DECISION **ON ARMADA**

Next week the American Record Manufacturers and Distributors Association, (ARMADA) holds its Fourth Annual Convention June 28, 29 and 30 at the Fountainbleu Hotel in Miami Beach, Fla. And if our judgment is accurate, this convention promises to be the most interesting since the organization's formation three years ago.

The primary reason for the keen interest in this year's meet is the state of transition now facing ARMADA members. For the past few months, a number of key distributors have been pioneering a movement to separate manufacturers and distributors as partners in the association and establish a new organization to be run solely by distributors for the benefit of distributors with manufacturers acting as associate members.

In the short span of time since this movement was begun, it has won the support of every distributor with whom we've discussed the subject. Adding further strength to the movement has been the absence of opposition on the part of manufacturers. As a matter of fact, many manufacturers, realizing the difficulties facing distributors in the rapidly changing and increasingly competitive record industry, have intimated that they would support

such a move since they feel it would result in an association which distribs have sorely needed for the longest time.

Distributors themselves, after a difficult business year, seem to have awakened to the fact that they should have made this move long ago.

As a result, distributor attendance at this year's meeting should be better than it's ever been before. We understand that many key distributors, among them some of the most solid veterans of the distributing business, who refused to attend or be part of previous conventions because they could not see any benefit in an organization run by such vastly different factions as manufacturers and distributors, expect to attend the up-coming affair to support the movement for a distributor-run association.

We, as a trade paper, are keenly interested in the Fountainbleu Convention. And we urgently hope that all indie distribs are equally interested and will be on the spot if and when fellow distributors ask for support. A young, new organization needs as much assistance as it can get, especially in its formative stage. Every distrib owes it to himself to be there.

Pick of the Week

THINGS" (2:33) [Adaris BMI-Darin] "JAILER BRING ME WATER" (2:25) [Adaris BMI-Darin] BOBBY DARIN (Atco 6229)

Darin, whose most recent chart-maker was the rockin'-twist'er, "What'd I Say," has a refreshing change-of-pace entry this time out. It's a light-hearted romantic jumper, dubbed "Things," that Darin and a femme chorus amble over in easy-on-the-ears style. Backing's a shufflin' new adaptation of a folk oldie, "Aunt Rhody."

"MARY'S LITTLE LAMB" (2:05) [Aldon BMI—Weil, Mann] "THE LIFE OF THE PARTY" (2:02) [Allied ASCAP—Dee, Kent] JAMES DARREN (Colpix 644)

The actor-singer's big hit string (currently it's "Conscience") should soon see the addition of this delightful ditty derived from the nursery rhyme "Mary's Little Lamb." It's a real-pleasing easy-twist'er that Darren and the Stu Phillips ork-chorus wax with coin-catching authority. Has that 'top-ten' look. The high-speed twist entry, "Life Of The Party," also appears to be a solid chart-maker.

"NOTHING NEW" (2:06) "DANCE WITH MR. DOMINO" [Travis BMI-Maddux, Jessup, (1:56)[Travis BMI-Bartholomew, Domino, Bartholomew]

FATS DOMINO (Imperial 5863)

FATS DOMINO (Imperial Sols) Fats Domino comes thru with another pair of chart-bound performances on his latest Imperial stand. On one side the artist requests, in delightful twist style, that we "Dance Along With Mr. Domino." The other end, "Nothing New (Same Old Thing)," finds Fats at his pulsating, ballad-with-a-beat best. Top notch support from his New Orleans instrumen-talists on this money-in-the-bank duo.

"THE BALLAD OF PALLADIN" (1:56) [Time BMI—Western, Boone, Rolfe] "THE WILD WESTERNERS" (2:14) [Columbia, Linduane BMI—Eddy, Hazlewood] DUANE EDDY (RCA Victor 8047)

The popular TV theme from "Have Gun, Will Travel," "The Ballad Of Palladin," is a cinch to be all over the airwaves in no time flat. It's the subject of Duane Eddy's newest RCA Victor stand and it's a galloping opus that features a first rate ork backdrop, for Eddy's fine guitarman-ship, supplied by Bob Thompson. Pairing, the title tune from the up-coming flick, "The Wild Westerners," is also a fascinating thumper that can head to hitsville.

"YOU SHOULD'A TREATED ME RIGHT" (3:15) [Saturn BMI—Turner] "SLEEPLESS" (2:30) [Saturn BMI—Turner] IKE & TINA TURNER (Sue 765)

Ike & Tina Turner should soon be represented on the hit lists with this new Sue stand. It's an infectious twist'er, tabbed "You Should'a Treated Me Right," that has Tina brightly belting against a sock femme and Ike Turner-led instrumental support. Another pop-r&b triumph for the artists. Fine beat-ballad blueser on the other end can also score.

"BETWEEN THE WINDOW AND THE PHONE" (2:17) [Hit-Way BMI-Allen, Jackson]

"I MISUNDERSTOOD" (2:26) [Central Songs BMI-Goodma, Jackson] WANDA JACKSON (Capitol 4785)

Lark, who's currently clicking on the pop and country charts with "If I Cried Everytime You Hurt Me," has a potent follow-up in her new Capitol outing. It's a heartbreaking, slightly up beat shuffler, labeled "Between The Window And The Phone," that Wanda renders with touch-ing sincerity. The tender, easy goin' ballad weeper, "I Misunderstood," can also garner dual-mart chart recognition.

"DOWN ON THE BEACH" (2:16) [Tideland BMI-Maresca, Moratto] "MARY JANE" (2:24) [Broadway ASCAP-Maresca] ERNIE MARESCA (Seville 119)

Maresca, who busted thru on the London-distributed Seville line with "Shout, Shout (Knock Yourself Out)," can go into the summer months with another strong Top 100 lid. Side to eye is "Down On The Beach," a joyful twist-mashed potato affair that deftly employs hit teen sounds over the past year. Flip is a twistin' name-song.

"LA BOMBA" (2:31)

[Bright Tunes BMI-Adapt: Margo, Margo, Medress, Siegal] "A TOKEN OF LOVE" (2:43) [Lionel ASCAP-Kaiman] THE TOKENS (RCA Victor 8052)

"La Bomba," a short-while-back chart triumph for the late Ritchie Valens, can again make the rounds—this time under the Tokens vocal guidance. Fellas are in a happy frame of mind as they enthusiastically knock out the sparkling handclapper. Spirited support from Sammy Lowe's instrumentalists. Companion piece is a haunting folk-flavored affair.

TED TAYLOR (Okeh 7154)

(B+) "DON'T LIE" (2:08) Ron-nant BMI—Taylor] Looks like another winning side for Ted Taylor. The chanter's professional vocal talents are put to good use on this rockin' uptempo happy blues affair. The side should step out in the sales department department.

(B+) "PRETENDING LOVE" (2:25) [Romant BMI—Tay-lor] On this side the songster renders a first-rate pop-styled ballad with some catchy lyrics. Jockeys should dig the wax.

VINCE HILL

(London International 10514)

(B+) "THE RIVER'S RUN DRY" (B+) "THE RIVER'S RUN DRY" (2:09) [Southern ASCAP— Worth] Hill, formerly a member of a popular English vocal crew, the Rain-drops, goes solo under exciting teen-beat circumstances. His strong deliv-ery is surrounded by first-rate rock-a-string color. U.S. teeners are in for a sock-rock treat.

(B) "NOT ANY MORE" (2:26) [Southern ASCAP — White, Charles] Good legit ballad has Hill often sounding like Tony Bennett. Performance is well-worth deejay spins spins.

GENE KENNEDY (Old Town 1121)

(B+) "DON'T TEAR MY PLAY-HOUSE DOWN" [Co Par-Forest BMI—Mack] Effective upbeat blueser from the warbler and his combo backing, topped by a strong funky harmonica solo throughout. Could got attention Could get attention.

(B) "I WISH I KNEW" [Hi-Hoss BMI—Kennedy, Taylor] Cozy romantic musings by Kennedy.

DAVE GUARD (Capitol 4787)

(B+) "PLANE WRECK AT LOS GATOS (Deportees)" (4:35)
[Ludlow BMI—Guthrie, Hoffman] Guard, former member of the Kings-ton Trio, and his new group, The Whiskeyhill Singers, offer a sensitive survey of a lovely number (sounding somewhat like "Vaya Con Dios") about Mexican wetbacks. Could get action if it makes enough turntables.

3) "RIDE ON RAILROAD BILL" (2:09) [Granada BMI -Arr. & Adapt. by Guard, Faryar, enske, Wheat] Lusty folk display (B) Henske, by the team.

DEAN RANDOLPH (Saturn 317)

(B+) "FAIR WEATHER FRIEND" (2:22) [Saturn—Matt] Singer and his ork-chorus backdrop do a pro, bright rhythm job on the catchy ro-mantic. Date, heard on the Philly-based Bomarc Records' affiliate, has the kind of rock color that could be heard from heard from.

"THIS GIRL" (2:18) (Saturn (B)-Matt] Easier beat doings. Number has an inviting melodic line.

THE 20TH CENTURY STRINGS (20th Fox 222)

(B+) "THE GREEN LEAVES OF SUMMER" (1:58) [Leo Feist ASCAP— Webster, Tiomkin] Big ork plays the lovely tune—getting new Top 100 attention via the reading by Kenny Ball (Kapp)—with much Latin-styled appeal. Radio audiences will appreciate spins on this com-manding reading. Track stems from a Hugh Montenegro-conducted LP, "Great Themes Of The Soaring '60's."

(B) "(Theme from) KLONDIKE" (2:08) [Hummable ASCAP— Mizzy] This is a TV main-title, also culled from the LP.

JIMMY FORREST ORCH.

(Prestige 223)

(B) "EXPERIMENT IN TER-ROR" (2:25) [Mancini] Join-ing many a disk reading of the pic theme is this haunting outing by the sax-led Forrest ork. A date that holds the listener's interest.

(B) "SOFT SUMMER BREEZE" (3:08) [Heywood] Swingin' band styling for the oldie that's been neglected of late.

THE UNIVERSALS (Shepherd 2200)

(B+) "A LOVE ONLY YOU CAN GIVE" (2:10) [Shat-Shep BMI—Collie, McVey] Lead songster pleasingly relates the tender lovey-dovey, while his fellow warblers add a good, mostly chant backing. Could move for the Hollywood-based label if it gets enough exposure.

(B) "I'M IN LOVE" (2:27) [Triphi BMI—Fugua, Carroll] Somewhat similar sounding sentiments.

JIMMY RIDDLE (Todd 1074)

(B+) "LET'S GO" (2:05) [Cigmo BMI-Martin] All who dig the twist and the general teen-market are in luck here. Musicians score with a solid romp offering, led by a funky upbeat harmonica. Could happen.

Storyline concerns the history of a 'lifer,' Robert Stroud, who, while in prison, became one of the world's foremost orni-thologists. As the Highwaymen effectively relate the story in song the actor hands in a stirring recitation. Could be a real big money-maker. The calypso favorite makes a soft and lovely return on the flip.

"SHELLEY!"—Shelley Fabares—Colpix CP 426 Teen fans of Shelley Fabares should come out quickly for this hot album featuring the young lark rendering in addition to her recent #1 out of "Johnny Angel" ten other popular tunes with superb range and pitch. Stu Phillips has come up with some first-class arrangements for the thrush who proves that she has an original, feelingful vocal style on this set. She belts out "Love Let-ters," "True Love" and "Funny Face" with win-ning authority. The LP has enough built-in suc-cess ingredients to reach the upper reaches of chartdom real fast.



"BRAVO GIOVANNI"—Original Cast Columbia KOL 5800

KOL 5800 Most critics agreed that "Bravo Giovanni" ended the 1961-62 Broadway season on a lively note, with most of the praise going to Cesare Siepi, the famed Met basso who is making his musical com-edy debut in the show. It's Siepi who dominates the original-cast LP, which gets bravos for its enthusiasm if not for melody. One winning tune is "Ah! Camminare." Matinee-idol status of Siepi can get strong sales for the album.

"DR. FEELGOOD AND THE INTERNS"-Okeh OKM 12101

OKM 12101 Dr. Feelgood (Willie Perryman) and the Interns take advantage of their current chart-rider of "Dr. Feel-Good" to name this initial album entry. The group's sounds are in the pop-r&b vein and there's plenty room for dancing as they un-leash their professional talents on a potent group of twisters. The interns provide the instrumental support as Perryman offers, in addition to his big-gie, "I'll Give Anything," "No More" and "What's Up, Doc." Disk should spark healthy sales.



"JULIE AND CAROL AT CARNEGIE HALL"— Julie Andrews, Carol Burnett—Columbia OS 2240 Here's double-barreled treat featuring the versa-tile talents of Julie Andrews and Carol Burnett that is sure to please a host of record buyers. The set contains the songs from the duo's TV special last week and much of the material should still be fresh in most minds. Highlights of this quality package include "No Mozart Tonight," "Mean-time" and a potent group of tunes tracing the his-tory of musical comedy. The album should step out lively. out lively.



"TEMPTATION"-John Keating-London SP 44019

44019 Here is another in the series of attractively pack-aged phase 4 stereo albums from London, this time featuring the orchestra and singers of John Keating. The orkster, one time arranger for Ted Heath, shows inventive creativity in this LP of standards which includes "Blues In The Night," "Love For Sale," "Maria," "St. Louis Blues," and "Jezebel." Keating uses a full orchestra with a block of jazz instruments to good advantage. A first rate package for audiophiles.



"YOU ARE MINE"-Frankie Avalon-Chancel-lor CHL 5027

lor CHL 5027 Frankie Avalon cashes in on the success of his recent chartrider of "You Are Mine" to tag this Chancellor LP outing of popular items. The young chanter fares extremely well on the ballads here effectively utilizing his new adult approach. In addition to his biggie, the songster belts out some smooth renditions of "I'll Buy That Dream," "I Care For You" and "The More I See You." One of the best sets that Avalon has cut in quite a while. Plenty of sales potential here.

"THE WILDEST COMES HOME"-Louis Prima

"THE WILDEST COMES HOME"—Louis Prima —Capitol ST 1723 The gravel-voiced Prima, backed again by Sam Butera and The Witnesses, lashes out with a deck of wild vocals in the distinctive Prima manner. The chanter runs the gamut of variety with Cole Porter melodies to the hard beat of the twist. Sam Butera does one vocal chore in "All Night Long," and Prima essays "Lover Come Back To Me," "You're Just In Love," and "Twist All Night." LP is a sock item which is guaranteed to delight his fans. fans.

"ITALY"-Roger Laredo-London SP 44014 A bevy of traditional Italian melodies are given some unusual treatment on this phase 4 stereo production from London with orchestra conducted by Roger Laredo. Special audio effects are achieved with the use of tambourines, chimes, and a variety of stringed instruments in this set which includes "Mattinata," "Come Back To Sorrento," "Anema E Core," and the still popular "Arrive-derci Roma." The disk includes the technical ex-planation of phase 4 for stereo buffs.

"LIMBO ROCK"—The Tides and Merry Melody Singers—Mercury SR 60714 This pulsating package from Mercury combines the authentic rhythms of the Caribbean limbo with a collection of tunes which are for the most part standard. The Tides use the seldom heard gut-string guitar, sax, and vocal chorus to carry the melody in an unusual set of arrangements. First rate bands are "Matilda, Matilda," "Let There Be Limbo," and "Caravan." The limbo is catching on and this disk could enlist many new followers. followers.

"THE TWELVE GREATEST HITS OF THE SAN REMO FESTIVAL 1962"—Various Artists —Epic LF 18021 The San Remo Festival ranks as one of Europe's most important musical events and this Epic disk offers a fine group of this year's winners. The set, recorded in Italy, is a first-rate international item and the dozen tunes here are some of the best to come out of the continent in the past year. In-cluded on the album are Claudio Villa's "Addio ... Addio," Milva's "Gondoli Gondola" and Gia-como Rondinella's "Il Nostro Amore." An attrac-tive cover should help the package in the sales department.

"OFF SHORE"—Leo Diamond—Reprise R-6024 Warm, languid melodies with an easy beat just fine for relaxed listening and dancing are played beautifully by the harmonica of Leo Diamond on this new outing for Reprise. With lush orchestral backing by Frank Hunter, reminiscent of the big bands of the forties, Diamond gives his rhythmic interpretations of such goodies as "Canadian Sunset," "Beyond The Sea," "By The Waters Of Minnetonka," and "Moon River." Hawkins' vocals are rock 'n roll styled and delivered with sock in such numbers as "Do The Twist," "Paulina," "Do It," and "What Can I Do (To Make You Love Me)." This disk, another in the seemingly unending flow of twisters, in-dicates the dance craze is still a hot item. The teen set will like this one.

"TONY MARTELL AND HIS NEW ORCHES-TRA PLAY FOR YOU"—Philips PHS 600 021 Trumpeter-orkster Tony Martell leads a compact group of nine men through an interesting variety on musical paces on this danceable entry from Philips. Martell has the ability to make his unit sound like twice their size on a hard-driving num-ber like "In A Persian Market" and can turn around and play cool jazz with equal authority as evidenced on "Sunny And Cool." The general spirit and superb musicianship of band ranks it as one of the best new groups to come around in quite a while. onu ez antella quite a while.



"EVERYBODY TWIST"—Warren Covington— Decca DL 74271 Warren Covington and his band give out with a bold and brassy big band sound on a dozen of the currently favored twisters. Drawing from the ma-terial of Hank Ballard, Joey Dee and Bill Black, the orkster lashes out with sock arrangements of "The Twist," "Peppermint Twist (Part 1)," "Twist Her," and a bouncy track entitled "Mama And Papa Twist." The LP is an unusually good twist entry with appeal for both adults and kids.



"LET'S TWIST TO THE MUSIC OF MY FAIR LADY"—Ernie Held—Pride LMP 1001 Here's an interesting package from Pride pre-senting a flock of tunes from "My Fair Lady" in smart, uptempo twist settings. H. B. Barnum has come up with some extremely danceable arrange-ments which are rendered with a fresh zest by Ernie Held's ork. The tunes are suitable for doing the twist, mashed potatoes and the hully gully. Plenty of fun to be had here.

"HERE'S THE SOLO VOICE OF DON BAR-BOUR"—Capitol ST 1716 Don Barbour, a member of the Four Freshmen until his untimely death last October, sings a col-lection of ballads and blues numbers on this, his only solo album. The chanter has a fine blues de-livery and receives top quality assistance from Shelly Manne and Bob Bain, who arranged and conducted the session. Some excellent tracks are "Where Are You," "Cry Me A River," "Baltimore Oriole," and "Got The Gate On The Golden Gate" from Mel Torme's "California Suite." The disk could make some noise.

"THE SPICE OF LIFE"—Sophie Tucker—Mer-cury-Wing SRW 16215 The subtle, tongue-in-cheek wit of Sophie Tucker is given wide range in this collection of recitations

is given wide range in this collection of recitations from her nitery appearances. The ditties are spicy, sophisticated, and much of the humor is by in-ference as opposed to the more earthy utterances of many of her contemporaries. Although the disk is unsuitable for air play, there is some enter-taining listening to be had in such numbers as "I'm Having More Fun Since I'm Sixty," "Mr. Fink," "There's A Lot Of Little Boy," and "I'm Starting All Over Again." Her many fans will enjoy this set.







"MIKE FRIGHT"-The Eligibles-Mercury SR

"MIKE FRIGHT"—The Eligibles—Mercury SR 60710 The Eligibles showcase their talents and versatil-ity in this set taken from their nite club act which features pop standards, spirituals, folk songs, and novelty numbers. The group takes a direct ap-proach to the melodies included and gives out with some fine harmony in all the numbers. Top-notch tracks are "Anything Can Make You Sing," "Come Back, Music," and "Zing, Went The Strings Of My Heart." An excellent LP that could spark good sales.

"ED KENNEY'S HAWAII"—ABC-Paramount-ABC-406

ABC-406 Love songs, songs of unrequited love, and songs dedicated to the beauty of Hawaii are given au-thentic vocal treatment by Ed Kenney in this LP of island melodies. With the Chick Floyd orches-tra, the songster is in fine voice as he surveys "Sleepy Lagoon," "Beyond The Reef," "Moon Of Manakoora," and "The Sand And The Sea." A top-drawer set of Hawaiian tunes.

"SOME OF MY FAVORITES"—Ferlin Husky— Capitol ST 1720

Capitol ST 1720 Ferlin Husky sings his current country-chart single "The Waltz You Saved For Me" along with a host of others which have been successful for the country chanter. Assisted by Kitty and Smiley Wilson, Husky delivers such good items as "My Adobe Hacienda," "I Fall To Pieces," "Tumblin" Tumbleweeds," and "Out Of A Clear Blue Sky." Husky's delivery is feelingful and straightforward and his coterie of loyal followers should help make this a strong seller.

"FLUTES FRONT & CENTER"—Ray Rasch and the Pipers 10—Warner Brothers WS 1454 Warner Brothers has come up with an interesting, off-beat package to produce some of best and most professional flute music ever put on wax on this listenable item. Organist Ray Rasch has assem-bled an all-star group of ten concert flutists for the session. In addition to doing all the scoring here Rasch injects his throaty organ to give the flute ensemble a potent tonal counterpart. The crew swings in top-drawer fashion on "All Of Me," "Heart And Soul" and "Isle Of Capri."

ACCORDION ITALIANO"-Angelo Di Pippo-Fiesta FLP 1342

Fiesta FLP 1342 Romantic Italian melodies have always lent them-selves to accordion interpretations. Angelo Di Pippo effectively captures all the warmth and high-spirits of Italy on this pleasant easy-listen-ing outing from Fiesta. The accordionist does not rely on gimmicks but plays honestly with feeling and sensitivity on "Tarantella Napoletana," "La Spagnola" and "Marina." Plenty of programming potential here.

"SINGING ON SUNDAY"—Kitty Wells—Decca DL 74270

Here is another fine entry in Decca's month-long Here is another fine entry in Decca's month-long program of country music promotion. The best-selling talents of Kitty Wells are put to good use in this album of country-treated gospel songs. The tunes, some of which were penned by Jimmie Davis, Roy Acuff and John Loudermilk, are rev-erent but spirited and in true gospel tradition. Included are the title tune, "Paul's Ministry," "I'll Reap My Harvest In Heaven," and "That Glory Bound Train." Kitty Wells' legion of fans will appreciate this effort.

"CAROLYN HESTER"—Columbia CL 1796 Folksingers are almost always male. Occasionally a girl with a fresh sound, such as a Joan Baez, comes along and proves that there are women who can sing well. Such as an individual new tal-ent is Carolyn Hester. On this her first album for Columbia, the lark displays an emotion-packed, stunning, wide-range voice that immediately sets her apart from the rest of the new-wave folk art-ists. "OVERTURES ON PARADE"—Band Of The Coldstream Guards—RCA Victor International **FSP-105**

FSP-105 The Band of the Coldstream Guards plays with the same colorful brilliance it displays on the parade ground in this exciting album of famous overtures from RCA Victor International. The band sets the pace with the overture to "Carmen" and includes the overtures to "Die Fledermaus," "Light Cavalry," "The Barber Of Seville," and "The Merry Wives Of Windsor." Under the baton of Major Douglas A. Pope, the Coldstream Guards' offering should appeal to both pop and classical devotees.

"DANCING UNDER PARIS SKIES"—Ernie Heckscher—MGM E 4024 Here are a host of Parisian tunes played in the sophisticated manner of the Ernie Heckscher or-chestra which does them in popular dance tempos. Van Alexander's arrangements are bright and lilting and very appropriate for a set which in-cludes "La Vie En Rose," "C'Est Si Bon," "Poor People Of Paris," "Milord," and "La Mer." Pleas-ant late hours listening.

"THE CATCH CLUB IN PERSON AT THE ASH GROVE"—Capitol ST 1726 This off-beat offering from Capitol introduces an enterprising trio of men who sing old English "Catches"—hence the Catch Club. Sung in the manner of the round, the interweaving of the lyrics makes them racy and flavored with double entendre. A few interesting "catches" are "Sir Walter," "I'll Tell My Mother," and "Hodge Told Sue." The disk is clever and different but has limited appeal and is not recommended for air play. play.

"ENAMORADA VERY MUCH IN LOVE"-Rob-erto Yanes-Columbia EX 5072 Here's a pleasant geared-for-dancing set from Columbia which showcases the vocal talents of Roberto Yanes offering a warm group of slow-paced and uptempo items. The album was re-corded in Argentina, and all the tunes here have a listenable, danceable Latin flavor. With a fine backing from Lucio Milena's ork the chanter renders "Enamorada," "Tu Mentira" and "De Desafio" in an appealing romantic style. Many terpsichorean delights to be had here.

"FOLKSONG: USA"—Robbinsdale Chorale — Audio Fidelity AFSD 5965 Here's a rich colorful package of dozen popular American folk items rendered with verve and style by the Robbinsdale Chorale. The group kicks things off on this Audio Fidelity outing with "Yellow Rose Of Texas" and dish up some mel-odic, striking renditions of "A-Roving" and "John Henry." There is enough good stuff in the disk to appeal to a wide variety of record buyers. A potent LP for spinners.





"TIJUANA MOODS"—Charlie Mingus—RCA Victor LPM 2533 Here's an interesting session cut six years ago featuring Charlie Mingus utilizing his now ex-pected potent rhythmic power on five self-penned Spanish-flavored items. The Mingus sound is emo-tional, highly personal and extremely listenable with close attention paid to tonal qualities. The set boasts some attractive solos from the crew. Mingus shines as he renders "Tijuana Gift Shop," "Los Mariachis" and "Flamingo." The LP should score with all of the artist's many fans.

"GOOD OLD BROADWAY"—Coleman Hawkins —Moodsville MV 23 Coleman Hawkins offers proof positive of his ability for the improvisation of ballads on this top-notch listenable outing of Broadway sturdies. The Hawkins sax takes a romantic, free-flowing melodic line while the rhythm section goes through the tunes in a subtle yet commanding cohesiveness. Hawkins is in complete control as renders "I Talk To The Trees," "Strange Music" and "Get Out Of Town." The set should bring out a host of jazzophiles. a host of jazzophiles.

"PLAY THE THING"-Marlowe Morris Quintet

"PLAY THE THING"—Marlowe Morris Quintet —Columbia CL 1819 Recently, organists are becoming to be regarded as significant forces in small jazz groups. Un-fortunately, most of them detract from the sound of their groups. Marlowe Morris evidences a subtle, rhythmic style on this Columbia set that ranks him with the top organ men around today. Morris gives the boys in his group a chance for some expressive solo work and effect is extremely danceable and listenable as they offer superior arrangements of "Stompy Jones," "Moonlight In Vermont" and "I Loves You Porgy."

"STORMY MONDAY"—Lou Rawls, Les McCann —Capitol ST 1714 For his premiere album Lou Rawls is teamed up with the Les McCann trio for a fine, free-flowing, jazz session on some articulate blues lines. The chanter displays a fine feeling for the blues as he renders a dozen gems here with the authority of a long-successful pro. The songster injects a fine, commercial r&b touch to some jazz arrange-ments of "God Bless The Child," "In The Eve-ning," and "If I Do." Disks loom as a sure noise-maker. maker.

"HOOTIN' 'N TOOTIN' "-Fred Jackson-Blue Note 4094

Note 4094 The current trend of soul jazz has given way to added vitality in the basic jazz idiom. Colorful melodic lines coupled with fast-moving changes offers individual artists more room for personal expression than ever before. On this Blue Note tenor saxist Fred Jackson showcases his ability to stamp his distinctive musical mark on each of the seven solf-menned tunes included in the sevthe seven self-penned tunes included in the ses-sion. With an able assist from Earl Vandyke on organ, Willie Jones on guitar and Wilbert Hogan on drums Jackson turns in top-drawer renditions of "Preach Brother" and "Way Down Home."

"NO STRINGS"—No Strings Sextet—Columbia CL 1817

CL 1817 Peter Matz, who conducted the No Strings or-chestra on Broadway, performs the same chore on this instrumental LP of the Rodgers score and also doubled as arranger. The melodies are de-veloped along modern jazz lines with effective in-strumentation provided by the oboe, English Horn and bassoon. Masterful musicianship is displayed throughout the disk as the group reads "The Sweetest Sounds," "An Orthodox Fool," and "Look No Further." Jazzophiles will go for this one.



Early this year he toured Japan and upon return signed with ABC-Paramount. "Let Me Belong To You" was his first Am-Par hit which he followed with a host of other big-gies. 



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

Still the biggest individual problem to the record industry in Australia is the sad plight of the singles market and although trade executives have been little—if any—improvement although singles production for March was a little better than February. The unusual thing about the present state of the industry is that for ten of the twelve months ending March 1962, 12" album production exceeded singles production! This fact alone will give readers of Cash Box some idea of conditions here and they will fully realize that there are definite and strong grounds for serious concern over the singles market in Australia. Some two to three years ago it was nothing unusual to achieve sales of 20,000 and upwards for good hits with a real smash doing anything from 60,000 to 100,000. Now a good hit is battling to do around 8,000 and a smasheroo is doing well to get beyond 30,000. In view of the seriousness of the situation, it is felt that the Manufacturers Association should take a long, hard look at what must surely be considered a major problem. It is further felt that there has to be sound reason(s) for such alarming fall-off in singles action and some effort to stimulate sales should be taken at once before the singles market vanishes completely! ("Anoko-no...," and "Sore-ga..." were then released as flip sides). Columbia and Hideo Murata Fan Club recently honored Hideo for his cur-rent smash—"Ohsho." The deck has sold over 30,000 copies in 6 months.

Willie Nelson is due in from the road real soon to cut an album in Nashville for Liberty. The chanter is currently riding the charts with "Touch Me."



Editorial

THE HIGH COST OF SERVICE

As competition grows keener with each passing year all levels of the coin machine business have found an increasing need for service. As the need increases, naturally the cost of supplying customers with this much-needed adjunct of sales increases proportionately. The factories are finding that more service schools are needed and in this area more manhours are required. A service representative to day can be found on the scene whenever a new ma chine is introduced, or whenever a showing of any kind is conducted whether it's a local show, a state wide convention, or an individual distributor's at tempt to personally hold a specialized session or one type of equipment. The more this demand for factory representation grows, naturally the greater the cost burden on the manufacturer. He must, how ever, be prepared to assist along these lines, in order that the product receive the utmost in merchandis ing support. Without the service, the operator wil go elsewhere.

On the wholesaler level, distributor parts depart ments have grown to the point where a wholesaler has a sizable investment in inventory always on the books, and as usual the investment means money that may have been used in other areas of the busin ness. Road men, repair work, installation costs trucking, to say nothing of the cost of financing sales, all add up to large sums spent, not necessarily on sales, but on service which is fast becoming one and the same thing. For while the corned beef sand wich is served at a phonograph service school, the hope is that the recipient will continue to purchase this same brand machine as time goes on, (and the price of corned beef is up, or haven't you heard)

The operator, the man who must deal with the location owner, can easily run into the red on the service problem if he does not conduct this part of the business efficiently. It's easy to say that a certain number of service calls must be made within a mini mum number of days, or week, but the cost of mak ing these calls is very high. Records, pool cues, balls clean title strips, new machines, payrolls, to name a few items, and of course, the loan and the bonus all come under the heading of service, regardless of what many ops would like to call them. He can in deed run himself ragged, and into bankruptcy if he does not follow a predetermined plan to service his location. To cut down is sure suicide.

To talk turkey beforehand, preferably at con tract signing time, outlining what will be offered in return for a mutually agreed upon commission ar rangement, is the only way in which this problem can be handled. As the service costs increase, how ever, the operator must realize that either collec tions must increase or the income must decrease. A knowledge of your operating costs is the only way in which you can keep your eye peeled for a shrink ing net profit.

So it seems as though each one has his own service problem and in each instance it's a costly one. But without service in this day and age a business can hardly stay alive. Once it's recognized for what it is—a long term investment in the future—we can handle it more efficiently and usually at a lesser cost.

CHICAGO-The effort to acquire the services of a new executive director to supervise the multitude of affairs of the Music Operators of America As-sociation (MOA) was augmented dur-ing the latter part of last week, June 8 & 9, in the Chicago headquarters. Several widely known officials of the organization's executive committee arrived in this city Friday morning to be available for interviews with some of the applicants for the important post.

MOA executive committee members on hand were Clinton S. Pierce, chairman of the board of directors; vice presidents Harry Snodgrass, Lou Casola and Les Montooth; and directors Paul Brown and Vic Ostergren. Snodgrass, president of Border Sunshine Company, in Albuquerque, New Mexico, planed into the city for the interviews, and then continued on via jet plane to visit in Washington, D. C.

Casola asserted that these interviews with prospective applicants will be held here, in Chicago, until the "right man" is selected for the executive directorship.

No choice of a new managing secretary had been made at press time as the coinmen evidently continued interviews until all participants had been heard.

The search for a new executive secretary of MOA started immediately after the MOA Convention this past May when the Board accepted Ed Ratajack's resignation. Ratajack had held the post of managing director for about two years. George Miller, prexy and managing director of the national organization is expected to

step down after completing his pres-ent term which expires in December of this year. Elections will be held to appoint a new president at that time with the nominations being held to men only from the industry proper. The executive secretary post can be filled by anyone within or outside the industry with a qualifying background of association and convention activi-ties. The man must be capable of re-storing to MOA a top-flight conven-tion in May when the national group will again hold its convention in Chi-cago. cago.

A Board meeting of MOA will be held in San Francisco in November when the anual NAMA Convention is held, in order to tie the meeting in with the vending conclave which is attended by most directors each year. There was no comment from Board members as to the interview schedule which is probably based on the num-ber of applicants available each time the Board meets to select a possible choice for the all-important post.

Expect Consumers To Spend Tax Savings On Entertainment, Fun




