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
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

"I'M IN HEAVEN TONIGHT" "LOVE WALKED IN" (2:10) [Chappell ASCAP-(2:25)

DINAH WASHINGTON (Mercury 71696)

Miss Washington, whose current entry in her personal hit parade is "This Bitter Earth," serves up two more winners here. It's an oldie-newie pairing, culled from her (and Brook Benton's) current hit LP, "The Two Of Us," that makes for a fabulous listening treat. The evergreen, "Love Walked In," is set to a soft cha cha beat while the newcomer, "I'm In Heaven Tonight," takes a slow ballad ride. Excellent duo.

"HUMDINGER" (2:45) [Conley ASCAP-Slay, Crewe] "MY BLUE HEAVEN" (2:30) [Leo Feist ASCAP-Whiting, Donaldson]

FREDDY CANNON (Swan 4061)

Cannon is back with two more that are right up the teeners' alley. Lead-off side, is a newcomer tabbed "Humdinger," that the artist, along with the Frank Slay ork-chorus, knocks out in his familiar 'rockin-the-location' fashion. The other end, has Freddy and company shufflin' thru the great old-timer, "My Blue Heaven" (from his "Happy Shades of Blue" LP).

The youngster, whose delightful "Itsy Bitsy" offering helped make this The youngster, whose dengified integration is youngster, whose dengified in the youngster, whose dengified in the young of the hottest (sales-wise) summers in years, dishes up a new pairing that can create a fall sensation. On one half he colorfully swings thru a fast moving (with a dandy pause gimmick) ditty tabbed "That's How Much." On the other side he cha cha's thru a cutie dubbed "Four Little Heels" (penned by "Itsy writers, Vance and Pockriss). Tantalizing chorus-ork assists on both cuttings.

SARAH VAUGHAN (Roulette 4285)

The lark takes a famed old-timer, "Serenata," and a brand new item, "Let's," and wraps 'em both up in most attractive fashion. The wonder-ful Leroy Anderson penned (with the Mitchell Parish lyric) oldie sails along at a charming light swing pace. The newcomer is an enticing romancer that follows the cha cha route. Joe Reisman's crew grabs choral and orchestral credits on both ends.

JOHNNY TILLOTSON (Cadence 1384)

Tillotson, who's had one money-maker after another (his most recent offering was the "Earth Angel"—"Pledging My Love" coupling), can make it to top-tensville with this one. It's a thumping cha cha romancer on which Johnny describes his gal as "Poetry In Motion." It's loaded with those big hit ingredients. Under end's an engaging quick-beat Tillotson original Tillotson original.

#### THE BOBBETTES (Triple-X 106)

The gals, who bounced back into the hit spotlite with "I Shot Mr. Lee" (the sequel to their while back "Mr. Lee" lick), can have a double-bar-reled smasheroo with this new Triple-X release. They're two very excit-ing up-datings of while-back R&B sensations, "Dance With Me Georgie" (Henry) and "Have Mercy Baby," that the "twistin' kids'll be buying up by the carload.

GUY PASTOR (Capitol 4450)

(B+) "LOVELY LAURIE" [Sunbern BMI—Bock, Harnick]
Songster—son of bandleader Tony Pastor—has a fine voice, and does a first-rate ballad job on a pretty item from "Tenderloin," the upcoming musical by the writers of "Fiorello!"
Fine legit ork-chorus backing. Class date that deserves lots of airtime.

(B) "JUST SQUEEZE ME" [Rob-bins ASCAP-] Oldie comes in for an easy swing statement.

#### RALPH DE MARCO (Shelley 1011)

(B) "FOR ALL WE KNOW" (2:07) [Leo ASCAP—Coots, Levin] The mainstay receives a worthwhile teen-beat revival. The nice De Marco vocal is backed by an inter-esting shuffle-beat combo arrangement (male chorus is also included). Very listenable date.

(B) "DONNA" (2:32) [Heather-field BMI-Mure, Henry] Tale of a girl who dies is handled in a pro beat-ballad manner. Opus is not the late Richie Valens' hit.

#### FRANKIE LAINE (Columbia 41787)

(B) "KISSES THAT SHAKE THE WORLD" (2:24) [Melo-Art ASCAP—Dentato, Gifford] Nice easy-beat blueser from the vet vocal-ist. Gal chorus and lightly pounding ork provide effective accompaniment. Side should get good airtime.

(B) "HERE SHE COMES NOW" (2:54) [E. H. Morris ASCAP —Hilliard, DeLugg] This portion puts Laine in a rock-type mood, though the beat is relaxed.

#### THE REGENTS (Kayo 101)

(B+) "THAT'S WHAT I CALL A GOOD TIME" (2:00) [Tweety Skyrocket BMI—Johnson] A fine, rompin' Lloyd Price-type outing from the team, which puts a solid songster upfront. Rockin' good show from the musicians. Date could mean some-thing thing.

(B) "NO HARD FI (2:07) [Tweety BMI—Williams] Bluesy FEELINGS" Skyrocket slow-beat statement from the artist.

#### JIMMY McCRACKLIN (Mercury 71666)

(B) "I'll Be Glad When You're Dead) YOU RASCAL YOU"
(2:18) [Gotham ASCAP—Theard] The oldtimer is revived with a bright-beat pose by the songster and musi-cians. A lively rocker with a well-defined heat defined beat.

(B) "NO ONE TO LOVE ME" (2:23) [Brenda BMI—Atis, Kixon] A basic, lonely blueser is Mc-Cracklin's vehicle here.

#### BEVERLY ST. LAWRENCE (Shasta 142)

(B) "ON AND ON" (2:25) [Mono BMI—Masten, Botkin] Lark newcomer heads an upbeat showing of a haunting theme. Male chorus and clicking combo sound top the backing sounds

(C+) "GOSH, I'VE MISSED YOU" (2:17) [Mono BMI—Owens, Floyd] Talent is mostly multi-tracked on the plaintive.

GLORIA LYNNE (Everest 19373)

(B+) "CONDEMNED WITHOUT TRIAL" (2:01) [Hill & Range BMI—Blair, Robertson) Thrush deliv-ers a waltz plaintive in the "Tennes-see Waltz" vein. She is sometimes multi-tracked, and strings are part of the setting proceedings. Can come-up with good exposure.

(B) "DREAMY" (2:41) [Octave ASCAP—Shaw, Garner] Styl-ist is cozy on the Erroll Garner moody.

#### TONY PRIMO (Nomar 101)

(B) "THAT'S THE WAY I FEEL" (2:25) [Michele ASCAP—Pleis, Pelaez] Virile-voiced Primo offers an upbeat rock warble against some pro guitar-led state-ments from the combo.

(C+) "I'M GONNA RUN AWAY FROM YOU" (2:18) [Mi-chele ASCAP-Pleis, Pelaez] Songster has a plaintive date here.

#### FLOYD ROBINSON (RCA Victor 7789)

(B+) "WHY CAN'T IT GO ON" (2:29) [Acuff-Rose BMI-Bryant] Fella wants a summer love affair to continue in this pleasing rock-a-cha statement from the singer and attractive combo-chorus support. Timely date with chances for success.

(B) "A GIRL LIKE YOU" (2:39) [Tree BMI—Robinson] Tal-ent presents a more affectionate trib-ute to the loved-one.

#### **ROOSEVELT GRIER** (A 110)

(B+) "MOONLIGHT IN VER-MONT" (2:36) [M. H. Goldsen ASCAP—Suessdorf, Blackburn] The N.Y. Giants' football player again tries a vocal stint, and does a com-mendable ballad job on the lovely mainstay. Rock-a-string accompani-ment and short, punctuated chants from femmes. Could make some noise.

(B) "SMOKY MORNING" (2:35) [Ricki ASCAP—George, Al-len] A low-down blues quality to the Grier reading here.

#### THE CHAPS (Brent 7016)

(B+) "ONE LOVELY YESTER-DAY" (2:25) [Clifton BMI-Cenci, Sonny) Attractive nostalgic blend by the boys on the tender, mo-ments-to-remember opus. Sufficient ments-to-remember opus. Sufficient exposure could get side off-the-ground.

(B) "PERFECT NIGHT FOR LOVE" (2:12) [Westbury BMI—Cenci, Sonny] Team is on the upbeat here. Amiable sound.

#### ADRIENNE ALLEN (Yale 240)

(B) "WHEN LOVE COMES KNOCKING AT YOUR DOOR" (2:07) [Rensark BMI —Martin, Krasner] Sentimental thrush vocal receives a good, busy-beat romantic setting from the combo-chorus. Might get some exposure.

(C) "GO, GO, GO, TO MAMA" (2:06) [Rensark BMI—Mar-tin, Krasner] Sound here is more in the sock-rock groove.

Pic main-title themes continue to flourish on the wax scene. Three more fine instrumental readings of the "Theme From The Dark At The Top Of The Stairs" (Robert Holliday is represented on Everest) hit the mar-ket this week. They're Percy Faith's beat-ballad-with-strings Columbia slice, Jack Pleis' quick-moving, string-filled Decca performance and Ernie Freeman's organ highlighted cha cha stylings on Imperial. All three have the chart goods. Faith's warm backing is from the musical, "Irma La Douce," Pleis has a powerful entry in the "Sundowners" sweep-stakes and Freeman has a catchy original.

#### "THEME FROM THE SUNDOWNERS" (2:35)

[M. Witmark & Sons ASCAP-Tiomkin] "MINE ALONE" (2:40) [Burlington ASCAP—Strauss: Arr: Mantovani]

MANTOVANI (London 1946) The beautiful, much-recorded "Theme From The Sundowners" receives an equally beautiful interpretation from the Mantovani ork. Tune should be well on its way within the next few weeks and the London crew's lush, soaring strings version will be biting off a big slice of the final sales pie. More of the same string enchantment on "Mine Alone" from Strauss' "Gypsy Baron." Side is in the "Mantovani Operetta Memories" LP.

#### "I'VE BEEN WRONG SO LONG" "CRY CRY CRY" (2:38) [Lion BMI-Malone]

[Lion BMI-Malone] BOBBY BLAND (Duke 327)

Bland can come thru in a big way with both ends of this new Duke ses-sion. They're two haunting, slow paced blues weepers, tagged "Cry Cry Cry" and "I've Been Wrong So Long," that Bland sells with money-making authority. Great pop-R&B double-header. Get with 'em.

"ITSY BITSY TEENIE WEENIE "PLEASE HELP ME, I'M FALL-YELLOW POLKADOT BIKINI" ING" (2:30) [Ross Jungnickel (1:53) [George Pincus & Sons ASCAP-Robertson, Blair] ASCAP—Vance, Pockriss]

#### HOMER & JETHRO (RCA Victor 7790)

"It's more than likely that new versions of the Brian Hyland chart-topper, "It's Bitsy," and the Hank Locklin smasheroo, "Please Help Me, I'm Falling," will soon be making the chart rounds. They're by comedy-wax masters, Homer & Jethro, and the new sets of lyrics—red flannels instead of "Bikini" and crawling instead of "Falling"—make for real happy listening. Chet Atkins takes producer credits.

"TRUE LOVE CAN BE" (3:00) [Maraville BMI-Holden, Johnston] "EVERYTHING'S GONNA BE ALRIGHT" (3:04) [Maraville BMI—Holden, Johnston]

RON HOLDEN (Donna 1328)

Holden is back with a strong chart-contender that has a flavoring of his R&R-styled, Latin beat hit affair, "Love You So." This side's tabbed "True Love Can Be," and it features an infectious, teen-appealing vocal and instrumental sound. Things move along at a bluesy, rock-a-ballad pace on the lower stanza.

"YOUR LOVE" (2:39) [Roosevelt "LONELY HANDS" (2:12) [Big Billy BMI-Hamilton, Cook] BMI-Singleton, Evelyn, Cook] ROY HAMILTON (Epic 9407)

This looks like the release that Roy Hamilton'(Lepic 9407) This looks like the release that Roy Hamilton'll be riding back into hits-ville with. One side displays Roy's warm, rich voice on a beautiful beat-ballad offering, titled "Lonely Hands." Opening and closing segments have the "Ebb Tide" sounds of the sea. The other half finds Roy and chorus rockin' with glee on dandy opus dubbed "Your Love." It's Chuck Sagle's crew flavorfully assisting in the backdrop.

IVY LEAGUE TRIO (Coral 62229)

(B+) "IF YOU GO ACROSS THE SEA" (2:49) [Northern ASCAP—O'Neil] Song team inviting-ly essays the pretty calypso-flavored lovey-dovey. Simple support main-tains a calypso-ish feel.

(B) "I'M JUST A COUNTRY BOY" (2:36) [Folkways BMI —Brooks, Barer] Familiar folk effort gets a pleasant, easy-go warble from the boys.

THE CUMBERLAND THREE (Roulette 4287)

(B+) "SO LONG (It's Been Good To Know You)" (2:40) [Folk-ways BMI—Guthrie] New folk crew offers a rousing, authentic folk revival of the onetime Weavers' hit. Engaging surface well done number well-done.

"HALLOWED (B)GROUND" (2:36) [Shaysee BMI—Stew-art, Rubin] Beautiful Civil War item is sensitively handled by the team. From an album tagged "Civil War Almanac" (Vol. 2).

#### JIM LOWE (Decca 31153)

(B) "MAN OF THE CLOTH" (2:45) [Sequence ASCAP — Tobias, Ballard] Unusual theme about a soldier who writes his girl that he has decided to become a man of the cloth is told with narrative-singing warmth by Lowe. Reverent combo-chorus backing. Off-beat tale that could come-up with important plays. plays.

(B) "SOMEONE ELSE'S ARMS" (2:05) [Trinity BMI—Lowe] Country-styled disenchanted here.

#### LITTLE GUY & THE GIANTS (Lawn 103)

 (B+) "SO YOUNG" (2:08) [Re-public BMI—Spencer, Crier, Johnson] Songsters pleasingly essay the tuneful rock-ballad against a good Latinish combo setting. Kids will en-iox a hearing. joy a hearing.

(B) "IT'S YOU" (2:16) [Republic BMI—Spencer, Crier, Johnson] Somewhat more harder beat to this portrayal. Good tune again.

#### WAYNE & RAY (Adonis 110)

(B) "FOR YOUR PRECIOUS LOVE" (2:35) [Jamie BMI— Redd] Song duo offers a feelingful survey of the pretty, country-styled affectionate. Simple combo backing. Side carries good teen-ballad au-thority thority.

(B) "PEGGY" [B.F. Wood-Ma-dara, Scott] Boys again take good romantic care of an affectionate. Both tracks are worth turntable action.

#### CRAIG ALDEN (Jamie 1166)

(B+) "CRAZY LITTLE HORN" (2:25) [Shapiro Bernstein ASCAP—Shuman, Carr] Affable, "Itsy Bitsy"-like sound to this roman-tic novelty. Vocalist Alden is backed by cheerful femmes, Latin-rock beat and horn sounds. It'll get spins.

(B) "GOGGLE-EYE'D" (2:18) [Shapiro Bernstein ASCAP— Shuman, Carr] Catchy item that also owes something to the "Itsy Bitsy" smash. "GOGGLE-EYE'D" smash.

## (B) "MELODIE SICILIANO" (2:09) [Zodiac BMI—De Bie] George's "Silver Strings" do a pretty job (against a triplet sound) on the pleasing melody. Both teen-adult au-diences will appreciate the arrange-ment. ment.

(B) "MARIANDL" (2:30) [Bourne ASCAP—Long, Na-chman] A similar string story is told here. Vibes get a featured role.

#### ADAM FAITH (Cub 9074)

(B+) "I DID WHAT YOU TOLD ME" (1:54) [Robbins ASCAP —Barry, Peacock] English rock song-ster gives-out with pro teen sounds as he handles a slick medium-beat ditty. Strings are a strong part of the set-ting. "Beat Girl" is the number's film source.

(B) "JOHNNY COMES MARCH-ING HOME" (1:58) [P.D.] The Civil War opus gets a teen re-write, and is effectively rendered by Faith and the strings.

#### THE BAYSIDERS (Everest 19386)

(B) "LOOK FOR THE SILVER LINING" (2:20) [T. B. Harms ASCAP—DeSylva, Kern] Vocalists offer an off-the-melody reading of the standard ala the Demensions' noise-making version of "Rainbow." Could grap some coin grab some coin.

(B) "TREES" (2:40) [G. Schirmer Jerry Vogel ASCAP—Kilmer, Rasbach] Similar warm-beat expres-sion on the familiar number.

#### JIMMY STARR (Laurel 1015)

(B) "ADELE" (1:54) [Sepe Jan-on ASCAP—Villafane, Mar-ino] Good rhythmic touch to Starr's handling of the name-song. Combo de-livers a catchy beat. Deck tells a teen story in pro fashion. Let the kids hear it

(C+) "BLUE BROKEN HEART" (1:56) [Janon Sepe ASCAP-Fraley, Mayhew, MacGregor] Opus with a country feel is warmly read.

#### MARTHA CARSON (Capitol 4437)

(B) "EVERYTHING'S AL-RIGHT" (2:08) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Carson] The country inspira-tional thrush returns to the label with a bright, gospel-type outing. Chrous and combo offer spirited support.


(B) "HIGH ON THE HILL" (2:01) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Car-son] The artist is more deliberate in another gospel-type reading.

#### JACKIE RANDELL (Jubilee 5393)



#### "WAR PAINT" (2:17) [Aldon BMI-Mann, Greenfield] "COUNTING TEARDROPS" (2:05) [Aldon BMI-Mann, Greenfield] BARRY MANN (ABC-Paramount 10143)

"War Paint" has what it takes to pave the way for hit tunesmith Barry Mann's rise to record heights. The artist's bow, under the Ampar banner, tells the delightful tale of a gal who's making herself up for a date with the boy next door. Mann's sock vocal is backed up in tremendous, hard beat rock-a-cha fashion on a deck that can go all the way. However, don't overlook the similarly styled "Counting Teardrops" portion. It's a tan-talizing slice that also has the chart strength. Deck's a Nevins-Kirshner product.

#### "PSYCHO" (2:27) [Olimac BMI-McPhatter, Oliver] "TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE" (2:13) [BMI—Sylvia, McKinney] **BOBBY HENDRICKS (Sue 732)**

Hendricks, who's had that "Itchy Twitchy Feeling" to get back on the charts for some time, can make it this time out. Side, dubbed "Psycho" (no relation to the flick), is an engaging quick beat'er that finds the therapist analyzing his romantic problems. The wax-buying teeners should help speed his recovery. A colorful thumper completes the pairing.

#### "I'M GONNA CRY (IF YOU QUIT ME)" (2:50) [Jobete BMI—Robinson, Gordy] "WHIRLWIND" (2:10) [Jobete BMI-Bradford, Strong] BARRETT STRONG (Tamla 54003)

The "Money" man, Barrett Strong, can have a chart item with this Tamla outing. Tune, tagged "I'm Gonna Cry," is an emotion-packed affair that Strong and the Rayber voices belt out with telling effect. Fetching, quick beat undercut finds Barrett caught in a romantic "Whirlwind."

#### "CAVE MAN" (2:25) [Arc BMI-Temple, Johnson] "FEEL SO BAD" (2:15) [Arc, Playmate BMI-Temple, Johnson] **THE VIBRATIONS (Checker 961)**

The Vibrations, who stirred up territorial chart interest with their "So Blue" reading, can go all the way with this one. It's a steady-beat novelty thumper, tagged "Cave Man," that's chock full of commercial vocal and instrumental sounds. The heartfelt beat-ballad coupler also has an eye on the sharts on the charts.

"STRANGE KISSES" (2:29) [Glad BMI-J. P. Richardson] ROD BERNARD (Mercury 71689)

"JUST A MEMORY" (2:37) [Big Bopper BMI-Fred, Bryan]

Chances are Rod Bernard will climb back into the hit listings with either end, or both, of his newest Mercury outing. Tabbed "Strange Kisses" and "Just A Memory," they're two chorus-backed, ballad-with-a-beat romancers tailored for teen tastes. Former was penned by the late Big Bopper (J. P. Richardson).

"BEFORE THIS DAY ENDS" (2:47) [Moss Rose BMI-McAlpin, Wilson, Drusky] "JUST OUT OF REACH" (2:39) [Four Star Sales BMI-Stewart] EDDY ARNOLD (RCA Victor 7794)

Here's a switch. George Hamilton IV, previous pop hit-maker, has a big country item in "Before This Day Ends." After the first of the year, the prices will be \$7.98 and \$8.98, respectively. According to Cole, the package is the "biggest thrill" of his 18-year re-

cording career with Capitol. "Every artist is constantly searching for something else," he said, "and if he's lucky, every now and then he finds it. . . I believe I found it in 'Wild Is Love."

Love." Capitol producer Lee Gillette says the LP is the "finest recording I have been associated with." Riddle said it was "Cole's greatest effort."

In a letter sent last week to record industry executives, Stuart Ostrow, vice president of Frank Music, pointed out that "This new concept guaran-tees you time to analyze what your recording investment should be after the production is a fact. On Nov. 4

recording investment should be after the production is a fact. On Nov. 4 you will have sufficient time and rea-son to proceed with any song from the score on the same first basis as any-one else." Ostrow further explained that this plan will save recording companies time, money and effort which they would have spent record-ing and promoting songs from a show that would soon flop. Now, critical reaction and public acceptance would be known and reasonably evaluated be known and reasonably evaluated

be known and reasonably evaluated before recording. In a letter to broadcasters, Dore Schary and the Theatre Guild, pro-ducers of the show, explained the ad-vantages of this plan to radio sta-tions—pointing out that valuable programming time would not be ex-pended on playing the original cast album and individual numbers from a failure. They too will have ample evaluation time after the show opens. Another innovation in promoting the show is the release to recording com-panies and artists an LP demo of ten numbers from the show, and the sheet music for these ten songs. This too will allow artists and execs to evaluwill allow artists and exects to evalu-ate first hand the relative merit of the songs. Ordinarily, a publisher of a show will groom four or five songs for industry-wide release. "The re-lease of ten from 'Molly Brown,' said Ostrow, proves our faith in the wealth of material in this score, and all ten, we believe have nonvelop and standard we believe, have popular and standard potential."

Album jackets and sheet music folders have been prepared in attractive two-color wrappings; the album containing explanatory notes outlining the plot of the show, giving informaconcerning personnel in the show tion and detailing how the tunes work into the story. Both album and sheet music also contain information generally re-quested by A&R men.

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



These are the months when various manufacturers stage conventions of their own in such far flung sites as Puerto Rico, the Ba-hamas and various resort areas throughout the U.S. During these months distributors run from one convention to another spending as much as a week with each company. This is extremely time consuming for distributors and costly to both much as a woon in the consuming This is extremely time consuming for distributors and costly to both manufacturers and distribs. While ARMADA has made great strides in bringing evidence to the attention of the State Attorney's office, I feel that the only thing that will bottle up the entire bootleg activity is to have a federal law passed making it a criminal offense to buy or sell the bootleg merchandise. I am appalled at the lack of concern shown by some dealers when they are offered this bootleg merchandise. They make no desire or show no concern as to whether or not it is being sold to them by legitimate sales people."



### **POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK**



"LAUGHS FOR LOSERS"—Dave Barry—Lib-erty LRP 3176 Latest entry into the comic LP races is Dave Barry's Vegas-recorded stint on Liberty. And it bears promise of securing a chart position soon. Barry's style is the understatement, relayed through casual patter. His subjects are the usual choice—Women Drivers, TV Westerns, Alcoholics, etc. Peg it for eventual stardom.

# "LOVE AFFAIR"—The Four Lads—Columbia CL 1502 Continually growing in stature as one of the

Continually growing in stature as one of the country's most consistent pop vocal quartets, the Four Lads take a change of pace here from their usual rhythmically-oriented LP's with a session devoted to the more mature love ballads. Of special teen interest.

















"SHAKIN' UP VEGAS!"—The Tony Pastor Show —Capitol ST 1415 The rollicking, rafter-shaking Pastor Show, taped live here at the Stardust, is headed by poppa Tony and includes sons Guy and Tony, Jr., and the Eydie Gorme-ish Penny Pryor. They sing and swing up a vocal and instrumental storm, bring-ing the house down with Tony's gravel-voiced "Oh Marie" and "I'm Confessin'" plus group-wise on "Everything's Coming Up Roses" and a rousing opening medly of "smile" songs. Vola-tile entertainment.

"YOU'RE LOOKING GOOD"—Dee Clark—Vee Jay LP 1019 Clark's current chart-rider, the title song, is the spanking bright opener for a delicious tune lineup which also includes such rhythmic gems as Ray Charles' "What'd I Say," "Baby What You Do To Me," "Wondering" and "Come To Cali-fornia." The infectious rhythm & blues-oriented stylings of Clark can score strongly.

"TOGETHER FOR THE LAST TIME" Volume I—Joe "Fingers" Carr & Ira Ironstrings—Warner Bros. 1389 The label's two 'fun' musicians, Carr (the world's greatest ragtime piano player) and Iron-strings (the best damn music in the land) meet head-on in an historic 1st volume clash of ivories and banjo which results in this potent portent of things to come. With Carr at the upright, the en-tire Ironstrings clan joins in stirring musical trib-utes to such cherished mementoes as "Ironfingers Rag," "Too Much Mustard," "Too Fat Polka" and "Aba Daba Honeymoon." Music? Indeed!

### "GUITAR & STRINGS"-Johnny Smith-Roost

"GUITAR & STRINGS—Jonning binth LP 2242 This is not just a guitar and string ork LP. Smith's imagination has soared high and far for the unusual arrangements here, which use solo guitar, solo violins or violas, massed strings and subtle rhythms in various doses and textures. The songs (nine) are concerned with the "bittersweet pleasure of remembered love" and Smith has ex-pertly captured these feelings in "Yesterdays," "The Inch Worm," "Golden Earrings" and "What Is There To Say." A sensitive and fragrant lis-tening treat.

"OUR LEADER"—Banjo Picking by That Multi-Fingered Plucker, Paul Miller—Fantasy 3287 Musical humorist extraordinary, Paul Miller is also the man responsible for the label's San Fran-cisco Marching, Trotting and Walking Band al-bums. Here, in basically a solo banjo role (along with rhythm assistance), he offers delightfully gleeful performances of such fondly-remembered pieces as "Sheik Of Araby," "If You Knew Su-sie," "Varsity Drag" and other vintage favorites as well as that grand old neglected opus "Take Your Girl To The Movies (If You Can't Make Love At Home)." It's all in good fun, and done extremely well. extremely well.

### "THE SOUND OF CONVERSATIONS IN MU-SIC"-The John Parker Orchestra-Medallion SIC"-TI MS-7504

MS-7504 Musical conversations—songs that originally used contrapuntal lines, two melodies or two voices, are put to use here as a stereo showcase. Parker uses blocks of instruments, brass vs. reeds, etc., in instrumental readings of these songs. Among them are "Together," "Let's Call The Whole Thing Off," "Love Is The Reason," "Who Cares" and "You're Just In Love." Of course sound separation is clearly defined.

"WE PLAY—YOU SING ... THE GREAT MIL-LION SELLERS"—Don Costa, his Orchestra and Chorus—United Artists UAL 3104 A gimmick sing-along session that ought to at-tract the teeners. Costa has recreated a dozen recent hit songs with ork-chorus arrangements, leaving the lead vocals to be sung by participants from the accompanying song sheet. Among the tunes are "Alley Oop," "Personality," "Ev'ry-body's Somebody's Fool," "Paper Roses" and "He'll Have To Stay."

### "EDDIE HEYWOOD AT THE PIANO"-Mercury SR 60248

SR 60248 The bright, enjoyable Heywood keyboard style in a program of pop/jazz standards. This is jazz entertainment at its most relaxing. Heywood, ably assisted rhythmically, skillfully weaves his way in and out of such melodic figures as "Cheek To Cheek," "The Song Is You," "The Continental," "Diane" and "Where Or When." Pleasureful lis-tening tening.

"SOUL JAZZ"—Prestige 1009 The label continues to bring forth exciting jazz listening in its recently revamped LP line. Here, there are just three tracks, each one a veritable storehouse of striking blues jazz. One side is en-tirely devoted to "All Mornin' Long" by the Red Garland Quintet, and features Garland, John Col-trane and Donald Byrd; the other side is split be-tween the Prestige All-Stars playing "All Day Long" and the Jackie McLean Quintet on "Lights Out." This is soul jazz at its soulfulest.

# "SOUL STATION"—Hank Mobley, Wynton Kelly, Paul Chambers, Art Blakey—Blue Note 4031

4031 Mobley is a tenorman with a compulsion to swing, and this he does here, for not only does his own rhythmic sense stand him in good stead, he has the good fortune of the Kelly-Chambers-Blakey rhythm section. And these three also con-tribute their own outstanding solo work to the session. Excitement is generated throughout, es-pecially on "Remember," "Split Feelin's" and "If I Should Lose You."

### "JAZZ SCENE 2"—Various Artists—Epic LA 16001

16001 As with "Jazz Scene 1," the companion album (reviewed last week) for this release, the tracks have all been culled from the Epic catalog. But, whereas #1 has collector's item interest, this set, dating from 1951-57, is little more than a "samp-ler" of recent jazz albums released by the label. There are some very interesting tracks here by Zoot Sims and Al Cohn, Kenny Clarke, Herbie Mann and Ahmad Jamal, but all are available in other Epic albums. other Epic albums.

### "PERCUSSIVE JAZZ"-Audio Fidelity DFS 7002

Lead-off set in the label's "Doctored For Super-Lead-off set in the label's "Doctored For Super-Stereo" series is one which translates the cur-rent percussion fad into jazz terms. There's noth-ing unusually exciting or original in the jazz played, but it's played well by capable musicians who follow the stereo-angled arrangements re-ligiously. Among the selections are "Harlem Noc-turne," "Witchcraft," "The Man That Got Away" and "There Will Never Be Another You." Obvi-ously, percussion is the object, and it's obtained with devastating results.

Stuarti is a fine, well-trained singer and does superior justice to this assemblage.







# ENGLAND

The Pye Record Company this week tops The Cash Box British LP charts with "Down Drury Lane To Memory Lane"—the lavish two-record album spe-cially devised as a birthday present to celebrate the 1st Anniversary of the Golden Guinea series of low priced LP's retailing at 30/-. This is the first low-priced album to reach the No. 1 slot. Marketed by 100% direct distribution, sales in three weeks have reportedly reached 60,000 albums. In order to meet the demand, both factory and sleeve manufacturers are working 24 hours, 7 days a week. Commenting on the achievement L. Benjamin, the company's assistant general manager told The Cash Box, "The phenomenal success is attributed to content, value, sales drive and sales promotion, the unconventional methods of extensive poster and TV advertising plays a major part in the success but at no time should we forget the 40 direct outlets of Pye via their sales force whose enthusiasm has carried the project through. Tribute must also be paid to Somerset Records who went along with the production of this two-record album from its inception over a very hurried and informal lunch in Paris."

Pye Records confirms the appointment of Tony Hatch, late of Top Rank, to the A & R exploitation team. As a talented pianist, Tony has already made two recordings himself—"Side Saddle," "Chick," "Stetson" and "Rumba-Cha." As a composer he was responsible for Garry Mills' current hit, "Look For A Star" and "39 Steps," recorded by Craig Douglas. In the A & R field he has super-vised recording sessions by The Knightsbridge Strings, with Reg Owen, Mal-colm Lockyer, Bert Weedon, Lorie Mann, etc.

Joe Meek of R.G.M. Sound, former A & R manager for Triumph Records and responsible for the hit "Angela Jones" by Michael Cox has signed three of his artists to the Pye label. Each have their first disk released this week. They are Ricky Wayne with "Make Way Baby" backed with "Goodness Knows," Peter Jay with "Paradise Garden" and "Who's The Girl" and The Flee-Rekkers "Sun-day Date" and "Shiftless Sam."

Following reports understood to be circulating to the effect that the Rank Organization and Electric Musical Industries (EMI) are discussing the pos-sibility of the latter taking over Rank Records of America Inc. M. Kenneth Winckles has issued the following statement: "On behalf of The Rank Organiz-ation Ltd. I wish it to be definitely known that no such discussions have taken place nor are any contemplated with EMI or any other organization."

After a tour of European capitols the president of Liberty Records, Alvin S. Bennett, together with his international sales director Richard Annotico, arrived in London last week. In an interview with The Cash Box, Bennett out-lined the growth of this young company. Formed in 1955 by Simon Waronker, Bennett joined Liberty Records in 1958 as vice president and general manager, having previously been with Decca and Dot Records. Last January, Waronker became chairman of the board and Bennett was elected president. The initial success of the Liberty label was marked by Julie London's first major hit, "Cry Me A River" to be followed by David Seville's "Witch Doctor" and today sev-eral of the label's artists are featured in The Cash Box Top 100, including Johnny Burnette with "Dreamin'" and Bobby Vee's "Devil Or Angel"—both released here on the London label as is Garry Miles' "Look For A Star."

Bennett said that the trip was one of good will—having firmly established themselves in the American market they are now taking a good look at the English record scene, visiting the diskery's licencees and distributors in the European capitols as well as having discussions with The Decca Record Com-pany which releases Liberty on the London label over here. Bennett told The Cash Box: "Our primary aim through the Decca Organization is to establish an artist as an artist and not just as a single record. As a result of this trip we will immediately start to put into effect concentrated promotion campaigns on the continent as well as England." Among the artists whom he hopes to bring over are Johnny Burnette and Bobby Vee and, if her commitments will allow, Julie London. Bennett returned to the States on Saturday, but Annotico is making another trip to the continent—taking in Portugal and Spain—before returning home. They have produced a big batch of colorful display material for dealer and distributor use. The second release of Warner Bros. albums includes two of the hottest items on The Cash Box album charts, "The Button-Down Mind of Bob New-hart" and "It's Everly Time." They have also made a rush release of "So Sad," the new single release by The Everly Brothers. Lee Gordon's next show is to be a huge jazz festival, to begin towards the end of October. Top American names booked so far for this bash are Dakota Staton, Al Hibbler, Sarah Vaughan, Dizzy Gillespie and Jonah Jones; other leading are to be added to the bill. Jimmy is fast gaining the reputation as Munich's top mu-sical host. His house is constantly full of show busines people and his charming wife makes a wonderful hostess. wife makes a wonderful hostess.

Rudolph Bing from the Metropolitan Opera has just signed German opera stars Anneliese Rothenberger, Herman Prey and Austrian Eberhart Waechter for Met roles.

Another Festival of Light Musicals is to be held in Stuttgart from October 17-23. Well known stars include Juliette Greco, Hazy Osterwald, and Belgium harmonica-guitar player Jean "Toots" Thielmans, who gained fame with the George Shearing Quintet. Stuttgart jazz orchestra leader Erwin Lehn will present new compositions and arrangements by Manny Albam, former Ken-tonite Bill Russo, and Dave Hilvinger, the former drummer with the Eddie Sauter Orchestra here in Germany.

American violinist Isaac Stern recently turned down a German tour. The loot wasn't sufficient.

That's one of the main reasons that stars such as Paul Anka, Harry Belafonte, and others just don't make the German concert halls and also stay conspicuously out of the German hit parade with their tunes tunes.

German top film star Kurt Jurgens who just starred in the American film the "Werner Von Braun Story" has just cut an English waxing of "Blacky Jones" for U.S. release on Top Rank.

Publisher Hans Wewerka reports that his Edition Modern has the rights here for music from "The Apartment." The hit by Ferrante and Teicher is released here on Helidor.

German star Willy Schneider who celebrated his 25th birthday on wax this month just cut an LP for stateside release called "I Remember Germany." This album is also expected to rack up top PX sales with soldiers stationed here.

Radio Luxemburg has set a half hour of Glenn Miller music every week. N.Y. born Karl Kaufmann who set a new world's record in the 400 meter dash at the Rome Olympics is also moving well with his first record. Karl's opera oriented baritone voice is showed to good form on his hit "Cupid Runs With Me" on Metronome.

Ariola records is holding its first national youth talent finals at Karlsruhe Austria and Switzerland. The winner gets a record contract. Along for the festivities will be Ariola top stars Dalida, Jan and Kjeld, Peter Wegen, Jimmy Makulis and Zarah Leander. Cash Box will be on hand and results will be reported in a later column.

We've been asked about the absence of the Hot American Singles, and Hot Covers Of English And American Hits column last week. It is also not present this week. The reason: No hot covers or releases. Paul Anka's "Hello Young Lovers" has been released on Columbia here. Maria and Franco Duval, a good looking teenage pair out of Berlin have been chosen to record the theme song for the 2nd annual TV lottery. The profits of this lottery go to the Berlin Children's home for Xmas trips.

More music on TV is the format for the new season. Peter Kraus has just signed for a show every 3 months for national release after his successful debut a few weeks ago. Peter is also doing a regular shot in England.

Publisher George Pincus is on his way to Germany. His son, Lee, recently visited Berlin for conferences.

Europe's number 1 jazz songstress Inge Brandenburg is set for her first stateside visit in February. She and her American manager, former AFN D.J. Charlie Hickman are busy lining up major jazz clubs and TV shots for the sensational gal. Her newest release here is a German version of "Goody Goody." Lee Karzian from the William Morris Agency is handling things stateside. That's it for this week in Germany.

He will leave on September 19th and his exact program is not yet fully known. The last creation of the number one Italian singer-composer is titled "Notte Di Luna Calante" (Night of Waning Moon) published by Fonit at the end of July, and the re-action is most promising. Furthermore, Modugno was invited by our TV station to arrange music for a new spectacle which will be called "I Garibaldini" (The Men Of Garibaldi), scheduled for next autumn. He will be starring, of course. Further news from Fonit is that Brenda Lee's "I'm Sorry," one of the strongest records of 1960 in the United States, was published here in August and while former recordings of Brenda's did not do too well in Italy, an immediate favorable reaction is expected from "I'm Sorry."

Rocco Granata, already very well known here, will again appear on the scene of our record market with his latest recording which couples "Rocco Cha Cha Cha" with "La Bella" (The Nice Girl).

I paid a visit to Mr. Franceschini and Mr. Croci, Italian representatives of The Seeburg Corporation of Chicago. The outstanding problems of the coin machine industry are two, according to both. "Number one is the lack of a national magazine in Italy specializing in the field, and number two is the lack of a really active dynamic association in Italy of all people concerned with this industry. So far we have worked independently of each other and thanks to this we were not able to avoid Flipper games being forbidden in Italy, the result of which was a terrific loss of money for the industry. The Roulette label is now available in the Scandinavian market, released by Scandinavian Record Co. Debut was made with an EP, "Porgy and Bess," recorded by Pearl Bailey. Until recently, the Roulette releases were introduced here on the Sonet label, also handled by Scandinavian, but in the future the records will appear on their original American label.

Nalen, the jazz center in Stockholm, has opened for the season again, Among the orchestras contracted for the new season is Carl-Henrik Norin's Ork.

Sonya Hedenbratt, who was very popular as a jazz singer in Sweden until she left the limelight three years ago, is planning a comeback. She will sing in Svend Miller's Danish orchestra, which is contracted for several weeks in Paris, France.

The Swedish part of Radio Merkur, the so-called pirate radio station broad-casting from a ship outside the three-mile border in Oresund between Sweden and Denmark, has moved into a new and modern studio in Malmö, southern Sweden. One of the neighbors is SBC (Swedish Broadcasting Co.) which has its office in the same building.

Cacka Israelsson is now cutting for Cupol. He was formerly recording for EMI on the Odeon label.

The Oscars Theatre in Stockholm will present "West Side Story" in 1961— if "My Fair Lady" has completed its run by then. "Lady" recently started on its fourth season at the theatre, where it has established an all-time record in Swedish theatre history.

Lennart Reuterskiöld of Reuter & Reuter Music Publishing in Stockholm reports that there are not less than 12 Swedish language recordings of "Yellow Polkadot Bikini" by now. It gives one a very good idea about the popularity of the song, but the high number of recordings might spoil the success since the record shops probably refuse to keep all recording of all labels in stock. Some complaints this way have been heard.

From Finland it's reported that 14-year-old Monica Aspelund from Vaasa might become the newest discovery on Finnish records.





NASHVILLE—The recently unveiled Starday recording studio, located just outside this city, is proving instru-mental in attracting many widely scattered artists back to this teening center of country music. According to a communique from Don Pierce, Starday prexy, the list of artists who have availed themselves of the studios this month, and who've taken advantage of the pool of top musicians available, includes Benny Martin, Cowboy Copas, Dottie West, Ray Hendrix and Paul Wayne. Forth-coming Sept. sessions will bring Lonzo & Oscar, Red Sovine, the Wil-lis Bros, and the Oak Ridge Quartet.



# What every operator should know about the 7-INCH 33<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> RPM SINGLE STEREO RECORD

### WHAT IS IT?

It is the 33 ½ RPM stereo version of the 7" single record. It is the same size but with the small standard center hole.

### IS IT AN ALBUM RECORD?

No. It is a *single* record. However, most  $33\frac{1}{3}$  stereo 7's which have been released to date feature single versions of best selling album selections.

### HOW LONG DOES IT PLAY? IS IT AN EP?

It has an average playing time, as the 45 RPM single does, of approximately  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 minutes. It is *not* an EP with two selections although two-tune versions can and probably will be released at a later date.

### WHAT DOES IT COST?

In general the pricing structure seems to be about the same as the 45 RPM single.

### WHY A 331/3 STEREO SINGLE?

There are several reasons. First, the sale of singles has been rapidly declining. Many record companies feel that a 33 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> single stereo record may revitalize this market. Why? Because first, it is recognized that the public dislikes the inconvenience of two different sized center holes and two different speeds. Furthermore, 45 RPM stereo has not caught on and there are millions of home players in the country that can play the 33 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> single.

### WILL THERE BE A MONAURAL 33 ½ SINGLE?

There is a monaural 33 ½ single soon to be produced by Capitol and Columbia and probably contemplated by other companies.



### WHY DID SEEBURG DESIGN ITS CURRENT LINE TO PLAY THE 33<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> SINGLE?

Between 80 to 85 per cent of the dollar volume in records today is in 33 ½ albums. Most of this music is largely unavailable as singles, either monaural or stereo. Seeburg believes the 33 ½ stereo single makes sense and may ultimately be the standard for the industry. If so, equipment that plays only one speed may soon be obsolete.

# Editorial:

# Op's Friendship With Location Owner A Vital Factor For Success

While discussing the many problems besetting the operators these days with a group of leading coinmen, we were surprised to find that they concurred on one of the most important factors involved in conducting a route-that is: A large majority of their locations can be retained for years because of their close friendships with the location owners.

The foremost and largest operator in the group -recognized as a dynamic and progressive businessman-explained his methods of conducting his route, gleaned from some thirty years of experience. "A large majority of my locations," he stated, "are friends of long standing. We've always treated them right, and they recognize and appreciate our cooperation. To solidify our position, we are conscientious in providing top service. We see to it that they have the best and newest of equipment. Our collectors are well trained to check the equipment, and be courteous to the people at the location. We have top mechanics, for whom we pay a little better than the market price, and who are available for service and repair at a moment's notice. To retain the friendship of the individual owner, we visit him periodically. Some more than others, as the individual situation demands. We are happy that we have developed our business to a point where a large majority of our spots are friends.

"And," he continued, "there are those who are always demanding favors beyond the ordinary top service and equipment. These, fortunately for us, are in the small minority. They stack us up against our competitors who are making offers of bonuses and loans of staggering proportions to jump the spot. We consider each case as a separate problem. In some instances, we meet the competition's offers to hold the location. In others, we make a compromise deal, and in others, we pull our equipment, even tho we sign all our locations to long term contracts."

This operator we quote is running a very large route. And yet, he finds the time to create friends of his location owners. From his conversation, it is obvious he considers this the most important function he can perform. Not only does he hold on to the spots, but for the most part, he has been able to eliminate the devastating factor of doling out his cash in the form of loans and bonuses.

The other operators listening in, surprisingly enough to us, advised that the same condition prevails with their routes.

The concensus was that, regardless of the many problems confronting operators in dealing with their location owners, friendship was the most important commodity necessary to solidify their position-attained thru top equipment and top service.

# **NAMA Membership To Accept Music Ops Engaged Primarily In Automatic Vending**

**Juke Manufactures Quality But Assoc. Will Serve Only Vending Interests** 

### **Clairification Of Policy Seen As Recognition Of Changing Industry**

CHICAGO—"Clarification of NAMA bylaws will make possible the accept-ance into membership of eligible opance into membership of eligible op-erating companies who are engaged primarily in automatic vending, but who may also operate music machines, provided, however, that the majority of their machines and the majority of their gross sales volume is in auto-matic vending." That's the way Thomas B. Donahue, president, Na-tional Automatic Merchandising As-sociation, this city, answered the query posing the possibility of NAMA admitting juke box operators and manufacturers to the vending ranks via membership in the national asso-ciation. The action was set in motion by NAMA's Board of Directors at a special meeting on Friday, September 9. The Board approved recommenda-

9. The Board approved recommenda-tions for two amendments to the as-sociation's constitution and bylaws; reaffirmed the association's present policies in regard to its annual Ex-hibit and Directory of Automatic Merchandising; and initiated tighter controls and safeguards in processing membership applications. The recommended changes in the bylaws concern clearer definition of the association's purposes, and specific definitions of membership eligibility. Because of the time necessary to complete details and action on the recommendations, the new policies will not become effective until Janu-ary 1, 1962.

ary 1, 1962. Donahue added that N.A.M.A. will

ary 1, 1962. Donahue added that N.A.M.A. will in no way represent or serve the music interests of companies which may be-come eligible for membership. "The proposed bylaws definition of the pur-poses of N.A.M.A. makes this abun-dantly clear. It states that the pur-pose of this association shall be to foster the interests of the automatic vending industry only," he explained. The proposed bylaws amendment on eligibility will specifically prohibit the membership of companies which operate ANY type of coin-operated amusement or chance-type equipment, no matter how many automatic mer-chandising machines they may op-erate. This action will incorporate in-to the bylaws the N.A.M.A. policy which has been in effect since the as-sociation was founded in 1936. The Board of Directors emphasized that "eligibility" of all applicants for membership depends upon the appli-cant's "good business repute," and charged the Committee on Member-ship Qualifications to recommend pro-cedures for extensive review and in-

ship Qualifications to recommend pro-cedures for extensive review and in-vestigation of all applicants. "The action of the Board of Di-rectors in effect recognizes that many fine vending companies in recent years Ine vending companies in recent years have, for competitive reasons, ac-quired some music machines. Also it recognizes the fact that a number of leading vending machine manufac-turers and music machine manufac-turers are already manufacturing both types of equipment," Donahue said. said. "To

said. "To exclude such organizations from membership in N.A.M.A. would fail to recognize the changes which have occurred and are now a fact. By clarifying our association purposes and membership policies we have re-affirmed our basic principle to serve only the automatic vending interests

of our members. Yet we are making it possible to include in membership those companies of good repute which

those companies of good repute which may have minor interests in music. "It should be strongly emphasized that no company whose major interest is in coin-operated music, or that any company which operates amusement or chance-type equipment, will be eligible for N.A.M.A. membership, no matter what automatic vending equip-ment is included in the operation," Donahue stated. "Also, these actions of the Board should in no way be interpreted as an

should in no way be interpreted as an encroachment on activities of other existing associations. Our Board ac-tion will specifically exclude N.A.M.A. activities in behalf of coin-operated music machines," he said.

### **Canteen** Acquires **Five Swiss Music Operating Firms**

CHICAGO—Canteen International SA, wholly-owned subsidiary of Auto-SA, wholly-owned subsidiary of Auto-matic Canteen Co. of America, head-quartered in Geneva, Switzerland, has acquired five Swiss vending firms, it was announced last week by Nathaniel Leverone, Canteen Board Chairman. Leverone said the five companies were purchased by Canteen in a straight stock transaction from Swiss businessman Max L Vollmer

businessman Max J. Vollmer. The firms now operate automatic music machines throughout Switzer-land. Under Canteen's direction they will merchandise a full line of vending equipment in that country, and handle distribution of music machines manu-factured by Automatic Music, Inc.,

factured by Automatic Music, Inc., another Canteen subsidiary. The five Swiss firms are: Cortina-Automaten AG Basel; Cortina Auto-matique Lausanne SA; Cortina-Auto-matici Bellinzona SA; and Emo So-ciete Financiere SA. Leverone said the acquisition im-mediately adds substantially to Can-teen European sales, with an addi-tional increase anticipated when vending machine sales get underway. Automatic Canteen Co. of America has other vending operation in Swe-

has other vending operation in Swe-den, Germany and England, plus its own manufacturing facilities in Ger-many, and manufacturing licensees in England, France and Italy.

# "King Of Games" Tourney Head **Advises That Location-Owner** Signature Not Needed With Ops' OK

### **Special Location Consent Forms To** Be Made Available At Contest Time

NEW YORK-New York's games operators received official contracts for the "King of Games" tournament to be conducted by Craig-Todd Agency to be conducted by Crarg-Todd Agency last week and a clause whereby opera-tors would be legally entitled to the material used in conjunction with the contest held up immediate response from recipients, according to Martin Greenfield, Craig-Todd head. Green-field explained that clause number four on the reverse side of the contract reads and obtain signed consent of reads . . . obtain signed consent of location owner for each registered lo-cation before contest material is released to such locations . . ." threw a snag into the preliminaries which to date have ran rather smooth. According to Greenfield the reason

According to Greenfield the reason for the clause was "to protect the operator against the possibility of the location interfering in progress of the tourney once the contest had started."

Actually, said Greenfield, consent of the location insi't necessary until the material is being delivered for display in the tavern. At that time the opera-tor may have the location owner sign for the display signs, stickers, cards, et al, and then begin placing them throughout the bar. "Most operators called and advised that it would be impossible to sign from 50 to 150 lo-cations in one or two day's time and that they therefore couldn't send checks to our firm until at least one more week had elapsed," stated Green-field. "The truth of the matter is that signatures aren't necessary now, but will be at the time the contest material is received."

is received." Meanwhile, the Craig-Todd firm advised that contracts were expected to be signed and delivered accounting for approximately 600 games before the

end of the week. The location signature snafu held up receipt of signed contracts but three larger than average firms reportedly signed and re-turned contracts before continuing with the location signature portion of the contest preliminaries.

the contest preliminaries. Craig-Todd expects to mail to parti-cipating games firms a number of "consent agreements" equal to the number of locations registered by each operator for signatures. "To send these agreements in advance would mean sending all operators at least 200 copies since that is the maximum number of machines any one operator 200 copies since that is the maximum number of machines any one operator is expected to enroll. Therefore, op-erators with five machines would re-ceive 200 consent agreements as would operators with 50 and 150 machines." continued Greenfield. "We can't mail the agreement for location-owners sig-natures until we know exactly how many locations are involved. We won't know this until we receive checks and signed contracts for a specific number of machines and locations from each of machines and locations from each operator." Craig-Todd continued with its pub-

Craig-Todd continued with its pub-licity campaign last week in the met-ropolitan tradespapers when another front page news story appeared in the *Beverage Retailer Weekly as* a follow-up to the original story of the contest, aimed at location owners, two weeks ago which carried a banner headline. Another contest promotion, "Tournament of Champions" tourney promoted by Harry Berger, West Dis-tributing head, was taking shape as a meeting of games operators, called by Berger Sept. 14, took place at the



"Being located in the fastest growing industrial section in the country," said Gottlieb, "we cannot but plan ahead for an ultimate goal of 360 beds."



UNITED NATIONS, N.Y .--- Top national dignitaries, foreign national leaders and anyone else attending the United Nations General Assembly meetings here starting Tuesday, September 20, will have to pass through International Mutoscope automatic photo machines for two photographs -one for the official identification badge to be worn during official meetings and the second photo for UN files.

Ordinarily, according to Larry Galente, Mutoscope president, security measures don't call for such close scrutiny. But with the likes of Khrushchev, Castro, Kadar plus top political luminaries from almost every country in the world, UN officials have decided to photograph everyone, including the thousands of newspapermen here to cover the event.

Galente advised that four Mutoscope photo machines will be required to handle approximately 10,000 people. "We'll start as early as possible and photograph 1000 people per day," said Galente from the United Nations location last week.

The Security officials had evidently found standard camera equipment, Polaroid cameras and other means of photography too slow because of the developing time necessary. "The coin machine industry came through with the answer and the result is that every political leader in the world will have his picture taken in a coin-operated photo machine before the General Assembly meeting is over!" stated Galente.
