Some Factors Affecting

SINGLE SALES

The record industry seems to be waiting for a Messiah to come along and boost single sales to the status it enjoyed a few years ago. However, rather than clearing the path and making the approach a simple one, the industry is cluttering the road with more and more obstacles.

Although every manufacturer knows the tremendous advantages of huge singles sales, many seem to be doing everything in their power to prevent the return of the singles sales figures of the middle fifties.

Let's look at a few of the obstacles created by companies by which they compete with themselves.

ALBUM DUMPING-

So many companies overload the market with huge quantities of albums that dealers end up selling them at ridiculously low prices. How can we expect a consumer to buy a single (assuming that's what he came into the store for) when some of his favorite LP's, often best sellers, are available for little more than double the cost of a single.

ALBUM TIMING-

A few years ago, an album sporting the same title as an artist's recent single hit would reach the market after the single had enjoyed a maximum sale. Today the LP is available at the same time the single is blossoming into a potential million seller, often causing the consumer to bypass the single (at 98c) for an album including the hit tune at not too much more. The consumer gets a good deal but the manufacturer is cutting his single's sale.

CUT OUTS-

Although cut outs are part of the basic structure of the industry, there is no doubt that a recent album (often too recent) by one's favorite artist on a top label at a price usually under \$2.00 is taking its toll on single sales.

RECORD PACKS-

The resale of returns of a recent single smash to people who pack them in poly bags and sell them in groups of 5 for \$1.00 is certainly great competition for a new single. And when an artist's previous single is stronger than his new release, this can be disastrous. We also see many current items in poly bags at the same time that they are still selling at 98c.

There is an endless chain of unhealthy merchandising techniques that we could go into, but we think

the point has been made.

Singles are the backbone of the business. They are the draw which brings the consumer into the shop. They make the big profit. It is difficult enough in our trade to function with the many factors over which the industry has no control such as disk jockeys' using valuable programming time for oldies rather than more new singles.

While we are in no way attempting to tell companies how to run their business, since each company determines its own policy, there is no doubt in our mind that the aforementioned factors are affecting single sales adversely.

BOBBY DARIN (Atco 6188)

The fabulous talent pulls another one out of the evergreen dept. and injects fresh new life into it. This time it's "Lazy River" that Darin updates in his great swing style. Sensational Richard Berhke ork support rounds out a chart-topping effort. "Oo-Ee Train" is a Darin shuffle-rock original that the Ernie Freeman ork-chorus brightly backs up on.

"STAYIN' IN" (2:03) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Loudermilk]

BOBBY VEE (Liberty 55296)

Ditty, tantalizing tale about a bad boy who has to be "Stayin' In" after school, is a thumping, string-filled opus that's already in the Top 100 category. Soft, Latin beat pretty on the underlid. The Playmates, Donny, Morey & Chic, have two charming teen follow-ups to their recent click, "Wait For Me." They're two rock-a-cha-cha-cuties, labeled "Little Miss Stuck-Up" and "Real Life," that the Joe Reisman backed threesome carves out in attention-getting style. Both portions have the chart goods.

"HAPPY BIRTHDAY BLUES" (2:57) [Blue Indigo BMI—Lee]

KATHY YOUNG (Indigo 115)

The young thrush, who came out of 'left field' and climbed the upper rungs of the sales ladder with her "Thousand Stars" revival, has another powerful item in her second Indigo release. JOHNNY NASH (ABC-Paramount 10181)

HAROLD BURRAGE (Paso 102)

NINA SILVANA (Vesuvius 1022)

(C+) "NOW AND FOREVER (Ora E Per Sempre)" [BMI—As-senza, Denny] A caress from the thrush in English and Italian. Chant-ing femmes and simple combo back-ing in the setting. ing in the setting.

(C+) "NICOLINO" [Denza BMI Assenza, Denny] Sprightly number sung entirely in Italian. Male chorus does the sans-lyric bit here.

HANK MARR (Federal 12403)

(B+) "RAM-BUNK-SHUSH" (2:14)
[Dornix BMI—Millinder, Glover, Mundy] Marr's outfit comes thru with a good-sounding blues-instrumental cover of the current Ventures' noise-maker. Has what it takes to grab off lotsa r&b and pop coin.

(B+) "SONG OF THE PROMISED LAND" (3:15) [Shawnee AS-CAP—Simeone] Skilled vocal group ties-in with the "Exodus" hit with an attractive chant stand on a familiar European melody. Lots of warmth here

(B) "TENDERLY HE WATCH-ES" (1:46) [Duchess BMI— Wiseman] The hymn is presently in an arrangement which will remind many of the team's big Xmas hit, "Little Drummer Boy."

THE FOUR SOUNDS (Tuff 1)

"DO RE MI"—Original Broadway Cast—RCA Victor LOCD-2002

Backed by reviews that generally ranged from good to great, Victor should have a solid original-cast item here. The Score by Jule Styne (music) and Betty Comden & Adolph Green (lyrics) is brassy and vaudevillian, with several good ballads—topped by "Make Someone Happy"—providing sentimental relief. Star Phil Silvers is dynamic and does a fine dramatic job on "All of My Life," an extended work something on the order of Styne's "Gypsy" number, "Rosie's Turn." Nancy Walker, Nancy Dussault and John Reardon lend fine support. LP is housed in a striking day-glo sleeve which fits into a die-cut outer sleeve.

The artist offers a dozen femme-titled songs, ranging in mood from the down-home bluesy "Hard-Hearted Hannah" to the brightly swinging "Marie." After a successful initial package-titled after its initial single hit, "Walk Don't Run," team shows-up again with sounds that should greatly please the kids. "THE ROCK AND ROLL STORY" — Conway Twitty—MGM E3907







The presentation is soft and unobtrusive, making it ideal as background for special moments.

In a rare pop showing for the folk-inclined label, pianist and musicologist Rettenberg, who was the first piano soloist to give a public performance of Gershwin's "Rhapsody In Blue" other than the composer himself, gives rich, but melody-conscious keyboard readings of mostly ballads by five masters of musical-comedy songs, some of whom are partly represented by some of their lesser known gems. It succeeds to a point but it's a case of either too much album or not enough musical interest to maintain it.



Thiele Heads Roulette Pop A&R; Reisman Does Indie A&R For Label

NEW YORK—Morris Levy, president of Roulette Records announced a complete change in the status of Roulette's pop A&R department. In order to clear up the confusion of unconfirmed









stories he announced that Bob Thiele will be the label's new pop A&R head and that this appointment is effective immediately as Joe Reisman, who has held the post for the past two years announced that he would be leaving the company upon the termination of his contract.

Levy also clarified the fact that Reisman's decision to leave Roulette was mutually agreed upon sometime back and that it was Reisman's intention to make this move in order that he could go out on his own as an independent producer. In this capacity, Roulette, stated Levy, will continue to call upon Reisman to produce both singles as well as albums for the company. According to Levy, Reisman has already been given several key recording assignments which will take him well past his contractual commitment.

Reisman also clarified matters by stating that the change is his status will now enable him to "carry on more creative work and give him a chance at more diversified production efforts."

Thiele, who is president of his own firm, Hanover-Signature Records initially became involved with Roulette this past summer when the latter firm loaned the Hanover-Signature operation money and in return was given first option on 55% of Hanover-Signature stock. Also, the Hanover-Signature operation was moved into the new Roulette building on 50th and B'Way in New York.

Thiele's appointment will in no way alter the Hanover-Signature label. The firm will continue with Thiele at the helm and, according to Thiele, it will concentrate mainly on releasing albums in the comedy field such as their best-seller, "My Name Jose Jiminez". Also, specialized jazz albums and special idea albums will be recorded. There will also be a single release on Hanover-Signature.

Thiele comes to his new Roulette post with a long record career to his credit. In the early 40's Thiele began the orginal Signature label. For seven years, he was associated with the Decca-Coral-Brunswick labels. He was in fact, instrumental in reviving the Brunswick label for the parent Decca company. During his seven years tenure, he discovered many artists and recorded hits with Jackie Wilson, Theresa Brewer, Billy Williams, Buddy Holly and The Crickets, Eydie Gorme and Steve Lawrence, Don Cornell, Debbie Reynolds and Lawrence Welk.

Upon leaving the Decca-Coral-Brunswick set-up, Thiele joined Dot Records and was reportedly responsible for bringing into the Dot firm Lawrence Welk and Debbie Reynolds.

Levy stated that the appointment of Thiele was "vitally important to the firm's future expansion plans and that Thiele would have a key role in the development and execution of these plans."

Col. Signs Brazilian Lark

NEW YORK—Maysa, a top Brazilian thrush, has been signed to a Columbia Records pact by Nat Shapiro, the label's director of international A&R. She will debut with an LP, "Accent On Love," in late spring. She recently made her American nitery debut at New York's Blue Angel.







Disk Sales For The First Three Quarters Of 1960 Top Same Period For 1959

NEW YORK-Factory sales of records for the first three-quarters of 1960 topped totals for the corresponding period in 1959, the Record Industry Association of America, reported last week.

For the period through the end of September, 1960 a total of 119,496,000 units, with a retail value of \$304.807.-000 were sold by factories, compared

with 117,629,000 units, with a retail value of \$289,296,000 sold in the same period the year before.

Stereo albums also showed substantial increases. A total of 18,238,000 records sold by factories in the first nine months of 1960 compared with 12,176,000 through the first threequarters of 1959. The retail value of these stereo albums for the first nine months of last year was \$78,120,00 against \$56,153,000 in the same perio

Total album sales for the period las, year amounted to 67,160,000 compare with 64,245,000 for the correspondin period of the preceding year. Total inch sales, including 33 and 45-single and EP's albums came to 51,667,00 compared with 52,020,000 for the firs

three-quarters of 1959.
As some 10-inch are still being sol by factories, in the first three-qual ters of 1960 factory sales of such records came to 668,000 compared wit 1,364,000 in the corresponding perio of the preceding year.

GERMANY

Elvis Presley got a wonderful birthday present on January 8. Exactly on that day, the millionth copy of "It's Now Or Never" was delivered from the Teldec press to the shops. Elvis is now the second American to be so honored. Mitch Miller also did the trick with his "River Kwai March" a few seasons ago. Right now, Elvis is also riding the top of the German charts with "Wooden Heart" from his film, "GI Blues." That record has already gone over the 1/2 million mark in this country. The big Elvis recording of "Are You Lonesome Tonight" is just beginning to sell in great quantities and there are already covers on the market by Wyn Hoop, Peter Alexander and Helmut Zacharias. It looks like this is Elvis' year in Germany.

The Indonesian duo from Holland who go under the name The Blue Diamonds have passed the 1/2 million mark on their recording of "Ramona."

At a recent press conference held in Munich where the Blue Diamonds were doing a shot on the Vico Torriani TVer, the boys reported that their next release will also be an American standard. They will record it also in French, German and English as they have "Ramona."

The German recordings of "Ein Schiff Wird Kommen" or "Never On Sunday" have passed the 1.5 million mark in sales. There are now 21 different recordings of the song on the market setting a new German record.

Cologne comedian Willy Millowitsch enters the top ten for the first time this week with his Ariola waxing of "Schnaps, That Was Your Last Word" which has established itself as the Carnival or Mardi Gras number for this year. The record has passed the 200,000 mark in sales.

Reporting on his trip, Jack said he was very pleased about the remendous interest shown in the entertainment business in Australia. However, many people from all sections of the trade were surprised to learn that australia has such a small population spread over such a vast area. ITALY

All the heads of the Italian record and music publishing houses are in San Remo to attend the most exciting music event of the year. TV station RAI will present the three evenings of the Festival on the screen.

Mr. Matalon of Italdisc told me that 150,000 copies of "Le Mille Bolle Blue" (One Thousand Blue Bubbles), the song which Mina presents at San Remo, were already booked by our national record shops a week before the festival. There is an atmosphere of great excitement and hope about this song and this songstress.

olimpia in Milan is the only Music Hall in Italy. Opened some time ago, for the first time this month it hosts a big recording star from France, Bob Azzam. The singer, whose name is popular in Switzerland, Belgium, France and Italy, and well known in the other countries of Europe, appeared on the international scene of music with his hit song, "Mustafa'." According to the artist, who I interviewed at the Olimpia Music Hall, he sold over one million records all over Europe during 1960. He is possibly the only artist in the world who has two contracts with two different record houses in France—Barclay and Festival, and he records one month for one house and the following month for the other. In consequence of this fact, his records are distributing in Italy by Gurtler and by Italdisc. "This is an exceptional way to wax more records and of course to get more money from my recording activities," he told me. Before leaving Paris, he waxed "Kili Watch" and now in Milan he means to get out a new single for Gurtler and another for Italdisc. By February 15 he is expected back in Paris at the Bobino night club. While in Milan, he has already received many proposals for engagements for next summer season at the best night spots on our Riviera.

Mr. Mottola, RCA's new press office manager, came to Milan and informed The Cash Box that Mr. Vaccari left the record department of RCA's organization for a more important position in another section of RCA's activities in Italy. After this resignation, the new head of RCA record house has to be considered as Mr. Ornato, who was recently in New York visiting the central seat of the house for the first time. On his way back to Rome, where the Italian offices are, and the factory and recording rooms of RCA are set, he stopped in Milan for a meeting of IFPI Italiano (Association of Italian Record Producers) and to contact The Cash Box. Ornato spoke with great pride of their biggest record enterprise—the publication of the history of music consisting of 40 LP's in four packages. The first two are already available. Latest "sure shots" released by RCA on our market are Elvis Presley's original sound track recordings of "G.I. Blues" and Neil Sedaka's "Calendar Girl." New items in the Italian record repertoire from RCA are "La La La," which Alberto Lionello made the successful "leit-motiv" on the Canzonissima Shows; a new EP by world known Renato Rascel and Miranda Martino's "Erano Nuvole" (They Were Clouds) from a new Italian motion picture.

The teenage Italian singer Robertino will be back on a new Scandinavian tour starting in the Concert Hall in Stockholm on January 26th. Gothenburg and Oslo are also on the schedule. The Swedish concerts are arranged by Knäppupp and with Robertino are also some of Knäppupp's leading artists.

CANADA

Competition among Canadian distribs for U. S. masters has reached its highest peak in the past few weeks. The new distributors have acquired lines from the established distribs by offering attractive deals to the U.S. companies. Big percentages and front money are no longer uncommon on the Canadian scene. Also, the increased promotion being given by the distribs plays a major role as to which company acquires the U.S. master. Most of the distributors have arranged their release schedule in order to coincide with the U.S. release dates. In the past the local distrib would wait until a favorable reaction was first shown in the U.S. before releasing in Canada. What has changed this pattern of thinking was the new policy of radio stations. Stations previously programmed the Top Forty exclusively, not giving a chance to new records unless they made the U.S. charts. Distribs now feel a record has a fair chance to break here at the same time as it does in the U.S., if not before. This has come about since stations are spinning material which they feel has a chance to become a hit.

A Salute To The 17th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition

The 17th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition opens in London this week at The New Royal Horticultural Hall. For the second consecutive year The Cash Box, as the International voice of the Coin Machine Industry, is pleased to publish this special A.T.E. issue.

Tribute must be paid to the organizers of the Exhibition-the members of The Amusement Caterers Association and The Amusement Trades Association -whose untiring efforts over the years have established this London Convention throughout the world as one of the major events of the coin machine year, attracting visitors from all over America and continent of Europe. This year, 1961, the organizers are confident and looking forward to establishing even bigger and better attendance records, this time for a more cogent reason—the advent of the New Betting and Gaming Law which came into force on January 1st 1961. A preliminary look through the hist of exhibitors reveals that possibly the main emphasis will be on types of equipment which, up to now, have been strictly illegal and have been operated either not at all or at best only in a few of the more tolerant parts of the country. Undoubtedly this will prove to be a tremendous draw and that is why everyone is confident that this year's exhibition will be an absolute 'must' for everyone in the business.

Although for obvious reasons the stress will be on that particular side of the business other aspects of the trade will not be neglected and indications are that there will be a considerable showing of new machines and equipment in all categories.

In accordance with its policy of reporting the world news to the international coin trade The Cash Box will, for the second year running, be exhibiting at the A.T.E. where copies of this special issue will be distributed. Subsequent issues of The Cash Box will carry full editorial and pictorial coverage of the Convention. We salute the 17th Annual Trades Exhibition and wish it every success.



British Industry Leader Cautions U.S. Exporters On Fruit Trade; Expects Phono Rate To Continue

In a special article for The Cash Box A.T.E. Edition Mrs. Lilian Shaw, Honorary Secretary of The Phonograph Operators Association, looks at the coin trade in Great Britain and reviews the prospects for the future.

In England, the year 1961 has opened in a flurry of excitement caused by the coming into force of alterations to ancient gaming laws. Some of these have been in operation for hundreds of years and were designed for an altogether different way of life to that prevaling in these Islands today. So long have the citizens of Great Britain been accustomed to severe restrictions on their gambling propensities, that the promise of a preak-through has unfortunately given rise to exaggerated forecasts of market opportunities in a care-free land. Statements appearing in the world Statements appearing in the world press have attracted shipments of equipment that will be difficult to sell.

Manufacturers and distributors would therefore be well advised to obtain a responsible market-survey before exporting to anything like capacty. Truth is that the new enactments do not permit widespread gaming: their purport is to legalise, in a sort of matronly way, tiny flutters in selective locations only. "Bandits" are still llegal in restaurants, snack bars and averns. They now become legal in clubs, but only on uneconomic terms for operators. No more than two machines are allowed in each location, top play is limited to six pennies, and all takes have to be used entirely for the benefit of the club members.

It must be difficult for an American pusinessman to visualise legal condicions of this nature, and still harder for him to believe that it will be at all possible to enforce them. True, there will be a lot of black-market operations: there always have been, so turnover will not be so greatly up on this score. But it would be foolish o underestimate the ability of the British police to secure a large measure of compliance with the law. Quite possibly, the illicit-trade-graph will ise substantially during the first six on nine months: in the fall, it will probably drop with increasing tempons winter sets in. To sum up, "backstage" trade should be lively in the pring and summer, eventually falling pack to the 1959 level of normality.

The other side of the picture is a permanent rise in restricted legitimate business now permitted. This will come nainly from the thousands of clubs which have always eschewed gaming nachines of all kinds. Because of hanges in the law, these are now, or hortly to become, buyers. Sales will be limited because these purchasers will keep strictly to the regulations of two machines per establishment and will be operated on the basis of take' being paid to members only. In pite of these limitations, however, here can be no doubt that, on the ong view, an increasing market waits exploitation, for clubs are a substantial feature of the British cene.

A warning is necessary: everything is not yet clear sailing. For instance, the Executive of the British Club and Institute Union has advised its 3,000 clubs, with a membership of 2,000,000 to have nothing to do with any gambling equipment. This advice is given, it is said, following an expression of it is said, following an expression of view by the Metropolitan Police Commissioner, Sir Joseph Simpson. (Full report of this was given in The Cash Box dated 24th December.)

1961 Should Be Steady

The jukebox trade this year should at least maintain its 1960 turnover. Sales-graphs have remained steady for over four months, although beginning to taper off as the annual show draws near. Jukebox buyers are displaying a tendency to become more selective. There is a growing feeling amongst British operators that with the high rate of purchase tax on disks, 200-players are not economic and are overweight to the Revenue. Manufacturers and distributors should, therefore, be on the lookout for a swing to lower record-carrying capacities. With the intensification of competition from the Common Market, American exporters to Britain should tighten up the spares position by insisting on importers stocking a reasonable pile; in this market the best selling point of all is a good service backed by substantial reserve of parts.

The phonograph industry in Great Britain faces, during 1961, higher fees to the licencing bodies known as Performing Rights and Phonographic Performance. Monopolies, the world over, are notorious for their large appetites, and in England, but for the arbitration of a Government appointed Tribunal, they would probably have driven most jukebox operators out of business. Last year, the Phonograph Operators Association appealed to the Tribunal against increasing demands of The Performing Right Society. Whilst refusing to rule for the lower of The Performing Right Society. Whilst refusing to rule for the lower rates proposed by the Association, the fee was pegged by the Tribunal at an alleged 1959 figure. This means the figure should keep steady for some

In the west, patterns of new commercial moulds are shaping, cartels are extending over national frontiers, import dues are being reduced to greater numbers of exporters. Critical decisions are due to be decided during the year as to whether present divisions between the Six and the Seven are to stand, or whether amalgamation is to be official policy. The result of discussion tabled for various dates between now and October will leave imprints on transatlantic trade for several years to come.

Canteen Racks Up Record High Of \$173 Million For '60; Aims For 50% Earnings Increase In '61

NEW YORK — Automatic Canteen Company of America, largest of the nation's vending firms, expects 1961 sales to reach a record \$200,000,000, and earnings to approximate \$6,000,000, "at least 50 per cent higher than 1960," Frederick L. Schuster, Board Chairman, said last week as the firm issued its 1960 annual report.

The report showed Automatic Canteen sales and operating income for fiscal 1960 (ended Oct. 1, 1960) set a new high of \$173,263,071, as compared with \$163,260,672 for 1959. Net earnings for the year were \$3,924,015, or NEW YORK Automatic Canteen

with \$163,260,672 for 1959. Net earnings for the year were \$3,924,015, or \$.73 per share, a decrease of \$773,776 from 1959 net of \$4,698,781, or \$.93 per share. (The statement of 1960 earnings includes earnings of Nationwide Food Service, Inc., for the entire fiscal year and for comparative purposes 1959 earnings have been restated similarly.)

Schuster said that "although final figures are not yet in, Automatic Canteen first quarter 1961 sales and operating income will be about \$42,000,000, up 10 per cent over the same period a year ago.

o00,000, up 10 per cent over the same period a year ago.

"At this rate, Automatic Canteen sales and operating revenues for 1961 will total approximately \$200,000,000 and earnings should be at least \$6,000,000," Schuster said. "This would be equal to about \$1 per share based on the increased number of shares now outstanding as a result of our recent stock offering," he added. Schuster said 1960 net earnings were adversely affected by heavy costs of the acquisition and expansion program undertaken during the year, and by losses incurred by Automatic Music, Inc. This latter loss, Schuster said, was caused by a decline in the coin-operated music business and by development and starting up costs incidental to AMI entering in the

said, was caused by a decline in the coin-operated music business and by development and starting up costs incidental to AMI entering in the background music field and starting manufacture of Automatic Canteen vending equipment. "We expect this subsidiary to return to profitable operations during the 1961 fiscal year," Schuster added.

"In the past year we have materially strengthened our leadership position in the vending industry through a program of carefully planned acquisitions and internal expansion activities," Schuster explained. "These moves include the acquisition of ABT Manufacturing Co., Nationwide Food Service Inc., Commercial Discount Corporation, Hubshman Factors Corporation, and a large number of foreign vending firms.

"During 1961, all these companies will add materially to our sales and profits, and combined with expected increases in our vending operations should produce a record year for Automatic Canteen," Schuster affirmed.

The Automatic Canteen chief execu-ve said that during 1961, "the com-The Automatic Canteen chief executive said that during 1961, "the company will continue its ambitious program of growth and expansion" in six major divisions: food and vending; equipment manufacturing; product; finance; electronics; and foreign. In this latter category, Schuster said that details of a move to strengthen Automatic Canteen's Canadian operations would be announced within a few days.

Schuster said Automatic Canteen's Schuster said Automatic Canteen's Finance Division, which includes Commercial Discount Corporation and Hubshman Factors Corporation, will continue to operate as a separate unit, accepting paper or leasing equipment of other Atuomatic Canteen divisions

of other Atuomatic Canteen divisions only up to the point considered sound from a financing angle, and at no time owning more than 25 per cent of Automatic Canteen paper in terms of total outstanding receivables.

Increased equipment production by the Rowe Manufacturing Co. subsidiary will be greatly facilitated during 1961, Schuster said, by the addition of 175,000 square feet of manufacturing space in the Rowe Whippany, N. J., plant. Production of vending equipment at AMI (Automatic Music Inc.), in Grand Rapids, started during 1960, also will be stepped up, he stated.

Schuster predicted that automation

Schuster predicted that automation of feeding will move ahead rapidly in 1961, and he stated that Automatic Canteen is now expanding and developing its equipment manufacturing program to fully capitalize on this situation. uation.

uation.

Starting up costs of Automatic Canteen's plastics manufacturing operation, initiated in 1960, should be more than offset during 1961 as production of hot and cold plastic drink cups grow, Schuster stated. Production for the past several months has been about 30,000 cups an hour, a figure which we expect to raise during

been about 30,000 cups an hour, a figure which we expect to raise during the year, he said.

Schuster, a successful business consultant prior to his taking over the leadership of Automatic Canteen in 1960, believes the country is headed for higher economic levels. He anticipates a higher trend in business generally, led by the capital goods industry, then followed by consumer durables and soft goods. "Our next five years, despite the usual cyclical ups and downs, should show a definite increase in our economy," he predicted.

Munves has advised that the firm's catalog will be available free of charge to all visitors stopping by Booth 138 during the ATE show.



pened but a few years ago an enter-prising music machine operator must have looked around and in one sweep-ing glance saw dozens of locations that ing glance saw dozens of locations that didn't have a juke box and had no intention of ever having one installed. Auto showrooms, banks, super markets and the like just have no rhyme or reason for installing a juke box. BUT the big difference here was that they could see nothing wrong with having music playing all through the day. It was merely a matter of equipment used in providing the location with that music. And here is where this enterprising operator found that he could add to his present income and stay in the same business of providing music. He installed Background Music music. He installed Background Music systems in the locations that wanted music of this kind.

Means of Diversification

In this day and age of tight dollars and even tighter competition the cry is to "diversify!" and many juke box operators are doing just that. Today's background music catalogs boast giant volumes of tapes, records, and FM facilities, featuring thousands upon thousands of softly recorded selections designed to fill the void—the background that is nothing but atmosphere until the music starts to play. Oftentimes the patron will not notice that music is playing which is exactly what is supposed to happen.

Industry Needs It

Giants in the industrial field with names such as General Motors, Ford, General Mills, Coca-Cola, and on and on, all have background music systems of one kind or another designed to improve efficiency and speed up. tems of one kind or another designed to improve efficiency and speed up production from a work crew who ordinarily "get tired" around 3:00 P. M. The background music operator programs faster paced "dance" tempos for this hour and the research firms tell us the work load grows from that point to quitting time

point to quitting time.

Medicos reach the local newspapers these days on an average of about once each week with another story on

these days on an average of about once each week with another story on how music is helping the patient, easing delivery of a baby, or helping extract a tooth that had other ideas. Never before has background music received so much publicity. Swimming pools are featuring underwater speakers, super marts have speakers installed behind direction guides, and delays in airports are supposedly eased with soft breezy music via the background speakers.

The business is definitely growing and its got a long way to go, or so say the men who are presently in it. Vending machine operators find that they can't do without it. Industrial plants have been educated by national advertising and factory sales representatives to think as much of background music as they do of their manufacturing equipment. It's become standard equipment. The vending operator can use this music system in many advantageous ways both in securing and holding locations. It beats bonuses.

Dual System Locations

Several of the back-ground music system manufacturers have set up special sales offices to cater to the juke box op in search of additional income via the background route. An operator intent on going about it on a large enough scale and with purpose will receive all the help he needs from any one of a half dozen firms selling the nation's soft mood music. music.

Three Types Available

Basically, there are three types of background music in operation today — "piped in" music which is off-premises, "on location" records, and "on location" systems featuring taped

Muzak is about the oldest and largest firm in the piped-in field. Tele-phone lines emanating from a central phone lines emanating from a central studio are used to bring music to individual subscribers who are billed monthly. Programming is prepared and controlled by Muzak's central studio and is tailored to different types of business and industrial plants. The firm markets its wares via a nationwide distribution network of franchised operators.

The music provided from records

The music provided from records on location but from a specially designed machine is another type of background music. The Seeburg Corporation and AMI, Inc., a subsidiary

of Automatic Canteen Corporation of America, one of the largest vending firms in the world, are prominent manufacturers of the record systems. Seeburg manufactures the Seeburg "1000" background music system which uses specially recorded disks playing at the 16 2/3 rpm speed. The unit features 1000 selections from catalogs specially recorded and categorized under various tempos and styles of music. The system will play continuously for about 45 hours. AMI's unit uses 33 1/3 rpm disks, 7 inches wide, of specially recorded music provided by RCA Victor, largest supplier of the disk type music. Opperators may interchange the disk packages provided with the original installation and return from time to time to refresh the system with new time to refresh the system with new music. Of course, the packages of records, specially prepared and merchan-dised along specific lines by Seeburg, are alternated and rotated through-out the operator's entire route of sys-

tems.

AMI and Seeburg, for the most part, sell the systems through their juke box distributors. Each firm also has a separate marketing division to handle the sale of background music and maintains a separate sales organization for it.

ganization for it.

The taped music is still another type of background music and it is quickly expanding in scope, mostly through the efforts of one Iz Edelman, President of Cine-Sonic Sound Corporation, with offices in Detroit and New York. Edelman introduced the taped units about five years ago and to date sales have increased each year.

The Cine-Sonic system utilizes a self-contained automatic continuous play cartridge. The tape is unbreakable, noiseless, and made from "lifetime mylar." Edelman boasts a library of 1000 hours of taped music available in 2, 4, 6 or 8 hour cartridges. The player unit will continue to play until manually shut off or by means of a time clock. Distribution is handled mainly through independent distributors and operators of vending machines. Cine-Sonic currently provides the New Yorker Hotel's 2000 rooms with music.

Net earnings were \$302,847 or 34¢ per share. This compares with net earnings of \$364,272 or 41¢ per share for the same quarter last year.

Sales for the first nine months (April to December inclusive were \$26,572,066, down 7% from \$28,602,090 last year. Sales of defense items for the period were lower than projected, which accounts for a substantial part of the reduction. Net earnings were \$547,345 or 62¢ per share on 887,722 shares, compared with \$632,618 or 71¢ per share on 886,210 shares for the same period a year ago. Shipments of pianos for the calendar year 1960 were the highest in the history of the Company. "Our position in this industry is being strengthened constantly," said R. C. Rolfing, President.






