Oldies-But-Evergreens

Oldies with sentimental attachments to rock 'n roll-bred adults, and tunes of recent chart stature are currently packing a strong one-two punch on the Top 100. Thus, there is renewed evidence that good rock material no longer need be committed to the dust-heap of "oneshot" songs that occasionally reappear as "oldies-but-goodies".

After all these years of rock influence, it is becoming apparent that evergreens in the truest sense of the word have been and will most likely continue to be created from this area. The wonderful pop standards that go back 20, 30 or 40 years have not maintained their popularity solely through those who were around when they were first introduced. If they were to rely only on such an audience, they would not be standards today. These songs are literally passed on from one generation to another, meeting, because of their special qualities, with continued acceptance.

This is what seems to be happening with such tunes as "Up on the Roof," "Take Good Care of My Baby," "Let It Be Me," "My Girl," "Hey Girl," all of which are being presently offered on new disk versions. Like many of the vintage evergreens, these songs have not only been exposed on disks, but receive fairly good coverage through the "live" media of night club and concert performances.

Coupled with this status for earlier rock material is the fact that recent hit material is being widely covered, a trend previously amplified here in an editorial concerning varied interpretations of Top 100 hits even as these tunes reach the peak of success in their original versions. This approach presently involves such recent winners as "If I Were a Carpenter," "By the Time I Get to Phoenix," "In the Heat of the Night," "Dock of the Bay" and "The Look of Love."

The Grade A quality of the latter selections would seem to point to the direction of a similar happy fate for these newcomers as befell many of the hits of five or ten years ago.

Perhaps it is a measure of the inferiority complex suffered by rock material over the years that we must support the thesis that such material is capable of longevity and affection. Time is already favoring many of the rock creations of the past which are already part-and-parcel of acts whose careers began long before the rock revolution and those who are not generally associated with the pop song form.

It should be realized that a good song which falls under the category of rock can establish itself as standard material with the same force as non-rock product from Schubert Row, Hollywood or Tin Pan Alley.

The fact that A&R men can dip into this catalog of rock hits for acts of all pop stripes indicates a wider, healthier musical base to move out from. Whether that base involves show music, rock or what have you, the family tree of pop music has never stood taller. ashBox CashBox H02100



The Motion Picture Academy finally got around to presenting Elmer Bern-stein with an Oscar—for perseverance. Until a couple of weeks ago eight of his more than 70 films had received nominations (including "Man With The Golden Arm" and "To Kill A Mocking-bird") but he had never once been

bird") but he had never once been accorded artistic recognition by the Academy. It's a shame that he had to get it with "Thoroughly Modern Mil-lie" (for "best original score") since he composed less than one-third of that score. The title song (an "Tapi-oca") was written by Jimmy Van Heu-sen and Sammy Cahn. And most of the other featured tunes ("Baby Face," "Rose of Washington Square," "Poor Butterfly," "Do It Again" etc.) are vintage titles. All musical selec-tions were arranged by Andre Previn. Even this is erroneous. It would have been more accurate to parenthesize: (substantially un-original). There's an exec committee of the Academy's music branch that is charged with determining eligibility. We would assume that Bernstein is a member of that committee—he's an efficient of the branch Should be here

charged with determining eligibility. We would assume that Bernstein is a member of that committee—he's an officer of the branch. Should he have ruled his score ineligible? Many music men and knowledgeable Academy members say—yes—that his score was, at most, fragmentary. Anyway you score it, "Most Thor-oughly Modern Millie" was the recipi-ent of this year's most Thoroughly Mystifying Oscar. About five years back we came across a marvelous song by an un-known writer. It was titled "He Was My Brother" and the composer was Paul Simon. We began to look forward to his efforts, marking him as a guy with a future. We feel somewhat the same about Paul MacNeil, a Boston boy who was recently been contracted by Hastings Music, the Big 3's BMI pub outlet. None of MacNeil's songs has been recorded yet. But it shouldn't be too long before you'll be hearing "Good Morning Today," "Midway" and many of the more than 40 songs he has composed in the past year and a half. MacNeil's influence goes back to a half.

MacNeil's influence goes back to traditional folk—"all the way back to Elizabethan and Anglo-Saxon ballads ... about a year and a half ago I was living in an apartment and it just so happened there was a rooftop there. I used to go up to get high. I decided to write a song about it. Before then I had been a professional performer. a whole identity problem. But sudden-ly I was back performing my own things."

Last October former vocalist Tony Orlando, professional rep for Robbins, was in Boston, searching for new writers. "For the first week or so I writers. "For the first week or so I heard nothing. I had been to the clubs, the discotheques—why not a couple of coffee houses? "Sword in Stone" sounded intriguing so I dropped by. There was nobody in the place—the owner, me but nobody else. Finally Paul came on with his act. I had never

heard these songs. Could he have writ-ten them? He had. Would he like to come to N.Y.? He wasn't sure. The next night I went to another coffee house and a girl got up on stage and started doing Paul's songs. I figured if other acts were doing his tunes, I was really onto something. The next day I phoned Arnold Maxim and said, "I found him the real McCoy-Mac-Neil."

Peter Yarrow agrees. And so do half a dozen coast A&R execs who are hold-ing his songs—non-exclusively. Rem-iniscent of Simon, Dylan and Hardin not a bad parlay—his songs are crammed with raw talent. His name





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

Picks of the Week

FOUR TOPS (Motown 1124) If I Were a Carpenter (2:47) [Faithful Virtue, BMI-Hardin]

Already riding the best seller lists in the U.S. and England, this rock read-ing of the while-back Bobby Darin hit features one of the finest performances of the Four Tops in a long while. Excellent arrangements put a punch into the rhythmic serving, and the vocal brilliance of the quartet transforms the ballad into molten blues with monster potential. Flip: "Wonderful Baby" (2:32) [Jobete, BMI-Robinson] Another fine track from the "Reach Out" LP.

TEMPTATIONS (Gordy 7072) I Could Never Love Another (After Loving You) (3:15) [Jobete, BMI-Whitfield, Strong, Penzabene]

Coasting gently into a build-up beat, the Temptations slam back from "I Wish It Would Rain" with another pop-styled blues set that should have them climbing right up the charts. Outstanding lead, delightful backup vocals and a terrific orchestral impact weave another hit spell for the team. Flip: "Gonna Give Her All the Love I Got" (2:45) [Jobete, BMI-Whitfield, Strong] Another strong side with snappier tempo and a bright group show-ing. Could follow a hit sales pattern also.

PAUL MAURIAT (Philips 40530) Love in Every Room (2:30) [Northern, ASCAP-Chaumelle, Kesslair, Francais] Glamorous orchestral follow-up to "Love is Blue" should establish Paul Mauriat on the singles scene as more than a one-shot star. Gilt-edged strings and the blue-chip piano glide through a pop-tango track which is a distin-guished coupling of adult sound in a young setting. Expect immediate multi-programming format acceptance. No flip info available.

ED AMES (RCA Victor 9517) Apologize (2:02) [Stone Canyon, BMI-Gordon, Griffin] Sparkling material in the Bob Lind vein and a performance that walks the line between teen and adult flavorings brings Ed Ames back for a return following his "Who Will Answer" outing. Arrangements feature a middle-of-the-road glitter and pop music beat behind the powerful Ames voice on a side with solid sales appeal. Should develop into a big item. Flip: "The Wind Will Change Tomorrow" (Cuando Sali de Cuba) (2:57) [Miller, ASCAP-Aguile, Kusik, Snyder] Soft side with easy listening luster.

AMERICAN BREED (Acta 824) Ready, Willing & Able (2:26) [Screen Gems-Columbia, BMI-Stone] Easing the tempo just a bit, the American Breed bounces back from "Green Light" with another solid shot at the pop winner's circle. Sparkling vocalizing from the team is offset with an outstanding arrangement and some extremely palatable material that should send the group on a surge to the top of the teen charts. Sharp showing with monster potential. Flip: "Take Me If You Want Me" (2:24) [Ambre, BMI-Ciner, Colbert, Graziano, loized]

FIRST EDITION (Reprise 0683) Only Me (2:35) [Irving, BMI-Nichols, Williams] Trading the put-on lyrical lilt of "Just Dropped In" aside, the First Edi-tion goes to press with a dejected lover's tale set to a steady-beating throb. Outstanding vocals and a dance flavor for teen fans work well together on a set that should keep the hit fires burning for the team. Should be a return engagement on the best seller charts via "Only Me." Flip: "Dream On" (2:45) [Yuma, ASCAP-Post, Meskell]

WILLIAM BELL (Stax 252) (I Love) Lucy (2:45) [East, BMI-Bell, Jones]

Outbursts of pop awareness for the old-school blues artists was pointed up by an explosive reception for "Cold Feet" from Albert King. His new single, "Lucy" is an even more exciting bit of talking blues with a power-packed brass backing and some guitar riffs that make their point in lan-guage that will have the side streaking for the top of the sales charts. Flip: "You're Gonna Need Me" (2:48) [East, BMI-King]

ERMA FRANKLIN (Shout 230) Open Up Your Soul (3:15) [Web IV, Ragmar, BMI-Berns, Ragovoy]

Look for Erma Thomas to repeat her "Piece of My Heart" success showing with this vibrant soul-set that packs a shattering vocal power with some ex-cellent blues band arrangements. Molten fire in the artist's delivery and a very fine dance throb join forces in forming a deck that should break wide open on pop as well as blues fronts. Flip: [No information available.]

PROCOL HARUM (A&M 927) In the Wee Small Hours of Sixpence (2:58) [Essex, ASCAP-Reid, Brooker, Fisher]

Intricate lyric intermingles medieval and modern imagery on a throbbing tale orchestrated with flashing piano, organ and pounding drumbeat for a flare and fire that will have the team soaring on teen sales indicators. Terrific dance punch and a grand vocal showing on the Harum's latest. Flip: "Quite Rightly So" (3:40) [Essex, ASCAP-Reid, Brooker] Excellent offering well worth the extra time the extra time.

LOU RAWLS (Capitol 2172) You're Good for Me (3:01) [Metric, BMI-Davis]

You're Good for Me (3:01) [Metric, BMI-Davis] Fine material is delightfully delivered by Lou Rawls in a session that con-tains elements that will appeal to pop, blues and middle-of-the-road spinners. Vocally exciting, ably supported by a smoothly throbbing orchestra, and work-ing with a song that links blues ballad appeal with easy listening fare, Lou Rawls is likely to hit with blockbuster action for this side. Flip: "Soul Seren-ade" (2:18) [Kilynn, Vee Vee, BMI-Ousley, Dixon] Flashy vocal of the current Willie Mitchell hit could bring both sides into the pop spotlight.

Picks of the Week

SMALL FACES (Immediate 5007) Lazy Sunday (2:55) [Nice Songs, BMI-Marriott, Lane] Looking for hit #3, the Small Faces raise a ruckus on a wild track pictur-ing a Cockney family-day. More humor in the team's approach here than in either of the two earlier chart-riders, and a carefree romp make the track a powerful way-out of the ordinary deck which should make a sizeable show-ing on the teen best seller lists. Flip: "Rollin' Over" (2:08) [Same credits.]

CREAM (Atco 6575) Anyone for Tennis "The Savage Seven Theme" (2:37) [Dratleaf, PMI-Clapton, Sharp]

Quite a departure from the Cream instrumental sound on this strings-steel-drum and easy-moving orked poem; as the group aims for impact through lyrical imagery. Surrealistic pictures are flashed one-after-another in a kaleidoscopic vision of today's problems. Side has a shock and near-protest appeal that could start underground waves with effect on the pop sales indicators. Flip: "Pressed Rat & Warthog" (3:18) [Dratleaf, BMI-Baker, Taylor] Taylor]

KENNY O'DELL (Vegas 724) Happy With You (2:29) [Beautiful, BMI-O'Dell] Debarking from his "Springfield Plane" trip, Kenny O'Dell eases the pace with a softly lilting ballad serving that could stir new fires in the following that he has attracted. Very fine material and an outstanding performance give the chanter-songsmith a solid shot at success that could overshadow his earlier noise-makers. Flip: "I Could Love You" (2:05) [Same credits.] Smooth rocker in the better known O'Dell style.

DECEMBER'S CHILDREN (World Pacific 77887) Backwards & Forwards (2:02) [Low-Twi, BMI-Whitley]

Here's a side that comes on with a terrific impact and all the magnetic teen charm of a modern-day "Name Game." Lyrical kick of an off-the-wall double-talk routine is joined with belting rhythmic punch that makes the side a bright one for dance and listening audiences. Fade is another kick on a track with overall appeal that should have it thundering up the charts. Flip: "Kissin' Time" (2:03) [Same credits.]

ROY HEAD (Mercury 72799) Broadway Walk (2:14) [Tracebob, Press, BMI-Womack, Carter, Penn, Oldham] A little extra in this strong performance from Roy Head should put him high on the comeback roster with a side that should break wide open on both pop and r&b scenes. Side packs a walloping dance beat and some instru-mental drive to put it across. Vocally a solid side, Head can be expected to shake up a larger fan following than ever bafore. Flip: "Turn Out the Lights" (2:19) [Press, BMI-James, Carter, Bevis] More subtle set with strong added potential.

SPIRIT (Ode 108) Uncle Jack (2:46) [Hollenbeck, BMI-Ferguson]

Now stirring attention via a debut LP, the Spirit premieres on the singles scene with a shattering track that makes use of an overwhelming instru-mental and vocal artistry to build listener involvement and response on a semi-blues, semi-rock session with breakout capabilities. Flip: "Mechanical World" (Very long) [Hollenbeck, BMI-Andes, Ferguson] Also receiving atten-tion, the slower flip is an outing likely to expand the team's overall effect.

JIMMY McGRIFF (Solid State 2522) Honey (2:30) [Russell-Cason, ASCAP-Russell]

Instrumental version of the Bobby Goldsboro goldie socks a "Honky Tonk" flavor into the ballad for double-strength. Side has the timely cover impact, and a dance appeal all its own. Look to Jimmy McGriff to return to the win-ner's circle with this pop and r&b effort. Flip: "(Sweet Sweet Baby) Since You've Been Gone" (2:23) [Cotillion, 14th Hour, BMI-Franklin, White] Dance-beat handling of the Aretha outing.

YOUNG SAVAGES (Roulette 7009) Sitting on a Plane (2:15) [Chardon, BMI-Titelman, George] Terrific discotheque and teen-radio flavoring on this big beat rock session is spiced with a hearty instrumental workout that should gain listening time for the team. Knocking at the breakout door with good material before, The Young Savages could find this serving to be the one that makes them a sales name. Flip: "Wait a Minute" (2:51) [Shelby Singleton, BMI-D'Amico, D'Amico, Barbello]

GENTRYS (Bell 720) I Can't Go Back to Denver (1:56) [Big 7, BMI-Levy, Illingworth, Grasso, Cohen] Quick-stepping rhythmic workout from the Gentrys sets up a tension that should spotlight this side on the pop scene. Grand dance-appeal and a perky vocal showing from the team create a side with power-packed programming attractiveness that ought to start a landslide showing for the single. Look for sales to snowball into the best seller category. Flip: "You Better Come Home" (2:54) [Mellin, Ludix, BMI-Russell]

Newcomer Picks

LEXINGTON AVENUE LOCAL (Epic 10309) Along Comes Mary (2:53) [Irving, BMI-Almer]

Name making song for the Association returns with a potent organ and drum thrust on a splendid arrangement that could do the trick for the Lex-ington Avenue Local. Team's showing here includes a delivery that makes the lyrics understandable, and highlights the lyrical workmanship on a side that should skyrocket on the pop front. 

The edict was directed against Ed-ward F. Knasin, Jr., and Barry K. Pressman, doing business in Lancaster as Superba Tapes Co. A&M, headed by Herb Alpert and Jerry Moss, com-plained that Superba has copied Herb Alpert & the Tijuana Brass instru-mental recordings and those of two vocal groups, the Sandpipers and the We Five, on tapes and then sold them to the public. Knasin and Pressman admitted these contentions. Judge Robert S. Thompson, noting that Superba pays no royalties to the artists or the rec-ord companies and was operating without the consent of the recording companies, issued the injunction under laws dealing with unfair business practices. Jerry Moss indicated that A&M

laws dealing with unfair business practices. Jerry Moss indicated that A&M Records will bring legal action against any unauthorized tape duplicators, wherever located, to put an end to the practice of tape duplication without the consent of the owners of valuable master recordings. Moss stated that this was being done not only to protect the interest of record companies, but also to protect the rights of the ar-tists who are being deprived of royal-ties as a result of this unfair practice.

The campaign will focus on the stan-dard AGAC contract which affords songwriters the strongest protection in terms of payments for their works and guarantees recorded release or agreement termination; foreign prop-erty rights and other stipulations not included in other forms of standard contracts. Other Guild assistance in evaluating contracts offered and legal rights are another of the points being stressed in attracting talents to AGAC "Our premise," said John Carter of the writer is primarily interested in cre-ating, and seldom understands fully the legal implications of a contract have explain clauses in other con-tracts to the writer." AGAC is also a major collection agency for royalties other than per-formance payments which are handled through ASCAP and BMI. Membership fees are determined on a scale running from \$24 for a new writer to \$200 for the major money-makers. The roster of members in-cludes ASCAP, BNI and SESAC com-posers, and runs the gamut from Bob Dylan to Richard Rodgers. Tees charged for the collection of royalties runs 4½ % up to a maximum of \$1,000. Last year's collections passed the \$3,000,000 mark for the Guild's largest year; and according to Carter, this year's figure is expect-ed to hit \$3,500,000.



Judge Tyler, in denying the injunc-tion, indicated that Kama Sutra had acted properly in dealing with The Ohio Express, and indicated that there was no binding contract between The Ohio Express and Cameo-Parkway when The Ohio Express contracted with Kama Sutra.

Judge Tyler's decision was made after a day long trial and after testimony was taken and briefs submitted from employees of Cameo-Parkway and Jerome Kasenetz and Jeffrey Katz. Roemer & Klein argued that the same issue that had been litigated in The Five Stairsteps & Cubie suit was being litigated in The Ohio Express Suit. Both Courts, in rendering a verdict for Kama Sutra, found that Kama Sutra had acted properly.



Mont-gomery brings to such tunes as "Georgia On My Mind," "I Say A Little Prayer For You" and "When I Look In Your Eyes" (from "Dr. Dolittle") his great skills as a jazzman, and he should make an excellent showing on the charts with this set.

The Troggs went into eclipse after "Wild Thing," their 1966 smash, but they recently came to life on the charts again with a shuffling rocker called "Love Is All Around." Now they've brought out an album of the same title, and it should assist them in re-gaining their fame. THE STORY OF BONNIE & CLYDE—Flatt & Scruggs—Columbia CS 9649



Talent On Stage

CRITTERS

BITTER END, N. Y.—Every team has its own kind of calling-card, a star performer, an animal magnetism, la-menting soul, name it. Just about ev-ery act also strives for variety though, even if it falls short of "making it," the filler enables performers to fill up time on stage.

With the Critters, ecumenicism works though, and the team's keynote might be termed "intelligent music."

Playing the Bitter End through the 22nd, the quartet puts over material that includes ragged-jagged up-tempo shouters, simple ballads and even a jazz-waltz with equal proficiency that brings them on a level above the com-mon and promises to develop further.

mon and promises to develop further. Despite the fact that the Critters have not had a really strong single seller since last year's "Don't Let the Rain Fall Down on Me," their art for performance and adaptability offers a sound base for album appeal; and the group's composers have an open-eyed knack that is likely to produce hot singles in the near future. Variety on the bill at the Thursday (18) show was exemplified by the equally strong crowd response to "Somewhere" and "Satisfaction," two numbers at opposite ends of the sound spectrum. In each case, the team was able to work in new views by original handling of organ lines, guitar licks and unusual drumming effect. Ingenuity also altered familiar pres-

"Satisfaction." Two alternating leads enabled the foursome to achive multi-hued per-formances, with fragile and hearty vocals interspersed; and further dis-tinctions were made by shifting tempi up or down according emotional breaks for the audience as well as "rest" for the Critters themselves. Occasional new-blues riffs illustrat-ed a talent for the "west coast" strain, though it was not used to overwhelm listeners in the small space-high vol-ume atmosphere; and organ state-lines or "soul" kept a consistent charge in the atmosphere. There was no lack of originality, entertainment, and performing adept-




Lanza's 'Caruso' Turns To Gold

Turns To Gold NEW YORK—The Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) has just certified the 17 year old RCA Victor Records soundtrack LP of the motion picture, "The Great Caruso," which starred the late Mario Lanza in the title role, as a gold album for having reached the \$1,000,000 mark in sales. Lanza has one other RIAA gold album, "The Student Prince," also on RCA. "The Student Prince" was released in 1954 and reached \$1,000,000 in sales in 1960. Prior to the formation of the RIAA, Lanza had two million-selling singles, "Be My Love" (1950) and "The Loveliest Night of the Year" (1951).

The first artist in the history of the phonograph industry ever to have a record which sold more than one million copies was Enrico Caruso himself, whose first disks shortly after the turn of the century for the old Victor Talking Machine Com-pany established the fledgling firm.



Talent On Stage

B. B. KING — CHUCK BERRY

GENERATION, N.Y.--Two long-es-tablished performers, B. B. King and Chuck Berry, provided the entertain-ment on Thursday evening, April 10, at the new Generation nitery in Greenwich Village. Both acquitted themselves admirably and earned the unqualified enthusiasm of the audi-ence.

ence. King, who records for ABC's Blues-way label, offered an excellent pro-gram of blues numbers. A spirited singer and a fine guitarist, he com-bines technical excellence with soul in a manner that satisfies the listen-er's desire for order and freedom at the same time. His current single, "Paying The Cost To The Boss" is seeing action on the Top 100. Mercury Records artist Chuck

Berry, is, like B. B. King, a singer and guitarist, but that's about as far as the similarity between the two performers goes. Berry is one of the originators of rock 'n' roll, and he had some of the biggest hits of the rock 'n' roll era ("Maybelline," "Johnny B. Good," "Roll Over, Beethoven"). He still performs his old material in his old style and it still sounds good. He's an effective showman, and his between songs patter helps to keep him in close contact with his audi-ence. His risque sing-a-long number, "My Ding-a-ling" is a classic that's al-ways fun to hear and participate in. All in all, Berry is a very entertain-ing artist with a following that will keep him in business as long as he wants to continue performing.

JOHN DAVIDSON

PERSIAN ROOM, N.Y.—John David-son, a versatile singer with apple-pie good looks, says he spent four years in out-of-town-tryouts before his "show" opened in New York, the place being the Persian Room of the Plaza Hotel. Actually, it must be admitted that Davidson did quite well outside of Gotham. There was a summer replace-ment series on TV in which warmth, affability and good-singing made the show a most pleasant affair, two major Walt Disney films, "The Happiest Millionaire" and the current "The One & Only Genuine Original Family Band," both which got to the Radio City Music Hall in New York, and a profitable LP catalog for Columbia Records.

Records. New York or no, that's a lot of notable experience. And it all showed to most entertaining advantage at his Persian Room opening last Wed. (17). A little nervous yes, but in an agree-ably boyish way. His TV and film

traits of warmth and affability were matched by fine singing that took in a wide-range of styles and rhythms. Attired in a Prince Albert-styled tuxedo and Beatles-cut hair, the per-former gave a fine account of Top 40 ("Can't Get My Eyes Off of You"), show music ("Hello, Young Lovers"), Hollywood ("Are We Dancing" from "Millionaire"), country music ("Oh, Lonesome Me") and oldtimers (Yes Sir, That's My Baby"). CAFE AU-GO-GO, N.Y. --- Ian & Sylvia, with recorded product out on both Vanguard and MGM, are still demonstrating some of the most beautiful harmonies to have come out of the folk revival. With Dave Rea on lead guitar, they have a tight per-forming act that still retains that

sort of spontaneous feeling so neces-sary to good folk and folk-oriented material. Their treatments of "The French Girl," "Summer Wages," and "Hold Tight" were excellent but the real highlights of the show were Joni Mitchell's "Circle Game" and an en-core version of Leadbelly's classic "Ella Speed."

LOS ANGELES NEOPHONIC

MUSIC CENTER, L.A.--- A potpourri MUSIC CENTER, L.A.—A potpourri of musical idioms and accents, as well as conducting styles, was put on dis-play as regular conductor Stan Ken-ton introduced works by Tommy Vig, Ken Hanna, Roger Kellaway, Raoul Romero, Earl Zindars and Louis Frat-turo, then shared the podium with Lalo Schifrin and Calvin Jackson, who conducted their own composi-tions. tions.

tions. Contrast—running a gamut from the simplicity of the Middle Ages to the sophisticated electronics of tomor-row—was provided by Lalo Schifrin's witty updating of early forms: selec-tions from a multi-movement "Trib-ute to the Memory of the Marquis De Sade;" and Roger Kellaway's "Self-Portrait," which juxtaposed a heavily amplified jazz quintet with the full Neophonic. Neophonic. Schifrin—Oscar nominee and Emmy

Schifrin—Oscar nominee and Emmy nominee—won every prize in sight with the Neophonic audience as he coaxed a chamber sound from his re-duced ensemble (which included a string quartet and vocalist), conduct-ed from the keyboard, inserting some funky licks of his own, and charmed the listeners with his explanations. Calvin Jackson's work, "Themes and Explorations," allowed the pianist to comment extemporaneously (Ex-

NEOPHONICplorations) on the written orchestral statements (Themes), an improvisatory art for which he is well known. Marring his opening was a missed down-beat, leading to utter chaos for the first theme. Tommy Vig, soloing on vibraharp, showed outstanding skill at orchestral development as he presented an ambitious opus with the humorous (but musically accurate) title: "Intro, Largo, Presto and Besame Mucho."
Like Vig, Raoul Romero is also a Las Vegas-based musician. His piece, "Motivos," is an exciting jazz waltz with Latin accents. "Nightmare," by newcover Louis Fratturo, proved to be a solidly constructed tone poem. Earl Zindars' "Vasa" failed to make full use of the Neophonic's instrumental scope, but as a typical big band chart, was well-written. For Kenton, and especially for his hard-working sidemen—the cream of Hollywood's studio swingers—the season was an artistic triumph. The same cannot be reported in financial matters. Let's hope there will be a next

Country On Stage

DAVID HOUSTON

NASHVILLE ROOM, N.Y.--Perhaps the purest of tenor voices in country music is that of David Houston, who made his second visit to New York's Nashville Room last week (his first gig being at the club's original loca-tion in the Hotel New Yorker). Amid the opening night glamor that boasted of label execs, trade press, etc., Houston's vocal prowess-while not as sharp as we've heard him be-fore-was nonetheless excellent in quality. He soars around the upper ranges of the scale with an ease that's remarkable, immediately bringing to mind the tag "Irish tenor." In fact, he enhances that image with his in-terpretation of one of Ireland's favor-ites, "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen," as part of his repertoire. It's interesting to note that it has only been in recent years that this quality has come to the fore--especially on his records.

And speaking of records, David's performance is composed mainly of his hit records, topped, of course, by the daddy of them all, "Almost Per-suaded." In addition, he serves up a

host of his other giants, including "With One Exception," "You Mean The World To Me" and his latest, "Have A Little Faith."

"Have A Little Faith." There's been a world of difference since David's first appearance in the Nashville Room—a general tighten-ing up of the act which has been a vast improvement in his on-stage image. Among other things, the Epic songster now sports his own group, the Persuaders, a combination which has all the earmarks and the poten-tial to be shaped into a top quality backup combo. Certainly the indivi-dual talent is there. Given some more time, the group should become a tre-mendous asset to Houston in the fu-ture.

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

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


Following a boom year in disk sales, the first official figures on record sales for the first month of the current year show a continued increase in total volume business. All may change following the Budget but interest in records has never been higher in the period immediately after the high-sale Christmas period. Board of Trade statistics reveal that total record sales in January, normally a quiet period, reached a new peak for the month at $\pounds 2,845,000$ (\$ 6,348,000). This compares with the $\pounds 2,191,000$ (\$ 5,172,000) garnered from disk rates in January 1067

(\$6,348,000). This compares with the £2,191,000 (\$5,172,000) garnered from disk sales in January, 1967. Increase in business was reflected both in the domestic and overseas markets. Locally, the all-industry turnover last January was £2,486,000 (\$5,966,400) against £1,881,000 (\$4,322,400) in the previous January. In the export market turnover increased from the £310,000 (\$744,000) made in January, 1967, to £359,000 (\$861,600) in January, 1968. Total production of records, too, spiraled. It was up 37 per cent overall on the previous comparable period. Singles and E.P. production rose by 21 per cent to 5,859,000 units. But the real boom came in L.Ps which, compared to January, 1967, were up 65 per cent to 4,635,000 units. With the exception of the best selling months of November and December, this was higher than the total album production in any one month last year.

the first outlet for the set up in the area. Albums and singles will be released in South Africa, Portuguese East Africa, South West Africa, Lesotho, Botswana, Angola, Rhodesia, Zambia and Malawi. First singles due are "Drifting Blues" and "That Did It," both by Bobby Bland. An LP, Bland's "Touch of the Blues," is also ready.

Bright Economic Climate Proving Sales Boon For Singapore Labels

NEW YORK—Disk sales in Singa-pore are moving along at a pace reflecting the bright economic climate in the island republic. Initial first-year production for three new companies in Singapore is 2,450,000 records valued at \$2,250,-000. Target output within five years is 8,925,000 records, 60 per cent of which will be exported for marketing abroad. abroad.

abroad. The country's high per-capita in-come of \$570 (second in all of Asia only to Japan) makes it a growing market for disk sales. And the coun-try's industrial incentives, labor force and ready availability of capi-tal also make it an ideal manufactur-ing location

Within the past year, three compa-nies have been established to produce records in Singapore and to sell their output in Singapore and other world

output in Singapore and other world markets: EMI-Electric and Musical Indus-tries (S.E. Asia) Ltd., a British-own-ed company, began production in August 1967 at Singapore's Jurong Industrial Park, with 45 employees. Phonographic Industries Ltd.— a joint venture between Philips of Holland and local capital from Singa-pore. Commercial production began in April 1967 with 50 employees in factory space leased from Singapore's Economic Development Board. Life Record Industries Ltd.—an-

other joint venture now preparing for production at a plant in Jurcng. According to executives of the three companies, several factors led to the establishment of the record industry in Singapore: The government's comprehensive tax-incentive program for industrial investors, combined with a high degree of political and economic stability; Availability of leased factory space for relatively small operations where high output can be achieved with modern equipment requiring a mini-mum of space; Market surveys that showed Singa-pore to be a favorable manufacturing base for two reasons—good domestic market and ideal location for supply-ing Southeast Asian and other world markets; A standard of living that allows for spending on luxury items such as records (next to Japan, Singapore provides the largest disk market in the Far East—and Singapore's popu-lation is only 2,000,000, compared with Japan's 98,600,000); The likelihood that at its present rate of growth the volume of record sales in the Far East could overtake the European market within five to ten years. Singapore now imports \$1,300,000

the European market market inter-ten years. Singapore now imports \$1,300,000 worth of records each year, and re-exports about 25 per cent of this total to neighboring countries. More than half of EMI's output goes to America, Fiji, East Africa, Mauritius, England, Hong Kong, Tai-wan and Thailand. The company's best customers are the U.S. and Canada.


Canada. Phonographic Industries, on the other hand, exports some 40 per cent of its output to Indonesia, Hong Kong, Thailand, Ceylon and Malaysia. EMI and Phonographic Industries each have four presses working. EMI now produces 1,440,000 records a year and is preparing to install eight more presses that will raise total capacity to 5,520,000 disks a year. Phonographic plans to install two new presses and increase its annual output to 3,000,000. 3,000,000.

In commenting on the performance of his Singaporean labor force, K. F. Bruce, manager of the EMI operation, said: "The efficiency of our staff can match the best anywhere in the world, including Britain."

It was great to see Australian artist Johnny Farnham featured on the cover of the International Section in the Cash Box dated April 13. There was only one problem, the sales figure said 15,000, when, in fact, it should have read 50,000. This is the generally accepted figure in the record industry here as being our equal to one million in the United States. Johnny Farnham has com-pleted the recording of an album which is expected to be issued within the next week or so. The set is entitled "Sadie, The Cleaning Lady" after his monster hit.

Among recent album releases from Australian Record Company, there is one of particular interest to jazz fans. The package, on the CBS logo, is called "Jazz Australia" and features four prominent jazz musicians with their respective groups: the Don Burrows Octet, the Bernie McCann Quartet, the Judy Bailey Quintet, and the John Sangster Octet. Other recent albums from Australian Record Company include "The Tremeloes" (CBS), "It's A Great Life" with Trini Lopez (Reprise), "For Once In My Life" by Tony Bennett (CBS), "The Wonderful World Of Today's Hits" by Les & Larry Elgart (CBS), "For Little Ones" by Donovan (Epic).

A recent visitor to this country was Mr. Coen Solleveld, President and Chair-man of the Board of Philips Phonographic Industries and Deutsche Grammo-phon Gesellschaft. Mr. Solleveld visited Phonogram Recordings of Australia as part of a world tour. Traveling with him were Mrs. Leslie Gould, Managing Director of Philips Records, England, who is very well known to Australian tradesters, and Mr. A. J. W. van Agt, Governing Director of Philips' Industries and Director of Phonogram. They spent time at meetings with Mr. Paul Turner, General Manager of Phonogram of Australia, and Mr. G. Bottrill, a Director of Phonogram of Phonogram.

On the matter of Phonogram Recordings, the Australian company, headed up by Paul Turner, is about to make moves into the field of local recording. The company has signed an exclusive contract with Paul Wayne, a recording artist in his own right and also a successful composer and record producer. In charge of repertoire for Phonogram is Bob Cooley. First release of Paul Wayne is. expected shortly.

The Bonnie & Clyde "thing" has had a fairly good run in this country, although the fashions haven't done much. The Georgie Fame record, which appeared well in advance of the film and became a big hit, did a great deal to publicize the movie. As if this weren't enough, the film was the subject of some discussion in Federal Parliament, which event was widely covered in the big dailies. Of course, the film is now showing to turn-away audiences and is assured of success. RCA can expect to grab a good slice of disc sales with their historic album, "The Truth About Bonnie & Clyde" featuring Billie Jean Parker and Jud Collins.

On the Dot label, released through Festival here. we find the originak soundtrack album from the film "Smashing Time" with music composed and conducted by John Addison and featuring the stars of the flick, Rita Tushingham and Lynn Redgrave.

Three new locally recorded singles through Festival are the Swingin' Times with "Sue For Two" and "Theme From P.J." (Spin label); Jack Iverson with "San Miguel" and "Amour"; and Climax 5 with "Gardens" and "She's' Already Spoken For." These latter two are on Festival. From overseas there is an interesting classical release now available thru the Festival group. It is-an album entitled, "Sir Malcolm Sargent—Music Maker." It is issued in England by the new label BBC Radio Enterprises which, as the name suggests, is oper-ated by the vast broadcasting organization in London. The album features some spoken word material from Sir Malcolm and the music of Elgar, Gilbert & Sullivan Delius and Walton. Sullivan, Delius and Walton.

Local group Somebody's Image who had a hit first time out (on the W & G banner) with their cover version of "Hush" have now switched to EMI. Their first effort under the deal features the outfit with two Australian compositions, "Hide And Seek" and "Livin' In Style." Other local singles from EMI feature Joy McKean with "Dancin' Shoes" c/w "One More Letter," the Second Move-ment with "The Big Top" and "Fairyland," Bryan Davies with "You Won't Be The Last" c/w "The End Of Another Day," and the Castaways with "One More Fool" and "Baby, What I Mean."

There is little doubt that **Bobby Goldsboro** is on his way to his biggest hit ever in this area with his touching preformance of "Honey." Airplay is just enormous. Record is on the U/A label thru Festival.

The Monkees will be climbing all over the singles and album charts soon with "Valleri" and the album "Pisces, Aquarius, Capricorn & Jones, Ltd." Both are on RCA.

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With the Eurovision contest out of the way, Germany is now concentrating on its own pop festival with the finals set for the 4th of July in Berlin. One interesting development is the new method being used to choose the artists for the festival. Each record company in Germany has been invited to participate by nominating 3 artists for the event. The artists must have been in the top 30 listings of one of the 3 top trade papers in the last 3 years in order to qualify for nominations. 24 artists will be chosen for the event. Television and the promoters of the event may nominate other artists for the contest as well.

The juries will meet in Cologne on the 25-27 of April to listen to the entries and to choose the songs for the event. On the 29th of April, the record firms will meet to divide the songs for the festival for their artists. After a whole year of no festivals for the German industry, the new event is really looked forward to as a chance for local music to once again take over top positions in the hit parade.

The musical "Fiddler Cn The Roof" is a smash hit. The 70 performances to date have brought in over 85,000 viewers which means that the shows were over 80% sold out. The leading man, Shmuel Rodensky, has a contract until August and the Hamburg promoters are now considering running through the summer months instead of the pause that was planned.

The statistics are out for 1967 sales on records. Sales once again totaled about 100 million dollars. The number of LP's increased but due to a 7% increase in the sale of low-priced LP product, dollar volume did not increase. Single sales stayed about the same while LP sales increased almost 19% in volume. About 30% of the LP sales are classical records. Low-priced LP product acounts for about 50% of the total LP sales and about 25% of the value. The record industry did not compare figures with 1966 due to the fact that several new firms were represented for the first time in the statistics, but figures show that about 10 million more records were sold this year than ever before. Here are the figures.

Single records 27.2 million in 1967 compared to 23.9 million in 1966. EP sales decreased from 5.3 million in 1966 to 5.1 million in 1967. 10" LP's went up from 0.7 million to 0.9 million while the 12" LP went from 17.6 million in 1966 to 24.3 million in 1967. Don't forget, however, that more firms are in the statistics this year than ever before. Exports increased. 7.6 million singles and 9.4 million 12" LP's were exported. The import decreased, however. Firms that exclusively import records and do not manufacture records are not in the statistics. Total sales were 75.9 million records.

Jack Martin of Mondial Records is raving about the new recording done by trumpet star Roy Etzel for his label. Roy has had a pack of hits on other labels and is now swinging for the new Mondial group. Gunther Ilgner of Cornet Records is a happy man with 4 hits in the charts for his young record company. Rowland W. tops the list with 2 hits himself, "My Maria" and "Monja," followed by Peter Orloff with "City Girl" and Jacqueline Boyer with "Oh Cherie Je T'Aime." Despite the titles, all four songs are sung in German.

Hans Wewerka from Edition Modern is going all out for the promotion of Eva Pflug on Liberty Records. The popular young actress has started her singing career with a hit. The record had advance orders of 10,000.

The trade press is full of news of the "Song For Europe" Eurovision Festival. A concentrated attack is now in the works to try to get the method used in Germany for choosing the entry to the festival changed. Most sources prefer the English system of picking an artist and then having a contest of top writers for the winning song which then would represent the country.

That's it for this week in Germany.

COIN MACHINE NEWS

Editorial: Keeping Tabs

Any operator who's ever had occasion to drive a vehicle for the military will remember the near-sacred importance attached to keeping that vehicle's log book up to date. Gasoline, mileage, lubrication, coolant, etc. etc. must have been recorded every time that truck was used. Rather ridiculous, most of us thought.

But the thinking behind such religious recording of data often pays off in the long run. The log book gives the maintenance officer the complete history of any given motor vehicle at a glance. Likewise, some form of data control system can help the coin machine operator to improve the earning efficiency of his route, simply through an occasional review of the past earning performance and mechanical proficiency of specific machines at specific locations.

We're not suggesting any exhaustive filing system that might require the employment of additional personnel, although some of the large operating companies (especially full line vendors) have found it immensely helpful and economical to maintain a file clerk on the payroll. On the contrary, as easily workable file of index cards, separated by location, with individual cards for recording the weekly earnings of each machine, could serve most adequately. An additional cross section of cards, separated according to type of equipment and brand, can give the operation a strong indication on which machine serves him best at which location.

A third series of cards should be kept for record titles and their individual earnings, as determined by the popularity meter. When those money-earning records are finally removed from the phonograph, store them away and place their index cards in some sort of "mothball file." Logged alphabetically according to the artists' name, they can easily be retrieved to fill a request or to try out an experimental "oldie."

The main reason for filing such information is, naturally, to be able to watch the weekly earnings of each machine at each location and determine strategy based upon the earning patterns they reveal. As all operators know, some amusement games work very well at certain locations but practically die at others. Likewise, some record artists are great here, terrible there. Certainly, the routeman can often sense when a machine should be changed, but simply to rely upon intuition or location complaints is far from professional. What is professional is to know **in advance** exactly what type of merchandise makes money at each of your individual locations, and an up-to-date working card file can provide the necessary data. If it doesn't offer you a golden formula for operating, it at least can improve your odds.

Full Production Set for C-S Combi; Film/Record Unit Off to Motel Show

MELROSE, Mass.—Mickie Greenman, general manager of the Color-Sonics division of the National Radio Company, announced last week that full production on the firm's Combi-150 audio-visual/phonograph machine will begin April 22nd at the minimum rate of 150 units per month. Furthermore, the production run is scheduled to be increased by July to 250 units per month and continue at that rate thereafter.

Sample units have been on test location since February, according to Greenman, who revealed that collection grosses in the majority of cases were "above the previous music machine's average."

The Color-Sonics executive cites the Combi's $2-25\phi$ pricing on record play and the added income deriving from the film selections as responsible for the collection rise.



Talley Industries, Mesa, Ariz., who owns about 12 per cent of General Times' 2,125,000 outstanding shares, has attacked the proposed merger and is seeking proxies for the election of new directors at General Time's annual meeting Monday, April 22, 1968, with the reported intention of merging it into the Talley organization.

A General Time-Seeburg announcement said the proposed merger would not be voted upon at G.T.'s annual meeting, but the proposal will be submitted for necessary stockholder's approval at a "special stockholder's meeting to be held as soon as practicable thereafter." The merger reportedly could be com-pleted only if present G.T. management is continued.

General Times makes consumer clocks and industrial and military timing devices. Talley is a missile propellants producer. Seeburg reported net income totaling \$1,552,832, or \$1.01 per share, on sales totaling \$91,036,381 in its fiscal year ended Oct. 31, 1967. It its first quarter, net income was \$1,717,862, or 48 cents a share, on sales of \$24,939,728. General Time net income in fiscal 1967 was \$3,831,890, or \$1.80 a share, on \$129,514,000 in sales.

Japanese Coin Firm Hires 150 Grads; Move Heralds Prosperous Future

TOKYO—A new hiring record for major coin machine industry firms may have been set recently when Sega Enterprises officially employed 150 new graduates of universities, techni-cal schools and institutes.

cal schools and institutes. The massive infusion of graduates has its origin in the traditional Japan-ese way of engaging new personnel. Customarily, representatives of Ja-pan's top ranking firms approach and interview students in their senior year. Shortly after graduation, the students assemble for a ceremony marking their official entry into the company of their choice.

There is keen competition among leading corporations to engage stu-dents of demonstrable ability and com-petence. And, many students are mak-ing a choice based on growth potential. In preparation for today's hiring, Sega had its personnel people inter-viewing prospective graduates for sev-eral months.

Sega's growth record and bright outlook undoubtedly helped to persuade many of the top graduates to opt for a career in the leisure field. Of the 150 graduates, 20 will enter the R & D and Production Engineering departments and 10 will be assigned to Quality Control-a measure of the importance that Sega is placing on these professional skills.

At the welcoming ceremony held at

the Haneda Tokyu Hotel, Managing Director David Rosen greeted the graduates by noting that "This is a dramatic confirmation of our faith in the vigorous future of the industry: it is also an affirmation of your merit-ed confidence in the prospects of Sega." Sega.







Jukebox operators have been known to say that, in most instances, too much emphasis in promotional areas is placed on the radio while not enough on the operator. They also contend that it is quite possible for the oper-ator one day to become the major out-let for singles sales. It is for this reason, they say, that each label should have someone on their staff whose sole concentration is towards the juke-box. The jukebox, they freely admit, will probably never replace the radio, inasumch as making or breaking a hit —but in conjunction with the radio it contributes a great deal towards the record's success. Jukebox operators have been known record's success.

It seems apparent that the jukebox is finally being recognized as a ma-jor exposure medium, at least from the answers we got to the following question.

THE QUESTION

To what degree are you involved in record promotion to jukebox opera-tors?

THE ANSWERS

Paul Jalis-Decca

"We promote singles on a regular basis that we feel are particularly suited to boxes, which we call the "Blue Book Series." Decca is the orig-inator of this type of product and feels it is a valuable asset to the operator in programming his boxes with a wide variety of musical tastes."

Promotion Dept.---RCA Victor

Promotion Dept.—RCA Victor "Our distributors are in direct con-tact with one stops thruout the U.S. and are called upon on a regular basis. The RCA record division services a regular list of one stops, and thru Sterling Title Strip of New Jersey, makes direct promotional mailings on a particular new single with title strips, as well as special insert sheets which we at RCA prepare thru our promotion department."

Jim Wilson---Starday

Jim Wilson--Starday "We don't send every new release out to the operators, but we do mail them samples of new releases which we deem particularly suited for juke-boxes. I still feel that many things can be created thru jukebox play. To-day, so many operators depend upon the one stop pre-selecting something for them. Then you have some of the older operators still around who will hear something they like then go in and buy a few copies, put them on the machines--check the playmeter and find out that its doing real good--then go back and say, 'I'm gonna cover my route with that tune, get me 150 copies.' Instances like this are good evidence that the jukebox is quite cap-able of initiating and stimulating sales. We send out letters and flyers to operators on a regular basis to give to operators on a regular basis to give them information on what we do have available. I think there should be a

closer union among labels, one stops and distributors---a better coordination or a point of sell type of thing. It would be good for all concerned."

Mort Hoffman-Epic

Mort Hoffman—Epic "We recently mailed out two stereo singles samples to MOA member op-erators along with a survey to de-termining if there was a genuine need for stereo singles by operators. We also occasionally mail out other sam-ple packages featuring those of our artists who do particularly well on music boxes. Then we have our total location programming guide book where we suggest those past hits we feel are suited for the various types of locations such as bars, lounges, c&w, discotheques, etc. Epic has always been interested in the music operator and we will continue to serve their in-terests like we have in the past."

Tom Rogan—Liberty

Tom Rogan—Liberty "It has been company policy to promote to the operators thru the one stops. However, we recently compiled a list of operators in the New York Metropolitan area and will soon begin promoting directly to them on what we feel will be good jukebox material. This way they will know what is avail-able in advance. We also plan to promote country & western product thru the mail. We'll enclose a note say-ing that this product will be avail-able at your one stop on such and such a date."

Sol Handwerger-MGM

Sol Handwerger-MGM "MGM is involved to the degree of direct mailing of sample releases, newsprints of stories concerning them, record reviews from the trade and consumer press. Of course we con-tinually service the operator with free title strips. We have a number of other ideas, but I can't reveal what they are. We also promote thru one stops as well as directly to operators."

Neil Bogart---Buddah

"I believe we are the only label servicing jukebox operators directly. Buddah was the first label to come out with stereo singles for the operators. We conduct regular mailings of pro-motion sheets and title strips. We send them very important new releases, such as the Lemon Pipers, at the same time we send them to our distributors."

Henry Allen-Atlantic

Henry Allen—Atlantic "We have a direct service to the jukebox operator—we send them ma-terial just like we do the radio sta-tions. Many times, we even sit down and call them on the phone keeping them up to date as to what material we have available, especially the ma-terial from automatic jukebox artists like King Curtis. Then we have the little LPs. We will even cut little LPs on request if the operators can show us sufficient evidence they can use

Marty Hoffman-United Artists

"We conduct mailings to one stops which have a direct bearing on pro-motion to the operator. There's a new form of promotion with the changing market."

Sid Schaffer-Kapp

"First of all, we are a manufacturer that deals primarily with distributors and they service the jukebox opera-tors in their areas with title strips which we supply free of charge. We try to promote our 'name' jukebox artists such as Roger Williams, but have never sent out sample releases before."

Moe Preskell—ABC

"I can tell you that we should be a lot more into it than we are, but our jukebox promotion is limited at the moment. We promote our artists to the entire trade via the trade press. We realize the jukebox is a good ex-posure medium and will give it con-siderable thought in the near future."


WHAT CAN YOU DO? READ ON!

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
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
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
