the country's biggest hits in "16 Candles" by the Crests and has clicked nationally with two of its first four releases.

The company was formed last April with two initial releases, "Pretty Little Angel" by the Crests and "Cute And Collegiate" by the Brooktones. The records were tested in only three or four locations, but never developed into records of national importance.

Then came the Rivieras' recording of "Count Every Star" which had a successful run on the best sellers, and currently the company's biggest click to date is "16 Candles" in the #8 spot on The Cash Box Best Seller list.

The people who played a major role in the success of the young diskery are: Fred Weismantel who heads A & R with George Paxton; Billy Dawn Smith, who handles arrange-ments for the label's recording artists; Abe Langsam, national sales manager; Jerry Moss, in charge of national promotion; and Betty Marx, co-ordinator between distributors and the record firm. The company recently moved to larger quarters to accommodate the increased staff.

In the midst of the Paxton-Winneton disk boom, the publishing operation has continued to come up with its share of hits. Among the pubbery's recorded tunes issued since Coed was formed are "Love Makes The World Go Rround" by Perry Como; "Pussy Cat" by the Ames Bros.; "16 Candles", the Crests' smash on Coed; "When Summer Comes Again" by the Ames Brothers; and the new Nat "King" Cole single out this week "Give Me Your Love".

The Paxton - Winneton song-writing staff which produced these songs include: Bob Haymes, Ollie Jones, Buddy Smith, Mamie Watts, Robert Mosley, Burt Keyes, Billy Dawn Smith, Art Valle and Alicia Evelyn. Other songs which this staff has produced during recent years are: "Why Baby Why", "Send For Me", "Just Born To Be Your Baby", "Build Your Love On A Strong Foundation", "Angel Smile", and "Just Between You And Me".

Warner Bros. Debuts 13 New LP's At First Annual Sales Meet Cummings Sisters First For Victor

BURBANK, CALIF. — Thirteen new popular albums, available in Vitaphonic stereo and monaural long play, were introduced at the first annual sales meeting and convention of Warner Bros. Records here recently. A total of more than 75 persons representing Warner Bros. distributors, company executives, divisional sales managers and field promotion men were on hand for the convention.

The January release is being backed by a major coordinated advertising, merchandising, point of sales and promotion campaign which the company brass is calling the most ambitious yet entered into by Warner Bros. The program has been integrated under the theme "Tomorrow's Sound Today," and specifically sells the company's prowess in the rapidly rising stereo disk field.

Two programs, called "Warner Bros. feature attraction presentation, and Warner Bros. stereo center" are being made available to record dealers as part of the January program. Each month during 1959, Warner Bros. Records will select one of its outstanding new releases as a feature attraction presentation. The January selection is the newly recorded "Rhapsody In Blue—An American In Paris," by Heindorf.

To enable dealers to earn additional profit, Warner Bros. Records will provide a display rack and header for both the monaural and stereo albums. For each five albums purchased on either monaural or stereo, dealers will receive one additional identical album at no charge. Dealers will thus earn a margin of profit of 48% on the feature attraction, based on suggested selling price.

As a participant in the Warner Bros. feature attractions program, dealers will receive each months' feature album directly at home for the dealers' listening pleasure and record library.

In conjunction with the rapidly growing stereo record market, Warner Bros. is now furnishing dealers with an opportunity to establish a complete Stereo Record Center in their stores. A combination floor and counter browsing unit, with capacity for more than 200 albums in three bins is available to qualifying dealers.

With the purchase of 100 Warner Bros. stereo albums of the dealer's choice, the dealers receive an additional 25 stereo albums at no charge, plus the stereo center browser at cost. The stereo center is an illuminated display and is so constructed to enable dealers to display the firm's feature attraction album as well as the complete line of Warner Bros. stereo records.

Dealers participating in the stereo center program earn an additional margin of 40% on their purchases. Special dating terms on minimum orders are available to all dealers.

Albums in the January "Tomorrow's Sound Today" campaign include the original film score recording of "Auntie Mame," by Heindorf from the Warner Bros. picture of the same name; the first original jazz performance of Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Flower Drum Song," by the Morris Nanton Trio.

Heindorf has a second album in the January release, "Rhapsody In Blue" backed by "An American In Paris." The Gene Lowell Chorus sings a broad selection of college favorites in "Halls of Ivy"; while the Chico Hamilton Quintet offers the jazzophiles an album entitled "The Chico Hamilton Quintet, with Strings Attached." "Soft and Subtle" is the second album release by The Guitars, Inc. "As I Hear It" is an album of songs selected by William Holden from some of his best pictures; Ira Ironstrings is back with another package, "Ira Ironstrings Plays: With Matches." "The World's Ten Greatest Popular Piano Concertos" is recorded by George Greeley, one of Hollywood's wellknown planists; while the Signatures make their vocal debut on the Warner Bros. label with "The Signatures Sign In." Folksinger Elmerlee Thomas records some favorites in "Sun's Gonna Shine;" and "Hot and Cole" features Buddy Cole and his swinging electric organ.

The release of this selection of albums will be backed by a major advertising and merchandising campaign. Point-of-sale pieces include a series of film strip streamers, mounted displays, browsers, special sales merchandising kits, and mounted review cards.

Jim Conkling, president of Warner Bros. Records, told distributors at the convention that Warner Bros. Records will be a major company shortly, while speaking of the philosophy and concept of the company. Conkling, George Avakian and Karl Engemann outlined the company's album and singles repertoire to the distributors. Hal Cook, vice-president and national sales manager, discussed sales policy, while Joel Friedman, merchandise director, outlined the firm's merchandising and advertising concept.

The meeting was held at the Warner Bros. Studios.. Guests were treated to a personally conducted tour of the studio, a chuck wagon luncheon served on stage, and a cocktail and dinner party at the Sheraton West with entertainment by the Mary Kaye Trio, Chico Hamilton and Troyce Key.

The sixteen sides— all but several Morton composed items—are streaked with such names as "Kid" Ory, Barney Bigard and "Stomp" Evans. No chance for a stereo version here, but jazz buffs won't mind a bit.



"PORTRAIT OF ART FARMER"-Contemporary C3554

The trumpeter—in his first feature date for Contemporary—works a full array of tempi here, approaching each with assurance and style. If the playing is in a minor key, there's depth ("Too Late Now", "The Very Thought Of You"); if the session drives, there's breeziness and punch. Sup-port on the eight tracks is tops: Hank Jones, Addison Farmer and Roy Haynes. Commanding iazz release jazz release.

Stars—Coral CRL 57239 Stellar clarinetist Scott is surrounded by men of the first jazz order and both Scott and his companions sum up the used-to-be of New York's once great jazz street with varying jazz expres-sions, from the plaintive to the all-out blow ses-sion. Artists include Coleman Hawkins, Al Cohn, Oscar Pettiford, George Wallington, Wilber De Paris, Mundell Lowe and more men of note. Tunes are all related to jazz history ("Lover Man", "Body And Soul", "Round Midnight" and "Woody 'N' You"). Important jazz stints.

"BENNY GOLSON'S NEW YORK SCENE"-Contemporary C3552

Contemporary C3552 Golson (tenor sax) heads a bright array of East Coast talent in both a combo (quintet, quartet) and a nine-man band set-up, combining the seven tracks with hard-blowing, lightness and ballad sensitivity. Pitching in with purpose are Art Farmer, Paul Chambers, James Cleveland, Gigi Gryce, Julius Watkins, Wynton Kelly and Sahib Shihab and Charles Persip. "You're Mine You" is the only non-original. Resourceful jazz solos and repartee here.

"NO COVER, NO MINIMUM"—Enid Mosier— Decca DL 8804

Decca DL 8804 Miss Mosier—a nitery artist and performer in B'way's "House Of Flowers" a few years back— doesn't miss a vocal trick here and she handles each one with deftness and originality. Her per-formances involve the plaintive ballad ("He Never Looks My Way"), a parody on rock 'n roll ("Kiss Me Cross-Eyed"), calypso ("Land-lady") and the clever novelty ("T'Morra T'-Morra"). A star performer may have well been born with this entry.

"MARTY NAPOLEON AND HIS MUSIC"-Ster-O-Craft RCS-504

Ster-O-Craft RCS-504 The stereo only and expert stereo diskery offers a fine, relaxed jazz-mood piece, with pianist-organist Napoleon at the helm of a pro four-man crew. Working with swing ease and melodic direction on eight sweet evergreens ("Apple Blossom Time", "Autumn Leaves", "Out Of No-where") are guitarist Joe Puma, drummer Mickey Sheen, tenor saxist Carmen Leggio, bassist Chubby Jackson and, of course, Napoleon on piano or organ. Excellent music in an excellent stereo enterprise.



"EDDIE DAVIS ... UPTOWN"—King 606 Tenor saxist Davis plays a mostly durable collection on the beat, generally on a pure swing road, but more than once veering off to a Big Beat path ("Fireball"). Davis' principal support comes from a brightly displayed organ (performer is un-billed). Tunes include "All God's Chillun Got Rhythm", "There's A Small Hotel", "Mean To Me", "Yesterdays". Heady sax work with both pop and jazz appeal.



Cuban Revolution Could Affect Disk Biz There

NEW YORK—The following is a letter from Havana, Cuba, sent to The Cash Box by Stan Steinhouse, a for-mer rep for Panart and Seeco Rec-ords in New York and who now re-sides in Cuba.

sides in Cuba. Havana, January 6th, 1959—With the situation apparently back to nor-mal after five days of "revolutionary" excitement, Cuban civilian, non-politi-cal life is as normal as it can be under the circumstances. Unlike other coups cal life is as normal as it can be under the circumstances. Unlike other coups and states of siege which have be-fallen Cubans at top impersonal levels from time to time, this revolu-tion has been a peoples revolution (90% of the rebel army were farm hands and laborers) and will bring for the first time in Cuba's history a real, radical uprooting of all its nega-tive forces. The plans have been made and while Mr. and Mrs. Joe Cuban go about their business today, the forces that are have begun the mechanics of the changes which will make Cuba a model democracy. Several immediate acts affected show business here. The unions both of Actors (ACAT) and musicians were taken over by the revolutionary forces and members of the Executive boards during the Batista regime were either arrested or sent packing. Some of the big names in show busi-ness have disappeared, either to exile

ness have disappeared, either to exile or to their farm retreats for reasons best known to them and the Revolu-tionary Directory. General meetings of all memberships of these two or-ganizations have been called for sometime this week, when they will elect new "revolutionary" members and effect the "cleansweep" in poli-cies which were introduced during the negime benefiting the few insiders of

and effect the "cleansweep" in poli-cies which were introduced during the regime, benefiting the few insiders of the political scene. These policies, those which were planned by the revolutionary elements of the unions, are apparent and can be stated beforehand, as they are common knowledge among the mem-bers. Proper bookkeeping, orderly dues record etc., as well as protec-tion from foreign entertainers who command fabulous salaries and have been getting them, without adequate union participation. The move is on to st op double contracts, non-members work, etc. As direct result of Batista's eco-nomic policy which was one of load-ing banks with public paper debt in lieu of the regular international and national reserves, the peso situation is precarious, if not outright danger-ous at this time. There are talks about slight devaluation, import restric-tions, nationalization of certain in-dustries and obligation to manufac-ture locally many imported items.

dustries and obligation to manufac-ture locally many imported items, both of consumer necessity and lux-ury lines. Here the recording industry has taken due notice and prepared for the restrictions which could be-fall the recording business, one of the most bounced about plums at the customs level.

Cuba will most likely enter the area of heavy local manufacture, like Mexico, Colombia, Brazil, Argentina and any other country with dollar problems. An advantage, due to her lim-ited local purchasing capacity at the Ited local purchasing capacity at the onset, or until things get better for the low economic levels who are the heavy buyers in the Latin countries, is the fact that she will be able to export to Venezuela, the mid-Atlantic countries and surrounding islands (except Puerto Rico) and sell her entire production

(except Puerto Rico) and sen her entire production. There are at this moment two man-ufacturers of phonograph records, both of whom are also producers of their own label besides pressing cor-respondents of USA organizations.

respondents of USA organizations. Cuban Plastics And Record Corpo-ration (Panart) Oldest and most in-ternational minded has fourteen presses on the line and a reserve of twelve more. Manufactures the en-tire BMI catalogue, less Angel and has turned Capitol into one of the most popular labels in its area of operation. The facilities of CPRC in-clude "MS" recording, a more ad-

vanced technique in stereo or binaural recording, directed by Mr. Ramon Sabat, president, whose frequent incursions into the European industry have turned his organization into the most advanced, technically, of the continent. CPRC studios have been used by Capitol, NBC and other international organizations. Labels produced by Panart include ODEON (Chile, Argentina, Spain, etc., all EMI) as well as many major independents of Peru and other countries, which are used to increment the Panart LP catalogue. They also manu-facture local labels, produced by independents.

Impresora Cubana De Discos: When New Years Eve came around this organization had just opened short thirty days before a quarter million dollar operation, under the apparent control of Jesus Goris, producer of Puchito records, a well known Cuban label, up to recent months associated with Montilla, through whose distribution in the United States and manufacturing contracts with RCA Customs Presssing had his Puchito label working. In association with one of Cuba's leading money men, Pedro Suarez, whose sugar interests amount to well over 10 million dollars, not counting another list of interests and investments in like or double amount. Goris. young man with ideas and CPRC's friendly competitor in the local level has seen a brand new manufacturing plant go up in the outskirts of Havana with facilities for 18 presses, although only six are working now and the latest equipment has gone into his project. Columbia Records' distributor has given the plant a pressing contract and other labels, from Mexico and surrounding countries have given Impresora their catalogue.

Two stateside catalogues which have turned into local and popular demand items in the Latin American record stores are Capitol and RCA, both popular and classic repertoires. Other labels, like London, Mercury, Columbia, must depend on specific artists (Mantovani, Platters, Sarita Montiel) to demand heavy sales from their distributors. American pro-ducers and manufacturers will have to reappraise their aims in the Latin field and cooperate fully with local distributors in connection with royalty demands and other requirements at the master lease level if they are to continue counting on Cuba for that portion of sales which can be had there.

A careful reorganization of the Radio Guild will also cause much distress among those free-lance importers whose control of certain stations assured the programming of their material and odd LP catalogues. It indicates that artists will have to take an interest in playing Cuba and chancing the possibility that they will assist and create a demand for their material, which can then be supplied in master form to the distributors for local manufacture. The most obvious example of this reasoning is Nat "King" Cole's tremendous popularity with the Latinos, after periodical appearances at Cuba's famed Tropicana Night Club and Panart's Capitol production of his material. The joint operation resulted in "Cole Español" which has outsold the combined total of other Cole material in Latin America and assisted all the Capitol Distributors and manufacturing associates to establish the Capitol and resulting rest of EMI catalogue firmly in the buyers "must" list.

Another positive factor which will undoubtedly help this grass roots movement in the record business is the definite stay away trend along night club row here in Havana among all the citizenry and it is expected that record stores will do land office business during the first few weeks of the post revolution period and continue to pick up from the depths of sales-less weeks and months in most interior points of distribution where the armed conflict and the curfew and quiet nights prevailed for the past two years.

Biggest musical hero of the hour is Daniel Santos, popular Puerto Rican singer who in the last weeks of 1957 recorded for "America" a small independent label two sides "Sierra Maestra" and "Adelante Cubanos" two of them martial-boleros dedicated to the liberation movement of Dr. Fidel Castro. The songs were heard through out the "7 RR" (Rebel Radio) network in their broadcast hours and were in Latin stops of juke box operators in New York, Miami and Caracas, as well as in Puerto Rico. Death penalty orders were issued by the regime SS-like force for the artist, who had once been a very favorite person throughout Havana with his recordings with Panart, later Seeco and in recent times with Ansonia Records. It is expected that he will be given hero treatment when he next appears in Havana, either during the course of the month or when his TV and Radio contract is negotiated by local agent. It is expected that the bulk of live entertainment will be appearing over the radiostations and local TV stations until such time as it is decided by the Revolutionary Party policy to follow with the big-time gambling Casinos.

Havana's musicians were getting \$6.50 per recorded side at record sessions, although it was set at \$7.50 per side/man and recording sessions of one side were frequent. Changes which will most likely bring the union close to stateside policies in recording and bring about other changes in the nightclub scales where prices as low as \$8.00 per night per man were common practice, Since March 1952 when Batista gave his last coupe more and more private clubs and organizations which are the source of work for local musicians, discontinued their night affairs. Since 1956 most of the interior cities of Cuba, joined in a national association, decided to discontinue all musical functions and close the clubs after the afternoon domino game and canasta parties. Night clubs were forced to cut down on their orchestras and most places stopped giving second shows as recent as June 1958. Afternoon dancing was a teenage affair and the popularity of certain North American ideals was noted among them, particularly Pat Boone and Tommy Sands. In the city of Havana

Billy Ward Enterprises Formed Will Produce 48 Sides For Liberty

HOLLYWOOD-Billy Ward Enterprises, a many-faceted clearing-house serving the theatrical profession, has serving been formed, with executive offices

Conceived and launched by Billy Ward, leader of the famed song-and-dance Dominoes, the venture em-braces an association of recording producers and consultants: scouts, coaches and managers of top-flight acts; associated composers, arrangers and writers, and affiliated BMI-AS-CAP music publishers.

Included is the newly formed Ro-Sanne Record Company, of which Ward is president. This company will scout, develop and record new talent for any of the existing record com-

panies that do not have provisions panies that do not have provisions in their set-ups to do so. Rosanne Rec-ords will limit its activities to pro-ducing disks for other labels and will not concern itself with distribution. Its first major client was Liberty Rec-ords, for which Rosanne will produce 48 gides nor upon 48 sides per year.

A songwriters' workshop will screen material submitted from all over the world, and develop new tunesmiths.

Mary Reeves, famed Hungarian drama coach, has been signed to head a department for the development of dramatic talent for motion pictures and television. "The response has been overwhelming," Miss Reeves said, "In the two weeks we have been in business more than 200 dramatic hopefuls have applied for an audi-tion." tion.

"This organization was formed out of necessity," said Ward. "The eight years I have traveled around the world with my Dominoes made me realize how desperately show business realize now desperately show business needed a creative organization. Most acts suffer because of poor manage-ment; most managers are considered unworthy by their acts because the acts expect managers to be miracle men, rather than business men."

He pointed out that his enterprises will "take a lot of managers off the hot seat," because it will provide coaching and recording, "the very life-lines of an artist's career."

"The same is true of agents," he added.

"My going into a new business does not mean I have retired from show business," Ward concluded. "The Dominoes are going just as strong as ever—and, besides, with business associates like I have one can easily do more than one thing at the same do more than one thing at the same time.'

Before forming the Dominoes in 1950, Ward was a vocal coach in New York City, with studios in Carnegie Hall and at 1650 Broadway. A pro-lific song writer, his tunes have sold millions of copies, topped by "Sixty Minute Man," a two-million seller which helped start the rock and roll trend in 1951.

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



Int'l Youth Band LP Released

NEW YORK—The interesting back-ground story behind the recent Co-lumbia LP issue, "Newport 1958—The International Youth Band," drama-tizes the position of jazz as an art of international standing. The album features seven numbers by the International Youth Band, an organization founded in 1958 by the Newport Jazz Festival. An idea of Marshall Brown and George Wein, the band of eighteen jazz musicians come from sixteen different countries. The Newport festival, went to Europe in early Spring of '58 to personally hear hundreds of musicians through-out the continent, including many be-hind the Iron Curtain. Hopscotching Europe, they conducted auditions on a tight schedule. Jazz writers, impre-sarios and recording executives in each country had been alerted and in each country the musicians were waiting when the pair arrived. Upon their return to the United States, Brown selected his men and they were quickly notified. In June, the seventeen musicians assembled in New York, were joined by 15-year-old

saxophonist Andy Marsala, repre-isenting the U. S., and they began in-tensive rehearsals of a book put to-gether by John LaPorte, Jimmy Guif-fre, Bill Russo, Adolph Sandole, Arif Mardin and Brown himself. With so many different languages represented, Brown often had to com-muniacte with a member through two

represented, Brown often had to com-municate with a member through two 1 or three other members who then translated the instructions into the man's native tongue. With less than a week of rehearsals, the band made its TV debut on the Arthur Godfrey show, then played a concert for a gathering of critics and jazz writers. As the band whipped into shape, it moved to Newport in preparation for the performances there. there.

It played two sets at the 5th annual Newport Jazz Festival over the July 4th weekend, to fine critical and pub-lic acclaim. It was from these per-formances that the record selections were taken. After the festival, the band performed on the summer Perry Como TV'er and then flew to Brussels, where it performed for a week at the where it performed for a week at the U. S. Pavilion of the World's Fair.





Charles Cooke Dies



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

The distributor and his sales force who can assist the operator in gaining this advantage thru knowledge of what the recording industry has available, will not only increase the sales of equipment, but will be aiding their own customers to the road to better profits.

It is therefore the earnest suggestion of *The Cash Box* that juke box distributors make every effort immediately to become record experts—and that he insist that every salesman in the organization become one as well.

The entire juke box industry will benefit accordingly.

How to become a record expert? It's very simple. All it needs is some time and application. Read the entire music department of *The Cash Box* as soon as it is received. Study the record reviews; read the news stories; memorize the various listings. It would be of great advantage to have *The Cash Box* handy when talking with operators. RECORD MFRS TO RELEASE PLENTY OF STEREO SINGLES

Everything Being Cut Both Monaurally and Stereo. Some Plan Simultaneous Releases, Others Can Deliver Immediately if Monaural Releases "Hit"

NEW YORK—When any new product makes its appearance, the question always arises—will it be accepted by the public—will it prove successful?

. When the producers of home stereophonic record players started thinking of three-dimensional sound on records, it wasn't their thought of whether it would be accepted, it was a question of manufacturing a practical mechanical unit which would reproduce a record which in itself would be recorded to bring the "new" sound to the listener.

These manufacturers of sound equipment and records were the foremost producers of this type of equipment. Their faith in the acceptance by the public is now history. It is reported that during the past year, thousands and thousands of home stereo record players have been sold.

The manufacturers of coin operated music machines, in producing stereo equipment, while pioneering in this field, felt that this new sound was no longer an experiment, but an established fact. The only barrier for complete success was the fact that, while the recording companies were producing album stereo records, not many were turning out pop singles. When the first coin operated stereo unit was introduced, there were just a handful of records available. However, in the past months this number has grown to a respectable number.

At the start of 1959, The Cash Box started to question the manufacturers of records as to the extent they intended to proceed with the production of this new phase in music. The results are most encouraging. The general consensus of these companies was reflected in this statement: "Stereo has become a household word today. Practically everyone has a general idea of what stereo means. The tremendous amount of advertising, word of mouth conversation, and radio and

television exploitation has made sound experts of millions. We intend to capitalize on it."

The juke box industry is now given the opportunity to capitalize on this trend as well. It is predicted that within the next year, many, many thousands of home stereo players will be purchased. These same people are patrons of juke boxes, and it is felt they too, will expect the same roomfilling sound to emanate from the equipment in their favorite location.

Here's what the record manufacturers tell us they intend to do in 1959 for stereo records:

Mercury Records: "We will produce all pop singles in stereo", stated Art Talmadge. "We feel that there are sufficient buyers to make the sale of our pop singles practical and profitable. Currently we have ready for sale the nation's number one seller, "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes" by The Platters, and the new releases by Patti Page, The Diamonds, Brook Benton, and The Gaylords."

ABC Paramount: "We have available for the stereo juke boxes the current Paul Anka and Eydie Gorme releases. Our policy will be to keep close watch on our releases and the minute we see a definite reaction to our regular single release we will issue it in stereo for juke box and home consumption," said Sam Clark.

Coral Records: Norm Weinstrower advised, "We have already gone into stereos for juke boxes. On the First of February we will issue five EPs. Two Teresa Brewer, one McGuire Sisters, one Lawrence Welk, and one Dick Kesner."

RCA Victor: Said Ray Clark, "We are recording everything in stereo. Anything with juke box potential will be released in stereo. New recordings by major artists will immediately be made available in stereo. We are already releasing extensive EP merchandise in stereo. These releases will be made available on a weekly basis. In addition to our regular stereo EP and single releases, we have released one single in stereo only. This is a record that lends itself to juke box play and stereo demonstration at the same time. It is 'Buck Dance' by The Little Thumpers."

King Records: Hal Neely reports "King Records has already issued two stereo singles. They are Bill Doggett's 'Rainbow Riot' and Dick Stabile's 'Poor Butterfly'. Our plans for the future are to issue in stereo all singles that show sufficient sales. We have been cutting everything in stereo for more than a year."

London Records: "We are going into stereo singles just as we have in LPs," stated Walt Maguire. "We have for immediate release two hit singles, 'The Children's Marching Song' by Cyril Stapleton and 'Talk To The Trees' by Edmundo Ros. In addition we have 10 to 15 EPs which are on the way to New York from England."

Seeco Records: Jerry Shifrin advises, "We have several Jose Mellis standards out in stereo and shall issue any of our singles that show sufficient sales reaction."

Dot Records: "Starting the first of the year, any Dot Records that begins to show hit potential will be immediately released as a 45 RPM stereo single," said Randy Wood. "By the middle of the year Dot expects to gradually step up its stereo production until all new singles will be released both monaurally and stereophonically."

Capitol Records: A spokesman for Capitol said, "When we have definite indications that there is an adequate stereo singles market we intend to release this type of recording. In the meantime we are closely watching the stereo singles market on a week to week basis."

Decca Records: A representative of Decca reported that "Decca will enter the stereo EP field in February with several releases suited for both the juke boxes and the home trade. Everything at Decca has been cut in stereo for some time and is continuing to do so. Should there be a demand for any of our singles in stereo we will be able to satisfy that demand immediately."

Stereo Gems Records Inc.: Bob


Rosen has the following to say: "We are going ahead with a full stereo program of good standard tunes. We just did several Lenny Herman sessions wherein he cut current show tunes and we will have five or six stereo singles for immediate release. We have been importing tapes from Europe covering the fields of jazz, pop and classical and they will be ready for release in the near future giving the juke box operator a full stereo selection. On the market already are six single releases of standard tunes by the Blair Smythe Orchestra."

Roulette Records: "Roulette has just issued a special release of ten stereo singles taken from our best selling LPs," said Irv Jerome. "However, we are cutting everything in stereo and should there be a demand we'll have stock for them the next day."

MGM Records: Charles Hasin reports "MGM has jumped into stereo all the way. We have been working with the juke box manufacturers in an endeavor to give them what they want and about February 1st we will issue about fifty stereo singles in addition to the ten we have already released. These fifty will not be culled from old stereo tapes that we have on hand, but will be fresh recordings currently arranged with stereo in mind before we went into the session. We also have hundreds of tapes in our files that we, as did every other company, cut during the past years, but these are not included in the fifty mentioned. For the future we plan to offer a full line of stereo singles."

Warner Brothers: One of the Warner Brothers execs informed our west coast representative that, "We now have 24 singles and EPs available in stereo. We have also given promotional copies of our singles to juke box manufacturers and distributors. We have made available to them a package of 18 EPs which we sell to the operator for \$10. In addition we have furnished complimentary copies of our stereo singles to various state operators associations."

Columbia Records: Goddard Lieberson states, "The future of stereo records in any form depends on the outlets for such records. At the moment the chief outlet for stereo singles seems to be juke boxes. The development of other markets remains to be observed."








Coin machine biz is in a deep freeze in New England with the worst snap






Games and Music Business Show Immediate Post-Holiday Pick-Up EASTERN FLASHES




