





"LIPSTICK ON YOUR COLLAR" (2:25) [Joy ASCAP—Lewis, Goehring]

"FRANKIE" (2:35) [Aldon BMI—Sedaka, Greenfield]

CONNIE FRANCIS (MGM 12793)

 The thrush, who has made quite a chart mark with her r&r-ballad refitting of the evergreens, currently it's "If I Didn't Care", changes the pace offering two new teen items on her latest MGM release. Topside's a contagious rocker, tabbed "Lipstick On Your Collar" while the flip's an emotional fish-beater named "Frankie". Ray Ellis' crew slickly assists on the two sides. The kids'll love 'em both.

"I'M READY" (2:02)

[Post, Vanderbuilt ASCAP—Lewis, Bradford, Domino]

"MARGIE" (2:15) [Mills, Fred Fisher ASCAP—Davis, Conrad, Robinson]

FATS DOMINO (Imperial 5585)

What could prove to be Fats Domino's biggest side since he scaled the record heights of "Blueberry Hill" is this sensational handclapper tagged "I'm Ready". Deck has a delightful set of lyrics, a great beat and a little bit of the old r&b sound. And the chubby one's at his energetic best. Watch it zoom. Backing is a wonderful r&r revival of "Margie" tailored in that distinctive Domino style. Can move way out too.

"HALLELUJAH, I LOVE HIM SO" (2:24)

PEGGY LEE (Capitol 4189)

What Peggy Lee did with "Fever" could be duplicated via her tantalizing rendition of the Ray Charles favorite, "Hallelujah, I Love Him So". Deck opens with a "Fever" flavoring and then heads into a swinging blending of Peggy's voice and Jack Marshall's music. Flipside, Miss Lee wistfully chirps the sad, slow moving lover's opus "I'm Looking Out The Window". Excellent mood coupler.

"IT HAPPENED TO JANE" (1:57) [Daywin BMI-Lubin, Roth]

"BE PREPARED" (2:31) [Artist ASCAP—Quine, Karger]

DORIS DAY (Columbia 41391)

From the lark's forthcoming pic "It Happened To Jane" come both ends of her latest Columbia issue. Doris, currently represented on the lists with "Love Me In The Daytime", leads off with the sunny, toe-tappin' title tune as Frank DeVol's ork-chorus lend a bright and breezy backdrop. The Flower Drum Kids, of "Children's Marching Song" wax fame, join in on refreshing march-flavored flip, "Be Prepared"—the Boy Scout's motto. Catchy coupler.

"THIS HERE GOAT" (2:20) [Hollis BMI—Cavanaugh, Stanton]

"HOLIDAY FOR LOVERS" (2:27) [Miller ASCAP—Cahn, Van Heusen]

MITCH MILLER (Columbia 41375)

This Here Goat" is a charming follow-up to Miller's "Children's Marching Song" success, and should be received with chart delight by the kiddie market. Here, Miller's Sing-Along Chorus joins the youngsters who perform in B'way's "Flower Drum Song" in rendering the ditty. Deck looks strong. The Sing-Along Chorus solos on the Latinish treat, "Holiday For Lovers", from a pic of the same name. Natural for the jocks.

BOBBY HELMS

(Decca 30886)

B+ "SOON IT CAN BE TOLD" [Jimskip BMI — Miller, Berger] A sweet-beat treat is sup-plied with slight upbeat tenderness by the pop-country songster. Opus grows-on-you and could be Helms' next ticket to the charts. Eye it.

B "I GUESS I'LL MISS THE PROM" (2:21) [Jimskip BMI—McKenna, Armstrong] Artist leans toward the country field in this tuneful middle-beat wistful.

DAVID ROSE & ANDRE PREVIN (MGM 12792)

B "LIKE YOUNG" (3:11) [Robbins ASCAP—Previn] Ork maestro Rose and pianist Previn work together beautifully, with the Rose crew supplying the string backing to Previn's lightly swinging touch. You can figure deejays putting out the welcome mat for this.

C+ "YOUNG MAN'S LAMENT"
(3:25) [David Rose ASCAP—
Rose] A blueser that's a fine after hours jock item.

ALAN LOMAX

(Kapp 271)

B "THAT'S ALL RIGHT DAR-LIN'" (1:55) [Ludlow BMI— Lomax, Lomax] Noted folk singer-authority offers a contagious folk item here that's both a pleaser for the folk trade and a commercial teen

B "WHO'S GONNA BE YOUR MAN?" (2:47) [Ludlow BMI—Lomax] Haunting folk ballad expertly rendered by Lomax.

DAVID SEVILLE

(Liberty 55193)

"JUDY" (2:27) [Monarch AS-CAP—Bagdasarian] Seville, the man resonsible for the Chipmunks, heads a pretty waltzer from the ork, while now and then a couple dancing get introduced to each other. Deck that has melodic and semi-novelty enemals appeal.

B "MARIA FROM MADRID" (2:01) [Monarch ASCAP—Bagdasarian] Zither-like instrument is the feature of this catchy Spanish

THOMAS WAYNE

(Mercury 71454)

B+"THIS TIME" (2:12) [Tree BMI — Moman] Wayne, currently enjoying a chartrider with "Tragedy" on the Fernwood label, offers a strong rock-romantic account here. Tune has a lot of teen heart, and the Wayne rendition gets its wistful way. Watch it.

B "YOU'RE THE ONE THA'T DONE IT" (1:54) [Tree BMI—Scott] Wayne socks this one out with verve. Kids will want to dance to

"MY SONG" (2:20) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP— B "MY SONG" (2:20) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP— Brown, Henderson] Stylist nicely swings the oldie and the Jack Pleis backing is arranged most agreeably. The jocks have a good one here.

B "I SAY HELLO" (2:26) [Florence Chappell ASCAP — Rome] A pretty sentimental from the recently opened musical, "Destry Rides Again", is appealingly portrayed by Miss Sherwood.

THE SQUARES

(Tel 1003)

B+"SQUARE ROCK PART 3" (2:02) [Hackney BMI—Sanderson, Benson] A blazer from the combo that could attract strong teen attention. Waxing opens with sexy dame introducing the piece and outfit takes over. Keep tabs on it.

B "DAVEY'S DRAG" (2:19) [Hackney BMI — Sanderson] More rockin' stuff, with voices in-volved. Upper date has the edge.

AL ALLEN

(Carlton 511)

B+"EGGHEAD" [David Jones BMI —Dunturi] A rock holiday for guitars that could show-up. The Allen crew keeps percussion and some guitars as a backdrop, while one guitarist offers fancy beat tricks. Watch for action.

B "I'M BEAT" [David Jones BMI—Dunturi] Side has funky approach which makes for an interesting effect.

THE FIVE BLOBS

(Joy 230)

B+"JULIET" (2:20) [Joy ASCAP — Tobias, Edwards] The "songsters", actually composed of one artist, Bernie Nee, offer a joyful namesong which has an inviting tune. Good instrumental feature is the hopping sax. Might get around.

B "YOUNG AND WILD" (2:12) [Famous ASCAP — Bacharach, David] Nee's voice multiplication works on a deliberately paced, tango-

"WHERE IS THE LOVE" (2:34) [Midnight ASCAP-Malis] "THINGS TO DO TODAY" (1:57) [Maytime BMI-Olofson, Call] THE FOUR KNIGHTS (Coral 62110)

The Four Knights, who recently made a chart appearance with "Oh Falling Star", could go all the way with their new Coral outing. Tabbed "Where Is The Love", it's a beautiful rock-a-ballad, with tear-compelling love lyrics that the songsters read with heartfelt sincerity. Superb choral and ork background supplied by the Charles Bud Dant outfit. "Things To Do Today" is a light-hearted, quick-beat cutie that the kids oughts be putting on their accords. oughta be putting on their agenda.

"LA STRADA DEL' AMORE (The Street Of Love)" (2:32) [Sounds ASCAP—Reardon]

"WHERE" (2:35) [Sheldon BMI—Shapiro, Mann] CATERINA VALENTE (RCA Victor 7525)

Two strong sides debut the famed lark on the label. One portion is a pretty Italian-flavored melodic, "La Strada Del' Amore", which Miss Valente reads with sure-handed ballad style. Of commercial note, too, is the deliberately phrased semi-dramatic, "Where". Both takes have likely chart bound.

"THIS BROKEN HEART" (2:48) [Arc BMI—Franklin] "YOU MADE ME CRY" (1:57) [Are BMI-Franklin] THE SONICS (Checker 922; Harvard 922)

Action on the original Harvard master of "This Broken Heart" by Action on the original Harvard master of "This Broken Heart" by the Sonics prompted Checker to purchase the lid for national distribu-tion. Deck, however, will be on sale in the New York mart on the Harvard label. Tune is a broken-hearted, slow moving lover's ballad that the crew reads with touching sincerity. Watch for loads of noise to come from both the r&b and pop depts. Underside displays the boys' slick quick beat vocalisthenics.

"I'M GONNA CHANGE HIM" (2:48) [Planetary BMI—Segal, Vance] "THE LITTLE THINGS YOU DO" (2:52) [Queensbury Coliseum BMI-Miller, Kay]

CATHY CARR (Roulette 4152)

• The thrush, just off her "First Anniversary" click, has a cute take on "I'm Gonna Change Him", a soft-Latin backdrop session that Miss Carr wraps up in a coy manner. Melody is highly appealing. Item should pass the chart test. Coupler is a pleasing, unpretentiously plied romancer. Could move, too.

"MAMA'S PLACE" (2:00) [Asset ASCAP—Allen, Belloc] "I CAN'T HELP IT" (1:40) [Asset ASCAP—Belloc, Wright] BING DAY (Mercury 71446)

Mercury recently enjoyed a 'left field sleeper' smash with the Mark IV's "I Got A Wife". Bing Day should provide them with another. His hip, talk-sing description of-"Mama's Place" is a delight that's gonna make the jocks really sit up and take notice. The easy-goin' flute-spotlighted musical backdrop pleasantly fits in with today's jazz craze. "I Can't Help It", on the lower grooves, is a spirited rock 'n roller that Day and the band belt out with coin-catching authority.

STEVE & DONNA

(Liberty 55192)

B "EVER SINCE THE WORLD BEGAN" (1:57) [Asa ASCAP—Lubin, Venet] The singing duo has a contagious rhythm jumper. Steve takes most of the lead work, with Donna supplying interesting background remarks. Guitar arrangement is a feature. Could happen.

B "ALL THE BETTER TO LOVE YOU" (2:39) [Daywin BMI—Lubin] Interesting, deliberate exchange between the two. Particularly effective Latinish beat from the instrumentalists. May break, too.

THE CHEVRONS

(Brent 7000)

B+"THAT COMES WITH LOVE"
(2:23) [Danbury BMI — Clinque,
Wilshinsky] Fine middle-beat rocker
debuts the new Time-Shad affiliate in
strong style. Songsters are surehanded, and have a pro lead. Could
be an auspicious intro for the label.

B "DON'T BE HEARTLESS" (2:21) [Danbury BMI — Abbott, Merrel] Boys wrap up the ballad in OK fashion.

FRANKIE LYMON

(Roulette 4150)

B+"WHAT A LITTLE MOON-LIGHT CAN DO" (2:20) [Harms ASCAP—Woods] The youngster re-cently scored with his "Up Jumped A Rabbit" and can repeat with his latest, a swinging rendition of the evergreen. Rudy Traylor's ork and chorus attractively showcase the art-ist on this engaging jumper.

B "BEFORE I FALL ASLEEP" (2:20) [Kahl BMI — Medley, Abrams] Under side's a change-of-pacer with Frankie softly piping a very pretty ballad. A sure-fire jockey favorite. Lad's easy-goin' style here is quite different from his youthful-sounding "Why Do Fools Fall In Love" date.

KENNY BAKER

(Orbit 541)

B+"I'M GONNA LOVE YOU"

[Rev BMI—Baker] Kenny

Baker's inviting reading of this catchy romantic rocker could put the label on the hit map. Deck has a flavoring of some of the late Buddy Holly's slices. Teeners take note!

B "GOODBYE LITTLE STAR" (2:16) [Rev BMI — Baker] An intriguing thumper with teen-appealing lyrics. Strong coupler.

THE FLAMINGOS

(Decca 30880)

B "EVER SINCE I MET LUCY" [Bourne ASCAP—Teifer, Sharp] The boys hop nicely to the good rocker, which has had previous disk experience: Sax makes a cute remark. OK pop-R&B fare.

"KISS-A-ME" (2:52) [Michele ASCAP—Wood, Beach] Tenderbeat item is expressively handled. Femmes join the team.

FELIX & His Guitar

(Aut 1000)

B+"CHILI BEANS" (1:57) [Win-this This combo effort has lots of rock sound sizzle, and could make it. Idea is a blend of the Latin and the Big Beat. Growling sax is a terrific feature. Voice interjects title. Could score.

B "PUERTO RICAN RIOT" (2:12) [Winston ASCAP — Garcia] Rhythmic affair, with a vocalist warbling in Spanish. Exciting.

JIMMY CASANOVA

(Felsted 8572)

B+"IF IT WASN'T FOR THE KIDS (Right Out Of The House)" (2:47) [Springton ASCAP — Alberts, Casanova, Leavitt] Delightful Novelty has the flavor of the recent Mark IV click, "I Got A Wife". Here three husbands take turns telling how they lost out to their wives. Good humor in story-ending punchlines, tune is catchy. Could move out.

C+ "ROBIN AND THE ROSE" (2:38) [Springton ASCAP—Casanova] Softly spun sentimental.

BOBBY HAMMACK

(Capitol 4193)

"LITTLE CHILD" (2:23) [Edwin B+"LITTLE CHILD" (2:23) [Edwin H. Morris ASCAP — Shanklin] First Capitol deck for the pianist-arranger proves an inventive treat. Oldie is first taken with ease, and keeps getting interesting vocal-instru-mental additions. Heavy jock exposure could get item a chart name.



NEW YORK-Between 50 and 60 NEW YORK—Between 50 and 60 up-state New York record dealers met in the Clark Music Company building in Syracuse, New York, at 7:30 P.M., April 15, 1959, to hear an address by the Society of Record Dealers of America president, Charles L. Simmons. Simmons had flown from his Dallas headquarters on a recruiting mission

Besides the dealers from northern New York who had already joined SORD as a result of direct mail advertising, 21 other stores became paidup members. Dealers had come from as far away as 150 miles to attend this special record dealer meeting. Cities represented at the conclave were Albany, Utica, Oswego, and many others. Several dealers from distant cities have asked for SORD representation at similar meetings and have been promised such representation by the Society of Record Dealers of America. America.

Simmons outlined several steps which have already been taken in SORD's effort to solve some of the retail record dealers most pressing problems. Simmons further pointed out that coming litigation, although he fully expects it to be successful, cannot solve all of the dealers' problems. "We (the dealers) must begin solving some of our own problems. We must create and live by a code of ethics and fair play for the industry. In the coming months, dealers must promote their own business welfare more aggressively than they ever have more aggressively than they ever have in their lives in order to retain their status in the record industry," added

Simmons announced that SORD yould have its first convention in New York in June to run concurrently with the NAMM convention. Headquarters of SORD will be in a hotel suite in the New Yorker Hotel.

Gershwin In Stereo

NEW YORK - "George Gershwin At The Piano," an album containing rare piano performances and a musical comedy rehearsal by the composer, has been issued by 20th Fox Records.

The package is available in monaural, and interestingly enough, in stereo form. One side of the disk is devoted to Gershwin's keyboard reading of his "Rhapsody In Blue," which was taken from piano rolls made by the composer in the 'twenties on the Duo-Art piano and rolls, an instrument known for its accurate reproduction. Side two contains Gershwin performing both his own tunes and others on the ivories and also an actual 1929 rehearsal segment, featuring Gershwin talking and performing, for the 1930 Gershwin musical, "Strike Up The Band."

The creation of a stereo version of the Gershwin piano playing was made possible by the use of an electric reproducing piano, and its handling by a musician, who controlled the tempo and expression of the machine.

Disk Jockey Doesn't Like The RCA Victor Sets Up Singles Cash Box "One Minute Disk For Dee-Jays" Editorial

Dear Sir:
"Once more I have to take exception "Once more I have to take exception to one of your editorials. In your April 25th issue, you have an editorial headed: 'SOMETHING'S GOTTA GIVE.' "You are right, something's gotta give and if the Radio Industry has to look forward to one-minute promotional records, I'm afraid that smart radio operators are going to turn away from any singles programming and look for broadcast material elsewhere. I know I am."

(Ed note): That's ok if you are looking for other than a singles audience. In that case you don't need singles now whether they are one-two- or three-minute records. The ence. In that case you don't need singles now whether they are one-two- or three-minute records. The history of deeays all over the country has proven that r & r jockeys who tried to switch their programming lost their audience. If you want to program for a housewife audience—then that is what you do. If you want to program for a teenage audience, you use rock and roll and beat records. If you want to program albums. If you want to program albums. If you want to program singles—then what difference does it make to you if you program 12 records an hour or if you program 20 records an hour. It is true that you sell sponsor products and not records—but let's face the facts of life. This is not just a one-way avenue. You are selling sponsor products through the free entertainment provided to you by manufacturers who spend thousands of dollars producing and promoting records. You are selling sponsor products by creating an exciting entertaining program. Records have proven to be that kind of proramming for you through the years, to the extent that they have literally pushed everything else off the airwaves. You can provide more exciting programming for yourself and up your own rating by exposing more records and discovering new stars. This will sell more sponsor products. We are sorry to be so blunt—but it's time that the record companies stopped being put down and having flaunted in their faces the fact that the deeays don't need them—whereas record companies do need the jockey. It is certainly true that you are the record companies do need the jockey. It is certainly true that you are the record companies were to suddenly go out of business.

"It's hard enough as it is to produce a decent record show with the sorry

"It's hard enough as it is to produce a decent record show with the sorry material available. It will be impos-sible to do so with one-minute disks."

(Ed note): Who decides what is a decent record? Why not let your lis-teners decide for themselves?

"You seem to forget that a Disk

Jockey isn't selling records, he is supposed to be selling his sponsors products and services. Unless he can produce a program that will attract and hold an audience, how can he expect to sell radio advertised merchandise?"

(Ed note): We think we answered this in our first rebuttal.

"Why is it when the record industry and YOU run into trouble, you always look to the Disk Jockey for a solution to your problems. It seems to me that instead of shortening releases, the record industry should turn out forwar valences of better quality." leases, the record industry should turn out fewer releases of better quality.

(Ed note): In theory this might be the answer. But have you tried telling that to the hundreds of manufactweers who must produce records to live. It seems very simple to us. If you don't want to play what you don't like—well just don't play it.

"Because of the poor quality of re-corded material in the past rew years, I have turned more and more to album programming. The result has been decidedly favorable. I have built a larger audience and in so doing have increased my time-sales terrifically. If you are successful in ramming through one-minute disks as you were in promoting the two-minute jobs, I'll be forced to rely on albums entirely. I feel sure that there are a number of Jocks who feel as I do. The result will be even less exposure than be-fore. It boils down to one hard fact, THE RECORD INDUSTRY WILL BE BITING THE HAND THAT FEEDS IT."

(Ed note): Since you are already programming mostly album material, then this suggestion does not really affect you. Your audience is apparently not of the eategory that listens to today's singles.

"The one-minute disks will probably find favor with the TOP 40 boys who, if you will investigate, cater almost entirely to a teen-age audience whose buying power is practically nil. Their total buying power may keep sales of single records humming, but again let me remind you, a disk jockey isn't sclling records."

(Ed note): We agree that disk jockeys sell sponsors, not records, but on the other hand, let us once again state that RECORDS ARE SELLING DISK JOCKEYS.

"I would appreciate it if you would give me space in your magazine for the above. Perhaps some other Disk Jockeys will express their ideas."

(Ed note): Let's hear from you, deejays. We are certainly interested in what you think.

Kapp Records Brown and Schoen's Bands In **Unique Experiment**

NEW YORK - Kapp Records released this week the first stereo recording of a suite of music specially composed and arranged for two big bands-Vic Schoen's nine-part score for Les Brown and his "Band of Renown" and Schoen's "All-Star Band."

To achieve the stereo separation which would make each band identifithe concerted instruments, Kapp the concerted instruments, (Kapp placed the bands in a "V" formation —Brown's on the left side and Schoen's on the right-with a single rhythm section, common to both in the center. The conductors' podium was placed at the apex, allowing each conductor to lead his own band and also hear the overall sound of both bands. In order to achieve the proper balance, both electronically and musically, it was necessary to conduct a series of experiments in which comparisons were made with each section of each band. First, the trumpets of the Brown band played a chord; then the identical chord was played by the "All-Star's" trumpet section. This process was repeated many times by each group of instruments in each band and the microphones were adjusted and seats rearranged until the sounds were accurately matched.

"Suite For Two Bands" was conceived early in 1958, when Schoen was musical director of "The Big Record" television series. When Les Brown was booked to appear, Schoen decided to start work on the two-band suite. His initial essay was "Ballet In Brass" (included in this album) and favorable audience response resulted in Brown's recall to the program several times. Schoen completed the suite later in the year, but it was several months before Les Brown was again in New York long enough to record the full score. Kapp predicts that the album will be, "justifiably considered an historic event in the recording industry."

A monaural presentation of the set is also available.





Although Gold will have the controlling interest in all the firms, it is reported that Kassner, Kessler and Sporn will continue to head the firms they controlled prior to the merger.

Although the merger has not been finalized, the story comes from an unimpeachable source. At press time, papers had not yet been signed, but this may have taken place over the weekend. \$2,000,000 is said to be the figure Gold will pay to acquire this controlling interest.

Disk Biz Down Under

MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA—Reports from our correspondent in Australia indicate that the record business there has taken a slight set-back over the past few months, due to the financial drag placed upon the community by the hard-selling TV appliance manufacturers. In spite of this, record sales over the past six weeks have shown a healthy increase and with the hoped-for reduction in sales tax, when the new government budget is announced later in the year, the industry expects a large volume increased in disk sales. At the moment there is a 25% sales tax on all records sold through retailers.

It was also reported that the section of the Coypright Act which stipulates that copyright owners receive mechanical fees at the rate of 5% of the retail selling price (this selling price includes sales tax), will be reviewed shortly. Record manufacturers expressed hope for the abolishment of this unfavorable legislation.





The artist has two tantalizing entries here that should have the registers jingling with excitement. Tabbed "Steal A Little Kiss" and "I Can't Stop Loving You", they're two happy rockers sporting a bright vocal and instrumental backdrops. Back-to-back winners for Larry.





The Secret Of PUBLIC RELATIONS

How To Win Friends And Influence People!

The Coin Machine Industry, which is probably the most maligned of all commercial endeavors, has been pondering Public Relations as a means of overcoming the sensational headlines, news stories, reports and fictional programs by the press, television and radio. All that the industry, from operators thru distributors and manufacturers, would like to see and hear would be truthful and factual reports of the individuals connected with the coin machine business, as well as the industry as a whole.

However, as is well known by the industry's members, the isolated unfavorable items are always blown out of proportion by the press—and used as an example of what the entire industry is purported to be. No matter what facts are used by industry members to refute these highly exaggerated and untruthful newspaper and TV stories, the industry continues to be unfairly smeared.

These heartbreaking and aggravating conditions are well known to all in our industry, and we bring the subject up again because we have found a means of eliminating the bad press. All that is necessary is that a fund of many millions be gathered — then used to sponsor a big time TV program, and run full page ads in local newspapers.

The solution was vividly pointed up by the television editor of the New York World Telegram, Harriet Van Horne, who reviewed a Playhouse 90 play "Judgment at Nuremberg" in the April 17 issue. Miss Van Horne outlines the story: The trial of several Nazis for war crimes. Threaded thruout the scenes were films made by the United States Army Signal Corps giving full views of the gas chambers and the crematory ovens

and the horrors of concentration camps. Miss Van Horne writes that during the play it was obvious that "words had been erased from the sound tape." In the final scene, Miss Van Horne states "In the course of a brilliant, bitter denunciation of the Nazis, Mr. Rains listed some of their more heinous crimes. And suddenly, for a brief but devilishly irritating moment, his lips moved, his face scowled, his teeth clenched—and no sound came.

"What were the awful words erased from this ringing indictment of the most savage, barbaric era in history? Were they obscene? Had the State Department requested their deletion?

"A few phone calls after the show uncovered the words. They were 'gas chambers.' Improper? Of course! Improper because one of the sponsors of Playhouse 90 is the American Gas Assn.

"The sponsor didn't actually request this deletion', a CBS spokesman related with understandable reluctance. 'But the network had assured the gas people some time ago there'd be no unpleasant references to gas on the show, ever. No suicides or explosions. I guess it felt that omitting all mention of gas chambers was simply honoring that agreement'".

So, it seems to us that if the coin machine industry was to sponsor some big time TV show, as well as running full page ads in the newspapers, it would be possible to have the industry given a fair shake—at least have an honest attempt made to determine the actual facts.

"How are we going to get these millions?", you ask. That's simple! Just ask those reporters who have been writing about the zillion dollar coin machine industry.

Celler Bill (HR5921) Before House Judiciary Sub-Committee. **Operators In Congressional Districts** Of Committee Members Urged To Write Short Letter In **Opposition Of Bill**

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Edwin E. Willis (D. La.), chairman of the House Judiciary sub-committee on Copyrights, informed the juke box industry that hearings on the Celler Bill (H.R. 5921) will be held on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, May 20, 21 and 22, in this city.

In addition to chairman Willis, the House committee is made up of Jack Brooks, Texas; William M. Tuck, Virginia; Roland V. Libonati, Illinois (Chicago area); William C. Cramer, Florida and John V. Lindsay, New York.

York.
The Celler Bill (H.R. 5921) would simply remove from the Copyright Act of 1909 the exemption granted operators of coin operated machines from the payment of royalties; and require juke box operators "to pay royalty fees for the use of the musical property of composers authors and

property of composers, authors, and copyright owners."

Those familiar with ASCAP's efforts of other years will recognize the Celler Bill as similar to a number of others introduced in the past.

These bills, and the current Celler Bill, would give the collection agen-cies the right to impose a royalty of whatever dimensions they feel like, and then could raise them year after

and then could raise them year after years died there.
of similar nature which have been introduced into committee in previous year at their own volition. All bills Witnesses for the juke box industry are now being alerted to appear in Washington, and they will present their opposition to the Celler Bill.

The drama is reputed to have been inspired by the recent Senate committee investigation of the juke committee investigation of the juke box industry.

Bob Costello, producer of the Armstrong Circle Theatre, in a discussion with The Cash Box, advised that story is based on the infiltration of a hoodlum group to the detriment of a legitimate operator in a small town. Nowhere in the story, he stated, will the juke box industry be maligned. Costello feels that the honest and legitimate operator will benefit by this drama, as it points out the conditions under which certain operating areas were adversely affected thru the mechanizations of gangsters and hoodlum controlled unions.

Producer Costello acknowledged

Producer Costello acknowledged that evidence provided during his preparation of the TV show indicated that the large majority of juke box operators were hard working, honest business men, and that just a fringe group of gangsters has infiltrated into the business. To further strengthen this fact, Costello stated that Senator John McClellan, chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Improper Activities in the Labor or Management Field, will make a state-

ment at the conclusion of the drama to the effect that the juke box indus-try is a legitimate business, being harassed by undesirable elements and hoodlum run unions, with only a certain small number of illegitimate characters in the business.







For the benefit of any other operator who might come across a situation like this, (and you can never tell!), here are official electricity costs for operating a juke box, as furnished by the Consolidated Edison Company, this city. If the kilowatt hour costs are different in your area, merely make this adjustment in figuring the total costs of electricity.

Figured at an average cost of 4¢ per kilowatt hour:

Juke operates for 8 hrs., cost per day, .0832¢, cost per month, \$2.49.

Juke on 8 hrs. standby, cost per day, .04¢, cost per month, \$1.20.

Juke operates for 6 hrs., cost per day, .0824¢, cost per month, \$2.47.

Juke on 6 hrs. standby, cost per day, .030¢, cost per month, \$0.90.

Figured at an average cost of 5¢ per kilowatt hour:

Juke operates for 8 hrs., cost per day, .104¢, cost per month, \$3.12.

Juke on 8 hrs. standby, cost per day, .05¢, cost per month, \$1.50.

Juke operates for 6 hrs., cost per day, .078¢, cost per month, \$2.34.

Juke on 6 hrs. standby, cost per

day, .0375¢, cost per month, \$1.12.





