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THE SHORT HOT SUMMER

Summer in future years may be looked forward to with greater enthusiasm than Spring. That could very well happen if future Summers are at least as good as the current one slowly and steadily drawing to a close.

It wasn't too long ago that Summer was looked upon as a sort of vacuum as far as the record year was concerned. It was a period in which a great majority of the companies were satisfied to cover overhead and if extremely fortunate, make a bit of profit. A smash during the hot weather months was cause for major celebration.

But with rapidly changing methods of merchandising during the past half decade the importance of the Summer months as a buying period also has changed radically.

With album discounts and new products introduced just as Summer begins, a keenly competitive album situation develops just as the heat wave begins to set in. Every manufacturer is thrown into a fight for the important distributor dollar-a competitive album atmosphere which doesn't seem to let up.

The singles picture has made a truly amazing change and is completely different from what it was in the summer months of the mid 1950's. If we use this Summer as an example, we'll have to get rid

of all the cliche excuses about Summer slumps-no one stays indoors, therefore no need for records: kids go off to camp and money is spent on clothes instead of records; Summer's too hot: Summer's too cold: and at least 400 others. If future Summers are anything like this one has been to date, record industry people may begin taking their vacations during April and May and perhaps early September.


Never before have we heard such enthusiastic reports about business. More records have been selling in greater quantities all Summer long than was the case in April, May and June. Bobby Vinton's "Roses Are Red"-a Summer hit-has passed the million-and-a-half mark and a number of other top tenners have exceeded the million figure-a figure which most companies found it difficult topping during early '62. Reports from every level of the industry and from almost every area across the U.S. are just sensational. It may be our imagination, but it also seems that there are many more great singles with sensational new and inventive sounds around today.

It's been a wonderfully hot Summer and we'll be sorry to see it come to an end. Let's hope it's an omen of things to come in the Fall.



Cameo/Parkway Intros New Rack Program Designed To Make "Everyone Happy"

PHILADELPHIA — Beginning Sept. 1, Cameo/Parkway Records will institute a new rack-jobber program that it believes will "make everyone happy," the label, rack-jobber and

J. Cameo/Parkway Records will institute a new rack-jobber program that it believes will "make everyone happy," the label, rack-jobber and distributor.

"For the past 6 months," Al Cahn, national sales manager of C/P states, "we have run a test program in six markets with one of the largest racks in the country and have solved what we think is the answer to most of our mutual problems between racks, distributors and manufacturers.

Objects of the program (see details below) are to obtain more profits to racks by lowering their purchasing costs; more net profits to distributors by simplification of handling and expenses; more profit to C/P by the increased volume expected; the virtual elimination of trans-shipping on the part of racks.

There are nine basic points to the program: 1. All racks will be sold C/P product at whatever its current deal (at the time of sale) plus racks' usual functionals plus an extra 7%; 2. Direct shipment to the racks; 3. Freight FOB destination (buyer pays half, C/P pays half); 4. Distributor gets billed at a special price for sales to racks and cannot buy at this price for his regular needs; 5. Orders can come to us directly or through usual distributor channels; 6. All orders are subject to the distributor's final OK, re: dating and credit. No order is filled without the distributor's approval; 7. Distributors get copies of all or any orders that are placed with them or that C/P ships direct; 8. Distributor handles all payments, collections and exchanges as usual (if the distributor prefers, some exchanges can be handled directly); 9. Distributor continues to service "agressively" all racks as usual.

The label feels that under the present existing conditions with transshipping and extreme "price pressure," most distributors sales to racks do not gross them 15%. Under its plan, the label notes that distributors are guaranteed a "fair net" on all rack LP transactions because it controls the shipping directly to racks is sold to the distributor on paper at a lower price.

There is no

price.

There is no need for any rack to trans-ship, the diskery says. "Under this plan," Cahn declares, "no distributor can profitably sell to any rack from his own stock and the usual channels of C/P as cheaply as the distributor can buy through the program."

"Any sales that are made through us will be cleared through the distributor in whose territory the rack is located and/or the shipment is made," Cahn adds.

Cahn emphasizes that "we do not

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intend to take over these accounts. We feel the distributor's function in our industry is a necessity . . . this program is intended to obtain the maximum sales at an acceptable profit to all concerned."

For the six months ended June 30, 1962, net sales reached \$3,896,341, up from \$1,055,622 for the same period of 1961, while net income increased to \$530,431 compared with \$118,418 for the comparable period of last year. This year on the basis of 605,500 shares outstanding, by the end of the first six months, the company earned \$.88 per share compared with \$.20 per share a year ago, on the same number a year ago, on the same number shares.

Lowe also noted that the earnings per share for this six months period were ahead of the \$.87 per share earned during entire fiscal 1961 on fewer shares outstanding.

Robert Dettmer, vice-president and secretary of Consolidated Electronics Corporation, will also be on the program as will a number of business experts. On the afternoon of the first day, Lou Simon, sales manager of Philips Records, will meet with his distributors, and Charlie Fach, sales manager of Smash Records, will head up a meeting of that label's distributors.

Atlantic & Atco's Deals For Summer-Fall Tops For Both Labels

For Both Labels

NEW YORK — The Atlantic and Atco Summer-Fall album program which terminate Aug. 31, have proven to be the most successful programs the company has ever run.

The amount of merchandise moved under the program which started at the beginning of July, easily exceeds the \$1 million mark, which was predicted by Len Sachs, Atlantic's album sales and merchandising director, the label reports.

"The response from dealers and distributors has been overwhelmingly enthusiastic, and this is true in all areas of the country," according to Sachs. "A large number of our distributors went as high as 300% above their quotas, and some even as high as 400%."

Sachs attributes the programs' success to a strong comprehensive salesmerchandising plan, plus an array of one of the company's strongest album releases. Details of the Atlantic and Atco programs include a 15% distributor-dealer discount, with a 30-60-90 deferred billing to qualifying dealers. The programs apply to 14 new packages on the Atlantic label, and 8 new LPs on Atco, plus the entire LP catalogs of both companies.

The new Atlantic albums include the double-LP and single-LP versions of "The Ray Charles Story," "Lonely Woman" by the Modern Jazz Quartet, "Mel Torme At The Red Hill," Hank Crawford's "From The Heart," Mose Allison's "I Don't Worry About A Thing," "Solomon Burke's Greatest Hits," "John Coltrane Plays The Blues," Chris Connor's "Free Spirits," "The Solid Gold Groups" by the Atlantic All Stars, The Red Mitchell-Harold Land Quintet's "Hear Ye!," and single LPs of the Modern Jazz Quartet's award winning "European Concert." A number of albums in the Atlantic catalog have also contributed to the impressive sales figures, particularly the entire Ray Charles series and "Herbie Mann At The Village Gate."

The Atco LPs, which were released for the program, include Acker Bilk's "Above The Stars," "Ben E. King Sings For Soulful Lovers," "Coast Allong With The Coasters," "The Great Group Goodies," by the Atco All Stars, and "The Meny Guitars Of Jorgen

These displays are relatively small, and can be used in windows or for wall mounting. They are completely flexible, so that merchandise specifically appropriate to the store can be shown. 

Additionally, all LP and tape sections contain complete product catalogs showing each album cover and listing the selections in each package.

"A SWINGIN' SAFARI"—Billy Vaughn—Dot DLP 3458

DLP 3458
Ace orkster Billy Vaughn, who seems to have a knack for dishing up hit instrumental singles and albums, turns in another delightful session which has all the necessary built-in success ingredients to step out in the sales department. This LP is tagged after Vaughn's current single smash, "A Swingin' Safari," and features eleven other danceable items in the distinctive style long-associated with the musician. There's plenty of enjoyment to be found in "Born To Be With You" and "Love Letters In The Sand." Sure-fire chart item.



"A TASTE OF HONEY"-Martin Denny-Lib-

"A TASTE OF HONEY"—Martin Denny—Liberty LST 7237
Martin Denny comes up with an ear-pleasing package of rhythmic melodies tagged after his current chart-riding single. Denny, who has scored in the coin department with his "Exotica" LP's, applies this same technique to these jazz-oriented tunes. The orkster launches the session with "A Taste Of Honey" and includes fine uptempo arrangements of "Walk On The Wild Side" and "Route 66." Swingin' orchestrations and the success of the single could bring out the buvers.



"SEALED WITH A KISS"—Brian Hyland—ABC-Paramount ABC 431
Brian Hyland, who is currently riding on the charts with his single of "Sealed With A Kiss," cashes in on the success of smasheroo to tag this new album session. In addition to his biggie the songster offers a varied program of previous triumphs and popular teen items. Outstanding tracks on this power-packed set include "Bye Bye Love," "Ginny Come Lately" and "Summer Job." LP should make a chart appearance in no time flat.



"TWO TICKETS TO PARIS"—Original Sound-track—Joey Dee—Roulette R 25182
Joey Dee, who was one of the main forces in spearheading the twist, comes up with his fourth album outing on this hard-driving soundtrack from the soon-to-be-released flick, "Two Tickets To Paris." The chanter's distinctive vocal vigor and vitality is firmly evidenced in "Twistin' On A Liner," "This Boat" and his current chartriding single of "What Kind Of Love Is This." The set also features the talents of Gary Crosby, Jeri Lynne Fraser and Kay Medford. LP should score heavily in the coin department.



"ALL THE WORLD IS TWISTIN' WITH JOEY DEE"—Roulette R 25171
Joey Dee and his Starliters, who have rolled up one of the most impressive sales records since the twist craze began, come up with a first-rate danceable set that should quickly develop into a runaway best-seller. The songster and the crew give dozen emphatic reasons why their success has been so consistent. Teens and oldsters alike should dig the gang's renditions of "Just Walkin' In The Rain," "Let's Have A Party" and "All The World Is Twistin'." A fine addition to the Dee catalog.



"RHYTHM IS MY BUSINESS"—Ella Fitzgerald—Verve V 4056
The inimitable Ella Fitzgerald, usually cast in a
small jazz group setting is superbly show cased
on this Vere outing which has her belting a tasteful collection of standards against the formidable
sounds of a big band conducted by Bill Doggett.
The lark's lyrical diction coupled with a firm understanding of melodic content carries her in
good stead as she renders top-rung readings of
"Broadway," "Runnin' Wild" and "After You've
Gone." One of the best sets that the songstress
has cut in quite a while. Powerful merchandise.




"FANTASTIC STRINGS PLAY FANTASTIC THEMES"—Felix Slatkin—Liberty LSS 14021 The Fantastic Strings of Felix Slatkin soar and shimmer their way through a session of melodies perfectly geared for a lush string section. The melodies are inventively arranged, and artfully orchestrated, and the orkster proves himself a master of musicianship. Top-drawer bands here are "Three Plus Two," "Run Strings Run," and "The Merry Cobbler." Especially brilliant in stereo, the disk is a choice item for stereophiles, and should cause plenty sales excitement.



"SPANISH GUITAR" Tony Mottola—Command RS 841 SD
Tony Mottola, who previously garnered chart laurels with his two "Roman Guitar" albums, should climb up the hitsville path real fast with this impressive disk of Spanish favorites. The orkster utilizes both classical and electric guitars for the session which come off as a warm, listenable blend of the two styles. Some compelling tracks here are "Beguine Tampico," "Espana Cani" and "Granada." LP should bring out the spinners in droves.



"LOVE AMONG THE YOUNG"—James Darren—Colpix SCP 428
The actor-chanter follows up his successful "Mary's Little Lamb" single with this album of romantic ballads from Colpix. Darren sings a few standards and some new tunes—all aimed at the younger set. The singer's warm voice and intimate delivery serve him well on such numbers as "While We're Young," "Young And Warm And Wonderful," and "Hello Young Lovers." His best to date, the disk could pull plenty of coin.



"ALL STAR SPECTACULAR"—Sammy Davis Jr.—Reprise R 6033
The extremely versatile Sammy Davis Jr. goes on a vocal rampage on this swingin' set from Reprise on which he capably mimics some of the greats of show biz. The multi-talented performer is very believable as Tony Bennett, Frankie Laine, Louis Armstrong, and a gang of others. The singer is also in top form as he gives fine, straight readings of "I Married An Angel," "You Can't Love Em All," and "Without A Song." Loads of sales excitment here.



"MERMAN—HER GREATEST"—Ethel Merman—Reprise R-6032
In a rare, other-than-original-cast disk showing, the great musical comedy performer has a go on 12 numbers she introduced on Broadway during the 30's (e.g. "I Got Rhythm," "You're The Top," "Do I Love You"). She can still land a vocal haymaker, partial proof of which is her ability to even rise above the full-bodied Billy May arrangements. Her many fans will love this entry, and will certainly wish for more of her greatest.



"THE EXCITING WORLD OF GEULA GILL"—Columbia CL 1859
Occasionally, a new, exciting international folk talent comes along that merits special attention. Such a talent is Geula Gill who, on this her premiere LP, displays the agile technique and artistry of a long-successful pro. The talented Israeli is backed by a duo of her peers and full ork for this delightful Columbia session in which she demonstrates her wide-range vocal charms in both uptempo items and ballads. Best listening tracks here include "Arava, Arava," "The First Train," and "Dana." An impressive entry.



"ROSES ARE RED"-Johnny Burnette-Liberty

"ROSES ARE RED"—Johnny Burnette—Liberty LST 7255
Although Johnny Burnette is no longer associated with Liberty, this top-drawer session of teen-oriented numbers should bring out a multitude of his many fans. The songster tags this album after Bobby Vinton's big hit of "Roses Are Red" which he delivers with all of his expected verve. Other impressive sides here are "I've Got A Lot Of Things To Do," "Girls" and "Clown Shoes." Disk looms as a sure-fire noise-maker.



"BEST LOVED FAIRY TALES"—Various Artists—Disneyland ST 1918
Here's an excellent off-beat LP featuring Rica Moore reading six world-famous fairy tales with a cool swingin' instrumentation supplied by Larry Bunker on bongos and Red Mitchel on bass. This unusual jazz-flavored approach to a kiddie package comes off so well that many adults will appreciate this enjoyable set. Some top-drawer bands include "Little Red Riding Hood," "Princess And The Pea" and "Bremen Town Musicians." Plenty of potential here.

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


Capitol Offers Discount On Tapes

HOLLYWOOD-A 10% discount off invoice on most 4-track stereotapes in the catalog of Capitol Records has been announced by Bill Tallant, veep and national sales manager of Capitol Records Distributing Corp.

Under the deal, which runs from Aug. 20 through Sept. 29 for both selling and shipping, dealers placing an order during the program for at least \$50 worth of tapes will be eligible for deferred payment terms calling for 20% installments on Oct. 10 and Nov. 10, 25% on Dec. 10 and the balance on Dec. 31.

All tapes in the catalog are covered by the program except those bearing the prefix ZT.





Roosevelt Restricts Airplay On Copyright

NEW YORK-Roosevelt Music, this city, has placed a restriction on radio and TV performances of a tune called "Ten Lonely Guys" in an effort to prevent the exposure of a Diamond Records' disking of the number.

Diamond rush-released a version of the song last week by The 10 Broken Hearts, all of whom are credited with its creation.

In an ad in this week's issue of Cash Box, the pubbery states: "Warning! To All Radio & Television Stations: The Performing Rights of 'Ten Lonely Guys' have not been licensed to any performing rights licensing organization, and until this has been done, you are asked to refrain from publicly performing this composition.'

Diamond execs Joe Kolsky and Phil Kahl told Cash Box last week that they were going ahead with the release of the disk, and that, in fact, they were already getting airplay on the waxing, in New York and other areas of the country.

They further stated to Cash Box that since a demo of the song, performed by the writers, exists, they have been advised by an attorney that the demo constitutes a commercial recording of the song under the Copyright Law (Section 1e). Contending that a first recording already exists, Kolsky and Kahl believe they can legally issue the deck by virtue of a letter they have sent to Washington informing the Copyright Office of their recording of the number.

Hal Fine, who heads Roosevelt, told Cash Box that he would seek a court injunction to stop the release and sale of the Diamond recording.

Jocks Get 2 Bennett "Friscos"

NEW YORK-Columbia Records refuses to call it quits on Tony Bennett's "I Left My Heart in San Francisco."

Since its release months ago, the tune seems to be headed for an evergreen status and an item that will be always associated with the songster.

Despite all this, the Bennett reading has never been a big chart item (it's number 79 on this week's Top 100).

To stimulate even greater sales, the label is re-servicing radio stations with a two-sided rendition of the song by Bennett, one the original studio recording and the other a "live" performance from Bennett's recent oneman show at Carnegie Hall.

Frisco itself has recognized the song and its interpreter by making Bennett an honorary citizen and giving him a lifetime pass to ride toll free on the Golden Gate Bridge.

JAPAN

Yamaha Music, of which cabinet reshuffle en mass was reported a few weeks ago (see Aug. 4 issue), completed the re-organization of its leading execs. New prexy, elected at the firm's general shareholders' meeting, is Yoshihiko Hiramoto. His former position was director of public relation dept. at Nippon Gakki Instrumentals, parent firm to Yamaha Music. Eddie White and Akio Nagaoka were the only figures who retained their former positions. White continues to serve as a veep and is in charge of the firm's New York office. Naganuma is an inspector. Other new directors are Mutsuro Hiyama, (managing dir.), Toshio Nirazuka (director), Atsushi Takahashi (director). Yamaha is no doubt one of the most active publishers here in Japan. It was established last fall as Nippon Gakki's (the biggest piano manufacturer) subsidiary. Its U.S. catalogs include Spanka, January, Arch, Brighton, Debmer, Flanka, General, George Pincus, Gil, Rambed, Roosevelt and others.

Teichiku Record's international expanding activity succeeded in getting the Romanian label into this mart starting Dec., 1962. The label will be first represented with two LP's (12") featuring the Bucharest Radio Symphony Ork. with Beethoven's Pastorale Symphony and the Tchaikovsky piano concertos.

Shinsekai Records, under the presidency of Kei Hoashi, is the only, at least as of this writing, other firm releasing Iron Curtain material here. Labels represented by Shinsekai include Russian Mazhdunarodnaia Kniga, Polish Mza, Yugoslavia's Jugoton and Czechoslovakia's Supraphon.

All Oct. releases were ok'd by JPRA (Japan Phonograph Records Association's) 89th standard committee. Checked and ok'd are 3,975 tunes in all-1,301 of local origins and 2,674 of international origins. The committee is a checking organ of the manufacturers' association against any tunes to be released thru its member diskeries. It will issue a warning if they find any tune unsuitable for release to the public with such reasons as obscenity, or the like.

A girl who made her success with last year's smash (but still selling well) "Kawa-wa Nagareru," Miki Nakasone of King Records, will soon (around Oct.) be represented with her newest, "Yukiko-no Tomoshibi/Yukiguni-no Musume." Meanwhile, Miss "Polydor" herself—Sachiko Nishida—is going to have as her Oct. release—a single, "Ichi-tai-Ichi No Blues/Yoru-ga Setsunai." Her recent big smashes are "Akashia-no Ame-ga Yamu-Toki" and "Moliendo

DENMARK

DENMARK
Radio Merkur, commercial station operating from outside the three-miles border, was operating only a couple of days before Danish Police confiscated the ship on international water, and arrested the crew. The ship was sailing under the Lebanese flag, and the whole affair has caused some laughs in Denmark. Lebanon recently banned the Danish Tuborg Beer, since the Tuborg trademark looked too much like a prohibited Lebanese political party's mark. By confiscating a Lebanese ship, Danish government has at least got a little revenge, it is said.

Elith Henriksen, head of RCA Victor in Denmark, back from European sales convention in Oslo, held between Aug. 13 and 16. Starting Sept. I, RCA in Denmark (Hede Nielsen's Fabrikker A/S) will handle the German label Tempo in Denmark.

NORWAY

RCA Victor held its European sales convention in Oslo between Aug. 13 and 16. The conferences, held every six months, are made in the beginning of the seasons and the coming sales campaigns are discussed. In Oslo for this conference were Alfred Leonard from Red Seal Dept. in New York, Peter F. Baumberger of RCA Victor International Division, Arnold Klein of RCA Victor, London. The German delegation was headed by Karl Heinz Richter of Teldec Schallplatten GmbH, Hamburg. From Sweden came a delegation under Sixten Eriksson of Grammofon AB Electra, Solna. Wim Brandsteder led the Dutch delegation and from Belgium was seen M. Goemaerg. Denmark was represented by Elith Henriksen of RCA Victor, Copenhagen, and RCA in Switzerland was represented by A. Reichstadt. Hosts of the guests were Eilif Meyer and John Johansson of A/S Nera (RCA Victor) in Oslo.

The Norwegian song "Kom Sol, Kom Regn," Norway's contribution to this year's Eurovision Song Festival in Luxemburg, has now been recorded in English by Lorne Lesley. The English title is "I Cried Last Night."

SWEDEN

June Richmond, well-known jazz vocalist, died of a heart attack in Gothenburg on Aug. 14th. Born in United States as Beatrice Louise Gachan, she had toured Sweden several times during the last ten years, and was now contracted to the Lorensberg Restaurant in Gothenburg. She was 47.

Metronome has made a record with three of the label's leading voices as a trio. They are Siv Malmquist, Anna-Lena Löfgren and Ann-Louise Hansson, all well-known soloists on records. The songs they recorded are a 'modernized' version of "On Top Of Old Smoky" and "Toy Balloon," the latter published in Scandinavia by Stockholms Musik-produktion.

When Count Basie and his orchestra recently played in Stockholm, they made some recordings in the Como Studio for American Roulette Records. This Metronome-owned studio has been used by Atlantic Records for some recording with, among others the Modern Jazz Quartet, and the result has been very satisfactory, reports Pelle Nyström, head of PR dept. at Metronome.

Putte Wickman and His Orchestra has cancelled its tour in the USSR, which was scheduled to start Sept. 17 in Moscow. Behind their decision were difficulties in getting complete lists of when and where to play in the USSR, and troubles with payment. Money earned in USSR has to be spent there and cannot be taken out of the country. The tour was arranged within the Cultural Exchange Deal between Sweden and USSR. A Russian artists troup has already been touring Sweden.

HOLLAND

Mr. Wim van Vught from Editions Altona reports big activity on the number "Like I Do." Firstly, the Nancy Sinatra recording was heavily plugged on the radio and specially on the commercial station Veronica. The first Dutch recording was made recently by Ellis Rex. Songstress debuted some months ago with "Twist Around The Clock." Second Dutch recording was done by The Cantaris on the CNR-label and now comes the news that the famous vocal group The Fouryo's waxed the title for the Decca-label. It is still the exception in the small country of Holland to obtain three different locals.

Same pubbery announced the waxing in Dutch of the German Hit-Parader "Paradiso," originally sung by Connie Francis. Dutch girl-singer Anneke Grönloh, high in the market, sung the title for the Philips-label.

Famous Dutch organist Feike Asma, whose summer-concerts at The Old Church in Amsterdam attract thousands of visitors every year, plays well-beloved classical and romantic organ-pieces on three new Philips-singles in the series "Sounds Of The Organ." Another Asma-recital on the organ of The Old Church can be found on a new EP in the series "Classical Requests" on the Philips label. This magnificent series features popular classics by the best Dutch performers: among new releases in this series are Ravel's Bolero by The Concertgebouw Orchestra conducted by the late, Eduard van Beinum, a Händel-recital by contralto Aafje Heynis and two EP's of the famous Royal Male Choir "De Mastreechter Staar" with Opera choirs and religious choirworks.

Philips' "Classic Jazz Masters" series, which has already presented most astonishing sounds in historic jazz-recordings already, released a 12 inch LP of a blues-singer named Robert Johnson. The artist died too young, poisoned by a jealous woman before his 21st birthday. In 1936-37, he recorded 29 sides for a label, of which 16 are presented in the new album. Back in 1938, John Hammond had planned to put Johnson on the stage of Carnegie Hall as the best performer of primitive Blues about women and bad luck, coming fresh from the share-croppers' huts in the Mississippi Delta. This album is another in the missing links of the history of jazz.

Mozart's four Horn Concertos from 1786, written in a lighter vein for his virtuoso friend Ignaz Leutgeb (who had to endure quite a number of practical jokes played upon him by Mozart) were recorded for Philips by The Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Paumgartner with Erich Penzel as the soloist. Penzel, being a refugee from Eastern Germany, is a newcomer to the Viennese musical world and still unknown in Western Europe, but his outstanding performance of the concertos make it clear that he was chosen for no other reason than being the best.

"Trad is certainly going to get a lift-up in Holland from this," says Bovema's Columbia-label manager.

The label is also going to release Lale Andersen's "Ein Fremder Mann," a vocal version of Acker Bilk's "Stranger On The Shore."

RCA had the Hank Snow disk on the market within three days of receiving the parts from the US. In view of the huge success of Lucky Starr's record, it will be interesting to watch the new version.

Stan Gervas, program manager of Station 6IX in Perth, Western Australia, has advised that his station is again promoting (for the second year) the "6IX Golden Microphone Award" for the record it chooses as the best locally produced record of the twelve months to last July 31. Mauricio Brenner, head of Producciones Fermata, reported to Cash Box that his diskery has arranged the representation of Festival Records of France in Argentina. First releases will take place in a few weeks, and special emphasis will be put on Marie Jose, Maria Candido, Jacques Helian and Fred Gerard. Besides, several of Festival's "disques litteraires" will be also put in the market, mainly those by Jean Cocteau, Albert Camus, Gerard Philipe and Paul Geraldy. But there are a couple of rivals for this King: RCA and Fermata—the publisher—are already promoting Sedaka's latest recordings, in English and Spanish: "Breaking Up Is Hard To Do" and the other songs in his albums. Since it very seldom happens that an artist has two titles on the charts (although Sedaka made it once, with "Calendar Girl" and "Little Devil") there may be some friction between "King Of Clowns" and "Breaking Up." The other rival for this chart topper is "Africkaan Beat" the Bert Kaempfert waxing, which is running extremely well after a slightly slow start. A bit lower is "Muñequita" (Roly Poly) and "Cuando Calienta El Sol." Both are published by Edami, and seem to have big force, too. "Muñequita" has been cut in Mexico by Enrique Guzman, who is becoming well known in Argentina, and there is also a local version by Johnny Tedesco. The lists show also the name of Elvis Pesley, who sells very well but seldom gets into the top fifteen. In this case it's "Little Sister."

Other strong records are "Twist" by Perez Prado and, of course, Paul Anka's "Young, Alive And In Love." In the singles field there's "Mr. Lucky" by Henry Mancini, "Monica" (Spanish tune) by Raul Sagan and "Riendo Me Despertaba," by Sonia y Miriam, Chilean duet.

Mario Kaminsky of Microfon is working on the promotion of "No Seas Timida," the latest Adriano Celentano release, while "Sei Rimasta Sola" is being prepared. As it has been already informed, Microfon hasn't been affected by Celentano's change of label some months ago, since Kaminsky's diskery negotiated the rights of representation directly with the singer. Thus it will continue his releases... although we don't think it will put to sale records with three tunes on it.

Columbia reports the release of two folk songs, recorded in Bolero rhythm by Los Panchos during their last visit to this country. The titles are "Los Ejes De Mi Carreta," one of Atahualpa Yupanqui's best productions, and "Los Sesenta Granaderos," another folk standard. This record complements Los Panchos' recent LP with tango music. Under the Orfeo line, there are two new albums: one of them has been cut by Don Goyo (Rene Cospito) and contains several tangos; the other one has been cut in Brazil by Plaza Records of that country and features the Serenata Tropical orchestra, playing tropical music. Tony Vilar's second LP is being prepared, since his latest singles have shown good sales. Roberto Yanes' new album, "Mario y Maria," composed with tunes penned by Mario Clavell and Maria Grever, is receiving good air play.

Fermata Publishers working on two new tunes, whose representation has been recently arranged: "Scalinatella," Italian song, and "Every Night Without Y

out You," the new Faul Arka mt, Just Feleased in the States, Fermata has several Italian tunes in its catalog, including "Pera Matura," "Too Much Chianti" and others.

Gigi Gallo of Promotora Sudamericana de Grabaciones reports that soon there will be several vesions of "Caterina" available. Besides the Tony Dallara waxing (already appeared) on Columbia, it will be put to sale cut by Arturo Testa (Philips) and there are other local versions being prepared. It is supposed that RCA will release the original version, dedicated by Perry Como to Caterina Valente.

Jose Ruzo of Edami is now at work with an English tune: "Come Outside," which will be titled "Vamos Ya." Spanish lyrics and a lot of promotion are being prepared. Edami is now enjoying several hits: "Cuando Calienta El Sol," "Muñequita," "De Rodillas" (which has been selling very well in the Roberto Yanes version) and "Aquellos Ojos Verdes," cut by Ray Conniff. "De Rodillas" has been also cut by Los Nocturnos (Music Hall), Carlos Ray (Odeon Pops) and Victor Hugo (Disc Jockey).

Julio Korn is working on the promotion of "I Can't Stop Loving You," in the Tony Vilar version, sung in Spanish. The lyrics were written by Felix Lipesker, member of the pubbery. The original version of "I Can't . . ," belonging to Ariel (ABC Paramount representative) hasn't been put to sale yet.

Connie Francis is becoming a big star, especially because of her recordings in Spanish, "Granada" and "Besame Mucho." However, the most popular of her waxings is "Where the Boys Are."

Regarding new Ecuatorian artists, Tito Ortiz and Mary Ramia, must be mentioned. Ortiz is already in the charts with his first recording, "Sufrimientos," released by Rondador Records. Ramia is performing in the Quito Hotel, with good success. She will soon travel to Peru and then visit Europe.



BELGIUM

Riverside, handled by Philips Records Belgium, reports a remarkable increase in sales of the Nat Adderley repertoire, since the youngest "Comblain La Tour Jazz Festival." A new EP-release was announced for last week of Adderley's own "Work Song" and "Blue Brass Groove." A real triumph on the same festival was his performance of "Gemini," written by "Cannonball" especially for this occasion and the record of which meets with big demands. Other Riverside releases are by world famous jazz guitar-player Wes Montgomery: "Round About Midnight" and "Missile Blues," written by himself, and Bobby Timmons, pianist of the Jazz Messengers, in "Moanin'" and "Soul Times," both written by Bobby Timmons.

They had several give away gimmicks going for visitors to their booth, including airplane flights over the area; a night on the town for two and mens and ladies wrist watches. Harvey, by the way, is the manager and number one supporter of a folk singing group with a great commercial sound called The Couriers. The group just completed a highly successful appearance at The Playboy Club in New Orleans, and have just put the finishing touches to a new Mercury album. Keep an ear and an eye on this young group, they'll be going places in short order. They were set to do the Jim Backus TV'er, "Talent Scouts," 8/28, to be introduced on the show by Hal March.

CKOY all nite spinner, Larry Wood, played the Johnny Tillotson single, "Send Me The Pillow You Dream On," the other wee small hours, and happened to comment that he could make good use of a pillow. Much to his surprise a day or two later he received a special delivery package containing—you guessed it—a pillow. This particular pillow carried the signatures of several of deejay Wood's all night femme listeners, right on the pillow in india ink. Compo's promotion man, Hal Ross, tried to get Larry to give up the pillow so he could make use of it in his national promotion chores on behalf of the Tillotson disk, but at last word Larry was sitting on the pillow—literally.

Under the heading of "what a deejay will sacrifice for a gimmick" will have to fall the recent marathon broadcasting stint by Gary Parkhill, morning man—P.D. at CJLX in Canada's Lakehead. The deejay set his sights on the wake-athon broadcasting mark during the recent Canadian Lakehead Exhibition and almost made it. He lasted sixty-five and a half hours without shut eye before a cow milking contest finally ruined him. He fell on his face in "udder" fatigue just after being crowned cow milking king of the Exhibition.

New voice over CJLX in the Lakehead these days is Jay Spark, a Montrealer who comes to the Fort William outlet after chalking quite a rep. as a teentype spinner at CJNR in Blind River. The Lakehead station is advancing the cause of country music in no uncertain terms these days. In addition to their regular live broadcasts with The Sunny Mountain Boys and Myrna Lorrie (who will be remembered for her while back RCA smash, "Are You Mine") CJLX added another C&W group billed as The Vagabounds. The aforementioned are all featured on the station's live Saturday night segment, entitled "The Great Northwestern Opry." All of this live talent is under the supervision of the station's C&W platter spinner Dave Carter, who hails from Nashville.

Another Fort William station, CKPR, is also going in heavily for C&W sounds as it has just signed a western swing group headed up by well known fiddler, Norm Ronbeck, who has appeared on the Canadian Network TV'er, "Country Hoedown."

Paul White at Capitol in Toronto reports that Norrie Paramour has been signed to appear on the CBC TV Network on Norman Sedawie's production of "Parade" during the week of October 29. With Paramour on the show will be one of Great Britain's leading female vocalists in the person of Helen Shapiro.

Tony Bennett simply knocked out the audiences at Toronto's O'Keefe Center during his week long stint (8/13—8/18). The chanter was in rare form throughout the engagement handling all the standards in great fashion. In addition he brought the house down with renditions of new Broadway items, especially a couple of songs from the forthcoming "Little Me." Great reception for Tony's "I Left My Heart In San Francisco" from all audiences during his O'Keefe stand. Co-starring with Bennett were the always funny Ford and Hines comedy team

Gilles Aubin, London's national field rep., reports from Winnipeg that his company's lines are all doing very well in western Canadian markets. According to Gilles, this looks like the biggest Fall season in the company's history. Red Robinson of Vancouver's C-Fun reported great success for a one nighter in Ladysmith, B.C. by The Ventures. Gilles adds that albums and the latest single, "Lolita Ya Ya," are all hot items in all western markets.

Len Headly, general manager of RCA Victor's Record division, announced an all out effort on the part of his firm to encourage and support good Canadian talent. Moreover, Len says that RCA is "determined to develop the finest and largest French (language) catalog in the industry." He points out that over the past twelve months, RCA Victor has doubled the size of its French LP

Donn and Cindy Reynolds are still packing them in at Winnipeg's Club Copacabana. Donn's current record release "The Wild One" is getting heavy exposure on Winnipeg airwaves. Donn Reynolds is a real "Ambassador At Large" on behalf of the Country Music Association. He manages to sign up new members wherever his tours take him. Latest new member to join the ranks of the CMA through Donn's efforts is Al Sharp of the Ritzo Agency in the Manitoba capital. Richard Wolf and Bernice Ross, writers of Tommy Britt's new single, "Ella, A Fella & A Striped Umbrella," are not the writers of "Itsy Bitsy . . .," the years-back novelty hit, as reported in last week's column.

MEXICO

Cash Box received letter from Lucho Gatica, who wrote that he performed at the the Araneta Coliseum in Quezon City, Philippines with great success. Lucho also performed in Japan, Hong Kong and Los Angeles and by now should be in México City again to fulfill many contracts and recordings. From Spain, Cash Box received the first of the three long plays recorded there at the Hispa-Vox studios. This album contains a great variety of rhythms, marvelously sung in Monna style, with the arrangements of Augusto Algueró, Greg Segura and Bebo Valdéz. Leroy Anderson's "Serenata" is one of the LP's cuts played on radio stations.

Spanish Hispa Vox Recording Company is recording Frankie Avalon in Spanish versions of some of his big hits, ala Connie Francis and Paul Anka. Enrique Guzmán, the most popular Mexican singer, recorded in Japanese the songs "Megushi" and "Omoitakuna Ikado," for the Japanese market. It is possible that Enrique will also sing in English some of his big hits, unknown in North América.

Mayte has, at last, the first LP of her career, Included are her big hits like "Norman," "Runaround Sue," "Lover Please" and her version of "Conscience," "Bobby, Bobby, Bobby," "Tell Me," "Crazy Talk," "It Keeps Right on a Hurtin," and "Lady of Seville." There is also a new song composed by Bobby Capó named "Tic Tac Twist." Of course, all of these songs are sung in Spanish and accompaniment is by Chucho Ferrer orchestra. It is a well done LP that should sell very well.

After four years of not having recorded any song, Leticia Julian returned to the music scene with RCA Victor presenting her version, in Spanish, of "Saturday Night" and the Mexican song "Refúgiate en mis Brazos." Lety has one of the most personal styles ever heard.

Marco Antonio Muñiz is performing now in Guatemala, while María Victoria is doing the same in the Mexican city of Guadalajara. Rebeca should be working by this time in San Salvador.

At the Musart label, beautiful singer of the "New Wave," Angélica María, recorded new songs for her first album

TV show. After that, they immediately return to México to continue their contract.

Jose G. Cruz was named new Peerless A&R manager and immediately began to record singers of the "New Wave."

After 30 days of visiting Argentina in a study plan, J. Manuel Villareal, general manager of Columbia Records, back in Mexico. Peter de Rougemont, manager of the Latin American section of Columbia, was his host.

There is a rumor that the world famous Mexican trío Los Panchos will be disbanded after their tour through Japan and that in the future they only will be together in some benefits and in recording sessions at Columbia Records. Also it is said that Johnny Albino, one of the members of this trio, will settle in Puerto Rico and only come to México occasionally.

Co-Ro Records introduced a new singer under the name of Yola, who recorded the songs "El Trenecito" (The Little Train) and "El Anillito" (The Little King).

Additionally, Tex will also be featured for one week beginning September 14th through 20th at the Los Angeles County Fair. Editorial

New Ideas Dictate Our Industry's Future

The success of American business depends primarily on the periodic introduction of something new. If it's new and has merit the American public will buy it and continue to buy it until such time as the novelty wears off.

The novelty of the movies wore off somewhat with the introduction of television some years ago and the movie industry to this day has felt the impact of this new medium. The legitimate theater has suffered from rising production costs over the years. Where once there was as many as twenty-two shows on Broadway there are now a handful-and not too many hits. Here are two examples of current failing profit pictures in the entertainment industry. Almost overnight, both seem on the threshold of a new and exciting future with an unlimited profit picture in store for each, although the research and the development of the new idea in each of the two industries may have totaled a score of years and possibly a hundred million dollars. Both fields—the legit stage and the movies—announced last week what was hoped to be the answer to its problems. The movie people said that they have finally overcome the filming and projecting problems of the Cinerama technique and will issue shortly two full length stories in Cinerama—one story based on the life of Christ and the other a zany comedy which also presents tremendous potential for an audience seeking amusement and entertainment. The announcement indicated that the new development could very well alter the construction of every movie house in the country and change the complexion of the film making industry.

The legit theater plan calls for televised showings of plays on opening night in several cities around the country. Rather than hurt the box office sale, it is seen that the innovation may very well help future sales through the broad exposure and education but more important the income from a television deal now makes the capitalization for straight dramas and comedies possible. Support has only been forthcoming for musicals which represent another type of investment. The first night opening—simultaneously across the nation—is definitely in the cards for the legit theater and the income from such a promotion will undoubtdly pump new money into what was fast becoming a major problem of the theater.

The coin machine industry has changed too over the years. New type games and amusement, and new innovations in coin-operated music have undoubtedly kept the industry very much alive. Everyone would like to see a major innovation take place along the lines of the two examples outlined above especially with a similar profit potential. But we need not grow impatient. Keeping a level head, is there anyone who really doubts that perhaps next year or in several years the coin machine industry can expect new innovation, radical change in equipment, and perhaps a basic change in the operation of such equipment? It certainly seems feasible to expect such change from as dynamic a group as our manufacturers and wholesalers and even the operators who are the life blood. 
