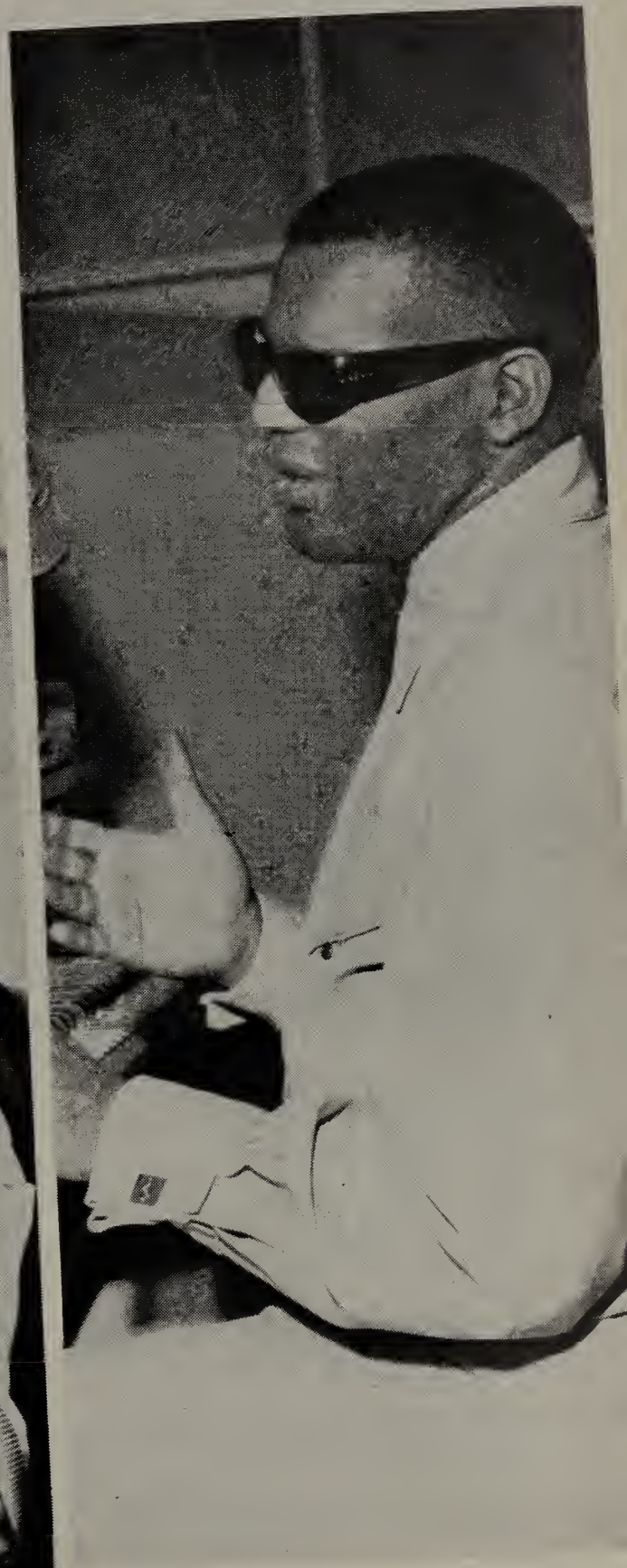
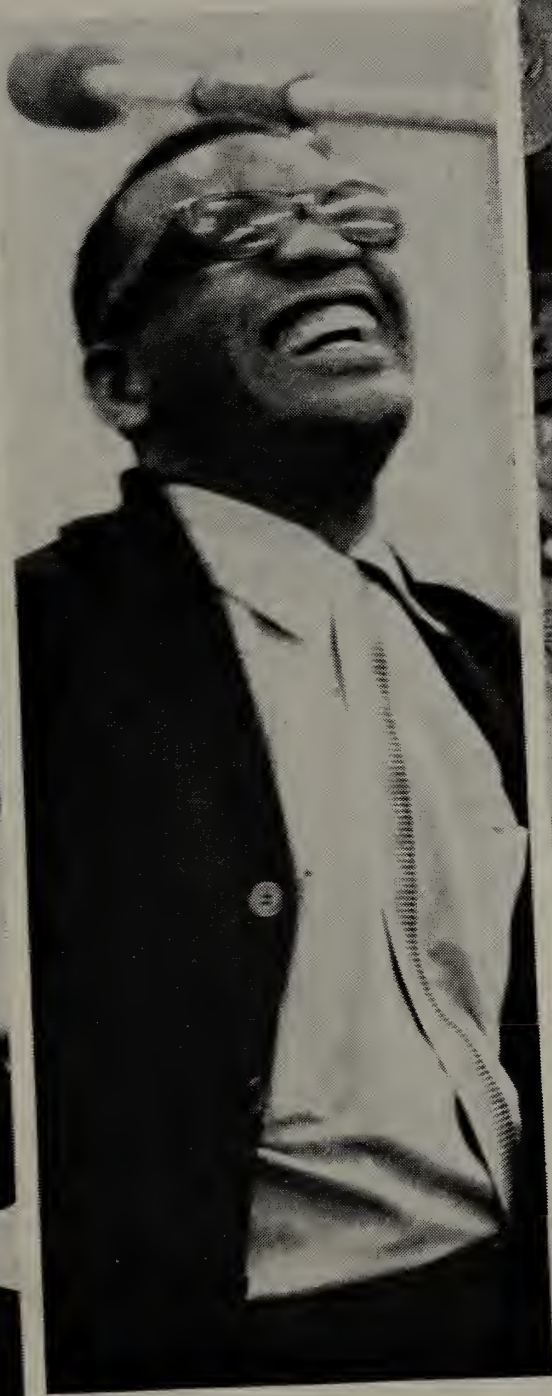

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HOT SUMMER FOR SINGLES

The Summer again looks like a swinging one for single sales. This has been the case for the past five years and from all indications there should be no change for the remainder of the current hot weather period.

After an extremely soft Spring, during which one dealer made the comment, "God Bless Ray Charles," things are hopping again and from every corner of the country reports about business are ranging from "excellent" to "great." And some of the singles responsible for the current excitement in the business have resulted in equally successful albums—all hitting with sufficient impact to keep things jumping for the next dozen weeks.

If any one individual deserves the majority of the credit for the favorable turn of events, it's Ray Charles. When things were really bad during late May and early June, Charles' whopping smash "I Can't Stop Loving You" and his "Country Music" LP began to bring people into the stores once again. Then some perfectly timed

hits such as "The Stripper" by David Rose, "Roses Are Red" by Bobby Vinton, "The Wah-Watusi" by the Orlons, "Palisades Park" by Freddie Cannon and Johnny Tillotson's "It Keeps Right On A Hurtin'" caught on, and thanks to these the Summer snowball hasn't stopped building.

The up-coming weeks also look very promising. A number of current smashes such as the two novelties, "Ahab The Arab" and "Speedy Gonzales" and other goodies including "Sealed With A Kiss," "Wolverton Mountain," "Gravy," "Breaking Up Is Hard To Do," "Johnny Get Angry," "You'll Lose A Good Thing," "Twist And Shout" and "Dancing Party" should keep things moving for the next three or four weeks until such others as "Party Lights," "Loco-Motion," the Brenda Lee two sider, and hit sides by Eddie Hodges, Dion, Bobby Darin as well as the new issues by the big guns take over the top spots.

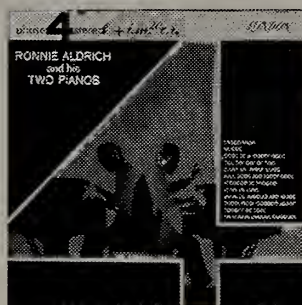

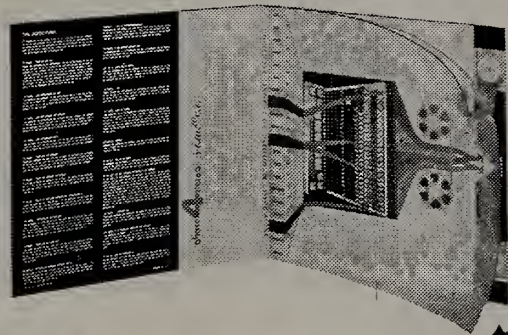

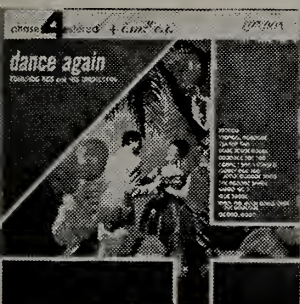

Capitol Inks Bobby Darin

HOLLYWOOD—Though Bobby Darin's move from Atco to another label had been rumored for months, the music business was still surprised at the rather sudden announcement last week that the star songster-actor had been signed exclusively to Capitol Records.

Announcement of the signing, which ended Darin's seven year association with Atco Records, came from Alan W. Livingston, Capitol veep, and Steve Blauner, Darin's personal manager.

No financial arrangements were made public.

Darin's first record on Capitol will be his own composition, "If A Man Answers," which is the title tune from the forthcoming movie in which he stars with his wife, Sandra Dee. The single will be recorded at Capitol next week and is slated for release early in September. Producer Nick Venet will be in charge of the session, with Jimmie Haskell arranging and conducting.

Immediately after recording the single, Darin will begin work on two albums, the first of which will be issued early in the fall. Darin will complete his initial recordings for Capitol release just prior to opening at the Flamingo in Las Vegas for a four-week engagement.

In announcing the Darin agreement, Livingston said:

"Bobby Darin is the kind of recording artist I like to sign most. He is far more than a young singer who has had several hit records in recent years. His recording career will be advanced far beyond his accomplishments of the past few years by his great versatility and wide range of talents. Bobby's current successes in motion pictures, records, television, clubs and concerts are merely forerunners of a career that will be one of the biggest in the history of the entertainment business."

Darin began his recording career with Decca in 1956. The following year he moved to Atco, for which he recorded until signing this week with Capitol. In 1958, he had his first hit record, "Splish, Splash." This was followed by an unbroken string of six hits, including his tremendous success, "Mack the Knife," with which Darin accomplished the changeover from a teenage star to a singer and entertainer who is one of the most in-demand stars in the business today. His most recent Atco singles, however, have been squarely aimed at the teen market.

On the motion-picture front, Darin will become the first actor since talkies came in to star in five films in one calendar year. In addition to the forthcoming "If A Man Answers," a Ross Hunter production for Universal International, Darin has starred so far this year in "Come September," "Too Late Blues," "State Fair," and "Hell is for Heroes." A fifth film, Stanley Kramer's "Pressure Point," in which Darin co-stars with Sidney Poitier, is set for fall release.

Another of Darin's show-business firsts came in January, 1961, when he became, at 23, the youngest performer to star in his own network television spectacular. In Sept., he will tape a Bob Hope show with Ethel Merman.

Darin is also mapping another concert tour after the success of his recent 10-day, 10-city series. During those concerts, Darin himself was on stage for over two hours—singing, dancing, doing comedy and impressions, and playing vibes, piano, guitar, and drums.

WB Holding Fall Sales Meets

BURBANK, CALIF.—Warner Bros. Records will unveil its fall album product this week (16) via a series of in-person audio visual sales meetings.

WB execs, headed by John K. (Mike) Maitland, president, Joel M. Friedman, director of merchandising, Bob Summers, National Sales Manager, and Joe Smith, National Promotion Manager, will hold sales meetings for distributors and all sales personnel in 16 cities throughout the country this week, which will be attended by a total of 35 WB distributors.

Maitland, along with district sales manager Hugh Hilliard, will hold meetings in the midwest; Friedman in the east with district sales manager Sid Schaffer; Summers in the South with district sales manager 'D' Kilpatrick; and Joe Smith in the west with district sales manager Arnold Thies.

Fall's In The Air At Decca Sales Meets

NEW YORK—Decca Records' top sales execs. cover five cities in as many days this week for regional sales meets at which new fall product will be introduced and an Aug. promotion tagged "Sales Unlimited" will also bow.

Sydney N. Goldberg, veep in charge of sales, accompanied by Claude Brennan and Louis J. Sebok, will meet with regional and division field personnel beginning Mon. (16) in Los Angeles, followed by New Orleans (17), Chicago (18), Cleveland (19), and New York (20).

Decca sales personnel will return to their home branches to kick-off the program next Mon. (23). Dealer accounts will be introduced to the new product and program and many new featured LP's will be distributed to deejays.

NARM Adds 7 New Members

PHILADELPHIA—The board of directors of the National Association of Record Merchandisers, at its recent meeting at the Beverly Hilton Hotel in Los Angeles, California, (June 30 and July 1), approved applications for membership in NARM, from seven companies.

In the Regular Membership category, which includes rack jobbers, three new member companies have been added to NARM's rolls. They are Brown Sales Company, of Columbia, South Carolina; Rapid Merchandising Company, of Minneapolis; and Record Wholesalers, of San Francisco.

Brown Sales Company services stores in the state of South Carolina. The major accounts serviced include the Winn Dixie stores, Eckerds Drug Stores, Harpers 5 and 10¢ stores, S. H. Kress stores, and Rose's 5 and 10¢ stores. Company principals are H. G. Brown, Jr. and H. G. Brown, Sr.

Rapid Merchandising Company of Minneapolis, services post exchanges in military bases and discount stores. Among the outlets serviced are the Family Thrift Centers, Twin Ports Sales Company, Ardan Sales Company, and the Post Discount Stores. Herbert N. Sandel is the president of Rapid Merchandising, and Noel Korngold, merchandise manager.

Record Wholesalers, Inc. services accounts in Northern California, and is under the leadership of Don Ayers.

In the associate membership category, two labels were added to the membership list, as well as a manufacturer of display fixtures, and one supplier of record accessories.

The record manufacturers accepted by NARM are Philips Records, represented by its national sales manager, Lou Simon; and G.N.P.-Crescendo Records, represented by Gene Norman and Bill Hall. Philips Records headquarters in Chicago, and G.N.P.-Crescendo in Los Angeles.

Alfred Saemann, Inc., a manufacturer of wire display racks, is a new associate member company, and is represented by Alfred Saemann and Murray Wallach. Record Accessories Corporation, represented by Morty Kline, rounds out the list of new NARM affiliates.

The new member companies are expected to make their first association contacts with the entire NARM membership at the forthcoming NARM Mid-Year Meeting and Sales Conference, which will be held at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago, Aug. 26 through Aug. 29.

Plan One-Stop Association; Irv Perlman Heading Drive

NEW YORK—The formation of a one-stop organization is being eyed under the direction of Irv Perlman of I. J. Morgan Co. of Philadelphia, a large one-stop & rack-jobber.

Perlman told Cash Box last week that although details on the setting up of such an organization are yet to be worked out, he recently sent out 26 letters to various one-stops on the possibility of such an organization and has received 11 replies so far requesting further information.

Perlman hopes to begin a series of meets with one-stops sometime in Sept., with a likely site being Chicago.

Though servicing 175 racks, Perlman noted that he had been turned down for membership in NARM, the rack-jobber organization.

Goldmark's Goldie Label Starts Rolling

NEW YORK—Goldie Goldmark, long on the publishing scene, has left Imperial Records and Post Music, to form Goldie Records and two publishing houses, ARMADA (BMI) and Fredella (ASCAP), this city.

With Goldmark in the new operation is Artie Ripp, previously associated with George Goldner. Ripp will serve as veep.

Both Goldmark and Ripp were at the recent ARMADA meet in Miami Beach to personally supervise the signing of distributors for the Goldie label, which is set to bow this week with a single by The Hollywood Flames.

The label and publishing operations are organized throughout the world. The foreign publishing company is called Goldmark Music Ltd. in association with Chappell Ltd.

ARMADA is already represented by three singles releases—"I'm The Playboy" by The Pyramids (Cub), "Let Me Be Your Boy" by Wilson Pickett (Cub) and "Bouquet Of Flowers" by James Velvet (MGM).

Besides the Hollywood Flames, the Goldie label has pacted The Janets and Bill Emerson.

Prior to his association with Imperial, Goldmark was associated for 9½ years with the publishing firms Sheldon, Shalimar, Sequence, Springfield and others, which were sold last year to Lew Chudd, Imperial prexy.

UA Bows Initial Double Sound-Track LP's

NEW YORK—United Artists Records has announced the first five decks in its new Double Feature Soundtracks series, featuring music from two soundtracks on each 12-inch album.

The initial release includes "I Want To Live" by Gerry Mulligan and "Odds Against Tomorrow," John Lewis and the Modern Jazz Quartet; "Exodus" by the Hollywood Studio Orchestra and "The Apartment" by the same orchestra; "The Big Country," Jerome Moross and "The Horse Soldiers," David Buttolph; "The Vikings," Mario Nascimbene and "Elmer Gantry," Andre Previn; "The Unforgiven," Dimitri Tiomkin, and "The Wonderful Country," Alex North.

The new Double Feature Soundtracks will retail for \$3.98 mono and \$4.98 stereo, Morris S. Price, director of sales, announced, and will be shipping to distributors within a week.

Angel Extends Prepack Offer

HOLLYWOOD — The 15% discount offer on a prepacked basic library of 50 Angel albums—24 titles in mono and stereo, two titles in mono only—has been extended through July 31; it was announced last week. Original termination date of the program was July 25.

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Sinatra Firm Sues Capitol Over for 1 Album Discount Program

HOLLYWOOD—A suit asking a total of \$1,050,000 in treble damages was filed last week (12) in the U.S. District Court in Los Angeles against Capitol Records by Frank Sinatra's Essex Productions, parent company of his Reprise Records, accusing Capitol of restraint of trade, attempting to procure a monopoly and violating the Robinson-Patman

Finley Elected PRI Pres.

NEW YORK—Larry Finley has been elected president of Precision Radiant Instruments, makers of low-priced LP's, including Tops, according to Alfred E. Bloomingdale, board chairman.

Finley, formerly veep, replaces Robert Blythe, who will remain with the company in an advisory capacity. Finley joined PRI in 1960 after forming a newspaper, The Daily Journal in San Diego, the Finley-Kinnon Broadcasting Co. controlling KSDJ—San Diego, opening the Mission Beach Amusement Park in San Diego and doing flick-TV producing.

Besides the Finley election, a new board of directors has been appointed: Jack C. Lewis, a Wall Street broker; Anthony De Santis, president of Virjune Manufacturing Co.; James Well, former president of the Pepsi-Cola Bottling Co., Los Angeles; Frank Sherwood, business management consultant; and David Fry, veep of the Diners' Club.

Finley announced that an enlarged processing, manufacturing and shipping center is being set up in Belle Mead, N.J. that will double production facilities. PRI also has a plant in Los Angeles.

The firm, which has cut 4,000 albums under 22 different labels, recently set-up five major divisions.

They are: The Tops division, under which albums by Tops, Golden Tone, Sunrise, Mayfair and Kimberly are released direct to retailers through PRI's own national marketing force; Hudson Records, which has eight labels sold exclusively through rack-jobbers and distributors; Allied Record division, a custom pressing division which is doing a major part of production for the U.S. Government as well as pressing disks for the Tops and Hudson divisions and indie labels; the premium division, which manufactures specialty premium albums from the Tops and Hudson catalogs; Cavendish Record Manufacturers, the manufacturing and export division of the company.

Tops has just completed a deal with the Motorola consumer products division in which Tops will produce about 10 million LP's to be sold as a go-along with Motorola stereo sets. Consumers will get a stereo disk library of 50 albums packaged 10 to a box, five boxes in a master carton. The albums will be released under the Tops' Westerfield label and custom pressed by the Allied Division of the company. Shipments for this month will be about 500,000 albums, with the contract to run to June of 1963.

Price Discrimination Act by offering to sell Sinatra albums at half price throughout the country and, in certain areas, below the 50% reduction to selected dealers."

A preliminary injunction is being asked against the Capitol deal.

As announced by Capitol, dealers can receive—from a period covering July 2 to July 25—one free Sinatra album, of the same prefix and selection, for each one purchased at the usual price.

In addition to Capitol Records, Inc., the suit also names as defendants Capitol Records Distributing Co. and Electronics and Musical Industries, Ltd. (EMI), the parent firm. Sinatra's own record production company, Bristol Productions, is also a plaintiff with Essex Productions and Reprise Sales.

Sinatra's attorneys are claiming that "Capitol is conducting its 'unfair competition' against only one artist of the many who record under its label." Sinatra now only records exclusively for Bristol and has many recordings either out or ready for release under the Reprise label. His recordings were distributed by Capitol between December, 1955, and April, 1962. His earlier recordings were distributed by Columbia and RCA.

Capitol and Reprise were involved in another legal hassle awhile-back when Capitol sued Reprise over a Sinatra LP on Reprise, which Capitol claimed had a title and cover that was too similar to one of its own Sinatra LP's. Reprise made changes on the sleeve.

Injection-Molded Vinyl Disks From Golden Crest

NEW YORK—Golden Crest Records is now making vinyl phono disks by the injection molding process, thanks to GC's subsidiary, Shelly Products, which has developed this new technique by using a screw type of plasticizer that molds vinyl at controlled heat levels.

Vinyl, the highest quality material on today's disks, has heretofore been used only in compression molding, a process in which the master disk or stamper is subject to deterioration so that successive pressings do not produce disks of uniform quality.

According to GC, injection molding of disks does not deteriorate the stamper, making every disk produced from the same master identical in quality.

Ray Charles "Story" Available On Single LP's

NEW YORK—Cash Box has been informed that Atlantic Records' two-disk album, "The Ray Charles Story," reviewed in last week's issue, is also available as two separate LP's. The release contains 29 tracks cut by the performer for Atlantic over a seven year period.

MCA To End Talent Agency Setup

HOLLYWOOD—The Music Corporation of America, which recently acquired a controlling share in Decca Records, will get out of the talent agency business.

MCA has notified the Screen Actors Guild of this move, on or before July 18, which is in keeping with SAG's ruling a year ago that no agency may represent talent and be a producer at the same time. Ruling is to take effect this Sept.

MCA is the largest TV producer, through Revue Production, and since its merger with Decca, which runs Universal Pictures, it is now in the flick production field.

MCA's talent agency is considered the most important in the world, covering all areas of show business.

Capitol Field Execs Gather In San Diego

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records Distributing Corp's field-force management group, including regional sales and promotion managers and branch and distributor sales managers, will converge on San Diego (Calif.) for seven days of conferences this week with CRDC and Capitol Records execs from Capitol's Hollywood and New York offices. In all, nearly 100 persons will participate in the meetings.

Stanley M. Gortikov, CRDC veep and general manager, and Bill Tallant, veep and national sales manager, will be in charge of the meetings.

Other CRDC brass attending will include national rack sales manager Max Callison, album sales manager George Gerken, merchandising manager Perry Maye, special products sales manager Oris Beucler, national singles sales and promotion manager Vito Samela, and Pete Goyak and Bud Hamilton, executive assistants to Tallant.

Among the executives representing Capitol Records at the conference will be vice presidents Joseph Csida and Lloyd Dunn, singles A&R director Voyle Gilmore, and Brown Meggs, executive assistant to Csida.

Topics to be discussed during the seven-day conference range from promotion to personnel selection and training. Considerable time is scheduled to be devoted to Capitol's singles activities, with that portion of the program to be presented by Csida, Gilmore, Meggs, and Samela.

On Fri., July 20, the meeting will be moved to the Capitol Tower in Hollywood where Alan W. Livingston, CRI vice president for records and phonos, and Dave Cavanaugh, director of album A&R, will present the new albums to be released by Capitol during August and September.

UA Sets Release Of Jazz Singles

NEW YORK—United Artists Records, following the introduction of the first five albums in its new jazz series, will shortly release two jazz singles produced by Alan Douglas.

The singles, featuring artists who also are included in the initial album releases, are by Danny Small and Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers.

Douglassaid that a regular release schedule for single jazz releases will now be established, as has been done with the album line. The five albums, which were previewed for UA distributors at the sales meeting in Miami Beach will be shipped late this month, and feature, in addition to Blakey and Small, Charlie Mingus, John Coltrane and Bill Evans and Jim Hall. Douglas is now completing the second album release which will be ready for the Fall.

Capitol, Project Records Have Stake In New Luther Dixon Label

NEW YORK — Luther Dixon, who has A&R'd many of the top hits from the Scepter and Wand labels, has formed his own label, Ludix Records, which has among its backers Capitol Records and Project Records, Bing Crosby's disk enterprise, Cash Box learned late last week.

It is understood that Capitol will distribute the label in most areas with some territories going to indie distributors.

Dixon is president of the label, and is being assisted by Simon Rady, an exec of Project Records.

Ludix's first release is a master purchase, "Sheri" by a new group called the 4 Seasons.

Dixon was scheduled to take to the road last Fri. (13) on behalf of the single.

Dixon, it was noted, has an option in his agreement with Capitol and Project to cut The Shirelles and Chuck Jackson, stars in the Scepter & Wand setup. He is still a stockholder in Scepter & Wand.

Nevins-Kirshner Form Companion Label

NEW YORK — The Nevins-Kirshner organization, whose first disk effort, Dimension Records, is firmly established with Little Eva's current chart-rider "Loco-Motion," has formed an affiliate label. The new firm will be known as Companion.

The initial artist on the new label will be Carole King, who has written such hits as "Will You Love Me Tomorrow," "Crying In The Rain" and "Loco-Motion." The lark's first release is "It Might As Well Rain Until September."

As with Dimension, Amy Records will distribute Companion.

Epic Signs Ames Bros.

NEW YORK — The Ames Bros., among America's leading male vocal groups, have been inked to an exclusive pact with Epic Records, it was announced last week by Dave Kapralik, director of pop A&R for the Columbia and Epic labels.

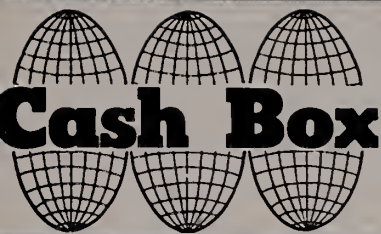
The group, long on the Victor label, will make its debut single for Epic in Nashville—their first session in that city—under the direction of Jim Fogelson.

The LP obtained by Vesuvius was negotiated prior to WB's agreement with Ricordi, Weiss said.

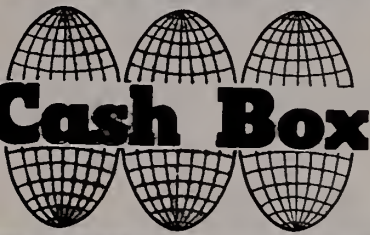

One end's a soft sounding romancer labeled "Heavenly Lover" while the other, "Zizzy Zee Zum" is a delightful novelty based on the "Turkey In The Straw" melody. It's a toss-up for honors.

Anka reads the old Johnnie Ray hit against a string-included ork sound.

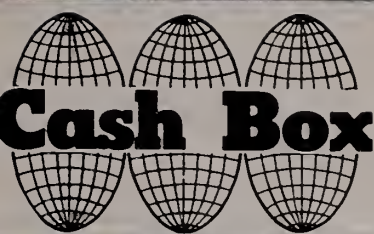

Teeners'll dig this new Swan outing from Danny & the Juniors. It's a stompin', handclappin' revamping of an old spiritual, "We Got Soul," that the artists pound out with solid sales authority. Sparkling support from the Frank Slay outfit. The kids will also appreciate "Funny," the fetching beat-ballad undercut.

(B) "YOU ARE EVERYTHING TO ME" (2:37) [Favorite ASCAP—Rodgers] Touching romantic expression by the artist. Easy full ork setting includes a flashy keyboard.

(B) "LOST LOVE" (2:58) [Valor BMI—Sedecca, Wagner] Plaintive performance here. Label works out of Los Angeles.

TOMMY HUNT (Scepter 1235)

(B+) "DIDN'T I TELL YOU" (2:17) [Vee-Ve BMI—Green, McCoy] Diskery's strong vocal artist should be getting solid teentime airplay with this exciting statement, a tale about a fellow who's willing to take the girl back. Hunt receives a first-rate rock-a-string backdrop. Might do big Top 100 business.

(B) "POOR MILLIONAIRE" (2:12) [Wajoma & Ludix BMI—Wolfson, Hall Keyes] Upbeat affair about a happy-go-lucky man.

EDDIE RAMBEAU (Swan 4112)

(B+) "SUMMERTIME GUY" (1:58) [Claridge & Jonathan ASCAP—Barris] Infectious good-humored twister from the warbler and his instrumental backing. Cute idea behind the ditty is that this fella shines, romance-wise, during the summer months. Sound could add-up to a click.

(B) "LAST NIGHT WAS MY LAST NIGHT WITH YOU" (2:20) [Claridge ASCAP—Rambeau, Rehak] Softie Latinish wistful.

THE RONETTES (Colpix 646)

(B+) "I'M ON THE WAGON" (2:17) [B. F. Wood ASCAP—Seneca, Steward] Solid speedy-beat gospel-flavored attack by the larks, who tell a tale about a gal who says she's gonna walk-alone until her fella returns. Contagious romp that has to be eyed.

(B) "I'M GONNA QUIT WHILE I'M AHEAD" (2:16) [Knollwood ASCAP—Carr, Warren] Gals, with strings added to the accompaniment, give-out with another zestful take for the teeners.

JOHNNY CAMERON (RCA Victor 8065)

(B+) "WHY DO FOOLS FALL IN LOVE" (2:00) [Patricia BMI—Lymon, Goldner] This is a bright come-back for the old hit by Frankie Lymon & The Teenagers. Cameron's upbeat vocal is accompanied by a sometimes honky-tonkish combo-chorus attack. Could be a first time-out on Victor click for the songster. Keep tabs on it.

(B) "THE CRYING I'M DOING ALONE" (2:30) [Leeds ASCAP—Altman, Meshel] Nice wistful is with expressive teen-market feeling by the songster.

CAMARATA (Vista 404)

(B+) "I'LL WALK THE REST OF THE WAY" (2:36) [Oil BMI—Meredith, Kronberg] Songstress daughter of folkster Josh White (his son, Josh White, Jr., cuts for Mercury) heads a strong reading of a solid country-styled item about a triangle. Setting is a pro Nashville sound affair. Could make noise.

(B) "GREEN CORN" (1:59) [Emarcy ASCAP—Adapt. White, Rosenfeld] Catchy stuff with a calypso feel.

ELMORE JAMES (Fire 1503)

(B+) "STRANGER BLUES" (2:59) [Fast BMI—James, Robinson] Elmore James has a good chance of picking up some loot with this fast-moving, danceable r&b happy blues item. The songster gives the tune a moving, feelingful delivery. A natural for airplay.

(B) "ANNA LEE" (2:50) [Fast BMI—James] Familiar-sounding slow-paced blues weeper essayed with coin-catching style by James.

JACKIE GLEASON (Capitol 4800)

(B+) "JOIE DE VIVRE (The Joy of Living)" (1:41) [Songsmiths ASCAP—Gleason] Gleason directs the ork in a delightful reading of a Gallic-styled charmer written for his new flick, "Gigot," which takes place in France. An instrumental specialty that will make many a station's programming.

(B+) "'ALLO, 'ALLO, 'ALLO" (1:57) [Songsmiths ASCAP—Gleason, Cahn] More in a similar sunny groove. Ditty is also from the flick.

FERRANTE & TEICHER (ABC-Paramount 10347)

(B) "TILL THERE WAS YOU" (2:12) [Frank ASCAP—Willson] With the upcoming flick version of Meredith Willson's "The Music Man," one can expect lots of disk readings of the score. This is warm version of the show's top ballad, cut by the dual-pianists when they were with ABC-Par. Choice good-music tinkling.

(B) "LIDA ROSE" (2:28) [Frank ASCAP—Willson] Team is snappy on the barbershop quartet delight from the score.

MAE SEPTEMBER (Bonanza 4916)

ROCKING CAPRIS (Confederate 145)

THE CANNONBALLS (Brunswick 55231)

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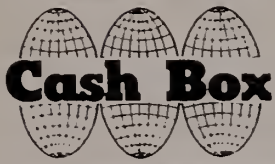

Recently married, Ray and his wife make their home in Atlanta. When he is not on the road he spends his leisure hours swimming, boating and water skiing.

Timi Yuro can't remember when she began singing, but she is sure it was about the same time she began to talk. Born in Chicago on August 4, 1940, Timi is the product of a close-knit family where music was always in the foreground.

At seven Timi began operatic training which continued for five years until the family moved to Los Angeles. Throughout high school she sang at teen age parties. The lark's professional career was born when she was discovered chirping at a teen night spot by a Liberty executive. Almost immediately the diskery signed her to a recording contract.

For the next ten months Timi's fortunes petered along at a virtual standstill. Then she cut "Hurt," which quickly zoomed up the best-seller charts. Everything happened quickly after that. Her next two singles, "Smile" and "She Really Loves You" followed the same success pattern.

Currently, the songstress is riding the Top 100 with "What's The Matter Baby."

Arch Yancey and Chuck Addams, two KNUZ-Houston spinners, celebrated the Fourth of July and July 5 this year when in the wee hours of the morning they successfully completed their 22-mile swim, a distance equivalent to the width of the English Channel. The pair doubled up to spend the Fourth of July swimming underwater the full width of the English Channel in a large Houston pool, whose manager estimated the crowd of spectators at several thousand. The jockeys donned skin-diving equipment at 8 A.M. on the Fourth and swam in relays in a set pattern until 3:10 A.M. the next day, never surfacing except to change air-supply tanks. Averaging 58 minutes to the mile, they spent 19 hours and ten minutes in the off-beat promotional stunt.

Lark Joanie Sommers, a former Buffalonian, was back in the city last week. WEBR-Buffalo spinners Al Meltzer, Jack Eno and Jack Gold invited the songstress to their respective programs for brief chats.

Using the theme "make that last one for the road a cup of coffee," WHIH-Norfolk, invited its audience to have a cup as the guest of the station over the July 4th holiday. The promotion was tied in with Carrols Drive In Restaurants with multiple outlets throughout the area. Starting July 2nd through July 4th, the station's deejays at frequent intervals reminded listeners "If you're partying over the holiday, drive safely and make that one for the road a cup of coffee. Have one on WHIH at any Carrols Drive In." Listeners needed only to drive to a Carrols Drive In and ask for a WHIH cup of coffee on the house. The outlet's program director Jack Baker said that wherever possible the station tries to inject a public service theme into all station contests and promotions.

Jack Kelly, who spins 'em on WKBW-Buffalo, is conducting a series of Saturday night record hops at Port Couderne Arena in Canada. Any artists interested in appearing on any of the hops should contact the deejay.

WBAB-Babylon, New York staffers are doing daily stints from the Suffolk County Fair including live broadcasts from the Mobile Studio parked at the entrance to the annual County Exhibition and Carnival. The station's Long Island audience is being invited to enter the contest. The prizes include encyclopedias and radios.

Bea Kalmus, popular Gotham singing-celebrity interviewer, who conducts her "Stairway To The Stars" show 12 midnight til 1 A.M. via CBS-WFPG from the Mayflower Hotel in Atlantic City, New Jersey nightly, is celebrating her fifteenth year as a radio air personality.

The third annual KSTT-Davenport, Iowa, Birthday Baseball Night was held July 3rd at Municipal Stadium before a record turnout of 12,095. It was the largest crowd in the history of the city for a local sporting event. The KSTT deejays played local fashion models in a baseball game before the regular class "D" midwest league game between the Quad-City Angels and the Cedar Rapids Braves. Free tickets were distributed through an area super market chain. A prize drawing and gigantic fireworks concluded the evening.

Ernie Maresca appeared on Tom Shannon's WKBW-TV Buffalo "Bandstand" show last week. This was the last program for Shannon who left after the broadcast for six months active duty in the Army. Dave Neaverth, another WKBW deejay, is expected to host the show until Tom returns.

Robert Q. Lewis, KHJ-Hollywood jockey, is running a "guess the mystery vocalist" contest on daily radio stanza. Winners get a varied assortment of prizes, most of which are more mysterious than the vocalist. Most records played are in the 1930 and 1940 vintage. . . . KHJ program director Arnie Schorr was guest speaker recently at Los Angeles City College and Pasadena City College, and was so effective, that within four days the station received 16 applications for radio jobs.

KBOX-Dallas was given special recognition recently for their editorial stand on the Citizen's Traffic Commission proposal to limit behind the wheel driver training to those students fifteen and older. KBOX-took the leading stand in the case by editorializing against the drivers younger than fifteen years. Dan Hydrick, general manager of the station, said that he felt that this support and public commendation by the CTC was gratifying and expressed the sincere feelings of civic leaders and educators throughout the greater Dallas area.

There's a welcome mat out for WMCA-New York spinner Jim Harriott at Long Island's Century Meadows Theatre. Box office receipts were up \$1,088 over the usual Wednesday night figures when Jim broadcast his radio show from the theatre lobby June 27 in connection with United Artists opening of "The Road To Hong Kong."

KYO-Seattle has embarked on an off-beat promotion that is both profitable and entertaining for their listeners. Each deejay's show becomes a new and different contest each day on the "KYO Scavenger Hunt." Once each half hour during the jockey's show an unusual item is mentioned for listeners to hunt. The first individual or group to bring all the named items to the station wins the prize . . . a transistor radio, record albums, theatre passes, etc. In addition to the "Scavenger Hunt," the outlet's program director, Chris Lane, added a special feature: every time a scavenger knocks on the door of a home seeking items in the hunt he asks "Is this the radio KYO fun house?" The bonus prize for the one who discovers the station's "fun house" is a record library including every recording on the current "single along '62 survey."

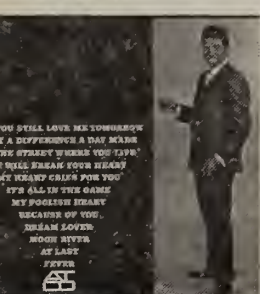
"THE CHAD MITCHELL TRIO AT THE BITTER END"—Kapp KL-1281

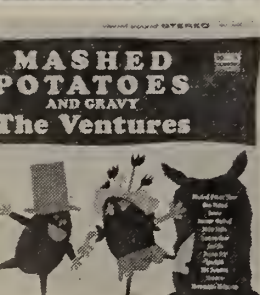
"THE STRIPPER AND OTHER BIG BAND HITS"—Si Zentner—Liberty LST 7247

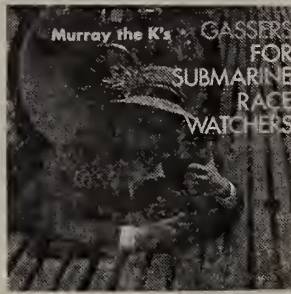
"THE GOLDEN HITS OF THE EVERLY BROTHERS"—Warner Brothers W1471

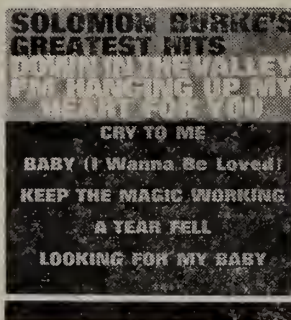
"BEN E. KING SINGS FOR SOULFUL LOVERS"—Atco 33-137
Following closely on the heels of his hit single, "Don't Play That Song," Ben E. King comes up with a package of standards and newbies done in his own special and spirited style. The chanter gives professional readings of tender ballads and smooth uptempo deliveries of the rhythm tunes. Included are "Dream Lover," "My Foolish Heart," "What A Difference A Day Made," and "It's All In The Game." The songster's fans should come out in droves for this one.



"MASHED POTATOES AND GRAVY"—The Ventures—Dolton BST-8016
The Ventures, whose last two twist LP's made it to chartsville, try for a third entry with this rhythmic package of tunes with a solid, driving beat. Geared especially for dancing the mashed potatoes, the tempos in this session are adaptable to other dances. Some swinging bands are "Gravy" (For My Mashed Potatoes), "The Wah-Watusi," "Hernando's Hideaway," and "Hully Gully." The disk should pull lots of coin.



"MURRAY THE K'S GASSERS FOR SUBMARINE RACE WATCHERS"—Various Artists—Chess LP 1470
Murray The K comes up with another package geared for his teen fans containing an impressive dozen of previous r&r and r&b hits and noisemakers. The spinner has carefully selected the tunes on this Chess outing with something for everyone. Some smart tracks here are the Shirelles' "Dedicated To The One I Love," "So Far Away" by the Pastels and the Harptones' "Life Is But A Dream." The disk should step out in winning fashion.



"SOLOMON BURKE'S GREATEST HITS"—Atlantic 8067
Solomon Burke, who has been making it big in the singles field with such best sellers as "Down In The Valley" and "I'm Hanging Up My Heart For You," includes these biggies in his premiere LP for Atlantic. The gospel-oriented chanter has a vibrant vocal style that comes off well in "Just Out Of Reach," "Gotta Travel On," "I Almost Lost My Mind," and "Keep The Magic Working." Plenty of sales potential here.



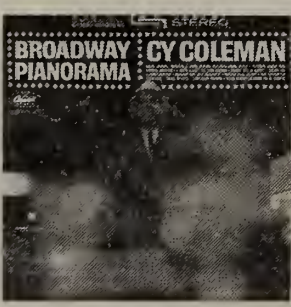
"THE GREAT GROUP GOODIES"—Various Artists—Atco 33-143
Here's another entry in the oldies derby that should find favor with a host of teen record buyers. With a sales-oriented eye the diskery has included fourteen rockin' items essayed with coin-catching style by such name artists as the Ikettes, the Robins, the Coasters and the Solitaires. Some of the previous chart-riders represented on the disk are "Framed," "Life Is But A Dream" and "Charlie Brown." Plenty of sales potential here.



"THE BLUES MAN"—John Lee Hooker—Battle BLP 6113
John Lee Hooker, currently making it big with "Boom Boom," sings a set of emotion-filled blues numbers inherently southern. The chanter sings of happiness, sadness, loneliness, and longing with a feelingful delivery that comes on strong in "Come On And See About Me," "I Want To Talk About You," "Wednesday Evenin' Blues," and "You're Leavin' Me Baby." The artist's current success could spark sales for the disk.



"SUGAR 'N' SPICE"—Ken Griffin—Columbia CL 1811
This new addition to the Griffin catalog has the organist playing a bevy of evergreens with his usual sophistication and stylized manner. The 88'er plays folk-oriented tunes, show melodies and romantic ballads on this Columbia release and includes such oldies as "Mary's A Grand Old Name," "Mother Machree," "Freight Train Boogie," "Where The River Shannon Flows," and "I'll Take You Home Again Kathleen." An easy listening disk.



"BROADWAY PIANORAMA"—Cy Coleman—Capitol ST 1740
Here is a top-drawer album from Capitol featuring the keyboard talents of Cy Coleman backed by a small combo and three feminine voices singing a part of each tune. Selecting his material from the music of Broadway, the 88'er swings through the melodies with verve and a catchy uptempo rhythm. A highly successful cleffer, the pianist plays his own "Tall Hope" from "Wildcat," and also includes "Old Devil Moon," "We Open In Venice," and "Luck Be A Lady." The disk is a sock item that should spark plenty of sales.



"ORIGINAL HITS VOLUME I"—Circa COH 1
There seems to be an unending deluge of "greatest hits" LP's and Circa gets into the swing of things with this album, a sampler of hit singles by a group of well known rock 'n roll artists. Leading off is Bobby Edwards' "You're The Reason," followed by such best-sellers as "Moments" by Jennell Hawkins, "Turn Around, Look At Me" by Glen Campbell, "The Surfer's Twist" by The Defiants, and "Once Upon A Time" by Rochelle and the Candles. A sock session with sure-fire appeal for the teen set.

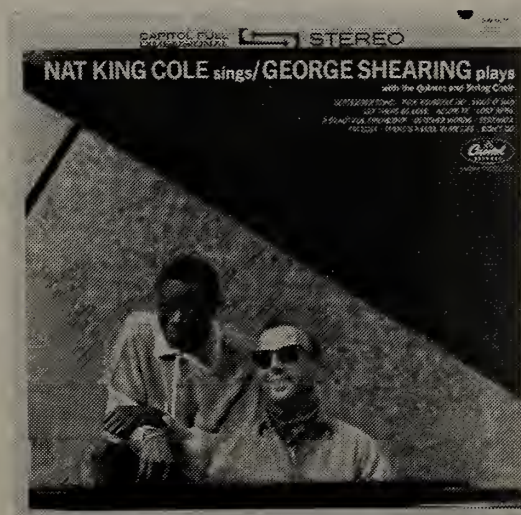

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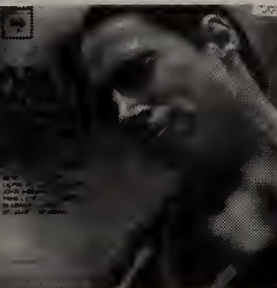
"INTRODUCING THE BEAUTIFUL NIKKI PRICE"—Epic LN 24005

Occasionally a new artist comes along with such an understanding of lyrics and phrasing that adjectives like superlative can be applied without fear of contradiction. Such a talent is Nikki Price. For this, her premiere album, the lark showcases an original, wide-range, jazz-flavored voice on "I'm A Stranger To Myself," "Fools Rush In" and "You Like Someone." A talent to watch.



"UP THE POTOMAC WITHOUT A CANOE"—Mark Russell—Columbia CL 1772

Mark Russell, with a rapier-like delivery, aims his satirical barbs at a host of political figures and lampoons various religious and minority groups in a manner most unoffensive. The comic accompanies himself on the piano and sings humorous ditties about national traditions, people and institutions. Russell is a sparkling wit with a fine sense of timing.



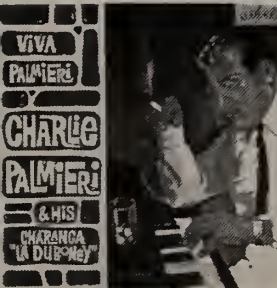
"IRA HAYES AND OTHER BALLADS"—Peter La Farge—Columbia CL 1795

Take one part country chanter, one part first-rate guitarist, one part rodeo rider and the result is new folk singer named Peter La Farge. The multi-talented artist is an accomplished folk chanter, guitarist, and tunesmith (he penned two of the tunes here). La Farge's style is all his own but the influence of his mentor, Josh White can be detected on "Ira Hayes," "I Gave My Love A Cherry" and "Alabama Bound." If this album is any indication, the songster seems destined for stardom.



"TED WEEMS' GOLDEN HITS"—Mercury SR 60708

Mercury comes up with a platter of nostalgia served up in fine style by the band of Ted Weems which scored many a ballroom triumph during the big band era of the 20's and 30's. Some of the arrangements might sound a bit schmaltzy today, but the Weems band follows a straight melodic line and can't be beaten for sheer musicianship. The orkster launches the set with his biggest hit, "Heartaches," and includes "Mickey," "Oh Mo-nah," "That Old Gang Of Mine," and "One Man Band." An excellent reissue of a fine band.



VIVA PALMIERI"—Charlie Palmieri—Alegre LPA 816

The Charanga La Duboney of Charlie Palmieri is an orchestral sound unfamiliar to the ears of most Americans until a few years ago. Unusual arrangements in which the melody is carried by flutes and strings highlight each orchestration in a very effective manner. Some interesting tracks are "El Vendedor De Mangos," "Lagrimas Y Tristeza," "Mi Amor No Esta De Moda," and "Estuve Pensando," all with a variety of tempos and rhythms. Good dance wax with a Latin flavor.



"CHRIST IN CONCRETE"—Eli Wallach—DaVinci D205

Eli Wallach gives a moving and powerful reading of Pietro Di Donato's "Christ In Concrete," with original music composed by Harold Seletsky. The thespian proves himself a great dramatic talent and a skillful master of character integration in this portrayal of the author's avant-garde work. Side 2 is devoted to a reading of Chekhov's one-act "Swan Song," and again Wallach emerges as an actor with great depth of feeling. A superb dramatic disk that merits the attention of the actor's and author's admirers.



"TWIST POLKA"—Ray Henry—Dana DL 1297

Dana offers its latest in the polka field, this time the music of Ray Henry and his polka band playing a collection of polkas, waltzes, obereks, and a twist polka tossed in for added measure. With emphasis on reeds and strings and toned-down brass, the lilting melodies are given a refreshing treatment. Polka fans will enjoy "Twist Polka," "Hop-Top-Jump Polka," "Tony, The Bachelor," and "Goodnight My Love."

JAZZ PICK OF THE WEEK



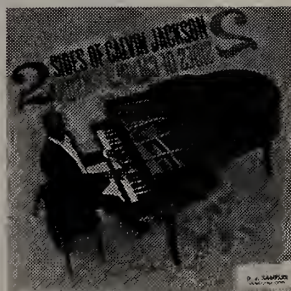
"LONELY WOMAN"—Modern Jazz Quartet—Atlantic 1381

John Lewis and the MJQ have earned many laurels in the past and this new Atlantic LP of impressive jazz items read by the group with their expected style and verve should go down the hitsville path in winning fashion. The session highlights the group's ability to inject symphonic statements along modern jazz lines. The quartet shines as they offer top-rung readings of "Lonely Woman," "New York 19" and "Lamb, Leopard." An eye-catching cover of a pretty lass should help spark sales.



"GRAVY TRAIN"—Lou Donaldson—Blue Note 4079

The most difficult thing in jazz is sounding different. Although he is strongly influenced by Charlie Parker, Lou Donaldson has developed a free-flowing style in the modern mainstream that is all his own. Donaldson is teamed up with Herman Foster on piano, Ben Tucker on bass, Dave Bailey on drums and Alec Dorsey on conga on this new Blue Note entry. The alto saxophonist gets a chance for some smart solos on the seven originals and standards included here. The group really swings on "Gravy Train," "Avalon" and "Twist Time."



"2 SIDES OF CALVIN JACKSON"—Reprise R-6022

This jazz offering from Reprise features the keyboard stylings of Calvin Jackson, a triple-threat composer, conductor, and pianist. Jackson's playing is jazz flavored but without the abrupt departure from the melodic line that characterizes much of the modern jazz. An adept arranger, the 88'er uses lush strings to complement his playing. First-rate bands are "Moon River," "Moonlight Sonata," "I'll Remember April," and "Like Someone In Love." Jazz buffs should go for this one.



"MAKE THE MAN LOVE ME"—Joy Bryan—Contemporary M 3604

For her initial album entry Joy Bryan's individuality and jazz-based musicianship rank her as one of the most promising new jazz larks to come along in quite a while, the thrush does not rely on gimmicks but renders the ten studlies on this album with an impressive, straight-forward appealing style. Some top-drawer bands here are "My Romance," "Almost Like Being In Love" and "These Foolish Things." A fine premiere showing.

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



"FRENCH PIANO MUSIC"—Andre Previn—Columbia ML 5746

The music of the French composers Roussel and Poulenc is interpreted by the skilled and artistic Andre Previn in his highly individualistic style. The pianist begins with the shorter pieces of Poulenc whose melodies are fused with French folklore and rich with clarity. On the other side Previn plays the longer works of Roussel which include "Trois Pieces" and the "Sonatine." This subtle but delightful blending of two sharply defined schools of composition is masterfully executed by the young performer. An excellent classical disk.



"MOISEIWITSCH PLAYS SCHUMANN"—Decca DL 710048

Benno Moiseiwitsch plays a collection of short romantic works of Robert Schumann, pieces which reflect the composer's feelings and emotions. The pianist has a light, delicate touch as he plays the "Kreileriana," eight short pieces depicting German romanticism. Also included are the "Kinderscenen," which contains the very beautiful "Traumeri" (Dreaming), "Arabesque," and the "Romance In F Sharp Major." First-rate listening enjoyment throughout.

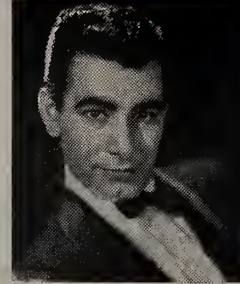

Vaughn's LP's, on Dot, are: "Theme From A Summer Place," "Blue Hawaii" and "Sail Along Silvery Moon."

Columbia LP's also getting awards include three original-cast LP's, "West Side Story," "Camelot" and "Flower Drum Song."

Jacqueline" is at the moment the most popular and the second one was sung to Mrs. Kennedy personally by Gilberto Valenzuela.

Rosita Quintana received an offer to play in Lima, Peru, in "My Fair Lady." Rosita has not decided yet. From the same city, a Post Card from Mexican singers Los Yorsy's who are fulfilling several contracts there.

Blanca Rosa Gil, who used to be one of the most famous singers in her country, Cuba, is planning to settle in México. She just signed a contract with Peerless Records, which released her "Aquel Rosario Blanco" and "La Vida Es Chinita" with Memo Salamanca's orchestra.

Los Fantasmas, popular Mexican trio, recorded also at Peerless Records the Spanish version of Brenda Lee's "Emotions," having on the other side Xavier Ra's composition "No, Ya No Me Quieras."

A big party was given because the sixteenth anniversary of the popular radio show "Así Es Mi Tierra," which all this time has been performed exclusively with Mexican artists.

Emilio Azárraga, the Mexican radio and TV magnate, returned to Mexico by after a long trip through Europe, where he spent a vacation combined with checking European TV programs. Composer Alberto Domínguez ("Perfidia," "Frenesi") will start a long tour beginning in Venezuela and ending in Rio de Janeiro. Domínguez is also a good pianist and arranger and RCA will very soon make a new LP on which he is going to introduce 12 of his new songs.

Big success for Enrique Guzmán, at the moment the most popular singer of the new wave," in the Blanquita Theater, where he is starring in the musical "W. Enrique also performs on TV, in movies, night clubs and on tours throughout the country. His latest Columbia LP will appear very soon.

Many visitors in Italy: Miss Gisela Kirsch of Sikorski (Hamburg); Gerard Hammerling of Schaeffers (Berlin and Munich); and at the same time three leading persons from South America: Riccardo Korn of Julio Korn (Buenos Aires), Vincente Mangione of Euterpe (Rio de Janeiro) and Enrique Lebendiger of Fermata (Sao Paulo).

Cash Box enjoyed a pleasant dinner with Mr. Lebendiger, along with Bruno Pozza of Ricordi and Mario Panvini Rosati of International Music. Lebendiger was in Rome to attend the meeting of C.I.S.A.C. (International Federation of Authors, Composers and Publishers) and then spend one week in Milan visiting Curci, Messaggerie Musicali, the Mintangians, Walter Gurtler, Tony Dallara and his brother, the Aberbach house in Rome and others. . . . Lebendiger recently enjoyed two big successes here with "La Novia," especially the version by Dallara, and "Brigitte Bardot" of which a lot of record versions were cut. Italian talent Mina and Dallara showed Lebendiger great interest in some of his new songs and it is likely they will cut them. Next possible hit here is "Luminarias," sub-published in Italy by Ricordi. But main result of his stay in Milan was the establishment of his Italian representation: in fact from now on Fermata will be represented in Italy by Mario Panvini Rosati. Incidentally, there was a second dinner with him, in the company of Franz Leonardi, the Milan music publisher, who has bought from Fermata the piece "Chega De Saudade," penned by the same author who composed "Orfeo Negro."

From Durium: Marino Marini selling with "Quando Quando" and "Caterina," Little Tony with new song "Liana," and Nini Rosso with the follow up to "Ballad Of A Trumpet," "Evelynne." A new piece by Nini Rosso will be released by Durium next autumn under the title "The Clown," which will surely repeat the big success of "Ballad." Dion of Laurie Records, represented here by Durium, is selling with "Born To Cry" and "Little Diane." Dion is due in Italy next autumn and Durium is trying to get TV stints for him.

From RCA Italiana: "Quando Calienta El Sol," which is a fascinating South American waxing, has not yet boomed, though it is selling fairly well; Perry Como is high with his famous "Caterina," while "La Paloma" is still selling strong, Elvis Presley comes out with "Good Luck Charm," Paul Anka sells well with "Agni Giorno," his Italian version of "Love Me Warm And Tender." The Tokens sell good enough with "The Lion Sleeps To Night," a record which was expected to hit stronger in Italy, but the taste of the public is something hard to forecast; on the domestic front, RCA Italiana has released as strong pieces, "Pinne Fucili Ed Occhiali" by Edoardo Vianello and "Lasciami Il Tuo Sorriso" by Nico Fidenco and "Basta Così" by the newly pacted Sergio Endrigo. More detailed news on RCA Italiana will appear next week.

Interesting EP by Tony Renis featuring his best dates: "Quando Quando," "Tango Per Favore," "Blu and Amor Amor." The other VCM best selling artist, Pino Donaggio, is still high with "La Ragazza Col Maglione." Nino Impallomeni, the Italian trumpeter of VCM, has cut "Moliendo Cafe" and "Afrikaan Beat." VCM released last week a sensational record titled "Sensational (The Exciting Sounds & Rhythms Of Les Baxter's Piano, Chorus And Ork)" on Capitol.

Ray Conniff, who enjoys in Italy widespread popularity, is due here by the end of this month and Manlio Baron, the director of Melodicon (Philips Italiana), plans to hold a party in his villa outside Milan in honor of the talent.

Biggest changes are expected at Rifi Records very soon. They are on the point of being finalized with an outstanding foreign organization.

David Toff, the music publisher from London, visited Milan in the company of his wife, contacting many publishers here. Their stay in Italy ended with a visit of several days to Stresa, a resort on the Lake Maggiore, 50 Kilometri from Milan.

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ENGLAND

A party was hosted last week by the directors of Leomark Ltd. to mark the anniversary of their first LP release of their New English Bible—New Testament. In the first year, nine LP's have been issued and the complete set of 12" LP's will be available by July, 1963. Issued with text and study notes the records are designed for use in churches, schools, homes, hospitals, libraries, etc. and have already met with success in Great Britain, Eire, Australia, Tasmania, Malaya, Korea, Japan, Africa, India, The West Indies, Central America and Europe. They will shortly be available in the United States and Canada (Columbia), South Africa (Gallo) and New Zealand (Delta).

The recordings, which are produced by Frederick Bradshaw, are made under license from the Oxford and Cambridge University Presses and feature many of this country's leading actors and actresses. The recording of The Gospel according to John which is issued in three parts was recently nominated "The Best Spoken Word Record of 1961" by a national poll of record dealers.

After four weeks on location in Greece, Cliff Richard and The Shadows are back in England to complete work on the musical film "Summer Holiday." Cliff sings nine songs—three with The Shadows. Production numbers have been written by Peter Myers and Ronnie Cass and the feature numbers, including the title song, by Hank Marvin and Bruce Welsh of The Shadows. The film has its West End premiere in December. Meantime, Cliff and the Groves visit the States in Sept. for the American opening of "The Young Ones" titled "Wonderful To Be Young" and a new title song will be waxed here for Stateside release.

Looks like a well earned hit for Australian singer Frank Ifield, who entered the charts after one week with "I Remember You" issued on Columbia and published by Chappells.

Publisher Roy Berry of Campbell Connelly happy to have the fast climbing "Little Rented Row Boat" by Joe Dowell issued here on Mercury and in the States on Smash.

Freddie Poser, late of Mills Music and now operating his own publishing and artist management company, currently handling "Angela" debut disk Decca by Jay and Tony Scott. Also has "Every Little Kiss" on HMV by Mike Berry, who last year won healthy sales with "Tribute To Buddy Holly."

Impresario Vic Lewis, who until two years ago was one of this country's top band leaders, picks up the baton again and with a newly formed orchestra all set to record four compositions by Nelson Riddle for release by EMI. The American conductor-composer, who is currently enjoying tremendous popularity over here, recently appointed Vic Lewis as his business manager for territories outside the U.S. embracing films, TV, music et al.

Cabaret artists Daphne Barker and Iain Kerr, resident entertainers at the Society Restaurant have waxed an LP entitled "Banned"—which it has been by the BBC. Just the platter for a party so Philips hosted one to launch it at its Stanhope Place headquarters.

Because of the popularity of Johnny Taylor's original version of "Romeo (Wasn't Built In A Day)" British cover waxed by Anne Shelton on Philips will not get Stateside release. However, Philips reports that another American smash, Bobby Vinton's chart topping "Roses Are Red," has been covered here by Ronnie Carroll for July release.

John Schroeder, A & R manager for Oriole Records, recently in Stockholm discussing plans with Simon Brehm of Karusel Records for bringing The Spotnicks to England in August. Schroeder later planned to Hamburg to arrange for release in Germany of two of Oriole's brightest hopes, Susan Sing and Tony Sheveton. Back in London, Schroeder will record a second LP with the label's top artist, Clinton Ford.

Monty Lewis just back from a successful trip to the States where arrangements were concluded with Cy Leslie to set up a subsidiary company of Pickwick International Ltd. in Great Britain. Commencing operations in October the company will market 12" LP's for considerably less than £1 (\$2.75). Lewis plans distribution via supermarkets, departmental stores etc. as well as through normal trade channels. Two series of children's disks—12" LP's and 7" EP's are also planned—available through normal record outlets and toy shops. Pure vinyl-pressing will ensure a top standard product, says Lewis who will continue to direct his own Rainbow Records, specializing in promotional disks for marketing with non-allied products.

Coincidental with the eagerly awaited premiere of "Music Man," Warner Bros. released the soundtrack LP featuring Robert Preston and Shirley Jones. The film score is handled by Chappells.

Top dj David Jacobs comperes a new weekly BBC TV show "Twist" with Don Lang and his Twisters and Tony Osborne and his Mellowmen.

"Bing's Hollywood"—a collection of 15 Crosby LP's comprising 189 songs featured in 42 films and spanning 22 years, has been issued by Decca as a well deserved tribute to this great artist. Each sleeve carries a color portrait of "The Groaner" as he appeared in one or other of his films.

With modern diesel engines taking over from the rapidly disappearing steam engines, railway enthusiasts—and there are many of them in England—will be able to listen to the last non-stop steam run from London to Edinburgh (Scotland) which has been put on disk by Argo Records and which will be available in both mono and stereo form later this year. Argo's managing director Harvey Usill, reports a steady demand for disks of this nature as several LP's and EP's have already been issued. Many famous steam engine have been recorded for posterity.

A welcome invasion from Nashville, Tennessee is imminent in London. Della Reese appears in "Chelsea At Nine" for Granada TV on July 25 and Jim Reeves, Chet Atkins and Floyd Cramer arrive later in the summer for a two-week appearance in South Africa.

KPM very happy to have "Some Other Love" featured in a recent TV play of the same name. Bert Weedon's Parlophone recording looks like getting into the charts. Other waxings by The Nashville Five (a British group nothing to do with Tennessee) on Decca and Harry Robinson on Philips.

The Sadlers Wells Trust has just signed a three-year agreement permitting six operas to be televised by the BBC. First production will be "The Mikado" from the Sadlers Wells current program.

Comedian Michael Bentine simulates the voices of more than 50 people from as many countries on his latest LP, "It's A Square World." The disk was produced by Parlophone's ever imaginative A & R manager, George Martin.

Promoter Don Arden confirms that Sophie Tucker will play four dates in England during the autumn starting at The Prince of Wales Theatre on October 27th.

Lee Pincus of Ambassador Music reports success with Andy Cavell's HMV recording of "Hey There Cruel Heart." An American version has been waxed by Chase Webster on Dot and publishing rights acquired by the parent firm Gil Pincus Corp. An Australian waxing is expected shortly. Pincus will be making a brief visit to the States within the next few weeks.

Indie producer Joe Meek chart happy with Mike Sarne's "Come Outside" Parlophone hopes Mike Berry's "Every Little Kiss" will have the same success. Meantime, Meek reports a change of style and rhythm for John Leyton on his latest Egyptian flavored release, "Down The River Nile" on HMV.



FRANCE

Some time ago, this column referred to the various changes occurring within the Ricordi Company of France. Since then, Ricordi's public relations gal, Maria Wencel, has filled in with a few more details. According to Miss Wencel, Guido Valcareugni has been named P.D.G., while the agreement between Ricordi-Vox Productions and Nadif has been signed. It is well-known that P. Bourgeois, the Nadif head, has long been a specialist in the sale of low-priced records on newspaper stands. Maria Wencel therefore believes the new Ricordi-Vox-Nadif pact will enable the team to resolve a few of the distribution problems now facing every French company as a result of the Common market.

Henri Vic, head of Fantasia Publications, highly satisfied with his success with "Un Premier Amour," is now betting heavily on "Ne Boude Pas," the French adaptation by Vic & Valade of Dave Brubeck's "Take Five." Thus far, two recordings of "Ne Boude Pas" have been made, one by Richard Anthony, the other by Jerry Mengo. The team of Vic & Ithier have also written "Seigneur, Tu Le Sais," already waxed by both Candido and Maya Casabianca. Maya remains an enigma. Off to an excellent start awhile back, she met with a nearly fatal accident and although happily recovered, she has done nothing much since. "Seigneur, Tu Le Sais" may get her off to a new climb upwards. Vic is also delighted at having the copyright to "Imagination" by Contreras, recently cut by Doris Day, as yet no French adaptation has been recorded.

Ledrich has recorded "L'ami Fritz Se Marie" by Bertret & Ledrich. Jean Fernandez of Barclay's says Les Chaussettes Noires have starring roles in the film "How To Succeed In Love," with Dany Saval as feminine lead. Garvarentz composed the music to this, and the six main titles will be cut for Barclay by the "Chaussettes." Still in the world of film music: before leaving for South America, Charles Aznavour will record the title song from "Les Comediens," which is certain to be a big hit in the future.

A whale of a cocktail-party was given at the Epi Club by Eddie Barclay in honor of Atlantic stars, The Commanders.

Finally, a few lines about Hughes Aufray: despite not having as yet found the song he needs to confirm him in stardom, Aufray is becoming very well-known in the world of song. Perhaps "Cotton Fields," "500 Miles," or "Les 2 Frères" will correct this. Hughes is to record all three with his skiffle group, but "Les 2 Frères" is the one to watch.

Versailles has signed a distribution agreement with Yamaha Music of Japan, with Unatex of Israel and with the well-known SRL Company of Argentina.

DENMARK

Nordisk Polyphon A/S has made an agreement with Gyldendalske Boghandel—Nordisk Forlag A/S, book publisher, to handle its Louisiana label. The start has been made with two LP's. Polyphon has also released an EP with Danish folk songs, among them "I Danmark Er Jeg Født" (In Denmark Where I Was Born) sung by the Copenhagen's Boys and Male Choir directed by Mogens Wöldike. Americans of Danish origin, visiting the old country this summer will buy the records, Owe Wiisholm of NPA told Cash Box.

French chansonette Patachou is doing very well at the Tivoli in Copenhagen during July. Critics were very enthusiastic. Swedish singer Anita Lindblom, the Fontana artist, opened at the restaurant Kystens Perle, north of Copenhagen on July 1.

FINLAND

Rolf Kronqvist, record producer at Oy R E Westerlund Ab, back from biz visit to Russia where he visited Moscow and Leningrad, among other cities.

Finnish singer Laila Kinnunen doing very well in Sweden, where she is touring this summer, according to reports from Stockholm.

The Columbia artist, Lill-Jörgen, is doing very well, reports Martti Piha of Pohjoismainen Sähkö Oy (PSO). Piha was very happy that Columbia had two records on the "Eight at the Top," a new Hit Parade program introduced by Finnish Broadcasting Company (FBC) on June 29. Lill-Jörgen topped the list and Cliff Richard with "The Young Ones" came in at the eighth spot.

SWEDEN

John Schroeder of Oriole Records in London phoned the Cash Box office and said he had spent two days in Stockholm with biz talks with Karusell Records. The young and upcoming group The Spotnicks tour Britain in August, he said.

Anders Holmstedt, head of Skandinavisk Grammophon AB, the EMI company, told Cash Box that starting this autumn, Thore Skogman will produce his own records and release them via the EMI organization. At the moment, Skogman is recording for Polka, a label from Scandisc in Stockholm.

Saga Sjöberg represented Sweden in a song festival in Zoppot in Poland over the weekend of July 7-8. She sings "När Min Vän" (When My Friend) by Owe Thörnqvist. The Polish song festival had representatives from some 20 European countries and Israel. The U.S. was represented by Connie Francis, who finally came to the event. Miss Francis is busy with film work in southern France and her film company was not too willing to let her go, but the U.S. Foreign Office stepped in and saved American goodwill. Originally, the idea was to bring Benny Goodman and his Orchestra to Zoppot after they completed their tour in Russia, but these plans had to be cancelled. The Polish song festival is covered by Intervision, the international TV-net of countries behind the iron curtain.

Börje Ekberg of Metronome told Cash Box that Ann-Louise Hansson and Anna-Lena Löfgren, two Swedish Metronome artists, are doing very well in Germany these days. Both are on the local charts in Germany with records (in German) made in Stockholm. Miss Löfgren is on the charts with "Schöner Als Es War," which is a Swedish song titled "Det Man Inte Får," published by Multitone.

Harriet Forsell, who did very well as Eliza in "My Fair Lady" in Gothenburg last winter, is planning a six weeks visit to New York this autumn.

BENELUX

Bovema's publicity-department has started editing a very attractively illustrated leaflet, "Teenager Hits," distributed free of charge to clients of all Bovema-dealers in the country. News and articles from the teen-music business, as well as a monthly quiz will help to promote and stimulate the interest for Bovema's teen repertoire.

Imperial's singing duo The Marichica's started their trip to New-Guinea on July 4. They will take their share in the entertainment of the Dutch army-forces overseas. Before they left, their new record "Vergeet Mij Niet" (flipside: "Maling Aan De Rest") was released on the Dutch record-market.

Bovema's Gramophonehouse will exclusively release the Epic- and Okeh-repertoire as well as some out of the CBS-repertoire (with such artists as George Maharis, Claude King, Jimmy Dean and Bobby Vinton) on its Columbia-label in Holland.

The new Bobby Vee-recording, "Sharing You"—on Bovema's Liberty-label has been released. His Master's Voice also launched Conny Froboess' new hit, "Lady Sunshine And Mister Moon."

John Ros, label manager for popular Decca in Holland (L. C. Phonogram), told Cash Box that the stereo "phase four" recordings on English Decca have found a satisfactory market in Holland already. He reported that Dutch dealers have also found in these brilliant recordings (the latest achievements in stereo's progress) a very convincing means of stereo-demonstration to support their sales in hi-fi and stereo sets. Mr. Ros was glad to announce that the June-July releases on Decca featured two new phase four LP's: "Percussion In The Sky" by Werner Müller & His Orchestra and "Twelve Star Percussion," a recording of International Pop All Stars.

The release was reported last week of a Dutch Decca-single: "Marching Along With The Blue Diamonds"—after seven days over 10 thousand copies have been sold in Holland. This was the result of TV and radio-plugging only, and the record is certainly "marching along" to a solid golden record hit. The Blue Diamonds were enlisted for the Technical Troops in April 1962; the boys recorded their popular medleys of Anglo-American soldiers' songs in the canteen of their barracks, in May 1962, with a choir of 700 soldiers and orchestra conducted by Jack Bulterman.

A new Dutch talent-discovery is an 11 year old girl named Sandra. Her beautiful soprano can be heard on a Philips single, with "Al Di La" and "Duzenden Sterren." Insiders like Dutch singer Willy Alberti were very much impressed by the young girl's musical qualities.

The Swiss-born composer Frank Martin (Geneva, 1890), particularly well-known for his Concerto For Violin (1951) and his Petite Symphonie Concertante (1945), is living in Holland since 1946 and has had quite an influence upon musical life in this country. As Hans Tecker, Decca's label manager for Holland pointed out: "It is, therefore, not unlikely that the new Decca-recording of two Martin works will become an excellent sales-item in Holland, the more so as this recording is the very first of both works." They are a Concerto for seven wind instruments, tympni, percussion and strings from 1949, and Etudes for string orchestra from 1956, both composed in commission. The works are performed by The Suisse Romande Orchestra, conducted by the great European advocate of modern music, Ernest Ansermet.

Fast climbing hit "Speedy Gonzales" by Pat Boone was released during the last week of June in Holland on the London label. Also released on London was "West Of The Wall" by Toni Fischer.

Latest rush-release out of the Delta Studio has been "Fanfarella," played in the Bob Moore-tradition by trumpeter Bert Grayson. First sales results in Holland are great. "Fanfarella" will be released in Germany by Ariola. Italy will release the record under Durium-label.

Other recent Delta-recordings: a very gay, Dutch-sung "Piccalilly" and "Una Noche" by the sensational Spanish discovery Trio Venus.

Among Dureco L.C.'s recent single-releases were two Top 100-items: "Cindy's Birthday" by Johnny Crawford (Del-Fi) and "Uptown" by The Crystals (Philles), released here on the Metronome-label.

Dureco L.C. released also a 12" Hed-Arzi LP about "The Process Eichman." The proceeds of the this LP will be partly granted to The Anne Frank Foundation.

Best-selling singles of Dureco during the month of June were: "Ship Ahoy" by The Singing Priest (Omega), "Rosa" by Jacques Brel (Barclay), "Ciao Amore" by Adriano Celentano (Caramba), "Valencia" by Jörgen Ingmann (Metronome), "Quando, Quando, Quando" by Claudio Villa (Cetra) and "Caterina" by Bobbejaan Schoepen (Omega).

First Stateside records to be released in Belgium by S. A. Gramophone: "Palisades Park" by Freddy Cannon and "Twistin' Matilda" by Jimmy Soul and to be released in the very next few days a lot of other hot U.S. singles on other labels of Gramophone S.A.E. as "Dancin' Party" by Chubby Checker, "Seven Day Weekend" by Gary U.S. Bonds, "Roses Are Red" by Bobby Vinton, "Wolverton Mountain" by Claude King, and "Teach Me Tonight" by George Maharis. Gramophone's best-seller of last week: a sure hit for the weeks to come: "Quando, Quando, Quando" by Italian singer Tony Renis (La Voce Del Padrone), recently number 1 in Italy and still in the charts in this country.

Polydor reports that "Yours, And Yours Alone" by Kenny Chandler is reaching unforeseen sales and demand is growing more and more every day. Further, Polydor's "Petit Gonzales" by Daniel Gérard, "Le Mexicain" by Marcel Amont and "Rik Van Looy" by Franky Bodet are hot.

The German Best Sellers topper for the past months has been the first German language record from Mina, who is swiftly becoming Italy's number one export item. Mina recently visited Germany for press conferences in Hamburg and Munich after making her new German record in Vienna under the A&R leadership of Gerhard Mendolson, who also handles Connie Francis here. The young lass brought her mother and Italdisc record company topper Dave Matalon along. Her last platter here is nearing the 1/2 million mark in sales at present, but top hits are no stranger to Mina. Her recording of "Il Cielo In Una Stanza" sold 750,000 copies in Italy and is the biggest selling record in Italy yet. Mina is also recording in Japanese for RCA Victor over the Rank Organization, in Spanish for Discophon, in French for Philips and she will soon make her first English speaking records. It is at this time unknown which label will issue her releases in the U.S., but due to the close ties between her A&R man and MGM, she will certainly handle with the firm for production there. Her former manager and now record company owner, Dave Matalon, built this label Italdisc on Mina's successes, and her records constantly top the Italian charts. It is certain that she will become an international top star as well, as the lass has verve, and drive as well as a singing voice. She is already so busy that she accepts no one-nighters and only works TV, films and record dates. She's set for several future nation wide TV shots here, and is making her first German film. There's no doubt about the fact that Mina is definitely established as a top star in Germany.

Rudi Schroeder of Will Meisel Music reports action on top hits from its Spanka, Meisel and Monopol publishing houses. The top hits at present include the Paul Anka hit, "A Steel Guitar And A Glass Of Wine," "Lover Please" done in German by John Lamers and several versions including a German record from Brian Hyland of his hit "Ginny Come Lately." Hans R. Beierlein of Montana Music reports that the first German waxings with English-French star Petula Clark were recently made in Munich. For the recordings, top German composers Werner Scharfenberger, Charly Niessen, Karl Goetz and Christian Bruhn were represented with originals and the production was in the hands of German conductor-arranger Henry Meyer and the chief A&R man from Vogue, Jacques Wolfsohn. Hans has all of the numbers sewed up for his publishing firm.

Theo Seeger of Peer Music reports that two great South-American songs have now been done in German. "El Reloj" and "Un Telegrama" have both been done by Gaby Novak, a new singer on the Supertone label. August Seith of Seith-Chappell Music reports that the Harry Belafonte song "Bali Mena," has been done in German by Anneke Groenloh, the standard hit "Don't Let The Stars Get In Your Eyes" is being renewed by Peter Beil, and two German songs of the Seith catalog "Bambus-Bambina" and "The Sweet Life" are being handled by Leo Leandros and Vivi Bach. All of the above mentioned songs will soon be released by Philips and star-producer Ernst Verch handled the production. Ernst is presently represented on the Best Sellers with the top two records there.

Dieter Heck of Marbot Music reports that along with his hits, he found another winner and married her. Dieter tied the knot in Hamburg on June 28.

Ralf Bendix, Electrola record star, has been signed to sing the title song for the Columbia film "Walk On The Wild Side" in German. He'll also handle the vocals on "Somewhere In The Used To Be." Brook Benton handled the choro stateside. Both songs are published by Peter Schaeffers here.

Peter Schaeffers also reports that there's plenty of action in Berlin at present. At the recent film festival Peter celebrated the 10th anniversary of his Melody Flm firm with a party for 250 guests at his home. Present were stars such as Tony Curtis and James Stewart. Music wise, his publishing house is swinging with plenty of top German hits including Speedy Gonzales with Pat Boone and Dalida in German, and new hits by Lys Assia, Heidi Bruhl, Lou Van Burg, Carmela Corren, Jan & Kjeld, Hildegard Knef, Jimmy Makulis and many others.

BRAZIL

Benigno Modugno's "Addio Addio," winner of the San Remo Festival of 1935, is beginning to get very popular around here. Copacabana Records just issued a Brazilian version made by Fred Jorge, with the young singer Roberto Audi. Romantic lyrics and a good arrangement. This can be a hot number on our charts.

Sao Paulo recently had original musical session in the Municipal Theatre. It was composed by young Brazilian musicians, members of the Camargo Guarani School. The first part of the program presented that evening was dedicated to chorale music, headed by Coral Paulistano. The second part was done by pianist, Eudoxia De Barros, who played the following compositions: Suite Infantil No. 2, by Persio Rocha; 7 Variações, by Lina De Campos; Seresta Suite Infantil No. 2, by Sergio Vasconcellos; Ciclo Miniatura and Ponteio No. 2, by Nilson Lombardi, and 14 Variações, by Almeida Prado. The third part was entirely dedicated to Oswaldo Lacerda's works; including Sonata Para E Viola, Variações And Fuga for wind quintet, played by Johannes Hebenaker and Eudoxia De Barros. Brazilian younger generation has in mind its music too, not only sambas, rocks, cha-cha-chas, and twists.

Philips just released many LP's. Among the pop LP's are "Max Greger's The Express," with Max Greger's Ork, under Polydor label. "Twist-Salut Les Amis," (Philips) with Johnny Hallyday performing American twists, "The Hit The Road" with Ray Charles, released here under the Polydor label. (Considering that Ray Charles proved to be a hot seller around here, this is the most promising LP of this series. In this album he sings very well in songs, such as "Georgia On My Mind," "Basin Street Blues," "Moonlight Sermon," and others). "Paul Anka Sings His Big 15 No. 3," featuring some of his hits like "Cinderella," "Loveland," "Cry," "All Of Me," etc., "Encore Of His Hits" with The Platters, "San Remo In Rhythm," with Tulio Gallo and Orchestra playing San Remo's hits for dancing, "Earl After Dark" with Earl Grant. The only Brazilian release, were "La Vai Brasa," with three harp players: Jair Fraga, Geraldo Martire and Carlos Barreto, and "Francisco Jose E Seus Sucessos De Oro," with the Portuguese singer who lives in Brazil, presenting some of his greatest hits.

In the classical field, Philips released Berlioz's Symphonie Fantastique, with Orchestre des Concerts Lamoureux of Paris under the direction of Igor Stravinsky. (Original label: Deutsche Grammophon.) Liszt's Concertos Nos. 1 and 2, with pianist Sviatoaslav Richter and London Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Kyril Kondrashin, Mozart's Symphonies Nos. 35 (Haffner) and 38, (La Figlia), with the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by Karl Bohm.

CANADA

If the sounds on their new Coral release are any indication, The Count Victors, a swingin', singin' group from Peterboro, Ont., seem destined for success by the bucket full in the very near future. The boys have had releases on the Quality label in time past that have proved to be potent sellers on the regional scale. However, their first outing for Coral will have all the exposure that this major label can give them from coast to coast in Canada and The U.S. Top side on their first Coral session, at this writing, seems to be "Don't Laugh At Me ('Cause I'm A Fool)." According to Hal Ross at Compo, the song was a big hit in England some years ago. Featured in the lead vocal spot on the deck is Danny Harrison. The flip side spotlights some first class "moovin' and groovin'" on the part of the Count Victors. It's the while-back Jimmy Reed blues outing, "Peepin' 'N Hidin'." The Count Victors line up as follows: Fred Munro—piano; Danny Harrison—guitar and lead vocal; Terry Lathangue—drums; and Bob Dixon—bass. In months gone by they have been featured in "live" appearances with some of the leading record acts in North America, including Bill Haley, Bobby Rydell, Bobby Curtola and U.S. Bonds.

There's a move afoot to bring the syndicated "Hound Dog" radio show to Canada. George Lorenz and Stu Levy, head men in the production and distribution of the show now heard on some twenty-eight American stations via tape out of Buffalo, New York, aren't saying too much at this stage of the game, but negotiations are underway to bring "Hound" to Canadian airwaves.

The Phonodisc head men in both Toronto and Montreal are busily preparing extensive promotions and receptions to tie in with the appearance of Jane Morgan in the Grandstand Production of Ottawa's Central Canada Exhibition from Monday August 20, through Saturday August 25. If Jane's appearance in the Capital even comes close to previous P.A.'s by the thrush in other Canadian centers, it will be a smash. Co-starring with Miss Morgan at the Ottawa Fair will be George Gobel and Columbia disk stars, Jerry Murad And The Harmonicats.

Young Jerry Palmer from Fort William, Ontario has been appearing in the Toronto area in a series of live shots recently. The Gaiety recording artist, and his manager, Don Grashey, plan to spend most of the month of July in Eastern Canada. Together with his band, The Rock-A-Byes, Jerry did one nighters at Streetsville and Brampton, Ontario late in June. If present plans work out, they'll be doing one night stands in the Ottawa area late in July. Jerry's latest hit side on the Gaiety label is "Gotta Learn To Twist." Label is handled in the east by Raleigh Record Sales—Toronto.

Roy Smith, of the promotion department at Compo in Montreal, reports that the company's radio station release plan for albums, inaugurated some two years back, has proved to be highly successful. The plan, whereby stations receive all new album material produced by Compo at a cost of one dollar for mono, and one dollar and twenty-five cents for stereo, over a specified time period from date of release, and the entire catalog at dealers cost, has proved popular with participating stations. It has been renewed to June 30, 1963.

Montreal's French language fifty thousand watter, CKAC, celebrates its fortieth anniversary in September. Of the original four men who were in charge of the original French Language broadcasts in Canada, over CKAC, Montreal in 1922, one man is still active with the station. He is Leonard Spencer, technical supervisor for the station. No less than nine men currently active at the management level in CKAC have been with the outlet for more than twenty-five years each.

CJLX—Lakehead deejay George Morris played host to Liberty recording star Buddy Knox recently when Buddy played a one niter at The Head Of The Lakes. "She's Gone," Buddy's latest for Liberty, received its Canadian premiere while Buddy visited with George on his show. Telephone reaction by listeners to both Buddy and his new side were fabulous reports the deejay. A member of Buddy's band, a recording star in his own right, Myron Lee, also spent some time on the Morris show. Myron has a new release on Del-Fi called "Town Girl."

Lucky folks in Vancouver. Julie London scheduled for a ten day stay at the west coast city's leading night spot, The Cave, (7/9) Gilles Aubin, London's National Field Rep., busy trying to convince the brass that his presence was required in Vancouver some time during Julie's ten day stay. Aubin has been so busy at his home office in Montreal of late, he just may not get out to the coast. He reports that the Phase 4 stereo series (Cash Box 7/14) has developed into a tremendously commercial item, and the London office is hard pressed to handle all the orders. Moreover new album release by Roy Orbison—"Greatest Hits," Fats Domino—"Million Sellers," Sandy Nelson—"Drumming Up A Storm" and The Mar-Keys—"Do The Popeye" have also kept Gilles and the rest of the folks at London unusually busy for the early summer months. The label has introduced its Fall Plan which offers dealers a straight ten percent discount on all catalog material until October 19, complete exchange privileges and deferred payments set up as follows: one third on November 10, one third on December 10th, and one third on January 10th., 1963. Top singles being handled by the London folks currently are "Things" by Bobby Darin; both sides of the new Atco release by Acker Bilk; the new item by Fats Domino and a new country release by Hank Cochran.

Billy Martin, Montreal recording star on London, played a week at the Ottawa House Hotel in Hull, Quebec beginning 7/7. He brought a copy of an LP he did for London's French language series into CKOY. The selections—all instrumental standards—proved to be excellent programming items. The set demonstrated the versatility of the artist and his group who have been riding high with a twist set under the London banner.

ARGENTINA

Neil Sedaka was the "visitor of the week" in Buenos Aires. The American singer performed on television and at dance parties organized by Escala Musical. His main engagement took place at the Luna Park Stadium, July 8. Previously, Sedaka spent several days in Santiago, Chile.

Daniel Gutierrez, artist manager, reported to Cash Box that Ives Montand, the French actor, singer and pianist will be in Buenos Aires Nov. 12. Manolo Muñoz, Mexican twister who has been already in Argentina this year, will return in October to perform with Chubby Checker at the Luna Park. This event (combined with "Twist Festivals") is also organized by Escala Musical.

Columbia is continuing its "artist of the month campaign." The first artists of the month were Los Cincos Latinos, before they started their new European trip. Now, Waldo de los Rios (arranger and orchestra director) will receive special promotion during July and August. As part of the plan, he will visit record stores and sign records for his admirers. All his records (he has several albums, like "Gold Music" and "South American Suite") will be highlighted in stores and on radio stations.

More about Columbia: the label reports record sales of "West Side Story," the LP with the music from the flick, in its first week of sales. This album has been also released in its stereo version, considering that there is a good market for this type of record. Besides, Columbia will put to sale a "Sing Along With Mitch" album in August. Previously, it had cut two LP's by Los Alegres Cantores, with popular "sing along" music in Spanish, with very good success.

Jose A. Rota, International A&R of Odeon (EMI representative in Argentina), has started a new tour of several provinces. The main reason for this visit is to promote Odeon records through the TV stations in the cities of Mar del Plata, Cordoba and Mendoza. Odeon has been promoting its newest "Favuloso" Selection LP through the Buenos Aires channels, with four daily one-minute spots, besides its normal radio exposure.

Alberto Martinez, coordinator of Southern Music operations in South America, has returned from a several weeks tour of Mexico, Brazil, Colombia, Peru and Chile, started after Mrs. Ralph S. Peer's visit to South America about a month ago. Martinez has been visiting the Peer representatives in these countries, to see the form of improving cooperation between them.

Julio Korn Publishers working on the foreign promotion of "Mami," a Chico Navarro local hit that seems to have good international value. The pubbery has recorded a acetate with all the available versions of the tune and sent it to Editions Intro of Germany, with some other Navarro songs. Another JK item is "Don't Let Her Go," already recorded by Dean Reed (Capitol) and Tony Vilar (Columbia-in Spanish).

More about JK: The high rating of a Channel 9 Saturday night fight program has been used as theme for two new tunes, which are being sold very well by Odeon Pops in the Pat Clipper version: "Las Barbas De Karadagian" and "Dedos Magneticos (Magnetic Fingers)." Both tunes are controlled by Julio Korn. The diskery gave a dinner to the press celebrating the first 15,000 records, with Martin Karadagian and El Indio Comanche, stars of the fight program, as special guests.

Columbia plans to release the "Los Panchos Sing Tangos" LP nearly at the same time in Argentina, Uruguay, Mexico, Chile, the United States and Japan. The album contains tango evergreens, sung as boleros.

Lucio Milena has been inked to direct permanently the orchestra that will back Juan Carlos Mareco in his TV show on Channel 13, while Tony Vilar (who's doing very well with his version of "Nacida Para Mi" and now has recorded "Johnny Remember Me" in Spanish) will also take part in the show during July. Both artists record exclusively for Columbia.

Violeta Rivas is appearing on TV Channel 11 in Buenos Aires and Channel 12 in Montevideo, Uruguay, at the same time. She is planning a tour of Venezuela and other countries soon. RCA is preparing some new recordings by her, including a version of "Un Cielo Para Los Dos (El Cielo In Una Stanza)" in Spanish.

News from Philips: the diskery has released a Selection LP by several artists (Johnny Hallyday, Trumpet Boy, Billy Nash, Las Guitarras del Diablo and others), a new album by "Los Violines De Oro Del Tango," and a new LP by the Barry Sisters. In the singles field, there are strong reports about "Paloma," cut by Los Cantores de Quilla Huasi.

Everybody is smiles at Tonodisc with the new diskery location, in a huge house near Constitucion station. The address is "15 de Noviembre 1287" and the phone number is 23-7724. Besides, the diskery is working hard on the new Time records it has released (including Hugo Montenegro's American Musical Theater Series and Al Mooney's percussion LP) and the new 70 Series it will market soon. According to Jorge Esperon, Tonodisc's topper, the plan is to "build big prestige around Time, giving the customers highly reliable products and very good music." Time records will be priced slightly higher than regular LP's, as Audio Fidelity waxings are.

Jose Ruza of Edami believes he has the four aces in hand with the four firsts "guanta" tunes, created by Marco Marcó, composer from Mar del Plata. The titles are "Esta Chica Tiene Algo (This Girl Has Got Something)," "Ritmo De Guanta (Guanta Rhythm)," "La Guanta" and "Guantanamo," and there are some waxings arranged. One of them is already on the streets (cut by Los Campeones for Music Hall), and the others will appear soon. The rhythm has been well received at dance parties, and may become a big success. There will be big international movement around it, as it has good commercial value.

The success of "The Night I Cried" has moved Ariel Records to release a Compact 33 with this Bryan Hyland hit and other three tunes: "I'll Never Stop Loving You," "I Should Be Getting Better" and "Ginny Come Lately," which seems a good hit-to-be. There is also an LP by Hyland due to appear soon. "Ginny Come Lately" will also appear on single.

More about Ariel: Los Puesteros del Yatasto—the good folk group—in Buenos Aires, will perform on radio and TV. This will mean very good promotion for their two LP's released by the diskery.

Smart Publishers at work with "Good Luck Charm," the Elvis Presley smash, which will be released also in Spanish by Johnny Carel (Orfeo), Jose Antonio (TK) and somebody at Music Hall. Romiglio Giacompol, Smart's topper, has returned from his two-month visit to Brazil (where he directs Smart and Notas Magicas) and is arranging the representation of several new tunes.

"Viejo Madrid," the tango evergreen, will be included in a musical comedy to be played in Paris. The comedy has been written by Alaria and Mores. The same tango is also part of "El Otro Yo De Marcela," written by Sixto Pondal Rios and Carlos Olivari, with music by Mariano Mores, that has been represented with big success in Buenos Aires and now in Madrid, Spain. "Viejo Madrid" is controlled by Neumann Publishers.

Special emphasis will be put also on Djalma Ferreira, who—according to Luque—has good possibilities in this market.

Music Hall reports the success of the new Los Santos single, "Medianoche En Moscu," currently in the number two spot of the best sellers lists. The diskery is preparing an LP by these artists, and besides, will include them in the promotional LP that is being prepared. As it has been informed, this LP will star several Music Hall artists of prestige, and will be sold at low price.

More from Music Hall: latest releases are "Pobre Negro" and "Por Que La Quise Tanto" by Jose Basso and his orchestra, and Compact 33 with the first four Rodolfo Zapata waxings, including his "La Cuadrera" and "El Casamiento" hits. The Carlos Argentino LP has been very well received by customers.

Producciones Fermata has two new records on the streets: "Rebel Rouser" and "Ring Of Fire" by Duane Eddy (Jamie series), and "Teach Me To Twist" b/w by "Swingin' Together" by Chubby Checker and Bobby Rydell. The first International Pop orchestra LP, released some time ago, is running well. The second album by this group is being prepared.

Microfon has put to sale the "First Component Stereo Series" of the Audio Fidelity line. First three LP's are "Symphony Fantastique" (Berlioz), "Bolero" (Ravel) and "Carmen Suite" (Bizet) and "Ballet Suites" (Tchaikovsky). It is supposed that these records will meet a good market.

Surco continues the releases of modern jazz music, after the success of the first two Modern Jazz Quartet albums, "Fontessa" and "Piramide." The new LP by this group will be "The MJQ At The Music Inn." There will be also an LP titled "The Newport Jazz Festival All Stars" and another "Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers."

Fermata Publishers promoting Paul Anka's "A Steel Guitar & A Glass Of Wine." The Spanish version has been written but still hasn't been recorded. Baby Bell just spent several days performing on TV in Venezuela.

AUSTRALIA

Sven Libaek has been appointed A&R Manager of the Australian Record Company. ARC handles several labels including Coronet (U.S. Columbia), Warner Brothers, United Artists, Kapp, Chess, Hickory etc. Libaek comes to the new A&R post with ARC with a wide musical background. Born in Norway in 1938, Sven began piano at the age of five. Sven appeared in Norwegian movie productions, as a result of one of these films Sven was given a major role in the U.S. produced film "Windjammer." During the making of this movie, Sven performed the Grieg A Minor Piano Concerto with the Boston Symphony Orchestra. He later joined two other Norwegian boys to form a folk-singing trio "The Windjammers," which worked right across the U.S.A. In 1959/60 Sven majored in Piano at the Julliard School of Music where he also studied composition, orchestration and conducting. The appointment of Sven Libaek to the post of A&R Manager with ARC is a further shot-in-the-arm to the local industry, and the entire trade will await, with great interest, the first records to be produced under his direction.

Latest record production figures available from the Commonwealth Statisticians are for the month of April. They show an almost alarming fall off in total production over previous months. Production of singles in April show a one-third decline over March, and a comparison of album production for the same period shows a fall-off of more than one-third.

Joe Halford, manager of Castle Music, advises that Castle has picked up the rights to three film scores. First is "Play It Cool," which stars Billy Fury and features Bobby Vee, Helen Shapiro, Danny Williams, Shane Fenton and the Fontones and Jimmy Crawford. The second film is "Tiara Tahiti," the theme from which already has three recordings on it in England by Danny Williams (HMV), Philip Green (Parlophone) and Frank Chacksfield (Decca). The third score to be picked up by Castle Music for Australia is from "Waltz of The Toreadors," the new Peter Sellers' film. All three scores were acquired from Castle from Filmusic, London.

July album releases from Reprise include "Sinatra And Strings" by Frank Sinatra, and "Alice Faye Sings Her Famous Movie Hits," which features Alice Faye with a batch of fine standards which were first featured in her films.

It seems that a great section of the industry is now under the influence of the TV medics, particularly Ben Casey. RCA made a rush release of John D. Dundermilk's single "Callin' Dr. Casey; Can You Mend A Broken Heart?." This disc is the forerunner of many singles that can be expected to be released in the medic kick.

Vicky Simms has a new release out the Festival label that could make the grade as a result of the air-play it's receiving. Topside is "She's Got Soul" and the coupling is "I'm Counting Up My Love," an Australian composition.

Pye Records out with an album entitled "The Kenny Ball Show" featuring the famous English trumpet player with his group. Package should score well on the strength of the great public response to many of the Pye singles by Kenny Ball. On the singles front Pye is out with Lonnie Donegan's "Keep On Me Sunnyside," "Johnny Loves Me" by Shelley Fabares, "Begin The Beguine" (comp) by The Original Checkmates and the Vince Hill slicing of "The River's Run Dry."

On HMV is a new single issue by local star Jay Justin. The "A" side is "Little Miss Tease" and the lower half is "Tomorrow Is Too Late," a local original by Jay in conjunction with Joe Halford.

Tony Brady, who recently arrived home after a successful three month tour of Singapore where he appeared at the popular "Cockpit Supper Club," has recorded four new songs for Festival Records. Tony has left Australia again for Singapore and Malaya to do a solid record promotion tour prior to visiting Hong Kong in August. Brady has been one of the most successful artists to visit Singapore and his single (released there on the Diamond label) of "Big Things Are Happening" enjoyed chart rating when it was issued there. It is expected that Tony will appear on the same bill with several topline American acts in Hong Kong in September. Tony Brady is being managed by John Holton who was formerly with Belinda Music.

One of the hottest songs on the Australian scene at the moment is "Wolverton Mountain" which is the subject of two strong selling singles. The Claude King release on the CBS-Coronet label is doing well in some States, while the local version by Kevin Shegog for W&G Records is doing well in other States. In almost no time at all the Cliff Richard single (Columbia) of "Do You Want To Dance" has hit the top spot on our best-seller list. But dealer reports show that it's being hotly pressed by "The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance," released here on the UA label for Gene Pitney. Elvis Presley returns to the chart this week with "Follow That Dream," the title tune from his movie.

JAPAN

Nitchiku Industrial Co., Ltd., headed by Hisao Adachi, was just substantially merged into Columbia's Record Division and all business including manufacturing, distributing, advertising etc. are now being replaced by Columbia. Columbia had long been in charge of pressing and distribution work of Nitchiku, licensees for the Warner Bros. (now distributed by Toshiba) and Epic labels. Simultaneously, Nitchiku officially withdrew from the manufacturers' organization, JPRA. Last fiscal year (Apr. 1961-Mar. 1962), Nitchiku produced 129,000 copies (0.39% out of the total figure by all JPRA members). Meanwhile the WB label, which had long been represented by Nitchiku here up until the end of last year, is going to reappear under its new pactee, Toshiba, next month (Aug. 20). Premiere release by the Toshiba distribution network includes three singles and five LP's, highlighting "Rome Adventure," the WB flick that will soon bow throughout the country, which includes "Al Di La" by Emilio Pericoli. On singles side, there's "Al Di La" (b/w "Rome Adventure")—by Emilio Pericoli and among others, "Crying In The Rain (Everly Bros.)," "Just One Kiss (Connie Stevens)."

3,350,903 copies—92,856 more than the previous month (April) were pressed during the month of May by all member diskeries to JPRA-Columbia, Gram-mophon, King, Nitchiku, Teichiku, Toshiba, Victor, Westminster. Further figures released by JPRA shows individual produced numbers as follows; LP's—1,219,949; EP's—56,537; Singles—1,994,837 and SP's—79,580. And, 582,332 copies out of the whole were stereo versions (including LP's, EP's and singles).

Willis Page, 60 year old native of Rochester, N.Y., arrived in Tokyo to direct the just-born Yomiuri Nippon Symphony Orchestra for the coming year as a regular conductor after his stint with Nashville Symphony ork as a director.

Columbia will release next month a 10" LP by a 6-year old girl Kumiko Goto, whose debut, "Pretty Little Baby" b/w "Too Many Rules," is currently making noise in this market. The album, "Pretty Little Baby," includes eight tunes.

The American label, Hi-Fi, is going to reappear in Japan from Nippon Grammophon (distributor for Grammophone, Polydor and others). The label will be included in Polydor but tagged Hi-Fi series. Premiere releases are set for Sept., covering stereo albums (three of them will also be available in mono versions).

Visiting Vienna Concertohaus Quartet once again had 9 wax sessions here recently for Nippon Westminster. Works recorded were those of Mozart, Brahms, Dvorak, Tchaikovsky and Haydn and releases are expected in the near future. Their first Japanese session was two years ago for Westminster in Tokyo, covering five works by Schubert & others. Regardless of the reported Columbia-Westminster tie (on international-originated waxes), Westminster will work independently in the above case. Nevertheless, Columbia will still keep distributing.

(B+) "LIVING WITH ONE AND LOVING TWO" (2:12) [Big Bopper BMI—Drummond] This time out the songster's professional vocal abilities carry him in good stead on this uptempo country lament. A fine showing.

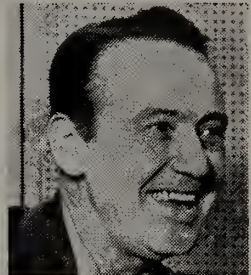

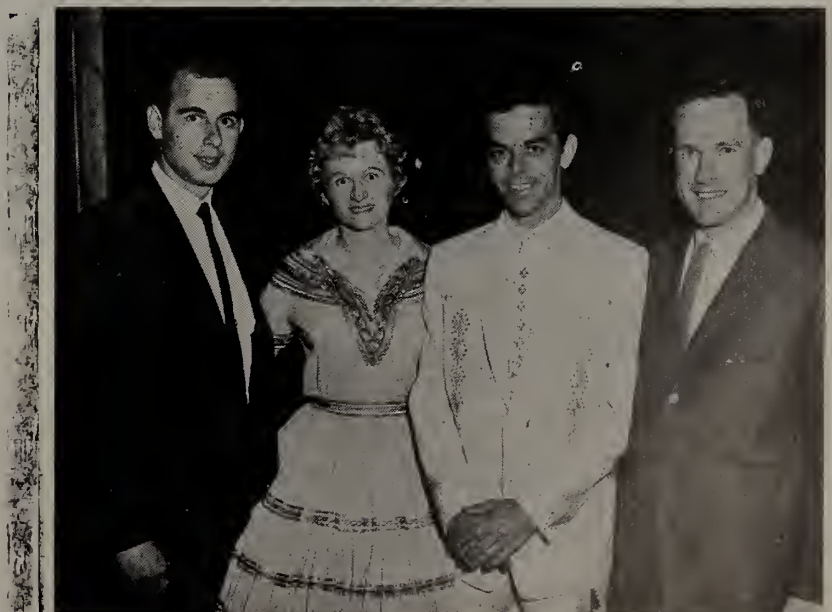

Redd Named Natl. Agent For "Cinch" Instant-Shine; Appointing Distributors For Sales Via Cig Machines

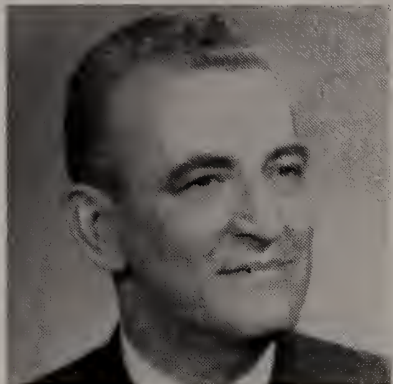
Frank LeBlanc Named Sales Mgr. Of Division

BOSTON—Si Redd, President of Redd Distributing Company, Seeburg distributor in this area for five New England States, advised last week that the firm has accepted a new product for national distribution to the trade. The item—an instant shoe shine package which has enjoyed broad sales success in the hotel, motel and service industries—is slated for national sales through cigarette vending machines.

The product is called "Cinch" and is manufactured by the K. J. Quinn & Co., Inc., manufacturers of "Quintone" and "Scuffy" boot polish, products which are currently available to consumers via standard retail store outlets.

The item is packaged three-to-a-packet, the packet the size of a king-size package of cigarettes. Three machines are therefore available for the price of one vend which will cost either 0¢ or 35¢ depending upon the machine. The package will cost the operator 15¢. Purchases are made by the case with price breakdowns for every ten cases.

Redd has appointed Frank LeBlanc, sales manager of this new division. LeBlanc has worked in the New England area before, both for Redd and in his own business, selling operators and distributors. LeBlanc will travel this week to Chicago, and from there to the Pacific Northwest where he will begin an intensive campaign setting up territorial distributors for the product through wholesalers with a large cigarette operator following. The item's profit potential has attracted several large operators in the

New Eng. area. Three distributors in this area and in New York State have taken on the line.

The product is currently available through the Hilton Hotel chain which bought direct from the Quinn firm, several million packets. In addition, the Howard Johnson branches are distributing the item through its motel division.

Promotion material in the form of stickers are available for advertising and identification on any cigarette machine. The product requires about 30 seconds to apply, and is then let dry for an equal amount of time. No rubbing or buffing is necessary. One pack does two shoes, any color, or two-tone. Three of these packets come in the one package which will vend from any cigarette machine. List prices start at \$48 per case for 1 to 10 cases.

Midway Ships 'Target Gallery'

CHICAGO—Ralph Sheffield, general sales manager of Midway Manufacturing Company, in suburban Franklin Park, Illinois, last week announced the release to the coin machine trade of Midway's "new and different skill game"—"Target Gallery".

He emphasized that this new amusement pinball game is strictly a definitely new, legal skill game, in the sense that it was created and designed solely for amusement purposes.

Sheffield further asserted that the exciting elements of three or four distinct types of amusement games, which have been extremely popular throughout the past few years, have been incorporated into "Target Gallery" to assure the best collection results at the lowest possible cost to the nation's operators. "And this," he said, "goes for the farflung foreign markets as well. You have the important elements of target, baseball, shuffle bowler and the action and design of a popular pinball amusement game for the greater excitement and thrills," Sheffield added.

"This game," he said, "offers exciting play action on both—the backglass and playfield—with the strong emphasis on skill and thrills, for continuous play; and more, and more coins in the cash box."

The player, he explained further, ejects the ball out of a center hole, at the front of the playfield. The ejected (or "pitched") balls are aimed at a target area (at the rear of the playfield, just below the backglass) consisting of "squirrels" and "rabbits".

The targets when hit by the ball "fly-away" (this is similar to the action of bowling pins "flying away" when hit in a coin-operated bowling game). The more "squirrels" and "rabbits" the player knocks down the higher the scoring "values" then become. The suspense in "Target Gallery" builds up as the "values" increase, Sheffield said.

There is also an "extra balls" feature in this game. In other words, when the "values" increase extra balls are awarded the player. This is an added inducement, for even though there are extra balls to play the play action is so quick that the player feels he must continue to play to reach his highest scoring level.

Midway's "Target Gallery" has highly polished chrome side rails on the playboard, and a one-piece all-steel front door to protect the cash box. It also has all-steel legs and a beautiful "sculptured" lightbox.

Sheffield asserted that although the Midway factory in Franklin Park is actually shut-down for the annual vacation period he is enjoying an unusually heavy production and shipping schedule with his "skeleton crew".

He stated in conclusion that the plant will of necessity be placed on a full production and shipping schedule, to be put into force when it reopens on July 16 to rush shipments of "Target Gallery" to Midway's distributors throughout this country, and in many foreign markets.

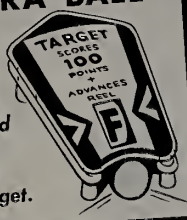

Red Rabbit Opens On Coast - Wittenborg, Continental, Seeburg, Vendo, National Used

REDWOOD CITY, CALIF.—The Far West's most unique drive-in restaurant—a completely self-service operation offering a wide variety of home-cooked dishes—opened for business in San Mateo County last week.

The drive-in, named The Red Rabbit, is located at 5th Avenue and El Camino Real in Redwood City.

How the public will react to the idea of dropping coins in a slot to open the door to a completely cooked chicken dinner with all the trimmings—or maybe fried prawns or hot tamales, remains to be seen.

According to owner Ferrien Davis of Atherton, the public will react favorably to the idea of immediate service and less expensive food—especially, he said, when it is discovered that dinners and other food offered in the automat are just as appealing as the food in the best service-type drive-in operation. The automated drive-ins of this type in the East, Davis said, have proven highly popular.

"Food is prepared continuously throughout the day in the kitchen located on the premises," Davis explained. The various hot plates and other items on the menu, he said, are placed in the dispensing machines which have a glass front, permitting the customer to actually see the items offered. Davis emphasized that no food is carried over for sale on a following day.

The menu of The Red Rabbit, Davis said, includes basically the same food which is offered at regular type drive-in restaurants. This includes a wide variety of hot and cold sandwiches, including the house specialty—The Bunnyburger—hot soups and chili, hot plate dinners, hot and cold drinks, salads, and desserts. A change machine accepts coins and bills from 25 cents to \$5.

The covered, outside eating area is equipped with over-head radiant heaters and a complete Hi Fi system. The total facility covers 10,000 sq. ft., including parking space for 21 cars. It will be opened 24 hours every day.

Davis said that the majority of the automatic food dispensers at The Red Rabbit have been purchased from Wittenborg, Inc.

"The Danish people," he explained, "have been using machines for the sale of prepared food products to the public for many years. Their modern machines, we feel, will be the best for our type of operation, providing great versatility in use and offering the greatest visibility of the food products to the customers."

He said other machines in use at the restaurant have been purchased from the Continental-Apco, Inc., of New York; the Seeburg Corp. of Chicago; Vendo Co. of Kansas City; and the National Vendors, Inc., and National Rejectors, Inc., both of St. Louis.

Davis, who is associated with Gordon Walsh of San Francisco in opening The Red Rabbit, said every attempt will be made to develop the restaurant into a family-type drive-in, specializing in take home dishes.

A resident of the Menlo Park-Atherton area since 1939, Davis was formerly in sales and marketing for Hills Bros. Coffee in San Francisco for 22 years.

When Weinand was asked by the Cash Box reporter the status in production at this early stage in the second half year's business period, and with the plant only re-opened a day or so, he instantly replied (accordingly) "A-OK."

He followed with a remark to the effect that the Williams Electronic production line is now "in orbit with 'Friendship 7'!"

He then commenced to explain the new pinball game's outstanding elements of interest.

He said: "Naturally, extended play is a prime factor in 'Friendship 7', dependent in time to the skill of the player. Furthermore, there is now a thrilling new way for the player to get his extra ball, by simply matching the letter on the 'Reel' with the lighted playfield letter and hitting the target (at the center of the playfield). The target scores 100 points and then advances the reel.

"When the player makes numbers 1 to 4 on the playfield," Weinand continued, "he adds the extra ball. Moreover, the high score adds an extra ball. If a ball is shot through the 'Moving Gate' on the playfield an additional 10 points is scored. However, when the 'gate' is lighted the player is rewarded with 100 points."

Cancer Scare News Doesn't Hurt Cig Sales

NEW YORK—Current tobacco sales figures indicate that while the world is concerned with the possible harmful effects of smoking cigarettes, sales have been on the increase. A case in point is Italy, where government order has cancelled all types of cigarette advertising. Cigarette sales have increased eight percent there. Taxes have been increased in Britain but sales have continued to rise. At the same time, Western Germany has been cause to lower taxes on cigarettes although the government is reportedly considering anti-smoking campaigns. The Soviet Union has never approved of smoking, labeling it as a bad habit, cancer inducing or not.

Since the sale of cigarettes is taxable in most countries, and the volume of sales results in considerable revenue for the various governments, combining this with the fact that tobacco is a state-owned monopoly in some countries, the world tobacco industry seemed to have little to fear in the near future, regardless of continually occurring medical reports.
