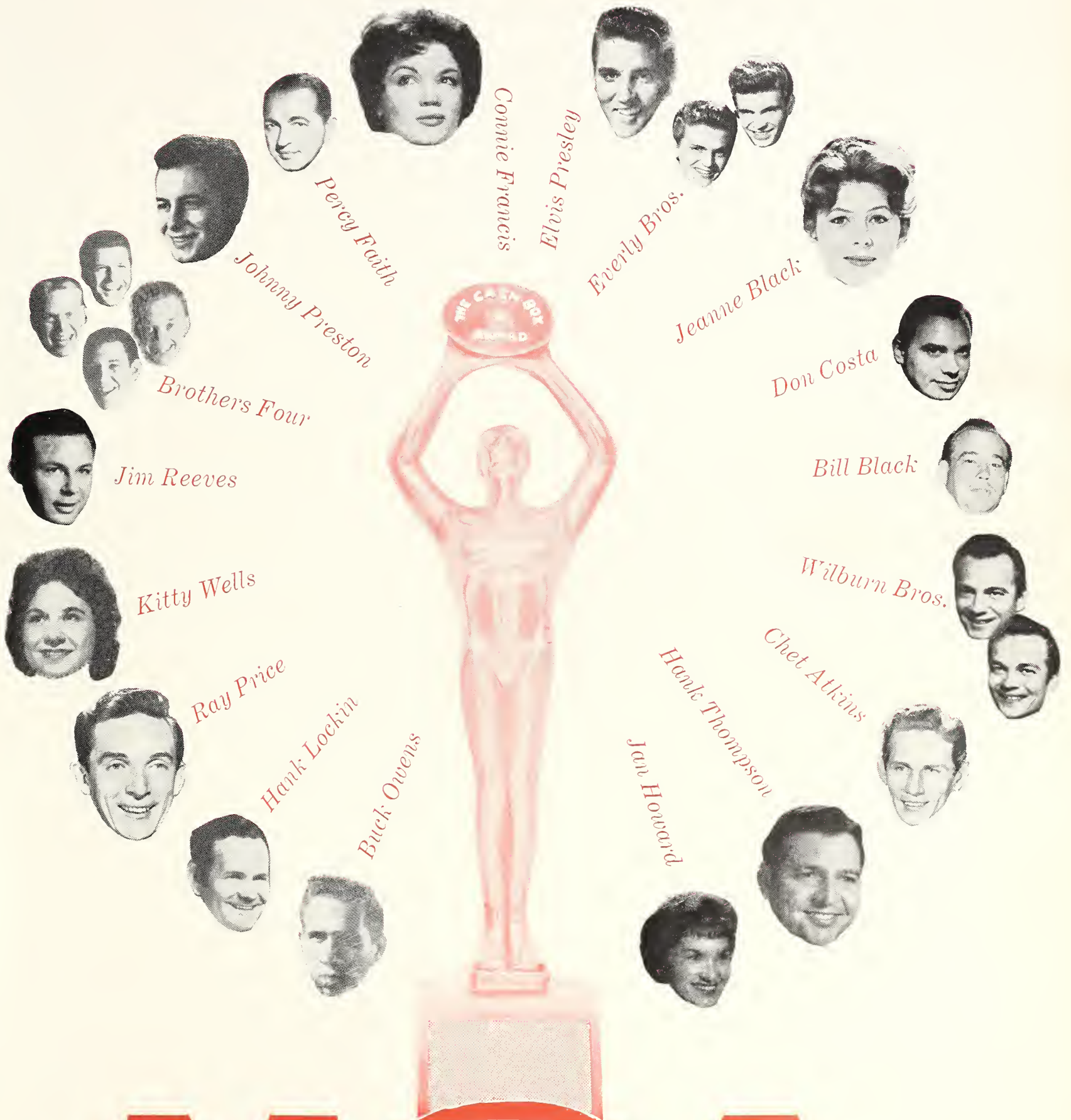

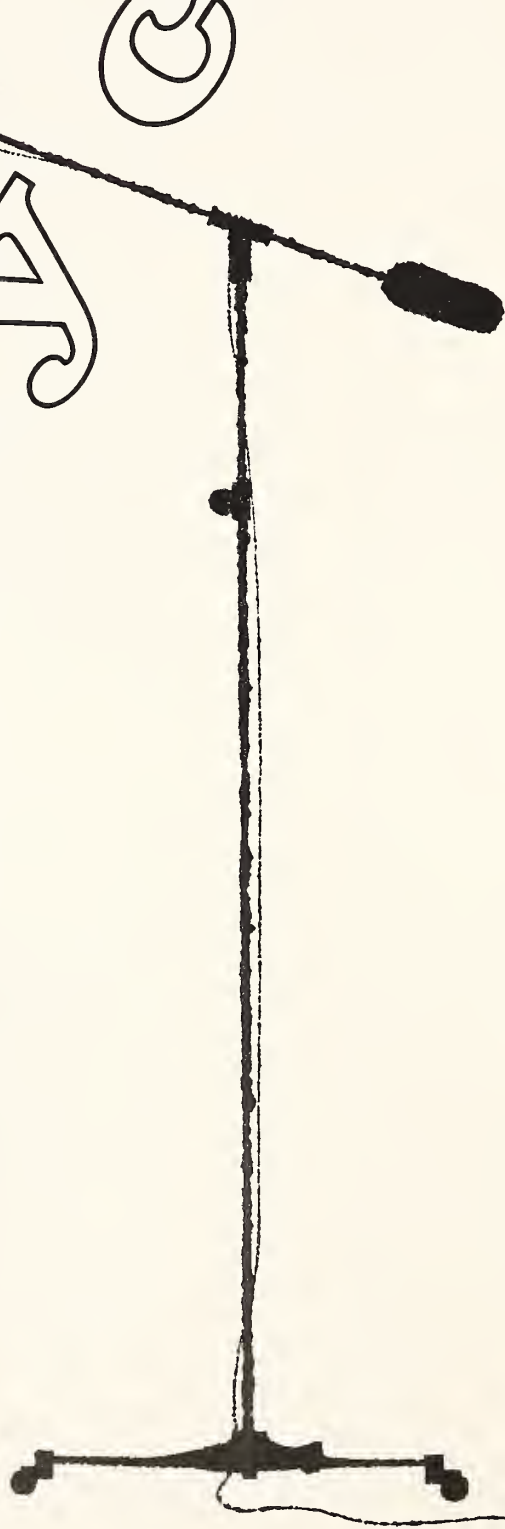

Let's Get Together

In an industry such as ours where so many manufacturers are familiar and friendly with one another on both a social and business level, it is surprising that there is such a paradoxical lack of unity when a concerted effort that would benefit all is needed. It's a most disturbing situation that could hurt the entire industry in future years.

The United States is paying for a similar lack of unity which existed in the early years of our missile program. The Army, Navy and Air Force, which cooperated so beautifully during the war, worked independently of one another in the development of our rockets and ICBM's. Today we are paying for this gross error by being behind in our missile successes where we might have been the leader.

In the war against bootleggers, unity is also a must. We are in no way trying to suggest that the bootlegging problem is one iota as important as the missile race. But to the record industry doing its best to weather a recession period during which sales have been soft, the bootlegging problem is probably its most devastating enemy.

The progress we have witnessed against disk counterfeiterers during the past half year has been most encouraging. But we must ponder what might have been accomplished had the RIAA and ARMADA worked together against the bogus disk-making enemy.

There is no doubt that more could have been accomplished had the two associations worked together. The nature of record bootlegging is nationwide. It is not limited to one small area. A counterfeiter in the east almost always has contacts in the west and vice versa. Yet the whole fight to erase this evil suffers when the two Associations work independently of one another. The two groups, each ignorant of what the other is doing, may very well be overlapping by investigating the same bootlegging ring.

We are convinced that a pooling of finances and information would kill off existing bootleggers more rapidly and prevent newcomers from propping up. A union would also help in furthering local and federal legislation (being engineered separately by the two organizations) designed to make the penalty against bootleggers more severe.

With ARMADA representing indie manufacturers, its finances in no way compare with those available to RIAA which represents the majors and most indies. It would be a shame if, because of lack of money, ARMADA had to relax its fight, especially now when it is footing a huge bill for the transportation of witnesses to the east for the Hackensack investigation.

With more unity the whole record industry must benefit.

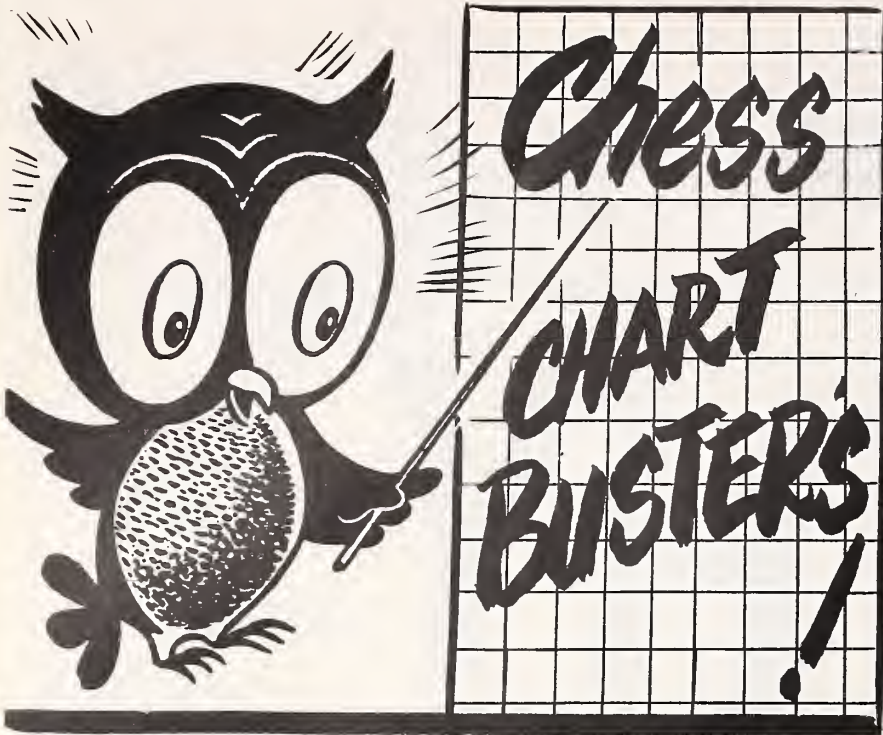

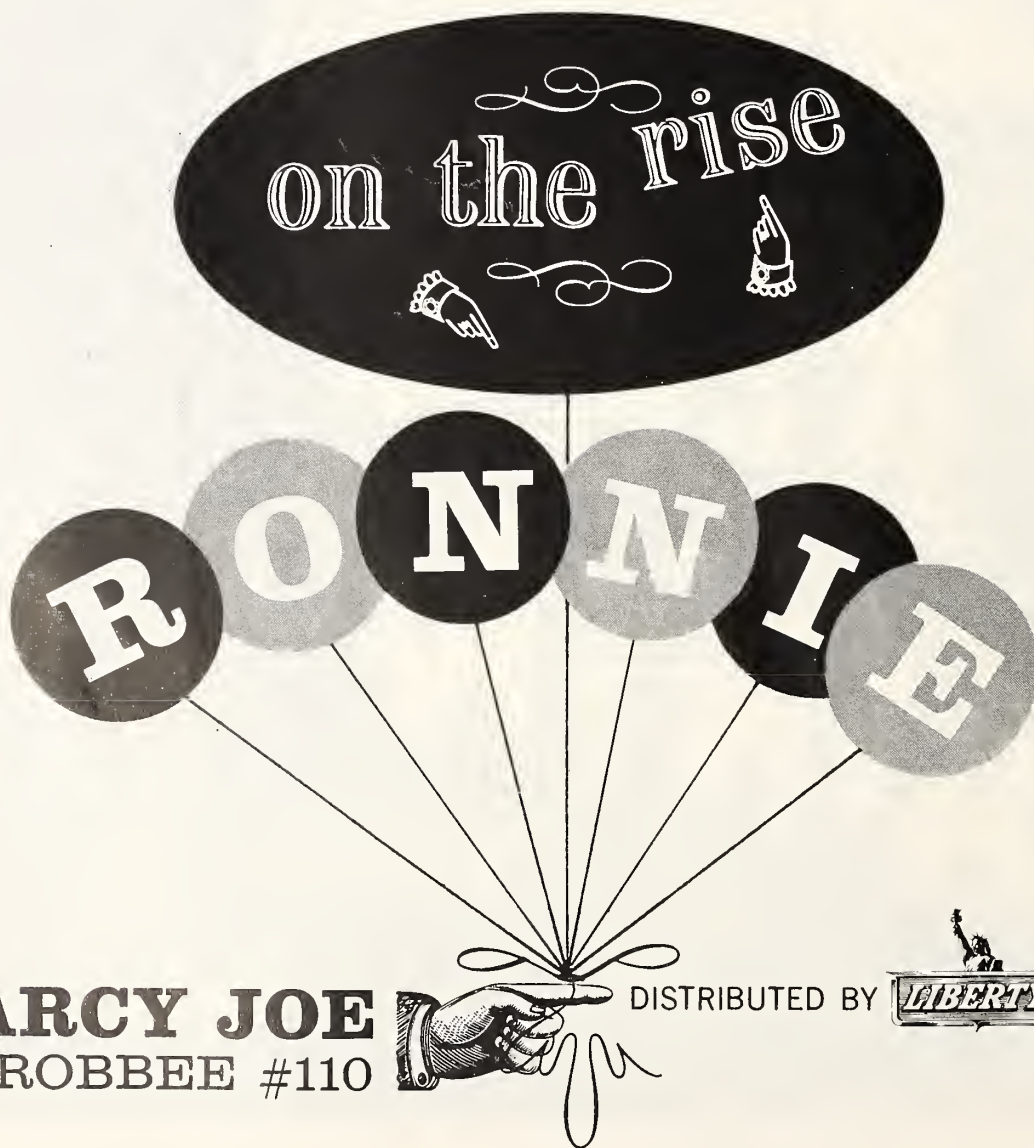

The Cash Box Pick of the Week

"DANCE ON LITTLE GIRL" (2:19) [Spanka BMI—Anka]
"I TALK TO YOU (ON THE TELEPHONE)" (2:38)

PAUL ANKA (ABC—Paramount 10220)

Anka appears to have reserved a permanent position in hitsville. Currently he's occupying it with "Tonight, My Love Tonight." In the days to come he'll be there with "Dance On Little Girl." It's a thumping rock-a-cha-cha romantic weeper that Anka (and the Sid Feller ork-chorus) puts across with telling effect. The emotional beat-ballad stand, "I Talk To You," also has that chart look. Both again, are Anka originals.

(B+) "WHAT YOU DON'T KNOW DON'T HURT YOU" (2:45) [Fast BMI—Marchan] Marchan can get back in the "Something On Your Mind" big business with this bluesy shuffle-rocker. Strong choral-ork support on a deck with that dual-mart, pop-r&b potential.

(B+) "I NEED SOME ONE" (2:38) [Fast BMI—Marchan] Marchan and the vocal crew packs lotsa emotion into the beat-ballad pleader. Watch it too.

JESSIE HILL (Minit 628)

(B+) "OOGSEY MOO" (2:44) [Minit BMI—Hill, Byrd] The artist, who has chart experience, could get off the ground in a big way with this infectious novelty-romantic blueser. His engaging vocal is backed by a delicious combo beat. Watch closely.

(B) "MY LOVE" (2:41) [Minit BMI—Hill, Nelson] An Appealing deliberate-beat portrayal of a lovely opus.

ALAN DALE (Sinclair 1003)

(B+) "MONDAY TO SUNDAY" (2:30) [Original BMI—Vecchiarelli, Catalano, Dale] Vet songster goes teen-market in a pro slow-beat manner in his debut for the label. He warbles the inviting romancer against a pretty softie teen-combo-chorus sound. Deserves big-beat attention.

(B) "THAT'S A TEENAGE GIRL" (2:38) [Original BMI—Goldman, Catalano, Dale] Catchy teen stuff on the upbeat. Upper lid is more effective.

CATHY CARROLL (Triodex 110)

(B+) "JIMMY LOVE" (2:49) [December BMI—Reynolds, Carroll] A powerhouse vocal-full ork performance of a dramatic teen-ballad & narrative about a gal who tells of her boyfriend's death just before she was to marry him. Jeanne Black (Capitol) also has a version of a tune, which could get big teen attention.

(B) "DEEP IN A YOUNG BOY'S HEART" (2:00) [December BMI—Reynolds, Carroll] Lighter teen-beat outing—and one with lots of charm.

WENDY LOVE (Palette 5076)

(B+) "WAYWARD BOY" (2:00) [Future & Compton ASCAP—Furth, Lafferty] Thrush invitingly handles the teen-wise ballad about gal who can't-help-lovin' a wayward teenager. Attractive softie combo-chorus sound supports. Could move with enough exposure.

(B) "BYE BYE ALLEN" (2:18) [Canon & Zodiac BMI—Lafferty] Another easy-go teen-romantic.

JEANNE BLACK (Capitol 4566)

(B+) "JIMMY LOVE" (2:55) [December BMI—Carroll, Reynolds] Tragic tale of a bridegroom-to-be who dies right before the marriage is related with good teen drama by the songstress and big-sounding ork-chorus. Can get around. Cathy Carroll has the tune on Triodex.

(B) "THE COMMANDMENTS OF LOVE" (2:39) [Central Songs BMI—Frazier, Pearce] Soft inspirational quality to this session.

RONNIE PREMIERE (Laurie 3091)

(B+) "SO LOVED AM I" (2:17) [James E. Kirchstein BMI—Barzyk] Fine contagious blues portrayal by the songster and musicians of a ditty that sounds something like the old teen hit, "Lonely Nights." Premiere has effective opening-and-closing chant bits. Worthy teen-beat sound.

(B) "ANGEL IN MY EYES (You May Not Be An Angel)" (2:31) [James E. Kirchstein] Unhurried blues-flavored romancer is done with sensitivity by the performer.

JIMMY BELL (Hickory 1146)

(B+) "LUNCH IN A BUCKET" (2:12) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Laudermilk] Singer, just off a noise-maker with "She Wears My Ring," heads a bright-beat rock-a-string affair with a somewhat folkish theme. Chanting gals are a fine sound asset. Bell could get even more action here.

(B) "(Yes) HERE I GO AGAIN" (2:18) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Gibson] Warm country-styled number by Don Gibson is touchingly relayed by the performer.

VARDI (Medallion 605)

(B+) "MAGGIE'S THEME (For Now For Always)" (2:23) [Wonderland ASCAP] A theme from an upcoming Walt Disney flick, "The Parent Trap," is done with excitement by the Medallion Strings & rhythm accompaniment, which has an effective teen-type sound. There's also a Camarata reading on Vista.

(B) "THE WONDERFUL SEASON OF LOVE" (2:31) [Twentieth Century ASCAP—Webster, Waxman] Attractive Latinish arrangement of a pretty pic number that's been getting various disk readings.

TOMPALL & THE GLASER BROS. (Decca 31258)

(B+) "JUDY'S GROWIN' UP" (2:00) [Cedarwood BMI—Wilkin, Walker] Songsters do an engaging job on the very likable, oldtime-sounding opus. Deejays are gonna give the side solid exposure; eye it.

(B) "WORDS COME EASY" (2:37) [Moss Rose BMI—Glaser] A country-flavored plaintive from the vocalists.

JOYCE AIMEE (Crystalette 744)

(B) "PLAYBOY LOVER" (2:28) [Lansdowne-Winston ASCAP—Wellington, Chaudet] Lass warbles a jumper against a bright rock-directed combo-chorus stint.

(C+) "I'LL TAKE CARE OF YOUR CARES" (2:30) [Remick ASCAP—Monaco, Dixon] Romancer from the past is intimately sung by the lark.

MIKE PRESTON (London 1981)

(B+) "MARRY ME" (1:55) [Lawrence Wright ASCAP—Jacks] Sprightly teen charmer is nicely surveyed by the songster and hopping strings. Gal warblers are also part of this side, just right for springtime programming.

(B) "GIRL WITHOUT A HEART" (2:20) [Cromwell ASCAP—Danzig, Dearlove] This interesting ballad has the feel of "Greensleeves." Pretty offering.

WADE CAGLE (Sun 360)

(B) "GROOVY TRAIN" (2:25) [Knox BMI—Cagle, Mooney] Fine choo-choo blues stomper is led by a hot sax. A sock-beat affair that has the teen crowd solidly in mind.

(B) "HIGHLAND ROCK" (2:08) [HiLo BMI—Cagle, Mooney] Good-sounding rock workout for a familiar Scottish tune. Two pro high-powered instrumentals.

(B) "BARGAIN LOVE" (1:55) [Jasmine BMI—Hines] Vocal crew, featuring a male lead and femme backing, agreeably surveys the nice light-beat romantic. Diskery hails from Memphis, Tenn.

(B) "BEFORE I SAW YOU SMILE" (2:37) [Jasmine BMI—Colaiuta, Kay] Good skip-beat arrangement backs the affectionate stint here.

EDDIE SAXON (Ford 104)

(B) "WHAT A NIGHT" (2:05) [Ben-Meyer BMI—Sauter] Singer Saxon and a gal vocal crew amiably handle the good-natured teen romancer. Worth teentime programming.

(B+) "JUST A LITTLE BIT MORE" (2:05) [Maverick BMI—Berry] Gals give-out with a contagious upbeat blues lovey-dovey. Lead thrush handles the storyline against busy vocal-combo comments. Could mean something.

(B) "WHY I MUST CRY" (2:30) [Maverick BMI—Berry] The "why" is explained with good-sounding blues warmth by the lead and other larks.

TENNYSON STEPHENS (Back Beat 533)

(B+) "RAIN, RAIN, RAIN" (2:35) [Lion BMI—Malone] Infectious, mostly multi-tracked Latin blueser from the singer, who is backed by a slick jazz-inspired band arrangement. Lots of fine R&B-pop listening here.

(B) "THE SOUL O' BIG JACK DUNN" (4:02) [Ranger ASCAP—Jones] The star sings-and-narrates this lively folk-type tale.

VIKKI NELSON (Mala 434)

(B+) "PLAYBOY" (2:28) [Emorye BMI—Carroll, Payne] Blues thrush offers a distinctive warble of a good-sounding blues romantic. Effective big chorus-combo sound supports. Deck could get around.

MARGIE RAYBURN
(Challenge 9110)

(B+) "HERE I AM" (2:58) [Jat BMI—Burgess] A good-sounding Latinish romantic is well-done by the multi-tracked songstress and rock-a-string (& chorus) backing, which offers a particularly effective sound. There's a chart chance for this cut.

(B+) "CAST A SPELL ON ME" (2:28) [Jat BMI — Burgess, Fuller] Another strong Latin-styled issue for the teeners. Should also be eyed.

THE FIRESIDERS (Swan 4074)

(B+) "I Remember ONE AND ALL" (2:33) [Claridge ASCAP—Vendetti, Giandomenaco, Davis] A distinctive slow-beat romantic is given an interesting, somewhat Everly Bros.-like blend by the fellas. A strong rock-a-string plus steady percussion beat sound accompanies the vocal. Could happen.

(B) "NO ONE CARES FOR ME" (2:06) [Claridge ASCAP — Vendetti, Giandomenaco, Davis] A countryish touch to this good-sounding quick-beat cut.

BUSTER BROWN (Fire 1040)

(B+) "BLUES WHEN IT RAINS" (2:17) [Fast BMI—Brown] Artist has had clicks before and can score solidly here in r&b with a ram-paging, shouting stand on a contagious familiar blues offering. Combo rocks advantageously behind him.

(B+) "GOOD NEWS" (2:15) [Starfire BMI—Hunter] Again, a powerfully moving upbeat blues stanza. (Not the same tune as the standard). Both sides rate a listen.

TY WHITNEY (Carmel 22)

(B+) "IT'S NOT AS EASY" (2:06) [Thayer BMI—Lubin, Stenner] Songster and rock-a-string ork supply a pro rock rhythm touch to a catchy romantic. The Hollywood-based label could have a success here.

(B) "BIG BROWN EYES" [Thayer BMI—Lubin, Stenner] Whitney is coy on the interesting folk-type romantic. Gal chorus is an important sound factor.

THE GALAXIES (Dot 16212)

(B+) "TREMBLE" (2:10) [Tree BMI—Galaxies] A potent no-holds-barred attack by the strong-sounding combo. This wild-one could come-up with Top 100 action.

(B+) "HEY, LITTLE GIRL" (2:20) [Sanwood BMI — Girasoli] Solid laughing sax gimmick spotlights this contagious novelty romancer from the vocal crew and combo. Could have a chart run. Distribution is handled by Nomar Records.

(B) "SINCE I MET YOU" (2:20) [Girasoli] Guys pleasingly portray the nice rock-a-cha ballad. Strings are included in the setting.

(B) "GEORGIE PORGIE" (1:28) [Raljo BMI—Yore] A whacky rock take-off on the old kiddie phrase. Good for bright-beat humor spins.

(C+) "BROOK BROOK" (1:58) [Raljo BMI — Yore] More zany upbeat stuff.

(RCA Victor 7887)

(B) "THEME FROM RETURN TO PEYTON PLACE (The Wonderful Season of Love)" (3:05) [Robbins ASCAP—Webster, Waxman] The fine warbler attractively handles the pretty pic main-title. She receives a lush arrangement from the unbilled ork.

(B) "WITHOUT LOVE" (2:52) [Buxton Hill ASCAP—Porter] A lovely Cole Porter ballad from "Silk Stockings" is another solid romantic vehicle for the performer.

THE DUALS (Star Revue 1031)

(B+) "STICK SHIFT" (2:25) [Hidle BMI—Bellinger] Combo supplies a potent blues attack between opening-and-closing sounds of speeding cars. Diskery is a Hollywood set-up.

(B) "CRUISING" (2:07) [Hidle BMI—Bellinger] As the title indicates, the sound here is relaxed (there's no gimmick car sound).

JIMMY MASSEY (Robbee 113)

(C+) "MOON ROCK" (2:23) [Mary-Jo ASCAP—Guarino, Martin] Fella goes on a rocket-ship trip to see the moon rock in this teen jumper.

(C+) "THE ONE YOU LOVE" (2:30) [Myers ASCAP—Dieni, Armocida, Julian] Massey does a sentimental vocal against an easy rock sound. Femme chorus appears on both tracks.

GEORGE SCOTT (Fairlane 701)

(B+) "THE MATADOR" (2:14) [Lowery BMI—Dowda, Scott] Interesting bull-ring-type sound with a good rock-directed touch. Trumpets are featured on the catchy tune. Could make noise.

(B) "TWILIGHT" (2:20) [Lowery BMI — Dowda, Scott] Trumpets are muted in a similar arrangement of the same tune. King handles distribution.

JOE MEDLIN (Brunswick 55214)

(B+) "HERE IN THIS MAGIC MOMENT" (2:33) [Figure BMI—Lehmann, Jackson, Fritz] The deep-voiced R&B-flavored songster offers a light-beat performance of a Chopin melody whose standard pop name is "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows." Busy chorus-rock-a-string arrangement directed by Dick Jacobs.

(B) "IN MY HEART YOU'LL ALWAYS BE" (2:50) [Merri-mac BMI—Tucker, Marie, Ott] Good slap-beat arrangement backs the singer's blues-ballad vocal.

JENNEL HAWKINS
(Dynamite 1007)

(B) "TWISTIN' JENNY"—Part 2 (2:30) [Titanic BMI—Hawkins] Swingin' rock organ work spotlights this quick-beat instrumental.

(B) "TWISTIN' JENNY"—Part 1 (3:50) [Titanic BMI—Hawkins] Initial section of the session has a longer running time. Label is handled by Allied Distributing of Hollywood.

B. G. KAY (RCA Victor 7879)

(B) "POPCORN, PEANUTS, CRACKERJACK & CANDY KISSES" (2:17) [Farel ASCAP — Farrar, Haskell] Lark heads a sprightly teen-market novelty about a fella who sells popcorn, peanuts, crackerjack, but offers "candy kisses" for free. Cute item.

(B) "OH HOW I CRIED" (2:36) [Farel ASCAP—Farrar] A country-styled performance by the artist.

JUMP JACKSON BAND
(La Salle 502)

(C+) "RIDING IN MY JAGUAR" (2:20) [Valencia BMI—Jackson, Warren] Straight upbeat blues is belted vigorously by vocalist Bill Warren in front of the rollicking big band efforts by Jackson.

(C+) "MIDNIGHT SHUFFLE" (3:00) [Valencia BMI—Jackson, Young] Again, the raunchy blues band supports Warren in a driving performance.

JEB STUART (Phillips 3567)


(B+) "COMING DOWN WITH THE BLUES" (2:06) [Roosevelt BMI—Covay, Berry] The blues songster gives a sound-wise account of the fine shuffle-beat ditty. Chorus and combo back-up with a polished light-beat arrangement. Could get both R&B-pop reaction.

(B) "DREAM" (2:39) [Michael H. Golden ASCAP—Mercer] An R&B-type look at the old Johnny Mercer opus.

Anna Maria Alberghetti, Jerry Orbach and Kaye Ballard solidly carry the singing load. Very attractive book-type sleeve.



"BASIN STREET EAST PROUDLY PRESENTS PEGGY LEE"—Capitol ST 1520
For four weeks this winter, hordes of New Yorkers turned out nightly to be hypnotized by the superb entertainment served up by Peggy Lee at Basin Street East (a record-breaking engagement). Capitol captured a typical night's performance, but there's nothing typical about the imagination, artistry and impeccable taste Miss Lee incorporates in her act. Here she's heard on "Day In-Day Out," "Fever," "Just For a Thrill," "Them There Eyes," "Yes Indeed!" and many others. Truly outstanding package.



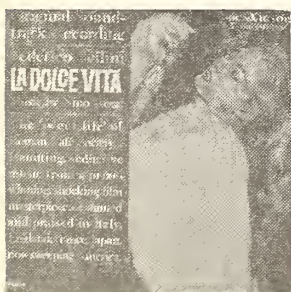
"BOBBY VEE WITH STRINGS AND THINGS"—Liberty LRP 3186

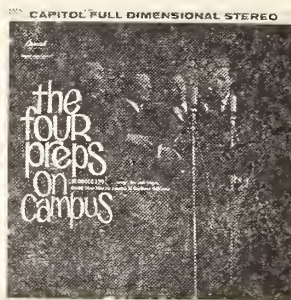
"I'M GLAD THERE IS YOU"—Gloria Lynne with the Earl May Trio—Everest SDBR 1126

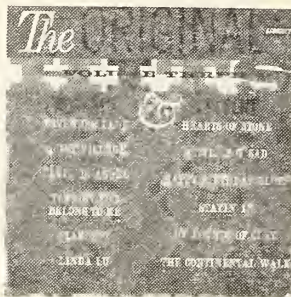
"PERCUSSION PARISIENNE"—David Carroll and his Orch.—Mercury PPS 6008

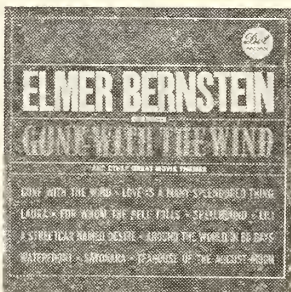
"THE FOUR PREPS ON CAMPUS"—Capitol ST 1566

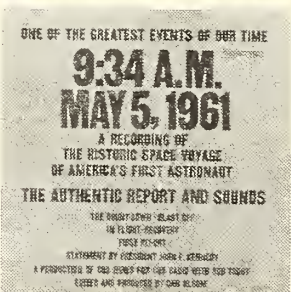
"GONE WITH THE WIND"—Orna Del and the Starlight Symphony—MGM E3954

"MERV GRIFFIN'S DANCE PARTY"—Carlton LP 12/134
Griffin's New York TV'er, "Dance Party," is a teen mecca and now that he's taken to disks, he has built up a large following. Leading off with his click single, "The Charanga," he continues on through such evergreens as "When The Red Red Robin," "Charleston," "You Came A Long Way From St. Louis" and "Don't Get Around Much Anymore" set down in tempos angled at the teen hoofers. Could do very well.



"9:34 A.M., MAY 5, 1961"—Columbia XX 1
The CBS News production covering first-hand the space voyage of America's first astronaut is issued here as an historic event. Robert Trout narrates the proceedings, from the count-down, through the flight, the suspenseful recovery of the space capsule containing Alan B. Shepard, Jr., and the congratulatory statements by President Kennedy. A complete disk recounting of a momentous occasion.



"DANCE TO THE 'NEW LIVE' SOUND OF RALPH FLANAGAN AND HIS ORCH."—Coral CRL 757363
Actually, the "new live" Flanagan sound is an engineering feat which subdues and/or brings forward various sections of the band throughout the performance. This sectional balance and counter-balance could prove an interesting change-of-pace for dance band fans. 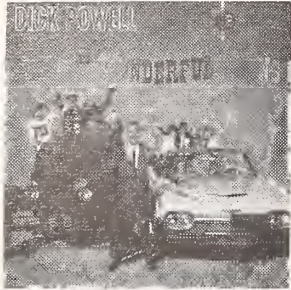

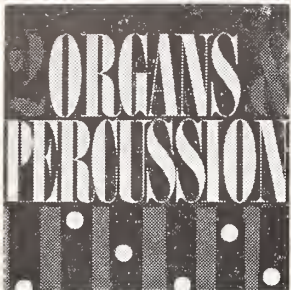


Album Reviews

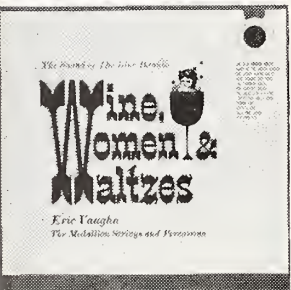
"2 ORGANS AND PERCUSSION"—Sy Mann & Nick Tagg—Grand Award GA 256 SD

The program includes several Don Elliott and Sascha Burland originals as well as some proven pops, all delightfully transformed to the world of speeded-up-voices in scat singing improvisation. Among them are "Skylark," "Bye Bye Blackbird," "Yardbird Suite" and "Didee Bird."



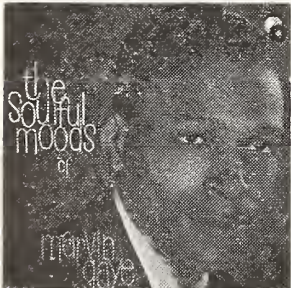
"WINE WOMEN AND WALTZES"—The Sound of The Blue Danube—Eric Vaughn, The Medallion Strings and Percussion—Medallion ML-7519

The charm and lilt of the Viennese waltz turns up in full, rich orchestral tapestries woven faithfully by arrangers Emanuel Vardi and Jack Elliot. Melody, of prime importance in this music, is strictly adhered to, yet the addition of percussive coloring becomes a vital ingredient for the enjoyment of the LP to set it aside from other such endeavors. Among the selections are "The Blue Danube Waltz," "The Emperor's Waltz," "The Skater's Waltz" and "The Merry Widow Waltz."



"KAKO Y SU COMBO"—Alegre LPA 803

Originally limited in appeal to Spanish-speaking audiences, this album of authentic Latin dance music takes on a wider commercial attitude considering the current renewed interest in Latin dance bands. The music is authentic in every aspect, with a strong spark of sensuous excitement running throughout the twelve selections. Rhythms include mambos and pachangas. Could do well in selected locations.



"THE SOULFUL MOODS OF MARVIN GAYE"—Tamla 221

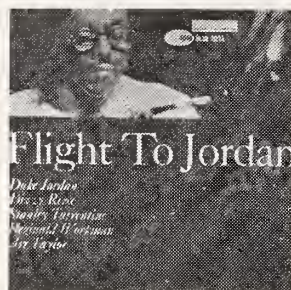
Gaye, a jazz-inflected vocalist, intros on LP turning in a good performance. Choice of material runs to the better pop tunes—"My Funny Valentine," "How Deep Is the Ocean," "Love For Sale," "Always"—and they're delivered in a late-hours soulfulness with sympathetic combo support. An honest effort.

JAZZ PICK OF THE WEEK



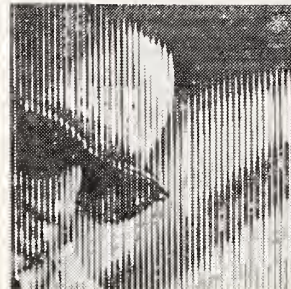
"NOT SO DUKISH"—Johnny Hodges and his Orchestra—Verve MG VS-68355

Although at first glance the title might indicate something different, this LP is all-the-way a very "Dukish" set. Nothing wrong with that, for Hodges has been a main cog in the Ellington wheels almost since they began to turn, and one of the early developers of the alto sax. He is still one of the most respected names on the instrument, playing in a mellow, melodic manner. The accompanying small band here is also mainly from the Duke and together they make pleasing, very enjoyable sounds. Top notch date by one of jazz's most consistent purveyors.



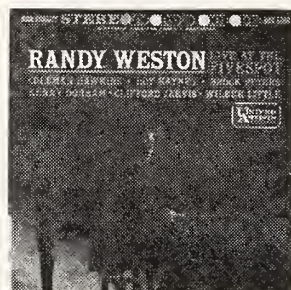
"FLIGHT TO JORDAN"—Duke Jordan—Blue Note 4046

Jordan, an early disciple of the bop revolution and now a solidly entrenched pianist in the New York "hard bop" scene, has displayed signs in the past of being a first-rate composer ("Jordu" is the most famous example). Here, commanding a group comprised of relative youngsters Stanley Turrentine, Dizzy Reece, Reginald Workman and Art Taylor, six Jordan compositions are treated with musical sympathy and understanding. Tunes include the warm melodic ballad "Starbrite," the spiritual-like "Flight to Jordan" and the low moaning "Deacon Joe."



"UHURU, AFRIKA" (Freedom, Africa)—Randy Weston, music, Langston Hughes, lyrics—Roulette R 65901

The Randy Weston-Langston Hughes collaboration is an extended suite commemorating and displaying militancy for, the African freedom movement. It is a particularly pungent piece of music with explosive, and at times, touching lyrics. A host of jazz's best names have been gathered for the date, especially the rhythm section which includes Olatunji, Candido, Armando Peraza, Max Roach, Charlie Persip, G. T. Hogan. Narration is by Tuntumeke Sanga of Tanganyika and vocal soloists include Brock Peters and Martha Flowers. Musicianship all-around is outstanding. Should witness a tremendous reception in Negro markets.



"RANDY WESTON LIVE AT THE FIVE SPOT"—United Artists UAS 5066

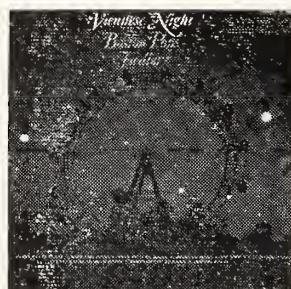
Randy Weston, a capable if uninventive pianist, gets lead billing here but it is the presence of Coleman Hawkins and Kenny Dorham solos and the inclusion of one vocal track by Brock Peters, a rich, sensitive baritone, that make this LP. Cut during performance at N.Y.'s Five Spot Cafe in a warm, relaxed atmosphere, the group (also including Roy Haynes, Wilbur Little and Clifford Jarvis) runs through five Weston originals ("High Fly," "Lisa Lovely") and one Billy Strayhorn composition, "Star Crossed Lovers," all arranged by Melba Liston, in the easy-going manner that the club induces to all who appear there.



"PERCUSSIVE SOUND OF THE BIG BAND"—John Evans—Directional Sound DS 5003

John Evans has molded a fairly clean crisp ensemble sound here. He is mostly partial toward the reed section laying down the basic line over which individual and grouped brass voicings are used for further theme development and to create musical excitement. The selection of tunes includes a handful of Swing oldies among which are "American Patrol," "Blue Skies," "Strike Up the Band" and "St. Louis Blues March." Enjoyable listening.

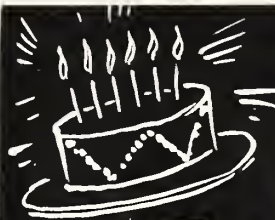
"VIENNESE NIGHT"—Arthur Fiedler conducting the Boston Pops Orch.—RCA Victor LM-2548

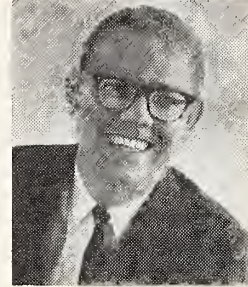

Defendants In N.J. Bootlegging Trial Enter "Non-Vult" Plea Punishable By Jail Sentence and/or Fine

NEW YORK—The first major court contest concerning disk counterfeiting came to a dramatic climax last Thursday (11) after eight days of trial when the three defendants, Robert Arkin, president of Bonus Platta-Pak, Inc., Fort Lee, N.J., Milton Richman, of the same firm, and Brad Atwood, Atwood Enterprises, Hollywood, offered a plea of Non-Vult, which could make them liable to a jail sentence, a fine or both.

Immediately after the plea was entered Judge Benjamin Galenti announced that sentence would be handed down June 2.

According to Black's Law Dictionary (4th Edition) the plea of Non-Vult is defined as follows: Non Vult Contendere—(Lat)—He (the defendant) will not contest it. A plea legally equivalent to that of guilt being a variation of the form "nolo contendere" and sometimes abbreviated "Non-Vult." Under the definition of Nolo Contendere, the Black Dictionary reads as follows: Nolo Contendere—(Lat)—I will not contest it. The name of a plea in a criminal action having the same legal effect as a plea of guilty so far as regards all proceedings on the indictment and on

which the defendant may be sentenced.

The reason for the entry of the plea of "Non-Vult" is that by a "Non-Vult" plea the defendants avoid an admission of guilt which could be used against them in a subsequently instituted civil action.

Under the indictment of "conspiracy to knowingly and wilfully selling goods having forged and counterfeited labels" (S-480-59) the following were charged: Bob Arkin, individually and as president of Bonus Platta-Pak, Inc.; Milton Richman, individually and as secretary of Bonus Platta-Pak, Inc.; and Brad Atwood, individually and as president of Atwood Enterprises, Hollywood.

Under the indictment of "knowingly, wilfully and unlawfully selling various named distributors records bearing forged and counterfeited labels purporting to be the labels of Cameo, Laurie, Warwick and Audicon, knowing them to be forged and counterfeited and without disclosing that fact to the purchasers," (S-605-59) only Arkin and Richman were charged, both as individuals and as executives of their respective firms.

Under New Jersey law, a misdemeanor, which the above crimes are, is punishable by a maximum of three years in jail and/or a \$1000 fine. For those accused on two counts, the penalty is the same for each but may run consecutively or concurrently as the Judge decides.

Art Talmadge, president of the American Record Manufacturers and Distributors Association (ARMADA), the organization which instituted an aggressive fight against the practice which Talmadge said siphons off some \$20,000,000 annually from legitimate operations, offered high praise for the prosecution which was conducted by Guy T. Calissi, County

Prosecutor, Bergen County, New Jersey, his assistant, Frank J. Cuccio, and Detective Gordon Graber, who handled the case.

"ARMADA's membership, while small in numbers, can take credit for a most remarkable achievement," Talmadge stated. "Through their special assessments which in many cases were actually a hardship, these firms have finally made possible a major break-through in the vicious practice of record bootlegging.

"The excellent preparation and carry-through of the Bergen County case must be lauded by the entire phonograph record industry. These public officials spent large sums of monies, and untold hours, days and months of their time to present a thorough case to the court. We are all in their debt.

"In addition, ARMADA's legal counsel, Blanc, Steinberg, Balder & Steinbrook, who were responsible for uncovering much of the counterfeiting offered invaluable service in gathering witnesses for the current trial."

The major break-through in the case came abruptly on Tuesday (9) when Earl Corr, a west coast printer who had not previously been identified in the case, was placed on the stand by the prosecution. Corr identified labels for the Cameo record, "Ding-A-Ling" by Bobby Rydell and a Laurie recording, "When You Wish Upon A Star" by Dion and the Belmonts which were on records seized in a raid at the New Jersey firm, Bonus Platta-Pak, Inc. last June, as having been printed in his shop. These labels had not been ordered by either Cameo or Laurie.

Corr had received plates of the artwork of both labels from a William Thompson, who had known Atwood on the west coast, and who is currently under indictment with Atwood in California on a similar charge. Thompson, who appeared on the stand Wednesday (9) revealed he had instructed Corr to duplicate the type on the labels, then print them. Corr was able to identify his labels because the type was not exactly the same as the original. There was also a damaged spot on the plate which Corr further identified.

Thompson, who followed Corr to the stand, said that Atwood had asked him to duplicate the two labels. He had arranged for the plating of the art work, then had taken same to the Corr plant and ordered the type to be set and the labels to be printed. Thompson said that Atwood had then instructed him to deliver the labels to the Korelich Engineering and Manufacturing Co., Los Angeles, which is a record pressing plant. At Korelich's he saw the records upon which the labels were to be placed.

Peter Korelich, head of the pressing plant, is also under indictment in the West Coast case.

Thompson further revealed that Atwood had told him the records were being sold by Arkin and Richman, through their firm in the East.

The West Coast case is scheduled for trial in August.

New Columbia Plant Officially Opens This Week



PITMAN, N.J.—The opening of Columbia Records fourth and largest record manufacturing plant in this small southeastern New Jersey city is being marked this week (17) by open house festivities presided over by Goddard Lieberman, president of Columbia.

The plant, which can, according to plant manager Joseph Massimino, produce at normal production rates 20 million LP's a year, is reputed to be the largest plant of its kind in the world.

In addition to trade advertising, the program will receive extra exposure by way of a series of ads in a pair of leading teenage national magazines, Dig and Modern Teen. Dealer co-op ads are also encouraged—especially for school papers.

AmPar Distrib Deal With Garner's Octave Label; 1st Pkg. In Stores

NEW YORK—The signing of a long-term pact between ABC-Paramount Records and Erroll Garner's Octave Records for the exclusive distribution rights to all new Garner recordings has been announced by AmPar prexy Sam Clark.

In a separate agreement, AmPar has already begun distribution of a new Garner LP—his first session in three years and the first he has done in stereo—tagged "Dreamstreet."

The distribution deal—which officially becomes effective on June 1—also involves all other artists who might be recorded in LP or singles form by Octave. Releases under the deal will carry both the AmPar and Octave logos.

Clark said that: "During my long career in the record business I had always hoped to become associated in some way with this phenomenal artist. It has taken all these years to see this happen and I certainly feel that

it's worth waiting for. . . I feel that the Garner legend will continue to grow and that he is rapidly establishing himself as a true immortal of the musical world. I trust that this affiliation will continue for many, many years."

Until recently, Garner's Octave recordings had been released through Columbia Records, but the deal was terminated via Garner's legal hassle with Columbia over Garner's refusal of rights over the release of his material.

It is understood that a prime reason for Garner's deal with AmPar is that AmPar product is not available through record clubs, a distribution method which Garner does not favor.

According to Allan Parker, AmPar's director of album sales and merchandising, initial distrib orders on the "Dreamstreet" LP have been 25 per cent in stereo, far above the usual breakdown of mono & stereo orders. Mono list is \$3.98, stereo is \$4.98.

In promoting the album, special window streamers have been designed for retailers, new display pieces are being planned, and Clark has ordered the entire home office sales reps to take to the road to spur the Garner package to all sales outlets.

WB May Greeley Promo Keeps Him On Busy Sked

HOLLYWOOD—In conjunction with Warner Bros. Records' naming of May as "It's Greeley Time!" month, pianist George Greeley is keeping his calendar full with personal appearances, recording sessions, concerts, new releases, and a promotion tour.

The major part of May for Greeley will be taken up with a two-week, coast-to-coast tour. On the schedule will be visits with top deejays, retail outlets, and WB distributes in such cities as San Francisco, Minneapolis, Chicago, Detroit, New York, Boston, Baltimore, Washington D.C., Charlotte, Atlanta, Cleveland, and Philadelphia.

Immediately following the tour, Greeley begins rehearsals for a concert at the University of California at Los Angeles, in which he co-stars with such artists as Dorothy Kirsten, Howard Keel, Alfred Newman, Gordon MacRae, and Eleanor Powell in a benefit for the UCLA band's summer tour. Also on his return, Greeley is scheduled to begin work on a new fall TV series, as yet untitled.

Also for the month following are a June 2 appearance on NBC's Hollywood Record Room with Bobby Troup, as well as scoring work on a major feature film.

Coming in the immediate future is still another album, Greeley's ninth for the label, to be entitled "Popular Piano Concertos from the Great Broadway Musicals."

George Greeley Month has entailed a major promotion program from the diskery. Concentrating its sales drive on Greeley's catalog albums, WB is supplying all its distributors with special Greeley stand-up browser boxes for floor display, window streamers proclaiming "It's Greeley Time," dimensional window displays featuring six Greeley catalog albums, special order forms, and slap-on wall decorations in the shape of climbing hands, each imprinted with Greeley's name. Co-op ads are being scheduled in local newspapers, and a special Greeley sampler entitled "The Best of the Popular Piano Concertos" is being offered to dealers to promote the Greeley catalog.

Newport Folk Protest Jazz Festival

NEWPORT, R.I.—A court action to prevent Music At Newport, Inc. from holding jazz concerts at Freebody Park this year was begun here last week by eleven Newport property owners. The plaintiffs all live near Freebody Park, site of the annual jazz event. They had filed a petition for a temporary injunction against Music At Newport, which is producing this year's concerts, the Mayor and the City Council.

At the hearing, presided over by Judge Florence K. Murray, five witnesses testified that the contract between the producers and the city for use of the park is "unlawful" and would be "a public and private nuisance."

In another area, it was learned last week that Sid Bernstein, a co-producer of the concerts, has taken steps to prevent the occurrence of the riots which forced cancellation of last year's Newport Jazz Festival. Bernstein has presented the city with \$10,000 with which they will provide additional police protection during the four-day festival. In addition, Music At Newport has stipulated the following conditions for the fest: no parking lots be located near Freebody Park, beaches to be lighted all night, no drinking to be allowed on the streets, and ticket booths be located at some distance from Freebody Park.

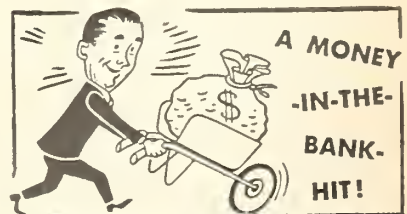

ALL THAT JAZZ

The Modern Jazz Quartet has embarked on its first Far Eastern concert tour, beginning in Japan, May 1 through 15, and continuing to Australia and New Zealand. As in their four major tours of western Europe during the past five years, International popularity has preceded the MJQ to the Far East, where they've won recent polls in Japanese and New Zealand magazines. And, as they've broken precedents by appearing at European classical music festivals, the MJQ is the only jazz group invited to participate in the 1961 East-West Music Encounter in Tokyo. Another highlight of the tour will be a TV appearance with the Tokyo Symphony Orch. over JOKR-TV-Tokyo in which they will preem such "third stream" offerings as Gunther Schuller's "Concertino for Jazz Quartet and Orchestra," Andre Hodiier's "Around the Blues," Werner Heider's "Divertimento" and John Lewis' own "England's Carol," which they've played with the Cincinnati and Minneapolis Symphonies and which appear on their new Atlantic LP, "The Modern Jazz Quartet and Orchestra," with the Stuttgart Symphony.

The MJQ jaunt marks the second jazz tour of Japan arranged by Monte Kay. Earlier this year Kay scored an impressive triumph by bringing Art Blakey and the Messengers to the Orient.

West Coast promoter Jimmy Lyons is hoping to stage a two-day Erroll Garner Festival in Carmel, Calif. following the pianist's June Crescendo date in Los Angeles. Plans are contingent on Garner's being able to fit it in with his summer tent sked, which is set to kick off July 3 at the Westbury Music Fair. He closes out at the Crescendo June 25. Most jazz fans remember Carmel as the scene of the artist's now-famous "Concert By The Sea" LP, which, since its release in 1955, has become his best-selling album, and one of the biggest of all-time.

Sid Bernstein presented the city fathers of Newport with a check for \$10,000 with which they'll provide extra police protection during the four-day "Music At Newport" fest, of which Bernstein is co-producer along with John Drew and Abe Margolies. Additional contractual stipulations which Bernstein has directed include that no parking lots be located near Freebody Park, ticket booths to be some distance from the park, beaches to be lighted all night and no drinking on the streets. Bernstein, who's had immense success in the past producing rock and roll theatre shows, apparently knows how to handle unruly crowds of youngsters, the non-jazz cause of Newport's past troubles.

Benny Goodman is reactivating his big band (14 pieces) for a series of five dance dates at Disneyland—starting May 27. BG's book will include many of the original Fletcher Henderson charts that initially sparked the BG band in the 30's. The final night, June 15, will climax the series with a giant graduation prom comprised of thirty high schools from the southern California area. Should be the biggest prom blowout of all-time.

Allan Grant's "Jazz Nocturne" is being broadcast remote from the Copa City nitery (Jamaica, NY) over WLIR-FM nightly. . . . Jack Wilson, former Dinah Washington pianist and lately a member of the Richard Evans Trio (Argo), is being discharged from the Army in August. With the Evans group set to disband, Wilson plans to hit the Big Apple to freelance. . . . Command, biggest name in stereo percussion LP's, is now using jazz stars as disk headliners. Doc Severinson ("Tempestuous Trumpet") and Urbie Green ("Persuasive Trombone") are heard in recent album issues. . . . Cerebral solo pianist Bernard Peiffer inked to appear every Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights for an unlimited engagement at Berne's Woodland Inn, Abington, Pa. (near Philly). Peiffer makes his home in Germantown and will make Berne's his home base of jazz operations.

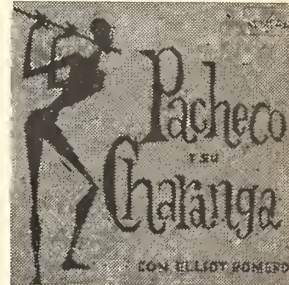

UA Names Norman Land European Administrator

NEW YORK—United Artists Records last week made another major step in building its world-wide coverage when Norman Land, former director of promotion for Europe and the Near East for RKO Pictures, was named United Artists Records European administrator by Art Talmadge, vice president and general manager of the label.

"With our revised and enlarged foreign affiliate structure now in operation," Talmadge said, "we have established our own office in Paris, where

Mr. Land will headquarter. He will work in close cooperation with all of our European affiliates. His appointment becomes effective June 1."

Sidney Shemel, director of foreign operations for UA who recently returned from a one-month tour of the European countries, has been holding a series of conferences with Land here with the latter scheduled to return to his Paris headquarters this week (17).

Shemel also announced that Deutsche Grammophon, currently distributing UA in Germany and Austria, will also handle distribution in Scandinavia and Switzerland. Under terms of the agreement, Shemel said, Deutsche Grammophon will feature the United Artists Records logo on all records in all four territories, the same provision that has been now effected in the balance of the European area.

Land, who resided in the U.S. prior to his RKO affiliation, was previously associated with Ziv Radio for five years, Xavier Cugat for four and a half years, Radio Station WPEN, Philadelphia as program director, and was with the New York City Symphony Orchestra under Leonard Bernstein.

"The rapid expansion of the UA line in Europe, plus the fact that such releases as the Ferrante and Teicher "Exodus" theme and Don Costa's "Never On Sunday" have become best-sellers on the continent, make it imperative that we have fulltime, experienced representation throughout Europe," Talmadge said. "We know the appointment of Mr. Land will be welcomed by our foreign affiliates."

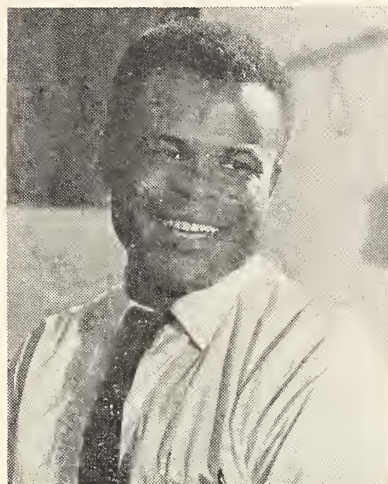

The only child of churchgoing parents, Roy began singing in church choirs at the age of six. He majored in commercial art at Lincoln High School in Jersey City, but gave up art when he became interested in electronics. Even during a stint as a heavyweight boxer he maintained his vocal interest, spending five years with the Searchlight Gospel Singers. During a date in a Newark nightspot he was heard by disk jockey Bill Cook who brought him to Epic and kicked off his big career.

Mina



Mina, now gaining international attention via her recording of "The World We Love In" (on Time in the U.S.), at twenty years old is one of Italy's brightest disk stars. In Italy she is known affectionately as "The Tigress of the Juke Boxes."

Her real name is Anna Maria Mazzini. Born in 1940 of well-to-do parents, she prepared for a career in accounting. At a pop concert she was encouraged by friends to get up and sing, which she did, and, pleased with the favorable reaction, entered show business as a serious endeavor. Eventually she was signed to a recording contract and immediately ran up an impressive string of hits.

Decca Repacts Andres Segovia

NEW YORK—Andres Segovia, the world famous guitarist, has signed a new exclusive long-term contract with Decca Records, it was announced last week by Leonard W. Schneider, executive vice president.

In announcing the newly completed negotiations, Schneider commented that this continues an association between Maestro Segovia and the label that began in 1944 and has produced a steady flow of consistent best-selling albums.

Maestro Segovia recently completed a series of recording sessions in Decca's New York studios. In addition to solo selections, he recorded a concerto with the Symphony of the Air, conducted by Enrique Jorda, for release later this year. Also, before leaving for Europe to resume extensive concert performances, a series of further recording projects was blue-printed with Israel Horowitz, Decca's

classical artist and repertoire director.

The latest Segovia recorded project, released last week on the Decca Gold Label encompasses a virtual history of his instrument and is titled "Three Centuries of the Guitar." Its selections trace the evolution of the classical guitar as an instrument of beauty and interpretation. This brings his catalog of albums to twelve, included among which is the highlighted Deluxe package Golden Jubilee album, released last year in commemoration of his half century as a leading influence in the musical world.

Segovia is today one of the most active artists now before the public, appearing in upwards of one hundred-fifty concerts a year throughout the Western world. His United States appearances, under the management of Hurok Attractions, long have been an annual feature of the January through April concert season.

Following a Spring series of European concerts, which began last week in Paris, Maestro Segovia will devote much of the Summer to teaching and writing. For several weeks he will be engaged in supervising a master guitar class at the Chigiana Academy in Siena, Italy, one of the many centers of instruction with which he has been associated for many years. He is also preparing an autobiography which will be published here by Harcourt, Brace and Company.

Clock-Cortez Single Bows New Merc. Distrib Policy

NEW YORK—The release last week of Clock Records' "Tootsie" by organist Dave "Baby" Cortez marked the first label to be marketed through the Mercury distrib set-up other than the firm's own trademarks. This week (15), a second outside label is being introduced into the Mercury distrib network—the Pioneer label's dishing of "Charlie Wasn't There" by Barbara Evans.

Until a few weeks ago, Mercury only distributed its own trademarks, but since the formation of a subsid, Smash Records, the label established a policy of making manufacturing and distribution deals.

The first of these deals was made with Walter and Doug Moody of Clock, while the second agreement was made with Paul Vance of Vanpok Recording Co., which will also produce sides for Mercury.

Adler-Chappell Form Firm For New Musical Score

NEW YORK—Composer Dick Adler and Chappell Music have combined to form Sahara Music, this city, to publish the score of Adler's upcoming musical, "Kwamina," starring Adler's wife, Sally Anne Howes, and English-African star Johnny Sekka.

The show is scheduled for an early fall production, with pre-Broadway showings at the O'Keefe Centre in Toronto and the Colonial Theatre in Boston.

Announcement of a label to cut the original-cast LP will be made at a later date.

Adler and the late Jerry Ross wrote the songs for two musical hits, "Pajama Game" and "Damn Yankees."

Kingston Trio Tours Far East



NEW YORK—The Kingston Trio has just returned from an eight-week tour of the far east. The boys' first stop was Honolulu, hometown of members Bob Shane and Nick Reynolds, followed by treks to Japan, Australia and New Zealand. Accompanying the performers were personal manager Frank Werber and bass player Dave "Buck" Wheat.

Freberg "U.S." LP Proving Controversial

NEW YORK—Satirist Stan Freberg, no stranger to controversy, is again in the midst of one via the first volume of a four volume series for Capitol Records, "Stan Freberg Presents The United States of America."

The LP has become a special sore-point of the Daughters of the American Revolution, which, in objecting particularly to tongue-and-cheek handling of the Boston Tea Party in the LP, has made a mailing to local radio stations which demands that the album not be broadcast.

In Dallas, WRR disk jockeys Bill Carroll and Jim Lowe decided that their audience determine the merits of the LP, and after it was broadcast, the response was reportedly "overwhelmingly" pro-Freberg and anti-DAR.

Seven local stations, including three major networks in New York, WNBC, WCBS and WABC, have banned at least one track, "Take an Indian to Lunch This Week," the lyrics of which, say the stations, are too controversial. The song, however, last week received the official endorsement of the National Congress of American Indians, and stated the organization's executive director Mrs. Helen Peterson: "We commend the use of political satire to help tell the Indian story and to promote respect and appreciation for all men's values and aspirations..." Freberg received a traditional Indian war bonnet.

Several years ago, a Freberg single, "Green Christmas," which knocked commercialism during the holiday, was the subject of much pro and con.

Stan Jones To Write For Mills Music Subsid

NEW YORK—Stan Jones, the writer-artist-actor who clefted "Ghost Riders In The Sky," has just signed an exclusive writer's pact with Ranger Music, this city.

Ranger has also acquired all the compositions by Jones in his own Stanley Music, which include all the tunes from two new Disneyland LP's, "Songs of the National Parks" and "This Was The West." Jones has served for fifteen years as a U.S. National Park Ranger.

In addition to song activity, Irving Mills, Mills' veep, said a series of choral and symphonic works by Jones for the school and concert field were in preparation.

Hendricks Named Music Director For Randall's Island Jazz Festival

NEW YORK—Jon Hendricks, of the Lambert, Hendricks & Ross vocal trio, has been signed as music director of the 1961 Randall's Island Jazz Festival, it was announced last week by Franklin Geltman, producer of the annual New York event.

Hendricks will supervise the overall musical concept of the festival and will also be in charge of special arrangements and special music features of the programs. Hendricks, who writes most of the material performed by the L, H & R Trio, is considered to be one of jazz's most articulate spokesmen.

This year's festival, the sixth in the annual series, will be held August 25-26-27.

Anka's Mother Dies

NEW YORK—The mother of singing star Paul Anka died last week (11) at the Englewood Hospital in Englewood, New Jersey. She was 38-years-old. Funeral services were set for Monday, May 15, in Ottawa, Canada, Anka's hometown.

Outside Entertainment Planned For MOA Attendees

MIAMI BEACH—Several special attractions have been set up for the entertainment of the ladies (and gentlemen too) attending the MOA Convention here this week.

For ladies only, a sightseeing trip has been planned for Monday. Wyllie's buses will depart the Deauville Hotel 11:00 AM Monday morning. On Tuesday, a complimentary luncheon and floor show for men and women will be held at 12:30 in the Casanova Room, off the main lobby of the hotel. And on Thursday, the day after the official close of the convention, those remaining behind will be able to take a trip to Nassau via Cunard Eagle Airways. Plane connections will leave from the Deauville Hotel for Thursday morning and Thursday afternoon departures. Further information concerning this trip is available in the hotel lobby.

Everest Says Printed Lyrics Triple Sales Of Sing-Along LP

NEW YORK—The addition of a special set of French lyrics for Everest Records' Ray Ventura album, "Sing Along In French," has tripled the album's sales, according to Martin Weiss, the label's ad-sales manager. Weiss said that not only are high schools and colleges requesting the album for classroom use but students majoring in French are writing in to Everest asking for additional copies of the lyrics.

In addition to the lyrics, the label has made-up an attractive lime colored day-glo kleen-stik which is prominently displayed on the front cover. Mounted easels and other point of sales display pieces are presently shipping to all Everest distributors.

World-Pacific Adds To Talent Roster

LOS ANGELES—World-Pacific Records has just signed to exclusive pacts three new attractions, according to topper Richard Bock.

They include: the Jazz Crusaders, guitarist Al Viola and Latin maestro Bobby Montez.

The Jazz Crusaders, a new group from Texas whose first LP is due in July, is led by Nesbert "Sticks" Hooper, drums, and also includes Wilton Felder, tenor sax; Joe Sample, piano; Wayne Henderson, trombone; Melvin Douglas, guitar. The group is currently appearing here at Ben Shapiro's Club Renaissance.

Viola's first album for WP will be a solo effort utilizing material from the catalog of Leeds Music, which will release simultaneously with the album a book of solo guitar arrangements by Viola.

Montez's first LP, "Viva! Montez," is the label's feature LP release for May.

Craft's Craft

Columbia Ups Pic Soundtrack Activity

NEW YORK—Columbia Records is increasing its activities in pic soundtrack LP's, it was noted last week by Irving Townsend, who heads the label's coast operation.

Townsend, for the first time in a year, paid a brief visit to the label's New York offices last week.

Townsend said the label had acquired the soundtrack rights to two major flicks, 20th Century Fox's "Snow White & The Three Stooges," starring skating champion Carol Heiss, and Columbia Pictures' "Guns of Navarone," with a score by vet soundtrack cleffer Dimitri Tiomkin. Tiomkin wrote the score for "The Alamo," which is currently a best-selling soundtrack LP for Columbia.

Columbia will release, as it did the original Broadway cast version, the soundtrack LP of "West Side Story," which is due for release this fall. As for other soundtrack deals, Townsend said, "I'm sure there will be more."

Columbia's Percy Faith, who recently relinquished his A&R role at Columbia for concentration as an artist and cleffer, has written the soundtrack score for "Tammy, Tell Me True," a sequel to the successful "Tammy" flick. Currently, Townsend said, Frank DeVol, who similarly dropped out of Columbia A&R, is writing the score for a new Doris Day flick, Townsend said.

Eureka-Lectern's Gold Off On Distrib Trek

HOLLYWOOD—Ric Gold, of the Eureka and Lectern labels, left last week on a tour of all thirty-four of the labels' distributors around the country. Eureka plans a four album release and Lectern a six album release between now and Sept. In Sept., Eureka will release ten new albums and Lectern will release six more albums.

During his trip, Gold will catch the openings of the label's folk artist, Bob Grossman, at "The Laughing Buddha Club" in St. Louis (15) and The Second Frett in Philadelphia (June 21).

New Coast Diskery Bows With 2 All-Teenage Singles

HOLLYWOOD—Film Town Productions, a new disk firm here, has debuted with two singles, which, the label says, are totally teenage efforts, from the engineer to the A&R men and artists. They are: "Some Kind of Nut" and "Arriba" by The Cashews and Big Sam Fletcher and "No Date For the Prom" and "(When Will They Take) The Braces Off My Teeth" by Ruth & April with The Moonrays.

Mercury Re-Issues "Grad" Hit

NEW YORK—Timed for high-school graduations next month, Mercury Records has re-released its years-back hit by The Cardigans, "Your Graduation Means Goodbye."

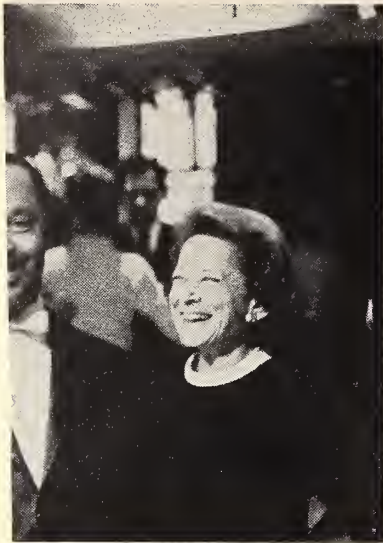

Hendricks Joins Liberty As Otis' Assistant

HOLLYWOOD — Belford Hendricks, for the past two and a half years chief arranger and assistant to Clyde Otis at Mercury Records, last week joined Liberty Records in the same capacity. He will report directly to Otis, who was recently named Liberty's Eastern A & R chief.

Hendricks will also join the label's talent roster, recording instrumentals for singles and albums. During his tenure with Otis, Hendricks functioned as songwriter, musician, arranger and conductor. With Otis, he wrote many tunes including "Call Me," recorded by Johnny Mathis and "Nothing In The World," a Nat Cole dinking. He also served as arranger-conductor on many of the Brook Benton-Dinah Washington hit sessions at Mercury.

The deal was negotiated by attorney Martin J. Machat, acting for Hendricks, and Al Bennett, Liberty president. In announcing the acquisition, Bennett stated: "The signing of Hendricks will not only strengthen our position in the East, but greatly assist Otis in developing new talent and ideas for Liberty."

Chasins & Wife Inked For Kapp Piano Albums

NEW YORK—Abrams Chasins and his wife, Constance Keene, have been signed by Kapp Records for a series of solo and duo-piano albums, it was announced last week by the label's classical A & R team, Emanuel Vardi and Paul Myers.

The signing thus brings Chasins, currently musical director of WQXR-New York, the radio station of The New York Times, out of retirement. He left the concert stage in 1946 to assume his post at WQXR.

Among the albums the couple will record for Kapp will be the Bach duo-piano concertos in C major and C minor, in collaboration with the Kapp Sinfonietta under the direction of Vardi, a solo Chopin album by Chasins and a complete set of Rachmaninoff Preludes by Miss Keene.

Chasins, who retired from the concert stage in 1946 to assume his post at WQXR, made his debut in 1927 as a soloist playing his own First Piano Concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Gabilowitsch.

Chasins is the composer of over one hundred published works, and his first book, "Speaking of Pianists," was widely-acclaimed. His decision to come out of retirement is largely due to urgent requests from his colleagues and from teachers to demonstrate some of these findings in actual performance, and to have them available in the permanent form of recordings.

Miss Keene first received recognition through her Town Hall debut in 1943, which resulted in her winning that year's Naumburg award. She has performed as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, Boston Symphony, New York Philharmonic, Chicago Symphony and others in the U.S., and abroad.

A forthcoming European tour will take Miss Keene to England, Germany, Scandinavia, Holland, France and Yugoslavia.

Steinberg & Ellsasser Elected To Int'l Academy

NEW YORK — Conductor William Steinberg and organist Richard Ellsasser have been elected as life fellows in the International Institute of Arts & Letters, according to an announcement from Switzerland. The old organization limits its membership list to 1,760.

B'way Disk Dealers Hit By Blue Laws Crackdown

NEW YORK—Retail record shops in the Broadway area covering approximately 42nd to 50th streets have been hit by a police crackdown on violations of New York state's Sabbath or Sunday blue laws.

On Sunday, May 6, police ordered the closing of all record shops in the area, involving about twelve record shops, and made at least one arrest, later dismissed in court.

Previously, the record shops had remained open on Sundays, each time getting a ticket involving mostly a \$5 fine.

At presstime, the stores involved had not decided whether to open the following Sunday (14).

Under the blue laws, only those establishments offering entertainment (i.e. theatres), food or drugs for sale can be open for business on Sunday.

Though retailers in the area have not united to fight the closings, the owner of one big outlet in the area, said a plan was in the "embryonic" stage to get records listed under the "entertainment" section of the laws.

The complexity of the situation is borne out by the fact that Whelans, the big food & drug chain, can remain open, despite the fact that the chain has record departments in each store (technically, all departments in Whelans not involving food or drug sale must be shut down, though this has not been the practice).

The area, which contains such top New York outlets as Colony, Tin Pan Alley and Strand, is a prime source of "leisurely" Sunday shopping, particularly by out-of-town visitors.

Shirelles Tie-In With Saks Department Stores

NEW YORK—Though none of its outlets has a record department, Saks department stores here have, nevertheless, tied-in with Scepter Music for a special promotion in conjunction with The Shirelles, the Scepter label's teenage stars.

The gals will make special appearances at both Saks 34th St., and its branch stores in Commack and Massapequa, L.I. One facet of the program, which starts at the L.I. branches on Saturday, May 20, calls for the performers to be introduced to their fans in new Saks' teenage apparel departments called "Pace Setter Shops," where Coke machines and special interest displays of the group's past hit records, albums and photos will be placed in key departments throughout the stores, while newspaper, radio and mail coverage will be initiated by Saks to announce the promotion.

Judith Stern, Scepter's publicity director, said that "although Saks has no record department, both special displays and a sales counter will be set up by the store for the purpose of debuting The Shirelles' new album, "The Shirelles Swing with Trumpets & Strings," being readied for release by Scepter in time for their first appearances at the Long Island stores. . . ."

Miss Stern said that another tie-in was in the completion stages using The Shirelles' name in conjunction with an "established" teenage leather product manufacturer, who would offer a national ad campaign and department store displays.

Increased Expenditures Cut Liberty Earnings; Bennett Notes Expansion

HOLLYWOOD—Liberty Records last week reported sales for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1961 of \$5,852,439, compared with \$5,740,848 in the previous year.

President Alvin S. Bennett said that expenditures arising from acquisition of Dolton Records and expansion of Liberty's international operations held earnings down for the past twelve months.

Earnings for the year just ended were \$290,921 after taxes, or 48 cents a share based on 604,500 shares currently outstanding. Earnings for the previous year were \$448,676 or 74 cents adjusted to the same number of shares.

In the company's annual report to shareholders, Bennett projected more than 25 per cent rise in sales for the six months ending July 31, 1961 over sales for the same period a year ago. He added that Liberty is conducting an expansion program which is ex-

pected to further benefit future operations.

Bennett explained that the company is preparing extensive overseas sales programs for Europe, Asia, South America and the Caribbean area. He stated that he anticipates a market for record sales abroad as great as in the United States.

During 1960, Liberty acquired Dolton Records and Cornerstone Publishing Co. Bennett said the firm has also recently broadened its East Coast operations. He added that the company will continue to increase its base of operations through compatible acquisitions and internal expansion.

Bennett also disclosed plans for an extensive promotion campaign to tie in with a new television series featuring the Chipmunks. The cartoon series, which will be under outside sponsorship, will be telecast nationally beginning this fall.

Turner Appointed Angel Mdsng Mgr

LOS ANGELES—Tupper Turner has been promoted to the newly-created post of Angel Records' merchandising manager, it was announced today by Jerome F. Prager, Jr., Angel sales manager. Turner, who has been a member of the classical merchandising department of Capitol Records Distributing Corp., will be responsible for all Angel merchandising and advertising activities on the national level. He will report to Prager.

Turner's appointment is the latest in a series of moves designed to place additional emphasis on all phases of Angel activities. On March 22, Prager was named to head up Angel sales activities. Simultaneously, Prager announced the appointment, effective July 1, of three District sales and promotion managers for Angel, Fred Dumont (far west); Ted Lindgren (central states); and Burt Page (eastern).

Last month, John Coveney, former merchandising manager for Angel and Capitol Classics, was transferred to New York City to take charge of all artist, reviewer, and radio-and-TV relations for Angel. At the same time, Robert E. Myers was named director of Angel A & R, with headquarters in Los Angeles.

Turner joined Capitol in May, 1957 as classical field representative for the eleven western states. He joined CRDC's classical merchandising department as product manager in 1958, the post he held until his current promotion.

Before coming to Capitol, Turner spent three years with the Los Angeles Philharmonic as special assistant to Alfred Wallenstein, then the orchestra's musical director, with special emphasis on publicity and repertoire. Turner had previously spent several years in the record-retailing field.

A professional musician, Turner has played clarinet with various symphonic and chamber-music ensembles and also led his own jazz quartet. He is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles and a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

In an associated move, Tonia Scott, formerly a secretary in CRDC's classical merchandising department, has been appointed Angel merchandising assistant, reporting to Turner.

Before joining Capitol three years ago, Miss Scott was a production assistant with a Los Angeles advertising agency. Previously she was an editorial assistant with TV Guide magazine.

She has also done freelance publicity and promotion and performed as a professional harpist.

Pony Express Helps Sales Of Victor's "West" Album

NEW YORK—Ralph Ergas, record sales manager of the RCA Victor Distributing Corp. in Kansas City, Kansas, created a novel promotion campaign to stimulate record sales for the Victor album "How the West Was Won" in conjunction with the St. Joseph, Missouri Pony Express Centennial Celebration.

At the Eshelman Music House in St. Joseph, he set up a giant window display on the Pony Express theme. It featured the 2-record album and its colorful booklet. Suggested by the famous Life series, the album stars Bing Crosby, Rosemary Clooney and Jimmy Driftwood.

Six copies of the album were carried by riders along the original Pony Express route from St. Joseph to Sacramento, California. Dignitaries in various cities in which the riders stopped were asked to sign a special scroll for each album, and the six packages were later auctioned for the benefit of the St. Joseph Museum Fund where they brought \$100 each.

During the promotion, a major newspaper ad campaign was launched by the dealer. With the added help of a lot of publicity, Ergas reported "very satisfactory sales."

NEW YORK—Secco Records topper Sidney Siegel left last weekend (13) for an extended trip on the continent to consummate business dealings. He will visit Paris, Milan, Rome and London. He will return to the U.S. early next month.

Preston Draws 110,000 During Philippine Tour

PHILIPPINES — Mercury Records star Johnny Preston drew more than 110,000 fans for eight performances on his current tour to the Philippine Islands.

Appearing at the Araneta Coliseum in Manila, Preston rocked audiences with fourteen tunes, all selected from recordings released in the Philippines during the past year. Preston's album sides were issued as singles in the Philippines, thus, according to Araneta, accounted for the high number of selections requested by Philippine fandom.

Sales of Preston disks reportedly average 35,000 a release in the Philippines. Mercury officials report the figure as unusually high for an area that has a limited number of phonographs.

50,000 autographed photos of Preston were purchased during his Manila appearances.

Preston, who is set for a trip to Australia later this month, has been asked for a return engagement by the Araneta's, bookers of the Philippine shows. Preston's manager, William Hall, is trying to arrange for a date after the singer's Down Under tour.

Stage Band Forum Set For Chi Music Show

CHICAGO—The growth of stage bands will be spotlighted at the upcoming 1961 Music Industry Trade Show here at the Palmer House (July 16-20).

A forum, "Stage Bands, the Music Dealer's Biggest Opportunities Since Rental Programs," will be presented on Wednesday, July 19, at 2:30 PM in the State Ballroom of the Palmer House. Moderator will be Charles Suber, publisher of Down Beat magazine.

The forum will also include a demonstration by the prize-winning stage band from Notre Dame High School of Niles, Ill., directed by Rev. George Wiskirchen, C.S.C.

"This session should be of immense value in showing music dealers how to benefit from the growing emphasis on stage bands and bringing dealers the inside story on this important new development in music," said William R. Gard, executive secretary of the National Association of Music Merchants, sponsors of the show.

Chubby Checker Bows Parkway Compact 33

NEW YORK—Parkway Records, handled by the Swan label, of Philly, has joined the Compact 33 club with the release of four sides by Chubby Checker in seven-inch 33 form. The dates include "The Jet," "The Ray Charles-ton," "Dance The Mess Around," Checker's current hit, and "Continental Walk."

Guy Mitchell Has Busy Sked In U.S. Abroad

NEW YORK—Performer Guy Mitchell has a heavy TV-nitery schedule ahead both here and abroad.

This week (15) a new filmed television series, "Whispering Smith," in which he co-stars with Audie Murphy, will begin a 26-week run on the NBC network. That same day Mitchell, who cuts for Columbia Records, will open a three-week engagement at the Checkers Club in Sydney, Australia.

As part of this booking, he will fly to Melbourne each Monday to star in his own live variety television show. He will literally saturate the Australian television channels, for the "Whispering Smith" series is already on the air in Melbourne on station GTV and in Sydney on ATN. As a result, this is the first time that an American artist will be appearing in an Australian night club at the same time that he will have two major weekly television shows on the air on different networks.

Following the Checkers appearance, Mitchell will play a week of one-nighters in New Zealand before returning to the United States.

Immediately prior to leaving for Australia, he also taped a segment for the "Perry Mason" television series. In addition, he recently appeared with comedienne Pat Carroll on the "Ann Southern" show, which segment is now being used as a spin-off pilot for a regular series next season.

In recent months, Mitchell has been touring the country on an extensive night club schedule. He has headlined at Blinstrub's in Boston, the Latin Casino in Washington, Eddy's in Kansas City and the Galaxy in Dayton. He will resume the tour on his return from Australia.

Dodo Marmarosa Back With Argo Pact

CHICAGO—Dodo Marmarosa, the jazz pianist who gained fame during the mid-40's, but who has been in obscurity for the last ten years due to a series of illnesses, has been signed by Argo Records to an exclusive disk pact.

Save for a few sides with Charley Parker and Artie Shaw, Marmarosa is barely represented on records. His first Argo LP was cut earlier this month and is set for release soon.

The 35-year-old artist has performed, in addition to Parker and Shaw, with Tommy Dorsey, Charlie Barnet and Boyd Raeburn.

Strand LP To Feature "Vocal Percussion"

NEW YORK—Strand Records will release next month a "vocal percussion" LP by lark Myrna March, who has just been signed to the label. The album, to be released next month, has Miss March singing so as to produce a percussive effect vocally. Performer was inked to a Strand pact by Sidney Pastner, the label's general manager.

Dealers Have Columbia's Space LP A Day After Shepard's Flight

NEW YORK—Columbia Records seemed to move with the speed of the subject matter in releasing its album on Commander Shepard's space flight on Friday, May 5.

Commander Shepard's flight took place at 9:34 AM (EST) and by 6:30 PM on Saturday (6), about thirty-two hours after the event, streamers in New York record shops advertised that the album was available, which, the label claims, is record time for the release of an LP.

At a singles sales meet in Columbia's New York office at 10:45, Friday morning, A&R producer Ernie Altschuler suggested an LP on the Shepard accomplishment. The others at the meet, including Bill Gallagher, vice-president and director of sales, Norman Adler, executive vice-president, Floyd Kershaw, production coordinator, agreed.

Altschuler hastened over to CBS radio, where a radio program on the flight, featuring Robert Trout, was being taped for broadcast at 7:35 PM. After being told that the tapes would be available for editing, Altschuler rushed to the studio for 2 PM to 6 PM sessions with thrush Sylvia Saynt. Meanwhile, by 2 PM the LP sleeve, one side consisting of type heralding the event, including the date and time of Shepard's flight, and a photo of Shepard and a rocket on the other, was already in production.

Altschuler worked until 2 AM editing the tape, and by Saturday Noon, with Kershaw in on the mastering, finished LP's were ready. Kershaw rushed with the LP's to College Point, L.I., where the sleeves were being prepared, and both he and Bill Grady, vice president and director of manufacturing, stuffed LP's into the sleeves.

By 6:30 PM, via shipments by taxi, station wagon, etc., the LP's were available in New York retail stores, and with a full working day on Sunday, the College Point plant had 10,000 LP's available for shipment, via air express, throughout the country by Sunday evening.

Besides actual comments by Shepard during his flight, the LP also contains a statement by President Kennedy and a performance by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir.

GERMANY

Conventions and exhibits head up the news this week. At the big industrial fair in Hannover recently, 2 buildings displayed equipment from the radio-TV and coin machine industry. Heading up the display were over 120 pieces of vending and music equipment from Rowe-AMI (Canteen). The Southern Music Publishing group also held a convention from May 8-10 in Zurich, Switzerland. In attendance were Mrs. Monique Peer from Los Angeles, R. P. Iversen and Mr. and Mrs. Arthur L. Fishbein from New York, T. H. Ward, T. F. Ward, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Kingston and Dennis Berry from London, Roli Marbot from Paris, Mr. and Mrs. Theodore O. Seeger from Hamburg, Manuel G. Salinger from Barcelona, Spain, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hochmuth from Vienna, Austria, Alberto Carisch and Leslie Annable from Milan, Italy, Mr. and Mrs. Han Dunk and Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Zmigrod from Amsterdam, Holland, Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Sjogren from Stockholm, Sweden, Jacques Kluger and Felix Faceq from Brussels, Belgium, Sunny Skylar from New York and Albert Brunner as host from Zurich. Mrs. Ralph Peer and Mr. Iversen, the president and V.P. respectively from Southern and Peer Music will visit Germany after the convention.

Rudi Schroeder from Monopol Publishing in Berlin is busy working on the new Paul Anka hit "Tonight My Love Tonight" which will also receive a German version by Peter Kraus.

Mercury's Eddie Layton was busy with radio-TV interviews on his recent trip to Germany. He did shows for the British Forces Network in Cologne, as well as the German radio station in that city, a TV shot for Hamburg and in Stuttgart. Eddie also did a TV show in Zurich. He's travelling here for the Hammond Organ people.

England's Monty Sunshine, who made his name through the great "Petite Fleur" recording as the clarinetist for Chris Barber, is touring Germany with his new band. He has visited 15 cities here.

Electrola A&R man Hans Bertram claims rights to the youngest recording star in the world. His daughter Kleine Elisabeth is just 13 months old but is already the star of the German version of "Baby Sittin' Boogie" with Ralf Bendix. Elisabeth has actually received an invitation to the U.S.A. to make records. Papa Hans is very proud and quite successful as the record has already passed the 200,000 mark in sales here.

Palette Records reports that Marlene Stolz, Peter Kreuder, Bobbejaan and Lou Neefs are set for appearances at the big radio-TV-phono industry fair in Berlin at the end of August.

Bobbejaan also ties the knot on May 18 with Josee Jongen in Brussels. Classical pianist Andor Foldes gave a command performance at the home of Germany's President Heinrich Luebke.

Polydor Records is making a policy of inviting record dealers from all over Europe to its Hamburg plant. Recently 70 dealers from France visited Germany and they were followed by 40 dealers from England. A special airplane is on hand to fly the dealers into Germany for their tour of the city and the Polydor facilities.

Dr. Heinz Stein of Quint Music in Munich paid a visit to Electrola Records in Cologne for talks with producers Nils Nobach and Hans Bertram. Dr. Stein reports that the big hit "Dreams Don't Cost A Thing" from the young Danish duo Jan & Kjeld has been released in the U.S., France and Holland. English text is by L.A. lyricist Bert Reisfeld.

Pop star Jean Thomé has signed a 3 year film contract with CCC Film Company in Berlin. The 275 pound youngster will do 2 films a year and will be presented as both a comedian and as a singer.

Bert Kaempfert has finished work on a new LP for American Decca records. His last work recorded in Germany "Wonderland by Night" is reported to have sold over 350,000 LP's. The new LP will include many Kaempfert originals. Here are the record production figures for 1960 in Germany.

Classical records pressed: 1.1 million singles, 3.5 million EP's, 2 million 10" LP's and 3.9 million 12" LP's. In the pop sector 35 million singles were pressed here, 8.7 million EP's, 1.4 million 10" LP's and 2.1 million 12" LP's. 170,000 classical records and 680,000 pop records were imported.

The Billy Vaughn recording of "Wheels" which tops our hit parade this week is selling over 5,000 records a day, according to Teldec records here. Peer Music is busy promoting "Bells" by Lester Lanin which was written by Bert Kaempfert and Peter "Morgen" Moesser. Although the number was written here, there are still no German versions of the song on the market.

The top English seller "Are You Sure" has been recorded by Will Brandes and Hans Lucas for Electrola. The song won the BBC pop music festival in England. The ITV festival winner, "Marry Me" has been recorded by The Mis-souris for Telefunken.

ITALY

Krikor Mintangian, the president of Durium, announced his first visit to the States scheduled for the end of May or the beginning of June. However, if he is not able to do it now, it will be put off until next September. The reason for the trip is the numerous friends he has there.

We had the pleasure of receiving two indications as to the growing importance of Cash Box in the world. Mr. Baumberger, the international director of RCA, after his short stay in Milan wrote to us saying, "It was a pleasure meeting you, particularly in view of the definite importance Cash Box has for all our industry in the various countries." Paul Marshall, the attorney and director of Top Rank who stopped in Milan during his European trip, left the following statement: "In the various countries, all the executives of music companies I met told me that Cash Box is becoming more and more important and influential and is the most important paper in the field." Marshall stopped in Milan for business talks with Durium's executives. While in Milan, he listened to two orchestras recording for Durium, currently playing in the best night clubs of Milan—Eduardo Lucchina's Band and Narciso Parigi's Band, known trumpet player.

The Rank label appears as number 7 on this week's chart with "Mule Skinner Blues," a record which continues to sell well. The latest hit release on the label here is The Jarmels' version of the old song "Santa Lucia" presented under the new title of "Little Lonely One."

Carisch released the old Italian song, "Parlami D'Amore Mariu" (Speak To Me Of Love, Mariu') waxed by Peppino Di Capri. During its first week the record sold 15,000 copies and immediately broke into the chart as the number 6 position. Di Capri also fills the number 10 spot with another old Italian song.

"Pony Time" by Chubby Checker has been released in Italy and in one week 1800 copies were sold, according to Mr. Giannini, manager of C.G.D.

Curci announces that they have the rights to all of the music from "West Side Story." Currently the show is being performed in Turin, where the manifestations for the centennial of Italy's unity is taking place. Afterwards it will be performed in Florence, Rome, and then in Milan. Curci also has a hit song from France—"Non, Je Regrette Rien," which both Edith Piaf (V.C.M.) and Milva (Cetra) have brought to success in Italy.

The best selling record of Melodicon (Italiana Philips) is still "A Summer Place" by Percy Faith. However, it is said that soon it will be surpassed by "Tracy's Theme" by Spencer Ross, which was released here as "Sex And Sax" (The cover features a sexy girl and a sax player).

New dance craze "La Pachanga" will become known in Italy via the record version by Michelino and his band on the Primary label. The sheet music of the song was distributed throughout Italy to the leaders of our bands by Southern Music in April and the reaction of the public is not yet known. Michelino is a name well appreciated, especially for his cha-cha performances such as, "Cha Cha Cha Della Segretaria" (Cha Cha Cha Of The Secretary) most played in our juke boxes and in all the dance-halls in Italy where a record player replaces the orchestra. It was a best seller, but for reasons we do not know it never entered our national charts.

Jimmy Pratt, Caterina Valente's personal drummer, wrote to us from Brazil where the songstress is making a tour—"Caterina is a big success here. We are enjoying it very much and the musicians are good. The music here is very interesting."

SCANDINAVIA

SWEDEN

On May 5, the unexpected war in the air started with the government-controlled SBC presenting hours of pop songs on records, starting early in the morning and continuing until after midnight. Since a government decision is needed for SBC to start anything new, it had to apply for such permission, and it seems that the Swedish government made a new record by granting this permission in less than a week. The newspapers here are now talking about the "war between Radio Rydbeck and Radio Kotschack" since SBC has Olof Rydbeck as president, and the so-called pirate station Radio Nord is headed by Jack Kotschack. The latter explained in an interview that "I am most happy for the competition, it is the best help Radio Nord could get." On other hand, some people here are wondering why SBC has to fear anything from any pirate station as long as the laws are what they are. Everyone listening to any radio station has to pay his annual license, no matter what station he is listening to. If Radio Nord, it has been said, means news license payers, this could not hurt the government stations. In the meantime, the Swedish government has ordered a committee to investigate "what there can be done against those pirate stations." Representatives for Department of Justice as well as Foreign Office are now studying the situation. Since the problem not only covers Sweden, but also Denmark, and, for the future, perhaps Norway, this problem might be discussed by all three countries.

Quincy Jones will not be touring in Sweden with his orchestra this summer, reports a spokesman for EMI. The planned tour seemed to be cancelled because there was no one willing to pay the expenses for flying the musicians over from the U.S. to Europe.

BFB has just released an EP with Siw and Johnny Ost, two members of a famous musician family from northern Sweden. "Sucu Sucu" and "Walk Right Back" are among the melodies on the EP.

Among people comin' and goin'; Harry Walters of EMI, London, in Stockholm for biz talks. Mr. E. Karjalainen of PSO in Helsinki, one of the EMI distributors in Finland, just spent some days in Stockholm where he studied the organization of SGA, the Swedish EMI company.

Norwegian singing group just opened at the Berns Restaurant in Stockholm. The newspapers and the audiences were enthusiastic. The group is at Triola in Norway and Karusell in Sweden.

Lennart Reuterskiöld, head of Reuter & Reuter and Essex Music, left for the United States on May 4. He will stay there for two weeks for biz talks with his American contacts.

Anders Holmstedt, head of EMI, Stockholm, told The Cash Box that two months after his Swedish visit and presentation on Swedish TV and Radio, Bobby Rydell's records have the same popularity they had immediately after his visit. "Sway" is still among the top sellers here. EMI has just released two LP albums, one with Karl Gerhard, a Swedish show man who recently celebrated his 70th birthday and another with songs by the poet, Nils Ferlin. The latter might be something for the world market, at least is what EMI here hopes for.

No foreign TV films with recording artists singing their numbers will be shown by Swedish TV seems to be the decision made here recently. A spokesman for SBC-TV recently declared: "We think we'll do better by making those films ourselves," and if they follow this decision, it means no presentation of foreign artists unless they come to Sweden so SBC-TV can make their own film. In last months, it has been more and more common for record companies to get short films from abroad with artists presenting their new songs.

Singer Lily Berglund is soon leaving Knäppupp to sign a contract with Philips. This step has been more or less expected for some time since her husband, bandleader Göte Wilhelmson, has been A&R man for Philips-Fontana-Sonora. Other news from Philips-Sonora is that Lars Billeng leaves as head of the record dept. for another position in the Philips concern. He will be succeeded by Bo Löfberg.

DENMARK

Per Sörensen of Dansk Grammofonpladeforlag reports that Dario Campeotto has sung the Danish Festival winner "Angelique" in Italian and the record is being released in Germany, Austria, Holland, Belgium and Italy. Campeotto is Italian but has been living in Denmark for most of his life. His Danish recording of "Angelique" has now sold more than 80,000 copies in Scandinavia.

NORWAY

A new Norwegian song, "Senor Manuel," composed by Bjarne Omdahl with lyrics by Alf Prøysen, should be the next Norwegian hit. It has been recorded by Nora Brockstedt on Karusell and Elisabeth Grannemann on Philips.

The first gold disk presented by Norwegian daily paper Arbeiderbladet since it started presenting gold disks (for the sale of 50,000) and silver disks (for 25,000) two years ago, was recently presented to the two EMI artists blind singers Erling Stordahl and Gunnar Engedahl for their recording of "Piken i Dalen." This record was not their biggest seller, since at least two of the other recordings has sold more than 65,000, but it was cut before the gold disk started to appear. Altogether, the two artists have sold around 453,000 records during the 11 years they have been recording. The popular team has recorded more than 50 titles.

FINLAND

Italian singer Robertino recently visited Helsinki for some appearances. He was brought over by the commercial Tes-TV.

Fazers (Rytmi, Decca, Philips, and other labels) are presenting their own Robertino, a 13-year-old Finnish boy, who, among others, recorded "O Sole Mio."

A new Finnish song which has great possibilities here is "Karnevaalitango" (Carnival Tango), composed by Toivo Kärki, a grand old man among Finnish tunesmiths.

Rolf Kronqvist, who used to work at the Musicians Union, has started working for Westerlunds, one of the EMI companies here. His new job is to handle the import from the company's foreign catalogs.

\$600 Million Latin-Amer. Aid Plan

WASHINGTON—The Senate, in a voice vote, last week approved the appropriation of \$600 million to kick-off long-range economic aid to Latin-America.

Because of a Senate amendment, setting a limit to 8% the amount of interest that might be charged by Latin-American credit firms engaged in financing low-income housing, the measure was sent to House-Senate conference group. The House previously passed the measure without the amendment.

Senator J. W. Fulbright (Dem.-Arkansas), and chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, had previously commented that the "bill is designed primarily to help the common man."

"It will help," Senator Fulbright said, "promote land settlement, low-cost housing, community water supplies, sanitation and education . . ."

There was little opposition to the appropriation, although Senator Jacob K. Javits (Rep.-New York) thought

the appropriation could not meet the needs of the program and should be doubled.

Senator Henry C. Dworshak (Rep. of Idaho), who opposed the measure, didn't think there had been adequate preparation for the undertaking and would cost the U.S. \$2,500,000,000 "before we are through," and Senator Homer E. Capehart (Rep. of Indiana) opposed the measure because it contained no assurance that the governments who received the aid would be "friendly" to the U.S.

Senator Albert Gore (Dem. of Tenn.), who supported the measure, said the Foreign Relations Committee would insist on minimum requirements for participation: no projects, he said, should be undertaken in countries ruled by a dictator or a few large landholding families, where the wealthy pay a smaller percentage of their income in taxes than do the poor, where there are oppressive interest rates and where adequate credit machinery is nonexistent.

CGD—Galleria Del Corso Reorganize Sales

MILAN—The CGD and Galleria Del Corso firms have reorganized, it has been announced. All the labels handled by these firms, both owned by Mr. Sugar and managed by Mr. Giannini, will be divided into two sales channels, instead of the previous single sales department. The first channel will sell CGD, MGM, Everest and Verve, and the second channel will sell United Artists, GC, an Italian label, and Palette.

Each channel will have production, publicity and promotion departments.

Giannini will continue to supervise all the foreign labels and conduct top

level foreign relations. He will be helped in his duties by two or three aides enabling him to also take care of the sales of all the foreign labels.

Concerning the new set-up, Giannini has stated that "this was absolutely necessary because we plan to sell 1,500,000 records next year and this cannot be done with sales organization."

"I am confident," he continued, "that we will reach our aim and that we will satisfy all the American companies which we represent and the Italian artists we have under contract."

JAPAN

JAPAN—The English lyrics of "Where The Boys Are" b/w "No One" (Japanese dialogue) both by Connie Francis, were put on the market on the MGM label. Her Japanese version of the same tune is now enjoying top sales.

The Italian label, Fonit, just appeared on our market for the first time. Teichiku is the distributor in this area. New releases are selections from the winning tunes at the 1961 San Remo Festival—"24,000 Baci" (24,000 Kisses), "Como Sinfonia" (Like A Symphony), "Patatina" (Little Potato), "Il Mare Nel Cassetto" (The Sea In A Drawer), and others.

As reported last week, special releases of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra and Isaac Stern were made by Columbia in celebration of their Japanese tour. Later we confirmed 11 LP's (10 out of 11 are in stereo), as recorded by the New York Philharmonic under the direction of Leonard Bernstein and 3 LP's by Stern (recorded along with the Philharmonic). Also released were 3 LP's by the Juilliard String Quartet featuring Bartok's "String Quartet Nos. 1-6."

Japan's King presented a Buick auto to the Japan Phonograph Record Association (JPRA). Thanks to the courtesy of the company, the board of directors of JPRA decided to accept it.

Japan's two oldest disk firms, Victor and Columbia, reinforced their selling management by opening new offices. Victor opened its new offices at Sendai (the northern part of Japan's main island), and at Hiroshima (western part of Japan's main island). Columbia's Hiroshima branch office was separated from the Osaka branch and will handle all consignment business in and around that area as an independent branch.

Victor, which has already issued 14 different compact 33's, is now preparing for other releases, perhaps in the coming month. This time the M.J.Q. (Modern Jazz Quartet) and other Japanese favorite modern type jazz groups will be featured. V Compact 33's are now available with classical selections.

The MJQ arrived at Tokyo's Haneda Airport on April 29. The members, Percy Heath, Milt Jackson, Connie Kay and John Lewis, were enthusiastically welcomed by Japanese jazz fans. Their first appearance before the audience was on May 5.

Robert B. Weiss, international director of Warner Bros. Records, here on April 30, while Goddard Lieberson, Columbia's President, stayed for another four or five days. Weiss will confer with the directors of Nitchiku Records, which is contracted with the Warner Bros. label, but the distributing is being handled by Columbia Records. His arrival was originally scheduled April 23.

For the second time in two days, a young American businessman in Tokyo, Arnold B. Levin, 27, filed a copyright application for his own music composition with the Education Ministry, reports the Yomiuri (English edition). According to the paper, the first application was for a ballad, "Love Needs No Words," and the second for a novelty, "Little Music Box." He is the first American to file music copyright applications with the Japanese authorities after the conclusion of the San Francisco Treaty, the paper added.

In the past week, the following foreign artists now visiting Japan were telecast over the nation by means of videotape—New York Philharmonic, Royal Ballet (twice), Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra, Arthur Grumiaux, leading violinist from Belgium.

ARGENTINA

Caterina Valente—the famous European artist—was well appreciated by the Argentine public. Her performances (Opera Theatre and Channel 9), were considered very good. On May 5, she flew to Santiago de Chile for a show on Radio Minería.

Dean Reed—the North American teen singer—spent a few days in Buenos Aires after his smash success in Chile and Peru. Although he isn't well known in the States, in Chile he was the greatest hit of recent years, and will return soon to shoot a picture. Currently, he is in the States recording "Runaway" and "La Novia" for Capitol.

Baby Bell returned from a two week tour of Mendoza, reporting that the songs the public liked best were "Put Your Head On My Shoulder" and "My Home Town," two Paul Anka tunes sung in Spanish. She also told us that her waxing "Fantastico" has been released in Japan.

Billy Cafaro will act in "The Show of Andy Russell," a TV program starting next month. Cafaro's last record, "Mon Amour," is selling well.

Ricardo Garcia, one of Chile's top disk jockeys, came to Buenos Aires to invite the recording industry to the International Festival that will take place in Viña del Mar in February, 1962. This song contest will include tunes from all Latin American countries.

Channel 9, CADETE, signed a contract with four well known musicians, Juan Carlos Correa, Freddy Lipesker, Jorge Buonsanti and Alberto Alcalá. This quartet had formerly performed on Hugo Guerrero's program.

Venezuelan magazine, "Canciones," considered Roberto Yanes the best foreign singer in that country. Yanes' last recording, "Il Nostro Concerto," will be put on sale very soon.

RCA is releasing the fourth LP of its "Explosivos" series, containing what the label considers are or will be 16 hits. The first three "Explosivos" sold about 112,000 copies.

Yuyu Da Silva, Brazilian singer currently living in Argentina, is going to Europe. Will work in Spain, Italy, France and Germany. Her last recording is "Cara De Payaso" ("Face Of A Clown") for RCA.

Lucio Milena, well known musician and arranger, has already finished the music for the picture "El Rufian." The main song of the film is called "Tengo Para Ti."

Teddy Martino recorded "Makin' Love" and "Vuelve Primavera" for Odeon Pops. Both are currently hits. Los Juveniles waxed "Greenfields" and "It's Time To Cry" (both in Spanish) for the same label.

Los Tres Sudamericanos started their own TV program. They recently waxed "Pissi Pissi Bao Bao" and "Que Facilidad" for Columbia, and now are preparing a new LP.

Two of the TV Channels, 9 and 13, will work as radio stations from 10 AM to noon, running disk jockey programs. As Buenos Aires has already 600,000 installed TV sets, this could affect very much regular deejays' popularity.

Mario Clavell, showman and composer, will start a new biz trip next July, including Uruguay, Chile, Peru, Colombia and Venezuela. Clavell cut recently "Yo Soy El Novio" (I'm The Bridegroom), satirizing "La Novia" (The Bride).

A new vocal quartet, Las Cuatro Plumas, will record for Philips. Santos Lipesker is its director.

Julio Korn publishers issued a song book with tunes composed by Eladia Blasquez, including "Novelera," "Humo y Alcohol," and eleven more titles. Eladia's last song, "Doce Meses de Amor" (Twelve Months of Love) has been recently recorded by Marty Cosens.

Peppino de Capri, famous Italian artist, will perform here in July. Although he is very popular in Italy, his records haven't been released here yet.

RCA is putting to sale lots of waxings by the "Nueva Ola": "The Story of My Love," by Raul Lavié, "Nadie es de Nadie" (No One Belongs To No One) by Raul Sagan, "Poetry in Motion" (Lalo Fransen), "I Believe" (Martin Meyer), and "My Heart Belongs To Daddy," by Jolly Land. All these tunes are sung in Spanish.

Orfeo released the first LP recorded by Maysa Nonjardin for Columbia. Maysa is very popular in Brazil, and last year she went to the States with a three year contract.

AUSTRALIA

RCA has released—in its Red Seal Series—an album of two Australian works played by the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Nicolai Malko. The pieces are "The Death Of a Wombat" by Ivan Smith and George Selwyn English and "Sinfonietta" by Robert Hughes. This is one of the few times that RCA has entered the local field—especially in serious music—and is backing the issue with an extensive promotion campaign.

In an effort to bring uniformity to payment rates for arrangers, an organization known as The Music Arrangers' Guild of Australia has been formed; the first branch to function is in Victoria but interstate branches are expected to be organized within the next few months. The guild is closely associated with the Musicians' Union and plans to set standard fees for arrangers and soloists. It is believed that it will set different fees for the various mediums—television, records, theatre, etc.

Local instrumental group The Thunderbirds, who did so well with their single of "Wild Weekend," are out with a new one which couples "New Orleans Beat" with "Delilah Jones (The Man With The Golden Arm)." Initial disk jockey and consumer reaction to their newie is reported to be very strong and it looks like breaking through for them. Oriole Records in England released "Wild Weekend" by The Thunderbirds. Kevin McLellan, group's manager, is being kept busy considering a whole flock of offers that are pouring in for personal appearances of the group.

Del Shannon's "Runaway" is the top tune across the nation again this week for the second time in a row—it's a hot seller everywhere, particularly in Sydney. A new entry in our best-selling list this week is "Little Boy Sad" by Johnny Burnette which has had a strong lift in sales following Burnette's recent tour of Australia. Another feature of our best-seller list this week is that EMI's London label has six of the ten top disks—including the three top tunes.

Henry Gay has joined the staff of radio station 3AK to take up the position of chief of recorded music programs. 3AK is affiliated with television station GTV-9. Prior to his new appointment, Henry spent many years in the program department of 3UZ and is widely known throughout the trade.

"Apache," which had a tremendous hit run here a couple of months back through the record by The Shadows, looks as though it could repeat the performance via the new Top Rank single by Jorgen Ingmann which has just been released. This is the version that did big business in the United States.

Elvis Presley still has "Wooden Heart" and "Surrender" in our top ten but "Wooden Heart" is on its last legs now. Pres is likely to hit the list again soon with "Flaming Star" which RCA released in an EP package. At this stage, RCA does not plan to release "Flaming Star" as a single.

Chappell & Co. Ltd., music publishers, has given EMI the green light to release Bobby Darin's single—on the London label—of "Artificial Flowers," the big tune from "Tenderloin." This disk should easily repeat its American success in this country.

Col Joye's new Festival single is shaping like a winner for Col. Initial reaction indicates that "Going Steady" will be the top side, although "Naughty Girl" is also getting plenty of disk jockey attention—this is to be expected.

EMI—on its London label—has released the first single of a local lass named Reyna Caron, who is being hailed as a coming disk star. Reyna's first record carries "Long Time Boy" and "Bay Of Naples." Apart from Reyna as the star of the record, it is the first record also for EMI's new musical director Geoff Harvey, who recently arrived from England.

Belinda Music reports that in keeping with its expansion program it has appointed John Holberton as manager of its copyright department. Mr. Holberton has had considerable experience in music publishing and was for some time with Chancel Publishing. Norman Whiteley, general manager of Belinda, recently spent some time in New Zealand on a business trip.

RCA rush-released Neil Sedaka's newie "Little Devil" to catch the impact of Sedaka's scheduled visit this month for television work.

MEXICO

At a recent party given to Eduardo Baptista, the president and partner of the big record manufacturing firm Panamericana de Discos, S.A., we were informed about his life: he started in the record business in México in 1921, importing records of the United States, and some Argentine records. At the same time, he made arrangements with the American firm Okeh to press Mexican songs in the United States. In 1925, he went to New York to buy machinery and installed the first record company in this country. The first artists he had were Dr. Alfonso Ortíz Tirado, Tito Guizar, Guillermo Posadas, Luis G. Roldan, Genaro Salinas, Pedro Vargas, Guty Cárdenas and some others. All these names are famous in México and other countries.

The names of the first Mexican labels were Olimpia, Nacional, Huici, and Artex and in 1931, in association with Gustavo Klinckwort, he founded Peerless Records, one of the most important companies in México. The first artists on this label were Luis Arcaraz, Rafael Hernández, Emilio Tuero, Nestor Chayres, Agustin Lara, Toña la Negra, Las Hermanas Aguila and Pedro Infante. Guillermo Kornhauser, now big executive of this firm, was the first A&R man.

In 1947, Baptista sold to Gustavo Klinckwort the Peerless company and thought he would retire but in a few months he decided to form a new company that is now Panamericana de Discos, S.A., another very important record label. In 1935, RCA Victor installed its offices in México and began to press Mexican records at this label, as Columbia Records did since 1947.

At the present, Baptista, who is now 63 years old, is completely retired and his company is managed by his son Eduardo Baptista Jr. and his son in law, Juan Campo.

Changing the theme, this week (15) the spring season of symphonic music at the Palace of Fine Arts. Names like Rudolf Firkusny, Jose Iturbi, Ruggiero Ricci, Irma Gonzalez, Filarmónico Octet of Berlin, Conjunto Español el Guito, Ballet Concierto and Ballet Popular de México are included in this season that will finish on July 6.

We were officially informed that from now on American songs that will be recorded in México with Spanish lyrics, will be controlled by Frederik Reiter and the Brambila Editorial if they belong to Spanka, United Artists or Chancellor Editorials or Publishings.

RCA Victor announced new releases for next month like Elvis Presley's record "I Feel So Right" and "Wild In The Country"; Perez Prado's "Ritmo De Chunga" and "Teresita La Chunga"; the Argentinian group TNT "La Espumita" with "Haciendo el Amor" and Johnny Tedesco with "El Rock De Tom Tom" and "Vuelve Primavera." RCA artists Lobo y Melón will appear next June 18 at the Hollywood Palladium and later they will start a tour in Europe that will last at least one year. From the same label, it was announced that Libertad Lamarque will perform in Spain and Ruben Zepeda Novelo will figure at the Jane Russel show at the Blanquita Theater.

Alvaro Carrillo's song "Un Poco Mas" was recorded at Columbia Records by Los Panchos Trio. For the same label, the Tropicana México released "Tomando Ron" and "Ay, Que Penita." With the Huerta's Sisters, Columbia Records cut "La Enorme Distancia" and "Desgraciadamente," and with the Sorrento Trio the famous song in new version: "Cuerdas de mi Guitarra." The Hooligans rock and roll group have sold thousands of records of their hit, "Money Honey" and "Red River Rock."

Gamma Records of México announced for next June "The Spanish Record Month" with the big attractive album "Magna Antología Del Folklore Español," 4 LP's made in Spain by Hispavox with an illustrated book. This fabulous album has 648 instruments and to make it they had to visit 115 different towns, travel 30,000 kilometers, use 150,000 meters of tape and 552 different interpreters. It took 4 years to finish it!

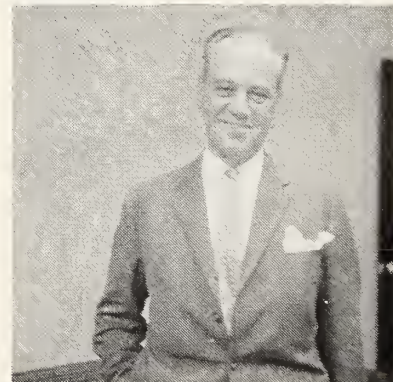

FRANCE

As we go to press, the Cannes Film Festival has just opened, but music-wise, there is nothing yet to report, unless it's that Nicole and Eddie Barclay went down to Cannes to be present at the showing of the Czech short subject, "Improvisation for the Left Hand and the Human Conscience," for which Barclay Editions controls the musical rights here. It is reported that the track is a musical masterpiece of which the main theme is called "La Chanson du Pigeon Gris." Meanwhile, Nicole Barclay hastened back to Paris to meet with U.S. record distributor Kaplan and to finish negotiating the agreement for a Barclay African set-up in Mali. More on this later. . . .

May 28 is the date of the annual French song competition marked by the awarding of a golden cock ("Le Coq de la Chanson Francaise"), to be held, as usual, at the Olympia Music Hall. 24 songs will be presented, but few details have been made public as far as the composition of the jury is concerned. Among the competing tunes will be a Magenta composition sung by John William (Deutsche Grammophon), "Le Voyageur Sans Etoile." Frida Boccara (Festival) will feature still another Magenta work, "Cherbourg Avait Praisoin." Nobody talks about Frida's singing much as yet, but she seems to have what it takes to forge her way to the front rank of the French chanteuses.

Passing through Paris, Gene Norman visited first of all with Leon Cabat, president of Vogue Records, whose firm is readying a new disk by Mouloudji. Two of the tunes he has recorded are already banned by the French Radio—which means they should go over big with the public. Bonifay and J. Aray have penned together the first French pachanga, called "Vive la Pachanga" and Cabat hopes to have as much success with the tune as he had formerly with that other Aray number, "Les tomates." Also worth noting, the "Clouglou Cha Cha." Vogue's former press agent, Claude Wolf—unless there's an eleventh-hour change of plans—will marry singer Petula Clark. The marriage will mark the crowning point of a romance among the repercussions of which was Wolf's departure from his post at Vogue Records.

EMI's A&R man Gerard Cote has supervised a rather original recording of Louis Gaste's "Le Paso Cha Cha" featuring Line Renaud accompanied by Jerry Mengo's orchestra.

Felix Marten has left his movie roles long enough to record several new sides among which are "Le Barodeur" and "Sur L'ocean."

And speaking of movie stars who return to the chanson and the studios from time to time, we note that Yves Montand will wax "Aimez-vous Brahms." Michele Arnaud, whose gifts as an interpreter are widely recognized, is leaving the Ducretet label to record for Pathé-Marconi. Her artistic director will be Gerard Cote, who reports that her first two songs for the new label are "Les Cigognes" and "Les Cornemuses"—which may herald the triumphant return to the limelight.

Pathé is continuing its big promotion on Bourvil and will release a 10-inch album of the 10 best-known songs of his career. Also in the offing on the Pathé label—a 12-inch album by J. P. Maugeon on piano with rhythm accompaniment entitled "Calineries."

Jack Mills will pass through Paris on May 11 as he tours the European countries and will revisit the City of Light before his definite return to the U.S. on June 15.

Philips announced the birth of two new ensembles—"Les Guitares de Diable" (who have recorded among other titles "Pepe" and "Mon Amant de Saint-Jean") and composer-arranger Jean Michel Defaye's orchestra which has cut "L'Aventura" and "Spanish Harlem." The latter tune seems to have all the makings of a hit. Dalida has waxed it in French, Italian, German and Spanish. No doubt that Dalida is really an international star who would make a serious error in abandoning her singing even briefly in favor of the films. "Spanish Harlem" has also swelled the recording repertory of Les Alcarsons (Philips) Les Killicats (Phillips), Norman Maine (Fontana), Tony Murena (Barclay) and Les Barclay.

The famous child star "Zazie" (real last name Demongeot) will come up out of the Metro where the Quenneau story left her, to do her first recording session for Bel-Air Records. "Securite, Sobriete" is the title of one of her sides and Tony Murena's orchestra will insure the accompaniments.

For his next session, Richard Anthony has chosen Ortis' "Allons Dana le Bois" (French version of "Good Time Bobby") and "Dis Lui Que Je L'aime" (Anthony's own adaptation of "Somebody to Love"). Newcomer to the world of song, Nicole Croisille (Fontana) will make her debut with "Dieu Merci il M'aime Aussi" and "C'est Peut être L'amour."

Brigitte Bertolier is happy at the fine showing in France of "Nous Les Amoureux" and has set to work to push "Emilia" by Cour et Barcellini which has been recorded by Philippe Clay and André Pop, as well as Datin and Vidalin's "Ca Tourne Rond," the French adaptation of "African Waltz." Ricordi Waltz released the original Cannonball Adderly recording of this one.

Raymond Lefevre has recorded for Barclay the marches of the French super production "La Fayette." Jean Philippe, Jean-Louis Vignon, Hughes Auffrey and Jacqueline Nero will try their luck and represent the Barclay label in the "Coff de la Chanson" contest. Gillian Hills, in step with the present-day rage in France, has recorded four rock 'n roll tunes. The Barclay issue of the musical track from Bardot's "La Bride Sur le Cou" is reportedly selling like crazy.

And Hubert Clavecin has lent the sounds of his soprano sax to Bel-Air's disk of "Aimez-vous Brahms" and why not!

"Les Fiancés d'Auvergne," first waxed by Verchuren and Cantournet, is featured on the latest disk of Segurel (Odeon).

Note the unexpected comeback of Leon Raiter, the popular street singer of the twenties, who is singing again (at 65) his old hits among which none can forget "Les Roses Blanches."

BRAZIL

Brazilian singer Celly Campello, a gracious teen-ager and one of the most popular stars here, has recorded an album of twelve songs by Paul Anka. As you can see at the bottom of this column, the LP is doing all right and we'll be not surprised if it climbs to more important positions in the next weeks.

In order to dissipate any doubts about the language used in Brazil, we want to say it is Portuguese and not Spanish, as most foreigners still believe. Brazil is the biggest Latin country in the world and the only Latin-American republic not influenced by Spanish customs, since it's the only one which was colonized by the Portuguese. In consequence, Brazilian music hasn't the slightest Spanish influence. Our rhythms, as we said last week, are based on several influences, most of all African ritual music. Nevertheless, none of these influences came from Spain, in opposition to what has occurred to all other Latin-American nations.

In the last year, the most popular Brazilian male singers were Nelson Gonçalves, Anisio Silva and José Orlando. American music had two very important representatives in Paul Anka and Elvis Presley. Celly Campello, Elza Soares and Angela Maria from Brazil and Brenda Lee and Doris Day from the United States, were the most popular female artists. Two American orchestras reached a very high level of sales: Ray Conniff and Billy Vaughn. Sylvio Mazzucca, Severino Araujo, and Henrique Simonetti were elected by public choice as the three best Brazilian bands of the year.

Silvio Caldas, the most famous Brazilian singer, whose "hobby" is fishing, is now singing in person at the Texas Bar in Rio de Janeiro, showing what he can do with his wonderful voice. The best known songs from Brazil have a new "color" when they're sung by our "number one" singer. Caldas is a real national institution, and is considered a man who sings our music just the way it is supposed to be sung.

Sammy Davis Junior, again had enormous success in his appearances in Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo. Sammy became an enthusiastic fan of our "new look samba," or as it's called here, "Bossa Nova."

Jim is now drumming up action on Mark IV's new release, "Come On" b/w "Should I Remember." . . . The entire music industry can take a cue from Nashville doings. Public relation talks will close the three-day meeting as far as the forums are concerned. The exhibit floors will be open to coinmen every day of the three-day meeting to permit viewing of equipment and discussions with factory executives.

The entertainment committee has reported a strong line-up of top recording talent for the annual banquet scheduled for Wednesday evening.

As far as the setting is concerned, Miami Beach has much to offer. Many conventioners have indicated that they intend to leave home earlier than usual to take in some of the Miami Beach sun. Others plan on an extended stay after the Convention closes.

On the other hand, only one major phonograph manufacturer will display equipment and but six recording firms will be present.

These are the statistics and much like the host before a party, there is wonderment over the outcome.

We'll know before the moon comes over Miami on Monday.

11th Annual MOA Show Opens In Miami

Forums Will Include Talks On Vending, Location Sales, Taxes and 33 Single

MIAMI BEACH—The Eleventh Annual Convention of the Music Operators of America will start here Monday, May 15, at the Deauville Hotel and will run for three days. May 17, the final day of the show, will also be the date of MOA's annual banquet which officially closes the Convention each year.

The coin machine show promised operator discussions during the three day confab on topics ranging from vending to the new 33 rpm single record currently being used on juke boxes in some areas.

A Board of Directors meeting will be held Saturday, May 13, before the Convention gets underway, it was advised by George Miller, president of the operator organization. Miller has had permanent MOA offices here since last month. Ed Ratajack, Managing Director, was expected to join Miller on Friday, May 12.

To keep the ladies happy during the business meetings, sight seeing trips have been arranged for Monday with buses leaving from the entrance of the hotel.

Directors of the Coin Machine Council, the coin machine industry's public relations organization, were scheduled to meet Tuesday, May 15, the second day of the show.

A complimentary luncheon with free door prizes was also scheduled for Tuesday.

The forums will occupy the early part of Monday and Wednesday with all of Tuesday devoted to a general meeting. Exhibit hours are from 2:30 to 7:00 PM each day. Wednesday exhibits will close at 6:00 PM.

Vending machine manufacturers will not be in strong evidence since the vending industry holds its annual convention in October. This year's automatic merchandising show will be held in Chicago.

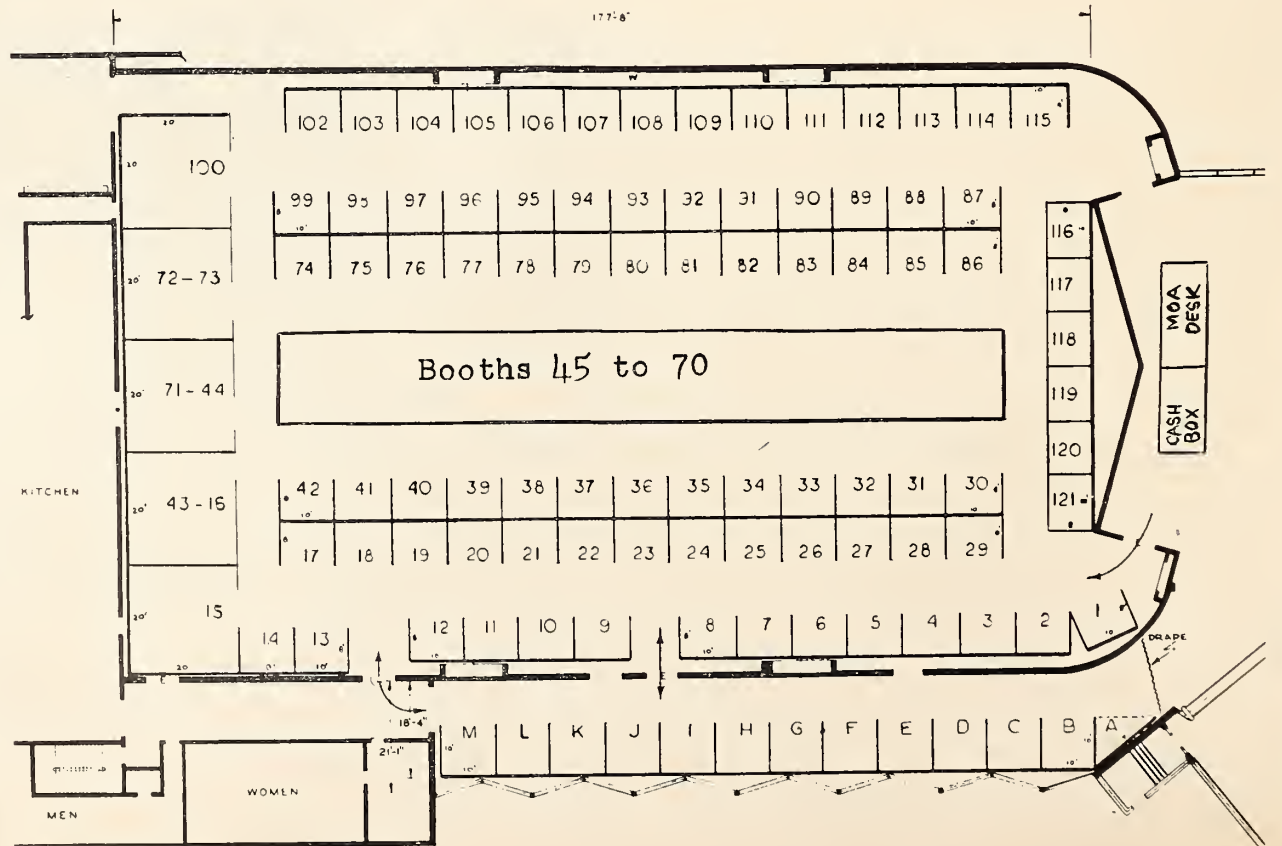
Six recording firms will be present on the exhibit floor which represents the smallest number of record firm exhibits since 1956.

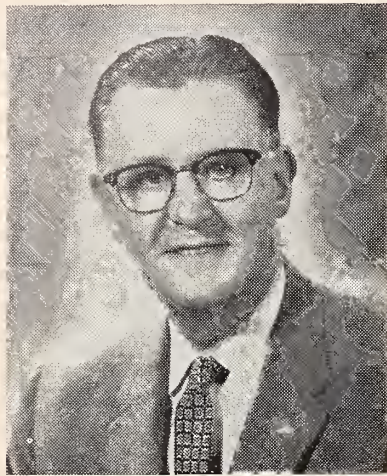

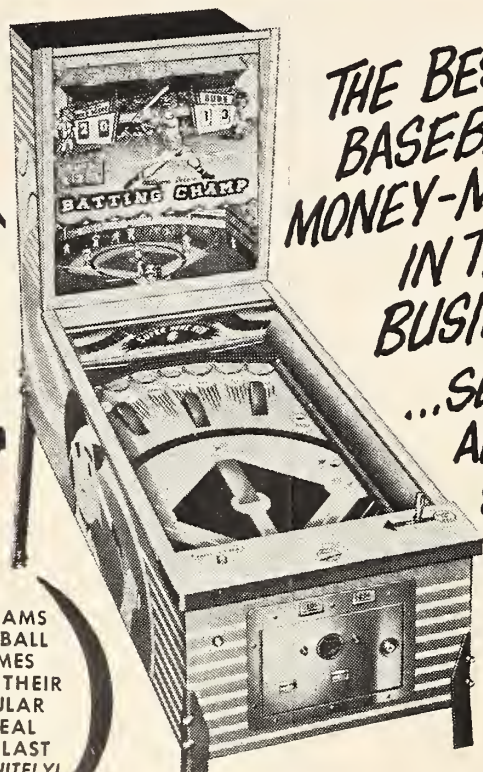

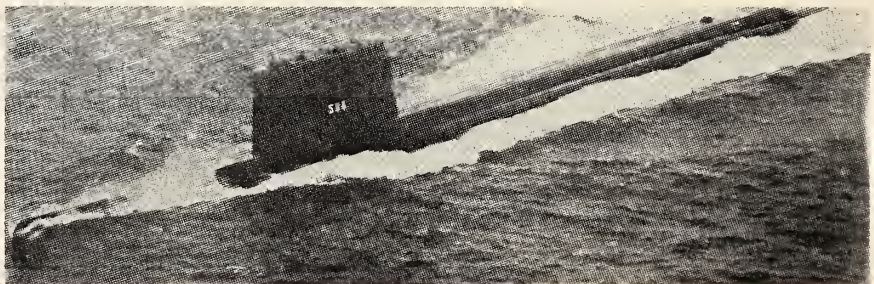
Cine-Sonic Background Music Part Of Nuclear Submarine's Equipment

USS Triton underway during North Atlantic tests. Nuclear sub is equipped with Cine-Sonic background music system.



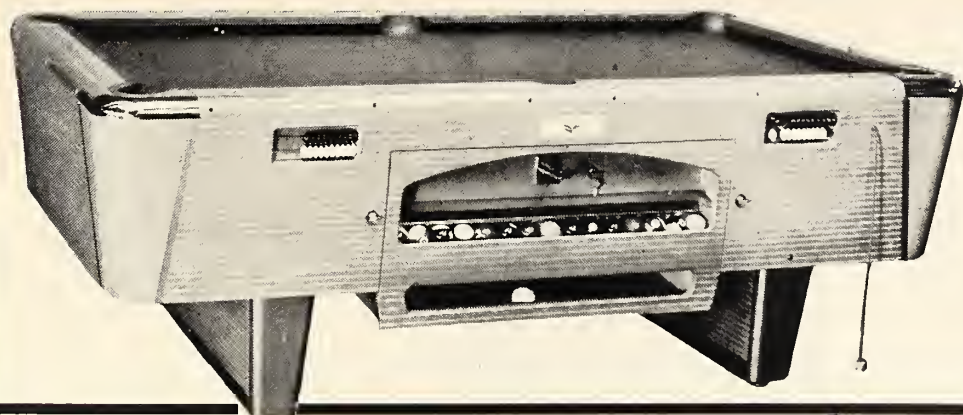
Next Nebraska Op Meet Set For June 10-11

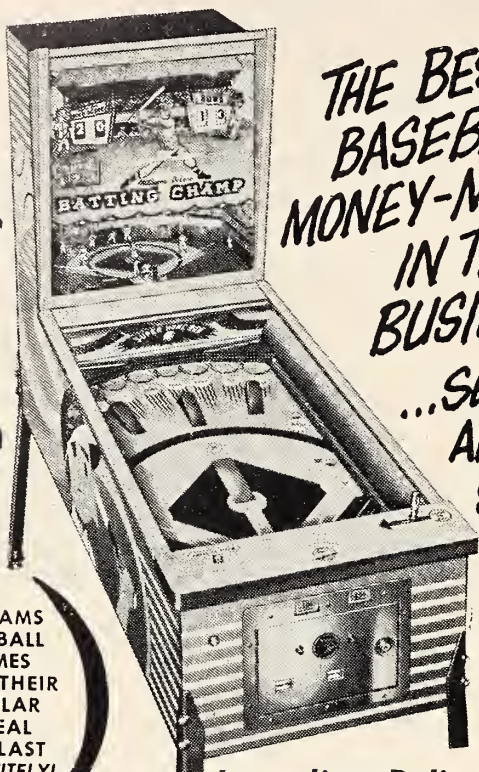

THE CASH BOX

British Coin Leader Sees No Advantage In Stereo Or 33

'Too Much Noise On Location for Stereo', Says POA's Mrs. Shaw—Points To Expense Of 33

LONDON—To coincide with the forthcoming M.O.A. Convention at The Deauville Hotel, Miami Beach, Florida, The Cash Box London Representative invited Mrs. Shaw, Honorary Secretary of The Phonograph Operators Association, to comment on two of the important subjects up for discussion—33-1/3 r.p.m. records and stereo disks.

"In wishing a successful year's trading and an enjoyable Convention to the Music Operators of America, it is noticed with interest that the agenda includes a discussion on 33-1/3 r.p.m. disks and stereo disks. During past weeks these matters have featured prominently in our trade journals and the Convention might be interested in the point of view of operators in this country.

"So far as stereo is concerned they agree that the tonal quality of output is an aspect of business and is to be encouraged. At the same time the majority of locations produce music against a great deal of hustle and bustle and background noise. It is therefore impossible to do justice to stereo disks in the vast majority of locations where juke boxes are found. Very few criticisms are levied by site owners against the quality of sound we have been enjoying for some years, so that the changeover to stereo must come through the wish of the operators of this country and not through site demands. The position we now have is that boxes capable of playing stereo music contain the normal 45 r.p.m. non-stereo single play. All the operators are moving only very slowly towards the inclusion of stereo disks.

"In regard to the 33-1/3 r.p.m. disk we can see no possible reason why record manufacturers here should make these for inclusion in juke boxes. For most operators such a move would mean a considerable capital expenditure in alterations to their boxes and they would not earn any increased revenue as a result of this additional expense. As we see it so far as the American market is concerned this move to 33-1/3 r.p.m. may be necessary because of private

users wishing to interleave LPs and singles on their record players for personal listening. Here those of our listening public purchasing LPs are not much interested in singles so that the same position does not apply. From the record manufacturers point of view the only benefit to be obtained by the production of 33-1/3 r.p.m. instead of 45 r.p.m. would be a small saving on cost of equipment—a saving not really worth serious consideration.

"From juke box manufacturers point of view very little can be gained from the sale of new boxes because if the position should arise the operators will switch over their existing boxes to the new speed.

"Summarizing from every angle the suggested change appears unnecessary and will put a section of the trade to a lot of trouble for no financial gain.

"It may be of interest to report that juke box trade has increased enormously and that while we still have our troubles through certain districts banning juke box music the P.O.A. are pressing ahead with their demands that these areas should not be prevented from enjoying the music of their choice in cafes, public houses and coffee bars."

These views are shared by most members of the Phonograph Industry in this country including Cyril Shack of Phonographic Equipment Ltd. a leading operator and distributor who says:

"Following reports in the trade press concerning 33-1/3 r.p.m. singles many operators fear that they would find themselves with obsolete equipment. However, in this country the size of the hole is the same for a 33-1/3 disk as for a 45 r.p.m. disk and the necessary change of speed to 33-1/3 would be relatively inexpensive. If record manufacturers do bring out 33-1/3 singles here they will most certainly have to dispense with the 45s. Record dealers would not want the complication of stocking one record in two speeds. As for stereo I don't think it would make much difference. We already have 'reverberated' sound and as far as the general public is concerned who are not experts in stereo sound the effect is good enough."

The general opinion of record manufacturers concerning the 33-1/3 singles is summed up in a comment by L. G. Wood, Managing Director of E.M.I. Records Ltd. "At the moment we are not convinced that there is a need for 33-1/3 singles here. We are, however, watching the development in America with much interest."

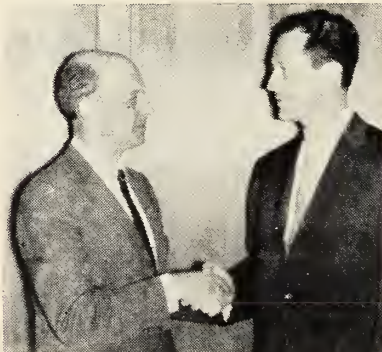

Utica Op Finds Bill Changer Big Factor In Increased Laundry Collections Claims 30% Pick-Up In Business

UTICA, N.Y.—A coin-operated laundry chain in Utica, N.Y. has reportedly increased its business up to 30 per cent with the installation of automatic bill changers.

Ray Seakan, head of Seakan Enterprises, which operates a total of 23 coin-operated laundry installations in the area, installed the dollar bill changers nine months ago and kept a careful record of results.

Made by the A.B.T. Division of Automatic Canteen Company of America, the units convert dollar bills into a dollar's worth of change in quarters, dimes and nickels. Each machine holds a change reserve of \$200, and requires re-stocking about once every other day. Phony money, foreign currency, or U.S. bills higher than one dollar will not operate the unit.

His 24-hour-a-day laundry stations each included from 50 to 60 coin-operated machines, some consisting of 30 washers, 14 dryers, and machines which vend candy, cigarettes, soft drinks, soup, and hot chocolate and coffee.

Customers must have a ready supply of change to keep so much coin-operated equipment operating at a profitable level. Constant shortages of change by customers prior to installation of the bill changers limited the use of the facilities. The change shortage also made the laundry facility somewhat dependent upon neighboring gasoline service stations and stores.

"The change shortage became a public relations problem, too," Seakan reported. Neighboring stores and business personnel called upon repeatedly to provide change began to regard the do-it-yourself laundry shops as nuisances, and their comments may have had a deteriorating effect upon business."

Fifteen per cent of Seakan's customers are night shift industrial workers, who like to do their laundry between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. on the way to or from work. Since stores are closed when they use the facilities, no extra source of change was available. For many customers, this meant they could not use the laundry machines, or purchase food snacks.

The increase in business since the installation of the A.B.T. bill changers has been most noticeable in Sea-

kan's Speed Wash North Utica location, where business has picked up 30 per cent. Seakan attributes this substantial rise entirely to the 24-hour handy availability of change.

"No stores are located near enough to make change for customers at this coin laundry. And customers do not come to this location to shop elsewhere while their laundry is being washed and dried. The change-maker

alone has made this a more convenient location for hundreds of customers," he indicated.

In three other locations, Speed Wash Whitesboro, Speed Wash South Street, and Speed Wash James Street, volume has increased from 10 to 15 per cent in the last nine months. In these spots, neighboring stores used to make change. Many of the customers make multiple shopping stops in these areas.

"Besides building our business considerably, the dollar bill changers have provided another important advantage," Seakan pointed out. "We now have far more freedom in choosing new location. Since we are no longer dependent upon neighboring stores for change making, coin-operated facilities can be placed in any location which, is convenient to customers."

troduced a game called 'World Series' and through the sale of this machine throughout the southern territory we met many of our present day customers. The game was successful and we picked up accounts that to this day are ordering equipment regularly from us."

After the success of "World Series," the Birmingham firm moved to larger quarters and then in 1949 purchased their own building where they are located today.

The showrooms resemble a large display house of all types of equipment which seemingly never ends. "We have plenty of all kinds of machines from a peanut machine to the big ball bowlers that are captivating the market today," stated the Hurvich Brothers during a tour of the vast showrooms last week.

The firm is still held in high regard among factories and operators alike and one of the reasons for their success is that they have always combined service and sales. "Without one you can't supply the other," said Harry. "We have always tried our best to continue through on all sales rather than have our relationship end the moment a machine or merchandise of any kind is shipped." "And its paid off for 30 years," stated Max.

And who can argue with 30 years of success?

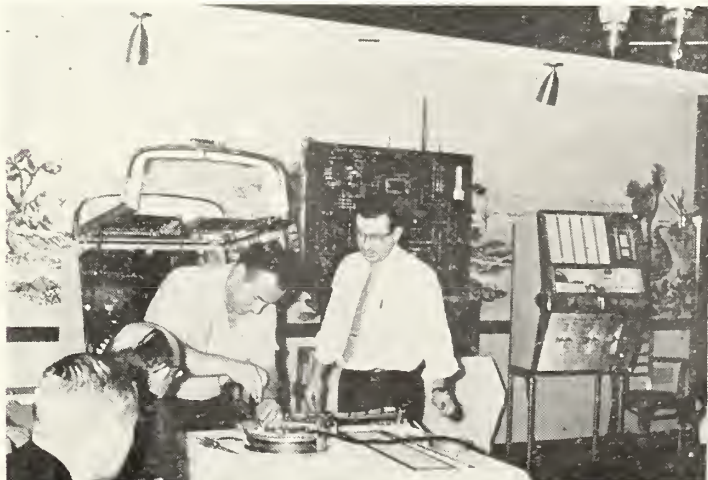

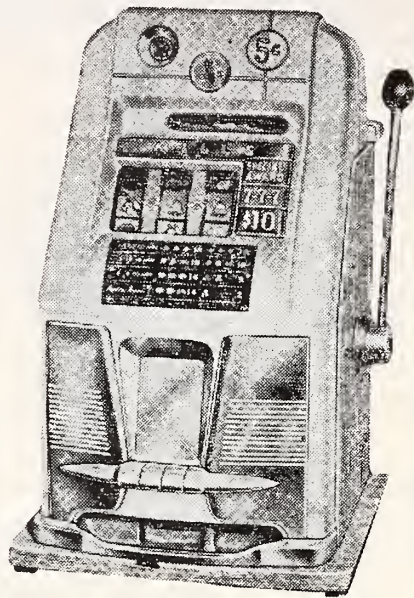

Op Interest High Over Midway's "DeLuxe"

CHICAGO—Spurred on by the reported unprecedented success everywhere with the "Shooting Gallery" rifle-target amusement game during the past several months Midway Manufacturing Company, Franklin Park, Illinois, happily proclaimed the release this past week of a new model highlighting further development in this series, in the "DeLuxe Shooting Gallery."

Ralph Sheffield, general sales manager of Midway Manufacturing Company, reported that the mounting excitement among the firm's distributors, after receiving sample shipments, has by far exceeded the previously unprecedented clamor which marked the introduction to the trade of the new game's predecessor, "Shooting Gallery."

"Immediate, spontaneous interest among our distributors far exceeds that which we noted upon releasing 'Shooting Gallery' last December," Sheffield stated.

"Naturally," he added, "we expected a healthy response and reaction, but not the fantastic sales and acceptance 'DeLuxe Shooting Gallery' has been receiving."

"As in the case of 'Shooting Gallery,'" Sheffield said, "this new game has already been approved by civic officials for licensing in New York, Chicago and Detroit. This is not only a very desirable amusement game, but one that anyone can play, have plenty of fun, and practice skill shooting at the same time."

The light-box (target area and scoreboard) features a "dancing clown" target at the upper center of the target area. Also on target are six "stars" which rotate at the center (three stars each to the right and to the left of center) presenting an exciting target.

The "clown" scores ten points, and 30 and 80 points when lit. All rotating "stars" score 10 points. The "blue" moving stars score 20 points when lit, and the "red" rotating stars also score 20 points when lit. There are also bulls-eye targets and two nonmoving

balls, which Sheffield stated make a good starting point for skillshooting players.

The scoreboard shows the previous score totaled as well as the present score for comparison among competitive players. The light-box is encased in a "domed" plexiglass blister offering more freedom in shooting for players. The gun actually shoots ten plastic balls, 11/16 of an inch in diameter.

Sheffield pointed out the fact that "DeLuxe Shooting Gallery" is "a 100% game of skill, and can be placed in any type of location." It appears to prospective players as an actual replica of a huge carnival shooting gallery. The game also has an adjustable time feature, which registers on the scoreboard.

In conclusion Sheffield averred that "DeLuxe Shooting Gallery," which measures 24 inches in width, 66 inches deep, and 64 inches high, is now being shipped on a steady time schedule. Production is maintained at peak to keep all of Midway Mfg. Co.'s distributors supplied constantly.

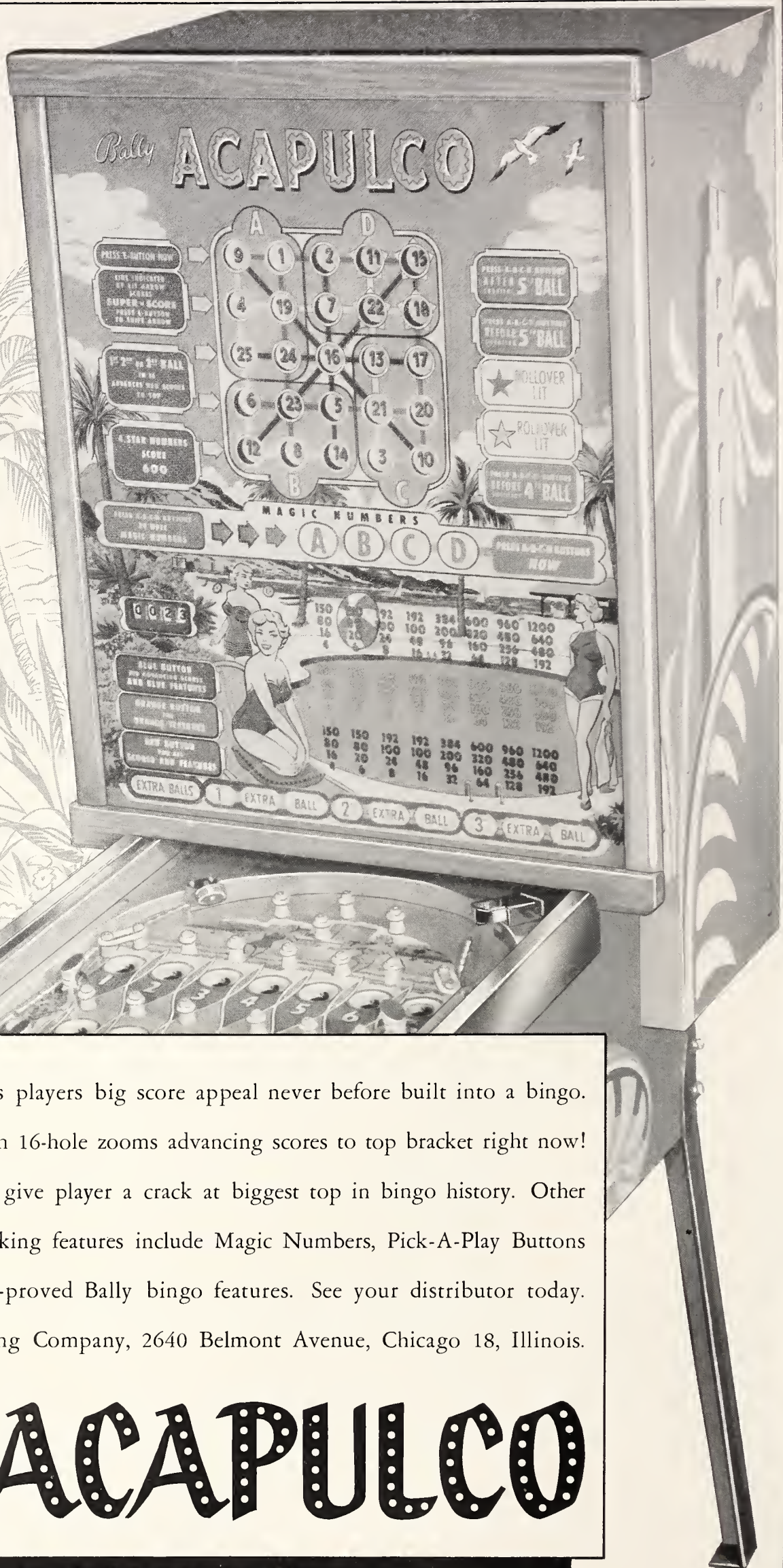
