

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A FRIEND INDEED

While pressures of keen competition in the record industry attract one's attention to new areas and methods of merchandising, all too often the old reliables are overlooked and at times may even be forgotten.

But when a soft singles period hits the industry, such as the one we are currently (not) enjoying, everyone seems to count his blessing that there is such a phenomenon as the JUKE BOX ... a mechanism which must be fed new single records whether the market be soft or swinging.

However, it is unfair to think of the juke box as only a steady customer who must buy records from the disk industry whether he cares to or not. The juke box of today is playing a tremendous role in popularizing both singles, albums and artists through many new and inventive methods unheard of only a few years ago.

New Rock-Ola machines offer a "Featured Star" idea which displays sleeves of singles in the unit, in a sense an advertisement for the specific single displayed.

Rowe-AMI machines feature a "Top Talent" program whereby a new disk pack of five 7" singles at 33 rpm are released each week. The package consists of ten cuts from a top LP plus a color repro scaled to fit the phono's display space. Seeburg offers an "Album of the Month" feature made up of six selections from an LP (three on a side of a 7" 33 rpm single) which can be played by the customer by pushing a single button. The machine also features a ten album display panel.

Wurlitzer today offers a "Top Ten Tunes" idea whereby the consumer can play the top ten hits of the day by pushing a single button. This machine also displays colorful disk sleeves and in addition highlights "Music Of The Week" a gimmick which features certain specific selections each week.

We are no longer living in an era in which the only attention getting factor in the juke box is the revolving mechanism which always seems to stop on the right number--the one you selected.

Today's new machines are very colorful. They are display masterpieces. They feature 33 and 45 rpm disks. And while attracting the public's attention they promote songs, records and artists for the music industry.

The juke box market should not be considered an outlet to which the industry turns in time of need, in time of soft sales. It is a valuable and progressive field very closely related to the record industry and more eager than ever for any support it can derive from the disk industry.

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records is launching a long-term "full-scale re-emphasis" on jazz. Label is bowing a "Dimensions in Jazz" series this week with three LP's among its Feb. releases and four jazzists have been inked to the label (see below).

This long-range repertoire and mer-chandising specialty will be desig-nated by a special "Dimensions in chandising specialty will be desig-nated by a special "Dimensions in Jazz" trade-mark, which all upcoming packages in the series will combine with the Capitol logo. Dave Cavanaugh, Capitol's execu-tive A&R director for album product, stressed the new series will be aimed mimarily at exploiting new jazz

primarily at exploiting new jazz names.

names. "New in the sense of needing their rightful exposure to the record-buy-ing public," he explained, "though certainly not new to the jazz scene. All have long-standing reputations on the jazz circuit."

All have long-standing reputations on the jazz circuit." One prominent exception to the "new name" concept, however, is the February release of George Shear-ing's last sessions with the late bas-sist Israel Crosby and drummer Vernel Fournier. These trio dates, dubbed "JAZZ MOMENTS," are sharp jazz departure from recent best-selling Shearing Quintet albums. "Shearing is one of the most re-

Masters Moves Into **Bankruptcy Proceedings**

NEW YORK—Masters, Inc., a major eastern discount-house chain and a big disk sales factor, has filed a Chapter 11 in U.S. Southern District Court of New York.

As noted in the Chapter 11 petition, financial difficulties are the result of expansion at too rapid a rate. Firm and a subsid operate 11 branches, two stores in New York City, outlets in Elmsford, New Hyde Park, Flushing and Hempstead, all New York, Paramus, N.J., York and Lancaster, Pa., and Ft. Lauderdale and Miami, Fla.

Firm reports total liabilities of \$5,213,327 and total assets of \$7,298,-285 in balance sheet estimates as of Jan. 15. Current liabilities are \$5,-093,315, including \$4,055,198 of accounts payable to merchandise suppliers, which include General Electric, Zenith Radio, Westinghouse Electric. Admiral Corp. and Sperry Rand. Current assets, reports the firm, are \$5,-925,957, including \$5,360,894 in merchandise inventory. Its annual volume, according to the petition, is about \$37 million.

President of the firm is Stephen Masters, who owns the privately held company along with his family.

Asa S. Herzog has been named the court-appointed referee in the Chapter 11 proceedings. A hearing will be held this Fri. (8).

FTC Hears Testimony From Publishing Company And Record Label Heads In Columbia Disk Club Suit

NEW YORK—The Federal Trade Commission's anti-trust suit against Columbia Records entered its third week last week with representatives of the music publishing business and manufacturers testifying on behalf of the federal government. Representing the pubberies were Mickey Scoop of the Big 3 Music Co., and Herman Starr of Music Publishers Holding Corp., a subsidiary of Warner Bros. Arnold Maxim, head of MGM Records also testified.

The counsel for the FTC asked Scoop if the Columbia Record Club received a discount on royalties paid for material used, and if so, why. Scoop replied that Columbia received a 25% discount because untapped marketing areas would be developed by the club, and that the over all good to be gained by the music industry was just cause for the reduced rate. The government counsel also asked Scoop if the record dealers would be hurt by the operations of a record club, and Scoop replied that dealer sales were unaffected.

The FTC counsel then asked if the Big 3 Music Co. gave the same discount to the other record clubs (RCA Victor and Capitol) and Scoop verified that all the record clubs received the same discount on royalties.

The publishers representatives were questioned as to the amount of royalties paid for free records such as those used for promotion and those given as bonuses to record club members. Both Scoop and Starr admitted that royalties were not paid on promotional records that were clearly marked for that purpose, but that royalties were paid on bonus records given away by the record clubs.

Scoop, when asked if Columbia paid the royalties on other labels distributed through the Columbia Record club, replied that he did not know.

Herman Starr of the Music Publishers Holding Corp. gave substantially the same testimony to these questions as Scoop did. Starr agreed with Scoop that the emergence of a record club by Columbia was a stimulant to the industry. Starr also informed the members of the hearing that his publishing company gave the same 25% discount on royalties to all three record clubs, and that the roy-

Lasker: LP Producers Losing Out On Teen Market

HOLLYWOOD-Jay H. Lasker, executive vice-president of Del Fi Records, has decried the overemphasis by producers of albums directed at the adult market almost to the exclusion of the huge and profitable teen buyer.

The kids, he stated, have not been given an opportunity to make a choice of diversified and planned product and have for the most part had to take the leavings or seep-overs from the adult market. States Lasker: "It is up to the record industry to put an end to the glut and over production of the so called catalog items wherein as many as 50 to 100 albums identically similar in concept and material fight for exposure while on the other end of the dealers store the teens are scratching around for something to buy that is interesting and not merely an adult offshoot or a package developed out of the teen adult single hit. The organ, Hawaiian and movie theme albums are certainly all right in their place but for the most part the kids show only limited interest."

"Del Fi, Lasker said, will plan and release material that will give the younger buyer an identity, an example is evidenced by a soon to be released "Pajama Party" album recorded live on the UCLA Campus. "The surfing identification has proven a record seller bonanza out here on the west coast-here where records made for the teens descriptive of their own world."

Del Fi expects to go to the school proms, dances, fraternity houses, to the beaches and amusement parks and hopes that other labels will join in a campaign in broadening the base of record album buyers.

Columbia To Market Faith's "Monaco" Score

HOLLYWOOD-TV viewers will see Princess Grace's "A Look at Monaco" on Feb. 17, and Columbia Records' plans to have the original score by Percy Faith available the next day.

The label, according to Irving Townsend, coast veep, is making the LP a rush-special project to be in the stores no later than Feb. 15 so it may go on sale the day after the telecast on the CBS-TV network.

All the music heard in the album was cut in Monaco by Faith, a Columbia artist, and a large orchestra. Faith spent two weeks in Monaco at the invitation of Princess Grace, who conducts the tour of her 240-room palace and other places of interest during the hour telecast.

When Faith departed for the special assignment, he had no idea his compositions would be chosen for an album by Townsend, who normally records him for Columbia. "When Percy came back . . . and played us the tapes, we were so impressed that we decided to make an album of the music," Townsend explained. Percy had no intention of doing an LP; he just went to Monaco to do a television show," Townsend emphasized.

In addition to Faith's original score, the album will include excerpts from Princess Grace's commentary plus photos.





The artist's personal style and swingin' phrasing carries her in good stead on this set conducted by Edward Robinson as she offers "Sign Of The Judgement," "In Times Like These" and "No Other Help I Know." An out-standing entry.

There are many blues-jazz singers around today, but few of them have such a sensitivity to lyrics as Etta Jones. The lark is deeply involved with all the songs she sings as she goes through her paces on this new Prestige offering with polish and good taste. No gimmick-oriented singer, Etta turns in some straightforward, feelingful readings of "I'll Be There," "Out In The Cold Again" and "You Don't Know My Mind." All of the artist's many fans should really dig the set.

"MILLION SELLERS GO BOSSA NOVA"-Ray Milan-ABC-Paramount ABC 443 Although there have been a slew of bossa nova albums released in recent months, little of it has been teen-oriented. Orkster Ray Milan along with his Quarter-Notes have broken that standard by coming up with a bossa nova session utilizing a potent dozen recent single hits. Kids will readily be able to dance as Milan (who doubles as chanter on a few of the tracks) and his crew offer "Sherry," "The Lion Sleeps Tonight" and "Re-turn To Sender."





"JUSTICE FOR ALL"-Jimmy Justice-Kapp KL1308

KL1308 Jimmy Justice, a consistent best-seller in England, aims his vocal talents at a bag of evergreens and recent hits on this swingin' session from Kapp. The wailer gets some solid backing from Bob Leaper on the set which is geared for both danc-ing and listening pleasure. The teen dance crowd should really dig his pulsating readings of "Span-ish Harlem," "Like Young" and "Parade of Bro-ken Hearts."



"SESSION ONE"—Yeomen—Mercury SR60771 Proof-positive of American youth's enterprise is this set produced for Mercury by Minneapolis junior achievement company tagged Hi-Top Re-cordings. The group consists of four young JA members who have perfected a distinctive, profes-sional brand of folksinging. The crew turns in some rousing Kingston Trio-styled readings of "Pullin' Away," "John Henry" and "This Land Is Your Land." Plenty of potential here.

"THE DANCING STYLE OF RUSS CARLYLE" —ABC-Paramount ABC 439

-ABC-Paramount ABC 439 In the past year there was major revival of danc-ing at both the teen and adult levels. Although not many kids will dig this romantic, easy-going big band tersichorean package from the Russ Carlyle group, their parents should come out in droves for it. The orkster has included a fine sampling of evergreens and self-penned items rendered in a wide variety of tempos. Best bets here are "Heart And Soul," "Mood Indigo" and " "That's A Plenty."



The tenor saxist's articulate solo performances never intrude on the basic melodic developments. Top-flight tracks here include "Cheese Cake," "Second Balcony Jump" and "Where Are You."

Chi Music Trade Show Sends Out Invites

CHICAGO—Invitations to exhibit in the big Music Industry Trade Show have gone to more than 600 industry members in the form of the new 1963

members in the form of the new 1963 exhibitors' prospectus. The 62nd annual Music Show is scheduled for July 21-25 in the Palm-er House in Chicago, with the theme "Move More Music from Store to Home in 1963."

The show, bringing together the entire music industry, is expected to be the nation's largest buyer-seller market of musical merchandise, and will see the greatest concentration of

market of musical merchandise, and will see the greatest concentration of musical instruments and related prod-ucts ever assembled under one roof, according to William R. Gard, execu-tive secretary of the National Asso-ciation of Music Merchants, which sponsors the show. Attendance is expected to be at least that of the 1962 show, when more than 85% of the nation's buyers of musical instruments, electronic products and related merchandise and service were on hand and more than 450 lines of merchandise were dis-played, Gard said. "Scheduled for late July, the 1963 show is strategically timed for fall buying and rebuilding of inventories to help everybody in the industry benefit to the fullest from the heavy

benefit to the fullest from the heavy sales year now being predicted-and to move more music from store to home," the exec stated.

Industry interest in the big industry-wide trade show is growing annually, and indications point to a record number of exhibits in 1963, Gard said.

Former exhibitors must return their applications by March 1 to protect priority on the space they occupied two years ago when the show was last held at the Palmer House.

The show will open at 1 p. m. Sunday, July 21, and continue till 12 noon Thursday, July 25.

Fourth floor - Radios, television, high fidelity and stereophonic consoles.

Sixth floor-Organs and accessories.

Seventh floor-Pianos and accessories.





Fame Of Robert Frost **Extended To Disks**

Extended To Disks NEW YORK — The wide-spread pop-ularity of the poems of Robert Frost, uncrowned "Poet Laureate of the U.S." who died last week (29) at the age of 88, was evidenced not only in print but on disks, too. His LP, "Robert Frost Reading His Own Poetry," is one of the continu-ing best-sellers of Caedmon Records, the spoken-word label, and has sold more than 100,000 copies since its re-lease in 1957. The recording took four years of "writing, cajoling and pleading," as the label put it last week, for the poet to sit before a microphone and read such poems as "Birches" and "Mend-ing Wall." But finally, Marianne Mantell and Barbara Holdridge, co-founders of Caedmon, overcame his reluctance, and in the autumn of 1956, Frost re-corded continuously for four and a half hours—filling up 9 reels of tape —in the front parlor of his roomy house in Cambridge, Mass. Following his death, many radio outlets used excerpts from the LP, in-cluding WINS and WOR in New York.

AF Wins Judgment From HiFi In "Railroad" Jacket Case

NEW YORK—After four years of court litigation, Audio Fidelity Rec-ords has obtained a judgment, amounting to \$9,915.38, against High Fidelity Records over its use of a jacket design similar to that of AF's popular "Railroad Sounds" LP. Amount includes damages and attorney's fees.

AF brought action against the label, owned by Richard Vaughn, in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of California, Central Division in September, 1958. The Trial Court held that the jacket served a "functional purpose rather than being a unique object capable of acquiring secondary meaning.'

The Circuit Court of Appeals, however, reversed the Trial Court and held that the plaintiff was entitled to an injunction and damages and the litigation was remanded to the lower Court for an assessment of damages. The Appellate Court reversed the lower Court, holding that the jacket was a distinctive object creating proprietary rights and entitling its owner to protection against unfair competition; and that the copying thereof would result in liklihood of confusion among consumers.

The counsel for the FTC asked Starr if Warner Brothers asked asked Starr if Warner Brotners askeu Columbia to withhold club distribution of "Music Man" for 90 days. Starr admitted this request was made. Counsel then asked if this was to give record dealers first chance with the album, and Starr replied that it was not. Starr also informed the hearing that his company considered all mail order record businesses which employed national advertising, as record clubs and afforded them the same 25%discount. Starr was referring spe-cifically to record deals made by Reader's Digest, which distributes specially produced Victor albums.

The next person to take the witness stand was Arnold Maxin, general manager of the record division of MGM. Maxim answered queries as to the structure and status of MGM the structure and status of MGM Records, and on its position within the industry. The counsel for the FTC repeatedly brought up the fact that Verve, a subsid of MGM, was dis-tributed through the Columbia club and that the contract was terminated last year. Maxin admitted that both Verve and Columbia lived up to con-tract agreements during the period Verve and Columbia lived up to con-tract agreements during the period of contract. The counsel for the FTC also asked Maxin if MGM had nego-tiated with Columbia and the other record clubs to have MGM products distributed through their respective clubs. Maxin said that MGM nego-tiated with Columbia and Victor but that it never went beyond the discus-sion stage and that no agreements sion stage and that no agreements were cemented.

Throughout this testimony, counsel for Columbia Asa Sokolow repeatedly objected to this line of questioning as objected to this line of questioning as irrelevant to the existent suit. The examiner for the FTC sustained the objection on the grounds that a dis-cussion of plans on matters that did not materialize was improper. The FTC's final question to Maxin concerned the dispession of Verya

concerned the disposition of Verve records still in the hands of the Club after the termination of contract. Maxin stated that offers and counter-offers had been made, but that no agreement as to the disposition of these records had as yet been made.

these records had as yet been made. Columbia's attorneys indicated that the company still had upwards of 50,000 Verve LP's on hand. Fred Hartstone, owner of Kreys, Inc., which operates six disk outlets in the Boston area, told FTC attorney Dick Levine that he could compete with all stores in Boston with the exception of one, which, he stated, sold disks far below regular prices. Hartstone said he sold LP's that carried a \$3.98 list for \$3.29. Asked how he was affected by the Columbia Club, he declared he could not possibly compete with a six-albums-for-\$1.89 offer made by the Club, especially when it came to classical warhorses. Hartstone noted that he was virtually unable to sell copies of Mercury's famed "1812 Overture" recording after it had been made available to Club members.

Asa Sokolow, questioning Hartstone the following day, tried to prove the dealer's ignorance of other mailorder operations.

Columbia's attorney tried to get Hartstone to name a host of specific LP's he had been hurt by when offered through other Clubs, including Capitol, Reader's Digest and Book of the Month. An FTC attorney broke in to argue that this line of questioning was pointless, but he was over-ruled.

Friday afternoon, George Marek, president of the record division of RCA, testified on behalf of the FTC. After a brief summary of the importance of the LP to the record industry, Marek was asked by FTC Counsel Dick Levine if he had ever en-

gaged in discussions with other label representatives on the possibility of having these records distributed through the Victor club. Marek ad-mitted that he had talked with Arnold Maxin of MGM, with a representative of Dot, and with a representative of London Records

London Records. Marek further stated that it would be of considerable cultural and eco-nomic benefit to the public if more labels were to be distributed by Victor inasmuch as a wider variety of prod-uct could be offered to the public. Marek continued by saying that he felt that dealers have not been hurt by the existence of record clubs, and that on the contrary they have been

helped. FTC counsel then asked Marek if exclusive contracts between Victor or Columbia and other labels were harmful

Marek answered that exclusive conmares answered that exclusive con-tracts per se were harmful since the complete catalog of a manufacturcr's product would not be offered by a rec-ord club and that the unoffered por-tion of a label's catalog would not get proper exposure. He continued by say-ing that indie labels who sign avalue ing that indie labels who sign exclus-ive contracts with a record club are forced to abide by the dictates of the larger company. When asked by FTC counsel if con-

When asked by FTC counsel if con-tracts with outside labels would bene-fit RCA-Victor, Marek replied, "It would indeed." The Victor prexy also stated that the clubs contracts with Reader's Digest and the Book of the Month Club were exclusive contracts to distribute Victor products. The final witness on Friday after-noon (Feb. 1) was Mrs. Rose Rubin, president of Monitor Record, Inc., who testified that independent labels were important to the overall music indus-

testified that independent labels were important to the overall music indus-try in that they were willing to take gambles on untried artists and material that would not be taken by major labels.

Mrs. Rubin also stated that she was Mrs. Rubin also stated that she was losing dealers because they had to stock sure things in order to compete with the record clubs. Mrs. Rubin continued by saying that

Mrs. Rubin continued by saying that she had tried to negotiate with the Columbia Record Club for distribution of some of her LP's because her prod-uct would receive wider distribution, and that she did not have some of her LP's sold through the Diner's Record Club.

Epic Has 4 New LP's, **Okeh Bows Dupree Set**

NEW YORK—Epic Records is marketing four new pop albums in Feb., while the Okeh label, an affiliate, is offering one album.

The Okeh date is "Cabbage Green: Champion Jack Dupree," a collection of 16 songs cut by the blues singer in the 1940's.

The Epic releases are: Adam Wade's "What Kind of Fool Am I?," "The Halifax Three," debut of the folksinging group, "Bluegrass Special," Jim & Jesse and The Virginia Boys, and "The Ould Sod," Brendan O'Dowda.

SESAC To Feature Live Talent At NAB Chi Convention



RCC is spending \$250,000 for ad space, which will include full-page spreads in Life, Look, Reader's Digest, McCalls and other mags plus 400 metropolitan daily newspapers.

Newspaper Strike, Gag Lead To Sing-Along **Novelty Single On Epic**

NEW YORK—The New York City newspaper strike has placed Gotham's public relations men, press agents and promotion men on their mettle in creating excitement for their clients and the results of one such public relations man's ingenuity has created a hot novelty deck for Epic Records. Records.

Several weeks ago, vet personal manager and press agent, Lloyd Leip-zig, who serves as aide to Mitch Miler on TV's "Sing Along With Mitch," booked Mitch on the Merv Griffin Show, the NBC-TV daytime entry. As a gag to surprise Mitch, Griffin commissioned writers Fred Hertz and Charles Grean to whip up a short musical tome entitled "The Man Who Wouldn't Sing Along With Mitch," and sang it on the air to instantaneous and strong audience and listener reaction. Leipzig immediately contacted Several weeks ago, vet personal

immediately contacted Leipzig Hertz and Grean to enlarge the tune for recording purposes. This was done in a matter of days and the demonstration disk was brought to Epic A&R producer Bob Morgan. Morgan was also deeply impressed by the hit potential of this material and promptly recorded the tune via the Halifax Three, a brand-new vocal group from Canada, slated to receive an all-out push from the diskery and their agency, International Talent Associates.

Excitement bubbled all over the Epic offices the following day as Morgan played the completed record for the staff. Len Levy, Epic's national sales manager, scheduled it for prompt release and shipped out test pressings to a few key distribu-tors and disc jockeys to test the reaction.

The next few days found Levy's office bombarded with calls, wires, inquiries and orders, so that Epic has pressed 400,000 copies in anticipation of the expected dealer panic in its release this week.

Leipzig, along with the Epic publicity and promotion staffs, is pushing "The Man Who Wouldn't Sing Along With Mitch" with an all-out campaign which includes a special jacket for the record, individual wires from Levy to Epic sales representatives throughout the nation alerting them about the new hit, disk jockey teasers, ads, TV exposure for the Halifax Three, and road trips by the group and the songwriters.

Leipzig, by the way, was formerly a member of Columbia Records' publicity department.

Buyers, clerks, and dealers have been saving the Merchandisers to build a home library of Columbia's great Master-works recordings. Outstanding selec-tions that have been offered are: Francescatti's recording of the Bruch Violin Concerto; Britten's Young Person's Guide To The Orchestra (an introduction to the instruments of the orchestra) with Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic; and Copland's Appalachian Spring with Bernstein and the New York Phil-harmonic. This month, dealers are being treated to a concert drawn from Columbia's release of seven al-bums by top pianists. Performances included in the February Master-works Merchandiser are Horowitz playing Scarlatti, Schumann, and Scriabin; Glenn Gould playing Prel-udes and Fugues from Bach's Well Tempered Claviar; Brailowsky play-ing popular Chopin Mazurkas; and Ivan Davis playing Mendelssohn's Rondo Capriccioso. The Italian Record Producers Association (AFI) has created a commission to negotiate with the musicians' reps and try to find a solution. In fact, the dispute seemed settled at one point, and the musicians returned to work, but the situation became difficult again. Therefore, just a few San Remo songs were recorded. By the way, regarding the AFI and referring to our column in the January 26 Cash Box issue, there was a misunderstanding about their activity. As a matter of fact, it is no longer forbidden for AFI to handle questions of general economic interest for record producers, but this activity must be mainly connected with syndicated matters, taxes, common advertising and So on


mainly connected with syndicated matters, taxes, common auversions so on. The new AFI articles of association don't provide common price policy. We wish to stress that each record manufacturer follows his own judgement about prices: as for the last increase some leading record houses decided it separately to face new work costs, and some other houses followed this first example: no common decision about prices was taken, as stated. 

To Bossa Nova or not to Bossa Nova, that is the question being asked by record firms and A&R men in Germany today. Now that the twist has absolutely proved its success and popularity here, and is now accepted as a standard dance, record men are looking for a new selling rhythm, and many believe that Bossa Nova is the answer. Over 20 different Bossa Nova records crossed our desk in one week. TV is giving Bossa Nova dance instructions, Bossa Nova contests are being held in major cities, and the press is also full of the new dance craze, but no Bossa Nova record has, as of this moment, made its way into the charts. However, trade people remember that it took the twist over 6 months to catch on, and after everyone had given up on the twist, is mashed through, and is still racking up top record sales on old and new recordings alike. To point out the concentratation on this new dance, the most popular Bossa Nova song, "Desafinado" has over 30 different recordings alone, and "Eso Beso" was released with 2 simultaneous versions by major artists. Another type of music which will be getting an acid test in the next few weeks is authentic Country and Western music. Although C&W has been accepted by the German public in the few tests made, and the hillbilly shows on the American Forces Network are top mail drawers from the German public, there has been a conspicuous absence of this type of recording in German on the market. An independent production group, AMFED Productions, operating out of Munich, is making the first test. Also from America comes news that the Budde original published tune "Copenhagen Carousel" has been recorded by John Buck for Warner Bros. and is the original disking of the tune. The record which has just been re-leased here has already received "Hit Of The Week" action and looks like a best seller. best seller.

best seller. A&R man Hans Bertram reports that Will Brandes, who is swinging chart wise with his "Baby Twist," will be representing Germany at a pop music festival in Zopot, Poland. Due to stomach troubles, Heidi Bruhl was unable to make the "Song For Europe" contest to test the most popular song of Europe. Instead, Polydor's Margot Eskens will be making the trip to London for the contest. Willy Millowitsch, the famous Cologne comedian, is now visiting the U.S. by invita-tion of the German radio stations in Chicago and Toronto. The French chart topper Francoise Hardy is in Germany to make her first German records. On hand will be her French A&R man Jacques Wolfsohn and the German publisher Hans R. Beierlein as well as Mr. Marbot from Paris. The production is being done in Hamburg. done in Hamburg.

Paul Siegel writes that he received a personal letter from President Kennedy thanking him for making good will abroad. Furthermore the president thanked Paul for his recording of "Stars & Stripes Forever" with the Oederland orchestra which was released here by Decca. L. C. Phonogram has added a new American label to its repertoire, Audio Fedelity, produced by featuring the Sid Frey stereo "Curtain of Sound" tech-nique. Leo Boudewijns introduced the first LP-releases in mono and stereo, emphasizing a most prominent factor of the series: the repertoire itself. Quot-ing from his introduction, Boudewijns qualified the superb recording-technique as a secondary function only when compared to other super-stereo productions that stick too much to gimmicks; the producers of AF-recordings have never overlooked the necessity of a commercial tendency while planning the reper-toire. Hence, the albums must have a strong public appeal. The first albums released by Phonogram include "Satchmo plays King Oliver," "Paris" by ac-cordianist Joe Basile and massed strings, Al Hirt's "Swingin" Dixie" and a most welcome album to this market: "Sound effects doctored for super stereo sound" (from dripping water to thundering jets). Young French chansonnier Claude Nougaro, whose first Philips-LP gained him the "Grand Prix du Disque 1963," appeared on Dutch TV for a 30 minutes tour-de-chant on January 23, introduced by Fred Hoyte of Philips' Phono-graphic Industries. The dynamic modern love-poet Nougaro sang six of his own chansons, all best-sellers in France and all on his winning LP. Among them are "Le Jazz et la Java," "Une petite fille" (the song that made him famous overnight), "Le Cinéma" and the frenzied "Rouge et Noir," Preceded by an EP last fall, the LP has been released in Holland as well. America has its Newport, Europe its Comblain-la-Tour in Belgium. Last year's jazz Festival there, organized by Californian Joe Napoli, featured the Dutch Swing College, and an LP has been cut of this exciting event of which Cannonball Adderley was a happy witness among the thrilled audience. The LP on Philips is another pearl in the string of brilliant live-recorded per-formances which the Band is giving these years, the second to last one being the Berlin Sport Palast Concert. Sandra's pleasant per-formances are backed by Frans Kerkhof's Orchestra. Editorial

WANTED: Association Support!

The next time yon feel dejected over lack of support from within your own trade association don't feel as though you are alone. Britain's coin machine trade press just last week took the industry to task for squealing "why don't *they* do something about these problems" when in reality, stated the editorial, the *they* these people are complaining about are actually themselves. This seems to be the problem in a nutshell over here, as it pertains to lack of association support. It is a universal characteristic but one which nonetheless needs a great deal of attention.

Each year Congressman Emanuel Celler introduces his copyright legislation amidst fanfare and support from the licensing organizations and although the current bills call for an annual fee of five-dollars per machine, membership in the national association, Music Operators of America Inc., shows no startling increase in numbers. Yet, MOA is expected to oppose it.

Last month the New York State Attorney General sent a bulletin to the State Police instructing them to notify the local District Attorney's office wherever there was evidence that coin-operated pool tables-whether sixpocket or not-were not licensed as are the regulation tables in pool parlors. The bulletin is in contrast to a directive issued by the SLA in 1956 which differentiates the six-pocket from the bumper-type table and association forces in the upstate region are working to fight this ruling which in effect could prohibit pool tables in the State, but again, membership in this local association is weak and aside from contributions from individuals at various levels, general operator support is discouraging, to say the least. Actually, if the operators in this section of the country need more than one good reason to support their association, they have a second reason in the Lerner Bill currently out of committee and smoldering, while operators fail to realize that the bill will take 10%of their gross juke box operating income from them, if passed.

Manufacturers feel that the industry's association support their association, they have a second reason in the operate many manufacturers will not, and in many instances cannot, take on the burden alone. There are too many markets with similar problems.

Distributors are generally quick to step in with financial support but they too receive the brunt of the demands since there are only a few wholesalers in each area and the expense can't be spread thin enough to make it painless.

The operator who is approached with a membership pitch requiring an annual fee of approximately fiftydollars feels that the dollar weekly cost won't break him, but then again it's not just one dollar but several dollars from several different areas which also need support and herein lies the crux of the problem, the money problem anyway. Physical and mental support requiring time and trouble will usually be assumed by civic minded individuals who do most of the work anyway. But they can't pick up the tab, too. And unless the individual operators who are actually the ones directly effected by anti-pool table rulings, and five dollar royalty payments, and percentage of gross taxes, and periodic abusive legislation, decide to dig down deeper and support these trade associations, then slowly but surely they will lose more and more of their business and their income as a result of legislation written by politicians who physically cannot cope with the conntless thousands of nondescript individuals concerned but can and will take heed when a trade association knocks on their door. It is the responsibility of every member of the industry to give associations complete support.

Celler Bills Back In Spotlight As MOA Officials Await Hearing In D.C. Ops; New Assoc. Joins MOA Ranks

WASHINGTON D. C.—Just as the seasons come and go, the Celler Bills arrived this month in the House of Representatives and the 88th Congress heard a bill which states the juke box operators should be required to pay operators should be required to pay royalty fees for the use of the musical property of composers, authors, and copyright owners (HR 1046); and then watched the Hon. Emanuel Celler (D., N. Y.) introduce a second bill, a repeat of a new bill introduced during repeat of a new bill introduced during the last session, and a bill which eventually died in committee upon the adjournment of Congress—HR 1045 which provides for the payment of these same royalties and outlines in detail the manner in which payment should be made. Both bills, repeats of former efforts, were introduced in the House on January 9. It marked the start of another ASCAP—Juke Box Industry battle and leaders in the the start of another ASCAP—Juke Box Industry battle and leaders in the industry as well as officials of the Music Operators of America, Inc., pre-pared for another organized attack on the juke box business. MOA prexy Harry Snodgrass was reportedly working closely with Attorney Nick Allen, who is based in Washington. Meanwhile Manager Bob Blundred toured the country in search of sup-port. (See separate story this page.) At press time no date was set for Committee Hearings but sources in Washington indicated that a date would be forthcoming. Nick Allen, MOA attorney, advised that his firm was on top of the situation and that he was awaiting word from the Committee as to a meeting date. Last year's session of Congress closed after a meeting date was set following a postponement due to illness of a postponement due to illness of Chairman Edwin Willis. The Con-gressman was hospitalized and the bill was not heard in Committee. While HR 1046 amounts to a straight repeal of the Copyright Act of 1909, HR 1045 details the manner

in which royalty payments are to be executed. It calls for the establishment of a government agency consisting of a board of trustees. This government agency, to be known as the Office of Performing Rights Trustees, will determine the amounts of royalties to be paid by the juke box operator.

The fee set up by the Celler Bill calls for an initial \$5 per machine per year, for the first year and ranges up to \$25 per machine per year for a period of four years thereafter. At the close of the four-year period trustees are to determine the amount of the fee to be paid in future years.

The Bill calls for the appointment of a three man board by the Attorney General to serve terms ranging in length from five years to three years to one year with a term of one year to be served by each trustee at the expiration of his first term. The bill reproduced and described in detail in the July 28 issue of Cash Box (HR 12450) is identical. Only the number has been changed to HR 1046.

The Democratic Congressman from New York was expecting a hearing before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Patents, Trademarks and Copyrights at the earliest possible date.

The hearings last summer originally called for a July 25 meeting but were cancelled due to the Chairman's illness. At that time, the music machine manufacturers, and representatives of MOA had requested a postponement in view of the unexpected meeting date which was announced just one week before.

He also intends to establish a public re-lations program to be guided by MOA officials without the expense of a pro-fessional PR firm. Blundred is asking each operator for an annual contribution of \$25 to support the PR phase of MOA. Dis-tributors contribute \$200.
