A Matter Of Money

The move of creative talent to establish their own music business operations has been noted here before: many modestly structured labels are the product of ideas and creative momentum, rather than the outgrowth of business-minded men who bring creative forces together and move out, with business acumen second to none, to conquer the charts.

A number of these creativelyoriented companies are now discovering that a successful operation requires accounts receivable that can be received—before it's too late.

It is a well-known truism of the business that one gets paid for his product in proportion to the demand for it, and a hot company can use its best-selling inventory as a wedge to collect on product selling less than like "hot cakes." But, when smaller labels run into cold streaks, they are left wide open for delays in payment that can be lethal.

Taking, of course, a long list of considerations into account, many smaller indies are associating themselves with larger record labels. Among their dominant points of view is the correct feeling that these more complex operations have the resources to assure collections of monies due smaller companies that do not have something going for them at all times.

While larger disk set-ups are not immune to the dreaded time when, as the trade puts it "the wheel turns," they usually possess some form of merchandise that can make a wholesaler dependent upon them for a better profit picture. In addition to being able to take advantage of better organized and staffed sales and promotional departments, the label that has tied-in with a bigger firm is also in better hands on other levels, whether it be through a more mechanized and less error prone accounting department or (in some cases) a battery of legal assistance.

Like most industries, particularly those witnessing a strong growth pattern, it is difficult for modest operations to cope with the increasing complexity of dealing on a straight business level with their customers. The philosophy of the survival of the fittest may no longer be applicable to the small guy. In order to survive at all seems a matter of availing oneself of the most efficient and commanding methods of keeping one's books. Going to the companies in the industry that can afford to survive is a solution that seems unavoidable for many operations.





MGM & Ricordi Share Ownership **Of New Italian Record Company**

NEW YORK—A joint recording ven-ture, Dischi MGM, has been formed in Italy under the auspices of MGM/ Verve Records in the U.S. and G. Ricordi & Co., according to Mort Nasatir, president of MGM, and Guido Rignano, manager director of the Italian firm. Deal was noted as unique in domes-tic-foreign label affiliations in that MGM and Ricordi will share in the operation on a 50/50 basis. Dischi MGM will distribute MGM and its associated lines in Italy. The firm will be administrated by Dischi Ricordi, a subsidiary of G. Ricordi, and will be headquartered in Milan. The new firm was formerly introduced to the press at a cocktail party given last Wednesday (16) at the Drake

Hotel in New York. The association between Ricordi and MGM has been particularly suc-cessful over the past six months in the promotion of the soundtrack of the MGM film "Doctor Zhivago." It also emphasizes the even closer co-operation between film and record activities on the world-wide market. In statements to the press, both Nasatir and Rignano evidenced a firm belief in a world record business. "The formation of this company," Nasatir said, "is another step in MGM's continuing expansion. It brings its artists on MGM, Verve, Kama Sutra and Verve/Folkways, and other associated labels, into an ever-widening one world market. In turn

Kama Sutra and Verve/ForkWays, and other associated labels, into an ever-widening one world market. In turn it also brings Italian artists of merit into the booming U.S. disk business." Rignano sees the new company as a major breakthrough for MGM and associated product on the Italian scene. He finds the combined MGM and Ricordi project as a "truly unique and powerful vehicle for the exploita-tion of outstanding Italian artists in the U.S." In line with this it was announced that the first Italian artist to be re-leased in the United States would be Remo Germani, one of Italy's leading pop singers. In addition, MGM will issue an LP of all of the songs in the San Remo Festival finals, includ-ing the winning entry.

In addition to the "Doctor Zhivago" soundtrack, MGM has been most suc-cessful in Italy with single and album product by Connie Francis (she has long been a great Italian favorite), The Lovin' Spoonful, Sam The Sham And The Pharaohs, and The Righteous Brothers. Future American product from Dis-chi MGM S.p.A. will include the soundtrack of MGM's next major mo-tion picture, "Grand Prix," Sandy Posey, Jimmy Smith, Ella Fitzgerald, Stan Getz and a roster of top Verve and MGM names.

Lou Adler Leaves Dunhill With Agreement To Cut Mamas & Papas

NEW YORK—Under a mutual agree-ment, Dunhill Records Ltd. has ter-minated its employment contract with Lou Adler. However, a new agree-ment will continue Adler's associa-tion with the label's hot group, Mamas & Papas, for whom Adler has been production supervisor. Richard Brown, vice-president of Filmways Inc., the parent firm headquartered in Culver City, in-formed Cash Box that the record label is continuing to operate and is presently reorganizing. NEW YORK-Elvis Presley will re-cord exclusively for RCA Victor cord exclusively for RCA Victor Records for at least eight more years, with the label exercising its option on the star. The label pointed out that its option was exercised six years in advance of the expiration date of Presley's previous pact, set to run through Dec. 31, 1972. The deal goes on to Dec. 31, 1974. Presley, an exclusive Victor pactee for more than a decade (he signed on Nov. 21, 1955), registered his greatest sales volume for the label last year. According to George Marek, vp and

general manager of the label who an-nounced the new arrangement, sales so far this year indicate that 1966 will out-perform the current record. Besides his disk triumphs, Presley has had a major second career, that of a film star. He's performed as the star of 24 films for a number of com-panies, his latest being "Spinout," for MGM. Victor has been the outlet for his soundtrack performances. The star's entire stereo catalog joined the label's Stereo 8 cartridge tape line last month. Presley's longtime man-ager is Col. Tom Parker.

MCA Calls Its Label Universal City; **Russ Regan Fills Number Of Slots**

Jimmy Smith



Jimmy Smith, or the Incredible Jimmy Smith as he is sometimes called, was born in Norristown, Pa., a suburb of Philadelphia. He once said in a "Downbeat" interview, "Nobody needed to interview or influence me. I was always a jazz musician, even when I didn't know it. I was like a horse who didn't know where to run. The world was a little too slow in recognizing what I was, and I was too young to understand what I had. But my parents knew, and they encouraged my playing. I was nine years old before the world began to take notice of me, but I was born a jazz musician." As is often the case among jazz artists, Jimmy Smith is represented by recorded product on more than one label. He is currently affiliated with the Verve label and is currently represented on the Top 100 Albums by his "Bucket" LP on the Blue Note label. "Bucket" is number 68 this week.

more than 1,438,605 sets moved in the same month a year ago. Cumulative distributor figures for 1966 to date now show FM radios at 2,5°3,358, or 37.0 per cent over the comparable figure a year ago of 1,892,324. Home radios cumulatively now stand at 9,677,815 distributed in 1966, 10.7 per cent over the 1965 figure of 8,743,169. Auto radios registered a striking

Conn Unveils Amplifier For Wind Instruments

NEW YORK—Since the dawn of rock 'n roll, when the spotlight was claimed by sideburns and swiveling hips instead of the current longhair hips instead of the current longhair fruggers, the amplifier has been pro-bably the most essential piece of any combo's artillery. As the big beat became a stronger and stronger in-fluence among terpsichoreans, the amplifier was the thing that gave the extra twang to the guitar and made the big beat even bigger. Although the guitar was perhaps the first rock instrument to be amplified, in later years amplifiers were develo-ped for the organ, bass, electric piano and hordes of other instruments ped for the organ, bass, electric piano and hordes of other instruments

piano and hordes of other instruments indigenous to rock or dance bands. Recently amplification was added in a brand new area—wind instruments, according to the Conn Corp. of Elkhart, Ind., which claims a "first" with the innovation. According to Conn, which also claims to be the nation's largest manufacturer of band instruments, the firm has developed nation's largest manufacturer of band instruments, the firm has developed a small device called the R-B elec-tronic pickup, which can be used to amplify any wind instrument. The device sells for less than \$50. Up until now soloists on wind instruments had to use a standard microphone to add volume, a practice which invited distortion and distract-ing surface noises. The new pickup.

which invited distortion and distract-ing surface noises. The new pickup, however, will eliminate such flaws because it will be activated by air inside the instrument. The wiring setup will allow all instruments in a single combo to hook into the same amplifier or separate amplifiers

secup will allow an inscriments in a single combo to hook into the same amplifier, or separate amplifiers, whenever desirable. Accordind to the firm, "a musician's special effects will be limited only by the amplifier itself. Reverbration, echo and vibration can all be induced by the amplifier. Conn estimates that the electronic pickup to be most widely used by combos and dance bands, more so than marching or concert bands, although it foresees the day when a soloist with a concert band doing an outdoor performance might use the device to enforce its sound.

A feature of the sup-plement is cover reproductions of al-most 200 of the albums listed. Also included is a special section entitled The Sound to Live With, which fea-tures a large assortment of phonos, radios and tape recorders from the Masterwork Audio Products line.

TALENT ON STAGE

MAMAS & PAPAS

There's something NEW YORK radically wrong with the concert concept. And it was very evident again at the Mamas & Papas Carnegie Hall

at the Mamas & Papas Carnegie Hall Concert last week. Many of the youngsters who laid out as much as \$6 (and if they came with a date, as much as \$12) to see the sensational Dunhill label quartet, walked out avapulating about how walked out complaining about how short the Mamas & Papas stint was and how poorly the entire show was programmed.

A very obedient packed house awaited the 8:30 start and at about 8:50 Tony & Siegrid came out on stage. The charming youngsters with a bag-full of interesting new mate-rial were well received by the large crowd. But it was unfair to ask the new duet to hold the audience's in-terest for close to an hour. And a

new duet to hold the audience's in-terest for close to an hour. And a few youngsters restlessly yelling from the balcony "where are the Mamas & Papas", made it uncom-fortable for everyone. Then when the twosome concluded their portion of the show, local WOR-FM dee jay Scott Muni greeted the audience with an announcement that there would be a ten-to-fifteen minute intermission. This news met with dissatisfaction.

minute intermission. This news met with dissatisfaction. Finally, the Mamas & Papas did their turn and were as great on stage as they are on records. They look delightfully kookie and harmonize

brilliantly. It's truly an exciting group to watch and listen to. But brilliantly. It's truly an exciting group to watch and listen to. But they did only about 40 or so minutes of their great LP material (most of it from their 1st LP) and could have done double that without losing the crowd for a second. Mama Cass, the "psychedelic mushroom" of the quar-tet, came off as a powerhouse on-stage talent with a great gift of gab, tremendously welcomed by the audience of high school and college and post grad youngsters. And she's got a brilliant voice that sparks the fine blend of her three partners John, Denny & Michelle. The quality of the Mamas & Papas portion of the show was outstanding. And we know there's a great deal to be said for the adage: leave 'em begging for more. But if word-of-mouth spreads the news that for \$6 a throw plus carfare, food, etc., you get between a half-hour and three-quarters-of-an-hour of the performer you're paying to see, promoters may find it more and more difficult to

you're paying to see, promoters may find it more and more difficult to pack the house. We have seen this happen on a number of different occasions and with a number of different acts dur-

with a number of different acts dur-ing the past year. We suggest a longer show from the main attraction; a shorter stint from the warm-up acts; and perhaps more than one preliminary act (each doing less) to change the pace.

TRINI LOPEZ

LAS VEGAS—Trinidad Lopez III may not have invented the Latin flavored sing-along, foot stompin' way with a song. But, for at least the past three years, the copyright has been in his name. Back for a third stint at the Flamingo, he's as in-vincible and uninhibitedly rhythmic as ever. That red and gold Gibson bounces along, as insistent as always, inviting participation and a definite asset to the act. His ingenuous bari-tone encompasses a long list of favor-

asset to the act. His ingenuous bari-tone encompasses a long list of favor-ites—a winning combination in a town that thrives on losers. Most of Trini's historic titles are included in the one hour show ("La Bamba," "Kansas City," "Michael," "A-me-ri-ca," "I'm Comin Home Cindy," etc.) including, of course, that first big chart item about an elu-sive mallet. With this, as the others, Lopez rings the bell of freedom and song, hammering out a cadence that few artists would dare approach. Almost all of the thirteen tunes on the bill are offered at a bright to frantic beat, including the usually performed ballad, "Watch What Happens," from "Umbrellas of Cher-bourg." With "La Bamba," there's a

brief excursion to "Guantanamera" (hardly noticeable) and, chances are, that tune will eventually be included in the act. Lopez' most popular disks have usually been identified with others prior to his versions. To his undying credit, he has the knack of infusing them with his own brand and trademark so you hardly recall the original. original.

original. Opening night crowd was con-spicuous by a number of celebrated names including Lee Marvin who stars in Lopez' first major screen assignment, the MGM film "Dirty Dozen" (not to be confused with a fact that Trini's latest "Greatest Hits" LP for Reprise marks his un-blemished twelfth for the label). Noteworthy, perhaps, was the ab-sence of Nancy Sinatra who has been ringside at practically every recent opening within 500 miles of Holly-wood. But Tina and Mia were on hand, along with a sellout crowd of well known well-wishers, sing-along-ers and just plain fans. The along-ers and just plain fans. The Flamingo, even sans Nancy, should be bursting at the seams through the end of this month.

SWINGING SIX

NEW YORK—Last week at the Plaza 9 a new show was unveiled, with a featured spot going to Decca's Swing-ing Six. The ensemble, made up of two sparkling young ladies and four well-scrubbed young men, falls some-where in between a singing group along the lines of the Sandpipers and a white-faced minstrel show a la the New Christies . . . unfortunately they fall too much in between. They appear to be an act without a "bag," founder-ing in water that, although it's shal-low, offers no solid footing. The members of the group certainly have talent, but it seems that they haven't been together long enough for individual talents to jell into a satisfying unit. At this point they seem to have no direction in mind, and

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it's too bad, because, as we said, they do have talent. There are some bright spots in their routine, including several smoothly handled fun bits, and a couple of their numbers come off very well. But on the whole, the act can use plenty of work. It can't even be referred to as a diamond-in-the-rough yet, because if it's a dia-mond, it's still too rough to recognize it as such.

it as such. The Philips vocal group offered works by such com-posers as: Bach, Schubert, Haydn, Telemann, Vicaldi, and Schumann. Their delightful scat translations of classical efforts ranging from Bach fugues to Schumann's "Fantasia In C" had a pronounced tendency to send the mind scampering about in a hopeful attempt at anticipating

where the next "bee," "dum," "ta," where the next "bee," "dum," "ta," or "bop" was to come from. Certainly the highlight of the evening was Mozart's "In An 18th Century Draw-ing Room." The four-man/four-woman group was backed by a rhythm section composed of bass and drum. Both





Should be a good catalog piece.





Northern Songs Ltd. Income RCA Presents Stereo 8 In London Down Slightly In 1965-66

LONDON — Northern Songs Ltd., sporting most of the big hits by John Lennon & Paul McCartney, had an-other strong showing for fiscal 1965-66. Although down a little from the previous year, the company registered profits of \$1,718,687.60, with \$987,-716.80 after taxes. This compares

with \$1,738,405.40, with \$1,041,331.20 after taxes, for the prior period. Looking ahead, Brian Epstein, one of the directors of the publicly-held company, said profits for the current fiscal year would come to at least \$1,960,000.

Bienstock Visits England For 1st Time Since Carlin Opening

LONDON—Freddie Bienstock is in London for the first time since the formation of his Carlin Music Co. Carlin is the successor in the United Kingdom to all the Aberbach and Hill and Range companies, which were completely purchased by Bienstock earlier this year. The Carlin catalog therefore now boasts the entire reper-toire previously controlled by J. & J. Aberbach. Carlin's professional activi-ies continue under the management *f* Franklyn Boyd, who has been ap-pointed a director of Carlin Music, and administration is handled by Derek Neibb and Arthur Chrisford. LONDON—The Radio Corporation of America and RCA Great Britain Ltd., in conjunction with Motorola, last week presented the Stereo 8 cartridge concept to members of the British motor industry, instrument manufac-turers and the press at a special re-ception at London's Hilton Hotel. Since RCA developed and intro-duced Stereo 8 in America in Sept. of 1965, a catalog of over 400 cartridges has been built and 2 million cartridges produced. "RCA has no proprietary interest in either the 8-track cartridge or player

Attractive new King Records releases are "Continental Tango Golden Album (Stanley Black" on London which is the 2nd release here, "Perez Prado Golden Album" on Seven Seas and "Bobby Solo Golden Album," For nearly ten years, the Seven Seas label of King Records has been considered most responsible for developing unknown Italian canzoni artists into national fame. This label represents many of the European major labels and controls almost half of the Italian top stars for Japan. In commemoration of their 35th Anniversary, King has gone all out in special promotion of LP's, focusing particularly on a three-set canzoni album titled "Tutte Le Canzoni Di San Remo." The set is unique, according to Hidetomo Kawai, A&R man of the label, in collecting the San Remo's original hit versions—by the artists who first made them famous—into three volumes. Saar and Ricordi—who most likely compete back home—have graciously agreed to King's two-year pending request to issue a canzoni-all-in-one album in Japan. Actors' Equity of Australia are making an all-out effort to slap a complete ban on the practice of miming on television. If the ban is successfully imple-mented, it will certainly create some radical changes in the format of many, many television shows in this country, both of national and regional status. Actors' Equity, following a meeting with the Musicians' Union, recently in-structed its members to stop miming on television unless it was the mimer's own voice. Members were also instructed that as of January 1, 1967, they were not to do any miming on television unless the mimed performance had been specifically pre-recorded for the show concerned. The whole affair came before Arbitration recently, when a group of television stations challenged the action of Equity.

before Arbitration recently, when a group of television stations challenged the action of Equity. Mr. Hal Alexander, general secretary of Actors' Equity, said his organiza-tion objected especially to shows such as "Kommotion." (This is a six-day per week show on which many local artists mime their own discs; but equally as many other performers mime top records by overseas recording stars.) Mr. A exander alleged that television stations were exploiting miming to beat a price rise in the cost of imported American programs. Mr. A. S. Cowan, who is representing the television stations at the hearing, said that as a result of the present proceedings he hoped the Union would withdraw its ban. Mr. Cowan maintained that miming was important to tele-vision stations from the viewpoint of sound, presentation, arrangements, and as a general aid to production. The case is before Arbitration Commissioner J. R. Donovan, who adjourned the hearing until November 21. This column will report future action. The company struck action with "Daddy" by the same artists some time back. Pebbles & Bamm Bamm are also heard on a new album of Christmas material. Both records are drawn from the Hanna-Barbera catalog of the United States
The publicity office of the P&O Shipping line advises that the Playbovs are travelling aboard the "Oronsay" en route to London to join Normie Rowe. During the voyage, the Playboys will entertain passengers on board. The four members of the group are Phil Blackmore, Rod Stone, Graeme Trottman and Brian Peacock.


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Although it looks like the battle between the GVL (representing the record industry and artists) and the ARD (representing the radio-TV stations) is coming to an end, no one seems to be thrilled at the expected results. It ap-pears that the time alloted for radio play of records by the GVL will be about 60 hours a week for three different programs, which means 20 hours a week per radio station program, and that's just too little. If all goes as expected, the rest of the time needed will be filled by non-GVL controlled material. This means that, in spite of a settlement, foreign firms making direct deals with the radio stations and local labels making non-GVL pacts directly with the stations will have a tremendous advantage over the regular record firms in terms of exposure and air play.

stations will have a tremendous advantage over the regular record firms in terms of exposure and air play. Several German compositions are beginning to make noise in the U.S.A. The Hans Last—Gunter Loose tune "Games That Lovers Play" has been re-corded by Eddie Fisher, Wayne Newton, Mantovani and several others which are fighting for chart recognition. It looks like the Eddie Fisher RCA record will get the nod. "My Yesterday Love" from the Newbeats is also making chart news. The song was written by Ralph Siegel Jr. especially for the group. Freddy and Miriam Bienstock dropped into Munich and visited with lyric writer Fred Jay for a few days. Fred, who is very active with the Voice of America radio outlet, is still writing hit lyrics both in German and English. Rudi Slezak of Aberbach Music has smash hits to push from Renate Kern on Polydor, Bobby Solo on CBS, Rex Gildo on Ariola and the Rattles on Philips as well as the Walker Bros. for Star Club. Hansa is pushing the Nini Rosso Christmas LP along with the new single "Olympia Melodie" for the upcoming Olympics in Munich in 1972. That's it for this week in Germany.

A Shot In The Arm?

or

How Green Is Your Valley?

Back in the early 1950's the music operating industry was going through a laborious period of transition. This transition was slow, complicated and even exhaustive, all hinged upon what many thought to be a simple matter —hiking the price of a single juke box play from a nickel to a dime.

With the exception of certain marginal areas of the country and certain marginal locations on even the best of routes, phonographs today are vending music at one play for 10c, three for 25c and of most recent origin, fifteen for a dollar.

For the past few months, discussions have cropped up from time to time involving another price hike. One of our major factory representatives has made his own positive stand on a price change public. **Cash Box** made an observation in its Oct. 8th editorial which advised the operator that national inflation was shaving his dimes down to peanuts. The answer seemed to lie somewhere between a better commission and a 15c coin.

Then, last week, we received a copy of a memo which was issued on Nov. 4th to all personnel of one of Florida's largest music operations—Mar-Tab Vending. The memo, simple but effective, reads:

AS OF DECEMBER 1, 1966 THROUGH DECEM-BER 15, 1966, ALL JUKE BOXES WILL BE CHANGED, WITHOUT EXCEPTION, TO TWO PLAYS FOR A QUARTER. PLEASE NOTIFY YOUR CUS-TOMERS OF THIS. THANK YOU.

> Signed SOL TABB President

Let it be said here that **Cash Box** is not about to begin an elaborate promotion in favor of raising the three for a quarter price standard. It is too difficult to make a single national recommendation at this time, and as such, an objective report on a pricing movement would be more in order. But it is also appropriate to record that Mar-Tab has advised that 40 test locations in the Miami area have been operating for the past three months at two plays for a quarter, the gross receipts in each of these test locations has risen an average of 35% and that the location owners are now as enthused with the new policy as is the operating firm.

The technical procedure originally required to change to dime play was difficult, involving the costly replacement of coin chutes. Operators also had to consider the possible alienation of the location owner and his customers. The coin mechanisms on most of today's phonographs are easily converted to several different pricing structures including two for 25¢. The change from three to two plays per quarter is also more moderate, proportionately speaking, than the original 100% hike from a nickel to a dime. Therefore the wrath of the location owner and his patrons is minimized to a great degree. However, price raising is strictly an individual job, not only for individual routes but for each particular location itself. As one distributor put it, "I can't advise my customers to change their prices in general. They know which spots will balk and which will accept it as just another item that's gone up in price.'

Back in the 50's, most agreed that the industry needed a shot in the arm. If an operator's collections need a shot in the arm today, this may be one way to do it. It's something being talked about today, something worth looking into, something quite possibly that's a little overdue.

And, that it be done in this way: (1) increase the size of the Executive Committee to include the present past presi-dents; (2) each past president on the council would have the right to vote the same as members of the Executive Committee proper; (3) each past president would serve on the Past President's Council for five years which would mean that, in order to get the council started, the first MOA president (George A. Mil-ler) would serve one year or until the 1967 Convention. The second MOA president (J. Harry Snod-grass) would serve for two years or until the 1968 Convention. The third MOA president (Lou Casola) would serve three years or until the 1969 Convention. The fourth MOA Presi-dent (Clinton S. Pierce) would serve four years or until the 1970 Conven-tion. And, the fifth and present MOA president (John A. Wallace) would serve five years or until the 1971 Convention. he will withhold formal announcement until he has completed his distribution program on a total national basis. He said he hoped to have the program completed by the end of the year.



A History of the Jukebox Royalty Debates, 1945-1966

Apathy. That was how industry representatives identified the lack of concern on the part of operators dur-ing the wrangling over H.R. 5174, a bill which had been talked to death



but which produced a quick rewrite, H.R. 7194. Although it did not pro-vide for rates, it did propose the ab-solute repeal of the 1909 exemption, removed the location owner from re-sponsibility (unless he owned the juke or serviced it) and provided "infringement" penalties ranging from \$250 to \$5000. Why had the bill been voted out of the subcommittee with such speed? In a minority opinion, Roland V. Libo-nati of Illinois offered an explana-tion: "There was lukewarm support for, and strong opposition to, H.R. 5174.... As a result, the subcom-mittee abandoned it. Nevertheless, responding to demands by the per-formance rights societies ... that something must be done to satisfy their special interests, a majority of the subcommittee decided to report out a different bill—*anything to get re-lief* (Editor's Italics) from the pres-sures for enactment of a law...." "Thus H.R. 7194 was born in sub-committee. This bill ... omits entirely any provision placing any limits on amounts of ... fees. ... Confusion remains. No operator can know the extent of his obligations or his liabil-ities under the law. Nothing in the secord of the subcommittee's hearings sheds any light on these uncertain-ties, for they dealt with an entirely different bill." After protesting the abscence, or skirting of hearings on H.R. 7194, subcommit

After protesting the abscence, or skirting of hearings on H.R. 7194, the language in Libonati's report dropped its formality to speak direct-ly to the members of the subcommit-tee.

ly to the members of the subcommit-tee: "The jukebox owner pays a license to the U.S. Government, the State, the county, the city, village, and in some places the township. He is tax bitten at every turn including his in-come tax to the U.S. Government and in some States and cities an (addi-tional) income tax... Now you want to add to his burdens by clamping another tax on license on his liveli-hood. He can't take it. As it is now, he can only survive by adding other types of vending machines to his promotion. Everything that glitters is not gold." Byron G. Rogers of Colorado, also a dissenter from the vote, drew a com-

Byron G. Rogers of Colorado, also a dissenter from the vote, drew a com-parison in his brief: ". . . This (bill) means that if an inventor of a spark plug should sell the same to General Motors and General Motors placed the spark plug in a motor coach wherein fares were charged for pas-senger transportation, then the in-



ventor would be permitted to collect from the operator of the motor coach for profit. It is not thought Congress will ever extend the law this far. Why should they extend it for music copyright owners? This legislation should be defeated." A meeting of the full House Judi-ciary Committee was scheduled for July 2nd, but was postponed because of Independence Day. But it was voted out of committee on July 25th and sent to the Rules Committee, last stop before being passed to the Senate. One trade paper had already decided that the battle was lost, and newly-elected MOA president Lou Casola took exception: "I am not at all in accord with re-cent statements made by a certain trade paper which has prefabricated a situation which is not at all based on fact. Meanwhile, the New York State Operators Guild sent MOA \$500, the Westchester Operators Guild sent \$200, and the Music Operators of New York sent "a large sum" to the MOA Special Fund. The association also sent men east to help form local and state groups, held meetings with record companies to discuss the legis-lation and went on a touring prolation and went on a touring pro-gram, speaking to local associations and asking for vocal and financial support. Until the next session of Congress when the beloved, respected and persistent Celler introduced the ever-popular Jukebox Exemption Re-peal Act in January, 1965. Did the sun riseth in the East? Then certain it was that a Cellar Bill would ap-pear. But H.R. 18 was only a stop-gap, or a hors d'oeuvre. The meat of the proposal was H.R. 4347, a revi-sion of the entire copyright law, sion of the entire copyright law, which included the jukebox copyright problem.

25th, then moved to April 12th. Jumped once again to May 26th. The performance societies recalled and complimented the Committee of 1963, extolling their wisdom for passing ILR. 7194, then blasted the jukebox industry as free riders. The societies were heard again on June 4, the op-erators on June 9th. Clint Pierce, Bill Cannon and Perry Patterson spoke; Nick Allen presented his brief and the hearings seemed to go well. The printed record of the testimony of June 9 is available, and the differ-ence between it and the transcript of the 1963 hearings show the tech-niques of the contestants and the trouble surrounding the phonograph operators.

trouble surrounding the phonograph operators. The heading on the 1963 transcript says, Providing For Royalties For Musical Compositions On Coin-Oper-ated Machines. It runs two hundred and twenty-four pages, of which forty-three are supplemental state-ments. The actual recorded testimony runs somewhere around one hundred and fifty pages. It deals with nothing else but a jukebox royalty bill. The 1965 transcripts run to three full volumes with stiff paper covers (their color may be described as Gov-ernmental Off-Chocolate) for a grand total of two thousand fifty-six pages, of which only one hundred twenty-one pages are concerned with jukeboxes.

Having failed, however close they had come in 1963, to get a repeal of the exemption by direct assault, the performance societies could now hope for a "smothering" process to over-come the operators. Congressional pique had brought out H.R. 7194, and the peevishness to be expected if the entire revision were to be held up here the peevishness to be expected if the entire revision were to be held up by the jukebox problem would be monu-mental and overpowering. Tactics now had to be changed if the opera-tors were not to be swamped.



Kastenmeier: You understand that kastenmeter: You understand that one of the reasons this came about historically is that after the exemp-tion was written in the 1909 law, nearly all other performance or use of music for profit, recorded music, by the networks and media, films and by the networks and media, films and background music, involve a perform-ance right today, and this apparently is the one area that is not touched in terms of the performance right fee. 





to the Beatles, and the Beatles re-produced it for him, or he had the Beatles to do it, and it became very popular, why every jukebox operator would want it and need it in there, and if he hear't assigned these colpopular, why every jukebox operator would want it and need it in there, and if he hasn't assigned these col-lection rights to one of these organi-zations, he could just make a fortune, going around, and say, "now I want \$10, or I want \$25 or I want \$100," and if you do not pay what he wants, then he can go right into court, Fed-eral court, mind you, and the opera-tor, the coin operator, has no defense. He must come in and pay. Now how are you going to deal with that situ-ation, if you leave provision 114 as it now exists? Tenzer: We are trying to bring out the facts, since you suggested there was a trend toward antimonopolis-tic tendencies, and this would give the individual the right to be in business for himself, and not be required to become part of a monopoly. Rogers: He has the right now to get into it, and if you give him the right under section 114 here, you have given him a club, that he can walk into any place, and the remarkable — Tenzer: You use the term "club" as meaning a right. Rogers: A what? Tenzer: A right. Rogers: Well, it may be a right,

Rogers: A what? Tenzer: A right. Rogers: Well, it may be a right, but if you own a jukebox, and had a man walk in one day and say, "Look, Bub, you owe me a couple of hun-dred bucks, and if you don't pay the \$200, I am going down here and file an action in Federal court." Tenzer: And I would say, "If you do, I will stop using your records." Rogers: Then you are one man. Tenzer: You are talking about one man.

man.

Rogers: Sure.

Tenzer: You are talking about the individual songwriter talking to the

individual songwriter talking to the individual coinbox operator. Rogers: Yes. But you have played it, and you are stuck with it, or he wouldn't be in there. George P. Miller appeared next, and after the usual banter, settled down to give his opinion. Miller: I am the little guy who may play some of that cheap music they were talking about. . . Now, in the early days of this business, we did not talk about all these legal things. We used to come in here and weep bitter early days of this business, we did not talk about all these legal things. We used to come in here and weep bitter tears for the poor, impoverished art-ist who had no business acumen, and who lost his music. We always used to hold up, as the one to cry about, Stephen Foster. He was a fellow who made no money. I have been in Congress since 1945, and we have had this up every Congress. Why? Be-cause they (the performance soci-eties) see about \$5 million they think they can slip out of this business, enough to break the jukebox business. (It is) one of the few businesses in the United States today that it is not under monopoly, because it does not lend itself to monopoly in this coun-try. There is not one of the opera-tors, and there are a number of them sitting in back of me, who is in the millionaire class. If any of them should be in the millionaire class, it would not be because they operate jukeboxes but because they have other interests. But in this type of business you have to make the personal touch in order to get their boxes into locayou have to make the personal touch in order to get their boxes into loca-tion, but even that can't be extended too far... Now if this bill, as it is written, goes into effect, it does give a club to anyone who cares to use it. Whether a man by design or accident uses a record that has a premium cost on it, he is subject to the law. So he must do what Congress has set up. How many of these people could afford to handle someone who could continously research and say, "This one can be played and that one can't

be played?" Tenzer: As you know, the Judiciary Committee are the lawyers for the House of Representatives, so we have to be legalistic in our approach. We

to be legalistic in our approach. We are conducting these hearings for the purpose of writing the law. Miller: I understand the gentle-man's position. I find no complaint with it. I have not tried to give any different view. I just merely tried to say that, as a poor layman coming before this distinguished group, I know how a criminal sitting before a court feels. (Laughter.) Tenzer: Well, we do hope some day that you can add another achievement to the great achievement of your

He gets an uproar of indignation from the cus-tomers and nothing in the coin box. . . There are many factors in the total popularity of a record, and the song itself is many times of minor im-portance. These are: the artists song itself is many times of minor im-portance. . . These are: the artists (singer, instrumentalist or group), either an established name or one with a new, unique or attractive sound; the song or tune, but never in its original state (Editor's Italics) the arranger who embellishes the composition, or orchestrates the work and decides how the total musical sounds will be arrived at, and whose style is recognizable in a result; the engineers who control the acoustics and make electronic alterations on the and make electronic alterations on the sounds as they are changed from sound waves to the resultant record-ing; and the very important area of exposure and promotion to the pub-lic.

Probably the outstanding example of Cannon's synopsis is the relation-ship between the Beatles and their musical director, George Martin. The difference between Yesterday as originally plunked on a six-string guitar in a hotel room, and the final result, with the Mozart-inspired cello and violin backing or the difference between I'm Only Sleeping, with its charming melody and the special electronic effects (George Harrison's guitar solo played backwards, the re-sult of artistic collaboration and guitar solo played backwards, the re-sult of artistic collaboration and tape-splicing) makes their recordings examples of what Martin has called "a minor art form." The effect of Moses Proffitt's re-marks on the committee are remem-bered by all those who were present that day

marks on the committee are remem-bered by all those who were present that day. Profiitt: Gentlemen, many of our good citizens today are still under the illusion that the automatic music business is the superhighway with no stoplights to the unknown para-dise where there are no limits on profits. During the past 30 years, I have seen and known so many opera-tors, who entered the business under the impression that once they got a number of machines on location that riches were just around the corner. How disappointing were their find-ings. . . Gentlemen, as a son of an ex-slave, I was taught by him never to fret or worry about what the other fellow makes and gets but to strive to have some left for myself at the same time that I help him make his. This is where the rub comes in. If my company has to pay the three copyright societies \$20 each per year, to say nothing about the possibility of paying \$30. or \$40 or the three copyright societies \$20 each per year, to say nothing about the possibility of paying \$30, or \$40 or more to each of the three, in addition to the mechanical fees we pay as part of the cost of our records, there cer-tainly would not be any profit left in the till for me, Moses J. Proffit. Robert Nims, representing the Na-tional Small Business Association, had the last word on the operator's attitude: "We have no ax to grind against anyone. We want to stay in business." Towards seven that evening, the

against anyone. We want to stay in business." Towards seven that evening, the committee adjourned. What followed that adjournment surprised, dis-mayed, confused and finally came home to the operators. Unsatisfied with the MOA in-creased mechanical royalty proposal, the performance rights societies pressed the committee, which by this time was ready to send the entire copyright revision out. The commit-tee, fed up with both sides, wrote a proposal including Section 116, in which they set down rates and penal-ties on royalties. MOA objected, whereupon the subcommittee slapped a "Confidential" stamp on their pro-posal, handed copies to both sides and told them to work it out for them-selves. selves.

selves. Informal meetings were then held between MOA and the societies, at which flat yearly fees were discussed. The societies bid high, MOA bid low. By the time it was over a middle figure had been reached and a ceiling had been set on royalties in the bill. The meetings, Fred Granger re-marked, were harmonious. "We didn't throw things at each other. Everyone behaved like a gentleman. I think they began to get an understanding of the economics of our industry, an understanding they didn't have be-fore." fore."

But the subcommittee by this time had grown tired of it all. Section 116, said to be written by the Registrar of Copyrights and the subcommittee counsel, was tacked onto H.R. 4347 and the bill was sent to the full committee, who reported the bill out to the Rules Committee. Only the closing of the Congressional session stopped the bill from going any fur-

the MOA hotly objected to Section 116, MOA notly objected to Section 116, and the absence of public hearings on it, as Libonati had objected to H.R. 7194 in 1963. The bill lies dead for this year; Celler will undoubtedly introduce its twin or a slightly amended version at the next session of Converses Once action the dust has of Congress. Once again the dust has of Congress. Once again the dust has settled and once again both sides are preparing to stir it as soon as the speaker's gavel in Congress bangs open another sitting. What, as the actress said to the bishop, does it all mean? Why this twenty-year squabble? What produced it and what is its end? The performing rights societies have covered the available sources of revenue with one excention: the juke-

have covered the available sources of revenue with one exception: the juke-box. At this moment, when back-ground music is played in a restau-rant, or when a string quartet plays *The Shadow Of Your Smile* in a Plaza Hotel dining room or when *Have You Seen Your Mother, Baby, Standing In The Shadows?* is played over the radio, one of the societies collects rent. The big money in the phonograph

The big money in the phonograph record industry is made on airplay these days, not on jukeboxes. Where once jukeboxes could create a star or bit monod there are a star or once jukeboxes could create a star or a hit record, they now only prolong it somewhat past its normal sales run. The one field in which they can create a demand is for "adult music" —anything other than rock and roll. Such music is made available on the Little LP, which has had a troubled bistory

Little LF, which has had a troubled history. So that is why the revisions and repeals have been proposed for twenty years. Their enactment would mean a new source of revenue for the neuroneance societies.

mean a new source of revenue for the performance societies. The question of the hypothetical impoverished songwriter: if all the fuss has really been about him, will he, if a royalty bill is made law, col-lect what he is theoretically owed? If so, how shall he collect—directly or through an agency? H.R. 7194 and Section 114 of H.R. 4347 would make him powerful enough to do so, but there is danger. Give a man carte blanche or a wide-open expense ac-count and the temptation to pad it is almost irresistible. If, as has been charged, the performance societies are monopolies, is it better to make the individual songwriter a monop-oly?

the individual songwriter a monopoly? Why is it necessary to wheel and deal in Washington? Because there is no assurance that a Government official will be wise and just; all of them have their political obligations and their careers at stake. But, some anorators may wonder, how can this and their careers at stake. But, some operators may wonder, how can this be? These men are running the Gov-ernment, which is a high and noble calling. A jockey rides a prize horse and the motion is beautiful, a cop protects the public, the minister watches his congregation, but all of them are liable to The Touch. When MOA officers and members have gone to testify in Washington they have found an almost granite-like fixation in some Congressional minds that the industry is hoodlum-run. Why? And why again do the newspapers of the major cities attack the industry as corrupt, illegal and immoral?

immoral?

The answer lies partly with the lack of authentic information about the industry, the lack of an organization to distribute this information and the lack of enthusiasm or the limited vision of the operator himself.

Finally, why, after all these years, has the jukebox industry made a monetary offer to effect a compromise and resolve the nagging royalty problem? Because it is no longer possible to stand on the point of the 1909 exemption unchanged. Congressional interest and sympathy and patience is nearly at an end with both sides;



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the royalty bills are now only a small part of a much larger bill, and to mourn for the old tactics is to mourn for the nickel cup of coffee or the fifty-cent movie; they are gone, gone,

fifty-cent movie; they are gone, gone, gone. The idea that the nation's opera-tors will at some time pay some kind of royalty, an idea always fixed in the minds of the performance rights societies, has now become fixed in the Congressional mind, and the juke-box industry spokesmen have no other choice but to deal with that idea on a flexible basis. Something will be paid; the contest will now be over how much. how much.

how much. Broadly, the battle of the music op-erators with the royalty bills is but one part of the national battle of small business to stay alive, and be-hind that battle is an idea submerged in recent years: that a man ought to be able to go his own way with his own prowess with as few fences as prescribe. Marga marge and consoliown prowess with as few fences as possible. Merge, merge and consoli-date; that is the order of the day, in business and in private life. What the jukebox operator has been ask-ing is to be let alone, to conduct his business as his own, and not as a subsidiary of Ambiguous Consolidated.

It is a strange, proud, not easily understood industry, this one. Per-

haps because it is run on flesh and haps because it is run on flesh and blood and nerve, by men and women with faces and voices, rather than by corporate image and press releases. It does not manufacture plastic Whatnots that can be used in the garden, office or home; it does not make the teeth whiter or the hair longer or the body more sensual; it simply provides selective musical en-tertainment so that the feet may be warmed by dancing or the beer spiked with salty tears. Its goal is not The Sweet Life but a living. Perhaps that is what is incomprehensible to the outsider. And the industry is, by and large, run by gentlemen, not by cookie-stamp Vice Presidents. That is, to the outsider, perhaps the most baffling thing of all. (This is the eighth, and final, in-stallment.)



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
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
