The label's distributors paid in advance for more than 150,-000 LP's and Norm Weiser, who heads the diskery's operations, reports that re-orders have come in from every distributor, sending the LP over the 200,000 mark prior to the film's debut. By July it is expected that 20 different "Cleopatra" LP's will be available from different companies covering the score from jazz to symphonic treatments.

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INDUSTRY HEADS TO MIAMI

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June 22, 1963

All during this week, the record industry will be migrating to Miami Beach for what could be one of the most interesting convention periods the record industry has ever known.

The main attraction of the "Big Week In Miami" is, of course, the **5th Annual ARMADA Convention** with its manufacturer-distributor meetings preceding and following the Association's actual convention dates of June 25th and 26th. But with many distributors in the onestop field, there is also keen interest developing in the ROSA Convention which will be held next door two days earlier. An extra added attraction that will bring other industry people to Miami during the week is the Society of Record Dealer's (SORD) board of directors meeting in the San Souci Motel June 23-25.

Attendance of trade people appears at present to be well over all previous highs and no doubt the difficulties that exist within the industry are causing the mass migration.

No one really expects any of the current problems to be erased at the forthcoming convention. But all seem to feel that an airing of the many difficuties can only do good somewhere in the future if not immediately.

"Chaotic" is the term we've heard a great deal about lately when the current record industry scene is described. Transitions predicted for the end of this year and for early 1964 have already come about and appear to be happening at a more rapid pace than was expected six months ago. And the changes have been hitting home at the distributor, rack jobber, onestop, dealer and manufacturer levels.

Perhaps everyone is trying to find out where he will stand in the record industry of the future.

If the conventions do nothing else, they are providing a common meeting ground for many of the minds who have been directing the course of much of the record industry. Hearing their opinions about the future, about what they are doing to counteract problems in their territory, about new developments in one territory that could be the up-coming developments in another area-all contribute to an accelerated educational course which might be called "Advanced Distribution Theory."

The course should be considered a prerequisite for everyone involved in disk merchandising.

ARMADA Execs Huddle With Roosevelt Small Business Comm.

NEW YORK-On the eve of the AR-MADA Convention in Miami Beach next week, ARMADA brass has met with the top echelon of the Roosevelt mall Business Committee on Distribution.

Last week, Jim Schwartz, ARMA-A treasurer, and Paul Ackerman, ARMADA executive secretary, went to Washington and met with Gregg Potvin of the Roosevelt Committee to describe some of the many difficulties in the area of record distribution. The Small Business Committee re-quested that ARMADA execs appear because of the tremendous amount of mail the Committee had received since the last ARMADA emergency meeting in Chicago a few months ago. At that time, ARMADA instituted a drive requesting distributors to write to the committee telling of the "chaotic" in-dustry situation at the distribution

Potvin explained that he was aware Potvin explained that he was aware of many of the record industry's diffi-culties but wanted to be further in-formed on the subject before an at-tempt was made to secure government aid on the industry's behalf. Schwartz and Ackerman are report-ed to have described the decline of the small vecord vetailor in recent years

small record retailer in recent years, the subject of transshipping, price variations and the total economic and chaotic situation in the industry today

dav. Potvin clearly indicated that the problem did fall into the sphere of the Roosevelt Committee and request-ed that ARMADA prepare a paper describing to the Committee some of the problems. Potvin also indicated that it is likely the Committee will include the examination of the record industry along with other industries it will be examining in the future. Examination of the record industry's distribution set up may take place in August or September. No site has yet been indicated.

Potvin also requested the names and addresses of all other industry associations.

Witnesses Offer Further **Defense Of Columbia Disk Club**

NEW YORK-The Federal Trade Commission's anti-trust suit against the Columbia Record Club continued last week (10-14) with Archie Bleyer, Mitch Miller, Dave Brubeck and Jimmy Dean serving as key witnesses on the club's behalf.

Archie Blever, prexy of Cadence Records, testified that he was not in-terested in having Cadence LP's dis-tributed thru the Columbia club but that the clubs do serve a useful pur-pose in advertising product which serves as a reminder to the public after they have heard the records. Bleyer also commended the clubs for being some of the few remaining out-lets where disks are sold at list price.

During the course of the direct ex-amination by Columbia counsel, Asa amination by Columbia counsel, Asa Sokolow, Bleyer discussed the press-ing contracts for the "First Family" LP with the various major and inde-pendent pressing companies. Victor and Columbia pressed most of the al-bums, with the remainder of the or-dors gring to smaller pressers. Bleyer ders going to smaller pressers. Bleyer stated that Columbia worked overtime to turn out the tremendous quantity of albums needed to fill orders. Cadence paid Columbia 27¢ per LP for a total of \$287,000, said Bleyer. Counsel for the FTC, Morton Needleman, in cross examination asked Bleyer if the Columbia Production company was in the business of press-ing records and if inter-company co-operation wasn't a negligible factor. Bleyer reiterated his early feelings that Columbia was still a competitor and the cooperation was excellent. Needleman asked Bleyer if Columbia had advantages over Cadence by vir-tue of the Club. The Cadence exec replied that the only advantage Colum-bia had with its club was in the area of copyright royalties (special rate for clubs) and that he would get those same advantages if he operated a club. When asked if "The First Family" LP established Cadence as an important LP company, Bleyer said, "There is no continuing element in the record business. We are in a creative enter-prise where success is dependent upon

prise where success is dependent upon the creative elements fusing into some-thing which will be acceptable to the public. We don't make shoes." Leslee Klemes, advertising director for the Columbia Record Club, testi-fied that the club has engaged in sev-eval test meilings to determine the eral test mailings to determine the (Continued on page 40)

Goldner Leaves Roulette To Set-Up Indie Operation

NEW YORK-George Goldner has left his position as vice-president of Rou-lette Records, according to a joint announcement last week by Goldner and Morris Levy, president of the label.

Levy indicated that the termination of Goldner's association with Roulette was on a completely amicable basis and that it was in line with Goldner's plans to go out on his own.

Goldner came to Roulette in June of 1962 as part of the arrangement whereby Roulette purchased Goldner's Gone and End labels. Since that time, Goldner has acted as veep in the A&R dept., and supervised the promotional activities of the label. His departure from Roulette in no ways of the label. from Roulette in no way affects the Gone and End merger, with the label's remaining a part of the Roulette setup.

Goldner said that the exact details of his independent operation would be announced shortly.

MOA Attendance Strength To Be Bolstered By Local Jukebox Reps

NEW YORK-Further indication that the upcoming convention of the Music Operations of America (MOA)—Sept. 4-6 in Chicago—will signal MOA's rebirth as a strong voice of the juke-box industry is the report that local jukebox organizations will be sending removed are to be on hand at the operator-reps to be on hand at the convention. Word of this development, seen as

a major force in spearheading a big turnout, comes from Joe Silverman, manager of AMA of Philadelphia, who successfully led a drive to see local successfully led a drive to see local jukebox organizations have a meeting set aside for themselves at the MOA gathering. Silverman wrote to local association heads asking for prime subjects to be taken up at a local as-sociation forum. Leading the replies were public relations and services of associations.

Silverman says there are at least local jukebox associations around the country. While many do not meet regularly, Silverman added, all have by-laws and regular elections of officers.

Harry Snodgrass, MOA president, has expressed hope that the MOA meet of territorial jukebox organiza-tions would result in concrete ideas on how MOA can better serve the lo-cals after the convention is concluded. Meanwhile, the two jukebox manu-facturers, Seeburg and Rowe AC, which have announced their participa-tion in the MOA confab are yet to

tion in the MOA confab are yet to be joined by Wurlitzer and Rock-Ola, the two other major jukebox firms. At presstime, however, both Wurlitzer and Rock-Ola were ready to meet with MOA officials concerning various as-pects on the conduct of the show.

PHILADELPHIA—NARM, the rackjobber association, has completed and released the results of its quality survey of Christmas product available in 1962, and has sent to its regular and associate members those results which pertain to their businesses.

pertain to their businesses. The total number of Christmas albums rated by the NARM rack jobbers was 206. Of that 206 albums, only four LP's were rated "Excellent." They were Johnny Mathis' "Merry Christmas" (Columbia Records); Bing Crosby's "Merry Christmas" (Decca Records); Elvis Presley's "Elvis' Christmas Album" (RCA Victor Records); and "Perry Como Sings Merry Christmas Music" (Camden Records, RCA's economy price label). Of the 206 albums, 37 were rated "good," 61 were rated "fair" the "excellent," "good," and "fair" categories totaling 102 albums. In other words, one-half of the Christmas product offered was rated "poor" or "very poor." The problem of the amount of Christmas goods on the maylet was

or "very poor." The problem of the amount of Christmas goods on the market was first considered by the NARM board of directors at its meeting in April, when the Christmas survey was initiated. Last week, a number of record manufacturers, based on the original thoughts of the NARM board of directors, on the results of the Christmas survey, and on the suggestions made by the NARM rack jobbers in answer to the survey request for such comments. In the latter, proceeding the recent

jobbers in answer in quest for such comments. In the letter presenting the recommendations, NARM executive director Jules Malamud wrote, "The recommendations offered are a service of the National Association of Record Merchandisers. Inc., in its continuing attempt to adapt the successful merchandising methods of other industries to the phonograph record business. The patterns and procedures for Christmas product recommended here, have been successfully utilized by many toy manufacturers with their service distributors. The plan has proven feasible in the toy industry, and should be adaptable in the phonograph record industry."

All record manufacturer member companies in NARM which had Christmas product last year, received the tabulation on their own company product.

NEW YORK—Sales of disks on the retail level set a new all-time high of 570,250,000 in 1962. Figure is an 11% increase over the previous sales neak of 513,100,000 set in 1961.

of \$510,250,000 in 1502. Figure is an 11% increase over the previous sales peak of \$513,100,000 set in 1961.
New total was announced by the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA), which said in its annual report last month that it expected sales to near the \$600 million mark (see May 25 issue).
Final tabulations based on data gathered by RIAA correlated with reports issued by Government agencies that LP's accounted for \$427.

Final tabulations based on data gathered by RIAA correlated with reports issued by Government agencies that LP's accounted for \$427,-000,000, about 75% of the total sales volume. Balance was composed of singles and EP's. In 1961, sales of LP's amounted to about \$415,600,000 and \$97,500,000 came from disks of all other types.

all other types. Sales of classical disks amounted to an estimated \$25 million, an increase of about 25% over the volume in 1961. Stereo disks comprised about 40% of the total LP sales.

Meader has been inked to the waxery for LP and singles product, sessions for which will get underway after a month's tour (July 15-Aug. 15). Meader has also ended his association with Bob Booker & Earl Doud, who produced his sensational "First Family" LP's that appeared under the Cadence banner. Volume one set an all-time LP sales high with some 4 million copies sold, and while volume 2 will not match the acceptance of vol. 1, it is a strong LP item, too. Meader's MGM dates will have matenial emoted by Carur Bolkin and Med

Asked about whether he would be doing further JFK impersonations on disks, Meader was reported as declaring that making a third JFK album would be "unconstitutional."

It's understood that Meader's pact with MGM also includes options for flick & TV appearances via productions from Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, the parent company. He is set for a guest shot on an upcoming MGM TV'er, "The 11th Hour."

Columbia Miami Branch Change Seen As Initial Step In "Stabilization" Move

NEW YORK—Columbia's Record Distributors has established a branch office in Miami, Florida, according to an announcement by Jack Loetz, CRD general manager. The branch replaces an independent operation in the city.

general manager. The branch replaces an independent operation in the city. A change of this type would not, under normal conditions be of major significance to the trade. However, in view of the many rumors which have been circulating throughout the industry about a forthcoming move by Columbia to further strengthen its position in the record market, the trade seems to feel that the formation of a Miami branch is of considerable importance.

There has been a great deal of discussion in the field that Columbia has been planning a number of distribution changes and consolidation moves for the near future, all expected to have a bearing on the "strengthening" of Columbia's status in the market.

The Miami change is one that had been rumored during recent weeks. However, until this week, the company would not confirm it.

Now that it has officially announced the change, it is believed that other rumored distribution changes will be taking place shortly.

Cash Box has heard from the field that Columbia will be opening company-owned branches in Minneapolis and Cleveland. It is also understood that there will no longer be a Columbia distributorship in Des Moines, this territory to be serviced out of the Minneapolis branch with resident salesmen covering Des Moines.

The trade also is expecting to see a similar move take place in Kansas City, this territory to be serviced out of St. Louis.

It is also believed that Columbia is now covering much of the Cincinnati territory directly from its Terre Haute plant.

The company would not confirm any of these anticipated changes.

"Cleo" Soundtrack Sales Reach 320,000, Big Orders Follow Film's Premiere

NEW YORK— With added impetus coming from the fanfare surrounding the New York premiere of "Cleopatra" last week (12), 20th Century Fox Records rolled-up a one day's order of 102,000 copies of its "Cleo" soundtrack LP last Thurs., a day after the pic's debut.

As of presstime, the label had sold 320,000 "Cleo" albums. The initial 150,000 sold went out to distribe on a no-deal basis, a policy which is no longer in effect.

The parent company—20th Century Fox Pictures—has pinned hopes on getting a badly needed profit on the \$40 million production. Its label subsid has looked to the "Cleo" set as the initial step in establishing itself as a greater industry force, and it appears that things are going well in this direction in view of the album's success. The LP is 18 on this stereo chart, 50 on the mono listing.

The flick has other preview dates ahead in the coming weeks. It opens in Los Angeles this Wed. (19), to be followed by premieres in Washington, D.C., Richmond, Detroit and St. Louis. By the end of Sept., 50 cities will have "Cleo" on public display. However, the trade seems to feel that all of these changes, which are expected to develop, are fore-runners of a "full scale marketing program" which Columbia is expected to break at its July convention in Puerto Rico.

Tradesters have been hearing a great deal during recent weeks about a significant "stabilization" move which Columbia is believed to have on the planning board. With more company-owned branches covering more of the market, the label can obviously keep tighter reins on its product and perhaps this is another reason why the Miami change has taken on such additional significance. It's the first official step giving Columbia broader control of its product in the field.

Should the other expected changes take place, they will no doubt add further credence to the belief that a major stabilization move within the company, perhaps in the area of price, is forthcoming.

Miele will headquarter in UA's New York office at 729 Seventh Avenue.

NEW YORK—Colpix Records will introduce its summer sales program, "Winner... Take All!" and new LP's to its distribs at the Eden Rock in Miami Beach on June 23 prior to the annual ARMADA meetings. Nine new LP's will be unveiled as part of the sales plan, and several others including the label's new spoken word series will be presented for the first time.

The albums in the plan cover music in several categories. They include "The Exciting Voice of Charles K. L. The other releases in the plan are "Wake up, America! (It's Time for Physical Fitness)," a comedy album, "Bye Bye Birdie" by James Darren, Shelley Fabares, Paul Petersen, The Marcels and Stu Phillips and His Orchestra and Chorus, "Nina Simone at Carnegie Hall," which was recorded during the artist's concert last May, "African Highlife and Music of the New African Nations" by Randy-Weston who is also making his debut on Colpix Records and "Lawrence of Arabia" and "Other Wonderful Movie Themes" by various artists.



Foxx] INEZ FOXX (Symbol 919) Label, a division of Sue Records, is already stepping out on a terri-torial level with this one. It's an infectious cha cha twist'er that sports a delightful back-and-forth vocal by Inez and Charlie Foxx—who heads up the potent instrumental backdrop. Can be a national pop-r&b smash. More of the same attention-getting sounds on the "Jaybirds" coupler.

Side, tabbed "Summer's Here (School Is Through)," is a sensational, hard-hitting rock-a-twist'er chock full of the vocal and in-strumental (supplied by Henry Jerome's crew) sounds and gimmicks necessary for chartdom. Artists do a complete tempo about face on this teen beat-ballad romancer. teen beat-ballad romancer.

This top-notch Mercury disk is an exception to the rule. All of the selections here were at one time big chart items. Highlights of this nostalgic set are "Save The Last Dance For Me" by the Drifters, "Devil Or Angel" by the Clovers and "Only You" by the Platters. Platters.



FTC, FCC Looking Into Audience Rating

Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce have developed substantial information concerning the ratings and the manner in which they are used. The agencies intend to base their investigation on that informa-tion and correct any misrepresentation or other practice violating the law.

In announcing the FTC action, Paul In announcing the FTC action, Paul Rand Dixon, commission chairman, explained that "if a broadcaster claims that a survey proves that he has a certain percentage of the listen-ing audience in his territory, and in-vestigation discloses that the claim is false and deceptive, the Commission will take vigorous action to prohibit the claim."



Seventy (70) per cent of the rack jobbers participated in the survey, a very good response. All NARM rack jobbers have been sent a complete run-down on all album ratings derived from the survey.



Mercury Rushes Lesley's LP Bow

Besides the latter offer-ing, the deck contains a number of adult-type tunes, including "Misty," "Cry Me A River," "What Kind Of Fool Am I" and other wistfuls. Quincy Jones, who produced the pack-age, chose her to be featured vocalist with his own band for their perform-ance at the CORE (Congress for Racial Equality) benefit at Carnegie Hall on June 9.

Getting A Hit-It's "Easier Said Than Done"

NEW YORK—Hits can come from anywhere and this old record cliche was never more applicable than in the case of Roulette Records' top 10 chart entry, "Easier Said Than Done" by the Essey by the Essex.

According to Bud Katzel, the label's sales chief, The Essex, three boys and one girl are all members of the U. S. Marine Corps. They were all on leave from Camp LeJeune, N. C. and arranged to audition for the Roulette A & R department. The audition done right on the spot re-sulted in the group getting an as-signment to do the background vocal chores for another Roulette artist recording date the next night. At the close of the following night's session, The Essex stepped up to the mike and recorded two songs, since the time was set up for a split session. The last song on the date was, of course, "Easier Said Than Done."

"Easier Said Than Done." A few weeks after The Essex re-turned to Camp LeJeune, the record was released and the "singing ma-rines" were on their way to the magic circle of hit artists. Roulette followed up the action on the record which first broke in Detroit by gaining spe-iel parmission for the group to again cial permission for the group to again obtain a leave so that they could go on the road to personally promote the record.

The Essex are now currently winding up this tour which covered Cin-cinnati, Atlanta, Chicago, Cleveland, Philadelphia, Pittsburg and New York, Roulette also secured permission to use the group in dress blue uniform for the cover of their first album, through the Pentagon. Having received this, the label now, accord-ing to Katzel, must again wangle a ing to Katzel, must again wangle a furlough for the group in order to record their album which will be re-leased in July. "In the past number of weeks," claimed Katzel, "we have had more dealings with the U. S. Marine Corps and the Pentagon than any of us did when we were members of the Armed Services." He said that contacts in the Gov-ernment have been cooperative and understanding.

response from ads picturing only Columbia and Epic product and ads picturing varied product. The results showed that the returns were from 17 to 66 percent greater from mailings which pictured multi-label product.

DeLois Owen Riley, an electronics technician, and Franklin M. Bien, an insurance agent, testified as members of the Columbia Record Club. Both men were asked by defense counsel if they understood advertising brochures claims and if they were aware of the fact that they could buy records cheaper at discount houses. They both stated they understood the claims and joined to get 6 LP's at once for a small outlay of cash despite the fact they would pay list for all other disks.

Louis Teicher of the Ferrante and Teicher piano team, Dave Brubeck and Jimmy Dean testified as recording artists whose records are distributed thru the club. The artists without exception said the exposure from CRC advertising in national magazines greatly increased their sales at the retail level, even after they had been released to the club for distribution to members. In all instances the men stated their images were kept alive by the clubs during non-performing periods.

One of the key witnesses in the week of hearings was Mitch Miller who was A&R head of Columbia until 1961. Miller, who was instrumental in the development of such artists as Ray Conniff, Percy Faith, Vic Damone and Johnny Mathis, discussed the label's growth in the various areas, especially its lack of growth in the jazz and folk areas. As to the CRC, Miller emphatically stated that club exposure was instrumental in helping him acquire an impressive amount of gold disks for his "Sing Along" series of LP's. Miller also discussed his strong dislike for the rock and roll type of music while he was A&R head but that despite its tremendous popularity, major artists survived the crisis and are now working at much higher prices. When asked by government counsel if his TV program had increased the sale of his records Miller said, if anything, it had hurt the sale of his LP's.

Simon Mael, financial and administrative vp of United Artists, testified on matters concerning the label's business dealings with the Diner's Club. Mael said he sold two LP's to Bernard Solomon of the Diner's Club, both of which sold more than a thousand copies thru the club, but that he was unable to collect from Solomon and had to turn the matter over to attorneys for suit. During cross examination by gov't counsel, Mael admitted that both LP's had not been selling well prior to Diner's Club distribution.

Samuel R. Rosenbaum, attorney and trustee of the Recording Industries Music Performance Trust Funds, gave a detailed explanation of the trust fund and how the monies are acquired. Rosenbaum said the manufacturers contribute to the fund on the basis of their own disk sales and that the money is used to pay musicians who play at public affairs and patriotic functions. Columbia paid in a total of \$915,000 in 1962, revealed Rosenbaum. As to his feelings about the CRC, Rosenbaum remarked, "It is my observation that any system of distribution of a product of this kind stimulates

Gift Disks-By-Wire Firm Sets Public Stock Issue

HOLLYWOOD-Donald L. Orsatti, president of Telerecord Corporation, president of Telerecord Corporation, national records-by-wire firm head-quartered in Los Angeles, has an-nounced that Telerecord is offering for public sale a stock issue of 200,000 shares at \$1.00 per value. Un-der its plan 100,000 shares will be issued to Orsatti for promotional services rendered on the basis of one share for every two sold for cash. share for every two sold for cash.

Telerecord plans to limit the sale of stock to individuals who are connected with recording and allied industries.

Telerecord will act as a clearing house for orders and deliveries of records, pre-recorded tapes and home entertainment equipment between dealers from coast to coast and internationally.

Telerecord expects to do a minimum gross business of \$1 million the first year, based on a projected two million sales. It is Orsatti's plan to have a network of at least 5,000 dealers and 5,000 military post exchanges accredited with Telerecord by the end of the first year of operation. The cost of active membership to dealers includes a membership fee and a performance contract with the Telerecord. Telerecord will act as a clearing house. The store in which the order is placed charges the list price of the record, a small service fee, and the price of communication.

An anouncement when the service will be available to the consumer is expected shortly.

Karl Nielson Speaks To Int'l Disk Club

NEW YORK—A general picture of the Scandinavian music market was drawn by Karl Nielson, general man-ager of Nordisk Copyright Bureau of Copenhagen, who spoke to members of the International Record & Music Men's Club here last week (12) at the association's last luncheon before a summer recess.

summer recess. While noting that most of Scandi-navia was basking in the sun of eco-nomic prosperity since the end of Wolrd War 2, a factor in successful yearly disk sales, Nielson cited sev-eral developments of forces outside the Scandinavian sphere of influence that could hinder containued growth. He specifically named the European Common Market. of which Norway He specifically named the European Common Market, of which Norway and Denmark are not members. This situation, Nielson said, has "ham-pered and curtailed" imports of disks, especially to Germany, one of the Scandinavian area's best disk cus-tomers and a CM member. Reason is that tariffs set by member countries make it less profitable to sell disks to Germany.

Germany. To counteract this, Nielson said that Scandinavian countries will have To counteract this, Nielson said that Scandinavian countries will have to increase imports to Great Britain, not, of course, associated with the CM, and other markets. The refusal of France to let Great Britain join the CM is seen as the factor keeping the two countries out. "We'll just have to wait until the day all are accepted," Nielson remarked. As to American disk product in Scandina-via, Nielson said it wasn't a big fac-tor in disk sales in the area. He added, in fact, that some difficulties had arisen over the past few years regarding the payment of royalties by firms importing American products, and it was only recently that the Su-preme Court in Sweden turned down claims of the Nordisk Copyright Bu-reau on the matter of collecting roy-alties from an importer of American disks.

disks Nordisk, organized in 1915 on a non-profit basis, is the only organiza-tion of its kind in Scandinavia, and its functions are: to negotiate with the music industry on conditions for the use of repertoire; and to collect and distribute fees from users. It works in close cooperation with BIEM, the clearing house based in Paris.







For instance, big record companies as RCA and CBS/Ricordi have already 12 records to be pro-moted and launched, as are Rifi, Cgd, Saar, Italidisc etc. Naturally, not all of these records will become hits, due to the high number of songs waxed and, of course, not all the songs will enter the charts since, (like last year,) just 3 or 4 songs will reach the top in sales. The record companies choose such a big number of records thinking they have a better chance to see at least one title make it, but the Italian public, instead of wondering about so many recordings appearing in such a short time on the market, seems to have a very specific taste and has reduced the number of its favorite artists. For instance, considering the charts, just two are appearing with an amazing regularity: Rita Pavone (RCA Italiana) and Adriano Celentano (Clan Celentano). Perhaps to these names another one will be added: Mina, who after a period of rest, is now climbing the hit parade with "Stesso Mare Stessa Spiaggia" (Same Sea, Same Beach). A few words about the Rita Pavone phenomenon: Once again we wish to point out that 10 months ago this girl, who is presently the "Queen" of Italian Pops, was completely unknown! Her first LP's released 30 days ago, is already number 1 in sales.

number 1 in sales. Just a short note now about the male phenomenon of the present Italian market situation: Adriano Celentano. Experiences such as Carosone's Dallara's, Sentieri's and many others prove that when a top artist leaves the Record Company which first launched him, there is a decrease in their sales, but, in the case of Celentano, it happened exactly to the contrary. He left SAAR 10 months ago, establishing his own record company (CLAN). His first record issued on the new label immediately reached the top of the charts and also the following ones achieved first place on the charts. The sales figure of Cel-entano's company amount now to 1,800,000 copies sold. With an unbelievable initiative, Celentano is presently increasing his activities; he has built up his publishing company 'Italian Yank' and a new label with the same name. Both the record and publishing companies are managed by Celentano's brother, Alessandro. Also a Show Praducing Company has been recently created by Celentano; whose address is—Via S. Paolo 1, Milano. Since we have Celentano in subject, let's say that Cash Box had the pleasure to listen to a new re-cording of this artist that will be released in September: "Le lunghe notti," published by Italian Yank and Ariston. This numbmer is a sure shot, too!

This number is a sure shot, too: The weekly news regarding EMI Italiana covers a new recording of the French singer Richard Anthony entitled "Donne Moi Ma Chance" backed with a Teddy Randazzo tune "On Twist Sur Le Locomotion." About another French artist, Frank Pourcel: his LP "Un' Orchestra Nella Sera" (An Orchestra in the Night) has received a strong reaction on the market, being now one of the most sold albums in Italy. EMI Italiana has just released the stereo version of this record.

And continuing on the subject of EMI Italiana, we pass to the classical field. Otto Klemperer, one of the best known orchestra conductors of the world, has released two albums: Bruckner's Symphony No. 7 and the Wagner's "Idillio Of Sigfrido."

"Idillio Of Sigfrido." Returning to the subject of summer promotions, we wish to indicate the records which are on the promotional list of CBS/Ricordi: we start the list with the CBS releases. First artist is Eydie Gorme singing the Italian version of "Blame It On The Bossa Nova," followed by Andy Williams per-forming in Italian, too, "Can't Get Used To Losing You," while Steve Law-rence has already on the chart, "Go Away Little Girl." The CBS list ends with The Brothers Four's "Ringing Bells" and a release of the Italian artist Gianni Sanjust: "Tu Verrai Da Me (You'll Come With Me)." The list of Ricordi's records includes Ornella Vanoni with "Coccodrillo" b/w "Mario," Catherine Spaak with "Prima Di Te Dopo Di Te" c/w "Noi Due." Giorgio Gaber singing "Porta Romana" and "Ragazzina" Cistiano Metz performing "Se Io Morissi" and "Io Non So" while Stelvia Ciani (a new female talent of the Ricordi's cast) waxed "Fiore Rosso" and "Stesso Mare Stessa Spiaggia." "Cantagiro" seems to be one of the most important events in the Popo Music

As already noted in our last column, the producer of the contest is Ezio Radaelli, a very well-known "impresario." We want to explain how this Cantagiro is ruled: It is a car group which is touring throughout Italy with two singing teams. Each evening the caravan stops in a different city where the two teams are competing in a show organized in the main local theater. At the end of this tour, a winner is chosen as per the votes obtained by the public in various places. It's this kind of direct contact to the public that has created the great popularity of this contest. This year, the main at-traction is represented by top artists Adriano Celentano and Peppino di Capri, partaking in the same show for the first time together. Vocalists Los Marcellos Ferial are returning to record hits with two

Following the recent visits of major American jazzists Thelonius Monk, Lionel Hampton and Louis Armstrong, Japan is due for a tour from the Cannonball Adderley Sextet beginning July 6. Nippon Victor composer Tadashi Yoshida held a recital in Osaka Festival Hall on June 27, with his popular numbers sung by such top singers as Frank Nagai, Kazuko Matsuo and others. Teichiku's chorus group, Four Coins, left Japan for performances in Hawaii, Los Angeles and other big cities in America. Nippon Columbia is releasing the works of Toru Funamura, the first Japanese composer exclusively pacted with a foreign label. They'll be issued here on France Pathe. Though Pathe Marconi is under contract with Toshiba, Colum-bia obtained the distribution rights only to Funamura's works. Teichiku Records signed a contract with Gravacoes Electricas, S.A. of Brazil and Maietti Records of Italy. Both labels, previously released on the King In-ternational label, will now be heard on the Union label.

Publicity helped a lot, but the truth is that Altemar has an excellent voice. "Fogo Nos Metais"—(Fire on The Brass) is the title of a new LP released by Philips, with Portinho and His Orchestra. A very danceable album, with six bossa nova sambas and six old-time sambas, arranged by Portinho, com-poser, maestro, arranger and musician who got a big break backing Noite Ilustrada in the smash hit "Volta Por Cima." In this album, Portinho once again proves his talents. As Cash Box anticipated a few weeks ago, Lana Bittencourt, one of the best Brazilian singers, has reappeared in a standard released by CBS, reading two European hits in their original languages: "Chariot" and "Dans Le Creux De T'a Main." Arrangements and accompaniment by Astor and His Orchestra. The Verve albums, released through Copacabana in Brazil, are enjoying big success. Every month some albums are released and immediately a great and hungry market of jazz bugs devours them. Here's some information about two very important meetings held recently in Lima, Peru by the Pan American Council of Author's Rights and the Inter American Congress of Author Rights' Experts, furnished by Ricardo Korn, head of Julio Korn Publishers and adviser of the Argentine delegation to these meetings. Since the South American author situation is not well known abroad, the following should be of interest to all Cash Box readers. Both meetings took place at the same time, in the last days of May, and were coincident with the consolidation of APDAYC, the growing Peruvian Authors and Composers Association, created after law number 13714 of that country, which established and regulated the Author's Rights in Peru. Repre-sentatives of most American countries were present at both gatherings. To the Pan American Council were, among others, Joracy Camargo (SBAT, Brazil), Arturo Mora Grau (SACHT, Chile), Jose Olaya Muñoz (SAYCO, Colombia), Ignacio Fernandez Esperon (SACM, Mexico), Hector Sapelli (AGADU, Uruguay), Santiago Adamini (SADAIC, Argentina) and Jose Santiago (APDAYC, Peru). The Congress was attended by Carlos Mouchet (Argentina). Juan Lewis Diaz (UNESCO representative), John Mills (Canada), Herman Finkelstein (USA), Rafael Morales (Peru), Enrique Avellan Ferres (Ecuador), Arsenio Farrell (Mexico), Richardo Tiscornia (Argentina) and others. others.

(Ecuador), Arsenio Farrell (Mexico), Richardo Tiscornia (Argentina) and others. Many points of interest were discussed, including the author situation in all Latin American and European countries, the Russia case, and action of CISAC, UNESCO and OEA in the composer field. Several scholarships have been de-cided for members of new author societies to enable them to visit other ones and study their methods of operation, thus providing new members with better knowledge. It was decided also to recommend all authors' societies to break relations with AVAC, a Venezuelan society headed by Maria Luisa Escobar, and establish relations with SACVEN, a new society represented at the Coun-cil by Alfonso Larrain. This is based on irregularities reportedly observed in AVAC operations. Regarding the composer's situation in Peru, APDAYC has recently signed an arrangement with the recording companies of this country that specifies a 2.5% royalty per side, against a very low royalty that was payed previously. However, this arrangement has caused a strange situation since there is a law in Peru that establishes that Peruvian technicians will be payed no less than foreign ones for their work. Up to now, BIEM has been receiving 3.75% per side. About 15 days ago the Peruvian government issued a decree that would mean a lowering of BIEM rights to the Peruvian composers level. The situa-tion is not clear enough, yet. Another interesting side of these meetings were that, for the first time, a publishers association entered in them. Up to now the associations were exclu-sively composers and authors. It may also be noted that in Chile the authors' right is a fiscal tax, received by the government and distributed afterwards by the Smell Authors' Pieth

The record royalty is payed normally and now amounts to 3.75%. From the American and European points of view, the Lima meeting means a bright widening of horizons, since up to now the only well organized countries in South America were Argentina and Brazil. Peru is potentially a very big market, with strong currency and a 12,000,000 population. Colombia is also a very interesting field, although its current author laws are not considered too good. Venezuela may also mean a good market. Up to now, the main trouble has been the lack of strong author societies. The Lima meet is expected to bring good results in a short time. New from Argentina: The publishing field is as busy as ever. Gigi Gallo of Fortissimo Americana keeps at work with "Non Costa Niente," the Sciorilli tune. The lastest recordings obtained by Gallo are by Billy Cafaro (RCA). Los Santos (Music Hall), Los Cuatro del Embers (CBS), Sonia (Philips) and Mariel (Odeon Pops). Ricardo Castelblanco of Edami Publishers is happy with the success of "Que Se Mueran Los Feos," cut originally by Luis Aguilar (Polydor) and now by Los Pick Ups (Music Hall) and Chilean singer, composer and artists' manager Luciano Galleguillos (Odeon). Castelblanco is also planning to promote Colombian cumbias, since he feels there are good possibilities for them. Mauricio Brenner of Fermata reports about new recordings of the songs controlled by his organization: Romana Farres (Odeon) and Rocky Pontoni (Music Hall) will cut "Yo No Se," a local product already waxed by Juan Ramon (Disc Jockey). The same Rocky Pontoni will cut "Cancion Triste," already recorded by Marty Cosens (RCA). Tony Vilar (CBS) will wax "Tu Vedrai" (Tu Veras) in Spanish. Juan Ramon (Disc Jockey) has cut "Joven Joven." 



Editorial

An Opportunity For Every Association

If every association in the country sent two or three representatives to the Music Operators Of America Convention comes September 4th then this all-important conclave would attract more coin machine operators than it has had in years. Association interest in MOA affairs of late indicate that this could easily become a reality. One sure way of seeing that it happens is to promote the idea now. That's why we're devoting an editorial to it this week.

An announcement from MOA offices in Chicago indicates that judging from association support received thus far, and after discussing the possibilities of devoting a specific amount of convention time to association problems, a special fornm will be held under the direction of Philadelphia's Joe Silverman, a coinman with excellent qualifications. Joe thinks that association leaders would be better off talking things over at a national convention away from home than to continually talk about local problems amongst their own members back home in the Main Street Restaurant. And if travel broadens the mind, it also solves problems. In fact if Silverman pulls this meeting off there might be more than one association leader who will go home gladly to his local problems after the show ends. Travel indeed broadens the mind, especially to other people's miseries-aside from the fact that you can learn a lot by listening and that's what Silverman has planned for the hundred odd operators expected to sit in at the association discussions, if they are held.

And so there is already a two-fold reason why association members should attend the MOA Convention. They can pick up ideas that may enable them to better cope with the legislative rulings, and the tax problems, and the location jumping, and the loans and the bonuses and the dozens of nightmares that keep them awake.

They can also lend strength to the growing MOA Convention overall attendance. If this happens, MOA will then be in a position to keep right on helping the local associations during the course of the year. That's the way these things happen. One hand helps the other.

A topic which may have been talked into the ground as recently as a year ago has turned up as the number one topic associations prefer to talk about if they do attend. The subject is Public Relations. There is no question that Virginia and Nebraska, and Florida, and Silverman's own Philadelphia group could offer some words of wisdom on how they brought about the pleasant local image in their own backyards. Another subject which seems to be at the top of the list is service—not to machines but to members. The associations want to know what they should do for members. A few of them could stand some help along these lines. There are other areas for discussion but if one or two subjects are discussed and a single problem is solved then the entire project will have been worthwhile.

MOA's 'new look' grows more attractive with each passing week. One of the reasons for this progress has been the introduction of new ideas. Joe Silverman can join the ranks of other MOA officials who are helping put this 1963 show on the road. Every association member should be certain his group is represented. If you don't happen to belong to a local association, join one. At the first meeting you attend, stand up and propose that a representative attend the MOA Convention in September. They may not elect you president this year but they will recognize your intelligence.

- Dime-N-Bowl Runs Coin Machine Contests In Several States
- 2000 Players and **30 Coinfirms Participate**

Big Prize Money and **Even Bigger Trophies**

CINCINNATI-Tournament play has spurred interest in many a sport around this country. There are suc-cessful tourneys and there are fail-ures. One of the reasons behind most of the successful ones are the pro-moters, the specialists who run the show from draw to find

moters, the specialists who run the show from start to finish. The coin machine industry could do worse than to take a tip from the promoters who have successfully put Ohio on the map as far as coin ma-chine tourney play is concerned. In less than two years, interest in coin operated bowling alley play has reached a high pitch in several Ohio cities and the end result has been new

operated a high pitch in several Ohio cities and the end result has been new life for the machines, a situation which would be welcomed in many coin machine markets today. The name of the tournament or-ganizers is Dime-N-Bowl and the president of the firm is Joe Wester-haus, Jr., son of the veteran coin ma-chine op and distrib here. Dime-N-Bowl, Inc. is an Ohio-based service organization whose pur-pose is the organizing and maintain-ing of coin-operated bowling leagues. Last week officials told Cash Box that the firm is nearing completion of its second successful season. Over 2000 bowlers on 250 teams in the Greater Cincinnati, Hamilton,

the Greater Cincinnati, Hamilton, and Dayton areas bowled in Dime-N-Bowl leagues this past season.

They bowl each week for 33 weeks from early September to mid-April. The teams consist of six regular bowlers, plus substitutes. Players are organized into leagues usually con-sisting of 12 teams, each team repre-senting a local tayer much the same senting a local tavern, much the same as softball teams around the country.

senting a local tavern, much the same as softball teams around the country. The winning team may receive as much as \$500.00 in prizes, and the last team receives at least \$72.00. The incentive is strong. Upon completion of the regular season, Dime-N-Bowl holds two huge tournaments. One is for all teams finishing in the first division, called a Championship Tournament—a Con-solation Tournament is held for sec-ond division teams. The Cincinnati champ receives an additional \$600.00, plus a four and one-half foot trophy (picture). Then comes the National Championship against the Dayton City champ. Winner of this receives \$1000.00, plus a trophy. The runner-up receives \$250.00. The tournaments are completed by mid-June. Dime-N-Bowl also has leagues in Los Angeles, Bowl also has leagues in Los Angeles, and Orange County, California. The Ohio tourney is the largest.

The fact that Dime-N-Bowl had over twice as many teams in their second season indicates the increasing popularity of this unique sport. They service leagues for over 30 operators

in several states. Their service en-ables operators to reap increased profits on their bowling machines, and not be bothered with the details of organizing and maintaining the leagues, a chore beyond the scope of most coin firms.

most coin firms. Prize money from the leagues comes from three sources: The oper-ator, the tavern owner, and the bowlers. Operators put up \$2.00 per week per team. This covers both prize money and costs of operating Dime-N-Bowl leagues. There are no other costs to the operator. The only func-tion the operator performs is that his collector picks up the bowling prize money from each location during his regular route. Dime-N-Bowl picks up the money from the operator every regular route. Dime-N-Bowl picks up the money from the operator every other week and pays all prizes by check at the completion of the season. All makes of bowling machines are used and acceptable in Dime-N-Bowl leagues. This enables every operator and every machine to become eligible. Dime-N-Bowl is presently prepar-ing for a big season part fall Loo

ing for a big season next fall. Joe Westerhaus, Jr., says, "We will set up and maintain leagues anywhere in the United States where operators or distributors want them." Their home office is 3726 Kessen Avenue, Cincinnati 11, Ohio. The phone number is 661-8500.

But the line really does aptly summarize the reason for the existence today of Automatic Products Co., St. Paul, Minn., a division of Gross Given Manu-fortuning Co. facturing Co. Gross Given Co. since 1935 has been

a sheet metal fabricator. For years the company manufactured equipment for other firms in the automatic vendfor other nrms in the automatic vend-ing field. By 1949, however, recalled William J. Gross, president of Gross Given, "we decided we'd rather do it for ourselves." Thus was born Automatic Products Co., manufacturer of the Smokeshop eigenetics vender.

cigarette vendor. Today Automatic Products is one of the leaders in its field. Further-more, it is the only independent manu-facturer in the industry, according to John B. Edgerton, Jr., the division president president.

The company sells its products through factory representatives or distributors, who are located through-out the United States and in Canada, Denmark, Switzerland and Puerto Denmark, Switzerland and Puerto Rico. This far-flung distribution network and the large volume of sales resulting through it is a far cry from the early days, when it took Automat-ic Products 18 months to sell the first

ic Products 18 months to term 250 machines. "It wasn't that we didn't have a topnotch product, because we did," said Arthur J. Brier, sales manager. "As a matter of fact, our first ma-chine, the Smokeshop 612, with 612 packs, was the largest capacity unit on the market at that time. -and the half dollar ac Smokeshop assembly line turns out up to 30 machines per day. One h undred employees make up the factory staff which has grown from the original crew of a handful back in 1949, when it took the firm 18 months to move 250 units. Figures are based on tax returns and payments. The number of packs taxed during April was about 1.953 billion aginst 1.808 billion a year ago. The ten month period ended in April showed a 2.8 per cent increase (19 billion) ahead of the ten-month period one year earlier.

Canadian Medicos Propose Cig Pack Stickers

QUEBEC, CANADA—Officials of the Canadian Medical Association here are expected to propose legislation calling for stickers on packs of ciga-rettes, stating that the contents are harmful. The proposal was announced last week and folowed previous state-ments by Canadian doctors which have been detrimental to cigarette markets.

Wall Street Journal Reviews Pingame Production

- Overseas Development With An Eye To Legality At Home
- **Total Sales Volume Up** For Five Years
- **One-Third Volume Goes To Export Markets**

NEW YORK—The pinball machine manufacturer in the United States was depicted by the Wall Street Jour-nal last week as a man who works diligently each day developing his markets overseas while defending the largel status of his products here at legal status of his products here at home

legal status of his products here at home. Bally, Gottlieb and Williams were quoted throughout the report and the mechanical make-up of a bingo game and an amusement pinball machine were clearly outlined. All three fac-tories did a total volume of \$15 mil-lion in 1962, according to the news story. This was based on the sale of 50,000 units. While Bally, of course, has suffered losses due to the passage of the East-land Bill which bans interstate ship-ment of bingo machines (WSJ states that sales dipped 40% after passage of the law), Gottlieb claimed a 30% increase in sales since 1956, while Williams took credit for a 70% gain

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in sales in the past five years in sales in the past five years. The story mentioned that while pin-ball machines were legal, local gov-ernments did not always agree with Federal decision. Cities including New York and Chicago, where the ma-chines are made, were listed as typi-cal of the markets banning the pin-

chines are made, were have the pin-cal of the markets banning the pin-games. The reporter evidently talked with just one distributor—Abe Witsen of Philadelphia, the Bally distributor there. Witsen claimed that it takes 800 novelty machines on his route to draw the income that 150 bingos and 50 novelty machines on his route to draw the income that 150 bingos and 50 novelties once drew, now that Pennsylvania bans the games. Herb Jones of Bally defended the firm's position in regard to bingo ma-chines and the gambling inference. Stating that the machines are not in-herently gambling devices, he added that "gambling does happen, it's silly to say it doesn't." Bally is also developing its sales abroad with an intense sales program, according to the article. "Maybe the whole world will turn puritanical," said Jones, "but it hasn't yet and there is still a large market for our machines." Gottlieb and Williams officials were

Gottlieb and Williams officials were quoted as saying that the export mar-ket represents one-third of their volume.

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



how long any one period will continue? The new bumper pool table manufactured by Al Simon's new plant—U. S. Billiards Corp.—was displayed last week and Simon was gratified with the reaction of ops. "I thought we had beautiful merchandise and now that I've heard it from the operators, I know we will need twice as many machines to fill the orders." That's the way Simon saw his manufacturing future last week as his crew got ready to display the 6-pocket model, and then the deluxe edi-tions, and so forth until, finally all of the line will have been displayed and reviewed. Then and only then will the plant enter into its sales campaign across the nation. A slow but logical approach. And one that takes patience, nerves, and good supply of greenbacks. All three become scarce when the pres-sure is on, hence the decision by U. S. to take the slow but sure way. The spring turns to summer and Joe Munves is seen flashing back and forth across the nation's arcades, having just returned from the middle west where the arcade ops are doing as well as the Atlantic City-Asbury Park gents. Joe's original design of a two-player arcade machine with a car race feature will see the light of day this week under the sponsorship of Harry Williams and his Southland Engineering plant. "Speedway" will be launched to the nation's coinnen and the tests show collections hold very well, an important criteria for estimating the value of any machine on location. Willie Blatt who perenially bawls that he is leaving the business seems to

Willie Blatt who perenially bawls that he is leaving the business seems to be getting more deeply involved than ever now that his vending machine busi-ness has expanded into theater concessions and other transit stops. Willie's son Marty runs the route. If you've ever stretched a point you can appreciate Blatt's forwarding of a newspaper photo which appeared across four columns of a Miami newspaper, and in the upper left hand corner if you look real close you might spot an outline of a penny-scale, which of course has nothing to do with the picture.
