

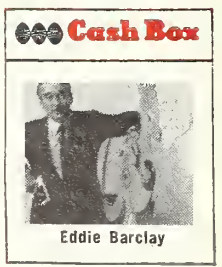

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Education & Entertainment

The record industry is going to move center-stage in playing a key role in the nation's crucial commitment to uplift the standards of education on all levels of instruction. The challenge to the business will be a rewarding one, from the standpoints of demanding the most of imagination and creativity and, in turn, providing for its continued well-being.

What is the nature of this challenge? It lies in the sphere of audio-visual aids. This may take the form of solely audio tools to instruct or—and here is a fascinating endeavor—the combination of audio and visual devices.

We are well aware that throughout the educational system of the United States the classroom and school library processes are implemented by the use of existing catalogs of music and the spoken-word. This is well and good. But, on the horizon is a vast new area of product expressly designed for educational needs. This development has been underscored by the recent establishment of ties between English Decca's Argo Sight & Sound division and the McGraw-Hill Book Co., which will handle the distribution of Argo's extensive collection of music and spoken-word recordings. The arrangement, however, will not stop at what Argo presently has on hand. Argo is about to undertake a program whereby it will merge audio works with film or slide presentations. This will entail the production of new aids from the ground-up, with audio presentations naturally designed to complement their visual counterparts (see story in this issue).

A vital factor in favor of record companies supplying such tools is their very resources in terms of artists. With built-in acceptance, performers can be

a decided asset in putting over audio-visual instruction. (Also, an important roster of talent can lead to the extension of record label activities into the feature-film and/or documentary fields without necessarily aiming for the educational market).

Certainly such an undertaking requires the recruitment of manpower in an artistic, creative and administrative sense. The result, of course, involves investment by companies that recognize that the youth-market is not merely one that buys Top 40 sounds, but must be sold a bill-of-goods in the nation's classrooms as well.

But, then the establishment of audio-visual techniques by record companies can go far beyond the classroom. The trade should be aware that audio-visual products may soon find their place in the home. The Columbia Broadcasting System plans to have by 1970 a home unit capable of playing audio-visual cartridges through an ordinary TV set. RCA is said to be working on home-entertainment projects along similar lines.

What the record industry creates in the form of audio-visual aids for educational use can fall under the category of entertainment. This entertainment-that-educates can certainly expand the classroom into the home. Entertainment-for-entertainment's-sake is also a logical step in the audio-visual field for home use.

In aligning itself with the visual arts medium, the record business is making a bid to keep up with the times, both in instances of social action and cultural fulfillment. For a business that thrives on excitement, the world of education is starting the record industry on a road to exciting prospects of things-to-come.

Argo's Audio-Visual Distrib Deal Will Segue Label Into Film Arena

NEW YORK—The arrangement whereby McGraw-Hill Book Co. will distribute Argo Sight & Sound product from English Decca (London Records in the U.S.) will go far beyond the existing catalog of Argo and other specialty line product.

The deal, earmarked essentially to the nation's 18,000 high school libraries, was reported in the Nov. 18 issue of Cash Box. Formal announcement came on Friday, Nov. 17, via a luncheon at McGraw-Hill's New York headquarters, where Sir Edward Lewis, chairman of the board of English Decca, Harold McGraw, exec vp of the textbook company, launched the tie-in with expressions of mutual benefits accruing to both firms.

Film Productions

While the current line of Argo product and other music and spoken word albums are now available in card-indexed library pre-packs of 300 albums each, forthcoming is a series of motion-picture and film-strip audio-aids, according to Leo Hofberg, general manager of Argo Sight & Sound in the U.S. Running from 15 to 52 minutes each, the audio-visual aids will be completely new productions, from both audio and visual standpoints, Hofberg said. Six such presentations are expected to be completed next year. These and others will include excerpts from operas, Elizabethan dramas and other items culled from literature and the humanities. London will recruit, Hofberg added, experts in each area covered to act as consultants on the projects.

Howard Hosbach, head of McGraw-Hill's dealer sales, said that the current line available will also be channeled through bookstores, including the Doubleday chain, university shops. Hosbach noted that the entire Argo line would be channeled through computer systems for speedy processing of inventories. He holds that the book and record fields share "almost identical selling tools" and marketing problems. Sales in small units are a common-ground, Hosbach adds.

Recognizing the theft and wear-and-tear possibilities inherent in library browser-box concept, plans are to replace damaged and stolen albums at cost.

Both Hofberg and Hosbach regard the Argo-McGraw-Hill arrangement as a pioneering effort in the use of records through library systems. The deal runs for three years, with options to continue after this period. Arrangement covers the United States and Canada.

Other Lines

In addition to the Argo line of music, poetry, and drama and literature, McGraw-Hill will handle the following lines: Editions De L'Oiseau-Lyre (England), music from the baroque period, Telefunken's Das Alte Werk music series, Historic series (both from Germany), Societe Francaise Du Son, music from France. Also, Argo Sight & Sound's first film, "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner," narrated by Richard Burton, will be distributed by McGraw-Hill.

Who are the Who? Top 40 disk buyers know the answer. The Who is a best-selling English group whose disks are distributed in the U.S. thru Decca Records. The Who is now in this country for a series of concert dates which has included the Hollywood Bowl, the Cow Palace in San Francisco and the Village Theatre in New York.

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GAC Opens Major Drive For Recording Talent

NEW YORK—GAC, a leading booking agency, has begun a strongly increased drive in the record end of the industry with major expansion moves in its record department. Heading the enlarged division is Mike Slobin, a 5-year veteran of the agency field, who joined GAC last week.

Two main goals were expressed in this campaign: closing the gap between record companies and agencies in the promotion and booking of acts, offering new and established talent the agency's facility for negotiating recording and booking agreements.

In working with the companies, GAC is opening a broader coverage in promotion through coordination with promo departments at record firms. This will enable an artist to be given increased saturation with regard to cooperative plugs for engagements, material and releases. GAC would also be able to offer new or established names to labels which would best suit the talents.

Benefits to performers include greater placement potential for either appearance bookings or recording con-

Atlantic Sale To WB-7 Arts Signed

NEW YORK—The sale of Atlantic Records to Warner Bros.-7 Arts has been finalized. Deal was consummated last week, according to Elliot Hyman and Benjamin Kalmenson, chairman and president of WB-7 Arts, respectively, and Ahmet Ertogun, president of Atlantic.

As announced on Oct 18, WB-7 Arts will acquire Atlantic through cash and WB-7 Arts stock, the total of which could reach \$17 million. Atlantic expects sales (net of return) to hit \$20 million for its fiscal year ending Dec. 31.

Atlantic becomes an independent subsidiary of WB-7 Arts, retaining its present management, personnel, distributors, licensees, artists, etc.

Elvis' Xmas Greetings To Reach Over 3000 Radio Outlets In Dec.

NEW YORK—Christmas greetings from Elvis Presley will emanate from 3,000 radio stations around the country on Dec. 3, and 10, said to be the largest saturation ever for an artist or perhaps any individual on radio.

The program, a complete half-hour radio special, highlights selections from Presley's RCA Victor Christmas Album and his two sacred albums, "His Hand in Mine" and "How Great Thou Art." Presley's Christmas single, "If Every Day Was Like Christmas," will also be featured on the program.

Millions to be Reached

Over 100 of the stations running the program are 50,000 watts. With some 1,200 cities, towns, and villages within the coverage area, the program blankets the U.S., reaching an audience of many millions at the height of the Christmas shopping season.

The Christmas program was devised by Col. Tom Parker, who also created the successful Elvis Palm Sunday Radio Show, which resulted in a large demand at record stores for the merchandise featured, according to RCA.

The Elvis radio special also includes a spot announcement for Christmas Seals given by Dale Robertson. In addition, one minute has been left at the end of the program for local public-service announcements.

RCA Promo Kit

RCA's support of the saturation program includes a special kit to aid the radio station in preparing the program. The kit includes the following: a 7½ IPS tape of the complete program plus a complete script with timings, and a separate copy of Elvis' Christmas single, "If Every Day Was Like Christmas." Also being mailed

under separate cover for store use are two, four color one-sheet posters (50" x 32") depicting Presley's Christmas and sacred product, and an ad mat has been prepared for local tie-ins by dealers and radio stations.

In order to assure the widest possible exposure for the Elvis Presley Christmas "Radio Special," full page trade ads will appear in Cash Box, Billboard, Record World, Variety, Daily Variety, Hollywood Reporter, and Independent Film Journal. Consumer coverage includes a full-page ad in Grit and other leading publications. To assure maximum coordination among all those participating in the promo, Col. Parker's office has mailed more than 20,000 copies of a booklet containing a complete list of the radio stations carrying the show to record dealers, RCA distributors, fieldmen and salesmen, as well as radio stations.

Ad Agency Role

Colonel Parker engaged the Ken Clanton Advertising Agency of Tampa, Fla., to service the entire project. As part of the Agency's overall participation in the program, it has prepared a special promotion package which is being sent to radio stations carrying the program for their use. It includes a complete Elvis Presley record catalog, as well as his Stereo 8 catalog, 100 Elvis Presley 1967 Christmas cards, 50 1968 Elvis Presley calendars, and a package of Christmas Seals. A grand total of 500,000 handbills showing Elvis' Christmas and sacred product is being sent to those stations carrying the program.

See Marginal Effect On Disk Sales In Britain's Pound Devaluation

NEW YORK—The devaluation of the British pound, received in the world of finance with a it's-not-as-bad-as-all-that stance, is expected to have only marginal effects on the English disk market. According to reports received from London, there might be lower sales. But, due to existing licensing deals, British record manufacturers do not seem overly concerned about the devaluation, which brought the British pound down from a dollar equivalent

of \$2.80 to \$2.40.

It was also pointed out that British talent with dollar deals for appearances in America would benefit from the devaluation. A spokesman for an American label with strong ties with the British market said that high price or low price for British goods, the company would still have to compete in the American market, and prices would reflect the competitive situation in the U.S., not financial maneuvers outside of the country.

Sam & Dave Strike Gold

NEW YORK—Sam & Dave's Stax recording of "Soul Man" has been certified as a million seller by the Record Industry Association of America (RIAA), marking the first certified gold record for the duo. Their new Stax album "Soul Men" was released a few weeks ago.

It's 'Rudolph's' 19th Birthday;

Disk Sales Hit 51 Million Copies

NEW YORK—A quartet of pop Yuletide standards, including 19-year-old "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer," is up for renewed promotion by Johnny Marks, composer and head of St. Nicholas Music.

In addition to "Rudolph," first introduced in 1949, there are "I Heard the Bells On Christmas Day," "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" and "A Holly Jolly Christmas." "Rudolph" and "Jolly" will be heard in the fourth annual presentation of the Burl Ives-starring "Rudolph" spectacular over NBC-TV on Dec. 8, presented by General Electric.

Meanwhile, Marks offers a statistical rundown of each of the song's success pattern:

Since 1949 "Rudolph" has sold over 51 million records in America, 24 million abroad and over 3,900,000 copies of sheet music. It was first recorded in 1949 by Gene Autry. His record sold over 6 million and is the all-time best seller of Columbia records. There have been more than 350 records of the song and it has been published in 115 different arrangements, which have

sold over 5 million copies. There are 15 new recordings this year. It has been successful abroad, with the television spectacular running in various countries.

"I Heard The Bells on Christmas Day" was first recorded by Bing Crosby on Decca Records in 1956, followed by 30 other artists, including Harry Belafonte, Frank Sinatra and this year Ed Ames. Over 4,000,000 records have been sold thus far, Marks reports.

"Rockin' Around The Christmas Tree" became a top hit in 1960 as recorded by Brenda Lee for Decca.

"A Holly Jolly Christmas" was a hit for Burl Ives on Decca in 1963 and has become another annual success.

Marks has written the music for the GE commercials for the past three years. One of his commercials won the Gold Medal Award of the 1967 International Film & TV Festival in New York.

The TV Special "Ballad of Smokey The Bear," with the score by Marks, which was in the Nielsen top 10 last year, will run again in May of 1968.

LHI Offers 1st Dates Under New ABC Tie-In

NEW YORK—The LHI label's first releases under its new distrib arrangement with ABC Records are on the market. They are "Does Anybody Know" by A Handful and "Angel of the Morning" by Danny Michaels. Lee Hazlewood, head of LHI, was in New York last week for conferences with Larry Newton, president of ABC, and other company execs, including Dave Berger, vp in charge of international arrangements. Hazlewood also met with Sir Edward Lewis, chairman of the board of English Decca, which handles the line in England.

Music Sales Acquires Folk-Directed Oak Music

NEW YORK—Music Sales continues its string of acquisitions in the music publishing area with the purchase of Oak Music, folk-oriented firm.

Music Sales, a published and distributor of music books and methods, has made such recent purchases as the Dorsey Bros., Burke-VanHeusen and Embassy publishing outfits.

Under the Oak deal, Irwin Silber, one of the partners in the firm (with Moses Asch), will continue to produce Oak publications for the next five years. Oak was formed five years ago and has produced some 150 titles, many hard cover items sold through its own distribution in book stores. That distrib system will be maintained. Among the composers represented in Oak are Pete Seeger and Tom Paxton.

Other Music Sales firms include Consolidated Music, Amseo Music, and Passantino Brands Music.

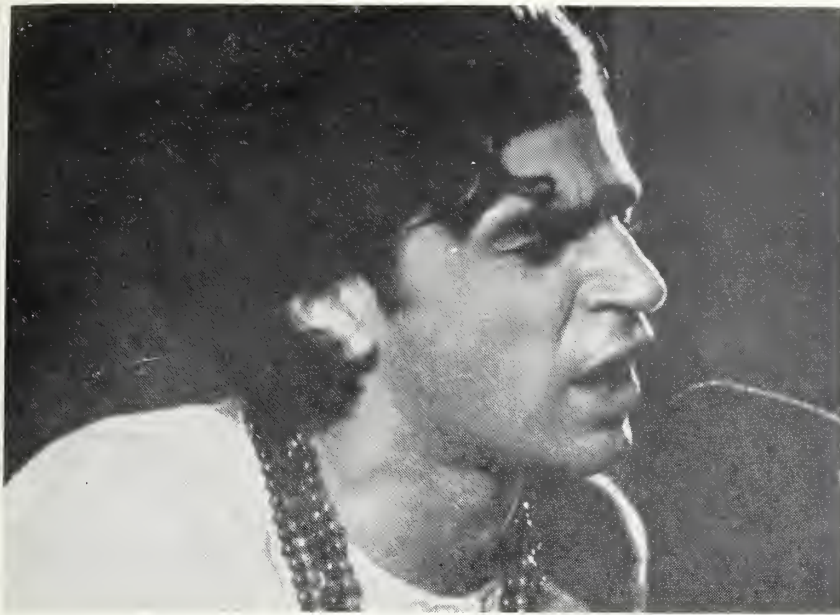

Rascals' Disk Made Timely

NEW YORK — The Young Rascals' new single, "It's Wonderful," on Atlantic Records, has been designed for the convenience of those radio stations with a tight time schedule and are unable to play the complete record.

The single is divided into two bands (linked by a spiral) on the same side of the disk. The first band, subtitled "music," contains the complete song and runs two minutes 30 seconds. Second band, subtitled "sound effects," contains psychedelic musical sounds and runs 50 seconds. It's been devised so that stations with tight schedules can fade out after the first band is over.

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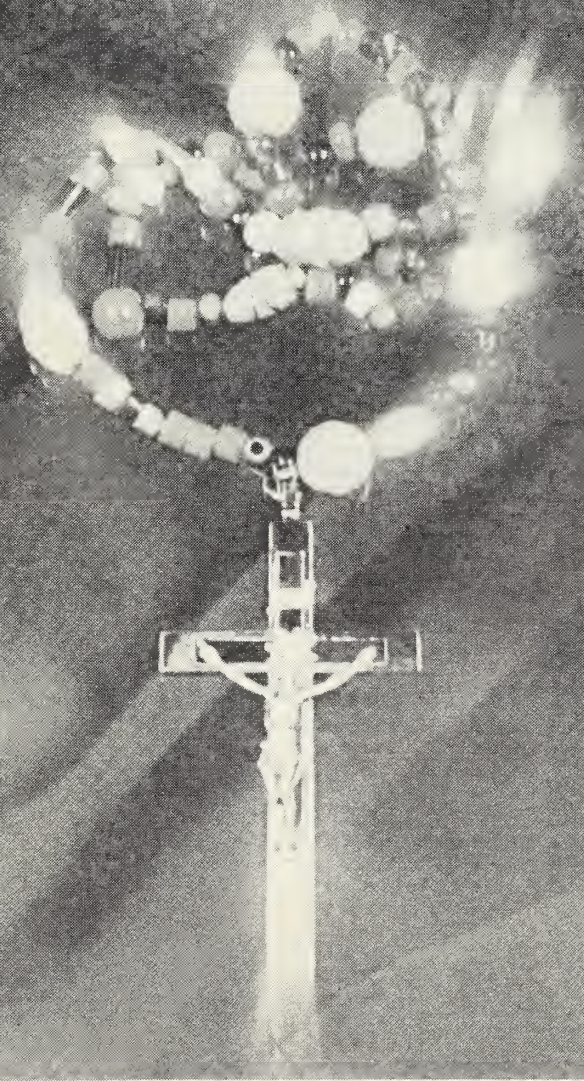
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Picks of the Week

ARETHA FRANKLIN (Atlantic 2464)
Chain of Fools (2:45) [14th Hour, Pronto, BMI-Covay]

Aretha Franklin picks up the pace on her latest offering, relying more strongly on her gospel background for heavy rhythmic push, and an overwhelming vocal impact. The side is a change-of-recent-pace side, getting her out of the style that produced her last blockbusters, and gives her a smashing entry that will top both blues and pop charts shortly. Flip: "Prove It" (2:58) [14th Hour, Pronto, BMI-Evretts, Ott] Another bombshell, much in the vein of recent Franklin goldies. Could have both ends riding high.

YOUNG RASCALS (Atlantic 2463)
It's Wonderful (Music 2:30, Effects :50) [Slacsar, BMI-Cavaliere, Bri-gati]

Lyrical simplicity of "Groovin'" and "How Can I Be Sure" is retained by the Rascals in their latest serving, but a slight trace of electronic gadgetry is used for the first time by the team on "It's Wonderful." Still basically an unaffected bit of combo sound, the main track is a lively expression of youthful joy and optimism. The second part of the side is a 50-second romp of happy-sounding, party-style effects. Big step forward on this new monster side. Flip: "Of Course" (2:40) [Same credits.]

DOORS (Elektra 45624)
Love Me Two Times (2:37) [Nipper, BMI-Doors]

Solid Chicago blues with a punch all its own marks something of a letup for the Doors, but maintains the kind of power that has driven them high up the charts with their last two top-ten outings. Rock pace that builds through the vocal thrusts of lead Jim Morrison, and excellent instrumental sections. Should break loose. Flip: "Moonlight Drive" (2:16) [Same credits.]

MÁMAS & PAPAS (Dunhill 4113)
Dancing Bear (3:07) [Wingate, ASCAP-Phillips]

Thudding folk rhythmic line puts a solid teen appeal in this excellent single taken from one of the quartet's early LP's. Simplicity in the lyrical outlook is somewhat reminiscent of "Puff, the Magic Dragon," and the sales potential is just as shattering. Sparkling jaunt that is bound to grab a big chunk of the sales action. Flip: "John's Music Box" (1:00) [Same credits.]

JAMES BROWN (King 6144)
I Can't Stand Myself (When You Touch Me) (3:25) [Taccoa, Soil, BMI-Brown]

Few performers have quite as potent a mystique as James Brown, and the enchanter of the soul set could double up with himself as a result of this fiery vocal side following his instrumental offering of last week. Smoother than usual in his new "I Can't Stand Myself," Brown works up a controlled frenzy in a terrific number aimed at pop, r&b and dance fans. Flip: "There Was A Time" (3:35) [Golo, BMI-Brown, Hobgood]

LULU (Epic 10260)
Best of Both Worlds (3:00) [Dick James, BMI-Black, London]

Although well known for her performances of up-tempo material, Lulu caught the American public's eye with her number 1 ballad "To Sir With Love," and is likely to stay on top via this new soft side packed with power from a solid vocal showing. New lovely side is from the "Sir" cleffers, and shows up the same sweet strength to continue Lulu's hit line. Flip: "Love Loves to Love Love" (2:07) [Blackwood, BMI-Levitt, Thomas]

DAVE CLARK FIVE (Epic 10265)
Everybody Knows (2:15) [Francis, Day & Hunter, ASCAP-Reed, Mason]

Attractive ballad material served up in the pop manner by the Dave Clark Five on "Everybody Knows" has become a British monster and is now forced into release here. The haunting melody and splendid vocal strength of this session will put the quintet high on the American scene again. Expect heavy sales. Flip: "Concentration Baby" [Branston, BMI-Clark, Smith]

GARY LEWIS (Liberty 56011)
Has She Got the Nicest Eyes (2:15) [Chardon, BMI-Titleman, George]

Nobody would have predicted a side like this from Gary Lewis, who steps into a new bag which blends traces of funk out of the blues and much of the while-back Beatles sound into a memorable session that should have him climbing the best seller lists once again. Snappy beat, fine vocals and a production that shines all go a long way in making this a heavy-action side. Flip: "Happiness" (2:28) [Chardon, BMI-Lehrman, Perles]

JEFFERSON AIRPLANE (RCA Victor 9389)
Watch Her Ride (3:11) [Jefferson Airplane, BMI-Kantner]

Hard rock beat with a backup centering on electrified workouts from lead guitar should put attention squarely in focus on the contemporarily lyrical "Watch Her Ride," the latest in a continuing hit string from the Jefferson Airplane. Grand imagery, fine vocals and a touch of Slick make this a top item. Flip: "Martha" (3:21) [Same credits] is a softer session which could pick up lots of airplay itself.

BILL WYMAN (London 907)
In Another Land (2:48) [Gideon, BMI-Wyman]

Stones bass guitarist Bill Wyman steps out on a solo session with his own first composition offering a trip further into the electrical-kaleidoscopic realm visited by the Rolling Stones in their last "We Love You" single. Vocal reverberation, use of thudding rhythmic and a good melody make the Wyman solo a side that should take off. Closing snores show the title's "land" as Nod to avoid acid comments. Flip: "The Lantern" (4:24) [Gideon, BMI-Jagger, Richard]

Picks of the Week

ED AMES (RCA Victor 9400)
Who Will Answer? (3:42) [Sunbury, ASCAP-Davis, Aute]

Cram the most significant questions about present world situations into a compressed recording, add the major trains of thought from hawk to hippie, and note events that point up the confused state of man; weave all these into a plaintive, church-chant melodic line, present them through the brilliant voice of Ed Ames and the result is "Who Will Answer?" This is one of the most powerful emotional expressions to be released in single form. A shattering statement which will be much requested particularly as a pre-Christmas plea. Flip: "My Love Is Gone From Me" (2:12) [Pavanne, ASCAP-Stanford, Badale, Paslidas]

AL WILSON (Soul City 761)
Do What You Gotta Do (3:20) [Johnny Rivers, BMI-Webb]

An impressive debut put Al Wilson into pop spotlights across the country, even that powerful side takes a backseat to the stunning blockbuster that makes up his new single, "Do What You Gotta Do." The deck is an easy-moving bluesy ballad with all the power and appeal needed to put it in high in the chart picture. Flip: "Now I Know What Love Is" (3:07) [Johnny Rivers BMI-Hutch] Detroitism item that could have r&b deejays flipping for both ends.

LESLEY GORE (Mercury 72759)
Magic Colors (2:29) [Screen Gems, Columbia, BMI-Sedaka]

Vocal strength saves Lesley Gore from getting lost in the orchestral splendor of her new "Magic Colors" side, and achieves a balance which will gain tremendously over her last hit outing. Spectacular side with excellent material and a fine production in a hefty rouser that should set the teen market buzzing. Flip: "It's A Happening World" (2:34) [Screen Gems, Columbia, BMI-Mann, Weil]

TOMMY BOYCE & BOBBY HART (A&M 893)
I Wonder What She's Doing Tonight? (2:38) [Screen Gems-Columbia, BMI-Boyce, Hart]

Two solid hits behind them and a big album too, Boyce and Hart bounce back with a deck that could easily prove their biggest to date in "I Wonder What She's Doing Tonight?" Big beat in the up-tempo manner couples the fine vocal stylings of the pair with a powerful production effort to turn out a top drawer dance side which will take teen ears by storm. Flip: "The Ambushers" (2:12) [Screen Gems-Columbia, BMI-Montenegro, Baker]

JOHNNY MATHIS (Columbia 44357)
Among the First to Know (2:53) [Picturetone Music, BMI-Fred Haber]

Mathis, master of the caressive ballad, reverses field in this rhythmic run at the top 40 market. A hard folk-rock backdrop, arranged and produced by Bob Mersey, marks his most magnetic single entry in eons. Voice-over to a non-conforming "cop-out" love lyric are added departures. P.D. and music library acceptance should be instantaneous. Flip: "Long Winter Nights" (2:35) [Green Light Music, BMI-Allen, Dante]

JIMI HENDRIX (Reprise 0641)
Foxy Lady (3:15) [Sea Lark, Yameta, BMI-Hendrix]

Following up his big reception for "Purple Haze," Jim Hendrix should find little trouble in climbing higher onto the pop and r&b scene with this funky deck loaded with punching rhythm for dancers, soul for listeners and an overall funk for the rock or blues fanciers. Watch for breakout action on "Foxy Lady." Flip: "Hey Joe" (3:23) [Third Story, BMI-Roberts]

PLATTERS (Musicor 1288)
How Beautiful Our Love Is [Catalogue, BMI-Wylie, Hester]

Touchees of the classical and a beautiful group-chorale styled backdrop make this potent ballad a solid item for across-the-board spinning over pop, good music and blues stations. One of the finest Platters recordings and a return to the team's well-remembered past, the side should take wing. Flip: "Love Must Go On" [Catalogue, BMI-Dixon, Ram] is an up-tempo bluesy rock lid with striking rhythm section and another shattering vocal showing. Could turn the deck into a two-sider.

FIFTH ESTATE (Jubilee 5607)
Morning, Morning (2:30) [Goodness & Truth, BMI-Wadhams, Askew]

Up tempo rock side with some fascinating workouts on guitar, and a very fine production job make for a big prospect from the hot Fifth Estate. Already widely known for their updatings of oldies, the team should gain an even bigger audience through this new outing that crams teen flavored beat and lyrics into a big outing. Flip: "Tomorrow Is My Turn" (2:37) [Same credits]

ARTIE KORNFELD CIRCUS (Bell 697)
The Rain, The Park And Other Things (2:41) [Akbestal, Luvlin, BMI-Kornfeld, Duboff]

Although the Cowsills have topped the field with their best selling vocal version, Artie Kornfeld's brassy orchestral reading is strong enough to make deejays wonder if "The Rain, The Park And Other Things" wasn't meant to be an instrumental smash too. Excellent drive on the sparkling new view could set this rendering for a big showing. Flip: "The Lonely Mermaid" (2:46) [Trajames, Gibran, ASCAP-Wisner]

WILLIAM BELL (Stax 237)
Everyday Will Be Like A Holiday (2:35) [East, BMI-Bell, Jones]

Basic small group blues combo puts icing on this r&b cake, which could open up the sales gun with special emphasis on the "holiday" lyric, but pick up added impact following the Christmas programming scramble. Lively slow speed side with an especially good workout from William Bell, who has a grand showcase on the middle-speed flip: "Ain't Got No Girl" (2:30) [East, BMI-Cropper, Hayes, Porter, Bell] which could steal much of the r&b spotlight.



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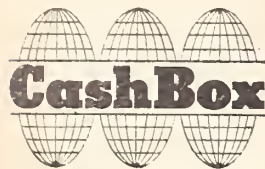
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Pick of the Week

STEVE LAWRENCE (Calendar 1001)
I've Gotta Be Me (2:52) [Damila, ASCAP-Marks]

The Broadway production of "Golden Rainbow" provides Steve Lawrence with excellent material for his debut with the new Calendar label. Stirring orchestral touches and the fine vocal sound of Lawrence make this a side that should gain ground in good music channels and make the single one that will see plenty of coin-op activity. Flip: "Life's A Gamble" (2:18) [Same credits]

Newcomer Picks

SCANDAL (Pepper 432)
There's Reasons Why (2:20) [Hat, Caliputania, BMI-Renfro, Smith]

Pretty snap to the mid-speed offering marking the initial release from Pepper Records indicates that the diskery has its sights set on the teen market, and should well hit the mark. Mamas & Papas-ygroup vocalizing and an outstanding production job make the deck a strong entry for pop perusal. Should see breakout activity. Flip: "Girl, You're Goin' Out'a My Mind" (2:25) [Same credits.] Pepper Records, P.O. Box 4006 Crosstown Sta., 47 S. Florence St., Memphis

CHICAGO LOOP (Mercury 72755)
Saved (2:20) [Pendulum, Ultimate Happiness, BMI-Adpt: Slawson]

First impression on this outing is that the tremendous rock beat is solid enough to set it in sales motion; second thought is that the lyrics are potent enough to catch hold of the listeners across the r&b and pop front; and a spoof use of Salvation Army band sounds gives the extra impact to carry the deck high on the chart listings. Fantastic session. Flip: "Can't Find the Words" (2:20) [Same pubs, BMI-Welch, Frias]

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE (Mr. G 804)
Morning Glory Man (2:25) [Andros, BMI-Durr]

Scintillating orchestral touches and a splendid vocal verve from the Declaration of Independence go a long way with this ambling soft-rock side. The team should attract considerable attention via a polished debut deck that has sound strength to put it high in the hit running. Mild dance beat, excellent production and pretty material set the stage for breakout action. No flip info available.

Newcomer Picks

LONG ISLAND SOUND (Dynovoice 903)
One, Two, Three And I Fell (2:05) [Patricia, BMI-Gentry, Cordell, Calvert]

Catchy bass line on the up-tempo teaser makes this side an effort that should excite a big reaction with teen fans for this team. The lid is a hard driving set of up-tempo fireworks that explode with enough impact to start a sales snowball. Flip: "Skid Row" (3:40) [Patricia, BMI-Gentry, Cordell]

CARE PACKAGE (Jubilee 5599)
The World Of Thursday Morning (2:29) [Tash, BMI-Howard, Kirin, Hoffman]

Right from the beginning, this deck takes off on a crashing rock level and drives along with no letup. Solid intro, powerful femme lead and a hard-hitting dance tempo gives the side enough luster to guarantee a bright future for the team and a bombshell reaction for the side. Flip: "To Discover" (2:48) [Tash, BMI-Godfrey]

IMPROPER BOSTONIANS (Coral 62543)
Gee, I'm Gonna Miss You (2:58) [Little Guy, BMI-Walsh, Ahearn]

Extremely lovely melody, delivered in a folk-orked backdrop, features the pretty vocal stylings of the Improper Bostonians in a hit-bound side that could follow the trends set by Association outings. Softie with smooth appeal for both pop and middle-of-the-road spinning. Deserves exposure and careful attention. Flip: "Victim of Environment" (2:41) [Little Guy, BMI-Walsh]

Christmas Picks

EDDY ARNOLD (RCA Victor 9387)
Jolly Old Saint Nicholas (2:15) [Traditional]

Easy listening vocal version of the traditional ballad from Eddy Arnold is slanted for multi-market response. Beautiful treatment with a sparkling vocal and light piano and guitar backdrop. Excellent seasonal spinning session. Flip: "This World of Ours (Cette Nutt La)" (2:40) [Northern, ASCAP-DeBout, Colpet, Harrison]

JOE TEX (Dial 4068)
I'll Make Every Day Christmas (3:28) [Tree, BMI-Tex]

Using the unusual power to put soul into his voice without ever raising the volume level, Joe Tex pours enough heart into his holiday outing to put it high in the running for Yuletide exposure in pop and r&b areas. Slow, easily building side with a beautiful loving message and tremendous vocal effort make for a Christmas hit. Flip: "Don't Give Up" (3:04) [Tree, BMI-Tex]

Christmas Picks

JOY STRINGS (Epic 10259)
O Little Town of Bethlehem (3:31) [Mech. Copy Prot. Soc.-Arr: Joy Strings]

Imaginative effort makes this Christmas outing one that could easily snag the pop spotlight. Using arrangements from "The House of the Rising Sun," the Joy Strings, an English Salvation Army group weave a most appealing mood about the traditional tune which could put it in competition with pop songs for Christmas spinning time. Flip: "We Three Kings of Orient Are" (2:28) [Same credits]

ROGER MILLER (Smash 2130)
Old Toy Trains (2:00) [Tree, BMI-Miller]

Unusual viewpoints, delightful imagery and a quaint melodic line from Roger Miller mark a strong Christmas entry which will both entertain children and amuse adults. The lovely side is one that should become a favorite with spinners seeking a change-of-pace seasonal suited to pop-good-and c&w programming. Flip: "Silent Night" (1:55) [Rogean, BMI-Williams]

JUSTIN WILSON "SMOKEY" JIMMY SAUNDERS
(Tower 380) (Jingalette)

Whitey the Snow White Lamb (2:30) [Valeta, ASCAP-Barry, Candullo]
Two versions of this interesting side for kiddie entertainment could give Rudolph a bit of stiff competition this year. The light-hearted handlings of both readings are likely to see action, Wilson's aimed at country fans, and Saunders for the popsters. Either could corner both markets.

Best Bets

JESSE JAMES (20th Century Fox 6700)

Thank You Darlin' (2:30) [Je-Ma, BMI-Mason, de Santos, James] Another fine blues outing from Jesse James, this one an outgoing lover's chant with some Latin ork bounce and a fine vocal showcase. Should stir up considerable r&b attention. Flip: "Bring Back My Baby" (2:10) [Je-Ma, BMI-Heartsman]

CHI-LITES (Revue 11005)
Love Me (2:47) [Jalyne, BMI-Record, Davis] Funky ork background puts a powerful push into the high-aiming, possibly high hitting r&b track. The moderately paced deck is a standout from the vocal line and material is also a top selling factor. Flip: "Love Is Gone" (2:55) [Jalyne, BMI-Record, Sims]

AHMAD JAMAL (Cadet 5581)

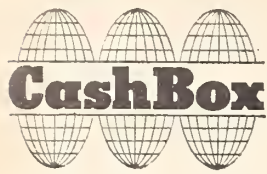

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Talent On Stage

Ray Charles

NEW YORK—It may be customary for acts to begin with a warm-up, but the Ray Charles Show '67 began instead at sizzling, and cooked its way well past red-hot before breaking all temperature gauges with a blazing finale that had the Copa thundering in response to "What'd I Say."

Foregoing the regular format of a three-act show, the Copa had instead the entire Ray Charles company in a three-part show which began with fantastic openers from Billy Preston followed by Raelets, and the master-craftsman of the blues solo and with the others.

Any one of the early acts could easily have been a show in itself, Preston turning on with a series of solid soul instrumentals on piano or organ, and a few vocal pieces that could gain him an inheritance of Ray Charles' throne. Alternating styles of Bach-Ramsey Lewis and modern blues, Preston performed "Somewhere" as never before, shifted into "Satisfaction" and blew the roof with a tremendous "Agent Double-O-Soul" breakout that had him working the audience into a frenzy.

Followed by the Raelets, nothing short of phenomenal could have topped

him, and that's just about what they did. The femme foursome worked out in red saris to numbers like "Hold On I'm Coming" and "Respect" drawing the best of the known versions and adding their own particular sound to the performance. By the time they left the stage, viewers were left tingling with both admiration and anticipation of Charles' entrance.

Introduced by Leslie Uggams as "the man who, when he does a song there's just nothing left to say," Ray Charles was received like a king arriving for coronation. He broke into things with a medium-paced instrumental and bounced back and forth from fast to slow, rousing to sentimental for an unforgettable hour of smashing entertainment and showmanship.

He spaced his performance beautifully, doing an instrumental here, a standard there, and hits everywhere. Reaching back nearly a decade there was "Hallelujah I Love Her So"; glimpsing today there was "Yesterday" and all along the line were songs like "Together Again," "I Can't Stop Loving You" and an ultra-slow "Georgia" that seemed almost a restless dream.

Electric Flag

NEW YORK—The Electric Flag, An American Music Band, waver fiercely on Wednesday night, November 22, at the Bitter End Cafe in Greenwich Village. The group builds up a solid wall of sound with an organ, two guitars, two saxophones, a trumpet, drums, and a conga drum.

The Electric Flag opened the program with a hard-driving, rhythmic rendition of "Up Tight," and played everything from hard rock to funky blues performing with infectious enthusiasm.

The Flag offered spirited presentations of "Sweet Talkin' Woman" and their new Columbia single, "Groovin' Is Easy."

The 8-man aggregate was particularly effective with "I've Been Lovin' You Too Long," a slow, emotional blues outing.

The band generates quite a good deal of excitement and demonstrates excellent musicianship. The Electric Flag should continue to wave happily and prosperously for a long time to come.

Bobby Darin

NEW YORK — The Saturday Night audience gave Bobby Darin a standing ovation at the Westbury Music Fair in Long Island, N.Y. and that was after having watched his back for a good portion of the evening. We're referring to the fact that the Music Fair is a theatre in the round and while a performer faces one third of the house at any given moment, two thirds see his side or his back.

But Bobby is such a loose and agile entertainer that one seldom felt he was missing any of his actions. He moved around the stage with his familiar hip and shoulder motions and delighted the sold-out house for more than an hour. During "Born Free" it was great to see his poise and confidence come through once again, as he leaned into the fifth or sixth line of the song, some loose paint and/or dust peeled off of the domed ceiling and floated down onto his head and in front of his face. Without breaking the beat he looked up and said, "What'cha doin' that for, I'm singin' your song."

But the rest of the evening was made up of his songs. "Mack the Knife," "If I Were A Carpenter" sung

with a blue spotlight was warm and touching. His big production presentation of "Drown in My Own Tears," was about a 5 to 7 minute number, built beautifully and was exciting every step of the way. He kidded with the front rows, told them how flipped his was over Leslie Bricusse's "Dr. Dolittle" score, sang a ballad from the flick and pleased everyone with his finger snapping rendition of "Talk to the Animals" from that same movie. From here he segued into his excellent impersonations beginning with the way Rex Harrison would do the number then flitting to James Cagney, Cary Grant, Tony Bennett, Dean Martin etc.

He even played guitar a bit on a swivel stool with the portable mike hooked up to the seat of the stool. And he concluded the show with some great fun audience participation stuff as he sang "Respect".

Darin is a pro in every sense of the word. He's always in control always exciting, and constantly fun.

The Roger Kellaway Orchestra accompanied and BD followed a good comedy routine by Nipsey Russell.

Arthur Prysock

NEW YORK—Appearing too large a man to be a romantic stylist, and commanding a voice too large to seem soft, magic is the only power that could be credited with Arthur Prysock's ability to become the melancholy, proud or pleading lover so convincingly. He looks and sounds like a football hero, but sings like the embodiment of a figure from mythology.

Just back from a tour of Canada, and now appearing at the Living Room, the Verve artist fits the decor and mood of the nightspot as though he was a missing piece of the club's jigsaw puzzle. He blends his voice into the darkness with material like "Stella By Starlight" or "Let It Be Me" and

touches the very soul of listeners with his spectacular reading of "Are You Ready for a Laugh."

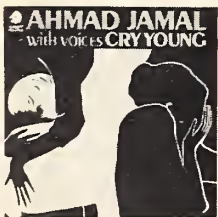
Just as perfect as his personal dramatic showing was the manner in which the act was assembled. Alternating soft material with mild swing versions of standards, Prysock maintained the aura of romance without falling into the trap of becoming dull or maudlin. He spiced sentimental tunes with lively readings of "Hello Young Lovers" and "You Always Hurt the One You Love" but stepped into a softer character between them, showing himself a flawless dramatic figure in attaining the character of either rejected, admiring or cajoling lover.

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

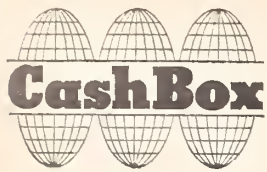

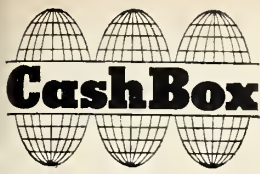

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Columbia Opens 'Hall Of Fame' To Yesteryear's Golden Disk Sounds

NEW YORK—Drawing on its extensive archives of recorded pop, jazz, film, vaudeville and Broadway music, Columbia Records has created a "Hall Of Fame" LP series.

The "Hall of Fame" series provides in LP form recordings that have been enjoyed only by owners of the original 78-r.p.m. disks, as well as previously unissued material, recapturing for today's collectors the sounds of the past.

The initial release features two single LP's, "Lunceford Special" with Jimmie Lunceford and His Orchestra, and "Ethel Merman (1932-35), Lyda Roberti (1934) and Mae West (1933)"; a two-record set, "Bing Crosby in Hollywood (1930-34)" and a three-record set, "The Essential Frank Sinatra." These releases present examples of each artist's recordings from the Columbia archives.

The Producers

The debut Hall of Fame albums were produced by two archivists and music historians, Miles Kreuger and Frank Driggs. Miles Kreuger, who is responsible for the Bing Crosby and the Merman/West/Roberti LP's, was formerly a member of Columbia's A&R staff and assisted in the production of several original cast albums. He is now under contract to Columbia Records especially for this series. He is equipped with a knowledge of the history of motion pictures, theatre and vaudeville and has written many articles on these subjects. He is currently at work on a volume of the American musical theatre to be published by Hill and Wang.

Frank Driggs is also a writer, but he is most noted for his work with jazz artists. He has produced many jazz LP's for Columbia's Archive series. His initial "Hall of Fame" albums are "Lunceford Special" and "The Essential Frank Sinatra."

The Sound

In preparing these albums, the producers utilized an exclusive piece of equipment developed by Columbia's engineering staff that revitalizes the sound on the original disks. The result is a recording that possesses a wider frequency range, provides greater clarity and microphone presence to voices and instruments that might otherwise have suffered losses in re-recording, and is much freer of surface noise than the original.

Crosby Film Songs

The Bing Crosby LP set contains, without exception, every motion picture recording Crosby made commercially from his screen debut in "The King of Jazz" in 1930, as one of Paul Whiteman's Rhythm Boys, to his starring performance in "She Loves Me Not" in 1934. The additional repertoire is taken from "The Big Broadcast" (1932), "College Humor" (1933), "Too Much Harmony" (1933), "Going Hollywood" (1933) and "We're Not Dressing" (1934), and includes the crooner's hit recordings of "Love in Bloom," "Temptation" and "Please." The cover, reminiscent of the era, features a caricature of

Crosby by cartoonist Al Kilgore, as well as numerous stills from the films. Additional photographs are included on the inside spread and back of the jacket, along with liner notes by Kreuger.

Merman, West & Roberti

The Merman/West/Roberti LP is comprised of 100 per cent of the Merman/West/Roberti recordings in the Columbia archives. Anticipating the question, "What do these three ladies have in common that links their recordings under one cover?," Kreuger explains in his liner notes: "To begin with, each is a singing comedienne with a trunkful of stage, screen and vaudeville credits. Each played the Palace and reached the pinnacle of fame within a two-year period of the others. But more important, each is blessed with a personality unlike any other performer, before or since. There are other belters, but only one Merman; other sex-bombs, but only one Mae West; other sprightly platinum blondes, but only one Lyda Roberti!" Among the songs included are Ethel Merman's "The Lady in Red," "It's the Animal in Me" and "An Earful of Music"; Mae West's "A Guy What Takes His Time," "I'm No Angel" and "I Want You—I Need You," as well as Lyda Roberti's "College Rhythm" and "Take a Number From One to Ten."

'Essential Sinatra'

The deluxe boxed set "The Essential Frank Sinatra" contains on three LP's the forty-eight recordings from Sinatra's first thirteen years in show business. These form an anthology of his early career from his first recording with the Harry James band in July 1939 to his last session at Columbia in September of 1952. The songs trace Sinatra's growth as a performer from a shy rendition of "From the Bottom of My Heart" to the mature, in-command styling of "Why Try to Change Me Now." Thirty-five of these selections are available for the first time in LP form. Included in the package is a 12-page illustrated booklet with an article by George T. Simon that documents the story of Sinatra's early days.

'Lunceford Special'

The "Lunceford Special" LP, the first jazz entry in the Hall of Fame series, features the Jimmie Lunceford Orchestra and the talents of soloists Trummy Young, Willie Smith, Joe Thomas and Snooky Young. The Lunceford band rates with those of Duke Ellington and Count Basie as one of the great bands of the 30's and 40's. Featured on the album are sixteen selections including the band's biggest hits, "Cheatin' on Me" and "Uptown Blues," and two previously unissued recordings made in 1933. The detailed liner notes were written by Stanley Dance.

CashBox Sure Shots

Completing the "Broadway Musical" package is Monmouth-Evergreen's "The Legendary Libby Holman," showcasing Broadway's great lady of the Dietz-Schwartz-Youmans heyday, newly recorded in her torch songs, blues and ballads.

The three albums comprising the label's "Big Band" holiday package retail at \$10. These are "Twelve Isham Jones Evergreens," with the Rusty Dedrick orchestra offering a dozen standards by composer-bandleader Jones; "Snowfall—A Memory Of Claude," tunes by the Claude Thornhill band, many previously unissued; and "Jazz Journey," a musical romp with trumpeter Dedrick and a ten-man band including Urbie Green, Don Landon and Teddy Charles.

Compass Buys 2 Masters

NEW YORK — Compass Records has just bought two new masters, "Trespassin'," by the Ohio Players, and "Miss Julie's School For Proper Girls," by the Tapestry.

Compass promo chief Buzz Willis, completed the deal for "Trespassin'" last week with Johnny Brantley of Vidalia Productions, producer of the master.

"Miss Julie's School For Proper Girls" is the second Compass disk by the Tapestry. Earlier this year the label released the group's waxing of "Carnaby Street."

Compass Records is currently represented on the Top 100 by lark Helena Ferguson's recording of "Where Is The Party."

RCA's Reply To Ames Disk: Big Promo

NEW YORK—Victor Records is so convinced that the new Ed Ames single, "Who Will Answer?" will become one of the biggest and one of the most discussed records of the year that when the disk was shipped to distributors on Friday, Nov. 24, the label began utilizing every medium of exposure and every means of promotion to insure the success of the recording.

Ames introduced "Who Will Answer?" on Carson's "Tonight" TV'er on Thanksgiving Day. The song deals with such subjects as nuclear war, apathy, religious discontent and "the underlying confusion of today's generation."

"Who Will Answer?" was penned by Spanish composer L. E. Aute. New English lyrics to the song have been written by Sheila Davis. Originally

known as "Aleluya No. 1," the song was a No. 1 hit in Spain last spring and was enthusiastically received in other Spanish-speaking countries.

Eddie Dean of Sunbury Music, the song's publisher, originally brought "Who Will Answer?" to Jim Fogle-song, Ed Ames' A&R man at the close of a recording session. Dean played the Spanish instrumental version and recited Sheila Davis' lyrics. When Ames heard the song, he immediately wanted to record it, and he did, about two weeks ago, at RCA's Music Center of the World studios in Hollywood.

Perry Botkin, Jr. arranged "Who Will Answer?" for Ames, employing a Gregorian-type chant, Bach-like instrumentations and the sounds of today's hard rock to achieve his effects.

Here is a sample of Sheila Davis' lyrics: 'Neath the spreading mushroom tree/The World revolves in apathy/As overhead a row of specks roar on, drowned out by discotheques/And if a secret button's pressed/Because one man has been outguessed/Who will answer?"

RCA Victor sees in "Who will Answer?" Ed Ames' fourth disk success of 1967. "My Cup Runneth Over", "Time, Time", and "When The Snow Is On The Roses" have already made the charts for Ames this year.

Request Offering Int'l Christmas Album Series

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y. — As the holiday season approaches, Request Records, distributed by RCA Victor Records, is once again offering a series of Christmas albums from its international catalogue. Highlighting the series is "Christmas In The Ukraine," by the St. John's Ukrainian Catholic Church Choir under the direction of Michael Dobosch. Also included are: "Fröhliche Weihnachten," recorded by the 90 man Volkswagen Choir in German; "Wesole Boze Narodzenie," sung in Polish by the Polish St. Cecelia Choir of the Holy Rosary Church in Hadley, Massachusetts; and "Christmas in Lithuania," sung by the Ruta Choir, under the direction of Algirdas Kacanauskas (the only Lithuanian Christmas album on the market).

These albums, together with the recently-released 28 other Request albums of 11 different nationalities, have found a market not only among the Nationals of the respective countries, but also in schools, colleges, libraries and among collectors of authentic music from other countries.

BLOOMFIELD, Conn.—Company officials of the Kaman Corp. of Bloomfield, Conn., have disclosed that subject to approval of the board of directors and regulatory authorities, Kaman will acquire two of the largest musical supply distributorships in the far west. With necessary approvals, Kaman would take control of the Coast Wholesale Music Company of Los Angeles and the Coast Wholesale Music Company of San Francisco.

Firm spokesmen said Kaman will exchange shares of its recently authorized preferred stock for all the outstanding stock of the two coast organizations. Stock in both is privately held. The Kaman preferred will be convertible into Class A common stock of Kaman Corporation on a share-for-share basis. Kaman's Class A common is traded over the counter.

Stewart A. Bliss, Kaman's vice president for corporate development, described the acquisition as mutually advantageous to the three companies.

"The move greatly extends Kaman's capability and business in the music and entertainment fields in which the company established itself a year ago with the formation of its Ovation Instruments Division. Operations of the music organizations will result in important contributions to earnings for Kaman in future years," he said. Ovation in New Hartford, Conn., produces and markets acoustic and electric guitars, electric basses and amplifiers.

Bliss said the West Coast distributorships, in turn, "will be strengthened by becoming part of a large, well-diversified and growing company. Kaman's growth in the music field will provide increased service for the customers of Coast Wholesale and increased opportunity for their employees."

He described the Los Angeles and San Francisco firms as "about equal" in sales volume and employment; among the largest of their type in the Western United States, and having combined sales of over \$5-million annually. "They both carry a complete line of percussion, string, brass, reed and electronic music instruments, amplifiers and accessories. They were formed over 40 years ago and have been under present owner-managers for more than 20 years," he said.

Ida Cox Dies At 78

NEW YORK—Ida Cox, famed blues singer of the '20's and '30's, died of cancer on November 10 in a hospital in Knoxville, Tennessee. She was 78.

Miss Cox was born in Cedartown, Georgia. Her first experiences with show business came when, at the age of 14, she ran away with a traveling minstrel show called "The Black and Tan." During her long career, she performed with such artists as Jelly Roll Morton and Louis Armstrong. She recorded for Paramount from 1923, accompanied by Lovie Austin (piano) and her own back-up group, the Blues Serenaders.

She had her own touring tent show in the South during the 1930's, and in 1939, she performed at the Carnegie Hall concert, "From Spirituals To Swing." That concert reputedly launched the boogie-woogie.

Miss Cox also cut for Vocalion-Okeh, offering such numbers as "Rampart Street, New Orleans" and "Moaning, Groaning Blues." In 1961 she waxed "Blues For Rampart Street" for the Riverside label. The disk, her first in more than twenty years, met with high critical acclaim.

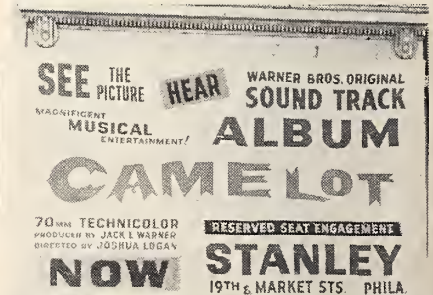
Manor Bows Biblical LP As First Album Release

Clyde is expected to leave New York shortly to report for rehearsals on "Black Comedy," which is scheduled for a seven-week run in Chicago and an eight-week run in San Francisco prior to its March 25 opening in Los Angeles at the Huntington Hartford. His commitment in the touring company is for six months.

Mounted Finds New Horizons

NEW YORK—Mounted Records, at 888 8th Ave. here in NY, has just inked the New Horizons, a vocal group consisting of two girls and four boys. First single, due for immediate release, carries "Turned On Christmas This Year" on the A side. Date was produced by Sandy Yellen and Glenn Moore. Billy Ver Planck wrote the arrangement for the side, and for three others that were recorded at the same session. B side of the New Horizons' first Mounted single is "And I Never Intended To Love You So Much."

Universal Goes Computer

CHICAGO—As a part of its current expansion program, Universal Recording of Chicago has computerized its bookings, accounting, inventory, payroll, etc. The main computer was so heavy that it had to be hoisted by crane through a second story window.

Blackwood's Hill Makes 'Total-Electronic' Disk

NEW YORK—"The Electronic Insides And Metal Complexion That Make Up Herr Doktor Krieg" is the title of a "total-electronic pop music single which Blackwood Music writer John Hill has written, arranged and produced for 20th Century-Fox Records. Artists on the disk are the Riders of the Mark.

Hill produced the completely electronic sound on this record by altering vocal and instrumental sounds through a process of tape manipulation. His technique utilizes synthesizers and amplifiers.

In producing the record, a satiric, anti-war song, Hill recorded normal vocal and instrumental sounds and refined them into a series of totally electronic sounds. His process involved over 60 hours of taping, reduced to a little over two minutes of play on the record.

As a graduate student in composition, Hill versed in the electronic innovations of composers such as Karlheinz Stockhausen and Henri Pousseur, and he recognized these innovations as translatable to the pop idiom. Hill, however, considers himself basically a pop musician. He has written and produced several pop recordings.

Centaur-Sear Link Forces

NEW YORK—Robert Margouleff, president of Centaur Film Productions and its affiliates, last week disclosed that his firms had become sales representative for Sear Electronic Music Center and Rangertone Electronics.

The future association, according to Margouleff, will "make readily available an entire line of high-quality, professional sound equipment including tape decks, film dubber-recorders and film synchronizers and resolver and high-speed digital film counters." The outfits are also developing new equipment and going into complete studio design.

Expanding its studio facilities, Centaur-Sear Electronics Music Center has installed a Moog Synthesizer, an electronic music device which makes a wide range of sound available through one integrated unit.

Domino & Bartholomew Back Together on Disks

NEW YORK—One of the most successful teams in the history of the recording industry, singer-songwriter-pianist Fats Domino and arranger-producer Dave Bartholomew, has been reunited on their own, newly-formed label, with exclusive world distribution by Dover Records.

Domino boasts more million-selling single records (17 on the Imperial label, 1 on King) than any artists except Elvis Presley (20) and Bing Crosby (20, counting his co-efforts—one each—with the Andrew Sisters, Son Gary, Grace Kelley and Fred Waring). Bartholomew was Domino's arranger and producer all the way through Domino's hit period, which spanned almost the entire 1950's. Domino wrote most of his own hits.

Back together on disks, Domino and Bartholomew hope to repeat their former success.

Scinlaro Handling Donuts

NEW YORK—Frankie Scinlaro has just assumed the management reins for the Donuts, a group that formed a few months ago and has been attracting attention in New Jersey.

The Donuts are booked for a month at the Action House on Long Island in December. In January, the Donuts make their New York debut with a two week stint at Ungano's Discotheque.

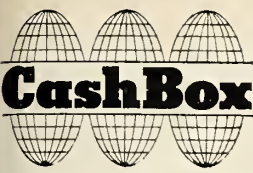

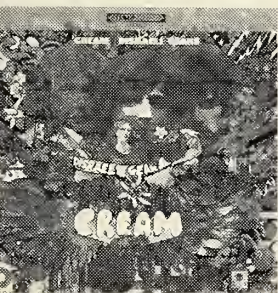
THE ESSENTIAL FRANK SINATRA—Columbia S3L 42/S3S 842

I-FEEL-LIKE-I'M-FIXIN'-TO-DIE—Country Joe & Fish—Vanguard VRS 9266/VSD 79266

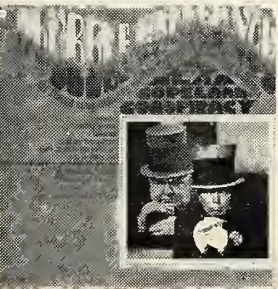

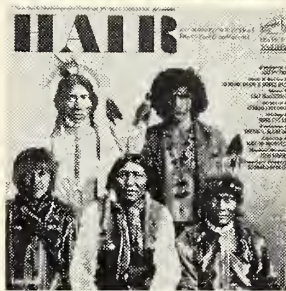
A BUBBLE CALLED YOU—Alan Copeland Conspiracy—ABC ABC/ABCS 617

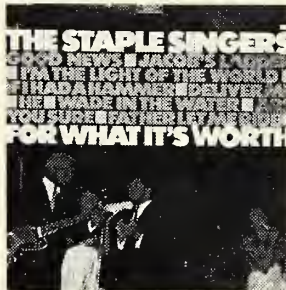
A BEACON FROM MARS—Kaleidoscope—Epic LN 24333/BN 26333

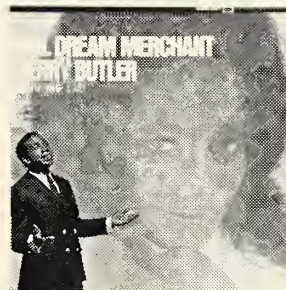
HAIR—Original Cast Recording—RCA Victor LOC/LSO 1143

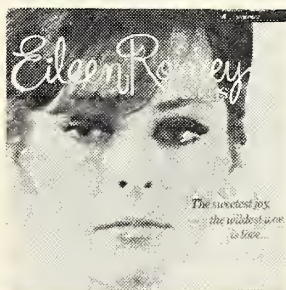
FOR WHAT IT'S WORTH—Staple Singers—Epic LN 24332/BN 26332

This set might well establish Eileen Romey as a powerful disk attraction.



THE MYSTIC ASTROLOGIC CRYSTAL BAND—Carole CAR 8001

The Mystic Astrologic Crystal Band, featuring Steve Hoffman, serves up a group of easygoing rock efforts. Included on the LP are "Factory Endeavour," "Flowers Never Cry," "Geometry Alley," and "Publicly Inclined (To Blow Her Mind)." The group performs with style and spirit, and the disk could go a long way.



THE PENTHOUSE—Original Soundtrack—United Artists UAL 4170/UAS 5170

This original soundtrack of "The Penthouse" flick with music composed, arranged, and conducted by John Hawksworth and lyrics by Hal Shaper should do very well in the market place, riding on the popularity of the film. Lisa Shane's vocal treatment of "The World Is Full Of Lonely Men" is a standout.

Masterworks Markets Largest Release Of 20th Century Classical LP's In History

NEW YORK—Columbia Records' Masterworks division has just marketed a release consisting of seventeen albums devoted entirely to 20th century classical music. The ten Masterworks and seven economy-line Odyssey LP's (Odyssey is a subsidiary label of Masterworks) constitute the largest such release in the history of the recording industry.

Dubbed "Music Of Our Time," the release makes available to the classical record buyer a vast and comprehensive cross-section of 20th century classical music. The selections on the "Music Of Our Time" albums range from the works of the fathers of modern music—Stravinsky, Schoenberg, Ives, Berg, Copeland and Webern—to compositions by some of today's leading innovators in electronic music, including Milton Babbitt, John Cage, Karlheinz Stockhausen and Henri Pousseur. The repertoire also features new music from Australia, Canada and Japan, as well as several premiere recordings of works composed especially for this release.

A Renaissance

Columbia's "Music Of Our Times" albums document a renaissance in classical music. The new movement in music, taking its direction from the pioneering efforts of such composers as Stravinsky, Schoenberg, Berg, and Ives, has resulted in a revolution in contemporary composition. Composers are introducing new sounds from new sources, including an assortment of electronic instruments, ring modulators, computers and synthesizers. These new instruments have taken some modern music away from the concert hall and into the electronic studio. A number of contemporary composers are creating music specifically for the stereo phonograph. Thus, by recording many of the highlights of the revolution in classical music, Columbia Records, via its studios, producers, engineers, etc., is also helping to make the revolution happen.

A special single record has been prepared to introduce the "Music Of Our Time" release to dealers. The disk is a sampling of the repertoire of the new-music recordings with narration by John McClure, Columbia Masterworks' A&R director.

The ten new Columbia Masterworks "Music Of Our Time" albums include: Schoenberg: Concerto For Piano And Orchestra, Op. 42/Concerto For Violin And Orchestra, Op. 36," with Glenn Gould (piano), Israel Baker (violin), and the CBC Symphony Orchestra, Robert Craft, conductor; "Berg: Lulu Suite/Schoenberg: Theme And Variations, Op. 43B/Webern: Im Sommerwind—Three Pieces For Orchestra," by the Philadelphia Orchestra, Eugene Ormandy, conductor; "New Electronic Music From The Leaders Of The Avant-Garde," which includes John Cage's 'Variations II,' with David Tudor at the piano, Milton Babbitt's 'Emsembles For Synthesizer,' and Henri Pousseur's 'Trois visages de Liege'; and "Bernstein Conducts Music Of Our Time, Vol. 2," which includes Lukas Foss' 'Phorion,' Edison Denisov's 'Crescendo e Diminuendo,' and Gunther Schuller's 'Triplum,' all performed by the New York Philharmonic, Leonard Bernstein, conductor.

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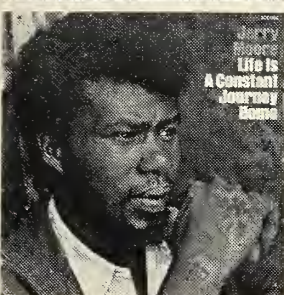

LIFE IS A CONSTANT JOURNEY HOME—Jerry Moore—ESP 1061

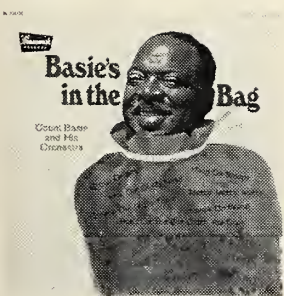

DELIGHTFULEE—Lee Morgan—Blue Note BLP 4243/84243

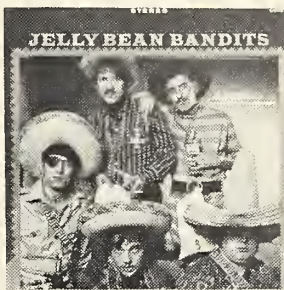

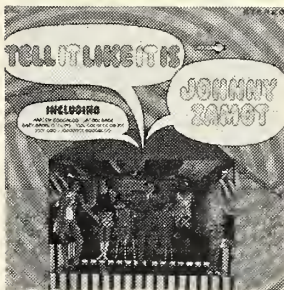
JANACEK: THE MAKROPULOS CASE—Prague National Theatre—Epic L2C 6067/B2C 167

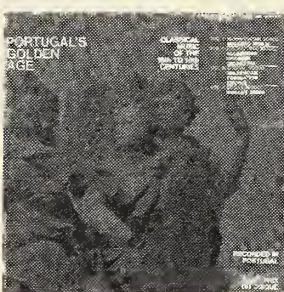
A NEW CONCEPTION—Sam Rivers—Blue Note BLP 4249/84249

Excellent performance.

Faith Numbers Spur Christmas Seal Drive

NEW YORK—Two Percy Faith numbers are being used as themes for the National Tuberculosis Association's 1967 Christmas Seal Campaign. Columbia Records has provided the Association with a special single record on which Faith conducts his orchestra and chorus in a rendition of his own composition, "Christmas Is," and an Irving Berlin tune, "Happy Holiday." Faith briefly introduces each selection on behalf of the Christmas Seal Campaign.

The record is being played on radio stations across the country to herald the annual appeal of the National Tuberculosis Association, launched November 14 and continuing through December 31.

The disk was distributed to stations in a colorful sleeve illustrated with the Christmas Seal in the traditional Christmas colors of red and green. A special Christmas Seal Song brochure, with backgrounds of the songs, the artist, and some suggestions for programming use, was sent with the record.

Both selections were taken from the Columbia album "Christmas Is," with Percy Faith, his Orchestra and chorus.

Word of the Epic Records star's trip was disclosed last week by the label's national promotion manager Fred Frank. She is scheduled to arrive Monday (27).

Coinciding with the trip, Epic is releasing Lulu's follow-up single, "Best of Both Worlds" from the composing team of Don Black and Mark London who wrote "To Sir With Love." Both songs are featured in Lulu's new LP.

Currently a leading recording star in England, Lulu appears regularly on the BBC-TV series "Three of a Kind" and recently appeared before Queen Elizabeth II in the November Royal Variety Performance.

WB Seeks To Spur LP Chart Winners Thru Strong Distrib Co-Op Program

NEW YORK—In order to accelerate the sales of 20 of its albums currently on the charts, Warner Bros.-7 Arts Records has entered into a co-op advertising program with its distributors. This special year-end promotional campaign is one of the most extensive dealer co-op programs in the company's history, and provides for a special advertising fund for albums purchased under it from now through the end of the year. All of the money allocated to dealers under the program, however, must be spent for in-store and local advertising of the approved list of albums. Mike Maitland, company president, believes the special advertising allowance will spur the company to reach the highest sales mark in its history. Label is currently 30% ahead of sales figures of last year at this time. Additionally, this special fund will also facilitate local dealers entering into co-op deals of their own with various large outlets such as major

department stores. 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CashBox Country Roundup

One of the unfortunate drawbacks to the fact of rapid growth in any area is that situation known as "growing pains." And country music, expanding as rapidly as it has been of late, is not without its share of these pains. One segment of the business where such expansion problems are especially noticeable is in the artists themselves.

Basically there are two types of artists—singers and performers—and there is most definitely a marked difference between the two. This diversification has been in existence for many, many years, but, what with the huge growth of country music in recent times, the situation has become far more evident—not only to music business people, but to the fans as well.

An artist who makes it big on records, but whose appearance in front of a 'live' audience is marked by an entire program of "just plain singing" earns the title of "singer," while an artist who can, in one manner or another, completely capture his audience by lending something more to his act is a "performer."

In most facets of the entertainment world, a manager will groom an act—be it a film actor or circus performer—in those details known as star qualities. However, the country music business is almost completely devoid of this sort of grooming. Very little, if any, attention is paid to an artist's 'live' performance—especially with the relatively new acts. It's quite conceivable that a manager is simply overburdened and cannot possibly devote the time necessary for such a project—but if a manager doesn't take the time to train an artist, who will?

It's true that a great deal of these so-called star qualities are inherent in an artist, but by and large that the most successful in-person acts are the result of a great deal of time, effort and planning. It's rare that they are accidental or simply unplanned. The world sees a Will Rogers very infrequently. Naturals do crop up occasionally, but the best of these are constantly seeking to improve themselves and their acts. There are reasons why an Eddy Arnold can shatter house records at what seems like every appearance. Why shows the likes of Buck Owens, Sonny James, Bill Anderson, Del Reeves, Ray Price, Johnny Cash and Judy Lynn can fill houses with the same fans time and time again. Why acts like the Merle Haggard, Judy Lynn, the Geezinslaw Brothers and Molly Bee, with no hit singles going for them, can delight 'live' audiences on the night club scene. Or why an infant in the business like Lynn Anderson comes on like gangbusters on stage. And why a handful of artists seem to get the majority of those network TV plums. There are other names who fall into this mold, but while the names are important, the reasons are more important. None of these acts or artists owes his success to accident. Many of them have devoted painstaking efforts toward creating something a little extra for the 'live' audience; and the efforts have paid off, in most cases, a hun-

dredfold.

But what of that other classification of artist—the "singer?" How many of these could be the superstars of tomorrow with the proper guidance? While they can assuredly make a nice living off the in-person circuit on the basis of their hit records, it seems that, without careful grooming, most of them will eventually hit a certain plateau of acceptance from which they many never grow any further in stature.



GOT A TIGER ON HIS TAIL—Eddie Briggs, who recently vacated his two-year post as Buck Owens promotion chief to take up a life of leisure as a KBBQ Country Gentleman, found recently that he couldn't get rid of the Tiger quite that easily. Just as Briggs assumed his new duties with the station, Buck popped up on the scene to check up on Smilin' Ed, offering a few programming pointers along the way, and was later joined by lovely Molly Bee, who also attempted to give Briggs some larnin'. Reports have it that, despite Briggs, Buck and Molly managed to salvage a small portion of the spinner's first effort at the station.

As a sort of post script to the above thesis, it's interesting to note that one of countrydom's top "performers," Sonny James, has just been signed up for another network TV shot. One of that select handful of network regulars, Sonny is set for the Joey Bishop Show on Nov. 28.

Word from the Jimmie Klein Agency informs us that Jerry Rivers, former manager of Nugget Records and sound studios, and personal manager of the Homesteaders, has been named talent and publicity director of the Klein offices in Nashville. The firm's booking roster includes, in addition to the Homesteaders, the Blue Boys, the Harden Trio, Arleen Hardin, Johnny Carver, Marti Brown, Jamey Ryan, Bobbi & Dude and Bobbie Shelton.

Leon Ashley has made it known that he will be producing a 13-week TV series, featuring himself and wife Margie Singleton as hosts. Don Tweedy, a&r director of Ashley Records, will direct the show, while Ed Hamilton, the label's promotion director, will handle the emcee chores for the series as well as the selection of guest artists. Ashley claims that, since the show will be completely different from those shows already being produced in Music City, his will not offer competition in that area. According to word from the Ashley setup, a major feature of the show will be in the exploring of the background of the guest artists appearing each week. Plans for the show have reportedly been in the making for some time now, but distribution deals have only recently been completed in New York. The first of the shows are scheduled to be filmed in December in Nashville and are set for airing in approximately 15 markets in January.

In an attempt to bring everyone up to date on the radio scene we have a list of some of the recent go-ins-on at outlets around the country. Down in Charlotte, N.C., Ken Elliott has been appointed program manager of WKTC.

Mercury Puts Best Foot Forward In Effort To Bolster C&W Line-up

NASHVILLE—Mercury Records which has been quietly rebuilding its C&W artists corps, took a major step forward in its re-entrenchment with the appointment of Eddie Kilroy as national sales and promotion manager for all country product. In making the appointment, Irving Green, president of Mercury, emphasized the firm is permanently establishing a full-time marketing executive in Nashville to afford rustic product top exposure via all the segments of the marketing cycle.

"We've shopped for some time, seeking an experienced C&W professional versatile enough to run the gamut from promotion and selling even to assisting Jerry Kennedy in screening song material and perhaps even helping Kennedy in producing sessions," Green stated.

Kilroy began as a deejay, spending seven years in Pop radio on stations ranging from KILT, Houston to WKBA, Nashville. In 1960, Kilroy

left radio to join Colpix label in Nashville, serving as southern promotion manager for 2 years, then joining Warner Bros.-Reprise for a year as southeastern promotion manager. He remained in Nashville for another year acting as national field promotion manager for MGM following which he moved to Houston where he spent the next year as production aid to Huey Meaux. He returned to Music City, U.S.A. last year as C&W promotion chief for United Artists.

Kilroy has a number of songs recorded, including "Pen and Paper," recorded by Jerry Lee Lewis and Faron Young.

Kilroy will be working with a Mercury stable of artists including: Roy Drusky, Dave Dudley, Faron Young, Priscilla Mitchell, Tom T. Hall, Don Wayne, and Gene Wyatt. He will cover country deejays and accounts on behalf of Smash product for Roger Miller.

Country Biz Getting Star Billing 'Down Under'

NASHVILLE—The ever-growing image of country music as a world-conquering, or at least a world-reaching, medium was given added emphasis recently when Australia's Norman Whiteley, owner of the Norman Whiteley Holding Company, made a trip to Nashville recently for business meetings with Hal Smith, president of Entertainment Corporation of America, which encompasses Pamper Music, Hal Smith Artists Productions and various other entertainment properties. While mapping out expansion plans for country music, Whiteley commented on the fact that the spread of that music "down under" has been phenomenal in the past few years, particularly in the "ballad" type.

Whiteley, in discussing the Country Music scene in Australia went on to say, "We haven't yet learned to accept the fiddle-type, bluegrass sort of music, but there is no doubt that the other modern country is really catching on."

The visit of Whiteley to Nashville

was two-fold. Masters will be exchanged between the Smith owned Boone Record Company, and Whiteley's firm, while a plan is being worked out for the exchange of artists as well. Whiteley will be opening a branch office for American talent, and operate a management agency handling U.S. acts for tours of Australia. Initial plans will involve Jeannie Seeley, Hank Cochran and Ray Pennington from this country and Col. Joyce, one of Australia's most popular singers from that country. Hal Smith commented on the talent exchange; "This could have far reaching effects on the popularity of American acts in Australia. It's a fine way to expose American talent throughout the Continent, with tours that will last from 21 to 31 days."

Whiteley and Smith completed final plans for an interchange of office and management agreement between the two companies with Whiteley continuing to handle details through Pamper Music of Australia, Pty.

Formerly a program director with WNOE, WJBW and WWEZ, all in New Orleans, Elliott is also the president and general manager of a New Orleans-based program consulting firm, Instant Radio Programming. He will continue to maintain an office in that city and will also continue his activity in publishing and production (Fordell Enterprises, Lodestone Productions, Green Emerald Productions, Masque Records, Entre Nous Music, Doubloon Records and Lodestone Music) and his representation of Frankie Ford and Johnny Green & the Green Men managerially and for recording contracts. Elliott asks that labels send country releases to him at P.O. Box 8588, Charlotte, 28208. . . . A batch of staff changes comes to us from WMAK-Nashville. Joe Sullivan, formerly of WKGN-Knoxville, now handles the program director role for the station, while Allen Dennis, also from WKGN, Dick Kent, from WSGN-Birmingham and Dave Randell, from WMEJ-Daytona Beach, have all become part of the air personality roster. . . . Celebrating its 5th year as a country broadcaster, KRAK-Sacramento hosted a show at the local Memorial Auditorium on Nov. 26. Headlining the gala affair was Sonny James, while a star-studded supporting cast included Tex Ritter, Lynn Anderson, the Gosdin Brothers, Ronnie Sessions and Glen Campbell. As part of a special promotion for the show, Sonny wrote a tune dedicated to both KRAK and Sacramento. Five thousands recorded copies of the tune were distributed free to those who attended the gig. . . . Richard C. Huckaba, a veteran of more than ten years with WKDA in Nashville recently took over the position of general manager of the station,

succeeding the late Charles "Smokey" Walker. Taking over the position of program director has been Doc Holiday, while the mantle of music director has been assumed by Bill Craig. . . . KLAQ-Denver has kicked off a new broadcast of the Rocky Mountain Jamboree, with a regularly-scheduled 'live' three-hour showing kicking off on Nov. 18. The package features 25 to 30 country acts each week and will also feature name guests stars. The show has a new home, the Tabor Playhouse (formerly the Westwood Theatre), Knox Court at Alameda, which has a 650 seating capacity. . . . KGBS-Los Angeles also hosted a Super Spectacular over this past weekend, this one taking place at the Shrine Auditorium on Nov. 25. Also featuring Sonny James & the Southern Gentlemen and Glenn Campbell, the KGBS package boasted, in addition, the Johnny Cash Show with June Carter and the Carter Family, the Statler Bros. and Carl Perkins. . . . Another station joining the country ranks recently has been WCAW-Charleston, which changed to fulltime country broadcasting format on Oct. 30. The 10,000-watt station had previously conducted a contemporary format and has reportedly been a leader in Pulse surveys for six out of seven years. . . . Back in KGBS country, Don Elliott has joined the station's air staff, following stints with WNJR-Newark, KLIF-Dallas, WMAV-Springfield, Ill., WQUA-Moline and KLAC-Los Angeles. . . . Another switch made very recently when WORC-Orangeburg, N.C. changed from a Top 40 to a country format. Country On Stage
JIMMY NEWMAN

NEW YORK—We owe Jimmy Newman an apology. We went to the Nashville Room last week to see him for the first time with what could best be described as a typical New York attitude. With little fame running advance interference for him, we weren't expecting a great deal. But he bounced into our city and made us realize that he is probably one of the most underrated entertainers we have seen to date.

Many an act comes into this city preceded by claims of greatness and wonderfulness and such things as that, only to wind up just another act, and while we aren't necessarily saying that Jimmy Newman ranks with the all-time greats, we did find his show to be one of the most pleasing pieces of entertainment that we've seen to date from a one-man act. The pleasant atmosphere of his show is lent even further emphasis by the fact that his coming was almost totally without fanfare of a superlative nature.

His Cajun-oriented package, replete with the idiom, the folklore, the humor and the music of the Bayou

section of our land, was as refreshing as a cool breeze from the Gulf and just as titillating. And his conduct on stage immediately marks him as a pro.

Naturally, his repertory is composed mainly of those songs which have become associated with him through hit Decca singles, such as "Alligator Man," "Back Pocket Money," "Louisiana Saturday Night" and his current hit, "Blue Lonely Winter," but the evening is laced generously with such traditionally Cajun gems as "Diggy Liggy Lo," "Big Mamou" and "Jolie Blonde," making a dish as attractive as a bowl of rice and gravy.

The over-all picture of Jimmie Newman at the Nashville Room is one of fun and enjoyment, an effervescent act that we would enjoy seeing again, as soon as possible.

Opening last week's round at the room were the Boys from Shiloh, who provided the crowd with some excellent bluegrass material and helped round out a thoroughly enjoyable program.

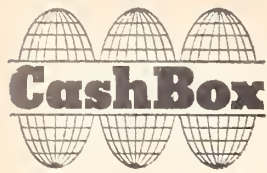

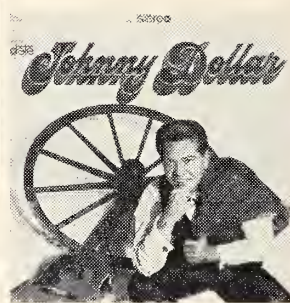
THE BEST OF HANK WILLIAMS, JR.—MGM E/SE 4513

Eddie Barclay, President of CPF Barclay and CED Riviera, has just released Europe's first pocket records "disques de poche." A costly publicity campaign, under the sign of a kangaroo, is currently under way. The mini disks are 5/8ths in diameter play at 33 1/3rd rpm and carry 6 tracks by English and American artists. The first mini-disks on the market feature Wilson Pickett, Aretha Franklin, Eric Burdon, The Jimi Hendrix Experience, Solomon Burke, Lavern Baker, Harvey Scales, Joe Tex, Don Covay and the Young Rascals.

The growth, power and potential of the domestic British market is graphically illustrated in the hit parade at the moment. Never before, not even when the Beatles were at their peak and the whole Merseyside range was in full flood, have the natives had such a grip on their own sales charts. Of the Top Twenty only the Box Tops with "The Letter" representing any foreign participation. For decades now the Americans have featured strongly on the British indexes and, having dominated for a good many years, appeared to be keeping up even with local talent following the Beatles explosion five years ago. But no longer. What is interesting about the British domination at the moment is the diversity of musical taste currently represented in the charts. Even when the Mersey Sound swelled into prominence, the waxes were categorized in a rockbeaty trend. But, this time, the all-British hit parade features smaltz, odies, flower power, ballads, rock, soul and even a foreign-tongued ditty called "Zabadak" by Dave Dee, Dozy, Beaky, Mick and Tich.

Southern Music currently high in the charts with Donovan's "There Is A Mountain" (Pye) also have follow-up disk by the Flower Pot Men "Walk In The Sky" as well as Frank Ifield's latest Parlophone waxing "All The Time," a country and western number from the Cedarwood stable in Nashville. On the film side which is developing very rapidly, Southern Music have the copyright to scores of several major films including "Far From The Madding Crowd" starring Julie Christie, penned by Richard Rodney Bennett, and just completed "Poor Cow" starring Carole White and Terence Stamp with incidental music and songs by Donovan. The film also features a host of Southern numbers. In production at the moment is "The Limbo Line" and "The Man Outside."

Bob Reisdorf who heads up the Liberty operation in the U.K. reports good sales of their L.P. catalog, particularly with "Gorilla" by the Bonzo Dog Doo Dah Band. This month sees the first release in their "Great Performances" series comprising albums by Vikki Carr and Slim Whitman. Scheduled for early in the New Year are albums by Cher, the 50 Guitars, P. J. Proby and the Ventures. Reisdorf is also planning an "Indian" month for early 1968 which will include albums by Ashish Kahn and Maharishi Mahesh Yogi.

Larry Page of Page One Records just back from the States where he had meetings with Charlie Fachs of Mercury Records regarding the release of the Troggs current British smash "Love Is All Around." Page also planned the American release of "Dream Magazine" by Svensk and discussed the possibility of U.S. visits by the Troggs and Svensk. At Calla Records distributor of Page One product, Page discussed the release of his instrumental version of "The Last Waltz" as a follow-up to the highly successful Larry Page Orchestra version of "Waltzing To Jazz," and acquired "Hold On" by the Fascinations. From the States Page flew to Toronto for talks with Bruce Beatty of Allied Records regarding distribution. In Los Angeles he spoke with J. Lasker regarding an overall label deal, and it was agreed that whilst negotiations were pending disks would be issued by We Believe ("Private Scotty Grant") and the King Brothers ("My Mother's Eyes"). With Ambassador Page negotiated for the U.K. distribution of their product and releases are being lined up for early in the New Year.

It's been a hectic time for Australian-born comedian/singer Rolf Harris. He had to break off his cabaret season in Vancouver, Canada, and return to London (November 13th) to take part in the Royal Variety Show. He resumed his Canadian engagements immediately after the show and return to London (November 26th) to record his Xmas Day show and rehearse for his new TV series beginning in the New Year. Because of the terrific response to his performance at the Royal Show, EMI have rush-released "Pukka Chicken" on Columbia published by Black Swan.

Everything is going Tom Jones' way. Having starred in this year's Royal Variety Show, he is currently on a sell-out nationwide tour and has a new single, "I'm Coming Home," on Decca which is destined for the top of the charts. In February he heads towards America where he begins a cabaret tour opening at the Copacabana, New York. He will also tele-record his own TV Spectacular in color, returning to Britain in April immediately after the first of his three annual month-long Las Vegas stints. 1968 will add a new dimension to the Jones career when he makes his film debut in a strong non-singing role.

President Records hosted a party for the press and deejays to meet American singer Felice Taylor currently in Britain promoting her latest release "I Feel Love Coming On." President are currently achieving chart success with the Equals L.P. "Unequal Equals."

Celebrated conductor Eugene Ormandy in Britain for a concert at the Royal Festival Hall. His British visit was the final part of a tour which included concerts in Vienna and Amsterdam.

From the latest Disney movie "The Jungle Book" comes a double-sided single on Vista, Phil Harris' "Bare Necessities" and Louis Prima's "I Wanna Be Like You."

After a Christmas season at the Gaiety Theatre, Ayr, Scottish singer Andy Stewart takes off again for yet another trans Atlantic tour. In February he leaves for New York and an Ed Sullivan TVer followed by a six-week tour of New Zealand and Australia. Although he will be spending a summer season in his native Scotland, the autumn of 1968 will see him back in the U.S. and Canada.

Coincidental with the opening of the film Camelot, Pye issues soundtrack album on Warner Bros. . . . The third award went to the already famous young composer Chico "A Banda" Buarque De Hollanda, with his already successful "Carolina," interpreted by Cybele & Cynara (two of the components of the famous quartet "The Girls from Bahia"), with an arrangement by maestro Radames Gnatali.

Rudi Slezak Concludes U. S. Deals

LONDON—On a recent visit to New York and Los Angeles, Rudi Slezak of Abigail and Dratleaf publishing companies acquired for the U.K. and Germany the catalogues of Era Records, Pattern and Bamboo. On the same trip Slezak, who heads up his own Slezak Musikverlag in Hamburg,

acquired the Big Seven Music catalog of America, containing such firms as Planetary and Francon, for all German speaking territories. Also included in the deal is Akbestal Music controlling all Cowsills numbers, including the current chart topper "The Rain, The Park, And Other Things."

British Labels & MRS In Dispute Re: Draft To Increase Mechanical Rates

LONDON—The Mechanical Rights Society (formerly the Mechanical Copyright Protection Society) has accused record companies here of a 'tactical move to bring about a split in the Society, leaving the manufacturers a clear field in which to impose their own terms on the copyright owners.'

Convicting Charges

The charge comes as a development in the major wrangle between the British Record Producers Association and the MRS, agency which collects mechanical disk royalties for publishers. The fracas started when MRS sought in a new draft agreement to up mechanicals from 6¼% to 10% of the retail price. After a meeting of the BRPA, attended by many record industry leaders, including Sir Joseph Lockwood of EMI and Sir Edward Lewis of Decca, the record companies told MRS that its proposals were "completely unrealistic" and that "they removed any basis for discussion." BRPA secretary, J. F. Axtmann put in on record that as from January 1st (when the BRPA-MRS pact expires) the disk companies would only issue disks on terms similar to those in the present agreement which has "satisfactorily operated for over five years to the mutual advantage of the publishers and the record companies."

In reply MRS administrator B. W. Pratt regretted BRPA's "out of hand" rejection of discussions on the new draft agreement and warned the record companies that as from January 1st "the formalities of Section 8 of the Copyright Act 1956 . . . shall be observed in full, and from that date all concessions are withdrawn." MRS, meantime, has warned its publisher members to ignore a letter from the diskeries in which the latter seek to persuade publishers to release material in the New Year for recording at the current rate of 6¼%. MRS says that it is "not accepted" that there is no basis for discussion and assumes that the outright rejection of the draft agreement is a tactical move designed to split MRS members. While still seeking negotiations with BRPA, the MRS council has convened a general meeting of its members for November 27th.

Even as that intra-trade row boils up, a second major battle has emerged. This time it concerns composers and publishers who are vexed at the development in BBC Radio.

Pop BBC

Given that the new pop service on Radio 1 is a big success with listeners, BBC has added millions to its au-

dience figures, non-pop composers are greatly concerned at the lack of opportunity of airplay for new works. Right in the thick of the battle is the Songwriters Guild of Great Britain which has fought a protracted campaign with BBC for greater use of British light music. By the very nature of the pop service, non-pop product is out, which means one entire channel is not available to those who seek to get exposure for a new piece of light music.

Hardening the situation to a considerable extent is the fact that now BBC producers on other channels have to approve all new material before BBC will undertake to air it. It's being said that the producers are reluctant to do this, except in the case of really standout material because, under a new agreement with the publishers, BBC now meets the costs of band arrangements. And whereas before a publisher would pay for arrangements with a guarantee of two BBC transmissions of a new work, now BBC has to guarantee eight performances before a publisher has to pay out. With BBC watching its purse strings in an effort to stay out of the red, it would appear that producers caution is cutting new light music composers' chances of exposure very considerably. The situation does not sit well with SWGB who take a dim view of BBC's lack of "patronage" of new composers. Especially as BBC is a monopoly.

Publishers, too, are unhappy if only because they have no chance of expanding significantly their light music and standard catalogs. With few new exposures, there will be few new standards from this end. The advent of Radio 1 has not entirely satisfied some record companies. There are those who preferred the "pirate" sound outlets. On the latter, their argument goes that a concerted pattern of exposure could be arranged, a promotion formula which would sell records. But BBC radio chief Robin Scott does not believe he's in radio to sell records so the four-six plays a day format is no longer available, except illicitly through Radio Caroline.

Indirectly related to this situation and illustrative of new wrinkles deemed necessary to secure promotion time, several companies are putting deejays under contract as disk artistes. Theory, presumably, is that brother deejays will play the waxes for their novelty value. And, anyway, with the launch of Radio 1 (and the death of the "pirates") many deejays are consistently in the news and, undoubtedly, have a fan following. Among the biggest is Tony Blackburn, who has been snapped up by MGM's Rex Oldfield for a solo single. Other deejays with waxes in the works include Tommy Vance (a veteran, yet with two disks already released) Mike Lennox, Tony Brandon and Dave Cash, among others.

U.K. Tour for Pips, Clark

DETROIT—Gladys Knight and the Pips, Motown's "Messengers of Soul," will embark next week (29) on a promo tour of the United Kingdom.

Another leading exponent of Motown's soul sound, Chris Clark, will be in Great Britain during the same period but will leave Detroit this week (24).

The Motown artists will appear on leading television and radio programs and play club engagements.

For Gladys and the Pips, it will mean taking time out from their tight concert schedule to perform for their British fans.

Roland Kruger On U.S. Trek

Roland Kruger, executive of World Music Palette, headquartered in Belgium, currently in New York thru Dec. 1st. He can be reached at WMP'S New York office, 250 West 57th Street.

What is "Soul?" That's a question with many answers but one of the answers is that "Soul" is the music that's getting ready to sweep the German charts. Some experts figure a gigantic 15% of total record sales going to the Soul sounds in '68. A "Sampler" LP put out by Metronome Records here featuring the Atlantic-Atco-Stax stars and selling for just \$2.50 (DM 10) has passed the 200,000 sales mark for a starter, and one top A&R man has announced that his 3 major German stars will all be featuring soul backgrounds on their new releases. Record companies had it hard when "Rock and Roll" hit the German market as top stars such as Elvis Presley just didn't appear for personal appearances and the producers had to depend on records as orientation for their productions, but the apostles of "Soul" are making the scene in full force. In the last 60 days James Brown with his Famous Flames and show hit Frankfurt and Berlin. The Drifters did club dates in several cities, and the Sam and Dave show featuring Arthur Conley and Lee Dorsey did concerts in Munich and Frankfurt with the "king of kings" Ben E. King topping them all with his club appearances. Munich is the center of "Soul" in Germany at present with several clubs featuring only "Soul" records and acts and doing great business and the kids doing the right steps to the swinging and soulful sounds. Otis Redding and Wilson Pickett with their packages are set for early next year here, and the "Soul" invasion is just starting. Make way for "Soul," baby, as it's got what it takes to make the chart scene in the land of beer and sauerkraut.

The trade paper "Musikmarkt" has announced their top 3 stars of 1967 in 4 divisions. Top foreign stars were in the "male" division: Frank Sinatra in first place followed by Tom Jones and Sammy Davis Jr. On the foreign distaff side of the picture, first place went to Barbra Streisand followed by France's Mireille Mathieu and Petula Clark. German language honors went to Udo Jurgens in first place in the male division followed by old favorites Peter Alexander and Freddy Quinn with female honors going to Esther Ofarim followed by Hildegard Knef and Catherina Valente.

November 15th was the starting date for the new Ariola music cassettes with 7 available now and 5 more at the end of November. Retail price is about \$6.00. The Philips system generally accepted in Europe is being used. The sales scene at Ariola is swinging with Peter Alexander's version of "The Last Waltz" passing the 120,000 mark, while the first Udo Jurgens LP for the label did 30,000 in the first 3 weeks of sales.

French star Adamo will do his first tour of Germany starting December 3rd and ending December 7th. 4 press conferences will be held in Berlin, Hamburg, Vienna and Munich for the star along with concerts in 8 cities.

It's all set. "Fiddler On The Roof" opens in Germany in February in Hamburg. Israel star Schmuël Rodenski—who also played the lead in his home country—will do the lead role here.

Rudolf Engleder, former distribution chief of EMI's Electrola who then became director of Ariola and left after 2 years, is now Marketing Manager of Deutschen Vogue. The popular Mr. Engleder will represent the firm in all trade organizations as well. Congratulations to Vogue and to Rudolf Engleder for the new post.

Teldec is drumming up action for a C&W sampler with top RCA stars represented. The LP sells for \$2.50.

Ralph Maria Siegel's musical "Charley's Tante ("Charley's Aunt") which was a tremendous success in Munich is now set for 4 more premieres. The show has already opened in Hagen to great critical acclaim and is set for Koblenz, Biel, Switzerland, and Amsterdam, Holland. Great news for a German musical.

Barbara Kist of AME-Kassner Music is really swinging this week with the tremendous success of "Siebenmeilenstiefeln" of "Seven Mile Boots" with Graham Bonney leading the way. The English hit "I Feel Love Comin' On" with Felice Taylor on Ed Kassner's President label also is high on the promotion list with Felice set for TV shows in Switzerland and Germany. Graham Bonney who has been a top seller here for over a year has now switched to President label which means a label switch here from EMI to Ariola. German star Marion who did her first English record recently also did a AME number called "I Go To Sleep" written by Ray Davies of the Kinks.

It looks as though E.M.I. have the "sleeping giant" of the year in "To Sir With Love" by 18 year-old Lulu. The record was originally released on the Columbia label way back around the end of July, but it failed to show out at all and the record was almost forgotten.

Then the film opened, and the deck was off and running on the way to the top. In our column of November 11, we somehow or other referred to the song "Pretty Polly" being a copyright of J. Albert & Son for this territory. This is incorrect . . . the sub-publishing is held by Leads Music for Australia.

Castle Music and parent company E.M.I. are making a solid promo drive on the new locally-produced single by the Twilights which carries two Australian compositions, "The Way They Play" and "Cathy Come Home," both written by group member Terry Britten and both published by Castle Music. The record is on the Columbia label and was produced for E.M.I. by their young staff producer David Mackay. "Cathy Come Home" was inspired by the rather tragic television show of the same name which was produced in England and has been screened a couple of times here by ABC-TV.

April Music have released the sheet copy of "Dream Girl" which is a strong disc success here. The song was written by well-known American composer Van McCoy, and the disc is out on Astor.

Disc-jockey moves: Don Rainsford from 3DB to 3AW; Mike Walsh no longer with 2SM; Dean Reynolds from 3KZ to 2SM.

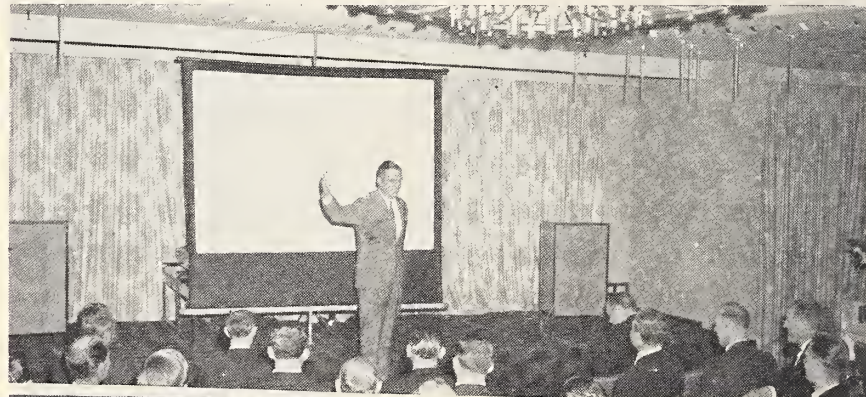

Albert & Son have printed the sheet copies on "You Don't Know Me" (Elvis Presley—RCA); "How Can I Be Sure" (the Young Rascals—Atlantic); and a re-print of "My Prayer" which is now starting to see some action under a new record by local group the Vibrants. Albert's have acquired the Australian rights to "The Rain, The Park And Other Things," the giant American hit for the Cowsills; this has now been issued here through Philips. Albert Productions (the disc production wing of the publishing house) advise that a new E.P. of the Easybeats is set for instant release. The disc, on Parlophone through E.M.I., is entitled "Easyfever Vol. 2" and carries "All Gone Boy," "Happy Is The Man," "You Me, We Love," and "Saturday Night."

CBS here, through Australian Record Company, are confident of success with the newly-released "Love Is Strange" by Peaches and Herb. The side has been catching strong play on commercial radio, and the ARC promotion team are now out in force in favor of the deck.

Johnny Hawker, a leading arranger/conductor/musician who has his own office in the recording studio building of Bill Armstrong. Pty. Ltd., is now on his way for a quick visit to both England and the United States.

Budget records are appearing once more in the market as happens more or less regularly every two years. In this case, some of the onestops are pressing their own series of records, selling them at about 500 pesos (\$1.40) against 1400 pesos (\$4) of regular-priced records and about 800 to 1000 pesos (\$2.20 to \$2.80) of "promotional" records. Although jackets and repertoire aren't always first-class, it seems that a strong market exists for the records.

Ernesto Parma, now associated with Melograf Publishers, informs that they control the right to "Quiero Llenarme de Ti," the winning song at the recent Buenos Aires Song Festival penned by Sandro (who sung it at the contest) and Anderle. The pubbery believes that the tune may have good international appeal, and it is possible that several European artists may record it. Also coming from Melograf is the news that pubberies Four Stars, Tree and Barclay will be represented in the future by this organization.

Odeon Publishers inform that they have contracted several new tunes from Europe and the States. Among them: "Mercy, Mercy" cut by the Buckingham (CBS), Noel Deschamps (RCA), Nancy Wilson (Capitol) and locally by Los Bull Dogs (RCA). The winning song of the Roses Festival, "L'Oro del Mondo," sung originally by Al Bano, has been also contracted.

The Records Division of Fermata is releasing a single with the Chico Buarque song presented at the recent Sao Paulo Festival: "Torbellino." There is also a new album by Cris Montez, "Foolin' Around," and another album by the Mafasoli Group, also coming from Brazil.

Augusto Conte of Quinto Records infos the release of a single by Luis Aguile. Titles are "La Chatunga" and "Serafino." Another press release reports that there is an album by local group La Nueva Generacion with titles selected from the local Cash Box Top Twenty: "There Is A Mountain," "You Only Live Twice" and "The World We Knew" among others.

Rodriguez Roque, in charge of press news at the Cosquin Folk Music Festival, reports that most of the top folk artists of this country have already been contracted for the event. Names include Mercedes Sosa, Julia Elena Davalos, Los de Salta, Ginette Acevedo. The contest is scheduled for January 20.

CBS is releasing a new single by Caravelli with two strong tunes: "The World We Knew" and "Aranjuez Mon Amour." There is also another strong appealing single by Roberto Carlos, Brazilian star: "Maria Carnaval y Cenizas" and "Ai que saudade da Amelia." Strong promotion is promised for both, as well as for the recent LP by Gigliola Cinquetti and a new LP by Ted Sommer tagged "Percussive Mariachi".

Music Hall is heavily promoting the new album by new international star Buffy Sainte Marie, recorded originally by Vanguard in the States and released here under the Difusion Musical series. Prodisa is releasing a new Command album cut by Dick Hyman and Orchestra tagged "Brazilian Impressions" and carrying a selection of tunes that ranges from Tom Jobim's "Insensatez" to Lennon-McCartney's "Eleanor Rigby." An excellent sound is the main attraction of the record, which continues Prodisa's policy of high-fidelity releases.

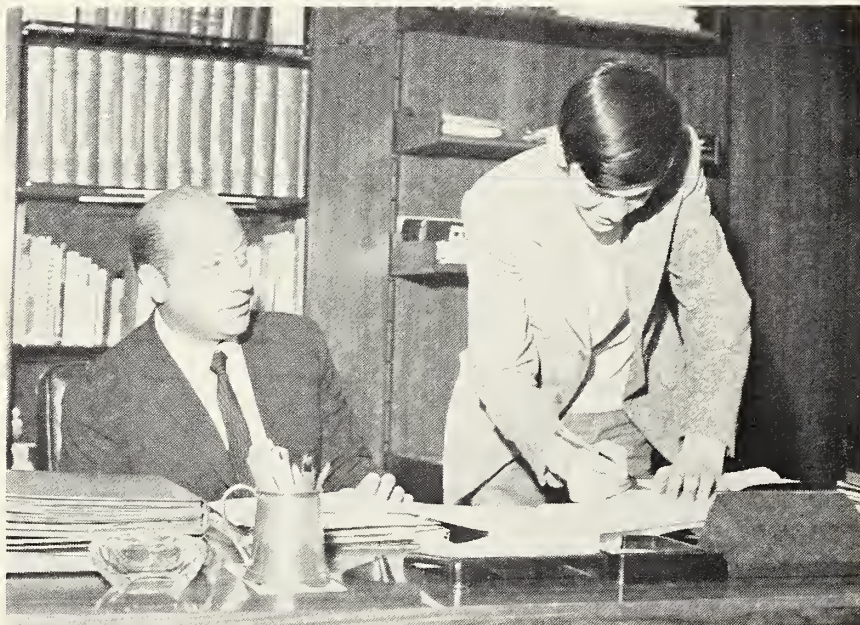

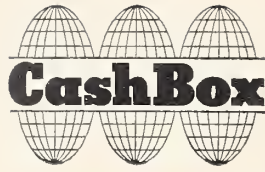

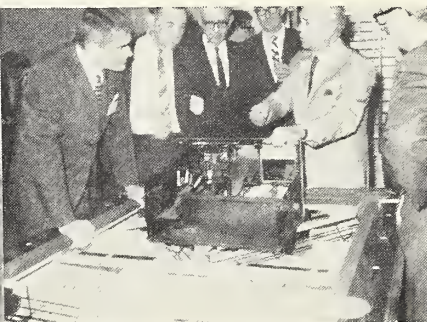

A History of Billiards—From Cleopatra To The Location

NEW YORK—How many times have you wondered about the where, what, when and whys of billiards? With all the talk in the air about a National Coin Table Pool Tournament, we decided to spend a few hours in one of New York's public libraries in quest of finding out about the "W's" of the game.

The history of billiards has been confused by claims of various authorities regarding its time and place of origin. Without offering definite proof, some contend that the game was played in ancient times, in different lands. William Shakespeare, in one of his works credits Cleopatra with mentioning billiards in her day and time. McGeoghegan, in his "History of Ireland," states that Cathaire More, a subking of Ireland in the second century A.D., bequeathed billiard balls and cues in his last will and testament. It has been proved since that the words billiards and cues were unknown during Cathaire More's days, and, consequently, could not have possibly been specified as bequeaths.

French authorities contend that while France was the first nation where the game was held in high favor, the sport first originated in England. On the other hand, English authorities, believe that the game originated in France, since its name is derived from the French word Billiard, meaning a stick. Disregarding this see-saw battle between the French and the English experts, our research indicates that the game was devised in England during the fourteenth century, and was taken from their very popular sport of lawn bowling. During the winter season, the English took lawn bowling indoors, but they had no room large enough to accommodate a lawn bowling court, the rolling of the balls was discarded and the ball was pushed at the object with a flat headed stick which they referred to as a mace. The heavy end of the mace was used first, but they found out by using the skinny end, they could propel the ball with greater accuracy.

After the novelty of playing the game on the floor wore off, they decided to play the game on a table and to make it a little more difficult and intriguing, arches were placed on the table, thru which the ball had to be projected. When this innovation had lost its appeal, pockets was built into each end of the table, and it is assumed that the final shot of the game was to knock the ball into one of these pockets. Eventually, the arches were removed and more pockets added. This is when billiards took the modern form of pocket billiards, which are the same type of tables that were adapted with a coin mechanism and are known today as coin-operated pool tables.

The flat-headed stick, mace, which was the first known billiard stick, was later succeeded by a crooked stick and as the game progressed, similar sticks like those used today were created. It is not known when or who placed the first leather strip on the end of the cue stick, but it must have been during the same period . . . be-

cause there is evidence that some of these early sticks would chip when the ball was hit too hard and to prevent this someone pasted a leather strip on the end of the cue to protect it.

In the eighteenth century, Captain Mingaud of France, who was a billiard enthusiast, practiced the game while being a political prisoner. When he was liberated, the Captain proved to be the greatest missionary of the sport by going on tour and making billiard shots unlike any ever seen before.

Early in the next century, Jack Carr, an Englishman, experienced difficulty with his shooting because his leather-tipped cue stick became glossy causing miscues. He applied chalk to the tip and found that as a result of the chalk's friction, the cue ball could be made to take on twisting and turning motions and allowed the pool player greater control over the cue ball. Carr is credited with the discovery of the principle of "English," called "Side" in England.

The first billiard table to appear on the American continent was brought to Florida in 1565 by a family from Spain. There is no further records on the progress of billiards in the United States until the middle of the nineteenth century. However, billiard experts say that George Washington played the game and that there was some interest both before and after the American Revolution. The style of billiards played at that time is not known, but quite likely, it was the game known as French billiards, since Lafayette played it while on a visit to the United States.

The table and way the game was played was constantly subjected to improvements, both in the United States and in Europe. According to Bert Betti, president of Eastern Novelty, one of the world's largest suppliers of billiard slate, "in 1827, the wooden playing surface was replaced with slate. Rubber side cushions were introduced in 1835, supplanting the wooden sides. Then later, felt was placed tautly over the playing surface and the size of the table was reduced."

The first championship in the States was held in Detroit in 1859. The balk-line game was the most popular style of play in the 1880's, there was also a great deal of interest in three cushioned billiards which was introduced in 1878. Pocket billiards also debuted in 1878 and possibly went on to become the most popular during the 1890's.

The greatest of the early billiard players was Jacob Schaefer, Sr., known as the "Wizard," whose brilliant career began in the 1870's, and who was a star well into the twentieth century. Schaefer's successor, Willie Hoppe, won an international championship in 1903 at the age of 16. In 1906, he won the world's championship, and until his death in 1959 was regarded as the greatest all-round billiard player in the game.

In the early days of pocket pool, the game was known as "pool," and the places where it was played were called

"pool rooms." Soon after, billiard authorities banned the name "pool" and renamed the rooms where the game was played to "billiard academies," so they would not be associated with the type of pool room where bets were placed on the outcome of horse races.

Pool enjoyed its greatest popularity during the 1890's and the ensuing 30 years, but with the coming of the automobile, motion pictures and other social and economic innovations, the sport dwindled in popularity. Then after the 1930's, the game resumed its popularity, but this time it was among college students.

Competition has all but disappeared on an international level and Willie Mosconi is generally regarded as the world and national champion, since no one will step forward and challenge him. Mosconi, is well known throughout the coin-operated pool table business as "Mr. Billiards," while serving as a sales representative for Dynaball's line of billiard supplies.

In our attempt to find out when the first coin mechanism was placed on a pool table, we kept running into blank walls. However, New York's Marcus Klein claims to have distributed them in the New York area as early as 1949. We believe that it was in the mid-1950's when the coin table actually caught on, as more and more states were allowed operation of six-pockets.

The prohibition of six-pocket operation within tavern locations in many states led directly to the evolution of the rebound tables, (exemplified by Valley's Bumper Pool).

As associations worked diligently to gain access to locations, the popularity of rebound tables was far overshadowed by six-pocket. The great legal victories, such as Millie McCarthy's of the state of New York in the early 1960's, opened up literally hundreds of thousands of spots to the coin pool table industry and almost overnight the coin pool table emerged as the most lucrative and service free piece of equipment ever to be seen in the industry. Many distributors contend even today that the pool table was the salvation of many operators.

No machine has ever been a 100 per cent blessing and the pool table has suffered its share of grief, especially in the area of direct sales, since its practically service-free nature enables location owners themselves to operate their own equipment.

A second possible drawback, but also one which has gained a great deal of money for the industry, is that the existence of the coin drawer on the pool tables prohibits the playing of virtually every known six-pocket game except eight-ball. Every manufacturer to a man agrees the eight-ball is the fastest game, therefore, creates the highest collections for operators. However, various attempts to bridge the gap have been and are still being attempted, such as, various brands of time tables and scratch ball return mechanisms.

Today, there are over half a dozen major pool table manufacturers competing for their share of the coin table business, many of which have also ventured into production of home and commercial tables, as well as, pool table parts and supplies and accessories.

Regardless of the ups, downs and the see-saw battle between the English and the French over the origin of the game of billiards, it has proved over the years to be one of the most enjoyable and popular games in the U.S.

No matter where the game is played . . . in billiard clubs, taverns, YMCA's, basements, recreation halls or ocean going liners . . . America's position in the world of green felt and rolling balls seems to be a permanent condition . . . rack 'em up!

Eastern Flashes

The devaluation of the British pound hasn't caused any great degree of conversion along coinrow. But in the factories and export houses who count the British market among their best customers, the prospect of keeping to the present equipment price poses a problem since it means actually a hike in the cost to the British distributor and operator. The possibility of dropping the cost of exported goods to come in tune with the new \$2.40 pound value is not too feasible since the profit margin hasn't been all that lucrative in the first place. The ultimate effect upon the rank and file of the trade should be slight at best and, if anything, might mean a greater influx in British-made merchandise over here. One aspect we'll all feel eventually will be a hike in the interest rate here, there and everywhere.
