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PROGRES

What was probably the greatest gathering of record distributors and manufacturers met last week in Hollywood, Florida. After two days of business meetings, it should be apparent to all that ARMADA is needed more today than ever before. An industry beset by troubles discovered a haven to turn to — a haven that should have been organized ten years ago — but which is yet perhaps not too late today. ARMADA, measured by time, is but an infant. But it is a lusty infant that has already shown strength in its successful battle against bootlegging.

Going back in our memory some five to ten years ago, bootlegging was a taboo subject. The legal departments of both majors and indies proclaimed it a problem "impossible" to solve. "Nothing can be done about bootlegging and publicity will only educate more potential bootleggers," we were told.

However, along came ARMADA, too youthful — too inexperienced to know that it was "impossible" to cure — and proceeded to make tremendous strides towards its cure in the almost laughably short period of twelve to fifteen months.

In the last five years a new ill has beset the industry — transshipping. At first a nuisance, then a problem and now a terror, it was described by everyone as "impossible" to cure. Again ARMADA — too naive to know transshipping is impossible to cure — is going to launch a study of all its legal implications, avenues that may be open to combat it, campaign to amend the law if it needs amending, or failing in the latter to seek new legislation. **THIS IS GREAT PROGRESS.**

Without a doubt, this study will not be accomplished in one day. But having started in the right di-

rection is indeed sufficient for the existence. Having started, we ARMADA will find this difficult problem.

Other subjects of the trade were thrown into discussion and most assuredly receive study in depth.

To state that all progress expressed would be a wrong picture. Most are probably impressed. Many with courage of the manufacturers who helped place "transshipping" on the agenda and particularly who sat on the panel.


Others were hoped expressed the opinion that the enthusiasm engendered in Florida, would dissipate at the convention dispersed distributors and manufacturers their 48 different states.

A small number were probably pessimistic.

However, the great was enthusiastic and long last progress was. Our own impressions of tremendous progress has and will be made and has grown into a powerful and influential force.

The success of ARMADA certainly spur its growth. Non-members alike wish progress forged by those who have not should do so. Perhaps should be put aside and join and lend brains to alleviate serious threat to income and survival.

"RUNAROUND" (2:20) [Broadway ASCAP—Maresca]
"LAURA MY DARLING" (2:30) [Shoestring, Cousins BMI—Cuomo]
THE REGENTS (Gee 1071)

The Regents, who had a smasher off the bat with their Gee bow, "Barbara Ann," can duplicate that success with this 2nd effort for the label. It's a rock delighter, tabbed "Runaround" (not the same tune as the teen oldie), that sports much of the hit sounds of the initial platter. Terrific assist by the Milton DeLugg crew. Fellas devote a warm ballad stint to "Laura" on the other end.

"I WAKE UP CRYING (2:10) [Belinda CAPAC—Bacharach, David]
"EVERYBODY NEEDS LOVE" (2:02)
[Ludix BMI—Dixon, Elgin, Jackson]
CHUCK JACKSON (Wand 110)

Jackson, who now has a heap of two-market, pop-r&b chart experience via his "I Don't Want To Cry" and "In Real Life" sessions, can add to his Prestige with his newest for Wand, "I Wake Up Crying." It's a slow, steady beat dramatic affair that Chuck and the ork put across with telling effect. "Everybody Needs Love" is solid thumper that can also make it big.

"EVERY BREATH I TAKE" "MR. MOON, MR. CUPID AND I"
(2:40) [Aldon BMI—Goffin, King] (2:40) [January BMI—Pitney]
GENE PITNEY (Musicor 1011)

The talented vocalist-tunesmith, who has already cashed in chart-wise (with "I Wanna Love My Life Away" and "Louisiana Mama") can make it three-in-a-row with either end, or both, here. Artist packs loads of feeling into the emotional, slow, hard beat rock-a-cha-cha, "Every Breath I Take." "Mr. Moon, Mr. Cupid And I" is charming, Buddy Holly-like cha cha romancer. Like 'em both.

"LITTLE MISS BELONG TO NO ONE" (2:50)
[Cedarwood BMI—Walker]
"SEA SHELL" (2:25) [Willow ASCAP—Pandel, Haack, Kasap]
TERESA BREWER (Coral 62278)

The chirp, who was at her bubbly, bouncy best on her recent chart-rider, "Milord," does a complete turnabout here displaying her top drawer emotion ballad stylings. It's a tear-jerker, titled "Little Miss Belong To No One," that she renders in slow, sincere beat-ballad fashion. "Sea Shell" makes for a charming, Hawaiian-flavored companion piece. Fine assist by the Dick Jacobs ork-choral group.

"I'm So Happy (Tra La La)," a while-back territorial noise-maker for Louie Lymon, can make the grade on the national level this time around. Bright rock performance by the Ducanes, who take advantage of the current come-back of chant-spotlighted r&r decks. Can zoom up there in no time flat. Boys turn to an inviting affectionate on the reverse stanza.

"AGAIN" (2:01) [Robbins ASCAP—Cochran, Newman]
"THE BOY MOST LIKELY" (2:30)
[R&J, Wemar BMI—Berger, Regney]
THE CONCORDS (RCA Victor 7911)

The Concordes bow on Victor with a performance that's right up the teeners' alley. It's the evergreen, "Again," that gets the bubbly-voiced, up beat modernization treatment. It's chock full of the commercial tricks the kids dig. Teacho Wiltshire grabs arrangement credits. Appealing beat-ballad romancer flipside.

BUDDY GRECO (Epic 9451)

(B+) "AROUND THE WORLD" (2:26) [Liza ASCAP—Adamson, Young] Famed pic tune gets a bright, shuffle-beat swing run-through from the legit nitery performer. This hip version of the tune can succeed solidly with the jocks. Watch it.

(B) "HEY, THERE" (2:49)
[Frank ASCAP—Adler, Ross]
Another hip, this time Latinish swing go for the "Pajama Game" favorite.

BILLIE JEAN HORTON (20th Fox 266)

(B+) "OCEAN OF TEARS" (2:12)
[R&R BMI—Franks, Sims]
This tearful, slightly up beat shuffler is wrapped up in easy-on-the-ears fashion by the thrush and the ork chorus. Can get around with deejay exposure.

(B) "DON'T TAKE HIS LOVE" (2:22) [Magic Circle BMI—Franks, King] Billy Jean leans more to the c&w field on this heartfelt ballad coupler.

TOMMY FALCONE & THE CENTURIES (Design 841)

(B+) "SHIP-TO-SHORE" (2:14)
[Jeb & Top Ten BMI—D'Amato] Teeners get an intriguing rock attack from the combo, featuring solid-sounding high-pitched organ work. Sound can do big Top 100 business.

(B) "LIKE WEIRD" (2:06) [Jeb & Top Ten BMI—Falcone]
Off-beat Latinish rockin' here.

INEZ JOHNSTON (Brunswick 55128)

(B+) "A CHANGE OF HEART" (2:30) [Figure BMI—Williams, Noble] Inez Johnston demonstrates that she can handle a blues-ballad in first rate style. Feelingful job that rates loads of attention. Grade "A" ork-choral support by the Dick Jacobs outfit.

(B) "WHY DID YA!?" (2:32)
[Tricky BMI—Blagman, Rudolph] The chirp continues her splendid ballad sounds on this portion.

RONNIE HAYDON (Camay 2001)

(B+) "S.O.S. (I LOVE YOU)" (1:55) [Original BMI—Downs, Bova] Familiar Morse code distress signal opens this catchy rock-a-cha-cha affair that bows Ronnie Haydon on the new Camay label (distributed by Sinclair-Whale). Good assist by the Vinny Catalano crew.

(B) "TOO LATE" (2:10) [Original BMI—Richman] Backing's an up beat romantic weeper.

CASEY ANDERSON (Sutton 1939)

(B) "FREEDOM RIDER" (2:23)
[Brookhaven—Gotham BMI—Anderson] The fine new song stylist turns in a potent multi-track reading on an up-beat folk-blueser on a controversial topical entry that's sure to encounter airplay difficulty in certain locations.

(B) "THE GRIM REAPER" (2:15)
[Brookhaven—Gotham BMI—Anderson] Here Casey hands in another striking reading against a pounding piano-led backdrop. Watch this boy.

RAY RUFF (Norman 508)

(B+) "LOVE MADE A FOOL OF YOU" (1:45) [Nor-Va-Jak BMI—Holly, Montgomery] Intriguing "Bo Diddley"-like rhythm to this entry that bows Ray Ruff, who has a style reminiscent of the late Buddy Holly. Strong chorus-combo support.

(B) "MY WISH IS YOU" (2:15)
[Norman BMI—Tharp, Schooler] This pleasant romancer moves along at a quick beat clip. Label is based in St. Louis.

MARGARET LEWIS (Ram 2451)

(B+) "SOMETHIN'S WRONG BABY" (2:00) [Hip Hill BMI—Underwood] Both the songstress and combo do a bang-up blues-beat job here. Miss Lewis' solid belt receives a first-rate setting attack from the musicians. Well-worth teen programming.

(B) "JOHN DeLEE" (1:51)
[Magic Circle BMI—Baum, Franks] A catchy folk-type ditty is taken for a joyous ride by the lark and combo-chorus. Commercial merry-beat sound.

HENRY MOORE ORCH. (King 5513)

(B+) "DOIN' EVERYTHING" (2:25) [Lois BMI] Lots of up-beat teen steps, as the title suggests, can figure in this fine blues attack by the Moore ork, featured on Hank Ballard dates. There are some vocal comments. Solid hop idea.

(B) "THE BIG FROG" (2:19)
[Ha-Lo BMI—Ballard] Bouncy blues instrumental on this portion.

DALLAN LA ROC (Arteen 1001)

(B) "UNTIL" (2:03) [Futura ASCAP—Motola, Furth, Tinker] La Roc's debut under the new Arteen banner is a warm, ballad-with-a-beat stint that should snare deejay attention.

(B) "MARGO" (2:10) [Futura ASCAP—Motola, Furth, Tinker] The soft-voiced, chorus-backed chanter takes a pleasant cha cha beat route on this gal-titled outing.

THE FOUR LADS (Kapp 412)

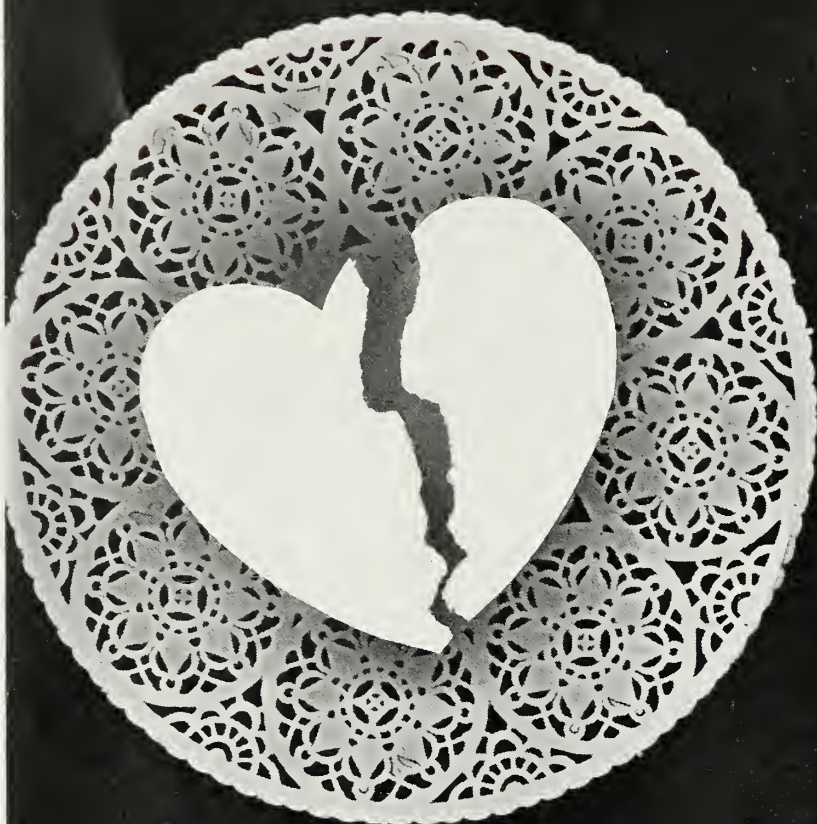
(B+) "GIUGGIOLA" (Joo-Joo-Lah) (2:24) [Comet ASCAP—Nisa, Cahn, Lojaco] The popular vocal crew do a sparkling account of an English version of the Italian ditty. A lively rock-slanted Joe Sherman-directed combo stint supports. Jocks will welcome the sound. The original Italian version, cut by Corrado Lojaco, is on Columbia, and Dean Martin also has a reading on Capitol.

(B) "OCEANS OF LOVE" (2:12)
[E. H. Morris ASCAP—Sigmam] A sprightly, continental backdrop backs the boys' reading of the catchy romantic. Also figures to make it with the deejays.

THE CALENDERS (Palace 104)

(B+) "WEEKEND" (2:30) [Seabreeze BMI—Pompilli, Beecher, Williamson] Teen-market musicians present a pro-sounding busy-beat bouncer. Kids should dig the session both as a dancetime (Lindy) and listening affair. Label hails from Philly.

(B) "HONG KONG" (2:22) [Palace BMI—Lee] As the title suggests, the fellas go rockin' with an Oriental-flavored approach.

THE JARMELS (Laurie 3098)

The group, having attracted territorial attention with their previous outing, "Little Lonely One," can really 'clean up' here. Side's a tantalizing, rock-a-string cha cha ditty, tabbed "A Little Bit Of Soap," that the artists wrap up in teen-appealing fashion. The standard is treated to an ear-arresting, tantalizing rock-a-cha cha format on the other half. Can make it, too.

"HURT" (2:28) [Miller ASCAP—Crane, Jacobs]

"I APOLOGIZE" (2:50) [Crawford ASCAP—Hoffman, Goodhart, Nelson]

TIMO YURO (Liberty 55343)

Here's a fine new talent whose name oughta be popping up all over the hits list in the weeks to come. She's Timi Yuro and her 'stepping stone' is a heartfelt, ballad-with-a-beat rendition of the touching torch'er, "Hurt." Gal's got the goods. Watch her stock soar. More of the same superb ballad sounds on the "I Apologize" revival.

BRIAN HYLAND
(ABC-Paramount 10236)

(B+) "LET ME BELONG TO YOU" (3:04) [East-West BMI—Udell, Geld] Hyland, who came thru with last-year's "Itsy Bitsy" chart-topper, can have a big one the first time out on ABC. Side's an ultra-lovely ballad that the songster puts across with touching sincerity.

(B+) "LET IT DIE!" (2:29) [Pogo BMI—Udell, Geld] This half features Brian in a rock-rhythm spotlite. It's a fast paced opus that can also move out real fast. Powerful two-sided assist by Stan Applebaum's ork-chorus.

LONNIE DONEGAN (Atlantic 2108)

(B+) "HAVE A DRINK ON ME" (2:44) [Folkways BMI—Led-better, Lomax, Lomax, Donegan, Buchanan] This is Donegan's hit English version of the charming folk tune, beginning to make noise here via the Buddy Thomas disk on Todd. Donegan and combo do the number infectiously, and deck could get action here.

(B) "BEYOND THE SUNSET" (2:33) [Robbins ASCAP—Brock, Brock] Performer does a tender vocal (plus narrative) on the heart warming oldie. Pretty ork-chorus sound supports.

JO ANN CAMPBELL
(ABC-Paramount 10224)

(B+) "EDDIE MY LOVE" (2:02) [Modern BMI—Collins, Davis, Ling] The years-back two-market Teen Queens sensation can make the chart go-round once again via this striking beat-ballad up-dating by the lark.

(B+) "IT WASN'T RIGHT" (2:25) [Marielle BMI—Barrett] This fetching love affair, also from the beat-ballad school, can also come thru.

THE SENSATIONS (Argo 5391)

(B+) "MUSIC, MUSIC, MUSIC" (2:45) [Cromwell ASCAP—Weiss, Baum] The old Teresa Brewer hit gets an effective upbeat R&B-slanted translation from the vocal crew, featuring fine femme lead Yvonne. The original-line referring to juke-boxes, "Put another nickel in" has "nickel" changed to "dime" here. Could make noise.

(B+) "A PART OF ME" (2:30) [BMI—Harrison] Same thrush heads the inviting slow-beat romantic. Group had the while-back hit "Yes Sir, That's My Baby."

THE FIVE STARS
(Columbia 42056)

(B+) "BLABBER MOUTH" (2:12) [Gil BMI—Gordy, Gordy, Carlo] A very well-done novelty attack on the order of The Coasters' classic, "Yakety-Yak." Blabber mouth gimmicks are a solid laff idea, and a muted trumpet makes a rare rock appearance. A fun romp that could catch-on.

(B) "BABY, BABY" (2:32) [Real Gone BMI—Carlo, Gordy] Distinctive R&B-ballad blend by the songsters.

THE CHANTELS (Carlton 555)

(B+) "GLAD TO BE BACK" (2:33) [Atlantic BMI—Barrett] Larks, longtime teen-market favorites, start their Carlton career with a strong string-backed romantic rhythmic. This striking session should be eyed closely.

(B) "LOOK IN MY EYES" (2:23) [Bea-Junior BMI—Barrett] Gals offer a more deliberate-rock ballad sound on this half.

LESLIE UGGAMS (Columbia 42055)

(B) "HE DOESN'T KNOW" (2:23) [Paramount ASCAP—Brooks, Warren] Label's fine lark talent admirably essays an attractive ballad from the new Jerry Lewis flick, "The Ladies Man." Stan Applebaum directs a good-sounding lush rock-a-cha (& chorus) sound. Classy cut for the jocks.

(B) "I LOVE HIM" (2:41) [Pogo ASCAP—Udell, Geld] A softer statement on another worthy romantic. Full ork-chorus backing is straight-forward. Deejays also note.

THE SALVADORS (Nike 1010)

(B) "DADDY SAID" (2:07) [Ludix BMI—Dixon, Denson] This sequel to the Shirelles' hit "Mama Said," puts pop in the spotlite. Fellas hand in a flavorful reading of the tune with the same format as the click.

(B) "A-E-I-O-U" (2:35) [Anthr BMI—Salvadors] The vowels take on a romantic word meaning on this inviting rock-a-shuffle opus. Diskery is based in Chicago.

MIRRIAM JOHNSON (Jamie 1193)

(B+) "I THINK I CRIED LONG ENOUGH OVER YOU" (2:55) [Linduane BMI—Johnson] Rousing country-styled rock-a-string-backed statement from the lark. Part of the setting sound includes a hopping sax. Solid-sounding rockin'.

(B+) "MAKING BELIEVE" (2:44) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Work] The pretty, awhile country hit is attractively multi-tracked by the lark.

ANDREA CARROLL (Epic 9450)

(B+) "PLEASE DON'T TALK TO THE LIFE GUARD" (1:58) [Joy ASCAP—Dee, Goering] Original-sounding rock-a-cha novelty about a gal who wants like to meet the life-guard, but can't because of the title sign (she decides, however, that she'll have him rescue her). Could get important summertime spins.

(B) "ROOM OF MEMORIES" (2:36) [Merimac BMI—Kasha, Ott] Lark hands-in a pleasant plaintive warble.

THE CLOVERS (Winley 255)

(B+) "LET ME HOLD YOU" (2:20) [Ninny-Ethel Byrd—Winley] Vet vocalists offer a good-sounding easy-beat blueser, with an effective upfront pose from the lead. Funky guitar tops the combo sound. Diskery is New York based.

(B) "WRAPPED UP IN A DREAM" (2:02) [BMI—Doe-Ri-Me] Same lead does a reliable teen-romantic stint on the pleasing lovey-dovey.

STU PHILLIPS (Colpix 603)

(B+) "LOVE THEME FROM THE GUNS OF NAVARONE (YASSU)" (2:34) [Columbia ASCAP—Washington, Tiomkin] The Malcolm Dodds Singers join the Phillips crew in ear-pleasing sans lyrics chant fashion on this rhumba-like version of the theme from the big flick. Enchanting slice with the alto-sax leading the way. A platter spinner must.

(B) "TROPICAL SUMMER" (2:49) [Suwal BMI—Phillips] This soft bolero affair befits the tune's title.

BOBBY HENDRICKS
(Mercury 71810)

(B+) "GOOD LOVIN'" (2:30) [Raleigh BMI—Kirkland, Taylor, Jesmet] Lots of slick rhythmic-rock color here. Songster knocks-out the blues ditty against an exciting rock-a-string (& chorus) backdrop.

(B) "HONEY DRIP" (2:10) [Raleigh BMI—Otis] Good-natured string-included blues bouncer from the songster. Squealing gal is part of the merry-rock accompaniment, which opens with a soft string sound.

CARA STEWART (Top Rock 003)

(C) "SMACK-A-ROO" (2:10) [Ethel Bert ASCAP—Hilton, Hudson] Lark tops a rockin' blueser.

(C) "MISTY GREEN EYES" (3:02) [Ethel Bert ASCAP—Hilton, Hudson] Slow-paced romantic.

THE BARDS (Cueca 1038)

(B) "YELLOW BIRD" (2:38) [Keith, Bergman, Luboff] Folk vocalists nicely deliver the current Arthur Lyman (HiFi) instrumental click. Worthy lyric reading of the lovely tune.

(B) "UNICORN SONG" (1:30) [James E. Kirchstein BMI—Dybdahl] Rousing folk ditty about the birth of the song.

ROY JACKSON (Moonglow 203)

(B) "MONICA" (2:03) [Popular ASCAP—Graves, Feyne] A true-love name-song receives a good-sounding rock-a-cha arrangement, headed by nice vocal from songster Jackson. Kids will dig the brisk-beat sentiments. Firm is located in Hollywood.

(C+) "LOVE AT FIRST SIGHT" (2:30) [Ray Maxwell BMI—Reven, King, Maxwell] Bouncy teen affectionate.

JANIE JONES (Jama 501)

(B+) "MY FIRST ROMANCE" [Beechwood BMI—Lehr] Cozy vocal by the lark on an inviting vehicle that seems like it was adapted from a PD tune. Combo-chorus is semi-dramatic. Could move. Label is based in Hollywood.

(B) "DEAR DIARY" [Beechwood BMI—London] Another soft-beat essay.

THE ARC-ANGELS (Lan-Cet 142)

(B+) "LITTLE WHEEL" (2:01) [Podolor BMI—Kisling] Lots of beat color to this trigger-fast "oldie" sound delivery from the songsters. Musicians tag-along with a pro teen sense. Youngsters will dig the energy of this entry from the Maywood, Calif. label.

(B) "GODDESS" (2:19) [Podolor BMI—Kisling, Randall] A feelingfully done teen-ballad with strings.

MIKE RONCONE ORCH.
(Capitol 4589)

(B+) "JUNK YARD" (2:01) [Fiore BMI—Roncone, Roncone] The Roncone musicians deliver-the-rock-goods with a solid Bill Black Combo-like shuffle-beat touch. Organ is included amid the guitar-sax-percussion rockin'.

(B) "TRAIN RIDE" (2:27) [Fiore BMI—Roncone] A lighter choo-choo teen sound from the ensemble.

MAD MIKE & THE MANIACS (Hunch 345)

(B+) "QUARTER TO FOUR" (2:18) [December BMI—Pow-er, Martin] Lots of excitement packed into this rousing sequel to U.S. Bonds' "Quarter To Three." It's a swinging vocal and instrumental handclapper that can break wide open a la the Bonds hit.

(B) "THE HUNCH" (1:37) [December BMI—Porcelli, Columbe] Here Mike and the Maniacs really go mad as they pound out a wild 'dance step' entry.

JANIE BLACK (Capitol 4592)

(B+) "I'M GONNA MAKE IT HAPPEN" (2:05) [Bourne ASCAP—Ballard, Jr., Tobias] Thrush, who previously appeared with sister Jeanne Black, takes her first solo run here. Side's an engaging rock-a-cha love affair that looks like a winner. Stick with it.

(B) "I STOLE YOU AWAY" (1:56) [Joy, ASCAP—Dee, Goehring] This end Jeanne dual-tracks her way thru a strong shuffle-rock outing. Excellent support, on both halves, by the Perry Botkin, Jr. ork-chorus.

THE TODDS (Todd 1064)

(B+) "TENNESSEE" (2:00) [Wonder, Achlen BMI—Russell, Cason] This one, with a sock-rock novelty intro (a la "Blue Moon") can put the artists all over the hit map. Group, with falsetto male-like voices, happily runs thru this quick beat, finger-snapping thumper. Fetching item that can take off.

(B) "MAY WE ALWAYS" (2:35) [Wonder, Conmar BMI—Russell, Willis] Here the Todds do a complete about-face turning in a warm ballad performance. Jay-Gee distribs the label.

THE 3 FRIENDS (Imperial 5763)

(B+) "DEDICATED (To The Songs I Love)" (2:15) [Travis & Escort BMI—Smith, Goldsmith] The titles of hit tunes cleverly make-up the lyrics of this contagious R&B-styled rocker from the song crew. A very good-sounding teen laff deck.

(B) "HAPPY AS A MAN COULD BE" (2:34) [Travis & Escort BMI—Smith, Goldsmith] Lead and combo-lark chorus pound away with an engaging blues approach.

RAY CHARLES (Atlantic 2106)

(B+) "AM I BLUE" (3:03) [Witmark ASCAP—Clarke, Akst] The great artist supplies that "Georgia" tenderness to the fine oldie, receiving a lovely string-filled back-drop. Jocks may give the take—from the "Genius of Ray Charles" LP—chart-hitting exposure.

(B) "IT SHOULD'VE BEEN ME" (2:34) [Progressive BMI—Curtis] Narrative sections are included in this solid swing-blueser.

KEYTONES (Chelsea 1002)

(B+) "DON'T TELL WILLIAM" (2:06) [Pacemaker BMI—Antell] This captivating funky instrumental affair (with a Duane Eddy flavor) by the Keytones—featuring Jimmy Promonte & the Billy Costa ork has solid chart merit. Title pokes rock fun at the take-off on Rossini's "William Tell Overture."

(B+) "PARKING FIELD 4" (2:00) [Erwin—HOWARD ASCAP Promonte, Orofino] More top instrumental sounds on this session from the Ventures' "Walk, Don't Run" up beat instrumental school. Label's based in N.Y.

DON ROBERTSON (RCA Victor 7909)

(B+) "TENNESSEE WALTZ" (2:42) [Acuff—Rose BMI—Stewart, King] The years-back Patti Page triumph can be a big chart item for Don Robertson, whose piano & ork chorus performs lovely in warm, Floyd Cramer—"Last Date"—like manner. Watch it closely.

(B+) "FEATHER IN THE WIND" (3:18) [Ross Jungnickel ASCAP—Robertson, Blair] This pretty sentimental-romantic finds Don in the inviting vocal spotlight. Jocks'll love 'em both.

RAY SMITH (Infinity 007)

(B+) "LET YOURSELF GO" (2:15) [Fame—Spartus BMI—Hall, Penn] Smith can head back to hitsville with his very exciting reading of this enticing rock-a-rhythmic. Sock ork-choral arrangement dished up by Bill Justis.

(B+) "JOHNNY THE HUMMER" (2:15) [Bloor H. H. BMI—Fuller] Another fascinating entry is the cute rocker that's sure to keep the kids jumpin'. Hot two-sider.

BILL GIANT (MGM 13020)

(B+) "BETTER LET HER GO" (2:40) [Aberbach BMI—Giant, Baum, Kaye] Giant can have a huge sales success with his MGM debut. It's a tear-compelling teen beat cha cha romancer that Bill and the ork-chorus deliver with money-making authority.

(B+) "WHEN I GROW TOO OLD TO DREAM" (1:59) [Robbins ASCAP—Hammerstein, Romberg] Here Bill and the accompanists flavorfully shuffle thru an appealing updating of the evergreen.

PAUL PEEK (Fairlane 21005)

(B+) "WATERMELON" (2:03) [Kenny Marlow & Wonder BMI—Cason, Moon] Infectious R&B flavored salute to the summertime favorite. Singer Peek belts against a fine busy-beat sound from the hopping sax-led combo-chorus. Could catch-on. Label is the King Records' affiliate.

(B) "COMING HOME IN THE MORNING" (2:02) [Lowery BMI—Stevens] Bouncy-beat item with a catchy touch.

EDDY HOWARD (Mercury 71773)

(B) "JUST A YEAR AGO TONIGHT" (2:35) [DeSylva, Brown & Henderson ASCAP—David, Rose] The songster, of "It's No Sin" and "Careless" fame, returns to the wax scene with an attractive straight waltzer in which he begins to vocal about a half-way down. This cut can click in juke-boxes catering to adult patrons.

(B) "I WANT YOU TO WANT ME TO WANT YOU" (2:25) [Fred Fisher ASCAP—Fisher, Schafer, Bryan] Same juke-box comment applies to this softie, too.

THE PETITES (Columbia 42053)

(B) "A LITTLE LOVE" (2:17) [Sherman & DeVorzon BMI—DeVorzon] Gals turn-in an appealing portrayal of the attractive teen lovey-dovey. Combo support is nicely soft-spoken. Merits teen spins.

(B) "MAKING MIRACLES" (2:08) [Artists ASCAP—Hooven, Dunham] Team goes after a tuneful and well-worded romantic sunny. Engaging bounce to this date.

MIRI CLAIRE (Amy 826)

(B+) "UNCHAINED MELODY" (3:00) [Frank ASCAP—North, Zaret] The durable receives a build-up rendition from the lark, who at first receives a dirge-like sound from the ork. Watch it.

(B) "I'LL BE SEEING YOU" (2:33) [Williamson ASCAP—Kahal, Fain] Straight romantic handling of the evergreen.

JAYE BROS. (Strand 25047)

(B+) "HAPPY ENDING" (2:15) [Wyndham-Pompador BMI—Stallman, Jacobson] Tuneful rock-a-cha romantic about a happy-ending only from the gal's point-of-view is done with a bright approach by the songsters, who are ably assisted by a gal chorus. Effective sax statements in the combo arrangement. Should get good exposure.

(B) "GOODBYE" (2:10) [We Three BMI—Stallman, Jacobson] Team and backing stay on the rock upbeat in this take.

THE CAVALRY MEN (United Artists 330)

(B) "BATTLE CRY" (2:00) [Kryder BMI—Iannopolo, Fratto, Consoli, Dunham] Growling sax and guitar section do an effective sock stint on "Battle Hymn of the Republic." Opening and closing sounds feature gun-shots.

(B) "CHANG CHANG CHA CHA" (2:23) [Unart BMI—Iannopolo, Fratto, Consoli, Dunham] "Ole Solo Mio" becomes a good-sounding rock-a-cha vehicle.

THE TRUETONES (Felsted 8625)

(B) "SINGING WATERS" (2:06) [Robert Mellin BMI—Lorber, Dixon] Attractive Latinish romantic sound from the vocalists, sporting a good lead, and the steady upbeat combo. Session done with the kids well-in-mind.

(B) "BLUSHING BRIDE" (2:11) [Bourne ASCAP—Henderson] Somewhat softer rock ballad sounds with a South-of-the-Border influence.

ROD BERNARD (Mercury 71842)

(B+) "SOMETIME (Tell Me)" (2:24) [Grand Prize BMI—Thommasson] Soulful teen warbly by the singer, who is backed by a light-bounce combo stint which includes a "sad" sax sound.

(B) "I'M NOT LONELY ANYMORE" (2:26) [Big Bopper BMI—Woodard] Softie sound again on a countryish plaintive. Same sax sound.

THE BOUNTY HUNTERS (Huron 22001)

(B+) "WHITE FEATHER" (1:24) [Dove-Raleigh, McQuinn] Haunting theme receives a striking guitar-led attack from the musicians. Type of colorful rock instrumental that could happen. Label is handled by Lodestar Records.

(B+) "ECHO EXPRESS" (1:55) [Dove-Raleigh, McQuinn] After a short slow-beat start, the format is a romp—and an effective one. Two exciting sessions.

PHIL & MARIE (Sway 902)

(B+) "LOVE DOCTOR" (2:03) [Li Philben & Kansoma BMI—Davis, Tate] Song duo does an exciting R&B-slanted job on the rockin' romancer. Pair's stint is supported by a strong combo romp. Can get action in both pop-R&B areas. Label is an affiliate of Washington D.C.'s Empire Records.

(B) "THANK YOU MY DEAR" (2:07) [Li Philben & Kansoma BMI—Davis, Tate] Funky sound from the vocalists and backing.

ROSIE'S BABY DOLLS (Fargo 1017)

(B+) "I SHOULD HAVE KNOWN" (2:11) [Mills ASCAP—Insetta] Young larks amiably do a light upbeat blend on an oldie romancer. Full ork and now-and-then deep male voice help out. Many jocks will spin.

(B) "IN BETWEEN (Wishing I Was Sixteen)" (2:20) [Southern ASCAP—Insetta] Apt easy-beat theme from the youngsters.

THE DREAMLOVERS (Heritage 337)

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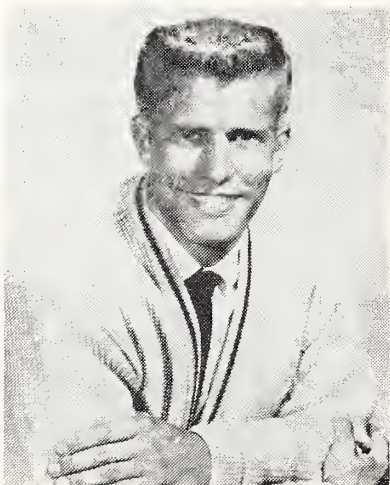
The Fireballs

ALL ABOUT DISK JOCKEYS

The doors to the new Mid-America Broadcast Center, home of WGN radio and TV (Chicago) since January, were officially opened last week at day-long ceremonies. The center, reputed to be the country's newest and largest radio-TV building, was opened by J. Howard Wood, president of WGN, and dedicated in a speech by LeRoy Collins, president of the National Assoc. of Broadcasters. The two story building contains over 100,000 square feet of floor space and is situated on a 13-acre site just fifteen minutes from downtown Chicago. It contains four TV studios, two radio studios and sufficient office space for all administrative functions. Included is a revolving stage for the production of live or videotape commercials. At present one of the country's leading color TV stations, WGN will eventually be an all-color TV operation, according to Wood.

Bill Bennett has inaugurated a "Knobby Knees Klub" on his nine-to-noon slot over WLOL-Minneapolis inviting wives and girl friends to send in names of husbands, boy friends, etc. who would qualify for membership. Bill makes a daily drawing for a prize. The prize?—A pair of Bermuda shorts, what else? . . . WINS-New York is hiding portable radios tuned to its signal throughout its listening area (in bushes, on trees, etc.) As soon as a radio is placed in location the deejay on the air at the time broadcasts the location. Whoever finds it is entitled to keep the radio. WINS' "Finders Keepers" contest is being held in conjunction with Portable Radio Month. . . . WINY-Putnam, Conn. is now in full swing in the northeastern Connecticut area with a staff that includes Lew Rogers, Stan Teed, Frank Carrol and Steve May. . . . Up to The Cash Box offices for a cordial visit last week was Russ Morton of WSOQ-Syracuse. Morton is program director for the "Sound of Quality" station and also handles the morning wake-up stanza.

Preparing for the big October blood drive in which they hope to top the 2,295 pint record set recently by Michigan State Univ., the boys at O.L.A., and Al "Flat Top" Daly in particular, send out an urgent request to all disk jockeys and artists for 30 and 60 second "encouragement" tapes to be broadcast on the "local" station. Those of you familiar with O.L.A. need no more than a reminder to get working on the tapes as soon as possible to insure a spot on the broadcasts. . . . George Gregg has gone poolside for KSO-Des Moines for the summer. His noon-to-three PM show is being conducted actually from the studio but water splashing and crowd sound effects indicate the contrary to his listeners, even to an occasional "boing, boing" from a mythical diving board. . . . Boom Boom Branigan, top rated DJ at WPTR-Albany, N.Y. writes that his show has been responsible for the sale of hundreds of radios—his mother sold hers, his brother sold his, etc.

Launching a stepped-up public service program with a National Foundation March of Dimes tie-in, KFVB-Los Angeles took the lead in promoting the polio vaccine program being emphasized for the next few months. Special spot announcements, created and produced by Chuck Blore (Crowell-Collier VP & PD), Bill Angel (asst. VP of programming) and Gary Owens (PD of sister station KEWB-Oakland), have been programmed on an intensive schedule June 1 and will continue through the end of August on all three Crowell-Collier stations, including KDWB-Minneapolis. An unusual aspect of the campaign was the cooperation of a local television outlet not affiliated with KFVB. KTTV's top newscaster George Putnam filmed a spot with Debbie Reynolds and recorded the sound track which was turned over to KFVB for its use. The track was recorded by KFVB and distributed to all other radio stations in the southern California area.

A special request to all diskeries for disk service goes out from Pvt. Jack Reno of the Information Office (Radio & TV Dept.) of Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. The office tapes the "Ft. Wood Show," which is heard on 30 different radio stations each week. Jockeys for the service are Reno, a former deejay with KCKN-Kansas City; Ron Shable, Art Mann and Kirk Justice, formerly with KAJI-Little Rock, Ark. . . . Mike Forney of KMOM-Great Falls, Mont., writes that despite the station's past years success with local hops (200 in 1,000 mile radius in 3 years), attendance has fallen off sharply. The cure, according to Mike is live talent and he would appreciate knowing what artists are available for bookings through the year. . . . With the recent KDKA "Sing-Along" a huge success, the Pittsburgh station is planning similar events for July 15 and August 10. The 1st sing-along marked the debut of the Off-Keys, consisting of deejays Art Pallan, Clark Race, Jim Williams and Bob Tracey, and proved so surprisingly successful that, with Bob Trow as vocal coach, the quartet will be heard at various public events as well as the future sing-alongs.

Top Ten Dance Party, the syndicated live teenage TV series, is running a special dance contest for prom dates. Set up in conjunction with MGM (negotiated by MGM's Sol Handwerger and TTDP's Alan Sands), the aim of the contest is to promote the new MGM LP, "Get Ready For The Prom" on the various Top Ten Dance Party programs. . . . WWDC-Washington, D.C. is providing plenty of provisions for 4th of July picnickers "provided they present proof that it's a perpetual picnic to listen to the programs and personalities on WWDC." The winners, giving reasons in 25 words or less, receive a transistor radio, ice bucket, charcoal grill and food for six including steaks and trimmings. Winner of the Picnic Party will have to provide his own ants.

New Jockey Johnny Brantley to have his own daily, 12:00-6:00 A.M. show, over WBNX-N.Y., starting Mon.-midnite, July 10. Show'll be rhythm & blues all the way. . . . "Fat" Pat Patterson, WAMS, Wilmington, Delaware, has joined the growing ranks of disc jockey-artists. Pat's first disk on Dandy Records, "That'll Be The Day", is already on the area charts. The flip side is "It's So Easy", another Buddy Holly revival. Pat's platform . . . he's helping his mother thru college, or if you don't like the record, buy it and break it.

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More Than 600 Attend ARMADA Meet

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—More than 600 persons chalked up the heaviest turnout in ARMADA's three-year history at the annual convention at the Diplomat Hotel here. The entire tenor of the convention was one of serious business, with the capacity sign in evidence at the two general sessions as well as the series of six symposiums which were held for the first time at this meeting.

Art Talmadge, United Artists Records vice-president and general manager, was given a unanimous vote of confidence for the outstanding performance of the association during the past year, and he, and the other officers who served during the year,

were unanimously returned to office for a second term. These include Bob Chatton, vice-president; Nelson Verbit, secretary, and Harry Schwartz, treasurer.

Highlights of the two-day confab included a comprehensive report to the entire membership by Sigmund Steinberg, legal counsel for the association, on the fight against counterfeiting and legal activities conducted by his office during the past year. Included was complete coverage of the Hackensack case which was successfully concluded last month when the first convictions in this area were handed down in a criminal court, with two jail sentences imposed, and the initiation of new legislation at both the state, (California) and federal levels.

Appearance of Congressman Emanuel Celler, New York, as the featured speaker at the closing banquet further stressed the status gained by ARMADA during the past year when the Congressman lauded the work of the association in the fight against counterfeiting, pledged his full assistance in the fight ahead, and publicly commended Talmadge and the association for having conducted such a vigorous and successful campaign against this "cancerous" practice, thereby benefitting an entire industry.

Nationwide interest in the convention was displayed when CBS carried a coast-to-coast radio program of the opening session of the convention, and

the major news services, news magazines and local press covered all proceedings in full, the first time such complete coverage has been given a music industry convention of this nature.

Two major symposiums covered the Detroit price situation on packaged goods, moderated by Irwin Fink, All-State Distributing, New Jersey, in which the pros and cons of this move were aired, with opinion well divided on holding a price or offering across-the-board price cuts to aid smaller dealers, and a second discussion which started out to cover disk jockey promotion but covered all areas of the industry before it was concluded. A statement by Goldie Goldmark relative to the import of cheap tape recorders and the threat they posed to record sales was still being discussed when the convention ended.

Also on the agenda were the airing of problems in inventory control, with Nelson Verbit as moderator; Problems of transshipping with Sigmund Steinberg, moderator; and Sales Incentive programs under the direction of Al Bennett.

On the lighter side were appearances by Woody Woodbury at the Monday night dinner, and Pat Harrington, who worked Tuesday night. United Artists took over a Miami Beach theater Monday midnight to hold the first preview showing of the new Ingrid Bergman—Yves Montand—Tony Perkins film, "Goodbye Again."

Transshipping Flares Tempers At ARMADA

Panel; Several Avenues Suggested By Members

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—Transshipping blew the roof off the convention hall as the incendiary subject was brought to the floor for discussion the first day of the 1961 ARMADA Convention last week at the Diplomat Hotel.

Tempers were lost, names were called and specifics stated. Distributors placed the blame directly in the laps of the manufacturers and, in reverse, manufacturers stated almost unanimously that it was wholly a distributor problem—having been started by distributors in the first place.

Amos Heilicher, Heilicher Bros., Inc., admitted to being a transshipper and called 95% of the distributors present transshippers. But he asked that something be done about it. Harry Schwartz, Schwartz Bros., called transshippers "crooks—thieves" and threatened to drop any line that did not back him up in his territory.

Bill Shockett, Malverne, asked manufacturers not to support the rack jobber, blaming transshipping on the lust for profits by unethical distributors and the unrealistic allocations by manufacturers, which causes a distributor to look to other territories to dispose of his surplus.

Jimmy Martin, also on the panel, blamed excessive allocations and called for the manufacturer to get rid of transshippers by whatever means and excuses that could be dreamed up. Ewart Abner, Vee Jay; Al Bennett, Liberty, and Bernie Lowe, Cameo, fended off the verbal thrust by repeating their legal position and by suggesting that distributors clean their own house.

At one time during the heated discussions, Archie Bleyer, Cadence, called for legal research to establish proper means to solve the problem and deplored the lack of harmony between the distributor and manufacturer. Bill Shockett then assured Bleyer that clearing the air was a healthy thing for the industry and that distributors and manufacturers would leave the room without taking with them the acrimony that prevailed during the discussion.

Shockett revealed that, after several discussions with the New York office of the FTC he was proceeding with the defense of two suits against himself. One by an out of town retailer and one by a New York retailer to establish the legal position of selling at different prices.

Joe Sinsheimer, Allen Dist. Co., told of his having obtained signed letters from distributors all over the Southern territories to the FTC, asking them to investigate the price structure that permitted lower prices to racks and one-stops. Shockett, Martin, Heilicher and Sinsheimer predicted a dire future if transshipping were not halted.

Sigmund H. Steinberg, legal counsel for ARMADA, who moderated the panel, closed the session pointing out that legal difficulties stood in the way of an easy solution, expressed doubt that the FTC would provide succor through the Sinsheimer approach, and suggested that his first, if retained for the coming year, will do extensive research into the existing legal paths of new or amended legislation.

Columbia Convention Coup In Rush Pressing

HOLLYWOOD, FLA. — Columbia Records' pressing division in Bridgeport, Conn., scored a major coup at the ARMADA Convention here when it picked up the coast-to-coast broadcast of the opening session, mastered the first ten minutes of the event in Bridgeport, pressed the records and air-expressed them to the convention for distribution. It all took place within a 22-hour span and became one of the most sought-after momentoes of the affair.

Peggy Lee To Europe

HOLLYWOOD—Peggy Lee left this week for a two-month combined p.a. and pleasure tour of Europe. It will be her first trip across the Atlantic.

Highlights of the tour will be a July 17-August 8 engagement at the Pigalle Club in London and an August 18 appearance at the Monte Carlo Gala, the annual Red Cross Charity for Princess Grace and Prince Ranier of Monaco. Last year another Capitol artist, Nat King Cole, starred in the show.

While in England, Miss Lee will tape a TV spec titled "An Evening With Peggy Lee" which is skedded for later show in Britain and tentatively the U.S. Upon return to the U.S. in Sept., the singer will tape NBC-TV's "Happy With The Blues," a musical tribute to composer Harold Arlen. It is reported to be one of the network's biggest Fall specials.

Accompanying Miss Lee on the trip are her daughter Nikki, her sister Mrs. Marion Ringuerette and four musicians—Stan Levy, Victor Feldman, Dennis Boudimer and Max Bennett.

Detroit Distrib Price Cuts Discussed At ARMADA Special Panel

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—The "Detroit Situation," which had caused considerable trade comment since being reported in *The Cash Box* three weeks ago, was considered of such vital importance to ARMADA members that it was installed as a special panel discussion substitute at the ARMADA conclave here last week.

John Kaplan, head of Jay Kay Distributors, Detroit, clarified his position on the move that cut prices to dealers in order that they may compete against widespread rack-jobber inroads in the area. Kaplan, who was the first Detroit distributor to cut dealer prices—and was followed by other distributors in the area—said his move was triggered by the "threat" of losing 30 important outlets in the city to Handleman Drug, which, through lower rack-jobber prices, was reported to be about to rack the chain of Grinnell stores. Kaplan cut wholesale package prices from its original \$2.47 to the rack-jobber price of \$2.25. The stores stayed with Kaplan and other distributors immediately followed suit for fear of losing their outlets to the racks.

The ARMADA panel attempted to bring attention to the "poor pricing" structure that enables rack-jobbers to pay less for the product than distributors. The panel asked to get the "water" out of the price by possibly changing list prices and lowering the mark up. Manufacturers present fought this suggestion on grounds that the dis-

counters will still cut prices and the cycle will start all over again.

Henry Droz, Arc Distributors, Detroit, outlined the function of a distributor and recognized the rack-jobber and one-stop as a sub-distributor and noting that there was a place for them but not as competition to the regular distributors. Droz claimed that the whole cost position in the industry is a "fictitious" one and that it should definitely be changed. He feels that the new low price instituted by Detroit distributors is the only way they can salvage and maintain the dealer.

It is important to note that none of the Detroit distributors felt that the price cut was a cure-all but that it certainly has helped stem the mass exodus of dealers to the rack-jobbers for the time being.

Home Taping A Threat To Profits, Says Goldmark

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—Goldie Goldmark threw a "bombshell" into the ARMADA convention when he advised the gathering of an impending electronic development that could "destroy the record business." "A foreign firm, going on the American Stock Exchange, will release, within the next six months a tape recording machine that will sell for \$9.75. Over 2,500,000 sets are now in the homes, taping all the current single and album releases, and 15,000,000 more, it is estimated, will be sold within three months after the new set is released."

"15,000,000 new bootleggers will be taping our releases from records which we have given free to the stations. So the net result is that we sell no records, not ever those supplying the music to the bootleggers," said Goldmark.

"We don't know how much the present 2,500,000 million tape machine owners are cutting into our sales, but we do know that some have the temerity to call the stations and complain because announcers are talking over the music, spoiling their taping," stated Goldmark. He suggested that ARMADA investigate this situation and take its case to the F.C.C. "This can be beaten," said Goldmark, "if a signal is sent out by the station which is inaudible to the human ear, but which will scramble the reception when taped."

Goldmark also suggested that "we can refuse to license radio stations to play our records," but this would be the more drastic action, since while it restricts taping, it cuts off promotion.

George Lee Exits Zodiac, Palette Records

NEW YORK—George Lee disclosed last week that he is selling his interests in Zodiac Music (BMI), Compton Music (ASCAP) and Palette Records to Felix Faecq and Jacques Kluger. Lee had been associated with Faecq and Kluger in these firms for the past five years and had been instrumental in their activation. Lee did not divulge his future plans but indicated he would "have something tangible" within the next few weeks.

Lee, a former singer with stints in the Stan Kenton and Buddy Morrow bands in the mid-Forties, previously was associated with Mellin Music as west coast representative. He worked in that capacity for the nine years 1946-55 before activating Zodiac.

Competitive Conclave

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—At the conclusion of the ARMADA Convention here a committee was appointed to select a series of categories which will be eligible for special ARMADA awards at next year's conclave. Ewart Abner, who was appointed to chair the committee, said that categories to be named will be announced to the membership shortly.

N.Y. NARAS Names Nesuhi Ertegun Prexy

NEW YORK—Nesuhi Ertegun, vice-president of Atlantic Records, was elected president of the New York Chapter of the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences (NARAS) by the organization's Board of Governors at its recent meeting. Elected at the same time were Alan Kayes to the post of vice-president, Henri Rene as secretary, and Billy Taylor as treasurer. John Stevenson was re-elected as executive vice-president.

In accordance with the NARAS constitution, four more members were elected by the Board in addition to the quartet named as chief officers. Julian "Cannonball" Adderly was elected to fill Taylor's spot in the musicians' category, while the three-at-large honors went to Is Horowitz, Mickey Kapp, and Gunther Schuller. All except Horowitz are newly-elected members to the Board.

In addition, the Board proposed the names of various members to serve on its membership, publication, education and publicity committees. Final lists of these committees will be released upon proposed members' acceptances.

Continuing in their respective capacities are George T. Simon as executive director, Lillian Tookman as executive secretary, and Butler, Jablow & Geller as legal counsel.

Flavor Not Lost

HOLLYWOOD—Lonnie Donegan's recording of "Does The Chewing Gum Lose Its Flavor On The Bedpost Overnight," a number one hit in England a few years ago which was released on Dot in the U.S. two years ago, apparently is still flavorful to some people.

According to Dot prexy Randy Wood, a disk jockey in Boston gave it a "Record of the Week" award on his program two weeks ago and caused renewed interest in the disk. Wood said that Boston distributors initially ordered 17,500 and then reordered an additional 10,000 last week.

Letter To FTC Circulated By Distrib

HOLLYWOOD, FLA. — At the ARMADA convention here last week Joe Sinsheimer of Allen Distributors, Richmond, Va., circulated a letter to be sent to the FTC which he requested be signed by distributors. The letter calls attention to "unfair" price preferences which exist in the industry, and also to the "unfair" competitive advantage of the record clubs over retailer and distributor, and urges the FTC to investigate these practices.

The letter is reprinted in its entirety below:

Mr. Albert Seidman
Federal Trade Commission
Room 2904, U. S. Court House
New York, New York
Dear Sir:

I most urgently request the Federal Trade Commission to investigate the unfair trade practices that exist in the phonograph record industry. I am most particularly concerned with the price preferences that are extended to the rack jobbers by manufacturers and distributors. These same practices and price preferences are not offered to the retailers. This is discriminatory pricing practice and should be terminated.

I would like to state that our company and the retail outlets have incurred considerable loss in sales of phonograph records to the Record Clubs because of the competitive advantage the Record Clubs have, since they are the manufacturer and, in this instance, the retailer.

In conclusion, I would be happy to co-operate with you in every way to correct the above mal-practice.

Parker Label Sets 10 Jazz LP's For Fall Release

NEW YORK—The Charlie Parker label's plans for Fall merchandise were announced last week by Joe Carlton, president of Carlton Records, which handles distribution for the CP diskery.

Plans include the release of ten new albums: a new Charlie Parker LP and a new Lester Young disk, both as yet untitled; the score of "Carmen" in jazz by Cozy Cole; a new Teddy Wilson album not yet titled; a Billie Holiday LP called "Holiday for Billie"; "Back On The Scene" by Joe Carroll; the new score for the Off-Broadway production "The Connection" which is now touring Europe—performed by the show's stars Cecil Payne, Benny

Green, Kenny Drew and Clark Terry; a new album by Barry Miles, a 14-year-old drummer protege of Woody Herman dubbed "Miles of Genius"; a new album by Slide Hampton (arranged with the permission of Atlantic Records); "The East and West of Jazz" starring Duke Jordan and Sadik Hakim.

The Cole, Wilson, Holiday, Parker and Lester Young albums will be packaged in the diskery's double fold series and will list for \$5.98. The Young, Parker and Holiday LP's, from old tapes, will be available only in monaural. The Wilson and Cole packages will list for \$5.98 in both monaural and stereo. The other albums will list for \$3.98 and \$4.98.

Carlton reported excellent response both here and abroad to the CP label's initial release some months back. He is currently examining numerous requests from Argentina, Brazil, Italy, England, Scandinavia, Germany, Japan and other countries who have all expressed a desire to handle the label in their countries.

Three More Liberty Premier LP's

HOLLYWOOD—Liberty Records last week shipped three new albums in its Premier LP series. The LP's are: "50 Guitars Go South Of The Border" by Tommy (Snuffy) Garrett; "Street Scene" by Felix Slatkin, and "Great Band With Great Voices" by the Si Zentner Band and the Johnny Mann Singers.

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK

YELLOW BIRD ROGER WILLIAMS



"YELLOW BIRD"—Roger Williams—Kapp KL-1244

The Williams keyboard flair in a lineup of assorted melodies that includes "Yellow Bird," "Two Different Worlds," "Greensleeves," "A Lover's Symphony" and "Gigi." Orchestral accompaniment, in the lush manner, is supplied by the orks of Frank Hunter, Marty Gold and Gene Von Hallberg. It's the usual flavorful Williams sound and has a large pre-sold market.

"THE WEIRD AND THE BEARD"—Jack Clements and Dale Stevens—Fraternity F-1012

A chance meeting some time ago between columnist-radio interviewer Dale Stevens (WNOP-Cincinnati) and comedy writer Jack Clements may prove to have produced the freshest and funniest new comedy team. Using material—delightfully original and unhackneyed—written by Clements, the two delve into normal comedy areas but come up with absolutely abnormal situations. This deck could be the big stepping stone to national fame.



"GREAT BAND WITH GREAT VOICES"—The Si Zentner Orch. & the Johnny Mann Singers—Liberty LSS-14009

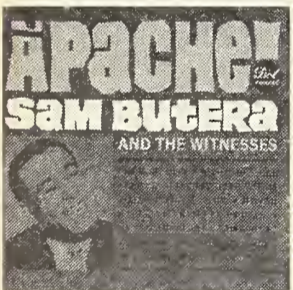
There are numerous ork-chorus disks on the market but few as virile as this. The pungent swing of the Zentner band sets the intense pace for such vehicles as "Serenade In Blue," "Little White Lies," "Tain't What You Do" and "St. Louis Blues" and the Mann voices are woven in various inventive ways—sans lyric, ensemble voicings, solos, etc. Its penetrating zest should be a much sought after upbeat change from the familiar sterile quality of many other ork-chorus sets.

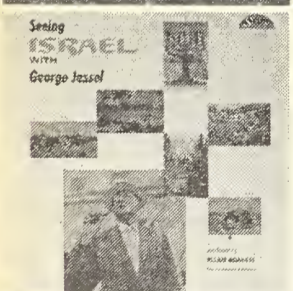
"APACHE!"—Sam Butera and the Witnesses—Dot DLP 3381

The rowdy, rampaging Witnesses, who proved such effective pace-setters for Louis & Keely, reel off a dozen pop items here led by the powerhouse tenor sax blowing of Sam Butera. Leadoff tune is the Butera single, "Apache!," followed quickly by "Spanish Harlem," "One Mint Julep," "Josephine" and a couple of vigorous Butera originals. For those inclined to virile ork music.



"SEEING ISRAEL WITH GEORGE JESSEL"—Strand SL 1031

Jessel proves an articulate and well-versed guide (historically) in this rocking-chair trip to the Holy Land. To a background of appropriate music and sound effects Jessel provides a monocular-eye view of the country's three major cities—Haifa, Tel-Aviv and Jerusalem—that reveals the adoring twinkle in his eye for this land. As Israel's unofficial public relations counsel, he is bound to increase tourism through this album.



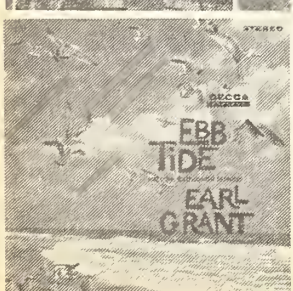
"STREET SCENE"—Felix Slatkin—Liberty LSS-14008

Slatkin's "street scene" encompasses such familiar boulevards as "Pigalle," "Streets of Laredo," "On the Street Where You Live," "Lullaby of Broadway" and the title tune, "Street Scene." As can be seen from the selections, the moods are widely varied (though mostly in the blue-tinged area) and Slatkin has outfitted them with flowing, colorful arrangements. Good commercial appeal.



"EBB TIDE AND OTHER INSTRUMENTAL FAVORITES"—Earl Grant, organ—Decca DL 74165

Singer-pianist-organist Grant concentrates here on organ stylings of twelve evergreens. He displays a technical skill on the instrument, especially with unusual gimmick sounds (as on "Ebb Tide"), and over-all handles what could be a cumbersome instrument with lightness and dexterity. Other tunes are "Stormy Weather," "That's All," "My Foolish Heart" and "Misty." There's lots of interesting inventiveness in the Grant style that many people will enjoy.



"SONGS OF THE BLUE & GREY"—The Wayfarers Trio—Mercury SR 60634

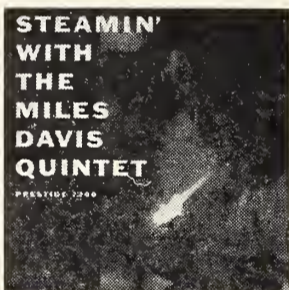
The Wayfarers Trio is similar to the Kingston Trio in that traditional folksongs are revamped to a pop-acceptable, arranged, gimmick sound. Here, songs recalling the Civil War are performed in this likeable manner. Side one, devoted to the North, contains "John Brown's Body" and "Marching Through Georgia"; side two, the South, has "Dixie," "Stonewall" and "The Hammer Song." Could do a brisk trade.



"THE PREMISE"—Original Cast Recording—Vanguard VRS-9092

This off-Broadway revue brought to New York theatregoers the improvisational theatre that began in Chicago and reached popularity with Nichols & May. Four cast members run through a series of satirical sketches that cover just about every subject imaginable. They're quick and, though not always completely original, their antics are food for chuckling thought throughout. This "live" recording has retained the presence of a theatrical atmosphere.

JAZZ PICK OF THE WEEK



"STEAMIN' WITH THE MILES DAVIS QUINTET"—Prestige 7200

The last of the now-legendary 1956 Miles Davis sessions for Prestige. Here has been recorded probably the most influential group in modern jazz history and the best of Miles' small groups—Coltrane, Chambers, Garland, Philly Joe Jones. The set includes a couple of steamy slow ballads, "When I Fall In Love" and "Something I Dreamed Last Night," and others (in the upbeat) including "Salt Peanuts" and "Surrey With the Fringe On Top." Needless to say, performances are outstanding and commercial potential is uniquely high.



"LES McCANN LTD. IN SAN FRANCISCO"—Pacific Jazz PJ-16

"Soul" pianist McCann and his two-man rhythm propulsion team are heard in a "live" date cut at the Jazz Workshop in San Francisco. Apparently, the natives were extremely receptive to the McCann sour movement for they respond here as others have welcomed him in the last year—his year of ascendancy. The LP moves along at a violent clip as McCann tears vigorously through such standards as "I Am In Love," "Jeepers Creepers" and originals "Gone On And Get That Church" and "Big Jim." Heady music for the believers.



"CECIL PAYNE PERFORMING CHARLIE PARKER MUSIC"—Charlie Parker Records/Carlton PLP-801

The first new sides from the Parker diskery feature a group led by baritone saxist Cecil Payne playing six Parker tunes and one Payne composition. The Parker music is consistently virile and "alive" and Payne, Clark Terry and the others respond with joyous, inspired interpretations. Among the tunes are "Cool Blues," "Bongo Bop" and "The Hymn." A fine jazz disk that indicates the level of things to come from the new diskery.

CLASSICAL



"STARLIGHT FANTASIE"—The Hollywood Bowl Symphony conducted by Miklos Rozsa—Capitol SP 8553

The label's Hollywood Bowl series has earned a secure, respected place with that large area of the public that leans toward light entertainment in classical music. Again, several choice classical items have been selected in this idiom and are performed here in proper perspective under the crisp direction of filmdom's Miklos Rozsa. Selections are Brahms' "Hungarian Dance No. 4," Liszt's "Les Preludes," Enesco's "Roumanian Rhapsody No. 1" and Tchaikovsky's "Marche Slave."

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Am-Par Distribs Meet In Miami

MIAMI BEACH—In its most important distrib conclave of the year, Am-Par Records held a 2-day Fall Program Convention at the Eden Roc here following the ARMADA meet. The conclave included the ABC-Paramount label as well as the Command, Grand Award and Westminster subsidiaries.

At the Friday (23) session new product for ABC-Paramount, Impulse (jazz) and Chancellor was presented. On Sat. (24), Enoch Light introduced new Command and Grand Award releases. Following the meeting, AM-Par prexy Sam Clark commented it was the most successful meeting to date, even surpassing the company's Big 5th celebration last year.

The AM-Par program, skedded for Fall release, offers a "special competitive" discount to distribs which in turn will be passed on to all "qualified" dealers. In addition, point-of-sale display kits containing a 4-color center-piece featuring the 12 ABC-Paramount LP's, window streamers and reproduction easels will be extensively distributed.

The first meeting was opened by an address by Clark who expressed his views on business trends and the continuing expansion of Am-Par, stressing the recent acquisition of the Westminster line. Clark then introduced sales VP, Larry Newton, who spoke about the importance of strengthening distrib-manufacturer relationships and the urgent need for coordinating efforts in the over-all campaign for record sales. Newton capped his talk by playing three forthcoming singles—by Bryan Hyland, Erroll Garner and Barry Mann.

For the primary purpose of the convention, Clark then next introduced Allan Parker, director of LP sales and Merchandising, who presented the 12 fall LP's on ABC-Paramount and the four on Impulse.

Next on the rostrum was Bob Marcucci, Chancellor prexy, and Peter Gerardi, Chancellor's operations director. They jointly presented the four new Chancellor sets.

The 12 ABC-Paramount LP's are: "Ray Charles & Betty Carter," "Cookin'", by Lloyd Price, "Paul

Anka Sings His Big 15" Vol. 2, "Journey To Love" by Teddy Randazzo, "His Singing Guitar and Paradise Serenaders" by Roy Smeek, "60 French Girls Sing Encore," "Oscar Brand Sings for Adults," "One-Two Polka Go-Round" by Lou Prohut, "The Golden Touch Plays 26 Favorites" by Frank Camarata, "Bawdy Barracks Ballads" by the Four Sergeants, "Latin Carnival" by Eddie Calvert, and "Great For Dancing" Vol. 3 by the Sociables.

The four Impulse packages include "Africa/Brass" by John Coltrane, "The Blues and The Abstract Truth" by the All-Stars, "Percussion Sweet" by Max Roach, and "Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers."

The four Chancellor packages are: "A Whole Lotta Frankie" by Frankie Avalon, "Rockin' Hot" by Fabian, "The Art of Singing" by Carlo Menotti, and "The Veryest" by the George Young Group.

All ABC-Paramount sets are in mono and stereo; Chancellor packages are in mono only.

Among the concluding addresses at the meeting, Clark introduced Am-Par exec VP Harry Levine, announcing that Levine would be in direct charge of the reorganization and general administration of Westminster. Howard Stark, Westminster sales manager, will be working closely with all Am-Par execs on the new line.

After the meetings were concluded, distrib and sales managers were guests at a banquet at the Eden Roc hosted by Clark and his staff. Here the distrib were informed of the winners of the Am-Par sales contest for distrib for spring 1961. Two cars each were won by Diamond Distributors (Los Angeles), Eric Distribs (San Francisco), Gold Record Distribs (Buffalo) and Music Suppliers (Boston). With a tie for fourth place, one car each was awarded to Garmisa (Chicago) and Malverne (New York).

Retail dealers will receive immediate notification on the details of the Am-Par plan as soon as the distrib have organized their individual sales programs.

Re-Birth Of Queen Label

NEW YORK—King Records last week announced that it will reactivate the Queen label. The label is designed to give every member of the King family an opportunity to be an A & R man and bird dog in his territory and find material for the Queen label on an incentive basis. Should the Queen label consummate a deal for any territorial hit (and they must be bonafide local hits) the person responsible will receive an A & R royalty of 1/2¢ per record.

When a deal is made with the smaller label, the original label name will be given equal billing on each record with the name Queen. Any distributor, who had been doing a good job with the original label, may retain the disk that goes onto the Queen label, if he can do a better job with it.

Second City A Hit In L.A. Opening

LOS ANGELES—The Second City Players, a Chicago-based theatre group which specializes in satirical improvisation, opened here at the Ivar Theatre to rave critical notices. The L.A. group is the same which has played in Chicago for the past two years and which recorded a Mercury album entitled "Comedy From the Second City." In the cast also is Severn Darden, who has his own recently-released Mercury LP tagged "The Sound of My Own Voice and Other Noises."

For Prestige he plans to bring back more of yesteryear's deserving talent in the blues and jazz field.

Lonnie Johnson's latest LP, "Losing Game" has just been released, bringing the fast-growing roster of Bluesville albums up to a total of 27. Future releases will include bluesmen Tampa Red and Blind Willie McTell.

Celler Vigorously Attacks Bootleggers In Address To ARMADA Conclave

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—Congressman Emanuel Celler, Chairman of the House Committee on the Judiciary, insisted in his address to ARMADA members that present federal and state laws are grossly inadequate to meet the problem of bootlegging—which is robbing all in the business of untold millions. State statutes, most of which consider the crime a misdemeanor and carry minor penalties, are therefore no deterrents. Furthermore, since counterfeit records are being shipped in interstate commerce across state lines, it is frequently too difficult for local authorities to secure the evidence and handle the prosecution successfully at the state level.

Celler said that for the proper administration of justice, it is essential to have federal criminal statutes. Such statutes will add the full power and weight of the FBI and other federal agencies to the state and county law enforcement organizations.

Celler then went into bill H.R. 6354 which he recently introduced in Congress and which, if passed, will impose for the first time, federal criminal penalties. If passed, a convicted violator can get up to ten years in jail and up to a \$10,000 fine or both. Celler pledged to fight for passage of this bill vigorously.

The congressman also stated that he would look into what he felt were other abuses in the record industry such as "mirror copying" of records and "covering" of records.

Celler praised ARMADA for its accomplishments against bootleggers in the short time since it was formed. He explained the pricing structure of the bootleggers' sales system in both singles and LP's and called for the

Federal government to help fight the bootlegging evil. He also made it clear that members of the record industry must support ARMADA. He accused people who purchased the bootlegged disks of being as guilty as those who manufactured them.

"Persons engaged in the manufacture, distribution and sale of records are in a command position to help stamp out counterfeiting. Manufacturers and pressers should undertake to better identify their own labels and such labels should be made difficult to copy."

Celler went on, "Distributors and dealers should join the manufacturers to eliminate conditions that offer opportunities of great profit to counterfeiters." If, on the other hand, they conspire with the racketeers either actively or passively, they too should be punished and will be punished under my bill. My proposal provides for the punishment not only of disk counterfeiters but also of those who knowingly receive or ship counterfeit records."

King Extends Deals

CINCINNATI—The extension of two dealer package plans was announced here last week by King Records. A new termination date of Aug. 31 has now been set on the two plans, the "Buy Three-Get One Free" EP deal and the "Two-For-The-Price-of-One" LP pre-pack (on 16 selected LP's). Originally, the plans were to terminate in June but Syd Nathan, head of the King diskery, said that the "tremendous success" of the program necessitated its extension.

Victor Gets Disk Rights To New B'way Musical

NEW YORK—RCA Victor has acquired the rights of the original cast recording of "Let It Ride," a new musical by Jay Livingston and Red Evans which will star George Gobel and Sam Levene when it opens on Broadway in the fall.

The musical is based on one of Broadway's great, long-running comedy hits, "Three Men On A Horse," and features a book by Abram S. Ginnes. Stanley Prager will direct. An unusual aspect of the new show is that Sam Levene scored one of his first triumphs in the original show and now will be featured in its musical adaptation.

Contractual arrangements were completed last week by Victor's A&R director of Broadway musicals and motion pictures, Joe Linhart, and Robert L. Yorke, VP, commercial records creation dept.

The show will preem at Philadelphia's Erlanger Theatre on Sept. 7 and will open at New York's Eugene O'Neil Theatre on Oct. 6.

Rydell A Smash In Copa Debut

NEW YORK—Bobby Rydell elicited a standing ovation from the SRO crowd at his Copa nitery debut here two weeks ago. The singer, playing to a mostly-adult audience, unveiled a night club act that incorporated elements of song-dance-comedy and performed it with the elan of a seasoned performer. The special material which most of the act was built around was on a highly intelligent level and promised a great night club future for Rydell. Particularly impressive was the way Rydell handled himself on the floor. He has a surprising amount of stage presence and audience communication and not once during the 47 minutes he was onstage did he lose his audience. When he completed his act he literally left the patrons asking for more. Rydell will be at the Copa through July 5 after which he will jet to Las Vegas for four weeks at the Sahara Hotel. Sharing the bill there will be George Burns.

Richmond-Telefunken Offer 20% Summer Discount

NEW YORK—London Records last week announced the instituting of special summer LP program for Richmond and Telefunken labels. Called the Richmond-Telefunken Summer Sales Program DB-61, it offers dealers special purchase plans on entire catalogs of the \$1.98 mono and \$2.98 stereo lines, new merchandise included.

As of July 1 and continuing through Aug. 31, dealers will be able to purchase either Richmond or Telefunken LP's at a 20% discount, plus extended billing of one-half Nov. 10, one-half Dec. 10, with an additional 2% discount.

According to a spokesman for the Richmond division, this plan is designed to "keep the dealer competitive under most circumstances as the extensive dating enables the dealer to anticipate his needs and stock his catalog in good depth."

5 New Deutsche LP's From Decca

NEW YORK—The release of five Deutsche Grammophon classical LP's was announced last week by Sydney N. Goldberg, sales VP of Decca Distributing. The LP's are direct, factory-sealed imports from Germany. All five are available in mono and stereo.

The albums are: Rudolf Firkusny, piano, performing the Ravel-Mussorgsky "Pictures At An Exhibition" and three other Ravel piano pieces; Janos Ferencsik conducting Liszt's "Hungarian Coronation Mass"; Lorin Maazel conducting the Orchestra National de la RTF in Ravel's "L'Enfant de les Sortileges"; pianist Carl Seeman and violinist Wolfgang Schneiderhan performing Beethoven's "Sonata in G Minor," and "Sonata in G Major"; the Regensburger Cathedral Choir singing liturgical works of Schubert.

BMI Surveys Concert Field

NEW YORK—A BMI survey of official concert programs, reputed to be the largest of its kind, revealed that contemporary composers led standard (pre 1900) composers with more works performed and more composers represented during the 1960-61 concert season. These facts were determined by an examination of the programs of 268 American orchestras, involving a grand total of 9,987 works. A study of 2,338 concerts also revealed that 1,729 subscription concerts formed the backbone of programming, followed by youth programs, 218; special concerts, 118, and touring concerts, 117.

A supplemental BMI survey of 74 major orchestras, duplicating one made last year, shows that there has been an increase of 7.2% in the number of contemporary works played by these orchestras, and an increase of 15.3% in the total of their performances during the past season.

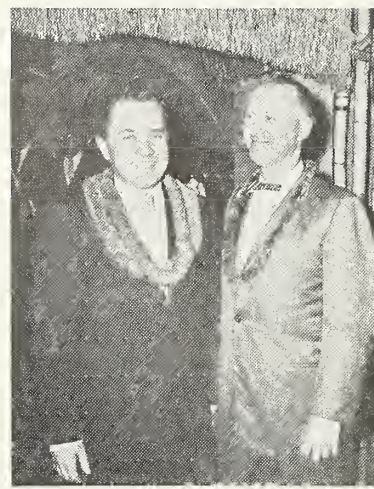
Of the top ten contemporary works performed by these orchestras, only two were written after 1940. They were Paul Hindemith's "Symphonic Metamorphosis on Themes by Weber" (1943) and Benjamin Britten's "Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra" (1946), based on the score for a film made in the 1930's. The other works in the contemporary top ten were "La Mer," Debussy (1905); "Firebird Suite," Stravinsky (1910); "Daphnis and Chloe," Ravel (1912); "Piano Concerto No. 1" and "Classical Symphony," both by Prokofiev (1910); "La Valse," Ravel (1920); "Violin Concerto No. 2," Prokofiev (1935); and "Adagio for Strings," Barber (1938).

The ten most performed standard works, according to the BMI survey, were, in order: "Piano Concerto No. 1," Beethoven; "Symphony No. 1," Beethoven; "Piano Concerto No. 20," Mozart; "Symphony No. 7," Schubert; "Symphony No. 7," Beethoven; "Piano Concerto No. 2," Liszt; "Symphony No. 41," Mozart; "Violin Concerto," Brahms; "Violin Concerto," Beethoven; and "Symphony in D Minor," Franck.

Contemporary composers of works of more than five minutes in duration were, in order of most performances: Prokofiev, Ravel, Stravinsky, Copland, Bartok, Hindemith, Debussy, Barber, Gershwin, and Respighi. Standard composers in order of most performances were: Beethoven, Mozart, Brahms, Wagner, Haydn, Mendelssohn, Bach, Verdi, Dvorak, and Schubert.

All types of orchestras were involved in the survey, including all major and metropolitan orchestras, 169 of the 883 community orchestras, and 50 of the 250 college orchestras.

BRAZIL

June is proving to be a very important month for the Brazilian records industry. Philips released its first 33 compacts in both Brazilian and International fields. Carlos Lyra, young composer and singer, waxed two sambas of his own: "Quem Quiser Encontrar O Amor" (Who Wants To Find Love) and "Mister Golden"; Sonia Delfino, teenage singer, appears in a compact with two Brazilian versions of American hits: "Emotions" and "Tonight My Love Tonight." The International repertoire is represented by Henry Jerome's "Man With The Golden Arm," Brenda Lee's "Emotions," Paul Anka's "Tonight, My Love Tonight" and by a Paraguayan singer Luis Alberto Del Parana with "Princesa Soraya" (Princess Soraya).

Philips is also responsible for a new album which should cause great sensation: "Sylvia Telles U.S.A.," made in the United States by the Brazilian singer, accompanied by such American musicians as Barney Kessel, Calvin Jackson, Joe Mondragon, Al McKibbon and Bill Hitchcock Orchestra. Sylvia is married to Aloysio de Oliveira, Philips artistic director and well known in the United States, where he lived for several years. Aloysio said the album is an attempt to break rhythmical barriers between two different musical idioms. And, we may add a successful one since the combination of Brazilian music and American rhythms seems perfect.

Brazilian public opinion will be shaken soon by a new LP released a few days ago by Copacabana Records. The album, entitled "A Musica Do Século XX De Jocy" (Jocy's 20th Century Music) was entirely cut with popular compositions interpreted by Jocy De Oliveira—pianist-writer-composer and now, singer—wife of maestro Eleazar De Carvalho, one of the closest friends of the late maestro Serge Koussevitzky, with whom he worked in Tanglewood. Jocy's style is completely new and critics have said that she's years ahead of her time. She is a very famous pianist with an international background, having given concerts in Europe and the U.S. with great success. And though the fact isn't known, when a classical musician turns to pop music here, the public here is puzzled.

There is another new Brazilian record company: Fermata Do Brasil Ltda. This company has three labels: Fermata, Premier and Young, and represents another six: Atlantic-Atco—New York; King Records—Cincinnati; Cameo-Parkway—Philadelphia; Jamie Records—Philadelphia; Hispa-Vox—Madrid, Spain, and Jupiter Records—Munich, Germany. Fermata's head office is Avenida Ipiranga, 1123—Sao Paulo, Brazil. The executive line-up is:

Fermata is also one of the most active publishers in South America.

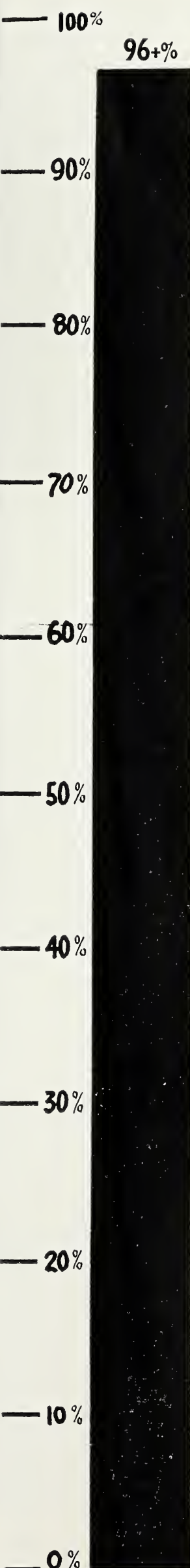

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ENGLAND

British record dealers are up in arms following the recent national advertising campaign by The World Record Club offering 27 LP's direct to the public at greatly reduced prices. W.R.C. offers any three of the 27 disks for only 30/-, acceptance constitutes membership and the compulsory purchase of 4 further LP's within the year for 29/6d each. Among the disks offered are 5 ex-Capitol LP's by top ranking artists, leased to W.R.C. and pressed for them by E.M.I. Records Ltd., who deleted the majority of them from the Capitol catalogue when they took over the label 6 years ago. Although W.R.C. has made the records available to dealers offering a 10% commission on all orders taken, W. S. Woyda, chairman of the G.R.R.A. (Gramophone Record Retailers Association) and buyer & manager for the record division of Keith Prowse (one of this country's largest chain of record dealers) commented: "This is an unfair and unrealistic discount and we consider the club's activities a serious threat to the industry and the prosperity of the dealer which we are pledged to fight to the utmost. The industry in this country enjoys trading arrangements which are second to none in the world and the envy of the world and we intend to keep it that way. It would have been far better for all concerned if the records had been released by the manufacturer on a low-priced label available to dealers direct." Answering the wave of adverse criticism which followed the W.R.C. offer L. G. Wood, managing director of E.M.I. Records Ltd. had this to say: "It is very difficult to assess what effect, if any, the Record Club operation is having on the retail trade. On the face of it, however, it would appear that the additional and extensive advertising which the club has given the gramophone record must result in an increased interest record wise on the part of the public thus assisting the dealer by attracting more customers to his shop. The ex-catalogue recordings by top ranking artists available through the club may also stimulate dealer sales of these artists' current recordings. I must emphasize that E.M.I. has always regarded the retail trade as the backbone of the industry and will continue to do so. To assist our dealers to counter the club's offer and to take advantage of the added publicity given to the record industry, we propose to launch in the very near future a re-issue series, i.e. a series of carefully selected records which have been deleted from our catalogues at a price competitive to that offered by the club. We are certain dealers will welcome this move on our part and will readily co-operate with us in our endeavours to demonstrate our continued belief in the importance of the British record retailer. Already we have received expressions of approval from dealers all over the country for the action we propose to take."

An arrangement has been made between Philips Phonographic Industries of Holland (associate company of Philips London) and the Mercury Record Corporation of America whereby part of the Philips record catalogue will be marketed in the United States by Mercury on the Philips label. The first releases both pop and classical are expected before the end of the year. Mercury will also undertake the acquisition of American talent and the recording of artists repertoire for the Philips label.

Argo, leading label in the field of spoken word recordings, has just added "King Lear" to its cycle of Shakespeare's plays. With 26 plays already recorded and 22 released director H. J. Usill promises to have the remaining 11 ready by 1964—the 400th Anniversary of Shakespeare's birth. Released here on Argo and in the United States on London. Also just completed are 2 12" LP's entitled "The Hollow Crown"—a history of the Kings and Queens of England in poetry, speeches and music recorded by The Royal Shakespeare Theatre Company, Stratford-on-Avon for transatlantic release later in the year.

Manufacturers sales of records in April this year were 3% less than in the same month last year. Export sales were 10% less than in April 1960 and less than the lowest April export sales previously recorded in 1955. Production of 45 rpm disks was up by 18% but there was a fall in 33 1/3 and 78 rpms of 14% and 56% respectively.

E. Mills, general manager of Vogue Records—100% Decca Group distributors, reports over the twelve months to March this year an increase of 33 1/3rd% and for April, May and June this year figures are up by 50%. Jazz-wise, production on the Contemporary, Emerald, Good Time Jazz, Tempo and Vogue labels maintains a high level.

After a two-day 'walk-out' Eydie Gorme and Steve Lawrence have resumed their cabaret season at Al Burnett's Pigalle Theatre-Restaurant. A ban by the Musicians' Union on the couple's trumpet player Johnny Frosk and drummer Jerry Gilgor nearly lost us the best cabaret act seen here for many a year. It is hoped that the American Federation of Musicians and the British Union will shortly come to some sensible and workable agreement.

After conducting a concert in the BBC Light Music Festival at the Royal Festival Hall this week Frank Chacksfield was presented with two Golden Disks for his million selling Decca recordings of "Limelight" and "Ebb Tide"—the latter released in the States on the Richmond label has been in the charts for 12 months.

The first EMI "Monday Spectacular" disk show for Radio Luxembourg was recorded last week. Guest stars included Helen Shapiro, Kenny Lynch and Harry Fowler.

Philips Records hosted a reception for top arranger-composer-conductor Percy Faith, in town for a pleasure trip en route for the Continent. In town after a continental business trip Dick Voltter, VP of Shapiro Bernstein for discussions with Cyril Shane, manager of the newly opened London office, currently handling three hot American hits—"Ring of Fire" by Duane Eddy which enters the British charts this week at No. 17; and two likely contenders in Pat Boone's "Moody River" and Billy Vaughan's "Blue Tomorrow"—all three are released on the London label.

Following Petula Clark, Dickie Henderson and Diana Dors at London's latest luxury restaurant "Room At The Top" is Mel Torme making his British cabaret debut on July 10th. He will also headline a Sunday show for ATV from the Prince of Wales Theatre.

Jack Lewerke, of Interdisc, currently holidaying with family in the south of France taking in the Jazz Festival at Antibes from July 17th to 24th.

Don Agnes, exploitation manager of Leeds Music, excited about the prospects of Sam Cooke's stateside smash "Cupid." For release here on RCA and published by Kags Music, the number looks like another "Chain Gang."

Johnny Ray, in London for his British cabaret debut at Talk Of The Town Theatre-Restaurant, would like to wax an album for Philips A&R manager Johnny Franz.

Del Shannon this week turns the tables on Elvis Presley as "Runaway" replaces "Surrender" at the top of the charts, thus Shannon reclaims the No. 1 slot that Presley forced him to 'surrender' just four weeks ago.

A week after release, Cliff Richard and The Shadows enter the charts at No. 11 with "A Girl Like You."

Having opened successfully in "Bye Bye Birdie," Marty Wilde this week waxed a new single for rush release by Philips, "Hide And Seek," especially written for him by Lionel Bart backed with his own compo, "Crazy Dream."

Lonnie Donegan's latest British chart entry, "Have A Drink On Me," for American release on Atlantic.

JAPAN

Editions Altona, Amsterdam, told **The Cash Box** they're starting a big push on the French-Belgian song "Bailando La Pachanga," composed by Neco Gomez. The Pachanga is scheduled at many dancing schools in Holland for next season and this composition is one of the best examples for teaching the new rhythm according to Altona. The first recording, by the Francis Bay Orchestra, is already on the Dutch market and others will follow soon.

Some time ago Sobedi, Brussels, launched a new label, named "Newtone," which specifically handles juke box music and pop songs. Recently the label released "Dogfight," which features the American Jokers. The initial reaction on this record was very good and Sobedi is expecting a lot from it. The second recording is on Caprice by Janie Grant: "Triangle"; reaction is satisfactory. Sobedi made a deal with Delta Records in Amsterdam.

Piet Beishuizen, head of the publicity department of Philips' Phonographic Industries, Baarn, Holland, told **The Cash Box** that their "Modern Music Series" will be launched during the "Wiener Festwochen" in Vienna, Austria. The Series forms a project on a large scale and of immense importance to the firm—18 records, presented in 14 carefully prepared albums, and containing 41 important 20th Century works, the earliest (Webern's Passacaglia op. 1) composed in 1908, the latest (an electronic piece by Raaymakers) in 1959. These LP's include works by Olivier Messiaen, Daniel-Lesur, Webern, Orff, Boulez, Stockhausen, Menotti, Berg, Hindemith, Stravinsky, Varèse, Schönberg, Krenek, Badings and Raaijmakers. In October, a press conference will be held in Paris for the Philips Modern Music Series. Mr. Beishuizen also told us that famous group I Musici just made new recordings of works by Mendelssohn, Schubert, Britten, Barber, Respighi and Bartók.

The Columbia-label of L. C. Bovema appears with 9 prominent artists in the current "Holland-Festival 1961." Conductors Carlo Maria Giulini, Otto Klemperer and Rafael Kubelik, pianiste Annie Fischer, violonists Leonid Kogan and David Oistrakh are the brightest of the group performing with the famous Concertgebouw Orchestra.

Both Vico Torriani and Caterina Valente with her brother Silvio Francesco have chosen German evergreens for their new Decca albums, just released in Holland. The harmonizing, vocalizing and arrangements of Heinz Kiessling's Studio Orchestra with Caterina and Silvio (dubbings) resulted in a most interesting sound. The famous sister and brother said this was their most successful recording. Torriani's "Liebe, Tanz und 1000 Träume" is also good. Silvio Francesco is heard on soprano sax with the Saxo Boys on 45 EP.

Artone's John James Vis told **The Cash Box** that Paul Anka's "Tonight, My Love Tonight" received a tremendous sales boost due to the fact that the American singer guested on NBC's "Perry Como Show" in which he was seen all over the country singing his current big smash. New in Artone's special 10" Verve LP Series—an extremely well-received line—is a unique collection of ten of Ella Fitzgerald's all-time greats. Titled "The Ella Fitzgerald Showcase," the set contains among others such well known features as "April in Paris," "Lady Be Good" and "I Can't Give You Anything But Love." John James Vis who was in charge of selecting the material, expects top sales of this particular release in the series. Artone recently successful with "Carolina, Dai" by Rocco Granata, are currently working on "Irena," Rocco's latest waxing.

Important gains for Delta Records (Amsterdam) organization is the joining of prominent sales-specialist and former Bovema publicity manager Huub Jacobse. Training the Delta salesmen and supervising the Delta publicity-department will be his most important tasks. Rocking Little Henny And The Shakin' Boys are getting a lot of publicity after their first recording for Delta. They have been booked for an international rock-festival in Belgium as sole Dutch representation. Preparations for a nation-wide tour and TV appearances are being made. Mr. Hans I. Kellerman, Delta's managing director, just signed a contract with German Jupiter Records for exclusive representation in Holland.

Pick of the L.C. Phonogram releases on 45 single: "Well I Ask You" by Eden Kane (Decca), "Sweet Little Kathy" by Ray Peterson (London), "Brass Buttons" by The String-A-Longs (London), and "Stand By Me" by Ben E. King (London). New Fontana EP's have names like Ha Dudaim, Tony Lang and the Melocantos, and Piron New Orleans Orchestra.

Pete Felleman, who directs Artone's Funckler Department, reports mounting sales of Clarence 'Frogman' Henry's "But I Do," an Argo etching, released locally on the Funckler-label. Platter was issued early in April, received strong initial response and is climbing steadily. Felleman further told **The Cash Box** that the first 10" LP by The Cousins, rocking foursome from Belgium, was released at the end of May. The quartet's two singles, "Kili Watch" and "Kana Kapila," are still in the bestseller class.

Paul Visser, Artone's public city manager, reports that Artone released over 200 EP's from the Verve catalog within a couple of years, making the label a leader in the EP field in the Benelux Countries. Latest issues include: "A Portrait Of Duke Ellington" by the Dizzy Gillespie Orchestra, "Sonny Stitt Sits In With The Oscar Peterson Trio," "Paul Robeson Sings," "Let No Man Write My Epitaph" by Ella Fitzgerald and "The Jazz Soul Of Oscar Peterson."

Good sales have been noted with Capitol's Benny Goodman-single "Lonesome Road" and the topper "Foolin' Around" by Buck Owens, says Mr. Cees Hundepool, Capitol-label-chief. Also Hank Thompson and his "Oklahoma Hills" are among the best-sold of country and western in this country.

The Everly Brothers surprised the Dutch record market with another earthshaker: "Temptation." As told us by Mr. C. Pompe, Bovema's Warner Bros-labelmanager, sales are quite satisfactory and also on account of the "West Side Story"—Edison 1960—LP of Leonard Bernstein nothing's left to be desired. Especially, the forthcoming visit of the musical to Holland in July will stimulate the popularity of Warner Bros.

Ria Valk has a great new hit with "Adieu-Vaarwel-Goodbye." It's a Dutch version of "Adieu-Lebewohl-Goodbye." Gerd Böttcher's German success that's based on Offenbach's "Barcarolle." This may be another "Rocking Billy" for the talented Dutch teenage singer (Fontana).

On July 5th, Philips started their program "Internationalities" on the commercial Radio Luxemburg. Disc jockey is wellknown quizmaster Lou Van Burg, who will announce platters in many languages. Program is on the air each Wednesday evening from 9.00-9.30.

The Japanese society of rights of author and composers (J.A.S.R.A.C.) week petitioned the Educational Minister for amendment of the royalty making it mandatory to pay royalties to lyric writers and composers of phonograph records of their works by radio and TV stations. The following is the story from the Yomiuri (English edition of Japan's leading paper Yomiur Shimbun").

J.A.S.R.A.C. was referring to a provision in the royalty law stating payment of royalties to lyric writers and composers is not necessary using records of their works if their names are mentioned. The society petitioned in its petition that this constituted an outright infringement on rights to compensations. Consequently, many lyric writers and composers not only facing difficulties but the lack of proper compensations is obstructing progress in the field of music. The petition said: Recorded works of J.A.S.R. members are being played everywhere—tearooms, cabarets, restaurants, department stores, hotels, theaters—the society said. Furthermore, they are 32 commercial radio stations and 41 TV companies throughout Japan are making use of their works—all free. The petition was submitted to Masuo A. Education Minister, by a seven-member delegation of the society, headed by Yaso Saijo, noted poet and president of the J.A.S.R.A.C., and Kosahu Yanai, well-known composer. Araki told the delegation that he would consider the petition but that the matter would require further study because the position of the other side also must be considered.

A J.A.S.R.A.C. spokesman said that the society soon would launch a nationwide movement to press the Japanese Government to take early steps for amendment of the Royalty Law.

Teichiku's business expansion this time pioneered in the field of classical music. President Shigeji Nanko, now in the U.S. on business, has long been planning to produce classical recording by Japanese artists and to introduce it throughout the world. The initial classical recording session for the year will be held at the newest public hall in Tokyo, Kosei-Nenkin Kaikan. The Tokyo Symphonic Orchestra under the direction of Masashi Ueda was selected for the first recording group. They are to cut Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 and Schubert's "unfinished." (In Stereo)

The U.S. Time Records will shortly release a 12" LP by a Japanese musician in the U.S. market. The LP, "Nehan," originally was distributed by Toshiba last year. Capitol records is the pactee with Toshiba, but the right of distribution in 50 states was especially arranged with Time thru Capitol's agreement. "Nehan" was composed by one of the outstanding Japanese composers, Torii Mayuzumi.

Competitive Toshiba and Victor started to foster their own kids' singing groups respectively. Toshiba reinforced its Toshiba Singing Angels both in number and quality. Taeko Mabuchi, classical A & R Director, was named as chief instructor of the choir. Mabuchi is an alumnus of national Tokyo University of Arts. At the school the group grew to the size of 20 girls (primary school age). Their recording in the form of 12" LP's issued last year thru Capitol Records in the U.S.

Meanwhile, some boys are taking music lessons from Victor. The newly formed Victor Boys Choir will cut their disk in September or so. These boys were picked up in 12 elementary schools in Tokyo. Instructor is Susumu Tsutsumi, now chief director of all Japan school boys Enunciation Instruction Institute, majored in voice in his school days at National Tokyo University of Arts.

A Latin American Trio, Louis Alberto Del Panama Y Su Trio Los Paganos, now visiting here, made its TV debut last week. Also last week, the trio had a recording session at Victor's Studio in downtown Tokyo. The tunes recorded are the top hits of today—"Kitakami Yakyoku" and "Nihon-No Orai San." "Kitakami Yakyoku" is now available on different labels because J.A.S.R.A.C. has its copyright and recording rights. J.A.S.R.A.C. is not a publisher, but the organization which controls the tune of its members' releases (like B.M.I. or A.S.C.A.P.). Usually the publisher has the publishing right while the diskery keeps the recording rights, as far as our local pop music is concerned. All rights, including that of recording, was entrusted to the composer and the writer of "Kitakami Yakyoku" to J.A.S.R.A.C. that's why the tune is available on different labels, contrary to the usual.

GERMANY

The reaction to the German Pop Music Festival by the public is already beginning to show up in the charts and experts are waiting for a big push by the record industry in the weeks to come. The majority of the jury at the actual festival was made up of radio-TV people and their decision is now being tested on the General public. The first test was made by radio Stuttgart who played the 8 finalist numbers and came up with the following results when all the cards and letters from listeners were counted. The winner of the festival, a tango under the title "Bailando A Dos" played by Hamburg Radio Orchestra leader Alfred Hause finished in 5th place, the 2nd place festival winner "Texas Jimmy" by the young teenage duo, The Missouriis, captured 1st place with 28% of all the votes, and the 3rd place "Kleiner Goldner Ring" by Lys Assia finished 8th. 2nd and 3rd place in the Stuttgart listener's competition went to the "Sudsee Ballade" by The Medium Terzett and "In Paraguay" by Tony Sandler. In chart action, the "Automaten Markt," a trade paper concerning mainly juke box action, lists "Sudsee Ballade" by The Medium Terzett on 34th place and "Texas Jimmy" in the number 46 position with "In Paraguay" making it in the 50th position. "Texas Jimmy" is also picked as number 10 in the Berlin hit parade and is the 5th best selling record by Teldec at this time. More news on festival winners as it comes along. Here's one more piece of info. Electrola has issued a new recording of "Kleiner Goldner Ring" by Lale Anderson and is shooting with all guns to better the sales of the same song by contestant Lys Assia. It's the first "cover" of a festival tune.

Metronome records reports the signing of Eva Astor from Graz, Austria to a long term contract. The 17 year old lass is the first new artist brought to the firm by the new producer-A&R man, Peter Moesser. Peer Music is looking for success with 3 South American tunes. "Ritmo De Chunga" by Perez Prado is being pushed as the newest dance craze, the newest from Audrey Arno and The Hazy Osterwald Sextet is called "Wieder Mal Pachanga" (Once More Pachanga) and the newest Ray Conniff waxing is a coupling of "Besame Mucho" and "Brazil."

Germany's number 2 tune "Wheels" is getting top action in German vocal versions. There are now records on the market by The Vagabunden on Columbia, The Continentals on Decca, The Trio Kolenka on Philips and Peter Steffen on Polydor and all are selling well.

Hans Sikorski reports that his publishing house is going all out for the new Angelina Monti recording "Iwan Iwanowitsch," "Cherokee" from Jorgen Ingmann and Ilse Werner's "Ich Mochte Auch Mal Nach Paris" (I also want to visit Paris").

The duet waxing of teenage stars Detlef Engel and Gerd Bottcher is getting top action reports music publisher Rolf Budde. The songs are "Home On The Range" and "Santa Lucia."

Ricky Steinberg of Mercury Records here reports that the sale of Mercury to Philips will in no way disturb the present distribution set up with EMI-Electrola here.

Peter Meisel was in town and reports top action on his hits "Texas Jimmy" by The Missouriis and "Hello Mary Lou" by Ricky Nelson. The Nelson tune will have at least 3 versions in German with the first 'cover' being done by the Danish duo Jan & Kjeld.

Fred Bertelmann has left Electrola records after many years and has signed a long term pact with Polydor Records and their newest A&R man, Hans Bertram.

Bernhard Mikulski is working hard on the Johnny Dankworth version of "African Waltz" and "Walk Like A Dragon" from Mel Torme.

Hot indie masters for sale is the order of the day in the USA but in Germany the situation is quite different. With very little independent distribution and each major firm handling their own distribution, a tune on a small label has little chance to break for hitsville here and even if it does, the majors compensate by covering the tune and not by buying the original master. There are exceptions to the rule. Former A&R chief of Ariola, Horst Fuchs, has an indie production firm and produces with his own capital but Teldec has the first refusal rights and Mr. Fuchs has a guarantee from the firm of a certain amount of material bought each year. Josef Niessen has also an indie production group with most of the masters being bought by Teldec and Ariola and Helmut Jantsch also produces independently with Ariola handling almost all of his production. Hans Arno Simon has started his own label, Simon Records and Metronome handles the distribution and Gerhard Mendolsohn has his Adano label with distribution also handled by Metronome. All other production is handled directly by the firms with the A&R men picking up a small percent of the sales and the costs and major profits handled by the firms. If you have any other questions about the Germany market, please write and we'll try to straighten out the situation in this column. That's it for this week in Germany.

ARGENTINA

According to Fermata publishers, "La Novia" (The Bride) is the first case of many European publishers interested in representing an Argentine tune in their countries. Only Italian publishers sent twelve proposals, seven of them the same day. The song has been cut by Tony Dallara in Italy, Sacha Distel in France, Domenico Modugno in Buenos Aires, and is the first tune to be recorded in the States by Anita Bryant for her new label, Columbia. "La Novia" is currently a best seller in Argentina, Brazil and Colombia, and has been in Chile and Peru.

Neil Sedaka is coming to Argentina. The famous singer and composer is expected here July 15, according to our information. If properly managed, Sedaka can become a big hit here. His "Calendar Girl" is selling pretty well.

Connie Francis will be here next August as part of a Latin America tour. Inter Bas (MGM's representative) is preparing a big reception, having released two LP's and two singles in the last few weeks. The label also sent Connie a selection of local music in Spanish, to be used by the songstress in her visit. (She showed great interest in this type of material.)

May and June have shown a dangerous decrease in record sales, and this is worrying diskeries very much. The increase of the cost of living and some confusion in buyers are considered the main factors; some sales managers add, that in general, retailers are making no effort to sell the merchandise. The attitude towards this situation is waiting to see what happens, and the starting of big promotional campaigns through radio, TV and advertisements, pointing to the fact that "promotional" (\$2.39 and \$2.98) LP's are inexpensive and offer the latest hits in one record. Currently, most labels have albums at reduced prices, besides regular LP's.

TV Channel 13 began broadcasting at 7 AM in an effort to cover morning hours with good news and film programs. This movement has been well received by viewers and advertisers and is becoming commercially profitable. Channel 9 starts operating at 10 o'clock, and TV7 is planning morning castings, too.

Microfon Records signed contracts with Productora Latinoamericana de Grabaciones for the release in Argentina of all Luciano Tajoli product, and has also become the local representative for the American Audio Fidelity and Italian Durium. First Audio Fidelity releases are "Jazz Percusive" by "Louis Armstrong and the Dukes of Dixieland", "Rome With Love," and "Los Toros Bravos." First Durium releases will be in July and will include Germana Caroli, Aurelio Fierro and Marino Marini, who's coming this week to Buenos Aires and will perform on TV9.

Orfeo releases: "Miedo de Amar" (Fear of Love) and "Tontito" (Little Fool) by Beto Espinosa; "Pepe" and "La Araña," recorded in Mexico by Chuck Anderson; "Telepatia" and "Mack the Knife" by Los Santos.

Jose Rota, Odeon Pops A&R man, told us that he believes "Siluetas" (Siluettes) will change existing standards in popular music waxings. The tune has been recorded by Los Llopis, the Cuban vocal group. Los Llopis have also cut "Baby Sittin' Boogie" in Spanish.

Luis Aguilé, one of Odeon's top stars, will tour Peru and Puerto Rico next September, and will probably go to Spain in January and Venezuela in February 1962. Aguilé's last record, "Pancha Calma" (A Pachanga) and "Tonight My Love, Tonight" (sung in Spanish) is selling well.

Columbia launched a new singer, Ruben Cortez. His first waxing is "Flor sin Retoño" and "Castigame," with Joe Carli's orchestra. "Flor sin Retoño" is a Mexican tune, and has been a best seller in many Latin American countries by Pero Infante). Now, with Cortez' recording it may break into Argentine charts very soon. Fabio Echeverry will wax it for Odeon Pops, in a few days.

"Cha Cha Cha Flamenco"—recorded by Rosamel Araya, Los Chapanecos, Los Chispitas and Clebanoff—is also selling well. The tune belongs to Mexican author Mario de Jesus and was found by Rodriguez Luque—head of Disc Jockey—during his recent trip to Europe.

Arturo Millan—winner of the last Benidorm Song Festival—is also a composer. His last production is titled "El Barquero" and he has already waxed it for RCA. Millan will start a tour of the Pacific Coast after he finishes a series of recordings.

Last from Philips: "Carolina Dai" by Los Big Ben (vocal group); Ayudame Dios Mio/Los Abriles; "Nuevos Sonidos Para Bailar" (New Sounds To Dance With), an LP featuring Las Cuatro Plumas, Geval Trio and Los Big Ben.

TK Records announced the release of the first Argentine Folk Music Stereo recording cut by Ariel Ramirez. The label will also start issuing "Duniophon" Arabian-music records.

Classical music catalogs are needed. Rodriguez Luque, of Disc Jockey, is seeking foreign catalogs of classical music, for release in Argentina. This type of record has a good market here. Luque's address is Pedro Goyena 72, Buenos Aires.

A couple of months ago, a big discussion was started, regarding the reasons for the current lack of interest towards tango music. The problem was discussed by a lot of people, and some of them said that "diskeries are trying to suppress this type of recordings, because foreign releases are more profitable. They also asked for a law that would require labels to release 50% of local music. The storm isn't ended yet, but it seems that will be over soon. According to our information, tango recordings have been increased instead of reduced in the last times even more; many diskeries are seeking new ways to increase popularity by means of waxings by well known melodic singers such as Antonio Prieto, Daniel Riobobos, or good arrangements such as by Presedo, Varela, Quinteto Real.

SWEDEN

AB Concert Hall Society, Solna, north of Stockholm, is in trouble in Sweden. The same company in Norway was reported to the Police earlier this year, and the trade in Norway is still waiting for something to happen. Concert Hall Society is a company owned by Musical Masterpiece Society in the USA with affiliates all over western Europe. It has mainly recordings of classic music in its catalog. The action against the Swedish company has been taken by several record companies (EMI and Metronome have signed the report) and other record trade organizations are standing behind the report. Concert Hall Society is accused of misleading advertising in which it offers its customer club members to buy four LPs at the price of SKr. 2:50 (around 50 cents). However, since the promised LP's happen to be 33 RPM EPs, this is misleading advertising. Second, the Concert Hall Society is accused for illegal competition since they advertise that they sell 12" LP records of finest quality at 30 per cent less than the regular retail price. These LP's cost (including postage) SKr. 21:50 while more well known labels offer LP's of even better quality thru the retailers at a price of between SKr. 15.— to 19:— (One US Dollar equals approximately five Kronor). Concert Hall Society is also accused of the methods it uses, according to which its customers are forced to buy the contracted four records, otherwise risking prosecution for breaking the contracts.

The report against Concert Hall Society has been sent to Näringslivet's Opinionsnämnd, an organization which does not have the power of a court, but whose decisions are considered just as valuable as an order from a court, at least as far as the moral aspect is considered. The organization can also hand over a case they've handled to the District Attorney with a recommendation of legal action on the grounds described by the organization.

Otto Keller, president of Concert Hall Society, declared that "we know all about this action, but we have nothing to fear since we have 60,000 satisfied customers behind us." Mr. Keller declared that the only thing dictating the action is professional jealousy against the large sale of Concert Hall Society records.

Ivan Nordström, A&R man of EMI, to Copenhagen for biz talks. Anders Holmstedt, pres. of EMI, just returned from an EMI-Scandinavian convention in Copenhagen.

Jörgen Ingmann contracted for several appearances in Sweden this summer. It is known that Metronome Records regrets that the entire summer has been booked for Ingmann, as they wanted to bring him over to the U.S. where his recordings of "Apache" and "Anna" were hits.

Felix Stahl, head of Stockholm's Musikproduktion, back to Stockholm from a biz trip at the European Continent, where he attended music festivals in France and Germany, among others.

According to a news bulletin broadcast by Radio Nord on Midsummer Day, there is an agreement between STIM (Swedish performing rights society) and the so called "pirate" radio station Radio Nord. No details were given. The negotiations were the result of an action by STIM. However, before Radio Nord started, it made an agreement with STIM, but the latter organization had underestimated the station's possibilities, and when it discovered how popular the station really became, they wanted a new contract.

Carli Tornehave, at the moment recording for EMI, has signed a contract with Philips, starting from July 1. Latest release from Philips is "Bazoom!" and "Bandstand Boogie" by Les Elgart. The first four songs composed and recorded by Owe Thörnqvist after he was contracted to Philips has been released in an EP.

Björn Fremer, publicity head of Sonet Grammofon AB, in the U.S. for a three months biz visit.

The Durium catalog is represented in England by Decca Records, Ltd. and in the United States by London Records.

It was learned that Nani Ricordi has left the post of manager of the Ricordi record house. Mr. Clausetti and Mr. Rignani will replace him.

"Tonight, My Love Tonight," the latest Paul Anka release here, is headed toward becoming one of the biggest hits of the year. This proves once more that Anka, all-time best selling artist with "Diana," is still one of the most popular foreign artists in Italy.

The American recording of "Giuggiola" by Dean Martin will soon be released in Italy by V.C.M., Capitol distributors here. A short time ago, Corrado Lojacono, author of the tune, was signed up for a new contract by Pathe, another V.C.M. label, and has a good seller on this label with his "Non So Resisterti," which was awarded a special prize at the Six Days of Song in Milan.

Gene Moretti announced that Connie Francis will tour Italy again at the end of the year. Mr. Giannini of CGD released the following list of Connie Francis' best selling records in Italy—"Jealous Of You," 230,000 copies sold; "Where The Boys Are," 60,000 copies sold; "Valentino," 30,000 copies sold; "Mama," 30,000 copies sold. Mr. Giannini is so sure that "Jealous Of You" will reach the 300,000 mark in sales by the end of the year when Connie visits Italy that at that time she will be presented the golden disc by CGD.

Mr. Matalon of Italdisc announced that Mina has signed a new 3 year contract with him (from November, 1961 through November, 1964). During his trip to Copenhagen to attend the IFPI meet, Mr. Matalon paid a visit to Philips in Holland, meeting Mr. Langenberg, President of the Philips parent company, and Mr. Mejerstein, of French Philips. He signed a contract with them for Italdisc's catalog to be represented by Philips in Holland, Benelux, France, Portugal, Switzerland and in South America (except Venezuela).

Famed French singer Gilbert Beaud was in Turin for two shows organized by the Committee for the Celebration of the Centennial of Italian Unity. Current hit in Italy for Beaud is "Marie, Marie." Also moving extremely well is his latest recording, "Quand L'Amour est mort" (When Love Has Died).

Tony Dallara, who was one of the first to pick songs from old Italian music catalogs, with "Ti Diro'" (I'll Tell You), will keep doing this now that revival of old songs has become a general fashion. The artists are Sergio Bruni, one of the top Italian singers, who had two songs in the final entries of last year's San Remo Festival; Luciano Virgili, another big name of the pop music scene, and newcomer Enzo Jannace, new voice in the Neapolitan song field. These three artists will sing, respectively, "T'e Pigliato 'o Sole" (Bruni and Virgili), "Tutt's dduje" (Bruni), "Nuttata 'e Manduline" (Jannace).

Sidet has the rights to "Basta" the new recording by Celentano, which couples "Non Esiste L'Amore" (Love Does Not Exist). The latter is expected to be a hit (sheet music published originally by Nazionale). Sidet boasts also of the new composition by Marino Baretto, Jr., "5 Minuti Ancora" a cha, cha, cha (Five Minutes More). This song is played by Marino Marini and Peppino di Capri.

Orfeon Records announced the signing of singer Emily Cranz (of Tucson, Arizona), who speaks Spanish as a native. Paco de la Barrera, A&R of the label, is now preparing her first numbers.

We received a post card from Lucho Gatica who has had great success in Puerto Rico. By this time he is in México to fulfill future contracts.

A new orchestra of Cuban musicians (who actually live here in México) has just been formed under the name of Orquesta Cuba and has recorded for Columbia "Vámonos pá la pachanga" and "Nocturno de Chopin." "(Scandal) Escándalo," the best seller in México at the moment, has been recorded on Columbia by popular folk singer Javier Solis with mariachis accompaniment. The other side is "Ven a salvarme" (Come to save me).

Andy Russell told us he had to postpone his tour to Argentina because channel 9 was burned. He will wait a few weeks and in the meanwhile will appear at the Yate del Prado's TV show. We have heard a preview of his new record at Orfeon: "Jóvenes y bellas" (Young and beautiful) and we forecast a big success when it will be released.

Mamie Van Doren arrived in the Mexican capital to perform at the Teatro Blanquita with her own show. Mamie came to replace Jane Russell after a short stay performing in theaters and night clubs.

Nilla Pizzi, famous Italian singer, signed a contract with Orfeon Records and cut with Chico O'Farrill's orchestra the songs "Carolina Day" and "Una sola palabra" (One lonely word). She is finishing her first album for this label.

Los Tres Diamantes, the most popular Mexican trio at the moment, has just recorded a Spanish version of the popular American song, "The Green Leaves of Summer." This could be the third big hit by this group. First was "Never on Sunday" and then "Mas Allá," the winner of San Remo's Italian festival. Los Tres Diamantes are exclusively on RCA.

Before this agreement, it took too much time for these countries to have a good service. Demand for Mexican music is getting better each day.

The Cámara Nacional de la Industria de la Radiodifusión (National Chamber of Radio Industry), decided to rush thousands of transistor radios for the poor people who live in regions of the country where they still do not have electricity. These radios were made in México at a very low price and with a large reception power.

The winners of the Third National Jazz Festival left by plane to Evansville, Ind., to participate in the Jazz Festival there.

In conjunction with a coffee firm, RCA presented its first weekly TV show, with participation by such popular artists as Pedro Vargas, Amalia Mendoza, Pablo Beltrán Ruiz, Lety Cisneros, Marco Antonio Muñiz, Ruben Zepeda Novelo, María Victoria and others.

The famous Broadway show, "The Tender Trap," is being performed in México in a Spanish version by Sergio Corona, Martha Patricia, Carlos Riquelme and Lulu Parga, under direction of Enrique Rambal.

The Symphonic Orchestra of the University is performing its 23rd season at the Palace of Fine Arts. Last June 25 soloist Ruggiero Ricci with orchestra under direction of Jose F. Vázquez was presented.

At the National Auditorium last Sunday Russian dancer Xenia Zarina performed with Marcos Paredes. Appearing on the same show was young Mexican pianist Rosita del Sordo, playing music of Schumann, Ponce and Chopin.

Cisne Records announced the signing of the Architecture Orchestra and release of "Mas Allá" and "My Home Town." On the other side, Orfeon Records cut with Los Tribunos the songs "No es Negocio" (It is not Business) and "Naranjo y Lucas."

All these new singers and musicians are demonstrating new blood that people like, and will enrich the Mexican musical atmosphere. In less than one year we have new idols like Cesar Costa, Enrique Guzmán, The Teen Tops, Locos del Ritmo, Hooligans and Julissa.

FRANCE

A young Festival—it was held for the first time last summer—but an important one, is the International Jazz Festival which will take place year from July 18th to 24th in Antibes-Juan-les-Pins. This jazz gathering financed by the Mayor's office of Antibes-Juan-les-Pins and is held on in Gould Square at Juan-les-Pins where 5,000 people (the normal attendance at each concert) can be accommodated.

In charge of promoting the Festival each year are two men—Souplet whose job is the important one of choosing the program and coordinating the musicians, and Jacques Hebee who handles the administrative part—work—hotel reservations, publicity, transport, etc. In the mind of the organizers, this Festival was to be the European replica of the Newport Festival and in the beginning, it was mainly reserved for European jazzmen—only a few invited U.S. artists. But in view of the tremendous interest shown by last year's concerts, the gathering became really international and a year's participants will come from many different countries and represent widely contrasting jazz styles. There'll be Ray Charles and his group with the Kalwinski Trio from Poland; Kenny Ball's Orchestra from England and the "Studio 5" group from Czechoslovakia, who surprised Nicole Sorel and Jacques Souplet with their jazz virtuosity when they visited Paris a few months back. Admission is charged to cover the expenses of the Festival and the succeeding concerts will be broadcast by the French Radio and television system while twenty national radio chains will make it possible for listeners all over Europe to hear the on-the-spot performances—and avoid commercial breaks!

Press and newspaper men from all countries including Japan, will converge on a meeting of European and American jazz and fans from all over are expected to flock to the Riviera. It is reported that a Boeing jet will transport 100 from Sweden to the "Midi" in time for the opening.

What conclusion can we draw from the organizing of such a meeting? An important point comes immediately to mind—that music in general and jazz in particular seem to be an ideal means of amicably bringing together people of different nations, colors and ideologies—and that is something!

Last year's Festival was recorded by Barclay and released on that label. The resulting album served to introduce European jazz in all its aspects. This year's International Festival will be "the year of Ray Charles" for the famous musician will be making his first appearance in France. It seems to be a situation peculiar to France that a jazz musician can come as important a star for the public as a popular singer—and even more so. This is now the case with Ray Charles. Sydney Bechet reached this state of popularity before his death and was a veritable idol of the teen-agers and one of the biggest music hall and record stars in France as well as Belgium and Switzerland from 1950 to 1955. Charles is following closely in his footsteps and Ray's popularity is growing side by side with rock'n'roll craze.

And speaking of rock'n'roll. It must be said that the conduct of things at the Jazz Festival leaves nothing to be desired and has nothing in common with the disagreeable type of incidents which took place at Paris' rock festival last week. In addition to the noise, the fights and the broken bottles which characterized last week's incidents, we note that even the performers were attacked. Richard Anthony was slightly injured by a broken bottle thrown by a spectator. Fans leaving the hall literally in a panic the nearest "Metro" underground station and prevented the passage of the police for approximately a half hour before the police intervened and made a number of arrests. This type of thing is particularly disturbing in view of Hallyday's proposed Olympia stint in September and any similar outbreak might mark the end of rock'n'roll concerts here. In contrast, excellent results such as the coming Juan-les-Pins concerts seem slated to be enjoyed and to grow.

Eddie and Nicole Barclay are back from a month's business stay in the States. After his undeniable success with "San Miguel," singer Hugues Aufray (Barclay) has now waxed "Tucumcarim" and "Femme Du Liberia" ("from Liberia"). Among recent U.S. imports of note are "Bonanza" by Al Caiola, "Wheels" by Al Caiola.

Charles Aznavour's latest sides for Barclay include an E.P. featuring "Faut Savoir," "Le Carillonneur," "Avec Ces Yeux-La" and "La Marche Des Anges" from his latest film, "Taxi Pour Tobrouk." The latter tune has been recorded by Les Compagnons de la Chanson and seems to be heading for the best-selling lists.

Edith Piaf's condition at this writing shows considerable improvement.

Gloria Lasso has just recorded "Ton Adieux," second prize winner of the "Coq" competition which was sung in the contest by Jacqueline Nerouze (Bel-Air). Other Bel-Air news: Spartaco Sax and his rock'n'rollers have four tunes written by French composers. We note that this format includes no singers and features the tenor sax.

Being shipped to deejays now is Carl Sauceman's new "D" outing "Love Divided By Three" b/w "A Lonely Waltz." The former was co-penned by WMOX-Meridian, Miss. deejay Carl Fitzgerald, who also clefted Sauceman's last release, "I Walk A Lonely Street" . . . 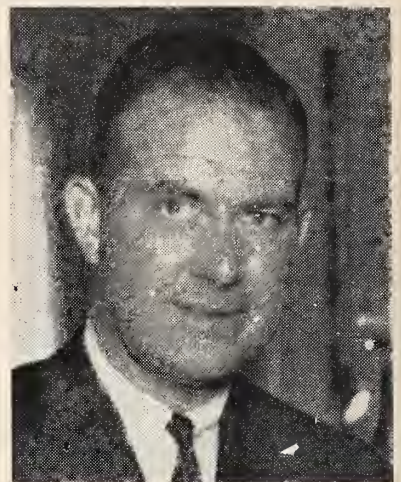

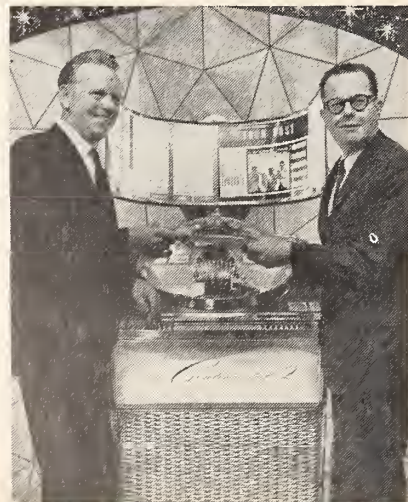

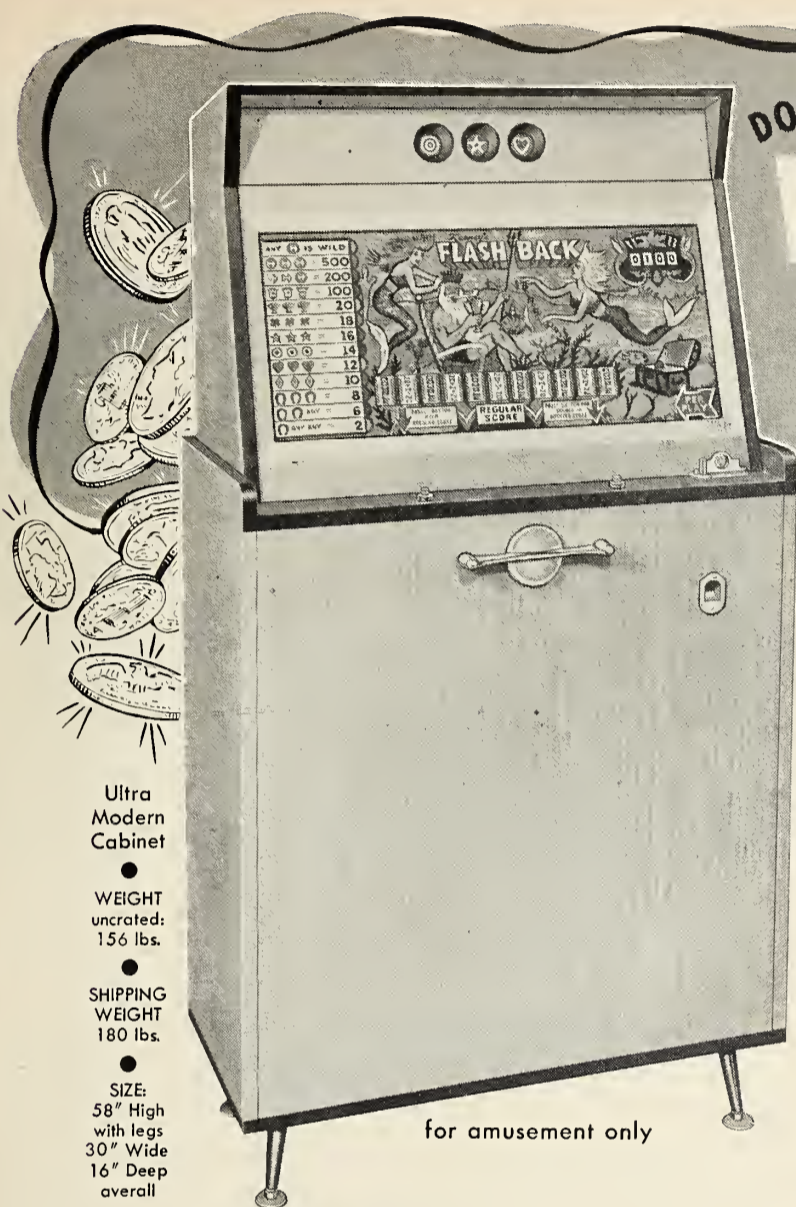

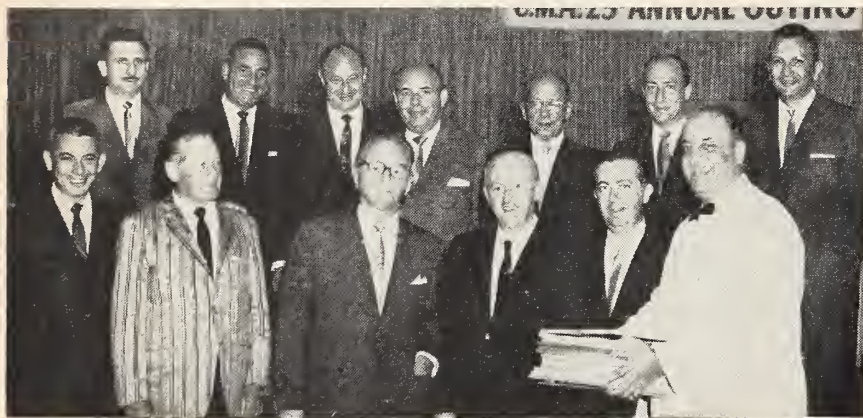

Canteen Unveils 'Dial-A-Sale' Machines For Supermarkets

Units Will Be Leased; Accept Up To \$10 Bills Now, Credit Cards Later

CHICAGO—Automatic Canteen Company of America announced that it is marketing a "totally new" automatic merchandising machine which can automate up to 90 per cent of supermarket operations.

Called "Dial-A-Sale," it makes possible automatic vending of staples, canned goods, meats, drugs and sundries, textile products and housewares, or ready-to-eat hot foods from unattended units tailored to fit any width or depth. The units are available singly or in multiples; product compartments may be made any size and are adjustable.

Frederick L. Schuster, Automatic Canteen Chairman, said Dial-A-Sale "operates on a totally-new, wholly foolproof principle of vending developed in Automatic Canteen's Tonomat plant in Western Germany." He said the units will be leased, rather than sold, with complete mechanical maintenance carried out by Automatic Canteen.

To select an item a shopper dials one or two numbers on a telephone-like dial at the unit, deposits currency or coins and receives immediate delivery of the item selected. Products are displayed in glass-faced cubicles. Customers receive the article they see.

For multiple purchases, Dial-A-Sale totals the items and gives correct change from a \$5 or \$10 bill. Other units now in development are engineered to complete the transaction when approved credit cards are inserted. These sales will be automatically recorded for both store and customer.

"It may be used to extend the store's selling hours by arranging

banks of machines either outside the store or in a separate inside area. Dial-A-Sale also makes possible the establishment of a new development—the completely automatic shopping island, open day or night, requiring only a minimum building to house the units and surrounded by open parking space," Schuster said.

Hills Bros. Completes Tests On Coffee For Bally Units

SAN FRANCISCO—Officials of Hills Bros. Coffee, Inc., this city, have advised that location testing of 'Vending Special,' the firm's coffee used for single-cup Bally vending machines has been completed and is now available in 1 3/4 lb. vacuum-packed cans.

A special 5c per pound allowance is currently being offered operators during an introductory period. Edlund can-openers are also being used as a giveaway to help promote the new coffee product.

Connecticut Ops Meet To Discuss New Free-Play Legislation, 2¢ Cig Tax and Importance Of State Assoc.

HARTFORD, CONN.—A dinner meeting of the Music Operators of Connecticut was held at the Hotel Bond, Hartford, Connecticut on June 15, and thirty-eight operators attended. President Jerome Lambert presided. Guests present were Mac Perlman, Bob Jones, Irv Kempner, Stanley Nankoff.

Joseph Burns, Counsel for the Music Operators of Connecticut told the group that an amendment to the State Statutes, which was Senate Bill 1158, had been submitted in the hopes of relieving the consequences of the Supreme Court decision which declared free plays to be of value. He stated that progress had been made, but we were not able to get the bill approved so the measure could be voted on. It was reported by Mr. Burns that the bill was carefully drawn so as not to conflict with the existing definitions of gambling devices. "We'll try again in the next session of the Legislature." Attorney Burns also reported about new legislation concerning vending machines and a 2¢ increase in the cigarette tax.

Abe Fish gave a talk about MOA and the Aescap Bill in Congress and especially stressed the importance of joining the State Association and not only being a member, but it is important for members to attend meetings. A Statewide Association is necessary to fight local ordinances that are unreasonable, and anything else

of statewide nature that requires watching and fighting. Members must realize these statewide matters cannot be handled by local members. "In union we have strength, otherwise we will all fall by the wayside," concluded Fish.

CMMA Successful In Assembly Bill Fight

LOS ANGELES—The California Music Merchants Association reports it has been successful in eliminating Assembly Bill No. 3068. This bill would have placed a state license of \$6.50 on a per machine basis, and would have cost the operators in California a hundred thousand dollars or more in licenses, according to association officials.

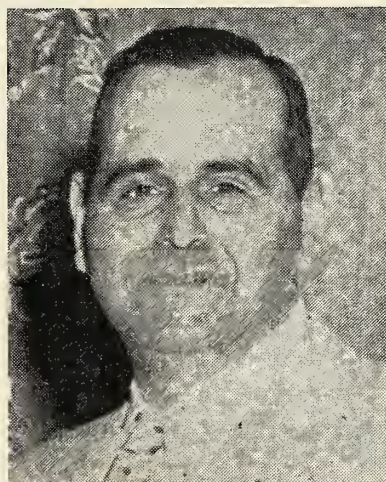

Miller, the State President and Executive Director of the California Music Merchants Association, reports that Assembly Bill No. 3068 was referred to the Rules Committee and then to an interim committee for further study which automatically cancels any further action on this particular bill during the 1960 session of the California Legislature.

Before enplaning for Cedar Rapids Ginsburg advised that Atlas Music Company is very actively re-entering the Iowa territory after having relinquished the Seeburg distributorship in that region about two years ago to Phil Moss, who is currently Seeburg's distributor in Iowa with headquarters in Des Moines.

Ginsburg stated in conclusion that Atlas Music will shortly open a branch distribution office and showroom for AMI phonographs and back-
