




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IT'S YOUR DUTY

Two weeks ago we received a news release from Jules Malamud, **Executive Secretary of NARM (Na**tional Association of Record Merchandisers) which announced that the association is engaging in a twomonth-long membership drive to bring more rack jobbers into the organization. It's a drive that will consume a considerable amount of the Secretary's time as well as the valuable time of NARM's eastern and western chairmen Abe Levine and Ed Mason.

The release brought to mind the lassitude of some people in our industry. To think that a group of people must solicit membership for an organization when everyone in the field of rack jobbing should be pleading for the right to be part of the association.

The same applies to all in the varied fields of our industry. NARM, RIAA, SORD. MOA, NAMM, NARAS, ARMADA are associations designed to benefit a certain area of the business. All have only one aim-to help make a specific facet of the business healthier and help solve problems that may be facing it.

If any of the above organizations is weak, it's because of the lack of cooperation it gets from the people in whose behalf it is working; a shameful paradox.

Time and again we have heard people criticize a trade association and follow with a lengthy tirade about what the association should do, the direction in which is should head, the people who should be running it, etc. Frequently the suggestions are extremely constructive and would probably often meet with strong acceptance if presented with as much sincerity and enthusiasm before the association as it is presented to us. Yet these "keen thinkers" are much too often not even affiliated with the association they are criticizing.

Why criticize from the outside when you have a golden opportunity to put your thinking to good use by working within an organization.

By not being a part of a trade association-whether you agree with its objectives or not-you are only hurting yourself. If all of the industry associations were given greater support than is the case in most of them today, all would be stronger and all could accomplish a great deal more only because of the number of people they would represent, if for no other reason.

It is the DUTY of everyone in this industry to be a part of as many associations as represent him.

The pop releases include the orig-inal cast of the new musical "Bravo Giovanni," starring Cesare Siepe, and a re-creation of songs from the cele-brated Harold Rome review, "Pins & Needles," which first opened 25 years ago (Rome sings on the LP). Other pop selections include: "Marty After Midnight," Marty Rob-bins; "Meet Claude King," "The Sound Of Johnny Cash"; "Tammy Grimes"; "Carolyn Hester," folk-singer; "Ira Hayes & Other Ballads," folk artist Peter La Farge; "I Can Get It For You Wholesale," Sy Sil-ver Orch.; "No Strings," No Strings Sextet; "Penthouse Paradise," Paul Taubman Orch.; "Art Van Damme Swings Sweetly"; "Play The Thing," Marlowe Morris Quintet; "Now Hear This," Dukes of Dixieland; "I Have But One Heart," Jerry Vale; "Of God I Sing," Stuart Hamblen; "The Spir-itetd Freddie Hart." Latin-American releases include "De Mexico A La Habana," dance

Latin-American releases include "De Mexico A La Habana," dance hits by La Sonora Santanera; and "The Exotic Moods Of Martita," Martita Ramirez.

WB Having Greatest Singles Success Yet

NEW YORK-Warner Bros. Records sales business in its history. Seven diskings from the label, in-cluding one from the WB-handled

Challenge label, are making stands on this week's Top 100.

The label's prides & joys are: "That's Old Fashioned" by The Ev-erly Bros. (22); "Al Di La" by Emilio Pericoli (33); "Lemon Tree" by Peter, Paul & Mary (55); "How Can I Meet Her" by The Everly Bros. (75) (flip of "Old Fashioned"); "Johnny Get Angry" by Joanie Sommers (80); and "Limbo Rock" by The Champs (93) (on Challenge).

Doing solid LP business for WB is "Peter, Paul & Mary," which this week holds-down the number 19 spot on the mono chart, while "Rome Adventure," from which the "Al Di La" was culled, is 48 on the stereo chart.

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Classical product includes three LP's by pianist Glenn Gould; Mo-zart's Concerto No. 24 and the Scho-enberg Concerto with the CBC Symph. Orch. conducted by Walter Susskind and Robert Craft, respectively; "Enoch Arden," with Gould playing Richard Strauss and Claude Rains narrating Tennyson's poem; Bach's 'The Art Of The Fugue (Vol. 1-Fugues 1-9)."

There's also a recording of the Mahler Symphony No. 9 by the late Bruno Walter plus a special bonus memorial LP: "Two Portraits Of Bruno Walter 1876-1962," including an interview with Arnold Michaelis; and recording the work, narrated by John McClure (three LP's for the price of two).

Two new releases by Eugene Ormandy and The Philadelphia Orchestra: disk premiere of Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 7 and "The Bach Family," pieces by three sons of Johann Sebastian Bach.

Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic are represented with two modern works: Lukas Foss' "Song Of Songs (Four Settings for Voice & Opera)" with mezzo-soprano Jennie Tourel, and Ben Haim's "Sweet Psalmist Of Israel" with harpsichordist Sylvia Marlowe.

Organist E. Power Biggs offers the first recording of Sweelinck's "Variations On Popular Songs."

Stimler Gets Liberty's **New Eastern Sales Post**

NEW YORK-Irv Stimler has joined Liberty Records as eastern sales manager, a new division at the label. Stimler comes to Liberty after heading up sales at 20th Fox Record for the past $2\frac{1}{2}$ years.

Stimler said that the new division was putting particular emphasis on two Liberty releases, an LP by Julie London, "Love Letters," and a single, "Elephant Walk" by The Miniature Men.

Carl Davis Joins Columbia As Chicago A&R Producer

NEW YORK-Columbia Records has made Carl Davis an A&R producer for the label in Chicago.

Davis, who will headquarter in Chicago, where he will maintain Columbia's newly created A&R office there, will produce singles and albums for Columbia, Epic and Okeh (he cut Ted Taylor's bow on Okeh; see separate story).

He reports directly to David Kapralik, director of pop A&R in the east for Columbia and Epic.

Since 1961, Davis did both promotion and sales work for Columbia Distributors in Chicago.

"Blue Hawaii" Marks Presley's 30th Gold **Disk From Victor**

NEW YORK-Elvis Presley will have to make room for yet another gold-disk, his 30th, for his "Blue Hawaii" LP, which has passed the million sales mark, RCA Victor Records reported last week.

The label noted that the sales figure was for domestic sales only, with an additional half million copies report-

additional half million copies report-edly having been sold throughout the rest of the world. "Blue Hawaii," a soundtrack LP, may well rank as the fastest million-selling LP in history. Released by Victor in Oct., 1961, it had sold 600, 000 copies by Dec., thus gaining for it a gold record from the Record In-dustry Association of America (RIAA), which awards LP's coming-up with a half million or more sales. During one three-week period in Dec. Victor reported that distribu-

Dec., Victor reported that distributors and dealers had sold no less than 350,000 copies of "Blue Hawaii."

On the LP charts, the album, recently number 1, holds the number 6 spot in mono, 8 in stereo.

The label also noted that Presley's current EP, "Follow That Dream," containing four songs from a Presley flick of the same name, has sold nearly a half a million copies in the U.S. alone. It's 28 on this week's Top 100.

David Mook Tops A&R At Bigtop Records

NEW YORK-David Mook has been named A&R director for Bigtop Records, according to the label's Johnny Bienstock.

Mook, formerly associated wth the professional department of Hill & Range, the pubbery, has already cut two new artists for the label: The Music Mates and Lou Johnson.

20th Fox Keeps Label; Gets "Cleopatra" LP

NEW YORK-20th Fox Records, figured by many tradesters to be on its way out as a label, is remaining in the disk field and is now undergoing a complete reorganization campaign under the direction of Basil Bova.

All of the diskery's distributors, Bova said last week, have been notified of the label's intentions to provide strong product. Additionally, distributors have been alerted to a new sales program consisting of the diskery's top LP product, including issues by Shirley Temple, Tommy Dorsey, Glenn Miller and George Gershwin.

A prize in the fall from 20th Fox will be the soundtrack of "Cleopatra," the 20th Fox flick that has been receiving tremendous publicity on two counts: its production cost (about \$30 million) and the marital rift between Elizabeth Taylor, its femme star, and Eddie Fisher (Richard Burton, also starring in the flick, has also been involved in Taylor-Fisher news).

Bova said that the "Cleopatra" LP would be released several months prior to the premiere of the flick.

On the singles level, 20th Fox is currently hot on "Mr. Hobbs' Theme," written by Henry Mancini for the 20th Fox flick, "Mr. Hobbs Takes A Vacation," starring James Stewart and Maureen O'Hara.

Bova, who was away from the label for a while before resuming his new post, previously served as national promotional manager of the label.

CAPITOL UPDATES "MUSIC MAN" LP; LOWERS DISK'S PRICE & OFFERS DISCOUNT DEAL

HOLLYWOOD-Capitol Records is preparing for the upcoming flick versiion of "The Music Man."

Though it doesn't have the filmtrack (Warner Bros., producer of the flick, has it), the label released the Broadway original-cast album when the show opened in the winter of 1957.

Capitol is re-releasing the LP in a new package and with "completely updated" sound this week (28). New suggested list prices are \$4.98 (mono) and \$5.98 (stereo), a dollar less in each case as compared with the initial release price.

To launch the album, Capitol Records Distributing Corp. is offering one free LP for every 10 purchased on a one-shot initial order. Offer runs until June 15.

Singles Bow From Charlie Parker Label

"My Fair Lady" Landmark To Leave New York

NEW YORK-Maybe they'll form a "Committee to Save 'My Fair Lady' as they did for Carnegie Hall.

The classic musical has become somewhat of a landmark in New York since it opened at the Mark Hellinger Theatre on March 15, 1956, but unless there are new developments the production will end its run, the longest in American musical history, at the Broadway Theatre on July 7.

When the musical closes, its run of 2,621 performances will be a record run for a Broadway musical. Previous record holder was "Oklahoma!," which achieved 2,212 performances in its initial stand on the mainstem.

The end of "Lady" in New York is by no means the demise of the production. It's still being performed all over the world, including road companies in the U.S., and is certain to make many a return engagement in New York itself. Warner Bros. is working in the flick version, starring Audrey Hepburn and, it was rumored last week, Richard Burton.

Millions have in disk libraries a copy of Columbia's Broadway original cast LP of the Lerner & Loewe creation (with a debt to George Bernard Shaw).

Mercury Bows 3 New Albums

NEW YORK-Mercury Records has made a special release of three LP's. Included are the original-cast LP of the Off B'way hit, "Fly Blackbird," "Mike Fright—The Eligibles at Vegas New Frontier" and The Tides' (backed by The Melody Singers) "Limbo Rock."

"Fly Blackbird," whose score was one of the several acquired from the Off B'way stage last season by E. B. Marks Music (Mercury also cut the original-cast LP of "All In Love"), was skedded to end its New York run last Sun. (27). The work, however, may tour Europe.

NARM SETS MID-YEAR DATES & SIT

PHILADELPHIA — The mid-vear meeting and sales conference of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM) will be held at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago. August 26-29, it was announced last week by Jules Malamud, NARM executive director. The dates selected will immediately precede the opening of the World's Fair of Music in Chicago, and will enable participants at the NARM Mid-Year Meeting to conveniently attend the industry event.

NARM will follow its format for its mid-year meeting and sales conference which proved popular with record manufacturers and rack jobbers alike, when it was first utilized at last year's meeting. Person-toperson sessions will be held morning and afternoon on Monday and Tuesday, August 27 and 28, and on Wednesday, August 29, until noon. Breakfast will be served to all mid-year attendants prior to the person-to-person sessions, and luncheon on Monday and Tuesday. In this way, the Person-to-Person appointment schedules can be operated on a most efficient basis, with close contact established between label and rack jobber for the three day period.

Each record manufacturer attending will have an appointment, at a specified time, with each record rack jobber in attendance. Manufacturers are expected to utilize their conference sessions to present their upcoming fall and Christmas programs, and to pre-sell for their distributors, leaving the actual order-writing for their regional distributors. Those firms, particularly the low-priced labels which sell direct, are expected to do some real order-writing.

A most important feature of the person-to-person sessions is the opportunity they afford the manufacturer and the rack jobber, to discuss matters of company policy and industry relationships. It is expected that discussions on packaging, merchandising aids, advertising policy, etc, will be of prime importance.

Kenneth Sachs (Merchants Wholesale Service, Detroit) and James J. Tiedjens (Musical Isle Record Corp., Milwaukee), co-chairmen for NARM of the mid-year meeting and sales conference, have stated that the

NARM regular membership (the ra jobber) will hold closed meetings of Sunday, August 26, and on Wedne day, August 29. Major associatio projects, both current and planne will be discussed at this time.

Duane Eddy, who was born in Corn-ing, New York, was first introduced to the guitar when he was only five years old. Nothing happened—then. But twelve years later, when Duane was seventeen, he was given a record-ing of Chet Atkins for his birthday— and this time it stuck

and this time, it stuck. Today the twenty-four year old RCA Victor artist looks back from a different point of view on those days, when he didn't have enough money to pay for lessons or for records, and so simply went from dance hall to dance pay for lessons of for feorus, and so simply went from dance hall to dance hall to listen to the musicians. He sold hot dogs and pop to listen to the gui-tarists, and after three years, in 1958, Duane went to a recording studio in Phoenix, Arizona, where he cut two records "Movin' and Groovin'" and "Rebel Rouser" on the Jamie label. Both of these self-penned items quickly zoomed up the charts. The rest is history. Eddy's distinctive gui-tar style (achieved by playing melody on the bottom string rather than the top strings) has won him a flock of fans through the years. Currently, he is clicking with "Deep In The Heart Of Texas."



Al Hirt, who in both size and stature is one of the biggest names in jazz, might have remained in comparative anonymity in his home town of New Orleans if his manager, book-ing agent and the whole of RCA Vic-tor's hierarchy hadn't persuaded him to leave his beloved home to cut his wax.

to leave his beloved home to cut his first wax. Prior to staking his New Orleans claim, however, Hirt "paid his dues" as a jazzman by occupying chairs in the bands of Tommy and Jimmy Dor-sey, Ray McKinley and Horace Heidt. These lengthy swinging sojourns fol-lowed a four-year turn in the Army from which Al was honorably dis-charged with the rank of sergeant. Thanks to the aid, encouragement and financial sacrifice of his father, Alois (a member of the New Orleans Police Board) and mother, Al was af-forded a fine, early musical education which included study at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. Today, he is versatile enough to blow the roof off a nightclub floor or sit-in with the New Orleans Symphony (which he's done often).







Calling "Dr. Kildare" Proves Too Hard To Handle

NEW YORK—The Hartford telephone company decided to call it quits when it was deluged with hundreds of telephone calls for "Dr. Kildare," which resulted from an ad placed in the personal columns of the Hartford Courant by MGM distributor Dick Godlewski.

The telephone gimmick was set-up as a publicity stunt for the Richard Chamberlain MGM recording of "Theme From Dr. Kildare" whereby persons calling a special number would hear a recorded message by Richard Chamberlain, Dr. Kildare on TV, plus a few bars of his MGM record.

Matters became complicated when disk jockeys at WDRC, Hartford picked up the gag and also advised their listeners to call "Dr. Kildare." At this point the entire Hartford telephone exchange was jammed with calls for the next three days. At the request of the local phone company WDRC discontinued the announcements on the air. Meanwhile, "word of mouth" information re "Call Dr. Kildare" spread thru Hartford, forcing the telephone people to cancel the "Dr. Kildare" phone number and yank the automatic answering service.





POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK

"AMERICAN WALTZES"-Mantovani-London LL 3260

Ace maestro Mantovani comes up with another exceptional LP, this time playing a superb col-lection of America's favorite waltzes. Mantovani showcases his artful musicianship and sensitivity showcases his artitle musicianship and sensitivity as an arranger with fresh and inventive interpre-tations of such grand old melodies as "The Waltz You Saved For Me," "Sidewalks Of New York," and "The Missouri Waltz." This is a top-notch package of warm and nostalgic tunes that has already made its initial chart entry and is destined to soar higher to soar higher.

"A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ON THE WAY TO THE FORUM"—Original Cast—Capitol SWAO 1717

SWAO 1717 The surprise hit was hailed for its fast and funny dialog, but this original-cast LP does point up the fine humor of Stephen Sondheim's lyrics. Sondheim, lyricist of the "West Side Story" and "Gypsy" scores, also has written melodies—his initial chore as a tunesmith for a Broadway score —and there's an ingratiating air about many of them (e.g. "Lovely," "Impossible," "Everybody Ought To Have A Maid"). Zero Mostel, the star, Brian Davies, Preshy Marker and Jack Gilford top the LP performances. Issue is a must for the original-cast shelf.

"THE CHIPMUNK SONGBOOK"—David Seville and Chipmunks—Liberty LST-7229 This happy offering from Liberty finds David Seville and the Chipmunks indulging in some vocal shenanigans done in the sing along manner. The Chimunks cavort their way through a bevy of oldies which include their current noisemakers "The Alvin Twist" and "America The Beautiful." The LP is loaded with the same ingredients for success which have made them consistent best-sellers in the past. Also included in the album are delightful renditions of "My Wild Irish Rose," "Bicycle Built For Two," and "Buffalo Gal."

"HUGO MONTENEGRO AND HIS ORCHES-TRA"—Time S 2062 Hugo Montenegro's bag of selections for this Time LP outing is truly diverse. The orkster at-tacks the classics, semi-classics and pop ever-greens with the same high standards of musician-ship. The songster starts the session with Peter De Rose's "Have You Ever Been Lonely," and includes such fine oldies as "Just Walking In The Rain," "Welcome To My World," and "Blue Skies." The group's rendi-tion of "Rally Round The Flag," "Brother Can You Spare A Dime," and "True Religion" attests to their artistry and proves this is one of their best albums to date. Disk should be a noisemaker in the folk field.

"23 GLEE CLUB FAVORITES"—Robert Shaw Chorale—RCA Victor LM-2598 Songs familiar and songs not so familiar are given a spirited and professional treatment by the voices of the Robert Shaw Chorale as they sing the songs favored by glee clubs for many years. Engendering moods both collegiate and reverent the chorus reads such standards as the "Whiffenpoof Song," "Gaudeamus Igitur," "Shall I, Wasting In Despair?" and "Brothers Sing On." A fine entry in the choral catalog.

"PIANO PLUS"—Lee Evans—Capitol ST 1708 Lee Evans demonstrated his keyboard artistry on his premiere LP for Capitol some time ago. Now the versatile 88'er takes off on a warm, romantic tack in a highly listenable program of popular melodic material. Backed by Glenn Osser's ork on the set Evans shows his first-rate control and feeling on "When Did I Fall In Love," "Again" and "I Feel Pretty." The album should create some excitement with all of Evans' many fans.

"WEAVERS GOLD"-The Weavers-Decca DL

"WEAVERS GOLD"—The Weavers—Decca DL 74277 The Weavers, for some time good solid exponents of American folk music, attest to their artistry with this collection of folk favorites. The group believes in a straight-forward delivery and dis-plays a genuine feeling for the music it sings which is evidenced in the rendition of "Rock Island Line," "Easy Rider Blues," "Across The Wide Missouri," and "Down In The Valley." The Weavers live up to their reputation with this LP and it should find wide acceptance among folk music fans. music fans.

"INSPIRATION"—Leopold Stokowski, Norman Luboff—RCA Victor LM-2593 Leopold Stokowski and Norman Luboff have com-bined their best-selling talents and come up with some moving arrangements of inspirational themes. This is a welcome alliance and they justi-fy it by giving sensitive interpretations of such choral-orchestral greats as Bach's "Jesu, Joy Of Man's Desiring," Wagner's "Pilgrim's Chorus," and Gluck's "O Saviour Hear Me" from "Orfeo and Euridice." The album is an exceptionally fine offering of some of the world's best sacred music.

"NIGHT TRAIN GOES TO HOLLYWOOD"-Buddy Morrow-Mercury SR 60702 Buddy Morrow cashes in on the current trend and comes up with listenable collection of mostly flick themes on this interesting jazz-flavored Mercury disk. It would have been a better set if the sounds were either straight jazz or standard pop treatments. But there's plenty of quality lis-tening as the crew reads "Never On Sunday," "Exodus" and Morrow's theme, "Night Train." Potent programming fare.

"GREAT THEMES ON THE ORGAN"—Bill Meeder—Cameo SC 4003 Another 4 Channel disk from Cameo features a full concert organ playing flick themes with a symphony of sounds. This new technical process is put to very effective use in showcasing the ver-satility of the concert organ. Meeder artistically manipulates the organ to reproduce the sounds of slender reeds, sweeping strings, and horns in the playing of such current favorites as "Theme From The Apartment," "Song From Moulin Rouge," and the "Third Man Theme." Good programming fare.

Arranger Marshall's bag of tunes runs from the evergreen "Sing, Sing, Sing" to such contem-porary hits as "Take Good Care Of Baby" and "Peter Gunn." Regardless of their origin all the selections here have an infectious, danceable swingin' beat. selections her swingin' beat.



"MOVIE THEMES FOR TEENS" — Leroy Holmes"—MGM SE 3979 This pleasant offering from MGM features the orchestra of LeRoy Holmes playing a set of movie themes geared for the teenage set, but having all the ingredients for a more universal appeal. With a band augmented by three guitars, two drums and a trio of girls, Holmes is able to create more than just an instrumental sound. Some top-notch bands are "Where The Boys Are," "Tammy," "Theme From A Summer Place," and "Love Me Tender." Pleasant late hours mood companion.



"SONGS OF ISRAEL TODAY"—Uri Zifroni— Fiesta FLP 1351 Fiesta has come up with a potent collection of ballads, uptempo items and folk-flavored tunes of modern Israel on this top-drawer package featur-ing Uri Zifroni's chorus and orchestra. The songs tell the plaintive story of the Israelis and the emotion-filled readings of the chorus do much to give the session an authoritative touch. Best listening bets here are "To My Country," "Never Mind" and "Believe Me, A Day Will Come."



"FROM THE HEART"-Etta Jones-Prestige

In her latest outing for Prestige, Etta Jones sings a collection of sturdies which are easily adapted to her warm and soulful rhythm and blues style. The lark delivers the tunes simply in a straightforward manner relying on a genuine talent rather than on vocal gimmicks. The thrush is at her very best as she essays "By The Bend Of The River," "You Came A Long Way From St. Louis," "I'll Never Be Free," and "There Goes My Heart." This is a fine disk with good sales potential.



"BURGESS MEREDITH READS RAY BRAD-BURY"—Lively Arts PRLA 30004 This unusual offering from Lively Arts boasts the dramatic talents of Burgess Meredith com-bined with the literary skills of Ray Bradbury. The thespian reads a pair of science fiction tales by the author which are essentially fantasy, but with a subtle element of truth that intensifies the inherent eerie qualities. Meredith's readings are skillful, moving and powerful and reflect a genuine feeling for Bradbury's works. Admirers of the actor and the writer will find this an ex-cellent permanent catalog item.



"BALL OF THE YEAR"—Jack Hansen—Dance Along DAL 1314 Here is a set of fine evergreens done in a variety of tempos and geared especially for dancing. The LP, tagged after the social event of a few months ago, features the talents of composer-conductor-arranger-trumpet soloist Jack Hansen. The ork-ster launches the session with a fox trot version of "The Night Is Young," and includes "Moon River" in waltz tempo, "Frenesi" in rumba tempo, and "The Third Man Theme" as a cha cha. Relaxed, easy listening and highly danceable arrangements should make this a choice item for dance buffs.

"HERE AND NOW"—Art Farmer-Benny Gol son—Mercury SR 60698 Art Farmer's and Benny Golson's jazztet is no a new-wave nucleus for rampant experimenta tion. Instead the group successfully combine moderated abandon with a distinctive, contempo rary, relaxed style to produce an original soun-within the confines of the modern jazz idiom The four professional sidemen are given a chance to demonstrate their individual talents on "Tonk, "Rue Prevail" and six other topdrawer items Jazzophiles should really dig the disk.

"RAY BROWN WITH THE ALL-STAR BIO BAND"—Verve V 8444 Here's a destined-for-success jazz package fea turing the Ray Brown playing with an accom plished group of jazzmen including some fancy solo work by Cannonball Adderly. With the ex ception of three items arranged by Al Cohn al the arrangements are by Ernie Wilkins, wh doubles as the conductor for the session. Both Adderly and Brown are of the Parker school and the men swing together in winning fashion of "Work Song," "My One And Only Love" and "Two For The Blues."





"OUT OF THE BLUE"-Carol Sloane-Colum bia CL 1766

bia CL 1766 Columbia has added another significant jazz ar tist to their growing roster of personalities in th person of Carol Sloane. The thrush was discov ered at the Newport Jazz Festival and her super pitch and melodic jazz-oriented phrasing evi denced on this disk indicate that the diskery ha come up with an artist of star potential. Th lark's impressive wide-range voice fares equally well on ballads as on swingin' uptempo items Most listenable selections are "Prelude To 4 Kiss," "Little Girl Blue" and "Will You Still B Mine."

"STOP AND LISTEN"—Baby Face Willette-Blue Note 4084 With the exception of Jimmy Smith and Ear Grant there are few organists around today whe have necessary talent to fare well in a sole spotlight. Baby Face Willette is such an artist On this second Blue Note session, he demon strates a potent, original hard-driving style or rendering jazz blues. Teamed up with Gran Green on guitar and Ben Dixon on drums, this promising newcomer offers impressive renditions of "Chances Are Few," "Stop And Listen" and "At Last."



"THE INTIMATE BACH"—Laurindo Almeida —Capitol SP 8582 Here's a first-rate item that should bring out the serious classical collector in droves. The session boasts an accomplished trio of fine talents who render a pleasant group of selections from Bach The artists, Laurindo Almeida on guitar, Vir gina Majewski on viola and Vincent De Rosa on French horn, go their paces in superb fashion Best tracks here are "Komm Susser Tod" and "Partita In B Flat."

"TRIAL BY JURY"—Various Artists, Glyde bourne Chorus, Pro Arte Orchestra, Sir Malcoln Sargent—Angel 35966 Angel brings together a host of accomplished players, the Glyndebourne Festival Chorus and the Gilbert and Sullivan-oriented hand of Sir Mal colm Sargent conducting the Pro Arte Orchestr-in one of the best readings of the light operett cut in quite a while. A group of skilled singer including George Baker, Elsie Morison and Rich ard Lewis have leading roles in this masterfu interpretation of the G&S classic. Savoyard buff should flock to this superb album.

CHICAGO-The World's Fair of Music and Sound, to be held August 31-September 9 here in McCormick Place, is expected to attract 20,000 industry dealers from throughout the country.

This was the estimate of Patrick H. Hoy, Chairman of the Fair's civic advisory committee and president of Material Service Corp., at the Fair's preview luncheon last Thurs. (24) in the Sheraton-Chicago Hotel, at which the scope of the exposition was detailed to more than 100 representatives of the press, radio and television.

Hoy described the exposition-an assembly of all segments of the music and sound industry-as an event of enormous significance to the industry and to the entire country.

At the press preview, representing segments of the nation's music industry participating in the Fair were: Al Preskill, vice-president of Allied Radio Corporation; Irwin Steinberg, executive vice-president of Mercury Records; Charles Ford, advertising manager, Leblanc Corp., and Ted Leitzell, public relations director, Zenith Radio Corp.

Each of these execs emphasized the importance of the Fair as the first

Steinberg emphasized the mutual national benefits to be derived from a serious exchange of ideas on a wide variety of subjects in business seminars scheduled during the Fair for retailers and distributors.

Preskill pointed out that the music clinics, under Dick Schory, the Fair's Director of Special Events, will provide retailers with an unprecedented opportunity to see demonstrations of the latest in hi-fi and stereo equipment.

A feature of the preview was an amplified phone call from Bill Veeck at his Easton, Md., home in which the Fair's vice-president and the former president of the White Sox, told that his interest in music was second only to baseball and that he believed Chicago to be the ideal location for a national music and sound exposition of so vast a scope.

Aaron D. Cushman, the Fair's president, announced that endorsement and acceptance of the exposition's concept by industry, civic and busi-ness leaders has been "wholeheartedly enthusiastic." He disclosed that the fair already had commitments by exhibitors for 50 per cent of available space. He introduced John King, one of the Fair's vice-presidents, John W. Brennock, the Fair's Director of Exhibits, and Schory.

Cushman described the diverse elements of the Fair, including:

1) Product and scientific exhibits for both trade and consumer. Among national exhibitors are: Zenith, Acoustic Research, Allied Radio, ABC Paramount, Revere Camera, Columbia Records, Capitol Records, Warner; Bros. Records, RCA Recording and Home Instrument Division, Ludwig Drum, Premiere Drum, Jenco Musical Products.

2) Business seminars for record retailers, hi-fi component retailers, radio-TV-phonograph retailers, distributors, band instrument retailers and radio program directors.

3) Music Clinics under the supervision of Dick Schory, director of special events. Participating in these discussions and demonstrations for both trade and consumer are such companies as Ludwig Drum, Acoustic Research, G. Leblanc Corp., Shawnee Press, Inc., and Allied Radio.

4) Cultural symposia will be presented daily on a wide variety of provocative topics. Nationally known musicians, educators and music authorities will conduct the symposia being organized by a Committee of Deans of Music of Universities and conservatories under the chairmanship of Leonard B. Meyer, chairman of the music department, University of Chicago.

5) International music groups will perform in the exposition area on three giant specially constructed sound stages. Artists and music groups from many lands will perform native music in native costume.

6) An entertainment spectacle will be produced three times daily for the run of the 10-day Fair in the 5,000-seat Arie Crown Theatre in McCormick Place. Show will provide a showcase for name artists in both classical and pop music.



The songs are "Napoli," "En Sang Om Kaerlighed (A Song Of Love)", "Ham Jeg Kan Li' (He The One I Like)," "Forelsket (In Love)" and "Lille Fröken Himmelbla (Little Miss Heaven Blue)," all with lyrics by Börge Müller and composed by Svend Gyldmark.

New sheet music from Mörks Musikforlag includes "Et Kys I Regnen (L'Om-brellone)" by Chiosso-Calvi with Danish lyrics by Robert Arnold. "Charlie (Norman)" by John D. Loudermilk with Danish lyrics by Peter Mynte. "En Flaske Med Et Brev (The Message In A Bottle)" by Tommie Connor, Danish lyrics by Peter Mynte, and "En Lillebitte Tare (A Little Bitty Tear)" by Hank Cachren with Donish lyrics Snar Cochran with Danish lyrics by Peter Spar.

Record prices recently went up in Finland. An LP went from 2000 markka to 2400 mk. Singles have risen from 450 to 490 markka while EP's have been upped from 800 to 890 markka. A U.S. dollar is estimated at 321 markka at the present. This rise of record prices is the first in Finland in five or six years.

Oy R. E. Westerlund Ab, one half of EMI in Finland, will have a half hour TV program every fourth Sunday, Rolf Kronqvist, manager of Record Division told Cash Box. HMV artists and their recent recordings will be promoted.

NORWAY

Rolf Syversen, a&r man of Iversen & Frogh A/S, local distributor of EMI in Norway, told Cash Box that the firm is most happy with 1962, so far. It has had between 40 and 60% of all records on the best selling charts. There seems to be no change in the popularity of EMI records, as names like Cliff Richard, Helen Shapiro, The Shadows and Germany's Conny Froboess seem to be so well established on the Norwegian market that every new release of theirs almost automatically becomes a best seller.

It seems that there will be a market for Norwegian language recordings in Norway, Jörg-Fr. Ellertsen, manager of Egil Monn Iversen A/S told Cash Box. His company has started to make more and more recordings in Nor-wegian, and, at the moment, it has some 20 local artists for local recordings. However, in the past Norway has been a mainly English language territory, depending upon records aired over the Continental Radio Luxembourg, and with no Norwegian records promoted over that station, Norwegian records have only seldom been able to break in their home market. One way to stimu-late interest in Norwegian records is via the press as government radio and late interest in Norwegian records is via the press, as government radio and TV seem to pay little attention to the local record production. Another thing is the expense, but since Egil Monn Iversen A/S now has its own recording studio, the chances to make local recordings are bigger than before.

The Norwegian group The Key Brothers looks like a big international hit, it was told to Cash Box. They are under exclusive contract to Egil Monn Iver-sen A/S, with Jörg-Fr. Ellertsen as their personal manager. In the near future, their Triola recording of "Candle Of Fate" and "Last Stand" will be released by Jamie Records in the U.S. They have also been released in Denmark, Finland. Sweden and Germany.



Editorial

The Trend Toward Stronger Association The trend toward stronger association ties between operators has been taking place within the industry during the past twelve months. With the exception of one obvious upheaval and of course, the announcement of new coin machine associations, the leadership of many trade groups have managed, almost unnoticeably, to bring the operators closer together.

In many instances, the attraction for greater attendance at meetings and increased membership in general has been the social weekend, a businesspleasure get-together which attracts the serious minded operator for the merits to be derived from whatever business sessions may be planned, as well as the fun-loving who ordinarily wouldn't be seen at a straight management meeting. In the meantime, the wives get a break to spend a weekend away from home, and this in itself is usually cause for greater participation by all concerned.

There was a time when we clamored for more meetings with attendance from a broader representation of operators. Whether they're in attendance for the fun or the pleasure, or a little of both doesn't make too much difference. NAMA has long since found that a weekend meeting can be successful and yet combine business and pleasure. Regional meetings prove this each time they are held. There is no question that this is the direction in which business meets are heading.

We would be remiss in writing an editorial on associations without mentioning the national organization, Music Operators Of America. Currently undergoing a change of command, the Board sees no reason why a stronger organization and an even stronger Convention should not emerge. Nationally speaking, the industry can look forward to a brighter association year.

All in all, it certainly appears as though more operators are spending more time with each other than ever before. And as the man says, once you meet 'em you have to like 'em!

AN OPERATOR'S SUCCESS STORY

From A Rented Pingame To A \$100,000 Building


TRENTON, N. J.—When Trenton Amusement Company announced its new name, Pearl Vending Service, Inc., several months ago, it marked the end of a quarter century under the old company name, a firm which was founded in 1938 on the promise of a rented pingame. The firm has pro-gressed to where it is considered among the top coin machine operating companies in this section of the coun-try.

try. The newly named firm has been fitted out this year with a new build-ing, a 10,000 square foot plant rep-resenting an investment of more than \$100,000. Unlike the late 1930's when the company's sole auto serviced a the company's sole auto serviced a handful of machines from a small shop, Pearl's staff of twenty employees now services hundreds of locations from a network of seventeen radio-dispatched vehicles with all types of coin-operated equipment.

Same Personnel

Same Personnel Many things have changed since the early days, but the personnel re-main the same. Hy Pearl, founder of Trenton Amusement, is president of Pearl Vending, and the former drug-gist from the Bronx continues to be the driving force behind the New Jersey operating company. After re-ceiving his degree in 1933 from the Brooklyn College of Pharmacy, Long Island University, Hy Pearl opened up shop and mixed prescriptions for about five years before renting his first pingame and leaving the drug business behind. "I couldn't afford to buy the games, but rented them from a Trenton distributor," recalls Hy. From pingames, Pearl branched out into juke boxes, and eventually op-erated all types of machines. The firm then entered into the vending field with cigarettes, has expanded the vending operation to include candy, cold drink and coffee machines and presently operates in several Jer-sev schools. and presently operates in several Jer-

and presently operates in several Jer-sey schools. Pearl Vending Service, Inc. is pres-ently an important part of several drawing board plans in the Central Jersey and Eastern Pennsylvania areas with blueprints calling for fun-spots to be equipped with Pearl ma-chines. The operation already includes many bowling alleys and discount shopping centers. "We're working toward bringing our vending opera-tions up to the level of our present amusement machine business," stated

Pearl during an interview with Cash Box last week. "We're signing loca-tions which require at least a mini-mum of three service calls per week. Anything less than this minimum doesn't fit into our expansion plans," said Pearl. The firm has always serv-iced its emuscient methings once each iced its amusement machines once each week and places a great deal of im-portance on juke box programming. The average number of record changes

The average number of record changes per location is approximately four new disks per week, or about twice the figure generally quoted from in-dustry sources. Hy's older brother Harry Pearl, a well-known personality in the coin machine business led the way so to speak, for the other Pearl brothers, when he entered the coin machine business many years ago. Harry today continues to operate routes in the

business many years ago. Harry today continues to operate routes in the Florida area with several amusement centers operating in the Miami sec-tion of the State. "One by one we followed Harry into the business," said Hy, joined at Tren-ton Amusement in 1942 by his brother Irv who today is vice-president and treasurer of the Pearl company. Irv's time is spent primarily in customer It's who today is vice-president and treasurer of the Pearl company. Irv's time is spent primarily in customer relations, an important part of the Pearl progress over the years. Brother Murray is secretary of the company and is an inside man. Isadore operates today in the Lakewood, New Jersey area, and is in close contact with the family. Few firms make progress today without the financial help of the local banks and lending firms. While Pearl is no exception, the company does differ from others in that it attributes a major part of its successful growth to the New Jersey banks and specific-ally the personnel of those banks who have worked with the firm since 1946.

An Understanding Banker

At that time the coin machine in-At that time the coin machine in-dustry wasn't considered an A-1 credit risk for most banks but Mr. Marvin Severen, an executive with the First Trenton National Bank had the fore-sight to understand the operating business and grasped the potential of such a firm as Trenton Amusement, as it was then known. Hy Pearl at-tributes Severa's understanding and as it was then known. Hy Pearl at-tributes Severen's understanding and his initial approval of financial as-sistance, as the beginning of a rela-tionship the company continues to have with banks "without which we could never have attained the position

we hold today." Severen was joined in the loan transactions by First Trenton National execs George House and Bob Chance, two men who have since been responsible for large sums of credit to the Pearl company. Severen re-tired last year and since that time has extended personal references in letter form to other banks stating that "never once in the sixteen years of business dealings with Pearl was a single late payment received" and his letters continue, outlining specific amounts transacted along with verbal praises of the firm's reputation and the personal repetation of Hy Pearl, not often seen under banking letter-heads. The references have opened many doors of credit to the Pearl company. The Trenton Trust Com-pany, another financial institution which has played a part in the growth of the coin machine firm, is to this day a major lender of money not only to Pearl but to the industry in this area. Pearl cites the Messrs. Austin to Pearl but to the industry in this area. Pearl cites the Messrs. Austin and Carty as being instrumental in originating these transactions.





Moore Denies Implicating Congressman

NEW YORK—The bribe trial of a Federal Judge continued last week in New York City after the Judge was indicted along with an assistant U.S. Attorney, for having accepted \$35,000 from Sandy Moore, former juke box distributor in this area. The charges include statements that the money was passed to Federal Justice Vincent L Koogh through an intermediate J. Keogh, through an intermediary, Doctor Robert Erdman, a surgeon, who has known the judge for many years. Purpose of the money was to intercede for Moore in a bankruptcy case.

Late in the week, Moore, who was on the stand all week long, admitted under cross-examination that he had not implicated Rep. Eugene J. Keogh, Democrat from Brooklyn, when he testified before a grand jury last year in an alleged bribery case.

The trial testimony of Moore and of Erdman, a confessed intermediary, has been that both Keogh brothers interceded with Fedral Judge Leo F. Rayfiel, who heard Moore's case and sentenced him to three years in prison last March. The sentence was later reduced to one year for Moore's cooperation with the Government. Anthony Corallo, alias Tony Ducks, has had his name linked with the bribe attempt, but Moore has repeatedly stated that Corallo's aid was only in terms of advice. 

Employment, Control, Safety, Highlight Midwest Regional In Chi

CHICAGO-A great many members of the midwestern division of the National Automatic Merchandising Association attended a two day Regional Meeting last weekend (Friday and Saturday, May 18 & 19) at the Sheraton-Chicago Hotel. Members converged on this city from all over the midwest.

The weekend's business and social programs were obviously so well planned by NAMA's officials and the midwest committee that every session was a highlight during the entire conclave. The affair was planned with the cooperation of the Wisconsin Automatic Merchandising Council, of which Herb A. Geiger, esteemed president of NAMA, is a member. The 1962 Midwestern Regional Meetings Committee is headed by William A. Schmidt, chairman of Indiana Vendors, Inc., Indianapolis, Ind.

Directors are: George W. Dow, William Wrigley, Jr. Co., Inc.; Edward L. Fischer, Tibbals Co., Inc., Cincinnati; Darrell C. McCleary, McCleary Coffee Vending Co., Bloomington, Ill.; William Newman, Interstate Vending Co., Chicago; Edwin H. Nieman, Dean Milk Co., Franklin Park, Ill.; Asher J. Rabin, Automatic Merchandising Corp., Milwaukee; A. E. Stevenson, Industrial Vending Co., of Cleveland, Ohio; and Roy M. Zola, Continental Coffee Co., Chicago. Thomas E. Mc-Carthy, of NAMA, was secretary.

A vital business phase which was scrutinized thoroughly during the two day meet was the problem of selectivity in personnel as route servicemen, and controlling the costly, troublesome employee turnover. Testing was discussed at length by Thomas Hungerford, executive director of NAMA, and A. E. Stevenson, Industrial Vending Co., of Cleveland, as the very best screening facility.

Testing was thoroughly digested by those who attended the Friday evening session, conducted by Stevenson and Hungerford. During the course of this vital step in employment, sample tests were taken by the conventioneers for the purpose of showing them the effectiveness of this phase. Despite the seriousness of testing much good humor was evidenced.

Hungerford, who was introduced by

chairman Bill Schmidt, explained in detail the "Selection Manual for Automatic Merchandising Route Servicemen," which was devised for NAMA member operators. The "Personal History" form, he said, should play a major role in the pre-employment interview. All other phases will then fall in line.

Among the requisites Stevenson considers vital to proper selection of employables are: Physical fitness, prior experience, personal finances (to avoid hiring debt-ridden routemen), family status, education, mechanical aptitude, mental alertness, mathematical aptitude, and (last but not least) honesty.

After the meeting the manufacturers of vending equipment hosted a gala "Bull Session" cocktail party, to give everyone an opportunity to visit and chat for a few hours. The huge Grand Ballroom of the Sheraton-Chicago Hotel was jammed to capacity for this affair.

It was business as usual the first thing Saturday morning as "Controlling Costly Employee Turnover" was dicsussed by William Newman, director of personnel and employee relations for Interstate Vending Co. Newman, who was a former head of personnel under John Edgar Hoover and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, proved to be very expert in his ability to evaluate prospects in the important field of employee relations, and in screening applicants.

He cited as the five basic steps to "upgrade" the selection of new employees the following: (1) Carefully studying the applicant. (2) The careful evaluation of basic requirements immediately. (3) A comprehensive interview (leave "no stone unturned"). (4) Review application thoroughly. (5) Background investigation (leave nothing to outward opinion).

Newman urged the practical use of "responsibility examinations" (such as polygraph examinations) where needed in the selection of responsible route servicemen. This session was followed by an interesting question and answer period.

The final business session, prior to a cocktail hour and the heavily attended lengthy luncheon session, was held in two separate rooms. For the study of "Operating Controls for Successful Vending" NAMA president Herb A. Geiger moderated the discussion in the East Room, for operators with seven employees or more.

Bill Schmidt conducted his session for operators employing six employees or less in the Tropical Room. The strict attention of the visiting operators easily bore out the obvious fact at the outset that all sessions were carefully and well planned.

Meetings and panel discussions were aimed primarily at employee-management relations. Controls discussions were concerned with costs to maintain routes, in which the routeman is very much responsible for an effective, profitable operation.

At the commencement of the luncheon session Tom Hungerford introduced the NAMA directors present, including NAMA president Herb Geiger. He also introduced all of the members of the 1962 Regional Meetings Committee, responsible for this meeting.

A highlight of the luncheon session was an important address by Walter Reed, NAMA's public relations director, and head of the Safety Committee, on "Safety Is Our Business." A film based on the frightfully ominous and fateful boiler explosions which can occur, he augmented his speech in part.

He carefully spelled out NAMA's Safety Program, explaining that the safety manual for hot beverage machines (with slides and records) will be available to members of the association in June, 1962. Also available will be Safety Check Sheets, which are being designed by David Hartley of NAMA.

When received, operators are urged by Reed to complete their checking and compliance of safety measures in hot beverage equipment within four weeks. After which, they are to report to NAMA that they complied. Compliance Certificates will then be sent to them from NAMA headquarters.

He concluded: "45 manufacturers of vending equipment agreed to back up their field representatives towards compliance in the industry's safety measures. "We urge all of you please keep your hot beverage 1 chines 'on the ground' (an obvious minder of the boiler explosions v nessed in the preceding film)-t can't make any money for you 'fly through the air!'

Just prior to Reed's address Thor Hungerford presented NAMA's "M uteman Awards" to ten of the asso tion's members for their constant forts in behalf of the automatic m chandising industry. They are: I Howe, Ray Bovick and Norb Kent, of Michigan. Orville Feathers of diana. Bob Berman and Jerry E of Wisconsin. And Illinoisans M Cockrell, Wally Lareg, Gerald Le and Charles Padula. The awards w made amid the thunderous appla of the luncheon guests.

The two day regional meeting rousingly concluded with a spir talk on "Opportunity Unlimited" Dr. Carl S. Winters, of Oak Park, linois, one of this nation's forem orators. Dr. Winters, a retired Bap minister, has for many years cha pioned the cause of 'skid row' bitues. Laughter reigned supreme Dr. Winters quipped: "Some peo spend the entire evening sowing th wild oats—and, then, in the morn pray for a crop failure!"



Schuster Looks For Improved Earnings For Second Half Of '62; Cites 'Celebrity' **Deliveries, Record Retail Sales, Consolidation**

CHICAGO—Frederick L. Schuster, Board Chairman of Automatic Can-teen Company of America, last week anticipated "improved earnings" for the second six months of the com-pany's fiscal year ending Sept. 29, 1962, despite slightly lower first-half earnings this year. The company reported sales and operating revenues for the first six months ended March 17, 1962, of \$99,-544,205, with net earnings of \$1,665,-735 or 25¢ per share on 6,766,065 shares outstanding.


Boltins Fielder Match 11, 1802, 01, 955, 735 or 25¢ per share on 6,766,065 shares outstanding.
These figures compare to first-half 1961 sales and operating income of \$83,758,784, and earnings after taxes of \$1,884,207 or 30¢ per share. Per share earnings give effect to a 1% stock dividend paid Nov. 1, 1961. Provision for Federal income taxes was \$1,333,000 this year, versus \$1,600,-000 last year. 1961 dates have been adjusted to include Joel Hurt Factors, Inc., acquired Dec. 18, 1961.
Second-quarter 1962 sales and operating revenues amounted to \$49,-824,550, an increase of \$41,545,283 for the like period a year ago. Net earnings for the second quarter were \$542,354 or 8¢ per share, compared to \$669,745 and 11¢ per share for the second quarter last year.
Schuster said that "the lower second-quarter earnings, despite a 14% increase in retail sales, are the result of late delivery of our new line of Celebrity vending machines. The delays resulted from an intensified testing and quality control program designed to perfect all machines—



nearly 30 models—before delivery to the field. "However," he pointed out, "the new Celebrity units have been com-ing off the line in growing quantity since the middle of March, and we now are working at a maximum rate to meet delivery schedules. "Continued record sales at the re-tail levels, a complete coordination of manufacturing procedures at our plants in Grand Rapids, Mich., Whip-pany, N.J. and Rockford, Ill., plus the continued excellent performance of our finance divisions, all give every indication that the efforts Automatic Canteen has directed toward consoli-dating and digesting acquisitions made during the past two years are now beginning to pay off."

Expect Nassau County To Sign Vend Contract

MINEOLA, N.Y. - Nassau County buildings will be spotted with vending machines if a contract now before the Board of Supervisors is approved, it was learned last week. A County spokesman said that cigaret, drink, candy, sandwich and milk units will be placed as a convenience for County employees and visitors. Expected gross was set at between \$25,000 and \$50,000 annually. The County has not decided on what it considers an equitable arrangement however.

The acquisition was made for 30,-000 shares of American Univend common stock, and a debenture of \$250,000. American Univend will also guarantee a Kiddielane bank note of \$500,000.
