SUMMER HITS

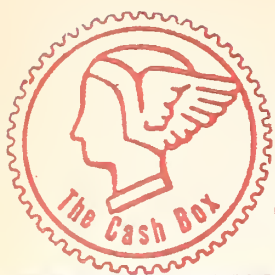
This week Summer bows in. It wasn't too long ago that the record business looked upon Summer's debut as the beginning of the slowest period in the record industry's annual business cycle. But in recent years the Summer has been a swinging record season and there is no reason why it shouldn't be that way this Summer.

All we need to start the ball rolling is a hot single. Last year we had a bumper crop of solid Summer smashes in "It's Now Or Never," by Presley, Chubby's "Twist," "Itsy Bitsy Teenie Weenie Yellow Polkadot Bikini" by Brian Hyland and "Alley Oop." All these perfectly spaced hits kept the youngsters running into the stores from early in the hot weather period right through to the conclusion. In 1959 "Battle of New Orleans" by Johnny Horton was the king sized smash that turned the trick. In 1958 "Purple People Eater" by Sheb Wooley, "Yakety-Yak" by the Coasters and Bobby Darin's "Splish Splash"

were three novelties that kept things hoppin'. And back in 1957 it was Billy Williams' "I'm Gonna Sit Right Down And Write Myself A Letter," the Everly Brothers' first smash "Bye Bye Love" and Debbie Reynolds' summer romancer "Tammy" which contributed to a torrid disk summer.

This year's zany novelty, if there is to be one, has yet to rear its head. But there are a host of hot singles riding strongly that will keep the teeners coming into the shops well into July. Such hits include "Quarter To Three," "Travelin' Man," "Hello Mary Lou," "Moody River," "Raindrops," "The Boll Weevil Song," "Runnin' Scared" and "Stand By Me" among a host of others.

If the breaks are with us and the industry follows-up these current smashes with a few more fast breaking singles, we could have a solid summer that might help many forget about the soft, recession hit Spring.

Eddie Barclay, young and astute president of C.P.F. (BARCLAY RECORDS) snapped in Paris celebrating his nomination as "Best European Record Producer for 1961."

Seen with Eddie, are old time friend, Duke Ellington, in town for shooting of UA flic, "Paris Blues," along with pop stars Dalida and Charles Aznavour, regulars on the European Hit Parade, thanks to the Eddie know-how.

In addition to their own BARCLAY operation, Eddie and his wife, Nicole also control the new and successful company, "BEL-AIR." Both the Barclay and Bel-Air labels distribute such internationals as MERCURY, ATLANTIC, KAPP, PRESTIGE, VERVE, MARDI-GRAS, SUPRAPHON, ERATO, HISPAVOX, PALETTE, and CARAVELLE.

Already one of the major forces on the European market, Eddie Barclay slipped another high card into an Ace-high full house by signing a contract for the distribution of UNITED ARTISTS RECORDS just a few days before the above celebration.

The Cash Box Pick of the Week

"TOGETHER" (2:51) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP—DeSylva, Brown & Henderson]
"TOO MANY RULES" (2:21) [Hope BMI—Stirling, Tompkin]
CONNIE FRANCIS (MGM 13019)

Miss Francis, whose long, long hit string currently includes "Breakin' In A Brand New Broken Heart," comes thru with two more top ten contenders here. On one side she again dips into the evergreen dept. dishing up a warm, persuasive beat-ballad revival (with an effective mid-deck recitation) of "Together." The other half, a sock-rock-a-string teen opus tagged "Too Many Fools." Dandy assist, on both ends, by the Cliff Parman ork-chorus.

"WHAT A SWEET THING THAT WAS" (2:29)
[Aldon BMI—King, Goffin]

"A THING OF THE PAST" (2:38) [We Three BMI—Brass, Levine]
THE SHIRELLES (Scepter 1220)

The Shirelles continue in high gear as they once again serve up a tantalizing romantic rock-a-cha-cha that's bound to break into the 'top ten' hit lists 'round the country. Side, titled "What A Sweet Thing That Was," is a winner culled from their "Shirelles Sing For Trumpet And Strings" LP. Coupler is a very pretty, soft beat cha cha opus.

"SOMEBODY NOBODY WANTS" (2:35) [Joy, ASCAP—Dee, Goehring]
"COULD SOMEBODY TAKE MY PLACE TONIGHT" (2:30)
[Valley BMI—Pomus, Shuman]
DION (Laurie 3101)

Laurie's Dion checks in with another sales heavyweight here. This one, tabbed "Somebody Nobody Wants," is a heartfelt jumper with a flavor of his past success, "Lonely Teenager." More fetching up beat sounds on the lower portion, "Could Somebody Else Take My Place Tonight." Topside has the edge. Bob Mersey's outfit tastefully backs up on both halves.

"THE TASTE OF A TEAR" (2:12) [Selma, Jo-Ho BMI—Givssfre, Sims]
"NEVER TILL NOW" (2:19) [Jo-Ho BMI—Evans, Nevens]
JOHNNY & THE TOKENS (Warwick 658)

Warwick, having cashed in with the Token's bow "Tonight I Fell In Love," can repeat with the crew's (with Johnny grabbing the lead spotlite) follow-up "The Taste Of A Tear." It's from the crying towel rock-a-cha-cha school and it's chock full of hit ingredients. Boys are appealing in the beat-ballad companion piece.

"IN TIME" [Almino BMI—Randazzo, Becker, Barberis, Weinstein]
"MY CLAIR DE LUNE" (2:43) [Trio BMI—Leiber, Stoller]
STEVE LAWRENCE (United Artists 335)

Chances are Mr. Lawrence will have another big-ballad performance climbing the upper rungs of the sales ladder in the coming weeks. Side that should duplicate "Portrait Of My Love's" success is "In Time," an ultra-lovely adaptation of Tchaikovsky's 6th Symphony. However, don't overlook the Debussy-based "My Clair De Lune." It's an extremely pretty opus that takes a soft beat cha cha ride. It also has the chart goods.

"THINK OF ME" (2:35) [Mal-Max BMI—Taylor]
"I DON'T NEED YOU ANYMORE" (2:25)
[Mal-Max, Curtom BMI—Mayfield]
MAXINE BROWN (ABC-Paramount 10235)

In her first session for ABC Maxine Brown dishes up an outstanding beat-ballad performance in the tradition of her two previous chart successes. This entry, tagged "Think Of Me," is a dramatic love affair that the chirp renders in penetrating fashion. "I Don't Need You Anymore" is a fantastic, hard-driving blueser that can also hit the big time. Roy Glover grabs the stellar ork support credits on the pairing.

"HEAVEN IN YOUR ARMS" (2:20)
[Geril, Isabel ASCAP—Granahan, Jacobs]
"MAXINE'S PLACE" (2:15) [Criss-Cross BMI—Burr]
MAXINE BROWN (Nomar 107)

Maxine Brown appears to have her third hit in-a-row for Nomar. Gal, who came thru with "All In My Mind" and "Funny" can do it again with "Heaven In Your Arms." It's powerful ballad-with-a-beat stand with Tony Bruno's instrumentalists turning in a grade "A" backdrop. Strictly instrumental is the rhythmic finger-snapper, "Maxine's Place," that the Frank Dell outfit enticingly waxes on the flip.

EDDIE ROBBINS (David 1001)
(B+) "JANICE" (2:40) [Regent BMI—Goldman, Catalano]
This gal-titled romantic pleader can give the N.Y.C.-based label a hit the first-time-out. It's a teen-appealing rock-a-cha-cha that newcomer Robbins (and the ork-chorus) knock out in attention-getting style. Watch it.
(B) "IT WAS FUN" (2:48) [Pam BMI—Goldman, Shapiro] This end is a complete about face with the artist in a pleasing beat-ballad stand.

JOE TEX (Jalynne 105)
(B+) "WICKED WOMAN" (2:26)
[Jot BMI—Arrington] It's the traditional blues cry but Joe Tex's exciting delivery gives it an added attraction for both r&b and pop marts. A tasty morsel that moves along at a brisk, infectious pace.
(B) "GOODBYE MY LOVE" (2:30) [Jot BMI—Arrington] Here Tex returns to solid ground in an earthy blues lament.

BOBBY FREEMAN (Joseie 889)
(B+) "SHE SAID SHE WANTS TO DANCE" (2:35) [Clockus BMI—Freeman] Songster answers his own awhile back hit, "Do You Wanna Dance," employing the same tune. Catchy cut that could make lotsa noise.
(B) "PUT YOU DOWN" (2:03)
[Benell BMI—Cortez] Unhurried pacings in the plaintive blueser.

GINA BOYER (Liberty 55340)
(B+) "PROMISE ME ANYTHING" (2:25) [Eden BMI—Williams, Ceroni] Label has added a fine singing talent in Miss Boyer. Pretty plaintive is handled with understanding by the performer, who receives an attractive hint-of-the-beat sound from the full ork-chorus.
(B) "SAY IT FROM YOUR HEART" (2:15) [Eden BMI—Hendricks, Otis] Performer displays rhythm-rock finesse in this colorful outing.

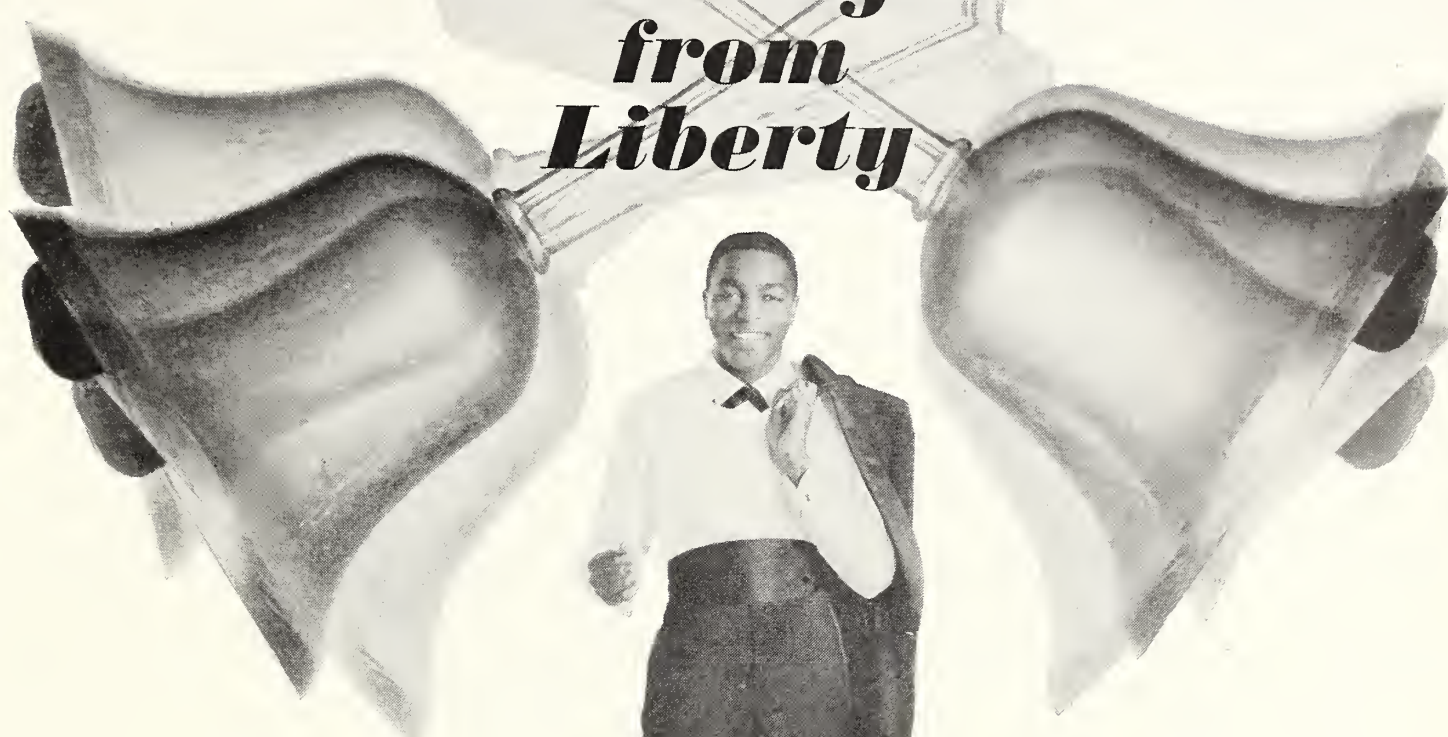

Latter offering opens in dramatically effective fashion. Jocks'll have a picnic with this two-sider.

The other half, "Impossible," is a beautiful ballad romancer that the lark puts across with touching sincerity. Superb support supplied by the Fred Norman crew.

"THEME FROM COME SEPTEMBER" (2:13) [Adaris BMI—Darin]

"THE VILLA" (2:37) [Northern ASCAP—Salter]

DICK JACOBS (Coral 62275)

Dick Jacobs and his ork-chorus can be all over the charts in no time flat with this captivating instrumental theme from from the up-coming pic (which stars the tune's clefper Bobby Darin) "Come September." Side, set to a charming baion tempo, is a programming must. The Neopolitan-flavored "Villa" is a pretty beat-ballad opus also from the same pic.

DON SHIRLEY TRIO (Cadence 1392)

Don Shirley's piano style has long been admired by all types of music fans because his style defies categorizing and he plays in many idioms. Here the traditional "Water Boy" (culled from the LP, "Don Shirley Trio") appears in a fresh, invigorating new arrangement. It opens with sparse melodic bass line, continues subtly, builds to a vibrant crescendo and then trails off. An exciting record that's already happening. Coupler, "Blind Date," is another strong teen rocker that can also come thru.

IKE & TINA TURNER (Sue 749)

Ike & Tina Turner, who've had dual-mart R&B-pop chart representations in "A Fool In Love" and "I Idolize You," can soon be claiming another one in "It's Gonna Work Out Fine." Side, a hip-swinging, beat-ballad thumper, sports a delectable chorus-backed, verbal exchange between the two. Strings play an important part in the rhythmic, rock-a-shuffler on the lower end.

PALAIS ROYALS (Nancy 1006)

(B) "PANIC (Theme from Something Else)" (2:00) [Hi-Note BMI—Thatcher, Doheny, Reid] Generally striking unhurried performance by the combo, which is topped here by guitars and sax. Vehicle is one of those mysterious, exotic affairs. New York is the diskery's home.

(B) "MARGIT" (2:15) [Mayhew BMI—Mayhew, Thatcher] Brighter teen sound from the musicians.

THE RIPPLES (Dot 16224)

(B+) "STILL WATERS" (2:06) [Doral & Camp & Canyon BMI—Wallace] Pretty soft-spoken theme is attractively presented by the ork-chorus, including a spinet-like key-board sound. Track could get places with enough exposure.

PRISCILLA LEE (Revolvo 61)

(B) "MOMMIES' GONE" [Jot BMI—Ebert, Bailey] Artist and backing (this time including a chorus) has more of an R&B flavoring.

TERRY BROWN & THE MARQUEES (Jo Ann 130)

(B+) "I NEED A HELPING HAND" (2:20) [Hosea BMI—Brown] Fine heart-felt blues-styled vocal by the Brown. Other songsters and combo support with good-sounding sincerity.

(B) "DON'T YOU DO ME LIKE THAT" (2:05) [Hosea BMI—Fisher, Allen] Jumping blueser from Brown and his friends.

ABBE LANE (Mercury 71835)

(B) "NEVER ON SUNDAY" (2:23) [Esteem & Sidmore BMI—Hadjidakis] Supported by a lush ork sound directed by hubby Xavier Cugat, the songstress does the French version ("Les Enfants Du Piree") of the hit pic tune. French angle offers change-of-pace programming on the ditty.

(B) "QUANDO VIEN LA SERA" (1:49) [Leeds ASCAP—Testa, Rossi] Lass sings this sprightly number in Italian.

CLAUDIA (Dore 601)

(B+) "LITTLE LOVE OF MINE" (1:57) [Kahl BMI—Goldner, Cox] A contagious gal's version of the old Clefones' hit, "Little Girl of Mine." Thrush and combo-chorus get-off a solid quick-beat sound here.

(B) "THIS IS YOUR LIFE" (2:23) [Meadowlark ASCAP—Bideu] Lass offers a cozy vocal of an inviting teen tune.

VIC DAMONE (Columbia 42021)

(B) "THEME FROM 'BY LOVE POSSESSED'" (2:43) [United Artists ASCAP—Cahn, Bernstein] Songster, who joins Capitol in the fall, takes on a big-ballad opus from the pic version of the best-selling novel. Johnny Williams directs the attractive ork backing. Damone in fine ballad form, as usual.

(B) "IF IT'S THE LAST THING I DO" (3:06) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP—Cahn, Chaplin] More intimate romantic singing by the performer.

THE RUNAWAYS (Moonglow 202)

(C+) "DUMB DUMB BUNNY" (2:00) [Venetia BMI—Erman] Dumb gal has a guy's heart in this quick-beat track.

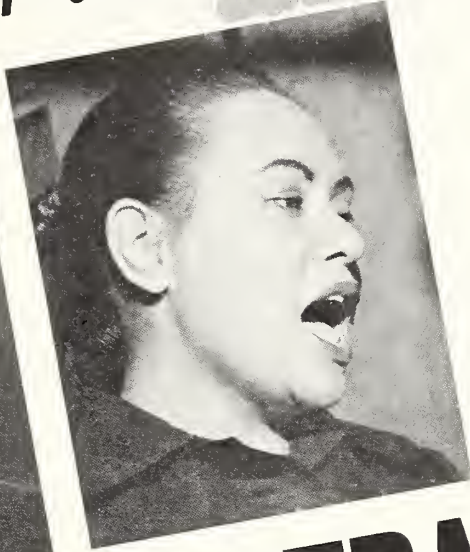

It's a solid summertime-sock novelty about a fella who does gym exercises to enable him to get even with "The Bully Of The Beach" but finds that the bully has also been working out in the muscle-building dept. Side is tailor-made for the teeners. There's hard-rock sound on the disenchanting teen theme flipside.

THE PORTRAITS (RCA Victor 7900)

(B+) "YO-YO GIRL" (2:05) [Daywin BMI—Harris, Gordon] Very cute calypso novelty from the gals, who tell of a gal who is about to tie the (yo-yo) string that ties her to the fella. Strong rockin' from the organ-included combo. Could take-off.

(B) "MY BIG BROTHER'S FRIEND" (2:26) [We Three ASCAP—Brass, Levine] Lead lass sings one about a "little sister" who wants to be loved by her "big brother's" friend.

TOMMY HUNT (Scepter 1219)

(B+) "THE PARADE OF BROKEN HEARTS" (2:03) [Ludix BMI—Dixon, Elgin, Lorber] The hot Scepter line can soon be adding another hit artist to its roster in the person of Tommy Hunt. Songster's bow is a haunting, Latin beat beaut convincingly waxed by the newcomer. Splendid chorus & string support.

(B) "HUMAN" (2:32) [Ludix BMI—Dixon] Here Hunt displays his top drawer emotion-ballad style. Great new talent.

THE GAINORS (Talley-Ho 102)

(B+) "THIS IS A PERFECT MOMENT" (2:40) Ravam BMI—McCoy] New Philly label bows with a generally strong pop-R&B showing by the lead and other songsters. Teen-wise semi-dramatic romantic is taken for an interesting Latinish ride, with the boys backed by a swirling string arrangement. Might score.

(B) "WHERE I WANT TO BE" (1:35) [BMI—Bagby] Boys move faster in another affectionate affair.

BILL HALEY (Warner Bros. 5228)

(B+) "HONKY TONK" (2:33) [Billace BMI—Doggett, Scott, Butler, Shepard] Vet rockster and his fellow musicians give a solid shuffle sock account of the famed blueser. About two-thirds of the way down a chorus invites the kids to do the honky-tonk step. Strong hoptime session.

(B+) "FLIP, FLOP AND FLY" (2:32) [Progressive BMI—Calhoun, Turner] Haley himself heads the vocal department in this bright return for the old Joe Turner hit. This end also possesses lots of beat punch.

THE IVY THREE (Shell 306)

(B+) "BAGOO" (1:47) [Saxon BMI—Koppelman, Kaye, Meyer, Ganz] Team, which recently had "Yogi" on the charts, offer a similar laff item about a "Mr. Magoo"-speaking character. Could achieve "Yogi's" success.

(B) "SUICIDE" (2:41) [Saxon BMI—Stallman, Jacobson] Interesting rock-a-cha romancer about a guy who is told that his love for THAT gal is suicide.

THE JOINER (BAND)

(B+) "FANNY" (2:11) [Chappell ASCAP—Rome] Another disk taking advantage of the upcoming flick version of the musical, the session is a pretty brisk-beat view of the lovely main-title that's similar to Mancini's recent click, "Mr. Lucky" (same organ interjections are included). Should be watched.

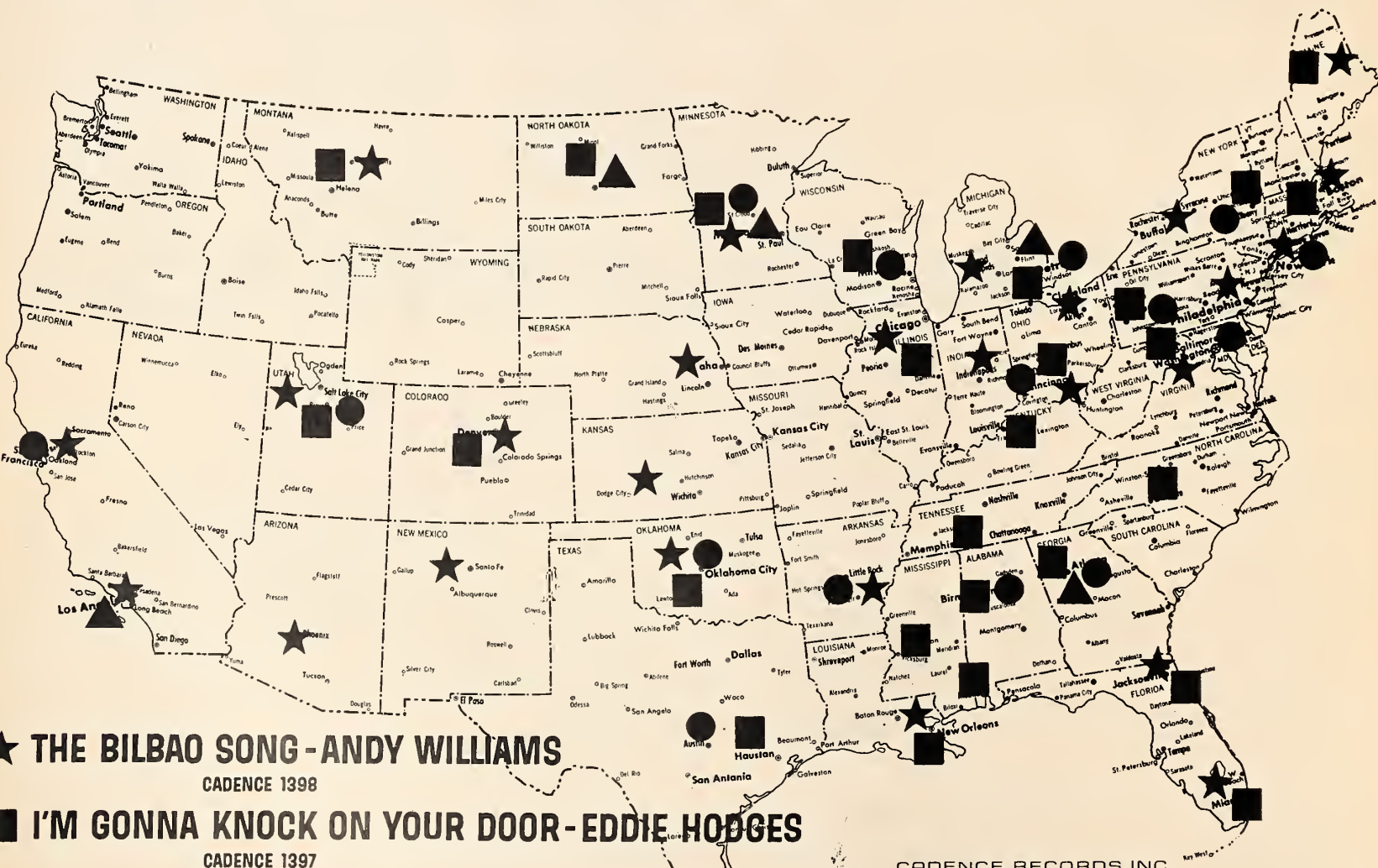

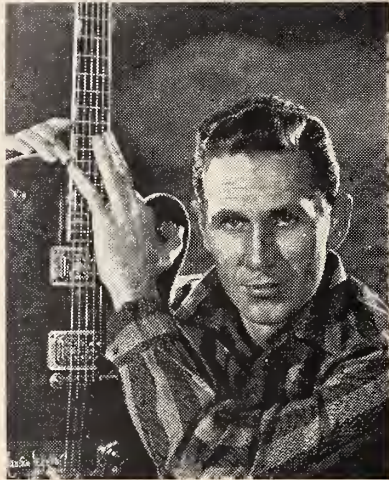

BIOS FOR DEEJAYS

Chet Atkins



RCA Victor has designated June as Chet Atkins Month. It is a small tribute to a large talent. As one of the label's key A&R men (head of the Nashville studio), Chet has recorded many outstanding hits, including those by Jim Reeves and Floyd Cramer. On his own, as a recording artist, his dexterous guitar work has been featured in 13 albums and numerous singles. As a talent he is proficient in country, pop, jazz and classical music.

Born in Luttrell, Tenn., June 20, 1924, he spent most of his childhood travelling with his family; his father was a piano and voice teacher. His first job was with Bill Carlisle's group on WNOX-Knoxville, which was followed by work at WLW-Cincinnati, WRVA-Richmond and KOA-Denver. He joined WSM in 1950 and has since become a fixture on the "Grand Ole Opry." Soon after coming to Nashville he began doing record producing work. His musical knowledge and good taste soon became widely admired and eventually entrenched him in his present position at RCA Victor.

The Regents



The Regents — Salvatore Cuomo, Charles Fassert, Anthony Gravanga, Donald Jacobucci, Guy Villari—are all Bronx boys from the same neighborhood who had been singing together "just for fun" at local gatherings. A local record shop owner was alerted to the group's potential when he heard them singing a song called "Barbara Ann," which was written by Fred Fassert, a twin brother of the Regents' Charles. The shop owner notified a friend, Morris Diamond, a record executive, who brought the boys to Roulette Records. The final result was a hit for the boys on the label's Gee subsid. Diamond is now their manager.

Gravanga, the only one of the group who did not attend Theodore Roosevelt High School (he went to Bronx Vocational), plays sax and writes the arrangements and is considered unofficial leader of the Regents.

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



"THEME FROM CARNIVAL AND OTHER GREAT BROADWAY HITS"—Mantovani—London LL 3250

The British orkster has created another highly listenable package of musical entertainment. He leads off with the enchanting "Theme From Carnival" (Love Makes the World Go Round) in a glowing string-accordion interpretation. Others that follow include "I Feel Pretty," "Till Tomorrow," "You Are Beautiful" and "Ascot Gavotte," all outstanding products of the Broadway arena. Huge sales strength here.



"LA DOLCE VITA AND OTHER GREAT MOTION PICTURE THEMES"—Ray Ellis and his Orch.—RCA Victor LSP-2410

The haunting insistence of the main theme from "La Dolce Vita" is Ray Ellis' leadoff track in this set of flick themes. The remaining thirteen tracks cover the most famous of the lot and include "Exodus," "Tara's Theme," "The High and the Mighty," "Spellbound," "Ruby" and "A Summer Place." This is excellent listening of mood music of a familiar nature and with the added hype from the "La Dolce Vita" present popularity could ring up a big sales figure.



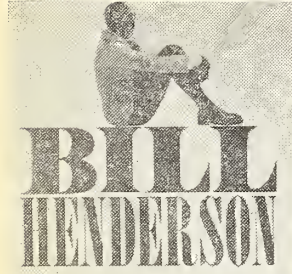
"RICHARD HAYMAN CONDUCTS POPS CONCERT IN SOUND"—Mercury PPS 6010

Eleven warhorses of the pops concert stage have been revitalized here by Richard Hayman to comply with the excellent sound of Mercury's "Perfect Presence" series. Although the piece's lengths have been shortened to maintain stronger pop interest, Hayman remains surprisingly faithful to their original form and comes up with one of the more outstanding disks of the sound series type—if only for musical content. Selections include the "Toreador Song," "Sabre Dance," "Danse Macabre," and Rachmaninoff's "Prelude in C# Minor" and "Prelude in G Minor."



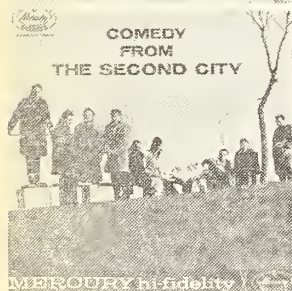
"COME SING WITH ME" — Eydie Gorme — United Artists UAL 3143

Quite a change of pace here for the thrush. She contains her usual bubbling infectiousness for subdued, warm and friendly etchings of a group of sentimental love ballads. The lot contains "You'll Never Know," "The Nearness of You," "Time On My Hands," "I'll Never Smile Again," "I Don't Know Why" and similarly oriented others. Don Costa's ork-chorus charts are a great help in setting the mood. Strong issue.



"BILL HENDERSON"—Vee-Jay LP-1031

Communication is Bill Henderson's forte and he does it with the sincerity and vital expressiveness that's missing in many of today's singer's. His strong blues background is a reason, his understanding of a fine lyric is another. But like many "better" singers, he hangs on the fringe of wide popularity, playing to a select audience made up largely of jazz fans. In this album, one of his very best to date, he follows collaborative Jimmy Jones arrangements through "Never Kiss And Run," "Twelfth of Never," "The More I See You" and "My How the Time Goes By." Exciting vocal entertainment.



"COMEDY FROM THE SECOND CITY"—Mercury OCS 6201

Second City, a group of thespians adept at improvisational satire, is receiving increasingly widespread interest, especially since the success of Mike Nichols & Elaine May, alumni of the original group. Here, Mercury has recorded "live" several sketches performed at the Second City nitery in Chicago, its home base. Best of the lot are "Great Books," a student discussion in a great books course, and "Business Man," "ace reporter for the Kiplinger letter who fights unfair business practices." Despite the absence of important visual effects, the disk provides many hilarious situations.



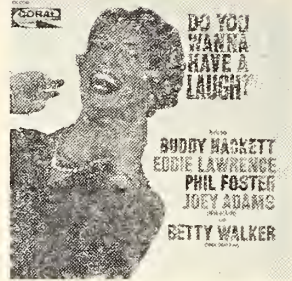
"THE PARENT TRAP"—Vista BV-3309

Walt Disney's latest flick, "The Parent Trap," occupies side one here with songs by Hayley Mills, Maureen O'Hara, music direction by Tutti Camarata and a title song performed by Annette and Tommy Sands. It should interest some teens. But then side two presents a half-dozen flick and classical themes given a lush, full ork treatment by Camarata. This should interest some adults as mood music. So, as with Walt Disney films, this LP could be called "family entertainment."



"SOUNDS OF THE THIRD REICH" — Sonic Workshop 0300

This two-disk album is to date the most complete documentation of the history of Nazi Germany, beginning in 1919 with the German Worker's Party and ending with the death of Hitler in 1945. It contains speeches by such top WW II figures as Roosevelt, Churchill, Stalin, Mussolini and Petain as well as high Nazis Goering, Goebbels, Himmler and, of course, Hitler. Dave Teig's narration which concisely ties all these events together is a powerfully damning condemnation of the depravity which ruled the regime and, as many of these works, is a stirring reminder of the sickness of the era. Only mar in the LP is the packaging which features a line-reflection disk that borders on sensationalism.



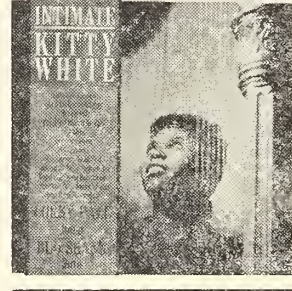
"DO YOU WANNA HAVE A LAUGH?"—Coral CRL 57380

The label has selected from its catalog a handful of tasty comedy morsels, some of which have since attained the status of comedy classics. Among the dozen tracks are Phil Foster's "Let's Keep the Dodgers In Brooklyn," Betty Walker's "Instant Ceil," Joey Adams' and Al Kelly's "The Baseball Expert" and Buddy Hackett's "The Chinese Laundry." A veritable treasury of hilarity that should find solid sales acceptance.



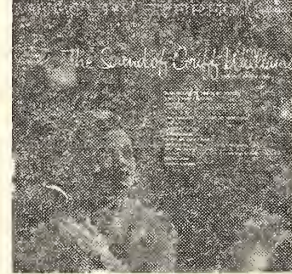
"SELECTED SHORT SUBJECTS" — Wayne & Shuster—Columbia CL 1636

Last year Wayne & Shuster contributed numerous two-minute comedy vignettes for ABC Radio's "Flair" network show. Twenty-two of these bits have been recorded here in a chuckingly funny comedy LP that moves along at a quick pace and never tires. The bits are usually interviews (with voice characterization) with a surprise ending. Lots of fun here.



"INTIMATE"—Kitty White Sings—World Pacific WP-1406

A more appropriate title for this set couldn't be found. If any one word was used to describe Miss White's vocal quality, it would have to be "intimate." She performs with a gripping persuasiveness and a delicate sensitivity that's matched by the harp accompaniment supplied by Corky Hale and Bud Shank's flute. A perfect package for those late hours listening sessions. Tunes are all fine chestnuts and include "Glad to Be Unhappy," "My Ship," "Yesterday's" and "My Romance."



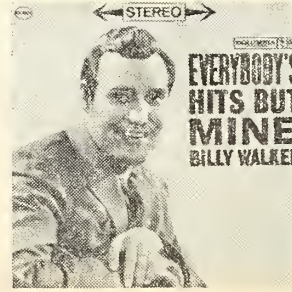
"THE SOUND OF GRIFF WILLIAMS"—Mercury SR 60608

The Griff Williams ork, actually under the direction of Bob Kirk, is a typical sweet-beat society bounce band with a shimmering sax section lead. It's the kind of music still played in ballrooms and for businessmen's balls, and has earned a strong following in these circles. Here it plays melody-first readings of a handful of evergreens, including "I Get a Funny Feeling," "Swonderful," "Sleepy Lagoon" and a couple of extended medleys.



"AFTER 12"—Joe Parnello—Kapp KL-1242

Pianist Parnello works within the realm of cocktail style piano and, as the case of his ilk, draws frequent stylistic flourishes from the jazz and classical areas. Always, the music is pleasing to the ear, delightfully light in texture and will provide a suitable backdrop for the moody moments. A lush ork accompanies Parnello here in performances of "The Moon Is Blue," "Autumn Leaves," "You Don't Know What Love Is" and "Lush Life."



"EVERYBODY'S HITS BUT MINE" — Billy Walker—Columbia CL 1624

In selecting the songs for this collection, Walker thoughtfully picked on many not often heard in collections such as these. So material-wise this is a far above average set. And Walker's interpretations are excellent, giving the tunes vivid, musically-truthful readings. This is a top-drawer attraction for country music fans. Among the songs are "There Stands The Glass," "I Guess Things Happen That Way," "I'm The One Who Loves You" and "Just Call Me Lonesome."

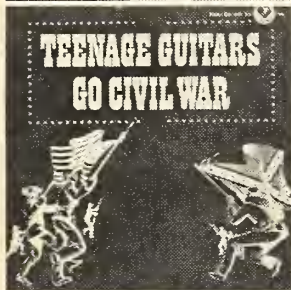
"A NIGHT OUT WITH CINDY AND LINDY"—Coral CRL 757370

The Cindy and Lindy nitery act is a fast-paced panorama of "smart" songs and special material that fits well into the atmosphere of an intimate boite. NY's Bon Soir was the scene for this session and evidently the duo clicked. There's a liveliness that's maintained throughout, and a zing of real freshness appears at frequent intervals. Enjoyable disk entertainment.



"THROUGH SICK & SIN"—Fay De Witt—Epic LN 3776

Comedienne Fay De Witt has a fairly pointed, sardonic wit as amply demonstrated in this disk in which her humor takes form in songs. The funniest of the lot is the opening number entitled "The Girl Representing Brand X," where she forlornly sings of her plight with inferior products. Other bits include a sentimental "Old Pizza Maker," a naively unfortunate "French With Tears" and a burlesquing "Stock Report."



"TEENAGE GUITARS GO CIVIL WAR"—Glory Kennedy and her 3 Electric Guitars—Pathe 702

Songs associated with the Civil War years have been gathered for a turn by guitarist Glory Kennedy, who also sings and is assisted in that dept. by Don DeVito. There are some interesting treatments of the old songs here and that might make a musicologist shiver but will sure please teen audiences—at whom the set is aimed. Selections include "Marching Through Georgia," "Tenting On the Old Camp Ground," "The Bonnie Blue Flag" and "Lorena."



"CHARANGA PACHANGA"—Bouffartique y su Charanga—Columbia EX 5051

As amply demonstrated in the U.S., the best charanga sound came from the authentic Latin bands, either here or in Latin America. Columbia proves this again by the issuance of this LP of pachanga by Cuban bandleader Oscar Bouffartique. The basic ingredients of strings, flute and vocal chorus are here, but they're all tied up in one exciting ensemble sound that surpasses many previous such releases. The lineup includes a couple of Bouffartique's single hits (in Cuba) and several other originals. Strong merchandise for this market.



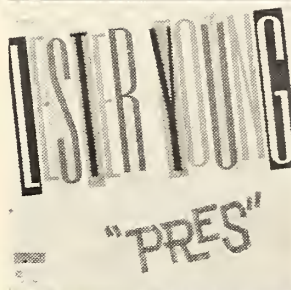
"GROOVE!"—Richard "Groove" Holmes—Pacific Jazz PJ-23

Disk debut of jazz organist Richard Holmes exhibits many reasons for his claim to the name "Groove." He really manipulates his instrument to fit well into the combo setup, never dominating or overpowering the others, and swinging along at a pungent, funky clip. Of course, working with such strong musical personalities as Ben Webster and Les McCann his path here is laid out for him. And he acquits himself glowingly. Tunes played include "Them That's Got," "Seven Come Eleven" and "Deep Purple." An auspicious debut for a newcomer to watch.



"BIRD IS FREE"—Charlie Parker—Charlie Parker Records/Carlton PLP 401

First issue of previously-unreleased tapes by Parker's estate are performances from a 1950 concert-dance at which the late altoist is featured as part of a quartet. Noise level is high and fidelity is low but Parker's playing has been brought out electronically so that it is fairly clear and listenable. And what a joy it is to hear Parker respond in such a relaxed and undemanding atmosphere. A valuable addition to the Parker archives that promises more to come. Tunes include "Sly Mongoose," "Star Eyes," "Laura" and "This Time The Dream's On Me."



"PRES"—Lester Young—Charlie Parker/Carlton PLP-402

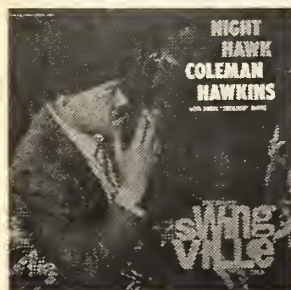
A series of performances by Lester Young that were cut at a party on a home tape recorder—date, location and sidemen, unknown. But, as with the above Parker disk, despite the low fidelity of the recording, it is a pleasure to hear some of the "natural" playing of Pres'. He performs here "I Cover the Waterfront," "Lester Leaps In," "Sunday" and three others. Has a high value to collectors.



"THE JOHNNY HAMLIN QUINTET"—Featuring Marci Miller—Argo LP 4001

The Hamlin Quintet is a well integrated unit that plays cohesive, close-knit ensemble arrangements which at times gives it a studied sound, but also earns it adulation from the "cool," fringe jazz fans. Vocalist Marci Miller fits into this pattern nicely, and displays feelings of warmth too at times. It's good jazz-inclined entertainment. Among the selections are "Just Squeeze Me," "Li'l Darlin'," "Serenade in Blue" and "Strike Up the Band."

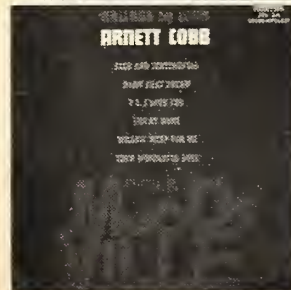
"NIGHT HAWK"—Coleman Hawkins—Prestige/Swingville 2016

The Hawk is still the master. As he keeps up to date with the younger set he has the enormous wealth of tradition and experience to draw upon. Here, as he clearly "outdistances" Eddie "Lock-jaw" Davis—though no fault of Davis', as he too is in good form—Hawkins etches a couple of moody ballads and some swingers. Among them are "There Is No Greater Love," "In a Mellow Tone" and "Pedalin'." Excellent catalog addition.



"REMINISCIN'"—Gigi Gryce Orch-Tette—Mercury SR 6062S

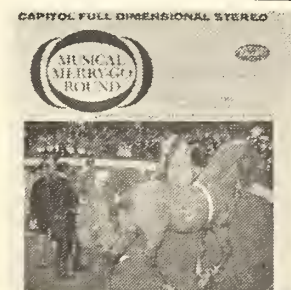
Gigi Gryce for the past few years has maintained a solid-footed equilibrium between "cerebral" and "soul" jazz. He is truly a "thinking man" when it comes to setting down his ideas clearly and concisely, yet with a swinging, soulful ensemble sound. Here he "reminisces" on such pieces as "Caravan," "Take the 'A' Train," "A Night In Tunisia" and a couple of originals. It's a highly evocative album and should get a strong reception from the field.



"BALLADS BY COBB"—Arnett Cobb—Prestige/Moodsville 14

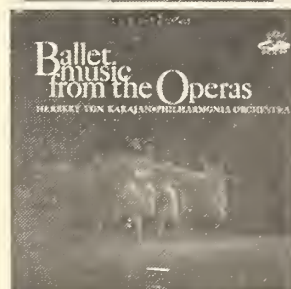
A major attraction of the Moodsville series is Arnett Cobb's big, deep tenor sax tone. For that matter, he has been a long-time favorite with many jazz fans as a top interpreter of the blue mood. This date doesn't differ from the set pattern, as it offers Cobb's soothing notes on seven tunes, among which are "Willow Weep For Me," "Blue and Sentimental," "Darn that Dream."

CLASSICAL PICKS OF THE WEEK



"MUSICAL MERRY-GO-ROUND"—Robert Irving conducting the Sinfonia of London—Capitol SG 7244

The "musical merry-go-round" here refers to the circular sound motion treatment given to two pieces here, Richard Rodgers' "Waltz" from "Carousel" and Oscar Straus' "La Ronde." The actual effect of a carousel is achieved dynamically. Other light-classical selections here read with vigor include Smetana's "Dance of the Comedians," Stravinsky's "Circus Polka" and Khachaturian's "Waltz" from "Masquerade." Thoroughly engaging musical package.



"BALLET MUSIC FROM THE OPERAS"—Herbert Von Karajan conducting the Philharmonia Orch.—Angel S35925

A recording of opera ballet music that, because of its content, will please both serious enthusiasts and the occasional classical fan. Von Karajan's precise interpretation leaves little more to be desired in this colorful arena. Included are excerpts from "Aida," "La Gioconda," "Tannhauser," "Prince Igor" and "Khovantschina." Has fairly wide appeal.



ADAM: "Giselle"—London Symphony Orch. conducted by Anatole Fistoulari—Mercury SR2-9011

Mercury adds greatly to its series of complete ballets with this fine stereo recording of the complete "Giselle." The charming romantic score is one of the most melodic and abounds in delightful little rhythmic patterns. Fistoulari directs it with finesse. Ballet fans have a choice item in this release.

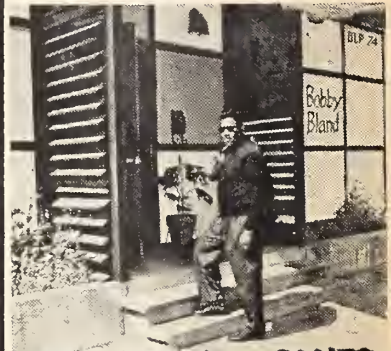

UA's Net Earnings Up 11.6% In First Quarter of '61

NEW YORK—United Artists Corp. had an 11.6% increase in net earnings for the first quarter of 1961 over 1960, chairman of the board Robert S. Benjamin reported at the annual UA stockholders meet here last week.

In addition, president Arthur B. Krim announced a three year program of completed feature films and films in production which he characterized as "unprecedented in the history of the company and of the motion-picture industry."

UA's gross world-wide income for the first quarter of 1961 totalled \$26,965,000, against \$23,188,000 for the like period in 1960.

First quarter net earnings from 1961 after provision for income taxes of \$820,000 were \$879,000, compared with net earnings of \$788,000 for the comparable period of the previous year.

The quarterly net represents earnings of 51¢ per share on the 1,713,621 shares outstanding on April 1, 1961. This compares with net earnings of 46¢ per share for the first quarter of 1960, after adjusting the shares then outstanding to the number outstanding on April 1, 1961.

UA's previously reported a record net of \$4,295,000 for 1960 on an all-time high company gross of \$108,531,000. The 1960 net earnings included a special credit of \$797,000, after provision for related taxes on income arising from adjustment of prior years' reserves.

Krim also announced that all divisions of United Artists including Lopert Films, United Artists Records, UAA Television and ZIV-UA-TV were operating at a profit with future growth anticipated.

Cooke Music Firm Opens English Offices

HOLLYWOOD — Sam Cooke and J. W. Alexander have extended their Kags Music publishing firm to London, England, to be known as Kags Music Ltd. Kags Ltd. also handles the business for Malloy Music, which is the pair's ASCAP firm. Kags Ltd. is run in collaboration with Leed Music Ltd.

Streamline CRDC Activities; Close Cleveland Branch

HOLLYWOOD—In a move to streamline its distribution activities and facilities, Capitol Records Distributing Corp. has realigned some mid-western territories and will close its Cleveland branch. Dealers, radio stations and newspaper reviewers, formerly serviced by the Cleveland branch, will be divided among CRDC's Detroit, Cincinnati, Buffalo and Pittsburgh branches. Almost all personnel of the Cleveland branch, including all sales representatives, will remain with CRDC.

The change will become effective July 1, according to William R. Tallant, Jr., CRDC vice president and national sales and operations manager.

Though CRDC's branch and warehouse facilities in Cleveland will be closed, the firm will maintain a sales office in that city for the benefit of dealers in the greater Cleveland area. The office will receive telephone orders and transmit them to the Pittsburgh branch. It also will carry a small stock of best sellers and new-release singles and albums.

Tallant indicated that the closing of the Cleveland branch will free more funds for sales, promotional and advertising activities, with no loss of effectiveness. "Service to dealers in the Cleveland area itself," Tallant said, "will continue to be just as good as it was with the branch. All orders received on a given day will be processed immediately and shipped

overnight from our Pittsburgh branch."

To alert CRDC customers to the change, Tallant is sending letters to all dealers formerly handled by the Cleveland branch, advising them of the CRDC branch which will be servicing their account.

Additionally, Tallant announced that, by mutual agreement, CRDC and B-H Record Sales Corp., El Paso, have terminated their contract. All outlets previously serviced by the El Paso Distributor will now be handled by CRDC's Los Angeles and Dallas branches and its Denver sales representatives, Boyd Distributing.

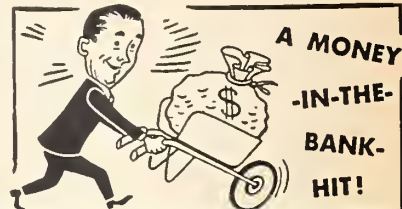

"Due to the tight program schedule for the two-day convention," Talmadge stated, "we hope to register the majority of those in attendance on Sunday. Our actual convention program gets underway at breakfast on Monday and will continue through the closing Tuesday night. Convention programming has been planned with consideration, and because of

The White House plan, designed to give more flexibility to FCC functions, would have had functions delegated to a group of commissioners, a single commissioner, a hearing examiner or other members of the FCC staff. In addition, the chairman would make his own appointments of personnel to pending cases.

NEW YORK—United Artists Records, effective immediately, has appointed Editorial Antar S.A. of Montevideo, as its distrib in that country. Contract, which was set by Sidney Shemel, UA director of foreign operations, is for three years, and covers albums, EP's and singles which will be released in Uruguay under the UA label.

At the same time, Shemel announced that UA had chalked up its first major hit in the Philippines, with the initial sales figures on the Steve Lawrence "Portrait Of My Love" revealing the largest gross sale of any single UA release in that area to date. Report came from Vilmarco, UA distrib in that area which headquarters in Manila.

Also, Jerry Butler's "For Your Precious Love," "Come Back My Love," "He Will Break Your Heart" (Carter was also co-writer on this tune.) "Find Yourself Another Girl," and other clicks.

Carter is also in complete charge of recruiting talent and cuts all albums as well as singles in the pop field for the diskery.

CHICAGO—A featured musical highlight of the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) meet in Chicago next month will be a show performed by Dick Schory's RCA Victor crew, the Percussion Pops Orchestra, between 6 and 8 PM on Wednesday, July 19, in the Grand Ballroom of the Palmer House.

The show, tagged "Sound Spectacular for '61" features the twenty-two musicians and 119 instruments with which Schory has cut his Victor LP's. Other pop and jazz artists will appear as soloists with the Schory group.

Joint sponsors of the show are Frank Holton & Co., Musser Marimbass, Lowery Organs and Ludwig Drum Co.

RIAA Adds 3 Members

NEW YORK—Three new members have been added to the Record Industry Association of America: Laurie Records, Spoken-Arts Records, Audio Recording & Manufacturing, which produces educational disks under the Eclipse label. All the labels are based in New York.

Rodgers Names Firm Head

HOLLYWOOD—Singer Jimmie Rodgers has announced that Nancy Streebeck, his personal press rep, will also head Honeycomb Productions, his personal management firm here. Firm currently represents Sue Raney, Marianne Gaba, Kenny Miller and Johnny Walsh, and plans are set to sign two additional artists before August 1.

Gorme-Lawrence LP Done In 3 Days By Costa

NEW YORK—Don Costa, director of A&R for United Artists Records, may have set something of a speed record for producing an album when he completed an LP for Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme in three days.

During this time, he personally wrote the arrangements for twelve songs, rehearsed them with the artists and conducted the recording session. In addition, he squeezed in two sides for a single release by Lawrence.

The recording was done in Hollywood, while the performers were appearing at the Coconut Grove. The reason for the haste was the fact that Gorme and Lawrence were leaving for London and an engagement at the Pigalle immediately after their Los Angeles date and are not scheduled to return to this country until August.

Verve "Early Bird" LP Program Offers Dealers 1-For-3

NEW YORK — MGM/Verve has kicked-off an "Operation Early Bird" dealer program—featuring one album free for every three purchased on the entire Verve catalog, according to Sidney Brandt, vice-president in charge of sales and operations for the labels.

The plan, which runs through July 31, also includes one-third dating payments in October, November and December plus the usual 2% discount.

The entire project, the label said, is the result of "extensive market research" and is "the kind of plan that distributors and dealers indicated was necessary to the job required of them."

A big advertising and promotion campaign will back the program, which also includes seven recently re-released Verve LP's, topped by three LP's by Ella Fitzgerald.

Moretti said there will be no dues, with members, or guests, who wish to attend the luncheon gatherings welcome to do so. Those who are interested in the August 16 meeting, at which a speaker, to be announced will be featured, should advise either Moretti or Norman Weiser, of United Artists Records, as soon as possible so that arrangements can be com-

pleted. Site will be announced shortly, Moretti said.

Among the plans for the club are annual awards to the top selling artists, records, etc. in the foreign markets, which will be based on surveys of those markets, and awards to foreign artists and records which have achieved prominence in the United States. Barring upcoming commitments, initial guest will be Connie Francis.

Moretti advised that the meetings are planned on an every-other-month basis. Luncheons will be paid for by those in attendance.

NARM's convention chairman is Glen C. Becker, of Music City Record Racks, Los Angeles.

In a further NARM development, it has been announced that Edward M. Snider, NARM prexy, and Jules Malamud, executive-secretary, will take part in the Association of Record

Manufacturers and Distributors of America (ARMADA) at ARMADA's convention this week in Hollywood, Fla. (26, 27).

As a panelist, Snider will represent the views of all rack-jobbers in relation to problems prevalent in the record industry as a whole today (i.e. bootlegging, discounting, pricing, 33 singles). Malamud, a charter member of ARMADA, will address the convention on the relationship among the rack-jobber, distrib and manufacturer. He will attempt to clarify the rack-jobber's position in the industry.

NEW YORK—An anti-bootlegging bill which was approved by the Criminal Procedure Committee of the California State Assembly last month (22) and subsequently passed the Assembly of the state of California, has passed the Senate of the state of California.

The bill is awaiting the signature of Governor Edmond T. Brown of California to become law.

The bill, Assembly Bill 3075, as it passed the legislature was changed so that the law can carry a mandatory jail sentence. The alternative provisions for levying of fines were removed from the bill which now reads that anyone who commits any illegal acts are to be punishable by imprisonment by not more than five years in the state prison or by not more than one year in the county jail. Hearings on the bill were heard before the Business & Professions Committee of the Senate of California, Senator Edward Johnson of Maryville, California, Chairman. The bill was introduced by Assemblyman Charles Meyers of San Francisco and was processed through the Senate Committee by Assemblyman John T. Knox of Richmond, California.

ARMADA was represented at the Senate Committee hearings by David Steinberg of the firm of Steinberg, Balder & Steinbrook, ARMADA's attorneys. Steinberg discussed the activities of the counterfeiters and at the conclusion the bill was presented by Senator Allan Short of Stockton, California.

The bill was unanimously approved by the Committee and was forwarded with a recommendation that it be passed by the Senate and that it be processed by the consent calendar.

It was necessary to have the bill put through the consent calendar since the Senate was adjourning within a few days and would not be in session again for two years.

Steinberg also contacted the Attorney General's office, the office of Consumer Counsel and various members of the Assembly of the Senate Committee to assure passage of the bill. ARMADA was also supported in this matter by Miss Helen Nelson of the office of Consumer Counsel of the Governor's office.

Art Talmadge, ARMADA's president stated that "ARMADA is pri-

marily responsible for the introduction of this legislation in California and for the passage of this legislature for both Assembly and Senate. It involved three special trips made by ARMADA's Counsel including appearances before a Criminal Procedure Committee of the Assembly of the Business & Professional Committee of the Senate. The effort made by ARMADA in California clearly indicates that ARMADA is using their efforts to effect necessary legislation on both Federal and State levels. A complete report of ARMADA's efforts will be given out at the ARMADA Convention in Hollywood, Florida on June 25 & 26."

Alegre Deals With Hispavox And Gamma

NEW YORK—Alegre Records announced last week that it had concluded deals with Gamma Records of Mexico and Hispavox Records of Spain whereby Alegre will release in the U.S. recordings from the Gamma and Hispavox catalogs. The deals were negotiated independently of each other.

The Gamma-Alegre deal calls for a reciprocal agreement in that Gamma will also release Alegre Records in Mexico. The Hispavox pact is only for single records. Columbia already has a contract with Hispavox calling for the release of Hispavox LP's in the U.S. under the Columbia label.

The first Alegre disks under these new pacts were released last week. They are "A Media Luz" b/w "Uno" by Sarita Montiel (Hispavox) and "Mi Parranda" b/w "Danzonette Con Cha Cha Cha" by Cascarita (Gamma).

Alegre also reported that the first "Pacheco Y Su Charanga" LP had surpassed the 45,000 sales mark and that it was readying a July release of a second Pacheco LP.

A Boy For Don Robeys

HOUSTON, TEXAS—Don D. Robey, president of the Peacock, Duke and Backbeat labels, and his wife, registered nurse Murphy L. Robey, became parents on June 11 with the birth of a son, Don D. Robey, Jr. Weight at birth was 9 lbs 3 oz.

RCA Intros "Hutch" Design In New Phonos

NEW YORK—A two-tiered "Hutch" design has been introduced by the RCA Sales Corporation as part of its 1961-'62 "Total Sound" stereo "Victrola" phono line.

The wide line of Victor stereo phonos also feature a low-priced stereo console with a retail guide price of \$159.95—\$20 under the previous starting price for consoles.

"The new RCA Victor stereo line reflects improvements in cabinetry, power, speaker complement, tuner and other areas," said Bryce S. Durant, vice president, product planning and development.

"Featuring the concept of 'Ear Level' sound, the two-tiered 'Hutch' stereo unit models have been designated the Mark I and Mark II . . ." An RCA Victor multiplex adapter will be available before Labor Day, Durant said. He noted that jacks for multiplex adapters have been built into all RCA FM tuners for the past few years, and the introduction of an RCA Victor adapter will allow these models to receive stereo-multiplex broadcasts.

Standing over four feet tall, the Mark I and Mark II are designed in the manner of two-tiered hutches or breakfronts, and offer Danish Modern and French Provincial styling. The compartments below the speaker combinations house a four-speed changer and AM/FM stereocast tuner.

A third compartment provides record storage space "large enough for most home music libraries," Durant said, adding: "The new 'Hutch' shape is significant, because it blends and compliments with furniture not only in the living room, but also in the dining room, family room and den."

Each stereo two-tiered "Hutch" model offers six acoustically balanced speakers.

Stig Anderson, Swedish composer of "Klas-Göran," came to Holland especially to meet Ria Valk at Amsterdam Airport. Ria just arrived from Monte Carlo and was welcomed by Theo Van Der Meer, managing director of L.C. Phonogram. In his speech, he congratulated her with her first gold record, after which he asked Anderson to present her with it. Also present were Wim Van Vught and Willy Rex of publishers Altona, which published the song in Holland. Why was Anderson there? Because he wrote the hit that brought Ria Valk such tremendous success: "Klas-Göran"—or—as it became popular in Holland: "Rocking Billy" (Fontana).

Bovema's Imperial label again released a new Lydia-single: "Just Out Of Reach" and "I Forgot To Remember To Forget." Lydia, although emigrated to the U.S., still does very well in Holland.

New His Master's Voice releases are The Crests' delightful interpretation of "Model Girl," Gilbert Bécaud's "Quand l'Amour Est Mort" and, after his brand new Peer-song, Johnny Jordaan's latest recording "Lach Dan Paljasso," backed by "Het Circuskind." Bovema's major label also reports the forthcoming visit of the German teenage star Conny Froboess on June 25, appearing on VARA's "Landdag" (annual meeting at Apeldoorn. Conny's recent hits are "Mein Vater War Ein Cowboy" and her duet—featuring also Rex Gildo in "Okky-Doky." In the classical area His Master's Voice presents the famous Melba with an operatic- and song-recital in the series "Great Recordings Of The Century."

Delta Records shows intensive activities both in Holland and Belgium. Hans I. Kellerman signed for the young company contracts with Italy's Durium for the Royal, Adventure, Titanus and Circus labels, and with Cobedi (Belgium) for Olympia and Newton. "Dog Fight" and "Blue Moonbeam," the well-known Jokers Lin recording, is recently released by Delta in Holland and Belgium. Selling figures are rising quickly. The complete history of music in sound under the name of "Orbis Lexikon," a gigantic effort of the German recording industry, introduced on the market by Delta, got a lot of approval from critics. Kellerman told The Cash Box that Delta is working at an extensive recording schedule, in preparation for the coming season as well as for export purposes.

Jan van Luyk just came back from England where he discussed advertising and other plans with Decca people in London. Van Luyk is advertising manager for Decca, London, and Fontana at L.C. Phonogram.

There is an increasing public interest for Bobby Vee and Johnny Burnette, Liberty artists whose recordings are released here on the London label. Rein Klaassen, sales manager of L. C. Phonogram, told The Cash Box that he is expecting great things of the latest singles by Vee ("Baby Face"/"How Many Tears") and Burnette ("Big Big World"/"Ballad Of The One Eyed Jacks").

The big hit of Bovema's U.S. Capitol label is Faron Young's "Hello Walls." Furthermore, C. Hundepool, Capitol- label manager, reports that Frank Sinatra's "Swinging Session" still meets with lots of demands. Hundepool already made his first LP selection for the forthcoming "Grand Gala Du Disque," where the Edison prices (comparable with America's "Grammies") will be awarded. Hundepool hopes to realize another Edison, following up his 1960 victory with Sinatra's "Only The Lonely."

A new hit album with a whole load of American success songs has just come off the presses of Basart. Such songs as "Goodness Gracious Me," "Greenfields," "Delaware," "Willie And The Hand Jive," "I Know What God Is," "When Day Is Done" are receiving widespread publicity. Peter Meisel has obtained foreign rights of a Dutch song called "De Feestneus," a Dutch composition of Addy Kleingeld and Ger Rensen, and a Basart world copyright. This will be a German carnival-"schlager" for the coming fall.

"There's an increasing interest for the music of André Previn," reports MGM-Holland. MGM released Tommy Edwards' rocking version of "The Golden Chain" and, as far as the country repertoire is concerned, MGM-Holland heartily welcomes the new Hank Williams presentation. The buyers will be delighted about the 5 re-packaged LP's by the great star.

The first German Pop Music Festival sponsored by the German Radio-TV stations and the major record companies here is over and the eyes of the trade are watching the charts to see if the material that won catches fire. The festival was held in the resort city of Baden-Baden where over 200 members of the press and top representatives of music publishers and record firms were present. Many stars not appearing in the festival itself were on hand and the 3 days of parties and press conferences were enjoyed by all. Festivities began on June 2 when a "Weinprobe" (Wine test) and dinner was given by the hosts of the festival in the Neuweier Castle. On Saturday, a press conference and cold buffet was served and all of the artists were introduced. That evening the mayor of Baden-Baden held a dinner and on Sunday afternoon a cold buffet was held at the Austrian Consulate.

The festival actually began when 713 composers and members of GEMA sent material to a jury of members of the press, record firms and composers. 24 compositions were chosen and 6 major record firms recorded the songs. The 24 best versions were chosen and presented in 4 different nation-wide TV shows where a jury of 10,000 viewers were chosen at random to choose the 8 best selections. On Sunday evening, June 4, a 2-hour nation-wide TV show presented the finals giving the songs added promotion. The 8 finalists were, in the order presented, "Ohne Dich Polka," Hans Arno Simon, Metro-nome Records; "Bailando A Dos" with Tango king Alfred Hause from Poly-dor Records; "Du Bist So Lieb Wenn Du Laechelst Cherie" from Nora Nova, Electrola Records; "Texas Jimmy" from The Missouris of Telefunken Records; "Das Gluck Kommt Unverhofft" from Inge Bruck, Metronome Records; "Sudseeblade," The Medium Terzett, Electrola Records; "In Paraguay," Tony Sandler, Ariola Records and "Ein Kleiner Goldner Ring," Lys Assia, Telefunken Records. The TV show started with a film showing the finalists getting off the special plane and the greeting by the mayor of Baden-Baden and then the festival began. The jury for the final round was the radio-TV stations of Germany and the members of the press and audience present at the actual show. 140 votes were given for the performance itself and each of the 8 radio-TV stations were allowed 35 votes for a total of 420 votes.

After all the tabulations were in, the 40-year-old director of the dance orchestra of Radio Hamburg, Alfred Hause, won first prize with his tango "Bailando A Dos" with 75 votes. Second place went to the new teenage duo The Missouris with their "Texas Jimmy" with 65 votes and world star Lys Assia took 3rd place with 64 votes for her song "Ein Kleiner Goldner Ring" (A Small Golden Ring). The festival is over but the work is just beginning. The record firms are now preparing advertising material and promotional aids to help the records into hits. Watch the charts closely for information on this festival. At this writing, Schaeffers Music has bought the publishing rights to the 3rd place winner "Ein Kleiner Goldner Ring" and Peter Meisel has signed up the 2nd place winner "Texas Jimmy." Next year, the winner of this festival will represent Germany in the "Song For Europe" contest. The next major festival will be held in September when Radio Luxemburg presents their pop competition. The Cash Box will also be on hand to cover that event.

Two weeks before the festival The Cash Box visited Hamburg and attended a cocktail party for Hal Fine of Roosevelt Music. The party was given by Lutz Templin who published the "Wonderland" hit. Also on hand were Bert Kaempfert who cut "Wonderland," Helmut Haertl, the director of Polydor records, Al Schacht of Aberbach Music who represents Roosevelt Music in Germany, Hal's partner Jerry Brown and his wife, composer-arranger Helmut Bruselwitz and lyricist Kurt Schwabach. At the party, Hal stressed the importance of foreign material in America, and promised many world hits from Europe in the years to come.

To celebrate the 60th anniversary of German "Kaberett" (Cabaret) Teldec records has put out 8 new comedy records of the top people in that field.

Teldec also reports that Mr. Fischer, the former head of distribution for South Germany, has left that post and taken over artist promotion and radio promotion for South Germany. That makes 3 different promotion men on the road for Teldec. Fred Weyrich is handling Berlin and North Germany, Fritz Koehler is handling central Germany and Fischer, South Germany Teldec VP and distribution head Arthur Waizenegger reports that his firm is the only one in Germany with more than 1 regular promotion man constantly on the road.

Electrola is putting top promotion behind the first German record by Vittorio. Until now, Vittorio has only recorded in the Italian language but has enjoyed much success with his last 3 recordings. Although born in Italy, Vittorio has lived for the last few years in Germany and his recording career began here.

The Gerig Music Publishing group is hard at work promoting new hits by Peter Alexander with "Paris Ist Eine Reise Wert" (Paris is worth a trip), and many others.

In line with our editorial on record producers and A&R men a few weeks ago, Heinz Gietz and Mr. Ilgner of Polydor have left the firm and will soon sign contracts with another company in an A&R capacity. Nils Nobach has renewed his contract with Electrola Records, and Gunter Verch has also renewed his Philips contract.

On May 15, Radio Luxemburg celebrated its 30th year as the only independent radio station broadcasting in German. That's it for this week in Germany.

ENGLAND

A recent visitor to The Cash Box office was Sidney Siegal, president of Seeco Records of America. Siegal had meetings with Ken Lindsay of Central Record Distributors, which, as a result, acquired exclusive rights to import and distribute Seeco and Tropical catalogs in the U.K. Starting in August, at least three releases will be made per month. First release "The Most Spectacular Dance Rhythms" on Seeco, released in the States as a 98¢ Special—the retail price here will be the lowest possible at 25/—. Top artists in the Seeco and Tropical catalogs include Marino Marini, Jose Valdez, Johnny Rodriguez, Bobby Capo and Vic Dickinson.

Bob Roberts, general manager for leading factors Thompson Diamond & Butcher Ltd., recently returned from The Tokyo International Trade Fair. He toured Japan and Hong Kong extensively investigating the possible importation of new products (record and radio wise) which could help the British dealer and increase sales of both equipment and records. Roberts reports that in the last five years the quality of Japanese produced material has improved one hundred per cent.

Delyse Records reports excellent sales for its 12" LP. "The London Record" a souvenir disk designed primarily for the overseas market. It will be released by EMI in Australia and the Argentine, by La Gloria in New Zealand and distributed in Canada by Canadian Music Sales.

MGM Pictures hosted a press reception for Polish born Bronislau Kaber for many years a top composer at MGM's Hollywood studios and now in London en route for France, Italy, Poland and Russia. Among his best known compositions is the famous "Hi-Lili-Hi-Lo" from the film "Lili." His most recent scores were for "Butterfield 8" and "Spinster"—the film chosen for the United States entry at the Berlin Film Festival. The music is published in England by Robbins Music.

Two valuable London theatres have recently been lost to the cinema. The London Coliseum for years the home of large scale American musicals including "Annie Get Your Gun," "Guys and Dolls," "Call Me Madam" and "Pajama Game" is now showing MGM's epic "Gone With The Wind"—later to be followed by "Spinster." The Royalty—London's newest theatre opened only a year ago—has also switched to films and is currently showing another MGM spectacle "Ben Hur" for an unlimited season.

Wedding bells recently rang for two of Britain's top female recording stars. In Paris, Petula Clark married French publicist and music publisher Claude Wolff and in London Shirley Bassey wed film director Kenneth Hume.

Shirley Bassey, currently on the charts with "You'll Never Know," starred in Val Parnell's "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" on June 18th—the last program before the series is rested for the summer. Taking over the weekly peak slot for July 2nd will be Bernard Delfont with "The Sunday Show" relayed from the Prince of Wales Theatre. The first show stars Eydie Gorme and Steve Lawrence, who arrived in London for a four-week cabaret engagement at Al Burnett's Pigalle Theatre-Restaurant. Johnnie Ray soon to be seen in cabaret at Delfont's "Talk Of The Town" will star in a later Sunday night show.

Producer Johnnie Stewart has a new series of weekly half-hour programs devoted to traditional jazz entitled "The Trad Fad." Two bands will be featured per show plus dancing by 130 fans. The first program stars Chris Barber and his Jazz Band and singer Otilie Patterson together with Bob Wallis and His Storyville Jazzmen. Other top bands lined up include Acker Bilk, Kenny Ball, Terry Lightfoot's New Orleans Jazz Band, The Temperance Seven and Alex Welch. The bands of Bilk and Ball, both enjoying transatlantic success, are also featured in a series of BBC Sound programs "Band Box." The first show also features The Springfields, an up-and-coming group whose first waxing for Philips is "Dear John."

Mills Music has a couple of hits on its hands with Anthony Newley's "Bom-Bom" on Decca and "The Menace" by John Barry on Columbia. Success has also come to Mills via their first venture into independent recording. Oriole issued "Three Swingin' Chicks"—a Bobby Darin type number—by Don Fox and EMI accepted "Buddies" waxed by Mario Fabrizi and Harry Fowler for release on HMV.

Following in the footsteps of Winifred Atwell, Lonnie Donegan, Benny Hill and currently Mark Wynter, the latest British star to tour Australia is Alma Cogan, who plans a flying visit in September or October. Alma hopes to return via New York where TV appearances are being lined up.

A host of top recording stars, deejays, publishers and friends were the guests of Dorothy Squires and Russ Conway at an informal party to launch their Columbia disk "Say It With Flowers" in the swimming pool of Dorothy Squires' country home last weekend. Now one of Britain's top instrumentalists and composers, Russ was at one time accompanist for Dorothy. Chappell & Co. Ltd. published the number.

Three fast-climbing hits from The Cash Box Top 100 make a bid for the British charts on the London label—Frank Gari's "Lullaby of Love," "Tonight" by The Velvets and "Ring of Fire" by Duane Eddy, who also has a new EP "Pepe." Topping the Warner Bros. releases and into the charts in its first week is "Temptation" by The Everly Brothers. Two new Top Rank releases—Craig Douglas follows up "100 Pounds of Clay" with "Time" and Dee Clark's Stateside hit "Raindrops." Norwegian star Jan Hoiland waxes his second British release for Parlophone "The Land That I Love." A strong list of releases on the Columbia label include Paul Anka's "Dance On Little Girl," a new disk from Cliff Richard and The Shadows "A Girl Like You" and "Say It With Flowers" by Dorothy Squires and Russ Conway. From United Artists, Ferrante & Teicher play the love theme from the film "One Eyed Jacks" issued here on HMV. A 12" LP, "The Sound Of Music" by The Stratford Strings is the latest issue in the Pye 'Golden Guinea' series. Cashing in on the legalized bingo craze, Philips issued "Bingo—I'm In Love" written and recorded by Dave Carey.

ITALY

ITALY—Mr. Frachetti, back from IFPI's meeting in Copenhagen, phoned us telling us that he wishes to thank the organizers for the wonderful hospitality he received and for the organization he found perfect. Other Italian people attending the meeting were Mr. Trinelli (head of Cetra) as IFPI's vice-president, Mr. Baron (head of Melodicon) as adviser; Mr. Bacchini, head of Italian Decca; and Mr. Matalon of Italdisc.

Some of the most important Italian publishers attended the "Coq D'or De La Chanson Francaise" held in Paris recently. Mr. Rapetti of Ricordi told us he was not too enthusiastic about the songs he heard. Mr. Carrera of Messagerie Musicale said he would have given prizes to just the three songs chosen as winners, and he asked Mr. Boutet of Edition Barclay for the rights in Italy to the winning "Voyageur Sans Etoile." According to Mr. Carrera, this song, if interpreted by an Italian artist such as Milva or Aruturo Testa may be a bigger success here than in France for "Les Gitans." Mr. Van Erden of C. A. Rossi firm told us he found that the organization, presentation and hospitality of the festival was perfect. The orchestra was exceptional, but as to songs he feels that they will hardly become international hits. Along with Mr. Van Erden, Carlo Alberto Rossi attended the festival as well.

Alberto Carisch of Southern Music bought the song which won the second position at Ton Adieu. He says that Milva, Mina and Betty Curtis would be the best interpreters of the tune for Italy. Mr. Giraud is the author of the tune as well as of "Les Gitans" and "L'Arlecchino Di Toledo," the songs Carisch bought in the past years at this festival. "Les Gitans" was a big hit here via the performance of Dalida. He feels that the winning tune of this festival (Voyageur Sans Etoile) looks like, as to the arrangement, "Let Gitans" which won two years ago. Instead, the opinion of Alfredo Rossi is that the level of the songs was a little low except for only one—"Ton Adieu," which he would have bought with pleasure. The best singer he heard was Jean Philippe of Barclay.

The new Impulse jazz series will be published in Italy by His Master's Voice. First to come out will be four LP's by J. J. Johnson, Kai Winding, Ray Charles, and Gil Evans. These records will be backed by a remarkable publicity campaign and, it is believed, will cause a real sensation among jazz fans. Pino Donaggi, the new sensation on the Italian pop music scene, will participate in the summer season of La Bussola, a most famous Italian night spot on the Versilia seashore. Pino Donaggio, who led the market with his San Remo recording of "Come Sinfonia" (Like A Symphony), has another item expected to hit the charts titled, "Tu Sai" (You Know). He recently presented song which backs "You Know" on the record, on a TV show.

Connie Francis, now well known all over Italy, has released "Aiutami A Piangere" (Help Me To Weep) also with a stronger second coupling—"Roman Guitar," another evergreen Italian song.

After the United Artists line passed to C.G.D. from Decca recently, "Exodus" by Ferrante and Teicher is the first UA record appearing on the chart. Also "The Magnificent Seven" is selling well and Mr. Giannini is pleased with the results.

A new big release by Caterina Valente "Non Dimenticar Le Mie Parole" (Don't Forget My Words), the old hit tune by D'Anzi, coupling "L'Arcobaleno" (Over The Rainbow). The record will surely sell strong in Italy.

The French firm, Ricordi, will represent the Italian lines Astraphon and Hollywood while French firm Pacific will represent Vedette and Panoramic from Italy. The four Italian labels mentioned belong to the Meazzi Bros. Company and these new contracts are the result of a trip to Paris by Mario Panvini.

ARGENTINA

Herbert Wise, of Consolidated and Amsco Music publishers, has been the most important visitor of the week. He spent some days in Buenos Aires, as part of a South American trip including also Brasil and Chile. In Brazil he arrived to an arrangement with Ricordi Brasileira for the publishing of the music his organization controls. It is probable that Smart Ediciones Musicales will be his representative in Buenos Aires.

Rene Maget, Odeon's general manager, started a biz trip of six Argentine provinces, with Enrique Rosso, label's sales manager. Maget will visit local distributors and see the form of increasing sales all through the country.

Columbia is returning to the "promotional LP" sales battle. A new album, under the title of "Ensalada Musical" and priced at \$239 (regular LP's cost \$360), is the answer to RCA's "Explosivos Vol. IV," that—according to RCA—has sold already 15,000 copies. Columbia is also preparing a big sales and promotion campaign. These LP's have proven to increase single's sales, and diskeries are paying much attention to it.

The "Sucu Sucu" marked the return of Argentine tunes to the State's Top 100, after an absence of a couple of years.

Antonio Prieto is starting again his trips, after a month of work on his last film. He's planning short visits to Chile, Peru and Argentine country cities Rosario and Cordoba, returning every week to Buenos Aires to finish the picture.

Odeon announced that it has produced the first fully Argentine stereo recording, titled "Tangos en Stereo." Previously, it has recorded in stereo, but the waxing had to be processed in England. We were also told that most of Odeon's recordings will be now released in both types of records, mono and stereo. Odeon's top artists, Baby Bell, Los Fernandos and Luis Aguile, are already preparing new tunes for such release.

Arturo Millan—Chilean singer, winner of last Benidorm Song Festival—is planning a tour of some South American countries. His last recording, "Quince Años Tiene Mi Amor" ("My Lover Is Fifteen"), currently a hit in Spain, will be released soon by RCA.

Frankie Avalon will perform in the Opera Theatre June 26 and 27. He'll probably be the star of a couple of TV programs on Channel 9.

Orfeo inked a new artist, Anton and his Danzonera, for a series of tropical music recordings. The first titles to be cut are "Cuento Verde" and "El Presidente."

Romiglio Giacompol, of Smart Publishers, told us that "24,000 Besos" looks big. RCA released a version sung by The Navarro Sisters, Philips by Los Big Ben (vocal group) and Odeon Pops by Los Llopis.

Boby Capó is back in Buenos Aires, after a couple of months' absence. In March-April he had a big hit with "Llorando Me Dormi" (I Went To Sleep Crying) and has now a lot of work on television and dance parties. "Llorando Me Dormi" is currently a hit in Chile.

According to Columbia's sales, single 33's are being accepted by the customers. This has encouraged the label as to release five double 33's, cut by Los Cinco Latinos, Ray Conniff and Cuco Sanchez. Columbia, Orfeo and Music Hall are the only diskeries with single 33's on the market.

Baby Bell received a gold record from Odeon for the sales of her records. Her last waxing is "Esta Eserito En El Cielo" (It's Written On The Sky), composed by Bob Azzam and sung in Spanish.

New Capitol releases: "Don't Let Her Go," Dean Reed; "Lonely Man," Pee Wee Hunt; "Sentimental Baby," Frank Sinatra; "This Is Brenda" and "Emotions," LP's by Brenda Lee.

Waldo de los Rios and his orchestra gave a concert of Hindo American Music at the Coliseo Theatre. De los Rios is considered one of our best musicians and arrangers, and some of his records have been released in the States and other countries.

Orfeo Records announced that it put in the market two American tunes, sung in Spanish: "Only The Lonely," cut by Brazilian rock 'n roll star Sergio Murilo, and "Let's Think About Living," waxed by Johnny Carel.

FRANCE

It's now official—the Fontana-Cides has been taken in hand, so to speak, by the mother-firm, Philips. The sales and distribution offices have been transferred to Philips headquarters, Rue Jenner, though the publicity and artistic services remain autonomous. We might mention two recent and excellent Fontana recordings by The Blue Diamonds of which one is "Baby Face," while Dario Moreno has made a French version of "La Pachanga" and the talented new Fontana singer, Nicole Croisille, needs only to find the right song for herself.

Henri Salvador has returned to the Philips fold—but this time as Monsieur Salvador—and his first new Philips disk will comprise rock n' roll "classics," including "Racine Rock," "Corneille Rock," "Moliere Rock," etc. Singer Maya Casabanca doesn't make many records, but each one counts and her most recent includes the very good "Reviens a Sorrente" as well as "Nuit d'Espagne" ("Spanish Harlem"). The latter tune promises to make the hit lists in the fall, for except for something really exceptional, it is hard to predict summer successes here as everyone knows that vacation time is the standstill period in France as far as the "chanson" is concerned. Les Alcarsons have also boarded the rock n' roll train with their "Quand tu Diras Oui" but get back to their own Spanish style in which they excel with "Oh Monica" which has also been recorded by Trumpet Boy. Jean-Michel Defaye, leading an orchestra of 50 musicians, will make an EP of four hit tunes. Yves Montand is preparing a 12-inch LP in English for sale in America, but will also make a 12-inch album of new French songs.

The records of the group called Les Guitars du Diable sell very well, but we wonder why there seems to be this mania in France for unexpected names; Pathe has a group called Les Chats Sauvages (The Wild Cats) and it appears that still another group will take the name Les Tigres du Bengale (The Bengal Tigers). Let's inform the artistic directors that there are still other weird names which haven't been used yet!

Rocky Volcano has waxed "Belle Maman" ("Mother-in-Law") and Roland Bacri, under the name of Roro de Bab-el-Oued, is making records in what might be called the Algerian dialect. "Voyage de Noce" by Patachou is really a best-seller and we can thank Madame Breton for having found the really good song which Patachou needed so urgently.

Philippe Boutet of Barclay Editions, decidedly insatiable, would like to repeat the success he had with "Non je ne Regrette Rien" in publishing "C'est Peut-être ça" by Dumont and Vaucaire with a Piaf recording. All the same elements would be present—same composers, same publishing firm, same interpreter. The great Piaf, after having been released from the hospital after a serious operation, rushed back again for another emergency operation just 24 hours later and her condition at this writing is extremely serious. It is clear that once back on her feet, Piaf would need above all a long and effective period of convalescence and rest!

Dalida has just waxed—in Spanish—"Non je ne Regrette Rien." No doubt about it—Dalida, like Piaf, is one of the rare French singers who really appeals to an international audience. Her success in France is duplicated in Belgium and in Switzerland, but also in Germany, for example. The winning song of the "Coq d'Or" competition, "Voyageur sans étoile" has now been cut by Francois Deguelt (EMI), Luis Mariano (EMI), Catalano (Fontana), etc., and the beautiful tune, "Cherbourg Avait Raison" which was not among the contest winners has been waxed by Rosalie Dubois (Ricordi), and Michele Arnaud (EMI). This song led to the discovery of Frida Boccara (Festival) and our confidence in her talent has been justified.

Jacques Plante has shown he has still another iron in the fire—he will head a new label called "Choc," devoted chiefly to excellent American recordings although he will also do French issues. Two of his artists are Bob Calfat and singer Lita Mirial (formerly with Decca).

Georges Colin of Robbins-France Melodie will push his firm's "Toy Balloon" of which the original recording was by The Mudlarks on the Columbia label.

Leo Missir, Bel-Air Records' A&R, reports that Pere Duval is one of Bel-Air's best-selling artists. Duval has just returned from a Europe-wide tour and has recorded "Plus Beau Que le Ciel" and "Il y Avait Beaucoup de Monde." These songs which are uniquely of religious and Christian inspiration, are accompanied by a rhythm section and an alto sax. Bel-Air's Los Matecoco have cut a new (and secular) side called "Tibili Bilin."

News from EMI via Roger Marouani: Cliff Richards' latest album, "Theme For a Dream" and Joe Loss' first French release, "Wheels in Cha Cha," as well as Nat King Cole's "The Touch of Your Leaps," a 12-inch Pachanga album by Rene and his Pachanga Orchestra and a new Janice Arthur side, "Love is a Dangerous Thing."

Seems that Richard Anthony has finally decided to make an effort to win that place he merits on the market here with a new big series of recordings which include "Belle Maman." This song which is off to a fast start in France was adapted by Aber and all the rock n' rollers have adopted it.

Bernard Stephane, a new recruit for Ducretet-Thomson, has created the Lutrot and Contet tune, "L'Ete." Danielle Darrieux is continuing and persevering in her singing career and it must be said that her latest waxing "Printemps de Paris" is excellent and that this Popp and Cour tune deserves special attention. Francis Linel has waxed a Ricordi tune, "Cafe de Minuit" while Aimable has made his version for Vogue accompanied by Luter and Jack Ary.

"Many a Wonderful Moment" has been adapted by Bertret under the French title of "Pour Nous Seuls" and will get waxings by Jacqueline Danno and Danielle Darrieux. Jacqueline Nero (Bel-Air), who performed so well in the Coq d'Or contest, has recorded "Un Petit Beguine" which, in case you didn't know, is called "Love is a Dangerous Thing" in English.

King of the Juke Boxes, Vic Tahar, who is readying his summer program, reports that the new Marcel Amont side, "Dans le Coeur de ma Blonde" might become the "Blue, Blanc, Blond"—the hit, quoi of the year. In any case, Vic Tahar is ready to back the tune to the limit.

JAPAN

JAPAN—The Japanese record industry and BIEM (head office in Paris), have been quarreling for 6 years on the matter of ratio to be paid as the rent for tunes under BIEM's control, as we reported last week. To begin with, our domestic law regulates that the ratio of the rent be 2% of the tax excluded retail price or 7.20 yen, on each tune. But BIEM is requesting 4%. This was the cause of the hard to resolve debate. The Japanese side says "all other nations are also paying the rent in accordance with its domestic law, act or regulation and more remittance than our law permits is substantially impossible for us to send and we can't enter the contract." Japanese diskeries asked the Educational Ministry to talk with BIEM, leaving the existing contract expired, but continuing it automatically for another year. This provisional contract was, to be accurate, the state of no contract. Further, it was again extended automatically starting January 1, 1961 thru March 31 by the proposal of the Japanese side. On BIEM's side, it also asked the Educational Ministry of Japan to mediate the debate. Japan Phonograph Record Association (JPRA) backed this plan up ardently. But the ministry failed to make any decision on this matter before the contract expired. The proceedings of the negotiations were reported to BIEM's head office by JPRA on March 22. Along with this report, JPRA proposed the prolonging of this pact starting April 1, 1961. BIEM replied in its ultimatum to JPRA (dated March 31)—"No recording of tunes under BIEM's control should be made in Japan from now on. No tunes of BIEM's control should be distributed affective April 1, 1961." (But those which have already been released before March 31, 1961 will be allowed to be used 2 years from now). This makes Japanese labels unable to use any tunes of European origin. But, as one quarter points out, "no severe attack" is expected for the Japanese side because it still can use German tunes through GEMA. GEMA seceded from BIEM last January. Moreover, BIEM nowadays doesn't occupy the important role it had before. Out of the whole remittance paid by Japanese diskeries for foreign material, only 13% or so is paid for BIEM. This is a declining figure for BIEM. For all that, both parties have again started conciliation talk. We might add that the U.S. and Canada pay only 2% as the rent for BIEM (cheaper than that of Japan). The matter should have been reported before the general meeting of International Federation of Phonograph Industry (IFPI) which met at Copenhagen May 30 through June 3.

Shujo Muto, president of Japan's King, remained as president of JPRA when the following directors were also put into their former posts, respectively, no May 27. Yonezo Hata (Columbia), Hitoshi Momose (Victor), Shigeji Nanko (Teichiku), Nobusuke Izawa (Toshiba), and Kei Hoashi (Shin-Sedai). And was re-elected executive director, as well. Secretaries are Kiyonari Nara (Columbia) and Michio Sakakibara, both newly elected. The board of directors who voted the above-mentioned people, also heard how the debate on the BIEM problem was going on.

The Victor sales campaign in commemoration of the opening of the Hiroshima and Sendai branches has started. This is the campaign for the firm's specially contracted stores. The stores in the business district of the Hiroshima branch will be classified into three ("A," "B," "C") groups, according to their selling results of May through June. All of them will be invited to the spa where they will discuss how to increase record sales of Victor. Sapporo (in the northern-most island, Hokkaido) branch, is also doing just what the Hiroshima branch is doing.

Meanwhile Columbia started its sales campaign, too. Both dealers and customers will share the favor given by the firm. This campaign, "DSC Golden Sale" is connected with the firm's phonographs. Anyone who buys "Columbia Stereo Phonograph-DSC System" will be given a special record. 100 men will be chosen in the middle of October to get 12 stereo LP's, 50 men to receive 6 stereo LP's and 1,000 people to obtain three stereo compact 33's each. The stores from which the first prize winners are chosen will be qualified to take 10 stereo LP's.

The Nishinomiya plant of the defunct Nippon Mercury Records will start to work again in the near future. Kenji Hasegawa, composer formerly with Nippon Mercury, Fusami Yamazaki and Masato Sugawara, purchased the long closed plant and established Mercury Co. Ltd. The new company has nothing to do with the disbanded Nippon Mercury Records. Victor is helping to reset up the revived plant. After the completion of the adjustment, the factory will work as the pressing plant for Victor, as the first step for the first three months or so. Then, if things go well, the firm will embark on producing and distributing its own records.

2,319,780 copies of records (996,098,017 yen at producers sale; tax excluded) were produced by 9 diskeries during last April, according to the statistics released by JPRA. This shows 9% in number or 22% in dollar value above last April. Production of stereo versions are going up—243,199 copies were put out during May, 1961 (226,015 during last April).

AUSTRALIA

In a shock announcement that took the entire trade by surprise, Ken Taylor has resigned his position of general sales manager and A&R manager of Festival Records. Taylor has held this position with the Festival Group for a number of years and it is believed that his sudden resignation was due to some difference of opinion on policy matters within the company. The Festival Company is now fifty per cent owned by Am-Par Record Co. of the U. S. At the time of writing, Taylor had not divulged what his future plans would be.

The death occurred recently of Sir Richard Boyer who, until his death, was Chairman of the Australian Broadcasting Commission for sixteen years. The Commission controls a network of Government-operated radio and television stations throughout the Commonwealth. Sir Richard was greatly respected by the entire trade as a man of great knowledge and first-class administrator. His funeral was attended by hundreds of his personal and business friends and associates who paid their respects.

American comic Bobby Sargent currently doing well in television in Australia.

Jim Cuff, merchandising manager of the Records Division of RCA of Australia, reports that the firm is enjoying a good run with the soundtrack album from "The World Of Susie Wong"; both film and stage production of the show are currently running in this country. Jim reports that RCA has a good tie in with the film company and dealers are giving maximum support to this exposure.

Also from RCA comes news of Elvis Presley's new single "I Feel So Bad" c/w "Wild In The Country." Advance orders have been so persistent and so great that RCA has been forced to bring the release date forward in order to meet commitments for pressings. If anything, Elvis is becoming even more popular here and he never seems to be without at least one best-selling single, EP and album.

Spent a couple of very pleasant hours recently with young English star Mark Wynter, who is here for TV and club work. Mark, who records for Decca (England), has his new single "Dream Girl" issued here by EMI. Wynter created a very favorable impression in his television debut performance on the Graham Kennedy National Show; in addition to TV, Mark is doing a season at The Embers, a Melbourne nightspot.

RCA publicity officer Iris Moxley is doing good work for the company with the bi-weekly issues of "Dee Jay Digest." This publication gives concise and informative details to the nation's disk jockeys on RCA artists and records.

Popular television singer Elaine McKenna recently cut some material for W&G Records. A single is to be rush released and an EP will follow during the next few weeks. Elaine is now in Brisbane, Queensland doing a two week season at Lennon's Hotel.

After having been on the market for a couple of weeks—and already showing on charts—EMI suddenly held the Andy Williams single of "The Bilbao Song," which is released here on the London label. No specific reason has been given for the holdup with the record but it is believed to be due to a publisher dispute. It's to be hoped that the delay is not a long one as it could seriously impair the progress that the disk was making.

French singer Vicki Renet is at present in Australia for television and club work.

The new Ampar label, nationally distributed through the Festival group, has issued Paul Anka's newie "Dance On Little Girl" c/w "I Talk To You." This is a strong followup up to Paul's "Tonight My Love Tonight" which was the first single released on the Ampar label.

Nat "King" Cole's brother Ike Cole, is due to arrive in Australia next month for personal appearances.

New American vocalist Tony Orlando is out on a Philips single with his slick side "Halfway To Paradise." Number is getting good disk jockey exposure and could become an important record in this country.

The Festival people—on their Coral label—have just released an album package entitled "The Millionaires" which carries twelve titles that were big single hits. The artists include The Maguire Sisters; Buddy Holly; Teresa Brewer; The Ames Brothers; Billy Williams; Pearl Bailey; Jackie Wilson; Debbie Reynolds and others.

The opening night (Australia premiere) of "The Most Happy Fella" had to be postponed as a result of the sudden illness of the star Inia Wiata, who was rushed to hospital three days before the show was scheduled to open. After a minor operation Wiata has recovered and returned to "Fella," which is now playing to good houses at The Princess Theatre in Melbourne.

Music publisher Felix Stahl now in Germany after attending the music festival in Paris. Stahl is the head of Stockholms Musikproduktion and other publishing houses.

Tunesmith and publisher Stig Andersson back in Stockholm from visit in Amsterdam where he presented Ria Valk with a gold disk for the sale of "Rocking Billy," the Dutch version of Andersson's "Klas Göran." Miss Valk got her gold disk at the Schippol Airport in Amsterdam when she returned from Paris. A party followed. Miss Valk may record a French version of "Rocking Billy" in the near future. Stig Andersson is bringing Ping Ping ("Sucu Sucu") to Sweden for a 16 days tour between July 28 and August 13. Also Swedish radio is interested. After Sweden might follow a tour in Finland, and perhaps also Denmark. Finally, Andersson told The Cash Box that with Bens Music he has the rights for Edith Piaf's continental success "Non Je Ne Regret Rien," and with Sweden Music, another of Andersson's publishing companies, he will release "African Waltz," a tune which should prove a standard tune.

NORWAY

Iversen & Frogh A/S (EMI in Norway) in cooperation with daily paper Arbeiderbladet has announced a competition among singing talents in Norway. The company is looking for new talents, and the winner of the competition is offered a recording contract with Columbia.

Coming up very quick on Norway's Best Sellers is "Hello Mary Lou" with Ricky Nelson on California, which this week jumped from the 29th to 9th spot on the best selling list. Also new for the week is "Runaway" with Del Shannon on Heliodor. Both records has got strong promotion over the commercial radio station Radio Luxembourg recently.

Karin Pedersen, 17, is a new good sounding newcomer who recently made her first record for Philips.

DENMARK

Danish Record Retailers' Association has come-up with a new slogan, "Say It With Records," now used on posters in every record shop all over Denmark. It is possible to buy a gift card for a certain sum, this card can be "changed" to records for the same sum in any record shop all over Denmark. This idea has been used with good success in among others England and Holland.

Vera Lynn has been booked for the Copenhagen Tivoli Variety Show for a fortnight from June 15. In this connection, MGM Records in Copenhagen is planning a special promotion for the three albums which so far have been released by this world-famous singer under the MGM banner.

14 year old teen idol Gitte has just recorded "I've Told Every Little Star" and "Do What You Want" for HMV. Both titles were launched on June 3rd in the TV show "Nordisk Marked," which will be transmitted in Eurovision on the occasion of IFPI's and EBU's (European Broadcasting Union) meetings in Copenhagen.

Connie Francis' latest U.S. hit "Breakin' In a Brand New Broken Heart" was just released by EMI. According to A&R man Kurt Hviid Mikkelsen of EMI, the company hopes Miss Francis will be able to include Denmark in her visiting program when she returns to Europe in September. Miss Francis' latest release "Jealousy"—incidentally a Danish song—is still selling extremely well, Mikkelsen told The Cash Box. Other EMI news: In their June LP supplement the company released among other the first six items in Mercury's new Perfect Presence Sound Series. A special promotion campaign has been planned to push these series.

On May 31, Metronome arranged a big party at its offices at Vibevej in Copenhagen. They presented Jørgen Ingmann with two gold disks, for the 100,000 sales in Scandinavia of his "Apache" and "Pepe," and at the same time, Metronome boss Bent Fabricius-Bjerre presented Ingmann with a silver disk for the sale of 500,000 of "Apache" in the United States. After getting the three disks, Ingmann joined the orchestra which played dance music for the invited guests until early the next morning. In the 1940 version, Lilian Ellis played the femme leading role, which includes several songs to sing.

BRAZIL

President Janio Quadros, besides his financial worries has to face (and is doing it with great determination) some other problems closely related with movies, Radio and TV. One particular decree has been the cause of deep concern and is expected to be published very soon: the one which will force TV and radio stations to play 50% of Brazilian music and the other 50% of foreign music. In fact, this will give greater protection for our musicians and singers. At the same time, it will stimulate Brazilian composers as well as our public's taste, creating a much more interesting inclination for Brazilian native rhythms. Following this decree, another will be issued, concerning Record Industries on the same basis, which means they will be forced too to press 50% of Brazilian music.

It is pertinent to report that our country is the third among the greatest record producers in the world. In fact, our industry only bows to the United States and England. Production increases every year, and right now we're pressing more than 20 million records a year. Official numbers depends on information we'll be able to get next week. Standard and LP records contribute with the biggest percentages of the mentioned production. EP still fights to gain public's preference and compacts are only beginning their career.

Brazilian team of **The Cash Box**, by invitation of RCA Victor Do Brasil, recently visited the plants of this famous record company, in the environs of Sao Paulo City. We had a very good impression, specially with the presses, thirty-five in number, and completely made in Brazil. The presses produce 15 thousand records each day, divided this way: 10,500 LP's, 3,500 singles and 1,000 EP's.

Wilson Miranda, a Brazilian singer of the younger generation, whose record "Alguem E Bobo De Alguem" has been on the charts for several weeks, signed a contract with Mocambo Records, after a couple of years with Chantecler Records.

In June, Brazilian people dedicate three days in honor of St. Anthony (13th), St. John (24th) and St. Peter (29th), with special festivities in every part of the nation. Composers write special music for these three days. Also special records are issued for the occasion, and many retail stores are doing good business selling these records, specially in the country.

Mexican singer Tito Guizar performed on the Ed Sullivan show on June 11 in company of his daughter Lilia. Tito received \$2,500 for his act and is now in Aruba in the Occidental Indias to fulfill another contract.

Panamericana de Discos, S.A. (Musart Records) will start a new TV show on Channel 5 under the direction of Hector Gonzales de la Barrera with weekly participation of their artists like Carlos Campos, Los Galantes, Flor Silvestre, Emilio Gálvez, Antonio Aguilar, Rigoberto Pantoja, Lucha Villa, La Florencia, Marcela Galván, Alberto Vázquez, Emilio Gálvez and some others.

A few days ago, Spanish dancer and singer Carmen Amaya arrived here to perform at Terraza Cassino plus TV and theaters. The last country where she entertained was Venezuela, with her gypsy show.

Seen on a recent Pedro Vargas' TV show were singers Berta Cabal and Juana Gallo, Yorys Brothers, dancers, and comic Chino Herrera, all of them introduced by Paco Malgesto. And talking about the Vargas', his son Pedro Jr. was signed by Frank Sinatra to act in his new picture, "The Badlands" now being screened in Kanab, Utah with Dean Martin, Peter Lawford, Joey Bishop, Sammy Davis, Henry Silva and his whole clan. Frankie discovered Pedro Vargas Jr. during his last trip to México and considered him perfect for some scenes in the picture.

The average of 150 new recordings that the different firms now rush to the market monthly is a decrease of 50, which means that the demand for records is not as great as it used to be. On the other hand, releases have better quality, attention and selection.

Clemente Serna Martínez, president of RPM network (Radio programs of México), arrived in town after a radio study in Los Angeles for two weeks. RPM is a network of more than 200 radio stations.

Mexican duet **The Montoya's Sisters** are performing now in Japan at the Shankay Hall, alternating with Nat King Cole. . . . The Montoya's Sisters will continue their tour to China and then return to México next month.

The Cuban version of the **Four Freshmen**, **Los Bucaneros**, will soon appear in Mexico City to perform in theaters and night clubs.

Chico O'Farrill, one of the best arrangers we have, told us he was creating a new rhythm based on the Pachanga. Chico and his orchestra just arrived in town after a successful tour in South America.

We just received reports from Alvaro Gómora and his tropical combo from Zurich where they are working in a nightclub. Two years ago, Alvaro began a tour to the Havre, Italy, Switzerland, Paris, Estocolmo, Gotenburgo, Paris, London and Athens. On July 1, he will go to Spain and after three months return to México.

Edgardo Obregón just signed a new contract to enter the A&R department of Columbia Records. Now the label has six A&R men.

RCA announced three new LP's: **Rosina y Socorro**, with the Navarro's Sisters, Vol. III; **Los 4 Hnos. Silva**, Vol. V and **La Sensación Jarocha** with **Toña la Negra**, Vol. III. The three albums promise to sell very well.

Last June 15, pianist **Paul Badura-Skoda** performed at the second concert of the Piano's Festival that is presented at the Palace of Fine Arts with the National Symphonic orchestra under the direction of **Kenneth Schermerhorn**. Beethoven's music was played.

Jorgen Ingmann's "Apache" and **Paul Anka's** "Pity Pity" just appeared in México under the Gamma label.

Herbert Wise, executive of Dorsey Brothers Music and Consolidated Music Publisher, came to visit México, and to see the possibilities of opening offices here.

Javier Solís, the most popular Mexican singer we have, cut for Columbia Records the new song "Si No Estás Conmigo (If You Are Not With Me.)"

Statistics demonstrate that 85% of the artists that at present are working on Mexican TV are Mexicans, including nationalized stars.

Jose Luis Durán, organizer of the Third National Jazz Festival, is trying to record the music of the Festival on some label. Musart Records may do it.

Argentinian vocal group **Los 5 Latinos** signed contract to perform in México the next month of September. They are now working in Spain and from that country they will fly to the United States.

Moriss Taylor of KPAY-Chico, Calif., notes that they are now booking in at the Ritz in Oroville, Calif. in two weeks for a regular Sunday night show and dance. Your Last Export Shipment Is The Most Important One

The importance of the export market grows in proportion to the growth of the market itself. Where once a wholesaler would make it a point to discuss the export business conducted by his firm as something special and apart from the regular run of trade, today most wholesalers doing business with the overseas buyers take the export trade in stride. This is a good sign because once a new phase of a business can be absorbed so completely into the daily routine of a coin machine outlet, the chances are this function is being carried out efficiently. There is always the danger, however, that the export business a firm carries on can be short changed in the process of it becoming an accepted part of the business.

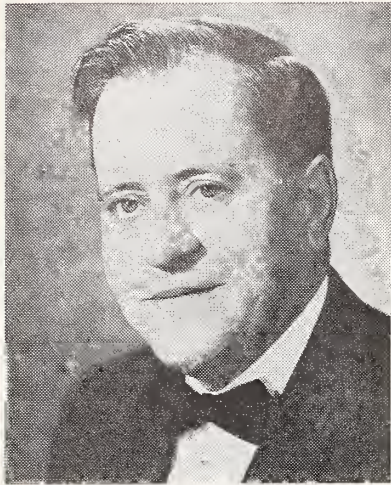
A damaged machine shipped to a buyer in the States is reported by the receiver almost before the shipping crate is removed. This is to be expected. A foreign shipment, however, can arrive in an unsatisfactory condition and result in immediate cancellation of future business with the shipper. Notice may never be given nor may a reason be offered. Just a plain and simple refusal to buy any more machines from that same firm. While this may be unfair, because of the distance between shipper and receiver and the details that go into an overseas order, sometimes it is wiser to take the loss and write it off than to go to further expense and complain.

This example is presented here simply because it is a common occurrence. One way to prevent this from happening to you is to double check all shipments before sending them out. This does not however, prevent damage from occurring in transit. Your reputation and future business lies with the last shipment of machines. Forget the previous favors, price deals and other generousities which have passed between you and your export customer. "What have you done for me lately?" is an international idiom.

The next time you do business with an overseas buyer, take the opportunity to ask him if he was satisfied with the merchandise. If the answer is "yes," he'll appreciate your asking. If the answer is "no" you will at least find out why and correct it possibly in time to save the account. If it's worth handling, it's worth holding on to.

Ainsworth Reports Excellent Progress With Fruit Machines

LONDON, ENGLAND—Of the several major fruit machine manufacturers who set up firms here before the advent of the new Betting and Gaming Law, one of the most successful is Ainsworth Consolidated Industries (Great Britain) Ltd. who report excellent progress.

Convinced that the market of fruit machines in the U.K. would follow the pattern already established in Australia, Hal Eldridge, General Manager of the London office is pursuing the policy of selling the well-known Aristocrat direct to the final users—clubs. He reports that whereas before the Act came into operation, there was a reluctance on the part of the clubs to purchase, they are now inquiring as to price, service and facilities available. Operators who, in the past, were only prepared to put machines out on a share or rental basis are now selling them and providing after service. Aristocrat fruit machines can also be purchased by clubs through dealers on a no-deposit basis for as little as £4. 0. 0. a week with guaranteed after sales service.

Sales are on the increase and it is understood that additional premises are being sought to accommodate the extra staff and storage space required. Shipments are being received from Australia on a weekly basis. A quantity of machines have been sold to the continental market—orders being accepted by the British company but shipped direct from the parent company in Australia.

Almost—An International Incident

CLEVELAND, O.—Morris Gisser, president of Cleveland Coin Machine Exchange, Inc., this city, leading distributors and major export suppliers, might very well have prevented an international incident last week. At least that's the way Gisser looks at it.

It seems that one of Gisser's export customers in Lebanon ordered a supply of various types of equipment one month ago and all but the gun games were shipped immediately. Not having received the gun games, the importer cabled Cleveland Coin and asked that the firm complete the order as soon as possible.

Since the equipment was now on hand, Gisser had his secretary cable the customer advising him that the machines would be shipped immediately. And that's when the trouble almost started.

Gisser decided to look into the cable matter to make doubly sure that the message was going out on time and upon reading the message, Morris almost froze in his tracks. Here's what the girl had typed to be cabled to a firm in Lebanon: "GUNS ARE AVAILABLE FOR IMMEDIATE SHIPMENT!"

"Naturally, we changed the wording a little," stated Gisser. "But I guess you could say I prevented an international incident!" added the veteran coinman.

In addition he stated that the pin action is one-hundred per cent mechanical response to the impact of the ball against the pin, or pin against pin—without rollovers on the alley, without magnets, and without the use of dangling chains. Hit pins are cleared off the alley with the speed of real pins on a real alley, resulting in fast play, and consequently fast earning power for the operator.

O'Donnell advised that other sterling features in the "Bally Bowler" include "High-Speed Totalizers," and shipped with each game are 3 Ebonite balls (4½ inches in diameter). The standard coin mechanism is 15 cents a game. A quarter is deposited for 2 games. Further, the coin mechanism is readily convertible to straight dime play, or straight quarter play.

The standard length of the "Bally Bowler" is 16 feet, and 5 foot extension sections are available to the operator. Scoring is according to official bowling rules. One to six can play.

In announcing "Bikini," new bingo type pinball game, Bill O'Donnell, Bally's general sales manager, emphasized that the new game "builds on the tremendous success of 'Circus Queen' but includes a new added feature which has proved highly attractive to players in all test locations."

"Scopitone" In London

LONDON, ENGLAND—Last week London had its first glimpse of the "Scopitone"—juke box with pictures. Designed, developed and manufactured in France by CAMECA (Compagnie d'Applications Mecaniques a l'Electronique au Cinema et a l'Atomistique) the machine was brought over for a four-day demonstration at the Institute of Directors. The company's British advisors, Paul Baratte & Associates Ltd. extended invitations to top level executives likely to be interested in this revolutionary idea including members of record, TV and film processing companies, electronic manufacturers and leading impresarios from the entertainment world.

From the more than favorable reaction received and subsequent negotiations now taking place it is certain that the full rights will shortly be acquired for this country. As reported in *The Cash Box* of May 6th Scopitone transforms and enlarges the scope of the juke box by substituting for the ordinary record a 16mm sound film. The machine takes 36 films of up to four minutes duration. A continuous running projector incurs practically no wear on the films (as tests of over 4,000 runs have proved) and incorporates a simultaneous automatic rewinding device. The sound is produced by a magnetic band alongside the film. The picture appears on a 54cm screen with perfect clarity and true color reproduction. Apart from the obvious promotion potential of Scopitone for recording artists it is eminently suitable for advertising, in-

struction and demonstration purposes. In France it is reported there are now over 150 machines on location and new films are being produced at the rate of four or five a month at an approximate cost of £500. It is hoped that the selling price of approximately £1400 may be reduced for this country and it is expected that the INF play will be 1/— here. A spokesman for Paul Baratte & Associates informs that even when it has been decided who will manufacture the machine in this country it is likely to be several months before Scopitone is operational here.

ANALYSIS OF FIRST QUARTERLY COIN MACHINE EXPORT REPORT

A Review of Coin Machine Sales To The World's Markets During January, February and March 1961

GENERAL Fifty-seven countries around the world bought more than 22,000 coin-operated machines valued at \$7,087,103 during the first three months of 1961 setting the base for what could be a big volume year for the industry. The biggest user once again was Canada taking top honors in all three categories, in the North America market. Venezuela led all of South America taking close to \$100,000 in phonographs and one-third that much in games. Western Germany easily led Europe for totals with a rousing \$1.3 million in phonographs alone. Games for the economically healthy side of Germany reached \$279 thousand. Australia failed some in total and in each category taking only 78 phonographs for a total of less than \$30 thousand. All of Asia is off in overall business but Japan's arcade business appears to be accounting for a larger than usual number of games. Africa business is steady in all departments. A surprise showed up in the Vending category with USSR taking 5 vendors for \$5,973. Could be a trend.

PHONOS 6 thousand phonos for \$3.5 million is good business for any quarter and that's about the story for Jan.-Mar. in US phonograph shipments. Europe topped the world again, of course, with \$2.7 million and West Germany took top honors there. Venezuela did close to \$100 thousand, better than average compared with last year while runner-up in Europe was Belgium with \$674 thousand. Seven countries in Europe topped the \$100G mark, a little better than average. Australia fell off from better totals each previous quarter, almost from the first day they lifted restrictions.

Asia, in their own small way, topped South America in phono imports with the Nansei Islands taking the lead there with \$170 thousand. Japan accounted for \$28 thousand while all other Asian ports accounted for less than \$10 thousand each.

South America wound up with close to \$200 thousand worth of phonos and after Venezuela while Ecuador and Chile just about tied with \$36 and \$34 thousand, respectively.

GAMES Total amount of money spent on games imports was \$1 million less than phonos. The ratio is usually about 3:2 and it stayed that way for the three months. Biggest importer was Europe and the UK but England failed to continue its skyrocket ascent. After doing more than \$1 million in the last quarter of the year last year the big fruit importer didn't quite make \$625 thousand. All evidence of the slackening of gambling machines into the United Kingdom. Reports from London as early as last fall indicated that this bubble was about to burst and as far as exporters are concerned its just about back to normal over there. But in spite of the fall off the country still topped Belgium's close to \$400G's while France made a tremendous showing after having restrictions lifted to reach the end of March with a first quarter total of \$385,000. Look for this country to take up some of the slack left by Britain, for a while anyway. Western Germany continued a strong showing quarterly figures of \$279 thousand. There can be seen no slowdown in this market simply because of the economy of the country as a whole. And all of this in addition to the machines manufactured over there. Austria made its first showing in some time taking 12 amusement machines worth \$1,430. Big surge in Italy with 145 units going in under the amusement machine category for a total value of \$39,368.

The action in North America, second leading continent for games imports showed some promise with Bermuda taking 42 machines and Dominican Republic importing 88 units worth \$10,795. Recent assassination of Trujillo might hold down imports for a while. It will as far as exporters shipping on credit basis are concerned.

Mexico buys sporadically, and with no life during the last quarter of '60, the Latin port took more than \$3,209 worth of games during the first quarter of this year. Japan led Asia as mentioned with \$67 thousand. Here's a port that shows signs of growing along with the economy of the country which is very strong. As a whole the entire continent took less than \$100 thousand.

VENDING Total volume just topped the one-million dollar mark for the quarter, better than average by a few thousand. Europe and Canada just about divided the total with Canada taking \$330 and Europe showing \$646 thousand. UK led the vending import race with \$200 thousand in machines while runner-up Western Germany bought \$153,393.

NAMA Sponsors Int. Vend. Convention Canadian and English Vendors To Attend

CHICAGO, Ill. — Cabled invitations to attend the first International Symposium of Automatic Merchandising sent to vending executives in England and Canada were met with an immediate and enthusiastic response, according to Thomas B. Donahue, president of National Automatic Merchandising Association.

NAMA is sponsoring the International Symposium this fall (October 31—November 1) in conjunction with its annual Convention and equipment Exhibit at Chicago's McCormick Place.

Donahue wired invitations to vending executives at both the International Automatic Vending Exhibition held May 15-19 in London, England and the annual convention of the Canadian Automatic Merchandising Association held in Montreal, May 25-27.

He said cabled replies were received from England within 24 hours, reporting that the invitations were "passed to all exhibitors."

Donahue's invitations read: "Best wishes for Exhibition success from your American vending colleagues. Please extend cordial invitation to all Exhibition visitors to participate in First International Vending Symposium..."

Recipients of the cables included W. R. Kern, manager of the British Exhibit; G. A. Cooper, an official of Automatic Vending Machine Association, London, England; and Vernon Lang, executive director of the Canadian Automatic Merchandising Association.

Donahue said he expects 300 to 500 vending executives from many foreign countries to attend NAMA's international conference.

Coin Machine Conditions In The Far East

LOS ANGELES, CALIF.—Joe Duarte, Duarte International Sales Company, Inc., this city, who has just returned from a tour of the Far East, reports of the coin machine conditions there as he observed them.

AUSTRALIA

In the city of Melbourne, state of Victoria in-line games were operated freely and with record earnings until April of this year when they were banned. It remains to be seen how the new law will affect operation of novelty pinballs and other amusement games. Under the new law licenses will be issued for games requiring manual skill, but to the location not to the operator. The ban has been a severe blow to operators.

Among the leading operators and dealers in Australia are Keith G. Willis, Jack Rooklyn, Andy McKelvey, Leonard Ainsworth, the Davidson brothers, H. P. Goddard, A. R. Hancock, all well known to U.S. distributors and manufacturers.

In the state of New South Wales gambling is allowed in private clubs, some of which are quite sumptuous and have a large membership. There are some in-line machines but slots are more popular, called "poker machines" because the reels have poker faces in lieu of fruits. They are manufactured in Australia. The "Aristocrat" and "Silver Jubilee" seem the most popular models. The mechanism resembles the Mills.

In the heart of Sydney is located one of the best arcades in the Far East, run by the Davidson brothers. All equipment is American. In Australia most machines are on shilling play roughly equal to our dime. The AMI phonograph is manufactured, under license, by J. H. Larkin. Import duty is high enough (65% plus 25% purchase tax) to keep out volume imports of rival models.

MANILA

There are exchange restrictions on the import of coin machines into the Philippines. In spite of this, there was an active market for in-line machines until their operation was declared illegal by the Supreme Court. There are more jukeboxes (many of the latest models) in Manila than any other Far East city. Among the leading operators in Manila are, John Spakowski, Bill Suter, Juan P. Gereña, Delfin Franco, J. Montoya, Pedro Franco. Competition is severe. Some operators are selling to locations although this practice is not widespread. The government is committed to a policy of "de-control" of imports. It is feared that when jukeboxes can be imported freely competition will become even more severe.

HONG KONG

Pinballs were banned about four years ago. Since then the coin business has been in the doldrums. Jukeboxes are operated on HK 10¢ which is less than 4¢ US and locations get 50%. This does not make for a profitable business. The two leading operators in Hong Kong are Ng Lian Chin and Jesse Yee. It is rumored that Rosen Enterprises of Japan will open up a bowling alley and arcade here. The city has no large-scale amusement center of this type now.

JAPAN

Japan is a new but great potential market for all types of coin machines. The interest in vending, music, and games is great. A bowling craze seems to be in the making. The Vendo Corp. exhibited its full line of vending machines at the Tokyo International Fair this year and announced plans for manufacture in Japan of all or most models. The AMI phonograph is being made in Japan under license but not available yet.

Pachinko parlors are all over Tokyo. This game is a crude upright played with small steel balls which the player inserts into the machine. If these balls come down through the right channels the game pays out

extra balls which can be exchanged for merchandise. More sophisticated games of this type or pinball type should prove equally popular, but at present they are unknown. Space for games is the big problem in Tokyo, which is now the biggest city in the world with a population of 15 million in the metropolitan area.

The leading coin machine firm in Japan is Nippon Goraku Bussan K.K. managed by Richard D. Stewart. This is a large and rapidly expanding operation covering all of Japan with a network of jukebox and game routes. The headquarters in Tokyo is in a large two-story building and houses modern well equipped administration departments and employee cafeteria. The company has an excellent training program for servicemen. They are recruited from the area in which they will work, brought to Tokyo, housed and fed in the company area for 12 months and trained on all types of coin machines. Affiliated with this company is a new modern two-story concrete and glass factory, covering a city block. In this new factory will be made the Sega slot machine, a new American type jukebox, games, rides, and whatever the Japanese or world market will require. The factory compares favorably with the best in the U.S.

Another fast-growing operation is that of David Rosen, who operates about 100 arcades in Japan, under the name of Rosen Enterprises. (He is no relative to the Dave Rosen of Philadelphia.) Rosen's arcade in Tokyo features guns of all types, all of U.S. origin. Michael Kogan is another operator who is expected to do big things in Japan. He is a leading jukebox importer but is also expanding into the arcade field. Samuel Willensky is another operator with a good sized route of jukeboxes around Tokyo. By a rather strange coincidence three of the operators mentioned—Stewart, Kogan, Willensky—started in the basement of the Masonic Building in Tokyo about 12 years ago and on a very small scale. Willensky still has his office there. Rosen has his office opposite the Imperial Palace and said he is hoping to get a concession from the Emperor, for a Palace location.

OKINAWA

Among the Pacific islands, Taiwan is still untouched, but Okinawa is covered with American coin machines, slots, pinballs, jukeboxes. Slots are operated in military and civilian clubs, but new regulations require the military clubs to own their own machines. There are about nine operators on Okinawa, all members of a strong Operators Association. It is remarkable to find on this small island such an outstanding example of cooperation—something that operators in other countries have not been able to achieve. Among the leading operators in Okinawa are Mr. Hanyu Shimabuku of Shima Automatic Musical Instruments Inc., Mr. Iko Kudaka of I.K. Vending Machine Co., and Mr. Kojiro Takaesu of T. K. Shoji Inc.

Ruffler & Walker Reports Best Biz Year In History

LONDON, ENGLAND — Ruffler & Walker, sole importers for Rock-Ola in this country report that following this year's A.T.E. where they had both the biggest stand and more equipment on show than in any previous year, business has been the best in the company's history. As a result of orders taken at the show for arcade and gaming equipment, wall machines etc. production has been fully absorbed for the remainder of the season. In fact "follow on" business and increased orders have strained Ruffler & Walker's import, stores and factory organization to the

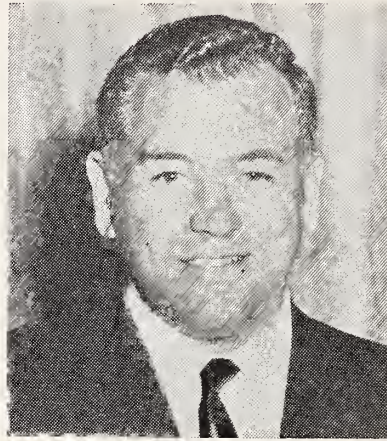

Prior to a recess of business activities for the day, Leonard Gross, vice-president in charge of the Seeburg Vending Division, spoke to the operators about the features in the new Seeburg "Ice-O-Vend" cold drink vending machine and other Seeburg vending equipment.

A cocktail party and dinner climaxed the day's festivities at the Belden Stratford Hotel, where the Texas group of operators retired for the evening prior to their return to San Antonio by jet plane on Tuesday morning.

Late Las Vegas Coin, English Distrib Firm, In Three Pronged Disposal

LONDON, ENGLAND—Since the demise of Machinery & Entertainments Ltd. trading under the name of Las Vegas Coin, as main distributors for Mills Bell-O-Matic, the company has undergone a three-pronged disposal.

As from April 15th this year a British firm Mattbells Ltd. of Manchester was appointed sole distributors for Mills Bell-O-Matic fruit machines and spares throughout the United Kingdom.

Another British firm Holdmatics Ltd. of Birmingham acquired the trading name of Las Vegas Coin Ltd. which has been duly registered and with it the sole distributing rights of the Ace-Pace fruit machine manufactured by Ace-Pace Corporation of America, for the United Kingdom and Ireland. A Director of the company, Don Brown, reports that already there is a great demand for the Ace-Pace machine which he attributes largely to the competitive price. Brown also feels that the days of reconditioned fruits are nearly over—the demand both from operators and club owners is more and more in favor of new fruits.

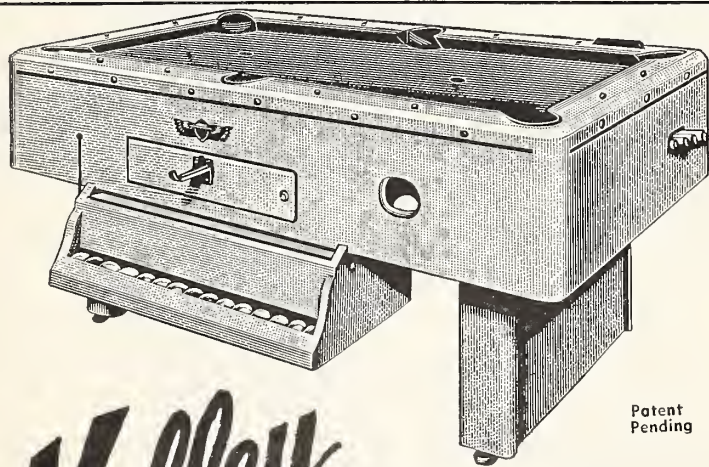
Atlas Holds Rowe Cig Service School

Eng. Gaming Act Runs OK

LONDON, ENGLAND—Commenting on the first Quarter of 1961, which has seen the advent of the new Betting and Gaming Act in this country, John Singleton of the A.C.A. noted that so far everything has gone smoothly and the law has come into operation almost unnoticed. Apart from a few minor cases of law breaking of the usual and expected kind there have been no unwelcome repercussions. The detrimental publicity and warnings of gang warfare forecast by certain sensational newspapers have not materialized.

By virtue of the new law which, for the first time legalizes (with limitations) the operation of cash pay-out machines in penny arcades and similar places, the natural tendency has been for an increase in sales of this type of machine at the expense of amusement only types. Since the normal fruit (legal only in clubs) is designed to pay out up to 20 times the stake, the emphasis has been on machines of home and continental manufacture which incorporate an element of variety as opposed to the straightforward American type fruits.

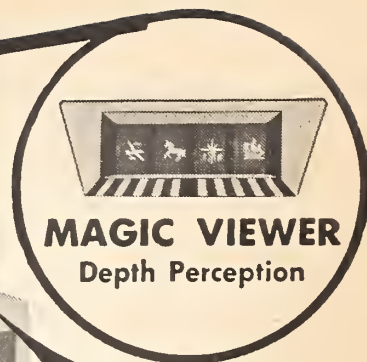

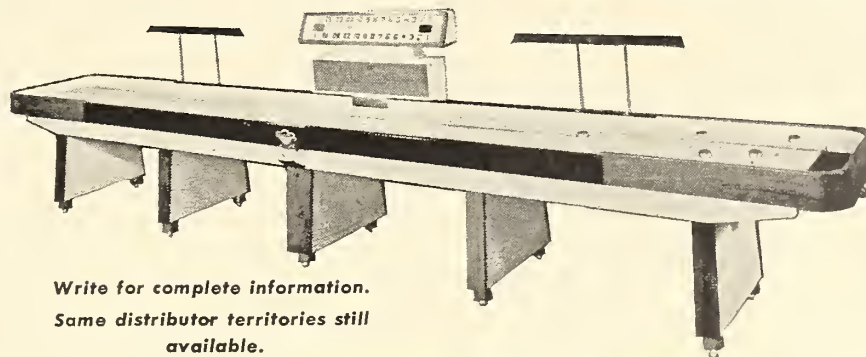

NAMA And Connecticut Council Teamwork Provides "Acceptable" State Health Code

CHICAGO—Joint action by National Automatic Merchandising Association and the Connecticut Automatic Merchandising Council has culminated in a successful revision of a proposed sanitation code which would have included a \$25 per machine license.

According to Richard W. Funk, NAMA legislative counsel, and David E. Hartley, NAMA public health counsel, a revised Connecticut health bill (House Bill 2590) passed the House and Senate, June 6, and will become law with the expected signature of Governor John N. Dempsey.

Funk said the original proposed bill was confiscatory, and through industry efforts, was revised several times before becoming "acceptable" to Connecticut vendors.

The new law provides for a \$25 operator license and a 50 cents per machine license. Not covered by the Code are bottled, canned and pre-mix soft drink venders, milk venders and machines that vend food and drinks in hermetically sealed containers. Although included under the Code, bulk venders will be assessed at 10 cents a machine instead of 50 cents.

The law also contains a clause which pre-empts cities in Connecticut from adopting local health regulations to license vending machines.

"Local pre-emption is an extremely

important part of the bill since future local ordinances could otherwise seriously hamper, if not eliminate, vending operations in the state," Funk said.

"Without the excellent cooperation of the Connecticut Automatic Merchandising Council—especially its chairman, Lou Grossman and executive director, Lee Isenberg—we probably would not have succeeded in getting this new law which adopts the language of the U. S. Public Health Service Code and provides adequate and uniform health regulation throughout the state," Funk said.

He pointed out that the original health bill would have allowed local municipalities to pass their own license fees and would have required voluminous information to be filed with the state, including the location of every vending machine. On this last point, Funk said the new law provides only that operators keep records of where machines are located and that these records be available for inspection by state authorities.

The new Connecticut health law will be administered by the State Department of Consumer Protection under Commissioner Attilio R. Frassinelli and Director Harold Clark with whom the industry has cooperated in development of the new law.



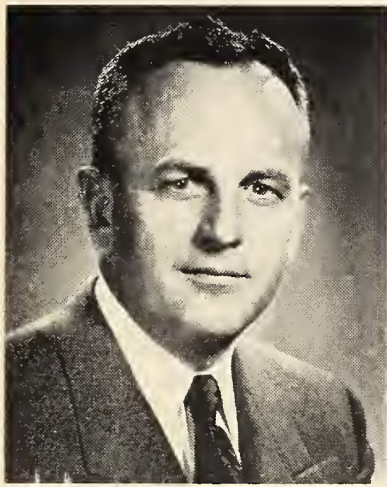

Seamen's Strike Starts

No Foreign Ships Involved

Claimed General Cargo Will Be Affected Less Than Ten Per Cent

NEW YORK—A seamen's strike began at midnight, June 15, after long hours and days of negotiation between the National Maritime Union and the employers, which threatened to affect three coasts in the United States.

A last minute intervention by Arthur J. Goldberg, Labor Secretary, failed, altho mediation efforts, backed by a personal plea from President Kennedy, will continue, and it is hoped an agreement will be reached in short order.

It is stated that no foreign ships are involved in the walkout, and that as for general cargo, the impact would be relatively minor, since United States vessels handle less than 10 per cent of the country's water-borne commerce.

The main point on which the strike hinges is the insistence of the unions that the companies bargain not only for their United States flag ships, but also for a huge fleet of foreign-fleet vessels that American owners have registered under the "flags of convenience," such as Panama, Liberia and Honduras.

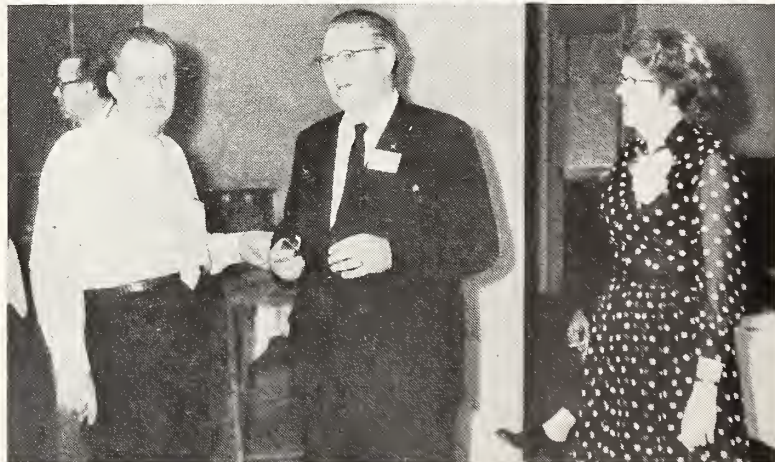
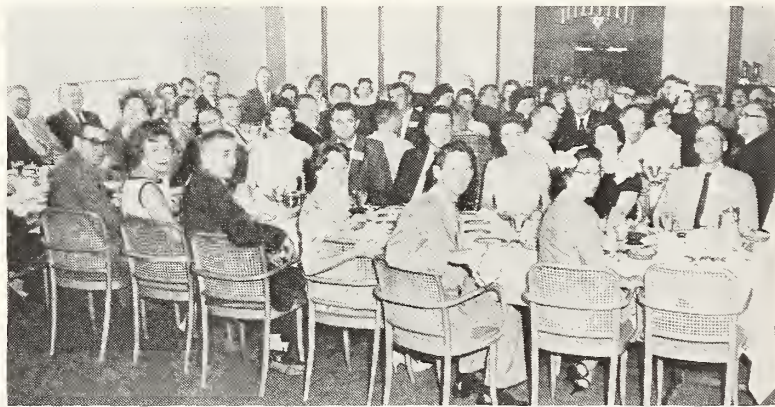
Robinson Hosts Ops At Rock-Ola Showing
