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ONLY THE BEGINNING FOR "FAIR LADY"

"My Fair Lady," now the matron of American musicals, is soon to end its initial run on Broadway, and those who believed it would run forever can take comfort in the knowledge that, in a way, it will.

Having already given statisticians a vast array of record-breaking data to come-up with, it is really only the beginning for "Lady." An IBM machine will even be put to the test to project the number of performances it is yet to receive from both professional and amateur groups all over the world in the years alread. And, to be sure, there'll be many a revival of the production in its hometown -New York.

Perhaps it's easy to say at this time that the run and various financial records made by "Lady" are never to be broken by another musical.

Who thought that a musical-at least in this century-would better the various marks set by "Oklahoma!," the previous musical comedy champ.

One came along-and we believe that another-perhaps a production being planned at this momentwill in time best records set by "Lady."

If records are made to be broken, is there a more delightful way to do it than to give the world a lasting work of art?

Certainly the record industry owes a "thanks" to the creators of "Lady" Alan Jay Lerner, Frederick Loewe (and, of course, George Bernard Shaw).

The fortunate label that got the original-cast rights, Columbia, was not the only diskery to benefit from the gem of a score. "Lady's" music has been a gold-mine for a number of regular-priced and low-priced labels. Just the name "My Fair Lady" on a record was (and still is) enough to insure consumer interest when such an album is displayed. Remember, too, that it was "Lady" that began the very successful jazz-goes-to-Broadway field. Foreign language versions of the score have also met with huge success.

Cash Box believes it expresses the feelings of music men everywhere when it hopes that the marvelous transition of Eliza Doolittle into a "My Fair Lady" continues to delight generations yet to come.

The Gone & End acquisition has already been approved by Roulette's stockholders, and took effect July 1.

Levy emphasized last week that as a division of Roulette, Gone and End would maintain their own distributors. He said there were no plans to change this set-up, and that there would be no transfer of artists from Gone-End to Roulette or vice-versa.

The Gone and End operation will now move into the Roulette building at 50th Street and Broadway, this city, and the executive alignment will be the same, with Bud Katzel as general sales manager for all the labels, including Gone and End, Henry Glover, pop A&R, Teddy Reig, jazz A&R, and Howard Fisher, comptroller.

Goldner has brought with him a number of his staffers, including Johnny Brantly, who will serve as R&B promotion representative for all labels, and Sam Goldner, who will act as coordinator for Goldner and assist Katzel in the sales department.

In 1955, Goldner and Levy became partners in Tico, Rama and Gee labels. When Roulette Records was formed in 1957, Goldner and Levy ended their partnership. Goldner formed the Gone & End setup that year.

Liberty Opens Chi Distrib

CHICAGO — Liberty Records has opened branch offices in Chicago for the distribution of the entire Liberty-Dolton line in Illinois, Wisconsin and Indiana.

Don Bohanan, Liberty's national sales manager, planed into Chicago early last week to formally set up the new distributive operation, which is located in the heart of Chicago's bustling Record Row, at 1329 South Michigan Avenue.

With Bohanan were Joe Zaleski, Liberty's midwestern district manager; and Fred Cassman, the new branch manager of the firm, Liberty Records Distributing Co. of Illinois, Chicago branch.

Bohanan explained this new Liberty distributing creation in Chicago as "the fruition of a definite—and much needed plan to garner the greatest possible concentration for product exposure of the Liberty and Dolton record labels.

"We opened here with a capable, experienced staff who will concern themselves with the Liberty and Dolton records alone, and concentrate on peak exposure and sales, of course," Bohanan said.

"We know our excellent product will continue to be well accepted in this wide area, and even exceed our expectations."

Other personnel appointed by Bohanan for the Chicago distributorship are: Ed Silvers, midwestern promotion manager; Harvey Goldstein, Chicago promotion manager: Dan Rankin, who was a salesman for Mercury Records for some 15 years. Other salesmen include Frank Kaiser, and Jack Wajer will concentrate in the Wisconsin territory.

Victor To Release 9 Albums In July

NEW YORK-RCA Victor Records is releasing nine new pop albums in July.

Included are two soundtrack LP's, "My Geisha," and "Hemingway's Adventures of a Young Man.

Four jazz releases include Gary Burton's "New Vibe in Town," "The American Jazz Ensemble in Rome," Americans Bill Smith (clarinet) and Johnny Eaton (piano) and Euro-peans' Erich Pete (bass) and Pierre Favre (drums), George Russel's "The Jazz Workshop," originally issued in 1957 and now available in Electronically Reprocessed Stereo; Nat Pierce Orchestra and trumpeter Buck Clayton in "Big Bang at the Savoy Ballroom."

A country issue is "Country Music Hall of Fame" with Jimmie Rodgers.

Two religious releases are: "We Thank Thee" with Jim Reeves and "Tony Fontane Sings the Songs from 'The Tony Fontane Story'," featuring the singer in 12 inspirational songs from his flick bio.

Capitol Deal On Sinatra Catalog

HOLLYWOOD-One of Capitol Records biggest artist promotion ever involves its catalog of Frank Sinatra LP's, including a new LP, "Sinatra Sings . . . of Love & Things" and reissues of two big successes, "Swing Easy" and "Songs for Young Lovers." (see separate story on new Capitol releases).

From July 2 to July 25, dealers will be given one free Sinatra album, of the same prefix and selection number, for each one purchased at the usual price, enabling them to offer the buyone-get-one-free deal on Sinatra LP's to consumer.

To promote the offer to consumers, Capitol has scheduled full-page ads in nine regional isuses of Life magazine, with a total circulation of nearly 4,000,000. Also on the advertising schedule are a full-page in the August issue of Esquire (on sale in July) and half-page spreads in metropolitan and community newspapers in areas not covered by the Life regional editions. In all, the magazine and newspaper ads Capitol is taking for the Sinatra promotion will reach a readership of better than 75.000.000.

In addition to the ads, Capitol has prepared large quantities of point-ofsale material for use in stores, as well as special display sales aids for use on racks. Among the materials which will be available to dealers are a 2by 3-foot theme-setter display piece, easeled display jacktes, two-color window streamers, special Sinatra pamphlet catalogs, four-color Sinatra divider cards for browser boxes, three-inch lapel buttons for clerks, and "As advertised in . . ." reprints of the Life ad.

Dealers and rack jobbers participating in the Sinatra program will also be offered deferred payment privileges. Terms call for one-third payment on Aug. 10, Sept. 10, and Oct. 10 on shipments made between July 2 and 25; shipments after July 25 may be paid for in equal amounts on Sept. 10 and Oct. 10.

Mike Stewart To UA As Veep Of Pubberies

NEW YORK - Mike Stewart has joined United Artists as executive vice president of UA's music corporation and all its other music publishing subsids, it was announced last week by David Picker, vice president of UA.

Stewart will be in charge of the world wide publishing operation of UA and will work together with the independent motion picture producers and composers in connection with music contained in motion pictures released by UA, and will supervise UA's music publishing companies' expansion into fields apart from motion picture production-namely acquiring catalogs, developing a new writer stable, seeking new non-film material, etc.

On making the announcement, Picker said, "With Art Talmadge as president of UA Records, and now Mike Stewart joining us as head of our world wide publishing activities, UA now has two highly experienced executives who will guide the continuing rise of the company's activities in this most important phase of its over all operation."

Stewart was formerly head of Korwin Music and Dominion Music, and has been active in the publishing field for many years. Among songs he published are: "Everybody Loves A Lover,"" "Moments To Remember," "No Not Much," "It's Not For Me To Say," and co-published with UA, "Never On Sunday," one of the biggest international hits in recent years.

Stewart's interest in Korwin ended about two years, and he told Cash Box last week that he had no announcement to make on the future of Dominion.

Columbia Inks Gary Graffman

NEW YORK-Gary Graffman is the latest classical pianist in the impressive Masterworks stable of Columbia Records.

The inking of Graffman, at 33 one of America's top young pianists, was announced last week by Goddard Lieberson, label president.

Schuyler G. Chapin, director of Masterworks A&R, said that the performer would record his first album, a solo recital, sometime this month. Produced under the direction of Paul Myers, it's set for release in Nov.

Graffman is Columbia's second artist to join Columbia's Masterworks roster this year, the other being Vladimir Horowitz, who joined the (Continued on page 44)

AT DEADLINE **Distributors Prep To Take Over ARMADA; New Manufacturers Ass'n In Works**

MIAMI BEACH, FLA.-At deadline time for this edition of Cash Box, ARMADA had not yet staged its big day of meetings.

But word throughout the hotel clearly indicated that distributors were all set to take over the organization. Many distributors who never attended previous conventions turnedout in force to increase the distributor strength in the association which in previous years was almost evenly balanced with an equal of manufacturers and distributors.

It was also evident that Amos Heilicher, of Heilicher Brothers in Minneapolis, a veteran distributor and one of the driving forces in the distrib movement to take over the organization, would be elected the new association's first president. It was also clearly indicated that manufacturers would be invited to remain as associate non-voting members of the new set-up, with a group of manufacturers to be chosen as an advisory committee for the distributor organization.

Although it was not confirmed at press time, it is understood that the

association will retain the name AR-MADA, now standing for American Record Merchandisers and Distributor Association. Every indication also shows that almost every manufacturer was in favor of the distributor organization and would support it.

Anticipating the change in contract of ARMADA, manufacturers held a private caucus on the evening preceeding the official convention meeting in Sid Frey's (Audio Fidelity Record's President) suite during which Frey introduced a suggestion that an association of record manufacturers (designed primarily for Indie Manufacturers, but welcoming the major) be formed to act in behalf of record manufacturers by protecting their interest via Congressional legislation, etc. (see separate story on Frey's letter to manufacturers on page 44).

Frey used the "Compulsory Copyright Law Revision" as a prime example of pending Congressional legislation which could be detrimental and perhaps completely destructive to indie manufacturers.

Speaking with sincerity and belief in the necessity of a manufacturer organization, Frey pointed out that there is great need for a lobby acting on behalf of indie manufacturers to combat such legislation in Congress. (Further details on this pending revision of the 1909 Copyright Law will be covered in subsequent issues).

Unfortunately, many of the key indie manufacturers in the hotel for distributor meetings were not in attendance at the caucus. However, the manufacturers who did attend agreed that such an organization was "ur-The meeting was adjourned gent.' with the understanding that manufacturers in the hotel who were not in attendance at the caucus would be contacted and asked to attend a subsequent meeting to be held the next day at which it was hoped more of the larger indies would attend.

Many manufacturers at the meeting were willing to contribute \$1,000 each to a fund necessary to the formation of the new organization. (Complete details of the forthcoming manufacturer meeting and ARMADA Day activities will be reported in detail in next week's issue of Cash Box).

"Butterfly" First Opera At RCA's Rome Studios

NEW YORK—All roads lead to RCA Victor Records' new Rome Studios during the next two weeks, as Victor personnel, led by George R. Marek, vice president and general manager, the cast, headed by Leontyne Price, and the equipment, featuring rare Japanese bells, all arrive for the recording of "Madame Butterfly"-the first opera to be recorded in the largest recording studio in the world.

"Butterfly," which stars Miss Price, Richard Tucker, Philip Maero, Rosalind Elias, and Erich Leinsdorf conducting a specially assembled orchestra and chorus drawn from the best musicians in Rome, will be recorded in the immense Studio A from July 10-July 22. Orchestra rehearsals on July 4, 6, and 9, will precede the recording sessions.

The Studio Building was opened at gala ceremonies on March 1, 1962. Studio A--which was designed specifically for recording opera and large symphonic works—is 375,000 cubic feet, measuring 40 feet high, 80 feet wide and 120 feet long.

In addition to Marek, who leaves for Rome on July 7, other Victor personnel who will be at the recording sessions include: Richard Mohr, Red Seal musical director, who will produce the new album; Jack Pfeiffer, Red Seal audio administrator; Al Pulley, administrator, audio engineering, Red Seal Recording, and Lewis Layton, RCA Victor's chief recording engineer.

Mohr has ordered special equipment to make the recording completely authentic. Rare Japanese bells, made for the first performance of "Madame Butterfly" at the Metropolitan Opera House in 1907, have been borrowed from the Met and have been shipped to Rome. They will be used in the Wedding Scene of Act I. Mohr is also using specially constructed timpani sticks, not available in Italy, and American mutes for all 62 string players.

POY HAMILTON'S GREATEST HITS

"LUCK"—Elvis Presley—RCA Victor LSP 2523 The sales generated by Elvis Presley's previous ventures must be called phenomenonal. On this new session from Victor the chanter offers an interesting, varied collection of rockers, blues items and Latinesque tunes with all the poise and authority that has consistently meant success for him in the past. Some top-notch sides include "Kiss Me Quick," "Just For The Sake" and "Something Blue." The package has the potential to pull astronomical returns.

"THE MUSIC MAN"—Original Soundtrack— Warner Brothers BS1459 This Warner Brothers soundtrack album of Meredith Willson's Broadway hit, "The Music Man," will be heralded with an all-out prono-tion compaign which will tie in with the initial screenings in key cities. The composer's melo-dies, both lilting and exciting, come off in su-perior style, particularly Robert Preston's "Seventy Six Trombones," and Shirley Jones' lyrical reading of "Till There Was You" and "Being In Love," which was written for the film. Buddy Hackett and Hermione Gingold also turn in winning performances. Impressive in stereo, this superb LP should hit the charts in nothing flat. flat.

"SINATRA SINGS OF LOVE AND YOU"— Frank Sinatra—Capitol SW 1729 Here's another dozen sides from Frank Sinatra cut prior to his affiliation with Reprise. The songster is in superb voice as he goes through the sturdies and popular items on this Capitol outing with his expected verve and style. Some first-rate bands here are "The Nearness Of You," "I Love Paris" and "I Got A Right To Sing The Blues." The disk should spark chart action.

"ADAM WADE'S GREATEST HITS"-Epic LN 24019

24019 Adam Wade's exceptional vocal talents are aptly showcased on this premiere album outing for Epic. The chanter ranks one of the most import-ant acquisitions of the diskery and this power-packed session of previous biggies should reap plenty of coin. The collection includes such potent past triumphs as "Tell Her For Me," "Ruby" and "I Can't Help It." The disk seems destined for rapid acceptance. rapid acceptance.

"BEWITCHING-LEE"-Peggy Lee-Capitol T 1743

1743 Here's coin-catching bag of some of Peggy Lee's biggest efforts grouped together on this top-notch Star Line offering from Capitol. The lark's distinctive jazz-oriented delivery coupled with superb range and pitch are displayed on "I Don't Know Enough About You," "Fever" and "Alright, Okay, You Win." The album has enough sure-fire built-in success ingredients to pull loads of loot.

"BOCCACCIO 70"—Original Soundtrack—RCA Victor International FOC-5 Carlo Ponti's three-act "Boccaccio 70" was scored by Nino Rota and Armando Trovajoli, both of whom have won plaudits for other screen efforts. Side one opens with "The Raffle," cleffed by Tro-vajoli, and features Sophia Loren singing "Soldi, Soldi, Soldi (Money, Money, Money)." The music is somber, sweet, and at times reflects a carnival-like flavor. Rota's contribution is "The Tempta-tion Of Dr. Antonio," which begins with an up-tempo Latin theme and modulates with the mood changes. The finale, "The Job," also by Rota, is a soulful jazz theme with excellent piano and guitar passages. Concurrent release of the film should spark sales.

"ROY HAMILTON'S GREATEST HITS"-Epic 24009 $_{ m LN}$

LN 24009 Roy Hamilton has been winning critical and sales laurels for quite a while for his original, dis-tinctive disk efforts. This new Epic entry which boasts a potent group of the chanter's hot singles should earn additional praise for the talented songster. Hamilton fans, who are legion, should appreciate the first-rate renditions of "Unchained Melody," "I Believe" and "You'll Never Walk Alone." The album should reach the charts in no time flat. The laughman is set apart from the rest of the new-wave come-dians in the fact that he is not sick. His bits of nonsense come straight from the mainstream of American life and Winter's appeal is as broad as the nation itself. Some yock-filled bits on this Verve album are "Igor And The Monster," "The Lost Island" and "Civil War." Heavy sales po-tential here. tential here.

"THE BEST OF REDD FOXX"-Dooto DTL

"THE BEST OF REDD FORM 234 Redd Roxx has been winning admirers and con-verts for years with his distinctive brand of drawling comedy. In the past much of artist's material has been off-color and unsuitable for air-play. On this attractive Dooto LP offering the laughman dishes up a dozen routines, culled from his night club routines, expertly altered for broadcasting. Foxx displays a rare genius for delivery on "The Lone Ranger," "Sneezes" and "The Valentine Present." The album should step out in the sales department. out in the sales department.

"BIG BAND BASH"-Ted Heath-London SP 44017

44017 Ted Heath, whose band is big, bold, brassy and bouncy, comes up with a pulsating and rhythmic package of evergreens done in his own flashy and fiery style. Fleeting traces of Miller and Kenton add to the excitement and inventiveness of John Keating's magnificient arrangements of "I Don't Know Why" and "Cherokee." Additional first rate bands are "A-Tisket A-Tasket," "Ca-puccina," "Harlem Nocturne," and "Out Of No-where." A must for audiophiles.

"ALONG COMES RUTH"—Ruth Brown—Philips PHM 200 028

PHM 200 028 Ruth Brown, who is currently hitting with "Shake A Hand," dishes up a dozen pure, emotion-packed r&b items on this listenable set from Philips. The thrush gives each tune a dramatic, feelingful reading with traces of her early gos-pel background adding a perfect, sincere touch. In addition to her chart-rider the lark renders impressive versions of "It's Too Late," "Love, Love, Love" and "The Treasure Of Love."

"IT'S PARTY TIME WITH KING CURTIS"-Tru-Sound Tru 15008

Tru-Sound Tru 15008 King Curtis, who recently rode the charts with "Soul Twist" on another label, unleashes his potent, hard-driving instrumental talents full-blast on this attractive set of r&b dance items. Curtis' rambunctious, a wide-open tenor style is perfectly suited to the fast-moving terpsichorean delights on the disk. Best bets here are "Free For All," "The Party Time Twist" and "Some-thing Frantic." The artist's admirers should flock to the package.

"BYE BYE BIRDIE"—Original London Cast— Mercury Wing SRW 17000 The fine Charles Strouse melodies and Lee Adams lyrics are aptly reproduced on this first-rate cast outing of the London production of "Bye Bye Birdie" on Mercury Wing's Limelight Series. Chita Rivera, who drew rave notices for her part in the Broadway version, is teamed up with Peter Marshall, English legit actress Angela Baddely and accomplished troup of supporting players and chorus. Some smart bands here include "The Tele-phone Hour," "Put On A Happy Face" and "Kids." Disk's economical price should bring out show buffs in droves. show buffs in droves.

'SONGS OF ITALY"-Cesare Siepi-London OS 25305


"PIC-A-POLKA" — Frank Wojnarowski — Dana DL 1299

"HAMMER AND NAILS"—The Staple Singers— Riverside RLP 3501 This etching by the Staple Singers lends credence to the fact that gospel music is gradually taking its rightful and important place in American music. The group plays and sings gospel tunes that are deep-rooted and meaningful, and gives them sincere, feelingful interpretations. Out-standing tracks are "Hammer and Nails," "No-body Knows The Trouble I've Seen," and "Do You Know Him." The album should swell the ranks of Staple Singers' admirers.

BLACK ORPHEUS

"CARNEGIE HALL CONCERT"—Dizzy Gilles-pie—Verve V68423 Kicking off with a potent French horn and trom-bone-oriented updating of his own "Manteca," Dizzy Gillespie quickly set a high standard for the four other jazz pieces on this polished disk cut live at Gotham's Carnegie Hall. The keynote for the session is vitality. Whether it is a varia-tion of his "Night In Tunisia" tagged "Tunisian Fantasy" or a first-class reading of the ever-green "Ool Ya Koo," the trumpeter and crew inject a forceful, commanding touch to each num-ber here. Excellent jazz fare.

"HOLLYWOOD JAZZ BEAT"—Ray Bryant— Columbia CS 8667 Ray Bryant, who has long been regarded as one of the best jazz pianists around today, offers proof positive of his keyboard artistry on this superior set of flick tunes. The 88'er goes through his paces against a full ork conducted and arranged by Richard Wess with his masterful, inventive style. The Bryant sound is at its best in some first-rate arrangements of "On Green Dolphin Street," "Ruby" and "Exodus." A worthy addition to the artist's catalog.

"A STUDY IN JAZZ"—Eddie Harris—Vee Jay LP 3028

LP 3028 For his fourth Vee Jay LP outing Eddie Harris showcases the composing side of his versatile coin. The tenor saxist wrote and arranged all six of the easy-listening originals on this free-flow-ing jazz disk from Vee Jay. Harris is not an avant-garde experimenter but a skilled voice within the confines of modern established jazz practice. Highlights of the session are "No One," "Cuttin Out" and "Olifant Gesang." All the jazz-man's many fans should come out in force for this top-notch package. top-notch package.

"SWINGIN' SINGIN' "—Les Double Six Of Paris —Philips PHS 600 026 This interesting session showcasing the profes-sional talents of the Double Six Of Paris reading eleven jazz sturdies in which they subsist voices for horns should generate healthy sales. There have been many attempts to use the human voice as a jazz instrument but few have been so suc-cessful. The group's straight-forward, command-ing style carries them in good stead on "Tickle Toe." "A Night In Tunisia" and "Boplicity." A natural item for spinners.

"JAZZ IMPRESSIONS OF BLACK ORPHEUS" —Vince Guaraldi Trio—Fantasy 3337 Once in a great while a jazz version of a film has exceptional merit in its own right. Such a case is Vince Guaraldi's impressive reading of four selections from "Black Orpheus." The 88'er along with bassist Monte Budwig and drummer Colin Baily put a new swingin' vitality in the flick's Latin and African-flavored melodies. The disk also includes two Guaraldi originals and two pop items. Jazzophiles should come in strength for the set. set.



Atlantic-Atco Distrib Meets In Miami Get Top Orders

NEW YORK—The Atlantic and Atco labels termed last week's distributor meet in Miami Beach as their most successful to date, with expectations of doing over 1 million in album sales during the course of the program.

The meetings took place at the Fontainebleau Hotel in Miami Beach at which both labels announced a major album release and sales program. A full turnout of distributors and their managers was expected. Top executives from Atlantic and Atco Records on hand were Ahmet Ertegun, president; vice presidents Jerry Wexler and Nesuhi Ertegun; Bob Kornheiser, national sales manager; Len Sachs, director of merchandising; Larry Maxwell and Norman Rubin, national promotion representatives; Red Baldwin, West Coast promotion representative. Sachs and Kornheiser indicated the two labels wrote the largest orders that have ever been taken by the company under such a program.

The following details of the Atlantic-Atco programs were revealed: A basic 15% discount will be given on the new album releases as well as on both catalogues. A 30-60-90 days deferred billing will be extended to qualifying dealers. The programs are to run from July 1 through August 31.

"Specific details of the program were worked out to accommodate

many of the normal distributor problems in order to help the distributor retain profitable relationships with his various retail outlets," stated Len Sachs. "Similar accommodations were very much responsible for the huge success of the last Atlantic-Atco programs in January in which we obtained over three-quarters of a million dollars in album sales."

Strong distributor reaction to the new releases was evidenced by the fact that in most cases distributor allocations were increased by more than 100%. A total of 16 new pack ages was released on Atlantic, includ-ing a 2-LP set, "The Ray Charles Story," consisting of 29 sides. This package was also offered to distributors on single LPs. Albums by Chris Connor-"Free Spirits;" "Mel Torme At The Red Hill" (his first Atlantic album): "Solomon Burke's Greatest Hits" (another first LP by an Atlantic artist); and "Solid Gold Groups" with 14 sides by The Drifters, The Clovers, Clyde McPhatter & The Drifters, etc., numbered on the list of Atlantic LP's. Atlantic's top jazz performers were represented with new releases-The Modern Jazz Quartet with "Lonely Woman," as well as single packages of a previous 2-LP release, "European Concert." An album by the musical director of The Modern Jazz Quartet, John Lewis, 'A Milanese Story," is on Atlantic's new release list as well as Herbie Mann with "Right Now," currently one of the labels hottest artists. There are also jazz sets by John Coltrane, "Coltrane Plays The Blues;" Hank Crawford, "From The Heart;" and The Red Mitchell-Harold Land Quintet, "Hear Ye!" Atlantic also offered a new LP by the recently signed singer-pianist, Mose Allison, "I Don't Worry About A Thing."

Atco distributors learned of the label's release of seven new LP's, headed by an album from Mr. Acker Bilk, "Above The Stars." The label recently released the title single from this LP. Other Atco packages offered were "Ben E. King Sings For Soulful Lovers;" "Coast Along With The Coasters;" "The Great Group Goodies" (an oldie-but-goodie set with 14 tracks by The Coasters, The Ikettes, The Sensations, etc.). Other entries on the Atco list were "The Many Guitars Of Jorgen Ingmann;" Bobby Darin Presents The Richard Behrke Trio with "Like West Side Story"; and Doug Fowlkes & The Airdales.

At the meetings Atlantic and Atco introduced new permanent merchandising aids which allow various combinations of albums to be shown. These displays were designed to meet the specific needs of retail stores specializing in jazz, rhythm and blues, or those stores that sell all types of album product. They are compact and mobile and will obtain maximum exposure within a minimum amount of display space. The Atlantic display is a silk screen day-glo motion display in which the Atlantic logo rotates. The Atco display is of a similar nature with respect to mobility, size and flexibility. Various other sales aids for distributor salesmen were created, such as illustrated sheets of the recent Atlantic LP releases to be used as permanent sales presentation. On Atco a new sales book was introduced containing 3" x 3" cover photos of the entire catalogue. Compact order forms and other salesmen's aids were made available at the meetings.

Roulette Racks Up Biggest Sales Volume At N.Y. Distrib Meet

NEW YORK—Using the theme, "Fall Harvest Of Hits For '62," Roulette Records racked up the biggest sales volume ever recorded in the diskery's history at its sixth annual distributors meeting here over the weekend of June 23-24.

With an almost 100% attendance on hand, including salesmen and promotion representatives, the meeting which was held at the Park Sheraton hotel in New York was, according to Morris Levy, president of the label, an "unqualified, stunning success."

Right from the start, after the usual introductory remarks by Bud Katzel, the label's general sales manager, Morris Levy took to the podium to introduce to the surprised distributors, George Goldner as a new vicepresident of Roulette and the acquisition by Roulette of Goldner's firms, Gone and End Records (see separate story).

The meeting was highlighted by an address from Morris Levy on the company's current position in the record industry. In his speech, Levy made it clear that Roulette had weathered a very difficult period and that since Nov. of 1961, had enjoyed the biggest months in the company's history. He also clearly outlined the company's plans to move forward in a tremendous expansion program. Following Levy's address, Katzel gave a sales address and the meeting was opened for discussion from the floor.

At the sales meeting, 11 new Roulette albums, two Roost albums and one new Tico LP was unveiled and shown on slides and heard on tapes by the distributors. A full 15% discount and 120 days deferred billing on all new albums as well as the entire Roulette, Roost, Tico and Gee catalogs, will be the terms of the label's "Harvest Of Hits" program.

Included in the new releases are: two new Joey Dee LPs, "All The World Is Twistin'" and the original soundtrack from his second motion picture, Columbia's "Two Tickets To Paris;" a Dinah Washington LP, "Drinking Again" in which the arrangements and orchestrations are by Don Costa: "15 Million Sellers"-Jimmie Rodgers, an anthology of all of the artist's biggest hits; "Come On Let's Play With Pearlie Mae," a risque for adults item from Pearl Bailey; "The Legend" with Count Basie & His Orchestra; "Si Si M.F." with Maynard Ferguson & His Orchestra; "Live, A Swingin' Night At Birdland"

featuring Joe Williams; "Big Band Jazz From The Summit" featuring Louis Bellson & His Orchestra; "Lalo-Brilliance" with the piano of Lalo Schifrin; "The Dixie Sound Of Jack Teagarden"; and "Brilliant Big Band Ballads And Blues" with Richard Maltby & His Orchestra. On Roost Records, the label offers "Feelin's" with Sonny Stitt and "The Man With The Blue Guitar" with Johnny Smith. Tico Records was repersented with "El Rey Tito—Bravo Puente" with Tito Puente & His Orchestra.

Another highlight of the Roulette meeting was the surprise arrivel of Dinah Washington, who stayed on to say a few words and lunch with the distributors and their salesmen.

Following the Sat. meeting, Roulette began its series of private, in-person get togethers with each distributor at a designated time. At the private meetings, personal area problems were covered and orders were taken for the new releases as well as catalog.

According to Katzel, more business was written at the private meetings than ever before in the firm's history. Because of the initial orders on the new releases and the anticipated reorders, Katzel indicated that, for the first time, Roulette would be pressing album merchandise in two plants in the east, one in the midwest, and one on the west coast. Prior to this, Roulette maintained no more than one or two plants for pressing album product.

During the meeting, special incentive plans for both promotion men on single records, and salesmen on album merchandise, was announced. Also, a contest will be held on the "Twc Tickets To Paris" LP with the win ning distributor receiving, quite naturally, "Two Tickets To Paris."

The sixth Roulette distributors meeting was summed up by Levy. He said, "it was the most spirited and enthusiastic gathering we have ever had. Every distributor seemed raring to go and this, of course, was so effectively scored in the orders that were placed at the meeting and in the re-orders that will be pouring in during the months ahead. Based on the sales meeting, we can safely predict that 1962 will be the biggest business year in the history of the company."

The merchandise shown at the meeting will be delivered to the distributors during the first week in August.

It's Official! Columbia Gets "Mr. President"

NEW YORK—Columbia Records confirmed last week that it had obtained the original-cast LP rights to the hot Irving Berlin musical due this fall, "Mr. President."

It was previously reported in Cash Box that the label was a leading contender in the acquisition of the score.

Musical, starring Robert Ryan and Nanette Fabray, is getting tremendous advance orders, largely due to the reputations of its createors, Berlin, Howard Lindsay & Russel Crouse, who are writing the book, and its director, Joshu Logan, Leland Hayward is producing.

Other featured performers include Anita Gillette and Jack Haskell, who are supported by Jack Washburn, Stanley Grover and Jerry Strickler.

Jay Blackton, vet Schubert Row maestro, will direct the orchestra, which will be scored by Phil Lang. Show opens in New York at the St.

James Theatre on Oct. 22, a change from the previously announced date.

Fire/Fury LP Deal







Frey Raps End Of Compulsory Licensing; Calls For Indie Assoc.

NEW YORK—Sid Frey, president of Audio Fidelity Records, has come out strongly against proposed revisions of the Copyright Act, now before Congress, which would eliminate the compulsory licensing provision for material cut on disks.

To support the fight against this change and to protect indie labels in other matters, Frey suggests the formation of an organization composed strictly of indie labels with regular meetings.

Frey informed his fellow indie labels of his feelings by letter and was scheduled to discuss the matter in AF's suite at the ARMADA meet in Miami last week.

Noting, in the letter, that such proposed revisions "already have the sanction of the Register of Copyrights of the United States Government," he declares that "we cannot sit on our hands without making some effort to have our voices heard."

Contends Frey: "The latest effort to curtail our [indie labels] activities and deflate our livelihood is occuring in connection with the proposed revision of the Copyright Law. Various proposals are distinctly slanted in favor of the music publishers, the major record manufacturers and the huge performing rights societies." Frey feels that with elimination of the compulsory licensing provision ". . . publishers could absolutely withhold the use of any popular copyright tune or could exact terrible conditions for such use and could thereby put us out of business by preventing the use of 'hit' tunes."

Frey feels pulishers could favor certain record companies and create a monoply which the compulsory licensing provision has thus far prevented. Frey says that in the case of LP's "in many cases we are forced to pay 2ϕ per tune for every tune used which, in effect, is 24ϕ per record."

Frey also says that some bigger companies are often granted a $1\frac{1}{2}\phi$ rate per tune plus an additional 25%club discount which brings the royalty for an LP album for them down to 18ϕ less $4\frac{1}{2}\phi$ or a net royalty payment of $13\frac{1}{2}\phi$ as opposed to 24ϕ .

Further defending the compulsory licensing provision as regards competition, Frey feels that the tremendous growth in the phonograph record industry is directly attributable to the fact that, apart from public domain tunes, any newcomer to the field and all independent companies have the absolute right to employ previously recorded copyrighted material, thus enabling them to compete, at least in that one area, with the bigger record companies.

Details of the new signings were worked out by Irving Mills just prior to his departure to Europe, where he is seeking new jazz talent and recording international jazz artists.

He has reported back to the pubbery that interest in jazz is still high in Europe.

Selection will be made by a committee, which includes Skouras, who stays at 20th Fox as a consultant, headed by Samuel I. Rosenman, board chairman.

Skouras resigned last week in the face of big financial difficulties at the firm, which over the last two years has seen the loss of over \$35 million from film production.

Pro Approach Helps Sell Home HiFi, Saxon Says

NEW YORK - A more professional NEW YORK — A more professional approach to completely-assembled hifi stereo sound systems is respon-sible for the current success of home instrument manufacturers in the music and sound market, accord-ing to Raymond W. Saxon, vice-pres-ident of marketing for RCA Sales Corn

Corp. "The introduction of improved and larger speakers, professionaly styled record changers, and the development of FM stereo radio have enabled the so-called ready-to-play producers to achieve a greater success in the consumer sound market."

Saxon issued his statement as the RCA Victor "Studiomatic" record changer was being demonstrated for the first time at the National Association of Music Merchants Show in the New York Trade Show Building last week.

The RCA-developed "Studiomatic" record changer, which Saxon termed "a major advancement in music reproduction," will be used in the deluxe models of the 1963 RCA Victor line of radio phonograph combination units, stereo portables and color television-stereo-FM-AM models.


This record changer incorporates a 12-inch turntable that minimizes vertical rumble, because of its greater mass, with more constant turntable speed to minimize wow and flutter. The new tone arm has been designed at a professional angle to insure accurate tracking and compliance. The four speed changer plays all sizes of same-speed records intermixed in

any sequence. Calling the phonograph market a "highly competitive field for all pro-ducers of sound equipment," Saxon said current indications are that more than four million complete phono-graph units, with an approximate retail value of \$475 million, will be sold in 1962. "This figure could very easily go higher, depending on the public's interest in FM stereo radio."

Saxon said the combination of the "professional approach" in building components and the industry's radically new cabinetry styling "should mean an even larger share of the total sound market for manufacturers of complete sound instruments."

"The 1963 RCA Victor phonograph line has more technical and styling improvements than we would have thought possible a few years ago," Saxon said. "Every type of consumer interest is covered in the portable line, for example, from a smart low priced portable to the 'float down' changer in the new stereo portable line."

Saxon said the growing public interest in FM stereo radio is reflected in the fact that all thirteen stereo combination units will be offered with factory built-in tuners to receive the new type broadcasting now available in most areas. Last year's line had only six models so equipped.



An authority on copyright law, Judge Burton has served on numerous committees of the Bar Associations; has published articles on copyright; and has lectured publicly and taught at Columbia University, New York University, Yale Law School, and the College of the City of New York.

He has served on seven different committees of the American Bar Association, and in 1956 was Chairman of the Committee on Copyright Office Affairs.

Judge Burton is a member of the Copyright Society of the United States and a member of its board of trustees. He also is a member of the patent, trademark and copyright foundation of George Washington University.

Don't Live For Future, **Brief Warns Retailers At NAMM Meet Seminar**

NAMM WICEL OCHINA NEW YORK—The retailer shouldn't be carried away with advancements in the phono and record business that are years in the future. Instead, he should be more con-cerned with what he can do to sell today what is available today to the customers of today. This was one of the observations made last week by Henry Brief, ex-ecutive-secretary of the Record In-dustry Association of America (RIAA), who spoke as keynote speaker on the topic of "What's Ahead for Phonographs & Records" at the Electronic Industries Association's Symposium on "What's Ahead for Consumer Products" during the AMMM music show in New York. Glenn Wallichs, Capitol Records head and RIAA prexy, was originally scheduled to speak, but couldn't due to a world-wide tour. "You don't stop selling automobiles today because somewhere off in the sugue future we will have new en-gines, new fuels, new types of propul-sion," Brief stated. "In any discussion of "What's

"In any discussion of "What's Ahead for Phonographs" it is therefore seems appropriate to talk about what we can sell today in order to reap tomorrow."

Some of the guidelines listed by Brief for sales based on the present include: how enterprising, how creative, how forceful, how imaginative shall we be?; how can we make people want to buy phonos and records?; how can we make people want to listen to our equipment, to see it, to touch it?

Brief said today's consumer is more interested in quality than gadgetry, in performance rather than conversation pieces, in simplicity of design and operation rather than a confusion of technical jargon.

When selling phonos, Brief added, the retailer should not eliminate "half the sales talk" by failing to dramatize "the wealth of entertainment" he is also selling.

In the sale of stereo LP's, which Brief said accounted for 40% of the total LP volume, he said that retailer would increase his sales of stereo records and phonos if he explained to the customer the extra breadth and depth dimensions available on stereo.

Mario Kaminsky of Microfon Records informed Cash Box that his label has inked Los Hermanos Barrientos, Chilean folk music group. Los Barrientos have already cut their first waxing for the label, a Compact 33 containing two Chilean, one Peruvian and one Uruguayan standards. 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



People met at Ricordi's offices in Milan, Ricordi being the original publisher of the song and the record. Attending was Bob Weiss, who periodically visits Milan on his world-wide trips and never fails calling Cash Box to say hello. This time the news about his visit concerned the success of "Al Di La" and he related how it started. In December, 1960 he heard "Sassi" recorded by Gino Paoli on Ricordi. Two months later, while he was in California, he learned the winning list of San Remo 1961 and immediately requested from Mr. Rap-etti, Gruppo Ricordi Musica Leggera, the rights to "Al Di La" for Music Publisher Holding Corp. and Ricordi's Italian recording of the number, which unfortunately wasn't available at that time and therefore was cut by Emilio Pericoli for Warner Bros. Records. WB coupled "Al Di La" by Pericoli with "Sassi" by Gino Paoli for release in the States. Some months later the pro-ducer of the Warner Bros. picture, "Rome Adventure," heard "Al Di La" as sung by Pericoli and he wanted him singing the same song in the picture. Pericoli was signed for the film, filmed in Italy. The distribution of the flick throughout the States gave the sales of the record a fantastic push. With the release of the film internationally, it is hoped that the Pericoli-WB record of "Al Di La" will enjoy world-wide success. All WB's record distributors are tying in with WB picture to exploit "Al Di La." Next NP by Emilio Pericoli to be released on the US market by WB is "Romantico Amore" backed by "Tango Italiano" (the song of San Remo 1962). Noel Coward's "Sail Away" just opened at London's Savoy Theatre. Critics not so kind to the author, raved about leading lady Elaine Stritch. Six of the numbers featured on the American Cast LP have been banned by the BBC as unsuitable for playing on radio and TV. The offending lyrics have been ad-justed for the British LP to be released by EMI and for the sheet music pub-lished by Chappells. Something of a collector's item is issued this week by Argo Records—spe-cialists in spoken word records. Entitled "Talking About Theatre," this 12" LP presents a montage of opinions expressed by nine leading figures of the British Theatre: actors Albert Finney, Peter Ustinov, Siobhan McKenna, Sybil Thorn-dike; authors Noel Coward, Harold Pinter; designer Sean Kenny; producer Peter Hall and critic Kenneth Tynan. The disk is set for American release on London.

London. A demonstration of coin-in-the-slot television was given at ATV House, Lon-don by British Relay Wireless Ltd. The system, which is entirely concerned with Pay TV by wire, would operate on a payment-for-time basis. A meter has been designed which accepts 2/—pieces only entiling the viewer to half-an-hour's programming. Sir Robert Renwick, chairman of British Relay Wireless and Television Ltd., said that if Pay TV was accepted by the Government it could start operating immediately as it was estimated that a population of 8-10 million are already embraced by wire systems. Of television, generally, Sir Robert stressed the need for a changeover from 405 line transmission to 625 which is even more important now in view of Britain's likely entry into the Common Market. At present Britain is the only country in the world still operating on 405.

Another kind of pay-as-you-view entertainment now to be found in this country is the Italian manufactured Cinebox imported by Filmbox Equipment Ltd. Two boxes are already on location in London and Birmingham but during the new few weeks more will be sited in key cities. Several new 35mm films in Eastman color are being produced featuring Shane Fenton and The Fen tones Colin Day, Steve Perry and Alan Klein. Mr. Acker Bilk will make a series of three.

Chart entry No.19 for the newly launched CBS label comes with Eydie Gorme's "Yes My Darling Daughter." A consistent seller, this is the artist's first appearance in the British Hit Parade. Disks are selling at the rate of 3,000 a day and sales are nearing the 20,000 mark within one week of release. Another strong seller is Andy William's vocal version of "Stranger On The Shore." No. 1 vocal group The Springfields—Tim Dusty, Tom—who leaped into prominence last more with their Bhiling disk "Pambine" are delighted with

Shore." No. 1 vocal group The Springfields—Tim Dusty, Tom—who leaped into prominence last year with their Philips disk "Bambino" are delighted with the reaction to their first stateside release "Silver Threads And Golden Needles." Mercury, which issues the disk on the Philips label, have invited the group to record their next session in Nashville. Lionel Bart's musical "Oliver" has its American premiere in Los Angeles on August 8. After a 14-week tour taking in San Francisco, Detroit and Toronto the show arrives on Broadway on December 27. As in London the producer will be Peter Coe and the stars Georgia Brown and Clive Revel. Meantime Decca issued two releases by Georgia Brown, "A Broken Doll" and "Don't Dilly Dally On The Way"—jazz versions of cockney classics—which are already issued in the States on London. Both tracks taken from her LP "A Little Of What You Fancy."

Another musical based on a Charles Dickens novel entitled, "Pickwick," with book by Wolf Mankowitz and music by Leslie Bricusse and Cyril Ornadel starring Harry Secombe is planned by Bernard Delfont for an autumn production.

First release on Melodisc's new rhythm and blues labels Chek and Dice have released. "My Own Desire" by Owen Gray and "ABC Boogie" by Ruddy Sketto. Material will be drawn both from this country and America with two regular releases each week.

Frankie Vaughan opens his nine week season of cabaret at "Talk Of The own" July 30. Following Frankie will be Shirley Bassey opening October 1. Town

HOLLAND

HOLLAND A Dutch TV program ("At Sight") recently devoted 15 minutes to a subject entitled "The Responsibilities of the Recording Industry." Invited for an inter-view were the directors of Holland's two prominent recording industries, Th. van der Meer of L.C. Phonogram and G. M. Oord of L. C. Bovema. The inter-viewer, A. Tjepkema, did not compromise to any viewpoint and handled his questions almost in the form of a legal cross examination. Asked: "Has the recording industry any other ideals apart from making money?," van der Meer answered: "It has. Firstly, we intend to satisfy all various tastes in music, and secondly we are a part of an extended international concern which has the possibilities to distribute recorded music all over the world, to be en-ioyed by people at the proper moments they wish and when they are in the right mood for it." Both directors affirmed the question whether the recording-industry has any influence on the character of the teen artists themselves: "Some of them grow out, with our support, to mature artists, others don't when they feel it was just for the fun of it, and will return to their original work or social tasks." Thanks to the "Holland Festival," a greater demand has risen for LP-albums

social tasks." Thanks to the "Holland Festival," a greater demand has risen for LP-albums with Literary Recordings. Mr. Hans Tecker, classical Decca's label manager in Holland, and who is also running English labels with Literary Series, told Cash Box of the noteworthy fact. Released last week in Holland were Shakes-peare's Comedies and Tragedies on Argo, "The Hollow Crown" (to be per-formed in Holland Festival) and the play: "Krapp's Last Taue" by Samuel Beckett. As Mr. R. Klasson, Phenegerer's also

formed in Holland Festival) and the play: "Krapp's Last Taue" by Samuel Beckett. As Mr. R. Klaassen, Phonogram's sales manager, has pointed out, there is still an excellent market in Holland for the ten inch classical LP, when re-leases are well considered. The recent release of Tchaikovsky's Violin Con-certo by Ruggiero Ricci (on Decca) is therefore fully justified in the form of a ten inch LP. Mr. Tecker, label manager for classical Decca, praised the high quality of the technical as well as the artistic levels of this recording, and was convinced of its highly commercial merits. This month new French movie "Les Parisiennes" will be premiered in Hol-land. Movie features French rock and twist idol Johnny Hallyday. Otto Vrie-zenberg, looking after Popular Philips' interests in Holland, told Cash Box that every 500th visitor to movie will receive a free copy of the soundtrack. It seldom happens that in Holland a German title gets more than one or two local recordings. An exception is the Altona number "Iwan Iwanowitch" with five local Dutch recordings. The last waxing was made by Johnny Kraaykamp and Rijk de Gooier, famous comedians, who recorded a special version of this title on the Artone label. Other recordings of same title are done by Anneke van Hooff (Omega), Beale Street Seven (Omega), De Marichica's (Imperial) and Daisy Bell (Artone). From Brussels comes the news that the Nevins-Kirshner-firm is officially established now. Pubbery handles the American Aldon catalogs for the Bene-lux area. Current success is "Happy Birthday Sweet Sixteen" and big plugs are made on "When My Little Girl Is Smiling." Editions Altona are the sole agents in Holland for Aldon; Editions Bens, Brussels are the representing firm for Benelux.

Mario Freidberg, Disco Importadora's general manager, told Cash Box of the signing of the contract of representation of the Argentinian label Disc Jockey. Mario wrote to this company to send him immediate tapes of Rosa-mel, Don Nobody and many other artists. Angelica Maria, one of the most promising singers of "the new wave," represented at Musart Records with her latest recordings, "Dile Adios" and "Johnny El Enojón." Orchestra accompaniment is under the direction of Jorge Ortega. Caterina Valente left town recently after her performances at Terrazza Cassino and told Cash Box that she will record in Germany a new LP con-taining only Mexican songs. Caterina signed a contract to perform again in Mexico.

Production is slowing down to a virtual standstill as the orchestras take their vacation, and sales have also slowed down considerably. Philips records has added a new A&R man in the person of Joe Dixie, who is also well known as a composer, arranger and music publisher. Joe's first production for the firm is a new version of the Brook Benton hit, "Walk On The Wild Side." August Seith of Seith-Chappel Music reports hot action on "Caterina" both in the original version by Perry Como and in German platters by Willy Hagara

The Operator Must Compete For Them

THOSE IMPORTANT LEISURE HOURS

After three years of research, a Twentieth Century Fund team has come up with a few surprises concerning the average American and his available leisure time. It seems that he doesn't have much more time than his counterpart of 100 years ago who worked seventy hours each week. Thus, to the dismay of practically every business marketing leisure-time products or services, the much publicized shorter work weeks do not necessarily leave more time for play. The fact of the matter is, once the typical seven day week is analysed realistically. the average thirty-nine hour work week doesn't leave thirty-one free hours as compared with the seventy-hour week of the 1900's, not when we must add $8\frac{1}{2}$ weekly hours commuting, an average of 5 hours consumed performing household chores, and other factors which tend to cut into the leisure time leaving "a few hours each week for leisure-time activities," according to the report.

The philosopher who wrote the report has termed leisure as "the time spent thinking-doing what you want to do for no other reason than the satisfaction of doing it." American industry vitally concerned with helping the average citizen enjoy his leisure time would rather he sail a boat (a deluxe model), or bowl a ball (preferably his own), than to "lean back under a tree and meditate," as advanced by the author (unless of course he is sporting an electric-eye camera).

All of which leads us to the conclusion that a coin machine operator who is so vitally concerned with the leisure time of the citizenry, should think of how he can win these precious few hours away from the "competition"—the manufacturers and suppliers of leisure time products. Obviously, the race seems more competitive in view of the findings of the research team.

Individual operator effort at the location level or through organized association presentations are certainly roads which should be explored by the coinmen. Perhaps a combined effort with other suppliers to the nation's locations—such as the brewers e.g. National Tavern Month, etc.—will stimulate location business and benefit the machines. We can't argue too convincingly with the young married who spends his "leisure" time painting the house. Let's keep the women happy, too. But if the guy is "sitting under a tree" somewhere, perhaps the enticement of a cool brew and a fast game of shuffle will get him up on his feet and off to the local taproom.

According to the Cash Box Annual Export Volume Report, published in the April 27 issue, Thailand imported only nine coin-operated phonographs during the entire year 1961. However, the country registered as many for the first quarter of 1962 and gave indications of increasing its imports on juke boxes.





Plans For Annual NAMA Convention Underway; San Francisco Site Of October Show

Exhibit Space Goes On Sale; From \$1000 To \$36,000 Per Exhibit

Exhibit Space Goes On SAN FRANCISCO – Plans are al-ready underway for the forthcoming National Automatic Merchandising Association Convention scheduled to be held here October 13 through 16 in Civic Auditorium, Brooks Exhibit Hall. NAMA officials have been work-ing on the giant Convention details almost since the close of the Chicago NAMA show last October in McCor-mick Place. At that time, the record 12,500 attendance indicated that early plans for a huge amphitheater, the size of a McCormick Place and now a Brooks Hall were warranted. Civic Auditorium is used here by the larg-est industrial conventions and can hold more than 10,000 persons. Exhibitors eligible to show mer-chandise at the NAMA Convention must meet certain requirements, ac-cording to Tom Hungerford, Execu-tive Director of the national organiza-tion. The classifications include: com-panies, firms, or individuals manufac-turing merchandise and service ma-chines, component parts and equip-ment supplied to the vending indus-try; manufacturers of products sold through merchandise machines; and suppliers of products or services per-tinent to the industry. Amusement machines will not be acceptable once again this year. It is doubtful if juke boxes will be permitted, although sev-eral of the vending machine manufac-tures also manufacture the auto-matic music machines. Exhibit space costs range from \$1000 to multi-booth installations costing \$36,000. Twenty-five percent deposits are necessary with all exhibit space orders. Applications must be sent to NAMA's Chicago offices at 7 South Dearborn Street. According to Gerald Whaley, Assistant Director of Public Relations, reservations will be made on a first come-first served basis.

basis. Literature currently in the mails offers a floor plan and exhibit break-down to enable prospective exhibitors to choose a suitable space to show their wares to the expected thousands from all over the country. The NAMA site of San Francisco will do away with, temporarily, the annual West-tern Conference which is generally held to accommodate West Coast vending representatives. NAMA has built a reputation for staging one of the most rewarding

Conventions ever seen in the auto-matic merchandising business. Last year's Convention in Chicago was loaded with informative panels, guests speakers, informal discussion, and an exhibit filled with every conceivable new idea in the trade. This year's con-vention is expected to feature many of the ideas which were in the proto-type stage in 1961 but are now ready for location. Among the many varieties of new machines, it is expected that inroads in the grocery and non-food vending fields will have been made and equip-ment to launch this merchandise into new-type vending locations will be displayed. Various services and new products for machines will also be present.

displayed. Various services and the products for machines will also be present. The site, San Francisco, is ex-pected to draw an even greater num-ber of visitors than a typically good convention city since the glamour and worldwide publicity attached to the West Coast city has helped the Cham-ber of Commerce enjoy gleeful exist-ences. No other city in the world, with the possible exception of Paris, en-joys such a top-flight press. San Francisco is, at its furthest point, seven hours away by jet air-liner. Many visitors will no doubt ex-tend or elongate the Weekend-Mon-day-Tuesday session to at least one day, since Columbus Day, October 12, a holiday, falls on the day before the start of the big show. Last year's show drew a record 12,-500, according to estimates made at the close of the show, and featured

Last year's show drew a record 12, 500, according to estimates made at the close of the show, and featured 145 exhibits. An international seg-ment was specially prepared for for-eign visitors and Drew Pearson, syndicated columnist spoke to the General Meeting audience. 
Dynamic Vending Forecasts 50% Rise In Sales


