

The record industry's future lies in the hands of new talent. Youngsters unknown to the record industry today, will be the hot record names of tomorrow.

Of course, when one thinks in terms of the present, the big names are the money-makers. They are the people the industry can count on with a good measure of consistency. They are the album sellers. But it is an established fact that any company enjoying great success with big names while ignoring what should be a never ending search for new talent, is a company which is headed downhill.

The effect of a new talent breaking through in star proportions has long been appreciated by the entire record business. When a new name hits big, the whole industry seems to come alive. Traffic increases in stores. The company producing the star finds that its whole line comes to life. Albums begin to sell. Other singles on the brink of breaking for the label, seem to get the necessary boost to send them over the hill. Everyone benefits from a smashing single.

Therefore, The Cash Box this week takes a step designed to call additional trade attention to "newcomers" by listing their pick records in a special "Pick Of The Week-Newcomers" section.

Primarily, this move is being made to call to the trade's attention Pick records by artists who have never before appeared on The Cash Box Top 100 chart. Prior to this week's innovation, newcomers who received "Pick Of The Week" awards in The Cash Box were listed along with the Picks by the top hot names of the day. Unfortunately, new talent has suffered from this approach at the radio station level. Many program directors, disk jockeys and librarians examining trade papers for suggestions on new releases, and realizing that they can only add about five or six new releases to their programming schedule in a week's time, tend to select veterans' new disks. As a result, too many exciting sides by new names have been suffering.

Therefore, it is urgently hoped that the new format we will be employing henceforth, will give newcomers a much needed assist. Perhaps radio personnel will now select new programming material with the thought of picking some from the pros and some from the plebes.



"SOME KIND OF WONDERFUL" (2:15) [Aldon BMI—King, Goffin] "HONEY BEE" (2:57) [Progressive BMI—Terry]

THE DRIFTERS (Atlantic 2096)

Chances are the Drifters will be right back at the top of the charts with their newest Atlantic slice. It's a fabulous rock-a-cha-cha, tabbed "Some Kind Of Wonderful," that the artists deck out in ultra-commercial fash-ion. Potent string-filled ork support by Ray Ellis & Co. Coupler's an enticing beat-ballad blues-styled ditty with a fetching falsetto lead.

"FELL IN LOVE ON A MON-DAY" (1:55) "SHU RAH" (1:42) [Travis BMI-Domino, Bartholo-[Travis BMI— Domino] mewl FATS DOMINO (Imperial 5734)

Domino continues to turn 'em out in two-sided hit fashion. His latest is no exception. The exciting handclap thumper, "Shu Rah," is set to replace "Ain't That A Woman" (chart-wise) while the beat ballad romantic walk'er, "Fell In Love On A Monday," will soon be filling in for "What A Price." Great double-header.

"GIDGET GOES HAWAIIAN" (2:15) [Columbia Pictures ASCAP—Styne, Karger] "THEME FROM DIXIE" (1:57) [Linduane BMI-Eddy] DUANE EDDY (Jamie 1183)

Eddy, who's currently riding high with his theme from "Pepe," offers another pic-title tune that'll be well on its way in no time at all. This one's from the up-coming flick, "Gidget Goes Hawaiian," and it's (natch) a 'pineapple-flavored' rocker with enticing sans lyric chants. The South rises again (wax-wise) on the twang-rock coupler that also looks like a bit winner. bi winner.

"MY THREE SONS" (2:18) [Don-Michael BMI-DeVol] "OUT OF A CLEAR BLUE SKY" (2:33) [Harry Von Tilzer ASCAP-Singer, Von Tilzer]

LAWRENCE WELK (Dot 16198)

Lawrence Welk, a name that now means Top 100 significance thanks to his "Calcutta" million-seller, should continue his newly-won singles pop-ularity with a charming "Calcutta"-type survey of the popular TV'er theme, "My Three Sons." Look for further Top 100 news from maestro Welk. Underlid is a cheerful "Third Man Theme"-type arrangement of the sentimental oldie, "Out Of A Clear Blue Sky," that can also zoom skywards skywards.

"SWEET LITTLE KATHY" (2:22) [S-P-R BMI—Peterson, Boyce] "YOU DIDN'T CARE" (2:03) [S-P-R BMI-Boyce, Marascalo] RAY PETERSON (Dunes 2004)

Peterson and "Corrina" walked hand-in-hand into hitsville via the artist's Dunes debut. He should easily follow suit with "Sweet Little Kathy." It's an extremely pretty, soft beat cha cha weeper that Ray (and the Bob Mersey ork) puts across with telling effect. "You Didn't Care" makes for a touching ballad companion piece. Bigtop handles the deck nationally.

"TREES" (2:28) [G. Schirmer & Jerry Vogel ASCAP-Kilmer, Rasbach] "IMMORTAL LOVE" (2:24) [A.M.C. ASCAP-Grover, Solis, Shore] THE PLATTERS (Mercury 71791)

Longtime song favorites should get solid chart coin with their usual fine ballad blend, this time on the pretty durable, "Trees," based on Joyce Kilmer's famed poem. Track comes from the team's "Life Is Just A Bowl of Cherries" LP. "Immortal Love" is a pleasing affectionate date in a lightly skipping manner. Could also move.

"AIN"T IT BABY" (2:33) [Jobete BMI-Robinson] "THE ONLY ONE I LOVE" (2:45) [Jobete BMI-Robinson] THE MIRACLES (Tamla 54036)

The Miracles don't have to "Shop Around" for a hit here. Artists fol-low their current smash with a tantalizing, similarly-styled rock-romancer titled "Ain't It Baby." Bill "Smokey" Robinson is featured on this deck with that 'bust-wide-open' potential. Things slow down to a beat-ballad pace on the lower stanza.

JOHNNY RIVERS (Chancellor 1070)

(B+) "I GET SO DOGGONE LONESOME" (2:02) [Hi-Low BMI—Cash] Solid rock-a-billy de-livery from the songster and pop-styled rock-a-string (& chorus) back-drop. This is exciting stuff, and it could step-out.

(B) "KNOCK THREE TIMES" (2:56) [Cigma BMI—Joy] Country-flavored stuff in a low-down vein. Strings are again present.

BOBBY TAYLOR (KaJo 2201)

(B+) "WALK, WALK, WALK" (2:16) [Jeneva & Just BMI— Taylor, Allen] Potent R&B-styled stuff on the order of the awhile-back Isley Bros. hit, "Shout." Both the dy-namism of the songster and combo-chorus could bring this sound onto the R&B & pop charts. The Rust label handles distribution.

(B) "IT'S FUNNY" (2:30) [Je-neva & Just BMI—Taylor] displays much blues understanding here.

FRANKIE FORD (Imperial 5735)

(B+) "DOG HOUSE" (2:12) [Travis BMI—Bartholomew, Guidry] The songster and combo goodsoundingly handle the theme, resembling the recent Joe Jones hit, "You Talk Too Much." Here, the lazy wife is told to start improving herself or she's gonna be in the doghouse as far as he's concerned. Can move.

"SEVENTEEN" (2:05) [Lois (B) BMI—Young, Gorman, Bennett, Boyd] Bennett's years-back-hit returned in a light-hearted session.

BOB KNIGHT FOUR (Laurel 1020)

(B+) "GOOD GOODBY" (2:11) [Mick Rick & Sepe ASCAP— Zeccola, Sepe] A teen-sentimental with that "oldie" soft-beat sell could mean a chart listing for the song-sters. Lead render the wistful against remarks from the other songsters, in-cluding falsetto bits. Could take-off.

(B) "HOW OLD MUST I BE" (1:40) [Miller ASCAP—Con-over] An easy-beat essay about a fella who wonders if he can fall in love in tender teen years.

RED WILLIAMS (Dot 16195)

(B+) "WALKIN'" (2:00) [Tracy BMI—Williams] A strong rock-a-billy sound from singer Wil-liams and the combo-chorus. This con-tagious sound could develop into a big chartrider.

(B) "WAITING FOR YOU" (2:05) [Tracy BMI—Wil-liams] This quick-beat side leans somewhat more toward the country field.

THE DOVELLS (Parkway 819)

(B+) "NO NO NO" (2:39) [May-land BMI-Borisoff] Another teen sound revival, a contagious up-beat display by the songsters and chorus with that chimes-like arrange-ment. Volatile performance for teen traffic.

(B) "LETTERS OF LOVE" (2:06) [Mayland BMI—Bori-soff] Boys are sentimental ala the un-complicated teen-ballad sounds of yore. Boi' sides have sounds that are coming hack coming back.

THE MEDICINE MEN

(Laurel 1016)

(B+) "TEEN FEVER" (2:15)(B+) "TEEN FEVER" (2:15) [Sepe ASCAP — Applebaum, Sepe, Perrysims] This far-out teen stint is spotlighted by sharp chants from the chorus and strings. Under this is a constant rumbling sound. Original stint that could come-through with chart coin.

(B) "LUCKY STAR" (2:02) [Sepe & Horsley ASCAP— Baker, Sepe] Tinkling keyboard and triplet backing head this relaxed sentimental.

CHARLES BROWN & AMOS MILBURN (King 5446)

AMOS MILBURN (King 5440) (B+) "I WANNA GO BACK HOME" (2:30) [Lois BMI — Brown] The two vet r&b song stylists team up for an enticing harmonic duet display of a homesick blues opus. They read it with solid "low-down" feelings and could rack up in the two-market dont dept.

(B+) "MY LITTLE BABY" (2:42) [J&C BMI—Nix, Glover] An-other easy-going soulful blues stanza is interestingly displayed by the two here. Both ends rate attention.

THE DREAMERS (Guaranteed 219)

 (B+) "MARY MARY" (2:25) [Da-vid Jones BMI-Lasman, Vin-cent] Male group & musicians solidly romp on the infectious name-song. One of those "oldie" teen sounds that will interact new generation of teen will interest new generation of teeners.

(B) "CANADIAN SUNSET" (2:40) [Meridian BMI—Hey-wood, Gimbel] Familiar opus—now practically a standard—is rendered with a good medium-beat blend by the singers. singers.

BILLY DE MARCO (Up 113)

(B+) "GOODBYE M I S T E R BLUES" (2:32) [Herkage BMI—Fenton, Trester] The catchy item is done with a bouncy teen sound by the songster and combo-male chorus. A teen-wise session, the vehicle of which is also represented on the Laurie label.

(B) "OUT OF MY MIND" (2:15) [Herkage BMI—Fenton, Tres-ter] The songster and same accom-paniment do a semi-sock stint here.

LATTIMORE BROWN (Excello 2196)


(B+) "SOMEBODY'S GONNA (B+) "SOMEBODY'S GONNA MISS ME" [Excellorec BMI– Brown, Reeves] The vet blues song-ster in an exciting display of earthy romantic tears. Spirited offering fea-tures striking instrumental combo as-sistance sistance.

(B) "DARLIN' DEAR" (2:23) [Excellorec BMI — Finney] Familiar slow blues ground is covered enticingly by the artist here in a pounding rock-a-ballad. Lad has a strong, faithful following in blues marts marts.

NELSON KEENE (Capitol 4540)

(B+) "TEENAGE TROUBLES" (2:60) [Eddie Mannion—Man-nion] This English import has a fine rapid-fire made-in-the-U.S. feel. Keene warbles the romantic (does the gal love the guy?) against a strong string-chorus statement. Could make noise here noise here.

(B) "KEEP LOVING ME" (2:02) [Selma BMI—Lee] Slow-beat tempo with interesting string remarks.



It's chock full of the sounds the kids dig. Get with it. Lower stanza's an emotion beat-ballad romancer that can also share in the sales and spins can also share in the sales and spins.

Stellar, quick paced choral-ork support for the chirp's fine multi-tracking. The late Johnny Horton's country click, "Whispering Pines," is a sock 'new' cha cha vehicle for Miss Maxwell.

"YOU AIN'T HEARD NOTHIN' YET"—Jackie Wilson—Brunswick BL 54100 The songster, himself one of today's most dynamic in-person performers, offers a tribute to one of the greatest of all time—Al Jolson—by performing here twelve of Jolson-associated tunes. No attempt at imitation is made and the deck comes off winningly as an outstanding ex-ample of Wilson's capabilities. Selections include "Toot, Toot, Tootsie Goodbye," "Swanee," "April Showers," "You Made Me Love You" and "Rock-A-Bye Your Baby With a Dixie Melody." Chart potential. potential.

"FAR AWAY PLACES"—Enoch Light and his Orchestra—Command RS 822SD The Enoch Light percussion ensemble is aug-mented here by Billy Rowland's harpsichord for an exciting musical journey around the world. The trip is highlighted by such melodies as "Waltzing Matilda," "The Third Man Theme," "Calcultta," "How Are Things In Glocca Morra" and "The Poor People of Paris." Voices, hand-clapping and imaginative percussion are spicy additives here. Should do very well in sales.

"COUNT BASIE & SARAH VAUGHN"-Roulette R 52061 Every groove bursts with solid entertainment. Sarah Vaughan is in great form here and with the Count Basie ork driving behind her, there's very little more to be said. Disk opens with a brisk, scat-highlighted reading of "Perdido," and then continues through "Lover Man," "There Are Such Things," "I Cried For You" and "You Go To My Head." Great collaboration.

"TALL TALES AND SHORT TEMPERS"—Jim Reeves—RCA Victor LPM-2284 The smooth, calming voice of Jim Reeves is a gently reassuring vocal stroke on a brace of folk chestnuts, most of which are American country tunes, but with a few of other heritage. He sings such remembered songs as "The Streets of Laredo," "The Letter Edged In Black," "That Silver-Haired Daddy of Mine" and "The Wreck of the Number Nine" with the simple straight-forward sincerity that has made him a star. Pack-age also includes his latest single, "The Blizzard," which, though new, is also in the folk tradition.

"SHOW GIRL"—Original Broadway Cast—Carol Channing, Jules Munshin—Roulette R 80001 Virtually a one-woman showcase for the many diversified talents of Carol Channing, "Show Girl" opened on Broadway in Jan. to good notices. Sup-ported very ably by just Jules Munshin and a French male quartet called Les Quat' Jeudis, Miss Channing clowns, mugs, and sings her way through a series of engaging songs and sketches created by Charles Gaynor. A very entertaining evening on the stage, "Show Girl" proves of high entertainment value on disk.

"AL HIRT-THE GREATEST HORN IN THE WORLD"-RCA Victor LPM-2366 After years of local New Orleans admiration, this big, bearded trumpet player is finally getting the national recognition his talents warrant. The trumpet is just a toy in his hands as he urges and coaxes it to do amazing things. Throughout, he remains completely musical, with a huge tone to match his size. Here, he's accom-panied alternately by the string and swinging band of Henri Rene, in a lineup of brassy swingers and ballads. They include "Begin the Berguine," "Sweet Sue," "Georgia On My Mind," "Willow Weep For Me" and "Undecided."



"THE SWINGIN'S MUTUAL"—The George Shearing Quintet with Nancy Wilson—Capitol

Shearing Quintet with Nancy WIISON—Capitor ST 1524 The easy-going swing style of the Shearing Quintet provides handsome instrumental show-cases for the wonderfully alive singing of Nancy Wilson. They're matched on six of the twelve tracks, while the Quintet goes it alone instru-mentally on the remaining six. Vocal sides include "On Green Dolphin Street," "The Things We Did Last Summer" and "The Nearness of You"; in-strumentally there's "You Are There" and "Blue Lou." Lots of jazz/pops interest here.













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"BABY SITTIN' WITH BUZZ CLIFFORD"-Columbia CL 1616 Rising to stardom via the novelty "Baby Sittin' Boogie," Buzz Clifford is given plenty of room here to stretch out in a display of his vocal talents. This first LP showcases his smooth ballad manner on "Ebb Tide" and "Unchained Melody" as well as displays his rock 'n roll ability on "Shake, Rattle and Roll," "I'm In Love Again" and "True Love, True Love." The "Boogie" hit is also included. Could be a big teen item.

"GREAT MOMENTS AT THE UNITED NA-TIONS"-Narrated by Dave Garroway-Signa-ture SM-9001

ture SM-9001 The history of the world organization is told in speech excerpts strung together by narration spoken by Dave Garroway. Bud Greenspan, writer and producer, has put together a stirring, com-manding perspective view of the U.N. in its time of crises, from its formation right through the present, An historical pageant worth owning.

"JACKIE GLEASON PRESENTS THE GENTLE TOUCH"—Capitol SW 1519 A departure from the usual Gleason mood fare, this album's emphasis is on the lightly-swinging side. Solo trumpets backed by a woodwind en-semble replace the familiar Gleason strings, and they maintain a flavorful, easy-going, cheek-to-cheek mood. The tunes employed are "Looking For a Boy," "By Myself," "How High The Moon," "Oh! Look At Me Now" and "Until the Real Thing Comes Along." Excellent mood offering.

"DIANA TRASK"—Columbia CL 1601 Actress-thrush Diana Trask awaits a smash single for disk stardom but until then this album will introduce her as an extremely capable song-bird with an intimate ballad manner and a natural easy-swinging gait. Glenn Osser surrounds her with sympathetic string orchestrations as she coddles "It Might As Well Be Spring," "My Funny Valentine," "Hello, Young Lovers," "I Hear Music," "Little Girl Blue" and other fine songs. A superior talent in a delicious first album.

"SONGS EVERYBODY KNOWS"—Teresa Brewer—Coral CRL 57361 The songstress offers fresh and invigorating readings of a dozen tunes which, with two excep-tions, were all famed country music hits. In this dept. she does well with "Anymore," "Walking the Floor Over You," "Mockin' Bird Hill," "Your Cheatin' Heart" and "Half As Much." Good lis-tening entertainment tening entertainment.

"ANDY AND THE BEY SISTERS"—RCA Victor LPM-2315

LPM-2315 A trio of vivacious songsters (Andy also plays the piano) that have already gained European recognition, Andy and the Bey Sisters bow their diversified talents in this LP. They exude an engaging warmth and perform with constant variety such tunes as "On The Sunny Side Of The Street," "Mood Indigo," "It Must Be So" and "Bye Bye Blackbird." Each tune is treated as an individual production number and the pace is kept lively. A big audience awaits their work.

"HAWAIIAN PERCUSSION"—Billy Mure, his Guitar and Orchestra—Strand SLS 1010 Strand now enters the percussion race with a well produced session featuring Billy Mure. The guitarist calls on all his technical facilities for this session, acting as arranger, conductor and prime soloist for a bill that includes "Hawaiian War Chant," "Song of the Islands," "Sweet Leilani" and "Drifting and Dreaming." The stereo percussion is well handled, with flair and show-manship but not with persistent over-emphasis as in many cases. Good, widely-appealing LP.





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"JACK HASKELL SWINGS FOR JACK PAAR"

"JACK HASKELL SWINGS FOR JACK PAAR" —Strand SL 1020 Haskell is a very capable "legit" singer with an agreeable, well-modulated voice. In this first al-bum for Strand he gets swinging assistance from the Al Cohn arrangements for brisk, bubbly per-formances of "Moonlight Saving Time," "Make Someone Happy," "Make Believe," "I Hadn't Any-one Till You" and other superior melodies. Good taste reigns throughout.

"AS TIME GOES BY"-Vera Lynn-MGM E 3889

E 3889 Miss Lynn, one of England's top entertainers, has a rich, colorful voice matched to a flawless delivery. Here she's at her most romantic and the deep expressiveness with which she sings is a refreshing breeze. Among the songs are "Young At Heart," "It's Easy To Remember," "I'll Re-member April," "In the Wee Small Hours of the Morning" and the cherished title tune. An enter-tainer of stature in a wonderful album.







"AZURE"-King Curtis and his Orchestra-Everest LPBR 5121 The blue mood is woven here by the threads of the King Curtis tenor sax, string backdrops by Samuel Lowe and soft voices of the Malcolm Dodds Singers. Curtis' soulful solo work is super-imposed over lush strings and now-and-then voices in dreamy performances of "Off Shore," "The Nearness of You," "When I Fall In Love" and "Our Love Is Here To Stay," among others.

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Having destroyed the Air Force in song, as well Having destroyed the Air Force in song, as well as other Armed Services and hobbyists, Brand now takes on the private fliers in merry song. Calling upon his usual collection of P.D. melodies, he has fitted them with appropriate lyrics and they now come out "When I First Set Out To Fly," "The A & E Mechanics," "Passenger's Lament" and "Teterboro Tower." Though the set has particular appeal to fliers, Brand has a wide following.

"GRIMM'S HIP FAIRY TALES"—As Dug By Don Morrow—Roulette R 25146 Like when Hansel and Gretel, two hip kids with

square handles, met up with a sexy witch with a twitch, well . . . Grimm never sounded like this when we were kids. But Don Morrow, with crea-tive assists from Andy Doyle and Mort Lindsey, put his imagination to work to come up with these hip, beat translations of Grimm's fairy tales. Here are Hansel & Gretel, Rumpelstiltskin, the Shoemaker and the Elves and others done to a crisp hip turn. A swingin' jazz combo accom-panies Morrow's narration. Not for the squares.

"EL MARIACHI"—Mariachi Monumental De Silvestre Vargas—Orfeon LP 12-119 The usual complement of Mariachis has been doubled by Silvestre Vargas, one of the founders of the genre, for a "monumental" reading of some of Mexico's classic songs. With spirit and obvious devotion they perform such cherished melodies as "Alla En El Rancho Grande," "Cielito Lindo," "La Bamba," "La Negra" and Guadalajara." Enjoy-able listening. able listening.

"A NIGHT IN TUNISIA"—Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers—Blue Note 4049 The Dizzy Gillespie jazz classic has always been a showstopper in the Blakey book. It's now the highlight of this album, which even takes its name from it. The fiery, pulsating, poly-rhythmic "Tunisia" stands out particularly as a showcase for Blakey's drumming, and he pulls out all the stops on this studio session. Other selections in the set are "Sincerely Diana," "So Tired," "Yama" and "Kozo's Waltz," but "Tunisia" re-mains the major attraction.

R 52064 Some of the newer items in the Maynard Fer-guson book are presented here. These are not the dance date tunes, but the more ambitious jazz undertakings of the band and reveals its direction toward wider communication with its audiences. The safest stand to take is that ultimately Coleman might have a strong hand in forming an important new direction in jazz. As yet his music important new direction in jazz. As yet, his music remains unlistenable to most. Here he plays six originals and one standard ("Embraceable You") with his usual devoted passion. It is a striking display of originality, to say the least.

"PERCUSSIVE JAZZ" Vol. 2—Arranged by Sidney Cooper—Audio Fidelity DFS 7007 Hip, swinging jazz directed at the big pop stereo market. Cooper's arrangements make use of a variety of interesting instrumentation and with brisk percussion effects combine in tight-knit ensemble work on such melodic tunes as "Every-thing's Coming Up Roses," "I've Heard That Song Before," "If I Were A Bell" and "It's All Right With Me." "DIXIELAND LEFT AND RIGHT"—Johnny Best and Dick Cathcart and their All-Stars— Mercury PPS-6009 The Dixie bands of Best and Cathcart are pitted against each other in a stereo battle of the bands. With Best's ensemble emanating from the left speaker and the Cathcart group at the right, they swing vigorously through a bill of standards, several of which are ideally suited for the two-band arrangement: "Little Sir Echo," "Sam's Song," "You're Just In Love." A bright swinging semi-jazz outing with strong pop appeal.

"FORREST FIRE"—Jimmy Forrest—Prestige/ New Jazz 8250 A hard driving, indeed fiery tenor man, Forrest

A hard driving, indeed fiery tenor man, Forrest pulls out all the stops in this blowing session. Accorded musically sympathetic support from organ, guitar and drums, Forrest drives un-relentlessly through a six-tune lineup which in-cludes "Remember," "Bags' Groove" and "When Your Lover Has Gone." He has plenty of "blues roots" and showmanship to appeal to a wide audience audience.

Each performs with brilliance. Although it's the third "Traviata" in the Victor catalog, it's the first in stereo. This plus Victor's low opera package price makes it a handsome, appealing set.

WAGNER: "The Flying Dutchman"—Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, Gottlob Frick, Marianne Schech, Chorus and Orchestra of German State Opera, Berlin, conducted by Franz Konwitschny—Angel 3616 C/L

3616 C/L Richard Wagner's eerie, despairing operatic version of the famed legend is put to disk with great care and sensitivity. It is a richly colorful work and is performed with amazing intensity by the principals. The recording itself is extremely well-balanced with realistic depth and movement. Only the third complete recording in the catalog, this three-disk set should receive a big welcome in-the market.



Originally a solo, he was teamed several years ago on a now-defunct label with a group called the Timberlanes. Coming to the attention of Laurie Records, they signed him and installed him as lead singer with The Belmonts. As Dion and the Belmonts, they racked up an impressive string of hits that included "I Wonder Why," "No One Knows," "Teenager In Love," "Where Or When" and "In the Still of the Night." Going out again as a single, Dion immediately scored with "Lonely Teenager" and is following it up with the current "Havin" Fun."

Cameo Sets Push For Int'l Ork Series

NEW YORK—Cameo Records has announced a big promotion drive on its new series of albums by the Interna-tional Pop Orchestra, consisting of 110 men recorded in England by EMI. The first LP, just released, will be sold, until April 30, to dealers and distribs on a 15% discount on both the mono and stereo versions. In ad-dition, the series is being sold on a 100% exchange privilege. On the dis-trib level, salesmen and promotion men will earn bonuses on each album they sell (until April 30). The label, which expects big airplay of the series, is increasing its supply of deejays samples to distribs. Ten to thirty-five samples to each distrib will be marked "For "Store Personnel— Not For Sale," to be given to clerks and managers at key album accounts.



Warwick recently picked-up the Andy Stewart waxing of "Scottish Soldier" from Top Rank.

Pye's Benjamin Feted Here By Dave Miller, Who Gets Gold Disk For English Sales

NEW YORK—Dave Miller, head of Somerset Records, welcomed Louis Benjamin, an exec of England's Pye Records, on his first trip to the U.S. at a swank luncheon last week (8) at the private Carriage Club here.

Benjamin will spend three weeks visiting New York and California to study latest marketing methods and to renew contacts established by Pye's general manager, T. R. B. Threlfall, during his visit to the U.S. last fall. A highlight of the luncheon was

A highlight of the luncheon was Benjamin's presentation to Miller of a gold record, representing the sale of a million records—over a fifteen month period—of Somerset LP's in England, which Pye distributes there under the Golden Guinea tag.

The Pye take-over of the Somerset line England followed the re-organization of Pye's stockholders in May of 1959, which led to Pye's new sales program of selling direct to dealers and such promotion devices as TV commercials and outdoor advertising for the selling of its product.

When first approached about the possibility of being represented by Pye in England, Miller was not too enthusiastic. After several meetings with Pye execs, however, Miller was told that his Somerset line would get a "major" push from Pye, including a \$150,000 budget for TV commercials.

In August of 1959, Somerset became the first low-priced label to be handled by Pye. One minute TV commercials were used to appeal directly to families. They were little spectaculars in themselves, involving elaborate sets displaying the locale of various countries represented musically in Somerset LP's. In addition, outdoor displays gave an added push to the line.

Pye's direct-to-the-dealer approach involves a salesforce of forty, including trucks which carry Pye product and from which the dealer can order LP's and receive them at the same time.

Pye also has warehouses in cities in handle drop shipments. Such outlets are located in Manchester, Leeds, Newcastle and Birmingham.

New Fla. Distrib Lists Labels

NEW YORK—Tempo Distributing, a newly-formed distributorship at 418 S.E. 11th, Hialeah, Fla., is now handling the Madison, Apollo, Envoy, Musitron, Concert-Disc labels for the state of Florida, it was announced last week.

Tempo is solely owned by Lewis Merritt. Merritt was formerly associated with Apollo Records and Nola Recording Studios. sales programs distribs have offere their accounts.

Roulette is working the discount l giving thirty-three albums free for every 100 LP's purchased. The label just released original-cast "Sho Girl," which was released on an 100° guarantee return, is included in the discount plan.

Label veep Joe Kolsky said the pla was initiated "in order to give th Roulette distributors and dealers th leverage neded to be competitive is today's market and to do the volum of business that should be done." H noted that the label had, during th label's 5th Anniversary Bonus sale i Jan. (extended to Feb. 15), offere dealers a buy-one-get-one-at-half-pric sales plan on the entire catalog.

King To Handle Kem Labe

Artists today are keenly ware of and desirous for worldwide stribution; the strength of such disibution is one of the important facrs in attracting them to our label. ecisions about artists, often involvg considerable outlays in recording cpenditures and guarantees, must be ade with a world viewpoint. We are onvinced that in the '60's our worldide record business will grow in size, igor and health."

In addition to its concern with the ictor pop and classical catalogs vailable in overseas markets, the Inernational department of Victor will e responsible for the promotion of

he RCA overseas catalogs in the U.S. Soria brings to his post long and aried experience here and abroad in he business and recording fields. Son f a private banker and member of he Rome Stock Exchange, Dario oria was born in Rome, was gradated from the University of Rome rith a degree in Economic and Comnercial Sciences and took post-graduate courses in law at the University of Ferrara. He came to New York in 1939 and became an American citizen. After an association with the Italian Pavilion of the World's Fair, he organized his own export-import company. From 1943 to 1948 he was associated with the Columbia Broadcasting System, first as assistant director, then as director. From 1948 to 1950 he was with the D'Arcy Advertising Agency, dividing his time between New York and Hollywood.

While still with CBS, in 1945, Soria introduced to this country Cetra Records of Italy which, beginning in 1948, were pressed domestically under the Cetra-Soria label. In 1953, Soria sold Cetra-Soria to Capitol Records and became President of the newly-created EMI (U.S.)—a subsidiary of Electric and Musical Industries, Ltd. of England-launching a new label: Angel Records. Five years later, when EMI sold EMI (U.S.) to its second American subsidiary, Capitol Records, Soria sold his interest in the company. In 1958, Soria helped Gian Carlo Menotti organize the first Festival of Two Worlds in Spoleto.

In 1959, with his wife, Dorle Jarmel Soria, he launched the new Soria Series for Victor, Soria will continue to supervise and produce the Series for Victor. Mrs. Soria, former press director of the New York Philharmonic and Columbia Artists Management, helped develop both Cetra-Soria and Angel Records. Active in the music world, she is an Associate chairman of Stadium Concerts, on the board of the National Music League and on the Editorial Advisory Board of Musical America.

HOLLYWOOD—Glenn E. Wallichs, president of Capitol Records, has an-nounced the label's full-scale entry into the electronics field through the activation of a wholly-owned subsid-iary, Electric & Musical Industries (U.S.) Limited, and acquisition of the operations and services of two inde-pendent electronics firms, Hoffman Electron Tube of Westbury, New York, and the Voi-Shan Electronics Division of Voi-Shan Industries, Inc., Los Angeles. Los Angeles. Commenting on the expansion, Wal-

Commenting on the expansion, Wal-lichs said: "Capitol's move into the electronics field is, we believe, a logi-cal step. It allows us to diversify our present activities by moving into an area that is closely related to our pri-mary business, and one in which EMI, our parent company has already as and y business, and one in which EMI, our parent company, has already es-tablished pre-eminence as a pioneer and as a major force in the vital area of research and development." "We feel that the resulting combi-

"We feel that the resulting combi-nation of EMI's superior technical re-sources and Capitol's highly-refined, wide-ranging marketing organization will result in a strong competitive position for EMI/US, and will give Capitol a second major area of busi-ness opportunity. New Company to Benefit from EMI Association

According to Bonbright, EMI/US has been activated for the purpose of manufacturing and marketing a broad line of electronics products in broad line of electronics products in the military, government, industrial and consumer fields in cooperation with Electric & Musical Industries Limited (England), principal stock-holder in Capitol Records, Inc. EMI will supply EMI/US with the major-ity of its products. EMI is one of the major electronics firms and reportedly the largest manufacturer and distrib-utor of magnetic tape in the United the largest manufacturer and distrib-utor of magnetic tape in the United Kingdom. A pioneer in the television industry, EMI began development in 1931 of a TV system adopted by the British Broadcasting Company (BBC) in 1936 for the world's first public "high definition" TV programming service. Since that time, EMI has been entrusted by the British Government with numerous important research and development projects in such advanced fields as radar and telemetry. In addition, EMI has for 30 years been a leader in the development of special-purpose electron tubes, manufacturing a wide range of products.

EMI/US Only Second Firm to Market Videotape

One of the most important products to be marketed initially by EMI/ US will be videotape. EMI/US will be only the second company to enter the broadcasting field with videotape. The tape being offered by EMI/US is currently used by both the BBC and the Canadian Broadcasting Company (CBC).

Bonbright stated that Capitol's Home Instruments Division, for which he is also responsible, may eventually be merged with EMI/US.

Bonright further reported the election of Capitol executive, A. Bruce Rozet, to the post of Vice President and General Manager of EMI/US.

Rozet Announces Company Organization

Bruce Rozet has announced that the new company will have four divisions:

MGM Adds 6 Albums In "Spectacular" Series

NEW YORK-Based on the success of its initial releases in its "Spectacular Series" LP's, MGM has just put six more members of the series on release. Three of the packages were produced by Eddie Heller. These include Roger King Mozian's ork offer-"Spectacular Brass Goes Chaing Cha," "Spectacular Guitars & Strings" and "Spectacular Percussion Goes Latin."

An "extensive" trade and consumer advertising campaign will include point-of-purchase displays, deejay promotion and newspaper and magazine publicity.

Broadcast Division, which will market studio equipment, professional tape recorders, and related equipment; Magnetic Tape Division, which will market video, audio and instrumentation tape; Electronic Tube Division, which will manufacture and market a full line of special high-performance electron tubes and microwave instrumentation, including photomultipliers, klystrons, travellingwave tubes, camera pick-up tubes, cathode ray tubes and storage tubes; Consumer Products Division, which will manufacture and market electronics products for home use.

Hoffman & Voi-Shan Personnel Retained

In making his announcement, Rozet revealed that EMI/US has retained key personnel of both Hoffman Electron Tube and Voi-Shan Electronics. The Hoffman acquisition became effective Feb. 1; the Voi-Shan acquisition on Feb. 21. Hoffman Electron Tube, a national firm handling distribution of electron tubes and microwave components, has for the past three years distributed EMI tubes in the U.S. Voi-Shan Electronics Division has been active in the development and manufacture of travelling-wave tubes.

To Provide Service, Warehousing in 28 Branches

EMI/US will maintain executive offices in the Capitol Tower, Hollywood, Rozet said. In addition, the company will utilize an eastern sales office in New York, manufacturing facilities in Los Angeles, and service and warehousing facilities in twentyeight locations throughout the United States for instant product availability.

Commenting on Capitol's entry into the electronics field, Bonbright said: "We feel that the activation of EMI/ US and the acquisition of two important firms in the electronics field are significant steps in our company's forward progress. We are particularly fortunate to participate in bringing to the entire U.S. market both the high skills and technical 'know-how' of EMI in the electron tube, tape and broadcast fields, and the outstanding nationwide distribution system offered by Capitol and its subsidiaries."

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Bonbright stated that EMI/US has reserved exhibit space at both the Institute of Radio Engineers (IRE) trade show in New York in March, and at the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) show in Wash-ington, D. C., in May.

Dues in this category ill be \$150 per year, while regular embership dues are \$200 per year. ssociate memberships, which cover nployees or representatives of full emberships, are pegged at \$50.00.

The board also was advised that a roup Insurance Plan, which will be andled through the Philadelphia Life isurance Company, has been set-up. he plan will cover owners, officers ind key personnel of all ARMADA tember firms who wish to join, but ach firm must join independently. epresentatives of the insurance firm ill be present at the June convention, ut the plan will start immediately, nd members are to be advised of proedure, costs, etc., within the next few 'eeks.

Talmadge advised the board that a ew BPI is now in preparation and hat it should be ready for presentaion to the convention in June.

"This is a matter of vital importnce to both the manufacturer and the istributor," Talmadge said, "and we vill have a plan which we know will e practical for all parties involved." A number of requests have been reeived from suppliers who would like to exhibit at the convention, Talmadge peported. In the past there have been o exhibits, but space can be arranged t the Diplomat, and the Board deided to accept such inquiries for con-





Sir Thomas Beecham, Conducting Great, Dies

NEW YORK—Sir Thomas Beecham, the great English conductor, died last week (8) at his London home after a cerebral thrombosis. He was 81years-old. Sir Thomas, who had suffered a previous cerebral hemorrhage, was recuperating from an illness which for the last year had kept him away from his duties as conductor of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Almost as famous for what he said about music as he did with music, Sir Thomas was noted for his interpretation of the works of Handel, Haydn and, in particular, Mozart. He was also known for his operatic conducting, a field in which he gained his initial prominence. Large amounts of money (totalling about \$150,000,000) he inherited from his father, who produced Beecham's Liver Pills, was spent in an effort to popularize opera in England.

After his first visit to the U.S. as a guest conductor of the New York Philharmonic in 1928, Sir Thomas was a frequent concert-hall performer here, conducting in Boston, Philadelphia and New York. In the early Forties, he was conductor of the Seattle Symphony Orchestra and guest conductor at the Metropolitan Opera (1941-42). In 1950, Sir Thomas led the Royal Philharmonic on a tour of forty-six U.S. cities.

Sir Thomas' recording activities began in 1910. For many years, he was under contract to Columbia Records, a relationship which ended in 1942 as a result of a dispute over a defective release. He is also represented on such U.S. labels as Victor, Capitol and Angel.

Sir Thomas is survived by Lady Beecham, his 29-year-old wife, his third, who will continue as manager of the Royal Philharmonic, and two sons.

Simon, now doing freelance writing, was associated with Metronome magazine as associate editor and editor from 1935 to 1955. He was program director of the Jazztone label, a record club operated by Crowell-Collier, and late last year resigned his affiliation with Bouree Productions, an indie disk producing company.

Lampley Exits Victor A&R To Finish Musical

NEW YORK—Cal Lampley, A&R director at RCA Victor Records, has resigned his position to devote fulltime efforts toward the completion and polishing of a musical comedy, it was announced last week by Robert L. Yorke, vice-president of the label's commercial records creation department.

Lampley joined the label after A&R stints with Warner Bros. Records and Columbia Records, during which time he recorded Louis Armstrong, Johnny Mathis, Dave Brubeck, Mahalia Jackson, Vic Damone, Arthur Godfrey, Genevieve, and scores of other artists.

NEW YORK—Underscoring the hectic world of the disk industry, a new Mercury single by June Valli was in dealers' hands last week only twentynine hours after it was cut.

The deck, an English version of an Italian success, "The World We Love In," was cut at 4 AM in Chicago last Wednesday (8). The mastering was done as the session was over and recording engineer Doug Hawkins, rather than wake anyone at that hour, chartered a plane to Dayton, Ohio, where he turned over the master to the local Mercury rep who immediately drove it to the plant at Richmond, Ind., some fifty miles away.

Hawkins took off for New York for some rest, and back at the plant was busily working on the pressings from noon to 5 PM. Shipments started to go out of the plant at 5 PM, and at 9AM on Thursday, the Valli deck was being handled by distribs, in some cases being stocked by dealers.

Salesmanship will be in the air fron the standpoint of both manufactures and retailer at the 1961 show, which will also be NAMM's 60th anniver sary celebration.

Gard pointed out: "Not only doe: the 60th anniversary show promise to be one of the biggest displays of musical merchandise in history, but al indications are that the exhibitors are planning a lot of old-fashioned selling After all, 85 per cent of the nation': buyers of musical instruments, electronic products and related musica merchandise and services came to last year's show and attendance could wel go even higher this year."

Retailers will study selling strat egy and "hard sell" marketing tech niques in special clinics on the art or salesmanship designed to help then in their own businesses.




"Freedom Now Suite" Inspires Davis Film

Bernard Ness of the record division of Rank told The Cash Box in a special terview on his return from New York that at the end of the month he is signing all his directorates within the organization. He will be taking up an eccutive position with RCA International and will be residing initially in pain. It is now quite clear that Rank has withdrawn completely from its cord operation which involved Rank Audio Plastics Ltd. and Rank Audio lastics Inc. The name of the latter company has been changed to Audio Plas-cs Inc. and Rank's former partners Hachette of Paris, France are considering ading new partners. As far as Rank Records of America is concerned, it has scontinued production and distribution of the Top Rank label (as reported i The Cash Box dated March 4). Artists' contracts have been settled individ-ally and the company is making no further statements. Negotiations are roceeding for the disposal of the catalog. Ness said that the remaining active mpanies of the record division of Rank in the United Kingdom are Filmusic ublishing Co. Ltd. of which Harold Shampan is general manager, which will nature in close co-operation with Pinewood Studios and Thompson Diamond Butcher, the successful wholesaling business of which Bob Roberts is gen-al manager. Arrangements are being made for the formation of a new com-any in America to handle Filmusic's publishing activities. The Rank Records iternational under the guidance of Paul Marshall continues its function from he New York office and the Top Rank label continues to be distributed iroughout the world by members of the co-operative and in the United King-om by EMI. om by EMI.

The new M.K. label or original U.S.S.R. recordings for which Associated ecordings have distributions rights in this country have, since the first re-ases in January this year, proved so successful that the original idea of by-onthly releases has been stepped up. In future five titles will be issued each nonth. This month's releases include two further 12" L.P.'s by Sviatoslav ichter, namely Beethoven's Appassionata Sonata and Haydn's Sonata No. 20. eter Higgins, the company's A & R manager, states that it has long been ecognized that performances by Soviet artists are of the highest artistic tandard and the M.K. recordings, which are released in the States by RAMCO, ave been hailed by the critical press for their technical quality. Associated tecordings, which has been in operation for little over a year, claim to have uilt up via its Parliament and Whitehall (Westminster in the U.S.A.) labels ne of the largest low-priced classical catalogs in the U.K. Firm operates irect distribution from its London depot and just opened a second depot in fanchester to have additional service to the Northern areas.

At the invitation of Max Diamond, newly appointed general manager of fassner Publishing house, The Cash Box representative called to meet Hans Vittstatt, distinguished German composer of "Pepe" and German publisher of he song, Gerd Hammerling of Peter Schaeffers Music, Berlin. Both men were h London to attend the film's premier at the Columbia Cinema and subse-uent reception at Claridges Hotel. On his first visit to London Wittstatt told 'he Cash Box that the song was first called "Andalusian Girl" and was re-orded here by Monia Liter. The company has a reputation for re-easing original and unique material and is currently enjoying success on this ide of the Atlantic with an EP, "The Land Of Song" Vols 1 & 2 by Ivor Emmanuel and The Norman Whitehead Singers. Sales have reportedly ex-ceded 20 000 eeded 20,000.

Ariole Record is pleased with the interest created by a 23-year old boy from Irinadad, Gerry Beckles, with his first disc "No Love For Johnnie" from the ilm of the same name coupled with "Come Back Running" to be released in he States on Laurie. Oriole also release an original cast EP from Tom Arnold's 'Snow White And The Seven Dwarfs."

Warner Bros. Records began operations in this country just a year ago and mmediately rocketed to the No. 1 slot with The Every Bros., "Cathy's Clown." Label now enters its second year with another No. 1 again by The Everly Bros., "Walk Right Back."

Arnold Klein RCA's European sales manager, has returned to London after visit to Italy for consultations with RCA Italia. When in Rome, Klein was aken seriously ill and rushed to the famous Salvatore Mundi hospital, where re spent two weeks. He is now resting at his London home but hopes to resume is world wide activities shortly. In the meantime, he expressed his thanks via The Cash Box to all his friends for their kind thoughts and good wishes and ooks forward to seeing them again in the not too distant future.

Advance orders of 373,000 heralded the rush release by RCA of Elvis Presley's "Wooden Heart," backed with "Tonight Is So Right For Love," ex-reeding by 20,000 the golden boy's previous record advance for "Are You Lonesome Tonight," which held the No. 1 slot for five consecutive weeks. "Wooden Heart" is taken from the album, "G.I. Blues," which has sold over 100,000 copies and is currently in The Cash Box charts for Finland, Norway, Germany, Belgium and Holland Germany, Belgium and Holland.

To mark the occasion a special EP sampler featuring five different Golden Guinea tracks will be on sale to the public at the reduced price of 5/--.

They are Angelo Romano, director; Pier Emilio Gennarini, co-director; Fabio Borelli, vice-director. We do not yet know what sort of pro-grams will be televised by the second TV channel.

RCA's new record releases from films are Max Steiner's theme from "The Dark At The Top Of The Stairs" (also available on RCA in the version by Chet Atkins); "The Alamo" is being shown in Italy and RCA has already launched on LP featuring "The Ballad Of The Alamo" with "The Green Leaves Of Summer"; Brigitte Bardot's "La Verita'" (The Truth) has just started its showings in Italy, simultaneously with the releasing of RCA's "Io Tengo Una Munceca" (song from the film) waxed with The Latins.

Another version of "Pepe" is available on Top Rank (Durium) by Encore Ensemble, as well as another version of "Exodus" by the same. Mr. Sussel is in touch with the promotion office of Dear Film, which will distribute the mo-tion picture "Exodus" in Italy within a few months, to arrange a strong pub-licity campaign both for the film and its music. Durium has the original sound-track of "The Dark At The Top Of The Stairs" (produced by WB) by Ernie Freeman on Imperial Freeman on Imperial.

Fricsay's label, Deutsche Grammophon, with Polydor, Heliodor, Coral, Archiv and Produktion, is handled in Italy by the record department of Siemens Elettra spa, the man-ager of which, Mr. Pogani, has recently left the post.

The Sixth International Jazz Festival of San Remo took place on March 3, 4, and 5th, featuring the first evening two films, the second evening a concert, and the third evening (which was televised) another concert with jazz artists from all over Europe.

The still-declining singles sales are causing great concern to most recor company executives. Some record men say that sales of average singles at so low at the moment that they hardly warrant the amount of production time and promotion effort invested in them. If the present fall-off in single continues it wouldn't surprise to see some of the major companies make drastic cut in their number of individual single releases. Many people in the trade believe that this is the best thing that could happen—they maintain the this would boost the sales of singles that are issued. It seems fairly obvious that there are far too many singles released in this country, where we have total population of around ten million. An important feature of the decline i singles sales is that the sharpest drop appears to be in those by overseas artist without making any great headway. The next three months could be the mos-crucial in the history of singles record sales in this country. The singles recor-being such a powerful voice in the industry every effort must be made to rt moment they are the backbone of most radio programming—and are vitall important to record companies, publishers, composers and musicians. The longer all parties concerned sit back and watch the fall-off in singles sales, the more difficult their task of restoring them to the key role they should be play ing in the trade. The obvious start in the search for a solution to the problet is a series of meetings between executives of all interested groups in an effor to locate the causes of this fall-off in singles and to determine what actio should be taken to stimulate public interest and demand. 

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EDITORIAL

"Foolish Laws Are Foolishly Enforced"

An editorial appeared in the February 12th edition of the Harlingen Star, a metropolitan daily newspaper published in that Texas city, that deserves wider circulation. It is reprinted below for the benefit of the nation's coin machine industry.

Good-natured citizens are inclined to tolerate foolish laws—until somebody tries to enforce them. The classic example in this country was Prohibition; and in France and Italy it is the income tax.

Just the other day, in manner mysterious, the state seized 200 cases of canned beer from the pro shop of the Harlingen municipal golf course. The liquor agents said there was a technical error in the issuance of the permit.

It was brought out that the permit has been in the same name for 14 years, and that the raid just happened to come at a time when the Life Begins at Forty golf tournament was in full swing. The result was inconvenience to the golfers, a loss of revenue to the golf conrse and some doubtful publicity.

But, you can't blame the liquor men who were enforcing the law—if that is what they thought they were doing. Actually, of course, the head of the Liquor Control Board, Coke Stevenson, Jr., appears to think otherwise. He has ordered the return of the beer and the dismissal of charges.

In something of the same vein, a pinball machine has been taken out of the Elks lodge in Harlingen (they won't get any out of the Brownsville lodge) by Texas Rangers. These "gaming devices" are against the law if they return anything of value—including a free game.

Now, it might occur to prond Texans conversant with the storied past of the Texas Rangers that it is, somehow, beneath the historic concept of the Rangers to go around seizing pinball machines; but a pinball machine, like an act of arson or murder is against the law. And it is the duty of the Ranger to enforce the law.

Perhaps if enough marble machines are destroyed and enough cases of beer confiscated improperly, we could review the entire body of law that holds pinball machines to be devices of the devil and prescribes a ridiculous and nitpicking procedure for obtaining and enjoying a beer license.

It might occur to Texans that it is no business of the state who sells beer. Nor should the state concern itself with those who want to bet on the turn of a wheel or the dice.

For as long as the state tries to control these things, the result will be the kind of law enforcement we have today.

Private clubs, for reasons completely inexplicable, may serve liquor by the drink. A private club seems to be any saloon whose patrons are willing to put up the joining fee. So be it. Whose business is it? Let the private clubs serve it by the drink, the bottle or the barrel; and let the corner saloon do the same.

Let the Elks have their pinball machines. Let the drug stores have them, too. Let who will gamble, or drink, and in whatever surroundings they choose.

Cloak & Dagger seizure of canned beer and pinball machines is best described in the classic military term "chicken." And the fault lies with the law itself.

NEW YORK The Coin Machine Council, national public relations arm of the industry, embarked on a five-city jaunt last week to tell the press in each city the true story behind the coin machine business and the people coin machine business and the people that make up the industry. "They understand the problems we're faced with and listen sympathetically with an open mind to the facts that we have to present." Casola's prime job with newspaper people is to educate them to the brighter aspects of the industry inso-far as the number of people em-ployed, the benefits that the nation's populace enjoy as a result of the in-dustry's place in the field of amuse-ment and topical stories concerning individuals in the business. As an ex-ample of the projects at hand, Millie McCarthy, operator from the upper New York State area, was expected to be profiled by a newspaper's wom-en's page any edition now as the re-sult of an interview arranged by New York State area, was expected to be profiled by a newspaper's wom-en's page any edition now as the re-sult of an interview arranged by CMC. "Our biggest problem right now is membership," said Casola, "and I'm talking with association leaders in each territory to get them to work for us at operator meetings." Casola reported that the Philadelphia asso-ciation under the leadership of Joe Silverman had pledged "100% mem-bership and cooperation." The West-chester and upper New York associa-tions had previously joined the CMC rolls with dues and donations to sup-port the program. Many were visited during Casola's New York City stay. The road trip is designed to accom-plish these two important projects— increased membership from within the industry and favorable press coverage to offset the unfair headlines of a short time ago.

short experience as President of the industry's PR Council. "We need a central information bureau where factual information can be had such as the number of feet of wire used by the industry each year, and the amount of people employed, and the number of board feet of lumber used,

amount of people employed, and the number of board feet of lumber used, and the tremendous quantities of raw materials utilized by our manufac-turers and sub-manufacturers can be made available to the communica-tions centers. Reporters constantly ask these questions and the informa-tion is quite difficult to come by." Another problem Lou ran head on into at the start of his road trip was one that is a familiar one to any per-son traveling with heavy responsi-bility, namely, time. "We can use twice the time to visit in each city. I didn't see every distributor I wanted to see. We had to make the best of it and get out when the flight scheduled called for it. Next time I believe we'll call on twice as many people in half as many cities." Casola's trip started Sunday, March 5, and will wind up in Chicago prob-ably on Saturday, March 11. Among the press members visited by Casola and his PR entourage were the Phila-delphia Enquirer, Phila.; United Press International, N.Y.; and Sunday sup-plement representatives. Include lea machines CHICAGO—The British have gone the way of the modern world and effective this week will no longer sit idle and relaxed while their eleven o'clock and four o'clock teas brew. American technology has penetrated the sacred British precincts of tea-drinking and in place of the kettle will come the machine, the vending ma-chine, that is. The American vending machine will now dispense the British tea, and according to the machine manufacturer, the Brittons like the taste better than their own. Interstate Vending Company of Chi-cago, one of the nation's largest vend-ing companies, and Associated Auto-mation, Ltd., wholly-owned subsidiary of Elliott Automation Limited, inter-nationally famous electronics manu-facturer, announced last week that they had agreed to form an operating company. Interstate Vending, Ltd.

facturer, announced last week that they had agreed to form an operating company, Interstate Vending, Ltd., which will distribute, market, and operate fresh tea vending machines to British industrial concerns. The machines will be manufactured by Elliott Automation under license from Interstate Interstate.

The time-honored tradition of teadrinking, one of the most cherished and protected institutions (protected by government regulation as well as by all other legal and moral sanctions) in the British economy and culture will remain unchanged. But the machines will revolutionize the means of consumption. Whereas formerly the tea habit was a product of typical laissez-fairism, with the tea brewed in pots and then wheeled through office and factory for casual morning

in pots and then wheeled through office and factory for casual morning and afternoon sipping, now the per-sonnel will dial their choice of lemon, milk and sugar, and with one push-button action and one threepence, re-ceive their freshly brewed cup. A time saver and money saver, the machines are directly modeled on Interstate's coffee vending machines. "We are pleased that the elaborate test marketing has proved the fact that the traditionally cautious Eng-lishman likes our tea as much as his own," said Ronald Wolff, president of Interstate. "Market tests indicate that the quality of the vended tea sur-passes that of the pot brew, and when the machine brew was sold in tests at a higher price than the other, it racked up larger sales because of its good, consistent quality." Cyril Dee, chairman of the new In-terstate Vending, Ltd., stated: "Our tea customs will be just as religiously observed as before, but we feel that both the direct and the indirect costs of tea time will be cut, in time lost to factories and labor accounting. We are grateful to have found that Inter-state's machine and their special tea-making process have such taste ac-





"I can safely say that we will make more money in the first half of 1961



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

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
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
