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Memo To Conglomerates With Music Business Holdings:

Firstly, welcome to the music business. We believe your company has entered into one of the most exciting areas of leisure-time activities. Many of you are already acquainted with the leisure-time field through various service (e.g. restaurant chains) and creative (e.g. film company) organizations. Naturally, we like to believe that the music and record industry is unique. And the fact is that it is. Increasingly so, it is a leisure-time area that is greatly affecting all the arts and then some. Think of innovations in the theatre. literature and film-making and you're bound to uncover some association with a new approach to music or the individuality and stimulating nature of many of the industry's artists and behind-the-scenes talent. It is hardly necessary to detail his essentially little corner of the creative world's influence on fashions, social change and even politics. You see and hear of this influence-the good and bad of it, we may add-on a daily basis.

Since the music and record field is expressing a new freedom, one of the things it seems to cherish most these days is a freedom of its own a freedom to create on the basis of reality and—to the frustration of accounting departments!—at its own pace. These factors apply not only with regard to the inception and implementation of ideas, but to the rapidity with which concepts are accepted (or rejected) in the marketplace, particularly within the immensely competitive singles field. In a business sense, there is a continuous flow of taking-a-chance product. This does not mean-even when one is trying to beat the clockthat a great deal of thought and creative insight are casualties to speed and the germ of an idea. Much product in the music business is generated by thoughtful and knowledgeable people who realize they must apply their skills, at times, with speed.

So, once again welcome to the music business. We think your investment in this exciting leisure-time venture can reward your company with an important source of income, endless fascination and a sense of accomplishment. CashBox 10P100

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




MGM Committee Eyes Polk For President

Phono Sales Up In September

WASHINGTON—Phonograph sales to dealers increased 6.3% in Sept. over sales during the same month last year. A report from the Electronic Indus-tries Association said phone sales on a Auto radio sales to dealers moved ahead on both monthly and yearly bases wish a 2.9% advance recorded for the month of Sept. and an overall 6.5% increase on a year-to-date basis. Total phono sales for Sept. were 658,011, compared to 619,221 last year. Total phono sales for 1968 so far are 3,477,417, compared to 1967's 3,257,397.

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K&R Philosophy Gives Clue To Future Com'wealth Deals

NEW YORK-Commonwealth United Music has evolved a philosophy of record and music publishing company acquisitions that will guide the firm's

future growth. The guidelines, as outlined by Charles Koppelman and Don Rubin, who operate CU's music field inter-ests, will, if implemented, lead to CU's ests, will, if implemented, lead to CU's buy-out of major operations on the music and disk scene. According to Koppelman & Rubin, their philosophy has the full backing of CU's young president, Bruce Rozet. Buy Indies By Region The record company approach is one in which K&R will seek the acqui-sition of modest but established india

sition of modest, but established indie labels on a regional basis, and tie-in these companies with a central sales office and a network of wholly-owned distributors. K&R, whose own com-plex of music activities was purchased earlier this year by CU, intend to earlier this year by CU, intend to purchase hot indie companies in the east, west, south (plus Texas). Kop-pelman said that the management talent at each acquired label would the talent at each acquired label would remain intact, but that CUM's central sales unit would handle the adminis-tration and merchandising aspects of all the labels. The near future may well see the first in a series of such label buy-outs, since K&R are pres-ently well into several negotiations at this time.

at this time. Lasting Writer Stable The music execs' view within the music publishing area emphasizes the bringing together of top writing talent within the scope of the contem-porary scene. K&R feel that many of today's writers have the capability to create a continuous flow of hit ma-terial in the decades to come. Their aim is to establish a music publishing entity that parallels the growth of a Chappell Music, whose founder Max Dreyfus recruited the cream of the young talent of his day, like Jerome Kern, Richard Rodgers and Cole Porter. Within their era, K&R see such writers as Leonard Cohen, Joani Mitchell, Paul Simon and Laura Nyro as talents with long-term value. The heads of CUM indicate that they are working on the purchase of various music publishing companies that hold copyrights of these very writers. K&R copyrights of these very writers. K&R see themselves at a distinct advantage see themselves at a distinct advantage in their dealings with today's young writers. They say that their own youth makes it possible for these writers to relate to them. The music duo admits that they may have to pay an inflated price for such catalogs, but in terms of their growth potential, K&R stress that time will make these deals excellent buys. The team points to their own writer, Tim Hardin, as a

Garrett Co. To Omega For \$3 Mil + Stock

HOLLYWOOD - Snuff Garrett Productions moves into the Omega Equi-ties operation through a \$3 million cash transaction plus an undisclosed amount of Omega stock to be trans-ferred to Garrett and his associates.

Snuff Garrett Productions will now become a subsidiary company of Omega Equities, but will continue to operate as an independent publishing and record producing company. There will be no personnel changes made within the present set-up.

In the deal, Garrett has agreed to a long-term employment contract and along with his executive vice-presi-dent, Ed Silvers, will continue to build the publishing and producing end of the business. Their two recording labels, Viva and Bravo Records, are managed by vice-president, Mel Bly, Garrett's publishing companies in-clude Viva Music, Stone Canyon Music, Zapata Music and Baby Mona Music. Purchase Tax Increase Depresses English Trade, But See Xmas Boom

LONDON

The raising of purchase tax by Chancellor Roy Jenkins on Nov. 22 in consequence of the European mone-tary crisis depressed the record indus-try at the outset of its Christmas

try at the outset of its Christmas boom in sales. The price of singles rises from $3/3\frac{1}{2}$ to 8/d; Pop LP's increase by 10d or 11d to about £1. 17. 6d on average. Classical LP's rise by 1/-generally to £2. 3. 9d with propor-tionate increase for more expensive series. EP's are up by 4d making EMI group pop EP's in this category 12/d; Decca 13/4d and CBS EP's 13/3d. The

Pye Budget Line "Golden Guinea" is increased from £1. 4. 0. to £1. 4. 7½d and its Marble Arch series now be-comes 14/6d, an increase of 7d. At press time Music for Pleasure, the major budget enterprise, was still con-ferring on the extent of the price in-crease on its product

crease on its product. Exces Shocked Decca sales manager Colin Borland told Cash Box, "We are again as-tounded that records are treated as a luxury when two-thirds of our re-cording costs are on classical and educational product. The Chancellor (Continued on page 38)

This unit, encompassing TIC's production and record studio activities, among other entertainment field situations, will be under the direction of Miles other entertainment field situations, will be under the direction of Mike Curb, president, and Gordon "Bud" Frazier, executive vp. In joining this TIC section, Frazier leaves a 20-year association with Capitol Records, his most recent association being the helming of Tower Records, the Capitol indie affiliate formed under Frazier 4½ years ago. Curb moved into the TIC operation earlier this year via the company's purchase of his Side-walk Productions.

walk Productions. Sidewalk, the recently - acquired James William Guercio Enterprises and three recording studios presently fall under the umbrella of Transcon-tinental Entertainment Corp. Recording studio operation is supervised by

Larry Ferguson, general manager, who also announced that Chris Huston will operate TIC's Selma-Vine studio in Hollywood.

In Hollywood. TIC made its initial entry into the music field late last year when it be-gan a series of acquisitions in the wholesaling area. Seven major rack and distrib operations are now in the TIC folds, with billings of about \$100 million a year.

'Cabaret,' 'Mancha' London Short Runs

NEW YORK—Broadway musical hits, as the past decades bear out, do not mean success in England. Two unqualified American smashes folded last week after short runs. They are "Cabaret," after 13 performances, and "Man of La Mancha," an all-time classic still playing in New York, after 253 performances. Another U.S. production, "Sweet Charity," also called it a run in London last week after 14 months.

Because of this, K&R will soon bring in a music business lawyer who can carry on with the details of purchases after they are initiated by K&R.

New BMI-Radio Pact **Ups Radio Payments**

NEW YORK—A new five-year BMI pact, covering performance rights for the 1,000 member radio stations of the All Industry Radio Music Licensing Committee, will become effective Jan. 1, 1969. NEW YORK-A new five-year BMI

According to Elliott Sanger of the Committee, a 1.25% fee will be initi-ally levied on all stations whose "net any levied on all stations whose "net receipts from advertisers after deduc-tions" are less than \$80,000, while those outlets whose net receipts ex-ceed \$80,000 will pay an initial 1.48% fee. Fees will be upped by about 2/10 of 1% in the final three years of the contract contract.


20th Reaffirms **ABC** Disk Ties

The company added that ABC is planning even more aggressive promo drives for key soundtrack albums, including "Jo-anna" (score by Rod McCuen), "Star!" and "Doctor Doolittle" (score by Leslie Briccuse). Latter film begins its first non-roadshow engagements during the year-end Holiday Season.

2-LP Packages Show Strength On Charts

NEW YORK—Four 2-record albums are currently on Cash Box' Top 100 Albums chart, and all of them are big hits. Two of the sets, "Electric Ladyland," by the Jimi Hendrix Expe-rience on Reprise, and "Wheels Of Fire," by the Cream on Atco, have both made #1 and have both been certified as gold albums by the Rec-ord Industry Association of America (RIAA) for sales of one million dol-lars or more.



Under the terms of the merger agreement, which has been approved by the Boards of both corporations, Screen Gems stock-holders will exchange one share of their present stock for one share of their present stock for one share of the common stock of Columbia Pic-tures Industries, Inc. The proxy statements pointed out that the proposed merger "has been the subject of careful consideration by the Boards of both corporations, and the merger is unanimously recom-mended." Stockholders were also advised that "it is the opinion of



management that the merger of Screen Gems and Columbia will en-able the combined enterprise to furth-er expand its activities and increase the effectiveness and profitability of its operations."





The Pentangle (Reprise 6315) The Pentangle, like Music From Big Pink, is a musical experience which has its own identity, unlike most "pop music" today. The reason for this is simply that the musical is nivolved are professionals and their musical tastes professionals and their musical tastes and abilities have guided their careers, not dollar signs or star status.

A good stereo system is essential for A good stered system is essential for fully appreciating this album, which was produced by Shel Talmy, well-known in England as a producer (the Who, the Kinks, etc.). He has done an excellent job on this album, especially since the only amplified instrument in the group is Danyy Thompson's base since the only amplified instrument in the group is Danny Thompson's bass. Probably he used pickups on the acous-tic guitars of Bert Jansch and John Renbourn on several cuts. The produc-tion job of recording the drums of Terry Cox is great and compliments the two guitars beautifully. The fifth members of the group is

singer Jacqui McShee, whose voice reminds us a little of Marianne Faithful. Her combination of Blues and Folk stylings merge in a unique delivery, however, and one has the feeling that he's listening to a great sexy female voice.

voice. Her stylings are best heard on the first minute of "Pentangling," which is also probably the best group effort, on "Mirage," and on "Hear My Call," a Staple Singers song. Her Blues phras-ing is great on "Way Behind The Sun," "Let No Man Steal Your Tyme" shows her ability with a folk song. She also harmonizes well with Bert Jansch on two cuts.

Bert Jansch was the one responsible, more than anyone else for forming this group. He has been well known to folk enthusiasts for many years as an excel-lent guitarist and songwriter, Donovan has recorded some of his material and claims to have been influenced by him.

He and John Renbourn, another wellknown guitarist, form the backbone of the Pentangle. Together their guitar work on this album explores untapped areas of the instrument's potential: they make this album a tribute to and a high point in the history of the Gui-tar. One can find traces of Blues, Folk, Jazz and Classical forms all through the album and especially on "Pentangling," a 7-minute-20-second excursion in-to many areas of nusic by each mem-ber of the group and also collectively. The guitars can be heard on every

The guitars can be heard on every cut complementing each other, sliding off, or calling and responding to one another. The best individual licks can be heard on "Bruton Town," "Bells," and "Waltz," a jazz-like instrumental which has an inspired bass solo by Dan-ny. Themsen, hand clamping and ny Thompson, hand clapping, and a triumphant yell signifying the end of the album.

drummer Cox, has been like bassist Thompson a respected studio musician for years and really proves it on "Way Behind The Sun" and "Bells" with ex-ceptional brush work.

Every cut on the album is good, with the group arranging most of the ma-terial. The material consists mainly of arrangements of traditional folk and blues songs and original group compo sitions. There is also a group adapta-tion of a Bert Jansch tune, "Mirage," and an excellent version of the Staple Singers' "Hear My Call."

It's refreshing to hear the clean sound of this album, not cluttered by powerful amps or added instrumenta-tion. One can feel a closeness to the instruments that, heretofore, was a hard task in the pop music field. It is one of the best albums one will ever hear, and as the liner notes say, "Play this rec-ord to those you love." FRED DENTE



DIANA ROSS & THE SUPREMES AND THE TEMPTATIONS (Motown 1137)

DIANA ROSS & THE SUPREMES AND THE TEMPTATIONS (Motown 1137) I'm Gonna Make You Love Me (2:56) [Act Three, BMI—Gamble, Ross] With both the Supremes & the Temptations holding firm in the top selling spots, the Motown acts team for the first time in a single that will be featured on their upcoming television special (scheduled for Dec. 9). The pop-blues smash "I'm Gonna Make You Love Me" comes on strong in a performance that has already broken wide open with the sales climax yet to come. Flip: "A Place in the Sun" (4:20) [Stein & Van Stock, ASCAP —Miller Welle] -Miller, Wells1

BEE GEES (Atco 6639) I Started a Joke (3:04) [Casserole, BMI-B, R & M Gibb] Crystal ballad in the softer Bee Gees vein (more akin to "Words" than "Gotta Get a Message to You") brings the group back for what could well become their biggest single yet. Paradoxical imagery offers magnetic charm to mystical interpretation, and the stellar vocal should make this a top teen track. Flip: "Kilburn Towers" (2:13) [Same credits.]

TOMMY JAMES & THE SHONDELLS (Roulette 7028)

Crimson & Clover (3:23) [Big Seven, BMI-James, Lucia] Stepping down the tempo and stepping up the production quality, Tommy James and the Shondells pour out a teen-typed ballad which should have them scoring rapidly with both their regular fans and pop aficionados who formerly decried their teeny-only appeal. Strong finish puts a golden cap on the session, Flip: "(I'm) Taken (2:28) [Patricia/Sweet Magnolia, BMI-Anders, James]

ARCHIE BELL & THE DRELLS (Atlantic 2583) (There's Gonna Be a) Showdown (2:35) [Downstairs/Double Diamond, BMI-Gamble, Huff] Cute reversal of western imagery in the lyrics and an "I Just Can't Stop Dancing" flavored workout bring Archie Bell & the Drells into the breakout spotlight once again. The new side is a fine dance track with a pretty twist that guarantees "listen again" attention. Should happen. Flip: "Go for What You Know" (2:07) [World War III, BMI-Melvin, Mervin]

TOM JONES (Parrot 40035) A Minute of Your Time (3:00) [Anne-Rachel, ASCAP-Westlake] Tom Jones may have bypassed Les Reed material for his new single, but the memory lingers on to haunt his style on a sparkling ballad. Deli-cious love lyric is heartened by Jones' singular vocal muscle and a middle of-the-road string section underplayed with some pop bass riffs. Overall impact for the young and not quite so. THE FOUR SEASONS (Philips 40577) Electric Stories (2:45) [Screen Gems/Columbia, BMI-Petrillo, Linzer] Stepping off with "Saturday's Father" the Four Seasons have been building a new group sound that progresses on this effort. New track is a lightly progressified pop sampling which trims the falsetto vocal and adds fuzz to the Valli + Seasons work. New direction for the quartert, and a new hit from them. [No flip info.]

JOHN SEBASTIAN (Kama Sutra 254) She's a Lady (1:45) [Faithful Virtue, BMI-Sebastian] Soft styled ballad with a sampling of folk and enough easy-pop to attract the notice of both middle-of-the-road and ton forty programmers. Delightful performance and material would be enough to start the action, and with John Sebastian's reputation in progressive circles, underground exposure adds icing to the hit cake. NEL YOUNG (Reprise 0785) The Loner (3:05) [Cotillion/Broken Arrow, BMI-Young] Writer-performer Neil Young bows with Reprise in a date fondly reminis-cent of his work with the deceased Buffalo Springfield. Tremendous power in the instrumentals and his vocal should have Young rising Phoenix-like from the ashes with this single. Track is mid-speed and dynamite for pop and progressive formats. 

A new policy in the servicing of new album product to the radio outlets in the smaller markets has been initiated by Warner Bros.-Seven Arts Records. According to Bill Casady, national promotion manager of the label, the plan was formulated following a re-cent NAB-RIAA conference in Den-ver, during which it was revealed that many of the smaller radio stations were serviced too late or not at all in the delivery of new album product. This problem was one of the main topics at the conference, and was dis-cussed by Charles Stone, vice presi-dent of radio for the NAB, Henry Brief of the RIAA, and Casady. Warner Bros.-Seven Arts will execute its new plan to aid the smaller outlets via a subscription service. Beginning with the label's January-February album release, a flyer listing each LP will be mailed out to the stations in question. The flyer will include such information as description of music, and whether the artist is new or established. The recipient would mark which of the albums his outlet would need and return the flyer to WB-7 Arts. These LP's would be shipped to the stations at a minimal cost of \$1.25 each, or \$2.50 for double pocket. Stereo albums would be offered ex-clusively—with the notation of only one of a kind to a station. To ac-commodate those outlets that want to participate and build up their record library, Warner Bros.-Seven Arts is mailing a catalog containing its 75 best-selling LP's. Casady believes this new pocedure of letting stations order their own albums will result in more round-the-clock airplay of WB-7 Arts product because the outlets will have selectivity in choosing what they need to fit their programming format. product because the outlets will have selectivity in choosing what they need to fit their programming format.



The membership of Big-Brother consisted of the explosive Janis Joplin, lead vocal; Peter Album, bass, vocals; Sam Andrew, lead and rhythm guitar, vo-cals; James Gurley, lead and rhythm guitar, vocals; and David Getz, drums. vocals. Big Brother's first Columbia album, "Cheap Thrills," reached the number one spot on the charts and achieved a gold record. While record-ing for Mainstream Records, Big Brother won chart status with the sin-gle "Down On Me" and the LP "Big Brother And The Holding Company." The group attained national recogni-tion in the summer of 1967 at the Mon-terey Pop Festival. Born in June 1966 in Port Arthur, Texas, Janis Joplin sang country music and blues with an Austin bluegrass band, and sang the blues in Frisco bars before joining Big Brother. Most of the group's music was written by Sam Andrew and Peter Albin, with Janis writing the lyrics. "Piece Of My Heart," on Columbia, was the final Big Brother chart single in 1968.





Sen. Murphy Presents Artist Fee Section

LOS ANGELES — Senator George Murphy (Republican-Calif.) will co-sponsor legislation that would pave the way for royalty payments to re-cording artists and record companies for the commercial use of their re-corded works.

Senator Murphy's co-sponsorship of Senator Murphy's co-sponsorship of the legislation was revealed by Stan Kenton, Chairman of the National Committee for the Recording Arts. The NCRA, comprised of the na-tion's recording artists, was organized two years ago to gain support for the proposed Williams Amendment to the new Copyright Legislation currently pending before Congress. The amend-ment would give artists, musicians, arrangers and record companies copy-right protection similar to that enjoyed by composers and publishers for the past 50 years. Kenton Cites Need

Kenton Cites iveed In an address prepared for a meet-ing of the California Copyright Con-ference at the Hollywood Plaza Hotel here last Tues. (26), Kenton said that "a large portion of the enterthat "a large portion of the enter-tainment industry exists primarily, if not solely, by the use of recorded music. Yet, these users pay nothing to the performers for the commercial use of their creations." Kenton said that recorded music is used in about "75 per cent of all radio air time and this time accounts for more than 80 near cont of radio revenue about \$800. per cent of radio revenue—about \$800 million."

Following renovation, the studio will accommodate: a 19 by 27 foot con-trol and re-mix room; a studio 33 by 39 feet with 23 foot high ceilings; a 16-foot-square lacquer cubicle; a 19 by 27 foot recreation room; four accoustical echo chambers; four EMT echo chambers; a 12 by 14 foot bus-iness office; and a large tape storage area. The studio console will accommo-date 20 mike inputs and eight channel iness office; and a large tape storage area. The studio console will accommo-date 20 mike inputs and eight channel outputs, with direct submix to 4, 2, or 1, wet or dry. The console also con-tains three cue circuits and four echo feed and returns on any or all inputs. And all stereo has pan pots to give dimension and depth to stereo re-cordings. The console will include au-tomatic control for selsyncing rec-ords. According to Mort Thomasson, Monument engineer and construction coordinator, "The studio is being de-signed primarily to accommodate the artists and musicians who will be re-cording. It is this feature which has been ommitted by more recent studio construction. We have planned the studio with the comfort of the artists and musicians in mind." Initially, the sound facilities will be used exclusively by Monument Record Corporation artists.

Kenton added that radio stations pay to composers and publishers about \$20 million in royalties, or 2.8 per cent of total broadcast expenses cent of annually.







Purchase Tax Increase (Continued from page 7) has not helped us to maintain or in-crease our export business by this move. One of the definitions of the word luxury in the Concise Oxford Dictionary is "choice foods" and choice foods do not seem to be sub-jected to any amount of purchase tax. We, ourselves, have not increased our LP prices since July 1963." Ken East, managing Director of EMI Records said, "The last imposi-tion was bad enough and this one, al-though smaller, doesn't help at all. It's like kicking a man when he's down." A spokesman for Pye Records com-mented, "Although we understand the economic difficulties of the country we think it is very unfair that, once again, the record industry is to be knocked in this way." RCA record division managing di-rector Bernard Ness said, "I don't think that the increase in purchase tax will make all that much difference to the sale of records but I would qualify that by saying that sales are already depressed by the penal tax levied on them. It is a ridiculous amount. Also the cost of distribution and other main and ancillary services will go up and no doubt this will eventually be passed on to the public." The only comment CBS managing director Ken Glancy had to make was "quite discouraging." Christopher Fross honorary secre-tary of the Gramophone Record Re-tailers Committee of the Music Trade Association said, "Records aren't alone in this. The percentage increase is about 2½% which is generally a sales deterrent in itself but this is the third increase in taxation since this government took power. People are not saving money like they used to—if there was faith in the govern-ment people would save more and this tax would not have been necessary. 

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








GET IT ON—Pacific Gas & Electric—Power P 701



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

Mann's latest excursion is into the world of pop/soul, as he unleashes a potent tribute, but done in an original manner, to Ray Charles. Although only one song on this set ("I Got A Woman") was written by Charles, all are associated with him. Should have appeal to pop, jazz, and soul fans.

BRER SOUL—Melvin Van Peebles—A&M SP 4161

BRER SOUL—Melvin Van Peebles—A&M SP 4161 Melvin Van Peebles, black novelist and poet, has put together a strange, haunting album of poems set to music, which he delivers in a down-to-earth, compelling style. The power of the album is difficult to de-scribe, and, since most of the cuts aren't suitable for airplay over any but the most progressive outlets, the success of this set will depend on reviewers comments and word of mouth. Our comment: this album deserves to be heard and appreciated.



Buckley, Jr.—Jubilee JGS 2-5033 On August 28, 1968, at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago, the dele-gates debated on what the party's plank on Vietnam was to be. Since the debate was held in the afternoon, few Americans saw the events on TV or heard them on radio. Thus, this 2-record set, which includes the voices of the "hawks" and those of the "doves," is a valuable informational docu-ment of contemporary history. Noted con-servative spokesman William F. Buckley, Jr., narrates and comments extensively on the various arguments.

DUKE ELLINGTON 'NORTH OF THE BORDER' IN CANADA—Ron Collier Or-chestra With Duke Ellington, Soloist—Decca chestra W DL 75069

DL 75069 An unusual effort from Duke Ellington, cut on behalf of the Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada to help promote the work of Canadian composers, this LP features the Duke sitting in with a hand-picked aggregation of Canadian musicians, conducted by Ron Collier. The highly interesting jazz compositions on the LP were written by Ron Collier, Gordon Delamont, and Norm Symonds. Well worth listening to.

THE WAY AHEAD—Archie Shepp—Im-pulse A 9170 Archie Shepp is one of the leading figures in the avant-garde jazz movement, and he holds his position by adding just the right amount of experimentation to the more tradi-tional patterns. Shepp's tenor sax is ably abetted on this set by Walter Davis Jr. on piano, Ron Carter on bass, Jimmy Owens on trumpet, Grachan Moncur III on trombone, and Beaver Harris and Roy Haynes alternat-ing on drums. LP features 3 new tunes, plus Ellington's "Sophisticated Lady." Should move well in jazz circles.

SIBELIUS: THE SEVEN SYMPHONIES— New York Philharmonic/Bernstein—Colum-bia MSS 784 The seven symphonies of Finnish com-poser Jean Sibelius (1865-1957) receive excel-lent performances from Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic on this five-record set. Bernstein offers a striking inter-pretation of each of the symphonies, and, taken as a whole, the package is monumental. Since his death, Sibelius' reputation has con-tinued to grow, and albums like this can only help the cause along.

BREAKTHROUGH!—Louie Bellson—Project 3 PR 5029 SD Louie Bellson's dynamic drumming comes through brilliantly on this solid big band LP. There is good work by sax man Pete Christlieb, particularly on "I Remember Bird." Bellson's driving rhythms give force to such items as "Shuffle Off To Broadway,' and "3x5+16," both of which he penned Other selections of note include "Ode To Billy Joe" and the title track. This is the big band sound at its best.

FROM PRE-WAR MUSICAL COMEDIES —Various Artists—Request SRLP 9027 This 2-LP set contains refurbished selections from 78 rpm recordings of pre-war German and Austrian musical comedies. The man behind the set is Hans Lengsfelder owner of Request Records, who, in earlier years, wrote, with Siegfried Tisch, the lyrice for all the shows represented in this pack age. Top stars of the era, among them Fried Czepa, Gusti Huper, Franz Engel and Frit Schulz, are heard on the disks.

STRAIGHT AHEAD—Count Basie—Do DLP 25902 Pianist Count Basie fronts his orchestr

Pianist Count Basie fronts his orchestr in a swinging, full-throttle excursion throug big band jazz country. Jazz aficiandos in ger eral and Basie buffs in particular will wan to latch onto this buoyant set, which, in addi tion to the title track, includes such com pelling items as "It's Oh, So Nice," "Swite In Time," and "Hay Burner." Sammy Nestice who arranged and conducted the LP, wrot all nine tunes on the disk.

ARRIVAL OF A YOUNG GIANT—Crai Hundley Trio—World Pacific WPS 21880 The youthful Craig Hundley Trio, in per forming twelve jazz tunes, displays a technic facility and mature sensitivity that man older musicians might envy. The Trio cor sists of Hundley, piano; Jay Jay Wiggin bass; and Gary Chase, drums. Tightly-kni smooth renditions of "Arrival," "It Was Very Good Year," "Eleanor Rigby," ar "Departure" are among the fine session Already having received exposure on suc TV'ers as the Johnny Carson Show, th Craig Hundley Trio bids fair to become major jazz attraction.

IN THE CLASSIC STYLE—Christophe Parkening—Angel S 36019 Christopher Parkening, the 20-year-ol American guitarist whom Andres Segov recently named as one of his successors (onl four others have been accorded that honor makes his recording debut with this albun and another, "In The Spanish Style," issue simultaneously. Parkening is a brilliant teei nician, and his future as a major guitari-is virtually assured. Lovers of classic guitar music will surely want to own th album, which contains pieces by Bach, Wei-and Tansman, and "In The Spanish Style which contains works by Mudarra, Sor, Ta rega, Albeniz, Moreno Torroba, Ponce, Villa Lobos, and Lauro.

into a step).

There was nothing wrong with any of the acts that followed (in fact there were several bright moments), there were several bright moments), but taken as a whole the performances of Hank Ballard ("Let's Go, Let's Go, Let's Go" and "How Cou Gonna Get Respect If You Haven't Cut Your Process Yet), Marva Whitney ("Love Makes A Women," "Who Can I Turn To" and "Respect"), Ramsey Lewis Trio ("Wade In The Water," "The In Crowd" and others), the Manhattans ("I Want My Baby" and others; their footwork caused a lot of excitement also) and a strong comic, Clay Tyson, were just to much strain on our fa-culties. The Butterfly are imost a religious-mystical experiimost a religious-mystical experi-nce, depending heavily on lyrical and iusical chants to create a suitable tmosphere, and they performed their

tmosphere, and they performed their tes well. Canned Heat is the super-hot Los ngeles hard-blues band, and received ie strongest acceptance in terms of ocal audience response. The Heat ave only one failing: they have no itstanding solo artists (many good roups don't), but (perhaps because f the heavy use of solos by the nglish blues bands like (Jeff Beck Ten Years After) they engage in

super-long (and mostly uninteresting) solo work. When the Heat play to-gether, they display a hard, soul-filled sound which any other group would be hard-put to match. Their lead singer, Bear, can be described as a male Janis Joplin, constantly on the move, and creating excitement wherever he goes. Tunes on th set included "Sandv's Blues," "We Love You, "Sonny Boy" and "Boogie." The Youngbloods, originally a New York group, have been out on the West Coast for some time, and this engagement was their first perform-ance here in quite some time. Now

west coust for some time, and this engagement was their first perform-ance here in quite some time. Now down to three members, the folk-rock based group, have gained enough skill and maturity to enable them to turn the volume on their amplifiers down to an acceptable level. And they're well worth hearing. Material ranged from Chuch Berry's "Too Much Mon-key Business," to Dino Valenti's al-most-standard "Get Together," to Fred Neil's "The Dolphin," and also included "Darkness," "Moxie," an in-strumental, "Ain't That Loving You" and "Beautiful." 

It's been a long while since a locally-produced deck appeared on our weekly national best sellers list, but with the amount and type of product being locally done right now, it won't be too long before the Australian aritsts themselves are again figuring in our chart. For instance, Festival Records have some strong chart contenders in "Age Of Consent" by Ronnie Burns, "Baby, It's You" by Jeff Philips; and "Chris-topher Robin," the new one for the Executives. E.M.I. have the new single by their golden-boy Johnny Farnham with a revival of "I Saw Monmy Kissing Santa Claus" which is the first Farnham record to be handled by Howard Gable, the new staff producer for the company. In addition to this one, Howard is also working on new sides for several of our top groups such as the Twilights, the Zoot, the Groove, the Master's Apprentices, and Marcie & the Cookies, all to be released by EMI before Christmas. Astor Records are out with the new duet side for Anne & Johnny Hawker, "You're Out Of Your Mind"; newcomer Matt Flinders is represented with "Something Is Happening"; Philips Records are in the local field with "Happy Without You" by the Strangers, and "Kilroy Was Here" by the Leather Sandwich. With all this action on the biggest batches of locally-produced discs we've seen for ages, it is more than likely that Australian artists will soon be show-ing again on our national chart. John Bromell, professional Manager of the Essex Music group of companies, is on-the-road on behalf of several hot items including "Wichita Lineman" by Glen Campbell, "Here We Go Around The Lemon Tree" by Jason Crest, "As Long As He Needs Me" by Shani Wallis, "Path Of Love" by John Cowsill, and "Kilroy Was Here" by the Leather Sandwich. Essex have mounted a very special campaign on "The Yard Went On Forever" by Richard Harris. John Sayers, a fine young recording engineer, has joined the ever-expanding operation of Bill Armstrong Studios in Melbourne. Sayers, who comes

with a lecoluling contract and a strong press coverage that they may visit the United States soon. New sheet music copies out through the Allans Music group of publishing companies include "Down Here On The Ground" (Allans), "Indian Reservation" (Acuff-Rose), "My Little Lady" (Davis), "Sweet November" (Acuff-Rose), and "Timothy" (Acuff-Rose). Allans have also issued the first in a series of miniature study scores of contemporary Australian serious works which will be widely used in conservatoria throughout Australia. The composers represented in the first group are Douglas, Dreyfus, Le Gallienne, & Werder. Target Music, the publishing company owned here by Jimmy Stewart and operated through the Leeds office, have the local rights to "Jesamine" by the Casuals. The record is starting to move here and Jimmy Stewart is expecting big things from it. The English company Mills Music through their promotion manager Tony Hiller are handling the affairs of Jimmy Stewart is Sweet-Peach Company for the English market. Sweet-Peach have just completed production on an album by Kevin Johnson entitled "In The Quiet Corners of My Mind." Doug Ashdown & the Grass Hart have completed their first "continuity" album for Sweet-Peach records. The set is entitled "A Day In The Death Of Davy Cohen" which was written by Doug Ashdown & Jimmy Stewart. Promi-nent English record producer Allan A. Freeman has now settled in Australia and will be working in conjunction with Jimmy Stewart on several projects. Allan A. Freeman over the years has been associated in the record production field with such artists as Frank Sinatra, Sammy Davis, Lonnie Donegan, Kenny Ball, Pet Clark, etc. Allan has a close personal tie with Australia in view of the fact that his father was born here. Chappell & Co. Limited have released sheet copies on two of the songs from the new Australian musical production "Her Only Mistake," composed by Bernadette Alam. The number are "I Love A Sunburnt Country" and "The Beaut Country." Chappell's, on behalf of E. H. Morris, ha

The German Pop Music Festival which accounts for the sale of millions of records has made some important rule changes for 1969. The Festival which will be held in Berlin on July 3rd is trying very hard to make everyone happy. Therefore, rules have been changed to cover the criticism of last year's event. The major changes are as follows: 1. 2 separate juries will pick the entries for the preliminaries from the hundreds of songs entered. Each jury will consist of 2 representatives of the 2nd German TV as they televise the event, 2 representatives of German radio who will broadcast the event, 2 members of the Organization for the Promotion of German Dance and Popular Music, the sponsors of the event, a trade journalist, and a lawyer who will be the non-voting head of the jury. Last year, 3 juries picked the entries. One was mainly composers; one, lyric writers; and one, representatives of the record industry with trade journalists and representatives of TV and radio also on hand. 2. The jury members may not enter the event as authors or lyric writers. Last year, the jury members were allowed to enter and many protests were heard.

heard. 3. The juries will meet from 4 to 6 days to hear the entries and every entry must be heard from start to finish. 4. The limitation of instrumentation for the demonstration recordings has been extended. Last year, 2 melody and 3 rhythm instruments could be used and several entries were disqualified because they used an electric organ which was not allowed. This year, the electric organ is allowed. 5. A limited publicity is allowed for the entries for the finals. Last year, this was specifically not allowed. However, comparative advertising is not

this was specifically not allowed. However, comparative advertising is not allowed. 6. The amount of entries per person is unlimited as it was in the past. 7. The final date for entries is the 10th of March. 8. The qualification for entry will be decided this month. Aberbach Music writes that Caterina Valente has just recorded the Italian goodie "Una Canzone" in German as her next recording for this market. Dr. Hans Sikorski dropped us a line to tell us that his son, Dr. Hans Sikorski, Jr., has taken over as general manager of his publishing firms. Gaby Richt of Metric Music is working hard on "On The Road Again" from Canned Heat, "Land Of 1000 Dances" which they just took over in their catalog and a whole heap of German hottes including new waxings from Vic Dana, Thomas Fritsch and Hardy Hepp. Hans Blume of Hansa Records told us that they picked "Greensleeves" as the next single for Italian trumpet star Nini Rosso over 37 other songs which have been produced with the artist. Notice just came from German Vogue that Hans Richard Danner, press chief and head of German production for the firm, is leaving his post on the 31st of March next year. He will continue to be associated with Vogue as an inde-pendent producer. That's it for this week in Germany.

Reinhold Svensson, well-known jazz pianist for more than 35 years, died Nov. 23 on a tour in Sweden. He would have celebrated his 49th birthday this Christmas. Just a few months after his birth, he became blind. In 1933 he started with jazz music and soon became one of Sweden's top names, often heard in radio and at dance restaurants. He also made a large number of recordings, many of them exported to other countries, among others to the U.S. Actual releases from Scan-Disc Recording Co. AB includes a new LP album with Tor Bergner who has recorded 12 of his own ballads. New singles include Greyhounds who have done two local songs in English, Larrys with a new local version of the oldie "10,000 miles" and "It's Been A Long. Long Time," Anne-Christine Ek has done Swedish versions of "Sunshine Girl" and a German tune, Skepparn (the Skipper) has done two local ballads and Jeja Sundström has done "Piccolo Man" in Swedish b.w. a German tune.



Once in many years, a record appears that may be considered the start of a new era for the music of a country. The case applies to Leonardo Favio whose first album has been released by CBS this week. It is difficult to explain why we consider this album so important, but it may be said that Favio has obtained a much-seeked combination between elements from tango and folk music, along with music from other countries, with results in form of ballads that have already proved its appeal to the market through the sale of 230,000 singles of "Fuiste Mia en Verano" in only six weeks. The album carries a series of songs that in most cases describe situations common to the people of Buenos Aires, including a song dedicated to his wife Carola, and another one where she increase of its commercial value in the international market. Is radio dead? The question was posed months ago by deejay Hugo Guerrero Marthineitz who was offered to start a radio program on Radio Belgrano and took what was considered a bad slot: the 2 to 6 PM period. He started his "Show Of The Minute" with pop, tango and folk music, jokes and interviews, in a way that was very little known in Argentina. In six months, the results have been astonishing. According to a research made by a local magazine, he now has 97% of the same Guerrero at Luna Park, a sort of Madison Square Garden in Buenos Aires. With publicity placed only in his program alo some other radio announcements, a crowd of 8,000 gathered to listen to Los Chal-chaleros, Edmundo Rivero, Roberto Goyeneche and the Cuarteto Vocal Zupay. Odon reports strong promotion work for the recent single by Yaco Monti, recorded in France. Title, as reported before, is "El Mundo que me Rodea" and is part of an album recorded by Yaco Winki. Received strong pub-licity at the recent Festival Buenos Aires de la Canción. It is expected that the waxing will sell as strongly as "The Music Played," the first Monro recording released in Argentina some months ago. RCA is releasing a string of strong LP's in a "Summer

tagged "14 de Coblan y Cadicanio" carrying fourteen standard tangos penned by well-known composers. Waxing will be done by Alberto Di Paulo and his orchestra with seven singers.
Phonogram's Press Dept. infos about the award received by arranger and musician Ariel Ramirez from the Fondo Nacional de las Artes for his work in behalf of Argentine music. Ramirez recently presented his work "La Misa Criolla" at the Gran Rex Theater with Los Fronterizos and choir and recorded recently an album with the same Fronterizos and Eduardo Falu.
Music Hall reports the release of a single with the main title from Richard Lester's "Petulia," currently being screened in Buenos Aires; a new album by Ecuadorian chanter Julio Jaramillo; another one by Johnny Albino; an EP by top selling regional chanter Rodolfo Zapata; an EP by tango and candombe singer Alberto Castillo; and a single by Mia Farrow, released orignally by Dot in the States.
Korn Publishers report the acquisition of the songs by the Bee Gees and Cream and the music from "Star!" The pubbery also has the rights to "Up With People!," the music movement that has recently reached this country, and to the latest song by the Tremeloes: "My Little Lady." As reported previously, the new address of Korn is Belgrano 1478, with phone number 37-5061.

Microfon's topper Mario Kaminsky infos about the recording of "Zamba de las Malvinas" by Los Changos de Anta, a single that is receiving strong radio promotion. The diskery presented recently the album produced by Julio Marbiz, "Creo en Dios," with a barbecue party at the Club YPF.

EDITORIAL: Meeting the Need

Sociologists, economists and other professional observers of the American scene say the decades immediately before us will be marked by what they term the "leisure timeboom." There's little guesswork in their prediction that the average American will soon have more free time on his hands than ever, and more money to spend enjoying that time. All the data is before us: there's the shrinking work week and work day, higher than ever per capita income, plus an unusual population metamorphosis that now finds half its citizens under 30-a citizenry that becomes more educated year by year to insure that fiscal and occupational prosperity will continue. Question is, are we prepared to meet it?

Music and amusement machine operators (distributors and manufacturers as well) are undeniably in the entertainment business. Our trade has aptly filled a vital public need for leisure relaxation for many years. Our jukeboxes have been termed "everyman's opera" and our games his "competitive sport." But, have we really given serious thought to how the socio-economic changes in American attitudes now taking place will effect our future business? If so, what are we doing to modernize our operational services and techniques and the machines we use to capitalize on a more demanding public; or will we be satisfied simply to work with the status quo of the street location that we all

know and love. The obvious answer is—a little of both. Leisure time recreation usually brings such thoughts to mind as ski weekends and European vacations. But let's leave that impression to the novelists and consider the real meaning. For one thing, it means more people will be eating out . . . so think what you can do to improve your position at the restaurant location. Lots of cars on the road today with lots of folks stopping at roadside hamburger places and gas stations . . . so think what you might do in this area. Another thing, more people are anxious to explore new avenues of entertainment, apart from the movies, the theater and the football game. Think about the "family

fun center'' style of arcade. You know, guite a number of such places are now in operation, some offering over-the-counter food service in addition to the games room. How about it?

Again, with more money to spend, the folks will be more ready than ever to drop coins into your music and amusement machines. Here the answers are obvious: get with the play price increase trend; get going with the new games coming out of our factories; get with such merchandising ideas as the dollar blll accepters. In short, take maximum advantage of what our distributors have on the showroom floor, because only with crisp, clean and imaginative machines is this trade going to make hay.

Leisure time isn't measured in two week vacations abroad. For the wage earner, it's measured in hours away from the job. For his missus, it's free time out with the girls now afforded by modern home appli-ances. These are the idle hours that can just as well be spent enjoying our equipment as sitting at home watching the boobtube-but only if we make our services appealing.

More specifically, explore the possibility of installing a coin op recreation room in factories for the workers. With shorter hours and staggered shifts, this area now becomes more feasible. As attitudes change, more women are coming into your tap rooms. Make sure your amusement machines and the records on your jukes fit the female taste, if this is the case on your route. Watch your audience well. If one of your spots is losing customers to a place down the street, it just might be some exciting new amusement game that's drawing them.

Our goal then should be to take serious stock of what we have standing on the route right now, consider the necessary steps for improvement and keep one eye out for areas of expansion that are sure to open for us in the years ahead. Let's stay on top of this "leisure boom." Update your business before the jet generation passes you by. America is marching to a faster pace . . . make sure you're in step.

Canteen Opens Giant Detroit Operations Facility

DEARBORN, MICH .-- The country's newest food preparation and distribu-tion center designed to serve industry, business and institutions in the ex-panding Detroit market was formally opened here Nov. 21st by Canteen Corporation.



(Continued) efficiency. Martin touched upon their new Value Analysis Program which is designed to help factory personnel in eliminating unnecessary product costs and encouraging labor efficiency. He also revealed that a number of new machine innovations are currently getting the once-over from the Re-search & Development Dept. at Grand Rapids, some units being a complete departure from standard Rowe fare. Taber and company treasurer Jerry Marcus advised the distributors to align their credit policies with opera-tors on a more rational basis. Martin observed that credit allowances in the music industry are much too liberal,

observed that credit allowances in the music industry are much too liberal, saying: "a sale is not a sale until the customer pays for the product." He further advised distributors of their duty to help the operator in this re-gard and stated that a tighter con-trolled credit system invariably gains the loyalty of the operator as his books become "more realistic." NOOKS become "more realistic." Rowe regional sales representative O. J. Mullinix asked the distributors to "Get Professional," and the attitude will pass down to their operators. "If you're doing business the same as twenty years ago, it's about time to change," he stated. "Our new credit system works for everybody" he de-clared, "a good step toward profes-sionalism."

sionalism." Rowe's Dan Denman gave a well re-ceived address on his Sales Perform-ance Development service. This is a system whereby Rowe factory per-sonnel will go into the field to hold financial, sales and route operations seminars with distributor personnel and their operator customers. SPD will conduct such seminars as on the subject of "Eliminating Timekillers on the Route," for example. This will benefit the operating trade by pointing out the time gaps and other bugs in the routeman's daily routine and make his working day more profitable to his firm. his firm.

"Rowe is now prepared to help every individual in this trade to bring higher earning performance out of his business. It will assist opera-tors and thereby certainly create their loyalty to the Rowe distributor which directly affects factory sales."

After the formal presentation, in-depth seminars on the technical points of the new phonograph, the new PhonoVue film program, the Wall-Ette wallbox, as well as promotion and ad-vertising on the local level were held.




