

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The Changing Scene:

FEWER AND BETTER SINGLES

The record picture continues to change from day to day. Many of the changes are subtle and unnoticeable and some are radical. One drastic change we have noticed during the past few months is the tremendous cut in the number of new singles releases being issued each week.

Record companies, especially the larger ones with huge artist rosters, have sharply cut the number of weekly single issues in an effort to concentrate on the strong numbers with hit potential.

Even the smaller diskeries, which in the past issued singles by the carload hoping that a few would stick, have given up this approach.

It is obvious that the trade has finally recognized that a greater number of releases by any given company does not mean greater success. It may mean that a company can have more titles making noise simultaneously but it certainly is not the formula for greater profits.

Limited programming time is responsible greatly change. Top 40 formula radio still dominates the air waves allowing a minimum of time for new releases. To add further woes to the manufacturer, many stations have been changing-the-pace of programming, not with new singles, but with oldies and million sellers out of the past-a practice which is of little benefit to the manufacturer.

In addition, the desire on the part of many jockeys to "discover" or be the "first" to recognize hit material out of LP's, has prompted many dee jays to turn to albums by top names.

The end result is that by issuing too many releases too frequently, the manufacturer finds that his records are competing with one another for exposure.

There is no doubt that during the remainder of this year, record companies large and small will be increasingly more selective in their singles releasing schedule. The days of the recording contract providing for a minimum of 8 to 12 sides a year are a thing of the past for all but the hottest talent in the business. More and more manufacturers are realizing that you can't clutter your singles schedule with sides that obviously have little potential but are a fulfillment of contractural obligations.

This is a healthy trend that will benefit the business considerably. It should result in more mileage out of a hit single for the manufacturer and more profits at the end of the year.

"HEARTS OF STONE" (2:00) [Regent BMI-Ray, Jackson] "ROYAL BLUE" (2:25) [Jec BMI—Black]

BILL BLACK'S COMBO (Hi 2028)

The Black Combo's long, unbroken hit chain (currently it's the "Blue Tango"—"Willie" duo) should add two more links with "Hearts Of Stone" and "Royal Blue." "Hearts" is the chart-topping pop-r&b oldie while "Royal" is an enticing new Black original. Both are presented in that now famous shuffle-rhythm format.

"ALL OF EVERYTHING" (2:20) "CALL ME ANYTIME" (2:39) [Roosevelt BMI—Singleton]

FRANKIE AVALON (Chancellor 1071)

The young hit-maker checks in with two more sides that have those money-making qualities notched into every groove. One half, "All Of Everything," is a soft ballad-with-a-mild-beat romancer that Frankie caresses in ear-arresting manner. "Call Me Anytime" is a change-of-pace delighter from the rock-a-shuffle school. Jerry Ragovoy's ork-chorus backs up on the former while Bob Mersey's crew does likewise on the latter. latter.

TOMMY EDWARDS (MGM 12981)

Edwards is back on the wax scene with two more chart heavyweights. Leadoff portion is a ultra-lovely multi-track up-dating of the while-back Les Paul & Mary Ford smasheroo, "Vaya Con Dios." Companion piece, "One And Twenty," is a beautifully penetrating beat-ballad opus with a classical-based melody and a lyric stemming from the famed A. E. Housman poem. The LeRoy Holmes ork-chorus warmly backs the artist's silky-smooth readings.

JAYE P. MORGAN (MGM 12984)

The great old Chuck Willis favorite, "Close Your Eyes," should be in for another chart go-round in the near future. Tune's fine new teen beatballad wrapping is attractively tied up by Jaye P. Morgan, the ork and choral group. Watch it take off. There's a touch of "Don't Let The Stars, etc." in the bright, happy-go-lucky undercut, "Catch Me A Kiss." Can also happen. also happen.

"I TOLD YOU SO" (2:03) [Sequence ASCAP—Geld, Udell] "YOU GOT IT" (2:17)

JIMMY JONES (Cub 9085)

Jimmy Jones takes dead aim at the charts and comes up with what looks like a pair of bullseyes. They're sock teen entries that feature Jimmy's attention-getting vocal style. "I Told You So" is taken for a "You Talk Too Much"-rocka-cha-cha ride while "You Got It" moves along at an easy-goin' shuffle-rock pace. Two-sided sales dynamite here.

"MODEL GIRL" (2:14) [Alan K BMI—Jones, Edwards, Jr.] "WE'VE GOT TO TELL THEM" (2:43) [Winneton BMI—David] JOHNNY MASTRO (Coed 545)

Mastro, who formerly held down vocal chores with the Crests, can have a first-time-out smash with his debut as a soloist. Tune, a very pretty teen beat cha cha ditty devoted to his "Model Girl," is treated to an inviting, chorus-back Sam Cooke-flavored reading. Backing's an ear-appealing, string-filled rock-a-cha-cha that also has the chart goods.

THE CHAMPS (Challenge 59103)

The Champs come thru with a double-barreled chart threat in their latest Challenge outing. On one end there's a rockin' new twist to the old dance favorite, "Hokey Pokey." Group's teen-appealing instrumental (and vocal) stand is a natural for those TV dance hops. The exciting Latinrock beat coupler, "Jumping Bean," has a fascinating, "Walk, Don't Run" feel. Looks like a back-to-back winner.

CLEO JONS (RCA Victor 7648)

THE "5" ROYALES (Home of the Blues 218)

THE ECHOS (Felsted 8614)

Disk Sales Bowing To Winter's Cold

NEW YORK-Old man winter is evidently not too sympathetic to the record industry's sales problems. Heavy snows and temperatures consistently below freezing have taken their toll in disk sales, particularly in the east and mid-west.

The cold snap-which at presstime had shown no signs of abating-comes at a time when labels are putting their best-foot foward in terms of product. But, to take rack sales as an example, the bad weather keeps traffic out of supermarkets and other establishments that have a rack section. Many of the latter stores offer a telephone delivery service whereby the customer can phone his purchases (i.e. food) and thereby avoid facing-up to the weather.

The record dealer, of course, also suffers from potential customers who spend most of their free time in-doors during unfavorable weather. If not actually intending to venture into a disk shop, the house-bound consumer doesn't even get a chance to see an attractive dealer window-display that could draw him into the store.

Major markets most seriously affected by the cold snap include New York, Baltimore, Washington, Cincinnati, Buffalo, Kansas City, St. Louis, Cleveland and Nashville.

Oscar Brown Writes Musical For Fall Debut

NEW YORK-Oscar Brown, Jr., the Columbia label's writer-performer, has written the book, music and lyrics for a musical set for a Broadway bow next October. Titled "Kicks & Co.," the production is sponsored by Robert Barron Nemiroff and Dr. Burton Charles D'Lugoff, who co-authored the years-back hit, "Cindy Oh Cindy." Brown, whose first Columbia album, "Sin & Soul," was recently issued by Columbia, is author of the new jazz opus, "Freedom Now Suite," and is currently holding forth at the Village Vanguard in New York.

Belafonte Pubbery Exec Relocates To L.A.

NEW YORK-Jesse Stool, formerly head of Harry Belafonte's Clara Music Publishing Company, a subsidiary of Belafonte Enterprises, Inc., is leaving his post in New York to return to his home base in Los Angeles, in an as vet undefined capacity with the Belafonte organization. His duties there, it is understood, will not be of a policy making nor administrative nature.

Stool, who came East one year ago, to work with the Belafonte music publishing firms, expects to return to the Coast within a month.

It's virtually impossible for any bu the very largest stores to stock ever instructional album available—nor i it practical. The dealer should care fully determine which courses are th most widely publicized, advertise and contain the most information fo the money. He should be certain tha he can order anything he needs and have it within a few days. Most cus tomers will not mind waiting tha long and inventories can always be built as business warrants.

Where a store is located near a col lege, there's an additional reason to look into the instructional record market. Under the National Defense Education Act, colleges can be reimbursed by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare for educational records bought for classroom use. Universities have been using the money largely for language courses. These same items can also be sold to high schools and in many communities to grammar schools.

Getting into instructional records need not be expensive and it can prove to be a steady source of income. It will pay every dealer to investigate the possibilities of setting up instructional record departments.

Instructional LP Disks Booming Reports Pickwick's Cv Leslie

Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick Sales Corp., merchandisers of "Instant" Learning Records, has submitted the following article—based on extensive research-to The Cash Box, and it is reprinted in full for the benefit of the trade:

Five years ago the market in instructional records was virtually nonexistent, estimates of the annual gross run as low as \$2.5 million and this was almost completely devoted to language sets. Today, the total sales in education records of one type or another represents a business of \$20 million a year with the figure climbing steadily. In addition to the language disks of five years ago, the public can buy albums teaching spelling, typing, shorthand, Morse Code, hypnotism, skiing, golfing, skeet shooting, mathematics, history, philosophy, photography, stock market advice, sales techniques, dog training, complexion care and memory improvement.

The significance of the growth from \$2.5 to \$20 million should not be lost on retailers. Educational records of all types offer some unusual advantages to the dealer; they are not carried by record clubs and they are not an "impulse" item so they aren't rack jobbed in supermarkets, variety stores and drug chains. Generally speaking, they cost at least \$5 ("Instant" Learning Languages, for example retail for \$9.95 and the dealer can keep his full markup on them because he doesn't have to cut price.) Instructional records have another advantage too, business picks up on them during the summer, which is traditionally a slow season for records. People planning to travel abroad want to brush up on a foreign language and students like to keep up with their courses between terms.

Although there have always been educational recordings, the postwar teacher shortage has given instructional records their current sales impetus. Colleges and public school systems have found that some of the records can be used in the classroom and privately by the students to help teachers manage larger classes. Public interest in self-improvement and education has provided a continually expanding market for these records.

The dramatic increase in enrollments not only in colleges, but in night schools across the country is a vivid example of this desire to "up-grade."

All of these factors plus the universal ownership of record-playing equipment and the development of the long playing album have made instructional LP's a logical extension of the record industry. Who buys these records? Our sales indicate that there's no pigeonholing these people-they include older men and women, teenagers, professional men, housewives, students, members of the Armed Forces, plumbers, you name it!

Every dealer should carry an educational department. He should study closely what's available from the score or more manufacturers who are already in the field. He should try to determine what the demands of his customers are likely to be in this area. In planning an inventory, a good rule of thumb is to set a figure of five per cent of total stock for instructional items. Then he should put sixty per cent of his newly created budget into language courses. In order of iniportance: French accounts for 37.5%, Spanish for 28% of national sales. Next in line are German and Italian. Finally, it pays to include at least one really offbeat language. Russian is ideal for this purpose because there is so much interest in it among students, government employees and the general public.

The remaining forty per cent of the dealer's "instructional department" budget should be divided up among such items as shorthand, typing and whatever else he feels will appeal to his particular customers.

Having laid in stock, he should now concentrate on letting the public know that he is in the business. Display one or two items in the window along with a sign saying that there is a full inventory of instructional records inside and create a small, separate department in the store. It's easy to construct a display for language courses with maps or travel posters. Many of the language sets are beautifully packaged and add considerably to the decor of a window.

There's no special training needed to sell the records; the customer



Her numbers consist of fine psuedo-blues items, including "Send For Me"—the recent Nat King Cole hit—"Yes Indeed," "Everyday (I Have The Blues)" and "I Must Have That Man." Jimmy Rowles heads the ork-chorus rhythm. Performer's fans should dig her beat here.

A collection of the thrush's past singles is a powerful package of pop vocal entertainment. 
"PICK A HIT FEATURING 'WHEELS'"—The String-A-Longs—Warwick W2036

"FOLK SONGS OF MANY LANDS"—Paul Evans—Carlton STLP 12/130 This date by Evans presents him in a different, and much more artistic light than pop audiences are accustomed to. Here, he sings folk songs are accustomed to. Here, he sings folk songs which have been fitted to arrangements that make them palatable to teeners as well as adults. The selections are admirable, among them "Passing Through," "Los Cuatro Generales," "Wayfarin' Stranger," "The Bomb" and the short and pungent "The Pig And The Inebriate." Introduces a whole new vista for the artist.



"STORIES IN SONG"-William Clauson- Capi-

Clauson, a singer of folk songs in the grand troubadour tradition, makes his Capitol LP debut an impressive one with a concert consisting of 14 an impressive one with a concert consisting of 14 folksongs of varied national origin (all sung in adaptations by the artist). Accompanying himself solely on guitar he carefully guides his rich tenor voice through the more familiar "Cockles and Mussels," "I Never Shall Marry," "Lord Randall" and the more obscure "The Three Little Piggies," "While The Old Man Was Out" and "The Oyster Girl." A significant contribution to the folk tradition.




"NEW SHOWS IN TOWN—1961"—Percussion Unlimited—Medallion ML-7515
Broadway's seven newest musicals are represented at least once, some twice, in this brassy, swinging, percussive session. Credit Al Caiola with the sprightly arrangements of "Hey! Look Me Over," "Make Someone Happy," "Little Old New York," "Dolce Far Nienti" and "Our Language Of Love," the best of the crop. Good music in a "deluxe sound" vein.



"GREAT FOR DANCING"—Volumes 1 & 2—The Sociables—ABC-Paramount ABC-374

The Sociables, a new instrumental group, appears aptly named considering the bright, bubbly brand of music it purveys. In two simultaneously-released volumes, the Sociables reach back to the Tin-Pan-Alley files of the Twenties and Thirties and come up with enough well-remembered fodder to allot 40 tunes per disk. A perfect dance beat for young or old, and always enjoyable listening.









"COLTRANE JAZZ"-John Coltrane-Atlantic

Seven of the sight tracks were recorded soon after the artist's break with Miles Davis and reveal his intense development of completely personal style. In originals ("Harmonique," "Fifth House," "Like Sonny") and obscure oldies ("Little Old Lady," "I'll Wait And Pray") he strives for and attains wholly unique expressions and not just in an experimental state, although that phase is recognizable. Accompaniment is by the Davis rhythm section. The work of a great artist.

"NEW HORN IN TOWN"—Richard Williams—Candid CJM 8003

Richard Williams could very well be the first of a new crop of jazz trumpeters falling under the unashamed influence of Dizzy Gillespie. He plays with open-horned honesty in a clear, bell-like brass tone, and with lots of punch. Other youngsters, notably pianist Richard Wyands, give the group a vital exuberance in the ensemble passages. Tunes are "I Can Dream, Can't I?", "I Remember Clifford," "Over The Rainbow" and four Williams originals. This lad bears watching.

THE PREVIN SCENE"—Andre Previn—MGM

To demonstrate the versatility of Andre Previn (of which no proof is needed), the label has collected an assortment of tracks from previous dates which find the pianist in turn accompanied by David Rose's string lushness, Shelley Manne and Red Mitchell and a more expanded jazz combo. 



It could only happen in Germany. The privately owned TV corporation, Free 'elevision, has not yet received permission to broadcast until this summer. Iowever, the firm has 480 employees and many shows including pop music rograms that will be out of date by then. As of January 26, the firm has been roadcasting a full day's program including news, and expensive filmed programs but the broadcasts are seen only within the house. Millions are being pent to keep the activities going until permission is granted for the firm to tart broadcasting on Germany's second channel. "It keeps our people busy and a practice," says the Free TV chief. Meanwhile, the state owned TV channel as signed contracts for a new experiment. Once a month, shows from foreign ountries including the U.S., England, France, etc. will be broadcast in the riginal language with German sub-titles. Back in the record business, Ariola as issued a 10° LP of 'Oklahoma!" sung in German. It's the first time an American musical has been so handled.

The Philips presses are rolling with its top hit, "Ramona," by the Blue Diamonds heading for the ¾ million mark. Two other records headed for hartsville are the Leo Leandros oriental version of "Tum-Balalaika" and Hitch Miller's "Fife March" which is billed as a follow up to Mitch's, "River (wai March," which passed the million mark here. The famous German classical onductor Wilhelm Furtwaengler had his 75th birthday on January 25.

Electrola records is busy these days. Its version of "Never On Sunday" by ale Anderson has passed the 750,000 mark; producer Nils Nobach has just remed from Paris where he recorded Edith Piaf in her first German recording of "Tell Laura I Love Her."

The first African hit written after independence by Congo composer Kasabelle, "The Independence Cha-Cha," has been recorded in German by The Nilson Brothers. Jupitor records has entered another record in the "Pepe" race. Organst Otto Weiss has recorded the song as an instrumental. Jupitor boss, Ralph Waria Siegel, is also looking for hits

where the shows will take place, but it marks one of the rare tours of American stars in this country.

French dixie clarinetest Claude Luter is now touring Germany with his band and the German Vogue record people are arranging special displays of his records in shops throughout Germany. Vogue is now planning an early release to its first German speaking production.

Claude Goaty will do two of his top French hits in the German language.

The new firm of Vogue-Pye is anxiously awaiting results of talks between the English Pye firm and American Columbia records. It's reported that Columbia may leave its Philips distributors in favor of Pye which would immediately push the new corporation here into a major factor in the industry.

Major American publishing house of Shapiro, Bernstein is extending its activities in this country with the opening of a London branch (see last week's story). Offices will be established in the Columbia Pictures building in Wardour Street and everything is being geared to start activation on March 1st. Cyril Shane, for the past seven years managing director of Kassner Associated Publishers, has been appointed general manager. Richard Voltter, vice president of Shapiro, Bernstein, is coming to England for the inauguration of the new company. As is generally known in addition to its subsidiary company, Skidmore Music, firm also handles the catalog of Columbia Pictures Music Corporation throughout the world. Outlining the company's plans, Shane told The Cash Box that in addition to exploiting fully the American hits of the parent company he will secure and promote as much British and Continental material as possible. Another company Twangy Music Ltd. is being set up to handle all Duane Eddy recordings and compositions. Shane points out that at the time of leaving Kassner the company is riding high with two hit numbers currently in the charts "Portrait Of My Love" by Matt Monro on Parlophone and "Pepe"—the theme tune from the Columbia film of the same name. "Pepe" is handled in the States by Shapiro, Bernstein. Taking over from Shane at Kassner is Ronnie Brohn.

Two new companies make their entry into the record market this week—both are small independent labels and both are specialized. One concentrating on imports and the other on exports. Boyden formed his own orchestra—The London Bach Ensemble with which he has recorded two sets of Bach Orchestral Suites released on the new Philharmonic label. Retailing at 39/9d, each LP is accompanied by a book of musical annotations. The disks are pressed in colored transparent plastic, mono in blue and stereo in red and packaged in four color sleeves. Philharmonic are selling direct to dealers. It is understood that three American companies are negotiating to release the label in the United States.

Swedish jazz musician Lars Gullin, who has been touring Denmark for some time, is now returning to his native Sweden where some jazz club engagements in Malmö are waiting for him. Jens Lawaetz, head of Danish State TV Co., on business visits to Stockholm, Helsinki, and Oslo.

"West Side Story" will be produced on Scandinavian stages this autumn, according to theatre publisher Lars Schmidt. Record companies, most of which have released one or another album from the show, are carefully watching this event, which is expected to first take place in Copenhagen.

A Danish operetta, "Farinelli," composed by Emil Reesen with lyrics by Mogens Dam, has been recorded on an LP by Nordisk Polyphon AS. Singing on the LP, on which 12 of the most popular songs appear, are Else Marie, Gardelli, Grethe Mogensen, Lise Panduro, Poul Bundgaard and Hans Kurt.

Scandinavisk Grammophon AS (SGA) has released a Danish version of the Swedish song, "Fröken JohansenogJeg," sung by Raquel Rastenni. This song, composed by Thore Skogman, has for long time been topping the Norwegian best sellers, and is now reported starting to grow big also in its native Sweden. According to Danish publisher Imudico, it might very soon be a bestseller also in Denmark. SGA promoted the record over the commercial radio station Radio Mercur on February 1.

Starting on Feb. 1, a strike was expected among the artists in Danish radio and TV. This is probably of very little importance to radio listeners in the Copenhagen neighborhood, where the commercial Radio Mercur has for long time been much more popular than the Danish government controlled radio. Representatives for Radio Mercur refuses to comment on the situation, but it is known that any strike of this kind is among the best that could happen to stimulate their popularity.

(SBC) reports that it aired the last film in the serial on Saturday (Jan. 28th). SBC has some more films in this series, which undoubtedly is one of the most popular TV programs in Sweden, but those films has been banned as being "too cruel with too much killings."

While waiting, Salvet's "Le Joie D'aimer" is coming up strong. Ricordi Editions is specializing more and more in publishing film music. Aminollah Hossein's score for the movie "La Menace" belongs to Ricordi. Fontana will market the record of the original track. Delerue will write the music for the film, "Une Aussi Longue Absence" and the main tune, "Trois Petites Notes De Musique," will be recorded by Cora Vaucaire for Pathé-Marconi.

ITALY

Everyone has been very surprised by the exceptionally large number of singers (41) that were employed for The San Remo Festival of 1961. Many suppositions have been made about the reasons that have induced Mr. Ezio Radaelli, the organizer, to invite such a large number of singers on the stage at San Remo, but nobody knows the real one. Many of the singers are almost unknown. unknown.

This year the Selective Committee rejected many old composers to accept, on the contrary, the songs of many among our youngest author-composers. The names of the chief features of the Festival of 1961 are as follows:

They all are well known in Italy—some of them are "best selling" on the record market. Renato Rascel and Domenico Modugno, the clamorous protagonists of the 1960 Festival were not present. Therefore, this year the festival was not built upon the antagonism of two big personalities. Yet, for those who liked contests, this year there were a couple of antagonists—Mina and Miranda Martino.

HOW THE SELECTION WENT ON: The Selective Committee, formed by light music masters and journalists specializing in this particular matter, chose 24 still unpublished songs among hundreds of songs that had been sent to San Remo. 41 Italian singers were chosen to present them on the stage at San Remo, 12 songs the evening of January 26th and 12 the evening after. The jury, through a voting system, had to select 6 songs each evening. The jury was composed by the public in the theater of San Remo and by various groups of persons gathered in the studios of R.A.I., spread all over Italy. The 12 songs voted on during the first two evenings were re-presented to the public the evening of January 28th. After that, the juries at the broadcasting studios have been replaced by a new system of voting. Everyone was invited to vote by means of the forms (polls—that is voting papers) of the "Votofestival San Remo." This year, for the first time, the Festival had been coupled with our weekly national lottery, "Enalotto." The prize has been fixed at Lit. 20,000,000. In every form (poll) of the "Votofestival San Remo" there was a blank space where voting people could write the title of the song they preferred out of the 12 selected and presented the third evening, January 28th. These forms were sold and collected by 12,000 lottery receiving offices all over Italy. By the scrutiny of them, it was determined the final pass-list of the 12 songs which had to be performed again in San Remo, the evening of February 6th, following an inverted order to their position in the pass-list (this is from the 12th up to the 1st). the 1st).

The R.A.I. was present at San Remo. The whole Festival, was, in fact, to be broadcasted on television and, in the third evening (January 28th) even by Eurovision. At the beginning, Sergio Pugliese, supervisor of the television program, was determined to send out only the third evening's program, but a prompt reaction of the record and music publishers, of the owners of radio and television shops, as well as of the public, caused Mr. Spallino. secretary for Post and Telecommunications, to intercede with Mr. Barnabei, R.A.I. general manager, who then assured the presence of television cameras in the theater of San Remo during the entire Festival. The intensity of the reaction of the above mentioned groups, the personal mediation of the Secretary for Post and Telecommunications together with the coupling of the Festival with a lottery, show that the San Remo Festival, this year no longer concerned only the Italian music industry, but it was a national event as so many people were concerned with it.

A month before the San Remo Festival, the entire Italian music industry stops every other activity in order to concentrate its efforts on it. During the month following the Festival, this industry goes on working on the products of the Festival. In total, for two months a year Sam Remo Festival monopolizes the activity of our music industry.

THE ORIGINS:—In 1951 the touring society, A.T.A. (Attivita Turistiche Alberghiere) of San Remo organized a light music festival in the Casino Theater in order to interest the tourists in San Remo. It was a lucky investment from an advertising point of view, because since then, every year, ten days before the beginning of the Festival it is impossible to find room in the hotels of San Remo. Besides, what was then only an unprofitable investment under the item "advertising," has now become quite a profitable economical enterprise.

Landi, the impresario, during an interview at San Remo, made the following statement for The Cash Box:—

"I have come to San Remo to engage some Italian singers for the Second Festival of the Italian Song in New York, where we intend, after last year's successful result, to represent the finalist songs of San Remo Festival 1961. But this year, for reasons I do not know, as I was not informed, the managers of the ATA have thought to engage a few singers of San Remo Festival for a tour abroad, which would possibly go also through the United States and Canada. Had I known that before leaving New York, I should have certainly managed to have my Festival within the tour. Today, for reasons of time and also because I have long since booked Carnegie Hall for the evenings of

February 17, 18, and 19, and a following gala performance on February 20 in Philadelphia I cannot make alterations. Therefore, the Festival in New York will take place in the prefixed evenings and in the above mentioned theater with the participation of singers that this year, have been out of San Remo—Nilla Pizzi, Luciano Virgili, etc. Thus most important Italian record and music publishers will be present there with one (or more) still unpublished songs. I don't rule out the possibility that the negotiations for the tour of San Remo singers through the U.S. and Canada might be satisfactorily carried out. In that case, I shall have the pleasure to present again in New York the singers and songs that succeeded this year at San Remo. This tour will take place, if it does, in the second half of March."

Hans Gerig, first publisher of "Sailor," came to San Remo from Cologne, Germany, to be present at the Festival, as he has done every year since 1955. He said he actually was the first German publisher who came to the San Remo Festival. This fact has given him great advantages in the last few years. He is, in fact, the publisher of "Volare" and "Ciao, Ciao Bambina" for Germany. Gerig has pointed out that Italian songs which went to the top in Germany over the years, commercially keep on a standard position in the German market. Phillippe Boutet of Barclay, during an interview at San Remo, expressed his disappointment because the author-rights of some songs have been sold even before the Festival. For instance, "Le Mille Bolle Blu," published by Paolo Alberto Rossi, has been bought in advance by Southern Music for the whole European Continent. Boutet is of the opinion that the songs this year do not possess commercial and artistic qualities as those of the past years. He thinks that the principal reason for that is due to the preponderant participation of author-singers, who have followed in the tracks of Domenico Modugno without possessing his inventive power. Mr. Boutet intends to buy "Un Uomo Vivo" of Ricordi and "Pozzanghere" of Curci.

- 1) "Al Di La'," sung by Luciano Taioli and Betty Curtis: The song has much commercial value and just after the Festival will be a hit mainly throughout the country, outside the big cities.
- 2) "Come Sinfonia" sung by Pino Donaggio and Teddy Reno: The tune has great artistic and commercial value. From the point of view of the artistic quality, it is the best of the contest. The author and performer, Pino Donaggio, is a young boy and a newcomer on the national music scene discovered by houses Curci and V.C.M. He has a deep culture of Classical music.
- 3) "Dai Carolina Dai" sung by Rocco Granata and Sergio Bruni: It is an easy and pleasant melody and all can sing it after listening to it only once.
- 4) "Febbre Di Musica" sung by Arturo Testa and Tonina Torielli: The tune wonderfully performed by A. Testa has not got particular value either artistically or commercially.
- 5) "Il Mare Nel Cassetto," sung by Milva and Latilla: A hit mainly because of the charm of young Milva and her powerful voice. Milva is a new songstress and the success she received in the theater is extraordinary. Big future possibilities for her.
- 6) "Io Amo Tu Ami," sung by Mina and Nella Floramonti: The fact that the tune was included in the final list was a surprise to all. It will be used as leitmotiv for a motion picture produced by De Laurentis. Excellent performance by Mina.
- 7) "Lei," sung by Joe Sentieri and Fausto Cigliano: The tune, with no possibilities of big commercial success, entered the end-list thanks to Sentieri.
- 8) "Le Mille Bolle Blu," sung by Mina and Genny Luna: The most immediate strongest and cheerful reaction because of the funny and pleasant vein of the melody and the extremely successful performance by both girls. Their recordings will strongly sell over the weeks following the Festival.
- 9) "Mandolino Mandolino," sung by Sergio Bruni and Teddy Reno: The tune entered the end-list thanks to the fame and popularity of Bruni and Reno.
- 10) "Non Mi Dire Chi Sei" sung by Umberto Bindi and Miranda Martino: A new hit by Bindi. A sure record success. Both wonderful performances by the author himself and by Miss Martino.
- 11) "Un Uomo Vivo," sung by Tony Dallara and Gino Paoli: Both record versions will be big hits in Italy.
- 12) "24,000 Baci" sung by Celentano and Little Tony: This rock and roll song will also sell strongly on record. Performed by Celentano, it is a sure success in Italy.

Victor Aquilina of Redifussion in Malta, interviewed at San Remo, told the rep of The Cash Box, "I am the only disk jockey in Malta and I have been spinning records for the past ten years. I have approximately ten hours weekly which include an American and Continental Hit Parade, an early morning "Non-Stops Pops" program and the pick of which is a weekly "Juke Box Saturday Night," which I choose from The Cash Box Top 100. I will accept any records sent to me. Featured in Italian TV "Souvenir" with Gianni Meccia and Teddy Reno and in "Campanile Sera" featured in England when on "Announcers Course" with BBC with Garry Miller and Pete Murray. The hits in Malta are exactly the same and in unison with The Cash Box."



BENELUX

LUXEMBOURG

In the drawing rooms of the Hotel Cravate in Luxembourg, Palette Records recently gave a lunch and a "beer party" on the occasion of the release in England of Bobbejaan's "Cryin' In My Beer," the big continental hit of which the Belgian singer already made several versions in different languages, and now in English. It became a very gay party, and those present were: Ernie Williams (dj English programs of Radio Luxembourg), Barry Alldis (ditto) and his wife, Ted King (ditto) and his wife, Camillo Felgen (dj German programs of Radio Luxembourg), Ray Van Cant (dj Flemish programs of Radio Luxembourg), Johan van Minnen (ditto), Jack Heath (music publisher from London), Maitre Graes (general secretary of Radio Luxembourg), Ian Ralfini (from the Pye Ltd. Company, London), Jan Torfs (editor of the "Juke Box" Magazine), R. Kluger (from Palette Records, Brussels) and Jan Theys (public relations officer from Palette Records, Brussels). Of course, all the disk jockeys made interviews and this means that Bobbejaan's records will get tremendous air time publicity.

The recording, "We're Gonna Dance," sung by Lorna Lesley with Vic Barell and his orchestra, was recently chosen on Radio Luxembourg as "Record Of The Week" by disk jockeys Ted King, Barry Alldis and Ernie Williams. The record has a good chance of becoming a best-seller. Released on the Ronnex label in the Benelux, Polydor bought the rights of this recording for release in the rest of the world.

BELGIUM

Jenny Rimini, 15 year old teenage-vocalist of Antwerp, cut her first two sides for Philips. First title, a Dutch version of "Seventeen" (Bel Air Music, California) becomes now "Zeventien." Flipside is "Hello Mate" ('What Do You Think About The Hit Parade') penned by Ben Cristy, Terry Rendall and Louis Baret. Both songs are controlled by "Intermusic Publishers," Antwerp.

The Cousins, the newly discovered Palette artists about whom we already wrote before, are having a tremendous success with their original, "Kili Watch." Numerous European TV stations have engaged the group to present their continental hit for viewers in Holland, Belgium, Paris, Frankfurt and

Ping Ping, the Dutch singer (from Suriname), now living in Belgium, is most happy about the phenomenal success of his recording of "Sucu Sucu." This best-selling version of a beautiful Argentinian number of Taranteno Rojas, now on the best-seller chart of Belgium, Holland, Germany, Switzerland and the Scandinavian countries, was released in the U.S. by Kapp Records Feb. 1. Ping Ping appeared on Dutch television recently and cut out on the numerous cover versions in Holland by name artists like Eddy Christiani, Maria Zamora, Alberto Cortez, Jacky Noguez and Caterina Valente. On February 4th Ping Ping was honored at a record shop in Maastricht (Holland), where one dealer sold 1,000 copies in three weeks time. Ping Ping is booked now for TV in Belgium, Denmark, Sweden, Germany and Italy. From February 1 on, Funkler records will be released in Belgium by Palette. Rocco Granata's newest sides: "Na Vota Casci'" and "Na Vota Cano'."

HOLLAND

Robert Oeges, Bovema's Columbia label manager, told The Cash Box that the EMI concern usually takes over the American repertoire in English versions very quickly. Both the Bill Forbes disk of "Sweet Sixteen" and "Rubberball" by The Avons, as well as Ricky Valance's "Jimmy's Girl" have just been released. Backed by continuous plugging on Radio Luxembourg, these disks will surely find their way, says Oeges. Furthermore, "Tell Laura I Love Her," Columbia's hotcake for many weeks, already sold the total of 20,000 units in Holland. There is a lot of demand for Russ Conway's newest hit, "Pepe," also

Velde sings his son "Oh Monica," well received by the public.

Johnny Meyer, the Dutch accordion star, recorded his new EP in the Bovema studio. The record will be released on the Imperial label. Johnny also made a series of recordings with Hammond organist Cor Steyn. The two are already well known in Holland, calling themselves The Hammacs. There's also a new record in the rock 'n roll field, on this label. Charles Tuinenburg, brother of the famous U.S. emigrated teen star, Lydia, picked "Don't Go" and "Yes Sir That's My Baby."

Felsted Records has released the original Dutch recording of Electric Johnny entitled: "Johnny On His Strings"/"Black Eyes Rock." The recording was made by C. N. Rood on the Dutch CNR label; original publishers are Editions Altona, Amsterdam. The following message was given to the American dealers: "One of the best selling instrumental combo's throughout Belgium and Holland today, and the busiest night club talent is Electric Johnny and his Skyrockets. Top side, "Johnny On His Strings," has been one of the most consistent sellers in Holland during the last five months and feel that it's quite possible that disk buyers here will also respond to this group as did European.

If possible, Capitol will release the new version of "Calcutta" sung by the Four Preps. "We expect to have a hit on our hands," according to Hundepool.

CANADA

Although demand for name artists has greatly decreased in the night club medium, work is becoming more abundant for recording artists in stage shows. Emphasis is being placed on shows appealing to the teen-age market. Many French hit recording artists failed to find more than fifteen weeks work in the night club circuit during 1960. The trend, therefore, has been to devote more time to personal and T. V. appearances. Michael Louvain has done well in this type of programming. Another example may be illustrated by the Johnny Mathis show which played in town for a week. This show did quite well because it attracted the under twenty-one set. Had he appeared in a night club this audience would have failed to see him. Adults hesitate to attend night clubs because of the new early closing by-laws. Night clubs cannot afford to bring in a big name under these conditions. An idea, which is new in Canadian circles, is the dance party type of show. This show allows the teenager to dance and also see hit artists perform for the price of one ticket. All Star Enterprises are introducing the idea at the Show Mart on Feb. 10 and 11. The dance party will begin at eight and close at midnight. The stars of the show were reported in the Feb. 4 edition of The Cash Box.

Phil Rose at Compo reports that the newly acquired United Artists Ultra Audio line has far surpassed its sales quota. Also doing well for Compo is the Bing Crosby Sing-A-Long LP on Warner Bros.

The big one at Phonodisc this week is "Wheels" by the String-A-Longs on Warwick. At Quality sales are highest for "Corinna, Corinna" by Ray Peterson. And at Zirkon all order sheets include "Angel Baby" by Rosie And The Originals.

AUSTRALIA

Many record company executives expressed great interest in the lead editorial of Cash Box January 28 on the standardization of record speeds. It wouldn't be a surprise to see an almost immediate switch to a common 33 rpm to cover all types of records. There is very little to hinder the adoption of a standard speed in Australia as there are very few record players in this country with the sole 45 rpm equipment and the large hole common to American singles has never been a regular part of disk manufacture in this country. If American record companies are prepared—in the face of problems brought about by various style record-players—to make an effort toward the adoption of 33 as the standard record speed, there is very little reason why Australian diskeries shouldn't also because we do not face the same record-player worries. The Australian record industry now has the chance to be the first country to adopt the suggested standard speed of 33 rpm for all records.

The very famous and popular Kingston Trio is scheduled to make a concert tour of Australia commencing February 13. Team will also visit New Zealand. Boys' first big record in this country, "Tom Dooley," was a sensational hit for them and it still rates as one of the best selling singles released here over the past few years. It's Just A Matter Of Time

Last week, one of the automobile industry's leading sales executives spoke before a group of businessmen, and while discussing new car sales possibilities for '61, stated that the sales potential is actually greater today than it was during the late 1940's. He referred to statements by uninformed people, appearing regularly in the press, to the effect that new car sales have reached a saturation point. In contrast with this, the auto exec pointed to actual sales figures and showed that new car sales run close to 10% of the total number of automobiles on the road. Furthermore, he advised that about 50% of the cars presently being driven in the United States are from seven to ten years old.

New car sales are expected to increase proportionately with the improvement predicted in the country's economy. He personally looks for a sharp upward turn before the end of the year. A comparison can be made here between the auto and the new coin-operated machines.

Most of the machines on location today are older models—phonographs go back from five to seven years, with games for the most part several years old. Should the economy improve, sales of new equipment will naturally increase. The saturation point of new coin-operated machines is nowhere in sight.

Due to a tight financial position evident around the nation today, most coinmen find it impossible to invest in the number of new machines they realize they should buy to protect their overall investment and keep up collections. However, once this situation is remedied and money from increased collections is available, these same operators will immediately pump new life into an operation that will be in dire need of new equipment and gradually return to a normal operating procedure.

Statements from Washington, from leading business executives, and general trends are on the optimistic side. The coin machine industry, from manufacturer to operator, can look to improved conditions as well as other businesses. It's just a matter of time.

ATE Attendance Will Set New Record

LONDON—Early reports from London's New Royal Horticultural Hall indicated that the final attendance figures at the 17th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition, held here January 31-February 2, will break all previous existing records. Display space, at a premium, was "doubled up" in many booths with several manufacturers using the same stand space to display merchandise. Several exhibitors refrained from showing complete lines to the thousands of visitors, asking that they return at a later date to showrooms in town.

Biggest attraction of the show was expected to be the fruit machines, just for sheer volume. However, new phonographs and games with many new model vendors were also expected to share a large portion of the attraction.

Complete news coverage, photographs of stands, personalities and events will be featured in the February 18 issue of The Cash Box.

Because of the conflict between the trade show dates and our press deadline dates it was impossible to report on the ATE in this issue. Complete coverage will be included in next week's issue.

Rockola Looks For \$6 Million Sales From Williams Acquisition

Firm Purchases Three Vending Companies From Williams Electronic Including IVI

CHICAGO—Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation moved into vending's major leagues last week when David C. Rockola, President, officially announced the acquisition of three divisions of Williams Electronic Manufacturing Corporation, a subsidiary of Consolidated Sun Ray of Philadelphia. The announcement came as no surprise having been made after legal notices from Rock-Ola's attorneys were circulated throughout the industry advising of the intended purchase three weeks ago.

"It is expected that these acquisitions will add \$5,000,000 a year to Rock-Ola sales," Rockola said.

The acquisitions, along with the recent purchase of the Fred Hebel Corporation in Addison, Illinois, make Rock-Ola a major factor in the merchandise vending machine business.

The companies acquired by Rock-Ola in their latest move into the vending machines business are Industrial Vending, Inc., Trilex Engineering, Inc., and the Merchandise Vending Division of Williams Electronic Manufacturing Corporation. The acquisitions involved an undisclosed cash consideration.

consideration.

Industrial Vending manufactures one of the leading lines of fresh brew batch and single cup coffee machines serving refrigerated fresh cream. All key and supervisory personnel of the three acquired companies now operating at the Niles, Illinois, and Filmore Avenue plant in Chicago, will be moved to Rock-Ola's main manufacturing facility at Chicago and Kedzie Avenues in Chicago. Preliminary preparations will make it possible to continue manufacture of the IVI coffee brewing machine without interruption at the new site within a week.

"Rock-Ola has purchased all of the machinery, assembly, production equipment, as well as other assets such as good will, patents and trademarks used in the Williams' operation," Mr. Rockola said.

"We consider ourselves most fortunate in being able to take over the manufacture of the IVI coffee machines which have had universal acceptance with some 2,000 operator organizations servicing the equipment."

Rock-Ola in recent years has expanded their engineering facilities in order to develop a complete line of electrical inplant and merchandise vending machines. These operations were supplemented last August by the acquisition of the Fred Hebel Corporation, manufacturers of powdered coffee, ice cream, hot food, and bulk milk machines. The latest acquisitions complement the present output and will be absorbed completely in Rock-Ola's main plant which includes twenty-three buildings covering an area of more than three and a half

city blocks at Chicago and Kedzie Avenues.

Rock-Ola's original intention to purchase the Williams' Vending interests came as a surprise to the vending industry. The trademark IVI is well known in the industry and was a pioneer in the manufacture of coffee brewing machines. The original IVI fresh brew coffee machine was invented and developed by John Totten, chief engineer of Trilex Engineering, Inc., who will become chief engineer of the subsidiary under Rock-Ola maagement, and Sidney Rudin, now one of the principals of Automatic Retailers of America. It met with such overwhelming success that it immediately won acceptance by operators in all parts of the country.

Among the companies now utilizing these machines are Davidson Brothers in California, G. B. Macke in Washington, D.C., Kielson in Ohio; Automatic Merchandising, Davend and Vendomatic in Chicago and Detroit. A number of these companies are affiliated with Federated Vendors, Inc., and Automatic Retailers of America.

The new acquisitions will become subsidiaries of Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation.



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

"An increase in sales in overseas markets by American producers will not only help to end the dwindling of the nation's gold reserves, but it will provide employment

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for thousands of jobless workers and stimulate new growth in every segment of our economy," stated Blough. American business, Blough said, shares with the incoming Federal Administration the obligation to do whatever possible to keep America "strong, secure, dynamic and free." Both the new President and business have a mandate to carry out such con-

Both the new President and business have a mandate to carry out such constructive policies, he said.

Referring to the gold reserve problem, Blough said: "When Government has done all it safely can to curtail expenditures of public funds abroad, it will be up to us to do the balance of the job by increasing our sales of goods and services in competition with foreign producers."

goods and services in competition with foreign producers."

Blough outlined four basic elements which would assist industry in achieving its goals: "First, innovation—the development of new products and services and the consequent creation of new markets.

"Second perhaps is the constant

of new markets.

"Second, perhaps, is the constant improvement of quality to the end that American products may retain or increase their superiority over competing items abroad.

"Third is the reduction of costs and the increase of productivity by every practical means so that American-made goods can be offered in world markets at the lowest possible prices consistent with the high standards of American production."

A fourth—and key—element is more

A fourth—and key—element is more intensive and effective salesmanship.

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

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CHICAGO—A new gravity-operated mechanism that keeps vending machines from taking all types of slug or foreign coin, has been introduced by the ABT Division of Automatic Canteen Company of America, Called the model 4000 Four-in-one slug rejecter, it enables a vending machine to validate quarters, nickels, dimes, or pennies, and reject all other coins. With 20 per cent fewer parts than other similar mechanisms, this new unit is more efficient in validating coins, more reliable, and easier to service. The mechanism features a newly designed "cradle lock," which provides an improved, positive means of blocking the quarter path to all of the smaller coins. Magnets within the unit control the trajectory of the coins as they pass through their assigned paths into separated deposit banks. Foreign coins and slugs automatically land in a reject chamber.

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
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
