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On Premium Albums

There is a great giveaway under-
way in the record industry. At no
time of the year is this more ap-
parent than during the Holiday Sea-
son. Turn the pages of a national
magazine, hear and view radio and
TV commercials during this time
of year and one is made aware that
the premium LP is being promoted
by more and more companies.

They are also used as come-ons
throughout the year, but seem
to have particular effectiveness in
relation to Yuletide material. Some-
times a single, well-known artist is
represented with a "never-before-
released" bill-of-fare, other times
various artists are presented in
samplers type packages.

On the surface, the advantages
to labels that provide these premi-
um LP's are great. There are
usually fantastically high pressing
orders and material most often
consists of catalog sessions. They
surely serve as natural samplers for
the remaining catalog of an attrac-
tion and could well stimulate the
sales of an entire LP repertoire by
an attraction.

But, these same labels should
consider a number of possibly
serious "back-fires," if you will.

The trend may well get out of hand
and cut into regular sales channels.
Offers may extend to all forms of
music, all types of top performers.
We know of instances whereby
some over-pressed premium LP's
by strong artists were dumped by
sponsors back into the field and
were sold to rack-jobbers at ridicu-
lously low-prices. Imagine the con-
sumer's surprise when confronted
with a 50¢ LP by a performer
whose other albums, probably
being displayed near the one-time
premium product, are selling at the
normal mark-up!

With due respect for the value
of the premium LP, manufacturers
who provide them should evaluate
whether or not, in the final analy-
sis, harm is being done in other
areas.

The album market is already
burdened with the merchandising
of the popularity of LP's by their
use as "loss-leaders" and in other
forms of discounts.

The premium LP certainly has
its place in the conduct of a record-
ing company. We suspect, how-
ever, the time has come for a meas-
ure of control to be instituted to
protect the heart of disk sales—the
dealer to consumer factor.



Sarnoff Reports: Victor's '64 Disk Sales Best Ever, Parent Co. Achieves Record Profits

NEW YORK—RCA Victor Records achieved the highest sales volume in its history in 1964, it was stated last week by David Sarnoff, board chairman of the Radio Corp. of America, as he announced the third successive year of record RCA profits.

While Sarnoff did not cite any figures for the disk division, he noted that the label had cashed-in on "the lucrative" show album field with such hit casters as "Hello, Dolly!" the musical which celebrates its first anniversary this month and "Fiddler On The Roof," a smash from the new season.

RCA's operating profits after taxes for 1964, subject to final confirmation, are expected to rise to more than \$80 million, exceeding last year's record by more than 20%. Sarnoff said this showing leaves the company "on the firmest footing of any time since its founding 45 years ago." "We expect in 1965," he added, "to achieve our fourth consecutive year of record sales and profits."

Operating earnings per common share for 1964, he noted, should increase to a new record high of approximately \$1.50 as compared with \$1.20 in 1963.

Sarnoff said that in addition to RCA's operating profit, non-recurring income totalling \$11,370,000 was realized from the sale of 141,747 shares of common stock of the Whirlpool Corporation and from a Federal excess profits tax refund relating to the years 1940-1944. This non-recurring income, he noted, added 22 cents per share of common stock to the operating earnings in 1964, bringing the year's anticipated total to more than \$1.70 per share.

"The rise in profits stemmed from increased sales in our commercial business, which more than counterbalanced the continued industry-wide decline in government sales," Sarnoff said. He reported that RCA's total sales will approximate \$1,800,000,000, compared with \$1,789,000,000 for the previous year.

Columbia Re-Inks Goulet To New 5 Year Pact

NEW YORK—Singer Robert Goulet has inked a new five year contract with Columbia Records.

The hot artist's continued association with the label was announced at a luncheon at the Plaza Hotel, this city, last week with Goddard Lieberson, president of Columbia, and Goulet as guests of honor. Other Columbia execs and trade press editors were also present at the fete, hosted by Norman Rosemont, the performer's manager.

Goulet can currently boast his biggest singles success to date, "My Love Forgive Me" (Mi Amore Scusami). For the past year or so, however, he has been a strong album voice. He has a total of nine solo LP's to his credit, including his latest, named after the singles success.

He also did a re-creation of "Annie Get Your Gun" with Doris Day. His first Columbia session was as part of the cast LP line-up of Lerner and Loewe's "Camelot," which first

gained him recognition. "Camelot" has sold more than 1 million albums for Columbia.

Goulet is a frequent guest on TV and has appeared in top niteries around the country. He recently made his flick debut. His first European tour was completed a short while ago.

WB-Reprise Execs On Way With New Product, Plan

BURBANK, CALIF.—Warner Bros. and Reprise execs have hit the road in a series of sales meetings with distributors, introducing the label's new product and sales program for 1965. The plan was revealed at the conclusion of a two-day sales and merchandising seminar which took place here on Dec. 17-18. The meeting, chaired by the company's president, Mike Maitland, covered both WB and Reprise promo plans for its Jan.-Feb. album releases, as well as preliminary discussions concerning the company's annual sales convention and future recording plans.

Taking part at the meetings were Mo Ostin, general manager of Reprise, Joel Friedman, director of merchandising, Bob Summers, national

Decca's Mid-Winter Sales Push Highlights 27 New Albums

NEW YORK—The Decca and Coral labels have announced the Jan. 4 release of 27 pop and classical albums to spearhead the company's mid-winter restocking program entitled "Sales Powered Proven Product For '65." To aid the drive, the firm is offering an incentive plan, details of which are available through all Decca branches and distributors.

Product heading the campaign includes: "I Wish You Love," a set of French melodies played by Carmen Cavallaro; Guy Lombardo's "Snuggled On Your Shoulder"; Sam (the Man) Taylor's "Somewhere In The Night"; "Try A Little Tenderness" by Sammy Davis, Jr.; "Les Brown's In Town"; late organist Jesse Crawford's "A Lovely Way To Spend An Evening"; music of the Islands in "Isle Of Dreams" by Joe Maize and His Cordsmen; Dave Pike's "Manhattan Latin"; "Music To Soothe That Tiger," the American debut of Herbert Rehbein and his Orchestra; the Goldman Band's "Marching Along Together"; violin soloist Florian Zabach's "Hot Canary"; and, for the first time in stereo, Danny Kaye's "Hans Christian Andersen" with words and music by Frank Loesser.

In the C&W field, releases include: a collection of "1964 Country & Western Award Winners" by artists like Kitty Wells, Webb Pierce and Ernest Tubb, among others; for the first time in stereo, a series of

"Golden Favorites" by Red Foley, Kitty Wells, Webb Pierce, and the team of Wells and Foley; and two volumes of "Original Hit Performances—All Time Country & Western." Decca's Gold Label Classical Division presents: Sylvia Marlowe's reading of three Bach harpsichord concertos; "Gypsy Violin Classics" played by Benno and Sylvia Rabinoff; Erica Morini's "Italian Baroque Violin Recital"; and The Abbey Singers album "Italian Madrigals and Haydn Part Songs."

Coral product is represented by four selections: a brand new release of unused material by the late Buddy Holly, "Holly In The Hills"; "The Vocal Style Of Al Morgan"; Charley Weaver's "Letters From Mama," taped on the Steve Allen Show; and "Dick Kessner's Golden Favorites," available in stereo.

The mid-winter program is being supported by full color litho books, which spotlight all the new product, and national consumer and trade advertising which has been scheduled to coincide with the release, and run for the program's duration.

Request RIAA Audit To Give "Poppins" Track A Gold Disk

NEW YORK—Buena Vista Records says it's got a gold-disk seller with its "Mary Poppins" soundtrack album and has requested gold LP certification from the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA). The association, following an audit, makes gold disk awards to LP's that sell more than a \$1 million worth of copies. BV feels the "Poppins" showing is extraordinary since the LP has been around on the charts for about 13 weeks and the flick itself has been exposed in only 16 key cities in the U. S. LP is number 3 on this week's album chart.

Bob Cooper Named Veep Of WSM-Nashville

NASHVILLE—John H. DeWitt, Jr., president of WSM-Nashville, announced last week that Robert Evans Cooper, general manager of the outlet and director of the Grand Ole Opry, has been named a vice-president of WSM.

Cooper, who began his career as a copywriter in Memphis, held several positions in broadcasting before joining WSM ten years ago as sales manager. He became general manager in 1957, and earlier this year was elected to the board of directors.

The elevation to the vice-presidency gives added stress to the importance of a continued expansion of the Grand Ole Opry. Under Cooper's leadership, the Opry this past year was expanded back into Friday night, and the program was sold on a delayed basis to more than 400 radio stations throughout the U. S. and Canada.

ABC-Par Realignment; Add New Execs Under Newton

NEW YORK—As ABC-Paramount Records moves into the New Year with Larry Newton as its president, the label's exec line-up sees shifts of previous personnel and new exec additions. Newton takes over from Sam Clark, who has been named to a post at the diskery's parent company, ABC-Paramount Theaters.

Remaining in his capacity as executive vice-president, Harry Levine will continue to supervise all opera-

sales manager, Artie Mogull, eastern operations director, Bruce Hinton, national promo manager, Sid Schaffer, divisional sales manager, A & R representatives Sonny Burke, Jimmy Hilliard, Jimmy Bowen, and Joe Smith; Stan Cornyn, Editorial Director, and Ed Thrasher, Art Director.

Bob Summers, national sales manager, reported that meetings will take place in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle, Chicago, Washington, Detroit, New York, Boston, Houston, Miami, Denver, and Atlanta, with distribs and their salesmen from neighboring cities in the immediate meeting sites attending.

A team of WB executives will travel to each of the cities and helm each of the meetings.

Chess Expansion Move To Begin With London Opening

CHICAGO—Marshall Chess, vice president of Chess Records, has announced that his firm will launch a worldwide expansion program in early Feb. The move will begin with establishment of headquarters in London, and several additional branch offices will be opened shortly thereafter, resulting in a global network including Asia and South America by the end of 1965.

Chess emphasized that existing distributors would be retained by the parent company. In the future, all decisions regarding foreign pressings will be made by the new Chess offices; but all releases, regardless of their Chess, Argo or Checker label, will bear the Chess imprint in their overseas distribution.

Flick "Fair Lady" Starts Round Of Awards; N.Y. Film Critics Call It 1964's Best Movie

NEW YORK—As a prelude of this year's Academy Awards, the flick version of "My Fair Lady" has started what will surely be a long list of awards with its selection as the best film of 1964 by the New York Film Critics. Also, the reviewers named Rex Harrison, repeating his original Broadway role as Professor Higgins, best film actor of the year.

Babes In The Wood

Rick Besoyan has gone straight. Well, sort of. After poking fun at the operetta styles of yore with "Little Mary Sunshine" (an Off-Broadway smash) and "The Student Prince..." (an On-Broadway fiasco), he has turned to an Off-Broadway musical version of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," the Shakespeare play stripped bare, and possibly inspired by the recent hit revival of "Rodgers & Hart's "The Boys from Syracuse" ("A Comedy of Errors").

This corner qualifies "straight" because Besoyan has not neglected to kid old-time songs and/or composers (e.g. Jerome Kern's early days) in such numbers as "Mother," "Old-Fashioned Girl" and the title song, which would lead one to believe that Besoyan is kidding again.

These and most of the other songs are catchy. They are not apt to have one leave his seat whistling them, but they do pop into one's head later on.

Since most of the songs are keyed to the book—which names the original Shakespeare characters and is set in ancient Greece—only a few of them will interest an A&R man. There's a striking, clever lyric idea in the ballad, "Little Tear," (Barbra Streisand?) and two nice romantic items, "Love Is Lovely" and "There's a Girl."

Aaron Schroeder, who is co-producing the work with Sandy Farber, is publishing the score. No cast LP session has been set.

Julie Rodgers



Twenty-one year old Julie Rodgers began her career at the age of 16. A native of London, she finished her education, then left with a girl friend for a holiday in Spain. As a lark she and her friend applied for jobs as dancers, and, to their surprise they were hired. Nine months later Julie was back in England.

Having a taste of the show biz world, Julie was discontent in London, even on her next job—a stewardess on a ship doing the Africa run. After one trip, she decided to audition for Teddy Foster, a bandleader who was looking for a vocalist to front his band. Julie got the job and sang with the band until it broke up. She then formed a duo with Teddy, playing cabarets throughout the nite-spots of London. It was during this round of bookings that Julie's three-octave voice first came to the notice of A&R director of Johnny Franz. Her second Mercury deck, "The Wedding," became immediate best-seller on both sides of the foam.

Sue Thompson



Sure-fire proof that real professionals do not fade away is Sue Thompson, who after a long hiatus from the charts, is clicking again with her Hickory recording of "Paper Tiger."

The lark, a product of Nevada, Mo., expressed an interest in music from her earliest childhood. At the age of five she was taking part in family sing-alongs. As a teenager Sue sang in her high school and church choirs. After graduation she opted for a show biz career and eventually went on the road to perfect her craft. Several years of one-niters later she came to the attention of Wesley Rose who inked her to a Hickory Records recording contract. A short time later she jumped into the national spotlight with "Sad Movies." Among the lark's other hit credits are "Norman," "Two Of A Kind," "James (Hold The Ladder Steady)," "Have A Good Time," etc.



PLATTER SPINNER PATTERN

The Marines had to yell for help—and gladly—as the result of a recent KYW-Cleveland pre-Christmas promotion aimed at securing toys for the annual Greater Cleveland "Toys For Tots" campaign. Built around a contest between the station's Jerry G and Jay Lawrence to see which could collect the most trading stamps, the promotion resulted in more than 1,700,000 stamps flooding into the local U. S. Marine Corps Training Center, receiving-point for the mail, in a 16-day period. The embattled Marines, annual participants in the Toys For Tots drive, had to enlist the aid of students from Notre Dame College and Willoughby Junior High School to help open the deluge of mail and affix the stamps into books. This year's campaign was so successful that it provided 5,000 more Christmas gifts for youngsters than the original 1964 goal of 15,000.

This week, as a tribute to the New Year, WLS will feature "The Good Sound of Music Spectacular '65." The special theme will showcase songs that hit the top during the past year by a host of well-known artists. The hits will be aired throughout the broadcast schedule, in addition to the outlet's regular programming.

Some lucky Beatles fan will get a chance to talk to the famed foursome from Liverpool—thanks to a contest on KHJ-TV-Hollywood's daily "9th Street West" program, seen every evening at 6. Under the guidance of producer Ric Eyrich and host Sam Riddle, the show is inviting viewers to select three contestants daily until the contest ends, later this month. Cards are submitted every day on the hour-long program, and put into a special "Beatles Barrel." Winning cards are drawn daily, and at the conclusion of the contest, qualified entrants will be selected by a panel of judges, with the ultimate winner picking up a special "gold phone" to talk directly to the Beatles in England.

KCUB-Tucson has unveiled a new image. The 35 year old 1000-watt 24 hour operation is using the theme—"Station With the Million Dollar Sound." Featured is pop music that is non-rock in content and all popular LP's. The station theme "Million Dollar Sound" is used to describe talent presented over KCUB in any 24 hour period. KCUB features pop-chart 45's on a formatted basis after news on the hour and half hour with the remaining time featuring the most popular album artists.

Helping hand dept.: A 19-year-old broadcasting major from Endicott Junior College in Beverly, Mass., has joined the staff of WMCA-New York for a month of on-the-job training in all phases of the station's operation, notes Ruth Musser, the outlet's administration veep. Susan Kridel is a senior at Endicott and is participating in that school's "internship" program. The program is designed to give students practical experience in their chosen fields of interest.

KMPC-Los Angeles personality Gary Owens was honored recently by the L.A. City Council for his civic and charitable activities, with a resolution, introduced by Councilman Gilbert W. Lindsay of the 9th District and passed unanimously by the City Council.

A steel town woman has been declared the winner of the KDKA-

Pittsburgh vote count contest—and, as a result, will sail on an expense-paid trip with her husband to the Caribbean as a guest of the outlet. Her estimate of the total popular Presidential vote was 69,200,000—just 1,864 votes from the official count as established by the Associated Press at 12 noon EST Nov. 16. The AP registered a count of 69,198,136 votes. Fred C. Reinhardt, president of the Second Federal Savings and Loan Association and Fred E. 

YOU'VE LOST THAT LOVIN' FEELIN'—The Righteous Brothers—Philles 4007

The Righteous Brothers' current hit "You've Lost That Lovin' Feelin'" tags their first album on the Phillies label, a collection of eleven while back r&r tunes and bluesy chestnuts. Their original readings of "Old Man River" and "Summer-time," fit nicely with bouncy treatments of "What'd I Say," and "The Angels Listened In." The duo is well supported with a muted big band sound throughout. A very appealing set.



WHO CAN I TURN TO (WHEN NOBODY NEEDS ME) & OTHER SONGS FROM THE ROAR OF THE GREASEPAINT—Anthony Newley—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3347

"Roar" is coming to Broadway sometime this season by way of England. It's score is by Leslie Bricusse and Anthony Newley, the "Stop the World . . ." writers. With the exception of "Who Can I Turn To," the writers' sequel to "Stop the World's" "What Kind of Fool Am I?," and perhaps "Look at That Face," the melodies are not quite as strong as "Stop the World . . ." This LP has the exciting voice of Newley to help a lot and also colorful orchestrations delivered by the Peter Knight ork. Newley's presentations are likely to get strong airtime exposure.



SOME BLUE EYED SOUL—The Righteous Brothers—Moonglow 1002

In contrast with their currently reviewed new album, this Moonglow release features the Righteous Brothers performing ten "Soul"-styled blues tunes. Although most of the numbers are well known in the r&b field, the sound here is brand new. The duo put their special stamp on "This Little Girl of Mine," "For Your Love," and "Baby, What You Want Me to Do," and others. The disc should reap substantial r&b coin.



FRANKIE RANDALL SINGS & SWINGS—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 2967


Frankie Randall showcases a strong pop-jazz vocal talent on this premier album outing for RCA Victor. The songster exhibits a free-swinging style akin to Sinatra, Greco et al, that combines deft phrasing with warmth and sincerity. Young adults and many teenagers will dig his handling of such beauties as "She Loves Me," "I Believe In You" and "As Long As She Needs Me." A fine new talent who'll reap label promo benefits in the John Gary, Peter Nero tradition. Plenty of choice programming for spinners too.



GREAT SONGS FROM ALL TIME ITALIAN HIT PARADE—Robertino—Kapp KL 1423

Robertino, one of Italy's best-selling popular disk artists, recalls a dozen of his country's biggest international hits on this new LP romp on Kapp. The chanter's warm and captivating vocal style serves him well on such familiar gems as "Arrivederci Roma," "Come Prima" and "Volare." All the tunes are done in Italian. Loads of listening enjoyment to be had here.

POP BEST BETS




THE CHUBBY CHECKER DISCOTHEQUE—Parkway P7045

Here's a two-pocket dance package from Parkway that wraps up every Chubby Checker hit from recent years in one grand-slam set. These have all appeared on earlier LP's, but the chanter's legions of admirers will surely come out in strength to pick up on this collective offering. Included in the line-up of 32 Checker giants are "Hully Gully Baby," "Limbo Rock," and "Bristol Stomp."



STEVE ALLEN, HIS PIANO AND ORCHESTRA—Dot 3597/25597

The multi talented Steve Allen sensitively glides through a dozen romantic tunes, producing a sound suited for dancing or mood listening. Easy on the ear are: "Impossible," "Tenderly," and "Call Me Irresponsible." The soft orchestrations offer a lush setting for the pianist's stylized readings. The 88'er has struck paydirt with several of his earlier Dot outings and could repeat with this one.



EDDY HOWARD SINGS THE GREAT ONES—Mercury SR 60972/MG 20972

Although the tragic death of Eddy Howard cut short a shining career, his memory is preserved for his countless fans via excellent recordings like this set of warm evergreen from Mercury. The chanter's bell-clear, wide-range voice is effectively showcased on "Stardust," "For Me And My Gal" and "Sweet Lorraine." Fine listening throughout.




DRACULA'S DEUCE—The Ghouls—Capitol (S)T 2215

This is one of the better albums in the monster idiom, and is worthy of more than a little air exposure. The vocal quality of the Ghouls almost makes it a pity that they have not chosen more conventional rock 'n' roll material; their instrumental setting is also praiseworthy. Any sales that could be prompted by the monster fad will be well earned by the crew. Slick bands here are the title tune, "Shake, Rattle and Rot," and "Voo Doo Juice."

Roy Scott has come up with a delightful dance package by fusing the Yiddish sounds of "Fiddler on the Roof" with a solid Latin beat. The set includes mambo, pachanga and bossa nova versions of the tunes from the smash Broadway show. Bright tracks here are a "Sabbath Prayer Fast Bossa Nova," "Mazel Tov La Bamba," and the "Fiddler on the Roof Cha Cha," which tags the platter. An ear-pleasing package that merits attention. Tailor-made for dance buffs.



MUSIC FROM GREAT ITALIAN MOTION PICTURES—Pino Calvi—Capitol SP 8608


Italian films, in recent years, have produced a multitude of fine scores from such important composers as Nino Rota, Riz Ortolani, and Pino Calvi. Composer Calvi conducts the orchestra on this Capitol survey of a program of recent well-received film scores. BOSSSES OF THE BALLAD—Illinois Jacquet—Argo LP 746


In recent years it has become increasingly popular to team-up jazz artists with strings, and this new Argo entry spotlights vet tenor saxist Illinois Jacquet along with a nineteen piece string ork. Jacquet weaves his distinctive brand of mid-stream musical magic on a handsome collection of Cole Porter Tunes including "I Love You," "Begin The Beguine" and "I've Got You Under My Skin." Jazzophiles should really dig the session.



JOHN WALLOWITCH—Serenus SEP 2005

Once in a while a new artist comes on the scene of special merit. Pianist John Wallowitch is just such an artist. The imaginative keyboard stylist conforms to no set pattern or school but interestingly and effectively utilizes elements of midstream jazz and classical constructions into delightful swingin' cohesive fusion. Highlights here include "The Sweetest Sounds," "Home, Sweet Home" and "You And The Night And The Music." A talent to watch.

CLASSICAL PICK



STRAVINSKY CONDUCTS HIS CHORAL MUSIC—Columbia ML 6047/MS 6647

For four decades Stravinsky has stood in top-most ranks of modern classical composers and this top-flight new program from Columbia which features a half dozen of his famous choral works (texts included) conducted by maestro himself should create plenty of attention. Although some of the selections are a little on the esoteric side (e.g. "Anthem," "Babel," etc.) classical buyers should appreciate the soaring harmonic and rhythmic variations. Fine performances are also turned in here by the CBS Symphony Orchestra and the Festival Singers of Toronto.

Spargo's appointment has already taken effect, and he is currently working with Hugo & Luigi in completing the album product for the Jan.-Feb. release. Hugo & Luigi stated that Spargo's appointment will contribute greatly to the extensive plans which the label is preparing for 1965, and in building new ideas and new artists in the album field.

Gallico Ties-In With Zombies' Publisher, Lorne Greene For New Pubberies

NEW YORK—Publisher Al Gallico has added new set-ups to his music operations.

With England's Joe Ron Coroni, head of Marquis Music, which publishes material by the Zombies, Gallico has formed a U.S. affiliate, Mainstay Music (BMI). Gallico's own firm, named after him, published the English group's first big U.S. hit, "She's Not There."

Gallico has also become a partner with Lorne Greene, of "Bonanza" fame, in a publishing company called Lorne Greene Music (BMI). First release by the pubbery will be Greene's follow-up to his smash, "Ringo." It's "The Man," which RCA Victor Records will market this week.

Both of the new companies will headquarter at 101 West 55th Street, this city.

HOLLYWOOD—Dick Clark's "Caravan of Stars" has completed its Nov.-Dec. tour with grosses up 11% over the comparable period of last year, according to Rosalind Ross, exec. director of Dick Clark Productions.

The group of 15 acts, headlined by Johnny Tillotson, Brian Hyland, The Hondells, and Dee Dee Sharp, averaged \$90,000 a week at the boxoffice over the 4½-week tour, with tickets selling at \$2.50 top.

Miss Ross also noted first substantial bookings at colleges, including three on the just-completed one-nighter trek, and says "this is proof that top popular music can and will attract all young adults, from pre-high school level to young marrieds."

Miss Ross explains the tour is not part of the regular "Caravan of Stars," but was packaged at the request of West Coast promoters who could not get the "Caravan," which was performing in the East.

Producers are David Susskind and Daniel Melnick in association with Joseph E. Levine.

Col's other musical casters this season are the already released "Bajour" and "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty" and a March entry, "Do I Hear a Waltz?" with a score by Richard Rodgers and Stephen Sondheim.

Victor Ups Price To Mgr. Of Manufacturing, Recording

NEW YORK—RCA Victor Records has promoted R. O. Price to manager of manufacturing and recording. Formerly general plant manager for Victor, Price assumed his new duties Jan. 1 on the retirement of A. L. McClay.

The new Martino deck features a Hank Williams ballad, "My Heart Would Know," backed with the title tune from the film, "Hush . . . Hush, Sweet Charlotte."

Peggy Lee sings "Pass Me By" from the flick "Father Goose" on her first single of '65, the flip is "That's What It Takes."

Rounding out the releases are platters by Hank Thompson, "I'm Gonna Practice Freedom" and "Life's Sweetest Moment," and Tommy Collins' "All of the Monkey's Ain't in the Zoo" and "Don't Let Me Stand in his Footsteps."

London's Number Game: Agent 007, That Is

NEW YORK—London Records has hopped on the James Bond bandwagon by releasing two albums closely tied in with the 007 trend. One of the platters, "James Bond Thrillers," features instrumental themes from the three James Bond flicks played by the Roland Shaw Orchestra; and the other is a vocal offering by Honor Blackman, who appears as Pussy Galore in the latest movie, "Goldfinger." Both LP's feature covers with scantily clad and attractive young women in assorted poses. Herb Goldfarb, national sales manager, reports an immediate distrib reaction to the LP.

Ettinger Exits Cash Box

NEW YORK—Bob Ettinger, an associate editor of Cash Box, has resigned from the post to return to Europe. Ettinger joined Cash Box three years ago after spending most of his adult life in Europe, and expressed a desire to return to the Continent to live.

After a vacation in Scandinavia, Ettinger will reside in London and expects to direct his talents toward the field of promotion and music publishing in both England and Germany.

Benton has been a big seller for Mercury Records for a number of years. His current success is "Do It Right."

Union Troubles Close "Mitty"

NEW YORK—Columbia Records continues to have its Off-Broadway troubles this season.

"The Secret Life of Walter Mitty," which got good reviews and is one of the label's cast LP's, was set to close last Sunday because the producer of the show, Joe Manchester, said that Actor's Equity had demanded \$4,000 in payment for "alleged" rehearsals for the recording of the casters, a sum he has refused to pay.

Recently, the label dropped plans to cut the Off-Broadway revival of "The Cradle Will Rock" over session salary difficulties with the American Federation of Radio and TV Artists.

Dick Clark Buys KPRO-Riverside, Calif.

HOLLYWOOD—Progress Broadcasting, Inc. has announced through Dick Clark, its president, the purchase of radio station KPRO in Riverside, Calif. from KPRO Inc., headed by Tolbert Foster. Blackburn & Co. was the broker for the sale.

The station broadcasts 24 hours a day on a frequency of 1440 k.c., and beams on a 1,000-watt, non-directional signal.

Clark describes KPRO as "the number one adult music station in the market, utilizing the full catalog of standard tunes," and said the programming and music format will not change.

Present management, under the direction of general manager Dave Taylor, will remain under the new ownership.

Of its own making was the great success of the Kinks, whose American outlet, Reprise, got solidly on the English Sound bandwagon with the group's mighty hit, "You Really Got Me." The boys are moving into 1965 with another big hit, "All Day and All of the Night." At the moment, they are touring Britain with America's own Gene Pitney. In the States, they did a TV stint on the Red Skelton TV'er. When their English trek ends Jan. 12, they'll head for their first trip on the Continent, a 3-day tour of Sweden. After that, the boys journey to Australia and New Zealand for two weeks. Members of the team are Ray Davies, leader and rhythm guitarist-writer; his brother Dave, lead guitar; Pete Quaife, bass; and Mick Avory, drums.


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

GREAT BRITAIN

All thoughts of a financial crisis went by the board in the biggest Christmas spending spree of all time. All the major labels found themselves with artists high in the charts and notching up tremendous sales both with singles and LP's. EMI had The Beatles "I Feel Fine" at No. 1 on Parlophone with Freddie and the Dreamers in hot pursuit with "I Understand" on Columbia. Decca was well represented by Val Doonican's "Walk Away" with The Rolling Stones and The Bachelors also in the Top Ten. Pye had a major hit with Petula Clark's "Downtown" and Philips was well to the fore with Dusty Springfield's "Losing You." They also did well in the LP field with CBS showstoppers "My Fair Lady" and "Camelot."

Looking to 1965 for trends it is interesting to note that more and more single artists are finding their way into the charts. Established British names such as Cliff Richard, Adam Faith and Matt Monro are brushing shoulders with more and more American artists such as Gene Pitney, P. J. Proby, Roy Orbison and Elvis Presley.

Manufacturers and dealers report that more people gave record tokens as Christmas presents than ever before. EMI whose biggest single disk success of 1964 was The Beatles' "Can't Buy Me Love," which topped the 1,250,000 mark, have got off to a good start to 1965 with the group's "I Feel Fine," which has already sold over a million copies.

Decca Records has acquired the American Ava catalog to be released in this country on the London label. Negotiations were concluded between W. W. Townsley of Decca and independent international representative Bobby Weiss. First release from Ava which specializes in film soundtracks is expected to be Elmer Bernstein's "The Carpet Baggers." The Ava catalog was previously issued here by EMI on the MGM label.

Island Records announced that it has acquired distribution rights to the American Ace label. This r & b catalog which has such names as Lloyd Price, Hughie (Piano) Smith, Sonny Boy Williamson, Elmore James and Frankie Ford will be issued on Island's subsidiary Sue label. First releases will be mid-January. A big expansion program is planned for Island Records during 1965 including the formation of a new pop label, Aladdin. Managing director Christopher Blackwell will be joined by Chris Peers and M. D. Harry Robinson in the production of disks for which artists are now being signed.

Latest British musical to reach London's West End after a three-week try-out in the provinces is "Our Man Crichton" which opened to rave reviews. Based on J. M. Barrie's "The Admirable Crichton," the show stars film actor Kenneth More and singer Millicent Martin, who made such an impact in the controversial TV series "That Was The Week That Was." Book and lyrics by Herbert Kretzmar and music by Dave Lee. The score is published by Screen-Gems—Columbia Music. Negotiations for an original cast album are under way.

The Zbigniew Namyslowski Modern Jazz Quartet, which created much interest on the British jazz scene when they toured here last summer from their native Poland, has its first release on Decca with an album titled "Lola." Because of the popularity, they gained last year, the quartet returns to Britain on February 13 for another tour. One of their venues will be Ronnie Scott's Jazz Club.

Zarah Leander, Swedish born star of stage and cabaret, makes a welcome return to disk with one of her most famous songs "Wunderbar" released by Oriole and published by Chappells.

Pop singer Billy Fury hopes to have his 15th consecutive chart entry with his latest Decca single, "I'm Lost Without You." Fury has recently finished work on a film entitled "I Gotta Horse."

Two pop stars kick off 1965 with their own series for BBC Radio. "The Tommy Steele Show" brings cockney singer back to the air after starring for two years in the West End musical "Half A Sixpence." Music and songs for the series penned by Tommy, The Raindrops and The Johnny Spence Orchestra. Vera Lynn stars in "We'll Meet Again" tagged after her signature tune.

All royalties from "Somebody Help Me," new disk by Kenny Bernard and The Wranglers, are being donated to the Oxfam Society. The number penned by The Wranglers is issued on Parlophone and published by Filmusic.

The New Christy Minstrels arrive in London on Jan. 7 on the first leg of their month long tour of Europe which will take in Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Italy, France, Belgium and Germany. The American Ambassador is hosting a reception at the American Embassy for them on the day they arrive in London. During their stay here they will top the bill of "Sunday Night At The London Palladium" on January 10, record two half-hour shows for BBC sound and four half-hour shows for Southern Television. To coincide with their visit CBS issued their latest single "Down The Road I Go."

Yvonne Preosilova, pop star from Czechoslovakia, emerges from behind the iron curtain to appear in the BBC's "Teen Scene." . . . Cilla Black has first album release "Just Cilla" issued on Parlophone. . . . Another single from Aladdin by Cliff Richard, "This Was My Special Day," on Columbia.

Latest album release from Australian Record Company includes the film track from "My Fair Lady" and three other MFL sets from Andy Williams, Ferrante & Teicher and André Previn, respectively. Also included is "Tell Me Why" by Bobby Vinton; "Without You" by Robert Goulet; "The World Of Lonely People" by Anita Bryant; "New Juke Box Hits" by Chuck Berry; and "Jazz Impressions Of Japan" by Dave Brubeck.

Barbara Nicholson, continuity writer at Winnipeg's CKY, was the proud recipient recently of a certificate of recognition in the Canadian Radio Commercials Festival. Her employers immediately arranged for her to fly to Toronto to accept the award. A hearts and flowers turn of events occurred when charming Barbara decided to combine pleasure with business and turn the award winning trip into a honeymoon at Niagara Falls. Upon her departure for the East Miss Nicholson had become Mrs. Bud McLean. Congratulations on both counts, Barb. Quality Records really beating the drum of late for the new Sue Thompson outing on Hickory, "Paper Tiger." It appears to be making the chart scene in solid fashion right across the country. "I can't Live Without You," by Joe Popiel is really developing some chart muscles. It's listed on many of Canada's leading charts and seems certain to break the chart barrier in every Canadian community. Definitely a national break out. Rockin' Robert's "SJ Smart Chart" is a real stronghold of Canadian content these days. His list is among the first in the country to list the great new Pat Hervey sound, "Think About Me." Others are bound to follow suit; it's a great commercial sound. The Jack London, Capitol outing is also well under way at CHSJ in St. John. Tom E. Swift postcards from Vancouver where he is working the promo circuit for his London outing, "I'm Gonna Try." He indicates he will be appearing on some cross Canada TV's originating on the West Coast. Petula Clark is set for a P.A. in Montreal at Comedie Canadienne from Jan. 5 through 10. Her record of "Downtown" is the gigantic hit it deserves to be right across Canada. It is distributed in most parts of Canada by the Compo Company on the Warner Brothers label, however in the Province of Quebec the record appears on its original Vogue label from Trans Canada. Al Mair reports that "Big Brother" by Dickie Lee is a solid top ten item at CKOC in Hamilton where Art Todd was among the first Canadian spinners to really get on the good sound.

Recent developments on the Montreal rating scene have CFCF's Dave Boxer whistling a happy tune. His comparatively new night time segment walked away with the November rating picture, resulting in no end of distress and unhappiness for his several competitors. Indeed, the boxer showing has gone a long way to improving the entire station's rating picture to a very marked degree.

Whitey Haines is enthusiastically talking up a new wax outing by Shirley Field.

Rather drastic changes on the Montreal radio personnel scene have occurred in recent days. Early morning deejay-program director, Doug Burrows, exits CKGM to take over as manager at CHIC in Brampton, Ontario. He is replaced at the Montreal outlet by Ralph Kirchen from CJAD in Montreal. Shortly after this change (12/18), CKGM announced that Dick Varney and John Murphy would be replaced in their respective time periods, and that Dean Hagopian from Ottawa's CKOY will shortly join CKGM's regular lineup. Neither Varney nor Murphy have made known their plans for the future. Their on air replacements at CKGM have not yet been announced by General Manager Don Wall.

RCA Victor of Canada have set something of a record on their production of the first Canadian musical original caster. "Le Vol Rose Du Flamant," the production in question, stars an impressive lineup of French Canada's top music talent. The idea to record, the actual recording and associated activities, cover, etc., pressing and distribution of the initial run was all accomplished in just under one week. It is on release through RCA's Canada International series which will open the door to world wide exposure for the fine production. This is another giant step forward for the recording industry in Canada, and the RCA Victor people are to be congratulated for their faith and foresight where Canadian talent is concerned. Another new Canadian album that is bound to create a stir, and then some, on the world record market has just been released by Arc. Catherine McKinnon offers a program of the more commercial folk items of recent vintage, "Today," "Dominique," together with a collection of standard items in the idiom. The charming vocalist has been a regular fixture on numerous network TV's and is now seen weekly on the Don Messer Show.

Among the best of the new single releases that are making jocks sit up and take notice across Canada is the latest outing by the Ray Conniff Singers, "If I knew Then." It should turn out to be a winner in all broadcast formats. Phil Najovits, genial Phonodisc topper in Montreal, is elated over the year just past at the company's branch in Montreal. According to Phil the firm experienced one of its best years in the market throughout '64. He is looking forward to a blockbuster '65 with hit new things by The Miracles, "Come On Do The Jerk," and Chuck Berry's "Promised Land" to lead the way. "The In Crowd" by Dobie Gray appears all set to catch fire in Canada. Bill Fisher will have winner after winner as '65 gets under way with "This Feeling Inside" by The Searchers roaring up the charts hot on the heels of "Love Potion No. 9" by the same group, big new outings by Sandie Shaw, The Honeycombs and The Kinks all seem certain to smash the chart barrier for Bill and his allied set up. Liam Mullan, vet Canadian record man, has just returned from Great Britain and a sojourn with the Epstein office where he was serving in the capacity of Road Manager for the Beatles on their recent tour of the British Isles. Liam is in search of a record promotion post with a Canadian firm again. He can be reached in Montreal at (514) 272 2619. Hal Ross has a blockbuster sound about to happen as the New Year gets rolling. "Somewhere" by P. J. Proby figures to introduce the artist to adult audiences as well as please his legions of teen age fans in North America. It currently is a big winner on the charts in Great Britain.

Lesley Gore is coming in for air play by the car load lot with her latest, "Look Of Love." "The Other Ringo" by Larry Finnegan seems to be a sure thing. Bill Smithers at Quality in Montreal expects the RIC outing to break wide open. "No We're Thru" by The Poets from the new Dynovox set up should come in for some considerable Canadian air action. Early tests have brought encouraging results. Best new side of the week is the recorded-in-England pairing by Pat Hervey. This one has got to be a smash for the delightful Canadian gal. "Think About Me," although it's the B side of the disk certainly seems to be the money side.

Bob Pugh at Raleigh is just as excited as he can be, and with good reason. This is a first class commercial outing. It's on Act. Easily the best album set in many a moon for Bobby Darin is his new one on Capitol, "From Hello Dolly To Goodbye Charlie" is Bobby at his best with tremendous musical assist from the swinging Richard Wess band. It's coming in for air play in amounts that are reminiscent of Bobby's big "Mack The Knife," etc., days. Count on Dusty Springfield to be a great big chart performer, both album and single wise very soon. Her "Live It Up" single is headed for hitsville, and her new Philips LP, "Dusty" has Clyde McGregor whistling a happy, money-in-the-bank tune over at Quality lately.



ITALY

The 15th San Remo Songs Festival is once again the principal subject of our weekly column. After the decision by part of RCA Italiana not to participate in the contest there was a week of hard work by part of the organizers in order to select the final 24 songs that will be presented this year at the contest.

Principal support for the Festival organization derives from the record field. All publishing groups are participating in the contest with their own record labels and recording artists. Such is the case of Sugarmusic with CGD and CGD Int., of Ricordi, with Ricordi and CBS, of Ariston with Ariston Records, of C. A. Rossi with Juke Box, of Curci Carosello/Cemed and so on.

Also, the 15th Edition of the contest is marking the debut in the Festival of some publishing firms that are owned by top record firms. This is the case of Phonogram with their pubbery "Esedra" and of Saar with their pubbery "Mas." For Durium, this is the second year it is presenting its own publishing production, having in the past year a great publishing hit in San Remo with "Quando Vedrai La Mia Ragazza." For Durium the 15th edition is also marking the debut on the scene of the Festival of its new voice, Beppe Cardile, who is at the same time, lyric writer and composer of the song presented, "L'Amore E' Partito."

Other debuting artists are Nicola Di Bari, a recent discovery of Saar, who already had last summer a hit record, Vittorio Inzaina of CGD who was revealed by the Castrocaro contest for new voices (whose winners were automatically entitled to take part in the San Remo contest). A debuting singer also discovered at Castrocaro is Franco Tozzi, pacted by Fonit-Cetra. Other artists who for the first time will tread the stage of the San Remo Casino are: Iva Zanicchi of Ri.Fi who recently entered the top 30 charts with two recordings; Wilma Goich of Ricordi who recently confirmed her talent at the Mediterranean Festival of Barcelona, where she was the winner; John Foster, the singer/journalist who had strong success in the summer thanks to his recording, "Amore Scusami." Foster records under the Phonocolor (Cellograph-Simp) label, and the 15th edition of the contest marks also the debut of this young dynamic record firm.

The list of artists debuting at the Festival of 1965 continues with Peppino Gagliardi of Saar who is displaying his extraordinary personality on the record scene, Bruno Lauzi of CGD, whose name already appeared on the Italian charts, Gianni Mascolo, who revealed himself at the Venice Contest (a festivals' stage) marking also the debut in San Remo of the new Alfredo Rossi label Ariston, Giordano Colombo who also took part in the Venice contest, and last but not least, Gian Costello, a well-known artist of EMI Italiana, who, in spite of his talented voice, and some chart action, never had the occasion to reach a great success; also Fred Bongusto, who recently left Ri.Fi, which first launched and introduced his talent, to sign a new pact with Fonit Cetra.

We pass-up comments on foreign talents, all of them being well-known all over the world: some of them will come to the Festival for the first time as guests of our country. To them we wish to express our welcome, hoping that they will enjoy a strong success in the 15th edition of this world known contest.

The Italian pubbery owned by Aberbach is also for the first time taking part in the contest. The two Italian protagonists of the last year's Festival, Bobby Solo and Gigliola Cinquetti will take part once again in the event. Gigliola was the winner of the 1964 edition with "Non Ho L'Eta' Per Amarti" and Bobby Solo was the top selling artist of the contest with 1,400,000 copies sold of his recording "Una Lacrima Sul Viso."

RCA Italiana Explains Decision To Withdraw From San Remo Festival

NEW YORK—Last week's Italy column noted that RCA Italiana had decided to withdraw its participation—involving its artist line-up—at this year's San Remo Festival. Artists who will not appear include Paul Anka, Alain Barriere, Dalida, Neil Sedaka and Gino Paoli.

As promised in the column, here is the letter sent by Giuseppe Ornato, managing director of RCA Italiana, to the members of the selection committee, ATA, explaining the label's action:

Gentlemen:

First of all we wish to express our appreciation and thanks for the confidence you showed to us in selecting, among 35 compositions, eight tunes which should have been performed by RCA Italiana artists.

Therefore we feel we must explain to you the reasons why RCA Italiana did not participate in the Festival.

On Thursday, December 3, ATA informed us, through one of our executives, that among the tunes selected, there were only three by RCA Italiana (for which we are listing below, also the suggested interpreters) and namely:

La Verita (Bardotti, Trovajoli, Pes) (co-publishing Spanka Italiana) Jimmy Fontana (RCA Italiana) Paul Anka (RCA Victor); Non Basta Mai (Ti Voglio Troppo Bene) (Reverberi, Bardotti) (co-publisher Pentagramma) Little Tony (Durium) Neil Sedaka (RCA Victor); Prima Di Vederti (Paoli) Gino Paoli (RCA Italiana) Romy Yamada (RCA Victor); Thus leaving out: Quattro Ragioni Per Non Amarti (Mancini, Sentieri) Donatella Moretti (RCA Italiana) Alain Barriere (RCA Victor); Ascoltami (Proteggimi) (Rossi, Bezzi) Louiselle (ARC) Dalida (Barclay); Parla di Te (Paoli, Del Turco) Riccardo Del Turco.

As soon as we knew this unexpected as well as final decision, we got in touch, on the same Friday morning, Dec. 4, with Mr. Gianni Ravera informing him that, according to the previous conversations, we had already made firm arrangements with the artists who were now excluded from the Festival.

In confirming the ATA decision, Mr. Ravera suggested informally to have Alain Barriere perform the song by Gino Paoli. At the same time he reported that some publishers from Milan had expressed to him their disappointment for being poorly represented among the 24 songs of the Festival.

Not the actual exclusion of the songs, previously approved by your Committee, but the climate in which such a decision had been made brought us back to the atmosphere of the 1962 and 1963 Festivals, to which, for the same reasons—RCA Italiana did not participate. Apparently the parenthesis of the 1964 edition, to whose success RCA Italiana greatly contributed with suggestions and innovations as well as its active participation, is to be ascribed to contingent circumstances.

Upon request of Mr. Ravera, on Friday noon, Dec. 4, we sent ATA a cable requesting them to exclude from the Festival all the songs already selected, if at least five of them (those to be performed also by our world-wide popular artists) should have not been accepted.

If, based on our request, ATA had shown their willingness to discuss with us the conditions of our participation, we could change our opinion on the criteria adopted presently, so similar to those of the 1962 and 1963 editions.

A few hours later, however, ATA cabled their harsh negative reply.

RCA Italiana decided not to participate in the XV San Remo Festival as the conditions indicated by ATA were unacceptable. Our company in fact would have been exposed to all the risks connected to this event (risks confirmed by several clamorous cases of the past) only with worldwide popular artists who succeeded in gaining their popularity outside San Remo, artists who maintain their record sales at constantly high levels. Besides all this RCA Italiana was not given the possibility to present on the stage of the Festival some artists already known such as Riccardo Del Turco, Donatella Moretti, Louiselle, the possibility which, we know, is given to other record companies.

D.G.G.-Polydor will be represented by Wencke Myhre and The Medium Terzett whereas Electrola will have stars Conny Froboess and Ralph Bendix on hand. Metronome has invited last year's winner Siv Malmkvist and Gigliola Cinquetti and Philips will go with The Blue Diamonds and Dorte. Teldec will have Peggy March and Billy Mo representing them. The festival which has produced huge hits for the past few years will once again be televised.

Next week we'll have a firm to firm report on the year 1964. That's it for this week in Germany.

Wolfgang Kretschmar, the public relations head of Philips Ton, will take over the head of the production/program department for the firm. The well known journalist Hannes Flesner will take over the public relations department which handles press, artist promotion and radio-TV promotion.

Electrola released the new Beatles LP "Beatles For Sale" on December 15 in time for the last minute Xmas rush.

Polydor reports top action on the new Connie Francis German waxing just released.

Michael Arends of Paul Arends and Trumpf Music reports that he's busy pushing Peter Alexander's smash hit on "Sweet Violets," which has passed the 100,000 mark here and is now working on "Chug A Lug" from Roger Miller, which was just released here.

Theo Seeger of Peer Music has two hot newies on his hands with "Is It True" in English from Brenda Lee and in German from Conny Froboess and "The Crying Game" in English from Dave Berry and in German from Peter Beil. Both top English tunes look like hitsville here.

Larry Yaskiel of Vogue here reports that "Have I The Right" from The Honeycombs made the top of the Frankfurt Hit Parade. He also reports that Pat Boone with the top hit "Memphis" has passed the 50,000 sales mark.

Rolf Budde is busy with his publishing push on "I've Fallen In Love With A Snowman" in English by Millie and in German by Sonnie on Polydor.

Rudy Slezak of Aberbach Music reports that he's got the big one with Cliff Richard's sensational German version of "Spanish Harlem" which is the top selling Electrola record at present and also topped the hit parades in Frankfurt, Cologne, Stuttgart and Berlin.

Eddie Barclay visited Hans R. Beierlein from Edition Montana and Star Club Records and took a four day information trip throughout Germany. Mr. Barclay met with representatives of Electrola, Polydor, Philips, Teldec, Metronome, Deutsche Vogue and Bellaphon.

The general manager of D.G.G. Helmut Haertel and the head of the central distribution-Overseas department Johannes E. F. Ellrich just returned from a South American trip. The spotlights of the trip include a conference in Lima, Peru with the Central and South American partners of D.G.G. who also coordinate the pop production in each country under the Polydor label. The D.G.G. partner in Mexico, Discos Universales (DUSA), doubled its expected sales in its first year of business.

August Seith of Seith/Chappell Music reports that the firm's got hits on top of hits. Right now the big push is on for "Everybody Loves Somebody" done in German by Gerhard Wendland, the German version of "Such A Night" by Johnny Reimar, "I Love You More And More Every Day" in German by Jimmy Makulis, Anna Lena's German version of "Cold Cold Heart," "Sweet William," done in German by Millie and of course the many many new LP's on "My Fair Lady." The firm also has new German hits by The Medium Terzett, Nana Mouskouri, Roy Black, Ralf Bendix, Shirley and many others. The German version of "Annie Get Your Gun" is still going strong. The show, which has already played long runs in Berlin and Munich, is now moving with the original cast to Hamburg for an expected long run. That's it for this week in Germany.

HOLLAND

Bovema's HMV-dept. has reported that the vocal trio The Shepherds will present the best of their Flemish repertory for Belgian TV this month.

This Gramophonehouse-label also did a special campaign for the promotion of Marlène Dietrich—albums and singles—one of which "Sag Mir Wo Die Blumen Sind" got the Edison-Award 1963 on the occasion of Dietrich's Stockholm-TV-show, broadcast here on December 23.

1st Xmas Day was a good day for Bovema's Columbia-label. Both the Golden Gate Quartet and the Benedetto Marcello String Ensemble were popular and classical highlights in separate programs.

Bovema's Imperial will tape the Adam & Eve-cabaret of Fiet and Frans Koster right on the spot of their Haarlem club.

Also thanks to the successful television series, "Bonanza," Lorne Greene with his RCA-record "Ringo/Bonanza," gets a lot of attention. Johnny Kendall and the Heralds made a new hit with their "Jezebel"/"The Hoochie Coochiemen." Frequently ordered too is the late Sam Cooke's "A Cousin Of Mine"/"That's Where It's At." "Ain't That Loving You Baby."/"Ask Me" of Elvis Presley is, it stands to reason, a hit. Los Indios Tabajaras have for many months already a lot of success with their record "Marta"/"St. Louis Blues."

The press conference organized by Warner Bros. Holland in cooperation with CBS Gramofoonplaten and held in conjunction with the "My Fair Lady" film at the Flora Theatre, Amsterdam, has met with great success. According to CBS' sales manager Hemmy J. S. Wapperom, the CBS soundtrack recording of the movie started to sell very well in the Benelux countries. CBS Gramofoonplaten has made a sort of "My Fair Lady Christmas Tree," which has been decorated with displays of all "My Fair Lady" records released in the Benelux countries. This CBS invention, first showed by Heinz Hartmann of CBS Schallplatten, Germany, at the London CBS convention, has been enormously successful and Dutch retailers are gladly accepting this wonderful "My Fair Lady" tree for window-dressing.

On Dec. 24, "Die Grosse Kür," a German movie, with two CBS artists Marika Kilius and Hans Jürgen Bäumlner in the leading roles, had its premiere.

Early this year, two CBS artists will appear on Dutch TV-screens. German singer Bernd Spier, who recently hit the Benelux market with his strong version of "Memphis Tennessee," will appear in a big show, which also features The New Christy Minstrels on Jan. 15, 1965. The Geschwister Jacob (4 sisters!), who recently appeared at the Dutch Grand Gala Du Disque, will perform again on Dutch NCRV TV, in the "Bueno de Mesquita Show," on Jan. 29, 1965.

On Dec. 16 last, Dutch VPRO TV showed CBS' Laguestra's "Latin American Show" featuring Julio B. Euson.

Producer Jean Kluger and Belgian CBS sales manager Pascal Robiefrold visited the CBS Benelux Head-Office to discuss the expansion of the local CBS production and the promotion therefore.

Dutch Artists Abroad

Malando (Arie Maasland), Dutch orchestra-leader and composer of world-famous tangos, returned in his native country Dec. 15 from a very successful tour through Japan. During the three weeks of the extensive tour, the Malando Orchestra played all prominent Japanese theatres, plus special concerts for (color) TV and radio. During the press conference at Schiphol Airport, Malando told that he was deeply impressed by the way the Japanese audiences recognized every melody right away after a few bars. Sales of Malando LP's are extraordinary high—all Malando albums appear there in special Japanese editions. The tour was organized by Philips' Phonographic Industries at Baarn, Holland and the Japanese Philips organization.

Three days after Malando's arrival at Schiphol Airport, Anneke Grönloh and The Blue Diamonds, left for a three week tour through Indonesia. Anneke Grönloh (Philips artists with five Golden Records) and The Blue Diamonds (one Platinum and two Golden Records each) were born in Indonesia, but had to immigrate to the Netherlands in their early teens. They are the first Dutch artists to visit Indonesia since many years, in fact as a result of the much better political terms between both countries. Thousands of fans cheered when Anneke and the duo arrived on Djakarta Airport. Tickets for appearances were sold out weeks in advance. To all probability, the Dutch top-stars will be introduced to Soukarno, Indonesia's president.

Topper Number One in Holland is Lucille Starr's "French Song," directly followed by Roy Orbison's "Pretty Woman." Both hits were released by Phonogram on the London-label, summer 1964. There was talk of a personal appearance by Miss Starr in Holland already before the end of 1964, which, however, had to be postponed for personal reasons.

Regarding Roy Orbison: Dutch impresario Paul Acket has already pointed out to "The Big O" that a promotional performance in this country would be most fruitful in the effect of sales. Definite agreements have not been achieved yet. Orbison's record-company in this country, Phonogram, is intending to hand the "Golden Tulip" (also in the possession of Billy Vaughn) to the popular star as soon as he will include Holland in a coming tour.

Thanks to the activities of a Dutch journalist in cooperation with several Dutch jazz-experts, the "Prince Bernard Fund" will grant a handsome subsidy yearly to a prominent Dutch jazz-musician added to a modern sculpture. Winner of this year is Boy Edgar, a medical doctor and band-leader. During a special party at the "Vara" Network Cooperation, the winner of last year, Herman Schoonderwalt conducted a big band with "Blue Boy," homage to Edgar. One of the speakers was Phonogram's PRO and Press-chief Rolf Ten Kate who urged in a fiery address to the journalists present to give more attention to jazz-music from own sources.

The Detroit Sound, the big feature of the Motown-Gordy-Tamla line distributed and promoted by Artone's susid Funckler Records in Benelux, was the subject of a recent local telecast presenting The Supremes, specially flown over for the occasion by Funckler exec Pete Felleman last October. This sensational all-girl Trio, a practically permanent feature of nearly all local family mags, has 3 singles moving now in this territory: "Come See About Me," "Baby Love" and "Where Did Our Love Go." Other recently released Motown recordings include "Needle In A Haystack" by The Velvelettes, "Too Many Fish In The Sea" by The Marvelettes, "Baby Don't You Do It" by Marvin Gaye and the "Where Did Our Love Go" LP package by The Supremes.

With "Bread And Butter" and "Everything's Allright" currently riding the local Top Twenty, The Newbeats as a result of their command performance at the Grand Gala du Disque last Oct., surely have arrived in Benelux. On account hereof, Pete Felleman of Artone's subsid Funckler, distributors of the Hickory label in this territory, just released a third single culled from "The Newbeats" LP Album. Specially selected sides "Thou Shalt Not Steal" and "Ain't That Lovin' You Baby" will be issued exclusively by Funckler in Benelux. Results of record sales further prove that Felleman's idea of inviting prominent artists from abroad for local Radio & TV exposure pays off!!



JAPAN

Nippon Grammophon increased its productivity, through a contract with MGM, and began pressing MGM hits which are to be released on Feb. 10. Included are MGM: "The Very Best Of Connie Francis," "Harlem Nocturn," "The Very Best Of Hank Williams" (First Collection), "Mr. Trumpet/Harry James," "Sousa Spectacle Marches," "Midnight Blue," "Musical Album/Star Light Symphony Orch.," "Looking For Love" (Soundtrack), "The Tillotson Touch;" Verve: "The Oscar Peterson Trio," "Bill Evanse Trio," "Hello Dolly!" (Ella Fitzgerald), "Hit Songs In '50's-'60's" Count Basie Orch, "Connie Sings Latin Numbers," "Connie Francis' Greatest Hits," "Charm Of Richard Chamberlain," "David Rose Screen Mood," "Kiss Of Fire" (David Rose Orch), "Tenderly" (Sam Taylor), "Ebb Tide" (Robert Maxwell Orch.), and eight MGM singles and two Verve singles.

Show Records now has a new star on its label: Dinah Lee. She hails from New Zealand and sings on a first single just issued in Belgium: "Kansas City" and "Doing the Blue Beat." John Foster's "Amore Scusami" is still going strong and other Show-best-sellers are the stars Mina, Remy Ray and Tony Geys.

Bobby Solo, famous Italian singer, had a concert in our country. The artist also appeared on the RTB radio program, "Nous Les Décagénénaire." Fans were enthusiastic about it. CBS Belgium is convinced records of Bobby Solo are selling better than ever before. Solo's last record released in Belgium was "Credi A Me" b/w "Le Cose Che Non Ho."

CBS released a wonderful new LP of the French artist Colette Magny. Although the start of this very special blues singer was very hard, success is becoming a reality now.

Roland Kluger just returned from the States where he was pleased to note that "Hawaii Tattoo" was doing so well. He visited his Zodiac Music and Compton offices in New York (publishers of the instrumental hit presently in the USA-charts).

Ad representative of Palette Int'l (producers of the Waikiki's "Hawaii Tattoo"), Kluger discussed several deals with the Kapp organization for releases of forthcoming material. He fixed releases by The Maya's (who originated the success of "La Playa"). Their LP will be issued in January, "The Maya's Play Tenderly." A new LP by Digno Garcia featuring "La Playa," sung in Spanish, will be issued in January as well.

According to Roland Kluger, several other masters by Palette will be issued through several other companies.

As a music publisher, Kluger traveled to Nashville, where he met Wesley Rose of the Acuff-Rose organization (represented in the Benelux by World Music).

Kluger brought over several numbers for publishing in Benelux. Just before leaving the States, Kluger noted that "Hawaii Tattoo" was still climbing high and may be as big as on the continent where "Hawaii Tattoo" reached the top in Germany, two years ago.

The first Frank Sinatra-Count Basie album on the Reprise label was and still is a very good seller in our country. So, Disques Artone Fonoplaten released the second Sinatra-Basie combination on the new Reprise album, "It Might as Well Be Swing," on which Sinatra brings us his own versions of some of the 1964 hits.

Chuck Berry, whose popularity is growing every day over here, has a new Chess record on the Belgian market: "Little Marie"—"Go Bobby Soxer," or a response to his success "Memphis Tennessee."

It really is a big pleasure for us to note that Dean Martin continues to sell his "Everybody Loves Somebody" in our country. Even now, with his new one out, "The Door Is Still Open to My Heart," his "Everybody" remains a chart topper.

On the United Artists label, Artone released two new singles—Garnet Mimms: "Look Away"—"One Woman"; Little Anthony & The Imperials: "I'm On the Outside (Looking In)"—"Please Go."

On the Ricordi label, Disques Artone Fonoplaten released the first 12" album "Canzoni Italiane" of the great singer Giuseppe Di Stefano, singing 12 well-known Italian songs. This album can become a consistent bestseller in the semiclassical catalog department, due to his very commercial quality.

In the Westminster-field, a first release in the "Silber-Serie," consisting of 6 different albums, were introduced last week, with such famous works of: Beethoven, Berlioz, Gershwin, Tchaikovsky, Bizet, and interpreters as: Clara Haskil, Rodzinsky, Leibowitz, Scherchen.

POLYGRAM BELGIUM REPORTS:

1964 was a most excellent year for the record business in the pop-field, with continuous top sales of artists like Johnny Hallyday, Claude François Sheila, France Gall, Les Gam's, Barbara, Robert Cogoi, Liliane, Willeke Alberti, Anneke Grönloh, Lesley Gore, Dusty Springfield, The Four Seasons, Brook Benton, Math Lucas, Jerry Lewis, and the extraordinary Swingle Singers.

This for the French, English and Dutch speaking artists, but also Gerhard Wendland (Germany) regularly came up with a hit record. And there is no doubt that 1965 even will be more successful. Liliane, who celebrated her 16th birthday in Dec. won the 1st. place in the Benelux popularity Poll 1964 and received a golden star on Jan. 2nd. at the City Theatre in Amsterdam.

Her new release of "Middernacht" (Midnight) and "Mixed Up, Shook Up Girl" will soon hit the charts in Holland and Belgium and TV performances in both countries are planned for January and February.

A sensational new Flemish release is Lize Marke's "Jij Danste Dicht Bij Mij" (You Danced Close To Me) b/w "Hoe Triest Si't In Venetië" (How Sad It Is In Venice), adaptation on Aznavour's No. 1 hit. This will be the break through for Lize.

Robert Cogoi has his first 12" LP out, and here he appears under quite another aspect as he gives the most excellent rendition in C & W-style of "Personne" (No One To Cry To), "Une Biere Pour Mon Cheval" (Mule Skinner Blues) "Peut Etre Oui, Peut Etre Non" (Maybe Yes, Maybe No) "Une Fille Comme Toi" (A Girl Like You) "Des Choses Que L'on Oublie" (Pick of the week) "Seche Tes Larmes" (Dry Your Tears) "Pourquoi Es-Tu



ARGENTINA

As we already mentioned last week, Year End social life has been particularly active this time. After CBS' party offering a gold record to Leo Dan for the sale of one million records in little more than a year, RCA had a gathering on December 22, at the Asociacion Sueca to award Palito Ortega, Los Chalchaleros, Juan D'Arienzo, Johnny Tedesco and Violeta Rivas for the same reason. This cocktail was emceed by TV personality Adolfo Salinas and RCA's sales & promotion manager Adolfo Pino, with the label's newest artist, cinemactress Graciela Borges, as "guest" star. The gold records were received by the artists from leading shop owners Gonzalez, Viale, Fravega and Gianelli, also present at the party.

One of the season's last events was the dinner offered by tropical music group Los Wawancó to the press, deejays and friends, celebrating a new anniversary of the successful combo. The meeting took place at one of the leading restaurants of Buenos Aires, and was still one more opportunity for seeing the record people together.

The Rolling Stones are coming! At least, on records: Odeon has started a strong promotional campaign in behalf of these artists, and expects to get very good results. First release (being promoted in advance through Ruben Machado's popular "Escalera A La Fama" Radio Excelsior program) is the group's album containing "Route 66," "I Just Want To Make Love To You," "Walking The Dog" and several other interesting titles. Additional press material is being made available by the diskery's press department, and nice news may be expected very soon.

More about CBS: the diskery will start a new program devoted to TV viewers through Channel 11, Thursday evenings. Title will be "Cancionisima" and will feature the label's artists. CBS has just inked melodic singer Horacio Molina, who has performed in many TV programs during 1964. Molina will start recording very soon. Another well known artist, Roberto Yanes, has already returned from his tour of New York, Santo Domingo, Costa Rica and Puerto Rico. Next year, Yanes will jet to Spain and probably pay a visit to other European countries.

Smiling faces at Phonogram, after the extraordinary sales performance of the "Folk Mass," cut by Ariel Ramirez and widely commented in this column some weeks ago. The LP is among the best selling albums of December, and passed the 40,000 sales mark in about a month. TV 13 aired a special program devoted to the Mass December 23, with Ramirez, Los Fronterizos and the Basílica del Socorro Choir.

Rodriguez Luque of Disc Jockey reported to Cash Box more details about the giant launching of the Barclay product in Argentina. After the successful release of an album and an EP by Charles Aznavour, the new ones are albums by Jacques Brel, Dalida, Les Chaussettes Noires, Frank Alamo, the Red Army Choir and LP devoted to tangos-European style, R&B and madison tunes. Undoubtedly, this is a very interesting addition to the Argentina catalog, since French music hasn't been too much available in this country.

Julio Korn Publishers expects very much from the new titles by Tito Rodriguez, included in his second boleros album, "En Mi Soledad" and "La Vendedora De Amor," and several other tropical music titles that may ride on the hit wave of the Carnival dance parties. Among these are "Oye Mi Consejo" and "Yo No Se," cut by Vitin Aviles and "Con Las Manos Abiertas," already waxed by Los Cinco Latino for Music Hall.

Music Hall is working hard on the promotion of teen singer Beto Fernan, both in the local and international fields. His records have been released by MH reps in Belgium, Japan, Spain and Venezuela, and other markets will be attained soon. Beto's latest recording is "Mama Provinciana," which is showing nice results in several parts of the country. 1965 will be a busy year for this artist, since he will have to fulfill several contracts in Buenos Aires and all through the country.

Mauricio Brenner of Fermata is happy with the success of "A Hard Day's Night," which is climbing fast in the lists and is a new smash in the Beatles' career. The tune has also several Spanish versions, among them one by Johnny Tedesco (RCA), and another by Sandro (CBS). The Beatles repertoire will be strengthened by several other recordings, including an album by Los Jets (Odeon Pops) and another one by Los Tammys (Microfon).

Ricardo Castellblanco of Edami is working on "Cuatro Guitarras," a tune premiered by Italian songstress Elsa Quarta during her recent visit to Argentina, and recorded by her in her country, and "Tell Me When," a British tune cut by Los Jets (Odeon Pops) and Los Buhos (CBS). Other noteworthy titles are "Que Es Lo Que Pasa," penned by Julio Gutierrez, and "Por Eso No Debes," written by Margarita Lecuona.

Otto Fey of Fenix infos about the first Nilser releases in Argentina, represented by his label. Titles are "Danza Y Romance" by Nilo Sergio, and "Romantic Music" by the Pops Symphonic Orchestra. Under the Verve banner, there is an interesting single by Kai Winding, "Dr. Novak," coupled with "Get Lost," which may get onto the charts. Fenix has also the representation of Magisom in Argentina and has a plan for local recordings of folk and pop music.

This album shows that Louise, being an agricultural engineer and therefore a woman of science, also is a woman with whom humor, tenderness, charm and precision balance harmoniously, who has found a personal style.

Eddy Defacq, an outstanding newcomer composer-performer, comes up with an album that could prove him to be the greatest discovery of 1965 in the "chanson"-field.

FRANCE

EMI's new stars, the Animals, featured on Dec. 15 for a one-night performance at the Olympia Music Hall. They made a big hit and the French audiences discovered that the group's repertoire is larger than "The House Of Rising Sun."

Roquefeuille, marketing and merchandising manager of EMI's French branch (Pathé Marconi), is back in town after a German tour. In Berlin he visited Allen, head of Electrola in Germany, to organize the release of French records in that country. Roquefeuille also visited Telefunken in Hamburg. He told us that Pathé Marconi just built a special studio to record movie soundtracks. This studio is able to produce more than 100 LP's each year.

Irving Green, president of Mercury records, just left Paris after a one-week stay. He visited Meyerstein, head of Philips in France, to make tighter contacts between the two firms. They particularly studied the release in U.S.A. of Michel Legrand's music from the Jacques Demy film: "Les Parapluies De Cherbourg."

Meyerstein was also visited by Langenberg, head of Philips International. At the same time Louis Hazan, head of Philips' variety department, went to London to study new English recordings.

After Philips and Veejay's world wide agreement, we are waiting for the first EP in France from Veejay's catalog. Philips announces it will be a Little Richard recording. The release is set for Feb.

Leon Cabat, head of Vogue Records, announces an important agreement with Cacheux, head of Compagnie Générale Du Disque, which releases a lot of American records on the Pacific label. This new contract will allow important distribution of Pacific product. This agreement has been inked for all territories where Vogue produces, imports, or exports.

Cabat is delighted with the strong position of Vogue stars in states. Petula Clark's song, "Downtown" is featured in the Cash Box Top 100. Warner Bros. released an LP by her, and Kapp will release one by Françoise Hardy. This girl will also go to New York during the last week of Jan. to do an important TV show.

Colette Renard is just back from an extensive Canadian and U.S. tour. She was featured in an important gala organized by the French ambassador in Washington, Hervé Alphand. The lark was very impressed when she learned that Vice President Elect Humphrey was in the auditorium (Colette Renard is cut by Vogue.)

Gérard Tournier, head of Agence Musicale Internationale, was visited by England's Sandie Shaw. He controls her repertoire by agreement with Freddie Poser. Tournier also met Lulu, who sings "Here Comes The Night," as she was in Paris for a Europe No. 1 live broadcast "Musicorama." On the same show we heard "the Animals" and Tournier announced that their last hit "Boum Boum" will be recorded in France by a big star.

Re: movie soundtracks, an agreement has just been concluded by Agence Musicale Internationale and Franco London Films for exclusive publishing by AMI representing Mellin for full-length films and for TV serials. "Robinson Crusoe" and "Don Quichotte" will be among the first to be published.

Tournier tells us he is quite satisfied by the good start of some of his songs especially: "Nobody I know" by Petula Clark (Vogue), "Je M'en Balance" by Danyel Gérard (DiscAZ), and "L'Ami Fidele" a song from Russia recorded by Enrico Macias (Pathé).

Ted Moura, head of Editions Amour and President Records is delighted by the very good results of six TV shows which featured the Italian journalist and singer John Foster. Foster's hit "Amore Scusami" has been adapted in French by Jean Broussolle, one of the nine singers of Compagnons de la Chanson. Fourteen recordings of this treatment have been released in France. There are versions by Dalida, Michel Cogoni, Franck Pourcel, Mathé Altéry, Georges Jouvin, etc.

Moura saw last month in Cash Box that Felix Stalh, a publisher in Stockholm, was interested in Albert Raisner's unpublished song "Dernier Train De l'Espace." He tells us that now this song is published by Editions Amour.

Jocelyne, the 14 year old girl singer on Polydor Records, will fly to N.Y.C. in Jan. for three TV shows.

Claude Pascal, manager the international department of Editions Tutti is back from London. He told us that it seems quite impossible to find good songs in that country. He visited about 30 publishers.

In London, Pascal met Marcel Stellman, who is European sales promotion manager for Decca, and who adapted Serge Gainsbourg's song "La Javanaise." English title is "Men Will Deceive You."

United Artists named a new manager of their Editions Associés and Dominion Editions, for France, Belgium and Luxembourg He is Eddie Adamis.

Douville, head of S.E.M.I. publishing, was recently visited by Mrs. Ralph Peer, president of Southern Music, a firm which S.E.M.I. represents in France. They talked over current publishing problems. Mrs. Peer is doing an extensive tour to visit European branches of the Southern organization.

Only few events happened just before and after Christmas in the record trade. Records manufacturers had things enough to do during the holidays distributing all their records.

At the Olympia, the last lead of the year is Marcel Amont. This singer, cut by Polydor, presented a one-man show.

Near Montparnasse, on the Bobino stage, we still have Georges Brassens.

Philips' young star Claude François will go for the first time to England and in U.S.A. He will not sing at this time. He just wants to study all the propositions he received from these countries. Claude will go to London in Jan. and he will fly to New York, Las Vegas, and Los Angeles during the second part of that month.

We learned a very interesting bit of information from Barclay. American film star Kirk Douglas will cut his first record in France. It will be an EP with four western style songs. The tunes are written by three young French composers.

Eddie Barclay announces too he will record in Jan. the first Laura Ulmer EP. Laura is Georges Ulmer's daughter and is 17 years old.

Claude Pascal, who manages international department of Tutti, met in London with composer Mitch Murray who wrote ten songs published by Tutti. The first song released in France is "Tu N'y Crois Pas" recorded by Alice Dona on Columbia.

Tutti will probably buy for France the rights of "I Love You Caroline." Sid Coleman, of Ardmere & Beechwood, is interested in Enrico Macias's song "L'île Du Rhône." He would like to see Macias to record the English treatment of the song himself.

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

1965

The Year To Unite

If ever the industry had an obligation to fulfill it would be the obligation to unite at all levels for the purpose of achieving victory in areas that are not necessarily concerned with the actual sale and operation of equipment. We are speaking particularly of the area of legislation where an industry can be stymied regardless of its ingenuity where manufacturing, distributing or operating is concerned.

For too many years, and this past twelve months has been certainly no exception, the law of the land has not always been favorable to the coin-operated machine and the people who comprise this industry. One of the reasons for much of the unfair legislative decrees has been the size of the voice denouncing such proposals from their inception. Mere numbers can often present a defense which stifles inequitable rulings before they gain broad recognition.

At the operator level, blanket membership in a local association is often enough to carry the financial burden of bringing the facts to the legislators and presenting in person the impressive picture of that industry in any given locale. While an apparently simple accomplishment, there are few associations which make claim to 100% membership.

The distributor is a unique individual but a vital link between the flow of equipment in territories across the country. The one thing all distributors have in common is the present problem of dealing with a territory's complement of operators on the one hand, location problems on the other, and again the hand of the law as it affects licenses, taxes, and credit. Every phase ultimately effects a sale, one way or the other. Distributor associations, locally, may enable the wholesaler to iron out common problems with less anxiety and expense, with gains for all. Nationally, the NCMDA might take steps to arrange for several meetings during the course of the year in order to look at these same situations from the national viewpoint.

MOA is as strong as its membership and unless local associations pave the way, membership cannot increase at the slow pace of one and two new dues-paying operators. Across-the-board dual memberships in both local and national associations has helped MOA become strong. Operators may well observe the power of a national association, and the advantages to be derived from such a trade group, when they consider past and present accomplishments of MOA in dealing with projects of the scope of a Celler Bill. The local association is the answer to national strength.

1965 should be the year in which the manufacturers of amusement machines voice a clear declaration of what their business is all about and in a way that carries this voice to the uppermost levels of government, so that the industry may continue to market equipment for every territory in the country instead of to a market which shrinks in size as a result of conflicting views. What is written here has been written before, and will more than likely have to be written again. But the cry of unity at all levels must continue to be heard. For as the association goes, so goes the industry. It is in this area that the problems become vital because they affect a complete unit—a pinball machine, a cigaret vendor, income from the play on every music machine, credit extended for an entire industry.

Before we can expect to succeed with the tools of our trade we must be certain that the path to this success is open. These problems are not localized in a person, a machine, or a location. They are widespread and affect the very life of this business. The year 1965 should be the year in which the individual—the operator, the distributor, the manufacturer—stands united. For this is the only way we can be certain that our business can continue to grow.

Williams-United Games Line Now Distributed By World Wide

CHICAGO—Nate Feinstein, of World Wide Distributing Company, distributors in this wide area for the Seeburg Corporation, advised this past week that as an aftermath of the recent Seeburg acquisitions of Williams Electronic Manufacturing Corporation and United Manufacturing Company the two amusement games lines are now being handled for distribution throughout this territory by World Wide.

Feinstein recalled the other day that in a recent policy speech at a Seeburg national distributor meeting in the Blackstone Hotel Seeburg Board Chairman Delbert Coleman announced that it was his intention and wish that all Seeburg distributors would be placed in the advantageous position of having all of the lines (music, vending machine, amusement games, and background music equipment) available for distribution in their respective territories.



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
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Associations Discuss Coinage Problem

CHICAGO—The National Automatic Merchandising Association took the lead last Tues. Dec. 29, at a meeting in the association's headquarters in this city, with officers of MOA, NVA and the National Laundry and Cleaning Council present, to attempt to formulate a successful plan of action toward the alleviation of the serious silver metal shortage. Congress it is felt, must be alerted to this problem as soon as possible.

Thomas Hungerford, the executive director of NAMA, chaired the meeting that was attended by board chairman Lou Casola, president Clint Pierce and managing director Fred Granger for MOA, Don Mitchell, secretary of NVA; and Ward Gill executive secretary of the Laundry and Cleaning Council.

This shortage, which has reached the critical stage along with the coin shortage, has aroused the vending and coin machine industries to an immediate action. However, Fred Granger explained, that all parties concerned are laboring towards this end.

Granger urged all members of MOA to contact their congressmen in Washington to impress upon them that alleviation of the silver and coin shortage is imperative at this time.

Herewith is NAMA's recently declared POSITION ON COIN SHORTAGE (dated, 11/10/64):

"The merchandising and service vending industry is vitally interested in any coinage decisions which affect coin-operated machines.

"The National Automatic Merchandising Association, in behalf of its industry, urges a solution to the coinage problem which will allow the continued operation of existing coin mechanisms.

"Therefore, we advocate the retention of sufficient silver content in the coinage to permit the continued use of present coin mechanisms, or the

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

Gottlieb optimistically based his belief that this exciting, new, colorfully cabinet flipper amusement game will achieve a "record high in sales in most of the world's coin machine markets" on the "fantastically high collection receipts" which have been garnered in all of the random locations "Sky-Line" flipper game has been installed for pre-testing purposes.

Syndicate Demonstrates Ability To Beat Slots, Says Sydney's Press

SYDNEY—Reports from the office of the Associated Press here have indicated the existence of a 10-man syndicate whose members have allegedly demonstrated to several newspaper reporters a legitimate system of beating slot machines.

With members of both the press and the Criminal Investigation Branch present, the ten men were described as having performed an ability to "crack" an extraordinary amount of jackpots in a three hour demonstration at one club. After watching the "unbelievable" performance, the men were advised by the Criminal Investigation Branch members that they had been doing nothing illegal in the process.

One reporter was quoted as saying; "Never did I see any tampering with or manipulation of the machine. Everything was perfectly fair—and bafflingly simple. The syndicate members put in their coins, pulled the handle—and collected the jackpot bonanza." "The secret appears to be in the handle-pulling action," another reporter stated. "Every so often the hand slips halfway down the lever. The lever is pulled gently for the greater part of its movement and then whipped through with a jerk," he declared.

One expected side effect to all this business—a sharp rise in the number of patrons in registered slot machine locations—began the very night the story broke, according to reports. A second side effect has also materialized—the syndicate advised that its members have already been barred from more than 20 locations, according to the reports. No official comment from the syndicate's publicity agency has thus far been received.

The pingame, which features 'Multi-Bumper' scoring on the playfield, offers a comical animation innovation on the light box which the distrib figures will guarantee to make the players laugh. . . . Bill Witsen, reporting excellent test location results with Bally's new 2-player set to premier next week.

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Chicago Chatter

Coinmen in this area look to a promising 1965 with keen optimism and anticipation. '64 has been reportedly an unusually active year in growth and sales accomplishment. There doesn't seem to be any reason for any halt in this upswing in total coin machine equipment sales, according to an almost unanimous consensus of opinions in coin-dom. . . . Patrick L. O'Malley, president and chief executive officer of Automatic Canteen Company of America, expects the record sales impetus (a 20% increase in sales for 1964, fiscal year ending Oct. 3) to carry over into 1965. And even hopes to better that record high. Pat is also anticipating fine results through the New Year with the manufacturing division of Canteen.

The introduction of new amusement equipment dominates the coin machine scene as the New Year comes in. 

Richard Howard. Beginning in mid-March, the weekend meetings will extend through early June with programming supplied by the association in addition to the business sessions of each state council, he advised.

As in 1964, several meetings are planned in areas which are not cov-

ered by state councils of NAMA in order to bring the program presentations within reach of all association members.

"Interest and attendance at last year's meetings has encouraged us to go ahead with a similar format, although the program will cover entirely different areas," said G. H. Tansey, the association's director of conventions and state council secretary. Dates and details of the program will be announced in a few weeks, he added.

ARA Exec Cites Service Expenditures As Fastest Growing Segment Of Economy

PHILADELPHIA—"Expenditures for services represent the fastest growing segment in our economy today," stated Davre J. Davidson, chairman of the board at Automatic Retailers of America, Inc., in a report issued last week. Davidson also predicted that, "in 1965, we will see an acceleration of such spending patterns, not only by individuals, but also by business and other organizations."

Davidson continued on to comment: "Since ours is primarily a service industry, we deem it a healthy sign that the rate of expansion for services is nearly double that for goods producing industries. This is an accurate barometer of the growing willingness of Americans to allocate increasing portions of their income for services. It is also proof of the opportunities that exist for those who can recognize and carry out these services in efficient ways.

"It is the area of services for businesses and institutions such as schools

and hospitals that we believe growth in 1965 will be most significant. More administrators in such organizations are accepting the concept of turning to competent, professional outside companies for help in handling support services apart from their primary roles.

"The market potential for institutional food services is approximately \$12 billion a year. Because of the recent combining of automated and personalized service of food and refreshments, the administrator can now turn with confidence to companies with the highly specialized resources required to carry out such support services.

"This, in turn, calls for continuing effort and research on the part of service organizations to examine client and customer needs carefully and accurately and then to supply an individually-tailored service or combination of services in order to meet these needs," Davidson concluded.

NAC Begins Heavy Membership Drive

Execs Prep For Fall Convention

CHICAGO—Two major committees of the National Association of Concessionaires are currently working on an intensive membership recruitment campaign which will blanket the entire country and reach into all segments of the concession-food service industries, it was announced last week by NAC president Edward S. Redstone, of the Northeast Drive-In Theatre Corporation, Boston.

The NAC membership committee, which is headed by Augie J. Schmitt, Houston Popcorn & Supply Company, Houston, Texas, NAC board chairman, is composed of the eight NAC regional vice-presidents. It is now in the process of selecting regional membership recruitment teams from their respective areas. There will be six NAC members on each regional team, representing concessionaires in diverse fields of the amusement-recreation industry, as well as manufacturers of equipment and suppliers to the concessions trade. In addition, the NAC Liaison Committee to the Candy, Tobacco and Related Industries, headed by NAC eastern regional vice-president Irving Shapiro of Concessions Enterprises, Boston, will concentrate heavily on these segments.

The current membership drive was instituted by the NAC Board during its recent convention in Chicago and is in line with the association's membership diversification program to include such segments of industries which participate in food service as amusement parks, pools, beaches,

rinks, auditoriums, arenas, department and discount stores, motels and others. NAC officials estimate that several thousand prospects will be personally contacted during the campaign and made aware of NAC's vital program and activities.

Growing interest in the 1965 Motion Picture and Concession Industries Trade Show being held at The Ambassador Hotel, in Los Angeles, October 27-30 is also very much in evidence according to Bert Nathan, NAC exhibit chairman. Even before the official trade show brochure has been issued, Nathan reported that advance reservations of forty-seven booths, which represents more than a third of the available exhibit space, has already been placed.

Louis L. Abramson, executive director of NAC, recently returned from Los Angeles where he inspected the Ambassador's convention and trade show facilities and conferred with officials of the hotel to set up preliminary arrangements for his organization's convention. The trade show, which is co-sponsored by the Theatre Owners of America, will run concurrently with the conventions of both organizations.

Abramson, who is also trade show administrator, said that the show will occupy 22,180 square feet in the Ambassador's Convention Center, located on the Casino Floor Level, which consists of the Ambassador Ballroom, Sunset Room, Boulevard Room and Foyer.

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
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
