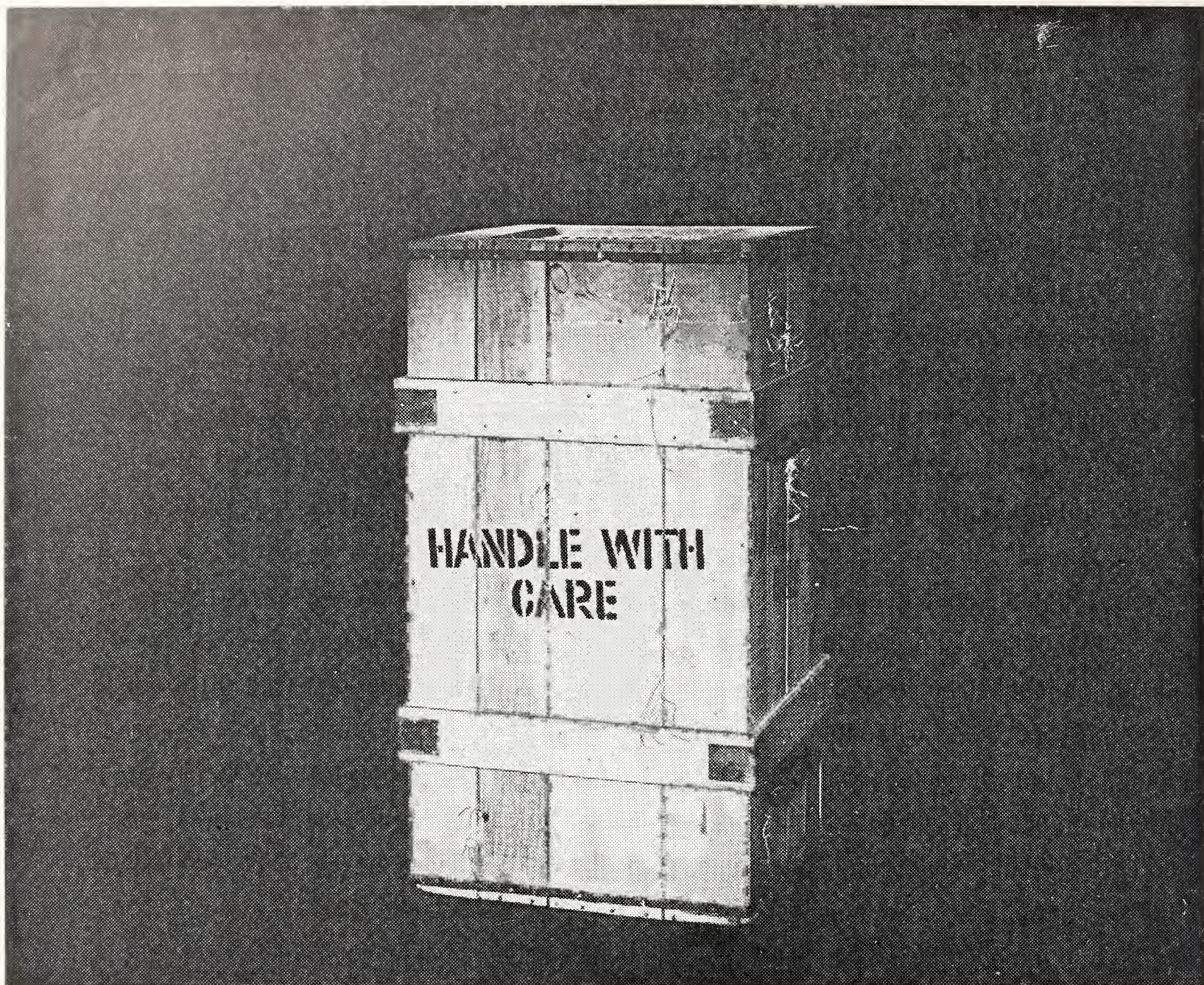

It's almost nine years now since "Gee" by the Crows, a disk generally considered by the record industry as the first rock and roll hit, was released. During the early years, 1953 and 54, every one considered rock and roll a passing trend and the most popular comment on the subject was: "it can't last."

Now, nine years later, and only one year away from the decade mark, rock and roll continues to gain in strength. Its effect has been felt around the world and the music annals of the future will refer to the Fifties as the rock and roll era.

But if we consider how rock and roll continues to build, these same annals may very well be referring to the Sixties as well as the Fifties as the rock and roll years.

A glance at the Top 100 best seller list clearly indicates that between 80% and 90% of the nation's top sellers fall into the rock and roll category. Few artists performing without the big beat over an extended period of time can remain important factors on today's singles scene. Yes, novelties, non-rock-and-roll instrumentals, inspirational material and many other categories are always to be represented in the singles department

and during certain periods may show increased strength. But there is absolutely no doubt now that the singles record buyer wants rock and roll music in heavy doses and if the manufacturer is to succeed he must supply it.

It is obvious that many of the leading recording stars of the early years are well aware of this existing situation. During the past year or so many of these top name artists have drifted away from the hard rock sound in an effort to broaden their repertoire and render a few classical standards, etc. But it is interesting to note that everyone of them has returned to the hard driving, big beat sound in order to keep their following. A break can only be temporary if an artist is to continue at the top.

Even in the album field, rock and roll product has been gaining. Although the percentage of such merchandise is approximately 20% of the Top 50 LP's, recent years have seen such albums gain in importance.

What many consider a passing trend only a few years ago is definitely a long running era of music. And it appears now that it may be a stronger era than even the Charleston or swing years.

Pick of the Week

"RIDERS IN THE SKY" (1:53) [Edwin H. Morris ASCAP—Jones]
 "MY LOVE FOR YOU" (1:56) [Harry Von Tilzer ASCAP—Cates]
 LAWRENCE WELK (Dot 16237)

The "Top 100" Welk sound, which just shared sales honors on "Yellow Bird," should continue its winning ways with a striking guitar-led teen-slanted revival of the old Vaughn Monroe hit, "Riders In The Sky." Wordless chorus adds a haunting touch. Coupler is a pretty sentimental date that might make some noise.

"HIT THE ROAD JACK" (2:00) [Tangerine BMI—Mayfield]
 "THE DANGER ZONE" (2:22) [Tangerine BMI—Mayfield]
 RAY CHARLES (ABC—Paramount 10244)

Deejays should find Charles' performance in "Hit The Road Jack," a happy blues-swing, refreshing programming. The performer's semi-wail stint is backed by a delectable sound from a femme chorus. Flip is a real low-down blues plaintive. Topside has the Top 100 potential.

"BACKTRACK" (2:03) [Vanadore BMI—Zanetis, Young]
 "I CAN'T FIND THE TIME" (2:34) [Pamper BMI—Nelson]
 FARON YOUNG (Capitol 4616)

With "Hello Walls" firmly entrenched as his toehold in the pop field, Faron Young could repeat the pop chart climb with "Backtrack," a colorfully displayed folkish item that's taken at a galloping beat and etched deeply with the commercial sound. A more conventional slow country ballad, "I Can't Find The Time," on the flipside could create important action in the country market.

After several rock-rhythm successes, including "You Can Have Her," the songster turns to two strong ballad statements. "There We Were" is a highly attractive pop version of Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata," with the string section strikingly reflecting the tune's classical origins. "If," Perry Como's onetime hit, is revived with the kids solidly in mind.

"LET TRUE LOVE BEGIN" (2:27)

 "CAPPACHINA" (2:46) [Comet—Massara, Nise, Pallauicini, Sherman]
 NAT COLE (Capitol 4623)

Songster bids for strong Top 100 action on "Let True Love Begin," a "Save The Last Dance For Me"-flavored opus which the performer with romantic taste against an interesting rock-a-cha sound from the full ork-wordless chorus. Underlid is a swingin' affair sung in both English and Italian.

"I DON'T LIKE IT LIKE THAT" (1:50) [Kel BMI—Kenner]
 "MR. JOHNNY Q" (2:12) [Alan K. BMI—The Bobbettes]
 THE BOBBETTES (Gone 5112)

"I Don't Like It Like That" replies to the current Chris Kenner (Instant) smash with a solid rhythmic attack by the larks and combo. Gals may well have a strong Top 100 entry here. Underlid has an infectious medium-beat way (strings included).

"LET THEM TALK" (2:07) [Big Bopper BMI—Hall, Stafford]
 "SHE ONCE BELONGED TO ME" (2:15) [Big Bopper BMI—Inman]
 JOHNNY PRESTON (Mercury 71865)

The songster can renew his Top 100 career (i.e. "Running Bear," "Feel So Fine," "Cradle of Love") with a fine calypso-backed sound on a theme about a guy who digs the dame no matter what's being said to "slander her name." Coupler is a dramatic slow-beat affair.

 From an LP devoted to softie hits by
 Elvis Presley ("Ballads of the King"),
 the fine mixed vocal group invitingly
 handles the pretty number. Attractive
 and, if properly introduced, interest-
 ing programming.

 Leiber] Similar job on another opus
 from the Presley hit catalog.

 The oldie receives a delectable upbeat
 banjo reading. This novelty approach
 to the tune, from an LP tagged

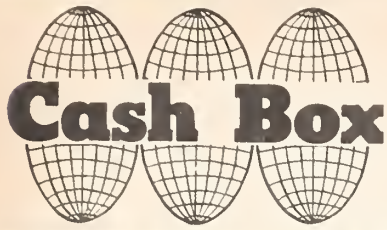

TONY ROSSINI (Sun 366)

(B+) "WELL I ASK YA" (2:08) [Hollis BMI—Vandyke] Strong teen tune, a smash in England, gets a sound-wise reading from the songster and rock-a-string backing. Should be eyed. Kay Starr (Capitol) also has a U.S. reading.

(B) "DARLENA" (2:35) [Hi Lo BMI—Todd] There's a potent rock-a-billy sound on this end.

HOMER DENISON (Time 1042)

(B+) "THE ENDLESS TIDE" (2:40) [Thursday BMI—Denison, Halliday] Very attractive melody is done with a strong lush sound by the pianist and full ork—wordless chorus. Could be a big deejay item, which could mean a Top 100 stand.

THE TOLEDOS (Down 2003)

(B+) "THIS IS OUR NIGHT" (2:05) [Emorey BMI—Bell, Williams, Sutton, Hooker] Team's lead hands in a solid emotional display of the strong romancer. Constant percussion beat in the setting adds to the drama of the affair. Handled by the End-Gone set-up, side has a sound that should be watched.

(B) "JOHN SMITH'S BODY" (2:00) [Emorey BMI—Carroll] Zany laff angle based on the famed Captain John Smith-Pocahontas tale.

KOKOMO (Felsted 8628)

(B+) "PIANO RHAPSODY" (1:54) [Barbro ASCAP—Wisner] Familiar "Hungarian Rhapsody" tune gets a sparkling sound a la the pianist's recent "Asia Minor" click. This colorful cut might score.

(B) "SWEET MEMORIES" (2:30) [Barbro ASCAP—Wisner] Another familiar theme is done with a milder upbeat sound.

KENNY DINO (Musicor 1013)

(B+) "DON'T BLAME ME" (2:49) [Robbins ASCAP—Fields, McHugh] The evergreen is done with a lovely ballad sound by the talented performer. Can move with enough exposure.

BILLY MAC (Music Makers 107)

(B+) "TOMORROW NIGHT" (2:24) [Bourne ASCAP—Coslow, Grosz] The blues standard, originally a hit by Lonnie Johnson about two decades ago, gets a persuasive R&B-flavored ballad pose from the warbler. Could get solid R&B-pop reaction.

(B) "DON'T TELL ME NO LIES" (2:05) [Alan K & Andrew Scott BMI—McDonald] Cheerful shuffle-beat blueser here.

SKEETER DAVIS (RCA Victor 7928)

(B+) "OPTIMISTIC" (1:57) [Big "D" & Neillrae BMI—Freeman] The fine country-pop lark hands-in a feelingful account of a lovely number of love-found and bound-to-last. Tender rock-a-string backing. Could develop into a chart stand.

(B+) "BLUEBERRY HILL" (1:58) [Chappell ASCAP—Lewis, Stock, Rose] The standby is heard with a rhythmic delivery plus bright string remarks. Also eye.

KING COLEMAN (Kenco 5017)

(B+) "ALLEY RAT" (2:16) [Bel-leclair & Straight Ahead BMI—Coleman] Novelty rockers about persons, places and things are humorously kidded by songster Coleman and an infectious medium Latinish beat combo. Fun stint could do chart business.

(B) "DRESSED IN PLAID" (2:27) [Kenco & Gradick ASCAP—Coleman] Zany blues-laff affair.

JACK JONES (Kapp 419)

(B+) "DONKEY SERENADE" (2:33) [G. Schirmer ASCAP—Forrest, Wright, Friml, Stothart] Songster's Afro-Cuban-swing version of the song differs markedly from his father's (Alan Jones) famed handling of the tune. Jack Jones is a fine songster, and this bright item merits spins. Jocks may lean heavy on it.

BIOS FOR DEEJAYS

Eddie Hodges



Eddie Hodges' story is short in years but long in experience. Born on March 5, 1947 in Hattiesburgh, Miss., Eddie no sooner left kindergarten when he moved with his family to New York and immediately began his show biz career by winning an audition for the Jackie Gleason show. That was in 1953. Guest shots on other major TV shows followed. Then came the big break—an important role in the Meredith Wilson Broadway musical, "Music Man"—which endeared the youngster to the entertainment world. After playing 405 performances (the show ran much longer), Eddie left to play Frank Sinatra's son in the film, "Hole In The Head," participating with Frank in the hit record from the film, "High Hopes." Then Eddie played "Huckleberry Finn" in the movie of that name, and then returned to Broadway in "Critic's Choice." Cadence Records signed him this year and he's hitting with his first single, "I'm Gonna Knock On Your Door."

Newest addition to the still-young Scepter label is songster Tommy Hunt. His first outing for the label, now in the #80 spot on the Top 100, is "Human."

Actually, Tommy was well known to record audiences before coming to Scepter. He was the lead singer with the Flamingos and scored with that group in such disks as "I Only Have Eyes For You," "Your Other Love" and many others. Recently he struck out from that group for a career as a single—"Human" indicates he's making it.

Tommy was born on June 18, 1934 in Pittsburgh; went to high school there excelling in track & field and swimming. He still keeps active in sports and gets to the gym for a workout whenever possible. After high school he served a stint with the Air Force and joined the Flamingos soon after discharge.

A New York trip complete with auditions for three major diskeries awaits the Sullivan Trio, a new group from Duquesne, Pa., top winners in KDKA's singing competition conducted at the three station-sponsored summer "Sing-Alongs." Auditions have been set for the trio with RCA Victor, Columbia and Capitol.

News of personnel changes, time shifts, etc., have been trickling across this desk from WKMJ-Detroit for the past two months indicating something's happening out there. Could be the station is going to start swinging the competition axe against WJBK and WXYZ. We're still awaiting full info from WKMJ execs.

Another station that looks like a big new swinger is WILD-Boston. Recently it went over to a combined r&b-jazz-pop format and reports from fieldmen indicate it's going to be a big voice in the area. Nelson Noble is heading up the operation as president with the deejay staff including Speed Anderson, Henry McFarlane and Mark Grimes. It's funny how the quest for success has led some stations to discard the rock sound for "good music" and others to do the reverse.

WAPE-Jacksonville, Fla., in its recent APE Club Convention, filled the Gator Bowl with over 50,000 teens for a rocking nine-hour show that featured the Everly Bros., Bobby Vee, Del Shannon, Jack Scott, Wanda Jackson, Tex Ritter, Mark Dinning, Charley Rich, Jerry Lee Lewis, the Markkeys and the Faron Young ork. Quite a party!

New York City's first FM multiplex stereo broadcast was beamed by WQXR last Wednesday. The broadcast kicked off a week of one-hour nightly test programs which will result in the scheduling of regular FM multiplex stereo shows during normal program hours beginning Sept. 7.

It wasn't hot enough to fry eggs on the sidewalk and that must have made the Miami chamber of commerce very happy. A couple of weeks ago a group of WQAM-Miami disk jockeys, dressed appropriately in chefs hats and aprons, cracked eggs on the sidewalk. They stuck but didn't fry. It finally took an acetylene torch to heat the sidewalk sufficiently to fry them (but nobody tried eating them). So, via WQAM, Miami people know that no matter how hot it gets, it's impossible to fry eggs on the sidewalk. Isn't that interesting?

Mr. C. Thomas, music director of KCIL-Houma, La., says he will place any deejay on a special mailing list to receive copies of new releases from the Louisiana area which might otherwise be "hard to get." The service, says Thomas will of course benefit the radio stations and may also help to

produce a surprise talent from the Louisiana area. (Like Joe Barry?) Service is completely free.

WRCV-Philadelphia continues to roll along with big band remotes. Last week they picked up the Warren Covington (Dorsey) for two hours from the Drexelbrook Club and also piped in Ray McKinley (Miller) from Sunnybrook, the largest ballroom in the east. The Sunnybrook remote (8/26) was the first of a series that will bring in future weeks such names as Count Basie, Stan Kenton, Maynard Ferguson, Harry James and Louis Armstrong. The program comes as a result of special arrangements just concluded after several months of negotiations with Raymond C. Hartenstine, Sr., owner of Sunnybrook, and the Pottstown Local, AF of M. According to the station these Sunnybrook remotes mark a milestone in the station's efforts begun in January 1960 to revive big band music and return it to its former high standing among the populace.

Usual Lee Wong, an oriental weatherman, has been added to the cast of characters featured on the morning WCKR-Miami Buddy Holiday show.

WMCA-New York's popular pre-dawn stanza, "Night Watch," is now being hosted by New York's tallest disk jockey: six-foot-five-inch Dan Daniel, who's filling the slot vacated by Burt Sherwood. Daniel, who spent four years at WJGY-Minneapolis, will also handle the Sunday 6-10:30 PM slot. . . . Joe Niagra exits KBIG-Hollywood in September, at the time the station's studios move to the transmitter on Catalina Island. Joe says he's in the midst of huddling with two Hollywood stations at the moment and a deal should be finalized soon. . . . Ted "Sweet Daddy" Atkins leaves KUDL-Kansas City for deejay and news work at KIMN-Denver. . . . Ken Dodds, after five years with CJGX-Yorkton, Sask., as announcer and local sales rep, has been promoted to the position of promotion manager at the station. . . . Among the new changes at WTRY-Troy, N.Y. are the promotion of John Mounter, former program director and merchandising manager, to program manager; the promotion of former continuity head, Al Herskovitz to production supervisor, and the addition of Pittsfield, Mass. disk jockey Jack Ryan to host the nightly "Tri City Ballroom." . . . Big Shakeup at WROV-Roanoke, Va. has Ron Sunshine into the PD post and new jockeys Fred Frelantz (from KIRL-Wichita), Charlie Bush (from WAXX-Eau Claire, Wisc.) and Dave Novak (from WIST-Charlotte, N.C.). Sunshine, in addition, is also holding down the 9-midnight trick. . . . Norm Castle is hosting the "Kall's Castle" weekends at KALL-Salt Lake City.

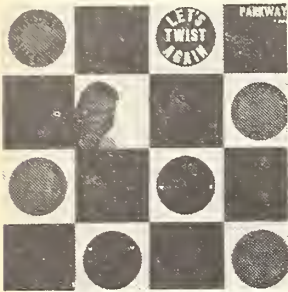

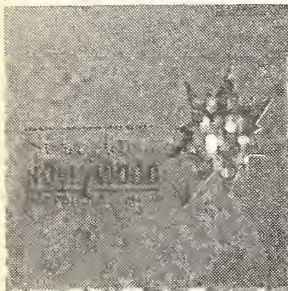

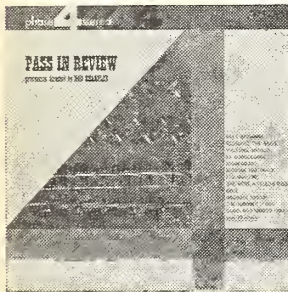
POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK



"LET'S TWIST AGAIN"—Chubby Checker—Parkway P 7004
The screaming, raucous teen invitation shouted by Chubby Checker on "Let's Twist Again" heads up this newest LP in which the songster performs a handful of other dance items plus more. He digs hard on "I Could Have Danced All Night," "Takes Two To Tango," "Ballin' The Jack" and "Quarter To Three." Has chart strength.



"STEREO ACTION GOES HOLLYWOOD" — Marty Gold and his Orch.—RCA Victor LSA-2381
The revolving sound of the label's sound series treks to screenland for a look-in on a dozen flick gems. Orkster Gold puts the effect to good use in interesting arrangements of such themes as "3rd Man," "Colonel Bogey," "Invitation," "Moulin Rouge" and "Around The World." Fine stereo listening.



"PASS IN REVIEW"—Bob Sharples—London SP 44001
London bows its "phase 4 stereo" line with all the pomp and fanfare of the world's biggest parade. Each country's band marches into view and then out of range followed quickly by the next band. Sounds of marching, horses, caissons, planes overhead and other trappings of a military parade accompany the music. It begins with "Rule Britannia," "Scotland The Brave," "Waltzing Matilda" and "La Marseillaise" and other countries through side one. Side two is all the U.S. with typical military parade music. Great listening here. An auspicious debut for the line.



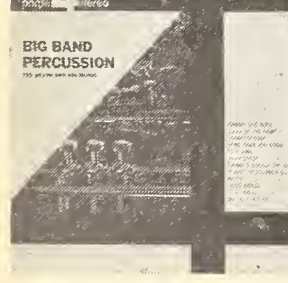
"HE NEEDS ME" — Gloria Lynne — Everest LPBR 5128
Titled after her recent chart-riding single, this album is Gloria Lynne's sixth for the label attesting to her consistent staying power in the album field. Here she sings all romantic ballads in her husky, blue-flame voice. Included are superb renditions of "Wild Is The Wind," "You're Mine You," "Make The Man Love Me" and "You Don't Know What Love Is." Potent entry for the thrush.



"SPECIAL DELIVERY" — Della Reese — RCA Victor LPM-2391
This is Della Reese's best album to date. Unhampered by a rock-n-roll beat (replaced by a crisply swinging Mercer Ellington band), she vibrantly performs on a collection of superior pop items. Her clipped, precise delivery is charmingly arrayed over "Won'cha Come Home Bill Bailey," "Have You Ever Been Lonely," "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows" and "You're Nobody Til Somebody Loves You." Exciting LP fare that will stand the songstress in good stead for new fans.



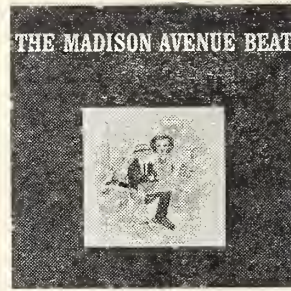
"MAGNIFICENCE IN BRASS"—Jerry Fielding and his Orch.—Time S/2042
A 27-piece brass ensemble under Jerry Fielding's direction comes to life with all the magnificence and timbre of brass ever captured on disk before. All the subtle shadings and textures have been used to full advantage, yet there is nothing loud about the album. Tunes have also been selected toward this end and wise choices were made in the prologue from "West Side Story," two excerpts from DeFalla's "El Amor Brujo," and the "City Of Brass" original. Stereo sound is extremely faithful. Disk should win a big following.



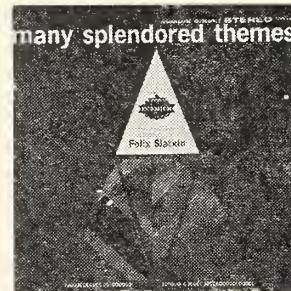
"BIG BAND PERCUSSION"—Ted Heath and his Music—London SP 44002
The Ted Heath big band swings out heartily on its first date for the label's new "phase 4 stereo" line and proves a winner from the start. Clever arrangements of songs that lend themselves to this treatment is the keyword and the precision Heath band is ably up to the task of efficiently disposing of such tunes as "Johnny One Note," "Peanut Vendor," "Daddy" and "Thou Swell" in spirited, vibrant terms. Album is one of the highlights of the series.



"WITNESS!"—Dramatic Highlights of Congressional Investigations—Riverside RLP 7513/14
Bud Greenspan has produced an exciting compendium of the "age of investigations." The two-disk package, cracklingly narrated by H. V. Kaltenborn, traces the Congressional investigating committees and presents the recorded highlights of the Kefauver "Crime Committee's" interrogation (by Sen. Tobey and Rudolph Halley) of Frank Costello, Frank Erickson; the "duel" between Joseph Welch and Sen. McCarthy; the Whittaker Chambers confrontation of Alger Hiss; the McClellan committee's activities, and many others. A fascinating disk account.



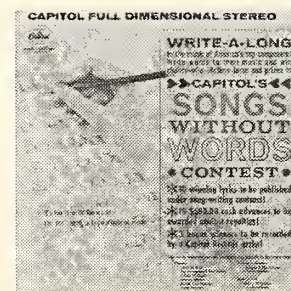
"THE MADISON AVENUE BEAT"—Lester Lanin and his Orch.—Epic LN 3796
The lively Lester Lanin band embraces no less than 58 commercial jingles in a spirited salute to the Mad Ave tunesmiths. All the "famous" nationally advertised brands are here and it makes great fun just listening and trying to guess the product for each jingle. The Lanin arrangements are cleverly constructed, making full use of the melodic potential of each tune. Great for dancing too.



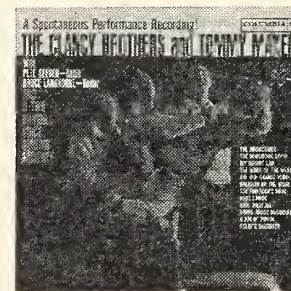
"MANY SPLENDORED THEMES"—Felix Slatkin—Liberty LSS 14011
Slatkin's strings in twelve deliciously fragrant flick theme moods. Selections are from the best of the lot, including "Spellbound," "Terry's Theme," "Around The World," "Summer Place," "Three Coins In The Fountain" and "Love Is A Many Splendored Thing." Inventive orchestrations give it strong appeal.



"THE MODERNAIRES SING THE GREAT GLENN MILLER INSTRUMENTALS"—Ultra Audio WWS 8510
The vocal group that began its ascent on the Glenn Miller bandstand recreates here a dozen of the old band's big tunes, some originally instrumentals, some which had originally featured the Modernaires. Alan Copeland leads a top flight assemblage of musicians playing refurbished (stereo) arrangements while the Modernaires superbly harmonize lyrics to "Tuxedo Junction," "Moonlight Serenade," "String Of Pearls," "In The Mood" and "Little Brown Jug."



"SONGS WITHOUT WORDS"—Jack Marshall—Capitol ST 1601
Label's "Song Without Words" contest is offering to budding clefters an opportunity to supply lyrics to as yet unnamed tunes by such illustrious writers as Johnny Mercer, James Van Heusen, Harry Warren, Jimmy McHugh, Gene DePaul and Jay Livingston & Ray Evans. Also, there are melodies by rock 'n' roll and country tunesmiths. Winning lyrics get cash, publishing and possibly a Capitol recording of the song. Some interesting melodies here, appropriately essayed by the Jack Marshall ork. Deck has appeal to all markets.



"THE CLANCY BROTHERS AND TOMMY MAKEM"—Columbia CL-1648
The joy of hearing pure, authentic folk songs sung by men of its heritage never diminishes. The Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem fit into this category. A virile quartet of men, they sing the earthy, robust songs of Ireland—the rebel songs, the love ballads, the traditional laments—as they were meant to be sung. They are accompanied by Pete Seeger (banjo) and Bruce Langhorne (guitar) and occasionally by the 200-strong audience in the simulated concert hall in Columbia's studios. A thoroughly charming session.



"IMMORTAL MUSIC FROM THE MOVIES"—Whittemore & Lowe—Capitol ST 1599
Filmusic that has become standard fare receives inviting mood interpretations by the dual piano team against a lush string orchestral backdrop. Selections include "Tara's Theme," "The High And The Mighty," "Ruby," "Lili," "Moulin Rouge" and "Spellbound."



"THE NEW 'I LOVE PARIS'"—Michel Legrand and his Orch.—Columbia CL 1640
Michel Legrand's first "I Love Paris" LP introduced him to American disk audiences and resulted in one of the label's biggest hit sets. The original songs have been retained, as have many of the original arrangements, but now newly-recorded in stereo a new sales vista is open for it. A tribute to the Legrand touch is that the modernity he achieved in the first set is just as up to date now with just some minor changes for stereo's sake. Among the tunes are "I Love Paris," "Under The Bridges Of Paris," "La Vie En Rose" and "The Last Time I Saw Paris."



"GUITAR LAMENT"—Al Viola—World Pacific WP-1408
A lot of of artistry and care has gone into the production of this album. Viola, basically a pop guitarist, takes on a new look as he combines influences from classical, flamenco and jazz in restyled interpretations of twelve pop songs played on the simple but eloquent classical guitar. Intriguing listening as Viola performs "Lover Man," "Black Coffee" and "End Of A Love Affair," among others.



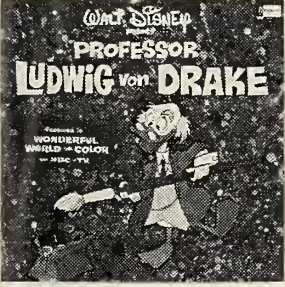
"THE MAGIC ISLANDS REVISITED"—Axel Stordahl and his Orch. and Chorus—Decca DL 79096
A "return to paradise" musical offering in which Stordahl gathers up his ork, the Gene Rains choristers, the seagulls and tastefully essays a dozen Island-influenced tunes. A 10-page colorful picture panorama of Hawaiian sights accompanies the disk in booklet form. Selections include "Return To Paradise," "The Hukilau Song," "Farewell" and "Forevermore."



"GUS BIVONA DEALS IN MILLIONS"—Warner Bros. W 1361
Echoes of the Swing Era here as Gus Bivona twists his way through line-up of the period's big hits in the original styles of their creators. Included are Woody Herman's "Woodchopper's Ball," Artie Shaw's "Summit Ridge Drive," Basie's "One O'Clock Jump" and Glenn Miller's "Tuxedo Junction."



"BABES IN TOYLAND"—Narrated by Little Boy Blue—Disneyland ST-3913
Also preceding the forthcoming soundtrack LP is this "storyteller" of the Disney adaptation of the Victor Herbert musical, which contains the same 15 selections as the \$1.98 set but with an additional narration of the story line by Little Boy Blue (Ginny Tyler). An 11-page color booklet is bound into the book-fold jacket. Musical performances are excellent and the narration has tremendous kiddie appeal.



"PROFESSOR LUDWIG VON DRAKE"—Disneyland DQ-1222
New Walt Disney character, Professor Ludwig von Drake, star of the NBC-TV'er "Wonderful World Of Color," is introduced on disks in all his comical self-esteem. Children should delight in his vaudevillian German accent and the manner in which he imitates Elvis and others. Good display cover.



"COUNTRY MUSIC SAMPLERS"—Various Artists—Starday SLP 143
Thirteen selections, each from a Starday album, serve as a generous introduction to the well-diversified Starday country music LP catalog. A big buy at the \$1.98 tag. Heard in the set are Cowboy Copas, George Jones, Frankie Miller, Benny Martin, Moon Mullican, Red Sovine and others.



"THE FIRST COUNTRY COLLECTION OF WARREN SMITH"—Liberty LST 7199
Fast rising young newcomer to country music ranks, Warren Smith bows on his first album for the label. In it he performs his two big hits, "I Don't Believe I'll Fall In Love Today" and "Odds And Ends," and lends a talented voice to the recreation of several country items of recent vintage, including "Foolin' Around," "Kissing My Pillow," "Pick Me Up On Your Way Down" and "I Fall To Pieces." Should get a solid country field reception.

JAZZ



"DONALD BYRD AT THE HALF NOTE CAFE"—Volume 1—Blue Note 4060
The relaxed, superbly sympathetic atmosphere of NY's Half Note Cafe has resulted in several outstanding location recordings. Here, Blue Note has taken its equipment into the spot for a two-volume session with the newly-formed Donald Byrd group and there's no doubt as to the consistency of the outcome. Byrd's sweetly surging trumpet work is supported by Pepper Adams, Duke Pearson, Laymon Jackson and Lex Humphries in a spirited exhibition of jazz fireworks. Since there are only four cuts there is plenty of room for each to stretch out.



"A DATE WITH THE MASTERSOUNDS"—Fantasy 3316
Disbanded except for Fantasy LP dates, the Mastersounds still maintain the high level of individuality that first marked their ascendancy. Here, Buddy Montgomery is back on v'bes (he's been concentrating on piano with the Montgomery Brothers) and he's a delight of tasteful ingenuity, leading the group through intelligently constructed readings of "Whisper Not," "Surrey With The Fringe On Top," "Noreen's Nocturne" and five others.



"FREEDOM SOUND"—The Jazz Crusaders—Pacific Jazz PJ-27
The Jazz Crusaders are four young men from Houston who through years of playing together have developed into a cohesive, purposeful jazz unit. On their debut disk there is a bristling enthusiasm that propels them headlong into a stimulating display of jazz knowledge. Selections, except for the "Theme From Exodus," are all originals by group members. Solid jazz listening here.

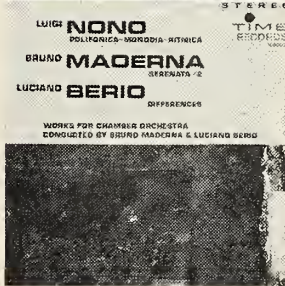


"GERRY MULLIGAN WITH CHET BAKER"—GNP-56
No liner notes to reveal circumstances of this date but it is apparent that it was made some time ago. Nonetheless, Mulligan and Baker work collaboratively here in a relaxed, easy-going manner and provide substantial interest for even the casual jazz fan. The addition of Buddy DeFranco and the Herman McCoy Swing Choir on side two gives a "pop" sheen to the proceedings and makes it even more accessible to non-jazz buyers. Pleasant listening package.

"WORKS FOR CHAMBER ORCHESTRA"—Conducted by Bruno Maderna and Luciano Berio—Time S/8002
Three young Italian composers who are working in the new electronic music idiom are represented in Time's latest classical venture, The English Chamber ork under Bruno Maderna's direction performs the conductor's "Serenata #2" and Luigi Nono's "Polifonica-Monodia-Ritmica"; Berio conducts an ensemble in his own "Differences." Earl Brown has done a highly commendable recording job on this controversial music.

End Of UA's Fall Program Will Show Top Sales Period

NEW YORK—United Artists Records will wind up the most successful sales period in its history September 1 when its Fall Program is concluded, Art Talmadge, vice-president and general manager, revealed last week. With 15 albums included in the program, Talmadge said that over-all gross for the program would near the \$1,700,000 mark.

In view of the steadily increasing billings, and the upcoming Fall selling season, Talmadge said that with the addition of Chet Woods, newly-appointed vice-president, and the naming of Jerry Raker as national sales manager, UA was firming up its entire selling organization.

In this regard, Raker last week announced two distributor changes. Weimar Sales will now represent UA in Phoenix, Arizona and El Paso, Texas, while Southern Record Distributors, Nashville distributor, will add the Memphis territory to its coverage for the company. Both appointments, Raker said, are effective immediately.

Starday Offers Ops "Hall Of Fame" Decks

MADISON, TENN.—Starday Records has bowed a "Juke Box Hall of Fame" series for operators, which the country-gospel label is offering to one-stops on a 25-free-for-every-100-purchased basis. Initial offering in the series is Cowboy Copas' "Filipino Baby" and "Signed Sealed & Delivered." The label also announced that it is extending its "Second Annual Country Music Spectacular Package Goods Sales," originally set to end August 31, to September 15. LP's and EP's are being offered on a 3-for-10 basis.

Columbia Sets 28 LP's For Sept.

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has set 28 LP's for September release, including 13 pop, 9 Masterworks, three Latin-American "EX" 's, one Harmony kiddie and two jazz (also available as a 2-disk package).

The pop issues are highlighted by "Your Request Sing-Along with Mitch," the fourteenth issue in the label's remarkably successful series by Mitch Miller, Doris Day's "I Have Dreamed," "Here I Go Again," soprano Eileen Farrell's second pop LP, and Tony Bennett's "My Heart Sings."

The other pop entries are: Marty Robbins' "Just a Little Sentimental," Andre Kostelanetz's "Wonderland of Sound," Pete Seeger Story Songs (folk-singer's first for Columbia), Flatt & Scrugg's "Songs of the Famous Carter Family," "Laugh Along with the Kirby Stone Four at the Playboy Club," George Morgan's "Golden Memories" and three stereo specials: Johnny Williams' "Rhythm in Motion," Simon Rady's "Voices in Motion" and Jack Pleis' "Stage Left—Stage Right."

The jazz packages include: "Friday Night at the Blackhawk" and "Saturday Night at the Blackhawk," the first Miles Davis Quintet LP cut "live" (also available as a two-disk package).

Italian-American Song Fete For N.Y. In Sept.

NEW YORK — An Italian-American Songs Festival will take place here at the Academy of Music of Brooklyn next month (22, 23 and 24).

The fete, directed by Vincent Fabrocino, will feature 24 songs, which a committee selected from 426 entries from all parts of the world, and will be sung by Italian artists being brought over for the event, and others from this side of the Atlantic.

The Italian performers include: Nico Fidenco, Mario Abbate, Tony Del Monaco, Mei Lang Chang, Elena Affo and Mario Lima. From the U.S., artists will include Rudy Adamo, who cuts for Roulette, Aldo Gulino, Johanna Valenti, Laura Stella, Gianni Rigani and Carmela.

Italy's Gianni Marchetti (RCA Italiana) will lead a 24-piece orchestra, arranged by Sal Assenza, with Giuseppe Adami as musical co-ordinator.

The first performance (22) will be in honor of Cash Box.

The fete hopes to have, among other officials, the Italian Ambassador to the U.S., as well as many reps from the pubberies and labels.

Leslie Creditors Meet

NEW YORK—A creditors' meet was held here last week (22) regarding Lou Boorstein's Leslie one-stop operation whose New York branch recently went into a Chapter 11 (see last week's issue). A committee of creditors was formed, headed by Eliot Blaine of Cosnat Distributors, which appointed an accounting firm, Landau & Co., to check Leslie's books. Also named was a counsel to the committee, Sherman & Citron and Joseph Klotz. Boorstein will offer a settlement plan, which the committee will evaluate after the accounting firm goes over the books.

Boorstein was accompanied at the meet by his attorneys Sam Kaufman, 507 Fifth Ave., and Ben Weintraub.

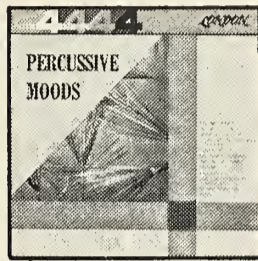

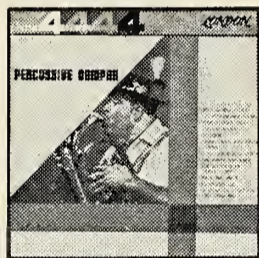

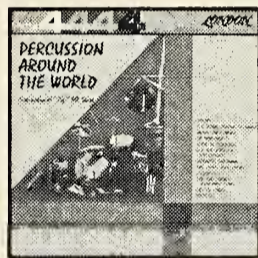

Mercury "Pills" Promo; Deck A Big Hit

CHICAGO—Mercury Records recent promotion of sending candy pills to deejays plugging the Ray Steven's dinking of "Jeremiah Peabody's Pills . . ." has received more mail comment and comic response than other promotion in the label's history—and the deck's #69 spot on this week's Top 100, moving from #81, was likely aided by the promotion's success.

Deejays and reviewers, the label said last week, have been writing to Mercury promotion men and to the firm's home base here describing the "results" of taking the green and purple pills, and, according to the letters, they cure anything under the heading of disease.

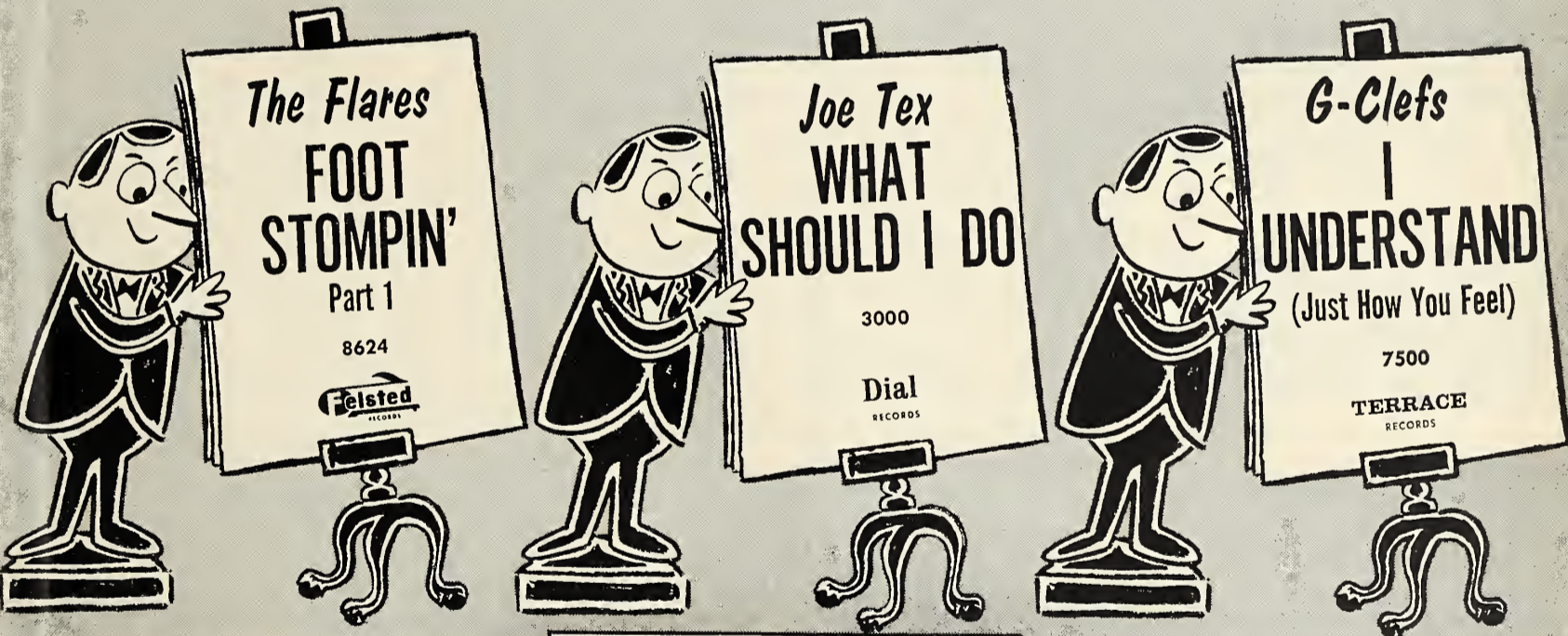
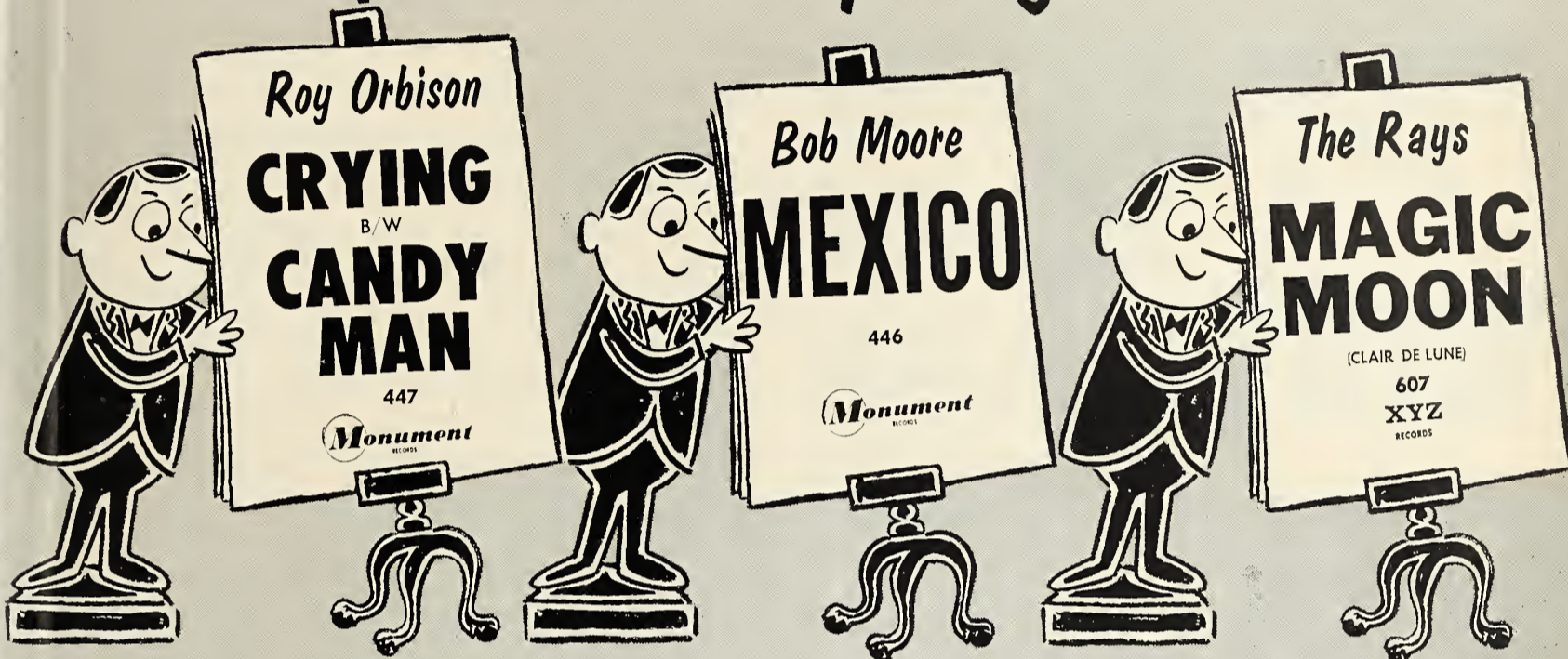

Liberty's Hot Summer:
3 Decks In Top 10

NEW YORK — Liberty Records is probably having its best chart showing for summer months, with three decks among the top ten on this week's Top 100.

Songster Bobby Vee's "Take Good Care of My Baby" moves from the #21 spot to #3 and Dick & Deedee's "The Mountains High" goes from the #26 spot to #8. Timi Yuro's "Hurt" gains a strong top ten position, moving from #7 to #5.

New Liberty items on the Top 100 include The Fleetwoods' "(He's) The Great Impostor" (78) (on the Liberty-handled Dolton label); The Ventures' "Theme from Silver City" (82); Ralph Emery's "Hello Fool" (100). Gene McDaniels' "A Tear" is ending its chart run in the #96 position.

UA Inks Shirley Bassey

NEW YORK—Shirley Bassey, one of England's top larks, has been signed to a term pact by United Artists Records, Art Talmadge, veep and general manager announced last week.

The performer is currently hitting big on the English charts with "Reach for the Stars" and "Climb Ev'ry Mountain" and recently scored with "You'll Never Know." For her first UA single, "Reach for the Stars" will be coupled with "You'll Never Know."

The performer is due in the U.S. for a five-week stand at the Persian Room here starting September 13.

In addition to the lark's signing, UA has also added The Four Coins, who previously cut for MGM and before that for Epic. They have already cut their first sides for the label.

Victor Adds New
"Hutch" Phono

NEW YORK—Due to the "overwhelming success" of two previous "Hutch" designed stereo phono units, RCA Victor has added a third model, retailing at \$525 (including built-in FM stereo radio). Raymond Saxon, vice president of marketing at RCA Sales Corp., said that orders for the first two "Hutches," introduced to dealers in June, have been so heavy that production already has been more than doubled. He added that a further production increase is a "possibility."

Victor also just announced four other new phonos, three with an FM stereo radio built into the tuner, ranging in price from \$399.95 to \$499.95. An optional RCA Victor FM stereo radio adapter retails at \$29.95.

Skyla-Ray Star Name
Gen. Mgr., A&R Head

HOLLYWOOD—Tieing-in with its expansion program, the Skyla and Ray Star labels of Hollywood have named Robert G. Demain as general manager and Dave Axelrod as A&R director.

Demain, who recently left Kapp as sales manager of the label's western operation, will work with Starla Kay Prexy, in directing all phases of the disk operation and two publishing firms, with an emphasis on singles.

Axelrod, who has done A&R work for many jazz labels, including World Pacific, Reprise and HiFi, has been given complete authority in developing new product and talent. The label now has an open-door policy as regards material, artists, producer publishers, etc.

ARMADA To Tackle Transshipping Problem

NEW YORK—ARMADA, still continuing its successful fight against disk bootlegging, is moving into the area of transshipping in an effort to find a "suitable solution" to the controversial activity, according to Art Talmadge, the label-distrib association's prexy.

Long one of the major problems confronting the industry, transshipping was one of the main areas of discussion during the annual ARMADA convention in Florida last June. Following the convention, ARMADA's legal counsel, Sigmund H. Steinberg, was instructed to investigate this problem from a legal standpoint and report back to the Executive Board on his findings.

After considerable research and investigation, Steinberg was able to report on three pending Federal bills which could, if any one, or all, were enacted, have a definite effect on this situation. These bills are:

1. Bill S.1396, now in the Senate Judiciary Committee, would permit licensees of registered trademarks as registered users. This would allow a manufacturer to assign the use of his trademark on an exclusive basis to a user (distrib) on an exclusive basis in set areas or territories. Under terms of this proposed legislation, a manufacturer would be required to file the granting of those rights with the Federal Trademark Division. It would be the responsibility of the

manufacturer to police this practice, and Steinberg stressed this would require great vigilance.

2. A second bill, S.1722, would offer a Federal Fair Trade law, if enacted, with complete price protection. Under the terms of this proposed bill, prices could be fixed at every level as determined by the manufacturer. This bill differs from other Fair Trade legislation which sets the price levels at retail only. Under the new bill, Steinberg pointed out, there is considerable flexibility, wherein a manufacturer can set the price to the distrib one-stops, rack operators and to the dealer from the distrib as well as the final retail price tag. The price setting would be voluntary with each manufacturer.

There have already been hearings held on this bill, Steinberg reported, with strong pros and cons presented to the Commerce Committee in charge. Morton Gorelick, a member of Steinberg's law firm, stated that these hearings would be continued.

A third bill, combining features of the two described above, has also been thrown into the congressional hopper, Steinberg said.

In reporting to ARMADA, Steinberg stressed that in order for any or all of this legislation to pass it would be necessary for ARMADA to join with other industries, including such fields as Hardware, pharmaceutical, etc., to fight for its enactment.

Talmadge, in pointing out that under the present laws the transshipping problem was one which was completely legal, said that ARMADA members, who were, without exception, vitally interested in this question, would be advised of the Steinberg report, and the costs involved in ARMADA's participation to fight for the enactment of new legislation which could help control the situation.

"We will also continue to pursue the counterfeiting battle which ARMADA instigated," Talmadge said, and while this fight has met with success, with even more indicated on both the legislative and prosecution fronts, we know that it is our duty to investigate every possible avenue for the modification of existing laws to protect against the transshipping problem in our industry. This we intend to do with the complete approval of the entire ARMADA membership."

NEW YORK—RCA Victor is releasing 14 open reel four-track stereo tapes for September, including eight pop and six Red Seals. The pop issues are: Harry Belafonte's "Jump Up Calypso," Perry Como's "Sing to Me, Mr. C," Lena Horne's "Lena at the Sands," Brother Dave Gardner's "Ain't That Weird," "Perez Prado features the New Dance 'La Chunga'," Dick Schory's "Stereo Action goes Broadway" and Marty Gold's "Stereo Action goes Hollywood."

The Red Seals are: pianist Van Cliburn performing Beethoven's "Emperor" concerto with Fritz Reiner conducting the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, volume 3 of "Victory at Sea," "The Sound of Stokowski and Wagner," "The Flying Dutchman" (complete), Highlights from Puccini's "Turandot" and Verdi's "La Traviata."

HOLLYWOOD—All European licensees of Warner Bros. Records met in Berlin last Friday (25), attending a sales meet relating to the label's fall and winter plans. Bobby Weiss, international director for WB, conducted the meet.

Those attending included S. Eridsson (Sweden), J. Ellertsen (Norway), J. Vikstedt (Finland), E. Henriksen (Denmark), J. P. Goemaere (Belgium), G. M. Oord and C. Pompe (Holland), W. Gurtler and P. DeGioia (Italy), M. Rosengarten and A. Reichstadt (Switzerland), L. Felder and R. Friedman (Austria), G. Orphanidis (Greece), H. Lieber, H. Blume, G. Schemke, H. Braunlich, H. Kaiser, K. H. Richter, A. Waizenegger (Germany). A special meet was held for the WB English licensee, Decca, at the latter's London headquarters on August 28.

The presentation included a color slide/film and stereo tape presentation of the new LP product; WB film highlighting excerpts from its productions, "Fanny" and "Parrish; 16mm WB short entitled "Okay for Sound," tracing the history of sound in motion pictures; and a special screening of the Warner Bros. film, "Fanny," for all licensees and members of their families attending the Berlin meeting.

On Saturday (26) all licensees attended a television spectacular starring Connie Stevens at the Radio Free Berlin studios. Licensees also attended a luncheon and a grand ball at the conclusion of the television show, the latter in conjunction with the Radio-Record-TV exhibition being held in Berlin.

Liberty Sets LP on "Alvin Show"

Liberty has named October 4 as "A-Day," with special promotions to be launched on that date, including a big dealer program.

Junior Learns



NEW YORK—Les Brown, Jr., 21-year-old son of the famed bandleader, nurturing hope for a career that will include records, nightclubs, and acting in Broadway musicals, works diligently under the guidance of vet vocal coach Harriet Lee.

All-Callas Angel Issue Includes New "Norma"

NEW YORK—As Angel Records' "Artist of the Month," soprano Maria Callas is spotlighted in all five September releases from the label.

Topping the issues is the first stereo recording of Bellini's "Norma," the performer's famed vehicle. The artist was featured in a 1954 Angel version, now withdrawn, of the opus. The 3-disk set (including a 20-page illustrated libretto) includes tenor Franco Corelli, mezzo-soprano Christa Ludwig, bass Nicola Zaccaria, soprano Edda Vincenzi, tenor Piero de Palma and the orchestra and chorus of La Scala under Tullio Serafin's direction. The four other LP's are highlight versions of previously released complete opera sets: "La Boheme," "Aida," "The Barber of Seville" and "La Gioconda."

Organist Layton Does Far-Flung One-Nighters

NEW YORK—Organist Eddie Layton (Mercury) has, since last March, been doing an unusual series of one-nighters on an international scale.

As the "goodwill ambassador" of the Hammond Organ Co., Layton started a tour of one-nighters in early March that kicked-off non-stop single dates from Oslo, Norway to all of western Europe. Without a stop, using a jet plane, the tour continued to the U.S., where Layton is currently hopping from state to state. The tour continues to Hawaii, back the mainland after a complete tour of Canada, and winds up with scattered one-nighters that will criss-cross Layton three times across the country.

Though the present tour ends October 6, a similar trek begins next March and continues through December.

Friedman is a student of Heifetz. A child prodigy, Friedman made his Carnegie Hall debut in Nov. 1956 and has since appeared with the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago Symphony, the National Symphony in Washington and other leading orchestras coast-to-coast. During the 1960-61 season he was part of the Young Artists Series at the Metropolitan Museum of New York. He recently completed his first European concert tour with recitals in London, Amsterdam and Berlin.

**Orfeon Dimsa (Venezuela)
Sets More Foreign Deals**

NEW YORK—With the installation of its own manufacturing facilities only a few weeks away, Orfeon Dimsa de Venezuela, S.A., is completing the signing of international agreements which will increase its release schedule by 35%.

Already distributing the Music (Italy), Jolly (Italy) and Vogue (France) catalogs in Venezuela, the label is completing arrangements for Artone (Holland), Ariola (Germany) and Oriole (England), all of which should be completed by September 1, according to the firm. Italy's Bluebell label was recently inked, but there have been no releases as yet.

The Ariola deal will be a combination import-pressing deal by which Orfeon will cover the complete classical line on a direct import basis and later press those items as well as the label's instrumental material, including some pop.

European talent associated with these labels are being promoted to "insure" their personal appearances in the area (Italian songster Tony Dallara, hitting in Venezuela with "La Novia" will make his initial appearance in Caracas in October).

OD de V has delayed activating its international release program partly because of a pier fire which destroyed over 40% of the originally received machinery in July, 1960.

**100% Exchange Deal
On Request LP's**

NEW YORK—In last week's round-up of Request Records' LP program in the Album Deals section, it was incorrectly stated that the label's LP's were being offered on a "100% return privilege." Actually, the plan offers a 100% exchange privilege.

**Mercury N.Y. Distrib Sale Off;
Expansion Move In Works**

CHICAGO—Mercury Records not only ended negotiations last week regarding the sale of its New York distrib branch, but decided to retain the operation and expand it as well.

(Trade rumors last week said that the branch would be bought out by either Alpha or Portem.)

The label announced that the organization of the branch will remain in tact, as well as the premises which is still under a long-term lease.

The label also said that a special products division will be created within the branch to handle product available from other labels. These other lines, now being sought by Mercury, will be added in the near future. Additional promotion and selling forces will be added as the new lines are acquired in order to service them properly.

Abe Chayet, who has been with Mercury as a member of the sales department for five years, has been promoted to general manager in place of Chet Woods, who just moved over to United Artists Records, and will oversee the entire branch operation.

Branch promotion head Herb Rosen will assume additional duties of merchandise manager. The administrative and sales personnel will remain the same.

In another distrib move, Irwin H. Steinberg, the label's executive veep, announced the signing of Seaboard Distributors, Hartford, Conn., as the Mercury distrib there. Marvin Ginsburg, Seaboard veep, met with Steinberg in New York recently.

Seaboard had already been affiliated with Mercury through the firm's special products division as the distrib of Smash, the label's subsid.

**Pickwick's Ed. Catalog
In Big Fall Promo**

NEW YORK—An all-out ad, promotion and merchandising campaign will be undertaken this fall by Pickwick International in behalf of its "Instant" Learning Records.

The label will be advertised in New Yorker, Holiday, Parent's, Saturday Review, Record & Sound Retailing, Cash Box, Billboard and the New York times.

The ads will offer free copies of a special booklet entitled "Reinforced Learning," which explains the teaching principle exclusive with "Instant" Learning Records. In preparation now for simultaneous release with the ads during the next four months are window streamers, piggy-back literature dispensers designed to attach to record display racks and three literature stuffers covering adult language courses, children's language courses and spelling. Product mats and six newspaper ad mats will be shipped to dealers along with a sales aid catalog that illustrates and describes all collateral material available.

NEW YORK—After several phone calls inquiring as to his relationship, if any, with the firms, Cy Leslie, president of Pickwick International, the disk producer, said last week that he has no relationship, corporate or otherwise, with Lesley Sales of Needham, Mass., a rack-jobber, or with Leslie Distributors, the one-stop here.

Connie's For Country Music

New Capitol LP's Include Lyric Contest Set

NEW YORK—Capitol Records is releasing five LP's this week, including "Songs Without Words," an LP that has 10 new melodies that will get their words via a big Capitol contest (see below).

The other entries are: "Immortal Music From The Movies," the pop LP for Capitol by dual-pianists Arthur Whittemore and Jack Lowe; "Two Sides Of Love," singer Dick Williams' new vocal group, The Singing Orchestra, an "instrumentally-voiced" ensemble of six female and eight male singers; "Buck Owens Sings Harlan Howard;" Wanda Jackson's "Right Or Wrong" (named after her current pop-country hit).

The "Songs Without Words" LP, created by Capitol A&R veep Alan Livingston, has 6 new pop songs written by vet cleffers Johnny Mercer, Gene de Paul, Jay Livingston and Ray Evans, Jimmy McHugh, Harry Warren and James Van Heusen; two country tunes by Audrey & Joe Allison and Cindy Walker; two rock 'n roll tunes by Barry DeVorzon and Winfield Scott.

The rules of the contest, which are detailed on both sides of the record's special dust sleeve, require entrants to write a lyric for one chorus only. Lyrics will be judged on the basis of commercial appeal, composition and style, and suitability, the manner in which the structure and content of the lyric fits the melody.

Preliminary judging of entries will be under the supervision of the contest division of the Reuben H. Donnelley Corporation.

The Disk Score On "Music Man"

NEW YORK—In a sense, a record a day for a year has been issued on Meredith Willson's score for "Music Man." The publisher, Frank Music-Rinimer Corp., has disclosed, in a report of mechanical uses of numbers from the show, a total of 365 recordings to date since the 1957 Broadway bow of the smash hit. The figure includes singles, LP's, tapes and even two player piano roles. "Till There Was You," followed by "Seventy-Six Trombones," is the most recorded tune from the show. Twenty-one LP's feature the score. More disk readings should come about on a large scale as a result of the upcoming flick version, starring original-cast lead Robert Preston and Shirley Jones.

Final selection of prize-winning lyrics will be made in each category by a panel of musical experts. The panel for each category will include a lyricist, musical director, and recording artist who is thoroughly experienced in that particular category.

The bonus winners—those whose songs will be recorded by Capitol—will be chosen from among the 10 prize winners by a special board of Capitol A&R execs.

To be eligible, entries must be post-marked not later than Jan. 31, 1962, and received on or before Feb. 15, 1962.

Individual promotion mapped for "Songs Without Words" includes special ads in This Week, Sunday, Hit Parader, and Song Hits magazines, trade advertising, and inclusion of the album in all Capitol consumer advertising for the month of September.

All music in the album was arranged and conducted by Jack Marshall.

New Capitol Ed. Guide

HOLLYWOOD—The 1961-62 edition of Capitol's Educational Music Guide, a 72-page booklet containing 15 articles by some of the nation's foremost musicians and music educators, is being readied for publication on Sept. 1.

In addition to articles covering the entire spectrum of music education, the new guide carries complete, illustrated descriptions and evaluations of more than 300 Capitol and Angel albums especially selected for use in all areas of musical and audio-visual instruction. The albums were screened and selected by a special panel of music educators from the more than 2,000 LP's in the Capitol and Angel catalogs.

The guide covers 15 specific fields of music and demonstrates how recordings may be integrated into various general and musical curricula.

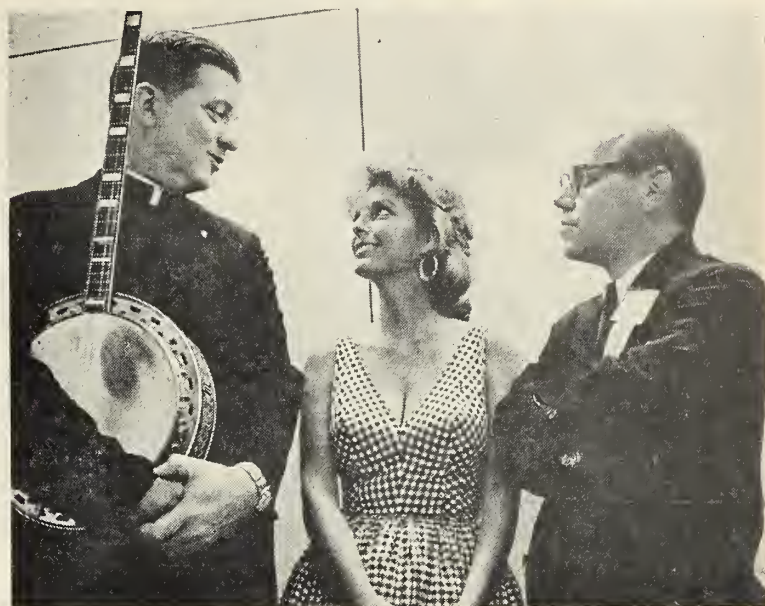
According to Art Duncan, director of Market Development for CRDC and head of the educational department, Capitol's share of the expanding educational market is steadily increasing. Many dealers, Duncan said, report that the educational market amounts to from 5 to 30 per cent of their total sales volume. In some instances, Duncan reported, the Capitol-Angel volume forms as much as 70% of dealer's educational sales.

Besides its interest in master deals, Mercury A&R men are now engaged in a heavy schedule: Quincy Jones is heading for sessions in Europe; Shelby Singleton goes to Nashville and Jack Tracy to New York. David Carroll just returned from a coast session with Clyde McCoy, to be immediately followed by a session of his own.

Parker Label Inks Cozy Cole; Fall LP's

NEW YORK—Cozy Cole, the vet drummer, has just signed a long-term pact with Charlie Parker Records, headed by the widow, Doris Parker, of the late alto saxist. Cole is one of a number of jazzists who have been pacted on an exclusive basis with the diskery.

Cole's first LP, "A Cozy Conception of Carmen," is part of the firm's just-issued fall LP's, which also include: "Lester Young's 'Pres is Blue,'" Parker's "Bird Symbols," Joe Carroll's "Man With A Happy Sound," "Slide Hampton's 'Two Sides Of Slide,'" Barry Miles "Miles of Genius," Duke Jordan's and Sadik Hakim's "East and West Of Jazz," Cecil Payne's "The Connection," Ann Williams' "First Time Out" and Jerri Winters' "Winter's Here Again."

The Cole LP, with a full orchestra arranged by Dick Hyman, was cut by the label's veep, Audrey Mayhew. Label is handled by Carleton Records.

Grean has such novelty hits to his credit as "The Thing," "Sweet Violets," "I Dreamed" and "Little Blue Man," while Hertz wrote the awhile Perry Como click, "Delaware."

Caedmon Promo For Wright LP

NEW YORK—Caedmon Records is promoting its LP, "Frank Lloyd Wright on Record," via a special publicity campaign to architectural and home-building magazines, the real estate press and city planning bodies. In addition, more than 800 schools of design and architecture and cultural institutions are also getting release sheets which contain a reproduction of the four-color LP jacket.

New Time Distrib In Boston

NEW YORK — Time Records has named Herb Dale Enterprises as its new distrib in Boston, replacing Gordon Dinerstein.

Net Cleffers Hit Singles Music, But Strike Some Bright Notes

HOLLYWOOD—The quality of material done on singles is low, but "good" pop music can make a comeback, says a group of cleffers, some of whom have contributed many an evergreen to the pop music catalog.

The writers gathered here recently as a result of Capitol Records new lyric-contest LP "Songs without Words," for which they wrote new melodies (see separate story).

The songwriters are in note-for-note agreement that the chief villain is the type of music featured on contemporary single records. "Music has been getting progressively worse in the single-record field," says Jay Livingston, "and there is no place for it to go but up. Illiterate lyrics and unmelodic, unoriginal melodies have swamped the pop-music field."

Gene de Paul, whose "I'll Remember April," is a top standard, adds: "The music industry today is in a state of mystery and confusion. Too much of the new songwriting talent leans toward the 'rock and roll' style. This is understandable because it's easy to write. One simply forgets about rhyme, reason, and intelligent construction."

Harry Warren, winner of three Academy Awards for music, simply says: "The general state of popular music today is sad."

Though perhaps biting the hand that feeds him quite well, rock-and-roll tunesmith Barry DeVorzon states: "The quality songs of today are stacked in the songwriter's closet while he either writes in the trend to make a living or hopelessly tries to get good songs recorded. But the good music written today is at least as high-quality as that written in the past. The only problem is exposure."

Jimmy McHugh, long one of the top creative hands in the business, says: "We have an abundance of melody writers today, good ones, but there is a great need for good, intelligent lyric writers. To write a good lyric calls for education—an intimate knowledge of words and the ability to effervesce with them. Cole Porter and the late Oscar Hammerstein and Larry Hart had unlimited boundaries with words because of their fine educational backgrounds."

Many of the writers also singled out the present lack of original picture musicals for the so-called decline in the quality of popular music.

Jay Livingston, who with partner Ray Evans has won three Academy Awards for movie music, says: "The motion-picture industry has all but stopped making musicals so there are no quality songs coming from that once-rich source."

"Broadway shows," says Livingston, "are the last source of good popular music, except for an occasional quality pop tune on which a courageous artist or record company is willing to take a chance."

Harry Warren sums up for his colleagues when he says: "What it boils down to is this: With very few exceptions, the outlets for good songs are closed up tight."

Does good popular music have a future?

Again the panel of composers struck a unanimous note. They feel confident that the market exists, but agree that exposure is the big hurdle. How will the writers of good pop tunes get exposure for their music?

Most of them expressed a hope, however wistful, that television would

lend a hand. "If television would only do for good music just half of what it has done for rock and roll we would have no problem," said one writer.

One encouraging factor, the panel says, is the apparent resurgence of the big dance bands. Though soaring costs have all but made an historical relic of the traveling big band, the writers pointed to the increasing number of name bands working in ballrooms around the country.

LP's are another dependable source of aid for the cause of good music. The LP is the last outpost of good recorded music, the composers feel. "The album has saved the day for music lovers," says Jay Livingston. "This is the one department that has grown increasingly better in quality. At this point, the old standards are being used up but, fortunately, new ones are emerging, and there's plenty of talent around to write more."

Rock writer DeVorzon, who says he has a "large file" of unrecorded "good songs," goes even further: "Someday the album will replace the single and by doing so will become the vehicle of the new song, not the single record. When this happens, the general public will again decide what is or is not a hit. Today this decision is made by kids in the 10-to-16-year-old bracket, who buy almost all the single records."

The panel of composers agreed, too, that the record companies are providing an ample supply of good-music LP's and that more radio stations are clearing more air for the programming of good music.

Another factor that may tip the scales to good music, the composers say, is the growing popularity of FM, an area where seldom is heard a rock-and-roll word.

Summing up, the feeling of the panel was this: Good music can and will make a surging come-back-if. The ifs are:

If the composers keep writing it and don't throw in the towel.

If artists and record companies keep recording and promoting it.

If radio stations increase their programming of it.

If television, with its vast audiences will give it a whirl.

Tops Names Head Of Premium Dept.

NEW YORK—Chris Wilson has just joined Tops Records, the low-priced label, as head of the firm's newly organized premium department. Present plans call for expansion of the department from the present five district men to a total of 12 district managers in 12 key cities. Wilson, who will head-quarter in New York, was previously head of Wilson Sales, a leading premium firm in Los Angeles.

ST/AND Forms Pop Label

NEW YORK—ST/AND Records, the classical-market LP here, has just bowed a pop label, Up Start. First single is "Baby Doe" and "Wishing Song" by Frances Archer and Beverly Gile, a folk-singing group which already has an LP on the parent label ("International Songs and Ballads") in addition to three previous LP's for Disneyland.

NEW YORK—Howe-Lee Music (ASCAP), this city, has acquired the rights, in English speaking countries, for a Swedish tune, "You," which has been given an English lyric, "Theme From The Stars," by Arthur Altman and Bill Meshel. Tune, written by Felix Stall, a leading Swedish writer-publisher, is representing Sweden in the Music Festival in Pesaro, Italy this month.

Jensen Cuts Needle Prices

CHICAGO—Jensen Industries, a leading phono needle producer, is cutting the list prices of its diamond needle line, effective September 1. New list prices will be mainly in three categories, \$4.95, \$5.95 and \$6.95, with most types falling into the \$4.95 category. President Karl Jensen said the new prices would increase sales by 500%.

Record sales for 1961 are still on the up and up. Board of Trade figures show that manufacturers' sales of records in June were valued at £944,000 which was 15% more than in June 1960; home sales were 18% more and export sales 5% more. During the first half of this year total sales were 8% more than in the corresponding period last year but export sales were 16% less. The production of both 33 1/3 rpm and 45 rpm disks continue to increase and were 52% and 13% more respectively than in June 1960. The decline in production of 78 rpm continues and in June was 44% less than in June 1960. Production of these records is now less than one-tenth of what it was at the peak in 1957 when 65% of all records produced were 78 rpm.

Ember Records International just had its biggest release to date—14 LP's retailing at 26/- (\$3.64). Many of the new releases were made during the 40's and 50's and feature a host of jazz greats. From the 20th Fox catalog come albums by Glenn Miller, Tommy Dorsey and Art Tatum. Ember's recent deal with Rondo has made available recordings by Duke Ellington, Artie Shaw, Erroll Garner and Sidney Bechet with vocals by Sarah Vaughan, Kay Starr and Frankie Laine. Britain is represented in the new "Flamingo Jazz Series," the first three issues being "Jazz At The Flamingo," "An Evening With The Bud Shank Quartet" and "Stompin' With The Ronnie Ross Quintet."

Ember International just issued a new instrumental single "The Giggling Girls of Greece" by Bernie Wayne. Ardmore & Beechwood which published the number, move to new offices at 363, Oxford Street, London, W. 1. on September 4. A & R also has the U.S. Bonds stateside chart topper "A Quarter To Three," which, despite initial predictions to the contrary, is also climbing high in the British charts, and his follow up disk "School Is Out" on the Top Rank label.

The highlight of Polydor's autumn plans is the introduction of a new series of Strict Tempo Dance records. Aimed at students and enthusiasts of ballroom dancing the disks by Horst Wende and his Orchestra have a strong beat and modern orchestrations making them equally suitable both for beginners and advanced dancers. The series comprising 9 EP's range from the foxtrot to the samba.

Delyse-Envoy, independent record company, recently had a stand at The Royal National Eistedfodd (Festival of Welsh Culture) at Rhos in Wales. The company's director, Mrs. Isabella Wallich, reports great success prestige wise and brisk sales resulted both in the home and overseas markets. The Delyse "London" record is now being marketed in U.S., Canada, New Zealand, India, Argentina, Chile, Brazil and South Africa.

EMI Records hosted a party for American songstress Linda Scott recently in the British charts with "I've Told Ev'ry Little Star." Linda is here to appear in "The Paul Anka Show" tele-recorded last week by Granada for autumn transmission. Her latest disk from the Cash Box Top 100 "Don't Bet Money Honey" was just released on Columbia. With her in London is Neil Galligan, president of Canadian-American Records.

The United Artists film from Francoise Sagan's novel "Aimez Vous Brahms" retitled "Goodbye Again" was just premiered in London. The theme recorded by Ferrante & Teicher is issued on HMV and published by United Artists Music Company who also have "Michael" the No. 1 hit from the Cash Box Top 100 and the original disk by The Highwaymen is released on HMV.

Meantime Lonnie Donegan has penned new words and music for the spiritual and recorded it for Pye under the title "Michael—Row The Boat" published by Tyler Music. The coupling is "Lumbered" (Essex Music) from the West End musical "Stop The World I Want To Get Off." Pye's A & R Manager Allan Freeman took the session in Blackpool where Lonnie is appearing in a summer show. Donegan is currently riding high in the Cash Box Top 100 with "Does Your Chewing Gum Lose It's Flavour"—a chart topper here in 1959. Originally released in the States by Dot in the same year without success the disk is now enjoying a new lease of life with American sales of 300,000. World sales excluding the U.S. have exceeded 500,000.

Pye Records released Clarence Henry's first LP in this country "You Always Hurt The One You Love." With his single of the same title and "But I Do" still high in the charts Henry is proving a big seller here. Another LP from Pye is an original cast recording of "The Lord Chamberlain Regrets"—a new revue which opened in London recently.

Publisher Bob Mellin visiting London for talks with general manager Len Edwards. Mellin's current stateside hit "A Little Bit Of Soap" by The Jarmels will be released here on Top Rank September 1. There is a cover version by Jimmy Justice on Pye. After a long run in the charts with Neil Sedaka's "Little Devil" and Connie Francis' "Breaking In A Brand New Broken Heart," Nevins-Kirshner publishes the current British hit "Halfway to Paradise" by Billy Fury on Decca. They also have two potential hits for September release Bobby Vee's "How Many Tears" on London and "Who Put The Bomp" by Barry Mann on HMV with a cover version by The Viscounts on Pye.

The BBC's new Saturday Night program "Trad Tavern" opens on September 23. The series will feature top British trad bands of Alex Walsh, Acker Bilk, Dick Charlesworth, Mike Milligan and Kenny Ball and his Jazzmen. "Trad Tavern" will incorporate a weekly "Pick of the Pops" record program. Spinning the disks will be dj Alan Freeman, just back from a visit to New York. Freeman takes over "Pick of the Pops" from David Jacobs who starts his own series of disk programs "The D.J. Show" on October 2.

While many top disk stars in summer shows are drawing the crowds in seaside resorts up and down the country agents and managers are busy fixing their autumn tours. Already set for nationwide dates are current chart toppers Helen Shapiro, Eden Kane and Billy Fury. Also booked for road shows are Adam Faith, The John Barry Seven, Danny Williams, The Brook Brothers, The Allisons and The Viscounts.

Val Parnell, managing director of ATV, hosted a reception to outline its autumn plans. In an effort to gain maximum audiences one-hour programs instead of half-hours, are to be shown on Saturday and Sunday nights. Topping the new programs will be a series of 10 Jo Stafford Shows featuring top artists from Great Britain, America and the Continent. ATV's top rated "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" returns on September 10 with Bob Hope heading the bill. Bruce Forsythe, who dropped out of the show last season owing to ill health, makes a welcome return as resident compere.

L. G. Wood, managing director of EMI Records Ltd., leaves for New York on September 20 for a 3 1/2-week business trip. He will be the first guest speaker at the initial meeting in New York of the newly formed International Record Mens Club established by American record company execs. The meeting has been specially arranged to coincide with his visit September 21. He will speak on the European record scene and his itinerary includes meetings with King Records in Cincinnati, Mercury Records in Chicago and Capitol Records in New York and Hollywood. Wood told the Cash Box that he plans to familiarize himself with the current record scene and renew old acquaintances.

Robert Jones, sales manager of Redd Distributing Co. Inc. of Boston, Mass. called at the Cash Box office during his visit to London investigating the coin and vending industries here. Jones later left for a tour of the continent.



SCANDINAVIA

DENMARK

Dansk Grammofonpladeforlag has contracted Wollmer Söresen as producer of records with its Sonet artists **Grethe Sönck** and **Dario Campeotto**. Söresen is also producer of programs on Danish non-commercial TV. He recently introduced one of **Grethe Sönck's** recent recordings by presenting her on TV singing her number in a lion's cage at a circus.

A new commercial "pirate" radio station has operations in the water between Sweden and Denmark. The name of the company is DCR (Danmarks Commerciale Radio, Denmark's Commercial Broadcasting Co.). Actress **Hannah Bjarnhof** has so far been contracted for a weekly program built upon the American idea called "Dear Abby."

Odeon has released a parody of "Angelique," the Danish Grand Prix song from this year's Eurovision song contest in Cannes back in March. The lyrics in "Angelique" reads "Hvor er du dejlig, Angelique" (How wonderful you are, Angelique), which has inspired the recording with **Hans Kurt** titled "Hvor du er dejlig, Akvavit" (How wonderful you are, Aquavit). Good sales of the record, reports Danish EMI.

Jorgen Ingmann will not be touring as frequently as before with his orchestra. He has just started as A & R man at Metronome in Copenhagen.

Music publishing company Imudico has signed a contract with the American publisher Rubank Inc., handling its songs in the Scandinavian market for the future. Imudico is headed by **Albert Kleinert**.

Daimi, who did very well with her Tono recordings of "Baby Sittin' Boogie," has made her second record, with the songs "100 Pounds of Clay" and "Don't Treat Me Like a Child." Her debut record, which also includes "Travelling Light," will be released in Italy by Fonit, reports Tono here.

An American song sung by a Danish artist in German is very popular in Austria. . . . The Danish teenage artist **Gitte Henning** has recorded "Breakin' In a Brand New Broken Heart" in German titled "Das kommt Davon" and her version is reportedly among the Top 10 in Austria.

Vilhelm Höy of AEG Dansk Elektricitets A/S celebrated 25 years with the company with a big luncheon at the Richmond recently. Among the 50 or so guests were representatives for Danish and foreign record companies, radio and TV companies, music publishers, etc.

NORWAY

Newcomer on the Norwegian Best Sellers this week is the British singer **Petula Clark** with her recording of "Romeo" on Pye Nixa label.

Ray Adams will be a great name in the international market in near future, according to **Egil Monn Iversen A/S**, Norwegian and known as **Ragnar Asbjørnsen** before he started work on an international career, his recent recording of "Violetta" and "You Belong To My Heart" will be played by the continental commercial radio station Radio Luxembourg during September. In any case, if played over Radio Lux, it will mean that his record will have every chance to become a hit in his native Norway, where this continental station is the most listened to radio station as far as pop music is concerned. The record was made in London.

Cliff Richard in Oslo for concerts. He will also be appearing in Stavanger and Bergen before returning to his native England. At the moment he is doing very well in Norway with his Columbia recording of "A Girl Like You."

The Chat Noir theatre in Oslo, internationally known variety theatre, will celebrate its 50th birthday with a jubilee show this autumn. The title of the show is "Vi jubler" and many of Norway's leading recording artists will appear in the show, which starts September 1. **Sölvi Wang** and **Anita Thallaug** are two names in the cast.

Orchestra leader **Kjell Karlsen** in company with singer **Per-Gunnar** have plans to start a new record company. Viking Music Aktieselskap will be the name of the new label. Per-Gunnar has, until now, been operating the Manu label, which will be joining the new company. Last attractions at the Chat Noir before they closed for rehearsals of their jubilee show was the American vocal group **Deep River Boys**.

SWEDEN

Abr. Lundquist AB, one of the oldest music publishing companies in Sweden, going back to 1838, has not done much activity in recent years, with exception for the sale of its large quantity of old catalog numbers. The numbers are titled "Rocking Lullaby," formerly known here as "Byssan lull" and "Russian Bobbysocks" (Yes, My Darling Daughter). The recording might have chances on the international market, and according to **Roland Ferneborg**, publicity head of Karusell, the company has plans of introducing the group internationally.

BENELUX

BELGIUM

Anvers Radio reports still tremendous sales on Paul Anka's "Dance On Little Girl"; it's also one of the most played records on jukeboxes. First reactions on the new record by Francis Linel, "Les Millions d'Arlequin" (on the Ricordi-label) are very hopeful. Big sales are also expected of the new platter by Camillo Felgen, "Wenn Ein Stern Von Himmel Fällt"/"Bye Bye", on Telefunken.

S.A. Gramophone still makes the biggest sales with "Zarina" by Rex Gildo, especially in the Flemish part. In the Walloon part of Belgium, the new Gilbert Becaud disk "Cavalier Du Grand Retour" is well on its way to the top ten. French rock-group "Les Chats Sauvages" get a warm reception from the Belgian teenagers; a second EP has been released. Among the new releases by S.A. Gramophone, biggest sales are expected from "A Media Luz" by Los Amadores (H.M.V.), "Rosina" by Rex Gildo (Electrola), "Tossin' And Turnin'" by Bobby Lewis (Parlophone), "The Writing On The Wall" by Adam Wade (HMV) and "Let's Twist Again" by Chubby Checker (Columbia).

With a very rainy season on the Belgian coast, Les Chakachas are attracting big crowds every night at the Casino of Knokke. A film company took advantage of the presence of Les Chakachas in Belgium to make a short musical color movie that will appear on all European screens this coming season. Belgian fans of Harry Belafonte will be delighted to hear the announcement that the television program made by Belafonte "Tonight With Belafonte" will appear on Belgian TV September 2. The RCA artist has an extremely large audience in Belgium since his very brilliant performances at the U.S. Pavilion during Brussels World Fair 1958. His records always sell very heavily.

Hawaiian group The Waikiki's made its first record 3 months ago: "Hawaii Tattoo" and "Hawaii Welcome," on the Palette label. The reaction in Belgium and Holland is just great. Everybody thinks this could be another "Wheels."

HOLLAND

New LP releases on Philips include "Cantos Y Ritmos De Espana," "Moments To Remember" by the Norman Luboff Choir, "Memories Are Made Of This" by Ray Conniff and his Orchestra and Chorus, and a most original Album by Oscar Brown Jr., singer-actor-author-composer, titled "Sin and Soul." Recorded in Holland is the first Philips LP of Joshua Heygen, who plays Spanish and German guitar. He is originally a Dutchman, but settled in Australia in the late Forties and has now obtained Australian nationality. He has given more than 200 radio performances and over 150 TV programs over there. One of these programs, "An Interlude With Joshua Heygen," became extremely popular. He specializes in classical music, but also plays folksongs. Heygen's record has been released in Holland by L. C. Phonogram. Special Album for tourists is "This Is Holland" (Philips), with the street organ "Arab" musical boxes in old and new Dutch songs and colored pictures, all typically Dutch.

First EP record of Herman Van Keeken (Van Herman) has just been released with his four recent hits "Corinna, Corinna," "The Green Leaves Of Summer," "Hello Mary Lou" and "Girl In The Wood." Another Philips artist, Johnny Hoes, is heard on EP with his current number two hit in Holland "Och Was Ik Maar." Included on a Philips EP of Simone Langlois is "Les Archers," with which this well known French singer had great success at the Knokke Songfestival. New on this label is Will Habets, who has a very fine voice; he signs modernized versions of "Oh So Pure" from Von Flotow's "Martha" and Rubinstein's "Melody In F". Debut disk of Jim Mirelli features two of his own songs, sung in German, also on Philips. Jacques Brel has a second single record in Dutch on this label, with "De Apen" (Les Singes) and "Men Vergeet Niets" (On n'Oublie Rien). The first, with "Marieke" and "Laat Me Niet Alleen" (Ne Me Quitte Pas) has proved to be a best seller.

Joe Rene, Dutch-born composer of U.S. topper "Tossin' And Turnin'" and A&R manager of Beltone, paid a flying visit to his mother country Holland as part of a pleasure and business trip through Europe. Fifteen years ago, Rene immigrated to the States, after he made a name over here as trumpeter with bands like Jaek de Vries' International, Johnny Fresco and Joe Andy.

The best proof that Jan & Kjeld are not fly-by-nights on the record-market are the sales-results of their latest: "Hello Mary Lou". C. N. Rood L.C. is also making good business with another young singer, Robertino; especially "O Sole Mio" is selling very good. Rood rush-released "Johnny Remember Me" by John Leyton, on Top Rank. Rood is making fair business with Pye's "Golden Guinea Series." There are now about eighty 12" LP's, supported by strong covers and an excellent folder.

Last Tuesday, neatly and attractively played Dixieland jazz broke the air on Schiphol Airport, where Mr. Acker Bilk and his Paramount Jazz Band, Kings Of "Trad", arrived to undertake their first Dutch tour. A delegation of Bovema-Columbia-sales execs, the press and also Bovema's President Mr. Gerry Oord welcomed the band with a lively press conference. The motion-picture "Where The Boys Are," Connie Francis' first appearance on the screen, got its Amsterdam-première last week in the city's biggest theatre, Tuschinsky. "The record and Connie's newest hit 'Together' will certainly reach top-sales," according to Frank Visser, Bovema's MGM label manager. Two young Dutch emigrants make their way in far Australia. They are The De Kroo Brothers, Dough and Leo, born in Holland, living for the past 12 years in Perth (Western Australia). This singing team signed a Columbia-contract lately and their first hit-record "Love's A Funny Little Game" will also be released by Bovema in Holland.

Growing international appeal for Little Henny And The Shakin' Boys: their recordings for Delta will be released in Belgium, Germany and Switzerland. Italy's hitmaker Tony Dallara meets with remarkable success in Holland with "La Novia," in Holland released under Delta-label. Delta sold the Belgian rights to Moonglow. Delta records just contracted distribution for Holland of the Héli catalog. In Belgium, Héli had a very successful start with the sales of "Matrosen Tango," sung by Die Anker Und Jenny. The record has been released in Holland by Delta. Héli stars The Seabirds, very popular in Belgium now, recorded two new titles of which expectations are high: "Hold Me Tight"/"In Your Heart", for the Héli-label. They got a tv-contract for next September.

AUSTRALIA

Jim Noall, head of The Embers, a popular Melbourne nightspot currently using a great deal of imported jazz talent, is moving into the rock concert field which has been pretty quiet of late. Jim has a show lined up starring Freddy Cannon, Jack Scott, Ray Peterson, Dion and Tony Orlando plus local star Johnny Chester and instrumental group The Thunderbirds. This show will play Brisbane September 6, Melbourne 7 and Sydney 8 and 9. Jim Noall's American agent Harry Lawrence is handling negotiations on his behalf. Harry Lawrence's office is in the Fisk Building, 250 West 57th Street, New York. Jim plans to run similar rock concerts each month with The Everly Bros. scheduled to appear on the October series. The jazz policy with The Embers will continue with Jackie Wilson and Miles Davis booked for future visits. Present plans do not provide for the rock and pop artists to appear at The Embers and there are no definite plans at present for TV spots.

The Festival group is now making a big drive on the Command label stereo series. Current issues include "Provocative Percussion Vol. III" by Enoch Light & The Light Brigade; "Tempestuous Trumpet" by Doc Severinson & His Orch.; "Reeds And Percussion" by The Command All-Stars; "Roman Guitar" by Tony Mottola & His Orch. and "The Percussive Trombone of Urbie Green."

EMI's London label carries the new release "A Tear" by Gene McDaniels. Gene had a nationwide smash here with "A Hundred Pounds Of Clay" and his follow up effort also looks set for success.

New RCA discovery Ann-Margaret is catching plenty of disk jockey attention with her debut single "I Just Don't Understand" c/w "I Don't Hurt Any More." Top side is currently a big item on Cash Box Top 100 chart and could easily duplicate that success in this country.

The Mercury people in Australia have released the initial batch of albums in Mercury's "Perfect Presence Sound Series." First issues are "Percussion Orientale" by David Carroll & His Orchestra; "Viva Cugat!" with Xavier Cugat & His Orch and Richard Hayman's album "Harmonica Holiday." The series retails at 52/6 which is regular price for pop albums in Australia.

Col Joye, one of the most consistent disk sellers in the local field, likely to claim top honors again with his new Festival single "Sweet Dreams" c/w "More And More." Col is still doing good business with his revival of "For Me And My Gal" and "Sweet Dreams" should keep the score going.

Nice to see Lonnie Donegan's "Does Your Chewing Gum Lose Its Flavor," on the Dot label, doing so well on Cash Box Top 100. Side was a big click when issued here on the Pye label some twelve months ago. Surely this is proof that time doesn't necessarily handicap a good single if it has the magic ingredients for hit stardom.

K. G. Jones, of Music Houses of Australia, Ltd., which owns and controls many of the leading music and record stores in Australia, corrects a statement which appeared in the July 22 column that said the Australia Record Co. and execs of RETRA (the dealer association) had a meeting, over recent disputes concerning ARC's disk club activities (Coronet), and that afterwards normal trading had been resumed between ARC and record dealers. Jones said the statement should have just referred to the State of Victoria only and that the "position is quite different in the States of New South Wales and Queensland, where record retailers are still refraining from any promotion or display of Coronet Records while those same records are issued to the Coronet Record Club."

American singer Jimmie Rodgers suddenly cut short his personal appearance visit to Sydney and left for Manila on August 15. Rodgers is reported to have been upset when during his act in a show in the Sydney Stadium a section of the audience began stamping their feet and shouting for local star John O'Keefe, who was on the same bill. The local press played the incident pretty big and reported that Rodgers left Australia a week earlier than scheduled.

There's no doubt about the Scots! Andy Stewart—almost unknown here about three months ago—is now probably the hottest disk star across the nation. It all began when his first single "A Scottish Soldier" started to catch disk jockey attention; suddenly it caught on very big and developed into No. 1 hit all over Australia. After a long chart run, it began to fall off sales so the Festival organization issued another single on the Top Rank label "The Battle's O'er." This one is already riding the charts and could easily duplicate the tremendous run of Stewart's first single. The Top Rank label has just issued the first album by Stewart and it is doing very good business in the stores.

Young singer-composer Barry Mann has his hot single "Who Put The Bomb Out on the Ampar label, which is handled in this country through the Festival company.

EMI out with a flock of new singles on its various labels. Among them—on the London label—are "Hurt" by Timi Yuro; "Back Beat No. 1" the instrumental by The Rondels; Ray Peterson's "Missing You" and "Black Land Farmer" by Wink Martindale. On Parlophone is Matt Munro with "Why Not Now" c/w "Portrait Of My Love." The latter was a big hit in England for Munro but Steve Lawrence cleaned up with it in this country because the Munro disk was not available at the same time. However, Matt is currently scoring well with "My Kind Of Girl."

MEXICO

Enrique Martin Garea, A&R of Spanish label Hispa-Vox, arrived in México spend a vacation and at the same time make some recordings with Chilean singer Monna Bell at Gamma Records, which is representing Hispa-Vox in México. Monna will record 4 numbers from the Benidorm's Festival, which ludes the winner: "Enamorada" (In Love).

Foreign artists just arrived here include The Hi-Lo's, Mike Connors, Bertha Dupois and Jonah Jones. The Hi-Lo's are performing at The Terraza Cassino the Cuban singer Olga Guillot and Freddy Davis; Mike Connors is performing at La Fuente with beautiful Ana Luisa Peluffo and also doing theater and Bertha Dupois is at Señorial starring with Rodney's Cuban show.

Tom Mack, A&R of Dot Records, came to the city to rest after hard work at the same time he recorded Mexican musicians in some of his own arrangements. These arrangements are of folk music from different countries which he plans to issue in the U.S.

The Twisters is the name of a new Mexican rock group, who signed an exclusive contract with Musart Records. "The Twist" and "Sucedió Que" (It Happened That . . .) are their first numbers for the label.

In the first 238 days of the present 1961, three Mexican songs have appeared in the American Charts; first was "Perfidia" with The Ventures, second was "Granada" with Frank Sinatra and third "Amor" with Ben E. King. The last two other songs made it: "Quien Será (Sway) with Bobby Rydell and "Besame Mucho" with The Flamingos and The Coasters.

Mexican TV has a very original show with the Violines de Villafontana and the five pianos of Ríos Mena. The Violines de Villafontana are the RCA's best sellers on LP's and the five pianos of Ríos Mena form a new, exciting group which could click in any part of the world.

The Spanish version, by the Navarro's sisters, of "Paco Peco," which is getting very popular in the city via the Limelitters' version, to be released here on September 5.

Argentinian vocalist Gladys Vieira and Chilean group The Silva's Bros. cut RCA one of the Benidorm's winners "Estaré Contigo" (I'll Be With You). The Silva's brothers will start a tour through Lima, Perú, Brazil and Argentina, that will last 15 days.

To The Million Dollars' Theater September 8 comes beautiful singer Maria Victoria. And in the middle of the month, when we celebrate our "fatherland activities," a caravan of Mexican artists will perform in San Antonio, Texas, sponsored by impresario Joaquin Ancona, Piporro, Amalia Mendoza, The Navarro's Sisters, the mariachi of Miguel Diaz, Cuco Sanchez, Los Principes Aztecas, Los Aguila's Trio, The Sinners and many others will appear.

Chilean singer Antonio Prieto signed a contract to perform in Spain next month. After that, he will return to México City for some performances.

Gamma Records announced a new series named Serie Folklorica de todos los países del Mundo (Folk Series of all the Countries of the World) with authentic music and interpreters of China, India, Africa, Yugoslavia, Normandy, Greece and many other countries. This series will be sold only on EP's.

After many years, our most popular folk singer Miguel Aceves Mejía, will appear on TV with a big show. To be in contact with the public, he accepted a short contract to perform at a theatre.

Ernesto Riestra, one of the most popular conductors of the past, returned to the record business and made new arrangements of his oldest hits. He recorded "La Escuela" (The School) and "Las Bodas De Don Refugio (Don Regio's Wedding), for RCA.

Popular impresario "Chato" Guerra is extremely sick and had an emergency operation. We hope he will get well very soon.

Arturo Durazo, new rock and roll singer, signed to the Gamma label. He will record four numbers. From this label, we have been informed, that 8 of the Benidorm's Festival tunes recorded in Spain by Hispavox will appear soon on the Mexican market.

Columbia Records announced a new record with folk singer Cuco Sánchez, accompanied by Antonio Bribiesca's guitar. The songs are Abel Domínguez composition "Hay Que Saber Perder" (You Have To Know How To Lose) and Erico Baena's song "Que Te Vaya Bien" (Have A Nice Time).

"Legata Ad Un Granello Di Sabbia" (Tied To A Grain Of Sand) by Fidenco was released last Spring by RCA Italiana as the "best of the Summer of 1961 and, indeed, it did become the number one of the summer. The record is also the top juke-box disk.

Giorgio Gaber is a well liked boy who waxes on Ricordi and has been very popular across Italy thanks to his "La Ballata Del Cerutti" (Ballad of the Cerutti). His latest release is titled "Le Strade Di Notte" (Street By Night).

The latest recording of Cocki Mazzetti, "Pepito," is gaining popularity. It's one of the most played records in the juke boxes near the beaches. Miss Cocki took part in the recent Pesaro's festival and took the happy composer of "Milord," wanted to have his "Giudizio" sung by her in the Italian version. After listening to her, his conclusion follows: "She is a great singer! I'll be happy to create tunes just for her, one of the most sensitive and complete interpreters I ever met."

Chigo, the rock and roll boy of Ri-Fi who was very popular in 1960, his recording "Coccinella," has cut a possible hit titled "No Alibi."

On the occasion of the release in Italy of Otto Preminger's "The Day After Tomorrow" Dear Film organized a festival of the record "Exodus." At present many recordings of Ernest Gold's melody are in circulation—(Piaf, Mantovani, Pat Boone, Ferrante & Teicher; (domestic) Milva, Joe Sentieri, Arturo Testa, Teddy Reno, Pina Calvi, Aru. Among all the recordings of "Exodus" available in Italy, a special selection will select the best ones and Dear Film will offer prizes to the artist to be held on the occasion of the "Exodus" premiere in Milan. The next Canzonissima song fest is being set. Canzonissima is a TV show which is put on the air each year in the fall and winter. Prizes to the songs of the year which, through a poll, are the best of the past twelve months.

Domenico Modugno, back from his tour of South America (Argentina, Chile, and Peru), enjoying a quiet rest at the seashore in Italy. Many of our national newspapers telling of the triumph of his music in America.

Nelson Riddle came to Rome for a pleasure-visit for the month of August. It is well known here thanks to his "De Guello" and his recent "Leaves Of Summer."

Two Compact 33 records issued by Ri-Fi Company have appeared on the market. One is by Italian band Zanetti Bros., while the other features a selection of original American pieces taken from among those which were high on the charts.

E. A. Mario, one of our best Neapolitan composers, passed away in 1961. His song was written in 1904 and in a half century he created about 1000 tunes, some of them Italian evergreens. His Master's Voice label featured the best of his music titled "Ricordo Di E. A. Mario" (Remembering E. A. Mario). Our radio TV station dedicated more than 100 records to his memory.

GERMANY

The biggest meeting of record stars and phono execs of all time is now taking place in Berlin and will last until September 3. Along with full displays by the major record firms, a TV show is being broadcast nationwide daily featuring the top record artists of the day and many top international stars. There are also special balls, a super TV spectacular from the festival grounds and enough activities to keep anyone busy during the entire fair. Cash Box will bring a complete report on the entire festival in 2 weeks, including the names of the displayers, the stars on hand, etc.

The first answer record to hit the market here has not met with top success. A release of "Yes, I'm Lonesome Tonight" by Wilma Lucini has not met with top success even though the original record "Are You Lonesome Tonight" was a top hit by both Elvis Presley and Peter Alexander.

The recent Freddy LP, which is selling here like a single, has produced the newest single for the artist. For the first time, a single release from an LP is really making noise on the market as DJ's all over the country picked out the old evergreen "La Paloma" and began spinning it. Now, after only 3 weeks on the market, the song already enters the top ten with top star Freddy remaining the best selling artist in Germany for singles.

Deutsche Grammophon has released a list of the labels that they distribute. The firm handles Big Top, Cetra, Command, Fiesta, Hanover, Lion, Nippon Grammophon, Pinnacle, Brunswick, Coral, American Decca, Gallotone, Metro-Jazz, Polydor, Signature, Helidor, Westminster, Cadence, Cub, Dunes, Grand Award, Polyphon, MGM, Duniaphon, Peerless and United Artists in this country. In addition, the firm distributes the production from Polydor, in Holland, Japan, Denmark, France, Italy and Brazil.

Hans Beierlein from Montana Musik reports that Cedric Dumont, the head of the dance orchestra for Swiss Radio, visited him and the pair plan a publishing firm partnership in Switzerland. International Stars Peppino Di Capri from Italy and Claude Robin from France have also recorded a pair of Montana original German compositions for their countries respectively. Top teenager Rex Gildo has also recorded the English hit "Dream Girl" in German. The Gerd Boettcher hit "Adieu, Lebewohl, Goodbye" (The Barcarolle) has also been recorded in Swedish by Nora Brockstedt and in Holland by Ria Valk.

Pardon My Slip: The number "Babysitter Boogie" by Ralf Bendix and Buzz Clifford is published here by Chappell Music and not by August Seith Musik as reported.

Paul Siegel from Berlin reports that he has lined up a new Hit Parade DJ show in Switzerland from Zurich and that he will also soon start a show in Rome. This is in addition to his "Record Millionaire" show from Berlin. Record manufacturers are requested to send all releases, especially million sellers to him at his office. His address is Paul Siegel, Abt. Tanzmusik, Sender Fries Berlin, Masurenallee 8-14, West Berlin, Germany. The Solami Musik firm reports top action in both Germany and Italy on the new Rocco Granata waxing of "Signorina Bella."

New Polydor star Rene Kollo is traveling around Germany visiting DJ's promoting his waxing of "Hello Mary Lou," which is already high in the charts. That's it for this week in Germany.

CANADA

Jim Corbett of Sparton Records reports that Sparton is now the distributor of Westminster Records. He also mentioned that the Westminster catalog would be trimmed to 200 albums. A new release of 15 albums is also being scheduled for the label's fall plan. His strongest singles include "Who Put The Bomb" by Barry Mann, "Kissin' On The Phone" by Paul Anka, and "Let Me Belong To You" by Brian Hyland.

Gilles Aubin, field rep for London Records, writes that his best news items are, "Johnny Willow" by Fred Darian, "Hurt" by Timi Yuro on Liberty, "Let The Four Winds Blow" by Fats Domino on Imperial, "Amor" by Ben E. King on Ato, "The Mountain's High" by Dick and Deedee on Liberty, "Take Good Care Of My Baby" by Bobby Vee on Liberty, and "Crying" b/w "Candy Man" by Roy Orbison on Monument.

Fifteen new releases for Quality Records have gone to the d.j.'s, reported Johnny Wargachuck. Included are these current Top 100 items, "Big Cold Wind" by Pat Boone on Dot, "Does Your Chewing Gum Lose Its Flavor" by Lonnie Donegan on Dot, "Human" by Tommy Hunt on Quality, "You're The Reason" by Bobby Edwards on Barry, "Lonely Street" by Clarence Henry on Quality, and "St. Louis Blues" by The Cousins on the new Parkway label.

Radio Station CKGM has produced and distributed a recording under its own CKGM label. The station introduced its first release, "Montreal, My Home Town" by Geri and the Gee-Ems, to the public at 50¢ a copy. All proceeds go to charities.



ARGENTINA

Luis Arriola Sirvent, Sicomericana's vice-president and general manager went to Spain to get in touch with Hispavox (represented here by his label) and see the possibility of releasing some other European labels in Argentina.

The flood of American music recorded in Spanish by Mexican artists is getting the attention of diskeries, publishers and singers. Mexico is now recording the latest hits from the States only a few weeks after they are put to sale in the US, and this could mean big competition for local artists that do the same work when the tunes are known here. The trouble is that Argentine recording companies don't release American records until the previous waxing of the same artist has stopped selling, as, in general, all waxings in Spanish are made after the original version is released. Mexican recordings would be launched at the same time or even before the American ones, and would have a big advantage over domestic recordings in Spanish. On the other side, if records are released here at the same time as in the States, many feel that there will be a loss of sales due to the existence of more than one hit by the same artist at the same time (a hit record needs from one to four weeks to get on the lists here, and may stay on them for as much as six months). Another matter of concern is that there probably will be a Spanish translation made here, and another made in Mexico, with different words resulting in big confusion among customers. This could be solved with better cooperation between Mexican and local publishers.

Los TNT will be here September 15, after a three month tour of Venezuela, Peru and Chile. RCA will release their second LP the first days of September with plenty of promotion.

Fermata has definitely decided to get into the record releasing field in six or seven months. It has already started promotion of some of the artists in its cast, with special emphasis on Bobby Rydell, whose records are already being played by some of the most important disk jockeys of Buenos Aires. Mauricio Brenner, head of the publishing and now recording company, is trying to get some important licenses to add them to the labels he is already representing. However, he didn't say what diskeries he is looking at.

Philips signed several new artists for its cast: Los Salteños, group of folk singers considered "very promising," Rudy Machado and his band (well known tropical music orchestra), Los Maticas (duet of electrical guitars) and Carlos Michel, young bolero singer from Uruguay, who started recording the current hit "Angelica." Some other new contracts are being considered.

Pedro Lujan has already recorded his first four tunes for Music Hall: "Menos tu" (But You), "Amor a Primera Vista" (Love at First Sight), "Serenata en Rock" and "Echale un terrón más de azúcar a tu café, nena" (Put Some More Sugar in Your Coffee, Baby). All these are his own compositions.

Luis Aguilé is preparing his next TV show that will be aired if he doesn't go to Peru and Puerto Rico next month. Aguilé's last waxings are the material from "My Fair Lady," sung in Spanish, and "Los Iracundos," a rock and roll number penned by himself. This will be his first rock 'n roll records.

Ariel Records inked a new singer, Martin Rey, described as "very versatile" and has a lot of swing in his voice. Rey will cut all types of tunes, from guaraní to ballads.

Nelson Navarro, Colombian singer and composer, recently inked by Odeon Pops, (he is the author of "Quemame los Ojos," which sold about 170,000 records here) has already cut his first single: "La Boda de Marina" and "No me Pongan Flores." The disk will be put on sale very soon.

Baby Bell is planning to spend more time in Spain. She has recorded two tunes there: "Alegria" and "Ven a Bailar el Fado." Some people consider that "Alegria" may be her next big hit. Baby has been inked to take part in a new film that will start very soon.

TK-Polydor hopes to hit the charts with "El Pez," cut by Los Españoles. Other important releases are Fernando Albuerno's "Mi Corazonada," Adele Adamova's "Estando Contigo," and the first record cut by the well known composer Don Fabian: "Arrepentido." On this waxing, Fabian sings, plays the piano and directs the orchestra.

New Music Hall releases: "Cara de Payaso" by Raul Verdier; "Wheels" by Billy Vaughn; "Delito" by Siro San Roman.

CHILE

Polydor has already released "But You Broke My Heart" by Teddy Randazzo. This record has already received some promotion with very good results. "Goodbye Again" by Ferrante & Teicher will be released when the picture is shown in Chile.

Danny Chilean, currently one of the most popular singers in Chile, recorded his second single, titled "Um poco de Amor" (A Bit of Love). RCA has already released it and it is doing very well.

RCA will represent Argentine Calesita kiddie records. The first titles to be put to sale are those recorded by Chilean humorist Lucho Navarro and by Los Tres Marias.

It is interesting to note how much recording activity has taken place in Canada since "Clap Your Hands" by The Beaumarks became a hit. The Beaumarks continue to produce Canadian hits (presently on the charts with "Classmate") and now Bobby Curtola with "Don't You Sweetheart Me" on Tartan has broken the ice in much the same manner. Now that the record industry has seen that Canadian hits can be made, many Canadian concerns are looking for Canadian talent. Frank Angellini made a little noise with "Tattle-Tale" on Zirkon; has another release expected shortly. Other Canadians who have recorded recently or plan to do so in the immediate future include Ronnie Lane and The Capers, Dave Nichols and The Coins, Johnny Rhythym, Deni Dante and The Devalons, Billy Mason, Claude Vincent (he is well known in the French market and is now preparing for an English session), Marty Hill, The Count Victors, and numerous other acts.

The Biggest Show Of Stars, featuring The Platters, Brook Benton, Del Shannon, Dee Clark, U.S. Bonds, The Drifters, Gene McDaniels, The Jarmels, The Cleftones, Curtis Lee, and Phil Upchurch, is being planned for an appearance sometime in September at the Montreal Forum. More news about this event next week.

Rusticanna Records just released the French version of "Seaman," the best German hit. "Marin" is the title of the French version sung by Pierette Roy.

Fernand Gignac and Roger Miron winding up a twenty-five day tour of the province of Quebec. Jacques Desrosiers last week appeared at the Casa Loma in Montreal.

Noram Records just bought out Aladdin Records. All future Aladdin record masters and artists will appear under the R.M.C. label.

The Jerolas, French Canada's most popular recording group, are preparing their third album for the RCA Victor label. They plan to leave for the United States in November.

Georges Brassens, popular international star from France, will be the first artist to appear at the Comedie Canadienne for the opening of the fall season.



BRAZIL

BRAZIL

Columbia Records just issued a new album with a work of two of the most popular Brazilian composers: the pianist and arranger **Antonio Carlos Jobim** and the poet and diplomat **Vinicius De Moraes**. The album is entitled "Brasilia—Sinfonia Da Alvorada" (Brasilia—Symphony of Daybreak) and is played by a symphony orchestra conducted by Jobim with the **Dante Martinez Choir** under the direction of **Robert de Regina**. The work is divided into five movements. This is the first composition of the kind to be dedicated to the new Brazilian capital.

Salinas, the young Brazilian pianist known in the United States via his tour with Brazil's **Leny Eversong**, waxed a new album for Columbia named "Concertos Para Voce" (Concerts For You). In this LP, Salinas presents compositions of Chopin; Tchaikowsky; Liszt; Brahms; Galos; Schubert and Beethoven, supported by **Lyrrio Panicalli's Violinos Do Céu**. Lyrrio's arrangements are responsible for the most brilliant part of the album, but Salinas proved to be in a very good shape, too.

Copacabana's News . . . **Brigitte Bardot**, the hot European number by **Miguel Gustavo** (ADDAP edition) is now an international hit. The Brazilian "Momo's March" is already on the top in France; North Africa; Viet-Nan; Benelux; Libano; United States and Canada. Brigitte Bardot belongs to LP: Carnaval No Municipal Of 1961.

Osmar Milani, one of the most popular Brazilian band leaders and arrangers cut a new album named "Estas Sao As Preferidas" (This Is The Favorites). This LP is also available in Argentina, where it is a reported success.

Eight Copacabana LP's are also reported hitting in Uruguay: "Feito Para Dançar" by **Waldir Azevedo**; "Maior De Que A Saudade" by **Agnaldo Rayol**; "Encontro As 9" by **Aloysio Figueiredo**; "Sax Sensacional Number Two" by **Moacir Silva**; "Ronnie Cord" (singer); "Serenta Ao Paraguai" by **Franquito**; "Mêcha Branca" by **Maria Thereza** and "A Meiga" by **Elizete Cardozo**. Brazilian music is now known in many countries. Some years ago, nobody knew our rhythms, singers, composers, orchestras, etc., mainly because our rhythms were played the wrong way, especially the Samba.

Brazil has many arrangers with enormous capacity, such as **Luis Arruda Paes**, **Erlon Chaves**, **Lyrrio Panicalli**, **Radamês Gnatalli**, **Waldemiro Lenck**, **Osmar Milani**, **Elcio Alvarez** and others.

No phonograph records at all are manufactured in France during the first two weeks of July and the entire month of August. The industry has already existing stock and publishers and labels to resume production and promote winter sales. Therefore, recording artists tour the country in a series of appearances appearing every night at a different summer resort. They perform new repertoires and receive the plaudits of the public. Success during the preceding season. **Felix M. Europe's** outstanding impresarios has given attention on the summer activities of some of the stars whom he manages:

The racketeer was spared from death by two policemen but the story made headlines in newspapers in less than six hours. "Juke Box Thug Escapes Death In Coin Machine Gang War" was the headline. The story ran along the same lines as dozens of other stories which have appeared, unfavorably publicizing the industry. The term "juke box" had absolutely no bearing on the event, other than in association with the victim's past record of a union organizing attempt among operators which went sour. With this one exception, the Brooklyn hoodlum probably had no other experience with juke boxes other than to play one of them. He certainly shouldn't be linked with the industry.

And now for the paradox.

When the Broadway musical "Do-Re-Mi" re-opened Tuesday evening, two days after the attempted murder, its publicists decided that juke boxes could be used to help promote the event since the show centers around the juke box and record industry. A local operator was called in to supply the machines and the show re-opened successfully with chorus girls dancing in the streets and half dozen juke boxes playing recorded music from the show's score. (See separate story this issue).

To a bystander watching the world go by in New York last week, the juke box would have presented a very interesting paradox indeed—connected with a hoodlum's attempted murder on Sunday evening, and the star of a Broadway opening 48 hours later.

The newspapers cleared everything up, however. They linked the Brooklyn thug's career with the juke box industry using a vague thread of evidence as reason for the obviously calculated attempt at greater readership—completely overlooked the publicity stunt even though it took place literally in the shadow of two metropolitan newspaper plants. The Broadway show story was admittedly a publicity grab. But the distortion of the truth labeling the thug's near murder to a "juke box gang war" rang with familiarity. Evidently the term "juke box" carries with it a dramatic overtone that attracts newspaper readers.

Nothing was done on a national scale to combat this unfavorable type of publicity until last year when the Coin Machine Council started rolling. Under a full load of steam CMC started showing tremendous results—then the money ran out. Lack of interest and little or no financial support were given as the prime reasons for the ninety-day notice before closing its doors.

A mass membership mailing has been sent out to the nation's operators with a plea for support. The coin machine industry desperately needs an agency such as CMC to fight its battles. These people were well on their way to educating the nation's press in order that distorted reports such as the one outlined above would not appear whenever an ignorant press saw fit to inject this type of information. Unfortunately, the industry didn't support the program. There are two months left before CMC is forced to suspend its operations for lack of funds. Your check will prolong its life. Enough checks will keep it going forever.

Juke Box Industry In New York Reels Under Salvo Of Newspaper Stories Linking Coinmen With Racketeers

Attempted Murder Of Brooklyn Thug Sets Fuse

NEW YORK—A concerned juke box industry awaited patiently the outcome of a New York newspaper's promise to Al Denver, president of the Music Operators of New York, Inc. to meet with him for an interview designed to serve the paper with "the correct facts on our industry."

The newspaper, New York's Daily Mirror, headlined an editorial in its August 24 edition "Smash The Racketeers" and suggested that "if gang warfare is related to the juke box racket, then the juke box racket must be smashed . . . we don't need juke boxes that bad. What is imperative is that there be no revival of the era that spawned Dutch Schultz, Legs Diamond, Mad Dog Coll, Owney Madden and their ilk. . ."

Reason for the highly inaccurate and inconclusive editorial was the attempted murder of one Lawrence Gallo, union organizer and leader of a plot which promised to organize the entire juke box industry in this area several years ago. The plan failed. Gallo, who manages to get his name placed in gangland-type headlines periodically, has been associated with the juke box "racket" and the headline in this particular story suggested that his near-murder was the result of "juke box gang warfare."

The New York press splashed the story across the top of dominant news pages and at press time, after five days of reports, the story is still receiving television and newspaper coverage. The juke box industry in New York, represented by MONY was highly distraught having recently made several steps forward in the public eye, as the result of an invaluable public relations program which eventually folded because of lack of funds.

The Coin Machine Council's New York branch, led by Henry Goldstein, managed to contact the Mirror via wires from Lou Casola, CMC president, and Al Denver, explaining the plight of the industry, and asking for an opportunity to set the record straight. Following are the telegrams wired to the Daily Mirror's editor:

STATEMENT BY LOUIS CASOLA, PRESIDENT OF COIN MACHINE COUNCIL

The New York Mirror's editorial, "Smash The Racketeers" (August 24) uses the recent attempted gangland slaying of racketeer Lawrence Gallo and the wounding of a policeman as a springboard for an all-out attack on the juke-box industry. It ends with a call to ban jukeboxes by law.

As the fact-disseminating organization of the coin machine industry, the Coin Machine Council categorically denies that there is any relationship between the Gallo affair and the juke-box industry. If there is a link at all

it is this: The hoodlum in question, representing outside underworld elements, once attempted to shake down juke box operators. The story of such gangster efforts to muscle in on the juke box industry was unfolded in detail during the McClellan Committee Investigation—a probe which found that "the honest, legitimate people who are in the great majority in the industry have been widely victimized by racketeers and thugs."

The New York Mirror's article, therefore, is a gratuitous smear of hardworking men and women. It is a defamatory piece which generates more heat than light and which could have been avoided if the newspaper had bothered to consult its own files or even to check the rackets commission for any evidence of a connection with the industry.

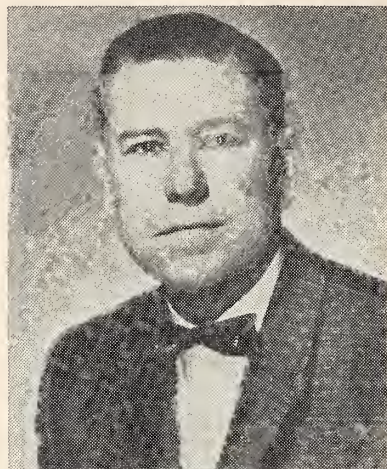
STATEMENT BY AL DENVER, PRESIDENT OF MUSIC OPERATORS OF NEW YORK, INC.

(Sent as wire to N. Y. Mirror)

Your editorial of August 24, (Smash the Racketeers), contains statements about the jukebox industry that are incorrect and unsubstantiated. Since the editorial maligns a legitimate business conducted by hundreds of small businessmen, may I ask that you extend the courtesy of assigning a reporter to interview me so that he may obtain the correct facts on our industry.

At presstime, it was advised that the Mirror had intentions of calling on Denver, and the CMC representative, Henry Goldstein, with a special interview designed to hear the juke box industry's side of the story.

The unfortunate outbreak in print came at a time when the nation's coin-



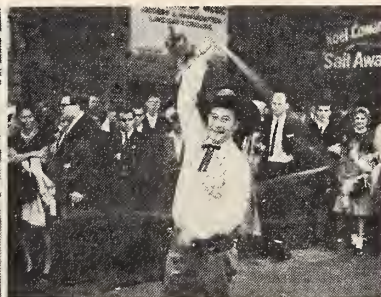

men were rejecting pleas from the Coin Machine Council, industry-wide organization with several top-notch accomplishments to its credit, for desperately needed financial support. The Georgia Coin Machine Merchants were running into the same problem—no financial support of a PR and legislative program. (See separate story.) Last year, after a sparkling public relations program, led by New York's Al Bodkin, the New York PR plan collapsed with no funds in its treasury. Reason given for the close of activities was lack of funds and interest. Similar stories have been reported from different sections of the country.

Meanwhile, the coin machine business in Brooklyn, New York and the outlying areas suffered another blow delivered by an ignorant and circulation-hungry press.

"Do-Re-Mi" Re-Opens As Juke Boxes Set Stage For Gala Block Party

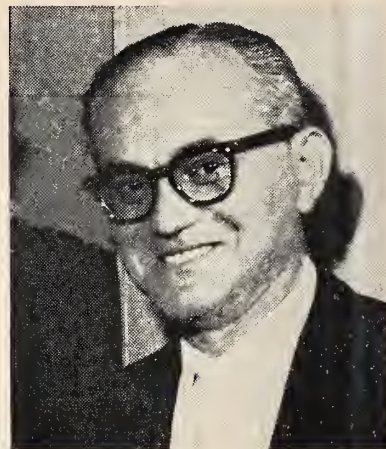

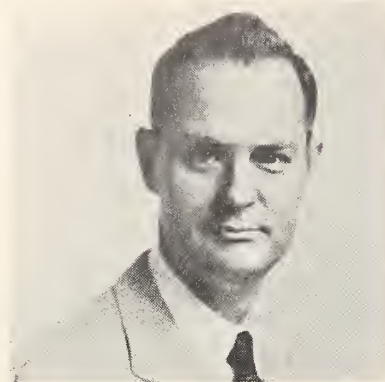
Fishman is senior vice president of Automatic Retailers of America, Inc., and has often addressed national convention groups to acquaint other industries with the vending story.

CHICAGO — Speakers from such widely separated areas and countries as Okinawa, Great Britain, Italy, Switzerland, Iraq, France, Holland and the Scandinavian countries already have agreed to share their knowledge of vending with some 8,000 executives from the United States and all parts of the world, according to Jack B. Low, planning chairman, at the First International Vending Symposium to be held in Chicago, U. S. A., on October 31.

The International Symposium and international guests' tour to be held the following day (November 1) are part of the 75th Anniversary Convention and Exhibit of the National Automatic Merchandising Association (NAMA).

International guests also will attend the remainder of the sessions during the four-day convention. These will deal with speeches and discussion topics of vending in the U. S. A., while the International Symposium meetings will be devoted to vending in other parts of the world, Low said.

"For the first time at our conventions, we are featuring this kind of information exchange on an interna-

tional basis," Low explained. "We are certain that both our U. S. A. executives and the visitors from other lands will benefit from this information exchange."

A number of advance registrations has already been received by the NAMA office from all parts of the world, Low said.

"Our international visitors will be interested to know that as of August 15, the size of the vending machine and product exhibit to be held at the McCormick Place Exhibition Hall has passed last year's record in size and variety," Low added.

He urged all international guests to notify the NAMA office, 7 South Dearborn Street, Chicago 3, Illinois, U. S. A., if they plan to attend the convention or if they desire further information.

Howard, Reed To Talk On Vending In Hospitals

CHICAGO—J. Richard Howard and Walter W. Reed will represent the National Automatic Merchandising Association and the vending industry at a five-day Advanced Institute for hospital administrators sponsored by the American College of Hospital Administrators, according to Thomas B. Donahue, NAMA president.

They will speak on "Vending in Hospitals" on Friday, August 18 as part of a program relating the "Impact of Scientific Advances on Hospitals."

The meeting is being held in Chicago and includes hospital administrators from all parts of the country.

According to Howard this is one of the first formal presentations or vending services before a conference of hospital administrators.

Howard is a member of the Board of Directors of NAMA, and Reed is director of public relations.

Natl. Rejectors Bill Changer Vends Foreign Currency

NEW YORK—Universal Match has adapted its currency changing machine manufactured by National Rejectors Inc. to handle foreign money.

The machine on location at New York's International Airport can exchange as many as six different currencies. To obtain change, a passenger using the machine receives the proper amount of exchange in the currency of her choice after inserting her \$5 bill. It's as simple as that.

Perera Company, foreign exchange specialists, have two of the machines at the airfield, both at the Sabena departure building. The amount of foreign money supplied by the machine is determined by the current rate of exchange less a fee of thirty cents for the service. Perera has leased several other machines from National Rejectors for locations elsewhere.

The machine in Sabena's location has for exchange French francs, Italian lire, German marks and English pounds. The machine accepts only the \$5 bill in American currency.

The return currency is vended in a cardboard container which is packaged according to the prevailing rate of exchange at the time the machine is serviced. Naturally, a change in currency rate would necessitate a change in the foreign currency amounts.

Ice Machine Cubes And Chips

FARIBAULT, MINN.—American Automatic Ice Machine Company, Faribault, Minn., is now manufacturing a new Crystal Tips 2-in-1 automatic ice maker. The new unit is a compact version of the Crystal Tips 2-in-1 ice maker and has been designated the Model B-11.

The Crystal Tips Model B-11 will make either ice cubes or ice chips, depending upon the customers' requirements. This model will produce up to 90 lbs. of ice per day. As the ice is made it is automatically stored in a fully insulated, stainless steel lined storage bin. The storage bin has a capacity of up to 60 lbs. of ice.



Mullinix' statement was the result of poor support from the Georgia coinmen of the organization which was founded last November. After two meetings and enough support to proceed, GCMMA contracted with Trade Association Consultants, professional association managers.

"Probably no single \$100 bill you have paid during the past year equaled in merit or value the potential value of having an Association of Coin Machine Operators in time of severe crisis," stated Mullinix.

He said that a pre-existing organization must be used to successfully combat oppressive measures and actions. He stated that the group just cannot organize fast enough when the problems strike. An organization must be constantly in being.

"I cannot say how disappointed I am because we have failed to attract enough members. Right now we owe TAC for some services rendered including travel expenses and a printing bill," said Mullinix.

Mullinix advised that GCMMA needs 100 members at \$100 each. "If we fail, I believe it will be at least another ten years before we can start to build again."

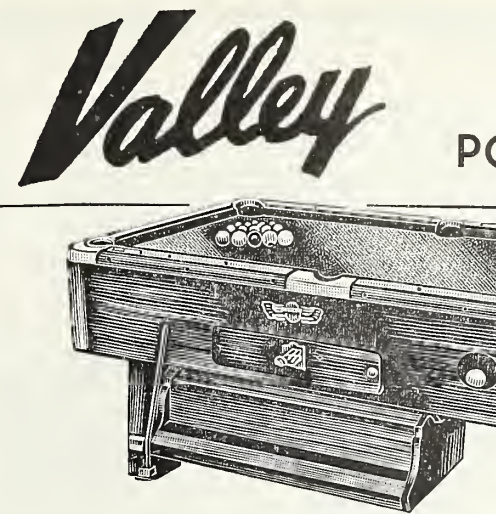

United Ships "Viking" Shuffle Alley

CHICAGO—General thinking at United Manufacturing Company of this city is focused on the universal sales possibilities for the approaching Fall season, according to C. B. (Bill) DeSelm, vice president in charge of the sales division. On this singular note he announced the introduction at this particular time of United Manufacturing's "Viking" shuffle alley bowling game, which DeSelm said, was designed expressly to give the amusement operator maximum service and the highest possible earnings in all types of locations for a long time.

He said: "Also, for the operator, our engineers have speeded play so that maximum earnings can be achieved with a minimum of effort. This, coupled with the exciting playing and scoring features—as well as the low, low cost for the game—make 'Viking' shuffle alley a 'must' amusement game for all operators.

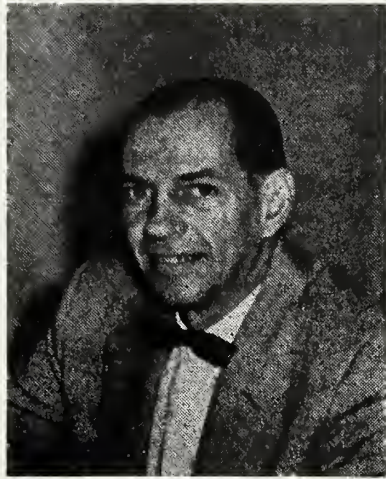
"In high speed play," DeSelm continued, "there is no waiting between the first and second pucks in the same frame in 'Regulation,' 'Advance' scoring, and 'Progressive' scoring. Play is continuous without a let-up."

DeSelm went on to explain the various scoring games offered in the "Viking" shuffle alley bowler. They are: "Flash-O-Matic," "Advance Scoring," "Progressive Scoring," "Mystery Spares" and "Regulation" bowling.

One feature on the "Viking" shuffle alley cabinet DeSelm urged us to detail is the application of extra durable stainless steel (highly polished) side-rails along both sides of the playfield. Another addition to this game he feels strongly about is the pin-hood just above the pins. The scoring panel on the pin-hood keeps the player cognizant of his score from frame to frame.

One to six players can compete with each other in the "Viking" shuffle alley bowler, at 10 cents per player per game. The cabinet is 8½ feet in length and 2½ feet wide.

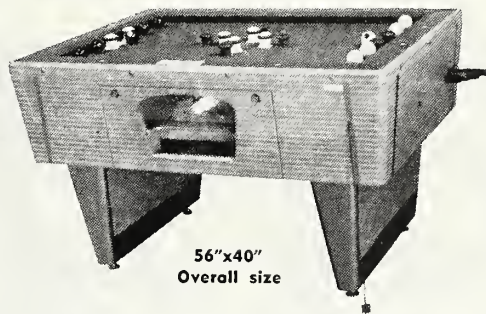

Std. Financial Acquires Universal Finance

NEW YORK—Stockholders of Standard Financial Corporation, at a special meeting here last week, approved the merger of Universal Finance Corporation of Los Angeles into Standard Financial, Theodore H. Silbert, Standard Financial president, announced. Stockholders of Universal approved the merger in Los Angeles yesterday. It is expected that, subject to certain tax rulings, the merger will become effective before September 30.

Universal will be operated as a newly formed wholly-owned subsidiary of Standard Financial Corporation under the old name of Universal Finance Corporation. Total outstanding receivables of Universal exceeded \$28 million on March 31, 1961, compared with approximately \$90 million in outstanding accounts of Standard Financial. Net profit after taxes of Universal for the year ended June 30, 1961 was \$340,000, compared with \$1,265,000 earned by Standard in 1960.

In addition, Silbert said that the acquisition of the shares of Security Industrial Loan Association, Richmond, Va., which was announced previously, is expected to close in sixty days. Security Industrial is under the general supervision of the Banking Department of the Virginia State Corporation Commission and operates in the field of second mortgage lending under an Industrial Bank Charter.

Commenting on these two transactions, Silbert said, "These are further steps in Standard Financial's policy of diversifying into new finance fields and to bring experienced personnel into our company to provide complete financing facilities for our clients. The combined companies annual volume financed should be approximately \$350,000,000.

Standard Financial is a nationwide, diversified financing, factoring and commercial installment banking company with executive offices in N.Y.C.
