

This week, Cash Box introduces a new feature designed to aid the one greatest consumer of single records-the juke box operator.

Through this new feature called "Juke Box Operator Record Guide" we will offer the op additional information which we feel will help him program his phonographs more profitably.

The weekly feature will include three separate segments:

Under the heading ACTIVE WITH OPS will be a continuous series of titles (other than those on the Cash Box Top 100 Best Seller List) which leading one-stops servicing juke box operators throughout the nation report are receiving strong acceptance from these ops.

The second section of the new feature will be headed NEW ADDI-TIONS TO TOP 100 and will offer ops a capsule view of all new singles (and their positions) that break onto Cash Box' Top 100 and therefore deserve careful attention as potential hits of the future.

The third segment will be headed AIMED AT OPS. This portion will report on all new singles which record manufacturers have designed primarily for operators, such as: newly issued recouplings of former hits; gold standards; jazz specialties; excerpts from albums aimed to suit adult tastes; operator kits and packs, etc. Since manufacturers do not issue such special merchandise on a regular weekly basis, there may be periods when this Aimed at Ops section of the Op's Guide will be excluded. However all new operator designed releases will be reported here as soon as they are issued.

The JUKE BOX OPS' RECORD GUIDE is another move in Cash Box' continued search for new ways to aid its readers in keeping abreast of action in the record industry.



Pick of the Week

"SCHOOL IS IN" (2:08) [Pepe BMI-Barge, Anderson] "TRIP TO THE MOON" (2:27) [Pepe BMI-Barge, Anderson] GARY (U.S.) BONDS (Legrand 1012)

Looks like the kids are gonna continue doin' the mashed potatoes for quite awhile. One reason is Gary (U.S.) Bonds' latest Legrand platter, "School Is In," which is a timely re-write of his recent smash, "School Is Out." The inviting "Trip To The Moon" gets a thumping reading on the lower end.

"FLY BY NIGHT" (2:34) [Sea-Lark BMI—Adams, Nader] "DANNY BOY" (2:55) [Boosey & Hawkes ASCAP-Weatherly] ANDY WILLIAMS (Columbia 42199)

Williams checks in with a sales heavyweight on his first-time-out for Columbia. It's a captivating ballad romancer, titled "Fly By Night," that the smooth-toned artist delivers with touching sincerity. Deejay exposure should send it soaring. The heartwarming revival of "Danny Boy" makes for an excellent companion piece. Lovely Bob Mersey ork-choral back-grounds on both ends.

"TONIGHT" (2:52) [G. Shirmer ASCAP-Bernstein, Sondheim] "DREAM OF LOVE" (2:13) [Arlou ASCAP-Arr: Ferrante & Teicher] FERRANTE & TEICHER (United Artists 373)

"Tonight," the beautiful ballad from the B'way musical (and up-coming pic) "West Side Story," is now displayed in a fabulous Latin beat choral-ork showcase with the hit-making dual-pianists in the spotlite. Could be a very big chart item in the near future. "Dream Of Love" is an ear-arresting adaptation of Franz Liszts "Lieberstraum." Could also step way out way out.

"A CERTAIN SMILE (2:42) "I CRIED MY LAST TEAR" [Minit BMI—Neville] (2:10) [Minit BMI—Neville] ERNIE K-DOE (Minit 634)

Both "A Certain Girl" and "I Cried My Last Tear" have what it takes to give K-Doe another "Mother-In-Law" chart triumph. Former's an in-triguing rock-a-cha thumper that has the chorus asking "what's her name?" and Ernie responding with "can't tell ya." Latter's a tantalizing shuffle-rock sentimental opus also set in an attractive choral-ork show-case Big double-basder here case. Big double-header here.

"TOWN WITHOUT PITY" (2:53) [United Artists ASCAP—Tiomkin, Washington] "AIR MAIL SPECIAL DELIVERY" (2:53) [Sea Lark ASCAP-Schroeder, Pitney] GENE PITNEY (Musicor 1009)

Pitney, who's currently cashing in with "Every Breath I Take," can really do big business with this title-tune affair from the up-coming motion pic "Town Without Pity." It's a haunting tale of young love set to a dramatic beat-ballad pace. Also of chart importance is the power-house shuffle-rocker, "Air Mail Special Delivery," that Gene belts out with coin-catching authority on the other half.

"HONOLULU NITES" (2:04) [Arvee BMI-Arr: Lyman] "(THE SLOOP) JOHN B." (2:39) [Ludlow BMI-Sandburg, Hays] **ARTHUR LYMAN GROUP (Hifi 5040)**

The Lyman Group follows its big money-maker, "Yellow Bird," with another ear-pleaser that's sure to bring in the loot in no time flat. It's the beautiful "Honolulu Nites" that the artists smoothly polish off in slow-to-quick beat fashion. The enchanting sea chanty, "(The Sloop) John B." is warmly viewed flipside.

"STRANGE LOVE" (2:18) [Jobete BMI-Stevenson] "COME TO ME" (2:38) [Jobete BMI-Johnson, Gordy] MARY WELLS (Motown 1016)

Lark, who now owns a pair of dual-mart money-makers in "Bye Bye Baby" and "I Don't Want To Take A Chance," can make it three-in-a-row with "Strange Love." Side's a pulsating, beat-ballad hip-swinger that Mary and the ork-chorus put across with telling effect. Could be her big-gest side to date. There's lots of excitement in the pounding rock coupler, "Come To Me." Should also be eyed.

THE NEW YORKERS (Wall 548)

(B+) "TEARS IN MY EYES" (2:35) [Cherio & Figure BMI —Parris, Goldman] Team's lead does a touching survey of the inviting wistful. The other warblers and combo back-up with an attractive soft-spoken stand. Merits exposure.

(B) "A LITTLE BIT" (2:12) [Cherio & Figure BMI—Par-ris, Goldman] A busy-beat Latin-blues performance from the crew that features an off-beat speedy percussion sound in the setting sound in the setting.

BOBBY KEENE (Coral 62290)

(B) "ANGEL OR DEVIL" (2:20) [Gower BMI—Scott] Keene gives a good teen-directed vocal ac-count of the bouncy opus, and is sup-ported by a full ork-chorus rock-a-cha statement. Enjoyable listening for the teen-beat crowd.

(B) "GOTTA GO TO SCHOOL" (2:14) [Emory BMI—Knight, Carroll] Horton Upbeat doing about a fella's school program. Chorus has a gospel-like chant stint at times.

PEPE LA STAZA (Everest 19423)

(B+) "MacDOUGAL STREET" (B+) "MacDOUGAL STREET" (2:32) [Rumbalero & Trio BMI—Ross] An attractive number concerned with love-found in New York's Greenwich Village is hand-somely portrayed by the songster and lush Latinish ork-chorus. Many jocks may dig the sentiments.

(B) "MARIA" (2:34) [Chappell ASCAP—Sonheim, Bernstein]
 A big-sounding teen-slanted version of the lovely song from "West Side Story," soon to have its pic premiere.

JOHNNY RHYTHM (MGM 13043)

"WOULDN'T IT BE NICE" (B) (B) "WOULDN'T IT BE NICE" (2:45) [BMI Canada, Ltd.
BMI—Rhythm] The teen-market vocalist has a quick-beat Presleyish outing. Good rock punch from the combo backdrop.
(B) "THIS IS IT" (2:25) [BMI Canada, Ltd. BMI—Bush] An emotional ballad essay from the per-former, who tells of love-found.

LILLIAN BRIGGS (ABC-Paramount 10253)

(B) "I'M BURNING FOR YOU" (2:16) [Valencia ASCAP— Mallin, Seelen, Lindsey] Medium-beat rocker again displays the lark's slick way with teen-directed merchandise.

ROSEMARY CLOONEY (RCA Victor 7948)

(B+) "GIVE MYSELF A PARTY" (2:30) [Acuff-Rose BMI— Gibson] Lark goes into the country field (Don Gibson's recent click) for a fine light-beat vocal against a rock-a-billy-like combo-chorus sound. Might get some pop juke attention.

(B) "IF I CAN STAY AWAY LONG ENOUGH" (2:34) [Tree BMI—Martin] Warm wistful, including an echo multi-track feat, on another country opus.

RONNIE TOBER (Guv 102)

(B+) "WHO TAUGHT YOU HOW" (2:19) [Larry Taylor ASCAP —Neiburg, Wood] Tober, who copped top laurels in a recent "Jr. Mr. Amer-ica" talent contest, displays his win-ning form on this brisked-paced merengue-like love ditty. Pleasing musical support from the Fred Nor-man outfit. man outfit.

(B) "SHE USED TO BE MINE" (2:15) [Larry Taylor ASCAP —Tobias, Carr] This tearful item puts the artist on a softer cha cha beat light.

THE DEE CALS (Mayhams 1960)

(C+) "STARS IN THE BLUE WHAT SHOULD I DO" (2:25) [Sorority Fraternity BMI-D -Cals, Mayhams] OK teen vocal group in a familiar romantic ballad setting. Slow, languid, moody affair. (C+) "A WONDERFUL DAY" (2:22) [Sorority Fraternity BMI-D-Cals, Mayhams] Light rocker is offered here in acceptable terms.

JUSTIN JONES (Flippin' 309)

(B+) "DANCE BY YOURSELF" (2:25) [Village BMI—Prosen] Fella is eyeing a chick who's dancing solo in this catchy upbeat R&B-flav-ored item for teeners. Singer Jones has a good-sounding busy-beat setting from the combo-chorus. Kids will ap-preciate deck's life.

(B) "LOVE (Your Magic Spell is Everywhere)" (2:05) [Bourne a ASCAP—Janis, Goulding] Bluesy light-beat reading of the sturdy.

DON & BOB (Argo 5400)

(B+) "GOOD MORNING LITTLE SCHOOLGIRL" (2:25) [Arc BMI-Level, Love] Vocalists and their combo backing say good-morn-ing with infectious R&B-styled vigor. Date stacks-up as a solid twist-beat date for both listening and dancing. Could move Could move.

(B) "I'M LOST" (2:13) [Arc BMI—Level, Love] Fellas turn to an expressive teen-slanted blues performance.

THE TREASURERS (Crown 005)

(B+) "I WALK WITH AN ANGEL" [Sylvania BMI—Barnes] This teen-directed jumper could put the Treasurers in 'lootsville'. Fetching en-try chock full of the vocal and musi-cal sounds the kids dig.

(B) "STORY OF LOVE" (Syl-vania BMI — Chojnowski] Thinks slow down to a warm beat-ballad pace here. Label's based in West Wyoming, Pa.

GEORGE WALKER, JR. (Carlton 560)

(B) "HELLO BABY" (2:55) [Jen-eva BMI-Walker] Moody, dramatic ballad stanza here features a soulful lyric expression from song-ster Walker. Effective guitar-rhythm support. Groovy blues market item.

(B) "WEE WEE HOURS" (2:15) [Jeneva BMI—Walker] Fla-vorful uptempo rocker again spot-lights solid combo with Walker wail-ing out front ing out front.

"LET THEM LOVE" (2:44) [Elsher, Alan K BMI—Hogan] "WELCOME HOME" (2:33) [Elsher, Alan K BMI—Hogan] THE DREAMLOVERS (Heritage 104)

Artists, having clicked with their first session on Cameo-distributed Heri-tage label—"When We Get Married"—can make it two-in-a-row with this one. Tabbed, "Let Them Love," it's a touching beat-ballad pretty warmly backed up by the Bob Martin's crew. More tender beat-ballad sounds on the ear-pleasing coupler, "Welcome Home."

"JOHNNY, I HARDLY KNEW YE" (3:45) [G. G. BMI-Lewis] "THE SECOND TIME AROUND" (2:45) [Miller ASCAP-Cahn, Van Heusen] GOGI GRANT (20th Fox 284)

This poignant tale of the sorrows of war, tabbed "Johnny, I Hardly Knew Ye," can give Gogi Grant a 20th-Fox click bow. It's a heartrending re-write of "When Johnny Comes Marching Home" that features a stirring martial beat backdrop supplied by Morton Stevens. Flipside, the lark hands in a soft and lovely reading of the recent Academy Award nominee.

Kenny Dino was born Kenneth Joseph Doino, February 12, 1942 in New York City. When just a young-ster, his family took up permanent residence in Hicksville, Long Island, and it was there that Kenny began his singing career. While a student at Hicksville High School he accrued a large local following as a result of numerous appearances at school and community functions. It was this neighborly enthusiasm (local fan clubs, demands for photos and autoclubs, demands for photos and auto-graphs, etc.) that urged Kenny to continue in search of a professional career after he returned from a two-year hitch in the Navy.





Columbia has secured from its archives 64 sides cut by the vari-ous Henderson bands (enough material for four full disks) and with an accompanying extensive documentation by Frank Driggs the package is of tremendous jazz history interest. Almost all of the famed early jazz names are represented here too. too.

"AFRICA/BRASS"—The John Coltrane Quartet —Impulse A-6 The intensive probing, searching Celtrane sax style reaches a high point in the 16½ minute (all of side one) "Africa," in which the quintet achieves a Mingus-like fury of neatly thought-out abandon. It's a wild thing with Coltrane standing out as a giant on his instrument. This same idea is carried out in the two tracks on side two, "Greensleeves" and "Blues Minor." Interest abounds here. abounds here.

"THE WONDERFUL WORLD OF JAZZ—John Lewis—Atlantic 1375 Devotees of John Lewis' musical mystique will get a big surprise here, as will the more tradi-tion-minded fans who have not followed Lewis too closely. It presents the pianist in the rela-tively simplified context of small combo mood-like jazz, highlighting soloists Paul Gonsalves, Herb Pomeroy, Benny Golson and Lewis himself, plus others. It's a surprise—an extremely delight-ful one. Selections include "Body And Soul," "I Remember Clifford," "I Should Care" and two Lewis originals.

"HARRY JAMES PLAYS NEAL HEFTI" — MGM E 3972 Neal Hefti is the catalyst here, supplying both the songs and the arrangements (a thing he's proven more than capable at for many big bands), and the precision-tooled James band takes the cue and the precision-cover sames band takes the cue and swings a neat jazz-oriented big band pattern through the session. James solos with his cus-tomary finesse and there are other notable solo-ists around for occasional trysts. Enjoyable lis-tening with some pleasant surprises.

"THIS IS THE BLUES"-Vol. 2-Pacific Jazz

PJ-30 The Pacific Jazz soul-stirrers are again heard in a compilation of tracks from their various PJ albums. The selections range wide through the blues acreage, covering ground well-surveyed by "Groove" Holmes, Curtis Amy, Paul Bryant, Bud Shank, Les McCann, Carmell Jones and many others. The six extended selections allow a good, long look at the wealth of material in the label's catalog catalog.

"SWINGIN' THE JINGLES"—Sascha Burland and his Orch.—Riverside 97515 Cleffer Burland was one of the pioneers in the use of modern music for radio and TV commercials (he was also one-half of the Nutty Squirells), his compositions now being heard all over the air-waves. Therefore it is not unusual that of ten of the top jingles surveyed here in swinging terms six are from his pen. Musically, the melodies are sound and provide fascinating vehicles for the jazzmen assembled here, playing charts by Eddie Sauter and Bill Finnegan. A very interesting jazz album. album.

"MY FAVORITE OVERTURES"—Sir Thomas Beecham conducting the Royal Philharmonic Orch.—Capitol SG 7251 Capitol has gathered up a sheaf of overture tracks recorded by the late Thomas Beecham and incorporated them into this one exciting album. Most of the five are not the usual warhorses and are welcome additions to the catalog, especially in Beecham's stirring direction. They include Ros-sini's "La Gazza Ladra" and "La Cambiale Di Matrimonio," Mendelssohn's "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and "The Fair Melusina" and Berlioz' "Le Corasire."

Cadence Debuts "Little LP;" New Product Features Six Selections and New Packaging

NEW YORK - Cadence Records last week introduced a new product in the field of packaged goods which it has dubbed the Little LP. Designed primarily for the teenage consumer, the new package is a 7"-33rpm disk and features, for the first time on a commercial basis, six selections, three on a side. (The three-on-a-side idea has been used in the past for samplers.)

The Little LP, to list for \$1.69 each, debuts with five initial sets attractively packaged in a heavy clear plastic jacket. Each jacket contains a title card featuring on its face the title of the Little LP, its six selections, and a four color photo of the artist which can be cropped to fit a wallet. On the back side of the card is a bio of the artist and his autograph. The record slips into the clear plastic



jacket and is exposed to the consumer, who can clearly see that he's getting a 33 rpm disk with a small hole and that there are three selections on a side.

Archie Bleyer, president of Cadence, in explaining the reason for this unusual packaging said, "We wanted something modern and new in keeping with the product. We felt consumers were not well aware of what the terms EP, compact 33's, etc., meant. We think the name Little LP clearly defines what the package offers and the clear plastic jacket leaves no room for doubt.

The new series debuts with five initial releases: "Words And Music by Johnny Tillotson," "This Is Johnny Tillotson," "Never On Sunday-The Chordettes," "Dream With The Everly Brothers," and "Rockin' With The Everly Brothers."

In testing consumer opinion on such a product, Cadence sent out a circular to some 7,000 Tillotson fans who had

N.Y. Philharmonic Strike **Ends Sessions At Columbia**

NEW YORK-The strike of the musicians of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra against the Philharmonic Society-which has delayed the opening of the orchestra's new seasonhas ended, for the duration of the strike, all sessions of Leonard Bernstein-conducted group for Columbia Records.

A spokesman for the label said last week that the orchestra's regular Monday sessions could not continue unless a settlement was reached. Last Monday's scheduled studio work was not held.

The musicians' union, Local 802 of the American Federation of Musicians, is holding out for a one year pact, a \$32.50 raise in the minimum salary of 180, two days off a week instead of one, overtime at any concert over two hours, and better tour conditions.

The Philharmonic Society has offered a three-year pact with a \$10 raise above the minimum salary, with \$10 more in the 1963-64 season, a guarantee of a longer season, and other benefits.

At presstime, no meetings between the union and the society had been scheduled.

1 Billionth Victor Disk Is Pressed

INDIANAPOLIS — The one billionth disk produced by RCA Victor was pressed last week (3) at the label's plant here. The deck that achieved this milestone was a 45 single, Eddie Arnold's "One Grain of Sand."

Attending the ceremonies marking the event, which included an on-thescene radio broadcast over WFBM direct from the production area, were City Comptroller, Al Losche, representing Mayor Charles F. Boswell, Fred Beyer of the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce, plant manager and spokesman Roy Price and Arnold, as well as plant personnel.

The platter was presented to Arnold by Losche, who had accepted it from record press operator Anna Franks. All record division employees, 1,300 in number, were given a duplicate of the one billionth record as a momento.

Along with Losche and Beyer, Price congratulated and paid tribute to "each and every person who helped in achieving this outstanding success."

Price underlined the magnitude of the achievement. "We are the world's largest manufacturer of phonograph records," he stated, "yet it required over 22 years to attain the one billion mark. Our record plant produced its first record here on August 5, 1939, and currently manufactures 65 to 70 million records per year. If all the records produced here in the past 22 years were spread out, one by one, they would cover a total area of 23 square miles, more than one-third the area contained in the city limits of Indianapolis. Also, if you were to play all the records manufactured in Indianapolis one after another, twenty-four hours a day for seven days a week, it would take more than 23,834 years of listening time.'

Following the ceremonies, the community officials and Arnold were guests at a luncheon and then were conducted on an inspection tour of the plant by Price.

Joining in the festivities were representatives of four other Victor record division operations in Indianapolis; the RCA record merchandise and administration group, the RCA magnetic tape plant, and record division E.D.P. and the RCA record engineering group.

The device, called a Vari-Vue, contains pictures which appear to "flash" back and forth as the album jacket is moved.

The first Columbia album covers to employ a Vari-Vue was "Stereo Dialogue For Brass," and the device pictured a "moving" trumpet and trombone. Current releases featuring Vari-Vue are: "Zungo! Afro Percussion," showing drums "played" by a pair of hands; "Rhythm In Motion," displaying a "moving" trumpet; "Voices In Motion," with "moving" lips; "Jose Greco And His Dance Company," featuring "dancing" boots; and "Stage Left—Stage Right" which employs a "dancing" chorus line.

Additional Columbia stereo albums will use the devices, which are manufactured by Pictorial Productions, Inc.

The list of dealers taking advantage of the service was compiled by Cash Box with the assistance of many record manufacturers abroad. In preparing the mailing, no restriction was placed on its size. Manufacturers were asked for a list of all stores they would like to see receive the mailing.

The overall concept of the flyer is to help promote all hit records directly at the retail level. It is realized that many disks listed may not be

available in a given area, but, for the dynamic dealer, the flyer can enable him to keep "ahead-of-the-game" by making him aware of the potential strength of any important release that will most likely be issued in his area in the near future.

By saturating the retail field abroad, the service is thus unique, for all other print media at the command of the local dealer are local magazines or newspapers.

In addition to dealers, many deejays in the territories serviced are receiving the flyer, thus enhancing its value by providing further exposure for new recordings.

For the manufacturer, of course, such blanket exposure of his product is a solid stimulus to better sales.

Quality have these aces: "Runaround Sue" by Dion, "He's My Dreamboat" b/w "Hollywood" by Connie Francis, "Bristol Stomp" by The Dovell's, and "Sad Movies" by Sue Thompson on Reo and The Lennon Sisters on Dot. Compo still big on, "I'm Gonna Knock On Your Door" by Eddie Hodges, new biggies include, "Fool No. 1" b/w "Anybody But Me" by Brenda Lee, "Without You" by Johnny Tillotson still big in Canada, "Don't Blame Me" by The Everly Brothers, and Michel Louvain's "Je Ne Sais Pas." "Ya Ya" by Lee Dorsey with the new Ral Donner and Adam Wade slices will certainly make Zirkon a top ten threat. Sparton is currently having its biggest singles month in quite a while with these blockbusters, "Hit The Road Jack" by Ray Charles, "Let's Get Together" by Hayley Mills, and still strong "Kissin' On The Phone" by Paul Anka and "Who Put The Bomp" by Barry Mann. 

At Connie Francis' cocktail party, held recently in Milan, Mr. Sugar told us he is on the verge of entering the film field as a producer. Beginning next year, he will start producing one film a year and it will be a musical film, of course, crammed with songs he publishes.

Alberto Carisch, the director of Southern Music here, said he is going to make a business trip through some countries behind the iron curtain, visiting Russia, Hungary and Roumania. He recently sold some pieces from his Italian catalog ("Guarda Che Luna," a big hit here, "Tua" and "Scusami," all penned by Maestro Malgoni) to some communist countries and said he got back a remarkable amount of money in payment for the music rights. Remarkable because there is no law inside the communist countries as to the amount of money publishers can receive for music rights. They take a chance, when selling their catalog pieces, because they can either receive no money at all, or whatever money the people inside the iron curtain decide to send them.

Mr. Rapetti of Ricordi phoned us to announce the figures of the best selling records of the company. They are: "Non Arrossire" (Don't Blush) by Giorgio Gaber—80,000 copies; "Riviera" by Umberto Bindi—50,000 copies; "La Ballata Del Cerutti" (Cerutti's Ballad) by Giorgio Gaber—40,000 copies; "Senza Fine" (Endlessly) by Gino Paoli—20,000 copies.

Following the fashion of the old Neapolitan and Roman songs, which have been seen at the highest spots in our charts and also abroad, is the revival of old tunes from Florence, like "Firenze Sogna" (Florence Dreams) performed successfully by Narciso Parigi (V.C.M.), and most broadcasted on the air. Singer Narciso Parigi is our sensitive and tender hearted interpreter of old songs from Florence. He is due in South America early this month.

While "Mule Skinner Blues" is still selling pretty well here, Durium has released Soma's new follow-up by the Fendermen titled "Heartbreaking Spe-cial." In two weeks, 15,000 copies were sold, as reported by Mr. Scussel of Durium. Durium also released Vogue's version of "Brigitte Bardot," interpreted by Roberto Seto. This disk will feature a special cover, while the original version on Barclay by J. Velga was published just a short time ago. Both are number one in France. number one in France.

Peppino Di Capri's in great demand currently with one of his latest record-ings, of an old Neapolitan song titled, "Piscatore E Pusilleco" (A Fisher At Pusilleco), which has been on the chart for a few weeks. Recently, she did "Jealous Of You" on TV and this is her record that sells best.

His Master's Voice-Columbia-Marconiphone (V.C.M.) will be represented in the Canzonissima (The Songest) music TV shows by the following hit names: Pino Donaggio, who will sing "Il Mio Sotterraneo" (My Tunnel); Luci-ano Virgili, "La Tempesta" (The Storm); Sergio Bruno, "O Cappotto," (The Overcoat); Corrado Lojacono, "Vienimi Vicino" (Get Close To Me); Lelio Lut-tazzi, "Chiedimi Tutto" (Ask Me For Anything).



The Juke Box Ops' Record Guide

As a result of continuous search for more efficien operating procedures, *Cash Box* has introduced . new feature which starts this week in the Record Section entitled "*Juke Box Ops' Record Guide.*" The purpose of the feature is to provide the nation's juke box operators with listings of money-making records that do not appear anywhere else.

Juke boxes have been, and continue to be, purveyors of many types of music. The section of the country and patron himself dictates the records that appear on any juke box. There is a positive need for a specialized report to the juke box operator informing him of successful records, over and above the standard Top 100 listings. Air play sometimes indicates successful records which may be used for programming. Individual taste enters into the picture. But in addition to this, professions' reports from the buying outlets are necessary sinc, they pinpoint exactly what the juke box operato buys for his machines. As we know, these dis³ aren't always the biggest hits in the country, an therein lies the need for this *Cash Box* service.

If an operator finds one record each week th' will bring additional income, then this service wi have proved worthwhile. The "Juke Box Ops' Record Guide" is divided into three sections.

ACTION WITH OPS is a report from the nation's one-stop record outlets listing records bought by ops that are not on the Top 100.

NEW ADDITIONS to the Top 100 comprises the second section of this feature and outlines newcomers to the *Cash Box* chart. This system will help pinpoint the additions to the chart each week.

AIMED AT OPS is the third section and lists singles which have been released with the juke box market in mind although in many instances these records will also be available to the public. Former hits are being recoupled by several manufacturers as a means of stimulating sales and these two-sided hits will be listed each week. Jazz singles, a favorite of the juke box operator, will also be listed in this new feature. Excerpts from LP's and abridged versions of lengthy single hits will also be listed. In all instances, the label, title, artist, and serial number will be included for each record.

"Juke Box Ops' Record Guide" promises to be another valuable feature for juke box operators.



Net Vending Profit Before Taxes Pegged At 4.58% Of Sales During 1960 NAMA Study Shows Cigs At 45% Of Sales, Hot Cup 19%, 83% Vend Dime Coffee

CHICAGO—The vending machine in-dustry's net profits before income taxes rose slightly to a national aver-age of 4.58 per cent of sales in 1960, according to an industrywide survey released today by the National Auto-matic Merchandising Association (NAMA) matic M (NAMA). This na

(NAMA). This national average compares with the 1959 figure of 4.33 per cent and varies from 5.27 to 3.18 per cent depending on the dollar volume classi-fication of the vending operating com-panies. It also fluctuates on the basis of product categories vended, accord-ing to the 14th annual study of op-erating ratio figures prepared by Price Waterhouse & Co. for the association. Actual profit from operations, not counting auxiliary income from non-vending source, average out at 3.58 per cent of sales as compared with 3.24 per cent in 1959. The report shows that for every \$100 sales at retail, the operator aver-

vending source, average out at 3.53 per cent of sales as compared with 3.24 per cent in 1959. The report shows that for every \$100 sales at retail, the operator aver-aged \$5.39 in product costs (\$58.65 in 1959), while operating expenses took another \$37.03 (\$38.11 in 1959). The national vending association's analysis includes figures from 184 typical operating companies totaling some \$128,900,000 in annual retail sales. This compares with 212 par-ticipating companies and a combined volume of \$124,000,000 in sales the previous year. Association officials explained that the extensive vending company mer-gers in 1960-61 account for the change in participation, reducing numerical participation, while still increasing total combined volume. The study analyzes cost and sales figures for vending operating compa-nies but does not cover manufacture of vending machines. Average annual sales for all types of vending machines were shown to be \$1,068 per machine (\$1,013 in 1959), with a range from \$447 per year for candy vendors to \$2,350 average sales per machine for combination hot bev-erage machines (\$424 and \$2,109 in 1959). The composition of sales by prod-1959).

The composition of sales by prod-The composition of sales by prod-uct lines for the reporting companies remained fairly constant in 1960, as compared with 1959. Cigarettes ac-counted for 45 per cent of all vended sales, while hot cup beverages amounted to 19 per cent of total sales. Sandwiches, salads and pastry totaled 3.5 per cent, while hot food sales (mostly in comp) in many bits of the sales. (mostly in cans) increased to 1.9 per cent from 1.6 per cent in 1959.

Macke Reports Record Sales and Profits

WASH., D.C.—Macke Vending Com-pany, this city, reported record sales and profits for the three months period ended June 30th.

b2% over \$5,555,517 for the same root period. Net profit after taxes amounted to \$278,988 for the nine months, an in-crease of 19% over \$235,375 reported

crease of 19% over \$235,375 reported last year. Depreciation and amortization for the nine month period amounted to \$858,095 as compared to \$565,661 in the like 1960 period. In a message to shareholders Presi-dent Aaron Goldman stated that based on preliminary figures the final quar-ter should maintain the favorable trends already in evidence for the earlier quarters. Goldman also stated that as the major extraordinary ex-penses stemming from the current ex-pansion program have already been incurred, per share earnings will see an increase during 1962. He added

The trend to 10-cent prices for hot beverages is clearly evident in the re-port, with 83 per cent vended at a dime, as compared with 75 per cent in 10⁵⁰ in 1959.

dime, as compared with 75 per cent in 1959. Growth patterns in vending in-dustry are best illustrated in the figures of 15 "trend" companies which have participated in the study each year since 1952. These companies op-erated a total of 28,130 machines in 1960 (16,408 in 1952). While cigarette sales accounted for 61 per cent of their total volume in 1952, they rep-resented only 40 per cent of total sales last year. At the same time, their combined sales volume rose from \$12,900,000 to \$33,000,000 between 1952 and 1960. Hot cup beverages (primarily cof-fee) for these 15 companies accounted for 4 per cent of sales in 1952, rising to 19 per cent of total sales in 1960. Copies of the complete report are available only to members of the as-sociation at a price of \$10 per copy. 

Mangan's Space Program Submitted To Treasury

CHICAGO-Jim Mangan, former coin machine exec, has announced that his original plan for selling space in the sky, under his "Worlds of Space" program outlined here on several previous instances, has been estimated to result in a dollar figure large enough to balance the national economy.

Submitted October 5, 1961 to Hon. "The location of each world," according to Mangan "is to be definitely fixed in Celestial latitude and longitude. This will make the little man feel big and think big!"

Mangan sees the peoples of the world purchasing space, with the intent that peace would therefore come about as an international (and selfish) moral equity. All present celestial space is owned by Mangan who has volunteered to turn over all of his claims to celestial space to the US Government. He estimates a gross return of \$300 billion, enough to retire the national debt.





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
