

Although there is a great deal of excitement in the album wor when a Broadway show premier in New York, there is usually noticeable lack of singles excit ment to go along with it. Yet when show is made into a film a new spar seems to be ignited under some of the more suitable material and th songs become singles successes.

A good example of this situation is the current success of "Tonight and the up-and-coming "Maria both from "West Side Story. When the B'way show preemed, th LP met with great success, but th singles struck out. More than a yea later, one vocal version, Johnn Mathis', met with strong accep ance, but that was about the exter of the score's strength in the single area. Currently, "Tonight" is or of the biggest hits in the countr and "Maria" may be headed in similar direction.

Pick of the Week

"TOWER OF TEARS" (2:16) "PORTRAIT OF A FOOL" (2:27) [MooMoo BMI—Twitty] [Cigma BMI-Riley, Innis, Killen] CONWAY TWITTY (MGM 13050)

Twitty's a good bet to make top chart news in the weeks to come with his latest MGM duo. "Tower Of Tears," is a haunting, heart-rending beatballad romantic opus (penned by Twitty) that he and the ork-chorus put across with telling effect. However, don't overlook the touching, slow moving "Portrait Of A Fool" that Conway tearfully paints on the other end. Can be a back-to-back winner.

"FREE ME" (2:20) [Painted Desert BMI-J. & L. Breedlove] "KISSIN' TIME" (2:30) [Big Bopper BMI—Inman] JOHNNY PRESTON (Mercury 23017)

Preston can get back on the winning track with this new Mercury effort. Session, tabbed "Free Me," is an emotional, string-filled rock-a-cha-cha romancer that Johnny and the ork-chorus deliver with sock sales authority. Preston and the crew romp over a color jump item on the flip.

"LITTLE MIRACLES" (2:33) [Winneton BMI—Miller, Carroll]
"BABY I GOTTA' KNOW" (2:28) [Winneton BMI—Weismantel] THE CRESTS (Coed 561)

The Crests, who've been absent from the wax scene for some time, mark their return with what looks like a real winner. It's a rock-a-cha-cha pounder, tabbed "Little Miracles," that the artists sock out in very commercial fashion. The fetching cha-rock'er on the other end, "Baby I Gotta' Know," can also make chart news.

The femme group, which recently scored with its fetching up-dating of "Music, Music, Music," can also hit paydirt with this newcomer. Tagged "Let Me In," it's a contagious, quick beat thumper that the gals nimbly glide over. Appealing beat-ballad work on the "Oh Yes I'll Be True" parties.

While a male chorus opens with a tale of teeners growing up the femmes proceed to up-date "Toyland"—from Victor Herbert's "Babes In Toyland"—soon-due as a Walt Disney 'live' musical. Catchy, quick beat shuffler flipside. Sock Camarata showcases.

Knight's powerhouse version of "Free Me" (a tune also cut by Johnny Preston) can give the songster solid chart status. Side's a captivating rock-a-cha cha romantic pleader chock full of those winning teen-angled vocal and musical sounds. The coupler, a hard beat pounder, dubbed "The Other Half Of Man," also rates close attention. Excellent choral-ork support on both lids.

DICK LEE (Blue Bell 505)

(B+) "AM I LOSING YOU" (2:08) [Spanka BMI—Anka] Songster's dramatic plaintive essay is supported by a good-sounding upbeat rock-a-cha stint by the string-included ork-chanting chorus. Can get some action.

(B+) "MILK & HONEY" (2:11)
[Vogue BMI — Herman]
There's charm to this Twist-inclined organ-led reading of the fine title tune of the hit musical. The first singles outing from the Pickwick set-up, date can make lots of airtime.

(B) "SHALOM" (2:35) [Vogue BMI — Herman] Accordion leads-the-way on the oft-cut number from the same show.

Light, who holds a B.A. from Johns Hopkins and an M.A. from New York University, achieved national recognition as one America's ten top bandleaders in the late 1930's, and has been starred at leading hotels and theatres. He has recorded for RCA Victor and Columbia and cut many hit albums including "The Original Roaring 20's" and "The Knuckles O'Toole" honky tonk albums. Light is a member of the Johns Hopkins Club, the New York University Club, The Lambs, the National Association of Composers and ASCAP.

By the time he entered high school he had earned a local reputation as a fine performer. Then came a 3-year contract as a regular on a TV variety show, "The Tom Dowdy Show." Bleyer inked Tillotson immediately and then followed the first version of "Dreamy Eyes," "Jimmy's Girl" and most recently "Without You."

Station's idea is that it's good for the people of the greater Southern Calif. community to know the problems and concerns of fellow citizens in other communities of the region because often what concerns one city in particular may concern them all in general.

For the second year in a row kids all over Long Island will be able to hear a different "message from Santa" everyday, by calling LT 9-7200. The "messages," pre-recorded daily by WBIC-Long Island, are designed to stimulate tots' interest in the Christmas season, and at the same time

keep them in line with friendly advice about how they can help around the house. Each one of the messages will also include a Christmas countdown, telling the kids how many days remain until the big one, Dec. 25.

Sure-fire proof of the power of radio is the big voice of WPTR-Albany. Last month the station started an editorial series urging a \$500 across-the-board pay raise for Troy, New York police and firemen which was to be on the ballot on the upcoming election. Troy officials claimed the raise would never pass the election, but offered a compromise \$250 pay boost. On election day, the public voted in a full pay raise by a landslide. "KEAN"—Original Cast—Columbia KOS 2120 Musical's hit status and the incomparable Alfred Drake's great stature as a Shubert Row star have undoubtedly produced an original-cast shelf staple here. The sumptuous, operetta-inclined melodies of Robert Wright-George Forrest, among the best of the new show score crop, have been brilliantly captured in LP form. Drake, who superbly follows his "Kismet" role (latter adapted by W&F from Borodin's music), is deftly assisted by Joan Weldon, Lee Verona and Oliver Gray and the ork-chorus. the ork-chorus.

Bobby Vee comes off as powerful, dramatic songster in this new offering from Liberty. Vee has included his current double-barreled hit "Run To Him" b/w "Walkin' With My Angel," in this collection. LP seems a natural for heavy chart action.



"SUBWAYS ARE FOR SLEEPING"—The McGuire Sisters—Coral CRL 57398
Preceding the original-cast LP (on Columbia), the LP is a delightful round-up of 11 songs from the upcoming musical, which contains many worthy additions to the fine catalog of songs by Jule Styne, Betty Comden & Adolph Green. The gals are at the top of their form, and they're greatly assisted by an excellent ork-chorus backdrop arranged by Murray Kane. One track, "I'm Taking My Time," has been released as a single. Programming exposure is high for all tracks.



"LET THERE BE DRUMS"—Sandy Nelson—Imperial LP 9159
Cashing in on the success of his current hit deck of "Let There Be Drums," Sandy Nelson has tagged his new Imperial LP after the single. Young drummer's varied range is beautifully showcased in this album of fast-moving dancing favorites. The Nelson sound is highlighted in ten minutes of "The Birth Of The Blues," a selfpenned item with intense feeling of rhythmic excitement. Disk looms as a possible noise-maker.

"SWING ALONG WITH MAVIS"-Mavis Rivers







Starting the disk off with a dramatic interpretation of the theme from "Exodus," Dr. Morel (he has a Ph.D. in music) gives colorful readings of "Lover" and his own arrangement of "Mosaico Espanola." LP provides delightful listening for any guitar fan.



"THE YOUNG APPROACH"—Faron Young—Capitol ST 1634
Country star offers a variety of moods and setting in his latest LP. His current chart item, "Backtrack," is the leadoff track, followed by "I Fall To Pieces," "Goin' Steady," "Moments To Remember" and "I Can't Find The Time." There's enough interest here for both pop and country fans.

The wax marriage of Jean Ritchie and Oscar Brand has provided folk tune fans with a superb blending of two exceptional talents. All the songs here are of the traditional question-and-answer variety. Brand's guitar provides part of the accompaniment for Miss Ritchie and himself as they read "Soldier, Soldier," "Billy Boy," and "Paper Of Pins." The additional music is supplied by the interesting banjo-picking of Dave Sears.

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

Willson To Write Musical Version Of Pic

NEW YORK—Meredith Willson will write the Broadway musical version of the famed 1947 flick, "Miracle On 34th Street," which The Stuart Company, Stuart Ostrow's producing firm, plans to offer in May, 1963.

Casting for the show, which has the tentative title of "The Wonderful Plan," is yet to be made. It was recently announced that Stuart would produce a Willson musical, "The Understudy," for the 1962-63 season, but this project has been postponed. Willson will write the book, music and lyrics for the new musical, repeating his stint for his first Broadway entry, the smash musical "Music Man." He wrote the music and lyrics for the current musical, "The Unsinkable Molly Brown."

Court Holds Label Liable For Foreign Royalty Payments

NEW YORK—As a result of a suit between four publishers and Seeco Records, a decision has just been filed by the United States District Court Southern District of N.Y. that holds

Southern District of N.Y. that holds a label liable for unpaid foreign royalties on tapes sent abroad to be handled by local labels.

In addition, the court held that "custom" could not deter a publisher from seeking, under the Copyright Law (Sec. 101e), a 2¢ royalty on disks manufactured rather than sold, and that acceptance of a royalty check by a publisher does not mean full paya publisher does not mean full payment if a subsequent notification by the publisher to the label notes that the check does not constitute complete payment.

The suit, made by Famous Music, Shapiro, Bernstein, Joy Music and Mills Music, at the instance of Harry Fox, agent for the publishers, involved a tape Seeco had sent abroad with songs copyrighted by the publishers and the publishers' involved claim for foreign royalties. They are "Love Letters" (Famous Music), "The White Cliffs Of Dover" (Shapiro, Bernstein), "Love Is A Simple Thing" (Joy Music) and "One Morning In May" (Mills Music).

In regard to Seeco's liability, United States District Judge Richard H. Levet notes in his decision that "the act of (the) defendant in preparing the tape was of the manufacture and, consequently, an infringement for which it should respond under Section 101e" and concluded that the plaintiffs are entitled to an "accounting from (the) defendant of all records concerned . . . manufactured by (the) defendant and to payment of a royalty of 2¢ on each of said records manufactured by (the) defendant serving to reproduce mechanically its copyrighted musical composition and, in addition thereto, three times the amount thereof..."

Sales Appeal

Al Sherman, president of Record Sales Corp., said he anticipates a sale of approximately 25,000 albums by Christmas on the basis of the "tremendous" acceptance during the album's first week out, when 9,400 LP's were reportedly sold.

Sales has built-up a large following among the pre-teen and teenage audiences in Southern California by way of his daily TV'er on KABC.

The amount of such royalties, Judge Levet declared, will be determined by a special master's report.

As to Seeco's claim that "custom"

As to Seeco's claim that "custom" had entitled it to pay royalties on the basis of records sold, Judge Levet wrote that "custom and usage may not be invoked to relieve (the) defendant of the clear-cut obligations imposed by the application of the statute." In addition, Judge Levet wrote that "the fact that plaintiffs may have accepted payments for a certain period on the basis of sales does not require a continuance of a waiver of payments of the royalties on the records manufactured but not sold." sold."

"No agreement for the continuation of such acceptance has been shown," Levet noted.

Judge Levet also awarded the plaintiffs counsel fees.

Seeco's attorneys, Aranow, Brodsky, Bohlinger, Einhorn & Dann, of New York, have 30 days in which to file an appeal.

The publishers were represented by Julian T. Abeles.

Change Date Of NARM's N.Y. Board Meet

PHILADELPHIA — Jules Malamud, executive secretary of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM), has announced a change in the date for the next NARM board of directors meeting at New York's Summit Hotel. Previously set for January 18-20, 1962, the dates have now been set for one week later, January 25-27. The change was necessitated, according to Malamud, by requests from several members of the board who, because of the "excellent" Christmas business already being enjoyed by the rack jobbers, feel that business in January, normally the best record month of the year, will be better than their previous expectations. They find it difficult to be away from their own individual operations at that busy time of year.

The new dates will mark the last meeting of the body prior to NARM's Fourth Annual Convention, to be held at the Eden Roc Hotel, Miami Beach, April -8-13, 1962.



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Spanish Record Market Viewed In Detail At Int'l Record And Music Men's Club Meeting

NEW YORK-The International Record and Music Men's Club held its second meeting last week at the Warwick Hotel and heard a thoroughly fascinating and detailed report of the record industry in Spain from Frederick J. Reiter, an attorney who represents Spain's Hispavox and Gamma labels in the U.S.

The names of people who volunteered to act as an executive board of the club was also announced. They include: Norman Orleck, Cash Box; Richard Broderick, RCA; Arnold Berry, Columbia; Paul Marshall, Top Rank; Jack Coleman, London; Joe Csida, Capitol; Mimi Treppell, London; Peter Sutro, Artia; Art Talmadge, United Artists; John Sipple and Sam Chase of Billboard; publishers Mike Stewart, Fred Reiter, Leon Brettler and Aaron Schroeder; and attorney Mortimer Edelstein.

Immediately after lunch served, Reiter took the floor and held the attention of every one in the room with his description of Spain's record picture.

Reiter opened with the remark that "Spain is a strange country."

It's part of Europe physically but yet it's not. Spain has been poor since it lost its empire. As recently as 1936 it was terribly poor. In 1939, the picture was still worse. During the '40's no assistance was available because of World War II. So the beginning of the '50's saw Spain a quarter of a century behind the rest of Europe.

However, of late, U.S. aid and increased tourist interest in Spain has helped the country gain. In 1960, 8,-000,000 tourists visited the country of only 30 million and spent \$500 million. But in a country top heavy with bureaucracy, things move slowly and Spain is still very poor. The government controls prices of all important items and all imports are subject to stringent license regulations. In addition the purchasing power of the average Spaniard is pitifully low.

These facts applied to the record industry result in only one conclusion -In Spain the record is still a luxury item out of reach of the masses. There are no singles in Spain. All are 45 EP's and LP's. Since there are almost no juke boxes in Spain, there is less need for singles. An EP costs \$1.20. An LP-\$4.10. Since a secretary's average weekly salary cannot pay the price of even three LP's, one can get an idea of a record's status in the luxury-necessity category.

For many years the total industry's dollar volume in Spain was only \$2 million. An encouraging sign, however, is that in 1960, the figure doubled. There are no distributors in Spain. Each manufacturer deals directly with the dealer and has his own sales organization. Records are sold to dealers at 25% off list.

Three-thousand sale is a hit. Tenthousand a tremendous smash. Stereo is insignificant in Spain because there are no players. 500 to 1000 LP's is a good sale.

Until the early Fifties, only Odeon and Columbia comprised the record market in Spain. In 1953, Hispavox opened up for independents. RCA and Phillips then joined the Spanish record scene. These five are Spain's majors with another half-dozen smaller firms which do not own their own plants rounding out the picture. Between them, they press almost all important labels from Europe, U.S. and Latin America. Two-thirds of the product issued comes from foreign masters, the other third being produced in Spain. But since the onethird contains Spanish covers of pop hits from other countries, there is very little Spanish pop material. Paul Anka is one of the biggest stars in Spain and a number of other American stars are beginning to attain

According to Reiter, anyone entering the record business in Spain has to have his head examined. One needs hundreds of licenses to release a record. There is a license for importing a sample; licenses are necessary for recording equipment; licenses are needed to get the raw materials that go into a pressing; and for pressing as well. Then when the record is released, there is censorship. There is no distribution, one must set up his own. Each pop record is an EP which means four sides not two. There is a jacket problem so nothing can be rushed out in two days as it is in the U.S. Photos are necessary, etc. There are extremely few promotional facilities. Few deejay shows. No Spanish trade publications. TV is an infant in Spain. There is no source for compiling a Spanish best seller list. There is no such thing as a plug side.

Extremely realistic with the dark side of the Spanish record market, Reiter concluded with an equally realistic view of the brighter side. Conditions are improving in Spain. Volume is growing. There are plans for a new-type juke box specially fitted for the Spanish market. Record manufacturers are aggressive and inventive. Hispavox recently came up with a first in Spain when it began issuing EP's on the very thin plastic at a lower cost. The thin disk is inserted into a booklike jacket. Reiter feels this may revolutionize the Spanish record market. It has been available in Spain for only two weeks and has met with "good acceptance."

Reiter then went into the publishing picture. In a market where 2/3of the recorded volume consists of pressing foreign recordings, publishers are primarily "sub-publishers." Most publishing operations are based on foreign catalogs rather than their own. Spanish pop hits are few and I

The lack of promotional facilities affects the publisher in the same way it affects the record companies. Madrid has only two deejay shows and they program no more than two hours a day of pop music. Raul Matas, whose Discomania request program is heard once a week, is a major factor in

The Benidorm Song Festival, the Spanish counterpart of the San Remo Festival, has produced some hits in Spain. One of last year's Festival favorites, "La Montana," a hit in Spain was recorded here in the U.S. by a few people but met with little success. However, Benidorm is burdened with the same difficulties San Remo faced in its youth. Music publishers in Spain must issue at least two to three thousand orchestrations of a number-not only for the sake of making a song popular but also because orchestrations are a major source of income for Spanish publishers.

SGAE, established by law and government controlled, is the only collection agency. It has great power and can close any establishment. Last year AGAE collected about \$4,000,-000-this includes film performances. For an American publisher it is absolutely essential that he have his song published in a Spanish version if he hopes to succeed with it.

Reiter concluded with the remark that Spain is a limited market but a challenging one and invited travelling music people to visit Spain when they tour the Continent.

LOS ANGELES-In a planned effort to increase its singles business, Reprise Records has named Ernie Farrell as national sales manager, prexy Jay H. Lasker announced last week. He spent three years as national promotion director of Cosnat Record Distributing's national operation and was also associated with the Gone and End labels.

Mrs. Glenn Miller Loses Suit Over "Miller Sound"

NEW YORK—Mrs. Glenn Miller, widow of the late bandleader; has no property rights to "the Glenn Miller sound," according to a decision just handed down by the state's highest court, which was divided 4 to 3.

Mrs. Miller, in a suit against Decca Records and its subsidiary, Universal Pictures, contended that she had a right to profit from both pic, "The Glenn Miller Story," made by Universal, and the soundtrack from the pic, sold by Decca, because the music was performed in the Miller manner.

The defendants answered that no Miller recordings were used on the soundtrack, and its use by Decca was not barred by the pact between Universal and Mrs. Miller.

Charles' "Twist" LP Getting Big Distrib Response, Sachs Says

NEW YORK—Distributors have tripled the initial orders allocated by Atlantic Records for its new LP, "Do the Twist with Ray Charles," according to Len Sachs, the label's director of album sales and merchandising. Diskery is supplying dealers with special display material for window and counter displays in conjunction with store and rack promotions, and has also undertaken a radio campaign to point up Charles' association with the Twist craze.

Altshuler Heads Atlantic Ad-Promo Dept; Kramer Into Gospel Mgmt. Field

NEW YORK—Bob Altshuler has been appointed director of advertising and publicity for Atlantic Records, replacing Gary Kramer who has left to form his own personal management and producing firm (see separate story).

Altshuler, who most recently was general manager of Cadence's Candid jazz line, has held similar ad-publicity posts with United Artists Records and Riverside Records.

Altshuler will handle advertising, publicity and domestic and foreign information services for both the Atlantic and Atco labels. He will also work closely with Neshui Ertegun, the label's veep, assisting him in coordinating LP releases on both labels.

Mercury Mails Int'l LP Catalog

CHICAGO-A new Mercury fourcolor international catalog is on its way to the firm's overseas licensees. Response to the catalog has been "tremendous," the label reports, and already a second printing run is scheduled. The catalog, as used by dealers overseas in many countries, is sold along with a 7 inch 33½ rpm recording, thus liquidating the cost of the catalog.

The catalog contains a complete listing of all the Mercury product available overseas by title and artist, as well as four-color reproductions of 216 albums in the regular, pop, jazz, and classical lines. There are also full color reproductions of the first 14 albums in the firms Perfect Presence Sound Series. In all, almost 500 album listings are listed.

Opry Scores Smash Success At Carnegie Hall

NEW YORK-WSM's Grand Ole Opry's sojourn to Gotham last week (29) was received warmly by a cheering, near-capacity audience. The performance, a one-shot affair for the benefit of the Musicians Aid Society of New York, was proof-positive of the current popularity of country music. The chanters from Nashville were given a welcome that is usually reserved for top international stars.

Wisecracking T. Tommy Cutrer acted as master ceremonies for an allstar bill that included Faron Young, Jim Reeves, Marty Robbins, Bill Monroe, Patsy Cline, the Jordanaires, Grandpa Jones and Minnie Pearl. For almost three and a half hours, the vast audience stomped their feet, clapped their hands and shouted cries of approval for their favorites.

A highpoint of the evening was the homespun, dry, laconic patter and songs of Grandpa Jones. The vet performer was "forced" into doing an encore that pushed the show way over its expected time limit. Young's plaintive reading of the inspirational weeper "When I Learned Enough To Live I'll Be Old Enough To Die" was met with a sensational ovation. Kudos also go to the distaff side ably represented by Patsy Cline, who rendered a swingin' uptempo





Columbia Gets Cast LP Of "We Take The Town"

NEW YORK-Columbia Records will release the original-cast LP of "We Take The Town," the upcoming musical starring Robert ("Music Man") Preston, according to an announcement last week by Goddard Lieberson, label prexy.

The show marks the label's fourth Broadway musical acquisition of the 1961-62 season, the others being the already released "Kean," and the upcoming "Subways Are For Sleeping" and "All American."

Presented by Stuart Ostrow's Stuart Company, the musical stars Preston as Pancho Villa. A March, 1962 opening on Broadway has been set.

"Town" will have a book by Felice Bauer and Matt Dubey, with music by Harold Karr and lyrics by Dubey. Alex Segal will direct.

As previously reported, Columbia has just cut "Seven Come Eleven," the cabaret revue now playing in New York at Julius Monk's nitery, Upstairs at the Downstairs. Miles Krueger produced the LP at Columbia's 30th Street studios on Sat., Nov. 25. In order to recreate the atmosphere of an actual cabaret performance, Krueger provided a "live" audience consisting of over 100 show business personalities.

Featured on the recording are the revue's six young performers: Philip Bruns, Ceil Cabot, Rex Robbins, Steve Roland, Donna Sanders and Mary Louise Wilson. As in the actual nitery performance, the singers are accompanied by pianists William Roy and Carl Norman.

Cadence Names Promo Exec

NEW YORK-Budd Dolinger, head of the Cadence label's sales and promotion department, has just appointed Denny Zeitler to handle promotional activities for the firm.

Zeitler, formerly associated with Musical Sales in Baltimore for four years as sales manager, will contact deejays, one-stops, rack-jobbers, operators, etc.

Coed Sees "Sleeper" In "Blue Angels" Waxing

NEW YORK—Coed Records, this city, feels it has a "sleeper" in "Flying Blue Angels" by George, Johnny & The Pilots, a deck based on the network TV'er, "Blue Angels." The label reported last week that sales in Vancouver had reached 6.500 and that the single was getting action in Milwaukee and Boston.

Kapp Sales In Far East Growing, Steinmetz Reports

NEW YORK-Kapp Records has broken the language barrier insofar as record sales are concerned, according to Eric Steinmetz, Kapp export sales manager, who just returned from an extensive trip to the far east, which included Taipei, Formosa; Tokyo, Japan; Okinawa, Honolulu and Manila.

The overall export picture for Kapp has been steadily improving and the Far East, which has never before been acceded as much attention in the international perspective, has grown considerably, attested to by the acceptance of good music, Steinmetz

The exec feels that the oriental and far eastern youngsters are beginning to dig American music irrespective of the language barrier. While a good deal of our music is not only copied, but even deliberately pirated, said Steinmetz, Kapp has sold its English language versions extensively. He estimated that the expanding sales prospects for the Far East are far from reaching a peak and may not do so for at least another five years. The Kapp export manager detailed that he met with many of the label's distributors before reaching this conclusion. In other areas, the figures indicated strengthening business for Kapp as well as U.S. singles and LP's in all areas covered.

Kapp's foreign policy in other areas has paid off in both exporting its product abroad, and in importing material for U.S. distribution, resulting in hit-making Lolita from Germany ("Sailor" and many others), several hits for Jane Morgan, and lately the youthful Italian vocal sensation Robertino, who despite his youth (12), has already earned the plaudits of international critics and the appellation of the "Young Caruso."

Charles Beulike Heads Col.'s Publisher Liaison

NEW YORK-Charles Beulike has been promoted to the position of manager of publisher liaison in the Pop A&R department for Columbia Rec-ords, David Kapralik, Columbia's coordinator of pop A&R, announced last week.

In his new position, Beulike is responsible to Kapralik for maintaining liaison with music publishers. He will also be handling contractual arrangements for recording sessions in the New York area.

Beulike joined Columbia in October, 1960 as supervisor of A&R for the Columbia Record Club, Inc. His musical background includes a number of years as a musician and arranger with Charlie Spivak's orchestra.

Steve & Eydie To Columbia According To Greengrass

NEW YORK-Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme are moving over to Columbia Records, according to Ken Greengrass, the pair's manager, who announced last week that his firm. GLG Productions, would produce L&G singles and LP's for Columbia.

A spokesman for United Artists confirmed last week that the performers were no longer on the label, but Columbia had no statement on the move.

Under a new indie producing set-up at GLG. Greengrass announced that the firm would produce dates for UA's The Highwayman, and that Don Costa, managed by Greengrass, would work independently with GLG in producing sessions for the Colpix label. Costa has his own producing firm.

Greengrass also disclosed that the firm was also planning a strong entry into TV and radio production.

Greengrass produced the current Silverkrin promotion, which is built around an album made by GLG, featuring Steve & Eydie. Before their association with UA, the performers were together on ABC-Paramount.

Roulette's Levy Makes TV Bow To Tell Of Twist

NEW YORK-Morris Levy, Roulette Records topper, made his TV bow last week (29) in an NBC-TV special, "We the People." Levy was shown via a six minute tape, at his nitery here, The Roundtable, which has changed to a nightly Twist policy, including Sundays, and he explained his own version of the dance, with his comments sandwiched between those of an anthropologist and pyschologists. According to Roulette, Levy does not plan to turn his short TV shot into a TV career-at least not right now, what with his Twist activities in the nitery and the label's smash single and LP, "The Peppermint Twist" by Joey Dee & The Starliters and "Joey Dee at the Peppermint Lounge," respectively.

Quality Drugs Names Rack-Jobbing Head

PHILADELPHIA-Ralph T. Anderson, president of Quality Drug Service Company, Inc., of Des Moines, Iowa, has announced the appointment of Roy J. Perini, as director and buyer for Quality's disk division. Perini, formerly of Detroit, Michigan, a veteran of fifteen year's experience in the disk field, has been associated with Merchants Wholesale Service Company, Handleman Company, and Neiser Brothers Variety Stores.

The addition of Perini marks another step in the growth of Quality Drug Service, as one of the leading rack merchandising operations in the Middle West. Quality Drug is a service distributor for nationally advertised health and beauty aids, housewares, and soft goods, as well as for records in leading chain stores throughout the area.

Qualiyt Drug, through its President, Ralph T. Anderson, is a charter member of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM). and Anne Stecheson.

Things Keep Humming As Cameo-Parkway Tries To Fill Twist Orders

NEW YORK-Thanks to its Chubby Checker Twist catalog and other entries, the Cameo-Parkway set-up is now using seven pressing plants on an around-the-clock basis seven days a week in an effort to fill distributor orders, according to the firm's Al Cahn.

Even with the seven pressing plants, Cahn noted that "we are still running approximately 10 days behind on deliveries, and at the rate orders are coming in it is getting worse instead of better as far as the back order situation is concerned."

Cahn also noted that label and jacket printers have reported that they have "never seen anything like this and are also running 10 days behind in filling our orders."

Cameo-Parkway's new office hours, according to Cahn, are 8AM to 12 Midnight.

Besides Checker product, activity at at the firm is centered around the "Chubby Checker—Bobby Rydell" LP, a single from the latter LP. "Jingle Bell Invitation" and "Jingle Bell Rock," a Meyer Davis Twist LP, and a new single, "Happy Jose."

Richard Hayman Inks Pact With Mills Music

NEW YORK-Richard Hayman, the harmonica artist and composerarranger, has just signed a 10 year exclusive contract with Mills Music, Jack Mills announced last week.

Hayman, who records for Mercury Records, is about to have released an album of Gypsy music that he arranged. From these, separate arrangements will be made available for school bands and orchestras.

Hayman has made 30 albums for Mercury, and for the past ten years, he has arranged for the Boston Pops as well as being a guest conductor with the ork.

Among Hayman's novelties the Pops has played during the past season are: "And Now A Word From Our Sponsor," a synthesis of TV commercials; "Pops Roundup"; a potpourri of themes from TV westerns; and a medley of Broadway show tunes.

In honor of his newborn daughter, Suzanne, Hayman has composed his first work for Mills. The instrumental is also called "Suzanne" and Mitchell Parrish is writing lyrics to the main melodic theme to be released shortly as a vocal.

Song Directory Contains More Than 100,000 Titles

NEW YORK-The titles of over 100,-000 song titles have been divided into 395 categories in "The Stecheson Classified Song Directory" just published by The Music Industry Press of Hollywood (\$25, 503 pages).

The song categories include, besides subject matter of the songs, writers, musicals (Broadway and flicks), Academy Award winners, millionsellers, etc. The publisher of each song is identified (a separate publisher's index is included).

The publishers have noted that the volume can serve a wide range in the entertainment field, including the needs of labels, various departments of TV and radio outlets, flick studios, managers and retailers.

LOS ANGELES-The board of directors of Liberty Records have declared a regular quarterly cash dividend of 10¢ a share payable Dec. 15 to shareholders of record Dec. 1. There are 204,500 common shares and 402,777 Class B shares outstanding. Class B shares do not rcceive dividends and are convertible on a limited basis.

\$5 Million Yearly From Labels Helps U.S. Music Appreciation

NEW YORK-The record industry contributes more than \$5 million annually to increase the public's knowledge and appreciation of live music. Since 1948 such contributions by the industry have exceeded \$35 million.

These facts were brought out at recent hearings conducted by the Select Subcommittee on Education of the U. S. House of Representatives that is investigating the economic status of the performing arts in the United States.

The moneys contributed by labels are used to show-case live music performances by sending musicians to play in schools, hospitals and other charitable institutions, in playground and public parades and at local and national patriotic observances.

Diamonds Cut Pic Soundtrack Vocal

NEW YORK-The Diamonds, the Mercury Records' songsters, have just recorded, in Hollywood, the soundtrack vocal of the title-tune from the forthcoming MGM pic, "The Horizontal Lieutenant." The stint will also be released as a single. The pic, set for spring release, is a comedy centering on an American military cleanup operation on a Pacific island, and stars Jim Hutton, Paula Prentis, Jack Carter, Charles McGraw and Miyoshi

Ala Label Formed In Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD - Singer-pianist Al Anthony has formed Ala Records in Hollywood. Anthony previously recorded for Columbia, Liberty and Dot. Ala is being distributed nationally by Mike Elliot's Circa, Inc.

Following in the footsteps of the Capitol Records "Song Without Words" contest and LP, Electrola records has released an EP containing four tunes without lyrics written by 4 of Germany's top pop composers. The songs penned by Michael Jary, who wrote the million seller "Wir Wollen Niemals Auseinander Gehn," for Heidi Bruhl, Gerhard Winkler, who has turned out hit after hit in his many years as a composer, Heino "Calcutta" Gaze and Lothar "You, You, You" Olias are all published by the EMI house publishing firm Edition Accord. All 4 of the winning texts will be published and recorded by Electrola, and 3 prizes will be awarded for each of the 4 numbers. The winning lyricist will receive his text published, and the royalties from the song as well as a record on Electrola and a 500 DM (\$125) cash prize. The 2nd best text will be awarded a cash prize of 300 DM (\$75) and the 3rd best text will be awarded 200 DM (\$50). The jury for the contest is being composed of the production chief of Electrola, the distribution chief of Electrola, the composer of the number, 2 top DJ's from German Radio, 2 trade reporters, one top German lyric chief of Electrola, the distribution chief of Electrola, the composer of the number, 2 top DJ's from German Radio, 2 trade reporters, one top German lyric writer and the chief of the publisher Edition Accord. Freddy, Germany's top selling record artist for the past 5 years here, will make his first "one nighter" tour of Germany next January. The top star who has had 5 million selling singles and the only LP in Germany to go over the 100,000 mark will visit Strassburg, Zurich and Basel Switzerland, Copenhagen, Denmark, Hannover, Nuernberg, Essen Stuttgart and Munich.

Two more labels have given up their indie distribution organizations and have gone into the Metronome Records fold as far as distribution are concerned. Bella Musica and Golden 12 records both small labels but with successful artists and single records will now be available through Metronome as of now.

The German Pop Music festival sponsored by German TV and the record industry will get underway on January 12 with the first prelims to be held from Frankfurt over national German TV. Each week thereafter, programs and preliminary contests will be held from Stuttgart, Cologne and Munich. Represented in the four contests will be 24 songs and 12 artists. The artists are Conny Froboess and Ralf Bendix from Electrola, Rita Paul and Peter Beil from Philips, Darmela Corren and Jimmy Makulis from Ariola, Bill Ramsey and Margot Eskens from Polydor, Siw Malmkvist and Nina and Frederick from Metronome as well as Peggy Brown, and the duo Pirko Manola-Gerd Boettcher from Teldec. Each of the soloists will be represented with 2 tunes in the preliminary rounds and one song in the finals to be held in Baden-Baden on February 17.

Top stars from foreign countries are set for German language records with German A&R men handling the production chores. Marcel Amont from France is now working with Gerhard Mendelson from Polydor Records, and Sammy Davis Jr. as well as Frank Sinatra's daughter Nancy Sinatra will be produced in Germany by Nils Nobach of Ariola Records.

Lale Anderson of Electrola Records had to turn down one nighter tours amounting to over 10,000 dollars in order to answer the 403 questions sent to her from Hollywood where the film "Lili-Marlen" dealing with her life will be filmed.

The "Oldies But Goodies" idea has really caught on in Germany. Since the first LP came out by Electrola under the title "The Most Expensive Program In The World," with takes from the 20's and 30's, every record firm has come out with a large collection of old material on single, EP and LP. The newest in the series is an LP from Electrola and a 4 LP set by Teldec for the Xmas season of standard material.

As the season advances, the winter cold and the annual record and music awards are upon us anew. The former may be viewed with apprehension, but the latter are welcomed with open arms. Soon to be awarded are the "grands prix" discerned by the Academie Francaise du Disque for the best recording, the best voice, the best this, the best that, etc. It must at least be said for this organization that with the subsidies provided by the record manufacturers' syndicate it holds elegant receptions about which all Paris talks, its diplomas and certificates are beautifully designed and printed, but the rest is "literature" and the publication of winners' lists.

We recently mentioned in this column that Paris seems to be on a real Anglo-Saxon "kick." We might have specified that it's an English jag in the case of singer Petula Clark, whose "Romeo" is a French best-seller much to the satisfaction of publisher Madame Breton who, by the way, has had more than one success with adapting old hits to modern tastes with rock 'n roll, and now the twist. There's even an adaptation of "Ay Ay Ay" by Salvet and Carere coming up. Les Trumpet Boys will record this one and ten other versions are scheduled. sions are scheduled.

Guy Beart, who has sort of disappeared from the news lately, is back in the middle of things with his "Operation Tango." In this period of rockin' and rollin' and twistin', Guy wants to bring back some calm and intimacy but with the tango in modern form and not the old "tango a Papa." And maybe that's not such a bad idea, what with the latest rock 'n roll disorders at the Palais des Sports recently where Les Chats Sauvages and Vince Taylor appeared. Vince never did get to sing and the police had to intervene to quiet and disperse the fans. The Palais des Sports looked as if a cyclone had struck it when all was over. The end of the story is not to be so funny because now there is a serious possibility that rock 'n roll concerts in France may be definitely banned, apart from the fact that concert hall owners scarcely dare any more to book such performances. such performances.

Annie Cordy and Luis Mariano are rehearsing an operetta to be given at the "Gaite Lyrique." The title, "Visa Pour L'Amour" has been changed to "Ballade Romaine" and the opening is timidly scheduled for December 15. Pathe plans to release an album with the same title on the same date. Let's note, to be exact, that the music is by R. Vinci.

Gilbert Becaud has just completed a new recording session. Among the tunes waxed, two are known: "Et Maintenant" by Delanoe, and "Toi, Le Musicien" by Amade. We hear that one of these promises to have a brilliant future. . . . Mathe Althery has recorded "13 Valses Romantiques." And the "music" of the bombs is still to be heard in Paris. Latest explosion was at the Alhambra where Leo Ferre is holding the stage. In the music world the victims of the "plastiqueurs" (bomb-placers) are talking of forming a club. In any case, there are enough of them now to make up a table of bridge.

And the record business has no lack of gay old times these days either. To celebrate the launching of its contemporary music collection, Philips gave a highly successful cocktail party in the reception halls of the UNESCO building. All the Paris critics and journalists were present and it was quite a serious affair. In a lighter vein but just as nice was the cocktail party thrown by Eddie Barclay at the Saint Hilaire club to mark the opening of Les Chausettes Noires at the ABC Music Hall. It was a happy mixture of journalists and twisters and a good time was had by all.

Vogue's president Leon Cabat is at present in England. Mr. Taylor and Mr. Beucler, President and Commercial Director of Arteco, respectively, have been decorated with the officer's cross of the Order of Artistic Education. Everything in France seems to finish with the awarding of medals. Mr. Wolfson of Alpha editions has acquired rights to "Run-around Sue." The French adaptation will be made by Mr. Grelbin. A recording is scheduled by Les Cyclones with vocals by El Torro on the Vogue label. Well at least this group deserves congratulations for getting off the beaten track when it comes to inventing performers' names. Jacques Helian (Festival) will also disk the tune. Vogue's new singer, Roay Armen, attracted much favorable comment when she made her first TV appearance a week ago. Les Copains have added "Tu Peins" to their list of issues.

Philips will release two Extended Plays of Catherine Sauvage singing songs by Kurt Weil and Berthold Brecht. Les Alcarsons are in Israel on tour until Dec. 15. Their "America Del Sol" disk is expected on the market here any minute now. Jacques Brel, resting up from his recent Olympia stint, sang at Charbonnieres and leaves next for Casablanca. Les Freres Jacques are off to Germany.

So far, commercial Danish broadcasts have mainly been covering Copenhagen and neighborhood. At the same time, it is said that the Danish government is working on a law that will definitely end commercial stations in Scandinavia, provided that the Parliaments in all Scandinavian countries accept this new law. Since Denmark has had those commercial stations for some years without seriously doing any attempt to stop them before Sweden also got commercial stations, it is believed here that the Swedish government stand behind the new law, but as in many cases in which both Denmark and Sweden have been involved, the Swedish government prefers that—officially—the idea originated from Denmark.

A representative for the record trade in Denmark told Cash Box that the official "strike" among musicians, which means that no more recordings (local) can be made after Oct. 1, is in fact no strike at all. There should be a more or less official agreement saying that during the time while new negotiations are going on (at least until Dec. 1) musicians will continue to make recordings as before. However, according to spokesmen for other recording companies, this does not seem to be the truth. It must be pointed out, however, that one is getting different explanations from Danish trade people, depending upon which record company one is speaking to. Another point is that everybody seems to be most unwilling to even discuss the situation.

ICELAND

The cold war has reached Iceland. The country has no TV of its own, but the American military base at Keflavik has had a TV station of its own. In recent times, the Americans have been allowed to use a stronger transmitter. The result has been that the TV programs now covers whole Iceland, which has resulted in great sales of TV sets. However, Communists have started a campaign of their own in order to stop this. "The old historical Icelandic culture is slowly killed by these American propaganda programs," in their opinion. The Communists are comparatively strong in Iceland, having ten out of 60 seats in the Parliament.

NORWAY

A new trio recently debuted on the Triola label. They called themselves The Key Brothers. However, they didn't like that name and in cooperation with one of the dailies in Oslo, they asked the readers to help them to find a new and better name for the group. Yaso Saijo, topper of The Japanese Society of Rights of Authors and Composers (JASRAC), delivered an important informal talk recently in Osaka (second largest city in this country) about illegal music playing in niteries in and around Osaka.

"Upon investigation by the society (JASRAC), we found there are about 200 nite spots with their unattached music bands in this area (to be exact, it includes Osaka, Kyoto, Kobe and its neighboring counties). Among them 80 clubs are playing music with no authorization while the remaining 120 spots are pacted with us and paying royalties. Furthermore, there are some pernicious clubs. They won't talk with us when we visit to negotiate for the legal contract. As the situation is like this, I decided to visit these clubs one after another to make final negotiation with them. And, we shall ask the Public Procurator's Office for legal decision if our last offer is turned down." He attributed this ultimatum to the fact that 40% is being left unpacted with them in the area in comparison with 20% figure in all Japan. JASRAC is the sole Japanese organization which controls royalties, as BMI, ASCAP, SESAC do. Another new publisher is about to be born in Tokyo. Akichiyo Miyamoto, formerly with the Grammophone people, is now having busy days establishing his new publishers), will officially start functioning shortly. Also on the show will be the "Twist'king Chubby Checker plus other American artists still to be named. These new shows will mark the return to the concert promotion field by Gordon after an absence of many months. Gordon was one of the first promoters to import American acts on a large scale to Australia.

One of the hottest titles right across the country at the moment is the novelty piece "My Boomerang Won't Come Back" which is on a Parlophone (EMI single by Charlie Drake. This one with its strong Australian flavour wa written in England where the Drake recording is enjoying great success an now it is giving "Goodbye Cruel World," a real battle for the top spot in Australia. Another single making big headway is the Bobby Edwards single—on Top Rank—of "You're The Reason"; this one is leaping up the charts her at a healthy pace and should catch big sales during the next few weeks.

Mercury Records just issued a new single by Crash Craddock "Ole King Cole" c/w "A Diamond Is Forever." This is Craddock's first release here is some months, but it is only a short while back that Craddock was one of th hottest disk properties in this country. Also from Mercury (this time on the Astor label) is the first release of the local artist Bobby Cookson, it carries "That's Alright" c/w "Flutter Flutter."

Neil Sedaka visited Australia again recently to appear on TV's "Revue '61, one of our major weekly shows. Sedaka presented many of his past hit song and got some fine and valuable exposure for his current RCA single "Happ Birthday Sweet Sixteen." This was Neil's second trip to Australia and it was s well received that he could return here early in the New Year for further T shots. The value of television exposure on a big show of the nature of "Revu '61" should be carefully considered by overseas stars when contemplating visit to Australia. General opinion is that this show reaches at least one thir of the total TV audience in this country. "Revue '61" is presented nationally a 8 p.m. each Sunday and originates from ATN-Channel 7 in Sydney.

While on the subject of television, one of our most popular personalities, Ber Newton, has cut his first disk; it is an EP released by W&G Records. Bert presents the "Letter To Virginia" and "Deck Of Cards." The disk was produce by Paul Young on behalf of Talent Promotion of Australia, the GTV-9 subsidiary company that manages Newton.

Record companies in particular—and disk jockeys to a lesser degree—ar expecting an upsurge in the local interest in "trad" jazz as it is now commonly known in England. The present action in this material here seems to sprin from the apparently tremendous disc sales of trad jazz in England but it it taking quite a while to show any really big influence on the local record market. The most successful artist to date on disk in the revival in this field it Kenny Ball—one of England's top sellers but these records are facing fairly stiff opposition still from the "pop" material as it is generally known. How ever the trad jazz market in packaged lines seems to be continually improving and many local dances are placing strong emphasis on the Charleston, Shimm and Cake-walk. In addition to this, EMI reissued "South" c/w "Ugly Child" be Graeme Bell's Dixie Band, which was a tremendous seller in the days of the 78 rpm disk, and Nat Oliver's New Orleans Group recently had a feature special of the service of the continual of the service of the service

At the other end of the musical scale, dealers report excellent consumer demand for most sing-along albums. Leading this field is the "champion" Mitc Miller, whose many albums—both mono and stereo—are enjoying topnotch sale and most major labels say that they are doing well with their sing-along releases. Many of our prominent commercial radio stations which previousl concentrated on Top 40 programming are now running special sing-along sessions in key time slots. These programs are undoubtedly stimulating consume interest in sing-along records.

New single releases from the Festival group include "My Heart Belongs T Only You" by Jackie Wilson; "School Is In" by U.S. Bonds; "I Love How Yo Love Me" by The Paris Sisters; "Big John" by The Shirelles; "Fool Number One" by Brenda Lee and "Moon River" by Carmen Cavallaro. In the package goods field they have an EP of "Col Joye Sings For Boys and Girls," and El "Shout" by Johnny O'Keefe has been re-issued for the Christmas trade and a album, "The Wild One's King-Size Hits" by Johnny, which is on the Leedo label; this one carries Johnny's current chart rider "I'm Counting On You."

Since December 1, record prices have increased 10%. The explanation of this move was given to Cash Box by Peter de Rougemont, head of Columbia, who stated some of the main reasons for this increase: 1) Sales tax has gone up from 8% to 10% upon selling price to dealers, an increase of 25%.

2) Mechanical royalties were increased by the authors' society from 3 1/3% per side (calculated on the retail price) to 4%. 3) Diskeries are paying \$1.50 per kilo for vinyl, which is almost three times as much as in the United States.

4) The Government has started to levy a charge on public domain material, to provide money for a fund to propagate the arts. 5) Musicians' fees have increased about 84%. 6) Wages and salaries had to be adjusted to take care of increased cost of living—and a bit more. C.O.L. is up 15% since January 1st, 1961.

Some companies had already raised their prices before. Suggested retail prices for singles are now 79 pesos, and for LP's 395 pesos (\$4.75). Another step taken by many companies is the elimination of dealers' special discounts, which were offered to buyers of more than a certain amount, and ranged between 5 and 20%. Some diskeries consider that this was the main reason for the extraordinary lowerage of prices that took place in 1961 (for example, new LP's of a certain brand, with a suggested retail price of 360 pesos, were sold by some stores at 249 pesos). "Dealers will be able to continue discounts, if they want, but won't receive discounts per quantity at the manufacturer. Thus, they'll have to take them from their profit," was said. The general opinion is that this will stabilize prices, and be a good basis for fair business in 1962.

Another problem faced by the industry these devices in 1961.

Another problem faced by the industry these days is the end of the arrangement with the musicians, which will take place December 15. As was previously informed, musicians asked for a raise from 360 pesos to 1000 pesos in their wages, and went into a ten months' strike when labels said they wouldn't pay that. The difference was settled on 700 pesos, and both parties arranged to find a permanent solution before December 15. However, nothing has been done. Some people consider that musicians will continue accepting their present wages. Others, express that "we hope that they will be more conscious in this opportunity."

He'll take part in the Casino Philips program, on Channel 13. The label has released "Unica" by Miguel Calo, "Fina Estampa" (recorded in Peru by songstress Teresita Velasquez) and "Tom Dooley" by The Kingston Trio. Another important release is "Olga en Mexico," an LP recorded by Centro American star Olguita Guillot, whose records hadn't been released before in Argentina.

Mariano Rivera Conde, A&R of RCA Victor of Mexico, spent a week in Buenos Aires, before flying to New York. Rivera Conde listened to the latest recordings of RCA Argentina and took some to release them in Mexico, as for example "Brigitte Bardot," the Brazilian hit (sung in Spanish).

Industrias Surco announced the release of the first series of Atlantic and Atco records for the second week of December. The main star of these records is Bobby Darin, and there is also an LP with The Drifters. Darin's first single will be "Mack the Knife" and "Nature Boy," and there will be also an LP with Christmas songs and a Compact 33 with "Come September."

Regarding Hugo Blanco's songs (see Cash Box, Nov. 25), this author has been very prolific in the last months: while Fermata announced the recording of "El Cigarron" and "Orquidea Arabe" on RCA; Julio Korn publishers report the publishing of "El Herrero" and "Felicidad." The fact is that there is big international success.

DEPRECIATION

A Major Industry Problem

Some day the coin-operated phonograph industry will be recognized by the Treasury Department and its Internal Revenue Division as an industry that derives its income from a juke box—but not necessarily the same juke box in the same location for an unlimited number of years!

What we're driving at is that the IRS, after constant prodding and innumerable requests from not only the juke box industry but American business in general, fails to understand the necessity of a more liberal depreciation system on income-earning equipment.

It is almost unbelievable to hear from juke box operators who are being forced to continue to write off music machines on IRS tax returns on a five year basis at 20% per year. Anyone taking the time to understand the nature of the juke box business and, more important, the value of a juke box, new and used, and the length of time it can earn income, would immediately understand the inadequacy of such a rigid policy. And yet, because this system was used possibly ten or fifteen years ago by the operator, IRS insists that he continue to use the same system of depreciation because he has set the pattern.

First off, there is no nationally recognized equitable arrangement of depreciating a juke box. The operator in Butte, Montana, may enjoy a more liberal write-off than the Union City, New Jersey, coinman. This doesn't make sense. Both men pay the same for a new phonograph and receive approximately the same trade-in value when the machine is exchanged.

Secondly, the terms of depreciation are not fair. The five-year plan should not be used today because a juke box, under today's pricing and trade-in values, is not necessarily a five-year investment. Any efficient operator in business today will usually keep a juke box on location for four years. In many instances, the machine is traded much earlier, but four years appears to be a fair length of time in which to depreciate a machine.

Now the method of depreciating this machine is something else. To argue that a machine does not depreciate most during its first year doesn't make sense. In any event, it certainly does not depreciate the same during the fourth year as it does during the first and second years. We have previously suggested 40-30-20-10% arrangements only to be informed by many leading coin machine firms that even this percentage is unfair.

Philadelphia operators, aided through the efforts of a trade association, presently enjoy a $50-25-12\frac{1}{2}-12\frac{1}{2}\frac{9}{6}$ depreciation allowance over four years. Cries have been heard from areas suggesting that a reserve allowance should be permitted in addition to a more liberal allowance. These are the problems and they must be solved to the mutual satisfaction of all concerned.

The legislature will convene in January after doing almost nothing about a much-talked-about depreciation solution for American business during the first session of 1961. American business was not at all satisfied with the paltry hand-out which in many instances was of no benefit to most firms. A Treasury Dept. questionnaire was mailed and returned with comments from several thousand businessmen in the USA this year. The Department is currently working on a report which may induce more liberal depreciation on industrial equipment. Unless the Music Operators of America brings to the legislators in Washington, the problems of our industry and educates them to the point where they understand the inequities of present IRS rulings, it will be a long time before the opportunity again arises. The arguments in favor of more equitable depreciation systems for the juke box are many. The failing of a governmental department to efficiently conduct its function of taxing the American businessman, and thereby losing untold sums of additional taxes via the purchase and sale of new equipment (which most certainly would come about) should be brought to the attention of the powers that be.

With rising costs and a reduction in the value of the dollar over the years, and we're speaking of ten, fifteen and twenty years back, it is imperative that this situation be resolved. We can only see an eventual solution coming about through a meeting of the minds. Let the leaders of our industry enlighten the Treasury Department. Any progress at all would be a milestone in the history of the music machine business.

Former Seeburg Exec Introduced Many Innovations To Juke Box Industry

CHICAGO—Carl T. McKelvy, 67, distinguished and venerable dean of Coin-Operated Phonograph Sales Managers, passed away early Thanksgiving morning. The cause of death was an abdominal aneurysm.

"Mac" McKelvy was vice-president and director of sales of The Seeburg Corporation for a period of almost 25 years starting in the late thirties. It was under his direction that many of the most important innovations in the

was under ms direction that many of the most important innovations in the industry were introduced. He was a prime factor in selling the income pro-ducing character of remote control wall boxes and it was he who pre-sented the industry's first 100 selection phonograph—the Seeburg Select-O-Matic. He also introduced dual pricing, the first "200," "160," and the principle of obtaining a larger coinage for 2-tune 7" records such as the EP.

McKelvy was one of the most dy-namic individuals in the industry and his sales presentations to the Seeburg Distributors were legendary for their

Distributors were legendary for their dramatic inspiring content.

Prior to Mr. McKelvy's association with Seeburg he was a sales executive for Brunswick-Balke-Collender Corporation, now known as The Brunswick Corporation. He was also with RCA Victor.

He is survived by his wife, Helen, and three grandchildren and will be remembered by literally thousands of industry personalities in manufacturing, distributing and operating.

Funeral services were held in Chicago on Saturday, November 25, and interment is in Memorial Park, Wilmette, Illinois.

'62 A.T.E. Convention Another **Sellout As London Coin Show** Still 2 Months From Opening

The vending industry excitement which is evident over here is also expected to play a large part in this ATE show as it did last month at the International Factory Equipment Convention (see Vending News). Many vending machine manufacturers and distributors are expected to attend this show in '62 and with the juke box, amusement machines and fruit machine industries taking major space allotments the show will probably result in a well-rounded convention of all types of coin-operated equipment.

The exhibits last year were quite colorful with awards being presented to the best exhibit during the convention. All major juke box manufacturers will be on hand as will most game manufacturers. The firms generally exhibit via the London distributors handling the respective lines.

New York's White Tower Chain Opens Test Vending Restaurant;

Using Canteen Equipment, The Sandwich Shop Announces 'Tower-O-Matic' Eating Spot; First For New York City

NEW YORK—For the first time, hungry New Yorkers can now eat in an all-vending restaurant which serves meals and beverages through coinoperated vending machines and lets customers heat their food "to taste" in pleaturing events.

customers heat their food "to taste" in electronic ovens.

Named "Tower-O-Matic," the new automated restaurant opened to the public last week, according to Thomas E. Saxe, Jr., president of White Tower Management Corporation. This is the first restaurant of its type opened by the company which operates more than 200 sandwich shops in 14 states. The store is located at 14th St. and Second Ave.

Undisturbed by waiters, waitresses.

Undisturbed by waiters, waitresses, Undisturbed by waiters, waitresses, cashiers, cooks or other presonnel, patrons will make their selection of food items and beverages, insert coins in the machines, press a button "and eat," Saxe said. Offering an intimate atmosphere, the restaurant will seat 36, and initially will have a hostess available to help customers unfamiliar with vended food service.

Hot and cold sandwiches, casseroles.

with vended food service.

Hot and cold sandwiches, casseroles, salads, pastries and hot and cold beverages will be dispensed through vending machines furnished by Automatic Canteen Company of America which also is acting as consultant to this unique project.

One of the highlights of the all-vending restaurant are two electronic "Tower-O-Matic" ovens which heat foods to piping-hot temperatures in seconds. The special ovens deliver foods steaming hot in containers which remain at room temperature.

"We believe that our luncheon and dinner customers will appreciate this new type of food service which is being introduced to New Yorkers for the first time," Saxe said. "The casual diner in Manhattan, just as with the

factory worker who has found this a popular type of food service in company lunch rooms, wants to obtain his food quickly and without fuss, eat at his own pace, and go about his business."

John F. Farr, Automatic Canteen Vice President, described the Tower-O-Matic as "the first automatic restaurant in which customer satisfaction was given priority over the more

taurant in which customer satisfaction was given priority over the more spectacular aspects of automatic vending. The White Tower approach has emphasized the customer rather than the machine," he said.

The automatic equipment in the new Tower-O-Matic restaurant does everything but hand-feed the customer.

Included are three glass-fronted vendors, each containing 130 food items either refrigerated or at room temperature. These are supplemented by two automatic coffee vendors and a cold drink dispensor providing a choice of several different cold beverages.

Two Automatic Canteen bill changers will act as cashiers for customers who need change. The vending machines and bill changer will be restocked during slow periods. Food will be prepared in a special White Tower bitchen

Saxe said that the restaurant's ex-Saxe said that the restaurant's exterior and interior have been designed to give "the same warm, homey atmosphere provided in our regular waitress-staffed White Towers. Cheerful colors of many hues, pleasant lighting and extra-comfortable chairs are part of this," he added.

Saxe said that several years of research and testing preceded the opening. "If this first Tower-O-Matic is the success we expect it to be, we will

The unit, called the Four-Selection Automatic Milk Vendor, allows fast change of cartons or load without emptying the entire machine and quick cleaning through the use of four independent conveyors, according to company officials. This feature, first on any milk vendor, allows any of the four conveyors to be removed independent of the electrical components such as switches and motor. Resulting easy cleanability allows the unit to

meet all sanitation and health codes,

meet all sanitation and health codes, said Jennings spokesmen.


Other important features offered by the Four-Selection Automatic Milk Vendor include a simplified trouble-free operation brought about through the use of only one small motor and switch on each conveyor without any mechanical parts in the dispensing action; completely sanitary, tamperproof delivery stage, which is effectively sealed off from the interior of the vendor as the door is opened; and fast cooling by forced air circulation and self-defrosting action.

The unit will dispense 1/3 quarts, 1/2 pints and pints. It will also handle most Canadian and foreign containers. Dimensions of the compactly designed unit are 23 in. deep x 32 in. wide x 71 in. high.

Vending Machines Highlight London's 9th Annual Factory Show

British Start With Tea-Coffee Machines Expect To Progress To Full Line Vending

This report was written by the Cash Box European Director who attended the British show and reported on it from the vending viewpoint.



Vending exhibits were colorful and featured new American and European equipment.

The 9th Annual International Factory Equipment Exhibition was held at London's Earls Court from November 13th to 18th. Sponsored by The London Chamber of Commerce and organized by Industrial and Trade Fairs Ltd. this year's event was larger than ever occupying both the ground and first floors of this major venue. All types of equipment, plant and methods used in factories both large and small types of equipment, plant and methods used in factories both large and small were for the first time exhibited in 14 separate sections. Great interest was centered around the section devoted to canteen, welfare and automatic vending machines.

Automatic vending in this country is still in its infancy and whilst we are not yet conditioned to accept the completely automatic canteen the fact that we are rapidly approaching this

completely automatic canteen the fact that we are rapidly approaching this stage is evidenced by the present trend of installing tea and coffee vending points on or adjacent to work floors. The benefits of these installations as a time and labour saving ancillary to the main canteen are fast becoming apparent. The general feeling is that once the advantages of vending are recognized the next step will be to install snack machines eventually followed by the fully automatic canteen.

At the F.E.E. manufacturers were able to show their equipment to the best advantage and at the same time be accessible to factory personnel attending the exhibition who are, in fact, most likely to bring about sales.

Amongst those exhibiting were AUTOBARS CO. LTD. featuring the new Autobar 250 and 450 tea machines designed for commercial and indusrtial locations. Also the popular cigarette and confectionery lines.

AUTOMAT LTD. displayed a fully automatic cafeteria with their "400" refrigerated multipurpose machine as a center piece.

AUTOMATIC CANTEEN (G.B.)

LTD. This was the company's initial exhibition in this country and a spokesman reported fantastic response. With a builtin heat maintaining unit and a high capacity of 176 meals the machine is eminently suitable for factory feeding. Sandwiches are heated by an infra-red oven the degree of heat being governed by a variable timer pre set by the operator. Sandwiches which can be warm, hot or even lightly toasted depending on the pre-setting are vended in 20 seconds, cellophane wrapped.

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



The "Pulltop" Story

New Can Could Be Boon To Vending

NEW YORK-It took a Philadelphia

NEW YORK—It took a Philadelphia lawyer and a small, dedicated team to develop and perfect a technological process which has been eluding mankind for over 4,000 years. The invention could be a boon to the vending machine industry.

The result of the process is a selfopening can requiring no tools or external gadgets—a process so basic in cencept and so important in convenience and safety, it has been sought after and talked about for centuries. (See pictures and story, Cash Box, Dec. 2, Page 56.)

But it also took nine years, \$1.5 million in developmental funds and the dedication and zealotry of a crusade to uncover, one by one, and overcome the almost Herculean obstacles which finally led to the breakthrough.

In perfecting the process, known as "PULLTOP," this hardy group also created the means of reproducing it—a relatively small, precision machine which can produce the end product at a prodigious rate.

A Philadelphia concern called CanTop Machinery Corp., has begun producing and will shortly market the machine and the process which has already elicited the enthusiasm and support of leading factors in the canning, food, beer, beverage and metals industries.

In commenting on the extreme simplicity of the process.

In commenting on the extreme simplicity of the self-opening can. A. Ralph D'Andrea, Can-Top president—said: "Very little effort is necessary—even a child can do it. All that is required is a gentle, outward pull on a tab."

The basic machine, about 50 inches high and 76 inches long, can be adapted to the canning of both liquids

and solids.

—Type S (solids), which makes a —Type S (solids), which makes a top that can be removed entirely in one swift operation, is for the processing of a wide range of solids embracing frozen concentrates, peas, carrots, fruits, sardines, coffee, macaroni, baby food, to name just a few.

Type L (liquids) will produce for the conventional can a top which pulls out exposing a pre-formed pour opening. It is designed to handle the canning of beer, soft carbonated beverages, and a broad variety of non-carbonated liquids ranging from evaporated milk, fruit and vegetable juices, soups, edible oils, as well as motor oils and other industrial liquids. What the "Pulltop" Process Means—

To the can manufacturer, the simplicity of the basic machine means that only one operator is needed to attend two or three machines, simultaneously. Moreover, either lid made by the S or L machines can be placed on the conventional can without re-

on the conventional can without re-designing a heavy investment in machinery. And since the machine integrates compatibly into the standard canning line, there are no engineering problems or equipment changes nec-

In processing carbonated beverages, the new self-opening Pulltop can will withstand pressures up to approximately 150 pounds per square inch, without leaking or buckling.

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


