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ROCK AND ROLL IS NOT OUT... BUT LOOK WHAT'S IN

It's been quite some time now since we've heard anyone say that rock and roll is on its way out. Everyone seems to agree that the rock and roll form of music is definitely not a passing fancy but a clearly defined piece of Americana that has made its impression on musical history.

Rock and roll simply is NOT OUT. But look what's IN.

In the past few months some of the strangest records have met with such tremendous success that even the people in the industry find it hard to believe.

In the midst of a rock and roll indoctrinated era, we see hitting right before our very eyes: "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" by the three hundred plus voices of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir accompanied by the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Eugene Ormandy; the touching number one hit "Three Bells" which 99 and 44/100% of the top brains in the pop music field must have tagged, when the disk was released, as a record which "couldn't" make it; Johnny Horton's stupendous "Battle of New Orleans," a historical folk song by

a country singer; and the heavy "I Loves You Porgy" by Nina Simone.

Add to this such other non-rock and roll successes as "Mack The Knife," "Broken Hearted Melody," novelties such as "The Battle Of Kookamonga," "High Hopes," "Ragtime Cowboy Joe," and lush ballads without the big beat such as "Smile," "Small World," and "Don't You Know," (an adaptation of a Puccini aria from "La Boheme"), and a German song called "Morgen," and you must recognize that the record buying public, although it wants its rock and roll music in heavy doses, is willing to buy an off-beat, far-out, or, if you will, a left-field recording.

It is these change-of-pace waxings which breathe new life and excitement into the entire record industry and at the same time bring new customers into the record shops.

The record buyer is wide open for any exciting new sound, gimmick or idea. So let us not discount any unusual recording because it is not in vogue. The business needs such waxings and the new talent which such recordings bring into the business.

DINAH WASHINGTON (Mercury 71508)

● The one-time Nat Cole success, "Unforgettable," gets that "What A Difference A Day Makes" touch from the stylist, giving song a beautiful, strong chart come-back. Warm and lovely instrumental setting. "Nothing In The World" (sometimes a reminder of "Maybe You'll Be There") receives a similar approach. Might be active.

JOHNNY MATHIS (Columbia 41483)

● We picture the songster making chart news with both of his new sides. The tender melodic, "The Story Of Our Love," is handled with typical Mathis gentleness and the same goes for his essay on the oft-cut "Misty" (taken from his smash "Heavenly" LP).

THE MYSTICS (Laurie 3038)

● Toss up the Mystics' latest Laurie coupling and you'll come up a winner either end. There are enough commercial features packed into "Don't Take The Stars" and "So Tenderly" to make 'em natural chart follow-ups to their "Hushabye" smasher. They're two ear-arresting, upbeat romancers that should be well on their way in no time flat.

"CHILDHOOD SWEETHEART" (2:35)
[Arc, Chuck Berry BMI—Anderson]

"BROKEN ARROW" (2:25) [Arc, Chuck Berry BMI—Anderson,]

CHUCK BERRY (Chess 1737)

● The next two big chart-riders bearing the Chuck Berry tag are sure to be "Childhood Sweetheart" and "Broken Arrow". On the former, a shufflin'-blueser, Chuck, along with a vocal crew, does an inviting bit of sentimentalizing. On the latter, an Indian-flavored novelty with a catchy rock-beat, Chuck is surrounded by a host of vocal and musical tricks. Like 'em both for that two-market action.

"YOU WENT BACK ON YOUR WORD" (2:27)
[Raleigh-Progressive BMI—Benton, Stevenson]

"THERE YOU GO" (2:40) [Progressive BMI—Ertegun, Wexler]

CLYDE MCPHATTER (Atlantic 2038)

● McPhatter's days with Atlantic should produce another strong pop-R&B item in "You Went Back On Your Word" (the last one: "Since You've Been Gone"). Session displays talent in contagious rhythm light, and should delight big beat folks. "There You Go" is a belting blueser that could make an important R&B stand.

"ANGEL IN THE RAIN" (2:33) [Tryton BMI—Sedaka, Grenfield]

"THE FIRST SIGNS OF LOVE" (2:15) [Rush BMI—Shapiro, Mann]

FOUR COINS (Epic 9337)

● Songsters have sturdy ballad material to work with on "Angel In The Rain" and hard-hitting rendition of tune seems to measure-up to a chart stand. There might be sales news also coming from the attractive "The First Signs Of Love" (material is a solid teen romantic, too). Lush rock-a-string arrangements backs on both takes.

KEENOS

(Lark 4513)

B+ "CATWALK" (1:50) [Jendar—Chambers, Beckelheimer, Embry, Hicks] Exciting instrumental-vocal. Guitars offer an earthy beat while songsters chant, clap and a "cat" meows in the background. Well worth keeping in mind.

B "KEENO BOOGIE" (1:59) [Jendor Hicks] All-instrumental and a socko affair at that. Fine teen dance entry.

JOHNNY WALSH

(Vista 350)

B+ "SO I'LL NEVER" (2:45) [Ardmore ASCAP—Ross] Fine ballad is read with understanding by songster Walsh. Strings and femme chorus create a strong teen-beat setting. Can succeed.

B "MY DARLING, WHY?" (1:36) [Walt Disney ASCAP—Ross, Walsh] Interesting rhythm on this session.

DON SCHROEDER

(Vee-Jay 327)

B+ "MELANIE" (2:14) [Tollie BMI—Schroeder] The warbler gives the name-song the teen warmth it deserves. Kind of sentimental that can go places.

B+ "BEN, EDDIE AND MC GEE" (2:10) [Tollie BMI—Lee] Schroeder works closely with femme larks to produce this fast-moving affair. Sounds to eye also.

FRANKIE VAUGHAN

(Columbia 41480)

B+ "I AIN'T GONNA LEAD THIS LIFE NO MORE" (2:16) [Count ASCAP—Drake] A happy folk-type number is taken for a merry, hand-clap ride. English songster Vaughan works in front of a bright Ivor Raymonde ork-chorus setting. It's got to be watched.

B "THE HEART OF A MAN" (1:43) [Shapiro, Bernstein ASCAP—Cochrane, Roberts] A semi-dramatic bit of philosophy from a pic of the same name. Wally Stott directs the ork here.

JOHNNY WELLS

(Astor 1001)

B+ "LONELY MOON" (2:30) [Parker BMI—Christian, Zellers] Intriguing pounding beat supports Perry Como-sounding Wells on the haunting ballad. A string section effectively enters the picture about half-way down. Could be a smash.

B "THE ONE AND ONLY ONE" (2:10) [Vernon ASCAP—Parker, Philip] An easy romantic essay and again Wells is close to Como.

WILDER BROS.

(Personality 1003)

B+ "THE TALE OF THE HIP ROOSTER (Sugar Blues)" (2:23) [Pickwick ASCAP—Williams, Fletcher] The "tale" is told mostly with cackles, though the guy & gal "birds" manage some exchange of words. Item is zany enough to attract loads of attention—especially with the humor jocks. One of the initial entries on Buck Ram's new diskery.

B "DREAM WORLD" (2:00) [A.M.C. ASCAP—Weidler, Ram] A lead takes over on the pleasing ballad. Falsetto femme backs-up.

GEORGE SMITH

(Barbary Coast 1002)

B+ "BESS YOU IS MY WOMAN" [ASCAP—Gershwin] Fine introspective reading of the "Porgy & Bess" gem by guitarist Smith, who is assisted by soft chants from thrush Lynn Gold. Different "P&B" fare for the jocks.

B "FANTASY ON 'BLACK IS THE COLOR OF MY TRUE LOVE'S HAIR'" [Barbary BMI—Everett, Smith, Shushan] Smith is sensitive on the lovely folk tune and again Miss Gold backs-up. Both takes come from Smith's "The Exciting Guitar Sounds Of George Smith."

MARION WORTH

(Cherokee 503)

C+ "ARE YOU WILLING WILLIE" (2:30) [Golden River BMI—Worth] Thrush is tenderly multi-tracked on the sentimental waltzer. Soft triplets stick-out in the setting.

C+ "THIS HEART OF MINE" (2:39) [Golden River BMI—Wilson] More in a teen-romantic way here.

VERN EDWARDS

(Probe 100)

B "COOL, BABY, COOL" (2:05) [Mona BMI—Coan, Dennis, Davis] Edwards belts and combo companions give him sock support. Fine for hop spins.

C+ "GLENDA" (3:16) [Mona BMI—Dennis] Affectionate turn here. The Charmettes warble on support.

JANE HARVEY

(Signature 12007)

B "I'M GONNA GO FISHIN'" (2:22) [Fred Raphael ASCAP—Ellington, Lee] A lyric version (by Peggy Lee) of a Duke Ellington theme from the "Anatomy Of A Murder" flick is handled with a good blues touch by the stylist. A rasping sound highlights the inventive, deliberate beat from the Don Elliot combo. Of interest to the cooler jocks.

B "A HUNDRED DREAMS FROM NOW" (2:44) [Vernon ASCAP—Ellington, Burke] Fine wistful warbling on another Ellington tune with lyrics by Johnny Burke. Billy Strayhorn's on the ork directing job here.

CRASH CRADDOCK (Columbia 41470)

● Crash Craddock demonstrates, via this Columbia outing, that he has the talent to justify the tremendous send-off the diskery is giving him. Crash sings with heartfelt sincerity as he carves out a potent, beat-ballad romantic pleader tabbed "Don't Destroy Me." Flip's an enticing rock-a-handclapper dubbed "Boom Boom Baby." Top end has that smash look. Could be a top ten'er. Watch it!

"LIZA JANE" (2:05) [Arc BMI—Arr: Hawkins]

"BACK TO SCHOOL BLUES" (2:15) [Arc BMI—Mascari, Hawkins]

DALE HAWKINS (Checker 934)

● Dale Hawkins can have his biggest money-maker to date in this intriguing rock and roll adaptation of the old folk favorite, "Liza Jane". Bright vocal team-work by Dale and chorus, along with a sock musical backdrop, makes this a cinch for r&r honors. However, don't overlook the zany "Back To School Blues" rocker that Dale and the group wax on the flip portion. Can be a back-to-back winner.

"IT COULD BE" (2:15) [Trinity-Desert Palms BMI—Baker, Greenlee]

"FANCY NANCY" (1:47) [Trinity-Desert Palms BMI—Paxton, Battin]

SKIP & FLIP (Brent 7005)

Announcement of the tribute to Youngstein was made last week by honorary co-chairmen Barney Balaban, president of Paramount Pictures; Harry Brandt, president of Brandt Theatres, and William German, president of W. J. German, Inc.

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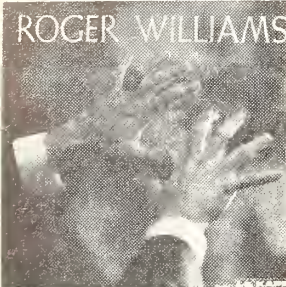

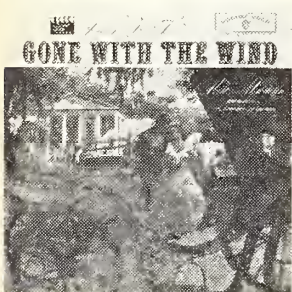
"WITH THESE HANDS"—Roger Williams—Kapp KL 1147 & Stereo KS 3030

America's angry young man in comedian guise delivers another blistering, hilarious attack on his favorite subjects: the world situation, religion, politics, doctors and sex. This session was recorded in performance and the audience responds faithfully. Sahl's huge reputation, though his humor is at times "way out," should attract sizeable sales.

Twenty years have passed since "Gone With the Wind" opened for the first time. As memorable and exciting as the picture was the score composed by Max Steiner. Here it is given its most complete recording, beginning with the now famous "Tara's Theme" on through the various characters and incidents and ending with the grandiose "Return To Tara," a reprise of the opening. Great music from a great film, performed magnificently.

Miss Kitt's personable charm and youthful exuberance is wrapped up in a dynamic performance of material which shows off the best of her abilities. She romps vivaciously through "Love Is A Gamble," "I'd Rather Be Burned As A Witch," "Independent" and her new single release, "Shalom." Entire session provides a thrilling musical experience.



"JOE REISMAN SALUTES THE ALL-TIME INSTRUMENTAL FAVORITES"—Roulette R 25082 (Monaural & Stereo)

Utilizing the identical arrangements of the original hit versions, Reisman's ork and chorus pay tribute to a dozen memorable instrumentals, some of which ("Theme From Moulin Rouge," "Yellow Rose Of Texas") are not entirely instrumentals. Other outstanding hits included here are "Ruby," "Poor People Of Paris," "Ebbtide," "Blue Tango" and "Canadian Sunset." An appealing assemblage of fine music.



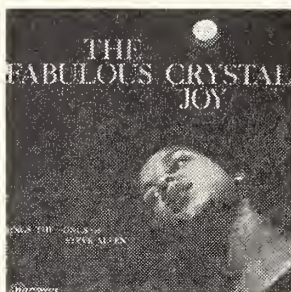
"DANCE PARTY"—Ralph Marterie and his Marlboro Men—Mercury SR 60004 (Monaural & Stereo)

Infectious teen dance session is presented by the Marterie band. Playing in the solidly thumping, hard rock beat that the kids go for, Marterie pulls a switch from his subdued swing manner of the past. Among the selections are "Tequilla," "Torero," "Tricky" and "Night Stroll." Good teen attraction.



"MARK TWAIN TONIGHT"—Hal Holbrook—Columbia OL 5440

Hal Holbrook's award-winning characterization of Mark Twain in a one man show of uproarious monologues charmed and delighted audiences during the past New York theatre season. On stage Twain comes to life visually and aurally and though the visual advantage is absent on this on-the-spot recording, Holbrook still manages a vivid portrayal of the humorist. The six monologues include "On Smoking," "My Encounter with an Interviewer" and "How To Be Seventy." Hilarious album.



"THE FABULOUS CRYSTAL JOY"—Hanover M 8002

Miss Joy makes her recording bow and through her warm approach to the twelve Steve Allen-penned tunes she displays evidence of being one of the better new singers on the pop scene. She's bright and brassy on the swingers and sensitive on the ballads, with a way of intimately wrapping her voice sensually around a lyric. Tunes include "Impossible," "This Could Be The Start of Something," "Count on Me" and "The Best Time of Day." Impressive debut with promise of even better things to come.



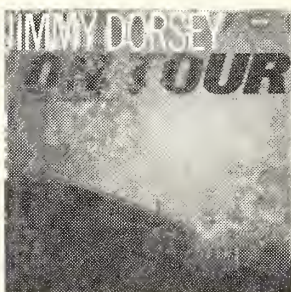
"A THINKING MAN'S BAND"—Si Zentner and his Orchestra—Liberty LST 7133 (Monaural & Stereo)

The swinging Zentner band plays with driving zest heard usually only in the big jazz groups. As a pop dance band this feeling distinguishes it as outstanding in its field. The arrangements are clear and uncluttered and are jazz-oriented, with sufficient solo room interspersed throughout. But mainly the band is a powerful cohesive unit. Although Stang has altered the narrations to fit his own distinctive style, the music, directed by Herbert Haufrecht, remains faithful to the originals. Wonderful kiddie special.



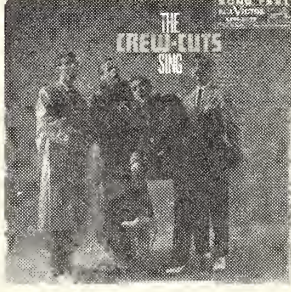
"JIMMY DORSEY ON TOUR"—Lee Castle and the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra—Epic LN 3579

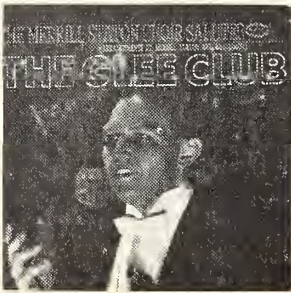
"DREAMSVILLE"—Lola Albright—Columbia CL 1327 (Monaural & Stereo)

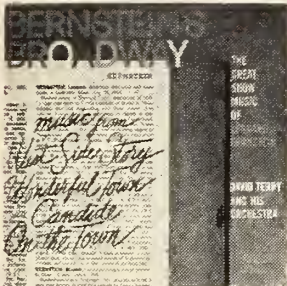


"THE MERRILL STATON CHOIR SALUTES THE GLEE CLUB"—Epic LN 3583 (Monaural & Stereo)

"BERNSTEIN'S BROADWAY" — David Terry and his Orchestra—Warner Bros. B 1325 & Stereo BS 1325

A tribute to the pop writing talents of Leonard Bernstein is paid by David Terry, who has arranged four medleys of selections from Bernstein's four Broadway shows—"West Side Story," "Wonderful Town," "On The Town" and "Candide." The performances are refreshing and imaginative yet remain faithfully respectful to the music's original form. A capsule look at one aspect of a great talent.



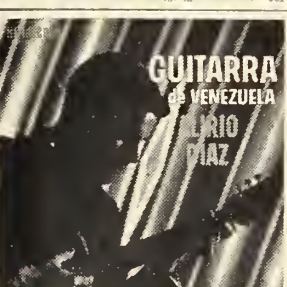
"SONGS OF BATTLE"—The Ralph Hunter Choir—RCA Victor LPM 1996 & Stereo LSP 1996

The Ralph Hunter choir, resembling here a massed chorus, performs a concert of the most famous American war songs. Six medleys; songs from the American Revolution, Civil War, World War I, World War 2, official armed forces songs and an opening army medley, comprise the album. They are rousing read with brash assistance from a marching band-oriented ork directed by Sid Bass. Spirited, sentimental sing-along set.



"AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOLS SING AMERICAN FOLK SONGS"—Request RLP 8036 (Monaural & Stereo)

A wonderful and valuable collection of Americana has been gathered by the label here. Seventeen high school choirs each have contributed one selection to this assortment of American folk songs. Clearly evident—and making for enjoyable listening—is the youthful vitality set in an atmosphere of measured informality which distinguishes such groups. Of collector's item stature.



"GUITARRA DE VENEZUELA"—Alirio Diaz—Hifi R 812

This album was recorded in Venezuela where Diaz reigns as one of the country's leading concert guitarists. In this session, his first for American audiences, he plays a bill composed of both folk and classical items, among which are two Bach violin pieces transposed for guitar. Diaz demonstrates a precise, measured approach, playing intelligently and maturely, apparently choosing his notes carefully and without haste. He is an artist of unflinching taste.



"OSCAR PETERSON PLAYS MY FAIR LADY"—The Oscar Peterson Trio—Verve MG V-2119

Although late on the "Fair Lady" jazz version scene, Peterson's magnificently inventive interpretations of seven numbers from the great score stand out as being one of the best of the lot. His piano playing encompasses earthy drive, humor, passion and an uncanny ability to communicate intimately with the listener. Ray Brown's bass is, as usual, a "talking" delight and Gene Gammage on drums, replacing guitarist Herb Ellis, sets up a driving beat. Great set.



"THE COOLEST MIKADO"—The Gilbert & Sullivan Jazz Workshop—ADEX 26101 & Stereo 27101

The familiar melodies of "The Mikado" are cleverly cast into a cool jazz mold and the session comes off as a highly imaginative, swinging one. Jack Fascinato has utilized unique instrumentation in arranging the date, casting such instruments as french horn, trombone, vibes, flute, guitar in the roles of the show's principals. Hip liner notes and displayable cover add to deck's sales attractiveness.

CLASSICAL PICKS OF THE WEEK



"PRESENTING JAIME LAREDO"—Jaime Laredo, violin — RCA Victor LM 2373 & Stereo LSC 2373

Laredo, 18 year old winner of the Queen Elizabeth competition in Brussels, performs masterfully in his debut album. In some of the standards of violin literature such as Bach's "Air On the G-String," Vivaldi's "Sonata No. 2" and Sarasate-Zimbalist's "Carmen Fantasie," Laredo demonstrates an unusually large tone, great technical facility and good musical intelligence. Excellence of this LP should spread rapidly.



BRAHMS: "Symphony No. 1 in C Minor"—Concertgebouw Orchestra of Amsterdam, Eduard Van Beinum, Conductor—Epic LC 3603 (Monaural & Stereo)

A searching, illuminating performance by the late conductor. The orchestra responds beautifully to Van Beinum's sensitive direction as Brahms' complex score is unfolded with complete spontaneity. A rich testament by a profound musician, which will enrich any collection.

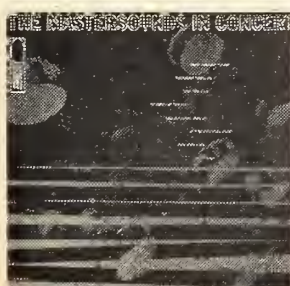
"JAMAL AT THE PENTHOUSE"—Ahmad Jamal Trio with strings—Argo LP 646

The Jamal trio, an example of the studied, tasteful approach to jazz which has made it so popular with American audiences, is backed here by a 15 piece string choir directed by Joe Kennedy. The strings are mainly used to quietly support the pianist's intelligently constructed melodic improvisations. Israel Crosby (bass) and Vernell Fournier (drums) are, as usual, a wonderfully capable rhythm duo. Strong sales are guaranteed.



"HAVE TRUMPET, WILL EXCITE"—Dizzy Gillespie—Verve MG V-8313

Eight evergreens provide Gillespie with a framework, within which he demonstrates his amazing lyrical improvisational ability. Playing both muted and open horn, Dizzy's articulate expression never ceases to astound. His rhythm section cooks at unceasingly torrid pace. Included are "Woody'n You," "My Heart Belongs To Daddy" and "My Man." Every Gillespie session becomes increasingly important.



"THE MASTERSOUNDS IN CONCERT"—World Pacific WP 1269

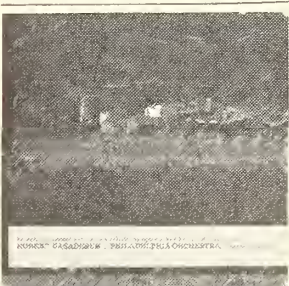
Its last album, "Ballad & Blues," brought recognition to the group as a major new jazz voice, and this date, recorded in live concert continues the group's invasion of jazz territory once the exclusive property of the MJQ. Using primarily the same instrumentation as the MJQ, they exhibit an exquisite lyric quality, sensitive and delicate, yet swing unself-consciously. Can happen commercially.

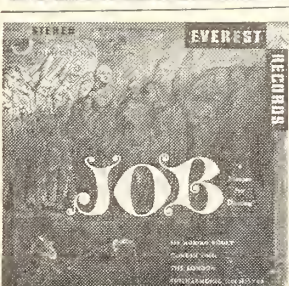

The noted French pianist offers authoritative performances in both works, which he has performed many times publicly. Ormandy and his men provide an expressive landscape through which the piano moves. A thoroughly enjoyable listening item.



VAUGHAN WILLIAMS: "Job" — The London Philharmonic Orchestra, Sir Adrian Boult, Conductor—Everest SDBR 3019 (Monaural & Stereo)

Sir Adrian Boult, known for his definitive performances of Vaughan William's music, offers a thoroughly understanding performance of this consistently interesting work. This particular "Job" is essentially ballet music based on poet William Blake's engravings which were in turn inspired by the original biblical "Job". Will appeal to lovers of both modern and 'program' music.

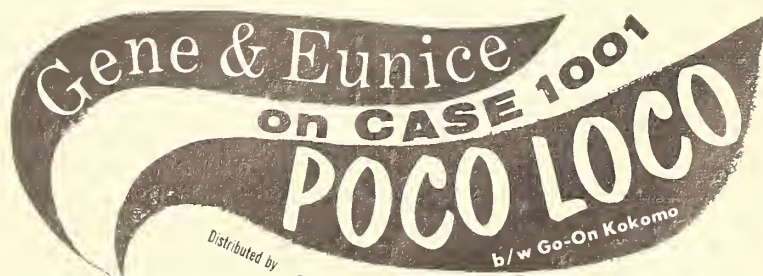

Also in the offing are further "Grandpa Magic" adventures which have already been waxed by Ed Wynn. Featured on the Wynn albums are Peter Keepnews and Debbie Paris.

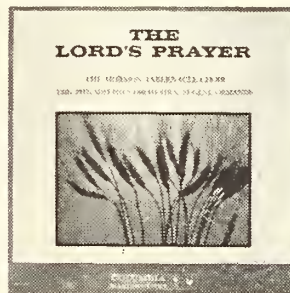

Capitol Gets "Fiorello" Original Cast LP

NEW YORK—Capitol Records will release an original cast album of the forthcoming Broadway musical comedy, "Fiorello," based on the colorful career of former New York City mayor, the late Fiorello La Guardia. Last Capitol show album was "The Music Man," a smash seller.

Announcement of Capitol's acquisition of one of the prizes of the upcoming Broadway season was made last week by the company's A&R vice

president, Lloyd W. Dunn, who said that Capitol will launch the album with "just about the biggest promotion the industry has ever seen." The album, which will be produced by A&R men Dick Jones and Andy Wiswell, will be recorded in Capitol's New York studios within a week after "Fiorello's" New York opening Nov. 23, at the Broadhurst Theater, and will be released shortly thereafter.

In addition to recording the original-cast album, Capitol, in the next few weeks, will release at least four single records of music from "Fiorello," recorded by some of the label's top artists.

"Fiorello" is being staged on Broadway by the same team that produced such past hits as "Pajama Game" and "Damn Yankees," Griffith and Prince. Book is by Jerome Weidman, with music by Jerry Bock and lyrics by Sheldon Harnick. Peter Gennaro is choreographer. The show stars Tom Bosley (as Fiorello), Pat Wilson, Ellen Hanley, Howard De Sylva, Pat Stanley, and Mark Dawson.

"Fiorello" went into rehearsal last week (14) and will have pre-Broadway runs in New Haven on Oct. 17 and Philadelphia on Oct. 27.

In commenting on Dunn's announcement, Capitol's vice president for sales and merchandising, J. K. Maitland, indicated that, although he was unable at this time to disclose Capitol's plans for promoting the "Fiorello" album, the campaign planned is "perhaps the most ambitious in the company's history. Naturally, we faced intense competition in getting the show, and we intend to make it fully as successful as our last big Broadway hit, 'The Music Man.'"

Roulette's Reisman Cutting Click Dates

NEW YORK—Joe Reisman, who has just rounded out six months at his new spot as Roulette Records' A&R chief, is giving a solid chart account of himself.

Under his aegis, the label has come up with such successes as the Playmates' "What Is Love," Mickey Mozart's "Little Dipper," Ronnie Hawkins' "Forty Days" and "Mary Lou," and Jimmie Rodgers' "Ring-A-Ling-A-Lario." Currently, he has come up with two new fast-breaking decks, Rodgers' "Tumcumcari" and the Rock-A-Teens' "Woo-Hoo."

Since his arrival, Reisman has taken sharp aim at broadening Roulette's album program and giving certain artists the opportunity of widening their scope by making a marked departure from the type of material they had been cutting. The album expansion has seen the production of over fifty albums, twenty of which he has personally supervised and produced. Aside from his A&R chores, the exec has maintained a heavy schedule of writing arrangements for the recording sessions as well as acting as musical director and conductor on dates.

One of the diskery's leading sellers in its fall LP release is "Joe Reisman Salutes the All-Time Instrumental Favorites," which features Reisman conducting original arrangements of top instrumental clicks over the last decade. Morrie Price of Arnold distributes in Chicago, reported that because of dealer calls on this album, he was declaring October as "Joe Reisman Month" in his area; the label added that it was lining up other distributors to initiate this same type of concentrated promotion.

Due this week is a Reisman instrumental which he wrote: "Lady Chatterly's Lover."

Following his final recording session last week, Reisman headed for the West Coast to record a Christmas album with Jimmie Rodgers before the latter departs for his scheduled tour of Australia. While on the Coast, Reisman will also record two new Hawaiian albums and an LP with new vocal group he has just signed, the Dick Lane Quartet.

French Star To Monitor

NEW YORK—Monitor Records announced last week that French actor-singer Yves Montand has recorded an album for the label which will be one of the diskery's featured September releases, issued to coincide with Montand's appearance at Henry Miller's Theatre in New York, September 22.

The album, "Chansons Populaires de France," was recorded in France and features Montand singing twelve French pop and folk songs.

NEW YORK—A reorganization of Columbia's Popular Artists and Repertoire Department has been announced by Goddard Lieberson, president of the company.

"Columbia Records has developed the most creative and successful Popular A & R group in the industry. Each member of our distinguished Staff is an experienced, trained musician. I want these inventive people to be free to spend full time and energy in creative activity. This can best be done by removing from A & R producers their sometimes-burdensome executive and administrative responsibilities. Henceforth, they will all function as members of a company-wide Artists and Repertoire Staff (including the Masterworks Department), reporting directly to me. Each A & R Staff member will continue to act as an independent producer of album and single material, each working with an assigned group of artists.

"Administrative operations in the Popular Department will be assigned to a newly-designated Coordinator of Artists and Repertoire, who will assume all responsibility for the technical operation of the Department, for integrating recording plans and scheduling releases.

"I am happy to announce the appointment of Stanley Kavan to the position of Coordinator for Popular Artists and Repertoire. He has been associated with Columbia for more than ten years and has worked closely

with the Popular Department since 1956. This previous administrative experience qualifies him admirably for this new post.

"The Popular Artists and Repertoire Staff will now be structured as follows:

"On the East Coast, the Popular Staff will include: Executive Producer Mitch Miller; Staff Producers Al Ham, Teo Macero, Ernest Altschuler, Tony Piano and Bob Morgan. Newly added to this group will be Howard Scott, who will function as producer of material for both Popular and Masterworks albums.

"Don Law will continue to operate as roving Country and Western Producer.

"A new alignment of the West Coast Staff will bring both Irving Townsend and Percy Faith from New York to Hollywood. The West Coast Staff will now include: Executive Producer Irving Townsend; Staff Producers Percy Faith, Frank De Vol and Allan Emig.

"Also serving on the Staff will be Nat Shapiro, Coordinator for International Repertoire, representing material recorded by Columbia or its affiliates throughout the world.

"Columbia's Popular A & R group has already helped to achieve for the company the largest sales in its history. We believe these organizational realignments will permit even greater growth."

Eversong Single On Seeco

NEW YORK—Sidney Siegel, president of Seeco Records, announced last week that he is releasing two sides from the Leny Eversong album, "Ca C'est L'Amour" and "I Want To Be Happy," as a single.

Siegel stated that "heavy and enthusiastic disk jockey play on the album prompted him to issue a single."

According to Siegel, the Eversong album enjoyed a relatively moderate sale during the first five weeks after its release until a recent issue of Time magazine reviewed Miss Eversong's performance at the Thunderbird Hotel in Las Vegas and likened her to Mildred Bailey. Since then disclosed Siegel, orders have come in for almost 18,000 copies and it is now the fastest moving item in the Seeco catalog.

Epic & Alpine In Talent Hunt

Already signed to Epic are c&w artists Fred Neal and Bobby Sykes.

Bobby Vinton is touring major markets for Alpine and has signed two new groups to the label: Bud and Ray, an instrumental group from Washington, D. C. and a folk-singing group from Canada called the Rebels.

2 Roulette Distrib Changes

NEW YORK—Joe Kolsky, executive vice-president of Roulette Records, announced last week two new distributor changes which became effective.

Flash Distributing Co. was named as the label's new outlet in Phoenix, Arizona, which was formerly covered by M. B. Krupp. The Flash Distributing set-up will be managed by Joe English. The Krupp distributing firm will continue as Roulette's outlet in El Paso.

The second change was the appointment of H. W. Daily as the diskery's new distributor in Houston. This area was formerly handled by United Record Distributors.

CHICAGO—Blues singer Bill Henderson has been pacted with Abner Records, it was announced last week. The label will soon be releasing Henderson on an LP and a single, "Moanin'."

The artist, formerly with Blue Note, recently completed an engagement at the Cotton Club in Atlantic City along with Miles Davis and the Three Sounds.

Jolly Joyce Sets All-Star Show

TORONTO—Talent agency head Jolly Joyce announced here last week that he is setting up a theatre, ballroom and arena tour for his latest package, "The All-Star Million Record Sellers Review." Show features Bill Haley, & His Comets, the 3 Browns, Frank Virtue & His Virtues and Dave "Baby" Cortez.

The tour starts October 3 at the State Theatre in Hartford, Conn. and continues through New England, the eastern states, the mid-west and south, closing on October 25.

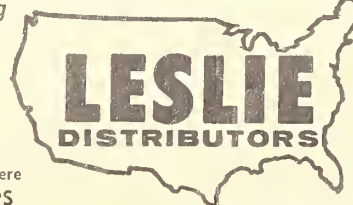

Operator Pleads For Stereo Singles

PIERRE, S. D.—Gordon Stout, Gordon Stout Company, this city, well known operator of juke boxes, writes the following letter to The Cash Box in which he registers his complaints about the stereo singles problem. Says Stout:

"This is a plea for help to get the phonograph people on their job in the field of stereophonic sound singles record production. I am making this plea in behalf of the entire juke box industry as well as for myself. I am getting out of patience with the obvious stalling and still almost nil production in this field after all the glowing promises that were made and are still being made about the future of stereo. I refuse to accept the suggestion that lack of distributor dealer demand for stereo in the singles field has been holding up production.

"I like this new Stereophonic sound. I started placing new stereo juke boxes on my better locations as soon as they were available. While at first but a few test records, old classics and such were all that was available in the new sound, I found that even the Hi-Fi-ionic recordings sounded better when played on the new dual amplification and separated sound machines. For that reason I kept right on changing to the new stereo sound. I now have 70 of these new units on location. I started making these changes last November. What peeves me is I'm still waiting and even begging for stereo sound recording of new hit singles.

"I don't know very much about distribution and retail selling of recorded music but I do know that most retail stores order but very few records until Juke Box and Disk Jockey reports start coming in that indicate hit potential. But why do we juke box operators and disk jockeys have to wait until a hit is established before we can have recordings in stereophonic sound? Even more exasperating, why do we juke box operators have to resort to EP's even then, with but very few exceptions? Is the reason because distributors and dealers prefer to sell EP and LP albums on account of the greater profit incentive? Frankly, this does appear to be the reason. If so, then who is left to help sell hit records that first must be established before sales of any kind can be profitable? Too, how can we who help make hit records help to sell this new sound unless it is made available to us in the new singles.

"Everyone knows that everything new must have exposure, demonstration and trial before profitable sales start rolling in. Therefore, my considered opinion, it is I am sure not necessarily because I am a juke box operator, that I feel juke boxes actually can and are doing the best job of presenting and proving the hit potential of new record releases. True, Disk Jockeys do a real good job of presenting and giving their own views as to the hit potential of new record releases but on Juke Boxes the listener must pay to hear the music play. Therefore, on juke boxes if a record continues to play, if it plays more than any other record in any given period of time, that is a hit record, at least in that location. If it does the same thing on juke boxes all over the nation a juke box survey should lead the way in proving the value of

new recording and at the same time it might very well be doing the same job for the new stereophonic sound. Juke Box operators buy records too, remember."

Wallichs Urges Support Of Live Music

OMAHA—Glenn E. Wallichs, president of Capitol Records, has urged Americans to rally in support of "live" music-making on the community-symphony level, or face the inevitable loss or our country's serious-music heritage.

As honored guest at a "Public Affairs Luncheon" sponsored by the Omaha Civic Music Association and Chamber of Commerce last week (15), the recording company executive, himself a native Nebraskan, spoke in celebration of the Omaha Symphony Orchestra's 13th concert season. Addressing over 400 of Omaha's business, civic and cultural leaders, Wallichs said:

"Ours is an age that boasts the highest standard of living for the greatest number of people in the history of the world. Here in America we have an expanding middle-class society in which almost every family has at least one car, a TV set, numerous electrical appliances, and above all, adequate leisure time. Yet our cultural standards today are at the point where . . . we think of music almost solely in terms of fads, personalities, and high-pressure salesmanship.

"In many respects, young people in countries like the Soviet Union find it easier to master difficult instruments for the simple reason that they face fewer distractions and diversions. Where there is no TV, no movies, no easy access to spending money, there is often more opportunity for concentration, application, dedication. The solution to this problem doesn't lie in abolishing present-day advantages—a step backward seldom contributes to real progress.

"The true solution is the building of desire—desire for accomplishment, for achievement. A symphony orchestra is the key to building this desire for accomplishment and achievement in our young people—the people upon whom the future of serious music and other cultural values depends."

On the subject of Rock & Roll, Wallichs commented:

"If your kids have shown an interest in this kind of music, you may be distressed about them. You shouldn't be. Their interest in Rock & Roll now is only one facet of a broader interest in all music. Interest, of itself, is normal and healthy. It needs only direction and incentive."

To dramatize his point, Wallichs utilized stereo recordings to preview an album called "The Art Of The Fugue," featuring performances by the American Federation of Musicians' "String Congress," a sixty-piece ensemble made up of boys and girls seventeen and under, and conducted by the well known American composer, Roy Harris. Said Wallichs:

"I think the album proves conclusively that the distance from Rock & Roll to Bach is much shorter than we might think—and it definitely shows what can be done by our young people when they have proper training and guidance. But we must face one fact. Older musical traditions will not go on unless they are carried on. It's up to us to pass along our musical heritage to our children—and the symphony orchestra is the one effective means we have for doing so."

In conclusion, he said:
"It is my sincere hope and belief that the Omaha Symphony Orchestra will be perpetuated for generations to come as a living source of culture and human values here in the heart of our great country."

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Columbia Launches Crash



NEW YORK—In an effort to establish Crash Craddock as the new teenage idol, Columbia Records in a joint effort with Craddock's manager Fred Koury this week launches one of the most extensive and complete promotional and advertising campaigns ever given a young performer. The entire campaign has been engineered by Dave Kapralik, Columbia's National Singles Merchandising Manager.

The campaign, which began with a series of teaser ads in trade papers, shifts into high gear when Craddock heads out on a seventeen major city "Meet Crash Craddock" reception tour timed with the release of his "Don't Destroy Me," "Boom Boom Baby" coupling.

The Craddock record will be housed in a special sleeve. On initial orders sent into areas where Craddock will be appearing, the disk will be inserted in a most attractive and interesting eight-page miniature record sized fan magazine. The merchandiser features a complete bio of the 19-year-old youngster and offers numerous photos of the lad from his childhood to the present. A standard illustrated consumer sleeve is being offered for all consumer stock.

Columbia is sending individualized tape messages from Craddock to numerous jockeys throughout the country.

A filmed performance of "Don't Destroy Me" is being distributed to 250 television deejay shows.

Huge quantities of 5 x 7 glossy photos are being given to each Columbia distributor for distribution to jockeys. Hundreds of thousands of 1 x 3 gummed back stickers with the slogan "I've Got a Crush On Crash" (in two colors) are being made available for fans.

Quantities of 2-inch by 4-inch "Crash" felt finished, adhesive backed miniature lapel banners for teenagers' jackets, loose-leaf books, etc., plus vast quantities of 8-inch by 10-inch offset photos will also be made available to fans.

Columbia has produced a tremendous number of huge, 2-color, 28-inch by 14-inch window posters featuring a photo of Craddock and open announcement space for details of his local in-person appearances or television performances to be placed in retail store windows throughout the country.

Other promotional material includes: illustrated fan club applications offering complete Crash Craddock Fan Club Kits; re-prints of the Columbia magazine "Insight" feature story on Craddock mailed directly to jockeys and dealers; and Columbia Disk Caddies for giveaways.

Columbia has groomed and tested the youngster's appeal at a number of hops and reports that teenage response to the lad is just fantastic. Last week, the lad made an appearance in Albany at the 100th Anniversary celebration of a department store, and it is reported that Crash took the town by storm (and his recording wasn't even available at the time).

Film companies have already approached the Craddock management to discuss contracts.

Until last August, Stere-O-Craft LP's were available only in stereo.

The company's executive-vice-president, Bill Prutting, said that there has been a strong reaction to the "Sightseeing In Sound" package, while Decca, who distributes the Stere-O-Craft line, last week reported "constant call" for the Braff set.

Liberty Buys New Buildings And Land On Sunset Blvd.

LOS ANGELES—Liberty Records has acquired the buildings and land at 6920 Sunset Blvd. from Gene Autry's Flying A Productions to provide expanded headquarters for the firm.

In the move to provide the most up-to-date facilities for home-office operations of the organization, treasurer Hal Linick, president Si Waronker and vice president Al Bennett have concluded negotiations for the property which incorporates 12,000 square feet of office space, plus a 4,000 foot studio.

Purchase price is reported to be more than \$250,000, with an additional allocation in excess of \$200,000 earmarked for renovations of the air-conditioned headquarters. Some 18,000 square feet of off-street parking space for Liberty's employees and customers is also included in the purchase.

Currently occupying quarters in Hollywood on North LaBrea Avenue which have proved inadequate to the demands of the company, Liberty will start its moveover to the new home office by mid-November.

The new building will provide quarters for Liberty's sales, accounting, A&R, recording, promotion, merchandising and engineering departments.

Expansion comes on the heels of Liberty's most successful sales drive, with the returns on the label's Fall Music Festival pointing towards a 100 per cent increase over last year's record breaker, Bennett revealed.

The rest of Evans' current itinerary includes personal appearances in Pittsburgh and Cleveland, TV shots in Buffalo with Pat Fagan and Bob Wells, to Rochester for a bit on Eddie Meath's premiere TV show, then hops and radio sessions in Syracuse and back to New York for a return engagement for Alan Freed, into Philadelphia for a Dick Clark'er on September 24, and then to Providence for a September 26 P.A. for Jack Spector.

"A primary objective of the group is to help create an awareness of the high professional qualifications and standards which are to be found in today's disk jockeys and music programmers. Membership applications are being accepted and are assured rapid processing."

The announcement carried the following statement by Bill Gavin, DJA secretary-treasurer:

"In spite of the glamour and excitement of participating in movie making, it should be emphasized that there is much important association business to be transacted at our meeting. Our full board of directors and a full slate of officers will be elected."

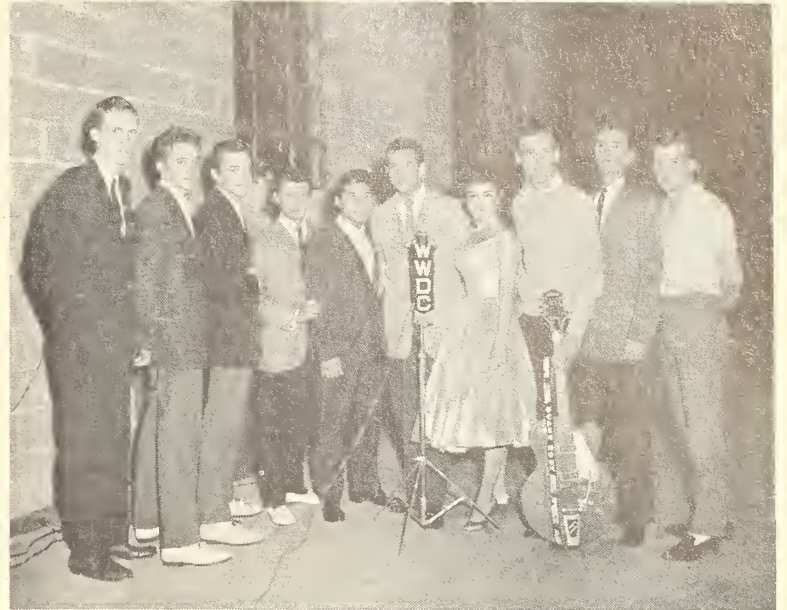
CHICAGO—John Doremus, WMAQ disk jockey, used a novel approach to acquire funds for the United Cerebral Palsy Foundation of Chicago.

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New Victor Pop LP's

NEW YORK — As part of RCA Victor's September Pop album schedule, last week's releases included albums by the Crew Cuts, Jesse Belvin, Don Gibson, and a jazz specialty by Rex Stewart and Dickie Wells.

The Crew Cuts' new recording, "The Crew Cuts Sing," features selections from the Twenties, nostalgic Tin Pan Alley tunes and traditional numbers.

The album represents a switch from the million-selling "Sh-Boom"-like singles which shot the Crew Cuts into national prominence a few years ago. Selections such as "My Gal Sal", "My Melancholy Baby", and "That Old Gang of Mine" are sung by the quartet to arrangements under Morty Jay's direction.

"Just Jesse Belvin" is the young singer's first album after successful singles on the Victor label. The recording is highlighted by a selection of standards such as "My Funny Valentine," "Love Is Here To Stay" and "I'm Afraid the Masquerade Is Over". As a change of pace, Belvin swings on "Alright, Okay, You Win" and "Take Me Back to the Island". The orchestras of Shorty Rogers, Ray Martin and Dennis Farnon are Belvin's backing on this album.

"Chatter Jazz" features the horns of two jazz artists, Rex Stewart (trumpet) and Dickie Wells (trombone). This is a light, sometimes humorous, sometimes tongue-in-cheek recording with interchanges between Stewart's and Wells' horns.

Additional Liberty plugs come from Joe London, pitching his "It Might Have Been," on his current p.a. sked, and via "The Fleetwoods" TV date on the Dick Clark Show on October 12. The latter group plugs their latest hit disk, "Mr. Blue," on the Dolton label.

Tops To Have Deejays As Singles Talent Scouts

LOS ANGELES — Tops Records, anxious to build a strong artist roster in conjunction with its entry into the singles field, has asked deejays to serve as talent scouts for the diskery.

Recognizing that the disk jockey has the best opportunity of being exposed to new local talent and is himself an excellent judge of this talent, Tops national promotion manager George Sherlock, is this month auditioning several artists in various areas of the country. These new people have been suggested by local disk spinners. Sherlock reports initial auditions have been "most gratifying."

According to Sherlock, any disk jockey who wishes Tops consider a particular talent should send any master or audition dub of the artist to Dave Pell, Tops A&R director at the record firm's western headquarters, 5810 S. Normandie Ave., Los Angeles 44, California. Disk jockeys in Philadelphia, Atlanta, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago and Baltimore are being contacted by Sherlock himself to audition new talent. While in these towns, he will introduce Tops' first single release.

"Since Tops will release at least two singles a month, we will need a strong talent roster. Disk jockeys have been telling us they welcome the opportunity of exposing some of the top caliber musical talent that comes to their attention. We're going to give them just that opportunity," said Sherlock.

In addition, Tops' new singles program calling for a minimum of two releases per month, plus stepped up activity in conjunction with its LP sales, has led Tops to make a plea to any and all publishers for a good long look at both their new tunes and old masters. Letters were mailed to publishers throughout the country from Tops' Los Angeles headquarters last week. The letter states that Tops needs a large number of the standards in the various publishers' catalogues and suggests a call or letter to Tops' president, Carl Doshay, to discuss material.

Mercury Shifts Distrib In Portland-Seattle Area

CHICAGO — Mercury Records, announcing a change of distribution in the Seattle-Portland area, has appointed B.G. Record Service Inc. as its distributors in that territory.

B.G. Record Service is co-owned by Bertha Gribble and Oliver Runchey and this will be the first Mercury distributorship to headquarter in two states, maintaining offices in both Washington and Oregon.

Mercury execs Irwin Steinberg and Art Talmadge, returning to Chicago last week after a meeting with the B.G. staff in Seattle, expressed enthusiasm over the new affiliation. Bertha Gribble, branch manager of the Portland offices at 2113 N.W. Northrup St., is a veteran of 15 years in record distribution. In her opinion, the northern Pacific area, prosperous with lumber and paper industries, is an important and growing record-buyer market. Oliver Runchey, branch manager of the Seattle offices at 1408 Sixth Avenue, is reportedly the largest distributor of stereo tapes on the west coast. The new Mercury sales force will consist of six salesmen, including one in Alaska. J. Brandon will operate as sales manager, and Agnes Mackie has been appointed promotional manager.

Announced also by Mercury is the opening of their new Eastern distributing branch, Mercury Distributors Inc. of Pittsburgh, located at 1430 5th Avenue. Staff is headed by branch manager Fred Katz, a 9-year veteran Mercury salesman, and promotional manager Bob Vogel. Both moved over from the now defunct Remlee Sales Corporation. The new Pittsburgh division is under the supervision of Don Thorn, Mercury's Central States division manager.

Victor Intros Two New Tape Cartridge Sets

NEW YORK—Reporting excellent dealer and consumer acceptance of its first tape cartridge player-recorder, the Radio Corporation of America last week announced that two additional instruments using its revolutionary magazine-loading principle will be available for shipment to distributors this Fall.

The new instruments are the monaural Model CP-1 and the fully automatic Model SCP-3, which can provide up to one hour of stereophonic music on one push of a button without turning over or handling the cartridge. The automatic stereophonic Model SCP-2 was announced in June and is now available at most RCA Victor dealers.

"Even at this early date, we are receiving success stories daily from our distributors and dealers about the public's enthusiastic acceptance of this major breakthrough in tape playing and recording," said Raymond W. Saxon, vice president, radio "Victrola" products.

The Model SCP-3 features 17 watts of maximum music power output, a frequency response of 50 to 15,000 cycles, a two-in-one amplifier with six tubes, two transistors, one tube rectifier, one selenium rectifier and a "Magic Eye" record level indicator tube. It has a Panoramic Sound System consisting of one 8-inch speaker (woofer) and two 3½-inch speakers (tweeters).

Available in a brown and beige simulated leather carrying case, the instrument includes two ceramic microphones, an extension microphone cable and a 25-foot extension cable. The Model SCP-3 will carry a retail guide price of \$350.

"With the fully automatic Model SCP-3 it is unnecessary ever to turn the tape cartridge over," Saxon said. "The instrument automatically reverses itself when it comes to the end of either a monaural section or a stereophonic section. With a push button, you can select any one of four monaural tracks or the two stereo tracks."

The Model CP-1 records and plays up to two hours monaurally with 8½ watts maximum music power output through a frequency response of 70 to 15,000 cycles. It contains a 6½-inch Duocone speaker and a five-tube amplifier including one tube rectifier plus one transistor.

Chipmunks LP Soaring

LOS ANGELES—Greatest album production increase in the history of Liberty Records has been achieved, it was announced last week by Al Bennett, vice president.

Demand for Liberty's new David Seville LP, "Let's All Sing With the Chipmunks," so far outstripped supply during the initial three weeks of the release that Liberty offices were swamped with unfilled orders despite delivery of more than 175,000 albums, reported Bennett.

A logjam developed in Chicago where special aluminum foil jackets for the disk are printed and processed by the I.S. Berlin Press, which has developed a special process for printing on metal foil.

The humidity and heat in Chicago during the rush printing of the Chipmunk jackets slowed the drying time on the special six-color press-run and forced installation of elaborate new drying ovens to accommodate the fast-multiplying orders.

Liberty's initial jacket order of 75,000 was boosted to 150,000 the first week following distributors' early demand, then jumped to 400,000 less than two weeks after introduction of the LP novelty platter.

A break in the weather and round-the-clock production by the printer now has the hit disk rolling to all retail outlets and distributors in record numbers, according to Bennett, who foresees record-breaking sales figures for the album.

The Seville LP jumped into the #35 spot in its first week on The Cash Box Album Best Seller List.

"Take Me Along" Tunes On 2 New Victor Singles

NEW YORK—RCA Victor released two singles last week by the Ames Brothers and Ann Grayson featuring songs from the upcoming Broadway musical, "Take Me Along," which stars Jackie Gleason.

The Ames Brothers sing the title song "Take Me Along", while Ann Grayson offers "Nine O'Clock". Backing the disks are "What Do You Hear", by the Ames Brothers and "I've Just Discovered Boys" by Miss Grayson.

"Take Me Along" based on the Eugene O'Neill comedy "Ah, Wilderness", opens at the Shubert Theatre on Broadway Thursday, October 22, and also stars Walter Pidgeon, Eileen Herlie, Robert Morse and Una Merkel.

The musical is produced by David Merrick and music and lyrics are by Robert Merrill, with book by Joseph Stein and Robert Russell.

MGM's "War & Peace" LP For Krushchev

NEW YORK—MGM Records, which has made the first recording of Serge Prokofieff's massive opera, "War and Peace," last week presented Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev with an edition of the new phonograph album.

Underscoring the theme that great art can overcome the barriers of national boundaries and different social systems, it was pointed out to the visiting head of the Soviet Union that "War and Peace" was recorded by an American company in Vienna, where the American conductor, Werner Janssen, led the Vienna State Opera Orchestra. The orchestra was augmented to include 110 musicians and the Vienna Kammerchor of seventy voices. The principal roles in the opera, which includes 200 singing parts, were sung by thirty-five Yugoslavian soloists. Russian linguistic experts supervised the phonetic authenticity of the libretto.

"War and Peace" was begun by Prokofieff in 1941, when the Nazi armies were at the gates of Moscow. It was completed in 1952, shortly before the composer's death. In its original version, the opera was divided into five acts, with a total running time of eight hours. It was Prokofieff's idea to have it presented on two successive evenings. Later, he revised the work to its present eleven scenes.

The playing time of the MGM Records edition is two hours and twenty-eight minutes. The album will sell for \$19.95.

In a note accompanying the gift, Arnold Maxin, president of MGM Records, advised Khrushchev that ten additional albums of "War and Peace" would be forwarded to him at the Kremlin for distribution to Russian hospitals for wounded veterans of World War II.

Maxin also expressed the hope that in the future recordings of American composers and instrumentalists would be heard as freely in the Soviet Union as are recordings of Soviet musical artists available to music lovers in the United States.

Saunders Publishes "Boys Against Girls" Score

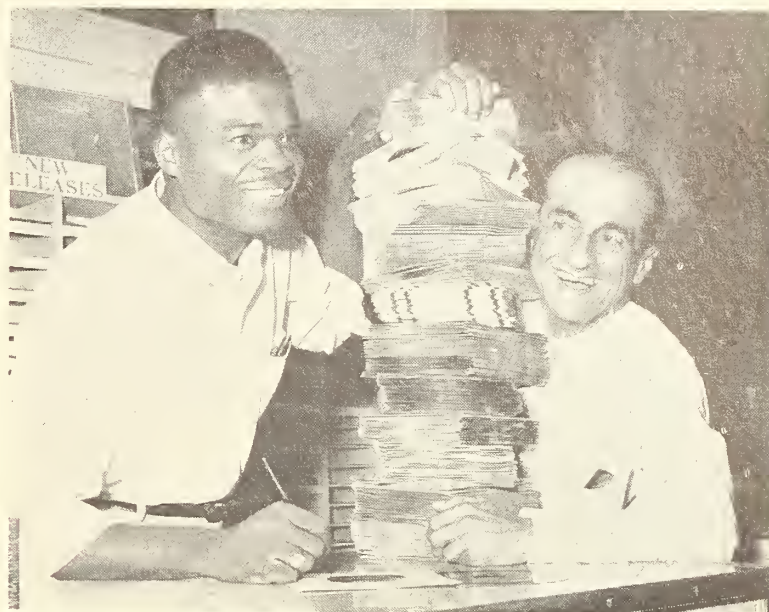

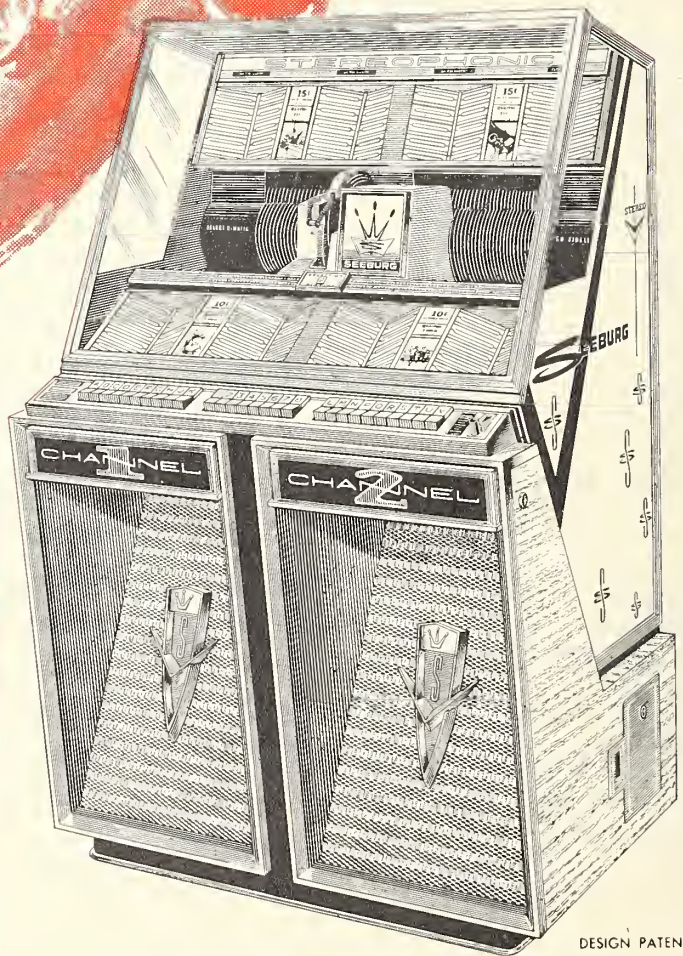

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Stimulate Traffic in:

The Suburban Location

With the migration of millions of city-dwellers to the suburbs, a market shift that has received heavy press coverage since the end of World War II, several changes in the individual's entertainment and amusement habits take place, some of which have a direct bearing on the business of the coin machine operator with locations in these suburbs.

The most important aspect is the change in the individual's entertainment and amusement habits in his new found town. The town, which was formerly a "typical American town" offers taverns, restaurants and other coin machine locations. However, the sudden increase in traffic is not always immediately apparent. Somewhere along the way, the apartment dweller and tavern patron arrives in his new home, but doesn't continue to patronize the local tavern. The reasons are many, some of which might be the strangeness of the town, the location itself, and other reasons that should be strictly a temporary obstacle facing the owners of these locations and the operators who install equipment in them.

In many cases, the newcomer does overcome the strangeness of the town and is once again a regular tavern patron. But what about the countless thousands who never get back to the local tavern? What is to become of the suburbanite who now finds entertainment in his own home or in the homes of his neighbors? What is to become of the location who has

been excluded from the entertainment program of these potential customers?

Human nature being what it is, these new found potential customers for coin machine locations must be *sold* on the local tavern as a means of enjoyment, not only as good as the former pub patronized in the city, but *better*. And the location owner together with the operator are responsible for making the location an attractive place of relaxation where the suburbanite and his family, plus his friends can meet *regularly*. It should be pointed out that the local suburban tavern is a wonderful place for club meetings (since the suburbs probably boast more "clubs" than any other part of the State). Luncheons, dinners, get-togethers and other social activities should be promoted to attract the new found customer, the person who was a "regular" when he lived in the city, but somehow has lost his zest for the tavern as an attraction.

Again, special local promotions, tailored to each location's facilities, advertising music, games, tournaments, celebrations, parties, all types of facilities for social clubs, must be brought to the eye of the new home owner. There was once genuine interest in the tavern, as evidenced by the former habits of the suburbanite. Stimulation of this interest will place the local coin machine location on a level where it belongs—a meeting place for relaxation offering *more* in the way of amusement than any city tavern they have ever been in.

"International Dynamic Industries," Wolberg continued, "is also equipped to produce all types of switches, counters, relays, and a myriad of other components and parts for amusement equipment. We, of course, will also concentrate on high precision parts for other industries."

N.Y. Op Sues City On New Juke Box Tax

To Test Constitutionality



AL DENVER

NEW YORK — Albert S. Denver, president of Music Operators of New York, Inc., announced that a test case has been commenced against the City of New York to test the constitutionality of the tax imposed by the City of New York upon juke boxes, which went into effect July 1, 1959.

The test case has been commenced in the name of Lincoln Service, Inc., one of the members of Music Operators of New York, Inc. Named as defendants in the law suit which has been started in the Supreme Court, New York County, are City of New York, Robert F. Wagner, as Mayor, Lawrence E. Gerosa, as Comptroller, Abe Stark, as President of the Council, Hulan E. Jack, as president of the Borough of Manhattan, James J. Lyons, as President of the Borough of the Bronx, John Cashmore, as President of the Borough of Brooklyn, John T. Clancy, as President of the Borough of Queens, Albert V. Maniscalco, as president of the Borough of Richmond, constituting the Board of Estimate of the City of New York, and Hilda G. Schwartz, as Treasurer of the City of New York.

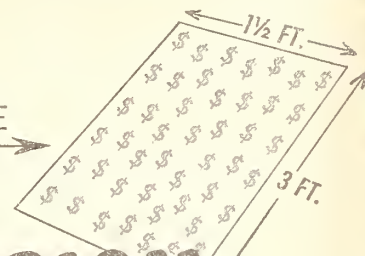
The suit charges that the juke box tax imposed by Local Law No. 50 is discriminatory and in violation of the applicable provisions of the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of New York.

The suit charges that although Mayor Wagner requested the authority and power to impose a tax on all coin operated devices and although the State Legislature passed an enabling act on April 13, 1959, authorizing the City of New York to impose a tax on all coin operated devices, both the request of the Mayor of the City of New York and the legislation passed by the State of New York were ignored. Instead, the law as finally passed and which became effective on July 1, 1959, was based upon a 1947 enabling act, which had become obsolete and which no longer was in full force and effect.

The suit charges that the local law taxing juke boxes and recently passed was based upon the 1947 statute so as to justify the singling out alone of juke boxes for taxation and in that

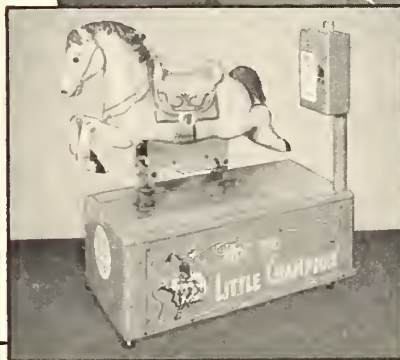

manner favor other coin-operated devices.

The complaint alleges that there are in the City of New York a large variety of coin operated devices which include vending devices of various types dispensing articles of food, drink, merchandise, cigarettes and various service devices such as laundry machines, lockers, etc.

The complaint alleges that although the statute passed by the State Legislature authorized a tax on all of these different categories of coin operated devices, in singling out juke boxes alone the law violated the rights of operators of juke boxes in violation of the applicable provisions of the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of New York.

The suit further charges that the law imposing a tax on juke boxes amounts to double taxation, for operators of juke boxes are already subject to the provisions of the gross

receipts tax.

The complaint further alleges that the imposition of the tax under the local law so substantially affects the income of juke box operators and the tax imposed bears such an unreasonable relationship to the net income of juke box operators that the tax imposed deprives juke box operators of their property without due process of law and in violation of the applicable provisions of the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of New York.

Denver announced further that after the suit has been filed, an application will be made for a temporary injunction to enjoin the collection of

Information Council Meets

Public Relations Firms Asked to Submit Plans and Programs

The plan, according to Lou Casola, president of Midwest Distributing Company, Rockford, Illinois, and president of the Information Council of the Coin-Operated Equipment Industry, is to inform the public relations men in attendance, and instruct them to prepare complete presentations—along with a prospectus of costs for such a public relations pro-

Among the other members of the executive committee who took turns in speaking at the roundtable session were Ed Ratajack, vice-president of AMI; Art Weinand, director of sales of Chicago Dynamic Industries; Bob Slifer, managing director of the National Coin Machine Distributors' Association (NCMDA); Lester Montooth, Montooth Phonograph Sales Company, Peoria, Illinois; and Anthony C. (Andy) Hesch, A. H. Entertainers, Incorporated, Arlington Heights, Illinois.

The meeting was concluded when Casola instructed the public relations executives in attendance to submit their presentations (a copy to be sent to every member of the executive committee) by October 1, 1959.

He further advised, after a brief discussion with members of the executive committee, that another meeting will be held, whereby the various public relation firms bidding for the appointment, will have appointments set up previous to the next executive meeting to discuss the content of their presentations. The time and place for the meeting are as yet undetermined, and the public relations firms will be advised of the time and place by letter.

In conclusion, both Casola and Jones urged the public relation people to pay strict attention to the allocation of a sound budget of costs for the program.

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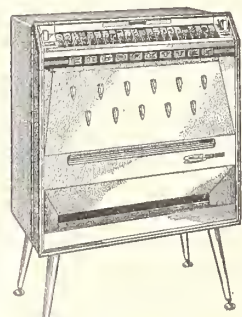

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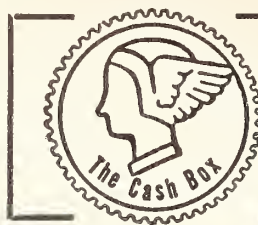
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Anticipated Upswing Starts In East

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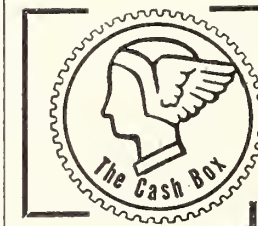

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**U. S. Business
For Balance
Of '59 Should
Break Records**

NEW YORK—It is interesting to note the leaders of industry, banking and government thruout the nation are viewing 1959 as a "year of plenty", and predict that the balance of the year will even be better than the first six months.

This prediction, being made in the midst of the steel strike, is of interest to all in the coin machine business. With the return of the steel workers (strike settlement is predicted by October 1), and the many thousands of workers in other industries affected by the strike, it is felt that the employment figures will reach record proportions. These are the type of worker who patronizes locations featuring coin operated equipment. The more people employed and earning wages, the more money is bound to find its way into some coin operated machine.

Other encouraging news, which support the predictions of these experts, is the plans of the car manufacturers, who claim their 1960 models will exceed 1959 sales by some million and a half cars. Should their hopes come true, sales of 1960 cars will run close to 7,000,000, and break the record high of 1957.

Then there is the report by the Commerce Department and the Securities and Exchange Commission that U. S. business has revised its capital spending plans for the balance of the year, increasing its plant outlay by another \$1 billion over the previous figure of \$32.2 billions. The new figure will be 9 per cent higher than the capital expenditure of 1958.

The capital spending in the last quarter of this year by manufacturing concerns, the report stated, is expected to be 30 per cent higher than at the low point in the closing quarter of last year.

The building program is advantageous to the Coin Machine Industry in that while the building is in progress, any number of workers patronize bars, taverns, restaurants, et al., while on the job, as well as during their off hours. Then, once the plants are built, thousands of working men and women are employed in them. It is important that operators in areas where this activity is evident make plans to place their equipment in every possible location.

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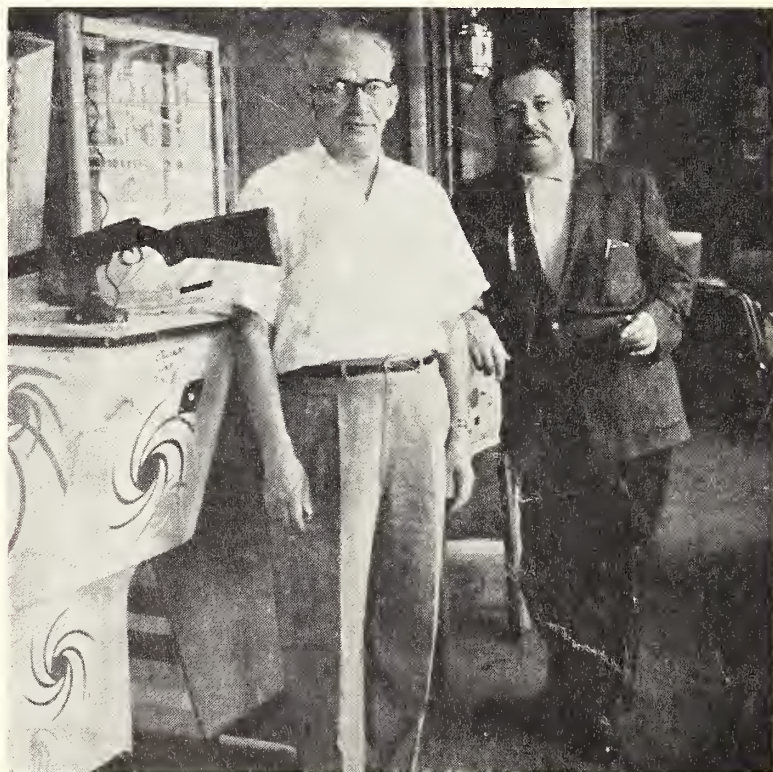

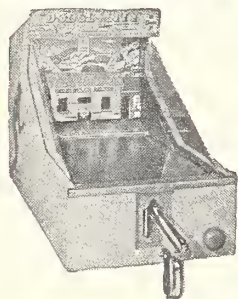

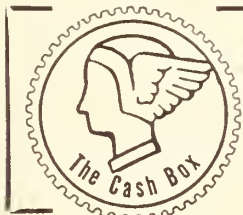

Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.
