



Recorded Journalism

*Mary Had A Little Lamb
Its Fleece Was White As Snow
And Everywhere That Mary Went,
Her Lamb Was Sure To Go*

With this nursery rhyme, spoken into a low-fi, but wonderful machine by Thomas Edison almost a century ago, the phonograph record was born. Note, then, that the first recording was a spoken-word effort. The announcement of this miracle of the "modern age" was heralded, as a matter of fact, as a method of retaining forever the voices and beliefs of great men. This forecast was true to a large extent, so that today we can be witness to events long past. Yet, it was a foregone conclusion after the introduction of music on records that this artform was to vastly dominate the repertory of disks.

Not to suggest that the wheel has turned, we may well be entering a new phase of recording ventures that will again cast the spotlight on non-musical interest in disks. It can be termed, in a great measure, recorded journalism. This does not simply mean that events of importance are to receive greater coverage.

In recent months, increasing numbers of dramatic news developments

or social problems have been transformed into recordings of a special project nature. This may well entail recordings which may present the issues pro-and-con, leaving the listener to judge for himself what position he should hold. The heart of this recorded journalism, of course, is controversy, rather than mere recapitulations of events that can be of value as a historical reference in the future. These recordings, as exemplified by Capitol's new, aptly tagged "Probe" series, appeal to people who, in a sense, are part of the events themselves.

Like any form of journalism, from newspaper, magazine to radio and TV, the record industry in embarking on this exciting new area is faced with a responsibility to present its case or the case of others with fairness and taste. And certainly not to be neglected are presentations that maintain interest as they inform.

It is somewhat ironic that the oldest of the scientific audio-visual channels of communication has happened on the journalism scene so late in the game. Nevertheless, it may soon be treated with the same measure of respect long earned by the other media.

Decca Ends Best Year; Opens '67 With 'Coming On Strong' Programs

NEW YORK—Coming on strong in 1966 to the tune of its best year yet, Decca Records moves into 1967 with the year 'round theme of "Coming On Strong in '67" and 17 new albums. There are 10 pop LP's and three classics.

The new pop product from the company consists of Jan Garber and His Orchestra with a set of Broadway, Hollywood and standard melodies titled "The Shadow Of Your Smile." The Quartette Tres Bien in a brand new set, titled "Where It's At," offering unique piano and rhythm interpretations of a collection of new and all-time favorites. Mimi Hines, is represented in the new Decca release with a set titled "Mini Hines Is A Happening." In this, her second release for the Decca label, the lark presents a vocal collection of Broadway, television and pop melodies. Pianist George Feyer pays a musical tribute to the legendary Lerner and Loewe classic, "My Fair Lady," in a collection titled "Echoes Of My Fair Lady." The album is another in a series of "Echoes Of . . ." recordings being released by the pianist.

A special highlight of the Jan. release schedule is two country packages. The Wilburn Brothers' latest titled "Two For The Show," where the boys showcase a collection of a dozen country favorites, including their own single record hit "Hurt Her Once For Me." Many of the big names from the Decca roster of country stars are included in a new set honoring the "1966 Country And Western Award

Winners." This collection of 1966's best includes, among others, Loretta Lynn, Jan Howard, Wilburn Brothers, Kitty Wells, Bill Anderson and Johnny Wright, all performing their own award-winning recordings.

New Orleans vibist Godfrey Hirsch represents the Coral label with new instrumental package titled "Happiness Is."

Rounding out the new popular releases from Decca is "An Evening With Boris Karloff And His Friends." These original sound tracks from Universal's greatest monster motion pictures, narrated by Karloff, is tribute to the men and women who have made cinematic history as master menaces and famous monsters down through the years. For the devotees of music and song of the Hawaiian Islands, Decca presents "Hawaii Stars," featuring The Nui Nui Six, comprising such Island talents as Ed Kenney, Hilo Hattie, Sonny Kamahele, Haunani, Pua Almeida and Nalani Olds. Ozzie Torrens And His Exciting Orchestra make their Decca debut with "Boogaloo In Apartment 41," presenting popular songs of the day set to the pulsating beat of the boogaloo.

Decca's Gold Label Classical Division is represented with three packages. The first features the New York Pro Musica, under the direction of La Noue Davenport, in a collection of "Florentine Music," from the Italian Renaissance period of musical history. Harpsichordist Sylvia Marlowe, presents works by Vittorio Rieti, "Con-

Shelby Singleton Starts Indie Operation

NEW YORK—Shelby Singleton has formed Shelby Singleton Productions, Inc., this city. Singleton, until his resignation from Mercury Records earlier this month, had been vice president of the A&R division of the Chicago based, multi-label Mercury operation.

The veteran A&R executive said there would be recordings created by staff producers as well as by a variety of independent producers throughout the country. Latter will work on assignment or via master purchase acquisitions to fulfill commitments to several labels will avail themselves of Singleton's services. Main offices are at 1650 Broadway.

All negotiations are being handled through Marshall and Vigoda, attorneys at 130 West 57th Street, New York, who are representing Singleton. Thus far, several deals have been concluded and several additional pacts are in negotiation.

Mietus Leaves BMI To Open Pubbery Service

NEW YORK—Lenny Mietus, one of BMI's key executives, who headed publisher administration for ten years has left BMI to set up a music publishers' agency. Prior to BMI, Mietus was with the Copyright Office in Washington, D. C.

Mietus has been contracting with music firms and will provide complete administrative service for his clients. The service will include copyrighting, music clearance, record licensing, the issuance of standard agreements, the collection of royalties, foreign and domestic, etc. In addition, Mietus will serve as "advisor" to music publishers. Under the new venture, known as Mietus Copyright Management, agreements have already been entered into with California, Nashville and New York firms.

Until Mietus establishes his New York location, he will conduct business from 2351 Laurana Rd., Union, New Jersey.

Joining Singleton in his new venture are Joe Venerri, formerly a member of The Tokens singing group, an arranger, producer, writer and musician; Billy Carl, lead singer with Billy & The Essentials and an arranger, producer and writer; and Judy Dion who will handle office administration and public relations activity.

Plans include a label, Singleton added, to be distributed by another major label not yet selected. His own varied background in A&R activity includes teen C&W, R&B, and Pop productions. His plans also envision creating LP ideas and projects for a number of labels to be merchandised both generally and as premiums.

As an adjunct to his New York offices, Singleton will also maintain offices in Nashville, frequently visiting there to record and to screen talent and material. He expects to make his first trip there within the next two weeks during which he will record seven singles and two albums.

Singleton's nine-year, hit-filled tenure with Mercury began in 1957 when he joined that firm as a local promotion manager at his original home in Shreveport, Louisiana following service with the U.S. Marines in Korea. He advanced rapidly within the organization, succeeding to the post of Southern Regional Sales Manager and by 1959 had transferred his activity to the A&R Division, operating out of the company's Nashville studios. Moving to New York, he was named a vice president in November 1962 and administered much of the company's recording program until his departure this month.

Marks' Specials Something Special In Nielson Survey

NEW YORK—Two TV specials with songs by Johnny Marks have emerged as Top 10 Nielson ratings heroes, and all over a two week period ending Dec. 4.

Ten specials, seven in prime time, were presented during the two-week period.

"The Ballad Of Smokey The Bear," presented over NBC-TV by General Electric for the first time, was second with a 21.2 rating.

"Rudolph The Red-Nosed Reindeer," which premiered in 1964, was presented over NBC-TV by GE for the third time, and achieved a rating of 19.4 to place fourth in the top-ten list.

General Electric has already signed contracts with Marks and the producers of these shows to present "Smokey" and "Rudolph" for the second and fourth times respectively over NBC-TV in 1967.

"Despite slipping business indices," said Gard, the industry can and must continue to grow in excess of the averages for other businesses and it is the purpose of the Music Show to set the direction for such growth. The theme of the 1967 show will be hard selling to compensate for any general economic declines. "We are on the threshold of becoming a billion-dollar annual business," declared Gard. "There is no reason why the musical instrument industry cannot pass that mark in annual retail sales very soon if we but continue the kind of aggressive, alert selling which has marked the past decade when we enjoyed a bountiful boom economy."

"Hard Sell in a Soft Economy" can assure that there will be no slowdown in the music industry because the potential market will exist regardless of any general business decline, the NAMM executive vice president stated. The 1967 Music Show will aim to focus on the best marketing tactics to capitalize on that sales potential, Gard concluded.



Violinist Isaac Stern was present not only as a personal friend of Casals, but as the representative of New York City's Mayor, John Lindsay. Stern presented Casals with the Handel Medallion on behalf of Mayor Lindsay and the citizenry of New York City. Others present were the Mayoress of San Juan, Dona Felisa Rincón; Governor Roberto Sanchez Vilella, who acted as official host; music critics; executives from Columbia Records; and such figures from the world of music as Mieczyslaw Horszowski, Eugene Istomin, Alexander Schneider and Rudolf Serkin.

A formal reception and ceremonies followed a surprise concert during which Messrs. Horszowski, Istomin, Schneider, Serkin and Stern were featured in a performance of "Happy Birthday," arranged by Manos Hadjidakis, the composer of "Never on Sunday." Stern and Istomin also joined in playing Casals' Piano and Violin Sonata. The Chorus of the Conservatory of Music of Puerto Rico also appeared on the program.

In addition to the celebrations on December 29, a concert in honor of Mr. Casals was presented under the auspices of the Mayoress of San Juan at the Tapia Theatre on December 27.

According to vp John R. Brown, the firm has stepped up its foreign activity during the year with new affiliations established in both Japan and South Africa.

Another new 1966 entity, Acuff-Rose International, works jointly with Chappell & Co. Inc. in New York on publication of Acuff-Rose song material in numerous types of printed arrangements of chorus, orchestra, marching band, and other combinations. Initial publications have found a brisk market at the school and college level. The move, consummated with Chappell early this year, is the first of its kind to involve a Nashville publisher.

In line with its expansion plans, Acuff-Rose will soon have at its disposal a brand-new, custom-designed, four-track, 18-channel stereo studio, complete with editing and mastering facilities. The studio, actually usable for virtually any normal recording session, will permit volume production of demo discs.

On the promotion level, Joe D. Lucas was named promotion chief for Acuff-Rose earlier this year. Lucas directs the promo activities of John Neal Brown, veteran Mel Foree, and a network of independent regional promotion men.

Hickory Records, meanwhile, is also making new moves in the area of acquiring outside masters and recording more songs from outside publishers.

The label has done extremely well during the year with several good music LPs and with Donovan. Three

New areas of distribution have also been a part of the Hickory picture. A club deal was signed with the Capitol Record Club, and a tape cartridge distribution arrangement is expected to be signed shortly.

Acuff-Rose Artists Corporation has beefed up its staff with the addition of Bob Dawes, formerly active on the West Coast with GAC and Coast Artists. Dawes joins Howard Forrester in handling bookings for Roy Orbison, the Newbeats, Roy Acuff, George Hamilton IV, Wilma Lee and Stony Cooper, and Don Gibson among others, plus Britain's Tom Jones and Frank Ifield. The Artists Corporation also handles exclusively all bookings for the country show at the annual Illinois State Fair.

The entire Acuff-Rose structure continues to be acquisition-minded, an attitude which is expected to play an even greater role once the firm moves into its new building, now under construction. Only last week, the signing of West Coasters Dorsey Burnette and Gary Crosby to Hickory recording contracts was announced. During this year, in addition, the publishing wing acquired all overseas rights to the catalogs of Lion and Don Music, the publishing firms of Don Robey in Houston, and to Stanyan Music, which includes copyrights by Rod McKuen and Glen Yarbrough. Acuff-Rose overseas includes a fully-staffed London office, as well as affiliates and subsidiaries in more than 30 countries.

Voting For Grammy Awards Underway

NEW YORK—The first round of voting for the annual Grammy Awards, the recording industry's most coveted prize, gets under way this week when members of the Record Academy will be receiving their ballots along with a long list of this year's eligible selections.

More than 4,200 nominees will be represented in the lists which cover 42 categories, ranging from classical to rock and roll, from jazz to country and western and from children's to rhythm and blues performances.

Academy members will be asked to vote for five nominees in the various categories, but, according to national president George Avakian, "they will be requested most urgently to limit their votes to those categories with which they are thoroughly familiar. Each year our members have been paying greater heed to our request for stronger self-discipline in their voting habits so that the Grammys will go to those most worthy of awards based solely on artistic achievement. While the Academy does recognize the interest in other polls that emphasize popularity and sales, it continues to remain dedicated to its chief aim: to encourage and reward outstanding artistic creativity throughout the entire field of recording."

Members will be asked to return all ballots by Thursday, January 12, to the accounting firm of Haskins and Sells, which will then tabulate the results, with the five top selections in each category comprising this year's Grammy Awards finalists. A second round of voting will then determine the 1966 winners, to be announced at gala awards ceremonies on March 2nd, held simultaneously in New York, Los Angeles, Nashville and Chicago.


Firm will be representing several labels, including Dot on an indie basis.

For the rest of this week it would be greatly appreciated if everyone would walk on tiptoes and speak in whispers. Please don't slam any doors, blast any radios or rattle any typewriters. And, by all means, hyping should be done softly . . . very softly.

While a few of us are nursing broken pledges and suffering from pangs of conscience (as well as other pangs), there are still a good many country folk who are out hustling up business for themselves. In fact, a whole batch of big names got together for a New Year's Day blast out at the Masonic Hall in Davenport, Iowa. The lineup featured such luminaries as Webb Pierce, Red Sovine, Dottie West & the Heartaches, Del Reeves, Bobby Lord and Ernie Ashworth, who helped ring in 1967 in a big way. . . . Speaking of Dottie West, the winsome miss is set to record a gospel album session this month with a batch of tunes not ordinarily associated with country artists. The session will be called "Dottie West Sings Sacred Ballads" and is slated for a June release.

The Moeller Talent stable will be kicking off the New Year on the right foot, with a whole passel of acts doing the circuit scene, especially the club circuit. Jan. 17-29 will find the Homesteaders in Milwaukee at Nick's Nic-A-Bob while Grandpa Jones will be at Toronto's famed Horseshoe Tavern Jan. 16-21. George Morgan moves into that same Horseshoe from Jan. 23-28 and will be at Mr. Lucky's in Phoenix the first four days in Feb., following Dottie West, who will entertain at the Arizona nitery Jan. 18-21. A longtime country showcase, the flame in Minneapolis will feature Carl and Pearl Butler Jan. 30-Feb. 4.

Puerto Rico will be flooded with country music once again when Dick Flood returns Feb. 21-Mar. 5 for another stint at Ramey AFB, plus performances at Roosevelt Road Naval Station. Dick's recent tour of Ramey was reportedly a sellout. Just prior to his heading for the Caribbean, he has a schedule that includes stops at Goldsboro, N.C. (Jan. 6), Biloxi (13), Panama City, Fla. (14), Valdosta, Ga. (18), Columbus, Ga. (19), Little Rock (20-21) and Clearwater, Fla. (27-28). In addition, he will play Montgomery, Ala. and Ft. Benning, Ga. during the month of Feb.

The Buck Owens Show will be heading for the Land of the Rising Sun come Feb. Starting with a Feb. 1 show at Tokyo, the tour will include mostly civilian concerts throughout Japan, as well as appearances in about 6 military bases. From there the tour will include stopovers in the Phillipines, Okinawa and Viet Nam where the group will entertain our fighting men. It should be quite a morale booster.

Billy Deaton tells us that he and Faron Young have renewed their radio show with Pearl Beer for the fourth year. Billy boasts that the show is the most successful syndicated radio operation in Country-musicland.

Little Jimmy Dickens knew that his benefit appearance at Oxnard AFB would occur on his birthday Dec. 20 and he also knew that his wife and daughter were flying out to meet him for the occasion in California. With his fame spreading far and wide, old Bob saw how the other half lives recently when he appeared as a special guest on the Joe Franklin TVer in New York. . . . Slim Whitman, Sue Thompson, Roy Clark and the K-SOP Wranglers packed the Terrace in Salt Lake City recently for Radio KSOP in one of the biggest country shows of '66 in that city. The station also claims to have pulled in top ratings in the market according to a recent Pulse survey. . . . Chicago-land's nighttime voice of country music, WOPA-Oak Park will soon increase its FM power to 50,000 watts. Georgie Fame, who recently signed a new five-year contract with CBS is no newcomer to the record scene. He has been in showbusiness since 1959 and his big break came in 1962 with the formation of his own group The Blue Flames, and regular engagements at London's Flamingo Club. This was followed by a recording contract and his first LP, "Rhythm And Blues At The Flamingo." He broke into the singles chart in 1964 with the quarter million selling "Yeh Yeh" followed by "Get Away" and "Sunny." Georgie Fame is now cutting his first single for release by CBS later this month. In America he'll be heard on the Epic label.



GREAT BRITAIN

The LP build-up which dominated 1966 reached a climax in the weeks immediately preceding Christmas and all companies, large and small, reported the biggest album Yuletide of all time. E.M.I., bereft of a new Beatles album or single, nevertheless were more than satisfied with the sales notched up by the Seekers and the Beach Boys. The fact that both groups had high-ranking single hits, "Mornintown Ride" and "Good Vibrations" respectively, boosted their album sales considerably. The success of the Music for Pleasure series of budget line albums in no way affected sales of the middle and high-priced LPs. As a grand finale to a year of growing popularity and mounting sales for Tamla Motown artists, E.M.I. were particularly happy to have a single smash with "You Keep Me Hanging On" by the Supremes and "What Becomes of The Brokenhearted" by Jimmy Ruffin.

For Decca it was a singles and an LP Christmas. Topping the charts and the singles sales was Tom Jones with "Green Green Grass of Home" which by Christmas Day had sold over three quarters of a million copies. Tremendously successful, too, was Val Doonican with his smash single "What Would I Be" which sparked off many sales for his three albums—"13 Lucky Shades of Val Doonican"; "More Shades . . ." and "Gentle Shades." Another fast-selling single for Decca came from the Small Faces with "My Mind's Eye." In the album field "The Sound of Music" continued to hit the highnotes and all the Jim Reeves albums found their way into countless homes all over the country. The Rolling Stones, like the Beatles, had no new releases but Decca reports that after a slow start their album "Big Hits" gathered momentum if not moss. Other Decca hits includes disks by the Bachelors, the Alan Price Set, Elvis Presley, Julie Andrews and Los Escudos.

Pye Records reported excellent Christmas sales with the accent on albums and their budget line Marble Arch series well in the lead. However, an unexpected best seller turned out to be the full-priced debut LP by Geno Washington "Hand Clappin', Foot Stompin', Funky But Live" on the Piccadilly label. In the singles field it was "Dead End Street" by the Kinks and "Sunshine Superman" by Donovan which netted the biggest sales for the label.

Philips also climaxed their fantastically successful year with a bumper Christmas both with singles and LPs. Albums had a slight edge particularly those in the higher-priced bracket. Harry Secombe, as always, proved a seasonal best seller with his "Christmas Cheer" LP as did the Walker Brothers with "Portrait" and "Take it Easy with The Walker Brothers." Britain's No. 1 female singer Dusty Springfield notched up healthy sales with her "Golden Hits" album. Fontana finished the year in a blaze of glory on both speeds. The New Vaudeville Band "Winchester Cathedral" album successfully followed their single, and Dave Dee, Dozy, Beaky, Mick and Tich were in the singles chart with "Save Me," and their new album "If Music Be The Food of Love . . ." was released to an enormous advance. Spencer Davis had "Gimme Some Loving" and Manfred Mann celebrated two months in the charts with "Semi Detached Suburban Mr. James." The group's big classical hit of the season was "The Messiah."

CBS reported top sales for their Super Stereo albums, particularly those by Percy Faith, Ray Conniff, Andre Kostelanetz, etc. Apart from established album charters such as "West Side Story" and "My Fair Lady," CBS did well with Bob Dylan's double pack "Blonde on Blonde"; Christmas albums by Andy Williams and Doris Day and Tony Bennett's "A Time for Love." Following his British tour in November, Dave Brubeck's "Time In" album also enjoyed good sales, and Bernstein's two-record set of Mahler's "Eighth Symphony" turned out to be the company's best selling classical disk of the year.

Besides the disks already mentioned, Christmas charts also included British entries by the Who with "Happy Jack" on Reaction; the Barron Knights "Under New Management" on Columbia, and the Easybeats "Friday on my Mind" on United Artists, and Cliff Richard "In the Country" on Columbia.

Interesting battle shaping up on the record scene in Montreal due to the recent re-birth of format radio. CFOX is reportedly playing pop records exclusively around the clock, while pop music time on CKGM has been expanded with the arrival of Buddy Gee. He holds down a three to nine PM seg on the station. In case you don't know, Buddy Gee is in reality CKGM vet, George Morris, back to his old stamping grounds in Montreal from the west coast. These developments together with the continued presence of Dave Boxer's nightly pop segment on CFCF have record men in the city in high glee as singles sales curves shoot upward. Buddy long-distanced word that he expects new Beatle product to hit his turntables in very short order. According to the Montreal spinner, the Beatles will shortly release a greatest hits LP set, following that in short order with a brand new album. A new single is expected by the Capitol folks in Montreal, possibly before the end of the year or shortly after the new year. Frank Henry, Monique Leroux and the Capitol folks appear all ready for a very busy new year.

Corrine Burke has been getting good dealer reaction in Winnipeg to a new Columbia set by Chad & Jeremy. "Distant Shores" includes among other choice items, the Gordon Lightfoot-penned, "Early Morning Rain." "I Take It Back" by the Shondells is getting heavy airplay on the Rick Honey and D.J. Burns segments over CKPR at The Lakehead. The two deejays, vets on the station's spin 'em staff, have moved to new time periods. Rick is on now from four to eight PM, while D.J. moves from the all-night program into an 8 PM to midnight time slot. New all-niter on the station is Rick Hamilton from CJRL, Kenora.

Matty Heft at Southern Music really celebrated a green Christmas—money green—thanks to several smasher titles in his Southern catalog. "Winchester Cathedral" continues to sell, and the latest version thereof in the new Sinatra album has opened up a whole new sales area for the hot property. Matt's "Mellow Yellow" item by Donovan rode high on the charts across Canada throughout Christmas. The Montreal-based Matt has high hopes for a strong entry from Sergio Mendes and his folks on A&M with "Constant Rain."

Donn and Cindy (Reynolds) just completed a lengthy night club stand at Canada's Lakehead. They did big business, bringing considerable demand for their Arc LP and singles that Donn cut some time ago under the London banner. They expect to close a record deal very shortly. Donn was dubbed "Country Music Ambassador" by Mrs. Jo Walker of the Country Music Assn.

Liam Mullan's all excited about early showing by the Buckingham's on their new Quality outing, "Kind Of A Drag." The Quality man in Montreal reports that "Snoopy" is absolutely tearing up the chart scene in Expoville. Another biggie in Liam's area is "Hello Hello" by the Sopwith Camel. The Ben E. King Atco outing of "What Is Soul" still does very big business in Montreal. Liam has had much help on the side from Music Director Bob Johnston at CFCF. "Another Night" by Dionne Warwick has opened up chart business in a big way as the town gets more and more soul conscious.

Word out of Toronto has one of the existing stations about to go through a format change, coming out as a contemporary chart operation. It'll be very interesting to see if that does happen. Should shake up the record scene in the big town if a second rocker makes the broadcast scene. Still on the Toronto radio scene, new head man in the programming spot at CHUM is well-known and well-respected pop broadcaster Grahme Richards. He was a vet of format radio with the Storz chain in the U.S. for many years.

Guess Whos played two dates for the CKPR stations in Northwestern Ontario, (12/22) in Kenora, and (12/23) at The Lakehead. "His Girl" was the hit sound of both evenings. Best Canadian wax in one heck of a long time this good Quality outing. Watch it go!

It's now up to the organizers to pick 26 of these tunes as finalists in the contest. The organizers reserve for themselves the final selection in order to match songs with suitable artists, the labels of whom are submitting names of their various candidates. HOLLAND

Mezzo-soprano Caroline Kaart was contacted by Phonogram and recorded for Philips "Christmas with Caroline Kaart" with children's choir, organ (Feike Asma) and large orchestra. Mrs. Kaart, widow of Dutch opera-tenor Hans Kaart, is of Scottish birth but has mastered a perfect control of the Dutch language. She ranks here among the best-sold singers of folk ballads and religious-type songs.

A very lively Christmas party was celebrated in one of the pubs of Amsterdam's old "Jordaan" quarter where singer Willi Alberti (40, many Golden Records and Awards) was the center of interest of a large circle of personal friends, family, musicians, press officials, music publishers and Phonogram staff. The Philips LP "Zo Zingt De Jordaan" was introduced, a production by Willy Alberti featuring himself and a number of singers who are popular in this famous working-class district of Holland's capital. The Jordaan, where Rembrandt used to live and work, has a history of over 350 years and this now completely worn-out district is doomed to disappear very soon. At the party, Phonogram's managing director Jack Haslinghuis and deputy manager Rein Klaassen were present. Rolf Ten Kate and Willy Alberti were speakers and toasters.

The Troggs, holding hit parade top positions in Holland with "Anyway That You Want Me" and "I Can't Control Myself" visited Holland for a weekend tour in December, promoted by impresario Paul Acket of The Hague. The leader, Reg Presley, announced to the press their soon-to-be-expected new LP entitled "Troggly Dynamite."

Phonogram reported fine successes in 1966 with English pop recordings. In December, topper in Holland was "Green Green Grass Of Home" by Tom Jones (Decca). Both Decca and Fontana guaranteed top sales with recordings by such groups like Spencer Davis, Dave Dee, the Small Faces, Manfred Mann (LP "As Is"), Alan Price, and the Walker Brothers. From American sources, Bobby Hebb (Philips) and especially Ike & Tina Turner made promising entries on the Dutch pop market. A most remarkable success was booked by Dutch singer Ramses Shaffy, Philips artist. His LP "Shaffy Chantant" was a hit, and so are his 45 rpm recordings, among them the December topper "Sammy."

Holiday sales were good for CNR. The sales were better than last year contrary to the pessimistic expectations. Fast-rising star is Reggy van de Burght. Her debut in the "Gert Timmerman Show" resulted at once in a hit: "Teddybear." Klaus Wunderlich, Telefunkens wonder organ player and distributor of hundreds of thousands of records is coming to visit the Netherlands for a TV-recording. That cabaret is not only committed these days for the "happy few" is proved by the strong increase of sales of LP's. CNR's "DRS" LP, esteemed by critics and public, will present its new LP shortly on TV.

Recent CBS additions to the popular LP field include an album by the famous accordion player Jo Basile featuring over a dozen famous tunes such as "Somewhere My Love," "What's New Pussycat," "What Now My Love," and many others, the latest album by Simon and Garfunkel entitled "Parsley, Sage, Rosemary And Thyme," an album by Lefty Frizzell entitled "The Great Sound Of Lefty Frizzell," Les & Larry Elgart's "Sound Of The Times," Johnny Cash's "That's What You Get For Lovin' Me," a new LP recording by the exciting Hammond organist Johnny Dupont entitled "All Stops Out," Charlie Byrd's "Brazilian Byrd" as well as album by the Benny Goodman Quartet "Live 1937-1938" featuring Benny Goodman and the original group.

ITALY

The special low-priced series released by EMI Italiana entitled "Invito Alla Musica" (Invitation to the Music) received extraordinary sales reaction.

As a result of this success, EMI Italiana has just released a package of 10 LPs devoted to music of Vivaldi, Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, Chopin, Tchaikovsky, Grieg, and two anthologies devoted to some Russian composers, to some of the most representative French composers.

The package of 10 LPs is sold at a price of 15.500 Italian Liras (\$25) and, of course, it received wonderful acceptance this Christmas.

Among the latest singles issued by EMI Italiana is the new disc of Richard Anthony containing "Sunny" b/w "Che Sbaglio Fai." "Sunny" has been also released by EMI Italiana by Cher.

We also have to mention a new single by the successful English duo David & Jonathan containing "Lovers Of The World Unity" "Innamorati Unitevi" and "Speak Her Name" ("Non Dite Il Nome").

A new Italian group has been recently pacted by Phonogram. The group "I Meteors" made their debut on the Italian musical scene accompanying the top talent of Gianni Morandi and has just recorded their first single: "Vi Sembra Giusto" and "Incontro Al Sol."

RCA Italiana has started a strong promotional campaign on a new English group: the Motowns. The first single contains two Italian titles "Prendi La Chitarra E Va" ("Take The Guitar And Go") c/w "Per Quanto Io Ci Provi" ("As Many Times I Will Try").

An Italian group is introduced by Ariston Records called "I Ragazzi Del Sole" (the Sun's Boys) and their first single includes "Atto Di Forza N. 10" b/w "So Che Tu Non Credi" (Italian version of "Something You Got Baby"). Ariston is strongly promoting this disc which is already obtaining quite good reaction on the market.

On the publishing side, Ariston is really enjoying the great success of "Bang Bang." There is presently a total of 12 Italian recordings, four of them listed among the first 15 best-selling discs.

Among the top selling LPs of the moment in Italy, we have to mention the new LP of the Rolling Stones just issued by Decca and including all the top hits of the group from "Satisfaction" to "Have You Seen Your Mother Baby Standing In The Shadow."

Decca's best selling single is the Rolling Stones' "High Tide And Green Grass."

Adamo is always one of the best-selling artists of EMI Italiana. His latest single containing "Se Mai"—after 15 days from the date of release—is already listed among the 15 best-selling singles in our market.

Fonit-Cetra is strongly promoting two new young talents. First one of them is Gianni Pettenati who is already obtaining a strong success thanks to his recording of "Bandiera Gialla" ("Yellow Flag") published by Curci. He has just recorded his second single including "Il Superuomo" ("Sunshine Superman") and "Puoi Farmi Piangere" ("I Put A Spell On You").

The second young discovery is Marisa Sannia. The songstress has just recorded her second single—"Una Cartolina."

The title of the TV show in which Marisa Sannia took part was "Chez Nous." Stage manager of the show was Enzo Trapani. Star guest was Francoise Hardy (SAAR) together with two other SAAR artists, Michel Polnareff and Antoine, all originally grooving for Vogue in Paris. Marisa Sannia presented the new title "Dai."

The Gurus will be introduced in Italy by Cemed Carosello. The first single of the group, originally grooving for United Artists, has been released this week by the record associated Curci's firm. The titles chosen are "Blue Snow Night" and "Come Girl."

The name of Mina still remains among the top protagonists on the Italian music scene. The latest success of the songstress is "Come Tu Vuoi," penned by Bruno Canfora and published by Curci. The recording released by RiFi is also serving as leitmotiv of the pop radio program entitled "Gran Varieta'."

"Dommage Dommage"—whose Italian translation is "Peccato" is the "A" side of the new single recorded by songstress Gigliola Cinquetti which CGD is strongly promoting for the Autumn/Winter season. The song has been introduced by Gigliola via the top TV show "Scala Reale."

In Italy, "Winchester Cathedral" is a success under the original version of the New Vaudeville Band, released by Phonogram under the Fontana label. Popular radio broadcaster Adtiano Mazzoletti of "Disc Jockey Hit Parade" has this recording at second place. As a consequence, Gianni Ravera, San Remo Festival organizer, has invited the group to perform at San Remo. The group will appear on Italian TV this month.

Other Phonogram artists who are supposed to appear in San Remo are Orietta Berti, Herve' Vilard, the Four Seasons, and Roy Black.

ARGENTINA

The Argentine Institute of Public Opinion has just considered Fermata's "Fourteen With Tango Music" the most publicized record of the year, according to a press comment from this label. Ben Molar's project has been widely discussed in magazines, radio and TV, and reaction of the public has been very favorable up to now.

CBS organized a party at the Embassy Club celebrating the end of the year and inviting people from the press and trade to the gathering. Juan Truden, who managed the company 'till 1965 and is currently working for CBS in Central and North America, was also present. Truden will spend some days in Buenos Aires, returning afterwards to Mexico.

Diskorn, the label managed by Julio Korn Publishers, is planning a big expansion campaign for 1967 which will include several educational records and other types of records. The label has prepared an album recorded at a kindergarten with a special lesson and the actual voices of the boys and girls attending it and is working on further projects of this sort.

RCA is releasing the two songs recorded recently by Palito Ortega in Italian: "Se Ti Accorgerai" and "Mai," as well as the album cut by Juan Ramon in Rome, both in Spanish and Italian, and another EP by this artist with versions of "Winchester Cathedral," "Gina" and "Esqueça," the Brazilian hit. The new album by Palito, "Un Muchacho Como Yo," is also available, as well as an album by hit duet Barbara & Dick with some of the latest International hits.

Coincidentally with Caterina Caselli's visit, Music Hall released an album by this artist, under the "Casco De Oro" title. The deck contains Caterina's latest hits like "Paint It Black" and "L'Uomo D'Oro" and, of course, her "Nessuno Me Puoi Giudicare." Also coming from MH is a Musart album by Chilo Moran, cut in Mexico, "Jamaica Ska" and a folk album cut locally by Rodolfo Zapata, and still one more by melodic trio Los Nocturnos.

H y R Records report the outing of new records by Chicote Magliano, devoted to regional music, folk artist Hedgar di Fulvio, folk group Carlos Aban and Bolivian artists Raul Quiroga and the Oruro Boys. There are also two Brazilian albums, under the Equipe series, recorded by Juarez Sant'ana and several other artists in that country.

Microfon has added a new version of Chilean hit "Solitario," this time by folk artist Julio Martin Olivera, recently inked by Kaminsky's label. There is also an album by Brazilian group Sambossa Cinco, recorded for Som-Maior in that country, and an LP by Eric Dolphy for the Prestige banner.

The Belter label is releasing an EP cut by French artist Patrick Jacques, currently living in Spain. There will be also an album and an EP by Paraguayan group Los Tres Sudamericanos, currently in Europa, which has recently received an award for "three continuous years of success" in Spain.

More about Fermata: since Sacha Distel is coming very soon, the diskery has started a special promo campaign in behalf of this artist stressed particularly on his album "Remembering Songs." Also under work is the first album by the Troggs. On the publishing side, Dino Alvarado (CBS) has cut "Este Pequeño Amor," while Los Manakenses, a lso for CBS, cut "Nana," Juan D'Arienzo, for RCA, waxed "Bailate Este Tango, Ricardo," while Jose Basso, on Odeon, cut "En Que Esquina Te Encuentro, Buenos Aires."

Jorge Closas, public relations man of Iberia Airlines in this area, is strongly engaged in the production of records with Spanish and pop music carrying of course the name of the company. Recently Microfon marketed an album tagged "Flying around the World" with a nice view of Iberia's jets, and now there will be an RCA album with popular Spanish songs arranged by Horacio Malvicino which is expected with interest.

Surco is releasing a series of Vox albums carrying classical music at budget prices, about 595 pesos (\$2.45). The first selection includes albums with works by Scarlatti, Gabrielli, Mozart, Chopin, Haydn and others. There is also an EP by Astor Piazzolla, and an album by Francoise Hardy, along with the second LP by Antoine and Les Problemes.

CBS has released an album by Bobby Solo with evergreen songs, reportedly with good success. An album by Bob Dylan is being prepared, and there are new singles by the Cuarteto Imperial, Leo Dan, Pancho Purcell, the Cyrkle and others.

The fine vocalists have racked up top popularity in Germany for years, and now the Polydor artists are making it on an international level with Kapp records doing the pushing. It's a great start for German product in the new year.

The teenage magazine "Bravo" with over 100,000 issues a week in print listed their top hits for "66." "Monday, Monday" by the Mamas & the Papas lead off the list followed by "Yesterday Man" from Chris Andrews, "Ganz In Weiss (All In White)" by Roy Black, "Sloop John B" by the Beach Boys and "Super Girl" by Graham Bonney. Sixth place went to "Barbara Ann" by the Beach Boys followed by "Yellow Submarine" by the Beatles, "Paperback Writer" by the Beatles, "To Whom It Concerns" by Chris Andrews and "Michelle" once again by the Beatles.

Top artists per hit parade were the Beatles, Roy Black, the Rolling Stones, Dave Dee, Dozy, Beaky, Mick & Tich and Chris Andrews.

Star composer-singer Udo Jurgens is set for two TV specials for 1967, and Caterina Valente will do four shows in the coming season. Michael Pflieger will do the direction for the shows.

A report from the record firms found that 74 records have reached the 1/2 million mark in sales since 1945 and 36 LP's have reached the 100,000 mark in sales. Only 15 of the singles hits were foreign records. Instrumentals took the 1/2 million prize 10 times in the singles sector, and Freddy Quinn leads the list with 9 singles and three LP's making the magic list.

LP-wise, 9 classical records made the 100,000 mark with the leader of all the LP's being the German version of "My Fair Lady" on Philips which sold over 1/2 million LP's. The German film soundtrack of the same show on CBS also moved over 100,000 LP's. Eight foreign LP's made the magic circle.

American Dave Hildinger took over the RIAS radio Dance Orchestra in Berlin. Former leader was Werner Muller who is now working in Cologne with the radio orchestra there.

Metronome records reports that the appearance of Mireille Mathieu in TV has brought a storm of sales to the young lass and her records. Gunter Gayer from Hans Sikorski Music is hard pushing "No Milk Today" from Herman's Hermits and the Four Kings in Germany and "Sunny" in its many English versions and a German goodie from Monika Marleen on CBS.

Esther & Abi Ofarim of Philips fame have given 10,000 DM (\$2,500) to the fund for physically disabled children. That's it for this week in Germany.

Among new jazz discs, "Popular Duke Ellington" on Victor, "Peggy Lee and Benny Goodman" on Columbia, "Miles Davis Story" on CBS, Wes Montgomery, "Easy Groove," and "Our Mann Flute" on Pacific Jazz.

In the folk section: "Encyclopedia Of American Folk Songs" on Electrola (and 2 LP sets, one with traditional folk and the other modern folk), "East Virginia" by Brothers Four on CBS, "Highwaymen" on CBS, "Ian & Sylvia" on Vanguard, and "Odetta; Folk Golden Album" on Victor.

Editorial

Saga of the Worthless Location Contract or The Wrong Name in the Right Space

Picture the tension of a Sunday afternoon as two professional football teams, having fought long and hard all afternoon to a tie, face off in the last few minutes of the last quarter. The ball is hiked, the quarterback is blitzed, the ball is loose, hands open and close greedily to recover the fumble. Out of the midst of a heaving, grunting mountain of humanity emerges the offensive linebacker—ball cramped to his chest and running like mad for the uprights. The crowd's going wild . . . he's across! Across the wrong goal line.

What might this analogy have to do with location contracts? Simple. Of recent weeks, MONY's Teddy Blatt (New York City's operator association attorney) has cited several instances where operators have gone into court to settle an arbitration matter with a location owner, only to learn the contract was originally signed by the location's bartender or some other party totally disconnected with legal title to the particular tavern or luncheonette. The outcome is obvious—the operator loses.

Says Blatt: "MONY's Installation Contract is the evolution of years of court battles, arbitration hassels and all other kinds of legal nit-picking. The contract we now offer our members is as perfect as possible for protecting the operator's interests. The horror comes after the arduous loan-bonus gambit is finally solved, the parties get down to signing and instead of securing the signature of the actual location owner, the operator unwittingly signs up the bartender or some other paid employee. If the real owner or owners ever desire to terminate the agreement, it wouldn't take long before their lawyers spotted the wrong signature on the contract and go to work."

To make a location contract valid, the operator must secure the signature of the owner of record or an officer of the location's corporation. "There are very few blanks to be filled in," Blatt declares, "in order to make the contract as simple and error-free as possible. If the operator doesn't know the real owner's name for one reason or another, he need only look at the liquor license hanging in the window and he'll learn it in a second."

The lesson here is principally directed at MONY members but obviously applies to all operators who utilize a location contract. To use one is to use one correctly or not at all. The principle behind the contract is sound but to drop the ball in the last quarter is to destroy time and dollars spent which today's operator can ill afford.

Approximately thirty-five guests, including operators and their wives and friends of the Bilotta family, accepted John's hurried telephone invitation and "a wonderful evening was enjoyed by all."

A Report From London

Rose to Stage AECOM Show Jan. 24-26

LONDON—Jack D. Rose, organizer of the Amusement Equipment and Coin Operated Machine Exhibition which has taken place at the Winter Gardens, Blackpool, in November and December for the past five years, will be staging the 1967 show at the same venue from 24th January thru 26th January.

Thus the Northern show will be taking over the dates previously chosen by the A.T.A. for their London exhibition. Rose reports a record response from manufacturers, distributors and operators and already the list of exhibitors numbers over 70.

This includes a large number of

'swag' merchants who, owing to the pre-Xmas rush of business were absent from the recent London A.T.A. Rose also reports that many major British manufacturers will be exhibiting at Blackpool for the first time. He predicts that there will be a considerable amount of new equipment on show which was not ready in time for the London exhibition in November and December.

With the announcement that as from 1968 the A.T.A. plans to revert to the January timing at Alexandra Palace everything points to a battle developing between the North and the South in the years ahead.

Seeburg Raises Glow-Logo in Chicago



CHICAGO—If you see a bright red glow this evening on the horizon on Chicago's Near North Side, it's not a fire. It's just the new sign that spells out S-E-E-B-U-R-G on top of that corporation's new \$6,000,000 plant at 1500 North Dayton Street.

The sign, just placed in operation, faces in a southeastern direction toward Chicago's downtown loop area, and can be seen for 34 miles, according to the White Way Sign Company, erectors of the sign.

They report the letter "S" in the sign is the largest single letter in any sign in the city of Chicago. It is 28 feet high. The entire display is 186 feet in length and is formed to the logotype of The Seeburg Corporation. The new building under the sign contains over 360,000 square feet on three floors and some 2,000 people are employed in the plant turning out a

variety of vending machines, background music systems and coin operated phonographs. The sign weighs 11 tons and contains 3,600 feet of neon tubing.

The building, the first new multi-story plant to be built in Chicago in over 15 years, also houses the firm's corporate headquarters and staff as well as its International Division from which its international activities are directed. The firm was founded in 1902 and made parts for pianos. This led to the development of pianos and organs and then automatic pianos that led the firm into the manufacture of coin-operated phonographs. Since the firm became a public corporation in 1958, it has diversified greatly. It has facilities in Tennessee and Connecticut that make vending machines.





NEW YORK—When Rowe AMI premiered its 'Music Merchant' phonograph last fall, it simultaneously unleashed a three-pronged promotional program designed to persuade location customers themselves to play more music.

Based upon the theory that a juke box play is an "impulse purchase," Rowe's Fred Pollak and Joe Barton advised their distributors that any phonograph will earn additional coins for the operator if it's made to "sit

an optional 15 to 30 minutes of "dead time."

Buchen Advertising's Charles Harrington, who's spearheading the 'Play-Me' program for Rowe, told Cash Box last week: "Fred Pollak came up with the Play-Me idea. He's had experience in merchandising and thought that direct appeals to the location customer by recording artists would punch up the plays and the coins. It's a novel idea and it's working. When we first went out to test locations and tried the Play-Me's, we watched people looking around trying to find the voice, saw it coming from the juke box and went over to check it out. Once there, they put some coins in and played some music. In a great sense, the Play-Me persuaded the customer to make an 'impulse purchase'.

"I think entertainment is as indispensable as soap and the process of selling it in mechanical form—the juke box—should be much the same.

"It's an all-around benefit," says Harrington. "The Play-Me promotes juke box play, the artist, very often his current record and always his record company. I've written most of the scripts for these records and they all include reference to the singer's label. It's a mutual handshake."

Harrington initially contacted the trade press to find out where performers could be located, read the newspapers to find out who was in town and then went after them with a script and a tape recorder.

"It must come as a shock to some

up, shine out and literally tell the customer to come on over and play the machine."

According to Barton, this on location merchandising program consists of: 1. the Change-A-Scene front panel to enable the operator to alter the appearance of the unit and give his juke box that "new look" as often as he wants; 2. the dollar bill acceptor, and 3. perhaps the most unique facet of the scheme—the 'Play-Me' promotional record.

The 'Play-Me' record is a seven inch disk, pressed on red plastic for quick identification, featuring the voice and song of prominent recording artists who "invite" the location customer to "come on over and play the juke."

Usually two to a machine, the 'Play-Me's' are automatically triggered by the Music Merchant after

You can talk about a machine's advantages in style or performance or sound and of course that's important; that's the product. But to go after the audience itself is to nudge the man with the dollar bill in his pocket or a fistfull of dimes."

The average Play-Me opens with eight to sixteen bars of the particular artist's current record or evergreen hit (Tony Bennet's 'The Shadow of Your Smile', Andy Williams' 'Moon River') followed by a few words asking the customer to come over and play their latest tune or any of the other "great recordings" on the machine.

guy sitting at the bar sipping his beer to hear Boots Randolph yelling out of nowhere: Hey! Get over here and play this juke box. Boots is a wild one. We recorded him in a hotel room at the MOA Convention between rehearsals for the banquet show. We taped Lainie Kazan out there, too. She had broken her hand in an accident the day before but was very good about helping us. Matter of fact, most all the recording artists and labels we contact are extremely excited about the idea—the only difficulty comes in nailing the artist down when he's in town for a few minutes time. Pet Clark was playing the Copa. We went over there and taped her between shows. She'd been doing eight a week but she's a pro all the way. She read the script cold and it came out sounding like a love letter. She did two takes, both perfect."

After Harrington makes the tapes, he sends them to a sound studio for mixing and pressing. "We're trying to cover all aspects of popular music, from Wilson Pickett to Sonny James, country to big band, rock and roll, ballads, the works. It's a fun project and it's an added push for the juke box," he said.

Harrington recalls the taping of Chad and Jeremy. "We had a script prepared but they wanted to wing it. They're both very sharp, very witty. We just let the tape run and let them cut up. They did several takes and we all cracked up when the tapes were played back. I think they are one of the most successful Play-Me's—relaxed, campy, surprising. That's the way they should be."
