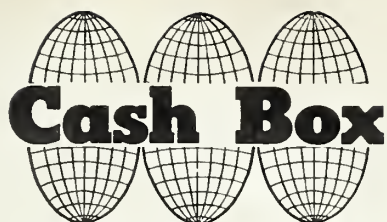

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Patterns Of Change

In several previous editorials we have addressed ourselves to the rapidly evolving nuances of the one-world record market. Tradesters and the general public alike are now fully cognizant that a host of global stars (e.g. the Beatles, Sonny & Cher, the Rolling Stones) are now equally successful on either side of the Atlantic. An artist's country of national origin is no longer an insurmountable barrier which can curtail his international acceptance.

In the past year, however, a new, provocative factor has been injected into the Anglo-American disk scene that has promulgated the spirit of internationalism to an even further degree. The conservative British record industry has been adopting, with increasing frequency, American methods of organization and marketing.

The somewhat restricted English business, controlled by a handful of manufacturers, now has an undercurrent of decidedly extraneous, American coefficients. Formations of indie producers, which once would have brought gasps of surprise from British record men, are today becoming almost commonplace. The Andrew Oldhams and the George Martins were

undoubtedly stimulated to go out on their own because of their American cousins, who have long held a vital place in the hit-producing process. Although it's too premature to predict whether the indie A&R talent in Britain will ultimately succeed, it is clear they will provide an artistic sounding-board for the rest of their industry.

The new Age of Enlightenment in England is not restricted to the creative side of the ledger. EMI broke the ice earlier this year by the decision of direct wholesaling, and it seems probable that other distributors will readjust their thinking in this regard.

Rack-jobbing and budget-priced disks are also carving out a niche for themselves in the United Kingdom. Although much apprehension was previously felt about the selling of economy merchandise, dealers stocking both types of product have reported healthy sales in both areas.

In the coming years the so-called 'English Sound' may well weaken, but if the British continue to modernize the behind-the-scenes aspects of their industry, they will insure a receptive audience for their record wares in the world marketplace.

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Yale Poet Series is Decca's New Pride

NEW YORK—Decca Records has announced the release of the first section of "The Yale Series Of Recorded Poets." This is a series of the important contemporary poets of the day reading from their own works. This initial release includes recordings by such outstanding names as Robert Frost, Conrad Aiken, Robert Lowell, Allen Tate, Stanley Kunitz, Louise Bogan, Louis MacNeice, R. P. Blackmur, Marianne Moore, Yvor Winters and John Hollander. The Robert Frost recording is the last one made by the beloved American poet laureate.

The genesis of the series is interesting. For several years the poet Lee Anderson, believing that poetry should be heard as well as read, devoted himself to recording living American poets on tape and achieved a rather unusual success because he was able to avoid the stilted atmosphere of the ordinary recording studio. He then decided that this collection should be placed in the hands of an institution such as Yale and be made available to the public on records.

Yale accepted the tapes as part of its library collection, established a committee of the English Department to oversee the project, and obtained the support of the Blue Hill Founda-

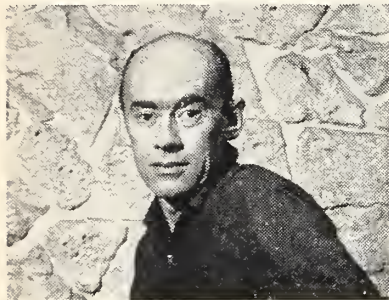
tion of New York. Anderson was retained as a Research Associate in English to assist the project and has since recorded many more poets in this country and England.

The poems chosen for the series are intended to illustrate the selected poet's work, and the poets chosen are men and women who are highly regarded but have, so far, appeared on record only in a limited way or not at all. The effort with these poets is to treat them in a distinctive fashion which reveals the essence of their work more discerningly than other recordings have in the past. It was made at a specially arranged reading at Yale University, and the poet's easy flow of comment and reminiscence, interspersed throughout the recording, provides an insight into his life, philosophy and work.

Other recordings in the series to be released by the firm will be available next month with subsequent releases to be chosen from the vast collection of tapes now in Yale's library. Each will be packaged in a multi-colored jacket with a photograph of the poet on the front cover.

Jack W. Meyerson, president of Carillon Records, handled the negotiations for Yale University with Decca.

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has announced two personnel promotions. Del Costello and Ted Rosenberg have been elevated to the positions of regional manager and district manager, respectively, in the Mountain Pacific Region, according to Joe Lyons, director of sales for the label.

Costello, as regional manager, succeeds Gene Block, who recently resigned to join Warner Bros.-Reprise as national sales manager. In his new position, Costello will be responsible to Lyons for all sales, merchandising and distribution activities in the region. Within this region, Columbia maintains distribution offices in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Denver, Seattle and Honolulu. In addition he will direct all local promotional activities, coordinating with the national director through Bob Moering, field promotion manager, Mountain Pacific Region, who is responsible to Costello.

Joining Columbia in 1962 as field promotion manager in the Mountain Pacific Region, Costello was promoted

to district sales manager for the San Francisco and Seattle areas in 1963.

Ted Rosenberg as district manager, will report directly to Costello. In his new position, he will supplement Costello's regional activities in the area of sales, merchandising and promotion. He will also continue to be responsible for directing the sales activities in the Los Angeles market.

Rosenberg joined Columbia in 1958 as manager of the Los Angeles Branch. From 1960 to 1962, he headed an independent record distributing company. Returning to Columbia in 1962, he has since that time been manager of the Los Angeles Branch.

Vanguard: 10 New Albums

NEW YORK—Vanguard Records' latest release consists of 10 albums of highly varied subject matter and features three Christmas offerings. The seasonal LP's include "Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht" by the Mozart Boys Choir of Vienna, Eric Kunz, baritone; Vienna State Opera Orchestra conducted by Erich Schwarzbauer. "Czech And Polish Songs Of Christmas" by the Children's Chorus of Radio Prague and "Christmas Carols And Motets Of Medieval Europe" by the Deller Consort and the Musica Antiqua of Vienna.

"Jeane-Marie Darre Plays Liszt" is the American record debut of this outstanding pianist. Other classical items include "Schubert: Trout Quintet In A Major, Op. 114" and "The Classic Spanish Guitar—Four Centuries Of Music" by Alirio Diaz. The balance of the release includes "Country Blues" by John Hammond, "The Dubliners In Concert," Shlomo Carlebach's "In The Palace Of The King" and "I Like It This Way" by Lisa Kindred.

Epic Launches Gift Giving Campaign

NEW YORK—Epic Records has developed a major gift-giving campaign which is being launched as the holiday season approaches, according to an announcement by Sol Rabinowitz, the label's director of merchandising. Instead of embarking on a specific Christmas gift program highlighted by specialized Christmas product, the label will utilize the slogan "A Gift Worth Giving . . . and Receiving!"—Epic Records' to help promote its existing catalog and new releases. Special material featuring the slogan has been sent to distributors for display during the holiday shopping season.

The major display unit suggests six of the label's LP's, including "Drive-In Movie Time" by Bobby Vinton, "The Bob Dylan Song Book" played by the Golden Gate Strings, "In My Style" by Jane Morgan and "Having A Wild Weekend" by The Dave Clark Five. A unique and separate display highlights the recently released set of Beethoven's Nine Symphonies, performed by George Szell and the Cleveland Orchestra.

Three posters have been designed to promote "The Gift For The Country

Fan," "The Gift For Everyone" and "The Gift Of Distinction."

Counter cards featuring "A Gift Worth Giving—For Mom—For Dad—For Brother—For Sister" have also been shipped. The cards list Epic albums that have achieved unusually high sales during previous holiday seasons. In addition, the label has supplied gold-and-red stickers with the slogan "A Gift Worth Giving . . ." which can be attached to the cellophane covering on album jackets.

LP Sales Swinging At MGM/Verve, Says NASATIR

NEW YORK—Mort L. Nasatir, president of MGM/Verve Records, has reported that the company is enjoying a "tremendous surge" in fall LP sales.

According to the company top leaders that are skyrocketing the sales are "The Best of Herman's Hermits," the New Lovin' Spoonful album of "Do You Believe In Magic" (Kama-Sutra); "Now Playing: Erroll Garner—A Night At The Movie;" the Gentrys, "Keep On Dancing;" the Royalties, "It's Gonna Take A Miracle;" and Elke Sommer, "Love In Any Language."

Sol Greenberg, director of album sales of the company, reports that the volume of sales for the current period outdistances last year's sales for the same period by a 2 to 1 ratio. Greenberg also stated that the Verve LPs which are current sales leaders are Ella Fitzgerald, "Ella In Hamburg;" Willie Bobo, "Spanish Grease;" Cal Tjader, "Soulbird, Whiffenpoof;" and Gary McFarland, "The In Sound."

Christy's Measure Of Success: "Do We Entertain"

NEW YORK—The New Christy Minstrels sing folk songs but are not folk singers. They sing protest songs but are not protesters. They sing middle-of-the-road tunes, blues numbers, songs of satire, and do it in many languages. In short the Minstrels defy classification, and consequently leave everybody wondering just what bag they're in. Cash Box had a recent opportunity to solve this problem when the Christys dropped by on their way to their recent Philharmonic Hall concert. What is the New Christy Minstrels bag? — "it's entertainment." The group's potpourri as an act is chosen from material that best suits the purpose of pleasing an audience.

The barb that is most often hurled at the group is that there is a lack of protest songs in their repertoire; however the Christys contend that they have no aversion to protest songs, so long as they are good pieces of music. The acceptance of any particular work for inclusion in the act lies solely in "how much entertainment value it adds to the act and not in its message."

The New Christy Minstrels have been a going success since their appearance in 1961, though but two of the original members are still in the group. It has served as a stepping stone to individual success for past members, such as Barry McGuire and Randy Sparks. The group is now, as it has always been, composed of individually talented people, any one of whom is capable of stepping out on the stage alone and wowing an audience, but who however are willing and able to submerge themselves into the group for the best interests of

Capital Mid-Month Albums

HOLLYWOOD—An all-new original cast recording of Edwin Lester's production of "The Great Waltz" and Peggy Lee's "Then Was Then—Now Is Now," comprise Capitol's mid-month album releases.

"The Great Waltz," produced in 1965 by Lester for the Los Angeles and San Francisco Civic Light Opera Associations, and premiered in the Los Angeles Music Center, stars Giorgio Tozzi and Jean Fenn. Also featured in the deluxe-packaged LP are Frank Porretta, Anita Gillette and Leo Fuchs.

For the production a number of renovations were made. These included a new book by Jerome Chodorov and several new songs with lyrics and musical adaptation by Wright and Forrest (additional lyrics by Forman Brown).

Among the Johann Strauss (Sr. and Jr.) melodies in the production are "The Blue Danube," "Two By Two," "The Birthday Song," "The Gypsy Told Me" and "Music."

Peggy Lee's album, with musical direction by Sid Feller, is a combination of old and new songs. Among the old are "Leave It To Love" (1949), "They Saw" and "I'm Afraid The Masquerade Is Over" (both 1938). Included in the new are "Everybody Has The Right To Be Wrong," (from the hit Broadway Show "Skyscraper") "The Shadow Of Your Smile (from "The Sandpiper") and "I Go To Sleep."

Animals Tour Behind The Iron Curtain

NEW YORK—The Animals, who are currently riding the Top 100 with their MGM release of "It's My Life," were recently the first western exponents of contemporary pop music to tour an Iron Curtain country. They were in Poland from Nov. 11 to 20 at the request of the Poznat, the Polish Ministry of Culture. The trek, which lasted almost two weeks, covered the major cities, including three days in Warsaw, two days in Cracow, and Cojowice and one day in Sopot, Lodz and Poznan.

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UA Exec Drive Seeks To Develop Closer Distrib Ties On U.S. Global Fronts

NEW YORK—Six months ago, the United Artists label started a drive to recruit additional exec talent to strengthen its ties with both domestic and foreign distributors. The task has been accomplished, reports Mike Stewart, exec vp of the diskery. But, Stewart still sees the need to continue a policy of exec additions to various operational divisions until the label feels that it is equipped to meet "the myriad and complicated" problems confronting a distrib today.

UA now has a network of over 30 domestic distributors and affiliates in every nation in which there is a recording industry of any consequence. "The hectic pace of today's disk world," Stewart states, "has created unique methods of operation in each area, and UA is now better prepared to deal knowledgeably with them on a local basis, via a staff which will be constantly traveling and hence up-to-date with happenings in all localities."

Among the newcomers to the United Artists roster of executives during the past half-year are Norman Weiser,

who now heads the west coast disk and publishing operation, Mike Lipton, who recently joined UA as director of marketing and regional sales, Bernie Lawrence now in charge of album promotion, Ron Eyre who is liaison with foreign labels and Tom McCaffrey whose area is regional promotion for singles.

The label is currently enjoying the most prosperous year in its history, surpassing even 1964 which previously had been far and away the biggest twelve-month period ever. Among the major factors in the UA success story noted are the constantly growing library of soundtracks and film music, ranking it as the industry leader in this area, and the continued growth in importance of the entire Ferrante And Teicher catalog, as these piano instrumentalists emerge as one of the nation's largest concert attractions. In addition, in singles, the continued growth of perennial hitmakers, Jay & The Americans, Patty Duke and Bobby Goldsboro has hyped the organization's growing profits. UA entered

Columbia's 9 Month Showing Indicates History-Making Sales Year In '65

NEW YORK—Columbia Records is on its way to its best sales year in history. Disk sales at the company for the first nine months of 1965 were up 15% over a similar period last year, according to Goddard Lieberman. This "indicates," Lieberman added, "that 1965 will be the best year" yet for the company.

Reported as a "major factor" in the sales boom are singles successes at the label, from established and new performers, from pop to country and western.

Albums, the label said, also showed an upswing in various musical categories. Masterworks LP sales are up 31% over last year, with a "partial" contribution stemming from the label's new long-range marketing plan for classical records, which offers a 50% margin to retailers on the ML and MS series. One of Columbia's great sellers is its Vladimir Horowitz set, "An Historic Return—Horowitz At Carnegie Hall," whose acceptance registered standing on the pop LP charts.

Indicative of the label's strong LP showing are the seven gold LP awards from the Record Industry Association of America, signifying sales in excess of \$1 million for each album. The "gold" LP's are "Barbra Streisand/The Third Album," "Wonderland of Golden Hits" by Andre Kostelanetz, "People," Barbra Streisand, "Dear Heart" by Andy Williams, "Ring Of Fire" by Johnny Cash "My Fair Lady," by Andy Williams, "Gunfighter Ballads & Trail Songs" by Marty Robbins.

Doing impressive singles business for the label are such relatively new disk names as Bob Dylan, the Byrds, Billy Joe Royal, Paul Revere, Simon & Garfunkel.

Columbia is rapidly expanding its facilities to keep pace with its constantly increasing sales. Most recently, a new \$500,000 studio was built in Nashville as part of the company's million-dollar recording complex located in that city. With the recent completion of new eight, four, three, two and single track recording facilities in Los Angeles, Columbia has available for use by independent producers one of the most complete studios on the west coast. The service centers in Dallas, Hollywood, Cleveland, Pittsburgh and New Jersey have been enlarged. A new research and development center is being constructed in Milford, Conn.

Fender Musical Instruments, which Columbia recently acquired, is continuing to attain high sales, the company reported. To keep pace with its growth, the Fender recently built a factory in Fullerton, Calif., and has just completed a distribution center in Santa Maria, California.

This year, Columbia has continued its program of overseas expansion. The company has acquired Discos CBS, S.A., in Colombia and has completed several licensing arrangements with foreign companies.

The Columbia Record Club has grown, in its ten-year existence, into the largest mail-order club of its kind in the world. Its membership now exceeds 1,500,000.

Audio Fidelity: New Home, Fresh Product Ideas

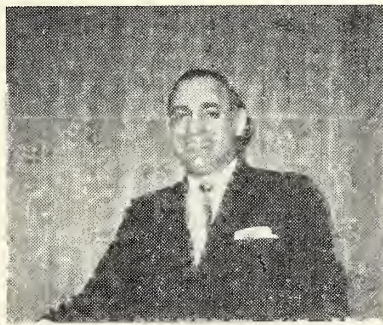
NEW YORK—With a foundation based on established catalog sales, Audio Fidelity Records is looking toward new product vistas to further solidify its well-heeled standing among indie labels.

A fresh point-of-view can be found in the spanking new headquarters for AF at 221 West 57th St. Enthusiasm starts at the top of the diskery's exec line-up in the person of Herman Gimbel, who acquired the label last April from Sid Frey (Gimbel emphasizes that his control is "100%", thereby dispelling some trade-talk that there are "silent partners" in on the operation).

It is Gimbel's record industry philosophy that a label must establish a feeling of confidence with the record buyer that assures the latter of a continuous flow of tasteful product. Faith in product is what can make or break a label, Gimbel feels.

Gimbel also contends that disks are often used as a "calling-card" for other areas of show-business, which leads to a cheapening of disk product (e.g. loss-leaders). "Records must be priced properly—cutting prices does not mean that records will sell," Gimbel says. As long as there's demand for a particular record, it can sell without discounting, he declares.

Gimbel reports that the old established "sound" line at AF continues to sell well. Dates by Joe Basile, Johnny Puleo and others are among the label's top-sellers. One of the label's

newer successes is "The Singing Priest" by Father Columba McManus, a Servite Friar in Canada. Also, the classical "First Component" series is a financial asset. In the latter area, the label recently issued five new sets, bringing the line's total to 18.

But, Gimbel plans to inject fresh product ideas into the company. Already in the works are a new "sound" process, a series of "electronic music" albums and the introduction of a general kiddie line. Latter will probably entail the purchase of an already existing kiddie-directed company. AF already has an ethnic spoken-word kiddie outlet in Kinor Records, which offers product tied-in with various Jewish Holidays. Another spoken-word

'LBJ Ranch' Producers To Radio: 'It's All Legal'

NEW YORK—Meanwhile, back at the LBJ Ranch things are beginning to happen. While lacking the instant-success pattern of the "First Family" LP, said to be the largest selling album in history (5 million copies sold), "Welcome to the LBJ Ranch" is shaping up as the biggest political-edged comedy satire since "First Family."

The album is selling well, with some 140,000 in sales as of last week. The chief difficulty in coming up with a wild sales spree, say its producers Earle ("First Family") Doud and Alen Robin, involves some fence-sitting on the part of radio stations. Some stations are laying heavy on the disk. WMCA in New York is playing short excerpts throughout its programming day. But, Robin complains, there seems to be a "whispering campaign" among many stations that seeks to feel out other stations and determine whether the other-guy is laying it.

The LP, as most of the trade knows by now, consists of clever tape editing of the actual voices of prominent men in politics (e.g. President Johnson, Gov. Rockefeller, Barry Goldwater) so that they make humorous replies to "interview queries."

In accepting the LP for release, Capitol Records had its battery of some 40 lawyers clear it. The legal subtlety involved is that it's OK to devise an "entertainment" based on personalities in political life (e.g. elected officials). This might not be so if an LP of this sort used the edited voices of a famous actor or actress.

But, Doud and Robin explain, many stations are still hesitant about programming the album. They claim that the more execs a station has (e.g. big-city outlets), the less chance the album has of being accepted for airplay. Therefore, major exposure to date has emanated from stations in the smaller cities, the ones with less major execs to wade through.

Doud and Robin had actually planned to have "Welcome To The LBJ Ranch" marketed before last Christmas. The rub, however, was that they did not realize the enormous amount of tape editing that would encounter.

In its final form, the LP does not include several intended "interviews"

Bureau Of Census Reports: '63 Wholesale Music Sales Up 71.6% Over 1958

WASHINGTON—Sales registered by the nation's 1,075 wholesalers of records, musical instruments, and sheet music were 71.6% higher in 1963 than in 1958, according to figures compiled by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census.

Total amount of sales reported by these businesses in the 1963 Census of Business was \$605 million as compared with the \$352 million sales reported by 674 establishments in 1958, last previous year of the Census.

New York led all States with sales of \$187.9 million, followed by California with \$97.9 million, Illinois with \$57.9 million, Massachusetts with \$28.2 million, and Pennsylvania with \$25.3 million. Those five States accounted for 65.7 percent of the total for the United States.

Statistics for establishments in this category do not include the firms which had no payrolls in 1963.

There were 11,140 persons employed in this type of wholesale firm at mid-November of 1963 and the payroll for the year totaled \$58.4 million, a gain of 77.4 percent over the 1958 payroll. In addition, there were 319 proprietors of unincorporated firms actively engaged in the business.

Operating expenses, including payroll but not the cost of goods sold, amounted to 19.2 percent of sales as contrasted with 19.5 percent in 1958.

Inventories of merchandise on hand at the end of 1963 totaled \$62.1 million. Inventories at the end of 1958 amounted to \$31.3 million.

Statistics in this release will be included in a bound volume to be issued later.

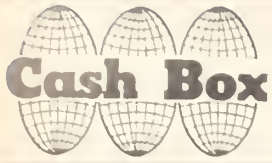
Both Doud and Robin are contracted to supply Capitol with two more comedy albums within the next 12 months.



LBJ'S 'GOLDEN' GIFT: After signing the Aid to Education Bill into law at his alma-mater, Southwest Texas State College in San Marcos, Texas, President Johnson was presented with a copy of the Golden Records' album, "The Presidents' Marches," which features the "President Lyndon Baines Johnson March" as performed by the Southwest Texas State College Band. The march was performed at the President's Inauguration and other functions involving LBJ. The writers are Andra and Ervin Litkei (the New York distrib).

In the left photo, Golden Records' Arthur Shimkin presents the President with a special 'Golden' copy of the LP, while Andrea Litkei and Al Massler, president of Golden (holding the LP's sleeve) stand by.

In the photo on the right, Massler and Mrs. Letkei are greeted by the First Lady. Massler, by the way, contributed monies to the college to replace a chair (used by the President of the college) and desk (which LBJ once sat at and which he used to sign the Bill) that were given to the President.

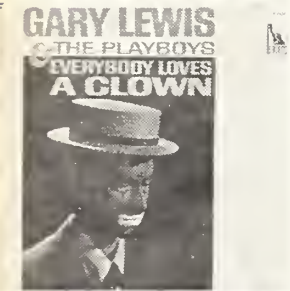
I LIKE IT LIKE THAT—Dave Clark Five—Epic LN 24178/BN 26178

Tremendously popular with the teen record-buying public, the Dave Clark Five dubs this session after their recent chart smash, "I Like It Like That," and looks for equally good sales with the album. The driving beat and infectious Liverpool sound are still strong attractions to the young public and should make this a top-selling set. In addition to the title track, some of the top cuts include, "A Little Bit Of Love" and "She's A Loving Girl."



THE 4 SEASONS' GOLD VAULT OF HITS—Philips PHM 200-196/PHS 600-196

With a long string of smashes strung out behind them, the 4 Seasons pack this session with a heap of their biggest hit sounds. Kicking off the hitsville concert with their current winner, "Let's Hang On," the group runs through memory lane, making frequent hit parade stops in an ultra-powerful, chartbound effort. Some of the tracks that should help make this a big LP are "Bye Bye Baby," "Dawn (Go Away)" and their million-selling "Rag Doll."



EVERYBODY LOVES A CLOWN—Gary Lewis and the Playboys—Liberty LRP-3428/LST-7428

Hitmakers Gary Lewis and the Playboys were quick to follow-up their top ten smash, "Everybody Loves A Clown" with this potent LP, titled after the single. In addition to the title track, the boys' stylized renditions of "Tossin' And Turnin'," "Mr. Blue," "My Special Angel" and "Sha La La" make a lot of good listening and dancing sounds. LP should be headed for the same big success as this red hot groups' previous efforts have enjoyed.



THE SING-ALONG WORLD OF TRINI LOPEZ—Reprise—R/RS 6183

Wherever Trini Lopez goes, his performances turn into sing-alongs, and the chanter enjoys the audience response so much that he decided to do this sing-along LP. There is plenty of Lopez, but along about the second chorus of such tunes as "When The Saints Go Marching In," and "Sweet Georgia Brown," the other voices join in. Backed with an electric guitar, drums and the Will Bronson Singers, the package should make it big in the sales department with living room sing-alongers.



HAVING A RAVE UP WITH THE YARDBIRDS—Epic LN 24177/BN 26177

Mix up country music with big band drive, basic rock and old-fashioned blues and spice the whole thing with lots of improvisation and a sprinkling of 'oriental' chords, and the result is a 'Rave Up' with the Yardbirds. Featuring the group's recent hit single, "Heart Full Of Soul," and their current charter, "I'm A Man," the package is a wild, pulsating assortment that should get plenty of reaction from the teen market.



MY NAME IS ALLAN—Allan Sherman—Warner Bros. W/WS 1604

Allan Sherman's uproarious antics come to the fore once again in another hilarious collection of melodic spoofs. The light, yet sharp, wit of the composer-comic does his usual top-notch job as he brings back well-known melodies with his own brand new, highly amusing lyrics. The Sherman pen is in peak form as he satirizes and parodies everything under the sun, in the best of taste, including TV commercials ("Chim Chim Cheree") and off-Broadway plays ("It's A Most Unusual Play.")



IT'S GONNA TAKE A MIRACLE—Royalettes—MGM E/SE 4332

The smooth, strong sound of the Royalettes is rampant on this powerful LP follow-up to their recent "It's Gonna Take A Miracle" click. Leading off with the title track and featuring the girls' current charter, "I Want To Meet Him," plus "Yes I'm Ready" and "He's Gone," among a host of pleasers, the LP is a pure delight. Fans of the group and the sound should both be eager to get their hands on this one.



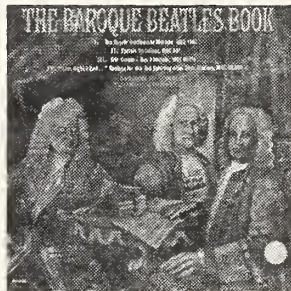
THE FERRANTE AND TEICHER CONCERT—Ferrante and Teicher—United Artists UAL 3444/UAS 6444

Everything to which their countless fans have enthusiastically responded is here in this new concert album by Ferrante and Teicher. The two pianists display their musical versatility, combining lighter melodies with more serious songs, backed by full, smooth ork arrangements. Included in the disk are "Tiger Rag," "Unchained Melody," and "The Last Time I Saw Paris."



YOU'VE GOT TO HIDE YOUR LOVE AWAY—Silkie—Fontana MGF 27548/SRF 67548

With the smashing success of their debut single effort, "You've Got To Hide Your Love Away," (produced by Beatle members Lennon-McCartney-Harrison) the Silkie look forward to similar success with this package by the same name. A touch of folk, a dash of blues and a sprinkling of jazz spice the group's sound, giving the album a very wide range of appeal. In addition to the title track, top listening bets include "Close The Door Gently" and "Tomorrow Is A Long Time."



THE BAROQUE BEATLES BOOK—Merseyside Kammermusikgesellschaft/Rifkin—Electra ELK-306/EKS-7306

Classics student Joshua Rifkin has orchestrated tunes of Lennon-McCartney, in the Baroque manner and has assembled a group of musicians, titled for this performance, the Merseyside Kammermusikgesellschaft, with the result being this unusual LP. Some may be surprised at the results, but many others have long since accepted the fact that the music of these two young men is something else. Fans of the Beatles should, and devotees of Baroque music must dig this set.

POP BEST BETS



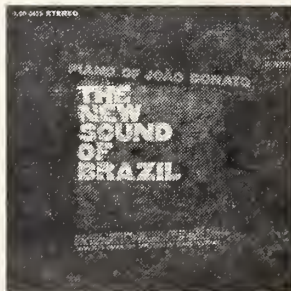
MARILYN MICHAELS—ABC-Paramount ABC-533/ABCS-533

Fast rising young songstress Marilyn Michaels makes her ABC-Paramount LP debut on this groovy set. Full strong melodic readings of a host of favorites, including a wild interpretation of "Won't You Come Home Bill Bailey," and "I Got Rhythm," "Fascinating Rhythm" medley and a powerful reading of "The Music That Makes Me Dance" from the "Funny Girl" show, in which the lark played the National Company lead should make this LP a big step in Marilyn Michaels' career.



ROY DRUSKY'S GREATEST HITS—Mercury MG 21052/SR 61052

Roy Drusky has come up with another in his usual pattern of fine country LP's and can look forward to quick, healthy consumer response. Containing a series of his best singles efforts, including his current chart-climber, "While Lightnin' Express" and "(All My Friends Are Gonna Be) Strangers," the album highlights all the substance, sensitivity and universality of great country love themes—love lost, love envied, love lamented and love found. The sincere Drusky style makes this a top country bet.



THE NEW SOUND OF BRAZIL—João Donato—RCA Victor LPM/LSP 3473

Considered among the top exponents of the Brazilian Bossa Nova movement, Joao Donato is showcased on this LP with an enchanting collection of standards in that country's modern pop music catalog. The multi-talented Donato, who is as well known for his compositions as his keyboard artistry, does a superb job of capturing the spirit of the bossa nova, with melodies ranging from exuberant to plaintive. Some of the top selections here include "And Roses And Roses" and "Samba De Orfeu."

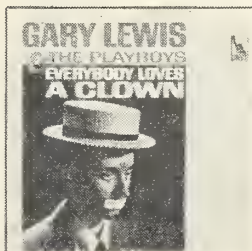

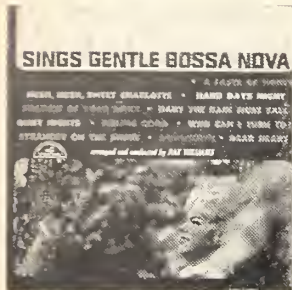

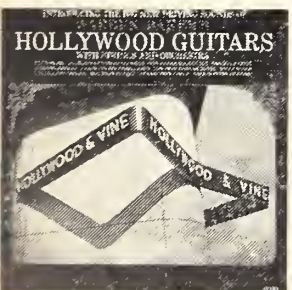
I'VE BEEN THERE—Jane Harvey—Audio Fidelity—AFLP 2149

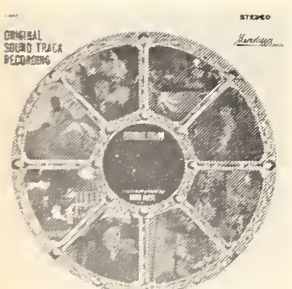
HITTIN' THE ROAD—Ernest Tubb and his Texas Troubadours—Decca D 4681/DL 74681

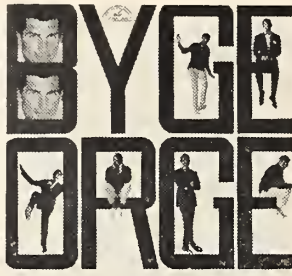
JULIET OF THE SPIRITS—Original Sound-track—Mainstream 56062/S-6062

Casey Anderson is truly a many-faceted artist and this is exemplified by this blues LP, of which most of the tunes are Anderson originals. From the tender lament of "A Little Lovin' Done" and onto the driving, stomping, wailing "Honky Stomp," Anderson shows a respect for the classic concepts of blues, without the fear to inject new sounds and patterns in order to please the contemporary listener. Devotees of blues, r&b, rock and many other scenes should all find something to like in this one.



BY GEORGE — George Hamilton — ABC-Paramount ABC/ABCS 535

Veteran screen star George Hamilton recently stepped into the recording field with his debut single, "Loneliness," and highlights his initial ABC-Paramount album with that same cut. The actor-turned-chanter displays a whole bagful of vocal talents as he runs through current and recent chart items, ranging from pop to rock to r&b. Some of the best listening bets include "You've Lost That Lovin' Feelin'" and "Memphis Tennessee," among others.



JAZZ PICKS

MONK MISTERIOSO — Thelonious Monk — Columbia CL 2416/CS 9216

With the groovy, funky powerful piano of Thelonious Monk, backed by the strong tenor sax of Charlie Rouse, Larry Gales on bass and drummer Ben Riley, this LP reeks of a musty sound that tends to carry listeners with it. With a special hurrah for the title track, "Well, You Needn't" and "Honeysuckle Rose," the album should prove to be a favorite with the popular 88'er's many followers.



WRAPPED TIGHT—Coleman Hawkins—Impulse A-87/AS 87

As the "In" title of this LP says, Coleman Hawkins is "wrapped tight," in reference to his musicianship. From the medium-tempo, bluesy title number through the rich moving "Intermezzo," the warm reading of "Red Roses For A Blue Lady" and finally the up-tempo rocking "She's Fit" and "Bean's Place," Hawkins' tenor shines. With the strong backing, that blends so well with the leader and the top material, this LP is bound to be a biggie with jazz buffs.



WINGS AND THINGS—Johnny Hodges/Wild Bill Davis—Verve V/V6-8630

Latest in their series of blues LP's is this multi-faceted outing of the talents of Johnny Hodges on the alto sax, Bill Davis on the organ, plus the backing of an outstanding crop of sidemen. Leading off in a rhythmically romping "Wings And Things," the boys have a powerful blues in "Spotted Dog" and a swinging limbo sound in Duke Ellington's "Imbo." The many fans that Hodges and Davis have garnered through their previous LP's and appearances should flock to get this one.



THE MAYNARD FERGUSON SEXTET—Mainstream 56060/S/6060

The first outing of the Maynard Ferguson Sextet, on this LP, is an exciting one. Ferguson gives out with plenty of his accustomed blasting on the lead track "To And Fro," but shows a little-seen side with his moving ballad rendition of "April Fool." Backed by saxes, flute, piano, bass and drums, all manned by top pros, the trumpet and flugelhorn of the leader weaves a web of sound that should be headed for heavy action.



CLASSICAL PICKS

OFFENBACH: THE TALES OF HOFFMAN—Angel CL/CLX 3667

The Angel classical catalog has made a noteworthy addition with this superb recording, featuring Nicolai Gedda, Jean-Christophe Benoit, George London, Elisabeth Schwarzkopf, Gianna D'Angelo and Victoria de los Angeles. The cast vividly brings this masterful work to life once again, making it a must for the classical collector's library. To make the 3-record set even more attractive, the label has made up a deluxe, washable box cover and has included a 35-page booklet, complete with score, photographs of the artists and biography of the composers.



HAYDN: SYMPHONY NO. 75 IN D MAJOR/SYMPHONY NO. 81 IN G MAJOR—Esterhazy Orchestra/Blum—Vanguard VRS-1138/VSD-71138

Previously hailed for their many fine recordings of the works of Haydn, the Esterhazy Orchestra, under the baton of David Blum, makes a sterling addition to their repertoire with this record. Both of these symphonies combine qualities of joy with powerful and moving beauty of the slow movements. The interpretation is outstanding, and the combination makes for a noteworthy piece of classical listening pleasure.

Although best remembered for his role as the "Tune Detective," both on radio and in books, Spaeth did much writing (some 32 books) and lecturing on the general music scene, attempting musical enlightenment of the public. Spaeth was also a songwriter and a member of ASCAP for 40 years. Commenting on his death, Stanley Adams, president of ASCAP, said: "... as a composer and author, Sigmund Spaeth made an imperishable contribution to the culture of our country; as an educator, lecturer and commentator, he helped popularize great music among the American people." He is survived by a step-son. His wife died last July 31.

Bateman got his start with Motown, where he recorded, among others, Mary Wells, the Supremes, Marvin Gaye, and the Marvelettes, for whom he produced "Please Mr. Postman" which went on to number one. After anklng the Detroit label he joined Double-O, a Liberty subsidiary, recording The Shangri-Las, Wilson Pickett, the Soul Sisters, and Lloyd Price. Most recently he produced for In Records, a subsidiary of Roulette Records.

Beach Boys On Tour

NEW YORK — The Beach Boys have left for a cross-country concert tour that will include such cities as St. Louis, Providence, Boston, Minneapolis and New York.

The fivesome, who have just released their 12th Capitol LP, "Beach Boys Party," will return to Hollywood in early December.

Columbia Releases 4 Tapes

NEW YORK — Columbia Records is currently releasing four tapes including a performance of Bach's Brandenburg Concertos with Pablo Casals conducting, pianist Rudolf Serkin, violinist Alexander Schneider, Peter Serkin at the harpsichord and the Marlboro Festival Orchestra. The other three tapes include Sibelius' Fifth Symphony with Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic, vocalist Steve Lawrence, and jazz musician Woody Herman.

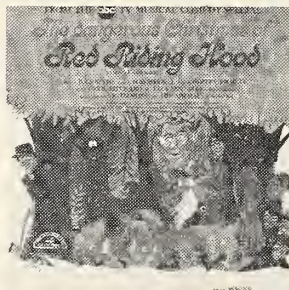
SING WE NOW OF CHRISTMAS—Tennessee Ernie Ford—Capitol T/ST 2394

THE DANGEROUS CHRISTMAS OF RED RIDING HOOD—TV Cast—ABC-Paramount 536

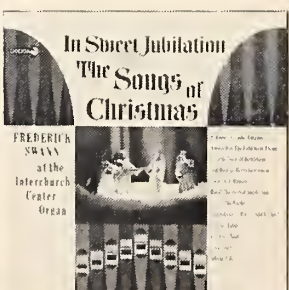

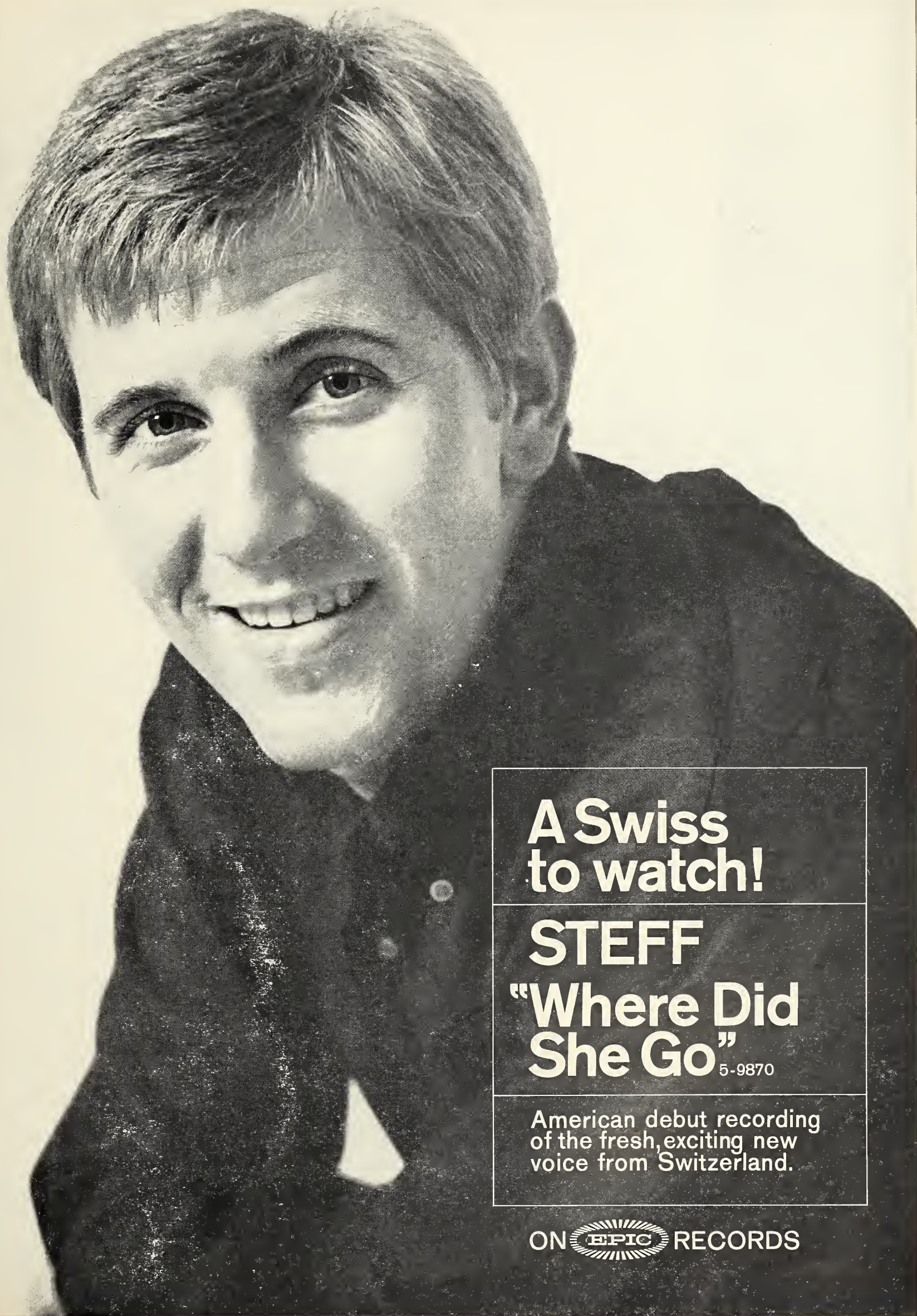
IN SWEET JUBILATION—Frederick Swann—Decca D 4637/DL 74637

He will also personally supervise all of the Famous and Paramount recording sessions on the west coast. Peirce will be assisted by Barney Fields, who will devote his efforts to promoting F & P tunes with deejays.

Trudy Sennert In U.S. For Peter Meisel Deals

NEW YORK—Trudy Sennert, head of the international dept. of Peter Meisel Music in Germany, has arrived in the U.S. for an extended trip. On her first visit to these shores, she will visit with publishers, indie producers and label execs in order to arrange deals for product to cross the seas to Germany and vice-versa. There may be a stopover on the west coast, she said.

Deals have already been completed whereby Meisel-originated product is to be released here. The 4 Corners affiliate of Kapp has just released Helmut Zacharias' "Moscow Medley" and "Mexico Medley." An LP by the maestro may follow. Also, London Records is releasing two singles featuring German artists in England. They are Draf's "Amanda" and Manuela's "Nitty Gritty."

The Peter Meisel music combine includes publishing companies and a label, Hansa.

N.Y. NARAS To Meet

NEW YORK—A discussion and explanation of the new, stream-lined Grammy Awards voting procedure will highlight this Tuesday's (23) New York NARAS membership meeting in the Bryant Park Studios of National Recording, 33 West 42nd Street.

The 8:15 PM session, to which all record academy members, as well as those interested in joining, have been invited, will serve as the local chapter's annual forum, during which members can question their governors and at the same time express their own opinions about what the Academy has been doing and should or should not be doing.

Though much of the meeting is expected to revolve around the awards, past and present, as well as the increased emphasis on contemporary sounds, it is intended also, according to program chairman Dom Cerulli, "to get the grass roots elements of the chapter move involved in its day-to-day activities. We hope to get more and more of the membership onto the various committees and performing functions that will make them feel they are more a part of NARAS. At the same time, we hope to draw from them the sort of new ideas and renewed enthusiasm that are so essential to our development.

"Sometimes," Cerulli continued, "organizations tend to become somewhat ingrown. This is something we want very much to guard against. By having a meeting like this, at which everyone, members as well as visitors, can express his viewpoints about the industry in general and, of course, the Academy in particular, we should be able to come up with some interesting and new concepts, some of which quite conceivably could become a part of future NARAS activities. Besides," Cerulli concluded, "it's about time we had another open forum for the creative phase of the record industry. All of us need to get to know one another better. And it also might help to open up some closed minds."

Libby Holman LP Creates Pre-Release Interest

NEW YORK — Pat Sabatino, sales manager of J.J.C., distributors of the new Evergreen LP, "The Legendary Libby Holman" reports that more than 1000 advanced orders have been received. This is the songster's first recording in more than a decade. In the package the famous torch singer of the late twenties and thirties has re-recorded the standards she first introduced in musical revues and some of the blues and earth songs in her present concert repertoire.

She recently gave two sold out concerts at the United Nations for the benefit of UNICEF and has scheduled three more concerts in February at Georgetown University, Washington, D.C.

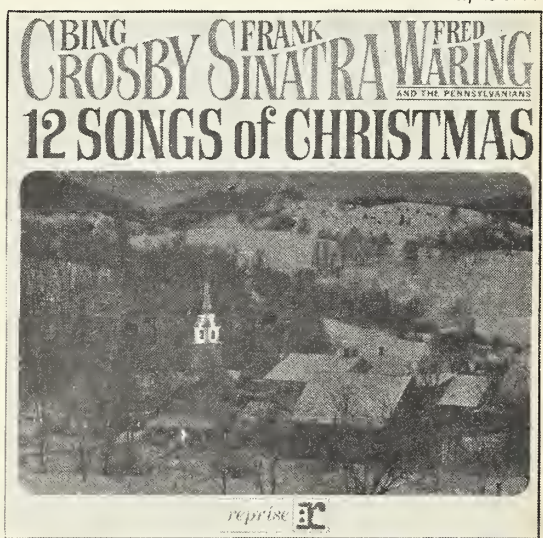

Capitol Realigns M & E Division

HOLLYWOOD—Dave Lawhon has been named to the newly-created post of national plant manager at Capitol Records, according to George Jones, vp of manufacturing and engineering.

Lawhon joined CRI in June 1947 as a press operator at the Los Angeles Plant. He advanced rapidly through the positions of assistant foreman (foreman, press department), manufacturing superintendent and manager at the Scranton plant. He will maintain his offices temporarily in the

Scranton plant until approximately February 1966 at which time he will be located at the Tower. He will report directly to Jones.

Evans began his career with Capitol in 1951 as a mechanical engineer in 1954. He was appointed Scranton plant chief engineer and two years later he became chief engineer, M&E Division. In 1964, he was promoted to the position of Manufacturing Superintendent of the Scranton Plant, a post he held until this latest appointment. He will report directly to Lawhon.

Bouselli has been employed at Capitol's Scranton plant in various capacities since 1946, when it was first purchased by Capitol. In 1952, he began work in the order service department and in 1957 he became material control analyst and eventually became supervisor of that department.

In February, 1963, Bouselli was appointed foreman of warehousing and shipping, a post he has held until the present. In his new position, he will report directly to Evans.

Fega Moves To WTMF

Mort Fega and his "Jazz In Stereo" show premiered on WTMF, New York on Nov. 22.

The jazzman was previously heard on WEVD, New York, for five years with his "Jazz Unlimited" program prior to joining WRFM, New York. He has m.c.'d the Newport Jazz Festival, and jazz concerts at New York's Town Hall, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center and Randall's Island Stadium.

Considered an authority on the jazz art form of music, Fega has been a jazz collector since his early teens and now has a collection of more than 10,000 jazz albums. He has also written extensively on the subject and has produced the jazz notes for numerous jazz albums.

Philips Hopes To Repeat With Xmas Mass Album

CHICAGO—For the third time in less than four years of operations in the American record market, Philips Records, under the aegis of product manager Lou Simon, may be headed for a holiday hit of religious derivation.

The "Singing Nun" album and last year's Congolese Dialogue Mass, "Misa Luba," were both the recipient of late autumn attention, leading to holiday season sales.

Now, "Misa Criolla," basically a Roman Catholic Mass, composed and produced in Argentina and released throughout South America by Philips in 1963, is the subject of widespread interest. Sung by Los Fronterizos Chorus and Orchestra, it consists of two parts—a dialogue mass and Navidad Nuestra, folk dance of the Nativity.

Performed in Spanish, by the end of 1964 the album reached over 100,000 sales in South America, becoming one of the all-time album best sellers in that continent.

Simon reports that the LP has enjoyed slightly over 20,000 sales nationally with approximately 2,500 coming from the greater Cleveland area. He noted that the album is part of the label's deluxe price Connoisseur series, with a double-fold package elaborately illustrated and fully annotated.

In addition, Philips has just received from its Argentinian affiliate a sound film recording of the "Misa Criolla" and is preparing for extensive television exposure. Sheldon Tirk, midwest operations manager, is coordinating placements of the film and record for TV exposure in the Midwestern area, while nationally exposure efforts are being coordinated by Philips' publicity director John Sippel and Hugh Dallas, label promotion director.

Our Glass Buys Copyrights

NEW YORK—Our Glass Music, the pubbery owned by independent producers Sonny Lester and Warren Troob, has purchased the copyrights in the catalogues of Miv, Emory, Emit, and Docker Music Corporations.

The purchase, which includes 120 songs as well as several Dave "Baby" Cortez hits, has been added to the copyrights now being developed by Lester and Troob. The duo revealed that in addition to working with established and new writers, they are currently in the process of negotiating for additional catalogues and are intent on making the firm a major music publishing entity.

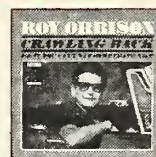

(and music) line at the label is Dauntless.

In the classical field, Gimbel is about to conclude a deal that will bring into the AF fold a large European classical line, which, by the way, was once marketed in the U.S.

On the international scene, AF is about to end its ties with the Philips label and begin to name distributors for the line on a country-by-country basis. This is the pattern for the company in Japan, South Africa, Canada, Argentina and other countries.

Singles success is another endeavor of AF under Gimbel. The label's singles outlet is Karate Records, which has under contract such performers as Jane Harvey, Guy Pastor, Glenda Grainger. In addition, there's an open-door policy on master acquisitions.

AF recently entered tape deals with Ampex and Auto-Stereo. Also, the label's product is available through the Capitol Record Club. An interesting sidelight here is that the Columbia Record Club offers two AF sets by Al Hirt.

To administer its ever-expanding operation, AF has an exec line-up that includes, besides Gimbel: Harold Drayson, vp and sales manager; Carl Shaw, vp of production and assistant to Gimbel; Carl Greenberg, vp of international sales; Barry Oslander, A&R chief; Diane Terman, public relations head; Bob Thyne, comptroller; Willy Hamilton, engineer; Charlie Blodgett, art director.

**Swingle Singers
Return To Gate**

NEW YORK—The Swingle Singers of Paris, who made their first American nightclub appearance at Art D'Lugoff's Village Gate last year, will return to the Greenwich Village cavern on Thanksgiving Eve, Nov. 24, for 12 shows in five nights, and then come back on Dec. 22 for a stint right thru New Year's Day, Jan. 1, 1966.

In the Thanksgiving engagement, they will share the stage with Argentine guitarist Jorge Morel. On opening night they will also have Hugh Masekela's African Jazz Band, who record for MGM.

During the weekend (Nov. 26-27), comedian Dick Gregory will join the Swingles and Morel. During the Xmas-New Year's period the Swingles will co-star with Herbie Mann's Latin-Jazz Octet.

Led by American-born Ward Swingle, the group became known with their hit LP, "Bach's Greatest Hits," in which the musicians used their voices to give the sonorous instrumentation of Bach compositions. They have since recorded (Philips, exclusively), 19th century classics under the title "Swingle Singers Getting Romantic."

They are accompanied by Guy Pedersen on bass and Daniel Humair on percussion.

These flexible vinyl records have an indefinite life span and can be played on any standard record player without removing the records from the books themselves.

Along with them will come "Goldfingers," personal bodyguard and chauffeur "Odd Job," who has assumed those responsibilities for the group and their hearse.

LOS ANGELES—The Nat Cole Cancer Foundation will hold the first west coast benefit on Dec. 10 at Hollywood's Music Center. Tickets will be scaled from \$5 to \$100.

The talent line-up for the show includes Juliet Prowse, Nancy Wilson, Gogi Grant, the Les Brown Chorale, Nelson Riddle's orchestra and the Krofft Marionettes. Gamut Productions is in the process of lining up additional talent.

Before the show, a film presentation of highlights of the late chanter's life will be shown.

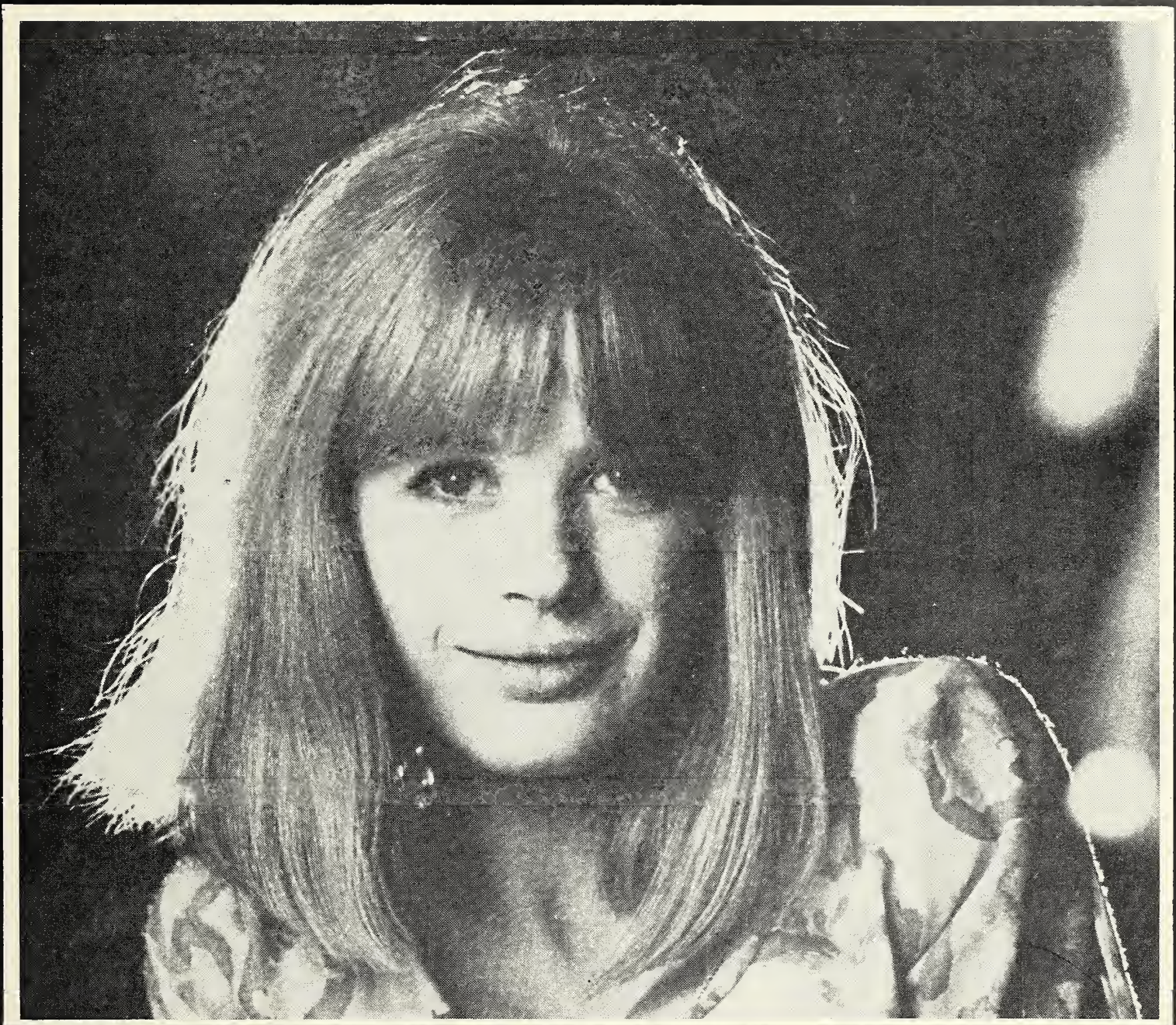

4 Seasons Wind Up '65 With Whirlwind Of Activity

NEW YORK—The 4 Seasons' schedule of bookings for stage and television engagements has been expanded as a result of the popularity they are currently experiencing with their Philips' recordings.

At present, their single "Let's Hang On" is a top ten chart item and, according to Philips' product manager Lou Simon, has surpassed the half million sales-mark. Another single, "Don't Think Twice," which they recorded under the pseudonym of the Wonder Who, is quickly moving up the charts.

On the album front, two recently released packages are enjoying strong dealer, deejay, and consumer reaction. One of these albums, "The 4 Seasons' Gold Vault Of Hits," contains both the "Let's Hang On" and "Don't Think Twice" singles. Their other new LP, "The 4 Seasons Sing Hits by Burt Bacharach, Hal David, and Bob Dylan," includes tunes by these top writers that have been international hits in recent months. In addition, Simon noted that the entire catalog of previously issued 4 Seasons' album product has been stimulated and is enjoying a resurgence in sales activity.

The group's busy schedule between now and the end of the year includes a whirlwind of television activity during a brief visit to the west coast. While there, in the space of two days, the boys will tape appearances on Dick Clark's "Where The Action Is," "Hollywood A Go Go," "The Lloyd Thaxton Show," and "Ninth Street West." College concert appearances will take them to such divergent points as University of Maine, Harrisburg, Pa., Atlanta, Ga., Philadelphia, and Boston.

On Nov. 25 they will ride the Coca Cola float in the Gimbel's Thanksgiving Day Parade in Philadelphia. The parade, a traditional annual attraction in that city, is televised locally and also receives press and newsreel coverage.

The group, who recently switched representation from GAC to the William Morris, has also announced a new personal management arrangement. Martin Machat, previously associated with the group as their attorney, will now serve in the dual role of legal advisor and personal manager.

More Time Voted For Chi Music Show

CHICAGO—Earlier opening and longer hours for exhibits was voted for the 1966 Music Show by the Music Show advisory committee of the National Association of Music Merchants, the show's sponsors, at a meeting at Chicago's Conrad Hilton Hotel, where the big event is scheduled for July 10 to 14.

All exhibits will be open for two additional hours on Sunday, the first day of the show, and for a half hour more daily Monday through Wednesday. Opening time on Sunday will be at 12 noon instead of 1 p.m. and closing time will be extended an hour to 6 p.m. from the previous closing time of 5 p.m. The weekday opening hour will be moved to 10 a.m. instead of 10:30.

The move was made to accommodate the rapidly-growing attendance at the Music Show, which hit a new record of 18,416 at the 1965 show. "The suggestion for longer hours came from many buyers and others who found at last year's Music Show that covering the large number of elaborate exhibits takes much time, especially with more thousands of visitors at the show," reported William R. Gard, executive vice-president of the NAMM. "We anticipate another record turnout at the 1966 Music Show and want to provide the fullest opportunity for everyone to enjoy a maximum of time viewing the exhibits."

"The only possible objection to extended hours was that exhibit time might interfere with business sessions and sales breakfasts starting earlier in the morning," Gard noted. "But attendance at the Music Show has become so big that there are many, many people not attending specific business or sales sessions who are anxious to start their tour of the show exhibits earlier than the previous opening hour."

Gard reported to the Music Show advisory committee on hotel room accommodations for the Music Show and noted that reservations had been arranged for 3,370 rooms in 1966, which is slightly higher than figures for the 1965 show. Hotel reservations will be very important at the 1966 event since the Housewares Show is scheduled the same week as the Music Show and hotel space will be very tight, Gard noted.

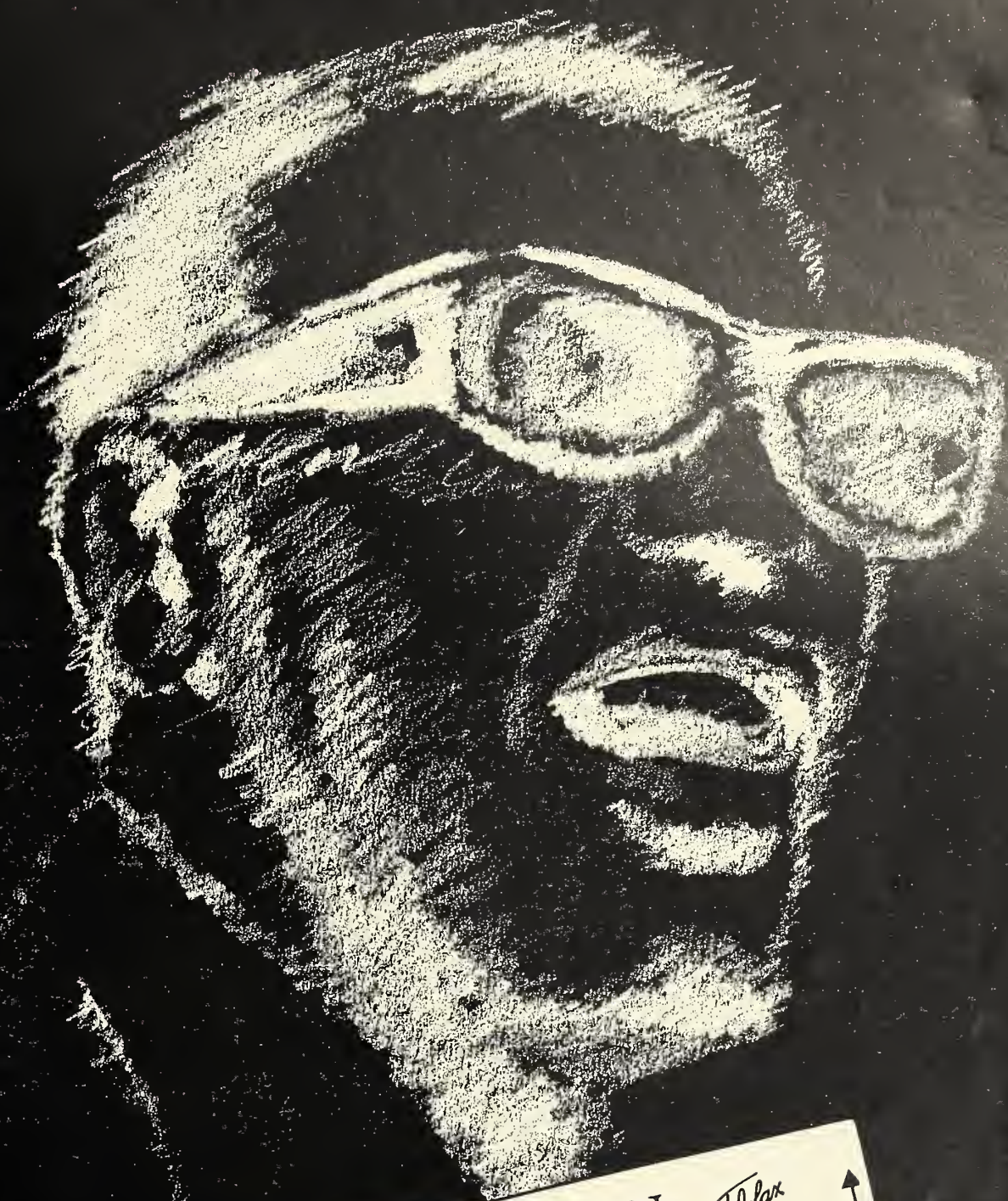

Rolling Stones Go Cross-Country

NEW YORK—Having just completed their concert engagements along the East Coast, The Rolling Stones have left for the remainder of their six-week tour of the United States.

The English musical group has had top attendance in every city in which they have played, including New York, Boston, Washington, Baltimore and Philadelphia. Grosses for the first two weeks of their visit reportedly total more than \$500,000 and the tour is less than half-way finished.

Among the cities still scheduled are Chicago, Detroit, Dallas, Denver, Seattle and Los Angeles, where they will conclude on Dec. 5.

Chuck Berry To Make N.Y. Concert Debut

NEW YORK—Chuck Berry, an outstanding artist of The New York Folk Festival last June, will be presented in his full length New York concert debut November 24, Thanksgiving Eve, at The Village Theater, 105 Second Avenue at 6th Street.

Berry is well known for such hits as: "Maybelline", "Memphis", "School Days" and "Roll Over Beethoven".

Berry is credited as a major influence on the contemporary folk-rock movement, which includes The Beatles and The Rolling Stones as well as Bob Dylan.

In this full length concert debut, the emphasis will be on the fantastic range of mood, content and versatility of Berry's talent as a composer and performer. The program will be divided into four segments: "Down Home"—illustrating his early influences of traditional blues; "Automobiles"—illustrating Berry's social commentary as reflected in the unique symbol of the automobile, in his songs, as it related to the particular culture in which Berry was reared; "Virtuosity"—showing Berry as a great instrumentalist; and "Watch Out"—in which Berry performs his hits that have had such tremendous influence on the musical world.

With the broadening concept of American folk music and the recognition of rhythm-and-blues as being an important part of American folk music, Berry has become a legend to folk music enthusiasts.

In Esquire, September, 1965, in a cover story on the twenty eight people who were most important to the college generation of today, Chuck Berry is included along with such others as the late President, John F. Kennedy, Norbert Weiner and Bishop Pike.

Bill Evans Cuts Back

NEW YORK—When Bill Evans returns from Europe at the end of November, he will complete the recording of an album featuring the pianist with his trio and a string orchestra playing concert music of Bach, Chopin, Granados, Scriabin and Faure in a most unique way. Since the music is representative of several periods, the Verve LP will be titled "Time Remembered." This title comes from a work specifically composed by Evans for the album.

Bang Signs Exciters

NEW YORK—Bang Records has announced the signing of the Exciters. Their first presentation for the company, a single and an LP will be waxed in the near future. The group's first hit, "Tell Him," was penned by Bert Berns, who is now affiliated with the label.

TRO & 20th Century Fox In Major Promo Tie

NEW YORK—Happy Goday, newly appointed vice president of the Richmond Organization, flew to the Coast late last week and immediately went into a series of huddles with Bill Smith, 20th Century Fox press topper. The Goday-Smith talks revolved around exploitation arrangements on the song "Phoenix Love Theme (Senza Fine)," from the upcoming 20th film, "Flight of the Phoenix." TRO is the publisher of the song.

Upcoming shortly is a Connie Francis single on the tune and in line with this, Goday will also hold conferences with Lionel Newman, a 20th studio exec and Frank DeVol who will produce the Francis discing for MGM Records. Miss Francis plans to cut the song in five different languages, thus paving the way for world wide cross exploitation of picture and song.

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ALBUMS REVISITED

NEVER ON SUNDAY

Some six years ago an unpretentious art-flick called "Never On Sunday" slipped into theatres around the U.S. Although its star, Melina Mercouri, was a popular favorite on the continent, she was almost totally unknown to American audiences. Any film-wise observer could have 'accurately' predicted that a property without star or production values (it cost a mere \$250,000) would not have the most munificent future. However, as so often happens with crystal-balling the fate of any vehicle, the pic quickly captured the fancy of the public and went on to become the 'sleeper' blockbuster triumph of the year. One of the ingredients of the film's success was certainly the sparkling, imaginative score of Manos Hadjidakis. United Artists Corp., the flick's distributor, quickly released the original sound-

track on the UA label. A host of recordings on the main-theme plus an Oscar for the Best Song Of The Year spurred the album to become an immediate best-seller. To date, the LP has sold some 300,000 units in the U.S. plus an additional 200,000 copies abroad.

But the story of "Never On Sunday" is far from over. Although the pic is no longer in general release, it has never gone into dry-dock either. The film is currently playing in almost every country on the globe. And as the flick goes, so goes the soundtrack. The label reports that the soundtrack still continues to sell at a healthy clip of 10,000 copies a year. From all indications it appears that both the flick and the LP, each cross-promoting the other, will be around for some time to come.

NASHVILLE—Frank Sweeney has been appointed national promotion director for Monument Records, it was announced last week by Fred Foster, the label's president. Sweeney replaces Joe Cash, who is exiting the company Dec. 1.

A 13-year veteran of radio, both as a deejay and as a member of management, Sweeney has been nationally known in broadcasting circles since a stint with WHOT-Youngstown. As music director of the outlet he was credited with breaking a number of national hits. He's also served on the staffs of such key stations as KYW-Cleveland and WKBN-Youngstown. Most recently, Sweeney has been associated with WKNR-Detroit as music director and air personality.

Reporting to Sweeney in his new job will be Ed Crawley, who handles the promotional chores for the Sound Stage 7 label in Nashville and B. J. McElwee, midwest regional man. Sweeney, in turn, will report to Monument v.p.'s Jack Kirby and Chuck Chellman.

Sweeney and his wife plan to move to Nashville shortly after the first of the year.

RCA Records First Ives' LP

New York—RCA Victor recently recorded Charles Ives' First Symphony in a performance by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Morton Gould conducting.

Written before the turn of the century, the work has not been waxed previously, and it was only recently that it became a part of the active symphonic repertory.

The recording took place in Chicago's Symphony Hall, and followed a performance by the orchestra under Gould's direction. The LP will contain two other works by Ives: "The Unanswered Question" and William Schuman's version of "America."

Roger Hall, Red Seal A & R Manager said: "Charles Ives is one of the most important composers America has produced having been a precursor of the avant-garde movement in this country. The First Symphony was written at a time when Ives had broken away from the Brahms school of composition and was opening new frontiers in much the same way as Debussy and Ravel were doing, though these were composers whose work was unknown to Ives at the time.

"This recording of a significant early work of Ives is a continuation of our policy of ever-broadening and enriching the RCA Victor catalog," Hall continued.

The album was produced for the company by Howard Scott and is tentatively scheduled for release in 1966.

McCoys Set European Tour

NEW YORK—The McCoys, who have a successful follow-up to "Hang on Sloopy" with their current "Fever," (#20 on this week's chart) will leave for an extended European tour on Dec. 3. Roy Rifkind, president of Celestial Artists, booking agent for the group, and Bob Feldman, Jerry Goldstein and Richie Gottelher of F. G. G. Productions, who records the chanters, will accompany them.

The group has been engaged to appear at several ballrooms and concerts in England and the continent. They will also be seen on many of the leading British TV's.

Colpix Launches 'Blonde' Promotion

NEW YORK—Colpix Records' West Coast general manager Bud Katzel recently outlined a major promo campaign for the label's new comedy waxing, "James Blonde Secret Agent 006.95 (marked down from 007.95) The Man from T.A.N.T.E."

Spearheading the firm's efforts is a special 45 EP for deejays, containing highlights from the Marty Brill/Larry Foster recording. Also launched are in-depth spots at New York's WNEW and WMCA, Los Angeles' KABC and Chicago's WFDM.

Larry Foster, appearing in Chicago's Scotch Mist with the Kirby Stone Four during November is making extensive appearances on local radio and TV in the Chicago area, and Marty Brill is covering the same type promo route in New York.

In addition to these efforts, the label has hired Ivor/Merns Associates in New York to co-ordinate a major press campaign introducing the disc to magazines and newspapers.

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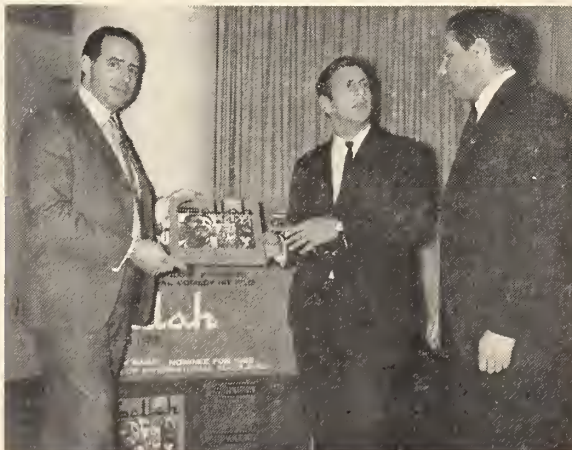

Several days later, in the same area, KLRN-TV presented a symposium on country music. The panel for the discussion consisted of Max Gardner, KOKE-Austin and A. V. Bamford, K-BER general manager and taped appearances by George Jones and Don Gibson. Bamford advises that the TV station is planning similar discussions in the future.

We hear that a new contractual agreement was recently completed between RCA Victor songstress Norma Jean and the Moeller Talent Stable which will enable the artist to be booked as a single act. For the past six years she has been a featured part of the Porter Wagoner Show, and, although she can now be booked as a single, she will continue to be a regular on the syndicated TVer and will continue to be supervised by Wagoner.

Former Sims recording artist Janet McBride and Vern Stovall (vocalist on Phil Baugh's "Country Guitar" and "One Man Band") have signed long-term contracts—management, writing and recording—with Dewey Groom's Longhorn label. Both artists have moved from Los Angeles to the Dallas area to begin immediate bookings. Janet McBride will have her first Longhorn release very shortly.

A new public relations and promotions agency has been formed in Music City, according to Tandy Rice, who owns and operates the firm. Located at 720 17th Ave. S, the Tandy Rice Agency will involve itself initially with professionally representing both individuals and institutions to the trade media. Rice was formerly employed as public relations director for the Moeller Talent stable, and, under the new arrangement, will continue to represent the agency, as well as other accounts.

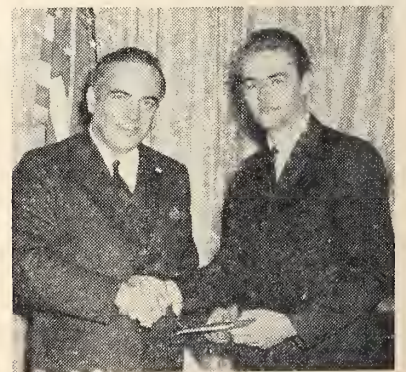

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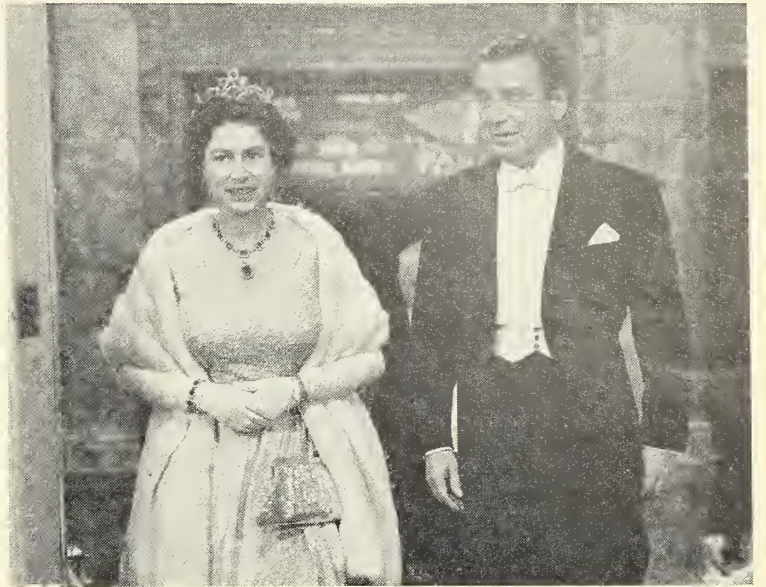

GREAT BRITAIN

A completely new series of LP's, designed specifically for the stereo market, has been created by E.M.I. Records for release on the Columbia label under the title Studio 2 Stereo. Designed to cater to the enthusiastic stereo buyer, Studio 2 Stereo will in no way interfere with the release of normal mono and stereo recordings issued by the company. A spokesman for the firm said that during the past two years there has been a steady increase in the demand for stereo disks not only at home but in the export field, and the publicity has all the technical skill required to produce such recordings. Studio 2 Stereo was given a champagne launching by E.M.I. in addition to a full promotional campaign including national advertising and window displays. The first release, comprising 12 albums, includes "Help" by George Martin and his Orchestra, "Men of Brass" by Sir Malcolm Sargent, "Mediterranean in Perspective" by Judd Solo, "Exotica" by Manuela and his Mountain Music, etc.

Two new members have been appointed to the Performing Right Tribunal because of the resignation of James Walker and Dame Alix Meynell. The new members are J. Pinder, former director of the Economist Intelligence Unit and now director of Political and Economic Planning and J. McGregor, former senior British trade commissioner in Canada. The function of the Performing Right Tribunal, which was set up under the Copyright Act of 1956, is to settle disputes arising between licensing bodies and persons requiring licenses to perform in public. Disputes may concern whether or not such a license should be granted or the terms and conditions of the licenses.

Brian Epstein was host this week at a reception given at Browns Hotel, London, to celebrate the appointment of Geoffrey Ellis and Bernard Lee to the Board of Directors of Nems Enterprises. Ellis has also been appointed to the Board of Nems Presentations. Lee has been with the firm for nearly two years and Ellis joined the company just over a year ago. Guests at the reception included chairman of E.M.I., Sir Joseph Lockwood; George Martin; Ron Richards and John Burgess of AIR (London); and publisher Dick James.

As part of the European Broadcasting Union's "Radio in Europe" week the BBC broadcast a special programme "European Pop Jury" heard simultaneously in six countries, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Belgium, Switzerland and Great Britain.

Each country entered two records from its Hit Parade—one by a foreign artist. Studio audiences in each country were asked to select the most popular record but were not allowed to vote for their own country. Votes were counted by a Swedish counting device, the Montometer. Swedish producer Klas Burling was in London to help produce the show for the network. Results of this competition will be given in a future edition. Another programme, "Pop Over Europe," set for broadcasting on Nov. 27, links London with Austria, Belgium, Monaco, Switzerland, West Germany and Yugoslavia. Each country will contribute their tune of the month.

The Moody Blues make their first visit to America on Nov. 19, when they appear on the Ed Sullivan TV'er. They are due to open at the Brooklyn Fox Theatre on Dec. 25 in Murray the K show and will also appear on Hullabaloo. Decca has just issued the group's latest single "Every Day" penned by themselves and published by Sparta Music.

The Fourmost are booked for a three-week cabaret season at the Savoy Hotel in December. They have a new single, "Girls, Girls, Girls," as well as an album, "First and Fourmost." The deck, which captures the comedy of their cabaret act, is issued on Parlophone.

With the spate of protest songs which has flooded the market recently, it's not surprising that someone should come along with a protest song protesting about protest records—British comedian Benny Hill has done just that on his new Pye single "What A World" published by Welbeck Music. Another anti-protest deck, "Age Of Corruption," comes from the pen of Alan Klein. The song is recorded on Parlophone and published by Design Music.

Philips-Sonora AB is just out with "Rocking Pneumonia and Boogie Woogie Flu" with Jerry Lee Lewis on a Philips single. Other releases include Bob Dylan on CBS with "Positively 4th Street," Kwyet Kinks with a new Pye EP, and Benne Iversen, Rune Larsen, Helge Nielsen and the Stringers, a Norwegian group, with "A Day In June" backed with a Swedish oldie. This week we had the pleasure of attending a welcome and meeting John K. (Mike Maitland, president of Warner Bros./Reprise Records, of the U.S. The function, a buffet luncheon given at the Southern Cross Hotel in Melbourne by Astor Electronics Pty, who are the Australian licensees for the Reprise catalogue. The luncheon was hosted by Sir Arthur Warner, Graham Warner, Neville Smith, Ron Harris, Ron Chamberlain, and Ray Emmanuel, all from the Astor group of companies. It was attended by representatives of radio and the press. Speeches were kept to a minimum, thus allowing the president more time to move around and speak freely with those present.

A recent welcome visitor was Bill Walsh, an American who has been placed in charge of the record division of RCA of Australia Pty. Walsh says he was happy to take the Australian post when it was suggested to him, because, among other things, he has fond memories of the days he spent in Australia with the American Armed Forces during World War II. Now that he has settled into his new position, he is starting to move around and visit RCA branches shortly, giving an American exec's viewpoint of the Australian trade as he sees it.

Local composer Charles Marawood has had three of his songs accepted by Marlene Dietrich for consideration for use in her shows. Marawood is a prolific composer of good standard songs; at one time he was writing something like twelve new songs each week for use in the popular television series "Boomeride."

At the time of writing this column there are a little more than thirty shopping days before Xmas, and action in the disc business is close to its peak. This is the big season for albums and most companies are pouring all their energies into the production, promotion and sales of the LP product.

There aren't many Americans in commercial radio in Australia today, but one who seems to have found an important niche for himself is Paul Ward, who is production manager of station 3XY. Ward hails from San Francisco; he has a vast amount of radio experience to his credit including stints in many major areas such as Los Angeles, Honolulu, and San Francisco.

Festival Records, who manufacture and distribute the Sunshine label, are to host a reception at the Chevron Hotel, on behalf of the label. At the reception, popular young local star Normie Rowe will be presented with a gold record for his current smash "Que Sera Sera" c/w "Shakin' All Over." Rowe has had a fantastic run with his discs; there was a time recently when he had three singles on the radio station charts at the same time. Festival plans to release the chatters next single soon. The waxing will hit the retail stores on Nov. 22; titles are "Call On Me" and "Tell Him I'm Not Home."

Featuring an all-imported cast, "Porgy And Bess" is scheduled to open on Nov. 22 at the Princess Theatre in Melbourne. The cast is headed by Inia Te Wiata and Phyllis Bash, and the entire production is directed by Ella Gerber from the U. S.

Festival-Leedon recording artists the Bee Gees, have a new single featuring two of their own compositions "I Was A Lover, A Leader Of Men" and "And The Children Lauphing." The latter is described by Roy Atkinson (promotion boss of Festival Records) as "one of the most potent and gripping message songs ever put down by a local group."

RCA of Australia is giving very solid promotional support to their new locally produced single featuring John Robertson and his multi-trumpets with "The Dying Swan." The firm is very excited about the waxing and believe it could be the world's next big instrumental hit. Another new local single on this label features Johnny Veen and the Shindigs with "He" b/w "So Mystifying."

We spent a little time recently with Barry Kimberley, manager of Essex Music of Australia. Barry was on his way south to Tasmania for a holiday with his wife. The manager says the firm is in pretty good shape at the moment with some strong hits, and some big-potential material is coming along.

BRAZIL

Not long ago we wrote that Audio Fidelity Do Brasil changed its name to Discos Som Maior Ltda. Now, after a recent visit to the reorganized firm, we can give further details about it. Director-president, who also fulfills the function of A&R man, is still Sebastiao Bastos, and he is assisted by Luiz Mocartzel, in charge of promo and PR. The newly formed label specializes in advanced modern popular music of Brazil and has been doing quite well since Bastos bought it from US Audio Fidelity, which it is still representing. The first samples of the new productions couldn't be more auspicious—"Sambalanco Trio," "Sensa Trio" and "Orgão, Balanço e Percussão" by Andre Penazzi, waxed in mono and stereo, give a good idea of the high technical and artistic level of the new line. Lately, another release "Festival de Bossa," has been released by the label. It is one of the good albums that we have heard lately in this country and it is excellent export material. The LP reunites some of the best old bands of former productions to some new ones like Alaide Costa singing "Terra De Ninguem," the Sansa Trio, with "Primavera," Carlos Lyra and Vinicius De Moraes & the cast of the show "Arena Conta Zumbi" interpreting "Eu Vivo Num Tempo De Guerra," Edu Lobo and the Sambrasa Trio doing "Aleluia," and organist Andre Penazzi, with "Arrastão." Last but not least, a mention about the art work of the new jackets of these albums—Hector Sapia, an Argentinian artist who won several graphic arts awards, has been pacted by Som/Maior and is presenting some extra-modern, high leveled artistic photo and drawing compositions on the covers of the LP's and compacts recently released.

A local company which has been known to be doing excellent work for the promotion of MPM is Aloisio de Oliveira's Elenco. The company tells us that the very much discussed Governor of the State of Guanabara (Rio de Janeiro), Carlos Lacerda, just finished cutting an album in which he declaims his own translation of Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar."

A. Ramalho Neto, who until lately was in charge of the promo department of RCA Victor in Sao Paulo, is now also heading the A&R of the company. Several of the label's releases are his productions, and include singles by Claudio De Barros, Maria Bethania, and the Cords, an LP by composer Walter Santos and an album titled "Tempo Novo" which features songster Wilson Miranda. This latest record has had the best possible comments from the critics and is due to be a sure success with the public. The single by Maria Bethania which includes "Viramundo," by Gilberto Gil b/w "Vivo Num Tempo De Guerra," by Guarneri and Edu Lobo is scheduled for success. This personal interpreter is scoring successes "Arena Canta Bahia" and "Tempo De Guerra," two shows in Sao Paulo. RCA's newly created vocal group the Cords, whose first deck "Escandalo Na Familia," the current number one number, b/w "Todo Meu Amor," is composed by Ronnie Cord and his brothers Norman and Junior. The BNN show "4º Festival de Balança," considered to be one of the most important promoted by the Centro Academico João Mendes Jr. of the Mackenzie Law University, for the São Luiz charity Association was recorded by RCA. During the four hour session some 4,000 people heard and applauded such artists as Jongo Trio, Vinicius De Moraes, Pedrinho Mattar, Elizete Cardoso, Maria Bethania, Wilson Miranda and Bossa Jazz Trio. A great MPM album is in the making . . . Two new albums by RCA Camden, of the "Reminiscencias" series: "Os Grandes Sucessos de Francisco Alves" and "Carmen Miranda—A Garota Notavel." The Walter Santos album we mentioned before is called "Caminho" and includes 12 exceptional compositions of that artist along with Tereza Souza. The most expressive and representative artists of Bahia are now under the RCA sign. Also with the label are Maria Bethania, Tomze (São Benedito/Maria do Colégio de Bahia), Caetano Veloso and Piti.

Romeo Nunes is the new general coordinator and A&R man of Discos Continental. His slogan is "Continental in the Route 66." The music man is busy in Rio de Janeiro with the renovation and changes in the releases of the company. With a good background of "discoveries" with Odeon, such names as Altamar Dutra, Trio Esperanca, Gilda Lopes and many others were presented to the Brazilian public. Nunes is launching some new and expressive names such as Tania Maria, Elisabeth, a 20 year old singer-composer who will be among the top soon, Ataulfo Alves Junior, son of the famous old-time composer of "Amelia" and Rio crooner Ernesto Marques making his disc bow with Continental. Besides this brand new and youthful cast, the label will still feature favorite artists Jamelão, Waldir Azevedo, Dilermano Reis and Jose Leão, who starts a career as ballad singer.

From Discos RGE, we received the news from Marcos Nobili who, together with Julio Nagib, is in charge of the company that they are more than happy with the way sales are growing. The latest releases include singles by Waldemar Lima, songster from Rio; Diana Montez, a première on RGE with two of her own compositions; Billy Vaughn, with "The Sound Of Music" (here called "A Nova Rebelde") b/w "Moon Over Naples," and Waldemar Roberto. In the "double-compact" field, Adoniran Barbosa, now with RGE, interprets four self penned sambas. Another singer-composer who joined the label is Belmiro Barrella; also Barclay artist Dario Moreno is present in the new releases of the company. LPs include "Bolos," featuring Oslain Galvão (in Portuguese) and Trio Cristal (in Spanish), world favorite Charles Aznavour (with his hit "Isabelle"), "Banda Tremol—Vol. 3," choice of the fans of typical Tirolian numbers. Helena De Lima sings live in "Outra Noite no Cangaceiro" and, as is a general rule in the country, an Italian name, Johnny Dorelli, completes the list of LPs with "Viaggio Sentimentale" with international hits arranged by Pino Calvi, visiting Paris ("Sous Le Ciel De Paris") and Lisbon (Romantica Città—Lisboa Antiga).

Produções Fermata also has an expressive catalogue, especially in its foreign releases, with singles by Sachs Distel, Dick Danello, Gilbert Stein (born in Egypt, raised in France, living in Brazil), and Sonny & Cher. "Double-compacts" include Chucho Martinez, singing Spanish versions of Brazilian hits, and the label's new group the Trade Winds. Also included in the catalogue is a good selection of LP's with the Los Tres Soles, with bolero type hits; Italian singer-composer Luigi Tenco, the swinging rhythm of "Killer Joe's International Discotheque," which includes "the Watusi," "the Monkey," "the Swim," "Hully Gully," and "The Girl From Ipanema." . . . Accordion soloist Carlinhos Mafasoli appears with his sextet in a series of Italian hits in "Appuntamento Con Il Sucesso."

To give news from CBS Do Brasil, we chose the cable quicky style. Still being felt in this country is the short visit of Argentinian songster Roberto Yanés. . . Alcides Gerardi is working on his latest hit "Aliança No Dedinho" . . . A new 33-single has been cut by Alcenir Da Silva. . . Carlos Alberto is scoring a new success with his 4th LP of which "Amor Perdido" and "Que Te Importa" are the best bands. . . Romantic songster Carlos Jose is following the success of "Querida" with another such number called "Vou Morrer De Amor" . . . "Sombras" and "Só Resta O Adeus" are the two hit numbers of the new "double" of Carlos Penedo. . . Already preparing an LP for the coming Carnival is artist Clério Moraes. . . Eliete Veloso has great hope for success of her latest waxing. . . Balanço is the word to be used for the new album by Lafayette and his group, featuring new songstress Dina. . . From the latest hit album by Emilinha Borba comes a single in which the lark inter-

The festive season in Holland is coming and Bovema's Imperial label launched several St. Nicolas items last week, including combined medley singing by the **Cocktail Trio** and well known children's choirs **De Merels** and the **Krekels**. Also wheeling around the charts this week is Holland's famous bar-organ **"The Turk,"** dedicating songs to the Spanish bishop and Santa Claus in his unique way.

Liberty has rushed out pop releases by **Johnny Rivers** ("Where Have All The Flowers Gone") and **Cher** ("Where Do You Go") and features another album by the **Ventures** entitled "A Go-Go."

French singer **Gilbert Bécaud** did a TV show here last week, in which he introduced "Don Juan," and "Rosie And John." HMV recently hit the market with Bécaud's latest EP recording, featuring a.o. his de Gaulle-hommage "Tu Le Regretteras."

Bovema-Gramophonehouse has told CB that both the **Luckberries** and the much heralded folkgroup the **Shepherds** will join the four rounds of the upcoming Eurovision Song festival. HMV will soon unfold another album by the **Shepherds**, which highlights their personal view of old Dutch songs such as "Hertog Jan" and "Ik Kwam Laatst Over Een Berg Gegaan."

This week Stateside released **Gary Criss**' "Hands Off Buddy" and **Dave Helting's** "It Ain't Me Babe."

Bovema's Columbia chief **Cees Pompe** told CB that after a long absence, baritone **Herman Prey** did a recital in Amsterdam on Nov. 8. The program included Columbia release, Schumann's "Dichterliebe." In the label's pop area, **Norrie Paramor's** "Warm And Willing," **Peter & Gordon's** "Hurting And Lovin'," and **Cliff Richard's** "More Hits By Cliff" are now hitting the stands.

For the promotion of its exclusive classical Erato label, Barclay is going to release a 12 inch album with a 40-page catalogue called "Concert Sur Trois Siècles." The LP, mono or stereo, will be brought on the market for only ten guilders (appr. \$2.80). On the disc will appear famous recording artists such as: **Maurice André**, **Huguette Fernandez**, **Robert Veyron-Lacroix**, **Genette Carles**, **Jean-Pierre Rampal**, **Marie-Claire Alain**, **Pierre Pierlot**, **André Navarra**, **Jacques Chambon**, **Suddetescher Madrigalchor de Stuttgart**, and **Mirella Freni**. The critics and dealers are enthusiastic which proves that there is a growing interest for the high priced classical records.

Barclay will release a de luxe serie multiphone/stereo 12 inch recording by **Charles Aznavour**, **Jacques Brel**, **Leo Ferre** and **Jean Ferrat**.

The **Yarbirds** on the **Riviera** label with "Evil Hearted You" b/w "Still I Am Sad" will also be appearing on TV soon.

Initial reaction to the **Chess International Blues Series**, compiled by **Pete Felleman** of **Artone's** subsid **Funckler Records**, has been very good. Both the **John Lee Hooker LP's** released in conjunction with the successful local appearance of the **American Folk Blues Festival**, in which **Hooker** was the big attraction, show surprisingly good sales results and radio response. In the coming weeks there will be further albums released in the series by **Howlin' Wolf**, **Muddy Waters**, **Sonny Boy Williamson** and **Little Walter**. Already scheduled for release are "The Best Of Muddy Waters" and "In Memoriam Sonny Boy Williamson."

The current Folk rage is hitting Holland too. Consequently there's good interest in one of the new local ensembles, the **Mudfield Skiffle Group**. "Een Lied In Espagnol" (A Song In Spanish) is their debut waxing on the **Funckler** label, a Dutch version of **Hughes Augray's** "Pepita." The group performed the song on the **NCRV-TV's** Hootenanny Show "Zing Er Eens Uit" this week.

Artone's Albert de Klerk recently gave a very successful organ recital in London. Widely acclaimed by the continental critics, de Klerk's superb performance met with great enthusiasm on the part of the English connoisseurs. The label recorded two albums, featuring the artist in **Organ Sonatas** by **C.P.E. Bach** and works by **Pachelbel**, **Walther**, **Bruhns** and **Buxtehude**, which are rated 'sublime' and 'excellent', respectively by Holland's foremost classical monthly "Luister."

Artone, distributors of the **Jansa** catalog in **Benelux**, announced the news that **Anneli Weiss** made her local TV debut on "Teen Magazine" transmitted over **NCRV** on Nov. 5. The lark was heard singing her renditions of "Sugar Candy" and "Winnetou's Schwester." Both songs are from her current single release.

Don Mercedes, a popular pop singer in Holland, made a new agreement with record company **Basart n.v.** His first record on their **Europhon** label "Zo Maar Een Soldaat," the Dutch cover version of the "Universal Soldier," had a special promotion and started very well. Three weeks after its release it was already on the Dutch charts and is still there. A new recording is in preparation.

Mr. Basart, president of **Basart N.V.**, visited **Milan** for a few days. He had a very successful conference with **Mr. & Mrs. Mintangian**, directors of one of the greatest recording organizations in Italy: "Durium." One of the results of that conference is an extension of the **Stibbe** contract with **Durium** for three years.

Nino Rosso, who waxed the Italian hit "Il Silenzio," will be on **A.V.R.O.** TVer "Johnny En Rijk Show" on Dec. 4. He'll play two numbers in that show. One of these is, of course, "Il Silenzio" and the other one is a newcomer in the hit field, "Nostalgia" released on the **Stibbe** Sprint label.

On Nov. 29, **Basart N.V.** will organize a party at the "Hof Van Holland" in **Hilversum**. At the party **Mr. Basart** will present **Nino Rosso** a Gold Record for his single "Il Silenzio," which has been on the Dutch charts for many months and is still selling.

CBS recently released an EP by the **Belgian** group **Les Dollars**. The group consists of 3 boys who became rather popular in a short time. Their first album contains the following tunes: "Oh, John," "Un Jour Comme Aougourd'hui," "Chagrin d'Amour Peut s'Oublier" and "Vive la Chasse." **CBS' Louis van Dyke's** album continues to sell very well. Recently he was awarded the **Edison** for this album, in the category local Jazz 1965. The label's **Kilima Hawaiians** and **Down Town Jazzband** are doing very well in Holland as well as abroad.

Recent **CBS** additions to the classical LP field include an album by organist **Edward Power Biggs**, entitled "Bach Organ Favorites," **Haydn's** Symphonies Nos 82 in C Major and 83 in G Minor by the **New York Philharmonic** conducted by **Leonard Bernstein**, **Sibelius' Violin Concerto** in D Minor, **Walton's Violin Concerto**, performed by the eminent **Zino Francescatti** the **New York Philharmonic** conducted by **Leonard Bernstein** and the **Philadelphia Orchestra** conducted by **Eugene Ormandy**. The company also recently released an album featuring 2 **Stravinsky Ballets**, **Orpheus** and **Apollo** conducted by the composer himself, **Ernest Bloch's** "Baal Shem" and the **Sonatas No. 1** for **Violin** and **Piano**, featuring **Isaac Stern** and **Alexander Zakin**. The second LP by **John**

Polydor has joined 2 other majors in tie-ups with top beat night clubs for exclusive release of product. **Philips** has a strong tie with the **Star Club** group for beat product and the **Star Club** label has been used not only for local productions, but also for top artists from the states and England, for local release. **Teldec** has recently booked the rival **Top 10 Club** in **Hamburg** for similar local product, mostly produced live in the club itself and now **Polydor** has started the new "Hit House" label for product produced in connection with the night club of the same name in **Munich**. The club has been prominent in bringing in such top names as **Wayne Fontana** and the **Mindbenders**, the **Kinks**, the **Hollies**, the **Renegades**, etc. The first release for the label is from **Johnny Deen** and the **Deacons**.

Polydor has strong Xmas product in a new **Freddy Quinn** single. The new **Freddy LP** is already racking up top orders.

Creed Taylor of **Verve Records** visited **Germany** where he recorded the **Jimmy Smith Hamburg** concert for the label.

Ariola has signed gold medal winner, in sailing, **Willy Kuhweide** to a recording contract. **Hans Blume** of **Peter Meisel's** **Hansa** label, has several new top releases including the followup to "Il Silenzio" from **Nini Rosso**. The original waxing passed the 650,000 sales mark here and the new record is getting top promotion. The record was the first number 1 hit for the young **Hansa** label.

The first meeting of the **German D.J. Association** took place in **Cologne**. All discotheque and radio **D.J.'s** were invited to attend. The meeting was kicked off by top **Radio Luxemburg D.J. Camillo Felgin** who was the honored guest of the meeting.

Larry Yaskiel of **German Vogue** reports that "Yesterday Man" by **Chris Andrews** has taken off like a bomb with 20,000 records sold in the first day of sales in **England** and the record getting tremendous action here as well. **Chris** will also record the song in **German** for the label. **Larry** also reports top sales for **Christophe** with his recording, in **French**, of "Aline" and tremendous sales on the **Udo Jurgens** chart single "Siebzehn Jahr, Blondes Haar" as well as **Udo's LP** "Portrait in Music." The label is also riding a new locally produced trumpet recording of "Nabucco Melody" by **Fritz Weichbrodt**, and "Shame and Scandal in The Family" by **Shawn Elliot** on the **Roulette** label. **Vogue** is also giving full promotion to a new single and LP by **Donovan**.

Hans Gerig reports that the winner of the **German Pop Music Festival** this last year "Mit 17," sung here by **Peggy March** with sales of over 350,000, has now been recorded in 11 languages and over 15 new foreign recordings of the tune have been released all over the world.

Jack Martin of **Hansa** productions dropped by to rave about the new recording of "The Wedding Serenade" b/w the first vocal version of "Il Silenzio" by **The Christiansen Choir**. Right now the top hits for the production firm are the new waxings by **Manuela** and **Dradi Deutscher** both on the charts. **Drafi's** record passed the 200,000 sales mark this week, and looks like a sure fire chart topper and perhaps the best selling record for the young star from **Berlin**.

The Best in Benelux Bens



ARGENTINA

French singer Richard Anthony is currently in town, appearing on TV and at dance parties. Anthony was very popular here some months ago with his version of "Chin Chin."

Visiting Buenos Aires is CB's Italian representative, Mario Panvini Rosati. Rosati will get in touch with the record and publishing industry here and will prepare a study of its development in South America.

The success of TVer "Studio Uno," aired weekly by Channel 11, has meant good promotion and excellent sales for Mina, the show's main star. Her recordings of "Un Anno D'Amore" and "Un Baccio . . ." are reportedly starting to sell well, and her first album is also gaining force. "Studio Uno" was a series of programs recorded by Italian RAI some months ago, and is being transmitted also in Montevideo, Uruguay. The lark's waxings are released by Producciones Fermata.

Odeon has released an album devoted to "Folk Magic," a show that was staged at the Astral Theater some time ago. Participants in the show were Atahualpa Yupanqui, Los Quilla Huasi, Ramona Galarza and El Chucaro. Huasi takes part in this LP by courtesy of Phonogram. Music and arrangements were directed by maestro Carlos Garcia, one of the best in this field. Other news is the recording of a Christmas song, "Rio de Navidad," by Galarza, c/w Italian hit "Ave Maria de los Barrios Bajos." Folk soloist Hernan Figueroa Reyes has waxed the Chilean hit "El Corralero," and it is expected to sell well.

A report from CBS states the success of the latest recording by El Chango Nieto, "Ansina es la Madre Mia," devoted to Mother's Day. The flip side is "Carta Pa' mi Mama," another folk tune. Maria Helena has recorded her second single, "Mi Serenata" and "Corrientes Es Asi." She will wax her first LP next month. In the international field, the label is releasing a single by Italian singer Luigi Tenco, "Me Estoy Enamorando de Ti," c/w "Alguien Te Dira."

Jose Bragato of Ala-Nicky sends word about the recording of an album by Los Paisanitos, a country group. Titles on the evergreen lists are "La Bamba," "El Aeroplano," "Corrientes Poti" and "Don de esta Zaza." Among the good running singles he mentions is "Shame and Scandal in the Family," recorded by the VIP's.

RCA is preparing a series of records tagged "Promoting Good Jazz Music," which include such artists as Jelly Roll Morton, Paul Desmond, King Oliver, Lionel Hampton, Bix Beiderbecke and Count Basie. There has been a revival of this type of music in Argentina lately, and the diskery intends to have good sales. Previously the firm started a "Promoting Good Tango Music" series. Among the pop singles, Barry McGuire's "Eve of Destruction" seems to be catching well, especially in certain parts of the country.

Mauricio Brenner of Fermata reports that Los Trovadores del Norte (Music Hall) have recorded "Mensaje a Lima" and "La Chamarrita," two folk tunes, and Tomas Campos has waxed "Muy Cerca de Ti" and "La Mama, La Pala y el Rio." Tango orkster Jose Basso cut "De Diez . . . siete," while teen artist Dany Montano cut "El Hombre es como El Oso."

Hugo Celano of Sprint infos that Odeon Pops has released the first single by teen chanter Ian Bo. The main tune is titled "El Pobre Enamorado" and is being widely promoted both by the publisher and the diskery. Celano hopes Bo will become a star soon.

Julio Korn Publishers reports the arranging of a representation of French hit "N'Avoue Jamais," which will probably be called "Jamás Jamás" in Spanish. The firm also has the rights to "Et Pourtant," the Charles Aznavour smash, and "La Primera Vez," recently recorded by Marty Cosens. Also on deck is "Mr. Lonley," another European tune of big interest.

In this month's Phonogram classical production scheduled we find the Christmas Concertos, recorded by I Musici. The work was written by Corelli, Manfredini and Locatelli. The diskery will also market the Five Piano Concerts by Claudio Arrau in a special package with a booklet, and Honneger's "Christmas Cantata."

H and R is releasing an album recorded by pianist Olga Wolf Palacios, with "Sonata" & "Twelve American Preludes" written by Albert Ginastera. In the pop field is an album by Paul Berger and his group, and another one by Gilbert, with a selection of standards like "Perfidia," "Final," "Siboney" and others.

Music Hall has released an album by Lawrence Welk tagged "My Hits 1965," including the theme from the TV series "The Addams Family." From the Kapp catalog comes an album by Roger Voisin with music written by Hindemith, Dahl, Berezowski and Sanders. There are also new singles by Sammy Davis ("The disorderly orderly"), Wink Martindale ("Hey Girl, Hey Boy") and tango orkster Rodolfo Biagi, "Canaro" and "Mariposita." There is also an EP cut by Pat Boone with songs in Spanish, including "Love Letters in the Sarc." which, some years ago, was a big hit in English.

FRANCE

Sheila's song, "Le Folklore Américain" reached the top of the chart. Adamo is second and this may seem strange if you know that he alone represents about 20% of the sales of variety records. The reason for that second place is a special politic of Pathé Marconi. This firm released an LP two months ago when Adamo was at the Olympia, and doesn't want to break its success (over 150,000) with a new EP. In the first place in LP sales in France is Adamo, followed by Philips artist Barbara.

We have news this week from:

CBS. This company is releasing a new EP by singer-composer Maurice Fannon. The main title is "Ma Petite Lady." The CBS Canadian composer is back in Paris for a long stay. He will appear at Bobino Music-Hall from Dec. 14 to Dec. 27, before starting a tour of France in January. His new EP is expected to come out on November 25. U.S. folk singer-composer Paul Simon will be coming to Paris for 3 days at the Théâtre de l'Est Parisien, at the end of November. On this occasion CBS will cut an EP with his U.S. hit title, "I'm A Rock." Orchestra leader Caravelli has just cut an LP of latest hits, including "Yesterday," "J'Aime" and "What's New Pussycat." CBS artist Joe Dassin has just recorded his third EP. Two titles seem to compete: a Mexican standard "Gantanamera" (launched in the States by Pete Seeger) and "Bip Bip."

DANYMUSIC. This new publishing company, located at 28 rue de la Reine Blanche, Paris, seems to be off to a very good start. It is managed by french singer-composer Danyel Gérard. He tells us that he published the new Hervé Vilard song "Fais La Rire," which seems to have a lot of promise. Richard Anthony will record, in Italian, Danyel's composition, "Comme Tu Es Jeune," and Christine Lebaill presents, on her new record "Toi Chopin."

PHILIPS. Claude François has a new EP with two songs he composed himself, "Même Si Tu Revenais" and "Geordie," and the French treatment of "I Got You Babe" ("Je T'Aime Trop") and "Eve Of Destruction" ("Ce Monde Absurde"). First reactions are really good and this EP should certainly reach a good place in the next chart. Nana Mouskouri and Michel Legrand, the composer of "Les Parapluies De Cherbourg," are singing together on a new EP. Titles are: "Et Si Demain," "Quand On S'Aime," "Connais Tu" and "La Musiques Des Etoiles." Actually Michel Legrand is in New York where he is working on several songs for Barbra Streisand. He will be back in town during the first days of Dec. to appear in a special Musicorama show with Jacques Brel. Mercury's Michèle Torr presented her 6th EP. Main title is "La Grande Chanson." A new LP titled "Jesus" presents 12 new songs about Jesus' life; orchestra and choir are directed by François Rauber, and these songs are all published by Bagatelle.

MEXICO

Nippon Grammophon's songstress, **Teruko Hino**, had her first recital on Oct. 23 at the Shibuya Public Hall in Tokyo. The **Mahina Stars**, **Hachiro Izawa**, **Taro Yamada**, and others appeared on the stage to congratulate the lark who had recently made a smash hit with "Natsumo Hino Omoide" (A Memory Of A Summer Day). The successful recital was broadcast by TBS TV on Oct. 30.

Fubuki Koshiji, one of the top singers of Japan, had a successful recital on Oct. 29 at the Nissei Theater in Tokyo. In the second part of the show, the songstress introduced new songs "NYOTAI" (Woman Itself), "Hair," "Lips," "Navel" and others penned especially for her by six composers and writers. The tunes will be released by Toshiba as an LP sometime this year.

On the same day, **Yoshiko Ishii**, one of the top larks of Japan, held a recital at Kosei Nenkin Hall in Tokyo to honor her twenty years' activity as a singer. In LP section are "Sound Of Music," "Presley's Golden Story," "Prado Golden Album," "Glen Miller Golden Album," "Fantastic Electric Guitar" by the Astronauts.

According to the announcement made by Minoruphone, the firm held a singing contest to enlist new singers. The contest started on Aug. 28 at Sendai, and finished on Oct. 28. The final contest, for 25 finalists, was broadcast over NET TV November 3.

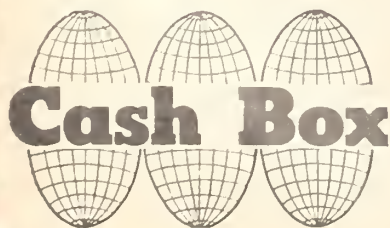

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CANADA

Barry Paine tells CB that Kenny Hamilton, the talented young Montrealer who just debuted on Apex, will shortly be off on a tour of nightspots in the U.S. Tentative plans call for his guesting on at least three of the top network TV'ers south of the border. His first single for the label, "Dear Brothers Sisters And Friends" is catching on in several key Canadian markets. The long awaited Andy Kim debut on Red Bird has arrived. "I Hear You Say (I Love You Baby)" was co-penned by the hit-making team of Jeff Barry and Ellie Greenwich in collaboration with Kim. With a little deejay boost it could well break the chart barrier.

Stan Kulin is very enthusiastic about the best selling potential of a new RCA Victor, Canada-International album by Les Feux Follets. It is expected that a series of TV guest shots on the "Sullivan Show," plus a fifty city U.S. P.A. tour will establish the group. They have just returned from Great Britain, and are looking forward to an extended European tour starting next August. The LP is set for release shortly in France, with release in Great Britain to follow shortly thereafter.

Another very hot set under the Canada-International banner on RCA Victor is the latest outing by J. B. and the Playboys. Limer notes on the group's new LP are penned by CFCF-Montreal deejay, Dave Boxer. The label has just debuted its new classical line identified as Canada-International-Classica. Three albums mark the first release in this series.

Jim Corbett has to be one of the fastest moving record men in the Country. Notes penned by him in the last couple of days have reached CB from Saint John, N.B. and Ottawa. He is in high spirits over one of his items, "The Duck" by Jackie Lee. The song, coming in for a lot of air action in important markets, and figures to a strong seller. It originated with Sparton's new U.S. associate, Mira. Phil Baugh is rapidly becoming a big name around the Sparton branches across Canada. His single, "One Man Band" is a run away chart item on the C&W side of record scene, and his new LP, "Guitar Man" is racking up all kinds of coin across Canada. On his recent trip through the east Baugh found good action on a release by a Halifax-based group, Walt and the Satans. The waxing that's making sales noise for the newcomers is, "Maybe I'm The One." Things are shaping up nicely for Sparton on the chart scene.

Coral's Bobbi Martin drops a line to mention, among other things, her latest release, "Tryin' To Get You Off'a My Mind" b/w "Just On Time." Hal Stanley of Ben Kaye Associates in Montreal is enthusiastic—as well he should—about a group he calls Canada's hottest record act, the Classels. They have just been presented with gold records to mark their 400,000th sale on the Trans Canada label. They have been on the French-Canadian record scene for only twenty months, so their accomplishment is all that much more astounding.

Al Mair reports on the whereabouts of Gordon Lightfoot. The red hot Canadian singer-composer is off to a Town Hall concert in New York, after a very successful stand at Detroit's Raven. One of Lightfoot's tunes, "Early Morning Rain" has just been waxed by Johnny Cash. Moreover, the Lightfoot-penned "Rain" appears in the latest LP set by the Kingston Trio. The writer and Ian & Sylvia will embark upon a European tour early in the new year.

Peter, Paul and Mary are set for a Toronto P.A. Nov. 28 and 29. Lou Shafir, top man in the singles dept. at Toronto's A&A Record Bar, reports such customer action on the Colpix outing by Gamma Goochee; the cut is named after artist. "Baby" by Wilma Burgess looks as if it will be a two-market smash, reports Mair. Pop and country airplay has been extensive so far on the new Decca single.

Soundaround Productions of Regina have embarked on cross country distribution for their initial single "Surf Party" by the Canadian Downbeats. It has been very big in the western Provinces, and with a little more exposure it could do well in other parts of the country. Get in touch with Earl Brown at P.O. Box 1262, Regina for copies and info. Another release on the fledgling Canadian label is set for early December.

Ben Scotti, who claims to be the only player on an N.F.L. team to have his option picked up by a record company, was in touch with us from San Francisco. The ex-footballer is now the national promo man for the red hot S.F.-based Autumn label. He indicates that a Canadian promo trip may be in the offing. His label has been responsible for hit after hit through their Canadian affiliation with Quality Records. It would be well for more American record promo men to include Canadian jaunts on their trips in the future. Not only do we sell a lot of American-produced product, but we turn out some pretty commercial material ourselves.

Lee Farley has stronger indications every day, from many sources in both the U.S. and Canada, that Dee and the Yeoman will have a chart biggie with their debut outing on Quality's Cancut label. "Take The First Train Home," is showing up on chart after chart, both in Canada and the States. CKOM-Saskatoon are among the leaders in Canada as far as breaking this very commercial outing.

The Leeds man, Al Albutt, is hoping for chart action on P. J. Probe's Melbourne debut. One of the best singles from south of the border in a long time is the offering on Diplomacy by the New Breed. The deck, "Green Eyed Woman" looks like a sure winner. No word on Canadian distrib yet. "Blue Lipstick" by Patricia Ann on Arc is shaping into a really big hit. It'll go up the charts along with Terry Black's outing of "Poor Little Fool." Rumor has it that Patricia Ann is the female interest in Black's life.

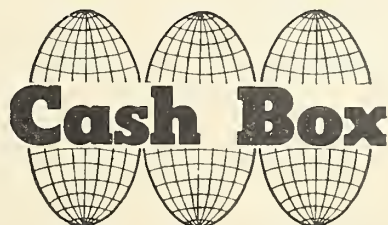

particular record in that particular location? What to call the prize is not, at the moment, important. What is important is to realize how it can be won—and why.

Besides the current hits—and there are never more than fifty receiving active and widespread play—there are at least fifty more racks to fill on the machine, single and little LP. Of these, a certain percentage are tunes that will always be played, for reasons of fame, season or sentiment.

“Music these days is just a fad. It comes out big and then drops dead,” you may say. Right and wrong. Popular music today embraces so many styles and beats that it is not one big rage, but a collection of rages. There are a great many styles on the musical scene today beginning at the top with pop vocal, rock 'n roll and country, working down through big band, modern jazz, folk, dixieland to national ethnic. For as many styles of music there are as many audiences and members of these audiences are present in specific locations.

When an operator thinks of good programming, his thoughts usually run in two different but related directions. 1. selective location preference (e.g. Irish music in an Irish bar) and 2. what we like to call “evergreen” hits, records of enduring popularity, which can be found in every musical style including rock 'n roll. Material for both areas of good programming is either presently available from our manufacturers or can be made available if enough operators want it. And we're speaking of both singles and little LP's.

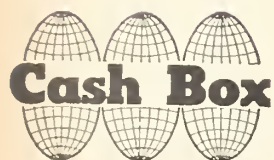
Claims and counterclaims by operators and record companies about available singles and LP's are simply another example of the lack of communication between these groups. Labels are anxious to push records and a juke box is, for them, a lucrative market and also an important promotional medium. It is obvious that we need each other.

Assigning blame for the alleged lack of sufficient programming material is a waste of time. Both operator and record company are anxious for location X and if a third party is needed to help them find it, then MOA, with its liaison committee, spearheaded by Bill Cannon, is attempting to provide one.

We urge support by both parties for Cannon's committee because there is money waiting to be made. Improved communications, yes. Broader knowledge of the market, yes. We urge these things—call them “ideals” or “goals” or what you will—they all mean the same thing: money. Money that is now being lost. Money that can be made. Money that is being made by knowledgeable operators.

When, on a weekday morning, the routeman begins his rounds, he knows all the places he must stop. But how well does he know those places? Who spends time in location X, how old is he, what does he like, how long does he stay when he comes in? How many patrons are couples? A few minutes conversation with the owner or manager of location X would give him a fair idea. It is as if there was a ten dollar bill in the pages of a book—but it will not be found unless you read the book.

Often, it takes as little time to make extra profits as it does to ask yourself why you are not. Oh yes, that prize we spoke about. If you're concerned about thoughtful programming, ready to spend time getting to know the preferences of your locations, willing to give your support to the MOA committee which is trying to provide better records, then you may be a winner. The prize? You'll find it in the coin box at the end of the week.

Who Gets the Prize?

In a culture which acknowledges industrial accomplishment with statuettes, plaques or citations, we'd like to suggest something for the business of operating music machines—a prize to commemorate the technical and artistic resiliency of “well programmed” singles and little LP's—those durable disks known for their earning power by many operators and for generating more business for the location.

Now, who gets the prize? Does it go to the record producing company, to the location patrons or to the operator who, not by sheer chance but by design, placed that

Seeburg in Zurich: A London Report

LONDON—The Seeburg Corporation of America held their annual European sales meeting in Zurich on November 9th and 10th. The host was Maurice Rosengarten of Musikvertrieb Switzerland and head of Seeburg's European group of companies. The theme of the meeting was I.D.A.—Innovation—Diversification—Achievement.

Some 60 delegates attended, made up of sales forces and managements of the Seerose group of companies together with independent European distributors. From America came Delbert W. Coleman, chairman of the Seeburg Corporation; Jack Gordon, president; Lou Nicastro, the newly appointed executive vice-president of the Seeburg Corporation; Sam Stern of the Williams Division of Seeburg; John Stuparitz, executive assistant of the Seeburg Corporation and Joe Hards, vice president in charge of Background Music Division.

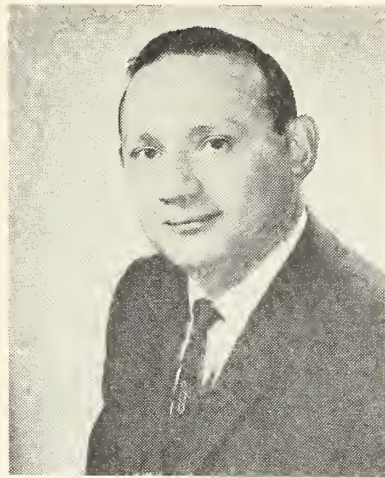
George Gilbert, vice president of Seeburg International contributed, as always, considerably to the success of the occasion. From Sweden came P. A. Atterbom of Pan Nordic and other European representatives included Serge Lievoux and Jean-Jacques Gaillard of Socodimex, Paris, France; A & D Christoff of Vienna, Cyril Shack, Max Fine and Peter Groom of Phonographic Equipment (distributors) Ltd. of the United Kingdom, Pohl and Rosenzweig of Seevend Germany; Henry Herbosch of Seevend Belgium; Pasquini of Seerome, Milan, Italy; O. Heller of Karlsruhe Germany.

Also present was a representative from Seeburg's Spanish distributors, Jack Dimenstein of Musikvertrieb and Seerose and Seeburg's Musical Director in Europe Eugene Tiel were also in attendance. Seeburg (Great Britain) Ltd. was also represented by John Lane. Another popular figure at the conference was Hazy Osterwald, a well known entertainer and owner of the famous Hazyland Discotheque in Zurich, Switzerland.

On the first morning of the conference Jack Gordon spoke on the recording industry from the juke box manufacturers' point of view and played a lot of new Seeburg records manufactured both in Europe and the United States. The afternoon was devoted to the European debut of the new 'Vast' Stereo Music Centre first launched in the United States last September. The machine has a capacity of 50 12" L.P. stereo records which can be automatically programmed to give either background music, discotheque music or specialized types of national or library music. The machine vertically stores and plays both sides of the 50 12" disks automatically at either 33 1/3rd or 16 2/3rd r.p.m. speeds. If programmed entirely with background music disks each of 2 1/2 hours duration the unit could provide 125 hours of music before repeating. The 50 records can be split into units of 5 or 10. Commercial records can also be interspersed for programming.

Another machine of major interest at the convention this time in the vending field was Seeburg's new exclusive hydro-swirl dry groundcoffee vendor. The machine eliminates all wet grounds brews and vends coffee in 12 seconds. The machine was also making its European debut. It has new dry ingredient canisters which can accommodate 11 lbs. of coffee, 15 lbs. chocolate, 10 lbs. sugar and over 6 lbs. of dry cream. Other features include a stainless steel dispenser shelf and stainless steel cabinet floor easily removable for fast cleaning. However, the major highlight of the Seeburg conference was undoubtedly the European introduction of the Electra phonograph. An important innovation of this moststriking piece of equipment is the scenic panel on the

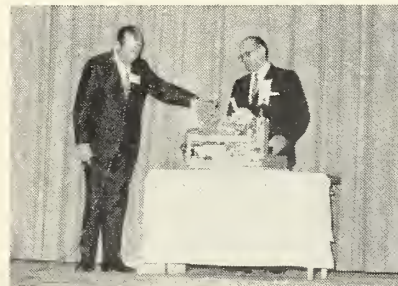

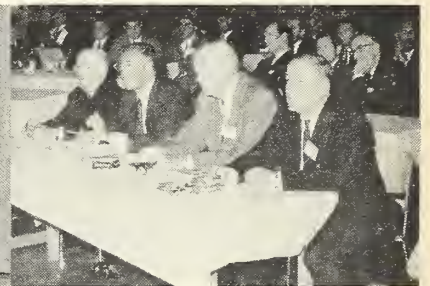

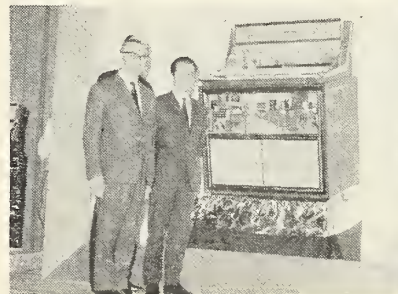

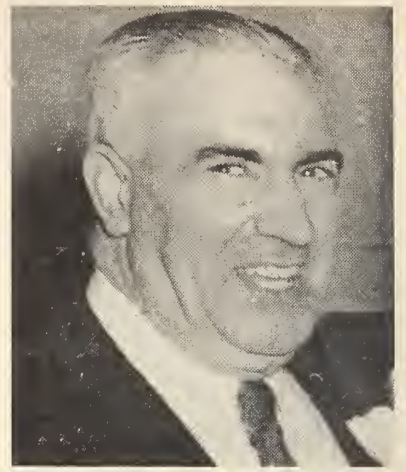
Granger concentrated his address on the excellent, continuing growth of so many regional associations. He remarked to the assemblage about the fine attendance at this affair.

MILANO, ITALY—The announcement here that Innocenti, one of the world's largest manufacturing companies, has been awarded the contract to manufacture the newly-designed Cinebox movie-music coin-operated machine was made jointly by Angelo Bottani, president of International Phonovision Society here, which created the Cinebox; and David Rosen, president of David Rosen, Inc., in Philadelphia, Pa., who is the exclusive distributor for the movie machine in the United States and Canada.

Rosen will also adapt the movie machine for his own Filmotheque-Discotheque unit.

"Innocenti's working capacity, characterized by its world-famous engineering with high-grade technical production, is a guarantee that the new movie-music machine will be the finest instrument in the field," stated the joint announcement.

Rosen came here from America to see the newly-designed machine after extensive operational tests had been made in the factory and on location, and he gave formal approval to the "new look" which will mark the new machine.

Innocenti—its full corporate title being "Innocenti, Societa Generale per l'Industria Metallurgica e Meccanica"—is a huge industrial complex consisting of two diverse production divisions. One deals with the manufacture of heavy machinery, and the other a motor division for the manufacture of automobiles and motor scooters.

"Modern machinery and equipment," said Bottani and Rosen, "were the basis on which Innocenti was able in recent years to enter new fields. 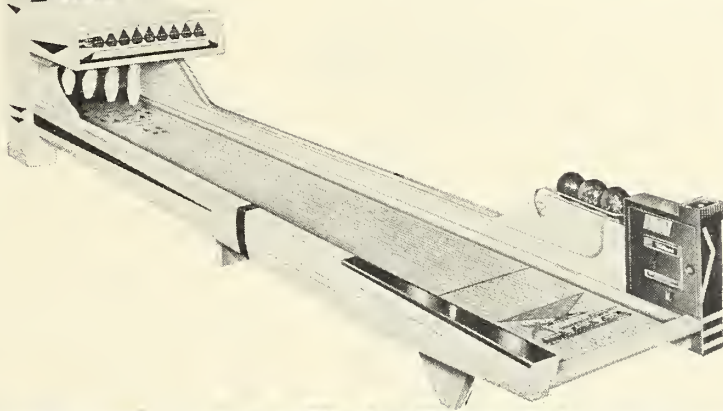

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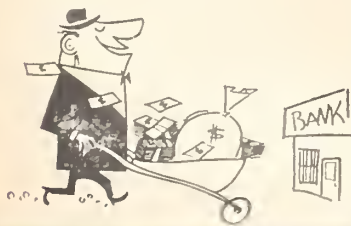
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Eastern Flashes

Sam (Musical Moments) Morrison, buoyant Bronx music and cigarette operator, says he's been standing by with phonos and cig vendors while all those stores, used as election headquarters during the recent New York mayoralty contest, change hands to prospective machine locations. SCORING WITH SEEBURG MUSIC—Marty Toohey, Seeburg's music and games rep in the East, currently immersed in a tour throughout the greater Northeast to promote the firm's stereo 45rpm singles leasing program, advises that a great number of ops have signed the leasing program and that those, hazy at first, become mighty enthusiastic once they get a listen to the music itself. Davis Dist. exec Henry Wertheimer was on hand at the first Regional ops meeting in Buffalo where with the assistance of Elmer Rowe and a 22 minute Seeburg promotional film titled "The Need For Change In Business Today," he claims he signed every one of the twenty operators present to a leasing contract. Another Davis rep, Jimmy Foster, who is now out of the hospital after a short term illness, has also enjoyed great initial success with the singles program, according to Buffalo's Jerry Auclair. Art Strahan, over at W.S. Distributors in the Boston area, says he's been emphasizing the Country & Western series to ops for their machines in the outer Boston terrains. Bill Swartz, Len Schneller, John Coogan and Bob Green at W.S. report that Atlas Music's Pete Porazzo, Neil Glazer, and Pete Porazzo of Automatic Music in Maine and Saul Robinson of Paramount were among the first ops to program the new stereo single sounds. In Hartford, Mac Perlman of Atlantic heard the details of the new leasing program and then advised new phono salesman Len Lubin (formerly a wine and spirits salesman) to make a tour of the Conn. area. Among the first ops from that state to lease the disks were Joe Ficca of Torrington, Art Rode of Terryville, the Allied Music Co. in Stamford and Hartford's leading operator Abe Fish. Mike Mulqueen's NYS Ops Assn. heard the details of the leasing program from Toohey last Wed. evening in Newburgh at their regular monthly meet. Down in New York City, Seeburg's publishing exec Mike Calland advised that Charlie Bernoff of Regal Music and Al Miniaci of Paramount were among the first ops there to hear the demonstration records in a personal presentation. Next week, an operator meeting, scheduled for Davis's Albany branch, will find Henry Wertheimer, Paul Lacuyer and Bob Porenbski playing the Seeburg stereo sounds after running the sales film spoken of above. In South Jersey, Atlantic's Izzie Grabowski joined with Toohey in calling on ops in the Asburg Park, Bayonne and Union City areas where they met with Frank Mandia of Coast Cigarette, Max Levine of King Amusement and Tony Reggion of Oakhurst—now all programming the new singles. Bayonne's Terminal Music programmed a set of the Rhythm & Blues and Go Go records in a top location just four doors from the Terminal HQ. Sid Koslow of S.K. Music has reportedly placed repeat orders on the new records exclaiming "I'm for progress." Mario Cergioli of Sunshine Music in Union City has ordered a set of Seeburg's Italian series on the strength of the authentic sounds the disks offer (the op recently made a trip to Italy). Frank Algee of Pleasant Music took one of the first sets of Go Go and Rhythm & Blues for his #1 location, according to Toohey. In Philly, Eastern Music's Marvin Stein and Mel Sonia are signing ops—the accent here appears to be on the Italian, Rhythm and Disc-O-Teen sounds. Frank Santora is covering the Trenton area for Eastern and colleague Jack Anderson is spreading the work in Eastern Pa. where C & W predominates. Zav Hovsepian of the Baltimore branch advises that salesman Bart Worthington placed sets of singles with ops in that area where the emphasis is being placed on music more and more in view of the current gaming situation. Among the first to take sets —Pete Mongelli of Mongelli Music who had service head Bernie hear the test records before sending his collectors into the showroom to hear the other selections available to ops on the leasing program.

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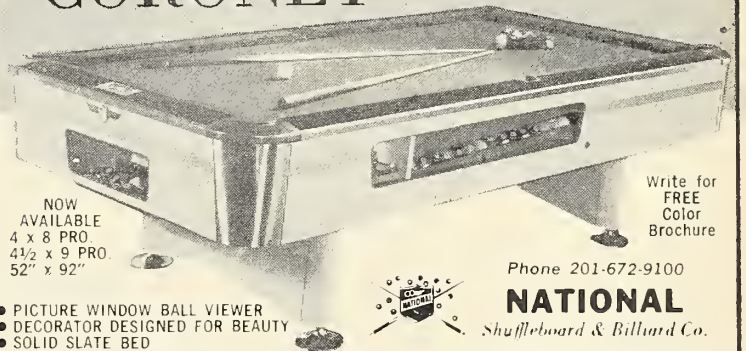
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California Clippings

Houston Happenings

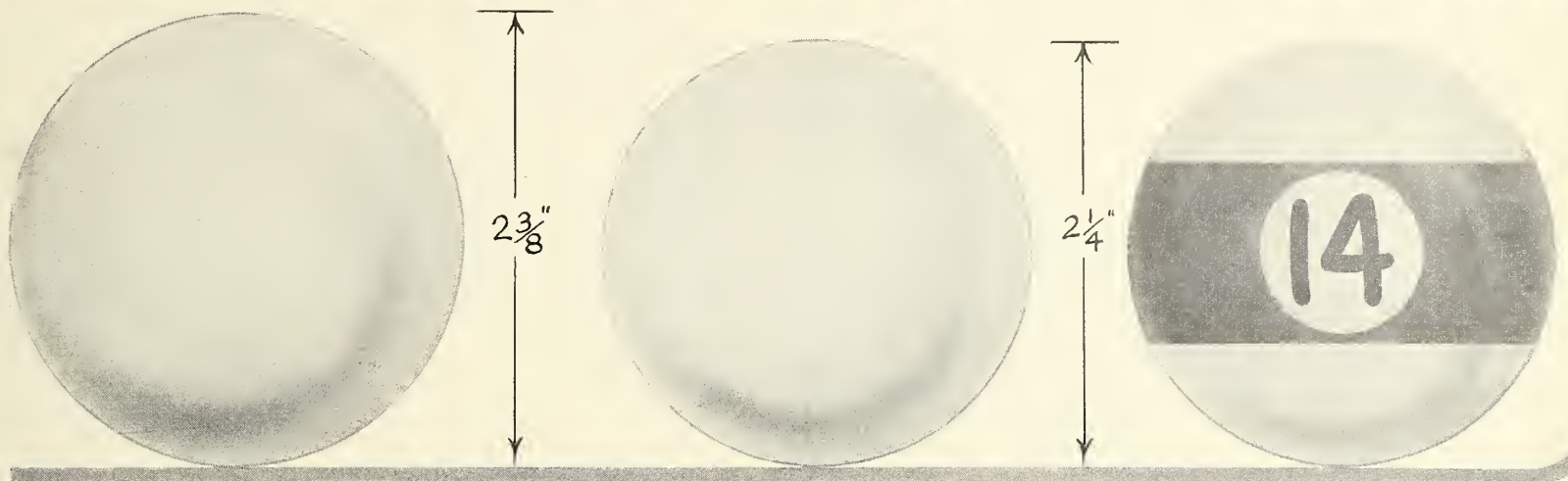

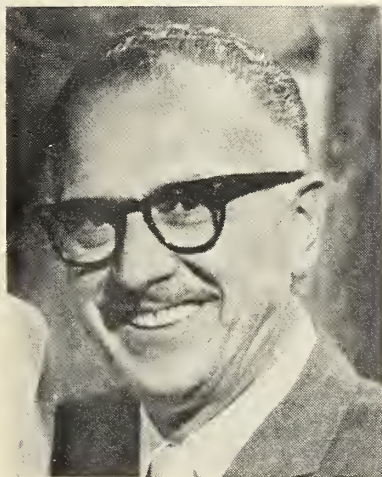

NAMA and L.A. Trade College Pioneer Pilot Course for Routemen

CHICAGO—More than 20 students will be graduated from the first training course for future vending routemen in early November at Los Angeles Trade-Technical College, according to Thomas B. Hungerford, NAMA executive director which assisted in developing the new program. The college earlier pioneered with formal training courses for vending industry mechanics.

The new training course is intended as a pilot project and began its 10-week instruction on August 30 under sponsorship of the Manpower Development Training Act. Students are attending classes 6 hours each day for a total of 300 hours, Hungerford said.

"We hope that this first attempt to offer formal training for potential routemen will result in a standard curriculum which can later be applied to similar courses in other schools," Hungerford said.

"The willingness of this outstanding college to work with the NAMA advisory committee in establishing the new pilot course guarantees our industry the same solid basis which has already been achieved in the training of vending machine mechanics," Hungerford added. "We are happy that Los Angeles Trade-Technical College continues to set the standard for effective vending industry training programs."

Kenneth Hogan, Automatic Retailers of America, Inc., Maywood, Calif., is chairman of the advisory subcommittee of NAMA which has worked with the College faculty in developing the new course.

The course is taught by Donald Fisher and Nicholas Paris, who also are on the faculty of the existing repairman course at the college.

Applicants for the pilot course were thoroughly screened by state and federal authorities and had to pass the four-part routeman hiring tests which have been developed by NAMA for use by its member companies.

Texts used in the instruction include manufacturers' service manuals, industry trade journals and publications issued by NAMA.

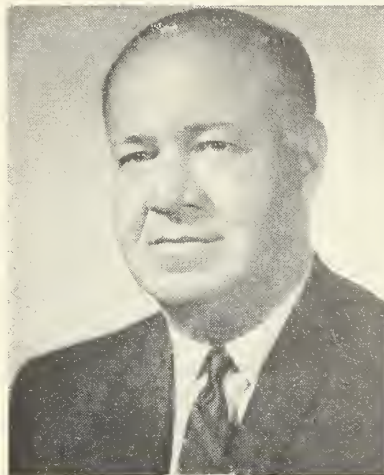
The curriculum of the pilot course concentrates on servicing different types of vending machines, but also includes instruction on the history and economics of the vending industry; orientation about the vending business, its terminology, trade journals, associations, etc.; customer relations; record systems and forms; truck maintenance and safety, and other subjects. Even "how to apply for a routeman job" is included in the course.

Guest lecturers from the vending industry, all from California, include the following: Harry Robb and Kenneth Hogan, Automatic Retailers of America, Inc.; Jack Romero and Phil DeMars, Interstate-United Corporation; Harold Steuber, Servomation Western; Gerald Scott and William Dayton, Automatic Canteen Company; Burt Avazian, MAB Industrial Vendors; and George Hammond, Richardson Vending Company.

Sidney S. Kallick, NAMA Western manager and counsel, is chairman of the industry advisory committee.

"We want to emphasize strongly that this is a pilot course from which we hope to gain experience in order to improve the selection of applicants, the course of instruction and eventual expansion," Hungerford stated. "After we have developed further refinements, this project is intended to serve NAMA members and other schools as a model curriculum."

the following points as significant in the renewed progress and growth of Interstate United:

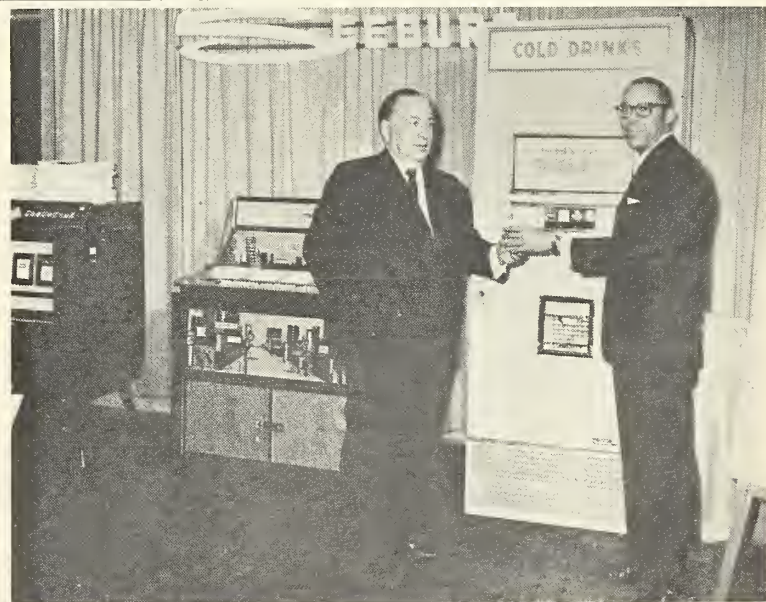
1. Improved morale of employees.

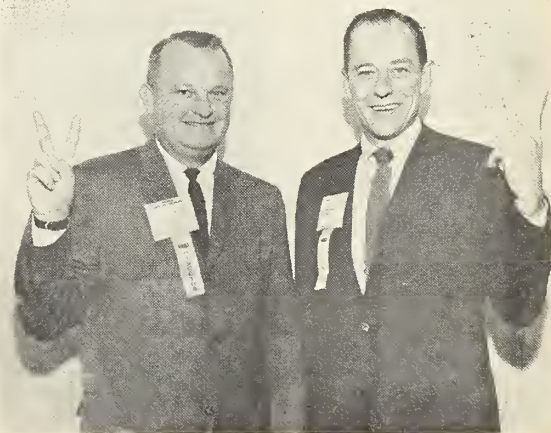
Kramer concluded, "In short, the future of our industry, and Interstate United, is bright. We intend to push forward into new areas of progress and profits."
