Columbia Records is making a notable addition to its Legacy Collection series in "John Fitzgerald Kennedy—As We Remember Him." A vast recorded, verbal and pictorial portrait of the late President, the package contains two 12" LP's of interviews with people who were close to him in public and private life and a 242-page book of JFK-associated material, much of it being made public for the first time. The package was produced by Goddard Lieberson, president of Columbia Records, who is shown examining the finished product. The label has made it known that all royalties received from the set will be donated to the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library.

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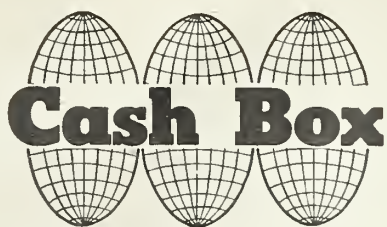

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There is a new way of looking at hit tunes. When music trade definitions were easier to come by, a hit tune was usually the product of a good number that was fortunate enough to receive a recorded rendition that sold enough copies to classify the song as a hit. Then, if the song were of such a nature that it could break away from its original disk version, it had the opportunity of going on to become a standard, thus settling down to the comfortable position of a copyright of consistent royalty value. But, whatever the merits of a hit song, it was rare indeed when one could turn the trick as yet another singles chart item.

This is hardly the case today. So varied are the sounds that can tickle the fancy of disk buyers that a hit of the recent past—whether it has the quality of a standard or not—can return with remarkable speed to the charts again. We have seen in recent months that a vocal version of a popular air can be completely set apart from its instrumental counterpart. Or a hit item done in one of the many forms of pop expression—and this is perhaps the key to the whole matter—can come on strong again when recorded in another (e.g. rock to jazz; rock to good music; folk to rock and so on). (A fascinating correlary here is that the markets for the various interpretations open to songs are individually strong enough to produce yet another successful singles disk.)

Among the many examples are "The In Crowd," first done as a rock vocal, then coming to roost on the charts again as a jazz instrumental, and the Beatles' "I Want To Hold Your

Hand," which became the subject of a startling A&R idea when it was done as a lush instrumental by the Boston Pops. A glance at this week's Top 100 will produce more, up-to-the-minute selections.

There is little doubt that the eclectic bearing of today's singles field has resulted in a newly-won longevity for the hit song. Besides the obvious increase in royalty accruals over a short period of time, a successful song stands a better chance of achieving evergreen status. But what about songs that are already established favorites?

They, too, as any chart in a given week will show, are becoming hits again, as surveyed in newer pop sound idioms.

We see two important conclusions to be drawn from the aforementioned. One is that there should be less concern on the part of labels that they may have missed out on a current hit. With an imaginative eye on the number of sounds that can make it today, a hit as recent as last week's best-seller listing can have a strong (if not stronger) return engagement on the charts. Secondly, there is a great opportunity for publishers to rummage through years back successes, even widely-exposed standards, and exploit them anew.

Thanks to the kind of consumer acceptance whereby there seems to be no-holds-barred in the types of sounds that can win chart sales, we are witnessing a phenomenon of great consequence that sees unparalleled saturation of hit songs.

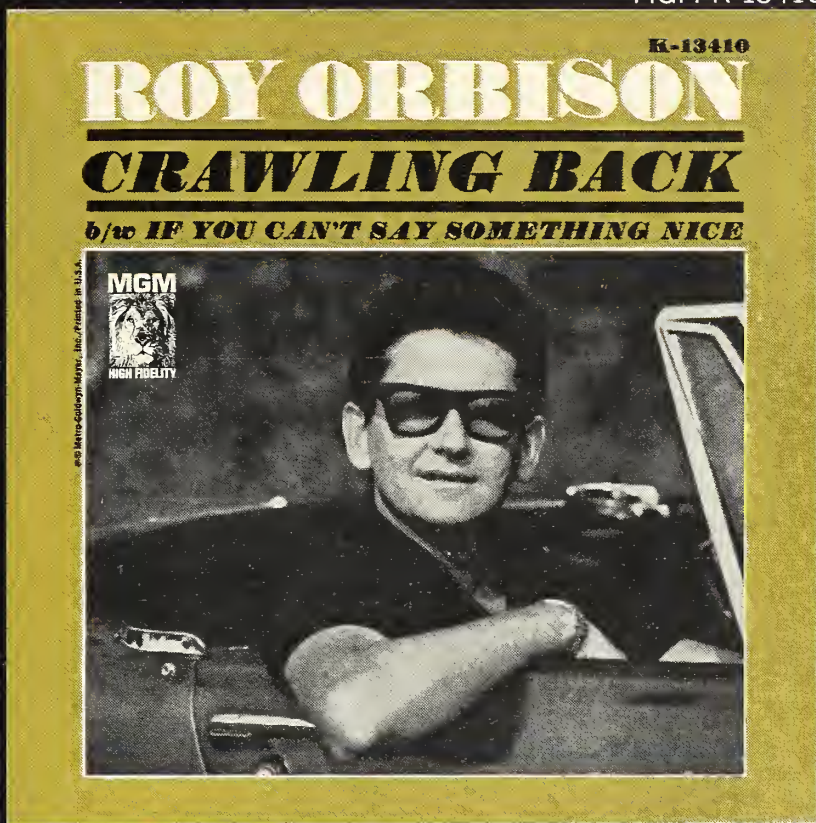

Victor Unveils 32 New LP's For Nov.

NEW YORK—RCA Victor has scheduled 32 albums for release during the month of Nov., including 11 in the Red Seal line and 5 under Camden Billing. The Label's listing is highlighted by the original cast album of the just opened "On A Clear Day You Can See Forever." The balance of the package includes "Hilo Hattie," "Pretty Miss Norma Jean," "Down The Line" by the Astronauts, "Classic Bossa Nova" by the Marty Gold Orchestra, "Juan Serrano Plays Popular Music Of Spain And The Old World," "The Exciting Joe Williams," a Homer and Jethro disk titled "The Old Crusty Minstrels," Skeeter Davis' "Skeeter Sings Standards," "Once Over Lightly" by Hank Locklin, Elvis Presley's "Harum Scarum," "Heartbreak Trail—A Tribute To The Sons Of The Pioneers" by Hank Snow, Joao Donato's "The New Sound Of Brazil," "Dick Kallman Drops In As Hank" and "Andre Previn Plays Music Of Young Hollywood Composers."

The 11 Red Seal releases comprise "Pictures At An Exhibition (Moussorgsky)/Prelude In C-Sharp Minor (Rachmaninoff)/Toccata (Prokofieff)" all by Lorin Hollander, "Keyboard Giants Of The Past, Vol. 2,"

"Haugtussa (Grieg) Songs By Brahms, R. Strauss, Kramer And Carpenter" by Kirsten Flagstad, Beniamino Gigli's "8 Arias-8 Songs," "Dances Of Poland" by Wanda Landowska, "Bartok/Violin Concerto No. 2, Stravinsky/Violin Concerto" by Silverstein with Eric Leinsdorf and the Boston Symphony, "Bartok/Sonatas Nos. 1 And 2 For Violin And Piano" by Bress and Reiner, "Haydn/Theresien Mass" by Grossman, the Vienna Boys Choir and the Vienna Konzerthaus Chamber Orchestra, "Jubilate Deo—Music Of Aichinger, Allegri, Di Lasso, Palestrina, Scarlatti, Victoria" by Schrems and the Regensburg Boys Choir, Leonard Pennario's "The Debussy Preludes" and "That Day With God—November 24, 1963."

The new additions to the Camden budget line include "Discotheque For Polka Lovers" by the Johnny Vadal Orchestra, "Living Guitars Play Music From The Country," "TV Country Jamboree," "The Sweetheart Tree And Other Film Favorites" by the Living Strings and the Ray Martin Orchestra's "Music From Thunderball And Other Thrillers."

3-Pronged Album Release From Mercury

CHICAGO—Mercury Records' vice president in charge of sales, Kenny Myers, has announced a three-pronged package goods release heralded as "More Pop ARTists From Mercury."

With the current emphasis on country and western music nationally, the label harkened back to its early summer program, "America's Brand Of Country Music," adding four all-hit albums by Dave Dudley, Faron Young, George Jones and Roy Drusky. Myers terms it "the strongest C&W unit in the entire history of the firm."

The two pop albums include Freddie and the Dreamers "Frantic Freddie," and "More Genius Of Jankowski," by Horst Jankowski.

In the classical portion of the program, the label has Howard Hanson conducting the Eastman-Rochester Orchestra in a first stereo recording of his own "Piano Concerto" coupled with the world premiere of John La

Montaine's "Birds Of Paradise." Two favorites in light classical music, Gershwin's "American In Paris" and Offenbach's "Gaité Parisienne" are paired in a new offering by the Minneapolis Symphony under Antal Dorati. Cellist Janos Starker, accompanied by Pianist Gyorgy Sebok, contribute the Brahms Cello and Piano Sonatas. The final classical release is pianist Gina Bachauer performing Chopin's "Piano Concerto No. 2 In F Minor, Opus 21" and "Fantasia In F Minor, Opus 49" in conjunction with the London Symphony under Dorati.

Myers and national sales manager Dick Sherman also announced an upcoming all-out push on the seven Johnny Mathis albums in the catalog. Mathis has just announced a consistent series of video appearances on programs, which now include the Ed Sullivan, Red Skelton, Andy Williams and Dean Martin shows.

Liberty Palm Springs Meet

HOLLYWOOD—The executive staff of Liberty Records and its subsidiary labels will go to Palm Springs Wednesday Oct. 27, for a series of meetings all day Thursday on behalf of Jan., 1966 product.

Liberty president Al Bennett, an avid golf enthusiast, suggested the Palm Springs junket because of the Music Industry's 6th Annual Golf tourney, which will be held in the same city on Oct. 29-31. Majority of the label's staffers will be on the greens at the Canyon Country Club, also the site of the Liberty meet.

Confabs will encompass A&R schedules and marketing procedures relative to promotion, ad-merchandising and publicity.

Decca: The Label's Biggest Ad Push In 20 Years

NEW YORK—Decca Records' "most imposing" national advertising campaign in the past 20 years has been announced by Leonard Schneider, executive vp.

A series of distinctive full-page magazine advertisements is planned during the 1965-6 merchandising season in The New Yorker, Time Magazine, Seventeen, TV Guide, the Schwann Catalogue, and the Philharmonic Lincoln Center Program, while several "junior pages" in color are scheduled for Esquire and two-page spreads in Country Song Roundup. A series of special insertions will also appear in Senior Scholastic Magazine.

Major record consumer markets throughout the country will be exploited through full-page advertisements, some of which will be in full color, in the Sunday magazine supplements of the New York Times, Chicago Tribune, Los Angeles Times, Dallas Times Herald, San Francisco Examiner and Chronicle, Atlanta Journal Constitution and the Boston Globe.

"The tremendous response in the trade and among record-collectors to the Decca roster of artists in both the popular and classical fields," Schneider said, "indicates that a campaign of this nature and magnitude should engender highly profitable results in record outlets throughout America." Charles Schlaifer and Company is the agency.

Columbia Offers 'Legacy' JFK Tribute

NEW YORK—"As We Remember Him," a lavishly produced picture of the late President Kennedy from the people who knew him, who were around him, is the latest addition to the Legacy Collection of Columbia Records.

The package, upholding the distinctive approach to Legacy entries, consists of 2-LPs and a 252-page book. The recorded portion is the result of over 400 hours of tape interviews—most of them specifically recorded for the package—with political associates and the family of the President, who was slain on Nov. 22, 1963. The book itself contains much, verbally and pictorially, that has never been published before. In fact, it will be marketed separately by its publisher, Atheneum, on Nov. 9. A pre-publication price will be \$14.95, and there'll be a \$17.50 tag following its official publication. The Columbia package will sell at a suggested list price of \$19.95, the most expensive Legacy Collection yet offered.

The package was produced by Goddard Lieberson, president of Columbia, who also wrote the preface to the book. At a press conference at the label's New York offices last week, Lieberson noted that the recorded tribute to JFK had produced an industry first: a book grown out of a recording project. The exec further explained that all captions printed in the book were drawn from words spoken on the disks. There is a special foreword by President Johnson.

The LP's and book are housed in a library slipcase, which has a book sleeve cover. However, color artwork on the slipcase can stand on its own.

Narration is handled by newscaster Charles Kuralt, who also served as special editor of the project.

The book is said to contain the most comprehensive photo biography of President Kennedy, with more than 200 pictures, some published for the first time; in addition, there are over 7000 reproductions of actual letters in JFK's own hand, official documents and other correspondence never before published.

All royalties from the package will

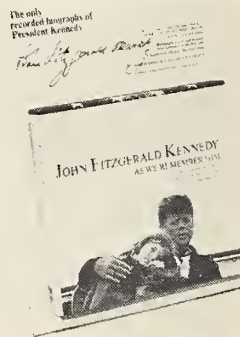
be donated to the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library.

The Ad-Merchandising Program

At the press conference, Stan Kavan, director of merchandising, covered the extensive ad-merchandising plans in store for the set, which, he declared, could well be the big Christmas gift item among 1965's disk efforts.

To help achieve this goal, the package will be featured in the label's full-color newspaper supplement, "When's Your Birthday," which is expected to reach more than 85 million readers; national ads will be placed in major "opinion makers" publications, such as Time, (its professional edition), The Reporter and the Saturday Review. Also, the complete package will be sent to all "VIPS" who were associated with and contributed to the preparation of the set; all syndicated columnists, record reviewers in key markets and major magazines for consideration as feature editorial and review material; a selected list of personages, prepared by Lieberson. Merchandising aids will include a 300 line ad mat, a 4-page, 5" by 7" brochure on the entire Legacy Collection, emphasizing the JFK set.

Columbia also figures it will get free advertising via the distribution of the book through the Literary Guild of America, which will offer the book at its reduced cost to more than 500,000 of its members.

Sherman Directs Merc Sales

CHICAGO—Dick Sherman, product manager of the Limelight and Emarcy labels, has added the national sales manager slot of the Mercury label to his responsibilities. In making the appointment, Kenny Myers, Mercury vice-president in charge of sales, pointed out that Sherman will continue to helm both of the all-jazz labels in addition to topping the Mercury national sales picture. Sherman will be working in cooperation with Myers.

Sherman, in stepping into the Mercury sales managership, replaces Dick Bruce, who has left the organization. Sherman started in the record industry with Columbia Records as a district manager in the central Midwest. He was alternately moved to the important New York-New Jersey district by Columbia and from there to the Home Music Library Division. He later joined New York Record Distributors, selling premium package product nationally for the Manny Wells' operation.

Joining Mercury in 1962, he covered the Southwest as a regional sales manager.

He was appointed National Field Sales Manager, working from the Chicago home office in June, 1964. He became Limelight product manager in January, 1965.

Kapp Drive On Jones Via 'Election Sweepstakes'

NEW YORK—Jack Jones is the Kapp label's nominee for singer of the year, and one of the label's most extensive sales programs is in the works to get the company's choice across.

The drive, involving Jones and dozen Kapp LP's, runs for the month of Nov. and incorporates the timely theme of "Election Sweepstakes," with dealerships across the country being turned into "headquarters" where consumers can take part in a sweepstakes drawing.

The drawing, which will be held Dec. 20th in New York, will award more than 1,000 consumer prizes with a value of nearly \$30,000. Those dealers whose Election Sweepstakes Headquarters are the source of winning entry forms will receive duplicate prizes.

A total of 1,112 prizes will be awarded. Two grand prizes will be RCA "Wayland" model color TV sets. Ten RCA Victor portable stereo phonos (Mark I) will be awarded as second prizes. One hundred third prize winners will receive complete sets of all 12 Jack Jones albums, while 1,000 fourth prizes of the current Jones album, "There's Love and There's Love," will be awarded. Dealers whose stores are the source of winning entries will win duplicate prizes.

Distrib managers and salesmen are also eligible for important prizes as a result of their participation in the Jack Jones drive. The manager of the distrib winner west of the Mississippi will receive a trip for two to Hawaii. The winner east of the Mississippi will receive a similar trip for two to Puerto Rico. In addition, 25 deluxe "World Watches" will be awarded to the distrib salesmen in a

Bob Sour Elected President Of BMI

NEW YORK—Bob Sour has been elevated to president of Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI). His election to the post was announced last week by BMI's board of directors.

Sour, who was serving as the performing rights organization's vp in charge of writer administration when elected, succeeds the late Bob Burton, who died last March as a result of a fire in his hotel suite in Vancouver, B.C., Canada, where he was attending a broadcaster's convention.

Sour became a member of BMI in 1940 as a lyric editor. He is the lyricist of a number of standards, including "We Could Make Such Beautiful Music Together" and a co-author of "Body & Soul." Latter tune offers an interesting sidelight to the Sour appointment, since the song is an ASCAP-cleared number. Sour's counterpart at ASCAP, Stanley Adams, has a BMI-cleared lyric to his credit, "What a Difference A Day Made."

Sour, a native New Yorker in his 60's, is a 1925 graduate of Princeton University. After graduation, he went to work for a real estate bond house.

From 1930 to 1938, he was a member of the New York Curb Exchange, and during the following year he was an associate producer for the Federal Theater. He was named vp in charge of writer relations at BMI in 1956.

Bobby Byrne To Head A&R At Command

NEW YORK—Bobby Byrne, name band leader during the Big Band era and associate director of A&R at Command Records, has been named to head A&R activities at the label.

The appointment of Byrne, with Command since 1960, was made known at a luncheon last week (18) at the Friars Club for trade paper editors. Byrne was present, as were Larry Newton, president of ABC-Paramount Records, of which Command is a subsid, and Loren Becker, recently named managing director of the company.

At the informal gathering, Becker said that the company planned to continue on a course that would "selfishly guard the reputation of Command." He said that the label would retain its current artist roster and administrative personnel, who would be in line, however, for additional responsibilities. Becker indicated that there would be some changes in product and merchandising concepts. The label's distrib network will also continue under its present set-up, he declared. The exec predicted that 1966 would be the label's best financial showing ever.

Command will retain an LP release schedule of about 18 to 20 albums a year (see below for six new releases). The company, Becker said in reply to a question, did not plan to produce a singles market line, but would rely on the concept of drawing likely-to-succeed singles from albums.

During the heyday of the Big Band era, Bobby Byrne's orchestra, featuring him on trombone, played many of the leading ballrooms and theaters in the country, including New York's Paramount Theater, the current home of Command (Command and its parent company soon move into the ABC Building on 6th Avenue).

Byrne was born on a farm near Columbus, Ohio, but his family moved to Detroit when he was five. His musical know-how came via his father, who was supervisor of music of the Detroit public school system. His dad taught him to play the trombone, cello, piano and several percussion instruments and also taught him composition and arranging. He received a thorough grounding in classical as well as pop music.

His skill on the trombone while he was playing in the Cass Technical School band in Detroit attracted the attention of the Dorsey Brothers. They enticed him to leave school and join the Dorseys in 1935. He spent five years with them. When Tommy left to form his own band, Byrne supplanted him on the trombone and stayed with Jimmy.

In 1939 he formed his own band and played all over the country until 1942, when he enlisted as an aviation cadet. He became a fighter pilot, and is today in the ready reserve as a Major.

After his discharge from the air force in 1945, he went back into the band business until 1951. He then played trombone on recording and

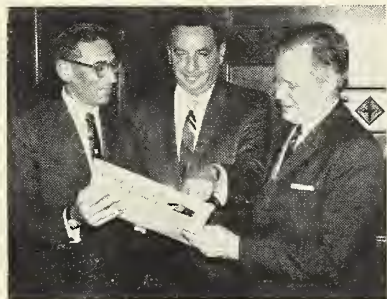
television dates, the latter including the Hit Parade, the Milton Berle Show and the Perry Como Show. He was musical director of Steve Allen's first NBC-TV show.

SIX NEW ALBUMS

Six new albums are being released by Command this month, three popular and three classical. The pop albums are Tony Mottola's "Love Songs Mexico/S.A.," Charles Magnante's "Romantic Accordion" and the Ray Charles Singers' "Young Lovers on Broadway."

The classical releases include two albums by William Steinberg and the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra. They are Brahms Symphony No. 4 and Beethoven's Symphony No. 5. Another new release is a package of the four complete Brahms symphonies by the Pittsburgh Orchestra.

In the coming season, Steinberg will again be guest conductor with the New York Philharmonic and he will appear with the Pittsburgh Orchestra at Carnegie Hall. Command is planning a heavy promotion schedule to coincide with the New York appearances this season.

Capitol Withdraws Beatles' Deck

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records has withdrawn its latest Beatles disk from the market, a coupling of "Boys" and "Kansas City." An announcement said that the label decided to stop the release—initially part of the label's Starline Series—because the performance it contains are "no longer representative of the Beatles as they perform today." "Boys" can be heard on a Capitol LP, "The Early Beatles," while "Kansas City" appears on another album, "Beatles VI." There was speculation offered that noted that the reason for the single's withdrawal centered around the "Boys" portion, since it may have been cut in a period in which Capitol and Brian Epstein, manager of the team, had agreed would not produce any new Beatles' singles.

Country Music Museum-Hall On The Way

NASHVILLE — While four thousand people attended the country music convention in Nashville last week, celebrating the 40th anniversary of radio station WSM-Nashville and country music showcase the Grand Ole Opry, the Country Music Association held a celebration of its own as it concluded its 7th year of existence, and most successful and productive year to date.

On Oct. 21 the CMA held a membership meeting at the Andrew Jackson Hotel in Music City and, in addition to its annual election of board members, the organization highlighted the steps it had made in the past year for all those people connected with country music.

One of those steps was the cementing of the plans for the long awaited country music museum and hall of fame. The construction of the building, which was first proposed several years ago, will officially begin early next year; however, most of the actual work was done in the past year or so. Pledges for donations to the building fund have now exceeded \$300,000, with the bulk being donated by many companies associated with the c&w field. With a minimum organizational pledge of \$10,000, donors include Acuff-Rose Music, BMI, BMI Canada, Capitol Records, Cedarwood Music, Central Songs, Columbia Records, Decca Records, Hill and Range Music, Hubert Long Talent, Mercury Records, MGM Records, Painted Desert Music, Pamper Music, Peer International Music, RCA Victor Records, Starday Records, Tree Music, Randy Wood and WSM-Nashville. Almost 60 artists have participated by signing up for the museum's "walk way of stars," with pledges of \$1,000 each.

Another major project on the part of CMA was the launching of the CMA Album, which was produced for the furtherance of country music. All services that went into the makeup of the LP, including talent, labels, production and pressing, was done gratis by the people involved and all proceeds will go to the CMA. The organization was given a \$25,000 advance against the guaranteed sale of the album, and, to date, has received addi-

tional royalties of approximately \$16,000 over and above the advance.

This year the organization staged the First Annual Pro-Celebrity Invitational Golf Tournament which was handled by Starday Records' prexy Don Pierce, chairman of the CMA. The tournament, held on Oct. 17, drew top names from both the world of golf and the entertainment world. The great response to the tourney has prompted the association to consider making it a permanent Nashville fixture.

The CMA has also begun an investment plan, called the Balanced Retirement and Investment Program, for its members. This program, handled by McCall and Associates has been set up to insure artists and other country music personnel against hard financial times in their old age.

CMA president Tex Ritter, closing his second and last year in office, took time during the meeting to present two awards to country music representatives. One of the awards, the Connie B. Gay, was given posthumously to former lawyer and BMI president Judge Robert Burton, who died this year after doing an outstanding job for the country music organization. His award was accepted by Sidney Kaye, chairman of the board of BMI. The other award, the President's Award, was given to guitar manufacturer Leo Fender.

Voting by members of the CMA was concluded with the following named people being elected to executive offices; Hal Cook chairman, Bill Denny president, Frances Preston exec vee, Bill Williams, Jack Loetz, Jack Stapp and Ray Harton vice presidents, Ken Nelson secretary, Kenny Myers asst. secretary, Dan McKinnon treasurer and Larry Moeller asst. treasurer.

Although this year was an exceptional one for the organization, everyone had high hopes and plans for an even greater year in 1966. As retiring president Tex Ritter stated, the CMA is "on the threshold of a great and tremendously interesting year."

Ford Foundation To Give U.S. Symphonies \$85 Mil

NEW YORK—In a precedent-shattering move, the Ford Foundation announced last week grants and endowment funds totaling \$85 million to about 50 symphony orchestras throughout the U.S.

The foundation program will be in two forms: (1) direct grants totaling \$21 million; (2) grants for endowment based on a \$64 million trust fund to be established by the foundation, which the orchestras will be required to match with funds raised from other sources on a 1-to-1 or 2-to-1 basis.

The monies represent the largest sum that any foundation has ever allocated at one time to one of the arts. The previous record was the \$7.7 million that the foundation gave to further professional ballet in 1963.

The objectives of the Ford music program are to strengthen orchestras, most of which experience perennial crises in financing by substantially increasing their seasons. The foundation, the nation's largest philanthropic trust, also wants to improve the low financial state of musicians thru longer employment. It is hoped that the plan will also increase quality by enabling musicians to devote their major energies to orchestras, and to attract more talented young people to professional careers in music.

The orchestras have not yet been chosen. They will be selected sometime before the spring from a list of 58 of the leading symphonic groups in the U.S. The grants will range from \$600,000 to \$2.5 million.

The tune is a twangy, low-down blues-drenched ode all about a real independent type of fella who does just as he pleases. "I'm Going To Change The World" is an interesting, rhythmic bluesy handclapper.

"If You Can't Say Something Nice" is lyrical, sweeping, chorus-backed romantic tearjerker in a traditional Orbison vein.

NEW YORK—The All Night Workers, a vocal-instrumental folk quintet composed entirely of Syracuse University undergraduates, has been signed to Pickwick City Records by A&R man Terry Phillips. The crew, which originally recorded for Philips on the Round Sound label, (both are wholly-owned subsidiaries of Pickwick International) has been playing the college circuit for the past two years.

4 NARAS Trustees Elected In L.A.

LOS ANGELES—Lou Busch, Ernest Gold, Neely Plumb, and Morris Stoloff have been elected national trustees to the national board of NARAS, the disk academy, by the Los Angeles chapter's board of governors. Gold had been active as a local board member in the 1963 to 1965 period, while Busch, Plumb and Stoloff are currently on the Board. Stoloff has served as alternate trustee for the past year. New Trustees join incumbents Mack David, Pete King, Dave Pell and F. M. Scott on the national board, which is comprised of reps from all chapters of the academy.

Supreme Court Upholds Decision In ASCAP's Favor

NEW YORK—The United States Supreme Court has upheld a Court of Appeals decision affirming ASCAP's right to refuse to quote Metromedia, Inc., operator of a chain of broadcasting stations, a rate to be applied to a form of license dictated by Metromedia itself.

Metromedia had attempted to compel ASCAP to quote a rate for the use of its repertory in terms of a particular method of computation devised by Metromedia. When ASCAP refused to quote rates on that unique form, the broadcaster sought to have ASCAP held in contempt of court for violating the provisions of a Consent Decree in the Federal Court in 1950.

Chief Judge Sylvester J. Ryan, of the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, dismissed the Metromedia petition. In upholding this decision in the Society's favor, the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit, observed: "... Metromedia has no right conclusively to determine certain elements of the 'fee' and then to require ASCAP, under pain of contempt, to quote a matching percentage figure. On the contrary, the decree gives ASCAP the initiative in proposing the entire formula, contemplates further negotiations if this appears unreasonable, and directs an application to the court in case of a stalemate. Thus far, it is Metromedia—not ASCAP—which has failed to follow the route by the decree."

The Supreme Court last week refused to review the decision of the Court of Appeals and dismissed, for want of jurisdiction, the Metromedia appeal which sought to have the Supreme Court review Judge Ryan's decision in direct appeal.

ASCAP President Stanley Adams, in learning of the decision, said: "All the members of the Society are deeply gratified by the action by the United States Supreme Court. We congratulate the society's general Counsel, Herman Finkelstein, and special counsel Honorable Simon H. Rifkind, and their associates, on their success."

Capitol Execs Confer With EMI Counterparts

HOLLYWOOD—Alan W. Livingston, president of Capitol Records, will head a delegation of six key execs in the Capitol family who arrive in London this week (25) at the time of the annual Electric & Musical Industries (EMI) board of directors meeting to discuss various aspects of the American and English disk industries.

In addition to Livingston, others in attendance will be—Stan Gortikov, president of Capitol Records Distributing Corp.; Voyle Gilmore, vice-president of A&R; Lloyd W. Dunn, Capitol vp; George R. Jones, vice-president of Manufacturing and Engineering, and M. S. Hardy, Treasurer.

The six executives will join Glenn E. Walliehs, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Capitol, who arrived in England last week.

Following the Board meeting, Livingston said a series of discussions would be held between the Capitol execs and their EMI counterparts. At that time, various related problems will be brought up and new ideas for both the American and English industry will be discussed.

"In the past few years," Livingston said, "we have developed an extremely close relationship with EMI. The success that our artists have enjoyed in England and that EMI's have had in America has led to a considerable strengthening of those ties. We now feel that there are many common problems, and many of them may be solved through the series of discussions we have planned for next week between the Capitol executives and their EMI counterparts."

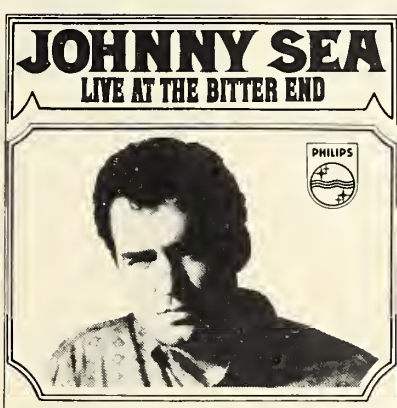

Other changes taking place in the broadcasting area include that of WRFM-New York, which has increased its power from a total of 39,500 watts effective radiated power to 75,000 watts total vertical and horizontal e.r.p., with FCC approval. In addition, WDAF-FM-Kansas City, Mo. has inaugurated separate program service for the major part of its broadcasting day. The station will continue to simulcast programs heard on WDAF-AM during morning and early afternoon hours.

After the first demonstration, which caused a major traffic jam, a policeman has been stationed in the area to direct the flow of traffic. The station has had Friday Night Hops ever since the opening of the new studios and they are now being dubbed "The Discotheque Hop," and will also feature the discotheque dancers.

Shades of Phineas Fogg, KNX-Hollywood is at it again! During the recent Los Angeles County Fair, the station lofted its well-known radio balloon and held a contest to see which listener could best estimate the height to which the balloon would ascend. A city councilman from Garden Grove, Calif. made the closest guess—15,700 feet, which was only nine feet off the actual record-breaking height of 15,691 feet to which famed aeronaut Don Piccard brought the gas bag. The mark breaks the current official record for hot-air balloon flights of 8,600 feet, held by Mark Pasley, and a record (pending recognition) of approximately 10,500 feet, set by Brenda Bogen.

WOWO-Ft. Wayne personality John Cigna recently hosted a plane-load of Fort Wayne area theatre lovers on a tour of top New York shows now appearing on Broadway. The "Show Plane Tour" left Fort Wayne Oct. 22 and returned Oct. 24. While in New York, Cigna and his group took in the Great White Way biggies "Hello Dolly" and "Golden Boy" and then took off on a tour of the United Nations and a round of shopping.

Former gal for all seasons at WHK-Cleveland, redhead Carol Crowley, who recently joined Ken Draper's Cleveland contingent at WCFL-Chicago, is now packing her suitcases again to become Mrs. Wm. Karm and move to Los Angeles. She tells us she is interested in air work or public relations in the L.A. area.

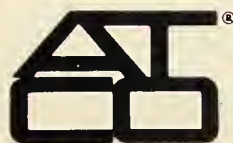

ALBUMS REVISITED

PERSUASIVE PERCUSSION



PERSUASIVE PERCUSSION, VOL. 1

"Persuasive Percussion, Vol. 1" was perhaps the LP that put the stereo disk on the map. Much like Milton Berle, whose antics in the early days of TV was credited with selling millions of sets, this album undoubtedly brought to light the startling musical aspects of stereo sound on records. The stereo disk, as tradesters will

recall, got off to a slow start, and one of the reasons often cited was a lack of recordings with effective stereo interest on a musical level. "Persuasive Percussion" helped fill that void when it was first marketed in early of 1959 as Command's first release. The deluxe package, with striking artwork by Joseph Albers (see cut), was an immediate number 1 smash. Almost seven years later, Command can report that "Persuasive Percussion, Vol. 1 (there were, subsequently, three other volumes plus four volumes of "Provocative Percussion," not to mention cut-rate copies of the Command style) is among its Top 12 sellers. It's simply, the label says, that the LP is still considered a prime "starter" disk by new stereo phono purchasers. Sales are said to average 150,000 copies a year. There have been \$5 million in sales on the album to date, Command says.

Atco Releases British Smash

NEW YORK—Chris Andrews' British hit, "Yesterday Man," is being released in the U. S. this week by Atco Records. The disk, issued only four weeks ago in England, is presently zooming up the British charts.

"Yesterday Man" is Andrews' first hit in Britain as a performer, but he has long been one of England's outstanding pop songwriters. He is the composer of a string of hits for Sandie Shaw and Adam Faith, including "Girl Don't Come," "I'll Stop At Nothing," "Long Live Love," etc. Andrews has been singing and writing songs for many years, and to date has penned well over 300 tunes.

Deal to release deck on Atco was made by Atlantic v.p. Jerry Wexler when he was in England last month. Wexler made the U. S. distribution arrangement with Evelyn Taylor, manager of Adam Faith and Sandie Shaw, who produced the hit.

'Star Dust' Writers Back With New Crosby Number

NEW YORK—Bing Crosby, whose "White Christmas" recording remains the unchallenged leader among all holiday and seasonal songs, has just recorded a brand new tune, "The White World Of Winter," for Reprise Records. The song is the first effort of the recently reunited team of Hoagy Carmichael and Mitchell Parish, who teamed on one of the all-time evergreens, "Star Dust."

The Richard Organization has acquired "The White World Of Winter," and a major exploitation drive is on the drawing boards according to TRO general professional manager, Happy Goday. The Crosby deck is the first of numerous new recordings expected.

Strong interest in the song is already being evidenced among television producers and radio programmers, with substantial usage anticipated in the approaching holiday period and winter season.

Barbara Lewis, who is currently scoring with "Make Me Your Baby" on Atlantic #19 (on this week's Top 100), was born twenty-one years ago in Detroit. She grew up and attended high school in the suburban Detroit area. The lark began writing and singing at an extremely early age, having come from a family of musicians.

Barbara reluctantly brought some of her tunes to Ollie McLaughlin one day hoping that he might be able to use them. He immediately saw great possibilities in her voice as well as her songs and decided to record her.

The songstress has written over thirty songs, including her present chart-rider.

When she is not on the road or at a recording session the artist spends her free time drawing and painting.

Changin' Times



The Changin' Times, who are currently zooming up the charts with their initial Phillips release of "Pied Piper," consist of two ex-songwriters: Artie Kornfeld and Steve Duboff. Their name derives from the well-known Bob Dylan-penned tune.

Music had been a hobby for both before they turned their individual talents to professional songwriting. Artie has written hits for Dusty Springfield, the Shirelles, Jan & Dean, Jay and the Americans, etc. Steve, newer to the trade, has written for Teresa Brewer and the Exciters.

The boys met in the office of Chardon Music, one of the pubberies headed by indie producers Charley Koppelman and Don Rubin. Inevitably they turned to performing and the Koppelman-Rubin team produced "The Pied Piper" as their first release. The rest is history.

Valiant Releases Charles Boyer LP

NEW YORK—Valiant Records last week released Charles Boyer's first recorded album of songs. The LP contains a dozen, long-standing Boyer favorites (e.g. "What Now My Love?," "I Believe," "Hello, Young Lovers," etc.) which have both a nostalgic and personal significance to him. The disk is tabbed "Where Does Love Go" after the vet thespian's first single released early last summer.

The album was produced for Valiant by A&R head Barry De Vorzon with Boyer's late son, Michael. Tommy Oliver arranged and conducted the recording sessions, in which 50-piece orchestra and choral group provided the musical background.



PICTURE OF SUCCESS—As it goes into its third year, Picturetone Music, the Wes Farrell-Phil Kahl publishing operation, can look back on a potent twelve month score. Picturetone had the number one song in the country, "Hang On Sloopy" by the McCoys and two top ten decks by Jay & The Americans, "Come A Little Bit Closer" and "Let's Lock The Door."

According to Farrell, "the giant is 'Sloopy,'" which Farrell wrote with Bert Berns. He continued, "we now have fifteen records on various versions of the song and it is already in the 'top ten' in England both as a single and an EP by the Yardbirds. In France, 'Sloopy' has just been cut by the Les Surfs."

The artists who have recorded Picturetone's songs include the Beatles, Jay & The Americans, Chubby Checker, Dusty Springfield, the Animals, the Yardbirds, Timi Yuro, Dion, Freddie Cannon, Trini Lopez, Bobby Rydell, Dave Clark Five and Del Shannon. Among Picturetone's biggest songs, not including their three BMI Award tunes, have been "Shabby Little Hut," "Down The Road I Go," "Think Of The Good Times," "Goodbye Baby Goodbye," "Hello Pretty Girl," "Lazy Elsie Molly" and "Baby Let Me Follow You Home."

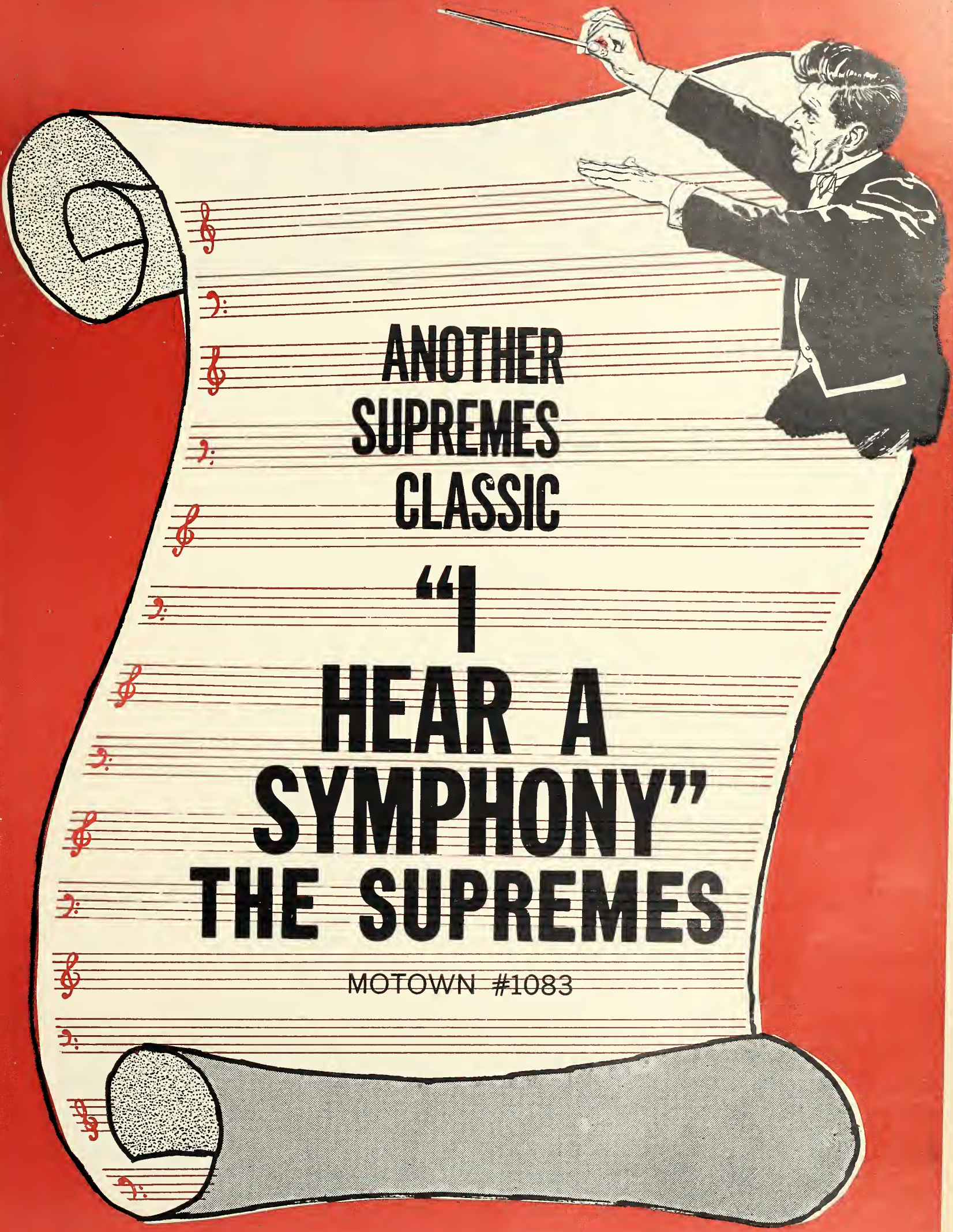

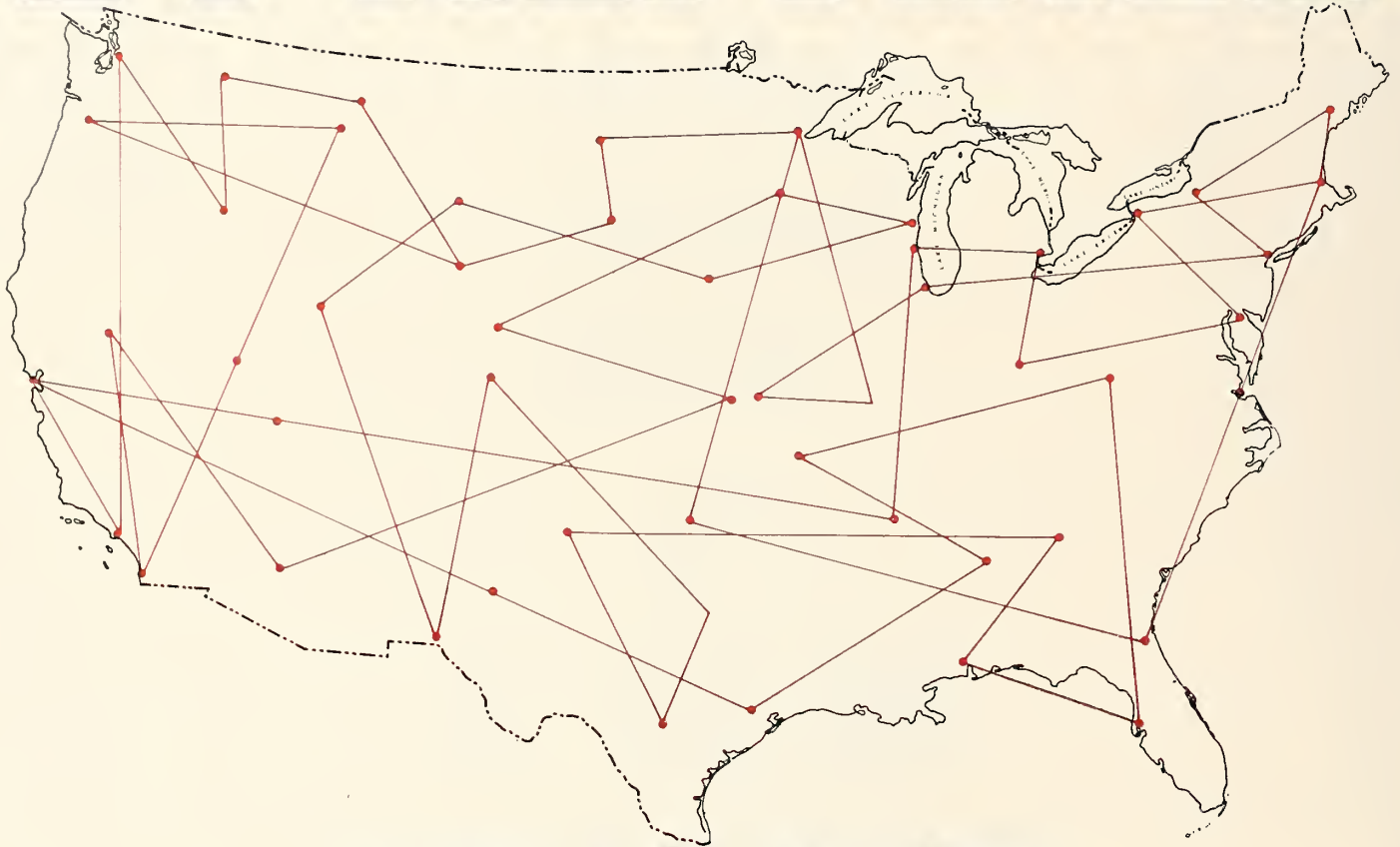

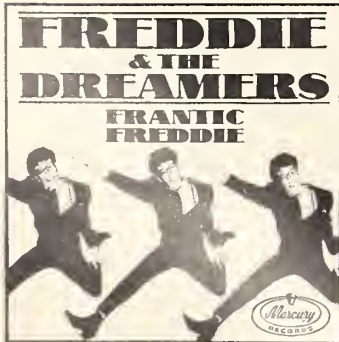

POP PICKS

JOHN FITZGERALD KENNEDY—AS WE REMEMBER HIM—L2L 1017

Columbia's Legacy series has been greatly enhanced by this notable tribute to the late President. There are 2-LPs on which those who were closely associated with JFK in public and private life comment with often fascinating frankness—for instance, Frank Bartlett's statement that JFK had found his membership in the House of Representatives a "waste of time," since it did not offer much stimulation or opportunity for debate. Accompanying the records is a book of immense pictorial and verbal interest. This effort is a significant part of the JFK legacy, disk-wise, book-wise or any other wise.

MY NAME IS BARBRA, TWO—Barbra Streisand—Columbia 2409

The "Funny Girl!" does it again in this powerful commercial followup to her "My Name Is Barbra" disk. Leading off with her currently charted "He Touched Me," she lends her inimitable style to the likes of "I Got Plenty Of Nothing," "Second Hand Rose" and a closing medley which includes, "Brother Can You Spare A Dime" and "The Best Things In Life Are Free" among many others. This LP should ride the same golden skyrocket as the lark's many previous outings have.

GOLDEN HITS—Roger Miller—Smash MGS 27073/SRS 67073

After racking up hit after hit for over a year, Roger Miller jam-packs this album with as many of his biggies as the grooves will hold, making a sure-fire attraction for his countless audiences in both the pop and the country field. Headlining the set with his five-Grammy-Award-winning "Dang Me," the chanter offers a platterful of wit, charm, sorrow and nonsense with a dozen of his delightful self-pennings. Other highlights include "King Of The Road" and his latest single, "England Swings," to name a few. Should zoom.

THAT WAS THE YEAR THAT WAS—Tom Lehrer—Reprise R/RS 6179

The famed wit of Tom Lehrer, which is considered a "must" for many a record collector or comedy buff, comes to the fore once again in a superb collection of self-penned satirical ditties. Accompanying himself on a ricky-tick piano, Lehrer brings forth bushels of ribald laughter and whole-hearted guffaws with his candid lyrics and excellent wordability. Top notch sales response is predicted for this acerbic LP, highlighted by such tracks as "National Brotherhood Week" and "MLF."

ACTION—Freddy Cannon—Warner Bros. W/WS 1612

Freddy Cannon wastes no time in cashing in on his recent hit single, "Action," with this percolating package dubbed with the same name. The chanter seems assured of grabbing a big teen reaction to the set as he cuts loose with a whole batch of biggies from the current rock and r & b harvests. The infectious beat of the kickoff title tune pervades the entire session, and dance floor enthusiasts should really dig such cuts as "Let Me Show You Where It's At" and "High Heel Sneakers." Should be big.

HANG ON SLOOPY—McCoys—Bang BLP 212

After zipping straight up to the top of the charts with their initial single, "Hang On Sloopy," the McCoys lose no time in cashing in on that single with this album by the same name. Lots of sales can be expected as the quartet unleashes a dozen stormy rockers from the current and while-back rock 'n roll catalogs. Among the best listening bets in the album are "Papa's Got A Brand New Bag" and "High Heel Sneakers," in addition to the title track.

1-2-3—Len Barry—Decca 74720

Len Barry has wasted no time in following his currently chart climbing single "1-2-3" with this powerpacked LP titled after the hit. Combining the title track with such other smash sounds as "Will You Love Me Tomorrow," "Treat Her Right" and "At The Hop '65," the last being an updating of the years past Dion and the Bell-monts success, the young chanter has created a potent, teen-oriented, market item, which should be eagerly sought after by his many fans.



THE JIVE FIVE—United Artists UAL 3455/UAS 6455

After striking quick singles paydirt with their recent winner, "I'm A Happy Man," the Jive Five are looking to score equally big with this album, tagged after that single. No newcomers to the recording field, the boys display plenty of spirit and ability with a dozen offerings, ranging from the hard-mover to the bittersweet blueser. In addition to the title track, top tunes in this one include "I Remember When" and the group-penned "Falling Tears."



THE DAWN OF CORRECTION—Spokesmen—Decca DL 4712/74712

Still riding the charts with their initial single outing, "The Dawn Of Correction," the Spokesmen dub this LP with the same title and jam-packs it with solid sounds from the current chart scene. The group promises to ride to the album charts with the LP as their solid rock ork sound and smooth handling of folk and folklike material is just right for the teen audiences. Best listening bets include "Colours" and "It Ain't Me, Babe."

JOE TEX/THE NEW BOSS

THE NEW BOSS—Joe Tex—Atlantic 8115

As his latest smash single, "I Want To (Do Everything For You)," continues to climb up the charts, Joe Tex comes across with a wild session of rhythmic blues wailing, highlighted by that same red-hot single. In addition to a sampling of bluesers from way-back eras, the chanter fills the set with a handful of self-penned items and a sprinkling of toppers from the country field. Some of the hotter grooves here include "C. C. Rider," "Don't Make Your Children Pay" and "Detroit City." Top notch r & b material.



YOU WON'T FORGET ME—Jackie DeShannon—Imperial LP 9294/12294

Currently riding both the albums and singles chart with her "Lifetime Of Loneliness" offerings, Jackie DeShannon should create a good bit of sales excitement with this package of romance tunes. Backed by full, rich ork and vocal arrangements, the lark combines a multi-range voice and a powerful style with a heap of self-penned ballads to make up an enjoyable listening session. In addition to the title track, other goodies include "When You Walk In The Room" and "Hold Your Head High."



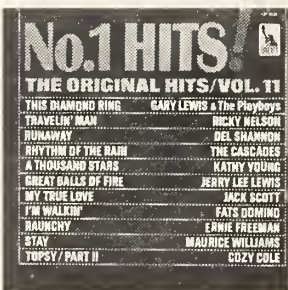
TODAY'S GREAT HITS—Lawrence Welk—Dot DLP 3663/25663

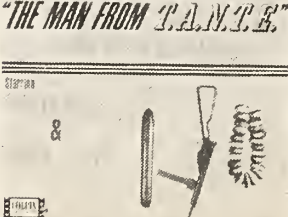
NO.1 HITS—THE ORIGINAL HITS/VOL. II—Various Artists—Liberty LRP 3418/LST 7418

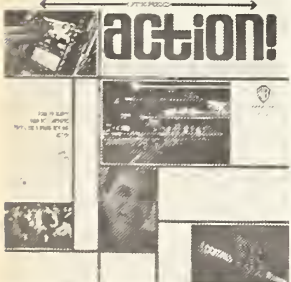
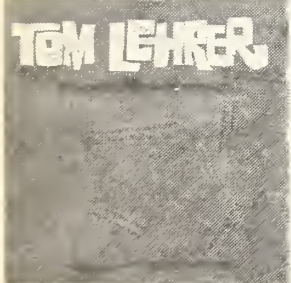
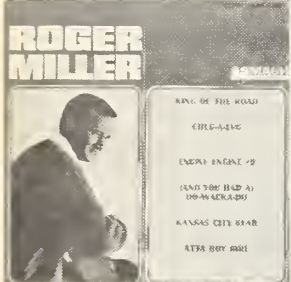

Blonde's scenes with M (mother) and Sissy Alot should get laughs a-plenty from what should be a large and highly receptive audience, if the outcropping of spy satires in all mediums is any indication.

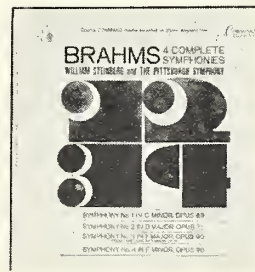
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BEETHOVEN

Williams, who played with the Count Basie band a few years back, is an artist who can't be outlined as strictly jazz, strictly blues or strictly rock. The explosive sounds in this package delve into all those fields and more as the chanter pours heart and soul into each track. Some of the highlights here include "Ol' Man River" and "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now," in addition to "Gypsy In My Soul."



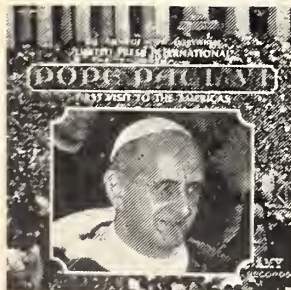
LOU RAWLS AND STRINGS—Capitol T/ST 2401

Lou Rawls is at it again with another dramatic vocalizing session full of well-chosen standards from bygone days. Kicking off the LP with the tender "What'll I Do," the crooner's rich, stormy voice is in rare form, with bittersweet romancers heading up the bill of fare. Late night programmers should find the heartfelt vocalizing and rich ork backing perfect for lots of air time, especially in such programmable tracks as "Cold, Cold Heart" and "My Buddy."



THE NEW SOUND OF THE OSBORNE BROTHERS—MGM E/SE 4291

The Osborne Brothers, who have gained a large audience via their regular appearances on the "Andy Williams" TVer, are looking forward to drawing in a steady disk following with this MGM platter. The four youngsters let loose with a widely-diversified repertoire, ranging from rock to Broadway toppers, delivered in a crisp, clean style that is sure to please many a buyer. Some of the highlights among the grooves include "Chim Chim Cher-ee," as well as "Hello Dolly" and "Downtown."



POPE PAUL VI, FIRST VISIT TO THE AMERICAS—Amy 8009

United Press International has presented an excellent summary of the historic visit of Pope Paul VI to the United States outlined in this Amy LP. The entire itinerary of the Pontiff, including his precedent-shattering speech before the U.N. and his celebration of his Mass at Yankee Stadium, is included in this package, which will make an exquisite collector's item for the religious or historical devotee.



THE PAUL BUTTERFIELD BLUES BAND—Elektra EKL 294/EKS 7294

A derivative of the growing interest in traditional blues music has been the rise of a number, as yet small, of young city-bred performers who concentrate their efforts on the country blues approach. Among this number is the Paul Butterfield Blues Band, six talented musicians who, with the strong vocal of Butterfield, blend into the deep feeling sound that is the blues. Including the likes of "Shake Your Money-Maker," "Mystery Train" and "Look Over Yonder Wall" LP should be dug by devotees of the sound.



LIVE FROM THE RATFINK ROOM—Jackie Kannon—Roulette R/SR 25312

When Jackie Kannon takes the floor, the night club audience is in for a whopping series of belly laughs, as is shown in this Roulette LP, recorded 'live' in the Ratfink Room in New York. Laughs come plenty fast as the comic lets his barbs fly at such subjects as politicians, New York and The Late Show, as well as any and all ethnic groups. Strictly for adults, the album is a good bet to wind up on many a collector's turntable and liven up many a party.

EXTENSIONS—Ahmad Jamal—Cadet 758

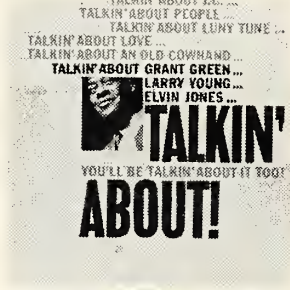
The groovy sound of Ahmad Jamal is rampant on this four track LP of a trio composed of Jamal on piano, Jamil Nasser on bass and Vernel Fournier on drums. Leading off with the 88'er's self-penned works, title track, the boys swing out in the strong-rhythmed groove for which Jamal has become so well known. With a pretty "Dance To The Lady" and an African-sounding "This Terrible Planet" also in the session, the boys wait with another power piece titled "Whisper Not." LP is fine swinging scene for jazz buffs.



THE MODERN JAZZ QUARTET PLAYS FOR LOVERS—Prestige 7421

This LP presents a collection of the earliest performances of Milt Jackson, John Lewis, Percy Heath and Kenny Clark, under the name of the Modern Jazz Quartet. Even though the overall group sound is never lost, Jackson's virtuosity on the vibraharp is everpresent on these tracks. Gershwin's melodic lines are fully complemented by the groups' sweet swinging medley of four of his tunes, with other featured stands including "Autumn In New York" and "But Not For Me."

TALKIN' ABOUT—Grant Green—Blue Note 4183

The smoothly melodic sounds created by guitar, organ and drums, played by Grant Green, Larry Young and Elvin Jones respectively, is a listening treat for jazz buffs of most persuasions. On this five track disk, the sound of one is the sound of all, as the boys blend the music, complementing each other's sounds. Featuring a salute to John Coltrane, "Talkin' About J.C." and a sweetly lyrical stand of "People" this LP should delight the trio's current fans and gain them scads of new ones.



SPUNKY—Monty Alexander—Pacific Jazz PJ 10094/ST 20094

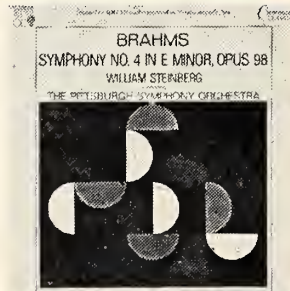
Jazz pianist and composer Monty Alexander is spotlighted on this LP featuring both self-penned and adapted works. Backed by Paul Humphrey on drums and Victor Gaskin on bass, the 88'er renders such originals as the swinging title tune, "Spunky," as well as the conga drenched "Jamaican Shake" and the rhythmically jerky "Rattlesnake." This one should satisfy the fans of the modern blues-based jazz sound.



THE TORONTO SCENE—Brian Browne Trio—RCA Victor Canada International PC 1022/PCS 1022

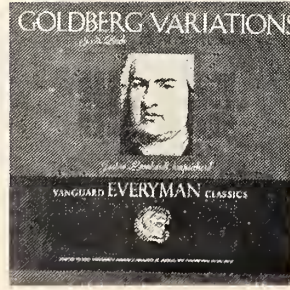

BRAHMS: SYMPHONY NO. 4 IN E MINOR, OPUS 98—Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra/William Steinberg—Command CC 11030SD

The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, under the baton of William Steinberg, has effected a moving reading of Brahms' final symphony, which completes the orchestra's recordings of all the Brahms' symphonies. In this attractively packaged, completely annotated LP, the orchestra pays a fitting tribute to this stark, moving work of the composer. All in all, this meeting of orchestra and music is a powerful addition to the Command Classics series.



BACH: GOLDBERG VARIATIONS—Gustav Leonhardt—Vanguard SRV-175

The "Aria With Thirty Variations" or "Goldberg Variations" is one of the true masterpieces of Bach's later years. This rendition of the work, by scholar-musician Gustav Leonhardt, is a further step in this artist's series of recordings of Baroque harpsicord and organ music in the Vanguard Everyman's Classic series. With the resurgence of the popularity of Baroque classics, this LP should be an especially well received one.

Columbia Releases 8 Tapes

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has announced the release of eight tapes, including four Christmas-oriented tapes, for the month of Oct.

The four Christmas tapes feature "The Mormon Tabernacle Choir Sings Christmas Carols," "Wishing You A Merry Christmas" with Andre Kostelanetz at the helm of the St. Kilian Boychoir, "Merry Christmas" by Andy Williams and "Here We Come A-Caroling" by Ray Conniff & the Sinners. Two other pop releases include "Doris Day's Sentimental Journey" and "The Wandering Minstrels" by the New Christy Minstrels.

The new release also contains two classical tapes, "Ives: Symphony No. 4" with Leopold Stokowski conducting the American Symphony Orchestra, and "Berlioz: Requiem" with the Philadelphia Orchestra, under the baton of Eugene Ormandy, and the Temple University Choirs.

Philips Adds 5 LP's To Deal

CHICAGO—Citing a solid response to the earlier "Get An Earful Of This" sales program, Philips product manager Lou Simon has announced a supplementary release of LP product. Sales results from the initial program, teed off Aug. 15, were so favorable, Simon said, that the additional albums were rushed to further bulk-up sales efforts on the part of Philips distributors.

Highlighting the release is "The 4 Seasons Sing Big Hits" album. In maintaining its global repertoire concept, the Philips package release contains a contribution by Tom Dissevelt, a Dutch producer whose specialty is electronic music. The LP, titled "Fantasy In Orbit," combines actual sound of electronic equipment plus processing standard instruments thru electronic sound equipment. Final pop album in the release is "Johnny Sea Live At The Bitter End."

In the first of two classical albums, Galina Vishnevskaya, soprano of the Bolshoi Opera, brings to the American market the first album of great Musorgsky songs, accompanied by pianist Mstislav Rostropovich and the Russian State Symphony Orchestra under Igor Markevitch. Miss Vishnevskaya will be touring America this season with the Moscow Philharmonic. The other Philips classical release is Tchaikovsky's "Swan Lake Ballet" highlights by the London Symphony under Pierre Monteux. Monteux covers 14 numbers from the well-known and popular ballet on the disk.

NEW YORK—Decca Records' Dallas branch has teamed up with deejays and merchants in selected cities for a contest centered around the Conway Twitty single of "That Kind Of Girl."

A different girl was selected from each school and then the semi-finalist was chosen by a panel of three platter spinners who judged each girl on poise, beauty, personality and character. The local winners from each school will receive an autographed pic of Twitty, a case of Coca-Cola and a personally autographed copy of the chanter's first Decca album when it is available. Along with the other gifts, the semi-final winners will be treated by the label to dinner with her favorite deejay. She'll also receive a \$50.00 Arthur Murray gift certificate and will go to Oklahoma City for the final competition to select "That Kind Of Girl." In most cases, the Decca branch has worked out agreements with local Ford dealers, in selected cities, for the use of the 1966 Mustangs.

The grand prize winner will receive an expense-paid trip to Nashville, Tenn., courtesy of Decca, to witness a Twitty recording session. She will receive a \$500.00 finishing and modeling scholarship from Patricia Stevens College, a \$50.00 Decca record library as well as a Decca four-speed phono.

UA Gets 'Anya' Rights

NEW YORK—United Artists Records has obtained the cast LP rights to the upcoming Broadway musical, "Anya," according to David L. Picker, president of the company.

"Anya" is the musical version of the Guy Bolton play, "Anastasia," in which Viveca Lindfors and Eugenie Leontovich starred on Broadway some seasons ago, later made into a film with Ingrid Bergman and Yul Brynner. The musical book was written by Bolton and George Abbott, who is also directing.

The score is by Robert Wright and George Forrest, who based their tunes on Rachmaninoff themes. Pair was responsible for "Song Of Norway" and "Kismet," both of which had melodies based on works by classical composers (Grieg and Borodin, respectively). Fred R. Fehlhaber is producing.

The production is scheduled to open in New York at the Ziegfeld Theatre on Nov. 29, with paid previews beginning Nov. 15.

In the cast are George London of Metropolitan opera fame, Constance Towers, Lillian Gish and Irra Petina.

"Anya" is a part of UA's blueprint for a concerted step-up in activity in the theatre. Other productions in which United Artists has an interest include the current British hit, Lionel Bart's "Maggie May," "Twang!," a widely-awaited Bart musical satire about Robin Hood, and a musical version of "Never On Sunday," being written by John Patrick of "Teahouse Of The August Moon" fame.

window display competition.

To get the drive rolling, Kapp is expected to spend at least \$30,000 in local coop newspaper advertising, advising consumers the ease in which to become eligible for the Sweepstakes. Thus, with the distribs' share of the ad budgets included, the total appropriation for space in the campaign will reach \$60,000.

Display material for dealers, including colorful set-ups, illuminated displays streamers and campaign buttons and everything required to set up "Election Sweepstakes Headquarters" in the store, will involve an outlay of at least \$30,000 more. The merchandising effort being placed behind the promotion is believed to constitute a new high in effort and expense for an indie firm. For example, several thousand light-up shadow box displays, highlighting the latest Jack Jones album, with a special blinker unit, will be made available. There will also be a generous quantity of triple-panel, winged display units, highlighting covers of the complete Jones LP catalog and keyed to the election theme, "I Picked Jack Jones." Also a part of the program are special sweepstakes streamers for window and in-store use; product stuffers including entry forms for the drawing; special side-wing easel units, a series of five album cover easels; glossy photos; dealer information kits and a host of lapel buttons shouting, "I picked Jack Jones, did you?"

A heavy trade and consumer ad program has been blueprinted with space in Playboy, the New Yorker and Esquire expected to further arouse consumer action in the 30 days to come.

At the radio level, Kapp's promo staff is busily setting up key stations throughout the country to act as "Election Sweepstakes" centers with a number of Jack Jones albums being made available for station giveaways during the drive. Jones has already taped a variety of special station promotion announcements in line with this phase of the campaign.

Meanwhile, Jones, who is now in New York for a month-long engagement at the Persian Room of the Hotel Plaza, is booked solidly for the month for magazine and newspaper interviews as well as a series of key radio and television appearances, all

Cadet Tolssue Bob Hope's '64 Vietnam Xmas Show

CHICAGO—Comedian Bob Hope's Vietnam Christmas TV show of 1964 will appear this season as a soundtrack LP from Cadet Records, the label's first release since switching its name from Argo. To be called "On the Road to Vietnam," the set will receive the most push ever attempted by Cadet's parent Chess Producing Corporation, according to president Leonard Chess.

Narrated by widely-known news commentator Alex Dreier at Hope's personal request, the soundtrack consists of all "live" recordings made on the comedian's most recent overseas trek to entertain American troops involved in the Vietnamese conflict. Stopovers include Thailand, Okinawa, Guam, the Philippines and Korea, but is primarily concentrated on Vietnam.

Hope's video show was viewed by some 70 million people, repeated twice because of tremendous public response, and guest stars on TV as well as in the album include Jerry Colonna, Jill St. John, Anita Bryant and Janis Paige.

Dick LaPalm, Cadet's national album sales manager, initiated the project via a chance encounter with Hope on a plane flight. His enthusiastic "that would make a great album" reaction to Hope's description of his Vietnamese trip and subsequent show led to negotiations with the comedian's West Coast agent James Saphier resulting in the LP.

He outlined the elaborate promotional campaign already set for the Hope album as follows:

(1) Ads in over 300 major college newspapers.

(2) Ads in all trade publications, key daily newspapers and national magazines.

(3) Servicing over 3,000 radio stations with the album in its entirety, including all types stations (r&b, Top 40, country, good music, etc.)

(4) Transportation advertising (buses, trains, subways).

(5) Servicing all major record critics, gossip columnists, & magazines with album copies and promotional material.

(6) Special easels, direct mail ads to every One Stop, retailer, etc. 4-ft. high easels for disk shop promotion.

Plans are already underway for British release of the "On The Road To Vietnam" album. Hope is a show-business giant there as well as here. International vp Marshall Chess plans a proportionately extensive ad-promo campaign in the British Isles.

The comedian is personally cooperating in promotional activities whenever his busy schedule permits. Hope, incidentally, is donating all royalty proceeds from the project to the United Service Organizations of America (USO).

The sale was made at the New York Coliseum Premium Show through John Shellman, president of Incentive Services, Inc. of Chicago. The announcement of the sale was made by Robert J. Clarkson, Manager of premium sales activity at Victor.

The special Victor incentive package includes seven Stereo 8 tape cartridges and a Stereo 8 Lear-Jet tape player designed for car music systems. The Ford Motor Company is featuring a similar stereo sound system in its 1966 Mustangs, Fords, T-Birds and Lincoln-Mercury cars.

L. M. Strauss, director of promotion of Knox-Reeves, explained that his client will use the Stereo 8 package in the top-prize category of a nation-wide sales contest, involving several hundred salesmen, distributors and jobbers early next year.

The impact of the Ford Motor Co. advertising for their 1966 Fords, Mustangs, T-Birds and Lincoln-Mercury cars, along with a heavy advertising schedule for RCA Victor, starting in Nov. is seen as giving even further impetus to Stereo 8 as an item for contests and incentive programs.

Australian Promotor In U.S. Booking Blockbuster Talent

NEW YORK—Harry M. Miller, managing director of Pan Pacific Promotions in Sydney, Australia, arrived in New York last week during a month-long business tour which saw him booking top talent for performances in Australia and the Pacific.

Last week's New York stopover was his second on the current trip, which also included stops in London, and Europe. From here, he swung out to California, where he is currently based at the Wilshire House in Beverly Hills.

Miller stated that the main reason for the trip was to aid the suffering music business in Australia which is in the grips of economic difficulties due to the severe drought which has hit the country. According to him, only "blockbuster"-type shows will help to stimulate the industry, and the talent line-up that he has planned for the coming year will make 1966, despite the drought, his biggest year to date.

Thus far the 1966 lineup boasts of such names of Tom Jones and Herman's Hermits, who are scheduled for Jan., Billy Joe Royal (Feb.), Sonny & Cher (Apr.), and Trini Lopez (May). Also scheduled for May will be a five-country tour by Carlos Montoya and a flamenco package, set for Australia, New Zealand, India, Hong Kong and Singapore. In June, Pan Pacific plans to stage the Latin "Ballet Folklorico" spectacle, in conjunction with the Australia-Elizabethan Trust Co., and in Sept. the firm will be staging a Roy Orbison concert and two legitimate properties. One of the legit items, "The Establishment," has already been acquired by Miller from Ashley-Famous.

Further plans include the arrangements for the company to step into the publishing field, covering rights in New Zealand and Australia.

Covering the complete spectrum from TV to rock, Pan Pacific is currently doing well with its road production of "Any Wednesday," in conjunction with the Australia-Elizabethan Trust Co. The firm will soon be opening a tour of "Porgy And Bess," cast with Maori tribesmen and 5 American principals. This is also in conjunction with the Australia-Elizabethan Trust Co., and the New Zealand Opera Co.

CHICAGO—Quincy Jones, vice-President of A&R for Mercury Records, is currently celebrating his 10th anniversary of association with the label in a year marked by his peak productivity for the firm.

Jones kicked off the year by igniting a concerted drive by Mercury for stature in the film soundtrack album category. He scored and conducted the Gregory Peck starrer, "Mirage," and followed this up with his own musical backgrounding for the controversial film, "The Pawnbroker." Both films have been most successful album additions to the Mercury catalog. His most important acquisition for Mercury's film music catalog was acquisition of the MGM-Filmways movie track, "The Sandpiper." Jones was able to obtain the much-sought-after track of the Elizabeth Taylor-Richard Burton starrer because of his longtime friendship and musical association with award-winning composer-conductor, Johnny Mandel, who did the score for the film.

The Mercury soundtrack album is a current chart LP. MGM sales brass in the film division estimate the film will be their biggest box office grosser and among the top five money-makers for the entire film industry.

Jones is maintaining his close association with the burgeoning Mercury soundtrack catalog, in that he is currently spending the bulk of his time in Hollywood, where he is completing the music for the forthcoming Anne Bancroft-Sidney Poitier film, "Slender Thread." Before the end of the year, Jones will announce two more im-

portant films for which he will do the music.

In between his writing and arranging for motion pictures, Jones is making frequent returns to New York, where he does recording sessions with Mercury artists. During the next fortnight, he will be in New York for sessions with Lesley Gore and Sarah Vaughan. Jones, coincidentally, has batoned and arranged all of Lesley Gore's recording since his initial venture with her which produced her first record and her first Mercury giant seller, "It's My Party." In addition, he has become increasingly more involved in the recording activities of Johnny Mathis. As his direct contribution to Mercury, Jones currently has an album out called "Quincy Jones Plays Music for Pussycats" successful enough that he is currently writing a follow-up, which will again feature current pop and motion picture themes of his own arrangements. The album will be released in January on Mercury.

In addition to his composing and arranging chores for both motion pictures and recordings, Jones acts as musical conductor for Frank Sinatra. Jones, a former Count Basie sideman and arranger, guest-conducts the pianist's band when they back Sinatra on recording sessions or TV and "live" appearances. The combination of Sinatra and Basie's band with Jones conducting did the ABC-TV "Hollywood Palace" show last Saturday (23). They are set for another network TV spectacular Nov. 20. On Jan. 5, Jones will do a solid month with Sinatra and the Basie ork at the Sands, Las Vegas.

Irving B. Green, Mercury president, emphasized Jones' versatility in appraising his value to the record firm. Green said that he hopes to have Jones accompany him to Brussels, Belgium, in early December for a meeting with Philips records executives from all over the globe. Jones has been invaluable, Green said, in preparing domestic Mercury artist product for the world market and also in uncovering international product from foreign labels, affiliated with Mercury, for the American record mart.

Jones actually completes ten years of association with Mercury in November. It was just a decade ago that he was hired for his first Mercury session in New York, where he did the arranging and conducting for a record date by the late Dinah Washington.

Set Riverside Distribbs, New Product On The Way

NEW YORK—Orpheum Productions, Inc., the recently organized company set up to produce and market the Riverside, Jazzland, Wonderland and Battle labels, has completed its initial primary market distrib set-up and is underway with an across the board catalog plan on all its labels.

Major distributors set so far include: Superior Records, New York; Affiliated, Newark; Associated, East Hartford; Marnel, Philadelphia; Schwartz Brothers, Washington, D.C.; Southland, Atlanta; Royal Disc, Chicago; Seaway, Cleveland; Hit, Cincinnati; Merit, Los Angeles; Eric, San Francisco; Microphone, Hawaii; Fortaleza, Puerto Rico; and Trans World, Canada.

Additional markets are being set up and it is expected that the entire domestic distribution network should be completed shortly.

According to Erv Bagley, Orpheum's vice president, "The initial distributor and dealer response to the reactivation of the Riverside lines has been most enthusiastic and gratifying, underlining the major importance of the Riverside catalogue as an established integral part of the jazz market today."

The company is now preparing a schedule of new releases; first release to come out in November. Negotiations for contract pacts are underway with several new artists and the company expects to soon announce a tie-in with a major independent producer. A complete re-organization, re-editing and re-packaging program has been developed to re-release the Jazz Archive Series in response to consumer and dealer requests. While continuing to use jazz and folk as the basic orientation of the Riverside label, Orpheum will broaden its base through further development of its Wonderland children's line, and the Battle Gospel Series. A strong merchandising effort in the classics field will be developed via the re-release of the Washington Classical line, and the acquisition of new material in this area.

MGM's Pope Paul LP Receives Church Approval

NEW YORK—MGM Records has been accorded recognition of its album saluting Pope Paul VI's visit to the United Nations. The LP, tabbed "Peace Mission To The United Nations, Pope Paul VI Visits New York City, October 4, 1965," has received approval of the Archdiocese of New York and the company has been granted permission to reproduce the Papal Seal on the LP as well. The label has also arranged for Holy Family Catholic Church, which serves the United Nations community, to share in the proceeds of the album.

Schiotz To Guest At Schumann Concert

Danish baritone Aksel Schiotz will appear as guest artist in a concert by pianist Lucy Brown on Monday, Nov. 1 at Carnegie Recital Hall.

The concert is the second in a series of three recitals presented by Miss Brown devoted to the works of Robert Schumann. Schiotz will sing seven songs. The remaining concert in this series will be held Nov. 22 with Miss Brown assisted by a number of artists.

Schiotz, who is heard on Capitol Records Import line, will arrive in New York from his home in Boulder, Colorado on Friday, Oct. 22 and will return to Boulder on Nov. 7. In addition to his scheduled appearance with Miss Brown, Schiotz plans to hold a Master Class in Westport, Connecticut on Oct. 23. The Class has been organized by singer and conductor Jeanne Kimball.

During his visit, Schiotz will also spend time coaching in several private New York studios.

2 Musicals In Works By Carolyn Leigh, E. Bernstein

NEW YORK—Composer Elmer Bernstein and lyricist Carolyn Leigh have formed a writing team to work on two musical properties aimed at Broadway production during the 1966-67 season. Their projects are entitled "Brother Bertram" and "How Now Dow Jones."

"Brother Bertram" is a work in which the writers intend to unearth, against all odds, the good in human nature. "How Now Dow Jones" deals with the "delightful and often profitable gullibility of the American public as related to the stock market."

Carolyn Leigh contributed the lyrics to the Broadway musicals "Peter Pan," starring Mary Martin, "Wildcat" and "Little Me." She is also responsible for the words of a number of songs which have become popular standards, including "Witchcraft," "Young at Heart" and "Hey, Look Me Over."

Bernstein has composed original music for more than 60 major Hollywood films, and has received five Academy Award nominations. Among his movie scores are "Man With The Golden Arm," "The Ten Commandments," "Hud," "The Magnificent Seven," "The World of Henry Orient" and the forthcoming "Hawaii." He has also been active in composing and conducting for television, and has an Emmy Award for his score for the hour documentary "The Making of the President" (1960).

E. B. Marks Acquires 'Get Smart' Music, Adds Foreign Pic Score

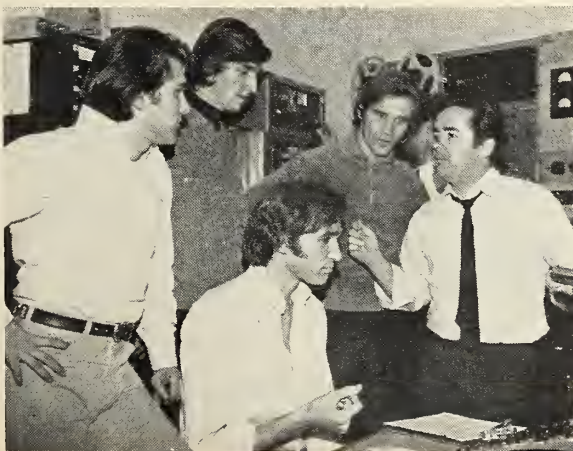
NEW YORK—E. B. Marks Music has added to its TV musical score catalog, a special area of interest at the firm, with the acquisition of Irving Szathmary's score for "Get Smart," the spy spoof series.

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Liberty Releases 2 LP's

HOLLYWOOD—Liberty Records and its Dolton affiliate are each rush-releasing special LP packages. The Dolton disk, "The Ventures' Christmas Album," features the popular instrumental crew reading a dozen traditional holiday tunes. The album will carry dealer terms effective through Dec. 31, 1965. The Liberty album is "The Sound Of Her Majesty's Royal Marines." The release of the disk, which carries dealer terms thru Oct. 31, is themed to the current U.S. tour of the British military group.

ASCAP Panel Says: Colleges Are Major Users Of Contemporary Classics

NEW YORK—University and College orchestras and their music departments are the major users of contemporary music, according to a panel consisting of composers Morton Gould and Ezra Laderman, and publishers Adolph Vogel, of Elkan-Vogel Co., Inc., and Arthur Cohn, of Mills Music. The panel at the third meeting of the ASCAP Symposium on American Music told young writers that University and College orchestras appear to be the prime establishments where more advanced techniques in the composition of symphonic and concert music are given attention and hearings.

Moderated by Gene Bruck, ASCAP's Coordinator of Symphonic and Concert Music, the panel also discussed the effects of grants and prizes upon young talents. It was agreed that while such grants and prizes provide a vital and necessary encouragement to talented music men, and provide a limited period of free time for creative activity, they were not in themselves a solution to a young composer's eventual financial well-being nor were they even an indication of a successful career.

The next meeting of the ASCAP Symposium will take place Monday, October 25 at Judson Hall. The moderator will be the jazz pianist and ASCAP composer, Billy Taylor, and the subject will be jazz. Panelists will include Marian McPartland, Artie Shaw, Herbie Mann and Randy Weston.

TRO: Hit Shows Helped By No Restriction Policy

NEW YORK—The Richmond Organization has a Broadway hit string going. Good notices for Charles Aznavour's one-man show (see separate review) makes the fifth straight success for a show whose score is published by TRO.

The string started with two English hits, "Stop The World" and "Oliver!", an American click, "High Spirits" and then back to two imports, "Roar Of The Greasepaint" and the new Aznavour date (a 3-week stand).

TRO head, Howie Richmond, claims that the firm's tradition-smashing policy of promoting songs from an incoming show long before its scheduled bow on Broadway creates a favorable climate for ticket demand. It's simply that the TRO organization does not believe in publisher restrictions on a Broadway-bound effort. "We're press agents," Richmond says, "for the talents of our writers and we believe in letting the whole world know about their talents."

"In fact we've taken steps to literally tell the world about it. We've authorized all our international affiliates to simultaneously release anywhere in Europe the English lyric and instrumental recordings of the show songs. The only restriction is on foreign language lyric versions in certain territories."

In general, the TRO approach simply represents an updating of the technique of exploiting a song properly and the score from which it stems.

Richmond has proceeded on a highly selective basis in acquiring show material. "There are a couple of costly flops on the street right now," declares Richmond. "Between them, it's a million dollars down the drain for somebody. So we go slowly and we're careful. We've had five straight Broadway hits now, and we've gotten actually hundreds of recordings on the songs from these shows."

Richmond referred to two forthcoming collaborations by Oscar Brand and Paul Nassau. The first of these involves a score for the Edward Padula production "The Insolent Breed," while the second, and a bit more in the future, is a musical based on "The Education of Hyman Kaplan."

A third project for TRO will reunite Newley with Bricusse for an as yet untitled production, to be undertaken soon after Newley's imminent departure from the Broadway cast of "Roar Of The Greasepaint." TRO also has the U. S. rights to the score of a forthcoming London musical, Johnny Worth's production of "Nell," based on the story of "Nell Gwyn." This too, it's anticipated, will find its way to Broadway, probably in late 1966 or early the following year.

PHILADELPHIA—Chips Distributing Corp. is now representing both Vox Records and Phonola phonographs and tape recorders, it was announced last week by Al Rosenthal, the firm's vice-president and general manager.

TRO Adds 12 Songs To Jobim Catalog

NEW YORK—The Richmond Organization has acquired 12 previously unavailable songs by Brazilian writer Antonio Carlos Jobim. The Jobim catalog has come into increasing popularity in the past two years, thanks to the acceptance of the Bossa Nova sound.

The new songs were acquired for world-wide rights exclusive of Brazil itself by TRO president Howard S. Richmond by arrangement with the Brazilian publisher. The new group brings to 23 the total of Jobim songs in the TRO fold, among them some of the most popular and most recorded of all.

Among the new items, "Someone to Light Up My Life (Se Todos Possem Iguais a Voce)," is regarded as one of the strongest. The tune has already

had three new recordings: by Percy Faith on Columbia; Herb Ellis and Charlie Byrd on Columbia; and the current single by Nicole Quasee on DCP, distributed by United Artists.

The TRO-Jobim catalog also includes "Desafinado," one of the most widely recorded of all Jobim hits, plus "Jazz 'n' Samba," "That Look You Wear," "No More Blues (Chega do Saudade)," "Song of the Jet" and "Engano." Additional new recordings of all the Jobim material are currently in the works.

Meanwhile, TRO will issue a new folio, "Charlie Byrd Plays the Music of Antonio Carlos Jobim," which will include the Jobim selections recorded by the Columbia recording artist. The folio is due soon.

Compiling Under Way For Grammy Nominees

NEW YORK—The first lists of records eligible for 1965 Grammy Awards nominations are in the offing.

Record companies throughout the land will receive forms this week from the Record Academy's office on which they will be able to list those recordings which they consider to be their outstanding product of the 11-month period ending November 1, 1965, and which they would like to present to the NARAS membership for consideration for nominations.

Several days later, the active membership of the Academy will receive similar forms on which they will be encouraged to list what they consider to have been the period's outstanding recordings in the various 47 categories.

As soon as company and member lists have been received, NARAS will start compiling this year's eligibility list, with all suggested items being carefully screened by experts for eligibility. The completed lists will then be sent to all active members, whose votes will determine the final nominations in the various categories.

Once this first round of voting has been tallied by Haskins and Sells, the independent accounting firm which has been handling the Grammy Awards tabulations for the past seven years, final ballots will be forwarded to all active members. Their votes will determine the winners, to be announced this year a month earlier than usual—on March 15—at simultaneous NARAS presentations in New York, Hollywood, Nashville and Chicago.

Musictapes To Offer Chess Dates

CHICAGO—Musictapes, Inc. has obtained the exclusive tape rights to all recordings from the Chess Producing Co. catalog.

In addition to the Ramsey Lewis hit, "The In Crowd," Musictapes will immediately release five additional recordings:—two by Ahmad Jamal, two additional Ramsey Lewis LP's plus a Benny Goodman recording which had previously been a tape best seller.

All tapes will be released immediately on reel-to-reel and on auto-cartridge. The autocartridges will be marketed through Musictapes' auto-cartridge marketing wing—T.D.C. Electronics.

The acquisition of the Chess rights increases Musictapes' label representation to nineteen, with a listing of more than 400 reel-to-reel tapes, and more than 600 autocartridge tapes.

Lambert & Courtney: A & R Team On The Move

NEW YORK—Mercury's youthful A&R team, Dennis Lambert & Lou Courtney, have greatly expanded their activities in the past few weeks.

The team, who wrote "Do the Freddie" and several other successes, are currently represented in the R&B area with the Mercury waxing of "I Dig You Baby" by Lorraine Ellison and have just released The Debs answer to the McCoys number one disk called "Sloopy's Gonna Hang On." They're presently reviewing material for a forthcoming follow-up session with Lorraine whom they consider to be one of the most promising young female R&B singers in the field.

They recently acquired two acts for the label as a result of a teen talent showcasing in Newburgh, N.Y. They signed The Gremmies, whose name derives from a West Coast surfing term. They've also taken on newcomer, Ellis Dee and will shortly record Cleveland R&B chanter, Carl Hall.

As a result of recent trips—Lambert to England, Courtney to Canada—several mop-haired groups are being considered for recording.

Meanwhile, their own writing activity goes on. Lesley Gore's new LP carries one of their tunes, "Just Another Fool" and others are scheduled for release by various artists. They are, nevertheless, on the lookout for good teen-oriented material for their newly acquired artists and expanded recording schedule.

Columbia Dedicates New Nashville Studio

NASHVILLE—The formal dedication of Columbia Records' new studio in Nashville took place last week (22) as part of the label's activities at the Country Music Festival. Columbia has just completed the \$500,000 expansion of the recording facilities. Goddard Lieberman, president of Columbia, along with Frank G. Clement, Gov. of Tennessee, Beverlie Briley, Mayor of Nashville, and other studio officials presided at the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new studios. Clive J. Davis, Columbia's administrative v.p., Bill Gallagher, Columbia vice-president, and other key executives were also present at the dedication. Over 800 of the participants of the Country Music Festival attended the opening ceremonies.

Under the direction of Harold Hitt, manager of the Nashville Studios, the new studio was constructed to keep pace with the label's increasing recording activities.

The new studio features the most modern audio and acoustic installations. The studio floor is supported on steel springs, which serves as a vibration barrier from a projected expressway which will run directly in front of the studios. A spring-supported inner wall and the special ceiling construction are other soundproofing innovations incorporated in the studio. The recording facilities have variable distribution of absorption to provide a wide range of natural reverberation characteristics accommodating the full scope of musical and dramatic program recordings.

The City of Metropolitan Nashville and Davidson County has made the land at 16th Avenue South and Division Street

Month to the radio stations, while various stations are sponsoring special promotions for the month. A number of network television shows are paying or have paid special tribute to Country Music Month—among them are The Jimmy Dean Show, The Steve Lawrence Show, Lawrence Welk, Dean Martin and Shindig.

In last week's column we printed a picture of Johnny Sea, which was

available to the Country Music Foundation. The Trustees of the Foundation are Tex Ritter, Frances Preston, Roy Acuff, Hal Smith, Lucky Moeller, Bill Denny, Wesley Rose, Hal Cook, and Dick Frank. Plans for the building are ready, and the contractor is W. B. Cambron and Company. Plans are being made for the ground breaking and this date will be announced soon. The music industry has rallied to the cause, and some \$300,000 have been pledged. A list of those firms or persons is available from the CMA office. The Walkway of the Stars which will be a part of the Building is a plan devised to honor those recording artists contributing to the building fund. The names of the artists who are participating in the Walkway of the Stars are on a list attached hereto. The building committee, along with the contractor, has visited other museums around the country, including the Western Heritage Center in Oklahoma City. A local fund-raising campaign among the businessmen of Nashville will be conducted some time within the next few months. A museum committee chaired by Hal Cook, and composed of Bob Cooper, Johnny Bond, Russ Sanjek, Steve Sholes, and Ed Kahn, has been appointed and is at work on acquisitions and other aspects of the museum. The firm of Jenter Exhibits, Inc., has been engaged to design and oversee construction of the museum interior.

Carl Smith added another tax deduction to his list when his wife, Goldie presented him with a brand new son on Sept. 26. The youngster, weighing in at the Nashville Baptist Hospital at 7 lbs. 11 oz., was named Larry Dean after Nashville talent exec Larry Moeller and chanter Jimmy Dean.

A couple of new C&W stations have just tossed their hats into the ring, as country music continues its powerful expansion. One of the stations is WHOL-Allentown, which reports tremendous response to its new all-country format. The other outlet, KELK-Elko, Nevada has just switched to 75% country programming and is in plenty of need for country records. All you labels that manufacture C&W product can help yourselves and the Country Music Movement by sending those disks out to all these new stations for airing.

Although the 1965 Country Music Festival is now only a fond memory for those of us who were fortunate enough to take part in the gala event, there are still a few more days left of Country Music Month. To date, the month has been a great one for those concerned with the C&W field, thanks to the terrific promotion by a large amount of people. CMA prepared and mailed 1500 45 rpm disks of special promotion spots on Country Music

accidentally labeled "Ferlin Husky." Our apologies to both of these artists for missing the error and allowing it to run.

Pete Drake and his band and Johnny Sea have been added to a large package set to play at the Hammond Civic Center on Oct. 31. The show was packaged by Bob Neal Agency for Len Ellis and the Lake County Police and features Stonewall Jackson, Faron Young, Hank Snow, Carl Butler and George Morgan. Drake and Sea are also featured in large packages set for Orlando, Florida and Tampa, Florida November 13, 14. Overall packages were set by Sonny Neal of the Bob Neal Agency.

We are extremely sorry to hear about the recent accident which befell young Sherrie Mack, the daughter of Warner Mack. While she was entering church a short time ago, a heavy metal door slammed on her finger, cutting it entirely off. The finger was sewn back on and the Macks are now awaiting the doctor's verdict as to whether or not it will heal properly. Our sincere wishes for favorable results go out to Sherrie and the family.

Skeeter Davis has learned once again that music speaks an international language. She was recently sent an article, featuring her, from the Hong Kong Music Maker, and another clipping from a Japanese newspaper, which also carried a story about her (She identified the picture easily enough, but the Japanese writing was somewhat tricky). Adding to her international image was the fact that she was voted one of Madrid's top three favorite American country artists, and in Malaysia her version of "Silver Threads And Golden Needles" reportedly jumped into the No. 3 spot in the popularity polls.

Dan McKinnon, president of KSON-San Diego, has just returned from a six-week tour in the Orient, including Viet Nam, as a news correspondent for ABC and KSON. While there, he delivered a batch of copies of Johnny Wright's "Hello Vietnam" smash to the Armed Forces Radio station in Saigon, to several Enlisted Men's Clubs in the area and to the USS Midway's radio station. According to McKinnon, the fighting men over there were delighted with it, and their morale was given a big boost to know that the folks at home were thinking of them. Other stops included in the itinerary were in Thailand, Singapore, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Japan and Cambodia.

Mercury waxer Jerry Wallace arrived in Nashville last week to record several new singles while waiting for the big Convention to kick off. His latest disk, "Life's Gone And Slipped Away," is currently climbing up the country charts in good fashion for the chanter.

The young man being launched on his record making career is Britain's Jonathan King, latest protege of Marquis Enterprises, the independent set-up responsible for his record breaking transatlantic hit "Everyone's Gone To The Moon." In charge of the launching are directors of Marquis Enterprises Joe Roncorni (with the beard) and Ken Jones. King is a talented young man who not only writes his own material but is at present in his second year at Cambridge University where he is taking a degree in English Literature. This is not the first success for Marquis Enterprises, which was responsible for recording and promoting The Zombies. "Everyone's Gone To The Moon" is issued in the U.K. on Decca and in the U.S. on Parrot, distributed by London Records. As a writer, King is responsible for "It's Good News Week" by the Hedgehoppers Anonymous, now climbing the British charts.



GERMANY

D.G.G.'s Polydor Records is making a strong move into the U.S. market. Germany's largest home owned record company has signed A&R man-composer-arranger Klaus Ogermann to an exclusive contract to sign and record U.S. artists. Atlantic Records will release the product in the U.S.A. This is a direct switch on the CBS-RCA tactics of moving into foreign markets and doing local production. Polydor is the first German firm to make a stab at the U.S. market from the U.S.A. itself and has armed itself with a strong link to that market with Klaus Ogermann who is recognized as one of the top men in the business. Polydor already has major production firms with their own artists in France, Japan, South Africa, Italy, South America and Mexico. Polydor hits in the U.S. market include all the early Bert Kaempfert hits before Bert signed directly with Decca for the U.S. market, "Sailor" by Lolita, "Morgen" by Ivo Robic, and the LP successes of Helmut Zacharias and many others.

Klaus Ogermann is no stranger to Polydor having worked in Germany as pianist and arranger for the orchestras of Max Greger and Kurt Edelhagen before leaving here in 1959 for his new home of America. Since then, he has turned out top productions with such artists as Lesley Gore, his own orchestra and many others.

In the international sector, Polydor has picked up distribution of "It Ain't Me Babe" by the Turtles and "Hello Josephine" by the Scorpions for this area.

The Scorpions hit comes from Holland. Two hits by Sam the Sham are also currently in the top ten here. They're on MGM, handled by Polydor. In all, Polydor distributes 5 of the top 10 this week which is a new high for the firm in the last few years.

Hans Blume from Intro Music is giving an all out push to "Eve Of Destruction" and the new protest wave from the U.S.A. Teldec reports that the original waxing by Barry McGuire is moving very well.

Hans Gerig reports that his publishing house is working hard on new platters by Roy Black on Polydor and Gitte on Electrola both of which are in the top 10. The new Popular label has put out new releases with former Electrola artists the Nilsen Brothers, former Saba star Charly Valentino, former Ariola hitmaker Peter Wegen and a new C&W group headed by Nipso Brantner.

Ariola's export manager George Ehmke has been on the road promoting the firm's product. In Copenhagen he visited Metronome's Bent Fabricius Bjerre, Cupol's Helge Roundquist and Totto Johannesen of Nor-Disc. In Haarlem, Holland, he met with Negrans' Robert Oeges and Discobell's general manager Dr. Vandewalle. The Eurodisc outings of classical and operetta music are going strong in Holland and the label is firmly established with the Dutch dealers and general public. In Zurich, Switzerland, Ehmke and Ariola's sales manager Friedrich Schmidt talked with Maurice Rosengarten, the head of Musikvertrieb and his staff about sales campaigns for the last months of 1965.

Metronome has released a new Casey Jones & The Governors platter as follow-up to the smash hit "Jack The Ripper." The song is "Yockomo" by Huey Smith, who also wrote "Don't You Just Know It" which led the hit parade here for several weeks. The new release is over the 50,000 sales mark in its first week. Casey and the boys are now on the big "Bravo" tour through Germany.

Larry Yaskiee of Vogue, is now concentrating on the German and English versions of "Shame & Scandal In The Family" by Shawn Elliot on Roulette and in German by Harry & Ronny on Vogue. The record has plenty of competition with 3 German covers and 2 English recordings of the song now on the market.

CBS is doing a top promotion job on the Glenn Miller Orchestra, with Ray McKinley and Bobby Hackett LP of "Glenn Miller Time '65" and a single of "Red Roses For A Blue Lady" b/w "Everybody Loves Somebody." The label is moving well with "Balla Balla" by the Rainbows, an answer record to "Woolly Bully," which is selling like mad.

The folk team of Belina & Behrend from Electrola, are now touring Germany to packed houses and will soon start a 9 month world tour taking them to the Eastern Countries, Italy, Greece, North Africa, Portugal, Spain, France and the U.S.A.

CBS held a press conference for former world ice skating champion Marika Kilius' new recording. Over 200 press, radio and TV personnel were on hand for the presentation. Marika sang her record for the first time in public, accompanied by Fats and His Cats who also accompanied her on the record.

AUSTRALIA

We had a very pleasant surprise recently in the form of a phone call from that talented young Australian artist Frankie Davidson who has just come back home after some two years in London. One of the first things Frankie did when he arrived back was to phone Cash Box. Frankie is presently mulling over a couple of very strong television offers he has received, and is also negotiating some nightclub appearances; this is a field in which Frankie Davidson is second-to-none in this country.

Prominent American music publisher Ivan Mogull will spend about one week in Australia (visiting Melbourne & Sidney) starting October 27th when he is due to arrive in Melbourne from Wellington, New Zealand. During his term in Australia, Ivan will be looking out for new copyrights and record masters that are available for the United States. The trip to Australia is part of a worldwide trip for Ivan Mogull.

Whatever happened to the suggestion of a few months back for the conversion of the entire record industry to a single-speed product? At the time it was first mentioned there was great enthusiasm for the scheme from the trade all over the world; but very little has happened towards putting the plan into reality. Australia could and should lead the world in the transition to one-speed.

Phonovox Records have recently issued a single by the widely popular Italian star Mina singing in English; titles are "Pretend That I'm Her" and "Just Let Me Cry." Distribution of the Phonovox product is now handled through W & G Distributing Co. Pty. Ltd.

The Annual General Meeting of the Association of Australian Record Manufacturers which was held recently, resulted in some changes in the office bearers of the Association. Claude Pickford (RCA) has taken over as President from J. M. Burnett, C. B. E. (EMI) who had held this office since the inception of the Association. Pickford was previously one of the Association's two vice-presidents, and this vacancy has been filled by C. Barlow (EMI). The other office bearers are R. Gillespie (W & G) Vice-President, J. Turner (RCA) Treasurer & Public Officer, and Miss V. Green, Secretary.

EMI's latest batch of singles includes several hot items from overseas such as, "Yesterday" by The Beatles; "Road Runner" with The Gants; "Pretty Thing" by Tommy Boyce; "Ring Dang Doo" by Sam The Sham and The Pharaohs; and "Hungry For Love" from the San Remo Golden Strings.

Music Publishing and Record Producing house of J. Albert & Son Pty. Ltd., are in the midst of preparing for rush-release, a souvenir Song Book of their hot local group, The Easy Beats. In addition to the words and music of the fourteen titles from the group's album, the Song Book will carry many candid recording studio photographs of The Easy Beats.

A recent visitor to Cash Box was lovely local singing star Lynne Fletcher who is out on promotion on behalf of her first single for the HMV label through EMI. Titles are "You Say Pretty Words" and "Crazy With Love," Lynne has been working on both titles on radio, television and dances.

Due to heavy air-play on imported copies of "Inky Dinky Spider" by The Kids Next Door, Australian Record Company Limited has scheduled it for rush release under the Kapp banner. Also on the rush list with ARC is the new Bob Dylan single "Positively 4th Street" which is out on CBS.

National television artist Yvonne Barrett makes her recording debut for GO!! Records with a single which couples "Little People" with "You're The One." Yvonne appears regularly on the GO!! show on TV.

Tony Geary, A & R producer for J. Albert & Son Pty Ltd., advises that EMI in England have accepted the Billy Thorpe record of "Over The Rainbow" for release in the United Kingdom; the record was a big hit all over the country a while back. Crescendo Records of the United States have taken up for release the Billy Thorpe revival of "Twilight Time" which has also enjoyed wide success throughout Australia.

RCA is out with a new local single by one of their top local acts, Digger Revell, with a revival of "As Long As She Needs Me" and "You'd Better Move On." Digger is backed with an orchestra directed by Thomas Tycho. Also on RCA is the P. F. Sloan release of his own song "The Sins Of A Family." Sloan of course is already widely known as the composer of the international hit "Eve Of Destruction."

All the people at Belinda Music are rubbing their hands in great delight at the fantastic national success of their songs which are associated with Sonny & Cher; "I Got You Babe," "Laugh At Me," "Sing Cest La Vie," "Just You," "Baby Don't Go," "But You're Mine" and "Hello."

Australian Record Company Limited has picked up the local distribution rights to the American Back-Beat label and the first issue will be the Roy Head single "Treat Her Right," which is released here on the CBS logo. ARC has also issued "Run, Baby Run" by The Newbeats which is on Hickory. The Paramount movie "The Sons Of Katie Elder" is now being seen in Australia, and ARC has hit the market with the Johnny Cash version of the title song on CBS.

Two new local releases this week from the Festival group are Judy Stone with "In My Neighborhood" b/w "This Is My Prayer"; and The Southern Gentlemen with "Leave Myself To Me" b/w "Mean, Mean City"; both are on the Festival label. Whilst the Leedon label (through Festival) has the new one by Ray Brown & The Whispers, "In The Midnight Hour" and "Now Is The Time."

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GREAT BRITAIN

The new EMI-Paul Hamlyn "Music for Pleasure" label launched at the beginning of the month is a major success. Over half a million 12" L.P.s have been sold in less than two weeks via some 3,000 outlets including regular record shops, bookshops, newsagents, departmental and self-service stores. The pressing plant is working at full pressure to meet the tremendous demand for these quality albums retailing at 12/6d (\$1.75). A spokesman for "Music for Pleasure" told Cash Box that of the 78 initial releases the best selling pop L.P. has been "Nat King Cole Sings" with Holst's Planet Suite topping the classical list. November will see a further eleven releases, nine of them pops headed by a specially recorded album of "My Fair Lady" starring Anne Rogers (who played 1600 performances of the show) and Tony Britten. Other releases include Jo Stafford, Jimmy Young, Billy May, Gene Vincent, Django Reinhardt, Jack Jones, Skeets McDonald and The Roberto Martin Gospel Singers. On the classical side Rachmaninoff's Second Symphony and "Miscellaneous Overtures of Rossini." Two special releases are planned for December—Walt Disney's own cover version of "Mary Poppins" starring Marnie Nixon (who sang for Audrey Hepburn in "My Fair Lady") and Bill Lee. The album has already sold over two million copies for the Disneyland label in America. The second release will be a "Hello Dolly" L.P. specially recorded for "Music for Pleasure" by EMI a&r manager Norman Newell. Heading the January releases will be another Norman Newell production "The King and I" starring June Bronhill, the same month will see albums featuring Eddie Calvert, The Big Ben Banjo Band, Fats Waller, Louis Prima and The Brendan Ballinakil Ceili Band.

EMI continues their onslaught on the L.P. market by launching another new series "Music for Sophisticats." The initial release comprises 12 albums, ten vocal and two instrumental, specially chosen to attract, as the title suggests, the more sophisticated record buyer. "Music for Sophisticats" features top quality recordings by established artistes of the calibre of Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Astrud Gilberto, Ella Fitzgerald, Nancy Wilson, Buddy Greco, Shirley Bassey, Andre Previn, Oscar Peterson, Vickie Carr and Timi Yuro.

November will also see the first stereo releases on the RCA Victrola label which retails at 20/6d. (\$2.85). Operatic and classical material will be taken from back RCA catalogues much of which has not previously been released in this country. Victrola will be the first low-priced label to carry complete operatic recordings in stereo. First release comprises 12 items, two operatic Berlioz "L'enfance du Christ" (two-L.P.s) and Puccini's "Tosca" (two-L.P.s) and ten orchestral including works by Beethoven, Elgar, Tchaikovsky, Bartok, Prokofiev and Vivaldi.

Britain says Goodbye at the end of the month to folk singer Joan Baez when she returns to America after consolidating her reputation on disk by a long and triumphant personal appearance tour. Before leaving she tele-recorded two shows for BBC TV for future screening.

Dave Berry, whose talents are under-rated in this country, is currently enjoying considerable success on the continent. His recording of "This Strange Effect" has topped the charts in both Holland and Belgium. He was the hit of Holland's Grand Gala du Disques recently and earlier this year took part in the Knokke Festival in Belgium. Absent from the home charts since his success last year with "Little Things" and "The Crying Game" everyone hopes his latest single "I'm Gonna Take You There" on Decca, published by Feldman, will re-establish him in the British charts.

A new low-priced country & western series comes out this month on the Fontana label retailing at 21/6d. (\$3) carrying material from the American Hilltop catalogue featuring such artistes as Johnny Cash, Jimmy Dean, Patsy Cline, Ferlin Huskey and Hank Locklin.

The Dick James Music Company is really in the groove with the Lennon-McCartney composition "Yesterday" from their film "Help." Although Paul took the number to the top of the American Top 100 his version is not issued here as a single. The battle rages between Matt Monro's ballad version on Parlophone (which notched up over 50,000 in its first week) and Marianne Faithfull's version which has a big choir backing on Decca. Both versions look like chart items. Other artistes to wax the number include Cilla Black, Alma Cogan and Mary Wells on albums. Number is, of course, published by Northern Songs Ltd.

Dusty Springfield, back in the charts, after a long absence, with "Some Of Your Lovin'" on Philips, makes a short visit to America at the end of October for TV and p.a.'s promoting her current American single "I Just Don't Know What To Do With Myself" which was a big hit for her in Britain. Her latest album "Everything's Coming Up Dusty" is selling extremely well and the Philips factory is working overtime to keep stocks rolling. Brother Tom who gave The Seekers their transatlantic hits with "A World Of Our Own" and "I'll Never Find Another You" has penned their latest single "The Carnival Is Over" released on Columbia and published by Springfield Music.

With the entry into the Top 50 of "La Yenka" by Johnny and Charlie on Pye, Polydor has rush-released a double sided jenka single coupling "Letkiss" with "Letkajenkka" by the original Finnish jenka artiste Roberto Delgado.

Independent producer Andy Wood has great hopes for The Shindig's new recording "A Little While Back" issued on Parlophone and published by Feldman. The number was penned by Graham Gouldman who has penned hits for The Yardbirds including "Heartful Of Soul"; "For Your Love" and their current smash "Evil Hearted You."

Philip Birch, Managing Director of Radlon, the sales company for pirate radio ship Radio London currently in America taking in Dallas, Los Angeles, Chicago and New York visiting American advertisers and negotiating for a Radio London representative in New York. Radio London claims a daytime audience of 13 million listeners.

Quickies: Congratulations to Fontana a&r Manager Johnny Franz on his marriage to his secretary Moira Creemer. . . . Once again Frankie Vaughan is donating all proceeds of his latest Philips single "The Happy Train" to The Boys Club Federation. . . . Pye Records hosted reception for Warner Bros. artistes Dick and DeeDee here for TV and p.a.'s to promote their latest single "Use What You've Got." . . . From the April Blackwood catalogue handled here by Dick James comes a new composition from the pen of Van McCoy "Baby I'm Yours" recorded by Peter and Gordon on Columbia. . . . Just issued on E.P. "Beatlecracker" by Arthur Wilkinson—a Tchaikovsky-type arrangement of seven Beate compositions. . . . A Burt Bacharach composition "London Life" waxed by Anita Harris on Pye. . . . Another Chris Andrews composition for Adam Faith "I Don't Need That Kind Of Lovin'" on Parlophone published by Glissando. . . . Bovema's Imperial label has several new Dutch pop-items out. Special promotion has been set up for **Imca Marina's** "Rote Rosen, Weisses Kleid," expected to be another 'golden' bestseller in the German-lyrical vein after the successes of the lark's "Lass Mein Herz Nicht Weinen" as "Harlokino."

Then, **Rien v. Nunen**, as a TV-actor still starring on the screen with the repeated "Stiefbeen" series, has a second recording on the market, "Vodde En Bene." So have **The Cavaliers**, the southern beat group, who had their items "Wait A Minute" and "You Cannot Make Me Cry" released.

Liberty's controversial **P. J. Proby** has a real active fan club in Holland, which has its own magazine "The Probyty," published regularly. Bovema's US-label is about to rush out Proby's "That Means A Lot" and hopes that current negotiations will result in the star's visit to Holland in the course of January next. Proby's "Let The Water Run Down" is selling very well these days.

Bovema-label manager **Cees Pompe** of Columbia stated that the popular folk-singers **Seekers** will join the next **Anneke Grönloh**-show on November 12. They will certainly do their latest hit, "The Carnival Is Over," due for release at Gramophoneous shortly.

Bovema's HMV-topground in the folk area, **The Shepherds**, still scoring tremendous successes at **Rene Sleswijk's** National Show, were featured in a recent **Corry Brokken**-TV-show. New recordings are in preparation.

"Who's James B.?" That's a big question for the Dutch music press and radio after that Imperial gassed everyone in the field with **James B. & The Starliners** and their "Oh/Oh,Seven!"/"The Blitz," a beat-item in which really "something else" can be heard! The artist's identity will be spectacularly unveiled very soon.

The Beatles' motion-picture "Help!" was just premiered in Amsterdam and other cities of Holland. Theatres are over-crowded and Parlophone's "Help!"-singles and-albums are still selling like hotcakes.

The Tielman Brothers played Scheveningen for a few months and are now touring the country Gigs at Nijmegen and Breda. Imperial, meanwhile, re-released their 1st 12" album for the occasion.

In the cadre of their promotional tour through Europe the American singers **Dick And Deedee** (Warner Bros.) will visit Holland on October 25. Interviews with radio and press are on their program for that day.

The Kinks (Pye Records) will come over to Holland on November 20-21.

Enormous success for "Maria" by **The Tielman Brothers** (Ariola). Two weeks after the release it is already number 20 on the Dutch hit parade. Even more a success is that also the United States (Scepter Records) have decided to release this item.

Another Dutch production "I'll follow the Sun"/"Wasted Words" by the **Motions** was also taken over by Scepter.

A new series titled "Golden Hits of The Everly Brothers" with old successes such as "Bird Dog," "Temptation," "Wake Up Little Suzie" will certainly find its way to old and new fans of Don and Phil Everly.

Donovan's "Universal Soldier" is still high on the Dutch charts. The Dutch cover version "Zomaar een Soldaat" by **Cowboy Gerard** should become a follow-up of his success "Het Spel Kaarten" (Deck of Cards).

An important release is an LP "Surinam" by **Alberto**. Prime Minister **J. Pengel** of Surinam was most enthusiastic about this good example of Surinam music and wrote an introduction on the sleeve.

The re-release of the first LP of **Edwin Rutten**, titled "Taking A Chance On Edwin" shows once again his vocal qualities in the jazz-field.

From the Chess catalog, **Pete Felleman** of Artone's subsid, **Funckler Records**, has rush-released 2 albums by **John Lee Hooker**, entitled "House Of The Blues" and "John Lee Hooker Sings And Plays The Blues," and an extended play recording by **Buddy Guy** on account of concert appearance of the American Folk Blues Festival 1965 (October 14). This release, being the initial one from Chess International Blues Series, presents the headliners of this year's Blues Festival.

New Artone-released Benelux outings from the United Artists catalog include "Some Enchanted Evening" by **Jay & The Americans**, "I'm A Happy Man" by **The Jive Five** and "If You Wait For Love" by **Bobby Goldsboro**. From United Artists' vast library of Soundtrack recordings, two new albums have been released in conjunction with the first local showings of the movies "The Knack" and "The Greatest Story Ever Told."

New locally produced material issued by Artone, presents **De Maskers** (The Masks) with an English and a Dutch version of local chart-item "Shame & Scandal In The Family," a brand new **Willy Schobben** single featuring the artist's golden trumpet sound in Sirtaki readings of "Saloniki" and "Nausikaa" and an LP offering by **The Yugoslav Invalid Partisan Choir** from Ljubljana. This Choir, directed by **Radovan Gobec** and numbering 70 members, was recorded "live" by Artone during a performance of Partisan & Folk Songs at the Tivoli-Concerthall in Utrecht. A selection of eighteen songs has been made available on Long Play.

Pete Felleman of Artone's subsid **Funckler Records**, local Roulette distributor, is very excited about the national break-through of **Shawn Elliott's** "Shame & Scandal in the Family." Platter appeared in the No. 12 slot of the best sellers listing this week.

New single material released by **Funckler** in Benelux from the Tamla-Motown catalog includes **Billy Eckstine's** first item for the label, "Had You Been Around," a **Supremes'** single culled from their "C & W & Pop" album with "Baby Doll" and "Sunset" and their latest LP package with "More Hits" including "Nothing But Heartaches" and "Stop! In The Name Of Love," with which songs the girls scored a huge success during their performance at the recent Grand Gala du Disque in Amsterdam.

The famous Russian pianist **Emil Gilels** (winner of the 1938 Elisabeth Competition in Brussels), of whom CBS recently released Chopin's First Piano Concerto with **The Philadelphia Orchestra** conducted by **Eugene Ormandy**, gave a recital at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw, on October 12, 1965, featuring works of Schubert and Shostakovitch.

After the concert, CBS arranged a meeting between **Emil Gilels** and his wife and **Isaac Stern** and **Alexander Zakin**, who arrived the same night from London at Amsterdam Airport Schiphol. They had not seen each other in 4 months and the reunion at Stern's Hotel was a very happy one. Mr. and Mrs. Gilels left Amsterdam for Basel (Switzerland), on October 13, 1965, escorted to the Central Railway Station by CBS' assistant sales manager **Gerard Hulsebosch**.

On October 12, one of the world's most celebrated violinists, exclusive recording star for CBS and member of the beloved **Stern/Rose/Istomin Trio**, **Isaac Stern**, accompanied by pianist **Alexander Zakin**, arrived at Amsterdam Airport Schiphol and were welcomed by CBS' sales manager **Hemmy J. S. Wapperom** and promo manager **Paul Muller**, who escorted their famous guests to their Amsterdam Hotel. Stern played Beethoven's Violin Concerto in Amster-

In Sweden, however, **Sonet** is distributing their sheet music via **Sonora Musikförlags AB**, which explains why the latter publishing house had the song in its catalog. Danish distributor of the sheet music is **Winckler-Produktion** in Copenhagen. The **Nino Rosso** recording on **Sonet** is doing very well in Denmark and Norway at the moment, and looks like a hit in Sweden, too.

"Eve Of Destruction," now on the charts all over Scandinavia, has been recorded locally here by **Sir Henry** and **His Butlers** for **Columbia**. Other local **EMI** recordings include **Grethe Sønck** on **Columbia** with "Dronning Hos Os" (Queen Of The House)/"Man Kan Ikke Tro På Mandfolk" (A Broken Heart And The Pillow). On **Odeon Otto Brandenburg** has done "Bon Soir, Mademoiselle"/"Syttent Ti" (Engine Engine No. 9).

NORWAY

Toril Støa has recorded "Long Live Love," in Norwegian titled "Leve Kjaerlighet," for **Troll**. **Al Bishop** has done "I Will Live My Life For You"/"You're Free To Go," also for **Troll**.

New on the charts here this week are "Look Through Any Window" with the **Hollies** on **Parlophone** and "Bird Dog" with **Everly Brothers** on **Warner Bros**.

SWEDEN

In Stockholm for business talks with publisher **Stig Anderson** and the **RCA Victor** people was **Jay Lasker** of **Trousdale Music**, Los Angeles, original publisher of "Eve Of Destruction," now on the top of the charts here.

Swedish TV has now been showing "The Adams Family" as a late Friday evening program for the last three weeks. **RCA Victor** has the theme song from the show, which seems to be very popular with the TV viewers but perhaps a little less popular among the critics.

A merger between **Philips** and **Polydor** in Sweden (as well as in most other countries) is a rumour heard almost every autumn, and of course, this year is no exception. None of the involved companies have any comments, but local papers and magazines have printed the "news" as they always do.

There will be an LP with the **Madmen** on the **Dollar** label, reports **Ake Söhr**, head of the new label. As reported last week, the label just debuted with a single by the same group. According to **Söhr**, **Dollar** will include mainly pop music, but some folk can also be expected.

Highlighting this event, CBS presented the entire Dutch classical press with a special press kit, containing photos, biographic material, etc. of this famous violinist, whereas the dealers of Amsterdam and The Hague received blow-ups and photo-material of this great CBS artist.

Recent CBS additions to the popular LP field include **Bob Dylan's** latest album, entitled "Highway 61 Revisited," containing such items as "Positively 4th Street" and "From A Buick 6," an album by **Lefty Frizzell** entitled "The Sad Side Of Love," **Marty Robbins'** "Marty After Midnight" and an album entitled "Canadian Sunset" by **Andy Williams**.



BELGIUM

Mr. Darlier, of the Herman Brauer publishing house told Cash Box, that this firm currently has quite a lot of hits on hand. Numbers such as "Goodbye My Love" by the Searchers; "Au Revoir Mon Amour" by Richard Anthony and "Aan De Overkant" (On The Other Side) by Jimmy Frey; while the publishing firm Vedette also can point to a long list, from which we shall cite the most important ones. These are "Mr. Tambourine Man" and "Subterranean Homesick Blues" by Bob Dylan; "Bluesette" by T. Thielemans; "Je Me Suis Souvent Demandé" (I've Often Wondered) by R. Anthony; "Bring It On Home To Me (Reviens Donc Chez Nous)" by the Animals; "Le Ciel, Le Soleil Et La Mer (The Sky, The Sun And The Sea)," Fr. Deguelt; "Once Upon A Time," Tom Jones; "Like A Rolling Stone," Bob Dylan; "Shame And Scandal In The Family," Sh. Elliott; "Positively 4th Street," Dylan; and "If You Gotta Go, Go Now," Manfred Mann.

In the Robert Mellin catalogue the current bestsellers are: "Cry To Me," the Pretty Things; "I Don't Want To Go On," Moody Blues; "Now," Dave Berry; "Hang On Sloopy," McCoys; "My One And Only Love," Dean Martin; "Everybody Needs Somebody To Love," the Rolling Stones; "Five Hundred Miles," Unit 4 Plus 2; "Roberta," the Animals. And to mention a few successes recorded by the Editions New Music Corporations: "Paysans (Peasants)," Eddie Defaca; "Une Marionette (A Puppet)," Franck Fernandel; "Ouvre Ta Main Et Donne (Open Your Hand And Give)," Enrico Macias; "Vive La Classe," "La Valse Du Printemps (Spring Waltz)" and "La Valse Ardennaise (Ardennes Waltz)" all by Lou Pascal.

Despite the fact that Vogue has enjoyed a whole string of hits on the label imported from its parent company in France (not to mention the British Pyelits) they have nevertheless produced an EP with a local well-known beat-group from Antwerp, Roland et les Bemols, on Pacific-label. The side with "Aurelie" seems to show good promises.

Discotrade has marketed a rather remarkable novelty, according to Mr. Braunstein, its manager. We had the privilege to listen to the first of a series of "Disco Flashes, Le Journal Qui Vous Parle" (Disco Flashes, the paper that speaks to you). On it are recorded speeches and interviews by prominent people, from religious, musical and political circles. The voices heard are of Cardinal Cardijn, about the Vatican Council, Dr. Schweitzer, the apostle of Lambarene, General de Gaulle, Raoul Levy and Maurice Chevalier, the latter about the success scored by the Belgian singer Adamo in France. The records, made of soft plastic and neatly packed, are sold for 30 fr. (60 ct), a very moderate price when compared to the price of a single sold here for 66 fr. (about \$1.60). These Disco-Flashes records play at 33 rpm. The commission responsible for the reports consists of such well-known reporters as Gilbert Varin, Jacques Danois, Henri Roanne, Marc Danval and Jacques Bal. A second recording is now being prepared with talks on "Le Sirtaki A 10 Ans" (Ten Years Of Sirtaki), "Paul VI At The UN" and other remarkable interviews.

Mr. Goldschmidt, manager of Anvers-Radio is quite satisfied with the present business trend. His low-priced Ember series of LP's, selling for only 99 fr. (\$1.98), is meeting with considerable success. As far as quality is concerned, this label is in good repute and sales having shot up, in a very short time, to astronomical figures. Anvers-Radio is now distributing, in this country, the Italian label, Durium, on which Marino Marini could well make a splendid come-back in the very near future. The firm is now taking steps to run an ambitious TV-program with Marini. The sales of Command-tapes are doing just as well as when this novelty was first introduced. The firm is especially famous for the excellence of its LP's.

The cabaret La Cantilène, in the rue de Flandre, in Brussels, is probably the only one of its kind in Belgium, presenting singing stars every Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Listed on the programme are such re-sounding names as Roger Riffar, Marc Oegeret, Ricet Barrier, Monique Leroy, Dominique Ney and Gilles Olivier, and Maurice Fanon. Other big names are to be programmed later on.

S.A. Gramophone is especially gratified, according to Emile Garin, its commercial manager, with the fine sales of Adamo-disks, and also with the initiative of the popular disk-jockey of the French language Belgian radio network, Jean-Claude. At his initiative a special train was laid on to Paris, in order to enable hundreds of teenagers to attend an Adamo-concert at the Olympia Theatre, with proceeds going to the fund for the erection of villages for handicapped children. Proceeds proved excellent. It was a really praiseworthy effort. Sacha Distel, now on "His Master's Voice" is enjoying great success with his first EP, on which appears "Scandal Dans La Famille" (Scandal In The Family), a sure hit. Success, too, for two lower-priced LP's (149 fr.) by Dean Martin and Frank Sinatra. The LP "Adama à L'Olympia" (Adamo At The Olympia) got off to a tremendous start.

Philips organized a reception in honour of the Singing Nuns, whose first EP is now being distributed here. The Nuns—Sister Maria Laetitia, from Bergen-op-Zoom, Sister Jovita, from Croningen, and Sister Anne José, from Venlo—belong to the Order of the Sisters of Charity, with headquarters in Ghent, although they are at present attached to the St. Ann Psycho-therapeutic Institute at Venray (Netherlands), one of the most modern and dynamic institutions of its kind in Europe. The Singing Nuns are working in the "Entertainment" section, where psycho-therapy consists namely of stage-plays, revues, music, songs and orchestral interpretations. This method has proved really quite effective.

Polygram Belgium reports the release of a fantastic new album with "Kerstliederen" (Christmas Songs) by the 1964 contest-winning boys' choir, "De Lustige Heivinken," directed by Brother Arnold. An album of old Flemish and other Christmas songs it is a very stylish production that no doubt will interest the buyers.

In both French and Flemish Belgium "Capri C'est Fini" sung by Hervé Villard on Fontana is on top.

Horst Jankowski's "A Walk In The Black Forest" is slowly walking to the top everywhere in Belgium.

Polygram proudly introduces the first hit single on Mercury by Fats Domino, "I Left My Heart In San Francisco" b/w "I Done Got Over It." The very well known American beat group the Walker Brothers released a new single entitled "Make It Easy On Yourself" b/w "But I Do."

The very famous French "Chansonniere," Barbara, came out with a new album. We believe that after her appearance in "Ancien Belgique" in Brussels this album will be a bestseller.

Young people still believe in the good old Rocking Time. That's the reason why a new album by Jerry Lee Lewis was released, entitled "The Return Of Rock."

On the "Folk" scene a new record has been released by Juan Montego and the Kingstons Orch. an original from Trinidad, titled "Shame And Scandal In The Family."

Artone subsid Funckler Records, managed by J. Tyberghein rush-released: "It's The Same Old Song" by the Four Tops (Tamla-Motown). Since the "Tops" are still one of the leading groups, thanks to "I Can't Help Myself," (Continued On Next Column)

there is a big chance that they'll soon have two songs on the Belgian Charts.

There was still another issue from Tamla Motown. The Temptations are back with "Since I Lost My Baby," the most commercial song they have recorded till now.

Funckler, in addition to doing considerable business with the singles by Bobby Vinton will, in addition to the regular issue of single material, also release Epic albums from artists such as Bobby Vinton, Buddy Greco, the Village Stompers, Bobby Hackett, among others.

Artone activities concerning the Colpix line are the LP's by Nina Simone. Nina has gained such a popularity over here, after her appearance at the Jazz Festival of Comblain La Tour, that there is a frequent demand for her albums.

"The In Crowd" by the Ramsey Lewis Trio, has been released on the Chess International label. This U.S. chart-rider will score very soon, and can be number one in Belgium in a few weeks due to the company's continued radio promotion.

Recent additions to the local United Artists catalog include "Themes Of Great Italian Films," "The Hallelujah Trail," "What's New Pussycat," "The Knack" and "I Want To Live."

Recent Cameo Parkway release in Belgium is Chubby Checker's "Cu Me La Be Stay" b/w "Everything's Wrong." Bestselling Chubby Checker albums are "All The Hits" and "Chubby Checker In Person."



ARGENTINA

Fermata boss Mauricio Brenner is currently in Europe, on a three-week trip that includes Spain, Italy (where he will stay in Rome and Milano), Switzerland, France and England. Departure from Buenos Aires took place on Oct. 14, and Brenner is expected to be back in the first week of November. Fermata's operations have been expanded from Argentina and Brazil to Europe in the past few years, and this tour is expected to tighten connections. Several top recording and publishing people will be contacted, too.

Last week, Odeon manager Philip Brodie organized a party at his home to honor the people from his organization attending the meeting of the Latin American Federation of Record Producers. The gathering featured all those associated with the company in this country, and the delegates to the convention. There was plenty of entertainment provided by Los Shakers, Los Wawanaco and other artists.

Music Hall has launched a new experiment in marketing under its "Difusion Musical" series: a box containing six albums—previously released individually—priced at 2950 pesos (\$16.90). Artists included are Gigliola Cinquetti, Rolando Laserie, Jose Basso, Julio Molina Cabral and others. Regular price for these LP's, bought separately, would be near \$28. The diskery is now working hard on the promotion of "The Addams Family" and "Apples And Bananas" by Lawrence Welk, and "I Want To Be Your Guy" by the Swinging Medallions. There is also a recording of "Quitate El Saco" by Pedro Laza and his Pelayeros, which will probably find a good market.

This Cash Box representative had the pleasure of meeting, after the Philips convention in Buenos Aires, Joao Araujo an old friend who came with CBD topper Alain Trossat from Brazil. Araujo commented on the big success that is being enjoyed by the Brazilian MPM (Modern Popular Music), already very much lauded in Cash Box' column from that country. This has motivated the recording of an album, "Cinco Na Bossa," which follows the hit of "Dois Na Bossa," and has been also recorded live at the Paramount Theater of Sao Paulo. Nara, Edu Lobo and Tamba Trio are featured in this LP. Philips' representative in Argentina is starting the release of a whole series of Brazilian MPM albums, including Tamba Trio, Ellis Regina and several other top names.

The Press Department of RCA sends news about Carlos Barral, who is expected by the diskery to become a strong star in the tango music field. Barral is twenty three years old and has already recorded two singles for RCA. He is now preparing a tour of several Central American countries that will last a couple of months. The label is also engaged in a strong campaign in behalf of Simonette, another strong potential artist. The lark will take part in a new flick, with Mexican stars Marco Antonio Muñoz and Emily Cranz, and local sensation Juan Ramon.

Microfon is preparing an album by Martin Sosa, with music designed for the country market, including "Gaviota," "Recuerdos" and others. Title of the album will be "Hoy Hay Baile." Also ready for release is the second album by Los Cuatro Planetas, with titles like "Girl of Ipanema," "Eight Days a Week," "I Feel Fine" and "Two Guitars." On the jazz side, there are several albums due including Miles Davis (Collector's Items), Thelonious Monk and Sonny Rollins.

Julio Korn Publishers are working on two Greek songs that have been recorded by Palette and released here by Disc Jockey, in the Kyriakos version: "Synnefa Platia" and "Mia Fora Monaha Ftani." There are also several Brazilian tunes sung by Roberto Carlos, who's currently in Buenos Aires: "Parei Na Contra Mao," "Broto Do Jacare" and "Minha Historia De Amor." "I Know A Place" has been recorded by Los Increibles for CBS, while "La Nuit" has been waxed by Marito Gonzalez on Music Hall and Juan Ramon for RCA.

For Mother's Day, Disc Jockey released a record by twelve-year old Luigi, titled "Busco Una Mama." This is the first waxing by this artist. Maestro Lucio Milena is working on an album with instrumental versions of sixteen chart-riding items. Milena has been working very much with DJ in the past months, providing the background for artists like Pepito Perez, Ricardo Rey and Rosamel Araya, among others.

Surco is cashing in with the film soundtrack "How To Murder Your Wife," currently being shown in Buenos Aires. Also among the label's best sellers is the soundtrack from "Goldfinger," a film so successful that the distributor started reshewing James Bond's "Dr. No," which has passed unadvertised when it was first shown in 1963. Also worth mentioning is a new tango quartet recording for the diskery, which will record fourteen standard tangos with modern arrangements. Title will be "Echoes of Buenos Aires."

CBS reports that Eddy Cramer, recently launched by the label, has cut a new single with "El Loco del Violin" and "Miedo," while there will be an album by Chad and Jeremy, tagged "Before and After," along with a single carrying the same title. Barbra Streisand's "My Name is Barbra" will be also launched, and there will be another single by the Byrds, "Me Sentire Mucho Mejor," following their "Mr. Tambourine Man." A new single by folk lark Maria Helena is also expected. Title is "Mi Serenata" and "Corrientes es Asi."

Stanko Jerebic of Melograf infos that Juan Ramon (RCA) will record "Las Colinas Estan en Flor," the Spanish version of a famous Italian hit. La Charranga del Caribe (CBS) is selling well with its version of "Pa' Batunga" and "Paisaje de Cumbia," while Las Medias Negras, for the same label, have cut "Mi Loro Pedro" and "La Viudita."

Lagos Publishers, strongly represented in the best sellers lists during the past months with its folk product, continues the promotion of "No Te Puedo Olvidar," "No Quisiera Quererte" and "Que Bonita Va," both in Argentina and abroad. Also on hand is a strong possibility, "Zambita del Musiquero," recorded by Horacio Guarany and Los Fronterizos, among others.

Smart Publishers send word about the recording of "Vete Por Favor" (Walk Away), by Claudio (Odeon Pops). The tune was recorded in Europe by Matt Monro. On the local side, composer Peregrino Salcedo and Angel Gente, have written "Tu Voz, Siempre Tu Voz," a tango that will be promoted strongly in short time.

Ala-Nicky Records are working on an album recorded by Vicente Orrego and his group, containing twelve tunes of Paraguayan music. Orrego is very popular in that country, and the record is expected to sell well. For the teen market, A-N has more singles by the VIP's, who already recorded "Downtown" and three other songs. Enough tunes will be cut to complete an album, and there will be other singles available, too.



ITALY

"Si Fa Sera" is a title which has suddenly entered the hit parade in Italy. The song was recorded by Gianni Morandi on RCA label. Gianni has been on the Italian light music scene for two years. Discovered and produced by Franco Migliacci, pacted by RCA Italiana, he started with rock ballads such as "Andavo A Cento All-Ora" and "Fatti Mandare Dalla Mamma," but reached the peak of his record sales with strong melodic songs such as "In Ginocchio Da Te" issued in the summer of 1964 and which became the selling disc of the season, and "Non Son Degno Di Te" another melodic ballad which was at the top of our charts in the autumn and winter season 1964/65.

"Si Fa Sera" was included as leit-motif of a 1965 summer TV series called "Mare Contro Mare," and step by step, confirming the extraordinary selling power of this boy, has reached the top position of the charts. The song is also published by RCA Italiana.

Other news from RCA Italiana concerns Rita Pavone. The little songstress will be the star guest of a contest which is held annually in Zurich (Switzerland), called "Festival Of Italian Song In Switzerland." The contest will be televised all over Europe.

She was also star guest of the "Gran Gala Du Disque" (Oct. 2) in Amsterdam (Holland).

RCA Italiana's Nico Fidenco, Jimmy Fontana, Edoardo Vianello, Louiselle and Dino will appear (Nov. 9) on the TV screens of Belgium, taking part in a big international show organized that day by the Belgian Television Company.

We have also been informed by RCA Italiana that Rita Pavone will star in a new weekly TV series called "The Rita Pavone Show." Among the star guests set for this series will be EMI's Adamo, who will be in Rome (Oct. 25, 26, 27) to present his latest tune "La Notte." He will also present, on Italian TV, a personal recital called "15 Minutes With Adamo," where he will present all his recent recordings.

Mr. Osterreicher Sr. and Mr. Osterreicher Jr. of Turikaphon, coming from Vienna, have paid a visit to Durium whose catalogue they represent in Austria. Other foreign visitors to our country was Mr. Hori of Hori Production and Tokyo Music Publishing. He visited at Durium, Sugarmusic, Leonardi and Curci.

Another guest of Italy this week is Mr. Sikorski of Hans Sikorski Musikverlage of Hamburg (Germany). He is accompanied by his wife, and by Gunther Gayer, head of the foreign department of the pubbery. Mr. Sikorski who recently entered the record field as an indie producer, is paying visits to all the principal Italian publishers and record firms. Currently in Milan, he will soon be leaving for Rome.

Continuing with news for the Durium firm, we have to announce that they have just entered their new offices located in Milan, Via Manzoni 42. The new telephone number is 701008. Also announced by Durium is the renewal of their exclusive agreement with Vogue in Paris, for the distribution of their production in that country.

Nini Rosso's recording "Il Silenzio" which is still a big hit in Germany, has now entered the charts in England.

The name of Mina is once again in the spotlight thanks to her recent recording of "Un Bacio E' Troppo Poco" which is getting a very good reaction in our market. The title is issued under the Ri.Fi label and published by Curci.

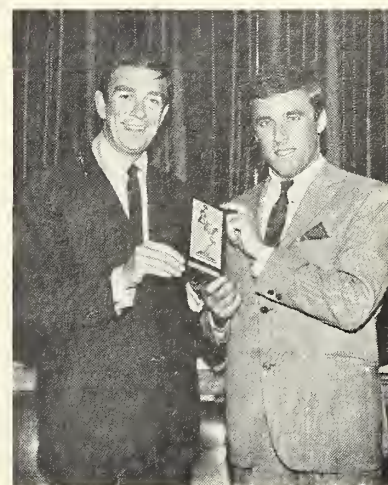

JAPAN

Connie Francis' first performance was held (Oct. 9) at Kosei Nenkin Hall in Tokyo. She introduced her wide repertoire including Latin, canzone, jazz, western, and film theme music. Among the twenty songs she did were, "Pretty Little Baby," "Vacation," "Follow The Boys," and "Where The Boys Are," in Japanese. Japanese fans will enjoy the dream-come-true performances to be held throughout main cities.

George Scheck, of Francon Music, the lark's manager, came to Japan with Connie. While in Tokyo, he tried to develop publishing operations for Connie with Shinko Music in Tokyo. It is said to have been a success.

Jimmy Johnson, president of Walt Disney Publishing Division, arrived in Tokyo (Oct. 8) accompanied by his wife. While staying in Tokyo, he met with Joe Webster, manager of the Japanese Branch of the firm, and with Nippon Columbia, for the purpose of developing the publishing operation of "Mary Poppins." At the meeting he also decided to edit the main score of "Mary Poppins" by himself and also decided to entrust the publishing to Shinko Music in Tokyo. Johnson started for Hongkong (Oct. 15) after sight-seeing around Kyoto.

Frank Mancini, M.G.M. promotional Division, came to Japan to investigate the sales and popularity of M.G.M. records, with the help of Nippon Gramophone, the local distributor of M.G.M. While here, with Connie Francis staying in Japan, he also tried to do promotional activity for the lark.

Takeo Hori, owner of Hori Production, returned home from an inspection tour through London, Paris, Milan and other cities, where he learned new methods of publishing operation.

Due to the announcement made by Nippon Victor, Mahina Stars, leading vocal group here in Japan, will record "Namidakun Sayonara" written and composed by Kuranosuke Hamaguchi. The attractive song has already been recorded by Kyu Sakamoto on Toshiba, and by Johnny Tillotson on M.G.M. both in English and in Japanese. Mahina Aters had a smash hit "Aishite, Aishite, Aishichattanoyo" recently, his latest, "Namidakun Sayonara" is drawing keen attention.

JASRAC's cabinet was made public this time. Keizo Horiuchi was elected as president. Yoshizo Kasuga and Shin Yoshida were elected as chairman and director of the board (respectively). However, deserving special mention, two publishers were included among 16 directors of the board. By two publishers' entry into the cabinet, JASRAC not only characterizes the representatives of writers, as usual, but also the representative of copyright owners. Further, JASRAC is said to have had a stronger voice in the government and user, and also is expected to have a say in the amendment of the law.

King Records reportedly took many orders from one of the record companies in Brazil. They are principally "The Night Of Dance Party" by Fumio Matsumoto and Music Makers, "Folk Song Of Southern Part Of The Country" by Miki Nakasone, "Sayonara Wa Dance No Atoni" by Chieko Baisho, "Tokyo Boys Chorus Group Goes To Asia" and others. While Baisho's "Sayonarawa Dance No Atoni" released by ABC Paramount was reported to be popular in America.

Philips Sales Department of Nippon Victor will release (Nov. 1) two sets of deluxe LPs as a strong year-end release. The titles are "Music Travel Around Europe" and "Music Travel Around Latin America." Each set consists of 3 LP's including more than 30 tunes like "La Seine," "Dark Eyes," and "The Third Man" in the former, and "Danny Boy," "Blue Hawaii" and "Besame Mucho" in the latter.

Yukiko Ninomiya, lark of King Records, will do a charity show Dec. 6-8 in Hokkaido, the profit from which is reportedly given to disabled persons.

Nippon Crown will hold "Crown Star Parade Show" Oct. 30—Nov. 4 at Okinawa, to honor the second anniversary of the establishment of the firm. Teruhiko Saigo, as a leading singer of the firm, will participate in the festival show.

Bo Diddley and Barry McGuire will be on stage in the same program at The Olympia in Paris. It will be a great night in that music hall, and a great success because French people are more and more interested in original versions of songs. This is a very important new fact in the French record market. We see now English and American singers reaching the best places on the charts.

Next week it is Chuck Berry who will sing at the Olympia. At the same time France's most important rock 'n roll singer Eddy Mitchell will be on stage for a week in Brussels. Eddy is a Barclay artist. Dalida, also with Barclay, is now recording 30 songs, 12 in French for a new LP, 12 in Italian and several others in Spanish and German. In the beginning of December Dalida will spend three weeks singing in Israel.

We receive this week several news from: PATHE MARCONI (Publishing): Henri Marchal, Pathé Marconi's manager, tells us he has a lot of hopes with two new author-composers, Annie Jansen ("Idoles De Toujours") and Eny Dual ("La Rose Plaintive"). He is very happy with the great success of "Il Silenzio" as an instrumental composition and as a song by Dalida's recording through Barclay label. Frank Pourcel recorded with his orchestra Adamo's new hit, "J'Aime."

PUBLICATIONS FRANCIS DAY: Young French singer Monty just recorded, on Barclay a French treatment of Herman's Hermits' hit "I'm Henry VIII, I Am"; French title is "On Ne Meurt Qu'Une Fois." Italian song "Il Peperone" has been recorded on Polydor label by Les Bab's in a French version titled "T'Es Tout Blanc." Lucky Blondo, who was a great success last summer with "Des Roses Rouges Pour Un Ange Blond," will soon record "Je Vais T'Oublier," a French treatment of "I'm Forgetting Now" on Philips. Through the Ducretet label, Les Missiles, a French male group, just recorded a French treatment of "I Can Make You Mine" ("Moi J'Attends Mon Tour") published by Lawrence Wright. Through Francis Day we will soon hear Philips "Ses Baisers Me Grisait," the French treatment of "Kisses Sweeter Than Wine." Nana Mouskouri is going to record the tune.

CBS: CBS budget classical collection "Classiques Favoris," the first one to have appeared on the French market is taking a new start. A new attractive presentation and the cheapest price for stereo, 9,95 + 1 Francs. The French version of "My Fair Lady" is now being shown in Paris, and it has been getting a warm welcome. The Spanish, Italian and German versions are being recorded by CBS in Paris. Through Odeon label we have this week the release of an EP by the Hollies tabbed "Look Through Any Window." Another very good EP through CBS is by the Christy Minstrels. They sing on it "Downtown" and "We'll Sing In The Sunshine."

VOGUE: Leon Cabat is in the States to meet managers of the different labels distributed by Vogue in France. He also went to Canada to visit people who represent Vogue in that country.

PHILIPS: This firm presents this week the songs from "Picolo Et Picolette," the famous French TV cartoon. Through the Fontana label they just released an EP from a young Canadian singer Donald Lautrec, main title is "Action." Sheila and Akim have recorded a song together. It's titled "Devant Le Juke Box."

JAPAN (Continued)

Emmie Jackson's first LP will be released in the beginning of Dec. by Nippon Columbia. It includes such recent hit numbers as "Namidano Taiyo," "Yumemiru My Boy," "Pretend," "Crying In The Chapel" and 8 others.

Nini Rosso's "Il Silenzio," which already is a top item in countries all over the world, has really entered into the Top 10 in Japan. With such expectation, record companies here are eager to have single releases of the title, which is going to cause an unusually competitive release. MEXICO

Lucho Gatica, the Chilean singer who settled a long time ago in México City, returned to the capital after a long tour through South America and Europe. He will inaugurate the Mexican Capitol studios with a series of recording of old Latin standards made with Billy May doing the musical accompaniments.

Mexican bolera singer Marco Antonio Muñoz, was a big success in Spain and is now performing in Italy. After that, he will return to México City and a few days later will fly to Puerto Rico where he is a real idol. RCA released his latest recordings, among which are "Yo Sin Ti," "Adios" and others.

Also from Barcelona, Spain, we received a post card from Andy Russell who wrote us that he finished a picture and that is now doing a TV series. Soon he will fly to Belgium and after that to Hollywood where he will do a show with Danny Kaye and another one with Steve Allen. By the end of the year, he will be performing in Buenos Aires, sponsored by Kaiser Company.

Brazilian actor-singer Ivon Curi left town to fulfill several contracts in his native country and later fly to Portugal. Before leaving he did three videotapes and a series of recordings at RCA. His main objective is to win the Mexican public.

New comer Matilde cut, for Musart Records, her version of Petula Clark's hit, "Downtown," and Sergio Endrigo's creation, "Era En Verano." Matilde appears very often in musical TV shows and her big dream is to be a popular bossa nova interpreter.

Discos Capitol de México, S.A. is trying to introduce in México the popular new Cuban rhythm, "Mozambique." They already released an EP by a popular Cuban interpreter and also recorded another EP with the Mexican dance band of Leo Acosta, under the musical supervision of Silvestre Méndez.

Orfeon Records cut a new LP with the popular Mexican group Los Hermanos Carrión, including hits like "Cast Your Fate To The Wind," "Mundo Cane II," "Blue Moon," etc. . . . Los Hermanos Carrión are planning a new LP in the Beatles' style, and another one with old Mexican standards.

A song written by Alvaro Carrillo and used in a TV soap opera is becoming very popular in a version by Pepe Jara, on RCA. Naturally it was immediately covered with versions by Javier Solís for CBS, Los Panchos (CBS) and Los Galantes (Orfeon).

CBS Records has released the second album recorded by Eydie Gormé and the famous Mexican trio, Los Panchos. Included in this album are songs like "Vereda Tropical," "Oración Caribe," "Flores Negras" and others. "Vereda Tropical" is currently doing very well in the Argentinian market.

Sonia López, leading tropical singer in México, cut two new songs for CBS in the cumbión rhythm. The titles are "Me Lo Dijo Perez" and "La Camisa Floria," both Spanish hits.

Capitol Records released an EP with German singer Ria Bartok, with the songs "Algo Bueno Me Va A Pasar," "Mi Mundo," "Labios Afortunados" and "Todo Me Es Igual." All of these songs are in Spanish.

There is a rumor that the American group the Supremes will arrive in México City by the end of this year. RCA are distributing their records in this country.

A new American label appeared in the Mexican market under the name of Red Bird and represented here by Grever Publishing. The first disk was recorded by Los France and called "Si Es Verdad."

The "Capri" night club is now presenting in its show the famous Mexican group, Los Xochimilcas, and the veteran trio Los Jaibos, who are again on the charts with "Carta Fatal."

Some of the first recordings ever made by Trini López were released by Cisne Records in an EP. Included are the names of "Rosita," "Only In My Dreams," "Just A Sinner Not A Saint," and "Where Can My Baby Be."

Mario Freidberg, general manager of Discos Tizoc, S.A., left town for a three-week business trip and part of vacation in New York. He will meet Walter Hoffer in that city.

Tomás Muñoz, general director of Gamma Records, returned from Spain and immediately was back to his work. Tomás spent three months in Spain, part vacation and part work.

The Cash Box hot line was burned up for several minutes the other day with Gerry Gordon, Allied's man in Montreal, phoning to rave about the action his firm is enjoying on all kinds of hit singles. At the top of the list is "Cara Lin" by the Strangeloves. Gerry has a real winner with Donovan's "Universal Soldier." It's getting it's share of the spins and selling very well into the bargain. Also on Pye, and happening large, reports Gerry is "Tossin' and Turnin'" by the Ivy League Trio. The Sam and Bill outing of "For Your Love" is a winner in most Canadian centres, reports Gordon. The Allied lines are handled in Canada's midwest by Arc in Winnipeg. This should end some confusion among dealers as to where they can secure Pye and Allied and Roulette releases in that part of the country. Speaking of Arc, it is that firm that has now secured the Hanna-Barbera line for Canadian distribution. Right off the top they're red hot with "Roses And Rainbows" by Danny Hutton. It took a long time building, but it is now confirmed as a cross Canada smash. Add John Wilson to the lineup of air personalities now at Toronto's CKEY. Wilson, returning to Canada from lengthy stints in his native U.S.A., has to be listed under the heading of broadcasters' broadcaster. He'll be the afternoon man on the newly, adult-oriented Toronto outlet. Little Caesar and the Consuls now confirmed as a cross Canada smash with their latest on Red Leaf, "You Really Got A Hold On Me." Action-a-plenty everywhere on this very commercial outing. It's also out in the U.S. on Mala, and is showing strong chart tendencies on both sides of the border. Harold Pounds has been receiving the trade's plaudits for one of the truly great coups on the Canadian record scene with the acquisition by his Sparton firm of the American Tower and Uptown labels, for Canadian distribution. According to the parent firm in the U.S. this will in no way affect their arrangement with Capitol Records of Canada Ltd., but following on the heels of Harold's deal for Canadian rights to the Mira label, must be noted as a major accomplishment for the hard working record biz vet. The long-awaited Andy Kim, Red Bird debut will be forthcoming very shortly. Dave Leonard has established his Monticana Company in New York, in Suite 824, 4 West 31st. St. His Canadian operation will still be H.Q.'d in Montreal with Marty Sherman as the top man there.

Frank Swain is the man at the top of the new Canadian Distribution set up, Caravan Record sales. Frank is a vet of the wax wars with several top postings to his credit. Two major acquisitions for the new company at the outset are Canadian distribution rights for product originating with Pickwick International Ltd. In addition Caravan will take over from Raleigh Record Sales as Canadian distrib for the red hot Red Leaf line. Their Red Leaf activities will commence with extensive promotion and sales activities by Caravan on behalf of the new outing by Little Caesar and the Consuls, "You Really Got A Hold On Me." "It Was I" by The Big Town Boys has been released stateside on Amy Mala. This forward thinking American firm seems to be getting the class of some very classy Canadian record product. Fred White postcards from Hollywood that his group, The Big Town Boys, are soon to make a string of appearances in the U.S. west. Could be some hope for action of the Polly Bergen Capitol treatment of the Jackie De Shannon's monster, "What The World Needs Now Is Love." Admittedly it follows very closely the De Shannon smash, but the arrangement is considerably different and middle of the road radio formats could put this one over.

Lee Farley sends out the air play S.O.S. on a threesome of good releases from Quality. "Freckles" by Skip Evans, "Take The Next Train Home" by Dee and the Yoeman and "I'll Never Forget You" by Dave Francey are all very worthy of attention from the country's spinners. Big deal in Winnipeg recently as the Guess Who's, Chad Allen and the Expressions returned triumphantly from an American tour, the city's mayor hosted the record stars at an official reception in Winnipeg's ultra modern city hall, and announced that the group would join the U.S. Army's Christmas tour of the Far East. The boys were then presented with Good Citizenship Community Awards. Extra words of praise from the mayor were for the group's manager, Bob Burns, and for Quality Records for their faith in Canadian talent, and efforts to promote it generally, and the Guess Who's in particular. A precedent was established when Lee Farley, national sales manager of the label, was named as an honorary citizen of Winnipeg, the first record man to hold this distinction. It's a boy for the Bob Gibbons' of CJCA in Edmonton. Robert Jeffrey weighed in at six pounds three ounces. New address for Raleigh record sales in Toronto is 390 Progress Ave., Scarborough. Stan Barrett, P.D. at VOXM in St. John's Nfld, reports that the station's deejays have turned to sports. The "We Five" All Stars have been good natured victims of all comers in the sporting arena, with proceeds from the "games" going to charity.

By the morning of Friday, Oct. 15th, the automatic merchandising industry could boast that it had established itself in the national economic community as an industry of prestige and profit, largely through the efforts of its national association, NAMA. When the 1965 NAMA Convention and Trade Show closed the following Wednesday morning in Miami Beach, the trade had taken still another giant step forward. Literally months of professional planning by Sid Shapiro, Gib Tansey and the rest of the convention committee brought before the vending industry at large a monumental trade show and discussion forum of such high caliber that phrases such as "fact filled" would better be replaced by Hollywood superlatives.

The 5,000-plus members and non-members who registered for the convention were composed of equipment manufacturers and suppliers, their sales staffers and distributor representatives and vending and coin machine operators. For obvious economic reasons, the attending operators were predominantly of the more affluent grade or were those local southern trade members; and although the rank and file operator from most parts of the country turned out in great numbers, numerous members and non-members still were unable to "pay the freight" or afford the time away from the route to travel to Miami to attend. How do they benefit from this invaluable presentation?

A major factor in the solution of this question of trade-wide communication was brought home in a speech delivered the evening of Tuesday the 19th by NAMA's S. John Insalata, the first director of NAMA's newly formed Department of State Councils, whose task will now include the transfer of the information detailed to those present at last week's show to the state and local association level.

While literature on the discussion forum (whose accent was on routeman efficiency and improved management techniques) will be made available to NAMA members through their Chicago headquarters and detailed accounts of the trade show's machine exhibition will be found in the trade press, the person-to-person impact of these presentations can only be communicated through an articulate, knowledgeable NAMA executive. Such a man is John Insalata.

However, this will be just a small part of Insalata's and his department's job in their entire spectrum of service to local groups. The traditional legislative, public relations and public health programs for which NAMA is famous will be carried on as usual. Now, however, the new State Councils Dept. will serve as the "small operator's" contact for any number of new areas of state action reflecting his needs and the industry's problems.

Right now, Insalata needs some information about the structure and activities of your local group. State associations can only be effective if the cooperation of state council members, and the work of the NAMA staff, make them effective. The State Councils Dept. exists to help encourage both of these while maintaining the continued cooperation and communication between NAMA and all state groups already existent.

By all means, take advantage of this new state-national association liaison department. As Insalata urged at the Miami meeting, "we are here—call on us!"

One Hundred Million "New" Quarters May Hit Nat'l Circulation By Xmas

WASHINGTON, D.C.—One hundred million silverless quarters will be released near the Christmas season, though an official date has not yet been announced.

Treasury officials said they were running ahead of production schedules and that silverless dimes and half dollars would be forthcoming by the end of the year.

Expected to help end the coin shortage which has hampered banks and businesses for the past several years, the new coins' content—copper sandwiched between two plates of cupronickel—had to be authorized by Congress. Silver content of the coins is now 40 percent, as against 90 percent for the old coins. With the reduction, a potential silver shortage—somewhat

like that of the gold reserve problem—will be, it is hoped, stopped before it gets a chance to start.

Dated 1965 to avoid collecting and hoarding, the new coins took more than two months to produce, and 435 million more will be ready by the end of the year. The first half of 1966 will see the production of some 1.9 billion quarters and 1.4 million dimes.

Instrumental in the development of the new coins was the National Association of Automatic Merchandisers, which pointed out that coin operated machines required coins with a certain amount of silver to trigger the dispensing mechanism. NAMA officials tested the first samples of the new quarters recently and reported that they worked satisfactorily.

S.D. Ops To Hold Special Meetings

MITCHELL, SOUTH DAKOTA—Earl Porter, secretary-treasurer for the Music and Vending Association of South Dakota, announced two special meetings.

A session with the association's attorney is scheduled for November 8th in Pierre, S.D. The meeting will be for the legislative committee which consists of the association's board of directors and officers.

"Don't forget," said Porter, "that we'll be having a regular two-day meeting in Huron, with a smorgasbord Sunday night and a banquet Monday night. I think arrangements are in the making for a band for Monday night so there will be plenty of dancing." Forums on background music, vending, games and music will precede the general meeting.

AMOA To Gather In Grand Bahama

MIAMI, FLORIDA—The Lucayan Beach Hotel, Freeport, Grand Bahama, will host the fifteenth annual banquet and weekend affair of the Amalgamated Machine Operators Association, December 3rd to 5th.

Due to the "overwhelming success" of the gathering in Grand Bahama last year, AMOA's board of directors voted unanimously to hold this year's session in the Caribbean, with an extended meeting time from two to three days.

AMOA president James I. Mullins said he expected a large turnout.

Bilotta, McCarthy And Moran To Talk Training

NEWARK, N.Y.—John Bilotta, prominent member of the New York State Coin Machine Assn. and distributor for Wurlitzer and Automatic Products, among other lines, announced during the recent Miami NAMA Trade Show and Convention that he would shortly be meeting with NYSCMA president Millie McCarthy and Jack Moran, director of the Institute of Coin Operations, the Denver, Colorado mechanic training center.

Purpose of the meeting would be to foster the industry's aims toward establishing further methods for the training of qualified coin machine servicemen to help fill a present void in the nation's industry.

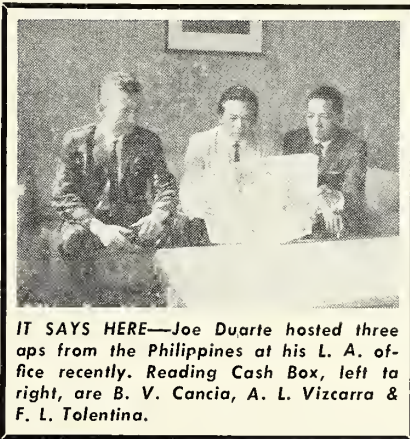

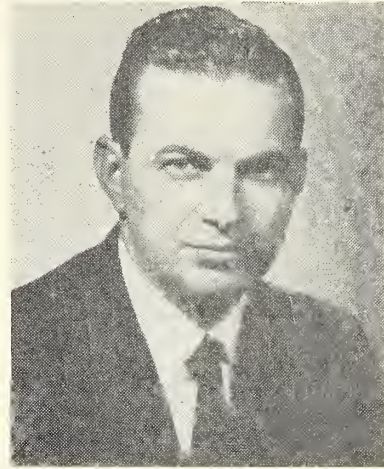
Greenberg expressed great satisfaction at having been appointed to handle the Tape-Athon line in his distribution plans.

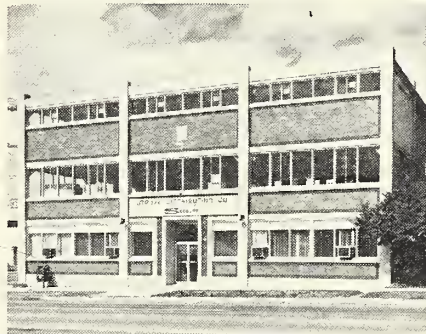
In making the announcement, Gordon said, "We are pleased to have a man like Ed Claffey rejoin the Seeburg organization. He has broad experience in our business that can

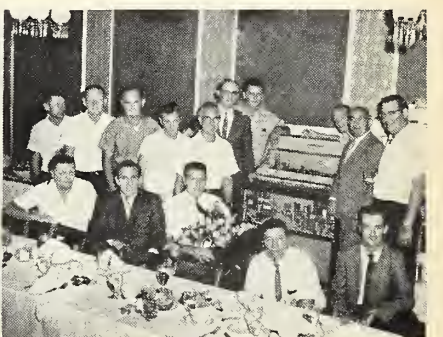

OSCAR P. & SEEBURG C. MOVING UP & ONWARD

ELIZABETH, N.J.—Oscar Parkoff, followed a rule which says, to wit, "if you're going to build a \$250,000 distributing outlet, do it at a time when your phonograph and vending lines are simultaneously selling at full capacity." Parkoff's new plant was planned more than one year ago and while the opening in May came three months before the coin vet saw Seeburg's music and vending lines introduced last month, he banked his investment on the factory's ability to come up with two winners. This, he says, is what has happened and the Atlantic-Jersey outlet is "concrete evidence that we were right in our respective moves." The "Electra" phonograph, has been augmented by Seeburg's "Hydra-Swirl" dry grounds single-cup fresh brew coffee vendor.

The 25,000 sq. ft. facility which boasts parking for 50 cars, shows the growth of a firm which started in Newark in June 1954. Parkoff, who is a brother of Meyer Parkoff, Atlantic New York Corp. head, started in the business in Philadelphia in 1948. Now Vice-President of the branch outlet, Oscar is in a position to announce that "we are endeavoring to fill orders on the new equipment." "We build with Seeburg," commented Parkoff, who was referring to the Seeburg factory's recent \$6 million addition opened this year. "Solid operating business practices have been our policy for all of these years," he said, and pointed to front-money, minimums, guarantees, and location contracts as some of the accomplishments the distrib has helped operators gain in the northern N.J. area. "From the HF100R to the V200 which established dime play, I've had a good

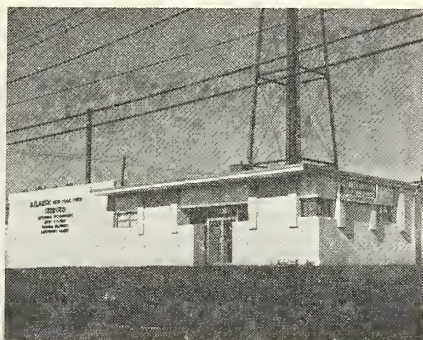
product since the beginning," said Parkoff during a recent office interview. "The AQ and Artist of the Week, stereo via the Model 222, the LPC-1 and album play, the LPC-480 and solid merchandising programs, have led up to the already successful "Electra" phono, which is also available with ITS and Album Pricing, two more Seeburg features previously pioneered."

With background music a growing and more important division in the overall Atlantic sales programs, and the sale of amusement machines and pool tables plus a full-stocked one-stop facility, Atlantic's Jersey outlet offers the full circle of coin-operated and location equipment.

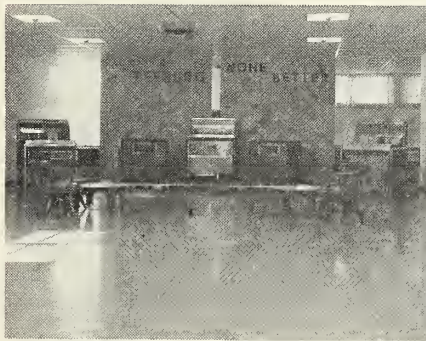
In addition to Parkoff, Paul Cantor supervises and manages the business. Irving Grabowski is the phonograph sales rep, Vito Raymo sells the vending line, Gerald Parkoff (Oscar's nephew) and Stan Linden handle background music, Ralph Hess is service manager, Hal Wertheimer is parts manager, Tony Villanova heads the records division, and the smile at the other end of the phone is Sandy Buehrle's, gal-Friday and receptionist. In addition, Atlantic's six servicemen and four mechanics pitch in and offer operator service to coinmen in the territory. Atlantic New York also serves the Connecticut territory via the E. Hartford branch which is headed by Mac Perlman. But to the ops in New Jersey, Oscar Parkoff credits the modern plant's very existence to them. "Without the support of our customers and the Seeburg products," he said "none of this would have been possible."

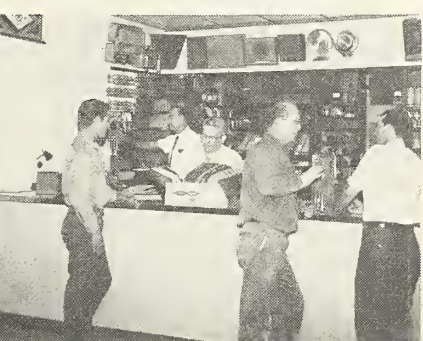

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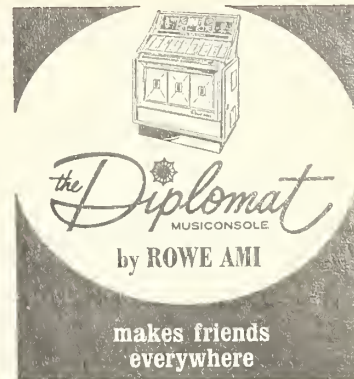
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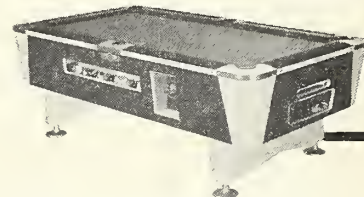

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INTERSTATE UNITED TO OPERATE NEW RESTAURANT

■ Releases Year's Report



KRAMER

CHICAGO—Interstate United Corporation has signed a long-term lease to operate a new "atmosphere" restaurant in New Orleans, called the Emerald Door. The announcement was made jointly by Alex Kramer president of Interstate United Corporation with Paul Kapelow, president, and Lester Gross, secretary, of the Chantilly Corporation, owner of the Carol, exclusive Garden District apartment building in which the restaurant will be located.

The new restaurant, with a seating capacity for 242 patrons, will be divided into five distinctively different dining rooms, each decorated to represent a different continent, Kramer said.

Interstate United Corporation recently reported increased sales and earnings for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965. Alex Kramer, president of the Lincolnwood-based national food service company, reported record sales of \$124,332,640 as compared to sales of \$98,539,003 reported in fiscal 1964. Net income in fiscal 1965 was \$483,761 or \$.22 per share on 2,184,221 shares outstanding, compared to the previous year's loss of \$3,372,753 or (\$1.54) per share. In addition special charges to surplus of \$161,007 for fiscal 1965 were made as compared to \$3,093,592 for fiscal 1964.

Kramer stated that "The encouraging return to profitability of Interstate United is, in part, the result of eliminating a number of unprofitable locations and discontinuing our manufacturing operations. Substantial savings have resulted by reducing general overhead, both in personnel and facilities, and by consolidating with the parent company the field organizations of United Food Management Services, Inc., our major food service acquisition.

"The extent of progress is not fully shown by the earnings statement," he said, "or by the record sales volume. It is sharply reflected in the strengthening of our management team, in more efficient operations and in the improved morale of our employees."

Since the beginning of the present fiscal year, Interstate reduced its total debt by approximately \$1,300,000. The company's working capital has been increased by \$4,095,586 from \$1,575,771 at June 28, 1964 to \$5,671,357.

Kramer said, "While vending operations continue to grow and the future is bright for this part of our business, we have placed increased emphasis on manual food operations, including commercial restaurants. New food and vending business obtained by the company during the last fiscal year includes the State Capitol office building in Springfield, Illinois; the Owens-Illinois Glass Company in Fairmont, West Virginia; and the Philco Corporation plant in Palo Alto, California. Most recently, the company was the successful bidder in obtaining a contract for the operation of 650 vending machines in Army and Air Force bases in Fairbanks and Anchorage, Alaska."

In conclusion, Kramer said, "The company is developing long-range programs which will encompass all aspects of our business. We are establishing training programs to develop qualified personnel. We are continually improving our service, our standards of quality and efficiency to insure continued growth in both sales and earnings."

WOE: TEAMSTERS HIT CHICAGO VENDERS

CHICAGO—A strike against three major vending companies has placed all of machines serviced by them out of action.

Officers of Local 781, International Brotherhood of Teamsters, called the strike against Allied Vending Company, Automatic Retailers of America and Interstate Vending Company at 12:01 a.m., Monday, October 18. Contract negotiations were broken off the next day. The union has threatened to strike the remaining vending companies unless a new contract is signed shortly.

Some 70 percent of the city's vending machines are now idle, and William Garrett, president of Allied Vending, estimated that over \$100,000 dollars is being lost daily.

One of the highlights of the Emerald Door, he said, will be its international menu, featuring food specialties from the five major areas of the world, including Europe, Asia, Africa, North and South America. In addition, the Emerald Door will offer piano bar entertainment in a cocktail lounge called The Jewel Box.

Interstate United Corporation, a national food service and vending company based in Lincolnwood, Illinois, already operates restaurants throughout the United States. In addition to locations already opened in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Houston and Columbus, it recently opened The Tower in Los Angeles and the Park 100 in New York City. A publicly held company, Interstate United is now doing business at an annual rate of over \$120 million. It maintains branches in 34 states and employs more than 8,000 people.

SCOOTERS SCOOT TO FOOD UPKEEP AT TRW

CLEVELAND, Ohio—In July, 1964, TRW Inc., this city, took over vending machine operations in their 1.7 million square-foot Tapco plant as a non-profit function. The service is operated to provide employees better food at a lower cost, and a small fleet of Cushman utility vehicles helps keep the operation efficient and well maintained.

TRW, formerly known as Thompson Ramo Woolridge, Inc., introduced a hot food line and diversified the cold food line. The vending operation includes nine banks of food vending machines, consisting of 110 vending machines, five dollar-bill changers, plus two complete vending cafeterias. Cigarette, cigar and Pepsi-Cola machines are operated independent of the TRW service.

Four women work part time preparing the hot and cold food in a manual cafeteria at TRW. The vending operation buys all of its food from this cafeteria and seven men are assigned to the vending operation.

The vending machines are serviced from supply racks that are towed through the plant by 3-wheel Minute-Miser electric vehicles—manufactured by Cushman Motors, a Lincoln, Nebraska division of Outboard Marine Corporation. Three men, each equipped with a Cushman, are assigned to service certain vending machine banks during each of two shifts. A fourth vehicle is used exclusively for maintenance and trouble shooting, and a fifth vehicle is used by the company that services the Pepsi-Cola machines.

The Cushman electrics are used continually and are idle only between the hours of midnight and 5 a.m. TRW has a regular preventive main-

tenance program, including periodical greasing, oiling, and battery care, and reports there are no maintenance problems at all with the Minute-Misers.

"We are very pleased with them," says Leo Kolk, supervisor of vending operations. "Before the vending machines and Minute-Misers, hand-drawn food wagons were used, which was an expensive and time-consuming operation."

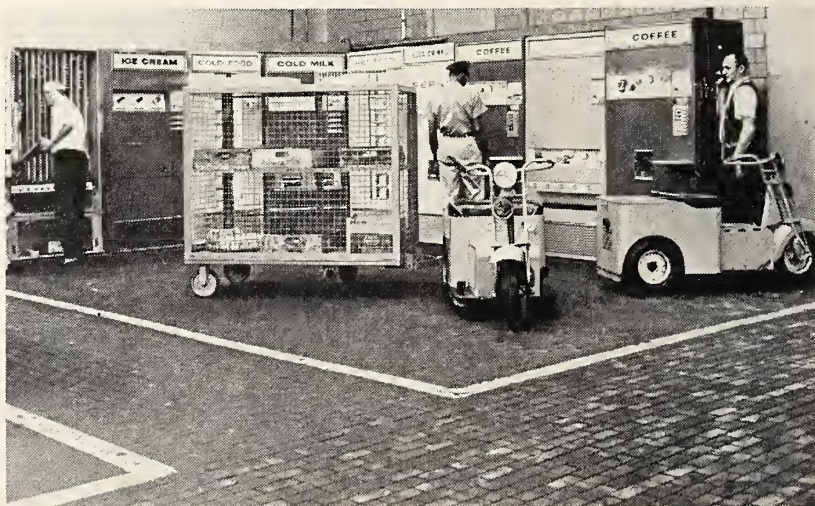
The vehicles at TRW average six trips a day over a route totaling 22 miles. More than 5,000 persons are employed at the plant, and the consumption is high—such as 35,000 cups of coffee a month.

"If our food isn't fresh," says Kolk, "we have no repeat business—and management insists that we buy better food. Also, if it were not for the Cushman Minute-Misers, we could not operate the hot food end of our business, which is the most popular part."

The servings of hot food are packed into an insulated storage cabinet and delivered to the heated vending machines. For weekend workers, the two cafeteria vending operations have micro-wave ovens where cold food can be quickly cooked.

A telephone at each of the vending machine banks permits service men to report a machine that is out of order. The trouble-shooter, equipped with a Minute-Miser, can go quickly to the scene of a mis-operating machine and make any necessary repairs.

Besides saving time and expense in the vending operation, the Cushman vehicle system enables the vending machines to carry hot food, permitting the cafeteria to open for only one shift a day instead of every working shift as formerly.



Top: Man left loads, man center partakes, man right phones in about trouble. Bottom: Trouble's found and fixed.

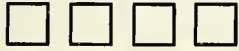

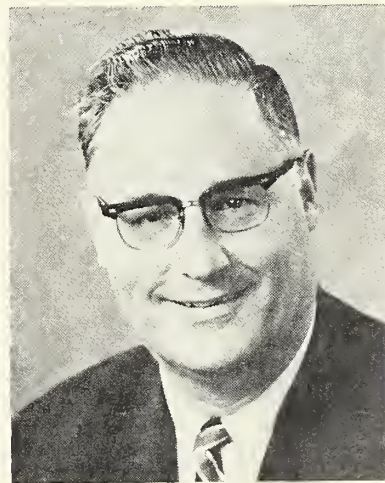
MIAMI BEACH—A most satisfying 1965 NAMA Convention and Trade Show came to a close last Wed. Oct. 20th finishing six days comprised of a stunning exhibit of the very latest in vending equipment and an excellent series of informative discussions. NAMA's Sid Shapiro estimated the total attendance to have been over 5,000 with operators converging on the Miami Beach Auditorium from almost every state in the Union. 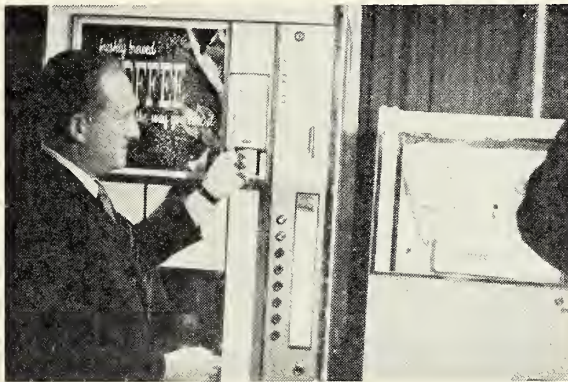

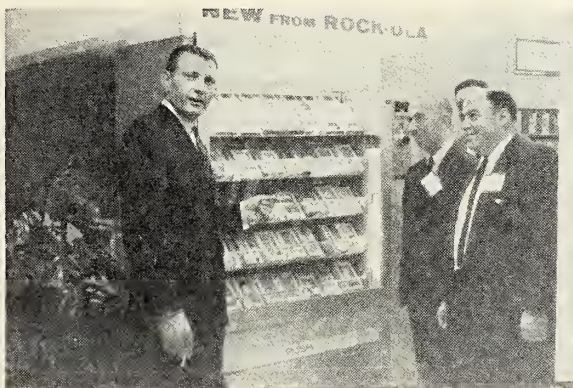

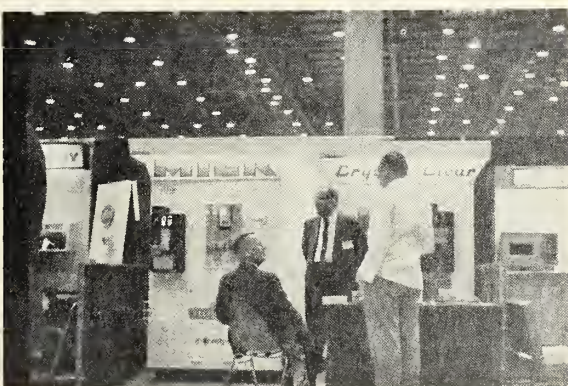

Bedecked in a bespangled jacket or done up in tux or getting down to business with rolled-up shirt sleeves, Arthur Prysock and his tenor sax charge in with "Let It Be Me," "Who Can I Turn To," "There Goes My Heart," "Let Me Call You Sweetheart," "They Say You're Laughing At Me" and "All Or Nothing At All."

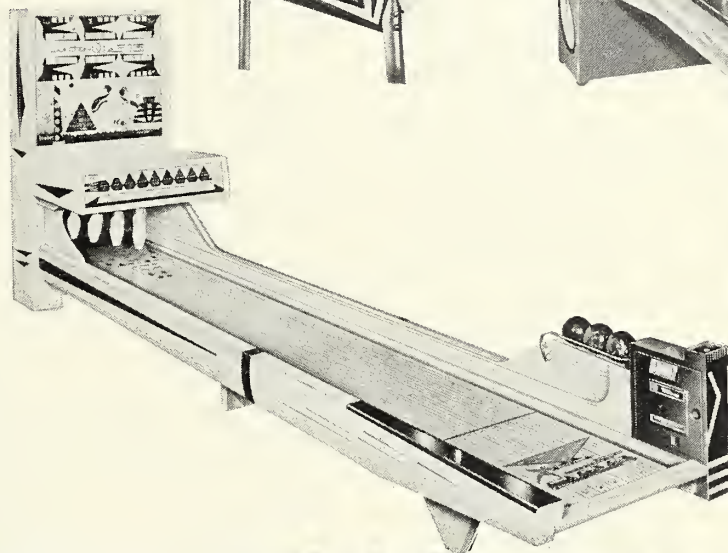
Chuck Berry, long a favorite of the hip underground, has been turning up more and more in other singers' repertoires. 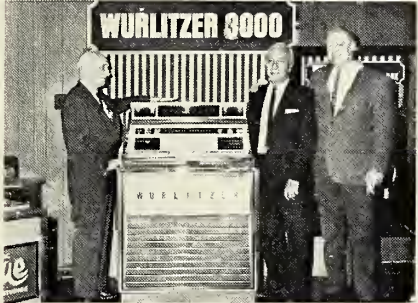

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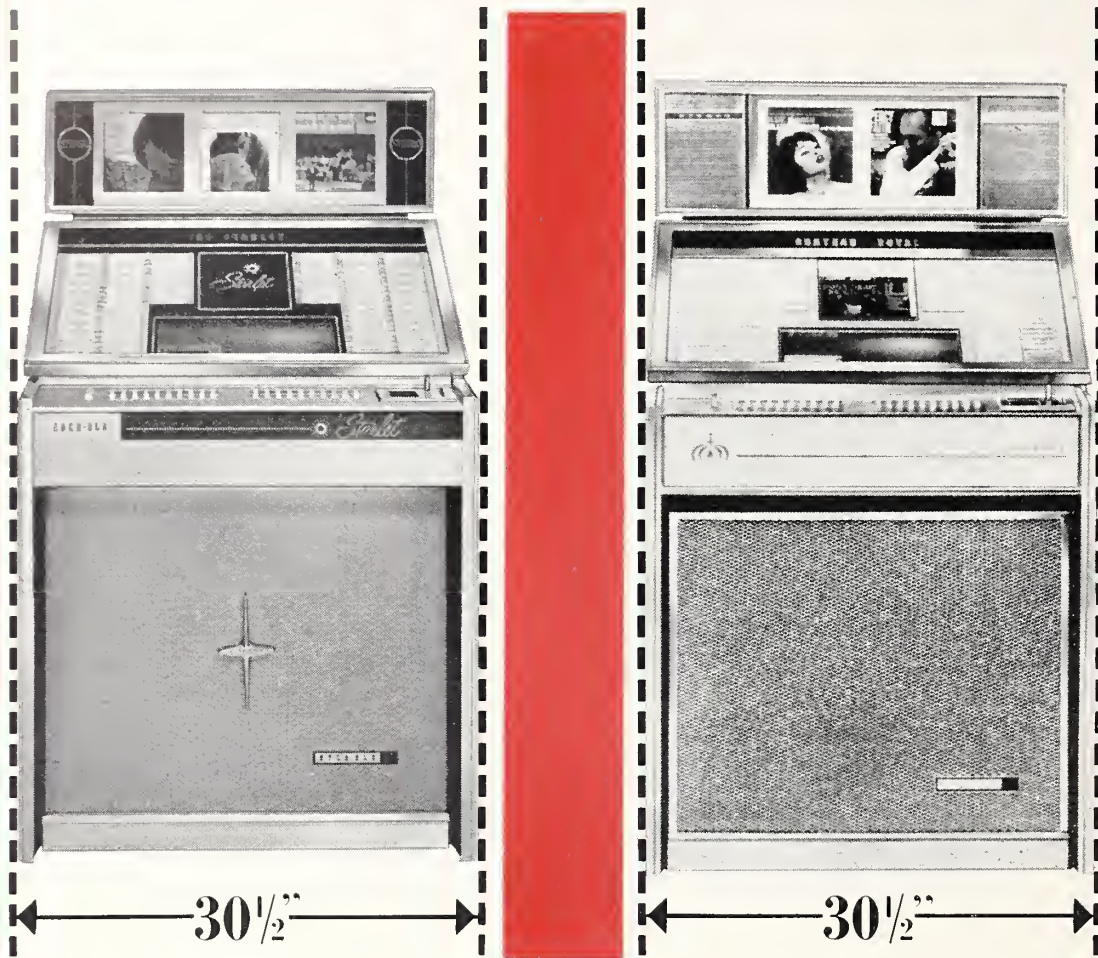
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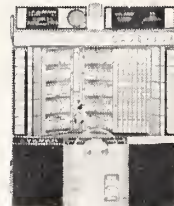


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
